Notice to Mariners.

No. 43.—*Erratum.*—The latitude of the Aden Light-ship is 12° 48' 50", and not 20° 46' 50" as published in the Notice to Mariners No. 36, dated 15th April 1885.

No. 45.—It is proposed that under the provisions of Section 43 of the Bombay Port Trust Act, 1879, the tonnage fee leviable upon ferry steamers coming alongside Port Trust wharves shall be increased from Rs. 75 to Rs. 100 each per mensem from the date on which the Mody Bandar will be available for such steamers, viz., 1st August 1885.

The daily rate for ferry steamers coming alongside the wharf, viz., 1 anna per registered ton per diem, will be abolished from the same date.

No. 46.—Notice is hereby given that on and after the 1st June 1885, a new subsidiary Occulting Light will be exhibited on Perim Island. Distance visible 14 miles; arc of illumination 185 degrees; facing east-north-east.

No. 47.—The following telegram from the Honourable the Premier, Victoria, to the Government of India, dated Melbourne, 1st May 1885, is published for general information:—

"Please publish that it may at any moment become necessary to remove facilities now afforded for navigation of Port Philip. In that event

vessels approaching heads will be warned by finding lights, Point Lonstale and Queenscliff, extinguished. No vessels will be permitted to enter between sunset and sunrise. Arrangements made for piloting vessels between sunrise and sunset. Electric lights may be exhibited at any time from Queenscliff and Point Nepean for defence purposes. Such lights must not be taken as guiding lights."

No. 26A.—All vessels using the Prince's Dock, before entering and while in dock, shall secure under lock and key in suitable cases or magazines in a safe place set apart for that purpose all combustibles and explosives kept on board for signal purposes only, and no person shall have access thereto unless in the presence of an officer whose duty it shall be to see such place safely locked up again, the key being kept in charge of the commanding or other responsible officer.

Subsidiary Rules relating to Public Conveyances, Section 14, Act VI. of 1863.

- Return fares, if the conveyance is specially engaged for the double journey, to be paid at half the rates shown in the annexed schedule.
- Detention charges—
Bullock Cart 2 annas per hour, all other conveyances 4 annas per hour, provided the total fare (including detention charges) does not exceed the fare payable for a whole day.
- For any distance not included in the annexed schedule the fare shall be fixed as follows:—

- No owner or attendant of a public conveyance shall be compelled to carry a single passenger in his conveyance for any fare less than that to which he would be entitled for the full complement of passengers, unless a proportionate fare is first agreed upon.
- In any case in which a public land conveyance is called from a stand or from a distance to any place to take up a fare, one half the full fare of such conveyance may be demanded by the driver in addition to the regulated fare of the conveyance as laid down.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

No. 2792.—The following draft rules under Section 31 and draft notification under Section 29 of the Indian Forest Act, No. VII. of 1878, are published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*. Persons who have any objection to urge to the draft rules and notification are required to forward their objections in writing to the Secretary to Government, Revenue Department, before the noon of 1st June 1885:—

Draft No. 1.

The following rules, made by the Governor in Council under Section 31 of the Indian Forest

Act, 1878, to regulate the management of the Protected Forest in the marginally noted villages of the Akola Táluka of the district of Ahmednagar are published, with the previous sanction of

the Governor General in Council, for general information :

1. Lands of either of the two following descriptions may be cleared or broken up for cultivation in the said forest subject to the conditions, if any, respectively applicable thereto, viz. :

(a) land the right to cultivate which has been recorded in an enquiry under Section 28 of the Forest Act, or

(b) land let for cultivation under a lease which is at the time in force and has been granted under these rules.

2. The unoccupied land in the said forest suitable for cultivation having been divided off by the Survey Department, under the orders of Government, into fields which bear distinctive numbers and having been measured and assessed by the said Department at a moderate rent, any of the said fields (hereinafter called "numbers") may be let at the rent so assessed to any person who is, and has been for not less than five years previously, a resident of the village in which the number is situate, subject to the conditions contained in these rules.

3. The lease of a number may be sold by public auction or granted, at the discretion of the Divisional Forest Officer, with or without payment of a premium.

4. Every lease granted under these rules shall be in the form A hereto annexed and shall be executed by the Divisional Forest Officer, if he is competent under the rules in force in this behalf to execute such an instrument, or otherwise by the Conservator.

No such lease shall be granted until the intending lessee has executed a counterpart agreement in the form B hereto annexed, bearing an endorsement of the tenor prescribed in the said form signed by the village officers.

5. In the first year in which these rules are in force leases shall be granted for a term of thirty years. Leases granted after the said first year shall be for terms which will expire simultaneously with the terms of the first year's leases.

6. The rent due annually in respect of lands leased under these rules shall be payable in two equal instalments on the 10th December and 10th January respectively.

7. On the expiry of the term of any lease granted under these rules the lessee shall be entitled to a renewed lease for such term and subject to such conditions and the payment of such rent as Government shall think fit to prescribe.

8. Every lease granted or renewed under these rules may at any time be cancelled by the Divisional Forest Officer or the Conservator of Forests :

(a) if the lessee or any co-sharer of the land held by the lessee is convicted of any offence under Section 32 of the Forest Act and such conviction is not subsequently reversed or quashed ; or

(b) if the land included in the lease or any portion of it is subjected, without the previous sanction of the Divisional Forest Officer or of the Conservator of Forests, to any mortgage, charge, sub-lease or alienation ; or

(c) if the land included in the lease or any portion of it is subjected to *dalhi* cultivation ; or

(d) if any instalment of rent due in respect of the land is not paid, or recovered under Section 81 of the Forest Act, before the close of the revenue year in which it is payable ;

(e) if the lessee ceases to be a resident of the village in which the land is situate.

When a lease is cancelled under this rule, it shall be deemed for the purposes of Rule 1 to cease to be in force from such date as shall be fixed in this behalf by the officer cancelling the same.

9. An appeal shall lie from any order made by the Divisional Forest Officer under the last preceding rule to the Conservator of Forests. The order of the Conservator of Forests shall be final.

10. No lease granted under these rules shall be deemed to confer upon the lessee any right in or over the trees or other forest produce of the land included in such lease ; but, subject to a reservation of the right of Government at any time to re-consider and amend or cancel such concession and to the provision of Rule 11, the Governor in Council directs that the lessee of any land of which a lease is granted or renewed under these rules shall be permitted upon or from the said land :

(a) to lop trees, not being trees which are reserved under Section 29 of the Forest Act, for the purpose of obtaining *ráb* for manure ;

(b) with the written authority of the Divisional Forest Officers to cut and remove trees, not being trees reserved as aforesaid and not exceeding 15 inches in circumference at the base, which in the opinion of the said officer impede cultivation ;

(c) to pasture and to cut and remove grass for his own cattle, sheep and goats ;

- (d) to gather and remove edible fruits and roots;
- (e) to gather and remove dead wood for fuel;
- (f) to quarry or gather and remove stones for his own use for any agricultural or domestic purpose.

11. Lessees exercising the privilege of lopping trees for obtaining *ráb* conceded by clause (a) of the last preceding rule, shall leave uncut a main leading shoot (*shenda*) of each tree which they so lop.

12. Any person permanently residing in any of the said villages may, in any unoccupied number of the protected forest in the village in which he resides, pasture, or cut and remove grass for his own cattle, sheep and goats without license or payment of any fee.

The Governor in Council reserves the right at any time to reconsider and amend or cancel this concession.

13. Except as provided in Rule 10 and in the last preceding rule, no cattle, sheep or goats may be pastured and no grass may be cut in the said protected forest without written authority from the Divisional Forest Officer.

RESOLUTION.

THE Government of Madras having represented that the existing orders on the subject of the receipt of testimonials and addresses by servants of Government are not altogether clear and precise, the Governor General in Council is pleased to lay down the following Rules in supersession of all previous orders on this matter.

2. The Rules do not apply to the receipt of addresses by the Head of any Government or Administration.

RULES.

1. Save as in these Rules otherwise provided, all servants of Government, covenanted or uncovenanted, are forbidden to receive complimentary or valedictory addresses in any form; or to accept testimonials of any kind; or to attend public meetings, or complimentary entertainments of a formal and public character, held in their honour.

2. The Government views with disfavour all similar manifestations in the case of retired officers, when following immediately upon their retirement from active service, and designed as an acknowledgment of acts done by them while in the service of Government.

3. It is not intended to prohibit such an expression of regard for the private or official character of an officer retiring from service, or leaving his station or district, as is involved in a farewell entertainment supported by his personal friends, even though some of these may be his official subordinates. But it is expected that the proceedings on such occasions will be substantially of a private and informal character.

4. Local Governments and Administrations are authorised to forward to an officer who has left a station or district the resolution of any local public body recording a vote of thanks to him for help and advice afforded during his official connection with the station or district.

5. Medical officers are not prohibited from receiving pecuniary recognition of their services from a community or body of persons which may desire to acknowledge these, but the previous sanction of the Local Government or Administration must be obtained by medical officers before receiving any public complimentary address.

6. The previous sanction of the Government of India must be obtained to the relaxation of these Rules in any special case in which the Local Government or Administration may think this desirable.

APPENDIX.

From E. C. BAYLEY, Esq., Secretary to the Government of India, Home Department, to the Secretary to the Government of the North-Western Provinces, No. 3599, dated Simla, the 11th August 1866.

I AM directed to forward the accompanying copy of a letter No. 484, dated the 13th ultimo, from the Superintendent of the Geological Survey of India, relative to an aërolite reported to have recently fallen at the village of Bustee near Goruckpore, and to the system that should, in Dr. Oldham's opinion, be observed in respect of the disposal of meteorites that fall in India.

2. The Governor General in Council considers that the course suggested in Dr. Oldham's 7th paragraph should be generally adopted.

3. I am, therefore, to request that, under the orders of the Lieutenant-Governor, the meteorite, referred to above, with, as far as practicable, the information required* by the Trustees of the Bengal Museum, may be transmitted to the Trustees of the Imperial Museum in Calcutta, to be dealt with in the manner severally indicated by Dr. Oldham.

* Endorsement to Government, North-Western Provinces, No. 2157, dated 31st March 1863.

Extract, paragraphs 7 and 8, from a letter from the Superintendent of the Geological Survey of India, to the Secretary to the Government of India, Home Department, No. 484, dated the 13th July 1866.

7. If this view of the question meets the approval of His Excellency in Council, I would solicit that instructions might be given to the Local Governments, &c., that all falls of aërolites, together with the papers relating to them, should, in the first instance, be forwarded to the Government Geological Museum, Calcutta, and at the same time that orders should be given to the Director of the Museum that specimens of all such falls should be forwarded without delay to the British Museum, with all particulars as to the date, &c., of the fall. In fact, that this Museum should be made the medium of transmission of such specimens to the British Museum, with which we are in constant communication, and with which we have established a system of mutual exchange.

8. If this plan be adopted, the 'Indian Museum' will not be deprived of the many opportunities of adding to its valuable collections of Indian aërolites, while the British Museum will be more certain than at present of receiving good specimens of all that come to Calcutta.

Note on the Observation and Collection of Aërolites drawn up under the direction of the Trustees of the British Museum, dated 1863.

THERE are two varieties of aërolites, or meteorites, that have been seen to fall from space. The one consists of stony masses, often containing particles of iron; and of these many have been observed in their fall; the other variety is composed, for the most part, of

iron. The actual fall of iron *aérolites* has been but rarely witnessed, though many masses of metallic iron have been found on the earth's surface, of the meteoric origin of which there can be no doubt.

It is a matter of great interest and of importance to science that as many as possible of these bodies should be collected for comparison, and that all the circumstances accompanying their fall be carefully recorded; and persons who, in the event of a 'fire-ball' being seen or of a mass having fallen, in their neighbourhood, will carefully collect facts regarding them, may make a very valuable contribution to the science.

For this purpose, inquiries should be instituted at once into the circumstances accompanying the fall of any meteoric mass, and into the state of any such mass when it has fallen; and as regards any meteoric appearance in the sky, it will be found advisable, after noting carefully the point in the heavens at which the meteor made its appearance, to give, as accurately as possible (see Note), the direction of its track and the point at which it disappeared.

Where it is possible this track should be delineated on a diagram, as explained in the Note.

The points to which especial attention is invited are enumerated in the following two series of inquiries:—

The first series relates to meteoric phenomena in the heavens, and their association with the fall of *aérolitic* matter to the earth.

1. Note the exact position of the observer, according to latitude and longitude.
2. Give the hour, day of month, and year.
3. Give the apparent size of the luminous ball, as compared with the full moon.
4. Its shape; whether round, pear-shaped, or otherwise; and, if elongated, in what direction.
5. It is particularly important to note the place where the meteor is first seen (as at A, see Note) like a star, and from which, as it moves, it may appear to be increasing in size.
6. State the duration of the phenomena; and
7. Whether the ball again dwindles away to the semblance of a star, and then disappears or whether it retains to the last its full size, or then, as is often the case, divides into several balls or stars.
8. Give the colours.
9. Record any facts that can be gathered concerning detonations or noises accompanying the other phenomena.
10. Endeavour to collect statements relating to the actual fall to the earth of any solid bodies.
11. Do they consist of stone, or iron, and is there anything peculiar in their structure?
12. Was the body red-hot, or warm, or did it exhibit evidence of having been warm outside and cold within—as, for instance, by being hot at first and intensely cold afterwards?
13. It is desirable, further, to notice the depth to which, and the direction in which, the *aérolite* has penetrated the earth: also to state the nature of the soil, the effect produced on it by the *aérolitic* mass, and the position in which the *aérolite* was found to be lying in the ground.

The second series of inquiries has for its object the acquisition of a more precise knowledge regarding the *aérolites* themselves. For this, it is important to preserve, and to collect, for the purpose of analysis and of scientific comparison, as many of these bodies as possible; and the following suggestions are offered in the hope of promoting this object:

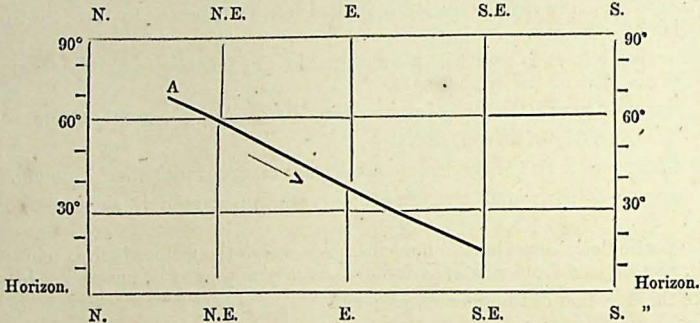
1. Endeavour to get the meteorolites as soon as possible after their fall, to prevent them from being injured, fractured, or wetted.
2. If not entire, try to procure fragments.
3. Should persons or museums not be willing to part with them for the British Museum, then procure drawings, photographs, models, or casts; accompanied by an accurate description of their colour, the external lustre, and, if broken, the nature of the substance or substances exhibited by the fracture; and especially be careful to describe the form of the *aérolitic* mass, whether angular or rounded, whether prismatic, or otherwise exhibiting an approximation to any geometrical figure. Also state whether its surface be smooth, or marked by any peculiar kind of roughness, or pitted with hollows.
4. Catalogues of the meteorites in the local museums are very desirable, with statements of their weights, and also the time of, and other facts accompanying, their fall, as detailed above.
5. From masses of iron or stone still lying on the earth, and too large to be brought away, detach specimens of good size, say from 20 lb. to 50 lb. weight, and collect all obtainable information, with detailed descriptions, drawings, measurements, historical accounts, &c.

6. Iron meteorites should always be cut with a steel saw and emery.

The collection of aërolites in the Mineral Department of the British Museum is now, as regards the mass and size of the specimens, the finest in the world, and any person who may be in a position to contribute additional specimens is requested to accompany them with an attestation as to the weight of the specimen, and facts regarding it such as the senders may be in a position to state on their own authority, or as may have come to them on authority which they have reason to accept as reliable.

NOTE.—The delineation of the tract of the meteor on paper is very desirable as presenting greater accuracy than a merely verbal description. A practical and simple method of doing this consists in noting down the tracts of meteors, or 'fire-balls,' upon a projection, like the diagram, of a hemio rama, taken from the place of the observer, noting the altitudes and azimuths corresponding to meridians and parallels of latitude. The accompanying sketch expresses that to an observer turned towards the East the meteor appeared in the N.N.E. at an elevation of 75°, and fell down to the S.E., where it disappeared only 10° above the horizon.

He subsequently served as Assistant Judge, Judge of the Small Cause Court, Joint Judge, and Judge and Sessions Judge in various districts, as Agent for Sirdárs in the Deccan, and as Registrar of the High Court, Appellate Side. In 1864 he was appointed to act as Secretary to Government in the Judicial and Political Departments, and was confirmed in that appointment on the 4th May 1865; and thus for more than 20 years the members of successive Governments have enjoyed the advantage of his advice and assistance as Secretary, Acting Chief Secretary, and Chief Secretary to Government in the Political, Judicial, Educational, and Secret Departments, and in 1884 he held office as a Temporary Member of Council.

While serving as Chief Secretary Mr. Gonne has also on many occasions rendered much assistance to the local Legislature as an Additional Member of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations. He has always taken a deep interest in the progress of education, and has furthered every measure undertaken with that object. In the Political Department his long experience and intimate acquaintance with the circumstances of the many Native States in Western India have been of

special value, and have conduced to a continuity of policy which has, as His Excellency in Council is glad to believe, been productive of much benefit to the States concerned. He has invariably advocated a liberal and generous policy in regard to the admission of the natives of the country to a share in the administration of public business and to all other rights of citizenship which they are fitted to exercise.

It is the pleasant duty of His Excellency in Council to express his high sense of the long and valuable services thus rendered by Mr. Gonne, who will undoubtedly carry with him the esteem and good wishes of all who have been brought into official or social contact with him in India.

PART I.

Notification.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 1st June 1885.

No. 2030.—In exercise of the power conferred by Act I. of 1870, the following Rules for Quarantine against Cholera have been made by the Government of Bombay, with the previous sanction of the Governor General in Council: they will take effect from the 28th ultimo in the Port of Aden and at Perim as a temporary measure:—

- I.—The Commander of every vessel, including buggalows or other native craft, arriving from Moulmein shall, before entering the harbour, indicate by signal the port from which such vessel has come.
- II.—Such Commander shall not, except as hereinafter provided, allow any communication, either with the pilot boat, except orally, or with the shore, or with any other vessel or boat in the harbour.
- III.—Immediately on any such arrival being signalled, the Health Officer of the port shall go alongside the vessel, and, if communication with the shore is desired, shall direct the Commander to take the vessel to the quarantine anchorage, duly appointed and notified in that behalf by the Resident, there to remain for a period of seven days from the date of arrival in the harbour, or for the shorter period prescribed in Rule IV., and undergo disinfection, which should apply as well to crew, passengers, effects and susceptible goods. The Health Officer shall also direct the Commander to prohibit, during the period for which the vessel remains at the quarantine anchorage as aforesaid, all communication, except such as is hereinafter provided for, between such vessel and the shore, or other vessels and boats in the harbour. If communication with the shore is not desired the vessel shall anchor at such place as may be pointed out by the Port authorities, having regard to the season of the year, and no communication shall be allowed with the pilot boat, otherwise than orally, or with the shore.

IV.—If the Health Officer of the Port has sufficient evidence that no cases of a suspicious nature have taken place on board during the voyage, and if the vessel is besides in good hygienic condition, the duration of the quarantine will be diminished according to the following scale:—

After eight days of voyage	six days of quarantine.
Do. nine do.	five do.
Do. ten do.	four do.
Do. eleven do.	three do.
Do. twelve do.	two do.
Do. thirteen do.	and upwards	twenty-four hours of quarantine.

V.—If during the period a vessel is at the quarantine anchorage aforesaid, any case or cases of cholera should occur on board, the said vessel shall remain in quarantine for a period of seven days from the date of the last case occurring, and be subject to all the prohibitions provided for in Rule III.

VI.—When any vessel has been placed in quarantine as aforesaid, the Health Officer may direct the removal of so many of the passengers and crew as may not be suffering from illness, and whose services may not be required on board the vessel, to such particular spots as may from time to time be selected by the Resident as places of quarantine, there to remain for a period of seven days. If a case of cholera occurs among such passengers and crew during any such period, they shall remain in a place of quarantine for a period of fifteen days from the date of the occurrence of the last case of such illness.

VII.—Any mails or cargo which may be brought by any vessel so arriving shall be landed under such precautions as the Health Officer may deem necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

VIII.—It will be the duty of the Port Officer to facilitate the conveyance to all vessels in quarantine of such supplies of provisions, stores and other articles as may be required by those on board. Such supplies will be placed on the boats of the vessels in quarantine to be subsequently removed by members of their crews.

IX.—All vessels arriving at Aden and Perim which may have communicated with vessels coming from Moulmein shall be subjected to the same quarantine as vessels arriving at Aden and Perim from that Port.

X.—All vessels which have undergone quarantine in the manner above prescribed should have the fact clearly stated on their Bills of Health.
