FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1865.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices in the Town Barracks, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

ACCOUNT.

Deposit Accounts not to be opened with Civil Treasuries.

Read extract from Resolution passed by the Government of India, in the Financial Department, No. 1721, dated 6th August 1864.

Resolution.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council having observed that in one instance, an Officer who obtained Letters of Credit which lapsed monthly, drew the full amount of the Letters, and placed it in a Deposit Account, desires that it may be announced in continuation of the new rules for issue of Letters of Credit and banking with Government Treasuries (vide Public Works Circular, No. 51 of 1864), that officers of the Public Works Department are prohibited from opening any Deposit Account with Civil Treasuries or State Banks, other than the Drawing Account for amount of Letters of Credit provided for in that Circular. All payments made by an Officer of the Public Works Department to a Treasury or State Bank must be final payments to credit of Public Works Department, and once made cannot be withdrawn. Refunds of such payments into the Treasury can only be made by a charge against the Drawing Account, which must be brought forward by the Executive Engineer in his regular monthly accounts.

Order.-Ordered, that copies of the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to the Local Governments and Administrations noted in the Governments of Madras, Bombay, Bengal, N. W. P., and Punjab. margin for information and guidance. Governor, Straits Settlements.

I am instructed to forward for your information, the Circular transcribed in the margin, issued under the orders of His

No. 70 M. n., dated 10th August 1864.

"Officers in command of Divisions and Districts are requested in future to refer all matters appertaining to the Public Works Department, in which Executive Officers of Stations may differ with them, or represent inability to effect, first, for consideration and orders to the immediate departmental superiors of these officers (Superintending Engineers), a course, which it is expected, will, in most instances, obviate the necessity for references to Army Head Quarters,—Local, and the Supreme Governments.

2. All documents of the above nature forwarded to the Quarter Master General are to have noted thereon that this Circular has been duly complied with."

Excellency the Comman-der-in-Chief, to Officers in Command of Divisions and Districts, in view to obviating the necessity for the many references and complaints made on trifling matters, capable of settlement on the spot, to Army Head Quarters.

Sir Hugh Rose would feel obliged by your co-operation in the matter; as doubtless a proper understanding between General Officers in command, and Superintending Engineers, would much tend to facilitate the harmonious working of Departments and the public service.

No. 480 of 1864.—In order to regulate the transmission of Public Stores through the agency of the Commissariat Department, and to prevent the necessity for employing troops on Escort duty during the rainy season, it is directed that Departments and Corps requiring stores to be transmitted by sea, shall make them over between the 1st October and 30th April, and by land between the 1st October and 31st March. In ordinary cases stores will not be received or despatched after the above dates.

When it may be necessary to set aside the above rule, the packing accounts are to be accompanied by an explanation of the necessity from the despatching officer countersigned by the Head of the Department; and if an Escort be required, a Report is to be sent to the Quarter Master General, who under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief will communicate the same to the Commissary General.

The above order does not apply to the despatch of stores by Rail or by Government Vessels.

Sin,—With reference to correspondence received from the War Office, relative to the pay of Soldier Students in the Normal College at Sanawur, who are about to be appointed Schoolmasters on the completion of their course of training, I have to inform you, that I have approved of the course proposed by the Secretary of State for War, viz., that the Soldier Students in the Normal Schools in India, should, unless they accept the Regulations in regard to pay, when appointed provisional School Masters, viz., 3s. per diem, be permitted to return to their respective Regiments.

"No. 498 of 1864.—The Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased to sanction the grant of subsistence allowance and other authorized privileges to the families of soldiers volunteering from Regiments going Home, who may in their new Regiment, be in excess of the prescribed complement of twelve married men per cent. No further increase is, however, to be permitted in a Regiment until the proportion is reduced to twelve per cent, and the privilege is not to be extended to families who might not have been in receipt of subsistence allowance in their former Regiments.

This order is to have effect in the three Presidencies.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

Sir,-I have received and considered in Council the correspondence (forwarded with paragrap's 1 of your letter of the 22nd February last) relating to the grant of the allowance of £5, in lieu of No. 79. furlough, to men whose Regiments are under orders to return home.

2. In my Despatch of the 25th March 1863, No. 115, I informed you that this allowance was not issuable

to men who re-engage while their Regiments are under orders to return home.

- 3. The Military Finance Department have suggested that as five Regiments of Infantry are to be relieved annually, the first five on the roster should be considered as under orders for home, but you are of opinion with His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, that the furlough bounty should be passed to all men who re-engage before their Regiments receive official intimation that they are to return home.
 - 4. In this opinion I concur-
- 5. With regard to the other questions contained in the paragraph of your Despatch, I consider that the allowance, in question, may be granted to the two classes of men referred to, viz., to men belonging to Regiments under orders for home who re-engage for other Regiments remaining in India, and to men similarly circumstanced who re-engage into their own corps, but when the latter leave India, volunteer into Regiments remaining in that country.
 - 6. In both of these cases, the payment of the £5 should be made in arrears after the volunteering.

'No. 206 of 5th June 1862. - With reference to the Circular Memorandum, dated Horse Guards 11th of March 1862, No. 189, containing instructions relative to Serjeant Master Tailors for Regiments of Foot Guards and Battalions of Infantry of the Line, His Royal Highness the General Commanding in Chief desires it to be understood, that no charge is to be made against the soldier for fitting his clothing for the current military year, as, in regiments not yet supplied with a Master Tailor, under the new regulations, the Secretary of State for War will admit a sums not exceeding-

8d. for each Tunic; 3d. for each pair of cloth Trowsers, and

2d. for each pair of serge Trowsers, as a charge against the public.

'His Royal Highness would take this opportunity of explaining, that when a Master Tailor is appointed to a Depôt Battalion under terms of the Circular above quoted, he may, when an opportunity offers, be transferred annually in rotation to each of the depôts composing it, so as to distribute the loss of a Duty Serjeant fairly throughout the Battalion, and not press unduly on any particular depot.'

'In the case of regiments serving abroad, the Service Companies of which may already have a suitable man for the appointment of Master Tailor with them, and who could not on that account undergo the necessary examination at Pimlico, application may be made for his being confirmed in his appointment, provided the Officer Commanding will certify that he considers him in every respect a man thoroughly qualified for the duties he will be required to perform.

2. Particular attention is called to the explicit ruling that the Serjeant Master Tailor is not to be in addition to the establishment of a regiment; and that when such an appointment is made, one Duty Serjeant is to be returned

3. The salary or allowance for fitting and altering the annual clothing is to be passed at the rate of Rs. 440 per annum for each regiment of British Cavalry and Infantry, and will include all charges for fitting, altering and buttoning the annual clothing, as also for sewing on badges.

4. For broken periods, the allowance will be passed to such extent as the Commanding Officer may consider equitable with reference to the work actually performed, and with special provision that the total annual payment, either as salary or fitting rates, does not exceed the aggregate of Rs. 440 per regiment.

5. In regiments to which Master Tailors are not appointed, the cost of altering, fitting, and buttoning the clothing will, from the 18th July 1864, be defrayed at the public expense, at rates not exceeding the following scale for all arms :-

In the abstracts to be submitted in duplicate by corps serving in India, Officers and men now with regiments are to be drawn for; a separate Roll being also required on account of Officers who have left India from whatever cause, and for soldiers deceased, discharged, or invalided, care being taken that in every case correct regimental numbers be given.

4. Officers who obtained their first payment of Prize on separate bills, under their own signatures, will not be required to submit fresh bills. On application to the Examiner Prize Accounts, they will be furnished with a printed notification duly filled up, on presentation of which to the nearest Pay-master, payment will be made.

5. The above order in no way affects the duties of the several station Prize Committees, who will continue to submit claims, in duplicate, as heretofore, and at all stations where it is known clamaints are residing, Committees for the investigation of such claims should be convened without delay.

6. Great care should be observed in obtaining recipients' receipts for sums paid, and receipts for amounts above Rs. (20) twenty must bear a one anna stamp.

"No. 788 of 1864.—Under authority from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, His Excellency the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to declare the following Horse Guards' Circulars Nos. 189 and 206 of 11th March and 5th June 1862, applicable to India from the 18th July 1864:—

No. 189, duted 11th March 1862.—It having been brought to the notice of His Royal Highness the General Commanding-in-Chief that a difficulty is often experienced in procuring competent Master Tailors in Regiments of Foot Guards and Battalions of Infantry of the Line, the following instructions on the subject have, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for War, been approved; and His Royal Highness desires that they may be adhered to whenever Officers Commanding may think fit to apply for the special culistment of Serjeant Master Tailors.'

'The Officer Commanding, having found a competent tradesman willing to enlist on the prescribed terms, will apply to the Adjutant General for permission for his examination as regards his trade, at the Royal Army Clothing Factory at Pimlico.'

'Should he pass the required examination, an application for his special enlistment as Serjeant Master Tailor will be addressed to the Adjutant General, accompanied with the certificate of the Superintendent of the Royal Army Clothing Factory.'

'The Serjeant Master Tailor is not to be in addition to the Establishment of the Corps, but will take the place of a Duty Serjeant, of which rank he will receive the pay and allowances, and his service will be allowed to reckon as Serjeant's service towards claim to pension; on discharge, he will be subject in all matters of discipline, to the provisions of the Mutiny Act, and Articles of War, and to the Rules and Regulations of Her Majesty's Service, and will be liable to be reduced for misconduct.'

'Whenever a Master Tailor is appointed under this arrangement, the sum of one shilling hitherto allowed for the alteration of each suit of clothing will cease, and neither the public nor the soldier will henceforth be liable for this charge; but in addition to the regimental pay and allowances of a Serjeant, the Serjeant Master Tailor will receive a salary at the rate of £44 a year. This salary, which will be paid by the public, will be drawn by the Commanding Officer in such sums as he may think fit, and is to be withheld until the completion of the fitting of the annual clothing to the satisfaction of the Officer Commanding, except as regards such payments as may be actually due to the workmen employed to effect the necessary alterations, when advances on account of salary may be made on the certificate of the Commanding Officer.'

The Serjeant Master Tailor will be prohibited from entering into any contract for the provision of volunteer or other clothing.'

'He will be allowed to have the assistance of men from the ranks on the usual terms for regimental purposes, but not otherwise.'

Copy of Treasury Minute, dated 8th June 1864.

My Lords have before them the Report of the Commission on Army Prize.

Their Lordships have again under their consideration the whole of the correspondence on the subject of the Kitwee and Banda Booty, and advert to the paragraph in the Treasury letter of the 2nd March last to the India Office, intimating the opinion of this Board that it would be advisable to suspend a final decision respecting the the Booty in question, until after the Report of the Commission.

My Lords observe that since the date of their Minute of 14th March 1863, in which they expressed their opinion regarding the principle on which the Kirwee and Banda Booty should be distributed, several claims have been preferred for a participation in the grant under the terms of that Minute, with regard to which claims the authorities in this country and in India are not agreed, and considering the general recommendation of the Prize Commission that disputed claims should be referred to the High Court of Admiralty, under the Act 3rd and 4th Vic. cap. 65. My Lords have come to the conclusion that the adoption of that course will under all circumstances be the most satisfactory in the present case.

With this view they have caused a draft of an order in Council to be prepared which is now read at the Board, signifying the pleasure of Her Majesty that the Booty of War captured, during the operations for the suppression of the repellion in Central India, and which has devolved to Her Majesty in virtue of her prerogative shall be granted to the Forces engaged in those operations, and referring the claims of all parties thereto to the Judge of the High Court Admiralty under the authority of the said enactment with directions that he shall make such order as to him shall seem right.

My Lords having approved of the draft order direct that a copy thereof be transmitted to the clerk of the Council, with the request of their Lordships that he will move the Lords of the Council to submit the same to Her Majesty for her sanction.

Whereas it has been represented to Her Majesty that, in the year 1857, a rebellion took place within that part of Her Majesty's East Indian Dominions known as Central India, that land forces, consisting of Her Majesty's troops and of troops of the East India Company were, for the suppression of the same, organized in three columns, termed respectively the Central Indian Field Force, the Saugor and Nerbudda Field Force, and the Rajpootna Field Force, under the command respectively of Major General, now General Sir Hugh Rose, G.C.B., Major General Whitlock, now Lieutenant General Sir George Whitlock, R.C.B., and Major General Sir Henry Roberts, since deceased; and that, in the course of the operatious which followed, certain proporty was captured at the places undermentioned, viz., Jhansi, Calpee, and Gwalior, by the force under the command of the said Sir Hugh Rose, of the estimated value of Rs. 4,90,000; at Kirwee and Banda, by the force under the command efthe said Sir George Whitlock, of the estimated value of Rs. 7,00,000; and at Ahwah, Kotah, and Bunnass, by the force under the command of the said Major General Sir Henry Roberts, of the estimated value of Rs. 1,82,000:

And whereas the said property belongs to Her Majesty in right of Her Royal prerogative :

And whereas Her Majesty has signified her gracious pleasure, that the said property and the proceeds thereof shall be granted to, and distributed amongst, the forces concerned in the operations above referred to, in such manner as may be hereafter determined:

And whereas it has been proposed, for the consideration of Her Majesty, that the said proceeds of such property should be thrown into a common fund, and be distributed equally among the forces under the command of Sir Hugh Rose, Sir George Whitlock, and Sir Henry Roberts, respectively:

And whereas the Prize Agents of the force under the command of the said Sir George Whitlock have preferred a claim, that the said property captured at Kirwee and Banda should be granted exclusively to the force under the command of the said Sir George Whitlock:

And whereas the late General Lord Clyde preferred a claim on behalf of himself and his personal Staff, that he and they should participate in the same, on the ground that he, as Commander-in-Chief in India, directed the operations which led to the capture thereof:

And whereas the said Sir Hugh Rose, has preferred a claim that he and the force under his command should also participate in the same, on the ground that such force co-operated in the actions or movement of the troops which led to the capture of the said property:

And whereas Major General Smith has preferred a claim for participation in the same on behalf of himself and a brigade under his command, in the event of the claim of the force under the command of the said Sir Hugh Rose being allowed; the said Major General Smith stating that the brigade under his command was detached from the before-mentioned force, under the command of the said Major General Sir Henry Roberts, and co-operated in the actions or movement of the force under the command of Major General Sir Hugh Rose:

And whereas a claim has also been preferred by Colonel William Middleton on behalf of himself and a force under his command, known as the Futtehpore moveable column, for a participation in the same property:

And whereas other claims may be preferred by or on behalf of the same or other persons to the property, or some part thereof, captured during the aforesaid operations:

And whereas by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, initialed "An Act to improve the practice, and extend the jurisdiction of the High Court of Admiralty of England," it was enacted, that, "the said High Court of Admiralty shall have jurisdiction to decide all matters and questions concerning Booty of War, or the distribution thereof, which it shall please Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, by the advice of Her and their Privy Council, to refer to the judgment of the said Court; and in all matters so referred the Court shall proceed as in cases of Prize of War, and the judgment of the Court therein shall be binding upon all parties

And whereas it is Her Majesty's pleasure to refer, under the authority of the said recited Act, all claims to share in the property captured during the aforesaid operations, and in the proceeds thereof to the judgment of the High Court of Admiralty of England:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the claims of all parties whomsoever to the property captured during the aforesaid operations, and to the proceeds thereof, be referred to the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty of England, who shall take into his consideration, if it shall appear to him to be necessary for the purposes of justice, any capture that may have been

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons at outstations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

RULES FOR SANDAL-WOOD AUCTION SALES.

- 1. Every Auction Sale shall be held in the presence of the Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent of the District, or Conservator or Assistant Conservator of Forests.
- 2. The assortment of the Sandal-wood as made by the Public authorities will on no account be disturbed.
- 3. The highest bidder shall be the purchaser, and in the event of any dispute arising between two or more bidders at the same price, the lot so disputed shall be put up again and resold.
- 4. The former system of upset prices is abrogated, but in the event of the first three lots in each class not averaging such a price as may be considered a fair market value by the Officer presiding, he shall be at liberty, should be deem it proper so to do, to stop all further sales in that Class.
- 5. Any surplus that may be found in weighing the quantity sold for delivery to the purchaser will be charged to him at the same rate at which the lot is sold-
- 6. A Candy in the Mysore Province is equal to 560 English Pounds, or 20 Maunds of 40 Seers, but that of the Coorg Province is equal to 550 Pounds only.
- 7. The wood will be handed over to the purchaser at the Sandal Kotees, and the whole quantity purchased, must be paid for, and taken possession of, within 30 days from the date of the sale.
- 8. Any quantity which may remain unpaid for at the expiration of 30 days from the date of sale, will be resold at the risk of the first purchaser; and should the wood paid for not be removed from the Sirkar Kotees within 3 months from the date of payment, Kotee rent at the rate of 4 annas per Candy will be charged from date of sale. It will then be weighed in the presence of one of the Forest Assistants and removed out of the Kotees, and the loses arising therefrom shall be borne by the purchaser. The Government does not hold itself answerable for the loss of weight arising from the wood being kept in store after sale.
- 9. The purchaser shall, after the sale, deposit a sum equal to 25 per cent. of the amount of his purcase, to be forfeited to the Government on failure of his adhering to the terms above specified.
- 10. It is to be understood that in conformity with existing rules, no Sandalwood can be sold by private individuals within the Mysore territories, or pass without a passport, which will be granted on application by the Forest or Revenue authorities.

Registered Letters.—The attention of the Public is called to the following paragraph 17 of the Rules for Registering letters at Post Offices:—

"Paragraph 17. A letter containing Bank Notes, Postage Stamps, or other valuable articles, should, as a rule, be registered, and should be securely folded, or enclosed in a substantial envelope, and always sealed with wax, in order to prevent, as far as possible, its being tampered with."

No Afternoon Delivery during the Monsoon.—During the Monsoon there will be only two deliveries of Letters and Papers issued from this office, at 9 A. M. and 1 P. M. daily.

The Letter Boxes over the Island of Bombay will in consequence be cleared at 10 A.M. and 5 P.M., excepting on Sundays, when there will be one delivery at noon and one clearance of the Letter Boxes at 3 P. M.

Samples of Merchandize by Post.—An arrangement has been made with the London Post Office for sending Patterns of Merchandize by Post between India and the United Kingdom, under the rules and at the rates of Postage indicated below. The arrangement will commence as regards despatches from India from the 1st May next. Intimation has been received from the London Post Office that the arrangement will commence as regards despatches thence from the 1st April.

- 1. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value. The rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own apart from its mere use as a Pattern. The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.
- 2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.
- 3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples, however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.
- 4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any explosive or dangerous substance will of course be applicable to Patterns, and no article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags is to be sent.
- 5. No Pattern Packet can be received if it exceeds two feet in length, width, or depth, or 3 lbs. in weight
 - 6. The Inland Transit of Pattern Packets will be by Banghy Post.
- 7. The following Postage rates (prepaid by a Stamp or Stamps) will be charged on Pattern Packets sent under these regulations by Post to the United Kingdom. The rates being consolidated rates, no Inland Postage is leviable in addition:—

- 8. If the Packets be prepaid with a single rate of Postage (as given in Column 1 of the above Table), the full rate chargeable being more, they will be forwarded charged with the deficient Postage, together with an additional single rate.
- 9. If the Packets be prepaid with less than a single rate of postage, they will be forwarded charged with double postage, less the amount actually paid.
 - 10. If the Packets be wholly unpaid, they will be forwarded charged with double postage.

N.B.—In respect to Inland Transit the general conditions for Patterns are similar to those for Book Packets, and they will be treated like Book Packets.

If received unpaid or insufficiently paid from the United Kingdom, they will be charged at the rates mentioned in Paras. 8, 9, and 10 of the foregoing notice.
