The following Notification in the Foreign Department, issued from the Camp of the Viceroy and Governor General, is republished for general information :—

## NOTIFICATION.

FOREIGN DEPARTMENT, POLITICAL.

*Simla, the 30th May 1863.*

His Excellency the Right Honorable the Viceroy and Governor General held a Durbar this day for the reception of the Chiefs of the Hill States between the Sutlej and Jumna.

The Chiefs with their nearest relatives and principal Ministers and the Civil and Military Officers of the Station having assembled, the Viceroy and Governor General, accompanied by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, entered and took his seat.

Each Chief and Native Gentleman present was introduced to the Viceroy and Governor General, and the usual offerings having been presented and accepted, suitable Khilluts were bestowed.

His Excellency then addressed the Chiefs in the following words :—

“The Chiefs of the Hill States in this neighbourhood have at all times enjoyed in a special degree the favour and protection of the British Government.

“Of this, a signal proof was given in the restoration of their Estates to your Ancestors at the close of the war of 1814.

“I can undertake to promise that the same favour and protection shall be continued to you so long as you merit it by good conduct and loyalty.

“I have it in my power, moreover, at the present time to illustrate by an example the interest which the British Government takes in your welfare.

“Some years ago, Government was invited to charge itself with the management of the State of Joobul in consequence of the incompetence of the then ruling Rana.

“Government undertook this charge with reluctance, because it has no wish to assume the direct control of native states, but rather desire to see them well administered by their own chiefs.

“Nevertheless the able Officers on whom this task devolved acquitted themselves of their trust with so much success, that, in a short period, not by oppression or extortion, but by prudence and economy, they restored the finances of the State to good order, and accumulated a considerable amount of surplus revenue.

“It was at one time proposed that this surplus should be expended by the British Government at its own discretion for the benefit of the State and people of Joobul; but it has now been resolved that it shall be transferred to the Rana, and that the responsibility of making a proper application of it shall devolve on him.

“I accordingly avail myself of this opportunity to place these accumulations in the Rana's hands, with the expression of my hope that he will make a judicious use of them.

“I trust also that the Chiefs who are assembled here today will learn from this example that to treat their dependants with consideration, and to abstain from wasteful and extravagant expenditure, is the surest way of advancing their own interests, and, further, that the British Government is their true friend, not unwilling to help them in difficulty, but, above all, desirous to impart to them the knowledge which will enable them to help themselves.

“I shall only add that you will most effectually second the exertions of the British Government for your good, if you do all in your power to provide a useful education for your own Children.”

After the concluding ceremonies His Excellency left his Seat\* and the assembly broke up.

\* There being no Artillery at Simla, the usual Royal Salute for His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General and the Salutes to which the Rajas of Sirmoor and Belaspore are entitled were not fired.

## General Notice

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXVIII.

### INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1863.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits, arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective offices, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

## GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 11th June 1863.*

No. 308 of 1863.—Assistant Apothecary T. Kythan (No. 368) is relieved from further Naval duty, and transferred to the Military Department.

*Bombay Castle, 16th June 1863.*

No. 309 of 1863.—The following General Order by His Excellency the Governor General of India, dated 22nd May 1863, No. 68 A, is republished:—

“No. 68 A of 1863.—His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General of India having decided that the Home system of District and Station Artillery Commands shall, as far as practicable, henceforward obtain in India in supercession of the present system, the following Rules are laid down for observance at the three Presidencies, and will take effect from the respective dates on which the provisions of this order may be carried out at the several Stations.

2. The Artillery serving in each Division and separate District of the Army will comprise an Artillery Divisional or District Command.

3. The Head Quarters of only one Brigade of Artillery will be located in each Division or District, and the Artillery Command of the Division or District will be exercised by the Officer Commanding the Artillery Brigade without extra emolument.

4. When it shall happen that in any Army Division or separate District there shall not be the Head Quarters of any Brigade of Artillery, then the Artillery Divisional or District Command will be held by a selected Field Officer, who will receive a Command allowance of Rupees (300) three hundred when the strength of the Artillery under his Command shall equal three Batteries, and an allowance of Rupees (200) two hundred when the Artillery shall consist of two Batteries.

These rates of Command allowance will be granted, whether the Batteries are or are not of the same Brigade.

5. Officers Commanding Artillery in Divisions or separate Districts will be responsible for the efficient condition of all the Artillery within their Command, and will ordinarily be required to inspect every Battery once during each half-year, under such instructions as may be issued by the Commander in Chief.

6. During their inspections travelling allowance at the usual rate\* will be admitted to Divisional or District Commanders, and also to their Staff Officers, if the Commander in Chief shall direct that the Divisional or District Adjutants shall accompany their Commanding Officers on these occasions.

7. It is to be distinctly understood that during the absence of the Commander and his Staff from the Head Quarters of the Division or District, no extra expense will be sanctioned on account of Command or any other allowances.

8. The Adjutants of Brigades will perform also the Divisional or District duties, receiving an extra allowance of Rupees (20) twenty per mensem.

9. When there is no Brigade Adjutant available, the Adjutant performing the Divisional or District duties will receive Rupees (181-5) one hundred and eighty-one and five annas per mensem, and this allowance will be passed when the strength of the Artillery in the Command shall equal two Batteries.

10. In the event of there being only one Battery or less than two Batteries serving in any Division or District of the Army, no Command allowance or Staff allowance for an Adjutant will be sanctioned.

11. Officers Commanding Artillery Divisions or Districts, will ordinarily, twice in each year, inspect the Arsenals, Magazines, and Ordnance Depôts, and also the Ordnance Mounted in any Forts situated within their Commands.

They will, however, have no authority over Officers of the Ordnance Department, and their duty will be confined to reporting any deficiencies for the information of the Commander in Chief.

His Excellency will, if considered necessary, bring the points reported upon, under the notice of the Government.

12. The Artillery at each Garrison, not being the Head Quarters of a Divisional or District Command, will be commanded by the Senior Officer, and his Command will be designated an Artillery Station Command.

13. If the Command shall consist of two or more Batteries not of the same Brigade, a Command allowance of Rupees (200) two hundred a month will be granted.

This allowance is only admissible to a Regimental Field Officer.

14. If the Batteries at any such Garrison shall belong to the same Brigade, the Station Artillery Command will be exercised by the Senior Regimental Officer, of whatever rank, and no remuneration will be granted.



15. When the strength of an Artillery Station Command shall equal two Batteries, whether of the same Brigade or not, an Adjutant will be allowed, with a Staff salary of Rupees (60) sixty, and Office allowance Rupees (30) thirty, as also an allowance, Rupees (30) thirty, for one Horse if not already in receipt of Horse allowance.

The Receiving Ship "Ajdaah" is of 1,440 tons burthen, built in England in 1846, copper and iron fastened and coppered : she has been decked with Teak.

The Schooner "Constance" is 186 tons burthen ; Schooner "Mahi" of 164 tons burthen. Both vessels were built in Bombay Dock Yard in 1838, with Best Malabar Teak, coppered and copper-fastened, and their Hulls are in good repair and sound condition.

A deposit of 10 per Cent. of the amount tendered is to be sent with the Tender, and good Security given by the tenderer for the payment of the remaining amount, which must be paid within 20 days from the day the offer is accepted by Government, or the deposit will be forfeited, and the Vessels re-sold at the risk and loss of the Tenderer.

The vessels are now lying in the Harbour, where they can be inspected at any time on application, between the hours of 10 A.M. and 4 P.M. daily, Sundays excepted.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

*Dogs*—Each Dog will be charged 2 annas for any distance not exceeding 20 miles; 4 annas for any distance not exceeding 60 miles; 8 annas for any distance not exceeding 75 miles; and 10 annas for any distance not exceeding 110 miles; Dogs will on no account be allowed to accompany Passengers in the carriages.

*Horses*.—The sender of one Horse will be charged at the rate of 2 annas per mile; if two Horses are sent together by the same owner, the rate for the two will be annas 3 per mile, and if three Horses are sent together by the same owner, the rate for the whole will be 4 annas per mile. The lowest charge for sending a Horse will be Rs. 3. The Company will not be answerable for injury done to any Horse of, or above, the value of Rs. 400, unless an additional rate of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on the declared value is paid at the time of Booking.

*Sheep*.—Will be charged at the rate of 2 annas per mile per hundred. The minimum charge being Rs. 5 per hundred. One man will be allowed to travel free with every hundred sheep.

*Cattle*.—Will be charged at the rate of 6 pies per head per mile, the minimum charge being for five animals: one man allowed to travel free with every hundred head of cattle.

*Carriages*.—Each 4-Wheeled Carriage will be charged at the rate of 4 annas per mile, the lowest charge being Rs. 4. Each 2-Wheeled Carriage will be charged at the rate of 3 annas per mile, the lowest charge being Rs. 3. Passengers riding in their own Carriages pay 1st Class fares.

*Goods*.—For Goods' rates see Goods' Table, and Classification, which may be had at the Stations on the line, or at the Company's Offices at Kurrachee and Kotree: all further information required by the public may be had from the Traffic Manager.

*Complaints*.—The Company's Servants are strictly enjoined, on pain of dismissal, to observe the utmost civility towards Passengers, and any instance to the contrary, if mentioned to the Inspector in waiting, or entered in the Complaint Book provided at each Station, or addressed to the Traffic Manager of the Company, will be attended to.

### GENERAL REGULATIONS.

The Company do not guarantee that their Trains shall arrive and depart at the times specified in the Time Bills, nor will they be accountable for any loss, inconvenience, or injury which may arise from delays or detention.

At the intermediate Stations the fares shall be deemed to be accepted, and the tickets furnished only upon condition that there be room in the Train for which the tickets shall be furnished. In case there shall not be room for all the passengers to whom tickets shall have been furnished, those who shall have obtained tickets for the longest distance shall have the preference, and those who shall have obtained tickets for the same distance shall have the preference according to the order in which they shall have received their tickets.

Tickets must be shown to the Company's Servants, or delivered up to them when demanded. Parties not producing their tickets are liable to be charged the fare from the most distant Station from which the Train may have started. They are only available on the day issued. Passengers cannot be re-booked at any intermediate Station by the Train in which they are travelling. Any person who shall attempt to defraud the Company by travelling or attempting to travel upon the Railway without having previously paid his fare, or who shall in any other manner attempt to evade the payment thereof, is subject to a penalty not exceeding Fifty Rupees.

*Children*—Infants in arms will not be charged; Children under 10 years of age, half price.

*Passengers' Luggage*—No free Luggage is allowed, except such small carpet-bags or packages containing personal luggage only as can be placed under the seat occupied by the passenger, and carried in his charge and at his risk, the weight of such small articles not to exceed 25 seers for 1st and 2nd Class Passengers, and 10 seers for 3rd Class Passengers; all other Luggage conveyed will be charged for at the rate of 4 pies per maund per mile; and the Company will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur to luggage not booked and prepaid.

**Caution against sending Valuables by Post.**—Robberies of Mails in various parts of the interior have lately become unfortunately of frequent occurrence, and there seems reason to infer that the highwaymen have been actuated either by information received from accomplices connected with bankers and firms, or by a suspicion that the Mails contain Gold, Banknotes, or other valuables.

Such depredations not only interfere with the safe and speedy transport of the important portion of the Mails, viz. that containing letters, but they entail upon owners of property heavy losses, as well as seriously cripple the efficient working of the Post Office Department.

Government orders on the subject of sending valuables by post are plain and explicit; they are now repromulgated, and the public are hereby cautioned against the practice, in the hope that they will see the advisability of not sending by the Government post, gold or other valuables, as, by so doing, the public Mails are exposed to peril and robbery, and their own property to risk, since the Post Office under the Postal Act\* is freed from responsibility for valuables enclosed in Parcels.

\* POSTAL ACT.—Section 49.

“The Government shall not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur in respect of any thing entrusted to the Post Office for conveyance; and no person employed by the Government in the Post Office Department shall be responsible for any such loss or damage, unless that person shall cause such loss or damage negligently, maliciously, or fraudulently.”

*Postal Regulations.*

“In order to protect as far as possible the Mail from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive Coin, Bullion, Precious Stones, Jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Banghy Post.

If a Post Master be informed or otherwise becomes acquainted with the fact that any letter or parcel contains valuables, he should refuse to receive it.”
