Anchorage around the village, including the shores on both sides thereof within 50 yards of high-water mark spring-tides, and from the mouth of the Creek, West to East up to Maria Creek as far as the same is navigable, including the shores on both sides thereof within 50 yards of high-water mark spring-tides, also the anchorage in the offing of Gorye, inclusive of Kutownee Creek situated South-East of the former named village.

Versoah.

From the Fort of Mhur on the North to Bhaindurwarra on the South, including the shores on both sides thereof within 50 yards of high-water mark spring-tides, and from the mouth of the Creek, West to East, up to Ratowdee Creek as far as the same is navigable, including the shores on both sides thereof within 50 yards of high-water mark spring-tides; also the anchorage in the offing of Mhur.

To the ADJUTANT GENERAL.

SIR,—With reference to your letter No. $\frac{23}{E}$, dated 13th January last, I am directed to acquaint you, for the information of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, that the Right Honourable the Governor General in Council sanctions the payment by Government to Regimental Agents of the value of all servicable unissued Soldiers' necessaries which may be now in store with British Regiments, the payment being made through the Officers Commanding the Corps, who will be required to account for the same as the articles are issued.

2. It is of course understood that the necessaries so taken over by Government will be brought into use before any which may be hereafter received.

3. I am to request that a Committee may be assembled at the Head Quarters of each Regiment to examine the necessaries in store, a list of which, with the Committee's Report, should be attached to the bill, and the latter should be sent to the Examiner of Clothing Accounts for audit.

4. The price of the necessaries issued must be credited in the Regimental accounts monthly by the Paymaster or Officer Commanding the Battery.

5. Forms of the returns of Regimental necessaries in store, received and issued, will be supplied by the Controller of Military Accounts to Officers Commanding Regiments and Batteries.

"No. 507 of 1864.—The following transcript of a Military letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 152, dated 16th May 1864, is published for general information:—

"INDIA OFFICE: London, the 16th May 1864.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—Paragraph 1. In connection with the subject of the re-organization of the Medical Service in India, Her Majesty's Government have, for some time past, had under consideration the present state and future prospects of the Indian Medical Service in regard to promotion, and the system of payment to the Medical Officers of the Indian Army and those of the British Army serving in that country.

2. A final decision upon the arrangements connected with the future provision of Medical Officers for service in India has been delayed from unforeseen and unavoidable causes, but will be communicated to you very shortly.

3. In the meantime, Her Majesty's Government have determined upon the adoption of certain measures affecting the interest of the present service, in regard both to pay and promotion.

4. It has been found by experience, that the promotion to the rank of Surgeon in the Indian service has been much slower than the same in the British service, and although this is in a great measure attributable to augmentations that have been made of late years in the latter, the difference therefore being in a measure temporary, it may in some degree be attributed to the difference which has hitherto existed in the relative numbers of the two grades in the two cases. In the British Medical Department I find the proportion which the Assistant Surgeons bear to the senior grades is as 641 to 355, while in the Indian service it has been hitherto—

5. To carry out the assimilation in this respect, would require therefore the promotion of Assistant Surgeons in India to the following extent:—

6. You are authorized to make these promotions from the date of the receipt of this Despatch. The establishment of Medical Officers above the rank of Assistant Surgeon in the three Presidencies will, so long as there are Officers enough remaining on the old lists to complete these numbers, be fixed—

7. With a view of removing all cause of complaint and misunderstanding on the part of the Officers of the Indian Medical Service, on the subject of their promotion to the rank of Surgeon-Major, under the Royal Warrant of 13th January 1860, Her Majesty's Government have determined to give retrospective effect to that Warrant, and to cause all promotions made under its authority to be dated from the 1st October 1858, being the date of the Royal Warrant for the British Medical Department, and it has been further determined to modify the instructions conveyed to you in my Despatches, No. 397, dated 31st October 1860, and No. 386, dated 30th September 1861, and to permit the period of service, qualifying Surgeons for the rank of Surgeon-Major under that Warrant, to be calculated from date of first commission, including all leave of absence of whatever kind.

8. It has been further resolved, that the following change in the mode of payment of Officers serving in India, whether of the British or Indian Medical Department, shall be introduced from the date of the receipt of this Despatch.

9. From that date the allowance of head money, as well as that for medical charge of British Regiments and Brigades, will be discontinued, excepting in the case of Assistant Surgeons, who will receive, while in actual charge of British Regiments or Brigades of Artillery, a special allowance of Rupees 150 per mensem in addition to their pay.

10. The following will be the rate of pay for Officers of the several grades in the Medical Department, below that of Inspector and Deputy Inspector General, who receive special salaries, whether belonging to the British or the local service:—

11. Surgeons of Her Majesty's Service, not being Surgeon-Majors, who may be in medical charge of Regiments or Brigades at the date of publication of the order, will not be affected by this rule, but will continue to receive their pay and allowances while attached to such regiments as heretofore.

12. Officers of the British Medical Department attached to Brigades of Horse Artillery and Regiments of British Cavalry, will draw, in addition to the rate of pay above laid down, Horse Allowance at the following rate:—

14. The rule regarding pension, at present applicable to the Officers of the India: Medical Service, will remain in force with the following modification:—

15. Officers compelled to leave the service on account of ill health, and entitled to half pay pension under present Regulations, will be allowed the half pay of their relative rank, as laid down in the Royal Warrant, dated the 1st October 1858. This rule will apply to all Officers retiring upon half pay pension from a date subsequent to the receipt of this Despatch.

16. Pending a further communication upon the subject of the Medical Service in India, Officers of the British or Indian Medical Service holding staff appointments, the salaries of which are consolidated, will continue to draw their salaries as at present; and all Officers of the Indian Medical Department in the receipt of staff salaries, including such as are in medical charge of Native Regiments, will continue to draw the aggregate amount of pay and staff allowances they now receive, provided it be not less than the rate of pay laid down in the above table for Officers of their rank and standing in the service.

17. In communicating to the Secretary of State for War the proposal to adopt the above modification, in the mode of payment of British Medical Officers in India, I expressed an opinion that, considering the extent to which the strength of regiments of British Infantry had been lately reduced, the number of Assistant Surgeons with their corps might, with propriety, be reduced from three to two, the reserve of Medical Officers of the British Army, which it is proposed to maintain to meet the demands of the British Army in India generally, being so calculated as to ensure at least that number of Officers being at all times available with each regiment.

18. The Secretary of State for War has consented to this reduction, upon the understanding that it shall be considered an experimental arrangement, and that the Staff Assistant Surgeons constituting the reserve shall be considered as forming part of the Medical Staff at the disposal of the Military authorities.

19. The establishment of Staff Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons of Her Majesty's service at present allowed is as follows:—

1	Inspector General of Hospitals.

10	Staff Surgeons.
30	Staff Assistant Surgeons.

20. You will consider and report at an early date whether this number of Assistant Surgeons will suffice, under the present arrangement, to ensure the constant supply of two Assistant Surgeons to the whole of Her Majesty's Regiments, or what increase may be required for that purpose.

"No. 508 of 1864.—The Despatch published in the foregoing order having been received at Simla on the 15th instant, the change in the mode of payment of Medical Officers serving in India, directed in paragraph 8, will come into effect from that date.

2. The Governments of Madras and Bombay will be pleased to make the promotions authorized in paragraphs 5 and 6 of the Despatch of the Secretary of State, with effect from the 15th June 1864, and those Governments will be further pleased to make alterations of rank in the grade of Surgeon Major, rendered necessary by paragraph 7 of the Despatch.

3. Rolls of promotions and alterations of rank, rendered necessary in Bengal, will be submitted by His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, to Government, as soon as may be practicable."

"No. 509 of 1864.—With reference to paragraph 10 of the Despatch published in G. O. No. 507, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct, pending further orders from the Secretary of State, that Inspectors General or Deputy Inspectors General of Hospitals in India, when not in receipt of the allowances of those appointments, shall draw pay at the rates laid down for a Surgeon Major, of twenty or twenty-five years' service, respectively, according to their length of service.

2. With reference to paragraph 12 of the same Despatch, His Excellency in Council is pleased to direct that, until further orders, Rupees 60 per mensem shall be passed as horse allowance to Medical Officers serving with Regiments of Native Cavalry, in addition to the pay laid down in paragraph 10 of the Despatch.

SIR,—With reference to my Despatches, dated the 24th February and 18th ultimo, Nos. 55 and 82, respecting the formation of an additional Brigade of Royal Horse Artillery, and the embarkation this season for India of two Batteries of the 1st Horse Brigade to relieve two Batteries of the 2nd, I have to inform you, that Her Majesty has been pleased to approve of the designation of the several Brigades of Horse Artillery being changed; and that the six Horse Brigades, including that which with a view to furnishing the Indian reliefs it has been determined to form, by the division of the present 1st Brigade, into two, shall be severally called A, B, C, D, E, and F Brigade.

2. The two Brigades which are formed out of the existing Batteries of the 1st Brigade will retain their present positions in the corps, and will be styled A and B Brigades, and the Brigades at present in India will become—

2nd (Bengal)	C Brigade.
3rd (Madras)	D do.
4th (Bombay)	E do.
5th (Bengal)	F do.

3. I have to request that you will communicate the subject of this Despatch to the Governments of Madras and Bombay, respectively.

'INDIA OFFICE : London; the 16th May 1864.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—Paragraph 1. In my Despatches of the dates noted in the margin regarding the absorption of the Supernumerary Field Officers of Artillery, it was stated that the reduction was to be effected by making only one promotion for every three vacancies.

2. This direction was given on information received from the War Office as to the mode in which it was intended to carry out the reduction in the old Royal Artillery. I am now informed, however, by the Secretary of State for War, that there was a clerical error in the letter addressed to this office on the subject, and that the intention was to absorb one Supernumerary Field Officer in every three vacancies, the other two vacancies being filled up by promotion.

3. A similar course is to be followed as regards the Officers of the new Brigades of Artillery. As stated in my Despatch, dated 30th January 1864, No. 26, the absorption is not to commence in the case of these Officers until it has been completed in the case of the Officers of the other Brigades.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—I have considered in Council your Military letter, dated 5th November last, No. 314, on the subject of the admission to the Invalid Pension List of Warrant Officers holding Commissions on the Veteran Establishment.

2. It appears to have been the practice to transfer such Officers, when declared unfit for further service, to the Invalid Pension Establishment, not on the proper allowance fixed for that Establishment, but on the pay and allowances fixed for Officers of the Invalid Establishment with the addition of Extra Batta. This is a very objectionable arrangement.

3. I have recently addressed the Government of Madras on the subject of the retiring allowances of Officers of the Veteran Establishment. A copy of my Despatch will have reached you in due course, and I desire that it may meet with the attention of your Government.

4. I shall not object to the transfer of such Officers to the Invalid Establishment when pronounced unfitted for the discharge of their duties, nor to an exception being made in their favor to the rule of that Establishment requiring certified fitness for the performance of garrison duty as a qualification for admission ; but I cannot sanction, in such cases, the grant of higher allowances than those drawn by the other Officers of the same Establishment.

5. When Officers of the Veteran Establishment return to England on retirement, their pensions will be governed by the rules laid down in my Despatch, dated 24th March 1862, No. 115, published in General Order, by your Government, No. 550, dated 19th May 1862.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

Registered Letters.—The attention of the Public is called to the following paragraph 17 of the Rules for Registering letters at Post Offices :—

“ Paragraph 17. A letter containing Bank Notes, Postage Stamps, or other valuable articles, should, as a rule, be registered, and should be securely folded, or enclosed in a substantial envelope, and *always sealed with wax*, in order to prevent, as far as possible, its being tampered with.”

No Afternoon Delivery during the Monsoon.—During the Monsoon there will be only two deliveries of Letters and Papers issued from this office, at 9 A. M. and 1 P. M. daily.

The Letter Boxes over the Island of Bombay will in consequence be cleared at 10 A. M. and 5 P. M., excepting on Sundays, when there will be one delivery at noon and one clearance of the Letter Boxes at 3 P. M.

Samples of Merchandise by Post.—An arrangement has been made with the London Post Office for sending Patterns of Merchandise by Post between India and the United Kingdom, under the rules and at the rates of Postage indicated below. The arrangement will commence as regards despatches from India from the 1st May next. Intimation has been received from the London Post Office that the arrangement will commence as regards despatches thence from the 1st April.

1. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value. The rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own apart from its mere use as a Pattern. The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples, however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any explosive or dangerous substance will of course be applicable to Patterns, and no article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags is to be sent.

5. No Pattern Packet can be received if it exceeds two feet in length, width, or depth, or 3 lbs. in weight.

6. The Inland Transit of Pattern Packets will be by Banghy Post.

7. The following Postage rates (prepaid by a Stamp or Stamps) will be charged on Pattern Packets sent under these regulations by Post to the United Kingdom. The rates being consolidated rates, no Inland Postage is leviable in addition:—

8. If the Packets be *prepaid with a single rate of Postage* (as given in Column 1 of the above Table), the full rate chargeable being more, they will be forwarded charged with the deficient Postage, together with an additional single rate.

9. If the Packets be *prepaid with less than a single rate of postage*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage, less the amount actually paid.

10. If the Packets be *wholly unpaid*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage.

N.B.—In respect to Inland Transit the general conditions for Patterns are similar to those for Book Packets, and they will be treated like Book Packets.

If received unpaid or insufficiently paid from the United Kingdom, they will be charged at the rates mentioned in Paras. 8, 9, and 10 of the foregoing notice.
