The year 1887 will be memorable throughout the British Empire, and will be of special local interest to these Australasian Colonies, from the fact that that year will witness the union of the Capitals of South Australia, Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland by a continuous line of railway, 1,760 miles in length, viz.:

SYSTEM OF AWARDS.

Judges shall be appointed—One-half of whom may be nominated by the official representatives of the foreign countries and colonies exhibiting, acting in conjunction with the Executive Committee.

Judges will be selected for their qualifications in relation to the special class of work assigned to them, and will be chosen from the best sources available, and will impartially recognise merit without regard to nationality.

The Executive Committee will appoint a sufficient number of Judges to each group of classes.

The Executive Committee will appoint Judges for collective exhibits.

The Executive Committee will appoint a Superintendent of Juries and Awards to frame rules for the guidance of Judges, to regulate their meetings and facilitate their work, and otherwise carry out the instructions of the Juries and Awards Committee.

Judges absent from three consecutive meetings, unless by written permission of the Superintendent of Juries and Awards, will be held to have surrendered their posts.

A vacancy in any body of Judges shall at once be reported by the said Superintendent of the Juries and Awards, and such place declared vacant, and such vacancy shall forthwith be filled by the Executive Committee.

Experts may be called in by a majority of any jury, their names having been previously submitted to and approved by the Juries and Awards Committee.

No exhibitor, nor his agent, shall be a Judge in any class in which he exhibits.

An exhibitor who is not the manufacturer or producer of the article exhibited shall not be entitled to an award. (Fine Arts and Live Stock excepted.)

Awards shall consist of three classes, *viz.* :—

1st Class.—Diploma of First Order of Merit and Medal.

2nd Class.—Diploma of Second Order of Merit.

3rd Class.—Diploma of Third Order of Merit.

Awards to be based on reports, made in writing by the Judges and attested by their signatures, setting forth the merits of the product adjudged, which have formed the ground of the award; and the awards so made shall be forthwith forwarded to the Superintendent of Jures and Awards, to whom the records of Juries shall be open for inspection.

The elements of merit shall include originality, invention, discovery, utility, quality, skill, workmanship, fitness for the purposes intended, adaptation to public wants, economy, and cost.

The promoters hope to be able to secure additional valuable awards for exhibits of special character.

All decisions of Juries must be returned to the Superintendent of Juries and Awards on or before a date to be declared by the Juries and Awards Committee, unless special written permission for an extended time shall have been granted by such Committee.

The Juries and Awards Committee will constitute a Court of Appeal.

In case of appeal, a fee of £2 2s. must be deposited with the Superintendent of Juries and Awards; if appeal allowed the fee will be returned.

The reports of the Judges recommending awards shall be forwarded by the Juries and Awards Committee to the Executive Committee by whom awards will be finally decreed.

The above System of Awards was adopted at a meeting of the Promoters held at Adelaide on the 2nd day of March 1886.

Regulations for Exhibitors.

1. Early application for space is requested to be made to the Secretary, in Adelaide, or to the Secretary to the London Commission. Applications must be made through the Commission or other official representative of the country or colony to which the applicant belongs, but in the event of no such representative existing, intending exhibitors can communicate direct as above. No applications for space will be received later than the 1st January 1877. The form (A) of application is appended hereto.

2. All space exceeding twenty square feet will be charged for at the rate of one shilling per foot for floor space, and six pence per foot for wall space, excepting sculpture and paintings approved by the Fine Arts Committee, which will be admitted free. Special arrangements may be made by the Executive Committee for the charge for space for machinery, agricultural implements, and other bulky goods.

3. Governments intending to take part in this exhibition are requested to forward an intimation to that effect not later than the 1st January 1887.

4. The Exhibition buildings will be constituted a bonded Store; but exhibits sold will be subject to duty.

5. Articles manufactured in the Exhibition buildings may be sold and removed with the consent of the Executive Commissioners. Exhibits may be sold during the exhibition, but may not be removed until its close, unless by special written permission of the Executive Commissioner.

6. An Act of the Legislature protects inventors, provided that application for a patent is lodged within six months of first exhibition.

7. The commission may refuse entry to articles they consider of a dangerous or offensive character.

8. Articles intended for exhibition will be received on or after the first day of March 1887, and not later than the twentieth day of May 1887, unless further time be allowed by the Executive Committee.

9. Space allotted to countries, and colonies, and not occupied by the twentieth day of May, 1887, will revert to the Commission for re-assignment.

10. The Commission will take precautions for the due protection of all objects in the Exhibition, but will in no way be responsible for damage or loss of any kind.

11. Subject to the approval of the Executive Commissioner, Exhibitors may appoint their own watchmen during the hours the Exhibition is open to the public.

12. Arrangements will be made for the supply of steam power, by the Executive Committee, at the expense of the Exhibitors, but Exhibitors must make application for the power required, and will be charged in proportion for the power used.

13. If Exhibits are not intended for competition, such fact should be distinctly stated when making the entry.

14. Exhibitors will be required to furnish and decorate their own courts or lesser constructions at their own cost, in conformity with the general plans adopted by the Executive Committee.

15. Special constructions may be made by Exhibitors, in the building or on the grounds, after receiving the approval, in writing, of the Executive Commissioner.

16. Exhibitors or their agents shall be responsible for the receiving, unpacking and arrangement of objects, as well as for their removal at the close of the Exhibition.

17. The transportation, unpacking, and the arrangement of the Exhibits will be at the expense of the Exhibitor.

18. Commissioners representing countries or colonies and private exhibitors may adopt one of two courses, namely,—

(a) They may ship their exhibits to Adelaide, and make their own arrangements for their reception and exhibition ; or,

(b) If consigned to the Exhibition, they should be addressed as follows :—

19. If no authorised person be at hand to receive goods sent to the Exhibition, they will be removed and stored by the Executive Commissioner, at the cost and risk of the Exhibitor.
20. Immediately after the close of the Exhibition, Exhibitors must remove their Exhibits and complete such removal within one month from the close of the Exhibition, unless further time be allowed by the Executive Committee.
21. Goods not removed in accordance with Regulation No. 20 may be removed by the Executive Committee and sold to defray expenses, or be otherwise disposed of as they may think fit.
22. An official catalogue will be published in English, the sale of which is reserved by the Executive Committee.

23. No work of art or any article whatever exhibited in the buildings or on the ground of the Exhibition may be drawn, copied, or reproduced in any manner whatever without the joint consent of the Exhibitor and the Executive Commissioner.
24. The Executive Committee reserves the right to explain, amend, or extend these regulations whenever it may be deemed necessary in the interests of the Exhibition.

28. The right is reserved of keeping the Exhibition open for two evenings during each week should the Executive Committee deem it desirable.

SIR,

I have the honour, by direction, respectfully to request that the Government will bring under the attention of the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies the fact that an International Exhibition will be held in Adelaide in the year 1887, to commemorate the fiftieth anniversary of the foundation of the Province of South Australia and the completion of the fiftieth year of the reign of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, with a view to an official intimation being made to the Governments of foreign countries of the holding of such an Exhibition, and an invitation being given to such Governments to participate in the Exhibition.

In making the request I have to ask that immediate communications may be opened up with the Secretary of State, and also with the various Governments (including the Governments of India, China, and Japan); and in your despatch I am to beg that you will be good enough to give prominence to the following points:—

1. That Parliament has set apart land for the Exhibition, and contributed £32,000 towards the erection of a permanent Exhibition Building and the laying out of the Exhibition grounds.

2. That, although the Exhibition has been set on foot by private individuals, His Excellency the Governor is President of the Exhibition, and His Excellency's Ministers are associated with him in the Executive management of it.

3. That H. R. H. the Prince of Wales and T. R. H. the Princes Edward and George of Wales have generously accorded to the Exhibition their royal patronage.

4. That it is proposed to open the Exhibition on the 20th June 1887.

5. That applications for space must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Exhibition in Adelaide, or to the Secretary to the Commission in London, not later than 1st January, 1887. Applications must be made through the Commission or other official representative of the country or colony to which the applicant belongs, but in the event of no such representative existing, intending exhibitors can communicate direct as above.

6. Space up to 20 square feet will be free, but any excess of that quantity will be charged for at the rate of one shilling per foot for floor space, and six-pence per foot for wall space, excepting sculpture and paintings approved by the Fine Arts Committee, which will be admitted free. Special arrangements may, however, be made for machinery and bulky goods.

7. Governments intending to take part in this Exhibition are requested to forward an intimation to that effect not later than 1st January 1887.

8. Articles intended for exhibition will be received on or after the 1st day of March 1887 and not later than 20th day of May 1887, unless further time is allowed by the Executive Committee.

9. Copies of the Proclamation of the Exhibition, together with the Sectional Committee's Classification of Exhibits, and General Regulations are forwarded herewith for the information of the respective Governments.

It will be a source of great satisfaction to the promoters and the colonists generally to learn that the European and American Governments, as well as the Eastern countries, will be represented at the Exhibition.

No. 6341.—In accordance with the provisions of Section 18, sub-section (1), of the Indian Explosives Act, No. IV. of 1884, and the directions contained in the Notification of the Government of India in the Home Department No. 1437, dated 14th August 1885, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to publish for the information of persons likely to be affected thereby, the following draft of special rules to regulate the conveyance, shipping and discharging of gunpowder and other explosives within the limits of the Port of Karáchi, which His Excellency in Council proposes to prescribe under the Act.

The Draft Rules will be taken into consideration on the expiry of three months from the date of this Notification :—

DRAFT RULES.

1. No vessel having gunpowder or other explosives in excess of 100 lbs. weight on board entering the Port of Karáchi shall proceed farther than the Deep Water Point Moorings until such excess quantity has been discharged and deposited in the Port Department Magazine erected on the spit between the Island of Baba and the Quarantine Buildings or such other place as Government may direct, and no vessel shall take on board such excess quantity within the above limits.

2. When receiving or delivering such gunpowder or other explosives, the master of any vessel is to see that the platform in the vessel's hold, the gangways and combings of the hatchways are covered with tanned hides or other suitable paddings, that the barrels or boxes are carefully stowed and the hatches properly secured and locked, and that the key remains in his own possession.

3. A cushion (stuffed with white oakum) covered with leather is to be used for landing all such powder barrels or cases upon, whether in the hold of the vessel, in the boats, or on the wharf, when landing or discharging powder or other explosives.

4. After the vessel has been discharged, the hides, hair-cloths, &c., are to be removed and the hold carefully cleaned out.

5. Every such vessel as last aforesaid when at anchor at night in the roadstead, or in the track of shipping, is to show a mast-head light, and every such vessel when under weigh at night is to show side-lights, according to the Admiralty Regulations.

6. Barges, lighters, boats and vessels carrying such gunpowder or other explosives, shall not when at anchor lie closer than half a mile from any of the shipping or public landing places.

7. When any vessel has such gunpowder or other explosives on board, a red flag is to be hoisted at the foremast-head, and kept flying until the cargo is discharged. The master and all the crew are to remain on board until the gunpowder or other explosive stores are discharged, unless it

be necessary to procure water or provisions, in which case notice is to be given to the Port Officer, but the vessel is not to be left without an officer on board.

8. Vessels, barges and boats having or taking on board such gunpowder or other explosives, are to be kept scrupulously clean and free from loose gunpowder.

9. In shipping or discharging such gunpowder or other explosives, tanned hides or wadmiltits are to be laid down in that portion of the vessel over which the cases or barrels pass.

10. All boats laden with such gunpowder or other explosives are to remain at anchor off the magazine abovementioned, until orders are received to land the same.

11. Only decked boats with closed-in hatches under lock and key (the latter to remain in charge of the official deputed to superintend the discharge of the gunpowder or other explosives), are to be employed for the conveyance of gunpowder or other explosives, and they are to have a moveable board attached to the bow and stern a foot long with the word "Explosives" painted in white letters on a black ground, and a red flag is to be kept hoisted during the time any such gunpowder or other explosives are on board.

12. The consignee, agent or other person concerned; shall give written notice (twenty-four hours before the expected arrival or intended shipment of any such explosives) to the Port Officer, who shall depute an officer to remain in charge of such explosives until the same has been deposited in the magazine, or stowed on board any vessel conveying it elsewhere.

13. The Port Officer is authorized on occasions when he may deem it expedient to permit ammunition properly packed in cases, when such cases do not exceed 50 in number, to be shipped on board a vessel lying at the ordinary anchorage on the day or the day before such vessel is intended to sail. Shipment shall be effected under the same precautions and conditions as are prescribed in the rules for the shipment of explosives on board vessels lying off the Deep Water Point Moorings. Ammunition permitted to be shipped under this rule must be taken in immediately on the boat going alongside and no cargo boat or other vessel having fire on board shall be permitted to lie on the same side of the vessel during the time of such shipment.

No. 6505.—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct the addition of the following rules to the draft rules for regulating the manufacture, possession and sales of explosives in the Bombay Presidency prescribed in Government Notification No. 4525, dated 24th June 1886, published at pp. 561 to 570 of the *Bombay Government Gazette*, Part I., of 8th July 1886.

The additional rules will be taken into consideration on the expiry of three months from the date of this Notification :—

DRAFT RULES.

29. Every license granted under these rules shall be liable to be forfeited on breach of any of the conditions subject to which it is granted.

30. If a person licensed to manufacture, possess or sell an explosive dies or becomes bankrupt or becomes mentally incapable or otherwise disabled, the person carrying on the business of such licensee shall not be liable to any penalty or forfeiture under the Act or the rules made thereunder for carrying on the business or acting under the license during such reasonable time as may be necessary to allow him to make an application to the authority granting the license for a new license in his own name during the currency of the unexpired portion of the original license. Such new license shall be granted on the payment of one rupee.

31. The fees leviable under these rules shall be taken in the shape of 'impressed stamps.' Ordinarily the applications for licenses or renewals of licenses shall, if not otherwise provided, be written on 'impressed stamps' of value equal to the amount of fee leviable in respect of such licenses or renewals; the licenses themselves being issued on plain paper. But when the licenses themselves are written or printed on impressed stamps, the application may be on plain paper. When an application for a license is written on an impressed stamp, and the license is refused, the value of the stamp will on application be refunded to the applicant.

32. All licenses except licenses to manufacture an explosive under Rule 12 or to possess explosives of the 5th (fulminate) class under Rule 21 shall expire on the 31st December of the year for which they are granted. Licenses granted under Rules 12 and 21 shall be current for the term therein specified. But the currency of a license may, unless the circumstances have so changed that the grant of a new license would either not be authorized under the Act and rules or is deemed objectionable by the licensing authorities, on application previous to its expiration, be renewed, on payment of the original fee.

33. When a license granted in accordance with these rules is lost, or accidentally destroyed, a duplicate may be granted to the licensee on payment of a fee of eight annas.

34. Any person holding a license, or acting under a license, granted in accordance with these rules, shall be bound to produce the same, when called upon to do so by any Magistrate or by any

police officer in charge of a police station, or by any police officer of higher rank.

35. All magistrates or other authorities acting under these rules will perform their duties subject to the control of their executive superiors and of Government.

36. Any authority empowered to grant a license under the foregoing rules may, if he thinks fit, direct by an order written on the license that it shall have the effect of a like license under the Indian Arms Act, 1878.

37. Any persons lawfully entitled under the Indian Arms Act, 1878, or the rules made thereunder, to possess any explosive coming under the head of ammunition as defined in that Act, may possess, without license under these rules, any such explosive in reasonable quantities for his own private use.

I. Whenever the rent payable to the khot consists of a share of the produce of the tenant's land, the amount of produce claimable by the khot shall be ascertained by an estimate of the probable yield of the crop of each field to be made by the khot on an inspection of the crop a reasonable time before the same is ready for reaping in the presence of the tenant, or a member of his family appointed by him in writing for that purpose, or his legally appointed agent, and of two respectable witnesses, one of whom is able to read and write, provided that unless the tenant otherwise desires the khot shall inspect and appraise the crops specified below on or before the dates entered below:—

Halwa Nāgli—On or before the 10th September.

Other Halwa crops—On or before the 1st October.

Late crops, that is harik, kulith, udid, tág, and tūr—On or before the 15th November.

Other late crops—On or before the 1st November.

Rabi, e.g., gram, &c.—On or before the 1st March.

Summer crops, e.g., páwta, &c.—On or before the 20th March.

Hot weather crops, e.g., rice (wáigan), náchni (gimvas), jack-fruit, &c.—On or before the 20th May.

Provided further that in the case of bágáyat crops the mámlatdár or mahálkari shall decide what constitutes a reasonable time within the meaning of this rule.

III. If notwithstanding that the days fixed for the inspection and appraisement have been notified as aforesaid, the tenant, or a member of his family appointed by him in writing for that purpose, or his legally appointed agent, is not present in his field on the days so fixed, the khot shall nevertheless proceed to inspect and appraise such tenant's crops and shall inform such tenant in writing of the appraisement so made within 24 hours of the same by sending him a copy of the entries relating to his fields by the khot in the abhavani patrak mentioned in the rule immediately following.

IV. It shall be the duty of the khot to keep a book to be called the abhavani patrak in such

form as the Collector may, from time to time, prescribe, in which he shall at the time of every inspection and appraisement that he shall make, enter on the spot the particulars of such inspection and appraisement, or cause the same to be entered. Each entry in the said book shall bear the date on which it is made, and shall be signed by the khot making the inspection and appraisement, by both witnesses, and also, if the tenant or a member of his family appointed by him in writing for that purpose, or his legally appointed agent be present and admit the correctness of the entry, by the tenant, such member of his family, or such agent, provided always that such tenant, member or agent is able to write his name and does not use a mark.

V. The khot shall be bound, if the tenant, or a member of his family appointed by him in writing for that purpose, or his legally appointed agent is present, to give him then and there a signed copy of the entries relating to his fields made in the abhavani patrak. If the tenant admits the correctness of the entries and has brought his receipt-book, the entries shall be copied on the debit side of the receipt book. In all other cases the copy shall be on a separate slip.

VI. An entry duly made in the abhavani patrak in accordance with the foregoing provisions, and signed with his name by the tenant or a member of his family appointed by him in writing for that purpose, or his legally appointed agent, shall be conclusive evidence of the facts therein recorded, and the appraisement shall be deemed to be final; and an entry so made when the tenant, or a member of his family appointed by him in writing for that purpose, or his legally appointed agent fails to be present, shall be presumed to be correct until the contrary is proved in the manner prescribed in the next following rule, and provided the tenant has been informed of the appraisement in the manner prescribed in the last part of Rule III.

VIII. If the khot fails to keep an abhavani patrak or to inspect or appraise the crop at the time and in the manner laid down in Rule I or to make an entry or to cause the same to be made therein in the manner hereinbefore provided, or to give information to the tenant in the manner provided in Rule III., he shall be entitled to recover from the tenant such rent only as may be due according to the yield of the crop admitted by the tenant.

RESOLUTION.

In Home Department Resolution dated the 12th February 1886, cited in the preamble, which announced the establishment of six State scholarships of the value of £200 each per annum, tenable for three years in England by persons who are natives of India within the meaning of section 6 of the Statute 33 Vic., cap. 3, it was laid down *inter alia* that no candidate for these

scholarships should be more than 21 years of age. It was further provided in paragraphs 4 and 6 of the Resolution—

- (1) that each scholar would be entitled to receive a sum of £100 for passage money, and that a similar sum would be payable within one month before his actual return to India, if he should complete the full period of three years' residence, or be compelled by sickness to return before the completion of that period; and
- (2) that if any scholar, not being disabled by sickness, failed to complete a residence of three years in England, or was guilty of gross misconduct, or disregard of the orders of Her Majesty's Secretary of State, he would, at the discretion of the Secretary of State, forfeit his scholarship and further be liable to refund the sum of £100 drawn by him as passage money.

2. As regards the age limit fixed by the Resolution of 12th February last, representations have been received by the Government of India to the effect that the result of prescribing a maximum limit of 21 years will practically involve the exclusion of Muhammadan youths from participation in the benefits of the scholarships in question.

The Governor-General in Council has now, after careful consideration and consultation with the authorities of the Calcutta University, resolved to raise the age limit. It is accordingly notified that the maximum limit of age for all classes of candidates for these scholarships shall be 22 years instead of 21 years as prescribed in paragraph 3 of the Resolution above cited.

3. In accordance with directions from Her Majesty's Secretary of State, the Governor-General in Council further announces that, in modification of the orders contained in paragraphs 4 and 6 of the Resolution of 12th February 1886,—

- (1) each scholar shall be provided with a free passage to and from England instead of with a sum of £100 as passage money for each journey; and
- (2) if any scholar, not being disabled by sickness, fails to complete a residence of three years in England, or is guilty of gross misconduct or disregard of the orders of Her Majesty's Secretary of State, he will at the discretion of the Secretary of State forfeit his scholarship, and will also be liable to refund the amount representing the cost of his free passage to England.

ORDER.—Ordered, that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Governments of Madras, Bombay, and the Punjab for information and communication to the authorities of the Universities concerned.

Ordered also, that a copy be forwarded to the Governments of Bengal and the North-Western Provinces and Oudh, the Chief Commissioners of the Central Provinces, Burma, Assam and Coorg, and the Resident at Hyderabad for information; and to the Registrar of the Calcutta University for information and guidance.

Ordered further, that a copy be forwarded to the Department of Finance for information, and that the Resolution be published in the Supplement to the *Gazette of India*.

No. 5565.—Their Royal Highnesses the DUKE AND DUCHESS OF CONNAUGHT are expected to arrive in Bombay on the 27th instant, in the Peninsular and Oriental S. N. Co.'s S. S. "Bengal," and will be received on arrival with all the Naval and Military honours due to their high position.

2. A deputation, consisting of the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor and

an Aide-de-Camp, will proceed on board the "Bengal" under arrangements made by the Director of the Indian Marine.

3. Their Royal Highnesses will leave the "Bengal" at 7 A.M., and the Senior Naval Officer is requested to make all the arrangements for the landing of their Royal Highnesses at the Apollo Bandar and for the proper salutes from Her Majesty's Ships in Port. In the absence of the Senior Naval Officer, the Director of the Indian Marine is requested to make the arrangements for the landing.

4. On their Royal Highnesses reaching the shore a Royal Salute of 31 guns will be fired from the Saluting Battery. A Guard of Honour of British Infantry, with Band and Colour, will be drawn up at the Bandar head. A Guard of Honour of Bombay Infantry, with Band and Colour, will be at Government House, Malabar Point. An Officer's Guard, strength 45 Rank and File British Infantry, to remain at Malabar Point during their Royal Highnesses' stay.

5. In the absence of the Government from Bombay, their Royal Highnesses will be received at the Bandar head by the Honourable the Chief Justice of Bombay, the Judges of Her Majesty's High Court, the Additional Members of the Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District, the Chairman of the Municipal Corporation, the Municipal Commissioner, and all Heads of Departments, or such of the above high officers as are now at the Presidency.

All Officers of Her Majesty's Services now in Bombay, and not otherwise on duty, are directed to attend.

The necessary arrangements at the Bandar head will be made by the Public Works Department, who will reserve accommodation for European and Native Ladies and Gentlemen, who will be admitted by ticket.

Full Dress will be worn.

6. An Address of Welcome will be presented to their Royal Highnesses by the Municipal Corporation.

7. Their Royal Highnesses will proceed direct to Government House, Malabar Point, escorted by the Mounted Company of the Bombay Volunteer Rifle Corps. No procession of carriages will be formed. The Commissioner of Police will maintain order and keep the streets clear.

Under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the Brigadier-General Commanding the Bombay District will make arrangements for the Troops in Garrison and the Volunteers to line the roads to be followed by their Royal Highnesses as far as the Church Gate Railway Station.

8. Their Royal Highnesses will leave Bori Bandar Station by Special Train at 12-30 A.M. on Tuesday the 28th of September. Their Royal Highnesses' departure will be private, and all arrangements connected therewith will be made from Government House.

9. The Military Department will issue instructions for the firing of a Royal Salute from

the Saluting Battery and for a Guard of Honour of G. I. P. Railway Volunteers being in attendance at the Station.

10. The Commissioner of Police will arrange for the maintenance of order.

11. The Commissioner, Central Division, and the Military Secretary to His Excellency the Governor and an Aide-de-Camp will attend their Royal Highnesses on the journey from Bombay to Kirkee. The local authorities will be present on the platform at the Stations where the special train stops.

12. Their Royal Highnesses will arrive at Kirkee Station at 5-30 P.M. and will be received by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, the Members of Council, the Additional Members of Council of His Excellency the Governor for making Laws and Regulations, the General Officer Commanding the Poona Division, the Officer Commanding the troops at Kirkee, the President of the Poona City Municipality, the President of the Suburban Poona Municipality, the Cantonment Magistrate of Poona and Kirkee, and all Heads of Departments, or such of the above high Officers as may be present in Poona.

13. On the arrival of their Royal Highnesses a Royal Salute will be fired. A Guard of Honour of British Infantry, with Band and Colour, will be paraded at the Railway Station, and a Guard of Honour of Bombay Infantry, with Band and Colour, will be at Government House, Ganesh Khind.

14. Their Royal Highnesses will proceed from the Railway Station to Government House, Ganesh Khind, escorted by a detachment of His Excellency the Governor's Body Guard. Their Royal Highnesses will be received by His Excellency the Governor on the steps of the great entrance of Government House.

15. Under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief the General Officer Commanding the Poona Division will arrange for the Troops and the Volunteers to line the route from the Railway Station to Government House, Ganesh Khind, and for the Guard of Honour of British Infantry to furnish an Officer's guard of 45 rank and File to remain on duty at Ganesh Khind during the stay of their Royal Highnesses. A troop of Bombay Cavalry to be encamped near Government House, Ganesh Khind, for escort duty.

16. His Excellency in Council feels assured that Her Majesty's subjects, both European and Native, will gladly avail themselves of the opportunity to testify their loyalty to Her Majesty the Queen-Empress and respect for their Royal Highnesses.

17. In honour of the occasion the Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that the 28th instant shall be observed as a public holiday throughout the Presidency.

18. Instructions for the Military arrangements will be issued in the Military Department.

No. 4883.—The following Rules framed by the Commissioner of A'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the A'bkári Act, 1878, for the management of the public distilleries at Vesáwa and Bassein in the Thána District, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein, are published for general information:—

Rules framed by the Commissioner of A'bkári under the provisions of Section 35 of the A'bkári Act, 1878, for the management of the public distilleries at Vesáwa and Bassein in the Thána District, and for the regulation of the storage, removal and transport of spirits made therein.

1. No toddy shall be admitted into the distilleries between the hours of 1 P.M. and 4 P.M., or between the hours of 9 P.M. and 5 A.M.

2. Toddy brought to either of the distilleries aforesaid shall be taken direct to the Inspector in charge thereof for examination and measurement.

3. The Distillery Inspector shall examine and measure without delay all toddy brought to his distillery and shall enter in a register, to be kept by him in the annexed Form A, the quantity of toddy brought in from time to time by or on account of each licensed distiller.

4. Each licensed distiller shall, at his own expense, construct and complete within thirty days after the date of his distillery license, or within

such further period as the Collector may allow, and thereafter keep in good repair to the satisfaction of the Collector, a strong room for the custody of spirit, and shall separately deposit therein all spirit manufactured by him as soon as it is drawn from the still, and shall not open the entrance thereof or remove spirit therefrom without the permission of the Distillery Inspector. He shall also provide Chubb's locks and such other fastenings for the entrance to the strong room as the Collector may prescribe. He shall also provide vessels of such kind and capacity as the Collector may prescribe for the storage of spirit in his said strong room. The Distillery Inspector shall measure and test all spirit taken into such strong room not later than the day after its deposit, and shall enter in the Register in Form A aforesaid the quantities and strengths of the spirit taken into and removed from each strong room daily. No licensed distiller shall be permitted to distil spirit until his strong room has been completed and approved by the Collector. Licensed distillers shall conform to the orders issued to them by the Collector or the Distillery Inspector as to the positions in which their respective stills and strong rooms should be set up and as to the level of the base of the stills.

5. Spirit shall be removed from the distillery only in casks, each of capacity between 16 and 17 gallons, or between 20 and 21 gallons, or in casks of such other capacities as the Collector may prescribe. All casks used for the removal of spirit shall be filled full to the bung-hole before being gauged and tested and passed out of the distillery.

6. Persons entitled to remove spirit shall provide each his own casks of authorised capacity for the removal of spirit. Each cask, before being used, shall be taken by the owner to the Inspector, who shall gauge its capacity by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose and shall brand upon it—

- (1) the name of the distillery,
- (2) the consecutive number of the cask,
- (3) the capacity of the cask in gallons and pints,
- (4) the date of branding.

7. Every cask so branded shall be again gauged once in every six months by the Inspector by means of the standard measures provided for the purpose, and shall then be branded anew if necessary. Whenever any cask is coopered, or repaired in any way, it shall be taken by the distiller to whom it may belong to the Inspector before being used for the removal of spirit, and shall be re-gauged by the Inspector in the manner aforesaid and shall be branded anew, if necessary. Whenever the capacity of a cask as ascertained by measurement with the standard measures may be found to differ from the capacity branded thereon, the old brand shall be erased and the correct capacity of the cask shall be branded upon it.

8. The Inspector shall keep a register of all casks measured and branded by him.

9. Toddy spirit may be issued from either of the distilleries to—

- (a) the person holding for the time being a license granting him the exclusive privilege of retailing country spirit of strength not exceeding 25° U. P. in the táluka in which the distillery is situated;
- (b) any person producing a permit signed by the Collector of Bombay for the transport of toddy spirit to Bombay for sale therein.

10. Whenever the person mentioned under clause (a) of the preceding rule wishes to remove spirit from the public distillery of the táluka of which he holds the liquor farm, he shall apply for and obtain a permit in the annexed Form B from the Huzár Deputy Collector, Thána, if the applicant holds the farm of the Sálsette Táluka, or from the Mámlatdár of Bassein if the applicant holds the farm of the Bassein Táluka. The permit shall be in triplicate. After the production of the permit before the Inspector in charge of the distillery, that officer shall proceed to measure and test the liquor which the permit-holder wishes to buy and remove from the distillery, and shall satisfy himself that the quantity and strength of the spirit offered for removal does not exceed the quantity and strength entered in the permit. He shall then note on the reverse of the permit all the particulars required to be by him there entered, and shall complete and sign the permit and allow the spirit to pass out of the distillery after each cask has been properly secured and sealed by himself. The Distillery Inspector shall then make the necessary entries in his register in Register Form C. hereto annexed, and shall deliver the second and third portions to the person transporting the spirit to be carried along with the same to the depôt to which the spirit is conveyed. He shall record the first portion in his office.

On arrival of the spirit at the depôt, the Sub-Inspector in charge shall examine the casks, and if he finds that the seals are unbroken and that the casks show no sign of having been tampered with, he shall allow the spirit to be admitted into the depôt and shall then measure and test the same, and satisfy himself that the quantity and strength are as shown in the permit. He shall then endorse each portion of the permit and forward the second portion so endorsed to the Huzár Deputy or Mámlatdár, as the case may be, who shall then adjust the duty account with the farmer. The third portion of the permit shall be recorded in the depôt.

11. Any person licensed to sell toddy-spirit in Bombay shall apply to the Collector of Bombay for a permit for the removal and transport of such spirit from either of the distilleries. The permit applied for shall be granted by the Collector on payment by the applicant of the amount of the duty payable on the spirit, at the following rates :—

The permit shall be in triplicate in the accompanying Form D. One copy of the permit shall be given by the Collector to the applicant and the second and third copies shall be forwarded by him to the Inspector in charge of the distillery. After the production of the original permit by the applicant before the Distillery Inspector, that officer shall compare the same with the second and third copies received by him direct from the Collector, and proceed to measure and test the liquor which the permit-holder wishes to buy and remove from the distillery, and shall satisfy himself that the quantity and strength of the spirit offered for removal does not exceed the quantity and strength entered in the permit. He shall also calculate the still-head duty payable on the spirit presented for removal and shall satisfy himself that the correct amount has been levied in the Collector's office. He shall then note on the reverse of the permit all the particulars required to be by him there entered, and shall complete and sign the permit and allow the spirit to pass out of the distillery after each cask has been properly secured and sealed by himself. The Distillery Inspector shall then make the necessary entries in his Register in Register Form E. and shall deliver the completed original permit to the person transporting the spirit to be carried along with the same to Bombay. The Distillery Inspector shall forward the second copy of the completed permit to the Collector of Bombay, and record the triplicate in his own office.

The Collector of Bombay shall furnish monthly to the Huzár Deputy Collector, Thána, a statement showing the number of permits issued for each distillery, the quantities of spirit of each strength arrived in Bombay under each permit, and the amount of duty recovered by him on the same.

12. In calculating the duty payable on toddy spirit removed from the distilleries, fractions of a pint shall be taken as one whole pint.

13. Spirit removed under any permit shall be of uniform strength, viz., either spirit not exceeding 60° U. P. in strength or spirit of strength above 60° U. P. and not exceeding 25° U. P.

14. No one shall be allowed to remain in the distilleries between the hours of 10 P. M. and 5 A. M. except with the written permission of the Collector.

15. No distillation shall be carried on in any distillery between the hours of 10 P. M., and 5 A. M., except with the written permission of the Collector. No spirit shall be issued from the distillery to the local farmer except on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and no spirit shall be issued from the distillery for transport to Bombay on those days of the week.

16. No spirit shall be removed from any distillery except between the hours of 9 A. M. and 5 P. M.

The rules will come into force from the 1st August 1886.
