Legislative Council of India.

5th September 1857.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 5th September 1857, and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXVI. of 1857.

An Act for Regulating Ferries in the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca.

Whereas, it is expedient to regulate the Public Ferries within the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca; It is enacted as follows:—

I. The Governor of the said Settlement may declare what Ferries within any part of the Settlement shall be deemed Public Ferries;

Governor may establish Ferries. and at any time hereafter may establish new Ferries, where they are needed; and may from time to time change the course of any Public Ferry, or discontinue any Public Ferry that is deemed unnecessary.

II. Tolls, according to such rates as shall from time to time be fixed by the Governor, shall be levied upon all passengers, carts, carriages, cattle, and other animals, and on all goods and merchandise carried, over any Public Ferry.

III. At every Public Ferry a Toll-keeper shall be appointed, whose duty it shall be to take the lawful tolls.

IV. A Table of tolls, written or printed in the English and Native languages, shall be hung up

in some conspicuous place near every Ferry, so as to be easily read by all persons crossing at the Ferry.

V. Every Toll-keeper who shall neglect to hang up and keep in good order and repair such Table of tolls, or who shall wilfully remove, alter, or deface the same, or allow it to become illegible, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten Rupees.

VI. Every Toll-keeper who shall ask or take any toll other than the lawful toll, or who shall without due cause delay any passenger, cart, carriage, animal, or goods, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Rupees.

VII. Every person crossing at any such Public Ferry, who shall refuse to pay the toll, or who, with intent of avoiding payment thereof, shall fraudulently or forcibly pass by or through any Toll-station without paying the toll, or who shall obstruct any Toll-keeper or any of his assistants in any way, in the execution of their duty under this Act; and every person who shall maliciously damage any toll-bar, boat, or any other thing employed in or about any Public Ferry, or who shall maliciously remove, alter, destroy, or damage any Table of tolls hung up as hereinbefore directed—shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Rupees over and above the value of the damage, if any, which he has done.

VIII. All Public Ferry-boats shall be numbered and registered as the Governor of the Straits' Settlement shall direct; and the names of all Tindals, or persons placed in charge thereof, and of all Toll-keepers, shall likewise be so registered.

IX. The Chief Civil Authority of each Station in which there shall be a Public Ferry shall make rules, subject to conformation by the Governor of the Straits' Settlement, fixing the number of passengers, carts, carriages, and animals, and the quantity of goods that may be carried in any Public Ferry-boat at one trip, and for the safe and convenient carriage of passengers and property, and for keeping the Ferry-boats in good order, and otherwise for the due discharge of their duty by all Tindals, Toll-keepers, and other persons employed at any Public Ferry: and any Tindal, Toll-keeper, or other person infringing or disobeying any such rule, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty Rupees, and also to make good any loss or damage caused thereby, the amount of which shall be summarily ascertained by the Magistrate within whose jurisdiction the offence was committed; and such amount may be recovered as any penalty under this Act may be recovered.

Bye-laws for regulating Ferry-boats, &c. to be made by Chief Civil Authority.

X. Every person who shall convey for hire any passenger, animal, cart, carriage, or goods, across any arm of the sea, creek, or river, within the said Settlement, to any point or place on the opposite bank or coast, within a distance of three miles on either side above or below any Public Ferry, without the special license of the Chief Civil Authority of the Station in which the Ferry is situated, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Rupees. Provided that nothing in this Section shall subject to such penalty any person who shall specially let for hire his boat for the conveyance of any other person or his family or goods across any creek or arm of the sea within the said Settlement.

Carrying for hire within three miles of a Ferry, without license of Chief Civil Authority, prohibited.

any person who shall specially let for hire his boat for the conveyance of any other person or his family or goods across any creek or arm of the sea within the said Settlement.

XI. All offences against this Act shall be summarily heard and determined by a Police Magistrate of the Station within the limits of which the same shall have been committed; and all penalties shall be recovered in the manner directed for the levy of fines and penalties by Act XIII. of 1856.

XII. Every Public Ferry shall be under the control and management of the Municipal Commissioners of the Station in which the same is situate. The said Commissioners shall appoint the Toll-keeper and such other establishment as they may deem sufficient for the purposes of this Act.

XIII. All tolls payable at any Public Ferry shall be collected by the Municipal Commissioners of the Station in which the same is situate, and shall form part of the Municipal Fund of that Station. The said Commissioners, with the sanction of the Governor, may grant a lease of any such Ferry for any period not exceeding seven years.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 5th September 1857, and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXVII. of 1857.

An Act to Establish and Incorporate an University at Madras.

Whereas, for the better encouragement of Her Majesty's subjects of all classes and denominations within

Preamble.

the Presidency of Fort St. George and other parts of India in the pursuit of a regular and liberal course of education, it has been determined to establish an University at Madras, for the purpose of ascertaining, by means of examination, the persons who have acquired proficiency in different branches of Literature, Science, and Art, and of rewarding them by Academical Degrees as evidence of their respective attainments, and marks of honour proportioned thereunto; and whereas, for effectuating the purposes aforesaid, it is expedient that such University should be incorporated; It is enacted as follows (that is to say):—

I. The following persons, namely—

of the said University, and all the persons who may
hereafter become or be appointed to be Chancellor, Vice-
Chancellor, or Fellows, as hereinafter mentioned, so long
as they shall continue to be such Chancellor, Vice-Chan-
cellor, or Fellows, are hereby constituted and declared
to be one Body Politic and Corporate, by the name of
the University of Madras; and such Body Politic shall
by such name have perpetual succession, and shall have
a common seal, and by such name shall sue and be sued,
implead and be impleaded, and answer and be answered
unto, in every Court of Justice within the territories in
the possession and under the Government of the East
India Company.

II. The said Body Corporate shall be able and

Power to hold and dispose
of property,

capable in law to take, pur-
chase, and hold any property,
moveable or immoveable,

which may become vested in it for the purposes of
the said University, by virtue of any purchase, grant, testa-
mentary disposition, or otherwise; and shall be able and
capable in law to grant, demise, alien, or otherwise dis-
pose of all or any of the property, moveable or immove-
able, belonging to the said University; and also to do
all other matters incidental or appertaining to a Body
Corporate.

III. The said Body Corporate shall consist of one

Chancellor, one Vice-Chan-
cellor, and such number of
ex officio and other Fellows

as the Governor of Fort St. George in Council hath
already appointed, or shall from time to time, by any
order published in the *Fort St. George Gazette*, here-
after appoint; and the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor,
and Fellows for the time being shall constitute the

Office vacated by leaving
India.

Provided that, if any person,
being Chancellor, Vice-Chan-
cellor, or Fellow of the said

University, shall leave India without the intention of re-
turning thereto, his office shall thereupon become vacant.

IV. The Governor of Fort St. George for the time
being shall be the Chancellor
of the said University, and

Chancellor.

the first Chancellor shall be the Right Honorable George
Francis Robert, Lord Harris.

V. The first Vice-Chancellor of the said University

Vice-Chancellor.

shall be Sir Christopher
Rawlinson, Knight. The

office of Vice-Chancellor shall be held for two years
only; and the Vice-Chancellor hereinbefore nominated
shall go out of office on the first day of January 1859.
Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Vice-
Chancellor of the said University, by death, resigna-
tion, departure from India, effluxion of time, or other-
wise, the Governor of Fort St. George in Council
shall, by notification in the *Fort St. George Gazette*,

nominate a fit and proper person, being one of the
Fellows of the said University, to be Vice-Chan-
cellor, in the room of the person occasioning such
vacancy. Provided that, on any vacancy in the said
office which shall occur by effluxion of time, the Govern-
or of Fort St. George in Council shall have power to
re-appoint the Vice-Chancellor hereinbefore nominated,
or any future Vice-Chancellor, to such office.

VI. The Chief Justice of Her Majesty's Supreme

Court of Judicature, the
Bishop of Madras, the Mem-
bers of the Council of Madras,

Fellows.

the Director of Public Instruction, the Principal and
Acting Principal of the Presidency College, the Presi-
dent of the Medical College Council, all for the time
being, shall, while filling such offices, be *ex officio*
Fellows of the said University. The whole number of
the Fellows of the said University, exclusive of the
Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor for the time being, shall
never be less than thirty; and whenever the number of
the said Fellows, exclusive as aforesaid, shall, by death,
resignation, departure from India, or otherwise, be
reduced below thirty, the Governor of Fort St. George
in Council shall forthwith, by notification in the *Fort
St. George Gazette*, nominate so many fit and proper
persons to be Fellows of the said University as, with
the then Fellows of the said University, shall make the
number of such Fellows, exclusive as aforesaid, thirty.
But nothing herein contained shall prevent the Govern-
or of Fort St. George in Council from nominating
more than thirty persons to be Fellows of the said
University if he shall see fit.

VII. The Governor of Fort St. George in Council

may cancel the appointment
of any person already ap-
pointed or hereafter to be

appointed a Fellow of the University; and as soon as
such order is notified in the *Gazette*, the person so ap-
pointed shall cease to be a Fellow.

VIII. The Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fel-

lows for the time being, shall
have the entire management
of, and superintendence over,
the affairs, concerns, and
property of the said University; and in all cases unpro-
vided for by this Act, it shall be lawful for the Chan-
cellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows to act in such man-
ner as shall appear to them best calculated to promote
the purposes intended by the said University. The

Chancellor, Vice-Chan-
cellor, and Fellows to superin-
tend the affairs of the Univer-
sity.
The said Chancellor, Vice-Chan-
cellor, and Fellows shall have
full power from time to time to make and alter any
bye-laws and regulations (so as the same be not repug-
nant to law, or to the general objects and provisions of
this Act) touching the examination for degrees and the
granting of the same, and touching the examination for
honours, and the granting of marks of honour for a
higher proficiency in the different branches of Literature,
Science, and Art; and touching the qualifications of
the candidates for degrees, and the previous course of
instruction to be followed by them, and the preliminary
examinations to be submitted to by them; and touching
the mode and time of convening the meetings of the
Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows; and, in
general, touching all other matters whatever regard-
ing the said University. And all such bye-laws and
regulations, when reduced into writing, and after the
common seal of the said University shall have been
affixed thereto, shall be binding upon all persons, mem-
bers of the said University, and all candidates for
degrees to be conferred by the same, provided such
bye-laws and regulations shall have been first submit-
ted to and shall have received the approval of the Gov-
ernor of Fort St. George in Council.

IX. All questions which shall come before the

Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor,
and Fellows, shall be decided

at a meeting of the Senate by the majority of the mem-
bers present; and the Chairman at any such meeting

shall have a vote, and, in case of an equality of votes, a second or casting vote. No question shall be decided at any meeting, unless the Chancellor, or Vice-Chancellor, and five Fellows, or, in the absence of the Chancellor and Vice-Chancellor, unless six Fellows at the least, shall be present at the time of the decision. At every meeting of the Senate, the Chancellor, or in his absence the Vice-Chancellor, shall preside as Chairman; and in the absence of both, a Chairman shall be chosen by the Fellows present, or the major part of them.

X. The said Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows for the time being, shall have full power from time to time to appoint, and, as they shall see occasion, to remove, all Examiners, Officers, and servants of the said University.

XI. The said Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows shall have power, after examination, to confer the several degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, Bachelor of Laws, Licentiate of Medicine, Doctor of Medicine, and Master of Civil Engineering; they shall also have power, after examination, to confer upon the candidates for the said several degrees marks of honour for a high degree of proficiency in the different branches of Literature, Science, and Art, according to rules to be determined by the bye-laws to be from time to time made by them under the power in that behalf given to them by this Act.

XII. Except by special order of the Senate, no person shall be admitted as a candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, Bachelor of Laws, Licentiate of Medicine, Doctor of Medicine, or Master of Civil Engineering, unless he shall present to the said Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows, a certificate from one of the Institutions authorised in that behalf by the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, to the effect that he has completed the course of instruction prescribed by the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows of the said University, in the bye-laws to be made by them under the power in that behalf given by this Act.

XIII. The said Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows shall cause an examination for degrees to be held at least once in every year: on every such examination, the candidates shall be examined, either by Examiners appointed for the purpose from among the Fellows by the said Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows, or by other Examiners so to be appointed; and on every such examination the candidates, whether candidates for an ordinary degree, or for a degree with honours, shall be examined on as many subjects, and in such manner, as the said Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows shall appoint.

XIV. At the conclusion of any examination of the candidates, the Examiners shall declare the name of every candidate whom they shall have deemed entitled to any of the said degrees, and his proficiency in relation to other candidates; and also the honours which he may have gained in respect of his proficiency in that department of knowledge in which he is about to graduate; and he shall receive from the said Chancellor a certificate, under the seal of the said University of Madras, and signed by the said Chancellor or Vice-Chancellor, in which the particulars so stated shall be declared.

XV. The said Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, and Fellows shall have power to charge such reasonable fees for the degrees to be conferred by them, and upon admission into the said University, and for continuance therein, as they, with the approbation of the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, shall from time to time see fit to impose. Such fees shall be carried to one Ge-

neral Fee Fund, for the payment of expenses of the said University, under the directions and Regulations of the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, to whom the accounts of income and expenditure of the said University shall once in every year be submitted, for such examination and audit as the said Governor of Fort St. George in Council may direct.

The following Bill, as settled in Committee of the whole Council this day, is published for general information:—

A Bill relating to the Importation, Manufacture, and Sale of Arms and Ammunition, and for Regulating the Right to Keep or Use the same.

Whereas it is expedient to regulate the importation, manufacture, and sale of Arms and Ammunition, and the right to keep or use the same; It is enacted as follows:—

I. In any District or place to which the provisions of this Section shall be extended by order of the Governor General of India in Council, or of the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, every person shall, within such time as shall be mentioned in the order, or, if no time be mentioned therein, within one week from the publication of the order in the District or place, give notice in writing to the Magistrate or other Officer authorised by the Executive Government, or, in any Presidency Town or in any Station of the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, to the Commissioner of Police, of any fire-arms, bayonet, sword, spear, spear-head, or other deadly weapon to be specified in such order, which shall be in his possession, or shall be on his premises in the possession of any of his retainers or servants; and shall also give immediate notice in writing of all other Arms of the like description which shall at any subsequent time come into his possession, or into the possession of any of his retainers or servants as aforesaid. The notice shall specify the number and description of the Arms so possessed, and also, in the case of Arms so possessed by retainers or servants, the names of such retainers or servants, and in what capacities they are respectively employed.

II. Whoever wilfully neglects to give such notice as aforesaid shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees; and all Arms in the possession of such person may be seized, and shall be confiscated, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

III. The Magistrate or such Commissioner of Police as aforesaid shall cause to be prepared from such notices a register of the names of persons having arms in their possession, and the number and description of such Arms; and shall also, at the request of any person giving such notice as aforesaid, deliver to him a certificate specifying the date of the notice and the number and description of Arms specified therein.

IV. If, in the judgment of the Government or of the Magistrate, or such Commissioner of Police as aforesaid, any such Arms as aforesaid, or any Ammunition in the possession of any person, cannot be left in such possession without danger to the public peace, it shall be lawful for the Magistrate or Commissioner of Police to cause such Arms or Ammunition to be seized and detained in safe custody for such time as may be deemed necessary.

V. In any District or place to which the provisions

Disarming of persons going armed without leave of Magistrate or other authorised officer, in other than Presidency Towns, &c.

of this Section shall be extended by order of the Governor General of India in Council, or of the Executive Government of any Presidency

or place other than places in which Section XLVII. of Act XIII. of 1856 (entitled "An Act for regulating the Police of the Towns of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, and the several Stations of the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca") is in force, if any person goes armed with any such Arms as aforesaid unless by leave of the Magistrate or other Officer authorised by the Executive Government in that behalf, he shall, unless he shall produce some certificate that he has obtained such leave, or that he is exempted by Government from the foregoing provisions, or shall give reasonable proof of his being otherwise exempted from the said provisions, be liable to be disarmed by any Magistrate, Deputy Magistrate, or Assistant to a Magistrate, or by any European Commissioned Officer in the Service of Her Majesty or of the East India Company, or by any Member of a Volunteer Corps enrolled by authority of Government whilst on duty, or by any Police Officer, if in the judgment of such Magistrate, or other Officer as aforesaid, it is dangerous to the public peace to allow such person to go armed. Provided always, that if any person shall

Proviso.

have leave, from the Magistrate of the District or place at which he resides or may be, to carry Arms on a journey, and shall obtain from such Magistrate a certificate stating the route by which he intends to proceed, the time which such journey is expected to occupy, and the Arms which he is permitted to carry, such certificate shall have the same force and effect according to its tenor in every District or place specified therein as if leave to go armed had been granted by the Magistrate of such District or place.

VI. The foregoing provisions shall not apply to—

Exemptions.

1. Officers, Soldiers, and Sailors in the Military or Naval Service of Her Majesty or of the East India Company, in respect of Arms and Ammunition kept by them for use in the public service.

2. Members of a Volunteer Corps, in respect of such Arms and Ammunition.

3. Police and Revenue Officers and other persons, in respect of Arms and Ammunition furnished by Government for use in the public service, or provided by themselves with the sanction of Government for such use.

4. Such other persons as the Government may think fit to exempt from such provisions.

Arms and Ammunition belonging to any ship or vessel, not exceeding the reasonable armament thereof, shall also be exempt from such provisions.

VII. If any person shall manufacture, repair, sell,

License for manufacture or sale of Arms or Ammunition.

or keep or expose for sale, any Arms of the description hereinbefore mentioned, or

shall manufacture, or sell, or keep or expose for sale, percussion caps, gunpowder, or other Ammunition, without a license to manufacture or deal in Arms or Ammunition, as the case may be, or contrary to any of the conditions contained in any such license, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees, in addition to double the value of any Arms or Ammunition sold; and all Arms and Ammunition belonging to the offender shall be forfeited, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

VIII. Licenses to manufacture or deal in percussion

License for manufacturing or dealing in Arms or Ammunition by whom to be granted.

caps shall be granted by the Governor General in Council, or by the Executive Government, or by an Officer specially authorised by the

Governor General in Council or by the Executive Government to grant such licenses. Licenses to manufacture or deal in Arms and Ammunition other than percussion caps may be granted by a Magistrate or Commissioner of Police, or by an Officer authorised by the Governor General in Council or by the Executive Government to grant such licenses.

IX. Any person licensed to manufacture or deal in

Licensed manufacturers or dealers to enter in a book an account of stock-in-trade, names of purchasers, &c.

Arms, percussion caps, or other Ammunition, shall enter in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, an account of all the stock-in-

trade which he may from time to time have in his possession or under his control, and also the name and address of every purchaser of Arms or Ammunition sold by him, together with the nature, description, and quantity of such Arms or Ammunition. Such book

Inspection of book.

shall be open at all times to inspection by the Magistrate or other duly authorised Officer, by whom copies may be taken of all entries therein contained. If any such person shall omit or fail duly to keep such a book, or to make therein all such entries as are hereby required, or if any person shall prevent or obstruct the inspection of such book, or shall make a false entry therein, he shall be liable for every such offence, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees, in addition to double the value of any Arms or Ammunition sold of which he shall fail to make such entry, or respecting which he shall make a false entry; and if the offender be licensed to manufacture or deal in Arms or Ammunition, he shall also forfeit his license, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

X. The Magistrate, Commissioner of Police, or other

Magistrate or other Officer may inspect dealer's premises.

Officer authorised by Government, may at any time enter the premises in which

Arms or Ammunition shall be manufactured or kept by any licensed manufacturer of, or dealer in, Arms or Ammunition, in order to inspect the stock-in-trade of such manufacturer or dealer; and if any such manufacturer or dealer shall intentionally conceal from such Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid any part of his stock-in-trade, or shall wilfully refuse to point out where the same is kept, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees; and all the stock-in-trade belonging to such person may be seized, and shall be confiscated, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

XI. Any license granted under the provisions of

Revocation of license.

Section VIII. may be granted subject to such conditions as shall be thought necessary, and may be revoked or suspended by the person or persons authorised to grant such licenses.

XII. No Arms or Ammunition, and no Sulphur or

Arms, Ammunition, and Sulphur, &c. not to be imported without license.

Salt-petre, shall be imported either by sea or by land into any part of the territories in the possession and under the

Government of the East India Company, without the license of the Governor General in Council, or of the Executive Government.

XIII. If any person shall import or attempt to import,

Penalty for importation without license.

without such license, either by sea or by land, into any part of the said territories,

any Arms or Ammunition, or any Sulphur or Salt-petre; or shall aid or assist in such importation or in such attempt to import; or shall knowingly conceal or assist in concealing any Arms or Ammunition, or any Sulphur or Salt-petre, imported without such license—he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding two years, and also to a penalty not exceeding One thousand Rupees; and the articles so imported shall be confiscated, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

XIV. The provisions of the two last preceding Sections shall not extend to Arms and Ammunition imported in reasonable quantities for private use; but the Collector of Customs may at any time detain any such articles, if he shall think it necessary, until he shall receive the orders of Government. Nothing in this Section shall exempt any person from the obligation of giving notice of Arms under the provisions of Section I.

XV. The Governor General in Council may by order prohibit the transport of Arms, Ammunition, Military Stores, Sulphur, or Saltpetre, or any particular description of Arms, Ammunition, or Military Stores, from one part of India to another, or the transport thereof in any particular direction, to be specified in the order, or prohibit the transport thereof except according to such rules and conditions as may be specified in the order; and the Executive Government of any Presidency or place shall have the like power within the territories under their Government.

XVI. If any person shall transport or cause to be transported, or shall attempt to transport, or shall aid in transporting, any such Arms, Ammunition, or Military Stores as aforesaid, without such order or contrary to the rules and conditions specified therein, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees; and the articles transported or attempted to be transported shall be confiscated. If any person shall by concealment or other device transport or cause to be transported, or attempt to transport such Arms or Ammunition as aforesaid, he shall, in addition to the penalty hereby provided, be liable upon such conviction to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding two years.

XVII. Whenever the Governor General in Council or the Executive Government shall consider it necessary so to do, they may by order prohibit the sale of Sulphur, and may require all persons having Sulphur in their possession to give notice thereof to Government, or to such Officer as may be appointed by Government; and any person neglecting to give such notice shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees; and all Sulphur belonging to such person shall be confiscated, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

XVIII. The Governor General in Council or the Executive Government may also at any time seize all Sulphur in the possession of any person, and detain the same for such time as they may deem necessary for the public safety, unless the owner shall consent to sell the same to Government at the fair market price thereof.

XIX. Nothing in the two preceding Sections shall apply to Sulphur kept or sold for medicinal purposes.

XX. The Government may exempt any person from the provisions of Sections XVII. and XVIII. upon such conditions, if any, as such Government may consider necessary.

XXI. If any Magistrate or such Commissioner of Police as aforesaid have reasonable cause for suspecting that Arms, Ammunition, or Sulphur are in any house, building, or other place, or that any Arms, Ammunition, or Sulphur are in any house, building, or other place in the possession of any person in whose possession they cannot be left with safety to the public peace,

he may, with such assistance as he shall think necessary, by night or by day, and by force if necessary, enter and search any such house or place, or cause the same to be entered and searched. It shall be competent to a Magistrate to delegate to any of his European Assistants the powers conferred on him by this Section.

XXII. The Governor General of India in Council, or the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, or the Chief Commissioners of the Punjab and Oude, respectively, or the Commissioners of Nagpore and Sind respectively, or any other persons authorised by Government, may order a general search for Arms, Ammunition, or Sulphur to be made, by any Officers or persons named in such order, in any District or place specified therein. The persons authorised by such order, and all persons acting under their authority, shall have the like powers of entry, search, and seizure as are conferred by the last preceding Section.

XXIII. If, on any search being made, any person shall refuse to produce or point out to the persons making the search, or shall attempt to conceal any Arms, Ammunition, or Sulphur, such person may be apprehended without warrant, and shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding two years, in addition to any other penalty to which he may be subject under this Act.

XXIV. After such time as shall be mentioned in the order of Government extending the provisions of this Section to any District or place, or, if no time be mentioned, after one week from the publication of the order in the District or place, no person shall manufacture, use, or have in his possession any cannon, howitzer, or mortar, without a license from the Governor General of India in Council, or from the Executive Government of any Presidency or place. If any person shall manufacture, use, or have in his possession any cannon, howitzer, or mortar, without such license, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a fine not exceeding Two thousand Rupees, and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding Two years; and such cannon, howitzer, or mortar, may be seized, and shall be forfeited to Government. Any person who has in his possession any cannon, howitzer, or mortar, at the time when this Section takes effect in any District or place, and who shall be unwilling to apply for a license to retain possession thereof, may surrender the same to the Magistrate or Commissioner of Police within such period as aforesaid.

The provisions of this Section shall not extend to any cannon, howitzer, or mortar forming part of the ordinary armament of any ship or vessel.

XXV. If any fine or penalty imposed by a Magistrate under the authority of this Act be not immediately paid, the Magistrate may commit the offender to jail, there to be imprisoned, according to the discretion of the Magistrate, for any term not exceeding six months where the amount of the fine or penalty shall not exceed Five hundred Rupees, and for any term not exceeding Twelve months in any other case; the commitment to be determinable in each of the cases aforesaid on payment of the amount.

XXVI. Any fine or penalty levied from any person convicted of an offence under this Act, or any portion of such fine or penalty, may be awarded to the person on whose information the conviction shall take place.

XXVII. The word "Magistrate" shall include any person exercising the full powers of a Magistrate; and all powers of conviction and confiscation upon conviction given by this Act to a Magistrate shall, within the Presidency Towns and in the Straits Settlement, be exercised by the Police Magistrates.

XXVIII. This Act, or any part or parts thereof, shall take effect in any District or place to which the same shall be extended by order of the Governor General of India in Council, or of the Executive Government of any Presidency or place.

XXIX. It shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council, or the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, from time to time to withdraw, from the operation of all or any of the provisions of this Act, any part or parts of any District or place which he may previously have declared to be subject thereto; and in like manner, as occasion shall require, to subject the same again to the operation of all or any of the provisions of this Act.

XXX. This Act shall continue in force for Two Years.

XXXI. Any Officer of Government, who, prior to the passing of this Act, may have seized, detained, or prevented the importation of any Arms, Ammunition, Military Stores, Sulphur, or Saltpetre, in pursuance of an order of Government, is hereby indemnified for so doing; and no action or other proceeding shall be commenced or prosecuted against him in respect of such seizure or detention.

'1. We transmit herewith three copies of the Warrants specified in the margin, regulating and providing for the Pay and Allowances of the Corps of Instructors of Musketry.

"VICTORIA R.

Whereas, We have deemed it expedient to adopt a project for the more complete organisation and better distribution of the Corps of Instructors of Musketry, in connection with the School of Musketry, with a view to ensure the more effectual working of the system of Musketry Instruction at present in force: Our Will and Pleasure therefore is, that, from and after the 1st April 1856, the Staff of the School of Musketry and the Corps of Instructors of Musketry shall consist of the numbers, and shall receive the rates of pay and allowances, specified herein, and shall be subject to the rules and regulations laid down in the same, and to such others as shall from time to time be issued under the orders of Our Secretary of State for the War Department.

1. Staff for the School of Musketry.

- 1 Commandant and Inspector General of Instruction, with the pay and allowances of a Colonel on the Staff, in addition to half-pay.
 - 1 Chief Instructor, Field Officer (Major), with the pay and allowances of an Assistant Adjutant General, in addition to the pay of his rank.
 - 2 Instructors (Captains), with the pay and allowances of Deputy Assistant Adjutant General, in addition to the pay of Staff Captain.
 - 1 Deputy Assistant Adjutant General (Lieutenant), with the pay and allowances thereof, in addition to pay.
- To assist the Commandant in experiments, and in the correspondence of the Establishment, &c.—
- 1 Paymaster and Acting Quartermaster, at 6s. a day, in addition to his half-pay.
 - 1 Surgeon, at 5s., in addition to his half-pay.

2. All Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers employed as "Inspectors," or Instructors of Musketry, will first have undergone training at the School of Musketry, Hythe, and have been reported by the Commandant of the Establishment qualified for the appointment.

Qualifications.

3. The Inspectors and Instructors of Musketry will, in all matters appertaining to their peculiar duties, be subject to, and in communication with, the Inspector General of Instruction, who will be responsible to Our Commander in Chief that the Troops are trained according to the approved system.

Duties.

4. The First Class Serjeant Instructors and Clerks of the School of Musketry will rank as Quartermaster Serjeants.

Ranks of Non-Commissioned Officers.

The Second Class Serjeant Instructors will rank next to the Quartermaster Serjeants.

The Third Class Serjeant Instructors will rank next to the Color Serjeants.

5. Neither the Second nor Third Class Serjeant Instructors are to be under the authority of any Non-Commissioned Officer of the Regiment or Battalion to which they are posted or attached, as regards the duties of their Office, but will be entirely under the superintendence of the Commanding Officer, and will act especially under the orders of the appointed Regimental Officer Instructor; they will be exempt from all regimental and barrack duties, and be employed exclusively in the instruction of the Troops in the theory and practice of Musketry.

6. Promotion from one class to another will be made as vacancies occur, either at the School of Musketry or in the Corps of Instructors, on the recommendation of the Inspector General of Instruction, grounded on the reports of the ability and conduct received from the several Inspectors and Instructors.

Promotion of Non-Commissioned Officers.

7. The clothing and appointments for all Non-Commissioned Officers of the School of Musketry and Corps of Instructors are to be of the pattern issued to Staff Serjeants of the First Class, and will consist of—

- 1 pair Trowsers } annually.
- 2 pair Boots }
- 1 Chaco, complete, biennially.
- 1 Slung Waist-belt.
- 1 Sword and Scabbard, with Sword-knot.

- 1 Case to hold writing materials on practice ground, as per pattern approved.

Facings to be blue.

The buttons, waist-plate, and chaco-plate to bear the device of cross muskets and crown.

The forage cap to be of blue cloth, with scarlet band and horizontal peak, having the device of cross muskets and crown in front.

8. The several ranks will be distinguished as follows:—

- Distinction of the several Ranks. Serjeant Major.—Four chevrons, with cross muskets and crown on each arm.
- Quartermaster Serjeant.—Four chevrons, with cross muskets and star on right arm.
- First-class Serjeant Instructors and Clerks of School of Musketry.—Four chevrons, with cross muskets and crown on right arm.
- Second Class Serjeant Instructors.—Three chevrons, with cross muskets and crown on right arm.
- Third Class Serjeant Instructors.—Three chevrons, with cross muskets on right arm.
- Privates.—Cross muskets and crown on right arm.
- The chevrons and device for Non-Commissioned Officers to be of gold lace. The device for the Privates in white worsted, or cotton on blue cloth.

9. The clothing for the School of Musketry to be applied for in the usual manner; and for the Second and Third Class Serjeant Instructors, to be applied for by the Regiment, or Depôt Battalion to which they are posted or attached, which is to be of the authorised pattern. In making a demand, to be specially designated—For Class

Manner of obtaining Clothing.

Serjeant Instructors of Musketry.

10. The First and Second Class Serjeant Instructors and Clerks of the School of Musketry will be entitled to one room, and to fuel and light, and furniture for the same, and will have choice of quarters after the Quartermaster Serjeant.

The Third Class Serjeant Instructors will be entitled to the same room, fuel, and light as the Second Class Staff Serjeants of a Regiment, taking choice according to seniority.

11. The Second and Third Class Serjeant Instructors will be members of the Serjeants' Mess of the Regiment to which they are posted to do duty.

12. The pensions to which the Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates of the School of Musketry and Corps of Instructors will be entitled, when placed on the Pension List, will be,—

13. Application for leave of absence or furlough to be made to the Adjutant General of the Forces, through the Inspector General of Instruction.

14. The applications of Serjeant Instructors for permission to marry must be forwarded by Commanding Officers to the Inspector General of Instruction, for the consideration of the Adjutant General to the Forces, accompanied by their opinion of the character and respectability of the persons whom the Instructors are desirous of marrying.

15. In the event of its being necessary to bring an Instructor before a Court Martial, he is to be immediately suspended from duty, and a report of the circumstances of the case transmitted to the Adjutant General, through the Inspector General of Instruction, for the information and decision of the Commander in Chief, if the man is serving at home; if abroad, to the General or other Officer Commanding on the Station.

16. Any Non-Commissioned Officer of the School of Musketry or Corps of Instructors, who may be sentenced by a Court Martial to be reduced to the rank and pay of a Private Sentinel, will be transferred either to the Regiment to which he is attached to do duty, or to any other Regiment the Commander in Chief may direct, if at home; if abroad, to any Regiment the General or other Officer commanding on the Station may order, to complete the term of service for which he re-enlisted.

17. Recommendations of men for the appointments of Non-Commissioned Officer Instructors are to be addressed to the Adjutant General, according to the prescribed form. The candidates must be Serjeants or Corporals, men of active habits, intelligent, and capable as well of receiving as of imparting instruction, unmarried, and not exceeding five years' service; they must also be medically certified fit for active service; must also be able to write accurately from dictation, understand the use of forms, &c., and have a competent knowledge of the four first rules of arithmetic, and of vulgar and decimal fractions.

18. Previously to appointment, candidates will be sent to the School of Musketry at Hythe, and, when reported by the Commandant as duly qualified, they will be discharged and re-attested, without bounty, for general service, their previous service being allowed to reckon towards pension; and when enrolled in the Corps of Instructors, they will be liable to be posted to, and removed from, different Regiments or Stations, at the pleasure of the Commander in Chief, former regimental connexion being taken into consideration whenever the circumstances of the Service will admit thereof. The attestations are to be made out in duplicate; one copy will be retained at Hythe, and the other, together with the men's 'Register Sheet,' will be sent to the Regiment or Station to which he may be posted, the Officer Commanding being held responsible that these documents are kept duly completed, according to regulation, and that, on every removal of an Instructor from one Corps to another, if at home, they are forwarded to the School of Musketry, in order that the entries may be duly transferred to the copy of the attestation in possession of the Commandant.

19. Each man is to be distinguished by a separate number, his former regimental number being placed at the side of it, as in the cases of transfer, viz:—First Class Serjeant Instructor A. B., No. 100, $\left\{ \begin{array}{l} \text{2nd Foot.} \\ 1504. \end{array} \right.$; and he will be mustered with, and accounted for in the Returns of the Regiment or Garrison to which he may be attached. Casualties amongst the Instructors are to be immediately reported to the Adjutant General.

20. Should it be deemed advisable, eligible and well-conducted Private Soldiers, who may be specially recommended by their Commanding Officers, will also be permitted to volunteer for this Corps, and be sent to Hythe for training. When reported qualified, they also will be discharged, and re-attested for Third Class Serjeant Instructors.

21. In each Regiment there will be—

22. Regiments proceeding on active service will not be accompanied by the Serjeant Instructors. These Non-Commissioned Officers will be posted to the reserves of Regiments, or elsewhere, as may be directed.

23. Captain Instructors will be gazetted to their appointments, and their names will be inserted in the Army List among the Staff of their own Regiments, as is the case with Adjutants.

24. District Inspectors will be selected from among the Regimental Captain Instructors, for the zeal and intelligence evinced by them in the discharge of their duties.

25. All applications for information on any particular question regarding the mode of carrying on the Instruction are to be made through the Commanding Officers to the Inspector General of Correspondence. Instruction, who, if unable to remove the difficulty, will refer the question for the decision of the Commander in Chief, without whose authority no alteration, however trivial, is to be made in the prescribed regulations as issued from the Adjutant General's Department.

26. District Inspectors are responsible that the system of Instruction, as taught at the School of Musketry, and which has been approved of for the Army, is rigidly adhered to, and efficiently carried out in the several Battalions and Depôts by the Instructors under their supervision. They will bring to the notice of the Inspector General of Instruction any deviation from the established system, or laxity in the practice, which they may discover in their periodical visits; on which occasions they will carefully and minutely examine the Registers of the Practices, and ascertain if the several Companies' Practice Returns agree therewith; they will also take opportunities of seeing the men when employed at their several practices, that they may thereby judge if the preliminary drills have been carefully proceeded with, as the results which are capable of being produced chiefly depend on the pains taken in exercising the men therein.

27. All the prescribed Regimental Returns of Target Practice, &c. (which are to be made out by the Sergeant Instructors, and not in the Orderly Room), after being signed by the Officer Instructor and countersigned by the Commanding Officer, are to be sent through the District Inspectors to the Inspector General of Instruction, as directed in the Instruction of Musketry.

28. The District Inspectors, before forwarding the several Returns, will ascertain if they are correct, and make any remarks thereon they may consider necessary, accompanying their Monthly Reports transmitting the Monthly Progress Returns of Battalions and Depôts with a statement showing the Battalions and Depôts they have visited during the period embraced in their reports, as also the number of men they found under instruction, and the nature of instruction in which the men were employed.

29. The Inspector General of Instruction will report quarterly, to the Adjutant General, for the information of the Commander in Chief, on the progress of rifle instruction among the Troops; as also furnish annually, on the receipt of the Battalion and Depôt Annual Target and Judging Distance Practice Returns, an abstract showing the efficiency of every Battalion in those practices, together with a report thereon.

30. The Inspector General of Instruction being held responsible for the efficiency of the Troops in the use of their Arms, will bring under the notice of the Commander in Chief everything he may observe acting prejudicially to that efficiency, as also any laxity he may discover on the part of those responsible for, and entrusted with, the important duty of training the Troops to the use of their Arms.

NOTIFICATION.

It is the melancholy duty of the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council to announce the death of the Honorable JOHN RUSSELL COLVIN, the Lieutenant Governor of the North-Western Provinces.

Worn by the unceasing anxieties and labours of his charge, which placed him in the very front of the dangers by which, of late, India has been threatened, health and strength gave way; and the Governor General in Council has to deplore with sincere grief the loss of one of the most distinguished amongst the servants of the East India Company.

The death of Mr. COLVIN has occurred at a time when his ripe experience, his high ability, and his untiring energy, would have been more than usually valuable to the State.

But his career did not close before he had won for himself a high reputation in each of the various branches of Administration to which he was at different times attached, nor until he had been worthily selected to fill the highest position in Northern India; and he leaves a name which not friends alone, but all who have been associated with him in the duties of Government, and all who may follow in his path, will delight to honour.

The Right Honorable the Governor General in Council directs that the Flag shall be lowered half-mast high, and that 17 Minute Guns shall be fired at the Seats of Government in India upon the receipt of the present Notification.
