No. 2549.—The following telegram from the Political Resident, Aden, dated 8th July 1885, is published for general information:—

“A telegram to the following effect has been received from the British Consul General at Cairo:—Quarantine removed on arrivals from Madras. Maintained against Bombay and Calcutta.”

No. 2581.—With reference to Government Notification No. 1357, dated 14th April 1885, the following rules under Section 12 of the Bombay District Municipal Act Amendment Act, 1884, for the Municipal District of Rájápur in the

Ratnágiri Collectorate are published for general information:—

Under the provisions of Sections 11 and 12 (a) and (b) of the Bombay District Municipal Act Amendment Act, 1884, the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the Municipal Commission of Rájápur in the district of Ratnágiri shall consist of twelve members exclusive of the President, and shall be constituted partly by election and partly by nomination by the Commissioner, Southern Division.

The number of elected members of the commission shall be six and of those nominated by the Commissioner, Southern Division, shall be six, out of whom three may be salaried servants of Government and three shall be non-official private gentlemen.

The Governor in Council is also pleased to direct that “the District Municipal Election Rules” published under Section 12 (c) of Bombay Act II. of 1884, under Government

Notification No. 115, dated 14th January 1885, with the amendments of them made by Government Notifications No. 561, dated 17th February 1885, and No. 2342, dated 23rd June 1885, shall apply to the said Municipal District of Rájápur, and in addition thereto to issue the following orders:—

The minimum amount of direct municipal taxes the payment of which shall entitle a person to have his name entered in the list of voters of the Municipal District of Rájápur shall be Rs. 3 per annum.

The elections of the Municipal Commissioners for the said Municipal District of Rájápur shall take place on the 1st October 1885.

"14. Every voter may vote for as many candidates as there are commissioners to be elected for the municipal district, or ward, as the case may be. A vote for any person whose name is not included in the list of candidates published under Rule 11 shall not be received."

The number of elected members of the commission shall be fourteen and of those nominated by the Commissioner, Northern Division, shall be fourteen, out of whom seven may be salaried servants of Government and seven shall be non-official private gentlemen.

The minimum amount of direct municipal taxes, the payment of which shall entitle a person to have his name entered in the list of voters of the Municipal District of Ahmedabad, shall be Rs. 3 per annum.

The elections of the municipal commissioners for the said Municipal District of Ahmedabad shall take place on the 15th August 1885.
