The work that has been accomplished so far has indeed been of the highest value. The growth during the last fifty years of a feeling of common nationality based upon common traditions and ties, common hopes and aspirations, and even common disabilities has been most striking. The fact that we are Indians first, and Hindus, Mahommedans, Parsees or Christians afterwards, is being realised in a steadily increasing measure, and the idea of a united and renovated India marching onwards to a place among the nations of the world, worthy of her great past, is no longer a mere idle dream of a few imaginative minds, but is the definitely accepted creed of those who form the brain of the community—the educated classes of the country. A creditable beginning has already been made in matters of education and of local self-government; and all classes of the people are slowly but steadily coming under the influence of liberal ideas. The claims of public life are every day receiving wider recognition, and attachment to the land of our birth is growing into a strong and deeply cherished passion of the heart. The annual meetings of Congresses and Conferences, the work of public bodies and associations, the writings in the columns of the Indian Press - all bear witness to the new life that is coursing in the veins of the people. The results achieved so far are undoubtedly most gratifying, but they only mean that the jungle has been cleared and the foundations laid. The great work of rearing the superstructure has yet to be taken in hand, and the situation demands on the part of workers devotion and sacrifices proportionate to the magnitude of the task.

Late Sri S. G. Gokhale

The General-Body of the Servants of India Society places on record its profound grief in the passing away of Shri. S. G. Gokhale at Pune on the 17th September 1983. Shri Gokhale joined the society on the 29th July 1928 and during his fifty-five years of membership of the society, he brought distinction in whatever work he undertook. After a brief spell at Jalgaon as manager of Criminal Tribes Settlement, he was transferred to Pune to take charge of "Dnyanprakash" the well-known Marathi daily of the Society. He was its chief-editor from 1946 till its closure in 1950. He was a Secretary of the Deccan Sabha for a number of years. He was a member of the Study-team appointed by the All India Newspaper Editors' Conference to study conditions of working journalists. He was the Secretary of Marathi Patrakar Parishad and was honoured in 1983, with an award for his services to Marathi Journalism. He was the Secretary of the Society from 1956 to 1973. In his death the Society has lost a sincere and dedicated member.

Late Shri K. G. Sharangpani

The General-Body of the Servants of India Society places on record its deep sense of loss in the passing away of Shri K. G. Sharangpani on the 3rd February 1984. He joined the Society in 1929. He was in charge of the Criminal Tribes Settlement at Jalgaon and was appointed a member of the Criminal Tribes Settlement Committee by the State Government. He was a Keeper of the B.V. Press Bombay for a couple of years and of the A. B. Press Pune, for more than twenty years. He went to Malaya in 1946-47 to look after the welfare of Indian Prisoners. In later years of his life he associated himself with Student's Welfare and was in charge of the Society's Library, Pune. In his death the Society has sustained an irreparable loss.

Objects and Working

The Servants of India Society was founded by Gopal Krishna Gokhale on June 12, 1905.

The object of the Servants of India Society being to train national missionaries for the service of India, every member is pledged to devote all his time to public work, and is also under a moral obligation to be a member of the Society for life. Secular and noncommunal in character, the society, as a body of political workers, recongnizes the necessity of earnest and patient efforts towards building up in the Country a higher type of character and capacity than is generally available at present and also the need for promoting among those amidst whom they work, a secular non-parochial and noncommunal out look.

Every member is required to take the following seven vows at the time of admission :

(1) The country shall always be the first in my thoughts and i will glve to her service the best that is ln me.

(2) In serving the country i will seek no personal advantage for myself..

(3) I will regard all Indians as brothers and work for the advancement of all, without distinction of caste or creed.

(4) I will be content with such provision for myself and my family, as the Society may be able to make. I will devote no part of my energies to earning money for myself.

(5) I will lead a pure personal life.

(6) I will engage in no personal quarrel with any one.

(7) I will always keep in view the aims of the society and watch over its interests with the utmost zeal, doing all I can to advance its work. I will never do anything which is inconsistent with the objects of the Society.

In order to train the members, the Society maintains a library at Pune where they can study public questions. The library is well provided with books on history, politics, economics and possesses a unique collection of reports, Parliamentary blue-books and other publications relating to India.

Attached to the society is a Home where the members can live in close union and fellowship and enjoy the benefit of a corporate life. The Home is large enough to provide accommodation for thirty persons.

In addition to members, the Society includes within its fold three other classes of workers - permanent assistants, attaches and associates - to enable persons who do not either possess the qualifications required of a member or the leisure to devote themselves entirely to the service of their countrymen, but who are in sympathy with its aims and object, to have opportunities of advancing the cause which it has at heart.

For a knowledge of the conditions which govern their admission reference must be made to the pamphlet containing the rules of the society.

Members of this Society are also permitted to work in other organisations already existing or brought into existence by them having similar aims and objects. It would certainly not be fair for the Society to claim as its own the work done by those organisations. But so much time and energy of its members are given to the work – often the day-to-day routine work-of those institutions, that some reference has necessarily to be made to it in a report of the Society's work. While doing so, the Society would like to express its thankfulness to these Institutions for giving it an opportunity to serve them and to serve the country through them. It, however, lays no claim to their work beyond what is justified by the service of its members.

REPORT FOR 1983-84

During the year under review, it may be reported with deep sorrow that two of its Senior Members, passed away. Shri S. G. Gokhale died on the 17th September 1983 after a devoted service of fifty five years, and Sri K. G. Sharangpani died on the 3rd February after a service of fifty four years.

The present membership of the Society is only thirteen. There is urgent need, therefore, for recruitings young men of character and capacity inspired by a desire to work for the country in a spirit of service and sacrifice.

Organisation

The members meet every year in June at its Headquarters at Pune for the annual session. The Society has branches in Madras, Bombay, Pune, Nagpur, Allahabad, and Cuttack

S. R. Venkataraman continued to be the President and R. S. Misra, the Vice-President of the Society. S. R. Venkataraman, R. S. Misra, S. S. Misra, R. G. Kakade and S. S. Ajgoankar continued to be Senior Members of the Society's Branches in Madras, Allahabad, Cuttack, Nagpur and Bombay. K. G. Sharangpani was the Senior Member of the Pune Branch till his death on the 3rd February 1984. Damodar Sahoo, P. K. Dwivedi and A. N. Mishra were elected to the council by the Members of the Society. S. S. Ajgaonkar was the Secretary of the Society.

Gokhale Day

Kakade was a member of the Gokhale Elocution Competition Committee of the Wadia College and attended the Meeting.

S. S. Misra spoke on the occasion of the 118th Jayanti of "Gopal Krishna Gokhale," the founder of the Society, at Cuttack which was presided over by B. N. Pande, the Governor of Orissa.

Sastri Day

Sastri day was celebrated in Madras on the 22nd September 83, under the Chalmanship of K. S. Venkataraman (I.C.S., Retd., Judge of the Madras High Court). The President S. R. Venkataraman welcomed the gathering. K. Chandrasekharan, a well-known scholar and retired Tagore Professor of Humanities of the Madras University, who had known Sastri from his

childhood released Sastriana No. 26, with an illuminating speech full of anecdotes and reminiscences about Sastri. A. V. Nagaraja Sharma and D. Thirugnanasambandam, both old students of the Annamalai University when Sastri was its Vice-Chancellor spoke of Sastri's many sided personality.

The Defence Minister R. Venkataraman sent a message "Wishing the function all success" and stating that "such functions were necessary to high-light the great role played by Sastri in the building of our nation," "We have the habit of forgetting the stalwarts who have built the nation," he had stated.

Sastriana No. 26 was favourably reviewed by 'The Hindu' on the 4th October and several inquiries were received bringing some orders for Sastriana as well.

Public Affairs

As the ex-officio Chairman of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Pune, S. R. Venkataraman, the President of the Servants of India Society, presided on the 13th June over the annual meeting of the Governing Body of the Institute to decide on matters relating to the administration and academic work of the Institute.

The President, wrote a booklet in Tamil, on the "Tribes of Tamilnadu," which was published by the Tamil Writers Co-operative Society in September 1983. DINAMANI, a Tamil daily, in reviewing the book characterized it as an informative and sympathetic account which belonged to a new genre in Tamil Literature.

The President wrote an article in English on one of the most primitive tribes in Tamilnadu, namely, the VILLIS of Chingleput district. It was published in the Vanyajati, the Quarterly Journal of the BAJSS in its January issue.

Venkataraman also published some letters of the late V. S. Srivasa Sastri written to the late Kuppuswami Sastri, relating to the Simon Commission, and to Sanskrit language and literature.

Venkataraman presided over a meeting in the Srinivasa Sastri Hall to welcome a delegation of twelve tribal leaders from Assam. In the opening remarks, he paid high tributes to the Assam tribes, to their tradition and culture and heroic struggle against unfriendly forces and their fervent desire to join the stream of India's national life. The prominent members of the delegation were Meijin Lung of Manipur College, O. Mawrie, Headmaster of the High School in Meghalaya, a Christian who had returned to his own Khasi religion. Nanda Mohan Burman, President, Nilkii Cachar Burman's Commission, Chilchar, spoke of the new awakening among the tribes.

The President received two South African Indian representatives, Rajendra Chetty and Lakshman Naidu. The former had brought out two impressive publications, one in connection with the Golden Jubilee of Sastri College, Durban, and another commemorating the landing of the first batch of Indian Labourers in South Africa in 1860. They are informative and well produced. Lakshman Naidu was a professor in Sociology in Canadian and Scottish Universities and is currently in India engaged in writing the history of South African Indians.

John Linton of the Quaker International, spoke on USSR in the context of the New Soviet Leadership, with Venkataraman in the chair. When Venkataraman joined the Servants

of India Society in 1929, he had the invaluable co-operation of many Quakers who were then working in various Government departments.

The President was interviewed by Sabita Radhakrishnan of Eve's Weekly, Bombay, on his reminiscences of Annie Besant, which appeared in the March 1983 issue of the Eve's Weekly.

The President also wrote a letter to the Press on "Sickle Cell Anaemia" a disease caused by starvation and malnutrition. Many primitive tribes like Panians, Kurumbar, and Irulars were afflicted by this disease in the Nilgiris. He made a plea to the Government to eradicate the disease by organising appropriate medical aid. It is said that a person afflicted by Sickle Cell Anaemia is not afflicted with Malaria. Perhaps, the blood of the tribes suffering from Sickle Cell Anaemia is insipid and bitter.

Venkataraman was also the Vice-Chairman of the Guild of Service, Vice-President of the Association for Social Health, Vice-President of the Indian Council of Social work, and Vice-President of the Indian Council of Child Welfare and attended their meetings, his health permitting.

S. S. Misra remained closely associated with the Kala Vikash Kendra, a well-known institution of Orissa for the promotion of dance, drama and music both as a founder member and also as a member of the Board of Trustees of the institution. He attended most of its meetings.

The Pune Town Planning Study Group, of which R. G. Kakade was the Honorary Secretary, prepared, during the year, four study notes on civic matters like water supply, roads and communications, etc.

Kakade was a member of the Board of Management of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics. He attended all

meetings of the Internal Management Committee and also of the Selection and Confirmation Committee and one meeting of the Board of the Institute.

He continued to be the Honorary Secretary of the Institute of Regional Development Planning at Nagpur. During the current year, he was acting as its Chairman also. The Institute helps prepare and evaluate development plans and gets research projects from the Planning Commission, the State Government, etc.

Kakade was reelected Honary Secretary of the Maharashtra Association for the Cultivation of Science in Pune, and in that capacity was a member of the Executive Committee, the Council and of all the sub-committees. He attended almost all the meetings of the MACS. The Association receives grants from the Department of Science and Technology of the Government of India and receives research projects from the ICAR, ICMR, DST, etc. It maintains a research farm at Baramati, Pune district.

Kakade continues to be the Chairman of Padmashree Dr. Vithalro Vikhe Patil Foundation at Pravaranagar, whose aims are educational, medical relief, cultural work and rural development. He attended a number of meetings of the Foundation in Ahmednagar and Pravaranagar. The Foundation has started from September 1983 an Engineering College and a Polytechnic in Ahmednagar.

Kakade continued to be the Managing Trustee of the late Justice Mahadev Govind Ranade Charitable Trust, which distributes small donations to a large number of institutions in Pune and outside. The Trust has a farm at Pursangi near Pune and a temple at Kolhapur. The Kolhapur Municipal Corporation conducts a school in a building in the compound of the temple.

S. S. Aijaonkar continued to be the Honorary Secretary of the Bombay Social Reform Association, a non-political and non-party organisation, founded by the late Justice Narayan G. Chandavarkar and other fellow-workers of Justice Ranade after his death in 1903. It is an off-shoot of the National Social Conference started by the late Justice Ranade in 1887. The Association which stands for elimination of such disruptive forces as casteism, communalism and others, and for the enactment of a common civil code, has a distinguished record of service for the furtherance of social reform in the Country. It has played a valuable part in bringing many beneficial measures on the statute book.

During the year under report the Association organised a public meeting to celebrate the completion of 80 years. Prof. Nalini Pandit spoke on "Life and Work of Justice Ranade."

The Association conducted G.L. Mehta Project for Education and Cultural enterprise, with the object of spreading formal as well as social education in villages, conducting and aiding schemes which induce villages to develop a more constructive approach towards life. The project which started with an initial contribution of Rs. 10,000/- from Industrial Credit and Investment Corporation of India, received during the year under report, grants from Community Aid Services Programme and R.L. Birla Trust from Calcutta. As usual, the work was carried on at Takwe Khurd in Maval Taluka, Lonavala, in Pune District.

Madhusudan Sahoo was engaged in Student Welfare activities which consisted in going around educational institutions near Bhubaneswar and lecturing to groups of students on the basic ideals of citizenry.

Damodar Sahoo attended the Conference of Swarajya Samitti organised by voluntary agencies at Cuttack. He was the Chief guest at the annual function of the Gandhi Smruti Uchha Vidyapitha and presided over the Annual Sports Meet of the Cricket Tournament.

As a journalist he reported news on important incidents which were published in daily Oriya news papers.

P.K.P. Nair continued to be a Member of the Board of Trustees of the Institute of Regional Development Planning, Nagpur, which was going through financial difficulties. However, the Institute was kept alive and two reports have been published by him after August 15, 1983. Nair looked after the Gokhale Memorial Library at Nagpur maintained by the Society.

Nair has been coopted as a member of the All-India Nair Talim Samiti.

J.H. Shah was looking after the office at Gujarat Raja Gram Vikas Sangh and was connected with other organizations.

M.M. Dhanore continued to be the Secretary of Prahalad Smarak Vachanaliya at Deoni which is a reputed library of the area in the Marathwada Region of Maharashtra.

Education of Backward Classes

Uttar Pradesh Branch

The Society has been maintaining 30 primary schools in the Mirzapur tribal area. Blockwise distribution of these primary schools was:- Two in the Patehara Block of the Sadar Tahsil, four in the Ghorawal Block, eleven in the Chatara Block of the Robertsganj Tahsil, nine in the Muirpur Block and four in the Babani Block of the Dudhi Tahsil. All these schools have their own buildings.

Out of these 30 primary schools ten were financed by the Govt. of India, Ministry of Home Affairs (B.C. Section), and twenty were financed by the U.P. Harijan and Social Welfare Department. All these schools have been recognised by the Education Department of the U.P. Govt and are regularly inspected by the Officers and Inspectorate of the Department.

With a view to develop educational facilities in the remote corners of the Mirzapur district, Atma Nand Misra started ten new primary schools during the year under report. Five of these primary schools were started in the Kandia Project area of the Ghorawal Block, two in the Nagawa Development Project area of the Nagawa Block and three in the Chopan Block of the Robertsganj Tahsil. The U.P. Government had sanctioned Rs. 10,000/- as a token grant for the year under report for these ten new primary schools.

The total number of students attending these schools was 2228 of whom 1671 were Harijans and Adivasies:

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of these primary schools was Rs. 1,89,289-39 during the year under report:

The Society maintained three Junior High Schools in the Mirzapur District at Siltham and Muirpur with grants from U.P. Harijan and Social Welfare Department and at Salkhan with grant from the Education Department of U.P. Government. These schools have their own pucca buildings. The total number of students attending these schools was 545 of whom 219 were Harijans and Adivasies. The low attendance of Harijans and Adivasies in these Junior High Schools was due to extreme poverty in the area.

At the Junior High School examination conducted by the Education Department, out of the 47 candidates who appeared from the Junior High School at Siltham, 33 secured first:

division and 12, second division. Most of them secured distinction in different subjects. Of the 42 candidates of Birla Vidya Mandir Junior High School, Muirpur, 26 secured first division and 15 second division with distinction in different subjects.

During the year under report the expenditure incurred on the maintenance of Junior High School, Siltham was Rs. 43,294-07, Junior High School Muirpur was Rs. 29,558-95 and Junior High School Salkhan was Rs. 79,353-651.

The total of all the three comes to Rs. 1,52,206-67.

With the financial aid from the U.P. Harijan and Social Welfare Department, the Society maintained three Hostels for Harijan and Adivasi students at Muirpur, Salkhan and in Mirzapur City. Free residential and boarding facilities are provided in these hostels.

During the year under report there were 115 Harijan and Adivasi students getting benefit of these hostels and the total expenditure incurred was Rs. 22,423-07 for their maintenance.

With a grant-in-aid from the Government of India (Ministry of Home Affairs) the Society maintained two Ashram Type Schools, one at Siltham in the Robertsganj Tahsil and the other at Khantara in the Sadar Tahsil of the Mirzapur district. There were 60 Harijan and Adivasi inmates in each Ashram who were given free boarding and lodging facilities. Clothing, bedding and reading and writing materials could not be provided to them during the year under report because of paucity of funds. All the inmates of these Ashram School were reading in the Junior High School, Siltham and the Upper Primary School, Khantara maintained by the Society and Junior High School Rjohan run by the Education Department. Besides providing teaching facilities for the curriculum prescribed by the Education Department, facilities for practical

training in agriculture and vegetable gardening were provided to the inmates at both the centres.

The total expenditure incurred on the maintenance of Ashram School, Khantara was Rs. 81,059-85 and Ashram School Siltham, Rs. 78,117-55, during the year under report.

A.N. Misra was in charge of all the above activities in Mirzapur District.

P.K. Dwivedi concentrated his activities in the hill districts. The Society maintained 31 Balwadies in the tribal districts of Uttar Pradesh. Out of these, fourteen Balwadies were financed by the Central Social Welfare Board, New Delhi, through Bhartiya Adim Jati Sevak Sangh, New Delhi, six by the U.P. Govt. Harijan and Social Welfare Department, Lucknow, and eleven by Tarai Anusuchit Jan Jati Vikas Nigam, Lucknow.

During the year under report the total number at beneficiaries was 1,264.

In the running of these 31 Balwadies the Society has incurred an expenditure of Rs. 1,58,184-72 during the year under report.

The Society is also maintaining 14 Primary Schools recognised by the Basic Shiksha Parishad, Government of U.P., in

the tribal area of Northern U.P., from Bijnore to Gonda. Out of these 14 Primary Schools, 11 were being financed by the Harijan and Social Welfare Department, Lucknow, and three by Tarai Anusuchit Jan Jati Vikas Nigam, Lucknow. Detailed information is given in the following chart:

An expenditure of Rs. 1,23,532-62 was incurred by the Society during the year under report on these Primary Schools.

The Government of India Ministry of Home Affairs (Tribal Section) has sanctioned two Ashram Type Schools to be managed by the Servants of India Society. In these Ashram Type Schools residential accommodation with light and water facilities is provided to girls of ST/SC and Backward classes, free of charge. One of these schools is functioning at Chandan Chauki in Lakhimpur Kheri district and the other at Bazpur in Nainital district providing education upto V Standard.

Besides residential facilities these Ashram Type Schools provide food and lodging, clothing, books and writing materials without any charge to the girls. The Society has also arranged to give training in music to the inmates. Apart - time Doctor visited the Ashram twice a week to look after the health of the girls, and give necessary treatment. Facilities for games are also made for their recreation. There is a Hostel Superintendent to look after the children. Motherly treatment is given by the teachers to the inmates of the Ashram.

During the year under report an expenditure of Rs. 74,450/ was incurred on the maintenance of Balika Ashram at Chandan Chauki, Lakhimpur Kheri, and Rs. 84,940-85 on Balika Ashram at Bazpur, Nainital.

In order to provide for more facilities to the students of ST, SC and Backward Classes who desire to take higher education in local colleges, the Servants of India Society has managed 5 Hostels in a rented building: two in Lakhimpur Kheri district: one at Palla and the other at Chandan Chauki; two in Gonda district: one at Tulsipur and one at Pachperwa; and one at Bazpur in Nainital district.

In these hostels, free residential accommodation duly furnished with light and water is provided to each student. Arrangement for food and lodging is also done by the Society free of charge. Soaps for bathing and cleaning the clothes are also given in every month to each student. In the Hostel compound, arrangement for their games is also made. 236 Jan Jati students have enjoyed the aforesaid facilities from these hostels during the period under report. One inmate, Rajendra Prasad Rana appeared in the competition of the I.L.T. at Kanpur.

Out of 236 students, 177 students were of Tharu, 27 Bhuksa, 21 Bhotias and 11 Scheduled castes. The Society

has also provided a post of Hostel Superintendent in each hostel to supervise the students.

The Society incurred an amount of Rs 1,31,005-53 for the maintenance of the hostel at Lakhimpur Kheri, Rs. 1,25,060-79 on the hostel of Gonda district and Rs. 1,16,483-93 on the hostel of Bazpur. Thus the Society has incurred an amount of Rs. 3,73,450-25 on the maintenance of the 5 hostels.

As Managing Trustee of the Ramanuja Memorial Trust, R.S Misra continued to manage the Ramanuja Intermediate College, Konhdar. The result of the College at the last Intermediate examination was 98 per cent passes with several distinctions.

Orissa Branch

Damodar Sahoo was in charge of the Rayagada Centre of the Society in the Koraput district of Orissa. The Servants of India Society which had started its tribal work in the district 45 years back, now runs the Thakkar Bapa Ashram for Adivasi and Scheduled Caste students at Rayagada; Thakkar Bapa Upper Primary School and four Primary Schools in the rural areas of the Rayagada Tahsil, are also managed by the Society.

Damodar Sahoo also looks after ten primary schools located around Choudwar near Cuttack, for early childhood education.

S. S. Misra continued to be in charge of the Gokhale Children's Home at Narasannapet, now in Srikakulam district in Andhra Pradesh State, an orphanage which was founded in March 1945 in the wake of a severe cyclone in the area. During the current year, there were 31 inmates, all of them belonging to backward communities. Among them, five boys appeared for S.S.C. Examination and three boys, for VII Class public examination. Vocational training in tailoring and type-writing is imparted to some of the inmates. The institution provides to the inmates, free boarding and lodging, clothing, soaps and oil, books, medical care, etc.

Madras Branch

The Thakkar Bapa Gurukulam at Nirmacimund in Tamil Nadu is a residential school for the Toda and Kota tribal children. It is situated 8 miles away from Ootacamund on the Mysore Ooty Road, in the midst of the Toda munds. It has been functioning since 1952. The gurukulam is managed by Mrs. Sitalakshmi Sadasivan under the guidance of S. R. Venkataraman.

The pupils of the Middle School attached to the Gurukulam in Standards I to VII with an enrolment of 269 pupils, were mostly drawn from Scheduled Tribes, Backward Classes, and others in the vicinity, as detailed below :-

The school had of 6 teachers, of whom 4 belonged to backward classes, one to S.C., and one to S.T. Pre-vocational training in agriculture is given to the pupils.

The hostel attached to the school, maintained 109 tribal Toda/Kota inmates (75 boys and 34 girls) who were provided free boarding and lodging, books/slates, uniforms, bedding and medical aid. The hostel has a warden and 2 cooks. The warden assists the tribal inmates in their lessons and gives them special coaching.

In 1983-84 a sum of Rs. 1,09,432-75 was spent on the working of the Gurukulam, including administrative expenses, against which a grant of Rs. 1,11,075-50 was received from the Government of Tamilnadu towards the boarding grant and teaching grant for the Institution.

The Gurukulam did not function for a month on account of the severe draught prevailing in the area and the Gurukulam has to refund a sum of Rs. 3,640-30 (Rs. three thousand six hundred and forty and paise thirty only) to the Government of Tamilnadu. In the result the society had to meet a deficit of Rs. 652-40.

The five schools in Kerala, namejy, Devdhar U.P. School, Nediyruppu, Devdhar L.P. School, Karulai, Devdhar L.P. School, Pulliyil, Gokhale U.P. School, Mudadi and Sastriar U.P. School, Chalode situated in the interior of Malapuram and Nilambur forest areas, continued to function under the guidance of Venkataraman satisfactorily as in the past, serving the educational needs of the backward classes and Mopla Muslims. K. Viswanathan Nair, Society's attache, was in immediate charge of the shools.

During the year the five schools had on their rolls 3,200 pupils. The five schools had a staff of 87. The community wise strength of the schools is as under:—

Teachers salary amounting to Rs. 9,31,424 - 50 were directly disbursed by the Government through the headmasters of each school to the teachers. During the year under report maintenance grant for the schools amounting to Rs. 10,406 was due from the Government against the contingent bills. But only Rs. 3,195-05 were sanctioned. The balance of Rs. 7,210 - 95 is due from the govt.

A donation of Rs. 17,000/- was collected from the public out of which Rs. 16,980 - 19 were spent on repairs of the five schools.

The Thakkar Bapa Gurukulam at Chillakur (nearGudur), Nellore district of Andhra Pradesh" was also being managed by Venkataraman. The gurukuram is a residential-school-cum hostel, primarily intended for the educational advancement of children of the Yenadhi tribe. The residential school was upgraded into a high school during the year 1983-84. The school had on its rolls 437 pupils and the hostel, 130 inmates as per details given below :

During the year the School was upgraded into a High School and the requisite number of teaching staff was appointed. The teachers were paid salaries according to the pay and D.A., fixed by the A.P. Government for aided institutions.

All the day scholars, averaging 317 who are mostly drawn from Harijan and other backward classes, were given free mid-day meals during the year. The school children were given free books by the District Tribal & Harijan Welfare Officer.

The school functioned efficiently, smoothly and satisfactorily. But the upgarding of the middle school into a high school had landed the management into unforeseen financial difficulties. The conditions of the grant of permission by the Andhra Pradesh Government for upgrading the school were that the management should deposit with the Education Department of Andhra Pradesh Government a sum of Rs. 35,000/ and pay the school staff the salary and D.A., at the Andhra Pradesh scale which were on the high side compared to those of the Central Government from which the Gurukulam received grants-in-aid for the school and the hostel.

The Gurukulam hostel maintained 130 tribal Yenadhi inmates in the hostel during the year, 95 of whom 70 are boys and 25, girls. The hostel was in charge of a warden and matron. All the tribal inmates were given free food, bedding and 2 sets of uniforms and books/slates and free medical aid. In addition, there is a Hon. Superintendent incharge of the entire Gurukulam, 2 cooks and one cleaner-cum-water carrier. The hostel

Inmates were given milk, eggs, fruits and buttermilk regularly. Of the staff members, 4 belonged to Scheduled Tribes, and the remaining two to backward classes.

The Society, however, found it difficult to pay the salary and D.A. of the teachers as the Government of India grant was received only in February 1984. At this juncture the District Collector offered to take over the Gurukulam on behalf of the Government of A.P., and run it for the benefit of the Tribes. The Society accepting the offer of the Collector handed over the Gurukulam to the Government of Andhra Pradesh.

SOCIAL WORK

R. S. Misra, at Allahabad, continued to work as the General Secretary of the All India Seva Samiti.

He was managing two Nursery Schools: the Gokhale Nursery School at Katzon Road had 27 children on the rolls; the Dr. Katzon Nursery School had a strength of 240 with 7 teachers.

The creative work centre at Katzu Road managed by him had 55 women regularly attending classes in tailoring, cutting, embroidery and toy making. Classes in knitting by machine is a special feature of the centre and there was always rush for admission.

The Rotary sponsored Servindia Homeopathi Dispensary started primarily for the benefit of children as a project under the Servindia Child Welfare Centre was very popular. The dispensary treated 5,423 patients during the year under report. The Rotary Club, Allahabad (Main) met the entire expenditure of the dispensary, during the year, amounting to about Rs. 5,000/-.

The building of Working Women Hostel has been completed at a cost of Rs. 16,50,000/-. 30 rooms have been equipped with tables, chairs, almirahs and ceiling fans. 19 working women have so far joined the hostel. A canteen has been started on contract basis in the hostel for providing meals and refreshment to the inmates of the hostel at fixed rates.

S.S. Misra, at Cuttack, continued as the Vice-President of the Orissa Branch of the Guild of Service, an organisation in charge of the distribution of sponsorship grants sponsored by the "Save the Children Fund" of England. About four hundred sponsorship grants amounting, on an average, to Rs. 110 to Rs. 115 each per month are being awarded to deserving students of Orissa by this organization.

R. G. Kakade at Pune, was re-elected chairman of the District Industrial Cooperative Association, which conducts two clothshops and a Handicraft Emporium and one cloth shop and leather goods prepared by artisans. He continued to represent the DICA on the Pune District Cooperative Board and he continues his Association with the Indian Society for Studies in Cooperation.

He is the Chairman of the Academy for Education (Higher) and Youth Services. The work of preparing a Directory of Youth Organisations and clubs in rural areas of Pune district was in progress.

Kakade was re-elected chairman of the District Probation and Aftercare Association, which conducts two remand homes for boys and one for girls in Pune city. It also runs a Child Guidance Clinic for diagnosis and treatment of problem children. He presided over all the meetings of the Managing Committee during the year. He was re-elected Vice-President of the Maharashtra State unit of the Association which conducts an aftercare hostel for girls at Borivali and for boys at

Chembur in Bombay. All the Remand Homes (numbering 32) and Navjeevan Mandals in the State are affiliated to the State Association.

He continued to be one of the Honorary Secretaries of the Society for the Welfare of the Physically Handicapped at Wanawado. During the year under report, all the boys and girls were operated at Sancheti Hospital.

He was a member of the Managing Committee of the Mahila Seva Mandal, which conducts a rescue home, a hostel for working women of low income brackets, a primary school and a vocational training centre.

He continued to be a member of the Board of Trustees of the Society for the Prevention of Mal-nutrition.

He was re-elected to the Managing Committee of the Navjeevan Mandal which works for the rehabilitation of released prisoners.

He continued to be a member of the Executive Committee of the David Sasoon Infirm Asylum, which has completed 120 years of its useful service to the community.

He continued to be a member of Bal Kalyan Sanstha. The swimming tank for physically handicapped children which it was constructing in Government House compound, was inaugurated at the hands of the Governor during the year.

S.S. Ajgonkar was a member of the Florence Nightingale Village Sanitation Fund Committee of the Social Service League, Bombay. From this Fund, grants not exceeding Rs. 1,000/- are paid to institutions and individuals undertaking to do rural sanitation work by such means as sinking wells, cleaning streets, sweeping refuse, filling insanitary pools and ditches, digging drains, etc.

Ajgonkar continued to be a Member of the Mafatlal Gagalbhai Textile Technical Institute Supervising Committee of the Social Service League, which provides systematic training to those who seek entry into the textile industry as a career and those who are already in the industry. The School is the only one of its kind in the country which imparts theoretical and practical training in textile technology to students without interfering with their jobs in any way. The training in the school is divided into two sections; the Post-Employment Training Section and Pre-Employment Training Section.

Ajgonkar was actively associated with the N. M. Joshi Social Workers Training Class of the League, started in 1926 which is conducted in the Servants of India Society's Home, Barmby. Its object is to equip people for better citizenship by disseminating the knowledge of social theories and social problems.

Ajgonkar continued to be the Hon. General Secretary of the Social Service League, one of the oldest institutions in Bombay. The League conducts, among other things, four High Schools, a Textile Training Institute, six Industrial Schools for Women, Primary and Pre-Primary Schools, three Libraries, a Gymnasium, a Co-operative Credit Society, a Co-operative Dramatic Association and two Dispensaries. The League, on an average, spends Rupees twenty-five lakhs a year for conducting its various activities.

He was also a Member of the Supervising Committee of the Bai Bachubai Kanji Karsandas Charitable Allopathic and Ayurvedic Dispensaries of the League. Both the Dispensaries are located at the League's Parel Office, and the patients are treated there at subsidised rates.

Damodar Sahoo, at Choudwar, Orissa, looked after a number of social service units, such as the Leprosy Clinic at Choudwar, Servindia Destitute Children's home which keeps 76

children, Ashok Pratap Tailoring School, fourteen creches, Laxminarayan Pathagar, and the Lalit Kala Music College. He also assists S.S. Misra in the Servindia L. N. Project. Sahoo also works in close association with other social work groups such as the Rotary Club.

P. K. Dwivedi in Bazpur, U. P. ran 12 creches in Nainital District, providing the inmates with nutritious food, medical aid and playing materials. The strength of these creches was 294. Two women workers each for a centre, look after the children. The total expenditure for maintaining these centres came to Rs. 88,925-54.

Dwivedi also looked after a Bal Kalyan Kainder for 40 Boys at Dhaki. The expenditure incurred was Rs. 6,229/-.

Dwivedi maintained tailoring centres for women, incurring an expenditure of Rs. 6,925/- during the year. He had also started two typing schools, one at Bazpur and the other at Sitarganj. During the year, 34 boys got themselves trained in Hindi and English typing and shorthand. 13 students among them belonging to the scheduled castes were able to secure appointments as clerks in the Bazpur Cane Development Society. One got appointed in a bank and two other as clerks in Etawa District. The expenditure incurred for the typing schools during the year was Rs. 17,643-75.

The Central Social Welfare Board had sanctioned, a sum of Rs. 45,000/- for organising 10 Rural Women Training Camps. The Society conducted seven camps during the current year, in the district of Mirzapur, Lakhimpur Kheri and Bijnore.

With the grants-in-aid sanctioned by the Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs, the Society maintained five Women Welfare Centres, at Kusungur in Allahabad district, and at Muirpur, Darchi, Eidar and Siltham in the Mirzapur district.

These centres were organised and looked after by Atma Nand Misra. These centres provided facilities for the general education of women besides imparting training to them in tailoring, embroidery and knitting. The total number of women thus benefitted was 162 of whom 100 belonged to the Scheduled castes, Scheduled tribes and other backward classes. The total expenditure, on the maintenance of these centres was Rs. 23,597-25.

With the financial aid from the Central Social Welfare Board, Atma Nand Misra conducted three Rural Women Training Camps in the village, Lendna, Patna and Khaliyari in the Robertsganj Tahsil of the Mirzapur District where instruction was imparted to Scheduled caste and Scheduled tribes women in matters of health and hygiene, care of children and other useful subjects. Sixty five women attended these camps.

The Society maintained with the financial assistance from the Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs, three typewriting institutes for scheduled caste and scheduled tribes boys and girls in Lucknow and Mirzapur and in Sarsa in Allahabad District. 75 candidates attended the training classes during the year, and expenditure incurred was Rs. 28,254-70.

The Society maintained one Nursery School at Khaliyari Bazar in Mirzapur district with 37 pupils. Expenditure during the year amounted to Rs. 2,010/-

Atma Nand Misra was also managing four Ayurvedic dispensaries at Khantara, Tikurla, Ghuwas and Khaliyari Bazar in the tribal area of Mirzapur district. During the year, 11,470 patients were treated through these dispensaries of whom 6,394 were new and 5,076, old patients.

On behalf of the Prohibition Council of India, the Bureau of Rural Development established in Sevagram and looked after

by P.K.P. Nair completed a survey on prohibition in Wardha district in Maharashtra and prepared a report. As follow-up, Bhajanmandals were organised with the initiative of the Bureau in nine villages. The Bureau continued its adult education work in ten villages at a total cost of Rs. 8,729/-. A few villagers were trained as instructors of Ambar Charkha at a cost of Rs. 3,793/-. A number of self-help activities were initiated by the Bureau in a few villages, such as repair of wells, construction of drainage channels, repair of culverts, making of soak pits and preparing compounds for Ambar Charkha sheds, at a cost to the Bureau of Rs. 19,051/- The Bureau provided equipments to Balmandirs at a cost of Rs. 801/-. One person was given training in workshop on a stipend which amounted to Rs. 744/- during the period.

The Bureau organised a seminar in March 1984 on Organic Farming. About fifty people participated. The expenditure for the seminar was about Rs. 10,000/-. A camp for awareness building in villages was conducted by the Bureau for 20 persons and the expenditure incurred was about Rs. 17,500/-.

Jawahar Shah in Gujarat organised a cooperative housing society in Kavitha village, about 30 miles away from Ahmedabad. It has 28 members belonging to Scheduled Castes. Each member contributed Rs. 3,000/- and the society has acquired 3.20 acres of land. The construction of houses is yet to start.

R. V. Neve in Amravati district, Maharashtra, revived the health care centre of the Shendurjana Bazar Centre of the Servants of India Society, by appointing a doctor. He also started a health care programme in one of the slums in Nagpur City with the help of a homeopathic doctor. Five creches under his supervision functioned in three different places, with 125 children.

Neve continued to give assistance to the Maharogl Seva Mandal, Tapovan, in Amravati, to help rehabilitate leprosy patients.

M. M. Dhanore in Marathwada Region of Maharashtra, conducted 10 non-formal education centres in Deoni area of Latur District from April 1983 to March 1984. These classes are for school drop-outs of the age group 6 to 14 years. Out of 10 centres, 9 were for girls and 1 for boys. About 270 girls and 30 boys were benefited by the scheme. The scheme was financed by a landlord and well-wisher of the Society, Mallikarjunappa Mankari of Deoni village with a donation of Rs. 8,400/-

Dhanore started a tailoring training centre at Neknur in Bhir District. Fifteen Rural Women were trained at the centre. The sewing machines were provided by the Department of Adult Education and Salary of the instructor was paid by the Society. Dhanore collected Rs. 1,080/- for the scheme.

He also conducted five creches in Marathwada where 125 children are looked after during the day. A Handicraft Centre for 15 rural women at Daulatabad has also been organised. They were paid stipends.

Dhanore was the Chairman of the Committee for Relief for the people affected by rain and floods in Marathwada during July-August 1983.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Servindia Rural Development Wing at Khantra

R. S. Misra had adopted for integrated development, the village Khantra in Mirzapur district. He continued his efforts during the year in three directions :

(1) An experimental farm has been started at Khantra under the Government of India Scheme for the development of agriculture in drought prone areas entrusted to the Banaras Hindu University, for demonstrating the process of multiplication of pedigree seeds specially developed by the Pantnagar University for arid areas.

(2) For developing the irrigation potential of the village, an old dam is being renovated for strong water for irrigation of fields. About Rs. 10,000/- have already been spent for the purpose. The renovation work also served as a famine relief measure for the villagers whose crops have been destroyed by drought.

(3) The integrated Rural Development Programme and the Antyodaya Programme of the U. P. State Government have been taken advantage of by him for the economic betterment of the villagers. Eleven buffaloes, two cows and twelve she-goats were provided to 15 families. These families have been provided with loudspeakers and one family with band with full complement of seven instruments. One loom for manufacturing carpet and one sewing machine were given to two families. Helping marketing of ghee has enabled the tribal people in the village to drink plenty of buttermilk.

Five homeless tribal families were allotted housing sites and building materials supplied by the Government were given over to the tribals to construct the houses by themselves.

Servindia Udyog Kendra at Sirsa

One firm of Carpet makers and exporters from Gopiganj in the Varanasi district has started a branch at the Servindia Udyog Kendra at Sirsa. Forty looms for Carpet weaving have been set up in the Udyog Kendra and young men of the village were trained on an "earn while you learn" basis.

Bazpur Centre

In order to enhance the earning capacity of the villagers, P. K. Dwivedi has taken up a programme for the development of fishing, sericulture and bee-keeping. Demonstration farms for the purpose have been established in the premises of the Bhoksa Boys Hostel at Bazpur. The total income from these farms during the year was Rs. 5,825/-.

Sadhu Charn Durry and Carpet Weaving Centre at Choudwar, Cuttack district, Orissa.

Damodar Sahoo has a production unit for durry and carpets at Choudwar. He has collected raw materials worth about Rs. 15,000/- for the purpose.

Bureau of Rural Development Sevagram Wardha District

P. K. P. Nair, continued his work for the development of villages around Sevagram. The Bureau had set up in 1981, a Rural Marketing Centre initially with the assistance of the All India Handicrafts Board. The Centre had five types of activities.

(1) Khadi Production In five villages near Sevagram. During the year 64,915 hanks were produced. This was, however, much below the capacity of the 92 Ambar Charkhas distributed. The total value of yarn produced was Rs. 69,121/-

(2) Khadi and Village Industries Sales Emporium. The total sales during the year amounted to Rs. 1,51,987/- and the Emporium earned a net profit of about Rs. 15,000/- on the sales.

(3) Rural Repairs Workshop. The Workshop imparted training in motor winding, repair of pumps and agricultural implements and welding. The total receipt during the year was Rs. 51,437/- and expenditure Rs. 47,085/-.

(4) Nursery and Horticulture. This activity was initiated during the current year in a bid to encourage horticulture in the area. During the year a little over a hundred acres have already been planted with various fruit trees. The land for the nursery has been provided by the Sevagram Ashram.

(5) Manufacture of bricks and tiles. The total net earnings this year came to about Rs. 20,000/- for the unit set up two years ago with the assistance of the Bureau. The unit employs ten people seasonally.

Shendurjana Bazar Centre in Amravati district

The Centre which was opened by the Society, forty seven years ago, continued to function actively under R. V. Neve. During the year, Neve started a goat farm for the rehabilitation of cured leprosy patients. Experiments were conducted for increasing wool production through cross-breeding.

The handloom section of the centre had to be closed down in January-February 1984 on account of back of demand for the finished products. Production was resumed in March 1984 and the section was thereafter functioning smoothly.

The research staff participated in several seminars and worked on various committees of the Central and State Governments, University Grants Commission, University of Poona and such other bodies. Important among these is the appointment of Shri V. M. Dandekar, Professor Emeritus as Chairman and of Professor N. Rath as a Member of the Fact Finding Committee of the Government of Maharashtra on Regional Imbalance of the Maharashtra.

In the M. Phil. Programme in Economics, there were 10 students and three Teacher Fellows this year. Six students were awarded U. G. C. Junior Research Fellowships for one year in the first instance to do their M. Phil in Economics. Among those who completed the M. Phil training programme in previous years, 5 years, 5 were awarded the M. Phil degree in Economics of the University of Poona during the year 1983-84.

Under the P. V. Pandurangl Prize Endowment, the M. Phil dissertation entitled "The Concept of Exploitation in Karl Marx" by Shri Thomas Palakudiyil was selected for cash prize of Rs 500/- this year.

There were 50 students for M. A. in Economics at the Centre for Post-graduate Teaching in Economics of the University of Poona located at this Institute. Four senior students were awarded National Scholarships this year. Miss Prita Shenoy and Miss Rohini Vijay Paranjape received the 'Professor B. D. Kanetkar Prize' for securing the highest number of marks in Entire Economics at the M. A. examinations of the University of Poona held in May 1982 and May 1983 respectively.

Most of the members of the research and teaching staff were engaged in teaching courses to the B.A., M.A. and M. Phil students in Economic. Besides, some of the teachers visited the post-graduate centres of the University of Poona located in the mofussil colleges to give lectures to post-graduate students.

At the instance of the U.G.C., the Institute organized the two-yearly Indo-Hungarian Round-Table of Economists from 5th to 7th March 1984 at Lonavala. The participants included a delegation of three Hungarian Economists and seven Indian Economists. Professor N. Rath led the Indian delegation which consisted of three from the Institute and four Professor from other Indian Universities and Research Institutes.

The Institute also organized a training programme for the XIIIth batch of probationers of the Indian Statistical Service on 11th July 1983.

The Institute Instituted from this year a micro-processor unit, S-800. This will help in carrying out most of the work of data processing in the Institute. Besides, the in-house computer facility will help Scholars students to get trained in programming and use of computers for their research work.

The research staff participated in several seminars and worked on various committees of the Central and State Governments, University Grants Commission, University of Poona and such other bodies. Important among these is the appointment of Shri V. M. Dandekar, Professor Emeritus as Chairman and of Professor N. Rath as a Member of the Fact Finding Committee of the Government of Maharashtra on Regional Imbalance of the Maharashtra.

In the M. Phil. Programme in Economics, there were 10 students and three Teacher Fellows this year. Six students were awarded U. G. C. Junior Research Fellowships for one year in the first instance to do their M. Phil in Economics. Among those who completed the M. Phil training programme in previous years, 5 years, 5 were awarded the M. Phil degree in Economics of the University of Poona during the year 1983-84,

Under the P. V. Pandurangi Prize Endowment, the M. Phil dissertation entitled "The Concept of Exploitation in Karl Marx" by Shri Thomas Palakudiyil was selected for cash prize of Rs 500/- this year.

There were 50 students for M. A. in Economics at the Centre for Post-graduate Teaching in Economics of the University of Poona located at this Institute. Four senior students were awarded National Scholarships this year. Miss Prita Shenoy and Miss Rohini Vijay Paranjape received the 'Professor B. D. Kanetkar Prize' for securing the highest number of marks in Entire Economics at the M. A. examinations of the University of Poona held in May 1982 and May 1983 respectively.

Most of the members of the research and teaching staff were engaged in teaching courses to the B.A., M.A. and M. Phil students in Economic. Besides, some of the teachers visited the post-graduate centres of the University of Poona located in the mofussil colleges to give lectures to post-graduate students.

At the instance of the U.G.C., the Institute organized the two-yearly Indo-Hungarian Round-Table of Economists from 5th to 7th March 1984 at Lonavala. The participants included a delegation of three Hungarian Economists and seven Indian Economists. Professor N. Rath led the Indian delegation which consisted of three from the Institute and four Professor from other Indian Universities and Research Institutes.

The Institute also organized a training programme for the XIIIth batch of probationers of the Indian Statistical Service on 11th July 1983.

The Institute instituted from this year a micro-processor unit, S-800. This will help in carrying out most of the work of data processing in the Institute. Besides, the in-house computer facility will help Scholars students to get trained in programming and use of computers for their research work.

We are glad to report that the following research students who worked for their Ph. D, under the guidance of the members of the staff of the the institute were awarded the Ph. D. degree of the University of Poona during the year under report:
