No. 3089.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 55 of the Deccan Agriculturists' Relief Act, XVII. of 1879, and in modification of Government Notification in the Judicial Department No. 6710A., published at pages 871 to 899 of the

Bombay Government Gazette of the 2nd November 1882, His Excellency the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that on and from the 1st of August next the Village Registration Circle of Belpimpalgaon in the Nevása Táluka in the district of Ahmednagar shall be amalgamated with that of Salabatpur in the same táluka and district.

The above amalgamated circle shall be known by the name of Belpimpalgaon-Salabatpur and shall be in charge of one village registrar who shall hold his office at Belpimpalgaon and Salabatpur respectively on such days in each month as shall from time to time be prescribed by the Registrar of the district.

RESOLUTION—By the Government of India, Department of Finance and Commerce

Read—

Rule 16 of the Rules published with Financial Notification No. 593,* dated the 5th February 1886, prohibit-

ing all public servants from making public or disclosing, except for the purpose of the working of Act II of 1886, any information contained in the documents delivered or produced with respect to assessments under Part IV of the said Act, and declaring that any public servant committing a breach of this Rule shall be deemed to have committed an offence under Section 166 of the Indian Penal Code.

RESOLUTION.—The Government of India invites the special attention of all officers concerned with the working of Act II of 1886 to the Rule read in the preamble, and further directs that all officers engaged in working the Act shall not merely not disclose any information of the character above referred to, but shall be most careful, as far as practicable, to regulate their proceedings in such manner as to prevent information which should be kept secret becoming known. Information of this nature, it should be precautionally noted, is to be withheld by officers enforcing the Act from persons in the employment of assesses.

ORDER.—Ordered, that the above Resolution be communicated to the several Local Governments and Administrations, and that it be published in the *Gazette of India* for general information.

BY THE COMMISSIONER OF CUSTOMS,

SALT, OPIUM AND ÁBKÁRI.

No. 2601.—The following Rules framed by the Commissioner of Ábkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the Ábkári Act, 1878, for the management of the public distilleries at Dádar and Chaupáti in the Island of Bombay, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein, are published for general information in supersession of those published at pages 1020 to 1025 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I., dated 20th November 1884:—

Rules framed by the Commissioner of Ábkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the Ábkári Act, 1878, for the management of the public distilleries at Dádar and Chaupáti in the Island of Bombay, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein.

1. No toddy shall be admitted into the distilleries between the hours of 12 noon and 4 P.M., or between the hours of 8 P.M. and 6 A.M.

2. Toddy brought to either of the distilleries aforesaid shall be taken direct to the Inspector in charge thereof for examination and measurement.

3. The Distillery Inspector shall examine and measure without delay all toddy brought to his distillery and shall enter in a register, to be kept by him in the annexed Form A, the quantity of toddy brought in from time to time by or on account of each licensed distiller.

4. Each licensed distiller shall, at his own expense, construct and complete within thirty days after the date of his distillery license, and thereafter keep in good repair to the satisfaction of the Collector, a strong room for the custody of spirit, and shall separately deposit therein all spirit manufactured by him as soon as it is drawn from the still, and shall not open the entrance thereof or remove spirit therefrom without the permission of the Distillery Inspector. He shall

also provide Chubb's locks and such other fastenings for the entrance to the strong room as the Collector may prescribe. He shall also provide vessels of such kind and capacity as the Collector may prescribe for the storage of spirit in his said strong room. The Distillery Inspector shall measure and test all spirit taken into such strong room not later than the day after its deposit, and shall enter in the Register in Form A aforesaid the quantities and strengths of the spirit taken into and removed from each strong room daily.

5. Spirit shall be removed from the distillery only in casks, each of capacity between 16 and 17 gallons, or between 20 and 21 gallons. All casks used for the removal of spirit shall be filled full to the bung-hole before being gauged and tested and passed out of the distillery.

6. Licensed distillers shall provide each his own casks of authorised capacity for the removal of spirit. Each cask, before being used, shall be taken by the owner to the Inspector, who shall gauge its capacity by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose and shall brand upon it

- (1) the name of the distillery,
- (2) the consecutive number of the cask,
- (3) the capacity of the cask in gallons and pints,
- (4) the date of branding.

7. Every cask so branded shall be again gauged once in every six months by the Inspector by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose, and shall then be branded anew if necessary. Whenever any cask is coopered, or repaired in any way, it shall be taken by the distiller to whom it may belong to the Inspector before being used for the removal of spirit, and shall be re-gauged by the Inspector in the manner aforesaid and shall be branded anew, if necessary. Whenever the capacity of a cask as ascertained by measurement with the standard measures may be found to differ from the capacity branded thereon, the old brand shall be erased and the correct capacity of the cask shall be branded upon it.

8. The Inspector shall keep a register of all casks measured and branded by him.

9. Each licensed distiller shall be provided gratis with a bound book of permit forms, the pages of which shall be numbered consecutively and severally stamped with the Collector's seal. The permits shall be printed in triplicate in the Form B. hereto annexed.

10. Whenever a licensed distiller wishes to remove spirit from the distillery, he shall enter in a permit form in the said book the particulars shown therein to be entered by him, and shall take, or send by the hand of his servant, the permit book to the Collector's office before 2 P.M. on any week day. The form filled in by the distiller shall there be examined by the Huzúr Inspector or other officer appointed for the purpose, who, if he finds the entries to be correct, shall receive the still-head duty recoverable on the spirit to be removed and shall sign the receipt and permit allowing the licensee to remove spirit from the distillery. He shall tear off the 3rd portion of the permit and forward it to the Inspector in charge of the Division in which

the shop to which the liquor mentioned therein is intended to be conveyed is situated, and shall return the permit book to the licensee, or his servant, without delay and before closing office on the same day. The licensed distiller shall, before 10 A.M. on the following morning, present the permit book together with the spirit intended to be removed to the Distillery Inspector. The Distillery Inspector shall then measure and test the contents of each cask of spirit offered for removal and satisfy himself that the quantity and strength of the spirit offered for removal does not exceed the quantity and strength entered in the permit for removal. He shall also calculate the still-head duty payable on the spirit presented for removal by the licensed distiller, and shall satisfy himself that the correct amount has been levied in the Collector's office. He shall then note on the reverse of the receipt and permit all the particulars required to be by him there entered, and shall complete and sign the transport permit, and allow the spirit to pass out of the distillery.

11. When the permit has been completed as above, the Distillery Inspector shall make the necessary entries in his register in Register Form C, hereto annexed, and shall tear off the 2nd portion of the permit which shall be delivered to the persons transporting the spirit to be carried along with the same to the shop to which the spirit is conveyed, there to be filed as provided for in the said shopkeeper's license. The Divisional Inspector to whom the 3rd portion of the permit has been forwarded the previous evening from the Collector's office shall return it after he has himself or by a Sub-Inspector seen that the quantity of liquor mentioned in the permit has been entered in the shop accounts and after the certificates on the reverse of the permit sent to him and that filed in the shop, have been duly filled in to the extent of the check exercised. The counterfoil of the permit shall remain in the distiller's book which shall be given up on the expiry of the license.

12. In calculating the duty payable on toddy spirit removed from the distilleries, fractions of a pint shall be taken as one whole pint.

13. Spirit removed under any permit shall be of uniform strength, viz., either spirit not exceeding 50° U.P. in strength, or spirit of strength above 50° U.P. and not exceeding 25° U.P.

14. No one shall be allowed to remain in the distilleries between the hours of 10 P.M. and 6 A.M., except with the written permission of the Collector.

15. No distillation shall be carried on in any distillery between the hours of 10 P.M. and 6 A.M., except with the written permission of the Collector.

16. No spirit shall be removed from any distillery except between the hours of 10 A.M. and 3 P.M.

The rules will come into force from the 1st August 1886.

On receipt of these returns the Controlling officers will prepare one general consolidated statement in Form Appendix B. attached to the Government of India's Resolution above quoted, and forward it to this Office by the 31st July 1886, to enable it to submit one general statement for the whole province to Government, who will pass it on to the Government of India by the prescribed date.

As the annual estimates of stores for 1887-88 prescribed in paragraphs 20 and 21 of the Government of India's Resolution already quoted are not needed by the Accountant General's Office, they should be forwarded separately to the Local Government direct. In many cases last year a non-observance of this course caused unnecessary confusion and loss of time.
