9. Weighing or measuring goods, 3 annas per ton, and a further charge of Rs. 2 per day when a clerk is employed.

10. For certificates of weight or measurement, Rs. 5 each.

## RENTS.

## 11. Imports.—

A.—*Import Goods except Iron and Steel as specified under item No. 210.*—Sugar, rice and dutiable goods will be allowed 7 days and duty-free goods 5 days free of rent after landing. After these free days have expired, extra rents will be incurred for every 3 days, or part of 3 days, at the rate of one-third of the wharfage fee to which the goods may be liable. Immediately after the expiry of free days goods may be removed into the Warehouse for Unclaimed Goods. No free days will be allowed for coal, coke, cinders, ashes, patent fuel, dust, or rubbish.

B.—*Iron and Steel as specified under item No. 210* will be allowed 7 days free of rent after landing; thereafter ground-rent will be charged for space occupied at the rate of Rs. 20 for 500 square feet per mensem in the open air, and Rs. 30 for 500 square feet per mensem in sheds.

## 12. Exports.—

A.—Goods brought for shipment when no vessel is named will be charged rent from the date of the receipt of the goods to the date on which a vessel may be named.

B.—Goods brought for shipment by any vessel which may be named will be allowed 10 days free of rent if the goods be kept in the open, and 7 days if the goods be kept in the sheds. Exporters must elect where goods are to be placed, whether in the open air or in sheds.

C.—Goods brought for shipment, but which may not be shipped but removed by cart, will be charged rent from the date on which they were brought for shipment.

D.—Part shipments shut out owing to no fault of the shipper, but because of the vessel being full, shall, if removed by cart or boat, receive the benefit of the free days as if the goods had been taken by the vessel.

E.—After the free days have expired rent will be incurred for every 3 days, or part of 3 days, at the rate of one-half of the wharfage to which the goods may be liable.

F.—On shut-out cargo removed by boats or carts one-half of the wharfage only will be recovered, provided that no dock labour is employed, and that the goods are removed within the 24 working hours of the departure of the vessel from the Dock.

G.—Shut-out cargo will be allowed to remain in the transit sheds or in the open, free of rent, for 24 working hours from the departure from the Dock of the vessel in which it was intended to be shipped.

13. In computing the days for charging rents, Sundays and the holidays enumerated in bye-law No. 85\* as well (in the case of dutiable goods only) as any other days on which Imperial duty may not be received, will be omitted.

14. Ships' stores and coal, for consumption on board the vessel to which they are taken, may be conveyed in lighters into Dock, and taken on board from such lighters free of overside charge.

15. Import goods delivered into lighters alongside for removal out of Dock will be charged  $\frac{1}{4}$ th of wharfage rate; export goods taken on board from lighters alongside will be charged  $\frac{1}{3}$ rd the wharfage rate. Opium taken on board vessels in Wet Docks from lighters alongside will be charged 2 annas per chest, or 1 anna per half-chest.

16. Burst bales, &c., relanded in course of shipment, for repacking, will not be charged a second wharfage fee.

17. For cotton, coir and wool brought by boat for shipment overside, when bales are burst, and when for that or any other reason they require to be landed at the Docks, the following charges will be levied:—

18. Railway materials for the G. I. P. and B. B. & C. I. Railway Companies forming part of a general cargo will be allowed free overside delivery in the Dock, and lighters employed to remove the same will be exempted from Dock dues, but only when such Railway materials form less than three-fourths of the entire cargo of the vessel.

\* BYE-LAW.—Working hours at the Dock shall be from sunrise to sunset, except on Holidays and Sundays. The sanctioned holidays recognized by the Trustees will be Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, the Sovereign's Birth Day, and any fast or thanksgiving days ordered by Government, or on any special occasions ordered by the Trustees. In computing the days for charging rents Sundays and the holidays enumerated as well (in the case of dutiable goods only) as any other days on which Imperial duty may not be received will be omitted. The day on which goods are landed will be counted as one of the free days except when goods are landed after sunset when the free days will not commence until the following morning.



Railway materials entitled to free overside delivery under this clause, when landed on the quay for ship's convenience and afterwards re-shipped into boats, will be treated as transhipment cargo under Rule 23.

19. Ordinary Ballast brought from a Port Trust Bandar, and on which wharfage fees have been paid, will be allowed into Dock free of charge, and similarly all ballast taken out of a vessel in Dock by boats may be passed free if removed to a Port Trust Bandar. Ballast brought from elsewhere into Dock will be charged the Trustees' "outlying Bandars" wharfage fee, but ballast brought or taken away by cart will be charged 4 annas per ton.

20. *Dock Dues.*—

A.—In addition to the foregoing charges on goods, every square-rigged vessel using the Docks (except troop-ships, for which special rates may be arranged,) will be charged 1 pie per ton per diem, the minimum charge (troop-ships excepted) being Rs. 25 for each square-rigged vessel.

B.—Vessels occupying a berth on the outside face of the Dock shall be charged half Dock dues in every case in which there may not be a berth available inside the Dock.

C.—Vessels will not be charged for Sundays or the holidays enumerated in bye-law No. 85 when no work is done.

D.—A vessel lying in Dock without cargo, waiting for charter or cargo, and not working, shall nevertheless be charged full Dock dues for the time she so lies idle.

E.—Dock dues on all country craft (not square-rigged) will be charged at the rate of 2 pies per ton per diem.

F.—The day that a vessel enters and the day she leaves the Dock shall be counted as one day.

G.—Charges for vessels entering the Wet Docks for repairs:—

For vessels 250 feet long and under ... .. Rs. 12 per diem.

For vessels over 250 feet, in length ... .. Rs. 18 per diem.

21. *Night and Holiday work.*—

The charges for night work at Wet Docks shall be as follows:—

A.—Rs. 30 per night from 6 P.M. to 6 A.M.

Rs. 15 per half-night from 6 P.M. to midnight.

B.—When gates are opened for receiving and delivering cargo, Rs. 15 per night from 6 P.M. to 6 A.M., and Rs. 7½ per half-night from 6 P.M. to midnight, or from midnight to 6 A.M., to be paid by each ship receiving goods through a Dock gate after working hours, except in the case of State Railway materials, the charge for which will be Rs. 3 per night and Rs. 1½ per half-night.

C.—The following extra rates shall be charged for work done in Wet Docks on Sundays and Holidays:—

For work done any time between midnight on Saturday and  
midnight on Sunday ... .. Rs. 200

For work done on Holidays ... .. „ 30 per day.

„ „ „ „ „ „ „ „ „ 15 per half-day.

D.—When gates are opened for receiving and delivering cargo, a fee of Rs. 15 per day and Rs. 7½ per half-day will be charged, except in the case of State Railway materials, the charge for which will be Rs. 3 per day and Rs. 1½ per half-day. Such fee to be paid on account of each vessel for which cargo is being received or delivered.

22. Boats using the East Wharf of the Wet Docks shall be charged the regular Bandar rates on goods and boats.

23. On goods landed at the Wet Docks and previously entered for transhipment one-third of wharfage rate as a transhipment fee will be charged; the transhipment fee will cover the right to deposit on wharf 3 days, thereafter the ordinary Dock ground or shed rent charges will be levied; the ship shall make its own arrangements for handling and removing the goods. In the case of Liners having preferential berths, special arrangements may be made with the Dock Superintendent as to all such charges.

24. Vessels desiring to discharge overside coal or other articles not allowed on the wharf, in order to avail themselves of wharf facilities for the rest of their cargo, may be allowed to do so free of overside delivery charge, provided that the goods so put out do not amount to more than one-fifth of the entire cargo. Any quantity in excess of this proportion to pay the usual rates. This is liable to the provisions of Dock Bye-law No. 30A.

25. The Dock Superintendent is authorized to land, at the expense of the Trust, whatever quantity of cargo may be necessary to enable a vessel to come into Dock, should it appear to him desirable to incur such expense. The goods so landed to be liable to ordinary Dock rates.

26. The Trustees will send out free of charge to vessels in the stream (ordinary Dock rates having previously been paid) such quantity of cargo not exceeding 500 tons as, owing to insufficient depth of water, such vessels may be unable to load while in Dock, provided that the vessel to which cargo may be taken shall have loaded in Dock to the greatest extent that the depth of water there will allow prior to sailing.

27. Goods will only be sent out to the stream on the written order of the Agent specifying description and quantity; or in the case of a vessel having no Agents, then under such special arrangements as the Dock Superintendent may consider necessary for the security of the Trust.



28. In the case of cargo sent out to a vessel in the stream and there shut out, the ship's Agents will be required to pay for its loading and taking out and for its return and landing at the Docks, or, if so directed by the Agents, at any Bandar, at the rate of one Rupee per ton.

29. *Cranage.*—

Vessels will be charged for the use of the Trustees' cranes as follows:—

*A.*—On a ship applying for cranes, if they are supplied, payment must be made for at least half a day whether they are used or not.

*B.*—Should the application have been for the first half only of a day, and the crane be required for a longer time, another application must be made through the Shed Manager at least one hour before the expiration of the first half of the day.

*C.*—Application for cranes required for the whole or half of the following day to be made by 4 P.M. to the Shed Manager.

*D.*—If required during the day application to be made to the Shed Manager.

*E.*—Applications for cranes at night, whole or half, to be made to the Shed Manager before 4 P.M.

*F.*—Should cranes for which application has been made for the whole day or night not be required for more than the first half day or night, written notice must be given to the Shed Manager at least one hour previous to the end of the half day or night, or full day or night will be charged for.

*G.*—Should cranes for which application has been made for half night only be required for the whole night, application to be made at least two hours before the end of the half night to the Shed Manager.

*H.*—All applications for cranes to be in regular book forms with counterfoils, and to be signed by the Ship's Officer on duty, showing number of cranes required, from what time, and for how long.

*J.*—The following rates will be charged for the use of the Trustees' cranes:—

For each 1½-ton crane per day or per night .....Rs. 5 0 0

For each 1½-ton crane per half-day or half-night ,, 2 8 0

Day to be from 6 A.M. to 6 P.M. Half day to be from 6 A.M. to noon or noon to 6 P.M. Night to be from 6 P.M. to 6 A.M. Half night to be from 6 P.M. to midnight.

Any part of a day or night less than a half will be charged as a half day or night

*K.*—Small consignments of transshipment goods, machinery, &c., landed from or shipped into boats or country crafts will be charged for the use of the 1½-ton cranes at the rate of 2 annas per ton, or the crane may be engaged by the day at the above rate of Rs. 5.

*L.*—When hand cranes are used at Wet Docks the ordinary Dock cranes rates will be charged, but these rates will not include labour required to work the cranes. Shippers or consignees will have the option of waiting until a 30-cwt. steam crane can be made available, or they may ship from the East Wharf, where Bandar cranes rates are charged.

*M.*—For weights over 1½ tons and not exceeding 5 tons ... Rs. 1 0 0 per ton.

*N.*—These charges will only be levied when Trustees' cranes are used.

*O.*—If weights are kept suspended more than one-fourth of an hour, double rates will be charged. The same charge will be levied for lifting weights from the hold of a vessel and placing them on deck as for placing them on the wharf.

*P.*—Machinery will be charged by measurement or weight at option of Dock officers; if by measurement, forty cubic feet will be considered a ton, and the rate per ton shall be that at which the dead weight is chargeable. This rule will apply to wharfage as well as to cranes rates.

*Q.*—Vessels occupying the crane berth only for the purpose of using the 100-ton crane will be charged a fee of Rs. 2½ for each working hour in addition to the cranes fees.

*R.*—An additional charge of Rupee 1 per ton will be made when articles require to be deposited on the wharf and afterwards lifted by the crane into trucks.

*S.*—For masting and dismasting ships the following charges will be levied:—

T.—In the case of masts and bowsprits the ship will provide slings and the labour required for slinging, both for masting and dismasting.

U.—In all other cases the ship will provide slings and the labour required for slinging articles to be landed: the Trustees will supply slings and labour for shipping and shifting on land.

V.—Any special work done by the 100-ton crane, to which the above rates cannot fairly be applied, will be charged by the hour, ton, or lift, as may be agreed upon with the Dock Superintendent.

30. The toll for the use of sidings at Wet Docks is fixed at four annas per ton, except in the case of State Railway stores, for which special rates not exceeding four annas per ton may be fixed by the Trustees from time to time.

31. For the use of the other sidings on Port Trust Estate the following charges will be levied:—

For Salt, loaded or unloaded, 3 annas per ton.

„ Firewood, charcoal and timber, Rs. 1½ per loaded wagon.

„ Cattle, Rs. 1½ per wagon.

*Draft Rules.*

In supersession of all previous orders on the same subjects, the Governor in Council is pleased, in exercise of the power conferred by Section 31 of the Indian Forest Act (VII of) 1878, to make the following rules to have effect in and for the protected forests of the district of Kánara on and after the 1st of 189 ; (namely) :

*Part I.—General Privileges.*

1. Subject to the provisions of Rule 2, any person may, without payment or license, cut or collect and remove for the purpose or one of the purposes, if any, hereinafter specified, any of the following articles of forest-produce, viz. :—

- (g) Leaves and creepers. ....

Provisions to which the 2. The privileges allowed by Rule 1 are subject :

- (a) to the prohibitions contained in Rule 22 ; and
- (b) to the proviso that no forest-produce be removed unless the same is *bona fide* required for the purpose or one of the purposes, if any, specified in Rule 1 as a purpose for which such produce may be taken ;
- (c) to the proviso that no forest-produce obtained under Rule 1 be used for purposes of trade or for the manufacture or preparation for sale or barter of any article of trade ;
- (d) to the proviso that none of the said privileges be exercised in any portion of a protected forest which is closed by order of Government under Section 29 of the Forest Act, or which is set apart as a beta-assignment ;
- (e) to the proviso that no such privilege be exercised by any person except in a protected forest which is within the limits of, or has been set apart for the use of, the village in which such person resides and, in the latter case, to the further proviso that no such privilege be exercised by any person without his first of all producing to the officer in charge of the protected forest a permit from his village officer.

3. (1) Subject to the provisions of clauses (a), (c), (d) and (e) of Rule 2,

Cultivators having no beta-assignments may have tree loppings for cattle-bedding and manure. any cultivator who has no beta-assignment and who requires green leaves and branches for his own use for cattle-bedding or manure may lop unreserved\* trees for the purpose of supplying his requirements : provided that he do not lop within ten feet of the summit of any such tree.

(2) When the jungle consists of low coppice, any such cultivator may, subject as aforesaid and for the purpose aforesaid :

- (a) lop unreserved\* trees to within ten but not within five feet of their summits, and
- (b) cut and remove unreserved bushes and stool-shoots : provided that the leading shoot be not cut in any case.

Clearance of undergrowth around garden-lands. 4. Any occupant of garden-land may :

- (a) cut and remove all under-growth to a distance of 66 feet in every direction from the boundary of his holding : provided that he keep the cleared belt always sufficiently demarcated to the satisfaction of the Conservator of Forests by means of forest boundary-stones, earthen bands or other marks approved by the said Conservator ;



(b) Dig a ditch on the inner edge of such clearing separating it from the rest of the forest.

*Part II.—Private Rights in beta-assignments.*

5. (1). The occupant of garden land to which a beta-assignment has been allotted at a settlement, is exclusively entitled within the limits of his assignment, and subject to the provisions of Rule 6 :

- (a) to lop unreserved\* trees and shrubs in order to supply himself with green leaves and branches for the purpose of manuring his said land ;
- (b) to the grazing ;
- (c) to all other minor forest-produce, other than hirda and shikakai, which are reserved to Government.
- (2) All other forest-produce in every such beta-assignment is the property of the State.

6. The exercise of the right described in Rule 5 is subject to the following provisions :—

- Provisions to which the rights recognized in Rule 5 are subject.
- (a) that no tree be pollarded, i.e. that no part of the stem be cut off ;
- (b) that, except when the jungle consists of low coppice, no tree or shrub be lopped within ten feet of its summit ;
- (c) that when the jungle consists of low coppice, no tree or shrub be lopped within five feet of its summit ;
- (d) that no branch or portion of a branch be cut which at the cut end exceeds nine inches in circumference ;
- (e) that land be not broken up except for the purpose of digging or repairing a ditch around but within the limits of the assignment ;
- (f) that the occupant of garden-land to which a beta-assignment has been allotted as aforesaid use every reasonable precaution and vigilance to prevent the occurrence of a fire in such assignment and to prevent fire reaching the assignment from outside thereof.

*Part III.—Permits.*

7. If any inhabitant of the Kánara District requires for his own use or for any purpose named in Rule 18 any forest-produce which he cannot obtain under any of the foregoing rules, he shall submit a written application for the same to the Range Forest Officer in charge of the sub-division in which he wishes to procure it, specifying the kind and quantity of produce he requires and the purpose for which he requires it.

8. Applications under Rule 7 for timber will only be received, except in very emergent cases, between the 1st June and the 1st November; and no application under the said rule will be granted :

- (a) if in [the opinion of the officer to whom it is made or referred, it is not reasonable ; or

(b) unless a reasonable time has elapsed since the applicant obtained forest-produce of the same description before ; or

(c) if the produce required by the applicant can be conveniently obtained by him from a depôt or at an auction or otherwise ; or

(d) unless it is satisfactorily shown that the produce is *bonâ fide* required by the applicant for his own use for the specified purpose or for any purpose named in Rule 18 ; or

(e) in case it is for timber, if the applicant has, on his own estate, trees other than fruit trees suitable for supplying his requirements ; or

(f) if it is for the timber of trees of any of the following species, viz :—

Sagwan	...	Tectona grandis.
Bitti	...	Dalbergia latifolia.
Honi	...	Pterocarpus marsupium.
Surhoni	...	Calophyllum elatum.
Gandhadamara	...	Santalum album.
Abnus	...	Diospyrus ebenum.

9. The Range Forest Officer may dispose of all applications made to him under Rule 7, except applications for timber in quantities exceeding 150 cubic feet, which he shall refer to the Divisional Forest Officer for his orders.

10. When an application is granted, a permit shall be issued to the applicant by the Range Forest Officer authorizing him to cut or collect and remove the forest-produce in respect of which it is given, within a period which shall be specified in the permit. If trees are to be cut, they shall be marked and the permit shall specify their situation, number and kinds and their maximum diameters at breast-height. No permit shall be given for cutting or removing wood at any time between the 31st May and the 31st October, except in very emergent cases.

11. Forest-produce obtained on permits to be paid for as Government shall from time to time direct; and measures shall be taken by the Conservator for causing the said rates to be duly published.

12. (1) Twenty-five per cent. of the purchase-money shall be deposited by a permit-holder at the time of the issue of the permit, and this amount will be forfeited to Government, should the forest-produce not be cut or collected and removed within the period specified in this behalf in the permit. The balance of the purchase-money shall be paid before any forest-produce is cut or collected.

(2) If reasonable cause is shown by a permit-holder for delay, the Divisional Forest Officer may, at his discretion, from time to time extend the period specified in his permit.

13 Due intimation of the issue of a permit, with all necessary particulars, shall be given by the Range Officer in

charge of the sub-division to the village officers within the boundaries of whose village the permit is to have validity.

Wood cut under a permit not to be removed before being measured and fully paid for.

14. The holder of a permit for cutting trees shall not remove any of the wood cut :

- (a) without reporting to the Range Officer that the trees have been cut ; nor
- (b) until the wood has been measured and stamped by a forest officer appointed by the Range Officer in this behalf ; nor
- (c) until the wood has been fully paid for, according to the measurement of the said officer.

15. (1) Wood obtained under a permit as aforesaid shall be measured in the manner at the time being in vogue at Government wood depôts in the Kánara District.

(2) Should the trees which a permit-holder has been licensed to cut yield a greater quantity of wood than that for which the permit was granted, the permit-holder shall pay for the whole quantity cut and shall be allowed, if he wishes, to remove the excess quantity.

16. The Range Forest Officer in charge of the sub-division shall keep a register of all forest-produce obtained on permits in such form and containing such particulars as the Conservator shall from time to time prescribe.

17. Forest-produce obtained under a permit shall not, without the permission in writing of the Divisional Forest Officer, be applied to any purpose other than that stated in the application upon which the permit was granted.

18. The purchase-money payable under Rule 11 for timber obtained on a permit may be remitted in whole or in part, when the timber is required for any of the following purposes :—

- (a) Works of public utility, such as village-chaukis, schools, dharmshálas, public bridges, covers to or fencing round public wells and repairs of religious edifices not the property of individuals ;
- (b) the construction or repair of agricultural implements ;
- (c) construction or repair of agricultural implements.

19. Purchase-money may be remitted under Rule 18 by the following officers, viz. :—

- (a) up to Rs. 15, by an Assistant Collector or a Divisional Forest Officer ;
- (b) up to Rs. 50, by the Collector or Conservator of Forests ;
- (c) above Rs. 50, on the recommendation of the Collector by the Commissioner.

20. The amount remitted and the number and date of the order granting the remission shall be noted on the back of the permit by the officer who issues the permit.

Remissions to be endorsed on permits.

21. (1) Permits for grazing will also be granted by the Range Forest Officer in charge of the sub-division on application being made to him in this behalf. The said permits shall be in such form and contain such particulars as the Conservator of Forests from time to time directs.

(2) The fees to be charged for permits for grazing shall be such as Government from time to time directs, and measures shall be taken by the Conservator of Forests for causing the rates of fees to be duly published.

#### Part IV.—Prohibitions.

22. The following acts are prohibited, viz. :—

- (a) the exercise of any privilege or right conceded or recognized by these rules in any manner or at any time or place or for any purpose not allowed by these rules or contrary to or without duly fulfilling any provision of these rules, or by or on behalf of any person not entitled under these rules to such privilege or right ;
- (b) the doing of anything whether in the alleged exercise of a privilege or right (not being a right recorded under Section 28 of the Forest Act or claimed as an existing right in any case in which the proviso to that section applies) or otherwise, which is not authorized by these rules or by a permit granted under these rules ;
- (c) the doing of anything by or on behalf of a permit-holder which he is not expressly authorized by his permit to do ;
- (d) the cutting or removal by occupants of garden-land who have beta-assignments, of green leaves or branches for use as cattle-bedding or manure, except from within the limits of their respective assignments ;
- (e) the removal of green wood for fuel ;
- (f) the removal of wood for fuel (unless under a permit and on payment of the price thereof), except in head-loads ;
- (g) the quarrying or removal of minerals except in such places as shall from time to time be set apart for this purpose by the Conservator of Forests or by some forest officer whom he authorizes in this behalf ;
- (h) the clearing or breaking up of land for any purpose, except as provided in the next following clause and in Rule 4 (b), without the permission in writing of the Conservator of Forests ;
- (i) the breaking up of land for the purpose of repairing any ditch within the 66 feet limit described in Rule 4, unless when the Assistant Collector and the Divisional Forest Officer certify in writing that such ditch is necessary for the protection of any garden-land from damage by floods or by cattle or wild animals ;
- (j) the kindling of a fire at any time between the 1st November and 30th June, both days inclusive, except in any place appointed for this purpose by the Divisional Forest Officer ;
- (k) the carrying of torches or other unguarded light, except on a road over which there is a public right of way ;



- (l) the pasturing of cattle, when any person tending or accompanying the cattle carries an axe or any other cutting instrument ;
- (m) the setting of traps, snares or pitfalls, except with the permission in writing of the Conservator of Forests or of some forest officer authorized by the Conservator of Forests to give such permission.

4. The pages of each register or record, or portion of a register or record, examined shall be numbered in consecutive order; and the total number of the pages in each register or record, or portion of a register or record, shall be entered in the descriptive list.

5. The entries in each year in every register or record, or portion of a register or record, examined shall be numbered in consecutive order, where this has not already been done; and the total number of entries for each year in each register or record, or portion of a register or record, shall be shown in the descriptive list, together with the dates of the first and last entries.

6. Every blank space, blank page, interlineation, and erasure found in each register or record, or portion of a register or record, when examined by the Commissioners shall be indicated therein by a stamp impressed; and the descriptive list shall show in appropriate columns on what pages in each register or record, or portion of a register or record, such impressions have been made.

7. Entries in registers or records, or portions of registers or records, which purport to be true copies only shall be indicated therein by a stamp impressed; and the descriptive list shall show on what pages in each register or record, or portion of a register or record, such impressions have been made.

8. Every descriptive list shall further show in appropriate columns the following particulars:

(1) the name and description of the person from whom each register or record, or portion of a register or record, to which it relates was received;

(2) the names and descriptions of the persons by whom such register or record, or portion of a register or record, was kept;

(3) the class or classes of persons to whom the entries in such register or record, or portion of a register or record, relate;

(4) the condition of each register or record, or portion of a register or record, or any other remarks relating thereto as the Commissioners may think fit to record.
