REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 6th September 1888.

No. 6018.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 216 of the Bombay Land Revenue Code, 1879, the Governor in Council is pleased to authorise the extension of the provisions of Chapters VIII and IX of the said Code to the village of Savindané in the Sirúr Táluka of the Poona District.

Bombay Castle, 11th September 1888.

No. 6126.—Whereas it appears to the Governor of Bombay in Council that land is required to be taken by Government at the expense of the Municipality of Bombay for a public purpose, viz., for the erection of a latrine, in the village of Sewri in the city of Bombay; it is hereby declared that for the above purpose a piece of land measuring more or less 300 square yards and forming portions of the new Revenue Survey under Nos. ^{1, 2 & 4} 2318,

bounded on the north by the vacant ground of Dinshaw and Bamanji Dáráshaw, on the south by the road leading to Sewri Fort, on the east by the vacant ground of Cursetji Jamsetji Banáth-walla, and on the west partly by the ground of Bápúji Moroji and partly by the vacant ground of Dinshaw and Bamanji Dáráshaw, is required within the aforesaid village of Sewri.

This declaration is made, under the provisions of Section 6, Act X of 1870, to all whom it may concern, who are hereby warned not to obstruct or interfere with persons employed on the land.

A plan of the abovementioned plot can be seen at the office of the Collector, of Land Revenue, Customs and Opium, Bombay.

No. 6127.—In exercise of the power conferred by Clause (c) of Section 11 of the Sea Customs Act, No. VIII of 1878, and in modification of Government Notification No. 2753 of 17th May 1881, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to appoint the east end of the Moody Bandar with a quay frontage of 450 feet facing the east, 200 feet facing the south and 50 feet facing the north to be a wharf for the use of passengers only. None but the following articles are to be landed or shipped at the said wharf:—

Passengers' baggage, tents and camp equipage, treasure, Government records and stores, Borhas' and Pedlars' packs when accompanied by the owners, horses, carriages and cattle, ice and provisions, and household stores of all kinds intended *bona fide* not for sale but for private use or consumption, eggs, and fresh fruit other than coconuts.

No. 6128.—The following alteration in Rule 33A of the Rules of the Registration Department (*vide* Government Notification No. 4013 dated 19th June 1888, published at page 528 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I, dated 21st idem), framed by the Inspector-General of Registration, Bombay, in exercise of the powers conferred by the Indian Registration Act, 1877, having been approved by Government is published for general information:—

33A. The Sub-Registrar of Virangám in the district of Ahmedabad shall hold office in each of the towns of Mandal and Detroj on one or more days between the 11th and 20th, both days inclusive, of each of the months of January, February, March, April, May, October, November and December, and shall receive for registration at those places any documents which may be presented to him for that purpose whilst he is holding office there.

During the period mentioned the office of the said Sub-Registrar at his head-quarters will be closed.
