## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 19th May 1890.

No. 284.—The following Native promotion is made with effect from the 3rd April 1890 :—

*21st Bombay Infantry.*

Color Haváldár Babnák Ramnák to be Jamá-dár vice Gopálnák Synák, deceased.

No. 285.—The following Notification by the Government of India, Foreign Department, No. 1375-I, dated 25th April 1890, is republished :—

“No. 1375-I.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, XXI of 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to apply the provisions of the Cantonments Act, XIII of 1889, so far as circumstances admit, to the Cantonment of Mhow, subject to the following modifications :

(1) For the words ‘Local Government’ wherever they occur the words ‘Governor-General’s Agent in Central India’ shall be substituted.

(2) For section 4 the following words shall be substituted :

‘4. The Governor-General in Council may, by notification in the official Gazette, define or alter the limits of the Cantonment of Mhow for the purposes of this Act and of all other enactments for the time being in force.’

(3) For section 7 the following section shall be substituted :

‘7. The Cantonment Magistrate shall be such person as the Governor-General in Council from time to time, by name or in virtue of his office, appoints in this behalf, and shall exercise the powers of a District Magistrate and such other powers described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, as the Governor-General in Council may from time to time confer upon him.’

(4) For the first portion of section 8 down to and including the word ‘order’ the following words shall be substituted :

‘8. The Governor-General in Council may appoint the Cantonment Magistrate to be the Judge of the Court of Small Causes in the Cantonment of Mhow, and shall in his order’.

(5) For section 12 the following section shall be substituted :

‘12. (1) All the provisions of Act V of 1861 shall be applicable to the Police-force employed in the Cantonment of Mhow.

(2) The administration of the Police-force in the Cantonment of Mhow shall be vested in such person as the Governor-General in Council, by name or in virtue of his office, appoints in this behalf, sub-

ject to the general control and direction of the Commanding Officer of the Cantonment.’

(6) In section 17, for the words ‘the territories administered by such Government’ each time they occur the words ‘British India’ shall be substituted.

(7) In sub-section (1) of section 18, for the words ‘any cantonment which is not included in a municipality and which is situated in any part of British India in which that Act is in force’ the words ‘the Cantonment of Mhow’ shall be substituted.

(8) For sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 27 the following shall be substituted, namely :

‘(1) Whenever the Governor-General in Council has, by a notification in the *Gazette of India*, extended under section 25 any enactment in any form to any cantonment or any part of any cantonment in British India, or made under section 26 any rule for any such cantonment or any part of any such cantonment, the Governor-General in Council may, by notification in the *Gazette of India*, declare the enactment or rule so extended or made to be in force in the Cantonment of Mhow or any part thereof, subject to such restrictions and modifications, if any, as he thinks fit.

‘(2) The enactment or rule shall thereupon, in accordance with such declaration, be in force in the Cantonment of Mhow or the part thereof, as the case may be, until the Governor-General in Council otherwise directs.’

II.—For the purpose of facilitating the application of the Cantonments Act, 1889, in the Cantonment of Mhow, any Court in the said Cantonment may construe it with such alterations not affecting the substance as may be necessary or proper to adapt it to the matter before the Court.

III.—The notification of the Government of India in the Foreign Department, No. 32-I.J., dated 27th January 1881 (extending the Cantonments Act, III of 1880, to the Cantonment of Mhow), and the portion of sub-section (1) of section 3 of the Mhow Small Cause Court Law, 1889, from and after the words, ‘and shall be deemed’ to the end of the sub-section, are hereby cancelled.”

No. 286.—The following Notification by the Government of India, Foreign Department, No. 1376-I, dated 25th April 1890, is republished :—

“No. 1376-I.—In exercise of the powers conferred by sections 4 and 5 of the Foreign Jurisdiction and Extradition Act, XXI of 1879, and of all other powers enabling him in this behalf, the Governor-General in Council is pleased to apply the provisions of the Cantonments Act, XIII of 1889, so far as circumstances admit, to the Cantonment of Neemuch, subject to the following modifications :

(1) For the words ‘Local Government’ wherever they occur the words ‘Governor-General’s Agent in Central India’ shall be substituted.



(2) For section 4 the following words shall be substituted :

‘ 4. The Governor-General in Council may, by notification in the official Gazette, define or alter the limits of the Cantonment of Neemuch for the purposes of this Act and of all other enactments for the time being in force.’

(3) For section 7 the following section shall be substituted :

‘ 7. The Cantonment Magistrate shall be such person as the Governor-General in Council from time to time, by name or in virtue of his office appoints in this behalf, and shall exercise the powers of a District Magistrate and such other powers described in the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1882, as the Governor-General in Council may from time to time confer upon him.’

(4) For the first portion of section 8 down to and including the word ‘order’ the following words shall be substituted :

‘ 8. The Governor-General in Council may appoint the Cantonment Magistrate to be the Judge of the Court of Small Causes in the Cantonment of Neemuch, and shall in his order’.

(5) For section 12 the following section shall be substituted :

‘ 12 (1) All the provisions of Act V of 1861 shall be applicable to the Police-force employed in the Cantonment of Neemuch.

‘ (2) The administration of the Police-force in the Cantonment of Neemuch shall be vested in such person as the Governor-General in Council, by name or in virtue of his office, appoints in this behalf, subject to the general control and direction of the Commanding Officer of the Cantonment.’

(6) In section 17, for the words ‘the territories administered by such Government’ each time they occur the words ‘British India’ shall be substituted.

(7) In sub-section (1) of section 18, for the words ‘any cantonment which is not included in a municipality and which is situated in any part of British India in which that Act is in force’ the words ‘the Cantonment of Neemuch’ shall be substituted.

(8) For sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 27 the following shall be substituted, namely :

‘ (1) Whenever the Governor-General in Council has, by a notification in the *Gazette of India*, extended under section 25 any enactment in any form to any cantonment or any part of any cantonment in British India, or made under section 26 any rule for any such cantonment or any part of any such cantonment, the Governor-General in Council may, by notification in the *Gazette of India*, declare the enactment or rule so extended or made to be in force in the Cantonment of Neemuch

or any part thereof, subject to such restrictions and modifications, if any, as he thinks fit.

‘ (2) The enactment or rule shall thereupon, in accordance with such declaration, be in force in the Cantonment of Neemuch or the part thereof, as the case may be, until the Governor-General in Council otherwise directs.’

II.—For the purpose of facilitating the application of the Cantonments Act, 1889, in the Cantonment of Neemuch, any Court in the said Cantonment may construe it with such alterations not affecting the substance as may be necessary or proper to adapt it to the matter before the Court.

III.—The notification of the Government of India in the Foreign Department, No. 35-I.J., dated 27th January 1881 (extending the Cantonments Act, III of 1880, to the Cantonment of Neemuch), and the portion of sub-section (1) of section 3 of the Neemuch Small Cause Court Law, 1889, from and after the words ‘and shall be deemed’ to the end of the sub-section, are hereby cancelled.”

No. 287.—The following Notification by the Government of India, Foreign Department, No. 1377-I, dated 25th April 1890, is re-published :—

(4) For the first portion of section 8 down to and including the word ‘order’ the following words shall be substituted :

‘ 8. The Governor of Bombay in Council may appoint the Cantonment Magistrate



to be the Judge of the Court of Small Causes in the Cantonment of Deesa, and shall in his order'.

- (5) For section 12 the following section shall be substituted:

' 12. (a) All the provisions of Bombay Act VII of 1867, or the corresponding law for the time being in force in Bombay, shall be applicable to the Police-force employed in the Cantonment of Deesa.

(b) The administration of the Police-force in the Cantonment of Deesa shall be vested in such person as the Governor of Bombay in Council, by name or in virtue of his office, appoints in this behalf, subject to the general control and direction of the Commanding Officer of the Cantonment.'

- (6) In section 17, for the words 'the territories administered by such Government' each time they occur the words 'British India' shall be substituted.

- (7) In sub-section (1) of section 18, for the words 'any cantonment which is not included in a municipality and which is situated in any part of British India in which that Act is in force' the words 'the Cantonment of Deesa' shall be substituted.

- (8) For sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 27 the following shall be substituted, namely:

' (1) Whenever the Governor-General in Council has, by a notification in the *Gazette of India*, extended under section 25 any enactment in any form to any cantonment or any part of any cantonment in British India, or made under section 26 any rule for any such cantonment or any part of any such cantonment, the Governor-General in Council may, by notification in the *Gazette of India*, declare the enactment or rule so extended or made to be in force in the Cantonment of Deesa or any part thereof, subject to such restrictions and modifications, if any, as he thinks fit.

' (2) The enactment or rule shall thereupon, in accordance with such declaration, be in force in the Cantonment of Deesa or the part thereof, as the case may be, until the Governor-General in Council otherwise directs.'

II.—For the purpose of facilitating the application of the Cantonments Act, 1889, in the Cantonment of Deesa, any Court in the said Cantonment may construe it with such alterations not affecting the substance as may be necessary or proper to adapt it to the matter before the Court.

III.—So much of the notification of the Government of India in the Foreign Department, No. 403-I, dated 4th February 1885, as extended the Cantonments Act, III of 1880, to the Cantonment of Deesa, and the portion of sub-section (1) of section 4 of the Deesa Small Cause Court Law, 1889, from and after the words 'and shall be deemed' to the end of the sub-section, are hereby cancelled."

The following rules framed by the Commissioner of Á'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the Bombay Á'bkári Act, 1878, for the management of the public toddy spirit distilleries established in the district of Ratnágiri and in the coast talukas of Kánara, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein, are published for general information:—

*Rules framed by the Commissioner of Á'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the Bombay Á'bkári Act, 1878, for the management of the public toddy distilleries established in the district of Ratnágiri and in the coast talukas of the district of Kánara, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein.*

1. No toddy shall be admitted into the distilleries between the hours of 1 P.M. and 4 P.M. or between the hours of 9 P.M. and 5 A.M.

2. Toddy brought to any of the distilleries aforesaid shall be taken direct to the Inspector in charge thereof for examination and measurement.

3. The Distillery Inspector shall examine and measure without delay all toddy brought to his distillery and shall enter in a register, to be kept by him in the annexed Form A, the quantity of toddy brought in from time to time by or on account of each licensed distiller.

4. Each licensed distiller shall, at his own expense, construct and complete within thirty days after the date of his distillery license, or within such further period as the Collector may allow, and thereafter keep in good repair to the satisfaction of the Collector a strong room for the custody of spirit, and shall separately deposit therein all spirit manufactured by him as soon as it is drawn from the still, and shall not open the entrance thereof or remove spirit therefrom without the permission of the Distillery Inspector. He shall



also provide Chubb's locks and such other fastenings for the entrance to the strong room as the Collector may prescribe. He shall also provide vessels of such kind and capacity as the Collector may prescribe for the storage of spirit in his said strong room. The Distillery Inspector shall measure and test all spirit taken into such strong room not later than the day after its deposit, and shall enter in the Register in Form A aforesaid the quantities and strengths of the spirit taken into and removed from each strong room daily. No licensed distiller shall be permitted to distil spirit until his strong room has been completed and approved by the Collector. Licensed distillers shall conform to the orders issued to them by the Collector or the Distillery Inspector, as to the positions in which their respective stills and strong rooms shall be set up and as to the level of the base of the stills.

5. Spirit shall be removed from the distillery only in casks, each of capacity between 16 and 17 gallons or between 20 and 21 gallons, or in casks of such other capacities as the Collector may prescribe. All casks used for the removal of spirit shall be filled full to the bung-hole before being gauged and tested and passed out of the distillery.

6. Persons entitled to remove spirit shall provide each his own casks of authorised capacity for the removal of spirit. Each cask, before being used, shall be taken by the owner to the Inspector, who shall gauge its capacity by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose, and shall brand upon it—

- (1) the name of the distillery,
- (2) the consecutive number of the cask,
- (3) the capacity of the cask in gallons and pints,
- (4) the date of branding.

7. Every cask so branded shall be again gauged once in every six months by the Inspector by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose, and shall then be branded anew, if necessary. Whenever any cask is cocpered, or repaired in any way, it shall be taken by the distiller to whom it may belong to the Inspector before being used for the removal of spirit, and shall be re-gauged by the Inspector in the manner aforesaid and shall be branded anew, if necessary. Whenever the capacity of a cask as ascertained by measurement with the standard measures may be found to differ from the capacity branded thereon, the old brand shall be erased and the correct capacity of the cask shall be branded upon it.

8. The Inspector shall keep a register of all casks measured and branded by him.

9. Toddy spirit may be issued from any of the distilleries to the person, or persons, holding for the time being a license granting to him, or them, the exclusive privilege of retailing country spirit of strength not exceeding 25° U. P. in the táluka or tálukas mentioned in the distilling license.

10. Applications for permits for the removal of toddy spirit from any of the said public distilleries should be made to the Huzúr Deputy

Collector at Ratnágiri or Kárwár, as the case may be, if the spirit is required for sale in the táluka of Ratnágiri or Kárwár, or to the Mám-latdár of the táluka of which the applicant holds the liquor farm, if the spirit is required for sale in any other táluka. The permit shall be in Form B annexed, and in triplicate. After the production of the permit before the Inspector in charge of the distillery, that officer shall proceed to measure and test the liquor which the permit-holder wishes to buy and remove from the distillery, and shall satisfy himself that the quantity and strength of the liquor offered for removal do not exceed the quantity and strength entered in the permit. He shall then note on the reverse of the permit all the particulars required by him to be therein entered, and shall complete and sign the permit, and allow the spirit to pass out of the distillery after each cask has been properly secured and sealed by himself. The Distillery Inspector shall then make the necessary entries in his Register in Register Form C, hereto annexed, and shall deliver the second and third portions to the person transporting the spirit to be carried along with the same to the depôt to which the spirit is conveyed. He shall record the first portion in his office.

On arrival of the spirit at the depôt the Sub-Inspector in charge shall examine the casks, and if he finds that the seals are unbroken and that the casks show no sign of having been tampered with, he shall allow the spirit to be admitted into the depôt and shall then measure and test the same, and satisfy himself that the quantity and strength are as shown in the permit. He shall then endorse each portion of the permit and forward the second portion so endorsed to the Huzúr Deputy Collector or Mám-latdár, as the case may be, who shall then adjust the duty account with the farmer. The third portion of the permit shall be recorded in the depôt.

11. In calculating the duty payable on toddy spirit removed from the distilleries, fractions of a pint shall be taken as one whole pint.

12. Spirit of different strengths shall not be removed under the same permit.

13. No one shall be allowed to remain in the distilleries between the hours of 10 P.M. and 5 A.M. except with the written permission of the Collector.

14. No distillation shall be carried on in any distillery between the hours of 10 P.M. and 5 A.M. except with the written permission of the Collector.

15. No spirit shall be removed from any distillery except between the hours of 9 A.M. and 5 P.M.

16. The rules will come into force from the 1st August 1890.
