No. 351 of 1865.—The following rules are published for general guidance:—

Clothing and Bedding used by Cholera Patients whilst suffering from the disease should be boiled in water for at least a quarter of an hour. A responsible person should see this effectually done in his presence.

In most Cantonments vessels may be found in the possession of the Washermen or elsewhere sufficiently large for boiling such articles; and it ought rarely to happen that the necessary disinfection cannot thus be done.

When, however, circumstances prevent the desired effective use of boiling water, all textile articles which have been soiled by the discharges of Cholera Patients should be burned at once. They should not be stored for boiling at some future time.

No. 352 of 1865.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 22nd May 1865, No. 504, is republished:—

"No. 504 of 1865.—With reference to G. G. O. Nos. 363 and 364, dated 30th March 1860, the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following paragraphs of a letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 109, dated 7th April 1865, and to notify that the increased allowances therein authorized are to have effect from the 1st May 1865:—

Paragraph 1. With my letter dated 24th November 1859, No. 412, I transmitted to you copies of a Royal Warrant, dated 1st July 1859, regulating the rank, pay, promotion, and retirement of Veterinary Surgeons of Her Majesty's British Forces; and I directed that such parts of this Warrant as related to relative rank and precedence should be made applicable to the Veterinary Surgeons of Her Majesty's Indian Forces. At that time, it was not considered expedient to alter the existing regulations affecting the pay and allowances, or the conditions of invaliding and retirement, of this class of Officers.

2. Consequent on the recent extension to Medical Officers of the benefits of the rates of pay and allowances fixed by the Royal Warrant of 1st October 1858, for the Medical Officers of the Army, I have had under my consideration in Council the subject of the allowances drawn in India by Veterinary Surgeons of the British and Indian Forces respectively.

3. Your letter, dated 21st December last, No. 470, also draws my attention to the present scale of pay to Veterinary Surgeons in India, which is stated to be relatively much less than that granted in England and the Colonies.

4. It appears to me that the time has now arrived at which other provisions of the Royal Warrant of 1st July 1859 may be introduced into India, in addition to those specified in my letter of the 24th November 1859, above referred to.

5. It has been accordingly resolved that the rate of pay laid down in the Royal Warrant, with the Indian allowances of the relative rank of the Officer, shall, for the future, be adopted as the scale of pay for Veterinary Surgeons of the British and Indian Forces. From the date of the commencement of these allowances, all extra allowance of whatever description will cease.

Paragraph 1.—In anticipation of the receipt of the report called for from your Government,\* as to the future establishment of Medical Officers required for the separate and local Indian service, I have to acquaint you that measures have been taken for providing Assistant Surgeons for the Indian service.

2. Shortly after my Despatch of the 7th November 1864 had been forwarded to you, notices were inserted in the public papers that an examination for thirty appointments to Her Majesty's Indian Medical Service would be held in February 1865.

3. The examination was held at Chelsea Hospital under the direction of the Army Medical Department.

4. Twenty-seven candidates have been returned as successful, and with the exceptions hereafter named, they have joined the Army Medical School at Netley, for the purpose of undergoing a course of instruction in Hygiene, Military Medicine, &c.

5. The following arrangements have been made with regard to Medical Officers who may be appointed to the Indian service:—

1. Passage allowance to India will be given on appointment.

2. Pay at War Office rates, *i. e.*, 10s. a day will be allowed from date of passing final examination at Netley.

3. Indian allowances and time of service for pension will reckon from date of arrival in India. The period of residence at the Army Medical School will reckon as service for the full pay pension only.

6. The gentlemen named in the margin, being students at the Army Medical School, Netley, were permitted, with the sanction of the Secretary of State for War, to compete at the examination.

In order that these six Assistant Surgeons may not obtain an undue advantage over the other candidates now at Netley, by being allowed to proceed to India before them, they will not be allowed to reckon the period they have already passed at the Army Medical School as service for full pay pension. They will, however, draw Indian allowances, and reckon service for pension from the date of their arrival in India.

10. Six copies of the Regulations for the examination of candidates for the appointment of Assistant Surgeon in Her Majesty's Indian Medical Service are herewith enclosed.

I have received and considered in Council your separate Military letter in this Department, No. 320, dated 19th September 1864, regarding the mode to be pursued in the case of men of the Sappers and Miners, volunteers for general service, who have elected for particular regiments, and who wish to re-engage for a second period of service.

2. I concur in the opinion of your Government, and that of His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, that those men should be borne as supernumerary on the Rolls of those Regiments for which they have respectively volunteered, their rank being as suggested by His Excellency that which they hold in the Sappers and Miners.

3. This arrangement has received the concurrence of His Royal Highness the Field Marshal Commanding in Chief.

4. I approve of your decision, that the sum of twenty pounds (£20) charged to a Sapper under the Regulations of Her Majesty's Indian Service, in addition to the usual amount required for discharge by purchase, shall be discontinued, but the amount to be charged in future should be the same as that for men of the Royal Engineers.

5. With reference to the case of Sapper Maclean, of the Madras Establishment, which was disposed of in accordance with the information furnished in your separate Military letter No. 310, dated 30th August 1864, I have to inform you, that the discharge certificates of all Warrant Officers, Sappers and Miners, and men of the Unattached List, if they are general service men, from whatever Corps they may be discharged, are to specify the position they held in Her Majesty's Indian Service.

1. I have received and considered in Council your letter in this Department, No. 195 of 1864, together with paragraph 18 of No. 34 of 1865, upon the subject of the grant, at a subsequent period, of passage to Europe at the public expense, to Soldiers who on discharge, with or without pension, elect to remain in India.

2. Such men are not, under the Regulations, entitled to passage to Europe \* \* \* \*

5. I have \* resolved, as a general rule, that a free passage shall not be allowed to those Soldiers who, on discharge, elect to remain in India.

6. I consent, however, to the grant, in special cases, by the Governments of the respective Presidencies, as proposed by His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, and concurred in by your Government, of free passage to men of certified good character who have remained in India after discharge, and fallen into distress owing to failing health, or inability to obtain employment, when this inability is not the consequence of their own misconduct. Every case should be separately and specially reported.

7. In the event of the grant of passage to any local service man, who is a pensioner, his pension will be in abeyance during the period occupied by the voyage.

No. 566 of 1865.—As a temporary measure, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that in cases of transfers or volunteers from one corps to another, where the uniform of the corps differ in such a manner that the clothing brought with the transfers and volunteers cannot be altered to correspond with that of their new corps, and when there may be no part-worn clothing in store with the latter, to exchange with that brought with the transfers and volunteers, new clothing will be issued to them under the following regulations:—

If similar articles of clothing in wear with the corps have three months and more to last, when issued annually; six, when issued biennially; the new clothing required will be provided, and will be renewed at the next regular issue; but if similar articles in use with the corps have less than the periods mentioned to last, the new clothing required will be provided in advance of the next regular issue, and is to be worn until the end of the period for which it would have served, had it not been issued until the regular time of delivery.



Transfers and volunteers to corps where the clothing of the former regiment cannot be made available, will be allowed to take with them, as their own property, one pair of cloth trowser or trews, and one pair of boots or shoes, the remainder of the clothing taken with them, and which cannot be altered, being sold for the benefit of the State, when the new clothing is issued.

Any soldier so taking his discharge and permitted to reside at any place, other than that of his discharge, will, in addition to the abovementioned amount, be granted, when not supplied with a free passage for himself and family, a travelling allowance to his elected place of residence, at the rate of one anna per mile for himself and his wife, and eight pies for each child accompanying him.

3. This allowance is never to be drawn in advance.

Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.
