#### Legislative Council.

#### 31st March 1855.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 31st March 1855, and referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 4th of June next :-

A Bill for the better Regulation of Buildings, and for the more effectually preventing Accidents by Fire within the Town of Calcutta.

Whereas it is expedient to repeal Act XII. of 1837, and to provide for the better Preamble.

regulation of buildings and for the more effectual prevention of accidents by fire within the said Town : It is enacted as follows :-

I. Act XII. of 1837 is hereby repealed, except as

Act repealed.

to any act or offence done or committed, or to any fine or

penalty incurred, or to any proceedings commenced before the passing of this Act.

II. No house or out-house which shall be built

Houses built after the passing of this Act not to be co-vered with an outer roof of combustible materials without the consent of the Commissioners.

within the Town of Calcutta after the passing of this Act shall be covered with an outer roof or covering of thatch or combustible materials, unless the consent of the Com-

missioners for the Improvement of the Town of Calcutta be obtained for that purpose.

III. It shall not be lawful for the owner or occupier

Houses not to be covered with an outer roof of com-bustible materials, without such consent, when rebuilt or repaired after the passing of this Act.

of any house or out-house, whether built before or after the passing of this Act, or whether at the time covered with an outer roof of thatch or other combustible mate-

rials or not, either in re-building, altering, repairing, or recovering the same, or on any occasion, or for any purpose whatever, to cover or cause or permit to be covered any such house or out-house, either wholly or in part with an outer roof or covering of thatch or other combustible materials, without the consent of the said Com-missioners first obtained for that purpose.

IV. It shall not be lawful for the owner or occupier

No house to have an outer roof of combustible materials after the 1st of January 1857.

of any house or out-house within the said Town which at the time of the passing of this Act has or is covered

with an outer roof of . thatch or other combustible materials, or for any person having control over the same, to suffer such roof or covering or any roof or covering of combustible materials to remain as the outer covering of the said house or out-house after the 1st day of January 1857.

V. Every person who, without such consent as aforesaid, shall cover or cause or Penalty.

house or out-house within the said Town wholly or in part with an outer roof of any combustible materials, or suffer an outer roof or covering of such material erected before the passing of this Act, or any roof or covering of combustible materials, to remain as an outer covering of the said house or out-house after the 1st day of January 1857, contrary to any of the provisions herein contained, and who shall not, within one week after notice given to him for that purpose, either remove the same or cover the same with an outer roof of incombustible materials, shall, on conviction before a Justice of the Peace, be liable to a fine not exceeding Company's rupces 100, or in default of payment thereof, to imprisomment for any term not exceeding one month. Provided that such notice as afore-Proviso.

said may be given by any per-

son or persons whatsoever, and that service of any such notice upon the said premises shall be deemed sufficient service of such notice.

VI. The said Commissioners are hereby empowered, 2

sent, by any writing signed by their Secretary or Surveyor for the time being, to the covering, either wholly or in part, any house or out-house within the said Town with an outer roof of thatch or other combustible materials or to the continuing of any such outer roof after the period herein before mentioned. But every such consent shall express the time for which it is to remain in force. And, after the expiration of such time, the owner or occupier of the said house or out-house suffering the said outer roof or covering of combustible materials to continue shall be liable to be proceeded against as if he had originally covered the said house with such roof or suffered the same to continue without such consent as aforesaid. But it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners from time to time to revoke or to renew such consent if they shall think fit.

VII. Upon any conviction under this Act, it shall

1. The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that from this date no Bills or Indents on account of Contingent charges in the Civil Department are to be forwarded to Government direct.

2. Charges on account of inevitable contingencies, that is, those details of expenditure which are the inevitable consequences of discharging authorised duties, or carrying on regularly sanctioned works, whether the rates be fixed by Regulation or depend on the fluctuation of market prices, may be sanctioned, and bills to any amount on account of them passed by the Civil Auditor, after due scrutiny, without reference to Government.

3. Contingent charges not coming under the above definition of inevitable contingencies, but which are, nevertheless, duly certified to be necessary to ensure full efficiency in carrying on authorised proceedings, may be sanctioned by the Civil Auditor, after he shall have satisfied himself of their expediency, to the extent of Rupees 500; and Indents and Bills on account of them may be passed by him accordingly, without reference to Government. Indents or Bills for charges of this nature which may exceed the amount of Rupees 500, are to be submitted by the Civil Auditor, with his opinion, for the orders of Government.

4. Subordinate Officers are to send their Indents and Bills for Contingent expenditure to the controlling Authorities of their respective Departments, and if approved by those Authorities, they are to be noted by them "Admissible," and forwarded to the Civil Auditor for audit or for sanction, or for submission to Government, as the case may require.

5. Heads of Offices who are under no controlling Authority, are to send their Indents and Bills for the Contingent expenditure of their respective Departments direct to the Civil Auditor, with a declaration at the foot of the former that the articles indented for are indispensably required for the purpose stated, and on the latter that the charges are faithful and just, and have been or will be bonå fide disbursed.

6. Indents and Bills passed by Heads of Departments invested with limited authority to sanction charges, will not, if the charges be within the limit of such authority, be liable, on account of their subject matter, to check by the Civil Auditor, who will, however, examine all such Bills in due course, and call the attention of Government to any apparent abuse of authority in this respect.

NOTIFICATION .- The Honorable the President of the Council of India in Council has been pleased to authorise the following addition to be made to Section XXI. of the Rules for the Management of the Post Office Department, passed on the 12th August 1854 :--

No Parcel shall be received for transmission by Bhangy Post unless it be securely packed in cloth or wax-cloth, or tin, and no such Parcel, packed in cloth or wax-cloth, shall be received unless Seals, bearing distinct impressions of some device (not that of a current coin), be fixed at intervals, not ex-. ceeding three inches, along the lines of sewing by which the cover is secured.

- 3rd .- The Packet must not exceed two feet in length, breadth, or width.
- 4th .- The name and address of the sender, and any words not in the nature of a Letter, may be written or printed upon the envelope or cover of the Packet, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom it may be forwarded.
- 5th.—The Books, &c. may be in any binding, mounting, or covering, whether such binding, &c. be loose or attached. In the case of Prints or Maps, Rollers may accompany them, and Markers, whether of paper or otherwise, may be sent with Books or other printed papers.
- 6th.—If a Book Packet be found to contain any enclosure which is sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any Letter, whether sealed or not, the Letter or other enclosure will be taken out and forwarded to the address on the Packet, charged with the full Postage as an unpaid Letter, together with an additional rate equal to the amount chargeable on a Book not exceeding half a pound in weight. The remainder of the Packet, if duly prepaid, will be forwarded without any extra charge.
- 7th .- If a Packet be not fully prepaid, according to its weight, but nevertheless bear Postage Stamps of the value of a single Book rate, it will not, as heretofore, become liable to the Letter rate of Postage, but will be forwarded charged with the deficient Book Postage, and an additional Book rate as a fine.
- 8th .- In the event of a Book Packet being posted altogether unpaid, or paid less than a single rate, it will be detained, and sent to the Dead Letter Office.

With the view to clear up any doubts that may exist, it is hereby notified, that no Packet of Newspapers can be despatched by Bhangy Dawk, at the rates of Postage provided for in Section XII. Act XVII. of 1854, unless the Postage be prepaid by Stamps; and that parties in the interior having Packets of Overland Newspapers sent to their address, from England or elsewhere, must either furnish their correspondents with Indian Stamps, or else employ an Agent at either of the Presidency Towns to receive, pay for, and re-post such Papers.

Not more than one Newspaper can be enclosed under one cover for despatch by Letter Dawk; and if a single Newspaper should exceed 12 tolas in weight, it will be forwarded by Bhangy Dawk, charged with Postage under Section VII. Act XVII. of 1854 (modified by the Notification by the Government of India dated 16th October 1854). If more papers than one are enclosed under one cover, they will, if not prepaid by Stamps, be sent by Bhangy Dawk, bearing Bhangy Postage.

If more Books (or Pamphlets) than one are enclosed under one cover, the Packet will be charged with Bhangy Postage. If only one Book (or Pamphlet) is so enclosed, Book Postage, according to Section XII. Act XVII. of 1854, only is leviable, and that must be prepaid by Stamps.

Prepayment of Postage on Newspapers sent by Letter Dawk is optional.

"Clause XFII.—The Delivery Peons are prohibited from going out of their usual course to deliver Letters, Papers, or Parcels, and from delivering them without immediate payment of the exact amount of Postage ; and they are not bound to give change. Should they be subject to detention, they are not to deliver the Letters, Papers, or Parcels, but to return them in the evening to the Post Oflice, for delivery the following day."

"Section XXXVII.—If any person shall refuse to pay any Postage which he is legally bound to pay for any Letter, or other article, the same may be recovered, by any Officer in charge of a Post Office, in the same manner as a fine may be recovered under this Act (*that is, by distress and sale of property*); and it shall be lawful to withhold from the person so refusing, until such Postage be paid, any other Letter or Packet addressed to that person."

2. No Letters will be delivered at the Post Office except on *immediate payment* of Postage; and any complaints that parties may have to make should be preferred, in the first instance, to the Deputy Post Master General.

As many Letters and Communications, having sole reference to the business of the Bombay Post Office, continue to come to the address of the Post Master General from Mofussil Offices, which ought to be addressed to the Deputy Post Master General in charge of the Bombay Post Office; and other Papers which ought to be directed to the Post Master General, are sent to the Deputy; and thereby much delay and inconvenience arises in the transaction of business : it is requested, with reference to the Advertisement in Government Gazette, dated the 21st November 1854, notifying that the business of the Bombay Office had been made over to the Deputy, that care be taken in addressing properly all Letters and Communications, either to the Post Master General, or to the Deputy Post Master General, according as the business to which they refer has to be attended to and disposed of by either. It is requested that instructions to this effect be issued to all subordinate Offices.

Parties who may desire to send or call at the Post Office for their Overland Letters, are requested to register their Names; otherwise the Letters will be sent out for delivery by the Post Office Peons. No Bearing Letters will be delivered except on *immediate* payment of the Postage.

## NOTIFICATION.

## FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

On and after 1st May next, all advances to the Executive Engineers, whether on account of salaries or works in progress, will be made from the Civil Treasuries only. Such advances will be charged to "Public Works Department."

2. The Civil Treasurers and Executive Engineers will exchange Receipts for the Balance Debtor on 30th April next, of the Executive Engineers' Account Current, the Civil Treasurer acknowledging the balance as paid into the Treasury on 30th April, and the Executive Engineer acknowledging the receipt of the amount as an advance on 1st May. These advances will be charged, as above directed, to "Public Works Department." The Civil Treasurers and Executive Engineers concerned are required to effect this promptly and carefully. The object is not only to charge the balances to "Public Works Department," which could be effected without the exchange of Receipts, but for a special purpose pertaining to this year only, to cause the Balances Debtor of the Executive Engineers' accounts to appear as advances of the year 1855-56.

3. Superintending Engineers, who may have received advances on account of salaries and establishment, are required similarly to repay any unadjusted balance remaining to their debit on 30th April next, and to take a fresh advance on 1st May.

4. The Military and Marine Accounts Current, closed on 30th April next, will be adjusted by repayment of the balance by means of advances taken, on or after 1st May, from the Civil Treasury for the purpose.

5. In supersession of existing restrictions in respect of advances to Executive Engineers, the following Rules are prescribed :----

6. The Civil Treasurers will advance, on demand, such sums not less than Rupees 300, and in even hundreds, as the Executive Engineer may certify to be necessary for his current sanctioned operations, without further detail, provided that after 31st October next no advance be made until the Executive Engineer's Account Current of the previous half year shall have been received correct, so far as the Civil Treasurer can determine.

7. The advances taken by the Executive Engineers will be adjusted by bills rendered to the Chief Engineer of Public Works for audit, and copies of the intimations of the amounts passed on audit to the credit of the Executive Officers will be sent by the Chief Engineer of Public Works to the Civil Treasurers concerned, to enable them to show the adjustment of the advances in their books.

8. Executive Engineers, from 1st May next, will render but one Account Current in the Public Works Department, without distinction of the several other departments to which the charges may belong.

9. The Chief Engineer of Public Works will open books of account in his Office, to be called "Public Works Account," which is to be a suspense account for ledgering, under such heads of charges as the Accountant General may prescribe, the sums passed by the Chief Engineer of Public Works to the credit of Officers of the Public Works Department.

10. The Chief Engineer of Public Works will submit to the Accountant General an annual statement of the actual receipts and disbursements of the Public Works Department, distinguishing in the receipts the amounts advanced from each several Treasury, and distinguishing the disbursements under the heads "Public Works Ordinary," and "Public Works Extraordinary," and "Cash Balance," with the other subordinate headings, according to the 11th paragraph of Extract No. 930 from the Proceedings of the Most Noble the Governor General of India in Council in the Financial Department, under date the 9th February 1855-This statement is to be rendered by the 1st August.

11. The Chief Engineer of Public Works will annually render to the Accountant General, on or before 1st May, as correct an estimate as can be conveniently framed <u>critic</u> expenditure of the Public Works Department of the ensuing year, under the several heads noted in the foregoing paragraph; and, on or before the 1st October, will render a corrected estimate, similarly framed.

12. When Executive Engineer Officers receive sums of money from extraordinary sources, such as the Sale of Stores (with the value of which the Executive Engineer has not been debited), or Travellers' Bungalow Fees, they are required to pay such sums into the Civil Treasuries, and to make an entry of the transaction in their. Accounts Current, debiting themselves with the receipt, and crediting themselves by the payment into the Treasury. These entries are necessary to ensure due account thereof by the Civil Treasury.
