(3) The First Assistant Collector of Bombay to be a Customs Collector for the port of Bombay, except for the purposes of Section 182 of the said Act, and to be an Assistant Collector of Customs for the purposes of clause (b) of the said section;

(4) The Assistant Collector of Customs stationed at the Prince's Dock, Bombay, to be a Customs Collector for the port of Bombay, except for the purposes of Section 182 of the said Act, and to be an Assistant Collector of Customs for the purposes of clause (b) of the said section.

No. 1674B.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 6 of Act VIII of 1878 (The Sea Customs Act), and in continuation of Notification No. 1674A, dated 9th March 1892, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased to appoint the following officers of Customs, respectively, as set forth below, to exercise the powers conferred and to perform the duties imposed on a Customs Collector by the sections of the said Act hereinafter specified in respect of each such officer:—

(1) to be discharged or shipped in the Wet Docks;

(2) to be discharged or shipped in the stream by a steamer or square-rigged vessel, except dutiable, restricted or doubtful goods;

(3) to be discharged or shipped by a country craft at the free anchorage;

and (b) under Section 72 for discharging and shipping or water-bearing goods beyond the notified hours on other than Sundays, holidays or prohibited days.

3. The Preventive Officers in charge of the Máhm, Varli and Arthur Bandar Custom Houses—Sections 158, 159, 160 and 201.

4. All Preventive Officers in the Town and Island of Bombay to the extent of granting under Section 72 written permission to land, at the several wharves where such landing is allowed, fresh fruit, vegetable and live-stock on all days, including Sundays and holidays.

No. 1674C.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 11 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, and in supersession of all previous Notifications as far as they relate to the port of Bombay, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following declarations and applications:—

\*6. *Jamsetjee Bandar*.—Landing:—Cotton, wool, coals and hemp, materials, stores and coals for the B. B. & C. I. Railway Company only. Shipment:—Cotton, wool and hemp, materials, stores and coals for the B. B. & C. I. Railway Company only.

\*7. *Arthur Bandar*.—Landing:—All free and unrestricted goods, except fish (salted or fresh) by native craft from customs ports. Shipment:—Cotton, wool, linseed, rape-seed and gingelly.

\*8. *Government Coal Depôt*.—Government coals.

\*9. *Apollo Bay Reclamation*.—Cotton, wool, coal, hay, straw, firewood, and laddi-stones.

\*10. *Apollo Bandar*.—Fresh provisions, passengers' baggage, ice, treasure, military stores and horses the property of Government or of officers proceeding on duty.

2. Except as is hereinafter in these rules otherwise provided, no goods shall be transhipped unless and until—

- A tranship-permit covering the same is produced;
- The transhipment-fees, if any, payable in respect thereof have been paid;

3. (2) When goods are so transhipped, the agent or master of the importing steamer shall, within three months of the entry inwards, furnish the Import Department with a correct list of the steamers into which the same have been transhipped.

5. In the case of dutiable goods or the goods the importation of which into British India is restricted by any law and the transhipment of which is not subject to any special regulations, leave to tranship to any foreign port on the Continent of India or any port in Ceylon other than a port included in any Customs union with the British Indian Government shall not be given unless the goods are to be transhipped into a steamer.

6. When goods which are to be transhipped in a dock are temporarily deposited on a wharf or in a shed, the Superintendent of the Dock shall not allow the removal of the said goods or of any of them, from the wharf or shed, without production of all such documents as are required by these rules, or except under the superintendence of a Customs Officer, as required by Section 129 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878.

No. 1674J.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 157, clause (a), of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased to make the following rule, viz. :—

At the port of Bombay, the provisions of Sections 61 and 136 of the said Act are extended to all coasting vessels of the description known as country craft and to all goods exported therein.

No. 1674K.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 14 of the Sea Customs Act, VIII of 1878, the Governor of Bombay in Council is pleased to declare the port of Bombay to be a warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act.

No. 1674L.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 157, clause (d), of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rule, viz. :—

The conveyance of country liquor, as defined in the Bombay Abkari Act; between the ports of Bombay and Karachi in any coasting vessel other than a vessel propelled by steam, is prohibited.

No. 1674M.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 9 (c) of the Sea Customs Act, VIII of 1878, and with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor of Bombay in Council, the Chief Customs Authority is pleased to make the following rule, viz. :—

“The presentation of an export shipping-bill for cancellation or amendment within the period of five days prescribed in Section 140 of the Act shall be deemed to be equivalent to giving the information required by that section, so far as regards the goods in respect of which such cancellation or amendment is applied for.”

No. 1674 N.—The following rules made by the Commissioner of Customs, Bombay, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Council, under Section 9 (c) of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, for carrying out the provisions of Section 76 of the said Act respecting boat-notes, are published for general information :—

1. Forms of boat-notes will be supplied by the Customs Department gratis. Only forms so supplied shall be used for boat-notes.
2. Boat-notes for goods to be landed in cargo-boats from native craft stationed at the dutiable anchorage will be furnished by the Customs officer at the anchorage, to whom application therefor must be made before a cargo-boat containing such goods leaves the anchorage.

3. Boat-notes for goods to be shipped into vessels at the dutiable or free anchorages shall be presented to the Customs officer at those anchorages for endorsement before the goods are shipped.

4. (1) When it is desired to keep afloat goods which have been discharged from any vessel pending their being re-shipped or landed, the cargo-boat containing such goods shall be taken to the bandar named in the boat-note, and the boat-note shall be shown to the Customs officer at the said bandar and his permission shall be obtained, with reference to Section 77 of the Act, to the goods being kept afloat.

(2) The boat-note shall be kept on board by the person in charge of the cargo-boat to cover the goods until they are re-shipped or landed.

(3) If the goods are re-shipped, the boat-note shall be again shown to the officer aforesaid, together with the necessary permit to re-ship; and his endorsement shall be obtained thereon before the boat leaves the wharf.

No. 1674 O.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 205 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, the Chief Customs Authority, Bombay, is pleased, with the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Council, to cancel the following Notifications made by him, viz. :

Persons who have any objections to urge to them are required to communicate the same in writing to the Chief Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, within one month from the date of the publication of this Notification :—

In exercise of the power conferred by sub-section (1) of Section 6 of the Indian Ports Act, (X of) 1889, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following rules in respect of native vessels in the port of Bombay, which, under Section 31 (3) of that Act, are not brought into the port by pilots, viz. :

1. In these rules, unless where the contrary appears from the context, “vessel” means a native vessel such as aforesaid, and “anchorage” means an anchorage at which it is for the time being directed by the Chief Customs Authority under Section 17 of the Sea Customs Act, 1878, that such vessels shall anchor.
2. All the cargo of a vessel which is bound, on arrival, to anchor at the dutiable anchorage, shall be discharged at that anchorage, except :

- (a) cargo for transhipment overside to a vessel which is not a vessel to which these rules apply ;
- (b) when the vessel has come from customs ports only, and all the dutiable and restricted cargo has been accounted for, any free and unrestricted cargo which she carries ;
- (c) laddi-stones, firewood, fresh fruit, and heavy packages.
3. A vessel which has come from customs ports only may discharge any free and unrestricted cargo which she carries, after having accounted for her dutiable and restricted cargo, if any, at any anchorage or at any wharf where the same may lawfully be landed.
4. (1) All goods for shipment on a vessel which has obtained entry outwards for a foreign port or which has any dutiable or restricted goods on board, and all dutiable and restricted goods for shipment on any vessel, shall be shipped at the receiving line of the dutiable anchorage, except :
- (a) goods transhipped overside from another vessel ;
- (b) heavy packages.
- (2) Goods transhipped overside from another vessel shall be received at the receiving line of the dutiable anchorage, if the discharging vessel is a vessel to which these rules apply ; in any other case, the receiving vessel shall return to the dutiable anchorage as soon as the transhipment is completed.
5. Free and unrestricted goods may be received by a vessel which has obtained entry outwards for customs ports only and which has no dutiable or restricted goods on board at any anchorage or at any wharf where the same may lawfully be water-borne.
6. No vessel shall move from the line of anchorage or wharf at which she is anchored without the permission of the Preventive Officer in charge of such anchorage or wharf
7. Such permission may be given orally by the Preventive Officer to the Master of a vessel if it is required for any of the following purposes, viz. :
- (a) to leave the port, if the vessel has obtained port clearance ;
- (b) to proceed to another line of anchorage or wharf in order to receive or discharge cargo in accordance with these rules ;
- (c) to perform direct transhipment in accordance with these rules ;
- (d) to go on to the hard for cleaning or repairing, if the vessel is empty.
8. Such permission shall not be given by the Preventive Officer, without an order from the Superintendent of the Preventive Service, if it is required for any of the following purposes, viz. :
- (a) to go and anchor off the Government Dockyard to be measured by the Port authorities ;
- (b) to go on to the hard for cleaning or repairs, if the vessel is partly laden ;
- (c) to proceed to another line of anchorage or wharf in any case not provided for in the preceding rules.

CONCESSIONS TO SELECTED FOREST OFFICERS WHO DESIRE TO UTILIZE THEIR FURLOUGH IN STUDYING FORESTRY IN THE FORESTS OF THE CONTINENT OF EUROPE.

CIRCULAR No. 4 F.

*Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Revenue and Agricultural Department (Forests), dated Calcutta, the 13th February 1892.*

READ—

Circular Resolution No. 20 F., dated 2nd September 1867, specifying the conditions under which Forest Officers on leave in Europe may study Forestry.

RESOLUTION.

In view of the importance of maintaining in the Forest Departments of India a continuous knowledge of the Forest systems of Europe, and for the purpose of encouraging the study by their officers of Continental Forestry, the Government of India have, with the concurrence of Her Majesty's Secretary of State, decided that the privileges set forth in the rules appended to this Resolution may be granted, with their previous approval in each case, to selected officers of the Forest Departments when on furlough.

2. The improvement of State Forests in India has depended, and will for some time continue to depend, in no small measure, on the adaptation to them of scientific principles borrowed from France and Germany. Under existing arrangements, candidates selected for the Indian Forest Service undergo a preliminary course of practical instruction, for a few weeks, in the forests of either France or Germany ; but progress in forestry is on the Continent so rapid that the knowledge which they acquire during their comparatively short tours, and at a time when their practical acquaintance with the subject is only commencing, is found to be insufficient for the needs of forest administration in India. It has therefore been determined to give facilities to officers, who have proved, by the merit of their work in India, that they are capable of assimilating and turning to account useful knowledge, to study forestry on the Continent when absent from India on furlough. Such officers, if carefully selected, would, it is confidently anticipated by the Government of India, be enabled, both by their special capacity and their practical experience of what is required in India, to bring back with them and introduce into Indian forest administration the most important improvements of the continental systems which may be applicable to this country, more especially in connection with the preparation and control of Working-Plans, in which exceptionally technical branch of forestry the greatest advance has recently been made in the Forest Departments of the Continent.

#### APPENDIX.

*Rules under which selected Officers of the Forest Department in India may be authorized to study during furlough, at the public expense, forest operations on the Continent of Europe.*

I.—A Forest Officer desirous of obtaining permission to study forestry on the Continent, under these rules, must submit an application, through the Conservator under whom he is serving, to the Local Government.

II.—The Local Government will forward the application to the Inspector General of Forests, with the remarks of the Conservator and its own recommendation in the case.

III.—The Inspector General of Forests will submit the application to the Government of India for orders.

IV.—The Government of India will require to be satisfied that the officer applying is likely to profit by the additional experience which he will gain by Continental study, and that he possesses a sufficient knowledge of the language of the country which it is proposed that he should visit.

V.—The application must reach the Government of India not less than four months before the date on which it is proposed to commence a Continental tour.

VI.—If the application is sanctioned, the officer should place himself in communication with the Inspector General of Forests, under whose instructions the plan of study proposed will be arranged.

VII.—On arrival in England the officer will report himself at the India Office; and it will then be decided by Her Majesty's Secretary of State what localities he is to visit.

VIII.—The total period to be spent on deputation will not, as a rule, exceed six months. At the end of that period the officer selected will submit to the India Office a diary showing how his time has been spent, and a report which should indicate fully the nature of the operations studied, and which should also include suggestions as to the application of such operations to India. The Secretary of State will decide whether the diary and the report show that the time of the officer has been properly employed, and will determine accordingly for what period the daily allowance admissible under Rule IX may reasonably be granted.

IX.—Each officer will be paid, through the India Office, the cost of a 1st class return-ticket between London and the place to which he may be initially deputed, and will also, subject to the preceding rule, be granted a daily allowance of 10 shillings during his stay in the Continental forests. Travelling allowance bills in full detail must be submitted to the Revenue Secretary at the India Office.

X.—The reports, notes, and drawings submitted by an officer may not, without the previous permission of the Government of India, be communicated to any professional journal or institution; and the Government of India will be at liberty to print, publish or circulate them should they think fit to do so."

This estimate should be obtained by the Chaplain or Officer in charge of the Cemetery from the Executive Engineer of the district.

*Application to erect a monument or to enlarge a monument already erected in the Government Cemetery at* \_\_\_\_\_

1. Date.
2. Name of deceased, as inscribed on monument.
3. Plot, line and number of grave.
4. If the grave is not of masonry throughout, state what masonry foundations will be provided.
5. (a) If the monument consists of a single stone without border or railings, state if the persons interested wish to pay the minimum endowment fee of Rs. 15.

(b) For any other monument, state—

- I.—Dimensions.
- II.—Kind of stone.
- III.—Whether there is a stone-border.
- IV.—Whether there are railings.
- V.—Whether the letters of the inscription are leaded, painted, gilt, or merely cut.

- 6. Cost.
  - 7. Inscription (to be written on the back of this application).
  - 8. Name of Architect, Sculptor or Undertaker.
  - 9. Executive Engineer's estimate for repairs.
- The above application (with drawing of Executive Engineers' estimate) is forwarded to the Archdeacon by .....
- Chaplain in Charge.

Date—

(b) This drawing, &c, if approved of by the Archdeacon, shall be returned by him to the Chaplain or Officer in charge of the Cemetery, who will collect the estimated endowment fee and remit it to the Accountant General.

(c) The endowment is intended to cover the cost of ordinary annual maintenance, re-lettering and repairs and not the risk of accidents due to floods or other natural causes, and the sum should be estimated accordingly. In the case of a monument already erected, the Executive Engineer, in his estimate for repairs, shall provide for the monument being placed upon a suitable foundation if he is not satisfied that such already exists. In the event of accident, the friends should be communicated with, and the procedure laid down in the Government of India Rules (Rule XIX, Government Notification, Ecclesiastical Department, No. 27, dated 1st July 1885) followed. The repair of fragile or costly work liable to be broken cannot be undertaken by Government and should be excluded in estimating the endowment required.

(d) When it is proposed to erect a cross head-stone or slab, consisting of one single stone over an adequate foundation, it is optional to the persons interested to pay the endowment fee for its maintenance, which is fixed at Rs. 15; but if no such fee be paid, the cross head-stone or slab will be liable to removal, if it should need renewal, under Rule XIX of the Cemetery Rules published under Notification No. 27, dated 1st July 1885. This optional endowment may be paid at any time after the erection of the stone.

(e) The capital amount required to produce the estimated average annual sum at 3¼ per cent. (the Savings Bank rate of interest) shall be paid to the Chaplain together with such amount as is required to cover the cost of remitting the principal sum (by Money Order) to the Accountant General, provided that the minimum capital amount shall be Rs. 15, and that all investments above that amount shall be fixed at such multiple of Rs. 5 as will produce a sum about equivalent to, but not less than, the average annual sum. (N.B.—Every 5 Rupees produces at 3¼ per cent. an annual sum of 3 annas.)

(f) The Archdeacon shall grant permission for the erection (or endowment) of the monument as soon as he shall be informed by the Chaplain (or other officer) in charge of the Cemetery that the capital fixed as above has been paid to him. The Executive Engineer of the district shall be informed in writing by the Chaplain (or other officer) in charge of the Cemetery when the monument is ready for erection, and be requested to see that it is erected in a workman-like manner and upon a solid foundation, and to bring it when completed upon his list as for repair by the Public Works Department, from funds to be supplied as laid down in Rule (2). In the case of an application for the endowment of an old monument the Executive Engineer shall be informed when the endowment has been effected and requested to bring the monument on his list.

(g) All monies deposited for repairs to monuments in any one station, or for any one Cemetery, shall be treated as belonging to one single account. The interest accruing on such monies shall form a common fund to be used exclusively for the repair of those monuments for which deposits have been made. For each Cemetery there shall be a book called the "Record of Endowments," which shall contain columns according to the following form, and Chaplains (or other officers) in charge should be very careful to keep a correct list of all endowments in this book, the names inscribed on the tomb-stone being entered:—

When received.	When sent to Accountant General.	Number on Cemetery Plan.	Name on Monument.	Amount Rs.

In order that Government may know that the tombs are kept in proper repair, an annual report should be forwarded for each Cemetery to the Accountant General, who will consolidate the returns so received and render a general return to Government. The returns should contain remarks both by the Chaplain and Executive Engineer as to the state of the tombs for which endowments have been made.

(h) When the Archdeacon has granted permission for the erection (or endowment) of the monument, the capital sum received under Rule (e) shall be remitted by Money Order to the Accountant General, who will invest it in a general account to be kept with the Savings Bank. The Accountant General will, at his discretion from time to time, invest the amount of the general account in Government Paper, if it appears convenient to do so. The interest on the general account shall be drawn once a year by the Accountant General and remitted to the Chaplains concerned, who shall pay the same into the Government Savings Bank in the names of the Chaplain and Collector (or Chief Civil or Military Officer).

- (i) Joint estimates shall be framed annually by the Executive Engineer and the Chaplains of the cost of repairs of the tombs as required by the Government of India Regulations (page 62,\* Clause (b), Section V, Chapter XI, Public Works Code), and the aggregate of the sums so estimated as required for *endowed* tombs shall be placed to the credit of the Executive Engineer, Public Works Department, at the Treasury by the Chaplain or other officer in whose name jointly with that of the Collector (or Chief Civil or Military Officer) the monies are in deposit at the Government Savings Bank.

(j) It should be understood that the Chaplain or other officer who is in charge of the Cemetery, in accordance with the rules for the care and use of Government Cemeteries, will be held responsible for seeing that such monuments are kept in proper repair so far as funds are available.
