Fort William the 7th September 1863.

Notification.—Under Section XI. of Act XVI. of 1862, the provisions of which have been extended to the year commencing from the 31st day of July 1863, the Honourable the President in Council directs that within the Territories subject to the Government of Bombay, save and except the Town and Island of Bombay, the general or special Notices required by Sections XXXVII. and XXXVIII. of Act XXXII. of 1860 shall not be issued for the year commencing from the 31st day of July 1863 in respect to the duties contained in Schedules 1 and 2 of the said Act, and that in the said Territories, the Town and Island of Bombay excepted, the returns of Profits or Income chargeable with duties under the said Schedules, as prescribed by Section XXXIX. of the said Act, for the year commencing as above, shall not be required; but that in the place of such Notices a general Notice shall be issued in the said Territories, the Town and Island of Bombay excepted, to the effect that, except as provided in Sections V. and VI. of Act XVI. of 1862, the assessment of the duties contained in the said Schedules for the year commencing as above upon the several persons liable thereto, either on their own behalf, or on behalf of any other person, shall be at the rates and on the same amount at and on which such persons were or shall be assessed for the year ending on the 31st day of July 1863, subject to the modifications prescribed in Section I. of Act XXVII. of 1863.

MARINE DEPARTMENT.

The following Circular letter from the Secretary to the Government of India, dated 28th August last, No. 764, is published for general information:—

Sir,—I am directed to state that under the orders of the Honorable the President in Council, an arrangement has been concluded with the British India Steam Navigation Company, "Limited," for the maintenance of a Monthly Line of Steam Communication between Calcutta and Bombay.

2. The dates of departure of the steamers to be employed on this Line are fixed for the present, as follows:—

From Bombay the 13th of each month.

Calcutta the 15th ,, ,,

3. The Ports of call are Bimlipatam, Vizagapatam, Coconada, Madras, Negapatam, Tuticorin, Cochin, Beypore, Cannanore, Mangalore and Sedashagur; but during the S. W. Monsoon only such of the foregoing Ports as it may be practicable to enter. Pondicherry and Colombo may be made Ports of call at the option of the Company.

4. The time of stay at each Port will be, for the present, not less than three hours of day-light and not exceeding twenty-four hours in all; with the exception of Madras, at which Port the stay will be

not less than twenty-four hours and not exceeding seventy-two hours in all.

5. I am to add that the first steamer from Bombay on the above Line will be despatched on the 13th proximo, and from Calcutta on the 15th idem.

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1864.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices, within fifteen days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, under date the . . 8th June 1863.

Read the following papers regarding Rules for Leave of Absence and Pensions to Uncovenated Servants:—

A Memorial on the subject from Uncovenanted Servants in the three Presidencies.

Letter from the Supreme Government to the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 42, of 15th June 1861, forwarding the above Memorial, and one from Officers of the Educational Department in Bengal, with other correspondence, regarding Pension Rules for Educational Officers.

Financial Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, No. 205 of 8th December 1862.

Ordered, that an extract (paragraphs 1 to 18) of the Despatch of the Secretary of State be published in the Calcutta Gazette for general information, and for the guidance of the several Departments of the Supreme Government, of the Local Governments and Administrations, and of all Officers and Departments concerned.

Extract (paragraphs 1 to 18) from a Financial Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, to the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council, No. 205 of 1862, dated the 8th December.

I have considered in Council the Memorial from the Uncovenanted Servants of the several Governments in India, praying for modifications in the existing Rules which govern the grant to them of pensions and leave of absence, together with your Public Letters, dated the 8th and 15th June 1861, Nos. 37 and 42; 6th August 1861, No. 56; and your Financial Letter, dated the 4th August 1862, No. 110, on the same subject.

2. The great body of the Uncovenanted Servants of India have always been Natives; and it has been the just and wise policy of the Government to employ, as largely as they could with advantage, the Natives of India in the administration of their own country. It is still the desire and intention of Her Majesty's Government that whilst, to a certain extent, European agency beyond the Covenanted Servants must always be employed in various situations, Natives of India should constitute the great majority of the Uncovenanted Servants in India.

3. Your Government points out the impossibility of making any distinction between Europeans and Natives. In that opinion I entirely concur, and whilst therefore I cannot but admit that there are differences of various kinds in the circumstances of persons of the different races who are employed in the Uncovenanted Service of India,

it appears to Her Majesty's Government to be indispensable that the Rules to be laid down should be such as are applicable to the whole of that body, of whom the great majority are, and must always be, of Native race and of Native habits

- 4. I think there is however, sufficient ground for an exception as regards Education, Officers, and Law Officers, and Native Judges. In those cases a previous course of study, and in many instances practical experience is required, and there is consequently reason for making a distinction in regard to that class of servants whose claims will therefore be separately considered.
- 5: I now proceed to convey to you the decision of Her Majesty's Government as to the general budy of Uncovenanted Servants.
- 6. It has been decided that no Uncovenanted servant shall in future be allowed to count for pension any period of service antecedent to his having attained the age of 22 years, and in calculating the period of service required by this Despatch as a qualification for pension, the period must be reckoned from that age.
 - 7. The allowances to be granted to Uncovenanted Servants on retirement are, in future, to be as follows, viz:—
 On production of such Medical Certificates as shall satisfy the Government under which the applicant may be serving of his incapacity to serve longer in India—
 - 1. Under fifteen years' service-a gratuity not exceeding twelve months' salary.
 - 2. After fifteen years' service—one-third of his salary (and of his personal allowance if any), provided that in no case shall a pension be granted exceeding the sum of Rupees 3,000 per annum, whatever the amount of salary, nor of Rs. 2,000 per annum, if the salary shall not exceed Rupees 12,000 per annum.
 - 3. After twenty-five years' service—one-half of his average salary (and of his personal allowance, if any) during the previous five years; provided, however, that in no case shall a pension be granted exceeding Rupees 5,000 per annum, whatever the amount of salary, nor exceeding Rupees 4,000 per annum, if the salary shall not exceed Rupees 12,000 per annum.

After thirty years' service, or upwards, a pension may be granted, without production of Medical Certificate, of the same amount and subject to the same limitation, as that sanctioned for twenty-five years' service on Medical Certificate.

- 8. The period of service which is to be admitted in considering a claim to pension must be continuous; but in case of the abolition of the office held by an Uncovenanted Servant, and his being subsequently employed by Government, his first period of service is to be taken into account.
- 9. Pensions of the full amount stated are to be granted only as the reward of approved service. In any case in which an Uncovenanted Servant, without having incurred the penalty of removal from Government employ, shall nevertheless, in the opinion of the Government under which he has been serving, not be entitled to the full amount of pension, the Local Government will make such a reduction in the amount of pension as it shall consider just.
- 10. These pensions have hitherto been payable only in India. As a rule, Europeans on being pensioned, desire to return to this country, and they are consequently under the necessity of employing an agent in India to receive and remit their pensions. If the pensions are allowed to be paid in England, the delay, risk, and inconvenience of agency will be saved, while the charge to Government would be very inconsiderable. Her Majesty's Government have therefore decided that each Uncovenanted Servant shall, on retirement, have the option of drawing his pension either in India or from the Home Treasury. After exercising his option on retirement, he may, at a subsequent period, change the place of payment from England to India, or vice versu. This change can, however, be allowed but once.
- 11. The rate of exchange is an important consideration in regard to payment in England. Her Majesty's Government will not now fix any permanent rate for the purpose; but as a rate of exchange based on the intrinsic value of the rupee, and the market price of bills, is annually fixed, in communication with the Lords of the Treasury for the adjustment of transactions between the British and Indian Exchaquers, which rate is applied to family remittances of Officers serving in India, the same rate appears to be equitable for the payment in England of the pensions of Uncovenanted Servants and is therefore to be adopted.
- 12. I am desirous of being furnished with a list of the Uncovenanted Servants who are entitled to the benefit of the Pension Rules; and it must be understood, that it is not now intended to grant the benefit of those Rules to any of the lower grades of servants who are not at present entitled to pension.
- 13. An Uncovenanted Servant may, under the existing Rules, be granted, on sufficient cause being shown, leave on private affairs for six months in one period, retaining his office with half salary up to 600th per annum, which is the maximum amount allowed to be drawn. This leave may be repeated after intervals of six years, and is allowed to count for pension. Leave of this description may still be granted, but the period of absence will not be allowed to count for pension, and the option may be given to Uncovenanted Servants of taking in lieu of the above leave a furlough for one year after ten years' residence, and a second furlough also for one year after eighteen years' residence in India, such absence being limited to two years during the whole period of service. For such periods an absentee, whose salary does not exceed Rs. 200 per mensem, may be allowed to draw one-half salary, provided, however, that it shall not exceed Rs. 800 or 80th per annum. If the absentees' salary shall be—

On taking leave on private affairs for the first time after the publication of the new Rules, an Uncovenanted Servant must decide whether he will apply for six mouths' leave on private affairs, or for one year's furlough, and having once exercised his option and obtained leave accordingly, he will not, during the remainder of his service, he eligible to the other description of leave.

14. In regard to absence on Medical Certificate, an Uncovenanted Servant under the existing Rules may be granted leave of absence for three years during the whole period of his service, of which two may be continuous, and two only can be counted as service qualifying for pension. For one year of the entire period the absentee may draw half, and during the remainder one-third of his allowances, limited however to 600% per annum.

- 15. Instead of the period of leave now allowed, Her Majesty's Government authorise the grant of leave of absence, on Medical Certificate, with allowances, to the extent of three years, in two periods, of which not more than two years may be taken at one time.
- 16. For the first fifteen months of each period the absentee may be allowed one-half salary, provided that it shall in no case exceed 600l. per annum; and for the remainder of his absence within the prescribed limit, he may be allowed one-fourth of his salary, limited to 300l per annum.
- 17. If any further leave should be applied for on Medical Certificate, it may be granted as exceptional leave, but without any allowance.
- 18. These periods of absence on Furlough and Medical Certificate are not to count for pension : but privilege leave in India may be allowed for one month in each year, which is not, however, to accumulate, and the grant of which must be always subject to the condition that no inconvenience or charge shall be caused to Government thereby; this privilege leave will count in the period of service qualifying for pension.

NOTIFICATION. - The following revised Rules for the grant of Leave of Absence to Uncovenanted Civil Servants are published by order of His Honor the President in Council for general information and guidance :-

LEAVE OF ABSENCE TO UNCOVENANTED SERVANTS.

These Rules are applicable to all Officers of the Uncovenanted Civil Service receiving salaries of not less than Rupees 100 a month, whether they receive their appointments direct from Government or from Heads of Offices and Departments.

The following are the kinds of leave allowed :-

I .- Leave on Medical Certificate.

II .- Leave on Private Affairs and Furlough.

III .- Privilege Leave.

IV .- Preparatory or Additional Leave.

General Rules.

- All applications for leave must be made publicly, through the regular channel, in the Department to which the applicant belongs.
- Officers appointed by Government can obtain privilege leave from the Heads of their respective Departments when the latter are duly authorised to exercise this power. But in other cases leave must be granted by the Government.
- 3. Officers appointed by Heads of Offices and Departments can obtain any leave under these Rules without reference to Government; but the authorities granting such leave must furnish to the Civil or Military Audit Office which passes the Pay Bill of their Establishment a monthly Return of the leave granted by them according to the Form given in Appendix A.
 - Absence without leave will involve loss of salary and render the absence liable to loss of appointment.
- No leave of absence shall have retrospective effect except in case of severe illness, to be attested by a Medical Certificate in the prescribed Form.
- 6. Applications for leave on Medical Certificate must be accompanied by a statement from the medical man by whom the applicant has been attended, distinctly stating, from personal Applications for Leave on Medical Cer-

Applications for Leave on Medical Certificate.

Symbol the applicant has been activated, disease, its symptoms, causes, and duration, so far as the knowledge of the Medical Officer extends, and by a Certificate from the chief Medical Officer of the Station or District, or, if at a Presidency Town, from a Presidency or other Official Surgeon, certifying, after careful personal investigation, the necessity for temporary removal, and the period for which absence is to the best of his judgment absolutely requisite for restoration to health. If the requisite leave be for a longer period than six months, the Certificate must be countersigned by the Superintending Surgeon of the Division in which the applicant may be employed. In cases of leave beyond sea, the Certificate must be also submitted, with the statement of the case, for the countersignature of the Principal Inspector-General of the Medical Department.

7. An application for extension of leave must, if the applicant be in India, be accompanied by a Certificate to Extension of leave on Medical Certificate. there with a statement showing sufficient reason for the extension solicited, and such Certificate must be countersigned by the Principal Inspector-General of the Medical Department, or by the Superintendent Surgeon of the Division in which the applicant may be residing. If the applicant shall have proceeded beyond the territories under the Government of India, he must furnish a Certificate and Statement to the required effect from a Surgeon or Physician at the place of his temporary residence by whom he has been attended; such attendance, and the period of it, to be stated, and the Certificate to be countersigned, after personal examination, by the examining Physician of the India Office, if the absentee is in England, or by the Principal Medical Authority of the Colony or country to which the absentee may have proceeded.

- 8. If any of the above particulars be neglected, or the omission of any one of them unsatisfactorily explained, the leave will be retused.
 - 9. Leave on Private Affairs and Furlough will be granted by Government, or by authorised Officers on sufficient cause being shown, and when the concession of the indulgence may in no way interfere with the interest of the Public Service. Application for Leave on Private Affairs.
- 10. When an Officer on leave in England is permitted by the Home Government, to return to duty by a particular vessel, this permission, if necessary, will be held equivalent to an extension of leave until the arrival in India of the vessel on which the Officer Extension of Leave to date of arrival of Vessel. is permitted to return.
 - 11. Leave on Medical Certificate, with allowances, is limited to the extent of three years in two periods, of which not more than two years may be taken at one time. Should any fur-ther leave be applied for on Medical Certificate, it may be granted, but Leave on Medical Certificate. without any allowance.

GAZETTE-4

Leave on Private Affairs and Furlough. 12. Leave on Private Affairs and Furlough, with retention of office, may be granted as follows:—

- 1st. Leave on Private Affairs-for six months in one period, which leave may be repeated after intervals of six years.
- 2nd. Or a Furlough -for one year after ten years' service, and a second Furlough, also for one year, after eighteen years' service in India, such absence being limited to two years during the whole period of service.
- 13. On taking leave under the preceding Rule, for the first time, an Officer must decide whether he will apply for leave on Private Affairs, or for Furlough, and having once exercised his option and obtained leave accordingly, he will not, during the remainder of his service, be eligible to the other description of leave.
- 14. Furlough and Leave on Private Affairs taken in India, will reckon from the date of leaving office to the date of return thereto. Furlough and Leave on Private Affairs taken beyond India will reckon from the sailing of the vessel on which the Officer embarks to the date of his return to India.
 - 15 Furlough or Leave on Private Affairs cannot be taken in continuation of privilege leave.
- 16. Privilege leave, when it can be granted without injury to the Public Service, and without additional expense to the State, may be allowed for not more than one month in each Calendar year, to be taken either in one period or in not more than two instalments. This leave is not allowed to accumulate and will therefore lapse if not taken within the year.
- 17. Privilege leave for one month in each Calendar year may be allowed to Officers who have not been absent on leave for eleven months immediately preceding, unless they took their last privilege leave in two instalments, in which case the indulgence will not be available until eleven months after the expiration of the first instalment and six months after expiration of the second instalment of the previous year's privilege leave.
- 18. Preparatory or additional leave is allowed to Officers proceeding to or from a Sanitarium on Medical Preparatory Leave. Certificate, or to or from the port of embarkation from India to Europe on Private Affairs, Furlough, or Medical Certificate, and is limited to such period as the authority granting leave may think sufficient. Officers proceeding from Presidency Towns on sick leave beyond Sea will be allowed fourteen days for preparation.
- 19. Officers retiring from the Service on pension will be allowed fourteen days' leave on half pay, provided the indulgence can be given without detriment or extra expense to the Public Service.

Absentee Pay.

- 20. Absentee pay, if at half salary, shall in no case exceed Rupees 6,000 or 600l. per annum :—or if at one-fourth salary, shall not exceed 300l. per annum. Within these limitations Absentee pay will be given as follows:—
- I.—To an Officer absent on sick leave in or out of India—half salary for the first fifteen months of each period of absence, and one-fourth salary during the remainder of his absence on allowances.
- II. To an Officer on leave on private affairs off—one-half his salary for a period not exceeding six months of continuous absence, and for any further period of preparatory leave which may be granted to him. But if an Officer absent on private affairs obtained an extension of leave on Medical Certificate, he will be subject for the whole period of his absence to the rules for sick leave.
- III. To an Officer proceeding on furlough whose salary does not exceed Rupees 200 per month—one-half of his salary; provided, however, that it shall not exceed Rs. 800 or 80l. per annum. If the absentee's salary shall be—

- IV. To an Officer on preparatory leave—one-half salary before commencement of other leave; and on return from leave—one-half or one-fourth salary, or furlough pay, according to the rate of salary he may be then drawing:
 - V. To an Officer on privilege leave-full pay.
- 21. An Officer who overstays privilege leave by not more than one month will forfeit pay for the period in excess, but if he exceed his leave by more than one month his office will become vacant. An Officer on privilege leave who may resign the service, or who may obtain sick leave without first re-joining will, in the former case, forfeit his salary for the period of privilege leave; and in the latter case be subject to the Rules for sick leave for the whole'

Rules for joining Office.

Time allowed for joining an appointment will be fixed by the Authority conferring the appointment.

An Officer entering the service of the Government is not entitled to any salary before joining his appointment; but when transferred from one appointment to another of equal or higher value, he will draw so much of the salary of his new office as may be equal to that of his former appointment.

Payments of Absentee Allowances.

- 22. Officers absent on privilege leave cannot draw pay until their return to duty.
- 23. Officers proceeding to England on Furlough, or on Private Affairs, or on Medical Certificate, must obtain Certificates from the Civil Paymaster, in the Form given below, for submission to the India Office on their arrival in London:—

24. But if they desire to draw their allowances through their Agents in India, the latter must execute a guarantee to refund over-payments. When Officers remain in India and draw their allowances themselves, and attach to their bills Life Certificates attested by a Deputy Magistrate or a Covenanted District Officer, they will not be required to furnish any security.

NOTIFICATION.—The following revised Rules for the grant of Pensions and Superannuation Allowances to certain classes of Uncovenanted Servants are published by order of His Honor the President in Council, for general information and guidance:—

Pension Rules for Uncovenanted Servants other than Educational Officers, Law Officers, and Native Judges, receiving more than Rupees 10 a month, and belonging to classes eligible to Pension under the Orders of Government.

General Rules for Application for Pension.

Applications for pension must be submitted in a letter to Government by the Head of the Office or Department in which the applicant may be employed, who shall certify that the character, conduct, and past service of the applicant are such as to entitle him to the favourable consideration of Government.

- 2. Every application shall be accompanied by a Register prepared according to Form A. in the Appendix. In cases of other than a Good Service Pension every application shall be accompanied by a Medical Certificate, stating the applicant's incapacity for further service, with the cause thereof, and that it has not been induced by irregular or intemperate habits.
- 3. Applicants for a Superannuation Allowance must be examined by the Principal Inspector General of the Medical Department, if serving at the Presidency, or by a Military Invaliding Committee if serving elsewhere within a moderate distance of a Station at which a Military Invaliding Committee, is periodically assembled. It is optional, however, with the Local Government to accept the Certificate of a single Medical Officer, or to convene a Special Invaliding Committee at a convenient Civil Station, if the applicant be serving at an inconvenient distance from a Station where a Military Invaliding Committee can be assembled.
- 4. Good Service and Superannuation Allowances on retirement, sanctioned under these Rules by the Local Governments, will be reported to the Government of India in Quarterly Returns in the Form given in Appendix B.

Allowances on Retirement.

- 5. On production by an applicant of such Medical Certificates as shall satisfy the Government under which he may be serving, of his incapacity to serve longer in India, he will be allowed—
 - I. Under fifteen years' service, a gratuity not exceeding twelve months' salary.
- II. After fifteen years' service, one-third of his average salary (and of his personal allowance, if any) during the previous five years; provided that in no case shall a pension be granted exceeding the sum of Rupees 3,000 per annum, whatever the amount of salary, nor of Rupees 2,000 per annum, if the salary shall not exceed Rupees 12,000 per annum.
- III. After twenty-five years' service, one-half of his average salary (and of his personal allowance, if any) during the previous five years; provided, however, that in no case shall a pension be granted exceeding Rupees 5,000 per annum, whatever the amount of salary, nor exceeding Rupees 4,000 per annum, if the salary shall not exceed Rupees 12.000 per annum.
- 6. After thirty years' service or upwards a pension may be granted, without production of Medical Certificate, of the same amount and subject to the same limitation as that sanctioned for twenty-five years' service on Medical Certificate. This pension, as the reward of faithful, efficient discharge of duty for thirty years, is termed a Good Service Pension.
- 7. Pensions of the full amount authorised in paragraphs 5 and 6 are to be granted only as the reward of approved service. In any case in which an Uncovenanted Servant, without having incurred the penalty of removal from Government employ, shall, nevertheless, in the opinion of the Government under which he has been serving, not be entitled to the full amount of pension, the Local Government will make such a reduction in the amount of pension as it shall consider just.
- 8. The foregoing rates of pension and gratuity are applicable also, without the production of a Medical Cartificate of unfitness for service, to Officers discharged on reduction of Establishment.

Service towards Pension.

- 9. Dismissal for misconduct entails forfeiture of the benefit of past service.
- 10. Service as a substitute does not count towards pension.
- 11. Periods of service before the age of 22, or of absence on other than privilege leave and preparatory leave shall not count towards pension.
- 12. The whole of the service, in virtue of which pension is claimed, must have been passed in an eligible grade and on a permanent Establishment; but claims barred by this Rule will be specially considered if the promotion from an incligible grade was bestowed as a reward for meritorious service or for good conduct.
- 13. The period of service must be continuous, but in case of the abolition of the office held by an Officer, and his being subsequently employed by Government, his first period of service is to be taken into account.

Gratuities

14. When an Officer is discharged with a gratuity under these Rules on reduction of establishment, the gratuity will not be given to him in one sum, but in monthly instalments of a month's pay until the full amount is exhausted. Should be be re-employed before or after the period for which gratuity is allowed, he will have the option of refunding the gratuity and recovering his former service, or of forfeiting that service by retaining the gratuity. In the latter case, any balance of gratuity remaining undrawn at the date of his re-employment may be paid to him.

Payment of Pensions.

- 15. Payment of pension will commence from the date on which the applicant ceases to be borne on the Establishment, or from that of his application, whichever may be the latter date.
- 16. No pension shall be payable in arrear, for a period exceeding six months, without the express sanction of the Government obtained through the Civil Paymaster,—unless the cause of the suspension of payment shall have been the neglect, order, or act of some public Officer and beyond the control of the Pensioner, when the Civil Paymaster, on a reference being made to him, shall exercise his discretion in passing arrears for payment, or submit a representation of the case for the information and orders of Government, as he shall consider proper.
- 18. An Officer shall, on retirement, have the option of drawing his pension either in India or from the Home Treasury. After exercising his option on retirement, he may, at a subsequent period, change the place of payment from England to India, or vice versa. This change can, however, be allowed but once. The payments in England will be made at the rate of exchange which is annually fixed in communication with the Lords of the Treasury for the adjustment of transactions between the British and Indian Exchequers.

Read reply thereto in paragraphs 19 to 24 of the Despatch from the Secretary of State, No. 205, dated 8th December 1862.

Fort William, the 6th August 1862.

Sir, - The Rules of the 4th Januray 1831, regarding the grant of pensions to Uncovenanted Servants, restrict the amount of pension to half salary for those who have served for thirty years or more (except as regards Law Officers and Native Judges, in whose case twenty-two years' service is sufficient), and to one-third for those who have served for a shorter period, not less than twenty years (fifteen years being substituted for twenty in the case of Law Officers and Native Judges).

- 2. Referring, however, to the extension of the service and the alteration in the prospects of its members stated the Rules were passed, the late Court of Directors decided, in their Despatch No. 21, dated the 28th February 1855, that 500% per annum should be the maximum pension to be granted to Uncovenanted Officers "hereafter appointed to the Service." Accordingly, as respects all Uncovenanted Officers who entered the Service prior to that date, the Rules of 4th January 1831 continue to be applied, and with reference to the continually increasing number of highly paid appointments which are now thrown open to Uncovenanted Servants, the Government of Bom-
- * The date of the orders of the Government of India notifying the decision of the Court of Directors in their Despatch No. 21 of 1855.
- bay, anticipating that the State will become saddled with large pensions payable on their retirement from the Service, have addressed us proposing that "before any Uncovenanted Servant who shall have entered the Service before the 19th May* 1855 is promoted to an appointment, the salary of which is Rupees 10,000 per annum and upwards, he shall be called upon to renounce formally any claim to pension beyond the sum of 500*l*. per annum."
- 3. The restriction proposed by the Bombay Government is in itself quite reasonable, and the only doubt we find regarding it is whether it is the proper way of attaining the object in view.
- 4. The Uncovenanted Service it seems to us, cannot claim to have any rights under the Rules of 1831 beyond what may be considered to arise out of the general pledge, which those Rules may be taken to give, that a member of that service when rendered incapable of further duty shall not be discharged without some pensionary support. As regards the amount of pension to be given, the Rules merely fix a limit which is not to be exceeded, and altered the state of the service when rendered incapable of further duty shall not be discharged without some pensionary support. and although it has, with rare exceptions, been the practice to allow the highest pension of which the Rules allow, this practice cannot be admitted to confer on the Uncovenanted Service any right to claim that maximum in all cases without any regard whatever to the original design and scope of the Rules.
- 5. The Rules of 1831 were obviously not framed with a view to the duties and emoluments of the high offices which are now bestowed on the Uncovenanted Service.
- Apart from any question of construction of the Rules as they stand, we see no ground for holding that the Government in passing the Rules of 1831, pledged the State to allow pensions on the scale, and according to the conditions therein prescribed, to all Uncovenanted Servants who were at that time in the Public Service, or who might enter the Service, while the Rules yet remained in force.
- 7. It appears to us that it was always open to the Government to modify these Rules whenever it might in good faith consider that the public interests called for their modification; and when it appeared that the circumstances of the Uncovenanted Service were becoming rapidly changed, and that the Rules which were framed chiefly in reference to Natives of India, among whom at that time it is probable that no salary higher than 500 or 600 Rupees a month would have been found, were claimed as applicable to a class of appointments for which they never were meant to provide we excite the Government would have been found. were meant to provide, we consider that the Government would have been perfectly justified in framing new Rules and making them applicable to all classes of appointments, which were plainly not included within the original intention of the Rules of 1831. This would have been a direct, and, in our judgment, a very legitimate way of attaining the object, which it is now proposed to attain by the somewhat doubtful proceeding of refusing promotion to a deserving Officer, unless he will consent to abandon that to which it is assumed he has a right under the existing
- We incline to think, notwithstanding the difficulty which is undoubtedly caused by the Proceedings of 1855, referred to in the second paragraph of this letter, that even now it will be better that the Government should assert its right to alter the Rules of 1831, as regards all appointments clearly not embraced by the original intention of those Rules, and to declare such alteration applicable to all Uncovenanted Servants, whether they entered the Public Service before 1855 or since.
- 9. But if this be done it may be right perhaps, having regard to the expectations which must naturally have been created by the order of 1835, to allow the full advantages of the Rules of 1831, with respect to all appointments made up to the present time, and held by Officers who entered the Public Service before 1855. Thus, such an Officer already holding an appointment of Rupees 1,500 a month will, on superannuation after twenty-two or thirty years' service, according to the class of appointment, be able to claim a pension up to 900l. a year; but he will not, if hereafter promoted to higher emoluments, be able to claim a still larger pension calculated on those higher emoluments.
- The distinction which will thus be made between persons (all having entered the Public Service before 1855) who have already obtained promotion to high and lucrative employment, and those who are yet

looking for such promotion, may possibly appear unreasonable and invidious, but it will not really affect the latter class more injuriously than will the proposal submitted by the Government of Bombay, and it is a course which, on the whole, seems to us less open to objection than the Bombay plan.

11. We request the favour of an early decision upon this reference.

Extract (paragraphs 19 to 24) from a Financial Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, to the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council, No. 205 of 1862, dated the 8th December.

- PARA. 19. I have also had under consideration your Financial letter, dated the 6th August 1862, No. 111, in which you refer to a proposition made by the Government of Bombay, in reference to the restriction on the maximum amount of pension prescribed in the Financial Despatch of the Court of Directors, to the Government of India, dated the 28th February 1855, No. 21.
- 20. That Despatch fixed the sum of £500 as the maximum pension to be granted to Uncovenanted Servants hereafter appointed to the Service," The Government of Bombay consider that it would be expedient to require any Uncovenanted Servant, who entered the service before the date of the orders of your Government on the Despatch of the Court of Directors, and who shall hereafter be promoted to an appointment, the salary of which is Rupees 10,000 per annum, and upwards, to renounce formally any claim to pension beyond the sum of £500 per annum.
- 21. In reference to that opinion of the Government of Bombay, you observe that the Uncovenanted Service "cannot claim to have any rights under the Rules of 1831, beyond what may be considered to arise out of the general pledge which those Rules may be taken to give, that a member of that Service, when rendered incapable of further duty, shall not be discharged without some pensionary support. As regards the amount of pension to be given, the Rules merely fix a limit which is not to be exceeded, and although it has, with rare exceptions, been the practice to allow the highest pension of which the Rules allow, this practice cannot be admitted to confer on the Uncovenanted Service any right to claim that maximum in all cases without any regard whatever to the original design and scope of the Rules."
- 22. You nevertheless consider that, with reference to the Order of 1855, it may be right "to allow the full advantages of the Rules of 1831, with respect to all appointments made up to the present time, and held by Officers who entered the Public Service before 1855. Thus, such an Officer, already holding an appointment of Rupees 1,500 a month will, on superannuation after twenty-two or thirty years' service, according to the class of appointment, be able to claim a pension up to £900 a year, but he will not, if hereafter promoted to higher emoluments, be able to claim a still larger pension calculated on those higher emoluments.
- 23. I must observe that, under the existing Pension Rules, an Uncovenanted Servant is not entitled to claim a pension of the full amount, which is only authorized as the reward of approved service, and when the Rules were framed it could not have been contemplated that a larger pension than £500 per annum could ever be granted.
 - 21. Under any circumstances, therefore, the full pension should only be awarded in cases of extraordinary merit

No. 479 of 1863.—Such of the Soldiers' necessaries as must be imported from England will be supplied to the Troops by Government in future.

Indents for this purpose are to be sent to the Adjutant General's Office, for transmission to Government and the India Office.

The articles, will be supplied at cost price, with the addition of a percentage to cover freight, incidental charges and deterioration.

The application to this Presidency of the following extract of a General Order by the Commander in Chief in India on this subject is sanctioned:—

This refers only to such (necessaries) as will have to be imported from England. Most of these articles can be procured locally, and the Commander in Chief desires the attention of Commanding Officers to the advantages, of this method of obtaining them.

"Besides the great saving of time, and perhaps of expense, the Soldier will always be better satisfied with anything purchased by himself or with his own knowledge. It may also be made the powerful means of developing regimental workshops.

"His Excellency therefore desires that in all instances recourse may first be had to the regimental institutions for such articles as can be made by the Soldier tradesmen, and to the local markets; the resources of Jails and Public Factories will also be available.

"Soldiers should be permitted to purchase these articles themselves in the bazar, whenever practicable, under the supervision of a Non-Commissioned Officer; but care must be taken that they are of the established regimental pattern. The Officers of the Commissariat Department will, under the orders of the Government, furnish the local prices and any other assistance which Commanding Officers may require."

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Financial Department, dated 18th August 1863.

Read again Paragraph 11 of a Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 129, dated 9th August 1861.

Read again Financial Orders, dated 25th September 1861.

Read again Financial Resolution, dated 19th August 1861, No. 10258.

Read again Endorsement from the Home Department, dated 9th June 1863, No. 3661, and the orders passed thereon, dated 23rd idem.

RESOLUTION.—In sanctioning the payment of certain bills referred with the abovementioned Endorsement from the Home Department, amounting to Rupees 704-2-8, for maps and instruments obtained by the Superintendent of the Geological Survey from the Office of the Surveyor General of India, the attention of the Honorable the President in Council has been drawn to the existing rule of cash payments for the value of stores received by one Department of Government from another.

- 2. This rule, he observes, originated with a suggestion of the Accountant General to the Government of Madras, that the Commissariat Department of that Presidency should cease to incur expense on account of supplies for the Civil Departments, and that all Civil Officers who received such supplies should obtain them in the market. The Government of Madras having adopted this suggestion, requested this Government to make arrangements for the supply of stores to the Civil Departments subordinate to this Government which obtained their supplies through the Madras Commissariat, and the Auditor General of India was thereupon directed to issue orders to the heads of all the Departments concerned, to the effect that, in future, stores should be procured from the market, or, if to the advantage of Government, through the Madras Commissariat on the usual indents, but that in either case cash must be paid for the supplies.
- 3. Subsequently, at the suggestion of the Military Finance Department, this rule was made general for all India, without reference to the source through which supplies were procured, the object being that by compelliag cash payments, which must necessarily be made by a Civil or Military authority, the transaction must come directly under the review of the controlling Officer of the service to which it relates.
- 4. His Honor in Council further observes that, in accordance with the terms of paragraph 11 of the despatch from the Secretary of State for India, No. 129 of 1861, dated 9th August, the charges for Stores obtained from England appear as charges in the Indian accounts and estimates, under the heads of account to which the expenses of the Departments and Officers indenting for them are debitable; but that on the issue of such stores by the indenting Officers and Departments, for the use of other Departments of the Public Service, the former under existing rules demand and receive cash payment for the value from the latter.
- 5. Again, in respect to Stores manufactured in this country, such as Gunpowder manufactured in the Government Agencies under the control of the Military Department, and Maps, &c. prepared in the Office of the Surveyor General of India, the cost of which appears in the first instance in the public accounts to the debit of the Departments concerned, His Honor in Council observes that on the issue of Gunpowder by the Military Department for the use of the Police Department, and on the supply of maps by the Surveyor General to the several Public Departments and Officers requiring them, the latter are required to pay for them in cash, under existing rules.
- 6, On a reconsideration of the whole subject, His Honor in Council observes that the system of inter-departmental cash payments above described entails much waste of public time and labour in the unnecessary issue of money from the public treasuries, which, after passing through the hands of the Officers concerned, finds its way back into the Treasuries, and leads to a multiplication of transactions in the shape of departmental debits, and credits, the adjustment of which is one cause of the delay in rendering the accounts, and of the uncertainty whether the periodical statements made of them can be accepted as final. The practice also involves double charges being made for Government Stores in the Budget Estimates, and in the accounts founded on them, whereby the estimates and accounts are confused, and the expenditure is made to appear greater than it is.
- 7. The real check against extravagant expenditure of Government Stores is the efficient supervision of the Officer or Department with whom the responsibility rests of fixing or controlling the amount of the Indent. In Officer or Department with whom the responsionly rests of uting of controlling the amount of the indent. In the event, however, of any Indent appearing to contain items of an unusual or of an unnecessarily expensive character, either as regards quantity or quality, it will be the duty of the Officer charged with the supply to call attention to it, and to await a final decision previously to executing the order, unless it should be of an emergent character.
- 8. His Honor in Council therefore directs that the system of cash payments by one Department of Government to another for the value of Stores already paid for by Government be discontinued, and that stores so transferred be charged as final charges in the accounts of the supplying Department, in the same manner as Stores issued for the use of the supplying Department itself.
- 9. But when one Department purchases articles for another in the market, the Department which makes the Indent must provide in its Budget Estimate for the cost, and place the supplying Department in funds by Transfer

cornered, that a copy of the above Resolution be sent to the Home, Foreign, Military, Public Works, and Military Finance Departments, the several Local Governments and Administrations, the Auditor General of India, the Accountant General to the Government of India, the Several local Deputy Auditors and Accountants General, and the Civil Paymasters, for information and guidance.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Phacies, Robberies, Felonies, Misdemeanors, Offences, and other Maritime Crimes whatsoever done or committed on the High Seas

And I hereby give Notice to all persons bound to prosecute and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

Revenue Survey and Assessment, Goozerat.

It being generally believed that the Superintendent of Revenue Survey and Assessment is empowered by Law to put up Survey Boundary

Soopa Parchole Bulsar Parnera Bugwara Chowrashee Mandvie Unkleshwur Broach Amod Wagra

Marks, at certain fixed charges, irrespective of the cost of labour in different Districts, the Superintendent of Revenue Survey and Assessment Goozerat hereby gives notice to the owners, occupiers, and cultivators of land, in the Talookas (of the principal division of the Surat Collectorate, and Sub-Collectorate of Broach,) noted in the margin, which will be under Survey this season, that they them-

Survey this season, that they themselves are allowed by law to put up Boundary Marks (by their own hired labourers) so long as such marks are of the size and material approved by the Survey Officers, and the owners, occupiers, and cultivators of land are hereby required to do so as soon as their fields are measured.

- 2. If within two days of the measurement of any field, the owner, occupier, or cultivator does not erect the Boundary Marks required by law, he will be served with the Notice required by Act III. of 1846, and if within the days of grace allowed by the said Notice, the owner, occupier, or cultivator fails to erect Boundary Marks of the size and number required, such marks will be erected by the Survey Officers, and the cost (whatever it may be) recovered under the provisions of Act III. of 1846.
- 3. Neither the Superintendent, nor Assistants Superintendent of Revenue Survey, have any power to regulate the price of labour, and if owners and occupiers of land (who can always employ their own farm labourers to erect Boundary Marks) decline to do so, under the impression that the Survey Officers are obliged by law to erect Boundary Marks at a cheap rate, they will find they are mistaken, and must take the consequences.
- 4. In those Districts in which stones are procurable, and where stone Boundary Marks are allowed, the Survey Officers will be prepared through their Contractors—to furnish stones of the regulation size, at a small fixed charge per stone.

The arrangement therein ordered is, it will be observed, to be carried into effect from the commencement of the next official year, and the necessary provision will accordingly have to be made in the Budget for that year, now under preparation:—

"Fort William, Office of Auditor General of India, the 7th September 1863.

CIRCULAR-No. 63.

From the Auditor General of India,
To all Deputy Auditors and Accountants General.

SIR.

Under instructions from the Government of India, No. 4300, dated 4th instant, I have the honour to inform you that, with a view to simplify and expedite the settlement of the Accounts, it has been determined that the undermentioned payments, now shown in your Financial Returns under 'Adjusted Charges on account of other Governments,' shall be treated as Payments of the Presidency or Province in which the money is paid.

2. The classes of payments to which this principle is to be applied are the Political and Territorial pensions adjusted under 'B. II. Allowances and Assignments under Treaties and Engagements,' and Superannuation Pensions and other payments adjusted under F. VII.—You will accordingly include all such payments in the Budget Estimates of your own Government from 1864-65. The provision hitherto made for these payments in the Budget Estimates of other Governments and Provinces will as a necessary consequence be discontinued.

3. For example, the Territorial and Political Pensions paid in the North Western Provinces on account of the Pombay Presidency, will be omitted from the Bombay Budget, and provided for in the Budget of the North Western Provinces as a final charge under 'B. II.'—Service Pensions paid in Oude on account of Bengal will be omitted from the Bengal Budget, and provided for in the Oude Budget as a final charge under 'F. VII.' Thus, all Political and Service pensions paid from Treasuries within your Presidency, will be provided for in your Budget Estimates as a charge of your own Government, while all similar payments which other Governments and Administrations may be called upon to make on account of your Government, will be similarly provided for as charges of their own.

4. Payments made to Officers, Civil or Military, of other Governments, while employed on any civil duty within the limits of your Government, will also be charged from 1864-65 against the Budget provision of your own Government for the respective Departments to which such Officers may be attached. No distinct or separate provision is required in this case in your Budget Estimate, which is taken for the full authorized Establishments, but should the Budget limit under any head be exceeded from this cause, the fact should be noted in your annual Appropriation Audit Statement.

5. The payments made to Officers of other Presidencies while on leave will continue to be debited as 'Adjusted Charges' of the Presidency concerned until further orders.

5. The following conditions are to be observed in sending Printed Papers:-

1st .- Every Packet must be sent without a cover or with a cover open at the end or sides.

2nd .- There must be no enclosure except Newspapers or other Printed Papers.

3rd .- There must be no other writing or marks upon the Newspapers or Printed Papers than the name and address of the person to whom they are sent, nor anything upon the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the papers, and the printed name and address of the Publisher or the Vendor who sends them.

4th .- No packet must exceed 2 feet in length, width, or depth, or three pounds in weight.
