INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1862.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the Penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the said Duties, who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

The following Rules for the blasting of Rocks, have been approved by the Government of Bombay:—

Rules for the Blasting of Rocks in or near any public Road, Street, Thoroughfare, or place in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, published under Section 20 of Act XLVIII of 1860.

1. No person shall blast any rock in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba without a Licence from the Commissioner of Police.
2. The holder or holders of this Licence shall produce it to any Officer of Police who may demand to see it.
3. The blasts at the said quarry shall be exploded only between the hours of 2 and 4 o'clock P.M.
4. Before the explosion of each blasting charge, a strong wooden lattice, sufficiently laden with stone, shall be placed immediately over the drift so as to prevent, as far as possible, the projection of fragments of stone by the explosion of the blasting charge.
5. The holder of this Licence shall employ such number of watchers as may be considered necessary by the Commissioner of Police to give warning to by-standers or passers-by of the intended explosion of each blasting charge.
6. If the safety or convenience of the public shall at any time appear to demand the alteration or revocation of this Licence, it shall be altered or revoked accordingly, as the Commissioner of Police may in his discretion see fit.

As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendants the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

The following Extract from a Report of a recent Survey of the Cocos Islands by Lieutenant JACKSON, I. N., Commander of the Bengal Government S. V. "Krishna," is published for general information:—

'On the morning of the 16th I hove to off Narcondam Island, with the peak bearing north (true) by azimuth, and observed its longitude west of Fort Cornwallis Flagstaff, Penang, $6^{\circ}02'48''$, and its latitude deduced from observation at noon by means of two patent log distances, $13^{\circ}27'00''$ north. The height above the level of the sea being 2,150 feet, and the variation 3° easterly.

From the above observations I find that Narcondam is placed about fourteen miles too far north in the Chart of the Bay of Bengal, published by Messrs. Allen and Company in London, 8th September 1857. This is obviously an oversight, as the latitude here given agrees with that of former observers.'
