"RESOLUTION.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the addition of the following Clause to Section VIII. of the Uncovenanted Absentee Rules:—

Clause 4.—If an Officer, while absent on leave under this Section, obtains an extension of leave on Medical Certificate, he will be liable for the whole period of his absence to the Rules applicable to leave on Medical Certificate.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

The following Summary of Construction of Income Tax Acts Nos. XXXII. and XXXIX. of 1860, published by the Government of India, is republished for general information:—

"FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

SUMMARY OF CONSTRUCTION OF INCOME TAX ACTS, Nos. XXXII. AND XXXIX. OF 1860.

When the Branch of a Banking or Trading Firm carries on an independent business, and a balance of profit and loss is struck by such Branch irrespectively of the accounts of the Head Firm, the Return of the actual profits made by such Branch should be delivered to the Assessor of the place where the Branch is established, and that Officer should proceed to make his assessment upon such Return.

Carried on at two or more places—
return of profits where to be delivered,
and assessment by whom to be made.

Act XXXII. of 1860. Section XLVII.
Section XCVIII.

Rules 36 and 42, and Section LII.

If the accounts of the Branch of a Banking or Trading Firm are incorporated in the accounts of the Head Office, and are taken into consideration in the general calculation of profit and loss made in that Office, the Returns of the Branch should still be delivered to the Assessor of the place in which the Branch is established, although in the proper Column no profits may be entered, but the remark that a balance of profit and loss had been struck at the Head Office of the Firm, mentioning the place where the Head Office is held. In any such case the

Assessor might accept the fact, and refrain from making any assessment; or if, in accordance with Section XLVII., Act XXXII. of 1860, he should declare that the Branch delivering such Return ought to be assessed, and the Collector of the District in which such Branch is established should assess the Branch in the exercise of the discretionary power vested in him by Section LII. of the said Act, the Head Office should have no difficulty in proving that the Return made by it included the profits derived from the transactions of such Branch, and in obtaining relief from the twofold assessment under the Rules for affording relief in cases of double assessments.—(*Financial Department Order, No. 97, dated 27th October 1860.*)

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1862.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the Penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the said Duties, who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

SIR,—I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 52, of the 12th ultimo; and in reply to inform you that when an officer is transferred from one station to another while absent on leave, he is entitled, unless he receives instructions to the contrary, to joining time in addition to the period of his leave, and such time, as well as his travelling allowance (if he is entitled to any under the rules), must be regulated by the distance from his old to his new station or from the place where he receives the order appointing him to his new station, whichever, in the case of joining time, is the nearest to his new station, and in the case of travelling allowance is least expensive to Government.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

Erratum.

The word "not" occurring in the 15th line of Section I. of Act II. of 1862, for extending the powers of Municipal Commissioners appointed under Act XXVI. of 1850 (published at page 24 of the Supplement to the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 4th April 1862) to be omitted, and the Section to be read as follows:—

I. It is hereby enacted that the Taxes raised under Act XXVI. of 1850 are, and shall be, applicable to the construction, support, and maintenance of any Hospital, Dispensary, or School, if such application be adopted by a majority consisting of two-thirds of the Members of the whole body of the Municipal Commissioners of the Town or Suburb: Provided always that it shall not be competent to the said Commissioners to expend annually the said Taxes to an extent exceeding in the whole 25 per cent. of the annual revenues of the Municipality for all or any of the three purposes last aforesaid, or to expend any portion thereof for such purposes without the approval of the Governor in Council.

MEDICAL DEPARTMENT.

Vernacular Class in the Grant Medical College.

An Examination for Admission into the Vernacular Class will be held at the Grant Medical College, at 11 A. M., on the 7th June next.

2. Candidates must be between the ages of 15 and 20 years, and physically fit for the duties of a Soldier.

3. They must possess a knowledge of the Marathi language in the Balbodh and Modi characters, sufficient to enable them to read and write letters and petitions, but a preference will be given to those who possess a competent knowledge of English.

4. No Candidate will be admitted who cannot produce a Certificate from a person of respectability, of character and conduct.

5. All students admitted must, as a condition of their appointment, reside, if required, within the College premises.

6. Students while at the College will receive the pay of First Grade Native Apprentices, viz. Rupees (8) eight per mensem.

7. They will remain in the College for three years, and, after successfully passing their examination, will be appointed Second Hospital Assistants.

8. All Native Apprentices now in the Service, whose acquirements may entitle them to appear at the Examination, and who may desire to be examined, will be admitted to examination, and preference will be given to them over other Candidates.

9. The power of dismissal for misconduct or incompetence is vested in the Principal of the College. A report of the dismissal of any Student will, however, be made to the Principal Inspector General.

10. The final Examination of Students of the Vernacular Class will be conducted by the Principal and Professors.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Financial Department, No. 2569, dated 31st March 1862, is published for the information and guidance of all heads of Departments:—

“Circular from Colonel H. M. DURAND, C. B., Officiating Secretary to the Government of India, Foreign Department, to Secretary to Government, Punjab; Officiating Chief Commissioner, Oude; Chief Commissioner, Central Provinces; Chief Commissioner, British Burmah; Officiating Commissioner, Mysore; Officiating Commissioner, Coorg; Agent, Central India; Agent, Rajpootana; Agent, N. E. Frontier; Officiating Political Agent, Rewah; Political Agent, Turkish-Arabia; Political Agent, Manipoor; Resident, Hyderabad; Resident, Nepal; General Superintendent Thuggee, and Agent King of Oude, &c., &c., No. 587, dated Fort William, 15th March 1862.

To enable this Office to furnish to the Financial Department information which that Department requires, and to prevent the growing evil of routine references, it is directed that whenever application for sanction to expenditure of any kind whatever is made to this Office, such full information be given as to the amount, dates, &c. of expenditure as may enable the Financial Department to ascertain precisely the effect of the sanctions on the expenditure of the year.

GENERAL.

2. Some of the most constantly recurring points on which information should be given, are noted in the enclosed Memorandum. Others may suggest themselves in particular cases.

3. Information on the points to which this letter refers should be given in a separate Memorandum or Postscript, and distinct from any letter to this Office, stating the merits of the case in which sanction to expenditure is solicited.

MEMORANDUM.

In applications for Pensions.

1. Date from which it is to be paid.
2. Whether provided for in Budget.

In applications for Jagheers.

1. Whether revenue of Jagheer was credited in Budget.
2. If so, to what extent and in what manner Budget will be affected.

In applications for Salaries, Establishments, &c.

1. Dates from which respective charges are to take effect.

No. 336 of 1862.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 2nd May 1862, No. 494, is republished:—

“The following paragraphs of a Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 124 of the 24th March 1862, are published for general information:—

1. With your letter* dated the 8th January last, you transmit correspondence relative to promotions to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the Artillery, so long as there are second Officers of that rank borne upon the Rolls of the Corps. In your communication to the Commander in Chief, dated 4th January, you express an opinion that it is not intended to retain the five Supernumerary Lieutenant Colonels since the seconding of Colonels and Lieutenant Colonels has been discontinued.

2. I presume that the number of Supernumerary Officers alluded to refers to the Field Officers, that is, both to Colonels and Lieutenant Colonels.

3. I am informed that the Supernumerary Lieutenant Colonels in the Royal Artillery are to be absorbed into the Regiment as vacancies occur. This is to be done in accordance with the principle laid down for the reduction of the Supernumerary General Officers in the Royal Warrant of 6th October 1854, Clause 4, viz., by making only one promotion for every three vacancies.

4. A similar Rule must be established with regard to the Indian Artillery.

5. Promotions may be made in succession to Lieutenant Colonel Sir R. Shakespear. The two next vacancies among the Lieutenant Colonels will lapse, should there be that number of seconded Officers of the same grade at the time of their occurrence.

6. This arrangement should be notified for general information.

No. 338 of 1862.—The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that from the 31st July next the Pay Offices at Mhow and Belgaum shall cease to exist, and that Majors Scott and Warden will proceed to wind up and finally close all the transactions of their respective Offices as quickly as possible, under detailed instructions which they will receive from the Controller of Military Finance.

2. The abolition of these two Pay Offices necessitates the redistribution of the following Stations; which will be paid as below provided for, from and after the 1st August, and all Officers and Departments concerned are directed to use their best endeavours to transmit their Abstracts as soon as practicable after the close of each month (commencing with those for July) to the proper Pay Office:—

No. 346 of 1862.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 5th May 1862, No. 501, is republished :—

"The following paragraphs of a Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 133 of the 31st March 1862, are published for general information :—

Paragraph 1. 'I have received and considered in Council your letter No. 375, dated 31st December 1861, transmitting correspondence relating to a Memorial from Lieutenant Williams, 13th Madras Native Infantry, praying for admission to the Madras Staff Corps, notwithstanding that he has not passed the prescribed examination in Hindustani.

2. 'Paragraphs 69, 72, 73, 74, 75, of your General Order of the 10th April 1861, No. 332, offer the privilege of joining the Staff Corps to Officers now holding Staff appointments upon certain conditions. Paragraph 72 requires of them simply that they do not possess the substantive rank of Colonel.

3. 'Paragraph 75 declares that those whose tenure of Staff appointment, at the time of transfer to the Staff Corps, shall have exceeded one year, will not be subjected to probation or to any introductory test other than those already prescribed for any Department in which they may be serving.

4. 'Paragraph 73 admits to the Staff Corps Officers who have held Staff appointments within the last three years, upon the understanding that they shall have passed the prescribed examination in Hindustani, and did not lose their appointment through misconduct.'

5. 'In paragraph 75 it is also declared that the option of joining the Staff Corps will be open to those Officers only who may be considered by the Government under which they are serving to be in all respects fit for the Staff Corps.'

6. 'It appears that Lieutenant Williams has been for some years Adjutant of his Corps, having passed the examination required in Madras for such appointment. A case has been also brought to my notice (and there may be other similar cases) of an Officer in Bombay, who has been actually employed upon the general Staff having passed in a Vernacular language, common to the whole or a large portion of that Presidency, though not in Hindustani.'

7. 'It would appear hard if, by a too strict and literal application of the rule regarding the Hindustani language, the privilege of joining the Staff Corps on its first formation should be denied to Officers who have been already pronounced by their own Government qualified for certain Staff situations, and have performed their duties well therein.'

8. 'Taking these circumstances into consideration, as also the necessity of adopting and enforcing one uniform rule in future for all Staff Officers in regard to the examination in Hindustani, I have determined that in cases of both kinds,—that is, where an Officer has qualified for a Staff employment or Department, as Lieutenant Williams appears to have done by passing the prescribed examination for that Office or Department, and also in the case of an Officer whose proficiency in any language other than Hindustani has already been accepted as the qualification for general Staff, such Officers, if coming under the terms of paragraph 69 of your General Order No. 332 of the 10th April 1861, may be appointed to the Staff Corps under paragraphs 72 and 73 of that Order, provisionally, and with the understanding that they pass the examination in Hindustani required for general staff within six months from the date of their appointment to that Corps, failing which they will revert to their former Corps and position in the Service.'

Paragraph 1. 'I have received and considered in Council your letter No. 44, dated the 8th February 1862, containing your decision on the following question submitted by the Government of Bombay regarding the Staff Corps:—

'*Question 130.**—An Officer proceeded to England on Medical Certificate in 1857; and, according to the New Furlough Regulations, was entitled to retain his appointment for a period of fifteen months.

Answer 130.—This Officer is entitled to reckon for Staff Service the period of fifteen months during which he was on leave.

'As he did not return on the expiration of that period, and consequently lost his appointment, are the fifteen months thus passed to be considered as Staff employ, so as to bring that Officer under the operation of paragraph 73? or, as he did not rejoin his appointment at the expiration of his leave, and can hardly be said to have held an appointment within the last three years, is he debarred from entering the Staff Corps?'

2. 'I am unable to approve the answer given, as it is not in accordance with the decision communicated to you in my Despatch No. 315, dated the 9th August 1861, which stated that "no leave of absence, either on the Staff Service required by the Royal Warrant as a qualification for promotion in the Staff Corps." An Officer may, however, be considered as having been on Staff employ for the period in question, so far as his claim to admission to the Staff Corps is concerned.'

'Letter dated 16th November 1861, No. 299.

Paragraph 35. 'Paragraph 54. According to the usage in India, Chaplains have not hitherto been considered entitled to share in Prize Money.'

'55. It is stated, however, to be the practice at Chelsea Hospital to allow of their sharing in Prize property. I am of opinion that a similar rule must be established in India.

'56. The revised scale of distribution of Prize Money commencing with the distribution of the Delhi booty, the right of Chaplains to share is to commence from the same date.'

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

The Alleppee Light will be known to Mariners as a revolving Light producing a bright flash once every minute.

The Lantern is elevated 131 feet above the level of the sea. In clear weather the flashes of the Light will be seen at the distance of six Leagues, and at lesser distances, according to the state of the atmosphere, and to a near observer in favourable circumstances the Light will not wholly disappear between the flashes.

The anchorage in the roads is with the Light Bearing from N.E. to E.N.E. in four to four and a half fathoms soft mud where the water is perfectly smooth.

“His Excellency the Governor General in Council considers that the system of permanent advances on account of Charges for Telegraph Messages may, with advantage, be introduced, and resolves that a permanent advance of 1-12th of their estimated requirements for the year shall be made to the several heads of Offices and Departments who will retain the same while in office, and on leaving, pay it over to their successors, or render an account thereof. the Current Charges on account of Telegraph Messages should be paid out of the advance. At the end of the month, a bill should be submitted in the ordinary course to the Civil Pay Master; after audit the amount should be recovered at the Treasury, and thus a sum equal to 1-12th of the grant for the year will be available in each Month.”

2nd.—The advances are to be debited in one sum in the accounts of Treasury Officers to the head of “Advances for Service Messages by Telegraph,” and exhibited in the Plus and Minus Memorandum, and the Officers to whom they may be made will write a note at the foot of their monthly Bills for Telegraphic Message charges to the following effect:

“Note.—The above Charges were defrayed from the permanent advance of Rupees I hold for the purpose of paying such Charges.”

3rd.—As the advance will be a permanent one, no adjustment thereof, except the original debit, will be requisite.
