PREAMBLE

*Extracts from the original Preamble to the Constitution
of the Society written by the illustrious founder
the late Gopal Krishna Gokhale, in 1905*

For some time past the conviction has been forcing itself on many earnest and thoughtful minds that a stage has been reached in the work of nation-building in India when, for further progress, the devoted labours of a specially trained agency applying itself to the task in a true missionary spirit are required. The work that has been accomplished so far has indeed been of the highest value. The growth during the last fifty years of a feeling of common nationality based upon common traditions and ties, common hopes and aspirations, and even common disabilities has been most striking. The fact that we are Indians first, and Hindus, Mahommedans, Parsees or Christians afterwards, is being realised in a steadily increasing measure, and the idea of a united and renovated India marching onwards to a place among the nations of the world, worthy of her great past, is no longer a mere idle dream of a few imaginative minds, but is the definitely accepted creed of those who form the brain of the community the educated classes of the country. A creditable beginning has already been made in matters of education and of local self-government; and all classes of the people are slowly but steadily coming under the influence of liberal ideas. The claims of public life are every day

receiving wider recognition, and attachment to the land of our birth is growing into a strong and deeply cherished passion of the heart. The annual meetings of Congresses and Conferences, the work of public bodies and associations, the writings in the columns of the Indian Press—all bear witness to the new life that is coursing in the veins of the people. The results achieved so far are undoubtedly most gratifying, but they only mean that the jungle has been cleared and the foundations laid. The great work of rearing the superstructure has yet to be taken in hand, and the situation demands on the part of workers devotion and sacrifices proportionate to the magnitude of the task.

The Servants of India Society has been established to meet in some measure these requirements of the situation. Much of the work must be directed towards building up in the country a higher type of character and capacity than is generally available at present, and the advance can only be slow. More over, the path is beset with great difficulties; there will be constant temptations to turn back; bitter disappointment will repeatedly try the faith of those who have put their hand to the work. But the weary toil can have but one end, if only the workers grow not faint-hearted on the way. One essential condition of success in this work is that a sufficient number of our countrymen must now come forward to devote themselves to the cause in the spirit in which religious work is undertaken. Public life must be spiritualised. Love of country must so fill the heart that all else shall appear as of little moment by its side. A fervent patriotism which rejoices at every opportunity of sacrifice for the motherland, a dauntless heart which refuses to be turned back from its object by difficulty or danger, a deep faith in the purpose of Providence which nothing can shake—equipped with these,

the worker must start on his mission and reverently seek the joy which comes of spending oneself in the service of one's country.

The Servants of India Society will train men, prepared to devote their lives to the cause of the country: in a religious spirit and will seek to promote, by all constitutional means, the national interests of the Indian people. Its members will direct their efforts, principally towards

- 1) creating among the people by example and by precept, a deep and passionate love of the motherland, seeking its highest fulfilment in service and sacrifice
- 2) organizing the work of political education and agitation, basing it on a careful study of public questions and strengthening generally the public life of the country;
- 3) promoting relations of cordial goodwill and co-operation among the different communities;
- 4) assisting educational movements especially those for the education of woman, the education of backward classes and industrial and scientific education;
- 5) helping forward the industrial development of the country;
- 6) the elevation of the depressed classes.

The Servants of India Society

Objects and Working

The Servants of India Society was founded by Gopal Krishna Gokhale on June 12, 1905.

The object of the Servant of India Society being to train national missionaries for the service of India, every member is pledged to devote all his time to public work.

and is also under a moral obligation to be a member of the Society for life. Secular and noncommunal in character, the society, as a body of political workers, recognizes the necessity of earnest and patient efforts, towards building up in the Country a higher type of character and capacity than is generally available at present and also the need for promoting among those amidst whom they work, a secular non-parochial and noncommunal out look.

Every member is required to take the following seven vows at the time of admission :

1) The country shall always be the first in my thoughts and I will give to her service the best that is in me.

2) In serving the country I will seek no personal advantage for myself.

3) I will regard all Indians as brothers and work for the advancement of all, without distinction of caste or creed.

4) I will be content with such provision for myself and my family, as the Society may be able to make. I will devote no part of my energies to earning money for myself.

5) I will lead a pure personal life.

6) I will engage in no personal quarrel with any one.

7) I will always keep in view the aims of the society and watch over its interests with the utmost zeal, doing all I can to advance its work. I will never do anything which is inconsistent with the objects of the Society.

In order to train the members, the Society maintains a library at Pune where they can study public questions. The library is well provided with books on history, politics,

economics and possesses a unique collection of reports, Parliamentary blue-books and other publications relating to India.

Attached to the society is a Home, where the members can live in close union and fellowship and enjoy the benefit of a corporate life. The Home is large enough to provide accommodation for thirty persons.

In addition to members, the Society includes within its fold three other classes of workers-permanent assistants, attaches and associates-to enable persons who do not either possess the qualifications required of a member or the-leisure to devote themselves entirely to the service of their country-men, but who are in sympathy with its aims and object, to have opportunities of advancing the cause which it has at heart For a knowledge of the conditions which govern their admission reference must be made to the pamphlet containing the rules of the society.

Members of this Society are also permitted to work in other organisations already existing or brought into existence by them having similar aims and objects. It would certainly not be fair for the Society to claim as its own the work done by those organisations. But so much time and energy of its members are given to the work-often the day-to-day routine work-of those institutions, that some reference has necessarily to be made to it in a report of the Society's work. While doing so, the Society would like to express its thankfulness to these institutions for giving it an opportunity to serve them and to serve the country through them. It, however, lays no claim to their work beyond what is justified by the service of its members.

Report For 1984-85

The present membership of the Society is only thirteen. There is urgent need, therefore, for recruiting youngmen of character and capacity inspired by a desire to work for the country in a spirit of service and sacrifice.

Organisation

The members meet every year in June at its Headquarters at Pune for the annual session. The Society has branches in Madras, Bombay, Pune, Nagpur, Allahabad and Cuttack. S. R. Venkataraman was unanimously elected President of the Society on 12th June 1984 for a third term of three years.

S. R. Venkataraman continued to be the President and Dr. R. G. Kakade, the Vice-President of the Society. S. R. Venkataraman, R. G. Kakade, P. K. Dwivedi, S. S. Misra and Ajgaonkar continued to be the Senior members of the Society's Branches in Madras, Nagpur, Allahabad, Cuttack and Bombay respectively. Damodar Sahoo, A. N. Misra and R. V. Neve were elected to the council by the members of the Society. S. S. Ajgaonkar was the Secretary of the Society.

Gokhale Day

S. S. Misra spoke on the occasion of the 119th Jayanti of Gopal Krishna Gokhale, the founder of the Society, at Cuttack which was presided over by Dr. Radhanath Rath, the Editor of the "Samaja". Messrs Harihar Mohapatra, Dr. Sadasiv Misra, Madhusudan Sahoo and Damodar Sahoo spoke on the occasion.

Sastri Day

Sastri Day was celebrated in Madras on 17th April 84 under the chairmanship of Shri V. Sethuraman, a retired

Judge of the Madras High court. Prof. K. R. Srinivasa Iyengar, Prof. L. V. Naidu spoke on the occasion. A. Ranganathan released Sastriana No. 28.

Public Affairs

As the ex-officio chairman of the Gokhale Institute of politics and Economics, Venkataraman presided over the Board meeting in Pune when the audited statement of accounts and the annual report of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics for the year 83-84 were considered and approved.

He took interest in the problems relating to Sri Lankan Tamils, the South African and Malaysian Indians.

As vice-President of the Indian Council of world affairs he arranged a public meeting on "Violation of Human Rights in Sri Lanka"— When Shri V. R. Krishna Iyer, a former Judge of the Supreme Court of India initiated the discussion.

Dr. Lokanathan, Mutharayan Professor in the University of Penang gave an informative and illuminating account of the political, Social and Economic condition of Malaysians and Indians. Venkataraman presided over the function where Shri C. K. Raman also spoke.

As Chairman of P. K. Swaminathan Birth centenary committee Venkataraman presided over its meeting held in Sastri Hall on 15th December 1984. Smt. Jothi Venkatachalam, a former Governor of Kerala spoke on the occasion and released the Swaminathan Birth Centenary Souvenir.

In connection with the Centenary celebration of the Indian National Congress, Mr. Engineer and Mr. Thapar of the department of Information and Broadcasting visited

the Madras Branch of the Society to film the portraits of the Congress leaders adorning the Society's Hall such as Ranade, G. Subramaniya Iyer, V. Krishnaswamy Iyer, Gokhale, S. Vijayaragavachari, Sri Aravinda Ghosh, Tilak, and Mahatma Gandhi.

S. S. Misra remained closely associated with the Kala Vikash Kendra, a well-known institution of Orissa for the promotion of dance, drama and music both as a founder member and also as a member of the Board of Trustees of the institution. He attended most of its meetings.

R. G. Kakade was a member of the Board of Management of the Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics. He attended all the meetings of the internal committee of the institute and meeting of the selection and confirmation Committee held since August 1984.

He continued to be Hon Secretary and a Trustee of the institute of Regional Development and Planning at Nagpur. During the year the institute brought out one publication.

He continued to be Hony. Treasurer of the Maharashtra Association for the cultivation of Science, Pune. In that capacity he was a member of the Executive Committee, the Budget Committee and the Building Committee. He attended all the meetings of the Association during the year.

He continued to be the Chairman of Padmasri Dr. Vittharao Foundation at Pravaranagar. The Foundation conducts an Engineering college and a poly-technic at Ahmednagar and a poly-technic in Parner taluka of Ahmednagar.

He continues to be the Chairman of the Canara Welfare Trust. He is the Managing Trustee of Justice Mahadev Govind Ranade Charitable Trust. The trust distributes small donations to about 50 institutions in Pune, Bombay and other places.

S. S. Aijaonkar continued to be the Hon. Secretary of the Bombay Social Reform Association, a non-political and non-party organisation founded by the late Justice Narayan G. Chandavarkar. The Association which stands for elimination of such disruptive forces as castism, communalism and others and a common civil code, has a distinguished record of Social Service.

During the year under report, the Association submitted appeals to the Government of India to pass urgent legislation preventing use of religious and sacred places for political purposes. It also urges the banning of political parties functioning on religious basis. The Association conducts G. L. Mehta Project for Educational and Cultural enterprise, with the object of spreading formal as well as social education in villages, conducting and aiding schemes which would induce villagers to undertake more constructive approach towards life. Under this project hearing aid apparatuses, carpets, school uniforms, shirts and knickers were distributed to needy children from the Central school for the Deaf, Bombay; Vanavasi kalyan Ashram, Kothimba, (District Thana); New English School, Jambulpada, (District Raigad) and Adivasi children of Vangaon, (Dahanu), respectively.

Madhusudan Sahoo was engaged in Student Welfare activities which consisted in going around educational institutions near Bhubaneswar and lecturing to groups of students on the basic ideals of citizenry. He read more

than a dozen books written by Dr. Nurman Vincent Peale on positive thinking, Enthusiasm, courage, confidence, Optimism, Faith, etc. He prepared exhaustive notes from books written by Dr. Samuel Smiles, William Cobbett's Advice to youngmen, Rev. John Todd's The student's Manual and Lord Chesterfield's letters to his son. He gave discourses to nearly 5000 students in fifty meetings.

Damodar Sahoo presided over the annual function of Bari High School, M. E. School and Balika Vidyalaya of Bala-sore District and distributed prizes to the students. He arranged 118th Birth anniversary of the Founder of our Society at Cuttack under the guidance of the Senior Member. He acted as the speaker in a public meeting organised by the Rath Jatra committee at Choudwar. He attended to Society's organisational work at Allahabad, Mirzapur and Delhi in the month of December 1984. He met the Government officials of the different departments of the Union Government to request them to release grant-in-aid in favour of the Choudwar Centre. He organised the 22nd death anniversary of late L. N Sahoo and the 11th foundation Day of the D. C. Home at Choudwar in the month of January 1985. He attended, as the chief guest, the annual sports of the Municipal High School, Choudwar. He was the chief guest in the Silver Jubilee function of the E. S. I. Hospital, Choudwar. He attended in New Delhi the orientation course for Govt. officials and Board members of voluntary organisations running Children's institutions, stayed there for a period of ten days during which he visited some of the villages adjoining Delhi and also Delhi orphanage.

As a Journalist he reported news on important incidents which were published in daily oriya newspapers.

P. K. P. Nair looked after the Gokhale Memorial Library in the Society's Building at Nagpur.

The Bureau of Rural Development, Servants of India Society, Sevagram organised a seminar in December 1984 lasting six days on a reassessment of the concept of Hind Swaraj elaborated by Mahatma Gandhi.

M M Dhanore continued to be the Hon. Secretary of Prahlad Smarak Wachanalaya of Deoni which is one of the reputed libraries at Deoni.

Education of Backward Classes

Uttar Pradesh Branch

The Society maintained 40 primary schools in the Mirzapur district. Out of these ten were financed by the Govt. of India, Ministry of Home Affairs and thirty were financed by the U P Harijan and Social Welfare Department. All these schools have their own buildings and are regularly inspected by the inspectorate of the Education Department, Harijan and Social Welfare Department and the Revenue Department.

Total number of students attending these schools was 2,126 of whom 1,543 were SC and 347 BC. During the year under report the Govt. of India have sanctioned an amount of Rs. 45,000/- to provide mid-day-meals to 400 SC & ST. Students reading in the ten Primary schools financed by them. As the sanction was received very late this would be implemented only from Feb. 85.

The Govt of India have also sanctioned an amount of Rs. 40,000/- to provide clothes to 400 SC & ST. Students reading in these ten primary schools. The clothes have been purchased and these will be provided to the children in the month of July 85 after stitching. The total expenditure on the maintenance of these primary schools was Rs. 3, 06, 320. 45 p. during the year under report.

The Society maintained three Junior High Schools in the Mirzapur district situated in the villages Siltham and Muirpur with the financial aid from the U. P. Harijan and Social Welfare Department and at the village Salkhan with the financial help from the Education Department of U. P. Government. All these schools are recognised by the state Government and have their own Pucca buildings. The total number of students attending these schools was 545 of whom 256 were SC & 176 BC.

The result of the VIII class of these Junior High Schools in the last examination conducted by the Education Departement was good. Of the 47 candidates of the Junior High School, Siltham who appeared in the examination, 40 secured First Division and 7 second Division. Most of them secured distinction in different subjects. Of the 44 candidates of Birla Vidya Mandir Junior High School Muirpur, 17 secured First Division, 25 second Division and 2 Third Division. Of the 39 candidates of Raja Baldev Das Birla songhati Vidyalaya Salkhan, 4 secured First Division, 29 second Division and 2 third Division.

The Republic Day ('26th' Jan.) was celebrated by Junior High School Siltham in a befitting manner as in previous years. The Basic Education Officer Mirzapur was the Chief Guest and the function was attended by

several officers of Education, forests, Soil Conservation and Development Departments and nearly two thousand local people.

During the year under report the expenditure on the maintenance of Junior High School Siltham was Rs. 40, 512. 41 p. Junior High School Muirpur was Rs. 25, 585. 95 p. and Junior High School Salkhan was Rs. 91, 534. 80 p. The total of which comes to Rs. 1, 57, 633. 16 p.

With the financial aid from the U. P. Harijan and Social Welfare Department, the Society maintained three Harijan and Adivasi Hostels at Muirpur, Salkhan and in Mirzapur City. Only free residential and cooking facilities are provided in these Hostels.

During the year under report there were 146 Harijan and Adivasi students getting benefit of these Hostels and the total expenditure of Rs., 23, 999. 93p. was incurred for their maintenance.

With the grant-in-aid from the Govt. of India, (Ministry of Home Affairs) the Society maintained two Ashram Type Schools. One at Siltham in the Robertsganj and the other at Khantara in the Sadar Tahsils of the Mirzapur District. There were 60 Harijan and Adivasi inmates in each Ashram who were given free fooding and lodging facilities. Clothes have been purchased and these will be provided to the inmates in July 85 after stitching.

All the inmates of these Ashram Schools were reading in the Junior High School Siltham and Upper Primary School Khantara maintained by the Society and in Junior High School Rajohan run by the Education Department.

During the year under report kitchen of the Ashram school at Khantara remained closed for 3 months. (From

Sept. to Nov. 84) The Kitchen could be restarted from 1st Dec 84 as a result of which five inmates dropped out. After Nov. 84 total enrolment in the Ashram was 55 against the sanction of 60.

The total expenditure on the maintenance of Ashram School Siltham was Rs. 91, 058. 50 p. and on the Ashram School Khantara Rs. 87, 171. 94p. during the year under report.

With the grant-in-aid from the Govt. of India (Ministry of Home Affairs) the Society maintained five Women's Welfare centres. Previously these five centres were located at Kusungur in the Allahabad district and at Siltham, Dudhi, Bidar and Muirpur in the Mirzapur district. But considerations of convenience led us to locate them at Kundadih, Ramgarh, Dhanora and Chandrabhannagar. Facilities for the general education were provided to the women attending these centres besides training in tailoring, embroidery and knitting by hand.

The total number of women attending these centres was 135 of whom 99 were SC & BC. Four Harijan women of Dhanora centre took benefit of I. R. D. Scheme with the help of the Society and got sewing machines on subsidy. Total expenditure on the maintenance of these centres was Rs. 30, 912. 06p. during the year under report.

With the financial aid from the Govt. of India, (Ministry of Home Affairs) the Society maintained three Typewriting Institutes for Harijan and Adivasi Boys and Girls in the Lucknow and Mirzapur cities and at Sarsa in the Allahabad district to provide training in typewriting to them, so that they may get employment and may take fuller benefit of reservation quota allotted to them in the Govt. Services. 78 Harijan and Adivasi trainees took

advantage of these institutes during the year under report. Three trainees of the Mirzapur Institute who passed their examination during 84-85 have been employed in different departments. Total expenditure on the maintenance of these institutes during the year under report was Rs. 33, 318. 79.

The Society maintained three Ayurvedic Dispensaries at Khantara Tikuria and Ghuwas in the tribal area of the Mirzapur district. Because of continuous financial crisis medicines could not be supplied to these dispensaries during the year under report. The Vaidyas of these dispensaries were instructed to give only prescriptions to the patients. 6903 patients took benefit of these dispensaries during the year under report.

A. N. Misra was in charge of all the above activities of the Mirzapur District.

The Society maintained 31 Balwadies in the Tribal belt of U. P. from Nainital to Gonda district. Out of these Balwadies 14 are being financed by the Central Social Welfare Board through the Bharatiya Adimjati Sevak Sangh, New Delhi, Six by U. P. Government.

The following chart gives an idea of the nature of the Balwadies maintained by the U. P. Branch of the Society.

During the year under report the Society has spent an amount of Rs. 1, 29, 878. 00 for the maintenance of the Balwadies.

The Society is maintaining 16 primary schools in the tribal belt of Northern Uttar Pradesh from Bijnor to Gonda District. These primary schools are recognised by the basic Shikhya Parishad, U. P.

The following is a detailed account of these Schools :-

During the year under report an amount of Rs. 78, 618. 00 was spent on the maintenance of the Primary Schools mentioned above.

Balika Ashram Type School :—

The Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs has sanctioned two Ashram Type Schools for ST Girls where residential accommodation duly furnished with light and water is provided free of charge. The total strength of the inmates is 104 of which Buxa girls No. 52 Tharu 50 and others 2.

The total expenditure on the maintenance of these schools was Rs. 18, 8, 473. 88.

Hostel for Boys :

Government of India has sanctioned five hostels for the Servants of India Society 2 in the Gonda District 2 in Lakhempur and one in Nainital District.

The Hostels provide free residential accommodation and arrangements of food & Lodging are made by the Society free of charge. The total number of inmates is 230, of which ST amount to 218, SC. 11 and others 1. The total expenditure on these hostels was 41, 3, 876. 58.

Besides these schools and hostels, the Society is maintaining 2 creches financed by Bharatiya Adimjati Sevak Sangh, New Delhi. Out of the total strength of 57, 25 are Bhoksa and 32 are Harijans.

The Society maintains a Bala Kalyana Kendra for Bhoksa Boys at Dhakhi. 41 children were benefitted during the year under report.

Servants of India Society is maintaining two type-writing schools. One at Bazpur and another at Sitarganj, Thirty Trainees took advantage of these schools during the year. The total expenditure was Rs. 16, 105. 70.

The Society is maintaining a Mahila Shilpa Kala Kendra for Bhoksa ladies to give them proper training in tailoring. The total number of beneficiaries was 35. The total income during the period under report was Rs. 4,015/- and total expenditure was Rs. 650/-

Rural Women Training camp :—

The Central Social Welfare Board has sanctioned 3 camps for Rural Women in the Nainital District. These camps were organised in Mazara Bidhi. The total number

of women that took part in the camp was 72 of whom 27 are SC and 45 are ST. The total expenditure on the maintenance of these camps was 14, 047. 36 paise.

P. K. Dwivedi was in charge of the above activities of the Society.

As Managing Trustee of the R manuja Memorial Trust Konhdar, Shri R. S. Misra continued to manage the Ramanauja Intermediate college, Konhdar. The college has over 500 students and produced the best results in the area.

Orissa Branch

Damodar Sahoo was in charge of the Thakkar Bapa Ashram, at Rayagada in the Koraput District of Orissa. The Servants of India Society which started its tribal work in the District 46 years back now runs the Thakkar Bapa Ashram for the ST and SC students at Rayagada.

Thakkar Bapa Upper primary School and four primary schools in rural areas of the Rayagada Tahsil are also managed by the Society. He maintains on behalf of the Society 14 creches with financial assistance from the Bharatiya Admijati Sevak Sangh, New Delhi and the Central Social Welfare Board. The children belong to ST families from Andhra Pradesh and Orissa. All the children are provided with supplementary nutrition, medical care and other facilities as have been provided by the Scheme. Two Balwadi centres are also managed by the Society with financial assistance from State Social Advisory Board. Damodar Sahoo has taken up an International Sponsorship project through the Christian Children's Fund, Bangalore. He has selected 300 children that are backward and helpless to be benefitted under the project.

S. S. Misra supervised the management of the Gokhale Children's Home at Narasannapet which was founded in 1945. This Home has 31 inmates, all of them belonging to Backward Communities. of these inmates five appeared for the S. S. C. examination and three for the 7th class public examination. Vocational Training in tailoring and type-writing is also imparted to some of the inmates. The institution provides the inmates free boarding and Lodging, Soaps, oil, books, medical etc.

Madras Branch

Thakkar Bapa Gurukulam, Nirgacimund is a residential School for Todas and Kotas, tribal children of the Nilgiris in Tamil Nadu. During the year 1984-85 there were 100 tribal boarders in the hostel, 53 Toda and 47 Kota children. They were provided with free meals, books and clothes. The hostel was subsidized by the Harijan Welfare Department of Tamil Nadu. There were 263 children in the middle school attached to Gurukulam with an enrolment of 269 pupils in 1984-85. of women that took part in the camp was 72 of whom 27 are SC and 45 are ST. The total expenditure on the maintenance of these camps was 14, 047. 36 paise.

P. K. Dwivedi was in charge of the above activities of the Society.

As Managing Trustee of the R manuja Memorial Trust Konhdar, Shri R. S. Misra continued to manage the Ramana Intermediate college, Konhdar. The college has over 500 students and produced the best results in the area.

Orissa Branch

Damodar Sahoo was in charge of the Thakkar Bapa Ashram, at Rayagada in the Koraput District of Orissa. The Servants of India Society which started its tribal work in the District 46 years back now runs the Thakkar Bapa Ashram for the ST and SC students at Rayagada.

Thakkar Bapa Upper primary School and four primary schools in rural areas of the Rayagada Tahsil are also managed by the Society. He maintains on behalf of the Society 14 creches with financial assistance from the Bharatiya Admijati Sevak Sangh, New Delhi and the Central Social Welfare Board. The children belong to ST families from Andhra Pradesh and Orissa. All the children are provided with supplementary nutrition, medical care and other facilities as have been provided by the Scheme. Two Balwadi centres are also managed by the Society with financial assistance from State Social Advisory Board. Damodar Sahoo has taken up an International Sponsorship project through the Christian Children's Fund, Bangalore. He has selected 300 children that are backward and helpless to be benefitted under the project.

S. S. Misra supervised the management of the Gokhale Children's Home at Narasannapet which was founded in 1945. This Home has 31 inmates, all of them belonging to Backward Communities. of these inmates five appeared for the S. S. C. examination and three for the 7th class public examination. Vocational Training in tailoring and type-writing is also imparted to some of the inmates. The institution provides the inmates free boarding and Lodging, Soaps, oil, books, medical etc.

Madras Branch

Thakkar Bapa Gurukulam, Nirgacimund is a residential School for Todas and Kotas, tribal children of the Nilgiris in Tamil Nadu. During the year 1984-85 there were 100 tribal boarders in the hostel, 53 Toda and 47 Kota children. They were provided with free meals, books and clothes. The hostel was subsidized by the Harijan Welfare Department of Tamil Nadu. There were 263 children in the middle school attached to Gurukulam with an enrolment of 269 pupils in 1984-85. The school has a staff of 5 trained teachers. Out of them, three were men and two women. The school needs, three more teachers to relieve the burden on other teachers. The total Boarding grant of Rs. 49,959.00 for 1984-85 from Harijan Welfare Department was less by 7,243.44 from boarding expenditure of Rs. 57,202.84. The deficit was met from the Society's funds. The total teacher's grant of Rs. 65,624.85 was against an expenditure of Rs. 66,467.00 leaving a deficit of Rs. 842/- which was met by the Society. The percentage of attendance of pupils in 1984-85 was 89%. The percentage of promotion in 8th standard common examination held in April 1984, was cent percent.

Mrs. Sitalakshmi Sadasiv M. A. was the manager and correspondent of this institution. Mr. S. N Sadasivam, B. A. who is an Associate of the School gave the maximum help to the school. The Deputy Inspectors of schools and many other visiting dignitaries expressed favourable opinion about the management of the School.

The five schools in Kerala, namely Devdhar U. P. School, Nediyruppu, Devdhar L.P. School, Karulai, Devdhar L. P. School, Pulliyil, Gokhale U. P. School, Mudadi and Sastriar U. P. School, chalode situated in the interior of Malapuram and Nilamber forest areas, continued to function under the guidance of Venkataraman satisfactorily as in the past, serving the educational needs of the Backward classes and Mopla Muslims. K. Viswanathan Nair, Society's Attache was in immediate charge of the schools.

Social Work

R. S. Misra, at Allahabad, continued to work as the General Secretary of the All India Seva Samiti till August,

1984. when he was elected one of the Vice-Presidents, of the Samiti.

He was managing two Nursery schools : the Gokhale Nursery School at Katzu Road with 80 children and three teachers. He also managed the Dr. Kunzru Nursery school at P. D. Tandon Road in Allahabad city where there were three hundred children and eight teachers. The creating work centre for women continued to serve the ladies of the town by imparting training in tailoring, cutting, embroidery and knitting. There were 70 students and three teachers. The Rotary sponsored Servindia Homoeopathic Dispensary managed by Mr. Misra attracted a fairly large number of patients during the year. The total number of patients treated at the dispensary was Rs. 5,000

The building of the Working women's Hostel has been completed at a cost of Rs. 16,50,000/-. The hostel has two blocks consisting of 32 rooms. The number of inmates in the Hostel rose from 19 to 32 during the year under report.

S. S. Misra, at Cuttack continued as the Vice-President of the Orissa Branch of the Guild of Service, an organisation in charge of the distribution of sponsorship grants sponsored by the "Save the children Fund" of England, under which 450 children both boys and girls are getting monthly sponsorships ranging from Rs. 110/- to 130/- for the prosecution of their studies. In addition to this the Orissa Branch of the Guild of Service meets the entire management expenses of 5 upper Grade primary schools of the State.

R. G. Kakade at Pune was re-elected Chairman of the Pune District Industrial Co-Operative Association which conductstwo clothshops and aHandicraft Emporium in Pune

and one cloth shop and leather sales Depot. at Baramati established in 1954. It is one of the two or three DICA in the State that is in a prosperous condition.

He is the chairman of the Academy of Education (Higher) and Youth Services. The Academy has published a catalogue of Youth Clubs and Women's Mandals in Pune District. It organised a couple of Seminars in the Dist. of Pune in connection with Youth Services.

The aims and objects of the Academy are organised & it conducts extension work, Research Pertaining to education above S. S. L. C. examination level and youth Welfare Services.

Kakade was re-elected chairman of Pune District probation and Aftercare Association which conducts two Remand Homes for boys, one for girls and child guidance clinic for problematic children.

Kakade continues to be vice-President of the Maharashtra State Probation and After-care Association.

He continued to be a member of the Managing Committee of the Mahila Seva Mandal. He was a member of the Mandal's constitution Amendment Committee which is now completed.

He continued to be a member of the Board of Trustees of the Society for the prevention of Mal-nutrition till September 84, when he resigned the office.

He continues to be a member of the Executive committee of the Navajeevan Mandal which works for the welfare and rehabilitation of released prisoners.

He continued to be a member of the Executive Committee of the David Sassoon Infirm Asylum, established

in 1864. During the year he attended almost all its meetings. The institution has completed a community Hall of its own, costing about Rs. 10 lakhs.

He continued to be the Hon. Secretary of the Society for the welfare of the Physically handicapped at Wanawadi.

Shri S S. Ajgaonkar was a member of the Florence Nightingale village sanitation Fund Committee of the Social Service League, Bombay. From this fund, grants not exceeding Rs. 1000/- are paid to institutions and individuals in rural areas undertaking to do rural sanitation work.

Shri Ajgaonkar continued to be a Member of the Mafatal Gagalbhai Textile Technical Institute supervising committee of the Social service league which provides systematic training to those who are already in the industry. The school is the only one of its kind in the country which imparts theoretical and practical training in textile technology to students without interfering with their jobs in anyway.

Ajgaonkar was actively associated with the N. M. Joshi Social workers Training class of the league which is conducted in the Servants of India Society's Home, Bombay. The class was started in 1925 with a view to equip people for better citizenship by disseminating knowledge of Social theories and Social problems. The course which is of six months duration is held every year from July to January by experts in these subjects and visits to 35 social Welfare Institutions.

Shri Ajgaonkar continued to be the Hon. General Secretary of the Social Service league, one of the oldest Institutions in Bombay. The league conducts among other things, four High Schools, a Textile Training Institute,

six Industrial schools for women, primary and Pre-Primary schools, three libraries, a Gymnasium, a co-operative credit Society, a co-operative Dramatic Association and two dispensaries.

Shri Ajgaonkar was a member of the Health Committee of the Association for Social Health in India (Maharashtra State Branch)

Shri Ajgaonkar was a member of the supervising committee of the Bai Bachubai Kanji charitable Allopathic Dispensary and Ayurvedic Dispensary of the league. Both the dispensaries are located in the league's parcel office and the patients are treated at subsidised rates.

Damodar Sahoo at Choudwar, Orissa looked after a number of Social service units, such as the leprosy clinic at Choudwar, Servindia Destitute Children's Home which maintains 85 children, Ashok Pratap Tailoring School, fourteen creches, Lakhminarayan Pathagar and the Lalit Kala Music College. He also works in close association with other Social work groups such as the Rotary Club.

The Servants of India Society is maintaining 12 creches in Nainital District which are financed by the Bharatiya Adimjati Sevak Sangh. The centres provide nutritions, medicine and playing materials to the infant. A qualified Doctor is also appointed to look after the children. 57 children are taking advantage of the centres. Out of the total of 57 infants, 25 are Bhoksas and 32 are Harijans. The total expenditure on the maintenance of these centres was Rs. 14,907/-.

Dwivedi looked after a Bal Kalyan Kendra for Bhoksa boys at Dhakhi. 41 children were benefitted. The total expenditure incurred was Rs. 4, 900/-.

The Central Social Welfare Board has sanctioned three camps for Rural Women in the Nainital District. The detailed information is given below :—

The total expenditure was Rs. 14,047.36.

The Bureau of Rural Development of the S. I. S. at Sevagram has made a few surveys on the working of total prohibition in Wardha District. A report in English on these surveys was published by P. K. P. Nair during the last year. A Hindi translation of the report was published during the current year. A number of periodicals carried the summary of the Hindi version. Five creches under the supervision of R. V. Neve were functioning in three different places. 125 children were being looked after during the Day.

The Goat farm has been continued for unemployed Leprosy Patients. This is a successful experiment for increase in wool production and weight increment of the goats through cross breeding. He was helping in rehabilitation of Leprosy patients of Tapovan, and Amravati. Handloom section in Shendurjana Bazar is functioning smoothly.

M. M. Dhanore in Marathawada Region of Maharashtra conducted 15 non-formal education centres in Deont area of Latur District. He started two Handicapped training centres by financial help of Aurangabad Dhir and Latur District, which were affected by drought. He dug three

wells on 2 nalabunding work. 170 drought-affected labour are being benefitted by the scheme.

Mr. Dhanore looked after the Co-operative brick manufacturing Society at Daulatabad which he formed in 1984.

RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Bazpur Centre

In order to enhance the earning capacity of the villagers, P. K. Dwivedi has taken up a programme for the development of fishing, sericulture and bee-keeping. Demonstration farms for the purpose have been established in the premises of the Bhoksa Boys Hostel at Bazpur. The total income from these farms was only Rs. 3,000/-.

Sadhu Charan Durry and Carpet Weaving centre at Choudwar, Cuttack district, Orissa.

Damodar Sahoo has a production unit for Durry and carpets at Choudwar. He has collected raw materials worth about Rs. 15,000/- for the purpose.

Bureau of Rural Development, Sevagram Wardha District.

P. K. P. Nair was in charge of the Bureau of Rural Development establishment by S. I. S. at Sevagram. During the current year, 2 people each from three villages were given training by the centre in weaving. The centre manages spinning in terr villages. The rural workshop at Sevagram undertakes welding, rewinding, servicing and repair of agricultural implements. The marketing centre of the Bureau undertakes the sale of Khadi and village

industries products like Ghani oil, soaps and handicrafts. The sales during the current year were a little over one and half lakhs of Rupees.

The Bureau maintains Amber Charkha Centres in five villages. Productions in these centres has been falling because of the lower remuneration earned by the women operating Amber Charkhas, compared to rising agricultural wages. Since 1985, the piece-wage rates for spinning were increased from 30 paise to 40 paise per hank and production is picking up. A woman could spin about 16 to 20 hanks a day.

The Bureau has initiated a dairy development survey with a view to assessing the real cost of production of dairy items and for purposes of documentation.

With financial assistance for recurring expenses from PADI, horticultural training programme has been started. The land of the Ashram Pratisthan was used for the purpose. Non-recurring expenditure could be met from Ashram pratisthan whose land will be benefitted from the programme.

Shendurjana Bazar Centre in Amravati District.

The Centre which was opened by the Society forty seven years ago, continued to function actively under R. V. Neve. During the year, Neve started a goat farm for the rehabilitation of cured Leprosy patients. Experiments were conducted for increasing wool production through cross-breeding.

The handloom section of the centre had to be closed down in January-February 1984 on account of lack of demand for the finished products. Production was resumed in March 1984 and the section is thereafter functioning smoothly.

The Staff participated in several Seminars and worked on Committees of Central/State Governments, University Grants Commission.

Professor N. Rath was elected as the President for the 45th Annual Conference of the Indian Society of Agricultural Economics to be held at Vallabh Vidyanagar in December 1985; was co-opted again as a member of the Governing Board of the National Institute of Bank Management, Bombay for a three year term commencing from 24th September 1984; was elected as a Vice-President of the Poona Divisional Productivity Council for the year 1984-85 ; served as Expert on the U. S. Educational Foundation Panel for Post-doctoral grants for the academic year 1984-85.

Prof. A. S. Nadkarni : was invited by the Government of Maharashtra to work on the 'Panchayat Raj Evaluation Committee' ; Member, Planning Board, Government of Goa, Daman and Diu.

During the year under report in the UGC's scheme for award of fellowships to college teachers, 6 teachers were awarded fellowships to work on their M. Phil. degree. Besides 7 other teacher fellows

(including 2 in Sociology) continued to work at the Institute under the UGC's Teacher Fellowships Programme on their Ph. D. theses.

In the M. Phil. programme in Economics there were 10 students and 6 teacher fellows this year. From the year 1984-85 the UGC has started holding all-India test for award of Junior Research Fellowships. From among our M. Phil. students who took the test, 2 M. Phil. students qualified in the UGC test and have been awarded Junior Research Fellowship. Among those who completed the M. Phil. training programme in previous years, 8 were awarded the M. Phil. degree in Economics of the University of Poona.

The following Professors and Scholars worked at/visited the Institute during the year under report.

1. Professor J. S. Uppal, Professor of Economics, State University of New York at Albany, New York, U. S. A., worked as a Visiting Professor for about 2 months from 25th June 1984 under the Senior Research Fellowship from the National Science Foundation, the American Institute of Indian Studies, New Delhi, in connection with updating of the data for his book.

2. Professor Samuel S. Lieberman, Associate, Centre for Policy Studies, The Population Council, New York, continued to work at the Institute as a Visiting Scholar, up to 10th April 1984 in connection with the research project 'Issues of Rural Development and Employment Generation ; A Case Study of Maharashtra'.
