Notification of the University of Bombay.

No. 7 OF 1866-67.

BY-LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

It is hereby notified that the following alterations in and additions to the By-laws and Regulations of the University of Bombay have been duly made by the Senate, and approved by the Governor of Bombay in Council.

I. That the words "Fifth Saturday in the First Term in Arts" be substituted for the words "Third Monday in December" in By-Law 1, p. 54 of the University Calendar for 1865-66.

II. That the words "Faculties of Arts and Civil Engineering" be introduced in By-Law 31, p. 59 of the Calendar for 1865-66, instead of the words "Faculties of Arts."

III. That in the second paragraph of Reg. 31, p. 59 of the Calendar for 1865-66, the word "First" be altered to "Second," and in the third paragraph the word "Second" be altered to "First," and then that these two paragraphs be made to change places; and that in Reg. 33 the word "eighty" be changed to "ninety," and the word "ninety" to "eighty."

IV. That the words "First Monday in the First Term in Arts" be substituted for the equivalent words "Third Monday in November," in Reg. 1, p. 61, and in Reg. 30, p. 70, and for the words "First Monday in December" in Reg. 1, p. 74.

V. That in Reg. 10, p. 63, and Reg. 43, p. 73, for the word "Syndicate" the word "Examiners" be substituted.

VI. That the words "Second Monday in the First Term in Arts," be substituted for the words "First Monday in December," in Reg. 13, p. 63, and for the words "Second Monday in December," which have not yet come into operation, in Reg. 21, p. 66.

VII. That the *N. B.*'s be removed from page 63 and page 66 of the Calendar for 1865-66.

VIII. That in Reg. 14, p. 63, after the word "Terms" the following be inserted "at a College or Institution recognized in Arts."

IX. That after the *N. B.* in page 64, the following words be added:—

"But after the year 1869, Candidates will not be admitted for examination in these languages."

X. That in Reg. 23, p. 66, and Reg. 4, p. 74, Reg. 5, p. 78, Reg. 16, p. 81, and Reg. 28, p. 82, for the words "one month" the words "two months" be substituted.

XI. That after the *N. B.* in page 67, the following words be added:—

"But after the year 1870, Candidates will not be admitted for examination in these languages."

XII. That in p. 70 of the University Calendar for 1865-66, Reg. 28, the words "morning of the Second Monday" be replaced by the words "Third Thursday."

XIII. That in Reg. 30, p. 70, the words "annually" be inserted after the word "held."

XIV. That for the words—

"Euclid—Astronomy," in lines 11—16, p. 72 of the Calendar for 1865-66, the following be substituted:—

1st. Euclid and Geometrical Conic Sections.

2nd. Algebra and Trigonometry.

3rd. Newton's Principia, Book I. S. I.—III.; and Astronomy.

4th. Analytical Geometry and Differential and Integral Calculus.

5th. Statics and Dynamics.

6th. Hydrostatics and Optics.

XV. That in Reg. 37, p. 73, after the word "Matriculation" and the comma, the following words be inserted—"and provided he shall have been admitted to the Degree of Bachelor of Arts, to be admitted."

XVI. That for Reg. 8, p. 74, and Reg. 9, p. 75, the following be substituted, viz:—

"8. Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Laws will be examined in the Principles of Jurisprudence and in the several systems of Municipal Law administered by the High Court of Bombay.

"9. There will be four papers, namely:—

"1. Jurisprudence and the Roman Civil Law.

"2. Personal and Property Law, including the Hindu and Mahomedan Laws of Family and Succession, and the Indian Succession Act of 1865.

"3. Contracts, Torts, and the Penal Code.

"4. The Codes of Civil and Criminal Procedure, and the Law of Evidence."

XVII. That the following *N. B.* be inserted at the end of Reg. 16, in Law.

N. B.—The Registrar, on his receiving the Applications of the Candidates (Form M), will inform the Examiners if subject *a* or subject *b*, or both subject *a* and subject *b*, have been chosen by Candidates, if allowed to compete for Honours.

XVIII. That the words "Fourth Wednesday" be substituted for "Third Monday" in Reg. 13, p. 75.

XIX. That for Reg. 16, p. 76, the following be substituted, viz.---

"The following papers will be set:--

In subject *a.* (Three Papers.)

- "1. Personal and Property Law, including the Hindu and Mahomedan Laws of Family and Succession, and the Indian Succession Act of 1865.
- "2. Contracts, Torts, and the Penal Codes.
- "3. The Codes of Civil and Criminal Procedure, and the Law of Evidence."

In subject *b.* (Three Papers.)

- "1. The Roman Civil Law.
- "2. International Private Law.
- "3. International Public Law."

XX. That in Reg. 17, p. 76, after the word "publish," the words "on the Friday" be inserted.

XXI. That the words "Third Monday in the first Term in Arts" be substituted for the words "First Monday in December" in Reg. 3, p. 77, and for the words "Second Monday in December" in Reg. 12, p. 79, and Reg. 25, p. 82.

XXII. That in supercession of the present Regulations in Civil Engineering (pp. 84-87) the following be substituted, viz.---

IV. CIVIL ENGINEERING.

LICENTIATE OF CIVIL ENGINEERING.

1. A Candidate for the Degree of Licentiate of Civil Engineering must have passed the Matriculation Examination of the University of Bombay.
2. A Candidate will be required to pass two Examinations. The one to be called the First Examination in Civil Engineering, and the other the Examination for the Degree of Licentiate of Civil Engineering.

FIRST EXAMINATION IN CIVIL ENGINEERING.

3. The First Examination will be held annually in Bombay, commencing on the fourth Monday in November.
4. No Candidate will be admitted to this Examination unless he produces satisfactory testimonials of having kept four terms in a School or College of Civil Engineering recognized by the University of Bombay.

N.B.—If an Undergraduate has kept two or more terms in a College or Institution in Arts recognized by the University of Bombay, and has passed an Examination in the subjects of the first year of a School or College of Civil Engineering in a manner satisfactory to the Head of such School or College,—this will be considered an equivalent for having kept two terms in a School or College of Civil Engineering.

5. Candidates must apply to the Registrar two months before the Examination (*vide Form Y*).
6. Each applicant must pay a fee of Rupees 5, for which a receipt will be given (*vide Form Z*).
7. Failure to pass the Examination will not disqualify the Candidate for presenting himself at any subsequent First Examination on a new application being forwarded and a fresh fee paid.
8. The Examination will be written, and oral.
9. Candidates will be examined in the following subjects:--

I. MATHEMATICS (Three Papers and oral).

- 1st. *a. Arithmetic*—From first principles, with the nature and use of Logarithms.
- b. Algebra*—To the end of Quadratic Equations inclusive, with Proportion and Variation, Permutations and Combinations, the Progressions and the Binomial Theorem.
- 2nd. *c. Euclid*—The first four and the 6th Books, with the definitions of the 5th Book, and the 11th Book to proposition XXI., with simple deductions.
- d. Trigonometry*—Solution of plane triangles, with expressions for the area.
- 3rd. *e. Conic Sections*—Geometrically, the Parabola and the Ellipse, as given in Goodwin's Course.
- f. Analytical Geometry*—The Point, the Straight Line, and the Circle.

II. MATHEMATICAL PHYSICS. (Two Papers and oral.)

Statics, Dynamics, and Hydrostatics.

III. EXPERIMENTAL AND NATURAL SCIENCE. (One Paper and oral.)

Elementary Chemical Physics, including Heat, Electricity and Magnetism, and the general principles of Chemical Science.

IV. ENGINEERING. (Three Papers and oral.)

- 1st. Properties and strength of Materials, Earthworks, Construction of Roads.
- 2nd. Bridges, oblique Bridge.
- 3rd. Construction of the Steam Engine, Elementary Carpentry, Surveying with Compass and Chain, and Levelling with the Dumpy or Y Level.

The prepayment of postage on letters is optional, but unpaid letters will be liable to an increased charge on delivery.

The postage on Newspapers and Book Packets transmittable as above remains unchanged.

Letters addressed to any of the above countries can be registered if desired, but upon such letters the postage and the registration fee of 8 annas each letter *must be paid in advance*.

Patterns or Samples of Merchandize can also in future be sent to Denmark only at the same rate of postage as Book Packets, and subject to the usual regulations of Pattern post.

Persian Gulf Mails.—The British India Steam Navigation Company's Mail Packet Boats will in future leave Bombay on the 3rd and 17th of each month, for Bussora, and will, in consequence of the disturbed state of Muscat, make the voyage *via* Kurrachee.

2. Mail bags for Kurrachee, Bunder Abbas, Linga, Bushire, and Bussora, also Bagdad and Turkish Arabia, will be closed in future at 12 (noon) on the above dates.

Notice.

The Post Master being frequently unable to obtain early intelligence, on overland Mail days, of the anticipated time of arrival of the North East Mail Trains upon which the departure of the Suez Steamer depends, and having in consequence no means of giving the public timely notice of unavoidable detentions of 2 or 3 hours, it is hereby notified that whenever the Suez Steamer is obliged to be put off, notices will be sent to the Secretariate, Chamber of Commerce, and the Public Journals in the Fort, and one will be hung up conspicuously outside the Post Office gates for general information.

To give the public the advantage of posting letters of importance to the latest hour, when such minor detentions occur, the Mail boxes will be kept open for fully *prepaid* letters upon which the after time fee is affixed, to within 15 minutes of the departure of the Mail Vans, notification of which will be obtained at the Post Office.

Letters intended for despatch by the above opportunity should always have the superscription "Per Steamer," and are liable to an extra Ship Postage of one anna per cover on delivery.

Mauritius and Cape of Good Hope Mails.—Regular monthly communication has been established between Port Louis (Mauritius) and Table Bay (Cape of Good Hope), calling at Natal. A Branch Packet will leave Port Louis immediately after the arrival of the Packets from Suez and Aden, that is, about the 25th of the month, and will return to Port Louis in time for the Packet appointed to leave for Aden and Suez on the 6th of each month.

Letters for Natal and the Cape of Good Hope, St. Helena, and Ascension, if marked *viá* Aden and Mauritius, will be sent by the route above mentioned, by the P. & O. Company's Packets on the 24th of each month in the monsoon.

The Postage on prepaid letters sent by this route will be 8 annas for $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. Prepayment is optional

Postage on Letters for Italy.—Letters for any place in the Kingdom of Italy can be prepaid in India at the option of the sender, and will be forwarded with the British Mails to Alexandria, and from thence to their destination by Brindisi or Ancona.

4. Sea and Italian Postage on Newspapers, Books, Printed Papers, and Packets of Samples for Italy cannot be fully prepaid in India, but when posted at any Office except at the port of despatch are liable to Indian Newspaper and Book Post rates, which must be prepaid.

"*Proof Sheets*" marked as such may be sent by the Letter Post at the rates prescribed for Newspapers, provided "*the contents be correctly certified on the cover by the signature in full of the sender*;" otherwise the same will be charged with Postage at the rate which would be charged on an unstamped Letter of equal weight.

If the Postage chargeable on Books, Packets of Newspapers, &c., be not prepaid as above, it will be subject to Banghy rates of Postage, but if partially prepaid double the deficient postage will be charged.

Not more than one Letter can be enclosed in a Banghy parcel, under a penalty not exceeding Rupees (50) fifty.

All Book Packets and Parcels *not exceeding ten tolas* in weight sent through the Post Office should be conveyed by Letter Post, and be charged with Letter Postage, unless specially directed to be sent by Banghy or Book Packet Post.

No Parcel exceeding 2,000 Tolas in weight shall be received for despatch at any Post Office, and no Parcel exceeding 600 Tolas on any line of Road on which the Banghy Mails are carried by Foot Runners.

Every fraction of one hundred (100) Tolas will be charged as 100 Tolas, and if such parcels, &c., be conveyed by Her Majesty's Indian Post, *partly by land and partly by sea*, Ship Postage will be charged in addition to Inland Banghy Postage.

Re-directed Postage.

Every Letter or other article re-directed at any Post Office, or forwarded by Post from any place to which it shall have been conveyed by Post, will be charged, in addition to all other Postage paid or due thereon, with the rate of Postage to which it would be liable if posted and prepaid by stamps at the place where it may be re-directed or from which it may be forwarded.

Books and Patterns to Belgium.—Under an additional Postal Convention concluded between Great Britain and Belgium, Books and Patterns can be sent through Great Britain to Belgium under the following Regulations:—

In future, under the term "Book Packets" may be forwarded not only stitched or bound books, pamphlets, and sheets of music, but also printed proof sheets, with ordinary corrections in writing and manuscript attached to such proofs and having reference to them as well as legal and other documents in manuscript; photographs and drawings [so long as those articles are not in glass or placed under glass]; prints or maps, printed, engraved, or lithographed, and whether in paper, parchment, or vellum: but no letter or communication of the nature of a letter, must be forwarded in such packets, or in or upon their covers.

Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, &c., or of a portion thereof will be allowed, whether such binding, &c. be loose or attached; as also rollers in the case of prints or maps; markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books; and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto.

Patterns or Samples of Merchandize may also, in future, be sent to Belgium at the same rates of postage as Book Packets, and subject to the following Regulations:—

1st.—The Patterns or Samples must not be of intrinsic value. This Rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and, indeed, whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a Pattern or sample; and the quantity of any material sent ostensibly as a Pattern or Sample must not be so great that it can fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2nd.—There must be no writing or painting, in addition to the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, and the address of the sender other than a trade-mark and numbers and the prices of the articles; and these particulars must, in all cases, be given, not on loose pieces of paper, but on small labels attached to the Samples, or the bags containing them.

3rd.—The Patterns or Samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of Examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material tied at the neck; or the bags may be entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the Officers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

4th.—No article likely to injure the contents of the mail bags, or the person of any officer of the Post Office, may be sent through the Post as a Pattern.

If either of the foregoing Rules be infringed, the packet must not be forwarded.

Notice.

Pattern Post to United Kingdom.—The following modifications of the Regulations of the Pattern Post between the United Kingdom and India have been made:—

2. The prohibition which has heretofore existed to the transmission as patterns of articles of intrinsic value by the Post between the United Kingdom and India has been withdrawn.

3. Further, the rule which forbids the transmission through the post of an article, which might injure the contents of the mail bags, or the Officers of the Post Office, is so far relaxed as to permit the transmission of Scissors, Knives, Razors, Forks, Steel-pens, Nails, Keys, Watch Machinery, Metal tubings, pieces of Metal or Ore, and such like as samples, provided that they be packed and guarded in so secure a manner as to afford complete protection to the contents of the Mail bags and the Officers of the Post Office, while at the same time the Samples may be easily examined. If any packet containing such articles as these be posted, which is found not to be sufficiently guarded, it will be stopped.

Samples of Seed and similar articles may be sent in the bags entirely closed, if transparent, so that Officers of the Post Office may satisfy themselves of the nature of the contents.

In exception to the rule permitting articles of intrinsic value to be forwarded, it must be understood that such articles cannot be forwarded in the Mail *via Marseille*.

Official Franking.—From the 1st of August next, the authority to frank letters on Her Majesty's Service only, which was given to the Officers and others enumerated in the two Franking Lists, is withdrawn, and the following Rules for the payment and settlement of accounts of postage on official correspondence will be in force:—

Privileged Offices.

2. The Public Offices, enumerated in the annexed List, will be privileged to send, and receive (without actual payment of postage) all letters and packets *bonâ fide* and exclusively on Her Majesty's Service. The Post Office will keep an account of the Postage due on the official correspondence of each privileged office.

Official Covers despatched from a privileged Office.

3. Official covers despatched from a privileged Office must be properly tied up, *faced*, and enclosed in a bag sealed with the seal of the office.

4. Each cover must be endorsed, "On Her Majesty's Service only," under the full signature (autograph or stamp) of the Head Clerk, or some other principal Officer of the Establishment.

5. The address must include the official designation of the Office to which the cover is directed.

6. The bag, when made up, must be sent before the hour fixed by the Post Office for the closing of the Mails for which it is intended.

Official covers addressed to a privileged Office.

7. Official covers addressed to a privileged Office by any Office not included in the privileged List must be endorsed, "On Her Majesty's Service only," under the full signature and official designation of the person by whom they are despatched.

8. The address must include the official designation of the Office to which the cover is directed.

9. The official covers for each Office will be enclosed in the official bag, and sealed and sent out with the ordinary delivery, or given to the messenger of the Office, should one be in attendance.

Official covers not sent by, or addressed to, a privileged Office.

10. Official covers which are not sent by, or addressed to, a privileged Office, will be treated in all respects like private covers. Postage labels, marked with the word "Service," will be made available for the prepayment of such covers.

11. Service labels are never to be used in payment of the postage of any letter which is not *bonâ fide* and exclusively on Her Majesty's Service. Every cover prepaid by service labels, must be endorsed, "On Her Majesty's Service only," under the full signature and official designation of the person by whom it is despatched. The address must also include the official designation of the Office to which it is directed. If the above conditions be not observed, covers (even though stamped with service labels) will be treated as ordinary unpaid covers.

12. Service labels will be procurable at the Treasury or local Stamp Depôt of each District; Officers requiring such labels will purchase the number required, paying for the same in cash as if they were ordinary postage labels. A receipt for the amount to be given by the Officer in charge of the Stamp Depôt, will serve as a voucher for the charge to be made in the Contingent Bill of the purchaser.

13. As the present supply of service labels is limited, no Public Officer should purchase more than he estimates will be sufficient for one month's supply; and it is to be remembered that service labels are not to be attached to letters addressed to, or despatched from, any privileged Office.

14. All officials who do not belong to privileged Offices, and who have official correspondence with other than privileged Offices, will have to make arrangements for supplying themselves with service labels either by direct purchase or through their departmental superiors.

Correspondence of local officials within the limits of their respective Districts.

15. For the present no change will be made in the arrangements under which the public correspondence of local officials is conveyed, within the limits of their respective Districts, by District Post or by General Post.

which they would be liable if addressed to France, according to the following table :—

And so on, adding a single rate of postage, As. 5-4, for every additional quarter-ounce or fraction of a quarter-ounce.

N.B.—The above rates include Indian Inland Postage.

2. Postage, if prepaid, must be paid by means of stamps attached to the letter on the side on which the address is written.
3. Unpaid letters received in India will be charged at the rate of As. 8-8 per quarter-ounce.
4. Prepaid letters may be registered, double postage being prepaid in stamps. No separate registration fee will be levied.

Care should be taken to endorse "By French Post" on letters sent under this notice.
