NOTIFICATIONS.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 10th March 1882.

No. 880.—The following telegrams on the subject of the imposition of quarantine at Aden on vessels from Bombay and the Turkish Red Sea Ports are published for general information:—

Telegram from the Government of Bombay, to the Government of India, dated 6th March 1882:—

“Resident, Aden, repeats following telegram from Consul, Alexandria. Telegram begins: To prevent Aden being compromised in Egypt seven full days’ quarantine on arrivals from Bombay and Red Sea ports with disinfection of ships, crew, passengers, effects and susceptible goods required and annotation on bills of health. Consul’s telegram ends. This Government presuming no other alternative left recommend to Government of

India imposition of quarantine at Aden as suggested by Consul, Alexandria, on vessels from Bombay communicating with shore. If quarantine imposed this Government propose informing Resident not to apply it to homeward mail steamers which should not be delayed and should not communicate with shore.”

Telegram from the Government of India, dated 5th March 1882:—

“Your telegram 6th. Imposition quarantine at Aden on vessels from Bombay and Red Sea ports sanctioned. Please prepare rules and submit for publication without delay.”

Telegram to the Political Resident, Aden, dated 10th March 1882:—

“Your telegram 3rd. Government of India have sanctioned imposition of quarantine at Aden on vessels from Bombay and Red Sea Ports as suggested by Consul, Alexandria. Mail steamers should not communicate with shore and should not be delayed.”

No. 913.—In exercise of the power conferred by Section 19 of the Indian Treasure Trove Act, 1878, the Governor in Council is pleased to make the following Rule:—

“In cases in which treasure is found hidden in soil the ownership of which vests in Government, the Collector making the inquiry under the Indian Treasure Trove Act, 1878, shall serve the special notice in writing required by clause (b) of Section 5 of the Act on the Government Pleader of any Civil Court within the limits of the jurisdiction of which the treasure has been found, or on any officer who may be appointed by Government as Agent in this behalf, and such Government Pleader or officer shall, except in cases in which the treasure is less than one hundred rupees in value, appear on behalf of Government before the Collector making the said enquiry on the day mentioned in the said notice.

“The Government Pleader shall be entitled to the usual fees calculated on the value of the share of the treasure to which Government lays claim, subject to any increase that may be sanctioned by Government in particular cases.”

No. 938.—In rule 11 of the rules under the Indian Factories Act No. XV. of 1881, published in Government Notification No. 2972, dated 10th September 1881, at pages 503—504 of Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette* of the 15th idem, after the word “Magistrate” insert the words “or in the case of the Kirkee Gunpowder Factory to the Officer Commanding the Kirkee Station.”

No. 957.—The Governor in Council is pleased to sanction the establishment of a ferry over the River Krishna at the village of Karve in the Karad Taluka of the Salfira Collectorate, on the Karad-Tasgaon Road, and to declare the same to be a public ferry under the provisions of Section 2 of Bombay Act II. of 1868.

No. 1757.—The following Notification by the Government of India is republished in supersession of Government Notifications No. 1251, dated 2nd March 1881, and No. 3300, dated 8th June 1881, published at pages 114 to 116, and 299 and 300 of Part I. of the *Bombay Government Gazette* dated the 3rd March and 9th June 1881, respectively:—

“DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE AND COMMERCE.

Fort William, the 3rd March 1882.

No. 1288.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Sections nine, fifteen, seventeen, thirty-two, fifty-one, and fifty-six of the Indian Stamp Act, 1879, the Governor General in Council is pleased to make the following Rules:—

CHAPTER I.—*Preliminary.*

1. These Rules shall come into force throughout British India on the 1st April 1882 in supersession of the Rules promulgated by Notifications No. 875, dated 26th February, and No. 966, dated 4th June 1881.

2. All words and expressions used in these Rules and defined in the Indian Stamp Act, 1879, shall be deemed to have the meaning attached to them respectively by the said Act.

3. There shall be two kinds of stamps for indicating the payment of duty on instruments under the Indian Stamp Act, 1879, namely—

(a) Impressed Stamps—including—

Impressed Sheets,—that is to say, sheets of paper bearing the impression of Stamps of different values engraved thereon, and sold to the public for use by them in accordance with these Rules.

Impressed Labels,—to be affixed and impressed by Government Officers as directed in Chapter III of these Rules.

(b) Adhesive Stamps sold to the public for use by them in accordance with these Rules.

CHAPTER II.—*Of Impressed Sheets.*

4. All instruments chargeable with duty, except Hundis, may be written on Impressed Sheets, and, except as provided by Section ten of the said Act and by these Rules, shall be so written.

5. (a). When any instrument is to be written on an Impressed Sheet, if the amount of duty with which such instrument is chargeable does not exceed one hundred rupees, a single sheet shall be used, unless—

where the application for the required stamp is made at a treasury, the officer in charge of such treasury, or, where such application is made to a stamp vendor, the vendor certifies that he is unable to furnish a single stamp of the required value,

CHAPTER III.—Of Impressed Labels.

(b). When the amount of duty chargeable in respect of any instrument exceeds one hundred rupees, or a treasury officer or stamp-vendor has certified under clause (a) that he is unable to furnish a single stamp of the required value, the number of sheets used for indicating the payment of duty shall not exceed the number which the treasury officer or the stamp-vendor certifies in either case to be the smallest number which he can furnish so as to make up the required amount.

(c). No certificate shall be made under clause (a) or clause (b) by a stamp-vendor in any case in which the stamp duty required exceeds the highest value of the stamps which such vendor is authorised to sell.

(d). When, under this Rule, two or more Impressed Sheets are used to make up the amount of duty chargeable in respect of any instrument, a portion of such instrument shall be written on each sheet so used.

(e). When a single sheet used under this Rule is found insufficient to admit of the entire instrument being written on the side of the paper which bears the stamp, so much plain paper may be subjoined thereto as may be necessary for the complete writing of such instrument: provided that in every such case the side of the sheet which bears the stamp must be covered by a substantial part of the instrument before any part of the latter can be written on the plain paper joined to such sheet. Provided further, that the part of the instrument written on the plain paper must be attested by the signatures or marks of all the persons executing the document and the witnesses to the same.

6 (a). Hundis other than hundis which can be stamped with an adhesive stamp under Section ten of the said Act shall be written as follows:—

(1) Hundis payable otherwise than on demand, but not more than one year after date or sight, and for amounts not exceeding Rs. 30,000 in individual value, on impressed sheets bearing the word hundi;

(2) Hundis exceeding Rs. 30,000 in individual value, and Hundis payable at more than one year after date or sight, on paper supplied for sale by the Government, and to which labels have been affixed by one of the officers mentioned in Rule nine, clause (b), or by the Superintendent of Stamps, Calcutta, and impressed by him in manner provided by Rule ten.

(b). Every sheet of such stamped paper shall be of a size not less than $8\frac{1}{2} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches, and no plain paper shall be joined to it.

(c). The provisions in Rule five as to use of two or more sheets of stamped paper when a single stamp of the required value is not procurable apply also to Hundi stamps used under this Rule.

7. The duty payable on any instrument chargeable with a duty of one anna may be denoted by a coloured impression marked on a skeleton form of such instrument by the Superintendents of Stamps at Calcutta, Bombay, Madras, or Rangoon.

and for the following—when written in any European language, provided that any instrument written in any European language other than English shall have attached to it a translation in the English language—

- (17) Agreements or memoranda of Agreements, which in the opinion of the officer empowered to affix the label cannot conveniently be written on Impressed Sheets:
- (18) Instruments engrossed on parchment and written in the English style, which in the opinion of such officer cannot conveniently be written on Impressed Sheets:
- (19) Awards:
- (20) Bills of Exchange payable otherwise than on demand and drawn in British India:
- (21) Bonds:
- (22) Certificates of sale:
- (23) Composition-deeds:
- (24) Conveyances:
- (25) Instruments imposing a further charge on mortgaged property:
- (26) Instruments of apprenticeship:
- (27) Instruments of co-partnership:
- (28) Instruments of dissolution of partnership:
- (29) Instruments of exchange:
- (30) Instruments of gift:
- (31) Instruments of partition:
- (32) Leases:
- (33) Letters of license:

- (39) Transfers of the description mentioned in Article No. 60 clauses (b), (c), and (d) of the First Schedule of the said Act.

9. The following officers are empowered to affix these labels to the instruments mentioned in Rule eight, namely,—

- (a) the Collectors of Calcutta and Karáchi;
- (b) the Superintendents of Stamps at Madras, Bombay, Lahore, Rangoon, Maulmain, and Akyab;
- (c) the Commissioner of Stamps, North-Western Provinces and Oudh;
- (d) the Superintendent of Stamps (Political Resident), Aden.

10 (a). Every such officer shall, upon any instrument mentioned in Rule eight being brought to him before it is executed, and application being made to him for that purpose, affix thereto a label or labels of such value as the applicant may desire and pay for, and impress such label or labels by means of a stamping-machine, and also stamp or write on the face of the label or labels the date of impressing the label or labels before returning the instrument to the applicant. In the case of instruments written on parchment, the labels must be further secured by metallic eyelets.

(b). When the stamp duty amounts to five rupees or upwards, such officer shall further write on the face of the label or labels his initials, and, when the stamp duty amounts to rupees twenty or upwards, shall also attach his usual signature to the instrument immediately under the labels.

11 (a). The payment of duty on instruments (other than Bills of Exchange, Cheques, and Promissory Notes) executed out of British India and requiring to be stamped after their receipt in British India, shall be indicated only by impressed labels.

(b) When any such instrument is taken to the Collector under Section seventeen of the said Act, the Collector, unless he be Collector of Calcutta or Karáchi, shall send the instrument to one of the officers mentioned in Rule nine, remitting the amount of duty paid in respect of such instrument; and such officer shall stamp the instrument in the manner prescribed by Rules 10 (a) and 10 (b) and return the same to the Collector for delivery to the person by whom it was produced.

CHAPTER IV.—Adhesive Stamps.

12. Bills of Exchange, payable otherwise than on demand and drawn in sets, when the amount of stamp duty does not exceed one anna for each part of the set, may be stamped with adhesive stamps.

13. Except as otherwise provided in these Rules, the adhesive stamp used to denote the duty of one anna shall bear the words 'one anna.'

14. The following instruments when stamped with adhesive stamps shall be stamped as follows:—

(a) Bills of Exchange, Cheques, and Promissory Notes drawn or made out of British India, with adhesive stamps bearing the words 'Foreign Bill.'

(b) Transfers of shares of Public Companies and Associations, with adhesive stamps bearing the words 'Share Transfer.'

(c) An entry as an Advocate, Vakíl, or Attorney on the roll of any High Court, with an adhesive stamp bearing the word 'Advocate,' 'Vakíl,' or 'Attorney.'

(Such stamp shall be affixed under the superintendence and responsibility of a gazetted officer of the High Court, who shall obtain the stamp from the Superintendent of Stamps and account to him for it. The gazetted officer who affixes the stamp shall write on the face of it his usual signature and the date of signature before parting with the instrument.)

(d) Notarial Acts, with adhesive Foreign Bill stamps bearing the word 'Notarial' printed over them.

CHAPTER V.—Miscellaneous.

15. When it is necessary under Section fifteen of the said Act to denote upon one instrument the payment of duty in respect of another, such payment shall be denoted by an endorsement under the hand of the Collector on the former instrument.

16. Every payment made under Section thirty of the said Act shall be made in cash.

17. The Collector may require every person claiming a refund or renewal under Chapter VI of the said Act, or his duly authorised agent, to make an oral deposition on oath or affirmation, or to put in an affidavit, setting forth the circumstances under which the claim has arisen. The Collector may also, if he thinks fit, call for the evidence of witnesses in support of the statement set forth in the deposition or affidavit of the claimant or his Agent.

18. Any Magistrate convicting or trying an offender under Chapter VIII of the Stamp Act may grant to any person, who may have contributed to the conviction, a reward within a limit to be fixed by the local Government.

No. 1449.—In exercise of the powers conferred by Section 7 of the Indian Salt Act, 1882, the Governor General in Council directs that on and after the date of this Notification the duty to be paid on salt manufactured in or imported by land into any part of British India, except Burma and that portion of the territories administered by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab which lies west of the river Indus, shall be rupees two for each maund of 82½ lbs. avoirdupois weight.

2. The Governor General in Council further directs that not less than two copies of a notice, in the vernacular language of the district, stating that the salt duty has been reduced from Rs. 2-14 (or Rs. 2-8 as the case may be) to Rs. 2 per maund, shall be issued by each Local Government to every town and village within its jurisdiction to which the reduction applies, and shall also be made public in such other manner as the Local Government may deem fit.

No. 1600.—Under the provisions of Section 292 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, the following revised Rules, framed by Her Majesty's High Court of Judicature at Bombay and concurred in by His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published for general guidance:—

“The following Rules to regulate the holding of Criminal Sessions are published in supersession of paragraph 15, page 8 of the High Court Circulars and of all previous Rules and orders on the same subject:—

I. Criminal Sessions shall be held commencing on the first Monday of each month at the Sadar Stations of all Sessions Judges and Joint Sessions Judges. When, however, the first Monday in the month is a close holiday, the Sessions shall begin on the next Court day.

II. At the undermentioned detached stations, when there is no Joint Sessions Judge, Sessions shall be held as follows:—

(1) At Alfbág, Sessions shall be held commencing on the third Monday in February, April and November. The Sessions Judge may, at his discretion, transfer to Thána any case the immediate trial of which is specially desirable, and which cannot properly be postponed till the next Alfbág Sessions.

(2) At Broach, Sessions shall be held every month by the Sessions Judge or Assistant Sessions Judge, beginning on the second Wednesday after the commencement of the Surat Sessions. The Sessions Judge may, for sufficient cause, transfer any case to Surat.

(3) At Sholápur the Sessions Judge shall hold Sessions on the third Monday of February, April, June, August, October and December. If it be desirable to hold Sessions at any other time than those specified, the Sessions Judge may make an application to the High Court. The Sessions Judge may, at his discretion, transfer to Poona cases which can be tried there without serious inconvenience to the witnesses, and which it is not desirable to postpone until the next Sholápur Sessions.

III. During the monsoon, namely, between 15th June and the 1st November—

(1) When a Magistrate, who is at or near the Huzúr, commits a case for trial, he shall forthwith send the record and proceedings, with note of the additional witnesses, if any, required by the accused, to the Sessions Judge or Joint Sessions Judge, who will be responsible for fixing the earliest day on which the case can be tried with due, but comparative, regard to the convenience of the witnesses in the case and also of persons concerned in other cases, criminal or civil,

pending before the Court. The date when fixed should be communicated to the Magistrate, in order that the witnesses may be bound over to appear.

(2) When the committing Magistrate is not near the Huzúr, he should commit the case for trial at the next Sessions, giving the Sessions Judge or Joint Sessions Judge immediate notice.

IV. During the fair season, namely, between the 1st November and the 15th June, the Sessions Judge or Joint Sessions Judge may, at his discretion, hold a Special Sessions (reporting the same to the High Court) for the trial of any case of which he may consider, after consultation with the committing Magistrate, that an early trial is desirable and may be held without prejudice to the accused.

V. Whenever, in cases not provided for in Rule III—

(1) The committing Magistrate is in telegraphic communication with the Sessions Judge or Joint Sessions Judge, or is otherwise able to obtain a reply from him within 24 hours from the time when a case is ready for commitment, he shall obtain from the Sessions Judge or Joint Sessions Judge an order fixing the trial for a particular day of the Sessions, and shall make the committal accordingly; and when the committing Magistrate is too distant for such a speedy communication with the Sessions Judge or Joint Sessions Judge, he shall commit for the first day of the Sessions, unless the Sessions Judge or Joint Sessions Judge shall, by general order, intimate his readiness to receive cases up to a later date. It is further directed that, whenever a Magistrate commits more than one case for the same Sessions, he shall, in the absence of any special days having been fixed for their trial, commit them at intervals of two days apart, *e. g.*, the first case for the first day, the second for the third day, the third for the fifth day, and so on.”

RESOLUTION OF GOVERNMENT.

Bombay Castle, 13th March 1882.

The mental disorder of His Highness the Rájáh Seváji of Kolhápur has been certified by a Committee of Medical Officers to afford no hope of his restoration to sanity. It has, therefore, become incumbent on Government to appoint a form of administration for the Kolhápur State, to be continued for such time as the Rájáh *de jure* shall be incapable of ruling in person.

2. Government do not desire to maintain during this interregnum the direct control of Kolhápur affairs which has subsisted, with only a brief interval, since the disturbances of 1844. The temporary administration now to be constituted will conduct public business in accordance with the traditions of the Kolhápur State, and its relations with the British Government will be regulated by the Treaties in force.

3. The administration of Kolhápur will be carried on in the name of His Highness the Rájáh and his style and title will be prefixed to public documents.

4. The affairs of the Kolhápur State will be administered by a Regent, assisted by a Council of three. The members of the Council will be the Diván, the Chief Judge and the Chief Revenue Officer. The Regent in Council will form the Executive Government and will deliberate and pass resolutions by vote on questions of public business submitted for orders by Heads of Departments. All engagements binding on the Rájáhs of Kolhápur under the Treaty of 1862 will be binding on the Regent in Council. The appointment and removal of the Regent and the members of his Council will remain vested in Government.

4. A Journal of proceedings in Council will be kept in charge of the Diván. The names of the members present at each meeting of Council shall be noted in the Journal, and it shall be stated what members voted for and dissented from each Resolution. The Journal shall be signed after each meeting of Council by the Regent and the Diván.

5. The Regent will have a casting vote in the Council when the votes are equally divided. If the Regent decides a question under discussion by his casting vote, a member of the Council dissenting from the decision may require that the question shall be referred to the Political Agent under Article 1 of the Treaty of 1862. The Regent will possess the same right of reference, if he is over-ruled by a majority of votes in Council.

6. Effect will be given to the Resolutions of the Regent in Council by the Regent and Diván through means of orders issued to the Heads of Departments under the hand of the Diván.

7. The State business will be distributed under the heads of General, Judicial and Revenue, and the Diván, Chief Judge and Chief Revenue Officer will respectively conduct the business of these three Departments under the control of the Regent in Council to whom they will be directly responsible.

8. Public finance will be in the Department of the Diván, who will place annually before the Regent in Council a financial statement and budget estimates. The accounts and budget, after consideration in Council, will be submitted for the

approval of Government. Loans shall not be raised on the credit of the Kolhápúr State without the previous consent of Government. The Regent in Council will adopt in the first instance the budget estimates approved under the present administration, which shall not be departed from without the sanction of Government.

9. The Judicial system of the Kolhápúr State, as now existing, will be maintained by the Regent in Council, who will however be at liberty to propose, for approval by Government, modifications in the regulations as to the jurisdictional powers of the Judicial Officers, and as to the right of appeal. The Regent in Council will be the highest Court of appeal and revision. This Court will consist of the Regent and the Diván with at least one other member of the Council when practicable. Sentences of death and of imprisonment for life are, according to the Treaty of 1862, to be submitted for confirmation by Government, who will also receive appeals from such sentences, and will exercise a general power of reviewing the Judicial administration, but will not otherwise entertain regular appeals from the Kolhápúr Courts. The law in the Kolhápúr State will be the law as now administered, with such modifications as may be made by the Regent in Council with the approval of Government.

10. The principles of Revenue administration, now in force in the Kolhápúr State, will be maintained by the Regent in Council. The Survey operations in progress will be carried on to completion. New taxation will not be imposed without the sanction of Government. Alienated revenue will be dealt with strictly according to the rules respecting alienations now established in Kolhápúr.

11. Appeals from the Executive Departments will be made to the Regent in Council, and orders will be passed on them by the Regent sitting with at least one member of the Council other than the Head of the Department against whose order the appeal is preferred.

12. The supervision of the Political Agent over the affairs of the higher Jáhírdárs will be maintained according to the terms of Article 8 of the Treaty of 1862.

13. The existing assignment for the expenses of the Darbár will continue subject to future modifications to be approved by Government. The expenditure will be controlled as laid down in Article 2 of the Treaty of 1862, by a Khásgi Kárbhári, who will conduct his duties under the immediate orders of the Political Agent.

14. The Administration of the Kolhápúr State as above constituted will continue in power during the pleasure of Government and subject to such modifications as may from time to time be deemed necessary by the Governor in Council.

15. The Right Honourable the Governor in Council is pleased to nominate Jysing Ráo Ghatgé, Chief of Kágál, to be Regent of Kolhápúr.

Ráo Bahádur Mahádev Wásudev Barv, C.I.E., will continue to hold the office of Diván and will be a member of the Council.

Khán Sáheb Meherjibháí Kuvarji Tárápurwála will be Chief Judge and member of the Council.

Ráo Bahádur Yeshwant Moreshwar Kelkar will be Chief Revenue Officer and member of the Council.

The other officials of the present administration will retain their offices pending further orders."

BY THE SANITARY COMMISSIONER.

The following Rules made by the Sanitary Commissioner, and sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor in Council, under the provision of Section 31 of Act I. of 1877 (The Bombay Vaccination Act) are published for general information in supersession of those already existing:—

- 1.—Every person before he can be appointed a public vaccinator, or authorized to act for a public vaccinator, will be required to pass an examination before the Superintendent of Vaccination regarding his practical and theoretical knowledge of vaccination, after which Certificates of Qualification in the Forms marked **F** and **G** to these rules annexed shall be respectively granted to him by the Superintendent of Vaccination and the Sanitary Commissioner.
- 2.—Whenever a public vaccinator obtains leave of absence from the Sanitary Commissioner either on account of sickness, or when proceeding on privilege or other leave granted to him by the Sanitary Commissioner according to the Rules which apply to the Uncovenanted Servants of Government, the Sanitary Commissioner shall authorize a proper person to act during the absence of such public vaccinator as his deputy.
- 3.—The following table showing the different Vaccination Districts into which the City of Bombay has been divided as well as the position of the Public Vaccine Stations fixed under the provisions of Section 3, and the days and hours of the public vaccinator's attendance at each Station, is published for general information:—

- 4.—Each public vaccinator shall attend at the public vaccine station under his charge on the day when it is open for vaccination, half an hour before the time appointed for commencing work; and shall assist the Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, or Head Vaccinator, as the case may be, in the performance of vaccination. He shall also be responsible that the records of the station under his charge are properly kept and up to date.
- 5.—All other vaccinators of the establishment shall assist at the morning working stations by bringing children for vaccination and inspection, or in such other way as may be necessary.

- 6.—Public vaccinators should endeavour to find out those children returned in the monthly returns of the Registrars of Births, whose duplicate certificates have not been received and who are therefore supposed to be unprotected, enquiring as to whether they really are unprotected; and in the event of their being so shall bring the same to the notice of the Superintendent of Vaccination, who shall take such action as may be necessary.
- 7.—Public vaccinators shall also search out unprotected persons within their districts, and should any person under the age of 14 years be found to be unprotected, the same shall be brought to the notice of the Superintendent of Vaccination, who shall give the usual notice of vaccination to the parents or guardians of such persons as required by Section 21 of the Act.
- 8.—Vaccination at public vaccine stations shall be performed gratuitously, but a public vaccinator may, as provided in Section 13 of the Act, "accept a fee for vaccinating a child by request of the parent or guardian elsewhere than at a public vaccine station." An additional fee of Rs. 2 for the use of the heifer shall be charged for such vaccination at a private house; but if more than one member of the family is vaccinated, this Municipal charge shall be increased at the rate of annas eight per each individual operated upon. A maximum charge of Rs. 5 for the use of the heifer shall be made for vaccinating all the members of any one family including servants. In the event of Firms or Companies being desirous to have their establishments vaccinated at their own premises, a fee of Rs. 15 shall be charged for the use of the heifer, and a further charge of annas two per head shall be made for each individual vaccinated. The sums so received are to be paid to the Municipal Commissioner to the credit of the Municipal Fund.
- 9.—Medical Practitioners will be supplied with animal lymph on points or glasses or in capillary tubes on payment of a fee of annas four for lymph sufficient to vaccinate one person.
- 10.—No member of the Presidency Vaccine Establishment other than a public vaccinator shall practice vaccination privately. Public vaccinators may, under Section 13 of the Act, accept a fee for vaccination, elsewhere than at a public vaccine station. The public vaccinator may attend private houses to vaccinate persons, and may charge a reasonable fee for his services as permitted by the Act.
- 11.—Application for the services of a public vaccinator elsewhere than at a public vaccine station should be made to the Superintendent of Vaccination; and if made to the public vaccinator of the district, or to any other public vaccinator, the applicant should be referred to the Superintendent.
- 12.—The Superintendent of Vaccination on receiving the application shall arrange to have the child vaccinated, as desired, by one of the public vaccinators, and in such manner as may best meet the convenience of the applicant and of the Vaccine Department.
- 13.—Medical Practitioners will, on application made to the Sanitary Commissioner, be furnished with forms of certificates required by the Act.
- 14.—Notification of any change made by the Sanitary Commissioner regarding districts, vaccine stations, or the days and hours of attendance of the public vaccinator at each station, shall be published in the *Bombay Government Gazette*.
