## INTRODUCTORY NOTE

1. Scope of the Returns.-The annual Statement of the Foreign Sea-borne Trade of British India is divided into and published in two volumes:-Volyme I contains the abstract and detailed tables of imports and exports, and Volume II the abstract and detailed tables of trade and shipping with each country, and at each port, together with the tables relating to the trade of Aden and of the French and the Portuguese Possessions in India.
2. Nature of the Trade recorded.-The trade dealt with in the Sea-borne Trade Accounts is the trade registered at British Indian ports between these ports and foreign countries for the fiscal year ending the 31stomarch. The foreign trade of ports in Indian States is small, owing to the absence of large harbours suitable for ocean-going steamers and to the prohibition of direct transhipment at British ports. The trade registered at British Indian ports can hardly be said to be that of the British Indian portion of the dependency only, that is, of the portion directly under British administration; it is rather the trade of the whole of India and Burma, including the Indian States. The trade of the French and the Portuguese Possessions in India is, as stated above, recorded in Volume II.
3. Statistical year.-All tables in this volume cover the five official years, April to March, 1919-20 to 1923-2t, except table 24 which shows by countries the share of each maritime province in the imports and exports of treasure during the year 1923-24.
4. Adoption of Rupee notation.-From 1921-22 the value figures are exhibited throughout this volume in Rupees. The change of notation from Rupees into pounds sterling was introduced in the Supplement to the Annual Statement for 1907-08 to 1910-11 and was adopted in the Annual Statement itself in the issues from 1911-12 to 1920-21.
5. Abstract Tables.-The summary Tables in this volume show, first (tables 1 and 2), the total value of imports and of exports as a whole, and secondly (tables 3 to 6 ), the total value of the imports, exports, and re-exports of the principal articles, classified in groups under the following five main heads :-
I. Food, Drink, and Tobacco,
II. Raw Materials and Produce and Articles mainly Unmanufactured,
III. Articles Wholly or Mainly Manufactured,
IV. Living Animals, and
V. $\left\{\begin{array}{l}\text { Postal Articles not specified (under Imports), } \\ \text { Postal Articles (under Exports). }\end{array}\right.$
(The system of classification of articles has undergone revision and the revised classification according to the five heads, mentioned above, has been introduced with effect from lst April, 1922, in the trade accounts of British India and. adopted in the summary tables of this volume.)

Imports from and exports to British Dominions and Possessions* are distinguished from those from and to Foreign Countries, and exports are divided, as in all the tables of the Annual Statement, into "Exports of Indian merchandise" and "Re-exports of British and Foreign merchandise." The term "Indian merchandise" comprises all goods which are the growth, produce, or manufacture of India. Indian merchandise is distinguished from British and Foreign merchandise in the declaration of shippers made in the shipping bills from which trade statistics are compiled. Appendix B to this volume, showing the classification of these tables, indicates the articles which are included in each group.

Tables 7 to 9 show the total value of imports, exports, and re-exports from and to each principal country, and Tables 10 to 12 the total imports, exports, and

[^1]re-exports of the principal articles. The articles are arranged in alphabetical order, provision being made for grouping together within the alphabetical order such articles as are related industrially or commercially. Certain articles are recorded by value only, but in most cases both the quantities and values are recorded.
6. Detailed Tables.-Table 13 shows the quantity and value of imports of articles, both dutiable and free, from the principal and other countries of consignment and the shares of the maritime provinces. The arrangement of the articles is the same as in the abstract tables 10 to 12 .

Tables 14 and 15 show in the same order the exports to the principal and other countries of articles of Indian merchandise and of British and Foreign merchandise, respectively.

The trade in each article with each country is recorded separately in these tables when its value is $\mathrm{Rl}, 000$ or more. If the value of the trade with any country in any particular article is less than $\mathrm{Rl} 1,000$, it is generally grouped under one of the heads-"Other British Possessions" or "Other Foreign Countries."

Government Stores.-Imports and exports of Government stores are separately recorded.

Tables 16, 17, and 18 show the quantity and value of imports, exports, and re-exports of Government stores. The values of Government stores imported during 1922-23 and the preceding two years have been re-calculated on the basis of the average rate of exchange for each year. The accounts of goods exported do not include goods bought by Government and shipped on Government or chartered vessels.

Treasure.-Imports and exports of gold and silver coin and bullion are also recorded separately and are not included in the tables relating to merchandise. The transactions in issued currency notes are, with effect from April, 1922, registered separately under treasure.

Tables 19 to 24 show the imports and exports of gold and silver coin and bullion and of currency notes from and to each country. Bullion, coin and currency notes are excluded from all general tables of imports and exports.
7. Explanation of Imports and Exports.-The tables relating to imports refer to goods landed, whether they are intended for home consumption, bonding, or reexportation. Goods landed and afterwards re-exported are therefore included under " imports," even though imported on a through bill of lading, unless they are removed under bond from the importing to the exporting ships at the same or another port (when they are omitted from the general tables of imports and re-exports) because the accounts exclude transhipment trade at ports. Goods are seldom imported or exported to be improved, and the "improvement" trade, such as is recognised in the statistics of some Continental countries, is not distinguished.

Transhipment Trade.-Indian ports, it may be noted, are not transhipment centres for foreign countries to any considerable extent, and the trade returns accordingly take no account of merchandise transhipped.

Passengers' baggage.-Imports of dutiable baggage are included in the trade statistics but not those of free baggage.

Ship's Stores.-Imports of ship's stores on which duty is paid and exports on which drawback is claimed are also registered.

Parcel Post.-Imports from and Exports to Foreign Countries by Parcel Post are included in the returns, but with certain exceptions the contents of foreign registered letters received and despatched are not recorded either for imports or exports. Imports by parcel post of goods, whether dutiable or not, are not classified according to their nature, with the exception of the items noted in the following paragraph, but are separately recorded at the end of the tables and are entered by value only. Exports by parcel post are treated in the same way as imports by parcel post.

From April, 1922, imports by post including. letter packets (registered and ordinary post) referred to Collectors of Customs for assessment, of jewellery, precious stones, gold• and silver thread, cigarettes, and cinematograph films are included with their appropriate heads and subheads in the import trado
returns. The statistics for 1922-23 and 1923-2t are therefore not comparable with those of the preceding years.
8. Countries to which Imports and Exports are credited.-Throughout the tables in this volume Imports are classified as received from the countries whence they were consigned to British India, and not, as in the corresponding volumes for 1910-11 and earlier years, as received from the countries whence they were shipped direct to India. The countries of consignment are the countries from -which the goods have come, whether by land and sea or by sea only, without inter ruption of transit save in the course of transhipment or transfer from one means of conveyance to another.

The countries whence goods are consigned are not in all cases the countries of actual origin or in the case of manutactured goods the countries in which the processes of manufacture were conducted or completed, since goods produced in one country may be purchased by a firm in another country and thence despatched, after a longer or shorter interval, to India. In such a case the second country would be the country of consignment, to which the goods would be cre:lited in these tables.

The substitution of countries of consignment for countries of shipment affects the imports from countries which have no seaboard* (separately distinguished in the tables of this volume). The recorded imports from such countries as Belgium, the Netherlands, Germany, Austria and Hungary are largely affected by this change. These countries were formerly credited in the returns with the exports from countries which did not possess a seaboard, such as Switzerland, or which did not always export their goods from their own ports but from tbose of a neighbering country.

Exports are credited in the tables to the country of final destination, i.e., the country to which they are consigned, whether that country possesses a seaboard or not, and not, as before, to the country containing the port of discharge as declared by the exporter in the shipping bills, whether carricd there direct or after transhipment. The country of final destination is the country to which goods exported from India are intended to pass, whether by sea and land or by sea only, without interruption of transit save in the course of transhipment or transfer from one means of conveyance to another.

As in the case of imports, this classification differs from that adopted in the corresponding volumes for 1910-11 and earlier years, the countries affected being (I) those without a seaboard, which previously did not appear in the tables, and (2) those countries through which goods consigned to countries without a seaboard were shipped.

A supplementary volume was issued in each of the years 1907-08 to 1910-11 inclusive. These supplementary volumes contained a classification of Imports and Exports on the system which was adopted in Volumes I and II for 1911-12 and subsequent years, imports being credited to countries whence consigned and exports to countries of final destination. For the four years, 1907-08 to 1910-11, the results of both methods are available for comparison.

In all tables of Volumes I and II where trade is shown according to countries, the countries included in the British Empire have been grouped separately from Foreign Countries, excepting in tables 4 to 7, 10, and 13 of Volume II, where geographical arrangement within the Continent is followed.
9. Method of ascertaining Quantities and Values of Imports and Exports.The statements of both quantities and values are based on the declarations of importers in Bills of Entry and of exporters in Shipping Bills as subsequently checked by the Customs officials. The quantities are not recorded in every case, but where goods are entered by waight, the quantities given represent the net weight exclusive of packages, sacks, casks, tins, bottles, etc., in which they may be coutained ur of reels on which they may be wound. In certain cases, number, gallon, or yard is the denomination employed. Piece-goods are shown by linear yards, oil-cloth and floor-cloth by square yards, and liquors and oils generally by gallons. When weight is the prescribed denomination, different units (tons, ewts, lbs, and ozs) arespecified according to the nature or various articles and the different trade practice. According to the provisions of

the Indian Sea Customs Act, VIII of 1878 (Section 30), the values of goods imported or exported are based on wholesale market prices, and represent-
(a) the wholesale casp price, less trade discount, for which goods of the like kind and quality are sold, or are capable of being sold, at the time and place of importation or exportation, as the case may be, without any abatement or deduction whatever, except (in the case of goods imported) of the amount of the duties payable on the importation thereof; or
(b) where such price is not ascertainable, the cost at which goods of the like kind and quality could be delivered at such place without any abatement or deduction, except as aforesaid.
In the tables of Imports and Exports of Treasure the weight of gold has, from April, 1921, been shown in ' fine ounces' and that of silver in 'standard ounces,' the latter meaning the British Standard ( $\frac{3}{4} \frac{7}{0}$ fine) ; while the value of both gold and silver imported and exported, whether on private or on Government account, represents the market value at the time and place of import or export, except in the case of Government of India rupees of which the face value is shown. The practice before April, 1921, was not uniform at all the ports.
10. Unenumerated goods.-Unenumerated goods, i.e., goods not separately specified, are divided into " Unmanufactured " and "Manufactured " (Classes II Group $S$ and III Group $V$ respectively) and are placed in the tables of imports and exports after all other goods recorded. These goods are entered by value only.
11. Charts.-Charts are annexed to illustrate (1) the variations in the total imports and exports of merchandise and in the net imports of treasure, and also $i^{6}$ ) the variations of principal articles in the import and export trade.
12. List of Countries. - A complete list of all the countries, the trade with which is separately recorded, is shown in Appendix C. This list has been revised in accordance with the territorial re-adjustments brought about by the War, and introduced in the Sea-borne Trade returns of British India with effect from April, 1921, affecting countries shown throughout this volume as follows, viz. :-
"Russia" no longer includes Finland, Esthonia, Latvia, Lithuania. and the part of Poland formerly Russian Territory;
"Denmark" includes a part of Slesvig formerly German;
"Germany" no longer includes Memel, Dantzig, the part of Poland formerly German, and Luxemburg ;
"Austria" and "Hungary," as newly constituted, are now shown separately. Fiume, Czechoslovakia and part of the Serb-Croat-Slovene State are no longer included therein;
" Greece" includes the parts of "Turkey, European" ceded to her ;
"Turkey, European," is now practically represented by Constantinople only ;
"Turkey, Asiatic," no longer includes Syria, Palestine, Armenia, and Mesopotamia.
"Tanganyika Territory" was formerly included in " German East Africa."
13. Index.-An index to the articles alphabetically arranged, specified in the tables of Imports, Exports, and Re-exports, is given at the end of the volume.
14. Calendar Year Accounts.-The particulars of the import and export trade of British India in principal articles for the calendar year are also published annually.
