It must be frankly confessed that such an enormous delay in the publication of the report of the Congress Session held in December 1919 is simply inexcusable. It ought to have been in the hands of the delegates long ago. I don't wish to offer any excuse because I don't think that would be fair. It is quite true that very adverse circumstances had to be combated and many unforseen calamaties had to be confronted. To add to the already heavy list of difficulties, the energetic and zealous general Secretary Lala Girdharilal is in jail for the last whole year. This has been one of the great hindrances in the early publication of the report. And then the balance sheet could not be prepared soon. As it would be evident from the perusual of the accounts the affair of Messes. Bond Brothers remains unsettled They have filed as a suit agaist the Reception Committee and as the case is sub judice no comments. are permissable but I must say that all attempts at arriving a fair compromise or proper understanding have failed uptill now even inspite of the efforts of the best and worthiest of our leaders. The intricacy of this problem has also handicapped us in publishing the report. All the same I still feel that we are to be blamed for this unreasonable delay in publishing the report and I offer sincere apologies for this neglect of duty.

I feel that it is now quite unnecessary that I should detail the circumstances in which the Congress was held at Amritsar. The events are more or less now a household property. There would be bardly an Indian worth the name who does not know of the events dismal and dark that took place in the Punjab in that year. The Amritsaries were busy with their preparations for a gigantic task the like of which they had never performed when all of a sudden the repression mill was set working and the Deferce of India Act was freely used to gag the mouths of public workers. This even was not considered sufficient by the well known Sir Michael O'Dwyer and Doctors Satyapal and Kitchlew were deported and then followed a series of events with the history of which every body in India is familiar.- The Jallianwala Bagh Massacre, the Martial Law regime, the buge atrocities perpetrated by the Police and Military are too well known to need any detailed description. Amritsar was practically paralysed and the public activities were entirely suspended. People were losing heart and the idea of holding the Congress Session in Amritsar was nearly abardened. No body dared to publicly express it or work for it. Had it not been for the immense help Pandits Malaviya and Nehru and their worthy associates the Punjab received at thier hands during that catastrophe it would have been certainly impossible to be able to hold the Session in Amritsar. Events may come and go but it is a more truism when I say- that the Punjab can never sufficiently thank these noble patriots who at the sacrifice of their time, energy and money and even at the risk of their personal liberty, helped the afflicted and terror-stricken Punjabees with a devotion all their own. The real credit of holding the session in Amritsar is theirs. But they alone could not have succeeded had they not been supported by the citizens of Amritsar specially merchants and lawyers. It is true that one or two "interested mis guided youths of Amritsar set up the idea of postponing the session to be held at Amritsar but the whole town stood up in a body against that and the result was that a very grand and highly successful session was held.

The release of some of the prominent arrested, convicted and interned leaders and Congress workers just on the eve of the holding of the session was a source of great delight and enthusiasm. The number and grandeur of processions of the various leaders exceeded all that had ever happened before in connection with any Congress Session.

The resolutions passed are as usual important through some of them have now only a historic importance. How quickly time moves is well evidenced by the change in the policy of the Congress within last 3 years. It was in 1919 at Amritsar that Mahatma Gandhi insisted on thanks for Mr. Montagu and using Reforms, working them sincerely for the betterment of the Government of the country and it was he who about 8 months after that launched the programme of Non-Co-operation. Now again there is a talk of going into the councils in order to mend them or end them.

Times have considerably changed and it is quite possible that the proceedings of the session held in 1919 may appear stale and inspid but as this document is a necessary link in the political history of India I expect that it shall be read with attention and care. I once sgain offer apologies for the delay in the hope that they shall be accepted.

# The Indian National Congress,

### AMRITSAR.

34тн SESSION.

#### FIRST DAY'S PROCEEDINGS,

#### (27th December 1919.).

Amidst scenes of enthusiasm the thirty-fourth session of the Indian National Congress commenced at 2-20 p. m. on Saturday the 27th December 1919 at the pandal in the Aitchison Park opposite the railway lines. The pandal was absolutely overcrowded hours before the session began, and overflow meetings had to be held outside. From an early hour in the morning very large crowds were collected outside the pandal and as soon as the gates were thrown open on completion of arrangements inside, there was a rush into the pandal. At one end of the circle was the platform for the President and leaders of the Congress and the ground was sloped up higher and higer towards the boundaries. Portraits of Their Majesties the King and the Queen were hung up at both ends of the pandal.

• Shortly after 10 o'clock the leaders began arriving one by one. Mr. Tilak and Mr. Gandhi as they came in had a warm reception and Hakim Ajinal Khan was lustily cheered and garlanded and compelled to climb up the rostrum and bowed his acknowledgments. A remarkable demonstration was reserved for the Punjab leaders released from jail. They came up almost in a body amidst thundering cheers and shouts of 'jai', and they had one after another to bow their acknowledgments. Eventually they were made the objects of demonstration for about half an hour. The pandal had by now been completely crowded and it was with great difficulty that leaders found their way inside.

One interesting feature of the sessions was the large number of ladies who were present as delegates and members of the Reception Committee.

By 12 o'clock the pandal was practically over-crowded, and it was with difficulty that people who believe in punctuality and came later could push their way inside. Although the Reception Committee had erected a large pandal to accommodate about twelve thousand people, they had never bargained for such a large attendance. No less than sixteen thousand people must have managed to squeeze inside by the time the session opened, and the thought that the congress platform was the only place where all released men could be seen together for the first time increased attendance inside the Hall. The result was that some of the ceremonials with which the opening of the Congress sessions is characterised had to be practically abandoned.

The Congress leaders began arriving in singles and twos shortly after 10 o'clock and were accorded a warm reception, Messrs. Gandhi, Tilak, Babu Bepinchandra Pal and Hakim Ajmal Khan were particularly cheered, but nothing equalled the reception accorded to Dr. Kitchlew, Dr. Satya Pal, Lala Harkishenlal, Pundit Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry and other released leaders. They were brought on platform and garlanded and were made the objects of prolonged demonstration. They were embraced by many on the platform and garlanded over and over again.

Among those who were present on the platform were :--Pundit M. M. Malaviya, Mr. Tilak, Mr. Gandhi, Mrs. Besant, Mr. Jinnah, Mr. and Mrs. Hasan Imam, Raja of Mahmudabad, Mr. B. Chakravarty, Messrs. C. R. Dass, C. P. Ramswami Iyer. Sir Dinshaw Petit, Messrs. S. R. Bomanji, K Natarajan, G. K. Devadhar, Srinivasa Sastri, Kasturiranga Iyengar, Vijayaraghavachariar, V. P. Madhav Rao, K. V. Rangaswami Iyengar, A. Rangaswami Iyenger, the released Punjab leaders, Mr. Neville, the Solicitor, and a large number of others.

The President-Elect's procession into the hall was abandoned owing to the difficulty of securing a passage. The congress session was announced to begin at 1 o'clock but it could not actually commence till a quarter past two. The pandal was by this time practically full to suffocation, and as there was confusion and noise for want of even standing room and it was found impracticable to begin the proceedings, Pundit Jagannath of Amritsar announced in Urdu'that Mahatma Gandhi, Dr. Kitchlew and Pundit Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry would address an overflow meeting outside the pandal, and advised those who were standing in the pandal for want of accommodation , to go and listen to the speakers outside at the overflow meeting.

Babu Bepinchandra Pal then stepped into the rostrum to make an announcement in English. He was accorded an ovation and amidst some confusion and noise, he said:—

Ladies and Gentlemen, I am not going to make any speech. The proceedings have not yet commenced, but it is the wish of the organisers, in order to meet your convenience, to have an overflow meeting, outside the pandal, and in that overflow meeting Mr. Gandhi, Dr. Kitchlew and Pundit Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry and others will address. I daresay you will find it more convenient to go there than to crowd in this hall and make a confusion making the proceedings more or less difficult. (Applause).

The Hon. Pundit Motilal Nehru, the president-elect, came in after 2 o'clock escorted by Swami Shradhananda, Chairman of the Reception Committee and a number of other leaders and volunteers. A start was made at about 2-20 p.m.

The proceedings began shortly after the President's arrival with a welcome song sung by some ladies led by Mrs. Sarladevi Choudhrani. This done, Swami Shradhananda read his adress of welcome as Chairman of the Reception Committee in Hindi which ran as follows:--

### Chairman's Address of welcome.

Swami Shradhananda, Chairman of the Reception Committee of the Indian National Congress, in welcoming the Delegates made an interesting speech in Hindi, of which the following is the translation.

"Om, tvam hi nah pita vaso tvam mata Sahatakra to habhuvithah; Adhate Sumnimahe."

O Support of all this creation, Thou art our Protector and Father, Thou art the Mother that secures self-respect for us; So we all call Thee to this holy sacrifice. O Thou Ruler of all rulers, and the Highest Refuge of all nations! bestow on this National Pandal to-day Thy firm Justice and unbounded Love, so that all sisters and brethren be inspired, and fearing neither the sentient nor the non-sentient creation, may pour down in this. National Yajna the oblations of Justice and Love, and thus lead it to a successful end.

#### DAUGHTERS AND SONS OF BHARATMATA.

On behalf of the Reception Committee, Amritsar, I extend a hearty welcome to you all. The gentlemen, who went down to Delhi and invited the bright ornaments of society who constitute this National Congress; who set about working for your reception immediately on their return from Delhi; who drank deep of the devotion to, and love of, the motherland, and worked day and night inspired with the one noble resolve of serving their country; who laid the foundation of Hindu-Mohammadan fraternity-a veritable confluence of the Ganges and the Jumna-on the sacred festival of Rama Navami, and thus turned this city already sanctified by the Sikh Gurus into a real reservoir of nectar; vanished from the scene on April 10th through the action of awe-stricken authority divested of all sense of justice. This cruel separation from their leaders on the one hand, and the arrest of that deified Being to worship and honour whom the mental vow of Satyagraha was taken, on the other, actually blinded the multitudes of Amritsar. The subjects, in accordance with their deeply cherished traditions, ran forth to lay their grievances before the chief authority of the town-their mai bap bare-But the authority trembled under some inborn headed and bare-footed. fear. He acknowledges that he had sent for military forces, and had given them distinct orders that if any mob-the same which looked upon him as the true mai bap,-were to make an attempt to approach his bungalow, it was to be prevented from doing so in whatsoever way it could be done. Like an offended child the simple-minded, unarmed people of the town tried to rush forward, but the representative of their father-King Emperor George Vgreeted them with a volley of bullets. The sight of their wounded and fallen innocent relatives and friends infuriated the mob. But all glory to those brave people, who, although disillusioned by this ruthless violation of their fond hopes, which prompted them to approach the authority of the town, did not lose heart, and picked up the dead and wounded on the one hand, and tried to pacify the mob on the other. Justice and truth loving 'deities are still pouring down flowers of sympathy and approval on the But the common run of people got benighted heads of these herces.

infuriated and lost the balance of their mind. The demoniac deeds, which they perpetrated in this state of madness, are a dark spot on the fair name of the Indian nation. The entire Punjab suffered in expiation of this very sin. Had Saraswati-the goddees of learning and wisdom—also joind the above confluence of the Ganges and the Jumna it would have become a pure Paryag. The unity of the Hindu, Mohammadan, Christian would have driven out all differences and the foundation of a truly United British Empire would have gone down deep to the very *Patala*. But where selfishness reigns supreme on all sides how could unselfishness shine forth. Orderliness gave place to disorder, and peace made room for a reign of terror. Martial Law rendered all men and women, young and old, lifeless. Every one was simply thunderstruck on getting news of the cruel bloodshed on the sacred day of the Baisakha Sankranti, Martial Law, however, prevailed and there was quietthe quiet of cremation ground and the graveyard—the silence of Death.

This silence prevailed quite up to June 29th, 1919, when I with two prominent leaders of India—the acknowledged friends of the Punjab, entered this seat of nectar, which was then in a state of stupor as the effect of the infused poison,—I mean the Honorable Pandit Malaviya and Pandit Moti Lal Nehru.

#### APPEARANCE OF LIFE AGAIN.

Life began to throb in this city immediately these two leaders had visited the sacred Jalianwala Bagh and inculcated the immortal doctrine of patience and fearlessness. It asserted itself first of all in reminding the people of this place of the invitation that had been extended to the Indian National Congress, and they said that the next session must be held at Amritsar. How this idea permeated the entire town, how efforts were made to stifle it and how inspite of these efforts it grew with redoubled force every day, need not be mentioned here. Amritsar people worked and succeeded. To-day the cherished desire of their heart is fulfilled, and I am afforded the privilege of according welcome to all true sons of the Motherland, who are devoted to her service.

#### A SANYASI'S PLEDGE.

In the history of the Congress this is perhaps the first occasion when a Sanyasi stands on its elevated platform. From the very day that I was selected as the Chairman of the Reception Committee the question is being asked 'Can a Sany asi take part in political agitation consistently with his vow?' My answer is quite simple. The day I entered this sacred stage of life I took up the vow of looking upon this entire creation as my family, and its entire wealth as one common store. I pledged myself to a life of service and social helpfulness unminded by any pandering to popular estimation. It is not for political agitation but for something higher that I stand here. The first reason can be stated thus. It was the joint command of the heroes like Harkishan Lal, Duni Chand, Rambhaj Datta, Kitchlew and Satyapal,-who, in their anxiety to save the fair name of this land from blot cared little for the sentences of death and transportation for life passed on them, and being perfectly innocent looked upon a petition for mercy as a sin, and thus raised the unhallowed dirty cells of the prisons to the exalted position of Kashi and Kaaba by their elevating presence, that I should accept the chairmanship of the Reception Committee. The same

command fell from the lips of the faithful Chaudhri Bugga, and the brave man Ratto, as I visited their cruel blood-stained hovels in the jail. And again the wives of these heroes begged the same of me who was a beggar Sanyasi, saying that the souls of these heroes will find no rest until and unless they were assured that the next session of the Congress would be held in Amritsar, and I had to yield and accept the chairmanship of the Reception Committee.

The second reason why I am here is the prompting of duties of my present stage of life. The institutions like the Sanatana Dharma Sabhas and Arya Samajes, that are founded for the preservation and propagation of the Sanatana Vedic Dharma, have enquired what a Sanyasi has to do with politics, I answer and say The Veda orders me to live a hundred years of active life, but of course in a way that I do not get attached to any of those activities.'

Poet Tulsi Das is true when he says: 'action is predominent in the entire creation.' Every being has to do its duty. So far this National Assembly has confined its energies merely to the political domain, but now it has to rise up to its highest duty, and brothers and sisters! we also have to rise along with it. The miseries that the Punjab has suffered teach us in a thousand ways that the highest of human privileges cannot be obtained without deep suffering and penance.

#### MY POLITICAL CREED.

These are not the days of policies and patched-up treaties and compromises. It is time now to uphold truth firmly and fearlessly. A Sannyasi has no concern with institutions whether religious or political. He takes up the vow of serving the entire creation. How can he be connected with any one institution. This very thought has perhaps been expressed by the Persian poet in the words:---

Na Hindu am na Musalman, na Gabram na Yahud.

'I am neither a Hindu, nor a Mohammadan.'

'I am neither a Christian nor a Jew.'

So I also say, 'I am neither a moderate,' nor an 'extrimist,' nor again a 'home-ruler.' I do not subscribe to any particular creed, and yet I do not agree with the second line of the same poet, where he says, 'I wonder what my end would be'? For my happiness rests on faith, and I feel sure that I shall have a happy end along with the progeny of my beloved motherland.

#### DO NOT DABBLE IN POLITICS.

A political saint has advised me to concern myself merely with religious and social works, and not to dabble in politics. I repudiate this advice thus. At a time when even the birds trembled to land on this soil of the Punjab, for fear of scorching their wings, this Sannaysi regarded it his duty to join hands with the political leaders to once more revive the faded hearts of the Punjabis with sympathy and love. Now that the patriotic men of this land have once again taken up their work, and the workers for this 34 years old National assembly have accepted the Punjab also as their own I will hand over the charge of the entire work to those who are best fitted to hold it, and retire with the consciousness of having done my duty.

### MARTIAL LAW THANKED.

Sisters and brothers, I extend a hearty welcome to you all from the Punjab in general and the inhabitants of this town in particular. I know and fully realise that we are unable to serve you in an adequate way, for the Martial Law spared no efforts to rob this city of its riches and wealth. energy and strength. But there is one emotion which even the cruelties of the Martial Law could not suppress. It is the love of the motherland, and a true affection for her sons. That I offer to you. In fact this emotion has been so strengthened that it would not be improper if we can in some wise make up our minds to offer our thanks to the originator of the Martial Law-Sir Michael O'Dwyer, and his two strong supporters, viz. General Dyer and Col. Frank Johnson. Perhaps it was with this idea in their minds that some people called cut ' Martial Law ki jai' before Col. Frank Johnson. The doses of Martial Law, which Lt. Col. Frank Johnson and General Dyer administered to the Panjab, have, instead of casting it 50 years behind, stimulated its political activity so far that now having as if bridged over a number of years it stands abreast of the other more advanced provinces. Where the idea of political unity and its privileges were known only to a handful among the educated, in that very soil of the Punjab even the remotest and the most unknown villages are now replete with a knowledge of the aims and strength of this National Assembly-nay even the ladies are evincing considerable interest in the movement. The letters that I have received from different villages during the last 15 days, and the remarkable change that I noticed in every sister and brother of the villages I visited, convince me that the nation is now fully awake.

Just now every string of the lute of this motherland is in tune. All of them sound the same note. Is it not time then to stifle the discordant notes of political party spirit in this welcome harmony of the followers of different faiths? Moderates, Liberals and Extremist, Radicals, Home-rulers of Maharashtra as well as those of Adyar and their various sections all profess to work for the same goal. It is said that they all aim at securing self-Government for their motherland and raising her to a position of equality in international relations with other countries. Then why should they hate each other so much? A man seldom perceives his own shortcomings. It is certainly the case when two men take up two different sides and begin to discuss. They are naturally biassed against each other. But a third neutral person can easily point out the shortcomings of either. I need no apology for giving credit to truth and I lay down my views openly.

#### THE POLITICAL SPLIT.

Mr. Montagu's Reform Scheme is pointed out as the main source of this present political split. The Moderates urged that they would join the others if the latter were prepared to accept the Reform Scheme, Here one naturally asked them if they would be satisfied with only this change. They answered and said 'No. It is one thing to accept what is given to us, and then to ask for more, and quite another to reject as unacceptable even what is given '. This was a legitimate reply from the Moderates, but even the

extremists now subscribe to this view. Now even Lokmanya Tilakisays, 'accept what is given now, and keep up an agitation for getting more'. Then where lies the difference? Both appear to say the same thing. The Moderates affirm, 'we have not receded from our position, the Extremists have changed their views. They have come up to us, so it should be acknowledged that we have scored a victory.' The Extremists say, 'The Moderates were for accepting whatever was offered, without any question. Now they are rising up to our position, and so must acknowledge defeat.' The reasons of either side have been published in newspapers and I need not repeat them here. The plain fact is that neither of them is ready to admit defeat. Both stand firm in their respective positions. The Moderates contend that the Secretary of State for India was impressed with the moderation of their proposals, and has therefore conferred some extended rights on us. The Extremists can well answer this contention saying, 'Had we not agitated for full 'swaraj' even this much could not have been granted to us. ' They can urge the following, Panjabi proverb in their support;-

"Condem a man to death and he will willingly accept suffering." But Mr. Montagu is putting forward quite a distinct view. In the course of his speech on the Reforms Scheme in the House of Commons he said in answer to a question by Mr. Spoor, 'Neither the commons are introducing these changes in the system of Indian Government on account of the agitation in India, nor do they believe that this agitation would continue.' He further added, 'agitation will not hasten the transference of power, but it might delay it.'

There are three parties, and their views go against one another. The view of every party is true in its own estimation. If the Moderates had supported the proposals of Mr. Montagu, they would have found it difficult to refute the arguments of the opposers of the Reform Scheme. But did not Mr. Bonar Law advance it as an argument for the speedy adoption of the Reforme Bill, that this one grievance of the Indian National Congress be removed before its next session. Mr. Montagu is also true, for it is with the help of his firm resolve that he has been able to move the British parliament to confer these extended rights on the Indians. The Moderates and the Extremists served him merely as pawns for his moves on the political chessboard.

#### A SETTLEMENT.

Such being the state of affairs, what is the quarrel about? Like the Pathans in old time both are patting their own backs, while the tenemies of the country simply laugh at them. How can this baneful conflict be got rid of? Reform Scheme is no longer open to dispute. Its acceptance by the Moderates and rejection by the Extremists are both worthlese boasts. Good or bad, complete or incomplete, the Reform Scheme is now a law for us. Of course, the Moderates would accept it, but I ask the Extremists what they mean by rejecting it. Are you prepared to boycott it completely? Would you not make as effort that such representatives be returned to the Legistative Councils, as may fully voice your views on those assemblies. There might have been some sense in Government rejection of the Scheme had the entire country joined hands in doing, so. This is, however, an impossibility now. But how is this controversy to end? In reality the dispute has already been settled, for Lokmanya Tilak Maharaj has pronounced his verdict saying, "accept what has been given to you, and keep up a constitutional agitation for a full measure of self-Government.

### LOKMANYA TILAK'S MANDATE.

Maharaj Tilak occupies an exalted position among the pioneers of political work, who were the first to preach the doctrine of political unity. What other here has suffered so much in the service of the motherland as this illustrious person' has done? Will not the soldiers constituting the army for the service of the motherland bow down before the. mandate of this old weatherbeaten General?

That clears the way. Both the Moderates and the Extremists agree that the reforms should be accepted. They differ only in ascribing the credit of these reforms. I put forward a suggestion before that numerically strong party, which at present holds the reins of this National assembly. You are very powerful. Some of your Moderate friends might have a monopoly of wisdom and policy, but for the time being you are the stronger both in enemies, they In front of you stand no numbers and in influence. are the sons of the same Motherland. Among them there are some old warriors who have suffered inumerable hardships in the service of the Motherland. Can you forget Mr. Gokhale who forgot himself in the service of the Motherland and laid down his life at the same alter. Can you ignore that political Sennayasi, the noble Srinivasa Shastri, who has taken the place of Mr. Gokhale? Or could you look down upon that foremost political fighter Sri Surendra Nath Bandopadhaya, whatever change the present times might have brought on him.

The entire dispute can be settled in a moment, if you would pay heed to the words of a Sannayasi. You bend down a bit, and henceforth employ yourself in working up what has been given to you.

Here you owe a duty, which I wish to put before you. It is true the British rulers refused us our rights for a long time. It is also true that there have been several instances of broken faith. There have also been some who not only tried to suppress our political demands, but did their best to deprive us even of those rights, which we had already enjoyed. However, how can we ignore the nobility of purpose and high sense of justice of the good sons of the British nation on account of the selfishness and injustice of a few. Mr. Montagu has achieved a glorious deed now, that can never be wiped off the page of this world's history. It is being said by a few, what has Mr. Montague done for us? He has simply discharged a part of his duty, and that too with a view to strengthen the British Empire. So why should we thank him?' I enquire of these men, "How many individuals there are in this world, who really do their duty? Is it not true that a good many of you, who agitate for more extensive political rights, fail to purge your minds of the ingrained hatred of some six crores of your own brethren, who inhabit India, suffer from numerous social disabilities, and are looked upon as untouchables? How many of you do really consider them to be your own? When you can deify Mah. M. K. Gandhi for his reclamation of a low class person how can you refuse to offer thanks to Mr. Montagu, who inspite of the hardest opposition could successfully win some measure of Self-Government for a nation that had gone down to the depths of degradation? Or shall we refuse to say a word in praise of the British Parliament that realised its duty to India, with whatsoever motive it might be? Sisters and brothers! I appeal to you in the name of the ancient civilisation of India not to let this splendid opportunity slip from your hands. Take care that you do not get the stigma of ungratefulness impressed on you.

An expression of gratefulness on this occasion does by no means imply that you should give up all constitutional agitation for further rights. Even while feeling grateful to Mr. Montagu we have to differ from him here. I cannot, however, help remarking that we should not be taken away by agitation so far that even the rights conferred by the Reforms be lost. The words of an Urdu poet exactly describe the situation:—

'Dhone ki reformer hai jai baqi,

Kapre pai hai jab talak ki dhabba baqi.

Dho shauq se dhabhe ko pih itna na ragar,

🔍 Dhabha rahe kapre pai na kapra baqi.'

'Wash on, O Reformer, so'long as there is a spot on the cloth; but pray rub it not so hard that the cloth itself may perish along with the blot.'

Now 1 turn my attention to that event which has attracted you here from distant provinces. I need hardly repeat the great trials through which the country has passed. The fateful event which originated from Delhi, the true and transferred capital of India. The first shot was fired in that city on the afternoon of March 30th 1919. It was then discovered how much of life there still survived in this so-called lifeless country. What did the evidence of witnesses, who appeared before Lord Hunter's Committee, show? It clearly showed that the spirit of valour was simply dormant in this community, that had been in deep sleep for centuries. It had not died out. The first drop of bloodshed fell on the site of the old capital of the Pandavas. and that blended the hearts of the two prominent sons of India-the Hindus and Musalmans. The first funeral procession with 50.000 mourners started on March 31st and proceeded to the Muslim cemetry; where by the side of that Muslim martyr's bier I met my dearest brother, Hakim Ajmal Khana Musallim-i-Iman, and a true lover of Hindu-Mohammadan unity. It was the bier of a Musalman, and on the way it was frequently borne on Hindu shoulders. It was a wonderful sight. The blood of the martyr united the hearts, estranged from ages, at his grave.

At two in the afternoon two other biers were borne to the cemetry. I saw them started on, and then went to the cremation ground with three biers. There after setting fire to the funeral pyres, I offered a prayer to the Almighty for the restoration of peace and appealed to the Hindus and Mohammadans to keep up their unity. Here a Sikh brother put in. "Do not leave us severely alone. We Sikhs also are with the nation." Hundereds of men in that vast concourse of thousands were shedding tears of love and sympathy. As I moved back from the cremation grounds Principal S. K. Rudra, (the religious brother of my dear friend Mr. Andrews, a true follower of that Oriental Ascetic Christ, and an adopted son of the Bharatamata) approached, and embraced me and said, 'I cannot bear this cruelty to which the innocent sons of the motherland are at present exposed. My heart is with the nation— and so is the heart of every true Christian.' It is my earnest prayer that God may grant to this barren motherland many such Rudras.

God's own glory was manifested on Friday, the 4th April, 1919, in the Juma Mosque of Delhi. Since that day up to the 18th April, police had been entirely withdrawn from the city. It is true that not a single shop or house was broken during this period. No assault of any kind was committed by any one on any other. No pocket was picked. All gambling dens also were closed, and seldom a man was seen drinking. Even the worst characters in the town looked upon ladies as their own mothers and sisters, and thus afforded them a freedom from every fear.

This spirit of love once started in Delhi penetrated through the entire Panjab. A current of unity and fraternity permeated the entire country with electric speed. All distinctions of mosques and temples had vanished. At this time Mahatma Gandhi moved up to Delhi to convey the message of truthfulness and forbearance. The bureaucrats could neither understand the might of truth, nor could they appreciate the grandeur of Satyagraha.

#### FRUITS OF DISORDERS.

¥

The chairman next dealt with the Jallianwala Bag incident and the fruits of Disorder. He said:-

The first providential fruit of these disorders is the Hindu-Muslim Unity, which it is the duty of the nation to strengthen by every means in its power. This can be done by purging our minds of not only our mutual hatred but also of hatred against any body else. To cherish the ideal of unity and fraternity with the entire creation is the highest duty of man, which we should all try to fulfil.

Its second fruit is the realisation of the sublimity of penance and forbearance. The Martial Law has well-established the value of character and indeed character is the key to true progress.

Its third fruit is a clear vindication of the powers of constitutional agitation and forbearance. The Jallianwala Bagh presented the best illustration of forbearance, for both young and old there received the volleys of bullets like showers of flowers.

Brothers and sisters! I am not a political man in any sense of the term, and so I shall desist from dealing with political questions. What further steps towards Self-government should be taken I leave politicians to discuss. I place before this august assembly only a few points which constitute the essence of my life-long experience.

#### SUGGESTIONS.

So far the main work of this National Assembly has consisted in passing resolutions for presenting our grievances to and seeking their redress from the rulers of the country. No efforts have yet been made to develop the capability of the people to properly assimilate the conferred rights. It is high time now to devote some attention to this work. The one way of doing it is to urge every father and mother to so regulate their own life and character, as to set a healthy example before their children. They must themselves show control over their sense-organs, body and mind, in order that their children also my do the same. This is simply essential for any true amelioration of our community.

In my 26 years' experience of public work 1 have come across very few educated people indeed, who could keep up their character under trials. In fact, such devoted patriots can be counted on one's fingers who can break the bonds of the golden chains of titles for the sake of their country. How many Brahmans of the type of Dr. Subramaniya are there in India, who would fling away the title of 'Sir' on receiving an improper threat from the Viceroy? How many true sons cf this land of Bharata are there like the poet Ravindranath Tagore, who deemed it a sin to retain even for a day the title bestowed by a Government that had associated itself with such a reign of terror as prevailed in the Panjab, and fling it as a protest? Or how many bold men are there like Sir Sankaran Nair, who refused to associate himself with a Government that could be guilty of such grave injustice, and resigned his seat on the Imperial Executive Council.

#### NATIONAL SCHEME OF EDUCATION.

Ladies and the true sons of Bharata Mata! So long as a National scheme of education is not introduced, and the students are not properly disciplined like the Brahmacharis of old, your children would go on growing as slaves of Western thought and Western civilisation.

The nation must, however, have a foundation first in order to have a National Scheme of education. That foundation was happily laid for our nation on the 30th March, 1919. Before that it was a nation merely in name. The work which the combined efforts of all political workers could not do during the last 34 years was achieved in a day on that memorable 30th March. These foundations were further strengthened by the incidents like that of the Jallianwala Bagh. The nation lacks one thing. What is that?

General Both Tucker of the Salvation Army stated before the Reform Scheme Committee that the  $6\frac{1}{2}$  crores of the 'untouchables' in India should be given special representation on the proposed Councils, because they were the anchor-sheets of the British Government. I would ask you to think and find out how these  $6\frac{1}{2}$  crores of 'untouchables' could be the anchor-sheets of government. I would also request you to take up a vow, while you are within this sacred pandal, to so behave towards these so far untouchables that their children may read in the same schools which your children attend; that they be allowed to mix with your families, as your families do amongst themselves; and that they may be allowed te put their shoulder along with your own to the wheel of political activity and advancement. Ladies and gentlemen, do pray with me that this dream of mine be realized.

The dream that had been passing before my mental vision for the last 26 years was realised at the Juma Mosque of Delhi and I would not be surprised if the above dream of mine also be realised during my lifetime. When that fortunate day comes, you shall have to give up your western methods of eating and drinking and dressing. You shall have to bid adieu once for all to your life of luxury. Then will the scattered parts of this nation unite. Then will a true system of National education evolve, which would be managed entirely by our own men. This is the secret of success. Let us, brothers and sisters, bow down our heads before the Almighty, who is thus described by a Bhakta:--

'Kanta hai har ik jigar men khatka tera, halka hai har ik gosh men latka tera, mana nahin jisne tujhe jana hai zarur, bhatke hue dil men bhi hai khatka tera.

O master, of all without distinction of colour, O Lord of the rich and the poor, let Thy true Light illumine this National Assembly, so that its leaders may see truth in its entirety, and may justly behave towards friend and stranger.

### ELECTION OF THE PRESIDENT

As soon as the chairman's address was over the formal election of the President was proceeded with.

#### (Speech Mr. Hassan Imam)

Mr. Hassan Imam who rose to propose the election, in response to the repeated voices of 'Urdu', 'Urdu'. first spoke in Urdu for which see Urdu supplement. Then he spoke in English.

Mr. Hasan Imam (Behar) in proposing the election of the President said:—Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen, I deem it a very great privilege that the task of proposing the name of the President of this Congress should be allotted to me. The distinction, to my mind, is particularly great inasmuch as this congress is of a unique character, and I have got to propose to you the name of one who has, in the course of the last few months, by his work endeared himself to you. He did not stand out so prominently in previous years for the reason that the occasion for his work had not arisen. Since the events of last April, Pandit Motilal Nehru has been working for the country unstintedly; he has given all his time to the patriotic service which he has rendered to the country.

Gentlemen, I have no desire to detain you, late as it is in the day,— I have no desire to detain you over this matter of the election of the President. After all, the election of the President is but a formal matter in this body. The election really takes place when the whole country expresses its affection for the man who is going to occupy the first seat in the congress. The whole country has acclaimed with the greatest satisfaction the name of Pandit Motilal Nehru as the person best fitted to preside over this congress. Gentlemen, I propose to you the name of Pandit Motilal Nehru for the presidency of this congress. (Loud cheers).

### Speech of Mr. Kasturi Ranga lyengar.

Mr. Kasturi Ranga Iyengar, Editor of the 'Hindu,' Madras in seconding the resolution said:---

Mr. Chairman and Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have great pleasure in seconding the resolution proposed with so much felicity by my triend Mr. Hasan Imam. As I am speaking on behalf of Madras, I may say that the Punjab has become very dear to Madras on account of the cruel persecutions and immense sufferings which her people have undergone and the heroic manner in which they have been borne. The hearts of the people of the Madras Presidency have vibrated with the warmest sympathy with their brethern of the Punjab in their days of deep distress. The whole country now from one end of it to the other has steod as one man in resenting the wicked acts of the Government and its officers; they have regarded it with deep humiliation and as a national insult, as a national oppression and the spoliation of national honour. The days of alleviation, redress and reparation seem now to have gone. Among the numerous public workers who brough t balm and succour to this afflicted land, I need hardly say that the Hon'ble Pundit Motilal Nehru is the foremost of them. It is but just and fitting that the honour of presiding at this great national gathering should be given to one who can hold it with credit and distinction and whose election, as my friend Mr. Hasan Imam said, has been hailed all over the country. I most heartily second the proposition that Pandit Motilal Nehru should preside on this occasion. (Loud cheers).

#### Speech of Lok, Bal Gangadhar Tilak

Lok. Bal Gangadhar Tilak who on rising was accorded a grand ovation, in supporting the proposition said :---

Mr. Chairman, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have comehere to herald the annual uprising of the political atmosphere of India. You know that meteorological observers take three readings. One is dry bulk thermometer, another is red blub thermometer and the third is the reading of the barometer. The All-India Congress Committee and the Provincial Congress Committees were engaged during the year in taking three political readings. One of them is dry bulb thermometer, I mean reading of the intellectual thermometer of the country and there they find that the reading is the highest for Pandit Motilal Nehru.

The second reading is what they call the red bulb thermometer. I call it the reading on the emotional thermometer of the Nation, I mean the sympathy of the people which I know is vested in them, and there they find that the highest reading is for Pundit Motilal Nehru.

The third is the reading of the social and political barometer, and you all know that in the social and political circumstances of the country the reading is the highest for him/during the last year.

Well, if these three readings are found to agree, I can assure you that there can be no other man better fitted to occupy the presidential chair of the Congress this year than my friend Pandit Motilal Nehru. You know that very well especially in the Punjab. Well, I have only come to declare these readings and to tell you that as an observer of the political atmosphere in India, not only of the All-India Congress Committee but also of myself, I have observed these readings, and I can add, if there was any necessity of adding at all, my own evidence of confirmation to the readings taken by the All-India Congress Committee. That being so, I do not wish to detain you any longer but support the proposition so ably placed before you by my friend Mr. Hasan;Imam and seconded by my friend Mr. Kasturi. Ranga Iyengar. I will be supported by other people, and I hope you will carry it with acclama ion. (Loud cheers.)

### Speech of Mr. B. Chakravarti.

Mr. B. Chakravarti (Bengal) then stepped into the speaker's tribune to further support the proposition. He was however very much interrupted by the audience by cries of 'Hindi, Hindi.' He said :--

Ladies and Gentlemen, I cannot satisfy everybody. If I speak in Hindi I shall not satisfy all of you. If I try to satisfy some of you by speaking in Hindi, I would offend my friend Mr. Sarma because he would not understand it. What have I to do? I am placed between two dilemmas. I must accept one, and I accept the one which is easiest to me, that is to speak in English (Applause). -You see Gentlemen, Mr. Hasan Imam is a genius. He can turn round in one direction and speak Hindi and turn round in another direction and speak English. I have only one mouth—I have not got two. That being so; you will pardon me, my brethern, sisters and daughters, if I say a few words in English.

I have no desire to detain you longer than two or three minutes. So far as I am concerned personally, and so far as the brother delegates of mine who have come from Bengal are concerned, I have the honour, the privilege and the pleasure of being associated with this resolution. I recommend to you the name of the Hon'ble Pundit Motilal Nehru not for his great and varied learning, not so much for his ripe and mature judgment. not for his great culture and great business capacity and abilities, but I recommed to you his name for his lifelong devotion to his motherland and his lifelong sacrifices for the uplifting of his own people. Bit to my mind, the greatest recommendation why the Hon'ble Pundit Motilal Nehru should fittingly preside at this great assembly in the Punjab is his recent devotion to the cause of the Punjab. My sisters and brethren, there is a silver lining to every cloud. Before there is a birth, there is always destruction, that is my faith. Those innocent men, women and children who had to sacrifice their life and shed their blood in the Jallianwala Bagh their death has produced the awakening of the Punjab and the result of it is the great assembly that I see here. It has regenerated the Punjab, the land of heroes. You are again heroes. It is partly through the exertions of the Hon'ble Pundit Motilal Nehru that you see in your land of heroes the twenty heroes who were wrongly and unjustly incarcerated and taken away from ycu. I shall only say one thing, and I think my daughters and sisters will appreciate it very much. If you want to enhance the quality of a man, if you want to enhance the beauty of a face, there must be-if there is a natural defect-there must be a little defect put on in order to show off the remainder. It is a set off. Mr. C. R. Dass always accuses me that I am a dressy man. I am not. It is a libel, but probably Pundit Motilal Nehru will not say anything to me if I say that he is a man more dressy than I am. (Loud Applause).

#### The Hon'ble Mr., Srinivasa Sastri.

The Hon'ble Mr. Srinivasa Sastri (Madras) in further supporting the proposition said:—Ladies and Gentlemen, I beg to support the resolution.

Hazik-ul-Mulk Hakim Ajmal Khan (Delhi) further supported the proposition and spoke in Urdu.

#### Speech of Hakim Ajmai Khan.

Hakim Ajmal Khan, President of the All-India Moslem League, in further supporting said, there could be no better selection for the present session. In addition to his past valuable services to the country Pandit Moti Lal Nehru's recent service to the Punjab entitled him to a every hearty support from them in his election as President. He therefore very strongly supported the proposal.

The Hon'ble Rai Bahadur Bhagat Ram (Punjab) also supported the proposition and spoke in Urdu.

#### Speech of R. B. Raizada Bhagat Ram.

R. B. Raizada Bhagat Ram of Jullundhar (Punjab) in further supporting said, he spoke from personal knowledge of the unique services rendered to the Punjab by Pandit Moti Lal Nehru. The Pandit was one of those brave men who had served the 'country for a whole lifetime. His recent services to the Punjab, however, were such as to be written in letters of gold. Pandit Moti Lal's name was now a household word in the Punjab and indelibly impressed on every heart. It was, therefore, the duty of the Punjab to honour such a man.

The Hon'ble Pundit Motilal Nehru was then formally installed in the presidential Chair by Swami Shradhananda amidst loud cheers.

The Hon'ble Pandit Motilal Nehru then stepped into the speaker's tribune and proceeded to read his address in English at about 4. 20. p. m. He was then interrupted with cries of 'Urdu, Urdu'. Amidst these interruptions, the President said:—

Ladies and Gentlemen, As the Congress was postponed from the 26th and as the address has already appeared in all the papers, I do not think it is necessary for me to inflict the whole of it upon you. But you will at least permit me to read a few passages and I shall not detain you long.

After the reading of a few passages from the address, there were further interruptions of cries of 'Urdu, Urdu', to which the President said :---

If you want to hear the speech in Urdu, I have arranged that the Urdu version of my speech should be read outside this pandal. Those who like to hear it can hear it there and they are quite at liberty to leave this pandal.

### DELIVERED BY "PANDIT <sup>1</sup> MOTILAL : NEHRU 27њ DECEMBER 1919.

# FELLOW, DELEGATES,

ŧ

T'is indeed an exceptional, honour to be thought fit to take the helm of the great ship of the Indian National Congress in the stormy weather we are passing through. The honour you have conferred on me is deserved only by a skilled pilot, who can afford to make light of the breakers and the rocks ahead. I wish your choice had fallen on one, who had both the skill and the confidence to steer clear of all danger the noble 'vessel you have 'so generously committed to my care, when it is about to sail on a perilous voyage. But all too unworthy as I am for the great distinction you have bestowed on me, I derive solace from the fact that there is a special feature of this session, which no doubt has influenced your choice, and which perhaps widens the qualification for the chair to include even such as I. That special feature presents itself at the outset and runs through our whole programme. It arises out of the recent tragic events in the Punjab which must naturally form the keynote of our proceedings. Those events furnish many a dark chapter to the history of the past twelve months, but none darker than the great tragedy enacted in this very city of Amritsar in April last. Fellow delegates, you have assembled here in deep mourning over the cruel murder of hundreds of your brothers and in electing your president you have assigned to him the position of chief mourner. That position I accept in all reverence and I thank you for it in all sincerity. The responsibility, however, remains and is considerably augmented by the great solemnity of the occasion. I can only hope to discharge it by your generous indulgence and the kindly cooperation which I trust I shall receive at your hands in a very liberal measure.

Last year when we met at Dehli the great war had ended and we were all looking forward, full of hope, to the great peace which would endure and which would bring the blessings of Freedom to all nationalities. The time had come for the fulfilment of the many pledges made to us and, in accordance.with the principles laid down by statesmen in Europe and America, this Congress demanded Self-determination for our country. Peace has now come, partially at least, but it has brought little comfort even to the victors. The pledges made by statesmen have proved but empty words, the principles for which the War was fought have been forgotten and the famous fourteen points are dead and gone. Vae victis is still, as of old, the order of the day. Russia, hungering for peace, is allowed no respite, and a number of little wars are waging on the continent of Europe. ' Prussianism has been crushed but it has been reborn in other countries of the west, which have enthroned militarism on high. The fate of Turkey hangs in the balance, and Ireland and Egypt are being made to feel the might of the British Empire. In India the first fruits of the peace were the Rowlatt Bills and Martial Law. It was not for this that the war was fought, it was not for this that many hundreds of thousands laid down their lives. Is it any wonder that the peace has aroused no enthusiasm and that the vast majority of the people of India have refused to participate in the peace celebrations?

With coercion has come concession. That has been the old time policy in India, as in Ireland, persisted in by England in spite of repeated disillusionment. Our rulers have failed to realise that repression and conciliation cannot go hand in hand; that the grace of a gift lies more in the manner of giving than in the thing given. And so the much discussed Reform Bill has been hurried through Parliament so that this "big meeting", as Mr. Bonar Law put it, may be pacified by it to a certain extent at least. The new act demands our most careful consideration. I shall deal with it at a later stage and it will be for you to decide how far it meets with your wishes. But through the surrounding gloom has come a ray of bright sunshine which has cheered up many a suffering individual and family in India. His Majesty the King Emperor has on the eve of this great meeting been graciously pleased to send out to us a message of His Royal clemency to be exercised by the Viceroy in the name and on behalt of His Majesty to all political offenders suffering imprisonment or restriction on their liberty. In the gracious words of the proclamation it is the "sentiments of affection and devotion" with which His Majesty and His predecessors have been animated that have consoled us in our misfortunes. It is for us, fellow delegates, on our own behalf and on behalf of the people of India whom we represent to convey your sincere homage to His Majesty and our humble appreciation of His royal benevolence. I have no doubt that you will discharge this loyal duty in a befitting manner and send out a hearty welcome to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales who is to visit our country next winter. Let us gratefully join His Majesty in his "hopes of the future and in the fervent prayer" to Almighty God that by his wisdom and under His guidence India may be led to greater prosperity and contentment and may grow to the fulness of political freedom".

It is due to this royal mercy that we have among us to-day the great leaders of the Punjab who till yesterday were in jail. On behalf of this great Congress I offer them the warmest of welcomes. They have passed through the fiery ordeal of suffering for the cause and they have come back to us to take their rightful place in the councils of this great assembly. Their suffering has not been in vain. It has taught a lesson which we in this congress, I trust, will not fail to learn.

In Memoriam.—But before we proceed further we must pause for a moment to pay our tribute of respect to the memory of one of our leaders who has passed away from our midst since we last met in Delhi. Nawab Sayed Mohammad, the President of the 28th Congress, held in Karachi in 1913 and for many years the Joint General Secretary of the Congress, died in Madras on the 13th February last. He was one of our foremost public men and had the courage to adopt the Congress creed at a time when the great majority of our Mohammadan brothers were keeping aloof from the national movement. May his soul rest in peace.

We must also do reverence to the sacred memory of the dead who were killed in Amritsar and elsewhere in the Punjab, and to the living who were put to indignities worse even than death and sufferred the most shameful barburities. No monument in murble or bronze is needed to consecrate the memory of the dead or the sufferings of the living. Our speeches here will be for got en, the resolutions you pass may in the future, have interest only for the historian. but India will never forget the sacrifice and the sufferings of Presidential these children of hers. (Hear, Hear).

The Panjab.-As I have already indicated the Punjab has the right to claim the first attention of this Congress. But before I deal with the various problems which it presents for our consideration I desire to congratulate you heartily, my fellow countrymen and women of the Punjab, and more specially those of Amritsar, for the courageous public spirit you have shown in holding the present session of your great National Assembly in this city. You resolved in happier times to invite the Congress to your Province, little dreaming of the dark days you were destined to go through before you were to realize your expectations. You lost no time in forming your Reception Committee and were cheerfully busying yourself with your patriotic work when a great calamity suddenly descended upon you. / You have borne this affliction and at the same time have adhered to your resolve. Your spokesman at Delhi, who invited the Congress, lay in jail together with many of his colleagues and has only now been happily released. Yet you did not flinch or seek to cast aside the burden you had voluntarily undertaken. All honour to you for your devoted patriotism. All praise for your patient suffering.

India has suffered much at the hands of an alien and reactionary bureaucracy, but the Punjab has in that respect acquired a most unenviable notoriety. Competent observers have borne testimony to the spirit that has animated the Punjab administration ever since it came under British rulo. Sir Henry Cotton and Mr. Bernard Houghton, both eminent members of the Indian Civil Service, have told us of the retrogressive and backward condition of the province and the militarist tendencies which hold sway there. Mr. Ramsay MacDonald in his book "the Awakening of India" says: --

> "It is generally conceded in India that the most incompetent of the Governments is that of the Punjab. It takes its stand upon two foundation rocks, "Prestige" and "Sedition," the meaning of the former being that it can do what it likes, and of the latter that if any Indian questions its doings his house will be raided and he will be deported......It has no notion of statesmanlike handling, no idea of political methods. The man in power simply uses his power whether it is in the form of a not too honest detective department or a not too discriminating executive or judiciary."

The proximity of the Punjab to the frontier has enabled its administrators time and again to enforce their will on successive Viceroys and Secretaries of State. The bogey of the frontier is exploited to the uttermost and the proposals made by the "man on the spot" seldom fail to secure acceptance at the hands of the higher authorities. With Delhi almost on the border and with Simla for its summer capital, the Government of the Punjab has the additional advantage of having the ear of the Viceroy, and it has thus come about that being the worst Government in India, it is the most favoured of all provincial administrations. Public life is not likely to thrive under these conditions and it is no wonder that for long there was no marked growth of political ideas in the Punjab. ------

· maintane and terms over the almost the alternation In order to appreciate the causes | which | ultimately, iledioto, the catastrophe of April last and its sequel, it is desirable to consider briefly the forces which have been at work ever since the first publications of public life began to be noticed by the authorities Before 1905 there was practically no public life in the Puhjab, but the stupendous blunder of Lord a Curzor in affecting the partition of Bengal in the face of a nation's resentment not only convulsed the affected province but sent as thrill for excitement, and discontent throughout the country, which could, not fail to arouse public activity in the Punjab. The introduction of the Colonization Bill in the logal Legislative Council shortly after brought troubles to the very doors, of the people. By this bill it was intended to curtail the valuable vested rights of the so-called colonists and to deprive them of the fruits of their labour which had converted the desolate wild around Lyallpur into a smiling garden. A strong agitation followed and this was dealt with by the usual policy. of, repression About this time the editor and proprietor of the "Punjabee"; newspaper, were convicted. Shortly after the Colonization Bill was passed by the local Council. But these measures failed to put down the agitation which was continued with redoubled energy. The more excitable among the people came into conflict with the police and there were riots in Lahore and Rawalpindi in April, 1907. Against the arrest and trial of the actual rioters no sensible person can have any thing to say but there was no justification for the arrest of Lala Hansraj Sawhney and some other leading public men, as was shown at their trial. Even less excusable was the deportation without trial of Lala Lajpat Rai and Ajit Singh. The policy of the Punjab Government in those days, and handed down as a legacy to succeeding Lieutenant Governors was to shut their eyes to their own reactionary administration and keep the Government of India and the Secretary of State in ignorance of the real causes of the disturbances by supplying them with coloured acccunts and fixing responsibility for their own lapses on the poor "agitator". Be it said however to the credit of Lord Minto that he refused to assent to the unjust law passed by the Punjab Council. But there was no lack of other weapons of repression in the already over-stocked armoury of the Punjab Government and these continued to be freely used during the years 1907 to 1909. The methods adopted were the suppression of the press and the prosecution of individuals unacceptable to the Government. Needless to say the young sapling could not weather the continuous storm it was subjected to and there was little manifestation of public life in the Punjab during the

But repression and terrorism have never yet killed the life of a nation, they but increase the disaffection and drive it underground to pursue an unhealthy course breaking out occasionally into crimes of violence. And this brings further repression and so the vicious circle goes on. No one can but deplore violence and political crime. But let us not forget that this is the direct outcome of continued repression. It is due to the perversity of the executive which blinds itself to the causes of the discontent and, like a mad bull, goes abcut attacking all who dare to stand up against it.

years 1910 to 1913.

Sir Denzil Ibbetson, the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab during the troublous days of 1967, was not slow to perceive the "new air which was blowing through men's minds" but instead of adjusting his sails to this "new air" he chose to steer his course right against it. He, as well as his successor, followed the broad and easy path of piling repression on repression in accordance with the hallowed traditions of the Punjab Administration.

This was the state of the Punjab when her destinies were placed in the hands of Sir Michæl O'Dwyer. It was a splendid opportunity for a broadminded and generous-hearted stateman to strengthen the foundations of the Empire by doing the barest justice to the natural aspirations of a people to whom the Empire owed so much. How Sir Michæl acquitted himself of this high trust every Indian knows.

During the early days of Sir Michæl O'Dwyer's rule occurred the Komagata Maru incident. The unfortunate men who had left their homes in a spirit of peaceful enterprise, many not wishing to return to India at all, found every door shut in their faces and were forced to return. The reception prepared for them by the Government of India, presumably at the instance of the Punjab Government, was the passing of the Ingress into India Ordinance, which empowered the Government to restrict the liberty of any person entering India. On landing in India they found themselves prisoners and, broken down as they were by the consistant ill-treatment they had received at home" and abroad, they completely lost their heads and the unfortunate Budge Budge riot was the result.

The Komagata Maru episode marked the recrudescence of unrest in the Punjab and afforded a pretext to Sir Michæl O'Dwyer to ask for more "effective power" from the unwilling Government of Lord Hardinge. During 1914 and the early part of 1915 insistant demands continued to be made for a carte blanche to deal with the situation and a draft ordinance of a drastic character was submitted to the Government of India for approval and promulgation. At last Lord Hardinge was compelled to yield and the Defence of India Act which substantially embodied the provisions of the draft ordinance was hurriedly passed through the Indian Council. 'How this "essentially war measure" has been used not only in the Punjab but in the other provinces as well to deal with matters wholly unconnected with the war, we all know. Sir Michael O'Dwyer was not slow to utilise it and soon after reported its "salutary effect" to the Government of India.

The years 1915 to 1917 were occupied with various conspiracy<sup>\*</sup> trials by special tribunals constituted under the Defence of India Act. The vernacular press was ruthlessly suppressed and hundreds of persons were interned under the Defence of India Act or the Ingress Ordinance. It was during this period that Lokamanya Tilak and Shrijut Bepin Chandra Pal were prohibited from entering the province lest they should introduce the virus of Home Rule here. This order was recently withdrawn as far as Mr. Tilak was concerned and I am sure you will all join with me in offering a most cordial welcome to him here after his arduous labours in England for the cause. To Mr. Pal, who is also present here, I offer a warm welcome.

War activities.—I now come to the war activities of the O'Dwyerian regime during which, in the name of patriotism and the Empire, methods were employed which were even worse than those I have so far noticed. These could only have been practised in the Punjab either by the direct sanction or Fresidentiaj Address.

a) «Annivance of Sir Michael O'Dwyer or by over-zealous subordinates in the hope of reward. The truth of the Persian saying—

(If a king tolerates one grain of oppression, his retinue will inflict a ton of misery.)

was fully realised in the course of this strenuous period. For a short time after the beginning of the war recruitment in the Punjab proceeded under normal conditions. But soon after Sir Michael O'Dwyer made up his mind to acquire the distincton of being the foremost recruiting sergeant in India and gentle pursuasion gave place to more vigorous methods. Then came the Prime Minister's appeal for increased war effort. Sir Michael O'Dwyer's energies now knew no limits. In his speech in the Punjab War Conference he said :--

> "You know the Delhi programme. My application of it to the Punjab I can explain in a single sentence. Two hundred thousand men for the regular army, voluntaryism if possible, conscription if necessary, twice the thourand men we have been asked for for the Indian portion of the Indian Defence Force, a war loan effort which will eclipse the last, the development to the utmost of our local resources and by God's grace, victory in the end."

These are noble words breathing a lofty patriotism for the Empire. But what regard was paid to the capacity of the province to fulfil the expectations of its ruler? At the Delhi Conference the total number of men to be supplied by India was determined to be 5,00,000. Of these Sir Michael O'Dwyer made up his mind to find no less than 40 per cent. from his own province, the population of which including the Indian States is only 13 per cent, It was too big an undertaking even for the martial races of the Punjab who had already contributed over 2,50,000 combatants and 70,000 non-combatants, since the commencement of the war. Hence the broad hint conveyed in the words "voluntaryism if possible, conscription if necessary." The various officials engaged in recruiting lost no time in translating those words into action and the horrors committed in the guise of patriotic effort are still fresh in the memory of the victims. An ingenious "quota system" was devised under which a rough census of the male population of every village was taken and each village was called upon to furnish a certain number of recruits within a fixed time. If the required number was not forthcoming within the time given various unlawful and oppressive methods were employed. Villages were punished collectively and individuals were subjected to great hardships and himiliation. I shall not here enter into any details as the Commissioners appointed by your Sub-Committee are enquiring into these cases of ill-treetment and will present to you their report in due course.

The Criminal law was openly abused and numerous proceedings were taken against innocent men under the provisions of Sections 107 and 110 of the Code of Criminal Procedure with the sole object of compelling the accused persons either to enlist or to supply recruits. There are judicial records in existence showing that those who did either the one or the other were Presidential acquitted while those who did neither were convicted. In the report on the 

"District Magistrates have spent much time in recruiting work during the year. The large decrease in the number of persons called upon to give security under Section '110 Criminal Procedure Code is in a great part due to the heavy recruiting for the . army."

In the report for 1918 it is again stated :----

"Recruiting for the army continued to be one of the main factors in bad\_livelihood cases."

Nor was the abuse of law confined only to bad livelihood cases. The following passage occurs in the judgment of the Sessions Judge of Karnal setting aside the convinctions of the appellants by the District Magistrate:---

> "The various orders passed by the District Magistrate from time to time clearly show that if these appellants had also supplied recruits from among their near relations or if they were fit for enlistment themselves they would have been let off provided 20 recruits were made up from the village as was originally demanded from it."

Similar methods were employed to swell the provincial contributions to the war loan. It will be interesting to prepare statistics to show how many subscribers found it necessary to transfer their war bonds at heavy discount soon after their subscriptions were announced. One of the favourite methods to deal with those who did not satisfy the authorities with their war effort either in supplying recruits or contributing to the war loan was to enhance their income-tax. The following short extracts from the judgments of Collectors, rejecting objections to the enhancement, will be instructive :----

- "He (the objector) has three sons and will not enlist one of them. He has not subscribed to any war fund or war loan although the he could easily do so."
- "Up to date he has not helped even by a single pice in any war fund or loan."

"He is a miser and has not helped with a single pie in any war fund ./ or loan." . .

The inevitable result of the systematic oppression, the main features of which I have described, was to spread serious discontent throughout the province and it is not surprising that the pent up feelings of the people occasionally found vent in the commission of serious offences. We have it on record that a Tehsildar in the Shahpur District was murdered and some of his companions sustained grievous hurt. In the same district a mob offered resistence to the arrest of some men on a charge of dissuading people from .

Presidential enlistment with the result that it was fired upon and several casualities occurred. 1

> In a recent speech made in Multan Sir Michael O'Dwyer expressed the lament that "those who worked in organizing recuiting for the division have had a most arduous task, they have had to contend against. apathy, timidity, and even with open hostility which in some cases unfortunately culminated into riot, bloodshed, and defiance of authority in Multan and Muzaffargarh ".

Mr. Montagu in his last speech on the Indian budget remarked :-

"Recruiting for the army has gone on in parts particularly affected by these disturbances with such zeal and enthusiasm that I think there is reason to believe that many a family was left without its bread-winner."

Did Mr. Montagu sufficiently realize the inwardness of the "zeal and enthusiam" he referred to or the extent to which it was carried? The " unauthorised, objectionable and oppressive methods" employed by zaildars and lambardars under pressure of the authorities are described in the judgment of the Sessions Judge of Multan as "matters of common knowledge." It is evident that this "common knowledge" did not travel beyond the seas to England or we should have found some indication of it in Mr. Montagu's :speech.

What I have so far said applies to all classes affected by recruiting and war loan activities and concerns mainly "the man on the sod, and the man behind the plough" for whom the late Lieutenant Governor professed the warmest sympathy and solicitude. Let us now turn to another class of people for whom he never affected any feelings other than those of unqualified hatred and contempt – I mean the people known as the educated classes in general and the politically minded section of them in particular. I have already shown that public life was all but dead in the Punjab some years before Sir Michael O'Dwyer appeared on the scene. It showed some signs of revival on his assuming charge of the province but was again put down by his masterful repression. There were, however, world forces at work which even the strongest man could not resist and the people of the Punjab whose :"manliness, sanity, and practical common sense" the then Lieutenant Governor was never tired of extolling for his own purposes could not remain unaffected. The famous memorandum of the nineteen members of the Indian Council, the Congress-League Scheme of Constitutional Reforms, the historical announcement of the 20th August, 1917, the visit to 1ndia of Mr. Montagu himself and the publication of the Montagu-Chelmsford Report all came in quick succession to the utter bewilderment of Sir Michael O'Dwyer. He saw Congress Committees spring up in important centres, and heard the whole province ring with the echoes of speeches made at public meeting and conferences in the course of which his administration was freely criticised. Early in his career as, Lieutenant Governor he had conceived an immense admiration for himself and his administration and so long as it was open to him he suppressed all talk of the slightest change or improvement. When that was made impossible by the announcement of the 20th August and the developments which followed it, he made highly offensive and provocative speeches in his own and the Viceroy's Council which served the only purpose

of adding to the bitterness of feeling on both sides. Up to the end of 1918 constitutional reforms were the absorbing topic at almost all public meetings and he could not well interfere with them. But early in 1919 came a terrible visitation in the shape of the Rowlatt Legislation which set a tremendous wave of agitation rolling in the country from one end to the other. It swept through the Punjab with same volume and force as through other parts of India and gave Sir Michael O'Dwyer the opportunity he sought. The people were no longer offering criticism which was invited by the Government, but had engaged themselves in a strong agitation against a set policy which the Government had made up its mind to carry out at all cost. This made all the difference with him and with the convenient bogey of the frontier to trot out in case of need, he prepared himself to deal the last effective blow.

The Rowlatt Legislation .- It will be convenient for me here to say a few · .• words about this most inequitable measure which even according to Mr. Montagu has met with "universal opposition throughout India." You must be perfectly familiar with the provisions of this Act and I shall only notice a few salient features which are enough to condemn it. It invests the Government with "emergency powers" to enable it to deal with anarchical and revolutionary movements. Part I of the Act supersedes the ordinary mode of trial by a special procedure when the Governor-General in Council is satisfied that it is expedient in the interests of public safety to provide for a speedy trial. I This speed is attained by doing away with commitment proceedings and the right of appeal which in one word means speed at the expense of justice. It is impossible to underrate the importance of commitment proceedings which give fair notice to the accused of what the case against him is, and how the prosecution seek to prove it. As to the value of the right of appeal there can be no two opinions. The most remarkable feature of the Act in this respect is that no right of appeal is given even when the judges differ, the only consideration shown being that no sentence of death shall be passed if there is such difference of opinion. .:

Parts II and II1 are designed to deal with two classes of anarchical and revolutionary movements but the difference between them is only one of degree. Part II applies when such movements are "extensively promoted" and Part III when they are "prevalent to such an extent as to endanger public safety." But whatever the difference between the two it is impossible in any given case to show that the movement in question was of the one kind and not of the other. For all practical purposes, therefore, the Governor-General in Council has a free hand in the matter and may proceed under Part II or III as he likes.' The fact that a person is concerned in any movement of either kind is in the first instance to be determined behind his back and later on, when his case is referred to the investigating authority, he is to be given an opportunity to appear at some stage (not all the stages) of the proceedings, which are to be held in camera. The unfortunate person is not to be allowed to be represented by counsel, he may not be told the name of his accuser, nor even all the facts on which the accusation is based and is not entitled as a matter of right to examine any witness, or produce any document if the investigating anthority considers it unnecessary. To crown all this the investigating authority shall not be bound to observe the rules of the law of evidence and there shall be no appeal from its finding. We then have the

Presidential Address. drastic powers given to Local Governments, which are milder under Part II than Part III but extend to the search of any place and confinement in jail of the person concerned.

These, fellow delegates, are some of the staggering provisions of the new law against which the whole country rightly rose as one man. Because there are unfortunately in this country, as there undoubtedly are in other countries, some misguided persons who endanger public safety, the whole nation must submit to the disgrace of allowing this terror to hang over it. It has been over and over again admitted that the great bulk of the population in India are law-abiding. The negation of law and justice which the Rowlatt Act represents could only be necessary to cover the inability or incompetency of the Government to cope with an evil which is by no means confined to India. The only justification pleaded is that the Act is not meant for the innocent and the law-abiding who need have no fear of its application to But it is conveniently forgotten that the sole judge of the innocence them. or guilt of any person, however high placed he may be, is the executive. And who can have faith in the executive if the safeguards imposed by law on them are removed? Our critics may, but let me tell them plainly that we do not. But it is said that there are safeguards. The Local Government cannot proceed without first obtaining the opinion of a judicial officer qualified to be a High Court Judge. The obvious answer is that in the first place that opinion is to be based on one-sided evidence and in the second the Local Government is not bound by it. All it is bound to do is to consider the opinion. If this opinion is against the Gvernment, but the latter is still satisfied that action is necessary, there is nothing in the Act to prevent it from applying either Part II or III as it likes. It is, however, pointed out that no Government would be unreasonable enough to disregard the opinion of the judicial officer whom it consults. After what has happened recently in the Punjab, and at different times in ' other parts of India, let no man ask us to put implicit faith in the reasonableness of Government measures and methods. What is possible for the Government to do it may do at any time. We cannot be satisfied until it is made impossible for it to depart from strictly constitutional lines. The next safeguard relied upon is the enquiry by the "investigating authority." As you have seen from the conditions under which that enquiry is to be held it is nothing short of an unmitigated farce and can afford no real safeguard. The last argument in favour of the Act is that it is nowhere in force and will never be put in force unless occasion arises and then only in the part of the country where such occasion arises. Here again the only determining authority is the executive though in this case it is the Governor-General in Council. It may be said that under the new Reform Act there will be three Indians in the Executive Council and at least they may be relied upon. But the Executive does not change its character by being English or Indian. The point is that no executive in the world, however competent it may be, has any bussiness to usurp the jurisdiction of duly constituted law courts or deprive the people of the protection afforded by them.

Much has been said of rumpurs and misrepresentations of the provisions of the Act. I confess that I have not come across them except in Government communiques and some police evidence before the Martial Law Commissions. It is a remarkable fact that though these rumpurs were supposed to have emanated from the educated classes, not a single witness was called nor a single speech produced to fix any particular person with their authorship or circulation though the C. I. D. were everywhere in evidence. Indeed one of the popular cries in the Punjab put the main provisions of the Act in a nutshell.

#### (No pleader, no appeal, no argument)

This is as true a description of the Act as any that can be given in six words, though the outhor of it has been convicted and sentenced by a Martial Law Commission.

Mr. Montagu has sought to defend this measure in his Budget speech in the House of Commons. He has resorted to special pleading and instead of justifying the principle of the Act has plunged into a consideration of the necessity to deal with anarchical crime. Political crime has to be dealt with, has to be rooted out, but I repeat, what has been said so often before, that no number of Rowlatt Acts or other repressive measures will put an end to it. The one and only way to cast it out is to remove the causes of discontent.

The most amazing part of Mr. Montagu's defence of the Act came when on being interrupted by an hon. member on the question of the accused being deprived of legal assistance, he said :---

> "Yes Sir; under Part I of the: Act he has assistance, but under. Parts II and III there is no legal assistance. This is not a law court but a committee of inquiry. It is more like a school master investigating trouble at a school, a committee of a club using its friendly services for the purposes of inquiry, somebody to explore all matters, somebody to see that injustice is not done, somebody to be sure that all the facts are investigated."

To compare the arrest and confinement without trial of a citizen, and numerous other restraints put on his liberty of action and speech, with the governance of a school or a club is, to say the least, adding a gross insult to a serious wrong. It can only be accounted for by the oft-repeated complaint that Mr. Montagu has recently, in his zeal to push the Reform Bill through, lost all sense of proportion of other things Indian.

For these reasons I have no hesitation in asking you to express in no uncertain terms, what I know to be your considered opinion, that the Act is an ugly blot on the Indian statute book and must be removed without delay. The issue before us is, as Mahatma Gandhi has concisely put it, "Is the will of the people to prevail or that of the Government"? The very existance of this measure puts a stain on our self-respect and our national honour. But I feel confident that if you persist in your constitutional efforts you will get rid of it. For, as Mahatmaji says; "A Government be it ever so powerful and autocratic is bound to yield to unanimous public opinion.

Presidential Addiem. Presidential Address. (Hear, Hear). It is a bad outlook before us if truth and justice have to surrender to mere physical force whether it is wielded by an individual or by a Government ".

I apologise to you, fellow delegates, for having detained you even for the few minutes I have on the provisions of this inequitous measure. I have done so as this is the first opportunity for the Congress to pronounce its opinion on the Act and also because it marks the starting point of the recent trouble in the Punjab. I must not 'omit' in' this connection to express our keen appreciation of the high sense of public duty shown by those members of the Imperial Council who resigned ther seats as a protest against the passing of the Act.

Satyograha.-The Rowlatt Bills, bad as they were, were made even worse and more unacceptable to us by the environment in which they were set. Mahatma Gandhi rightly pointed out that they were. " the unmistakeable symptoms of the deep seated disease in the governing body "-a disease which soon after broke out in all its virulence and neaked ugliness. To fight this disease Mahatma Gandhi started the great Satyagraha movement. A new force was introduced into our politics, a force with the most tremendous potentialities. India's masses were suddenly awakened and the message of Satyagraha entered the humblest home. Some of us did not entirely agree with the wording of the Satyagraha pledge, many were of opinion that the time had not come for the civil disobedience. But few, I imagine, can disagree with essentials of the doctrine. These, as I:conceive them, are truth, fearlessness and non-violence. And, as a corollary, I would add that it is the right of every man to refuse to obey any law which goes against his conscience and to which he cannot with due regard to truth submit, and to suffer the consequences of such disobedience (Hear, Hear). This is specially so where the laws are passed against the will of the people. I would here refer you to what an aminent American has said. Mr. Hadley, president of the Yale University, says "You can compel ignorant people to accept a statute, you can force bad men to obey it when they do not want to; but if a statute or judicial decision passes the line of those duties which good and intelligent men as a body accept and impose upon themselves, it is at once nullified. The process of nullifying law has sometimes been called passive resistence."

The qualities I have mentioned above, whether you call them Satyagraha or by any other name, are essential if we are to take our rightful place amongst the nations of the world. We shall not be free or deserve freedom unless we have these qualities in ample measure. Unless we adhere to truth and discard fear we cannot get rid of the slave psychology, the outcome of generations of repression, which has been our sad inheritance. And violence cannot avail us. That is the special weapen of the west and we cannot hope to win freedom by armed force. But even if we could do so it would be a barren victory, a victory which would degrade and coarsen us and make us less fit to enjoy the freedom we had so won. We would develop the same vices against which we are contending now and in our turn would start the game of repression, 21

The spirit of Satyagraha was nobly shown by the great and peaceful Presidential demonstrations of the 6th of April. That day must remain a red letter day for India. It was the greatest event of the year. Some persons, ignorant, of history and Indian tradition, have likened the hartal to the general strike after the manner of the west, and have called it the forerunner of riot and bloodshed. But the hartal in India is a spiritual weapon, the old time method of showing sorrow, of having grievances redressed by patient suffering. Tt has from time immemorial been resorted to to express grief at a national calamity, sorrow at the loss of a loved citizen. It is not used as a threat, nor as a weapon against the forces of law and order. And this was fully shown on the Satyagraha Day when the mighty demonstrations passed off peacefully without the slightest conflict with the police or military.

Some words of Mahatma Gandhi have been distorted to mean that the Satyagraha movement was the cause of the disturbances in India. Fellow delegates, I say most emphatically that this was not so. Neither Satyagraha nor the hartal was the cause except in so far as they greatly displeased the authorities and made them provoke the people. There was no civil disobedience of laws in the Punjab. Satyagraha flourished more in other parts of the country and yet there was no disturbance there. The hartals of the 6th April did not cause any breach of the peace. It was only after two popular leaders of this city had been suddenly deported and Mahatma Gandhi, the most revered Indian of the day, had been arrested, that the passions of the populace broke loose in certain parts of the country. That would have been so even without Satyagraha or hartal. The disturbances were the result of the action of the authorities. They knew full well, in the Punjab at least, that the consequence of their provocative action would lead to trouble and they took measures accordingly.

Martial Law and after.-The events which followed must be fresh in your memory. Martial Law was enforced and for long the Punjab was almost cut off from, the rest of the world. The truth was hidden from us and we had to rely on the one sided accounts presented by Government for our benefit. Outsiders were not permitted to enter the charmed area. even Mr. Andrews being turned out of the province. Within a few days of the declaration of Martial Law the All-India Congress Committee demanded a full and impartial enquiry, and a little later appointed a Sub-Committee to conduct an enquiry. This Sub-Committee laboured for months and collected a great deal of evidence. It was hoped to present this evidence to the official committee which had been announced.

Lord Hunter's Committee.-The appointment by the Government of India of Lord Hunter's Committee was most disappointing but we waived our substantial objections to it and decided to co-operate provided only full facilities were given to us to repesent the people's case. At the earliest possible opportunity we urged upon the Government that the presence of the Punjabee leaders, who were in jail, was necessary for a fair enquiry. For many days we were in frequent communication with the Punjab Government and we were led to believe that our requests were being favourably considered by them. We refrained from going to the press in order to avoid embarrassing the Government and waited patiently for their answer. That answer came on the eve of the Hunter Committee's arrival in Lahore. You must have seen the correspondence subsequent to this and our Sub-Committee's ' statement which have already appeared in the papers, and I can add but

Presidential little. I would only point out to you that we tried to meet the Government A'ddress as much as possible. We modified our original request for the release of all the leaders during the enquiry and agreed to the presence of only one or two of them at a time in custody before Lord Hunter's Committee while evidence relating to them was being given. That was all we wanted and which the Government finally refused to give us. It was not an extravagant request. Even criminals have a right to be present in court during their trial. The Punjabee leaders are not being tried in the technical sense but their actions are being judged, they are being attacked by official witnesses and much of the blame and responsibility for the disturbances is being cast on them. Yet they were not allowed the privilege of the meanest criminal, although the officials of Government, who are as much on their trial and have at least as much to answer for, have had the fullest opportunities of appearing before the committee and conducting their case. Some of these officials have even been allowed the advantage of giving their evidence in camera. After the most anxious consideration the Sub-Committee came to the conclusion that "if it was to discharge the trust laid upon it, if it was to vindicate the national honour and the honour of the great Punjabee leaders, if it was to see truth and innocence established, it could not possibly engage in an enquiry in which the people's party was so heavily handicapped ". I feel confident . that you will approve of and endorse the action your Sub-Committee took, and trust to its judgment in taking all necessary steps to obtain justice.

> Meanwhile Lord Hunter's Cammittee has pursued the even tenor of its way, roused occasionally by some particularly callous official admission. Their findings can but be exparte decisions, based on the evidence of one party The other side of the shield will be presented to you by the Commisonly. sioners appointed by your Sub-Committee, who have strenuously laboured to collect and sift the evidence for the people. I do not overlook the fact that the proceedings of your Commissioners are in the legal sense as exparte as these of Lord Hunter's Committee. There is however this to be said that your Commissioners have the additional advantage of considering the evidence given before the Hunter Committee. They have for good reasons deferred publishing their report and the evidence on which it will be based and this Congress will not have the advantage of having their considered opinion on the Punjab occurrences before it. This has also considerably handicapped me as in the absence of your commissioners' report, it is somewhat difficult for me to deal with some aspects of Martial Law.

> But whatever findings the Comissioners appointed by the Congress Sub-Committee may arrive at, the central facts of the recent tragic events have now become so crystallised as to enable us to form an adequate idea of the true nature of the horrors through which the Punjab has just passed. These central facts are now matters of common knowledge and emerge clearly above the few controversial points which we may safely leave to our Commissioners. What we in this Congress are concerned with is not so much the fixing of individual responsibility for particular acts as the ascertainment of the spirit which runs through them all. I shall now by your leave touch on some of the main incidents and broad features of the occurrences which clearly indicate the spirit with which the people on the one side and the administration on the other were actuated.

Amritsar.—I shall take the case of A mritsar which stands out more prominently than any other as affording in itself a complete illustration of the spirit on either side.

. The people of Amritsar observed the 6th of April in the true Satyagraba spirit. So they did also the 9th April, the Ram Naumi day, and Muhammadans gladly and eagerly joined their Hindu brethren in celebrating the festival. There was no violence, no threats, and the processionists played the English National Anthem in honour of the Deputy Commissioner. That showed the psychology of the people of Amritsar on tha Ram Naumi day, Hindus and Moslems observing the festival together, and both joining to do honour to the King Emperor. The next few hours brought a strange transformation. The Bazaars were filled with mourning and the crowds that had rejoiced the night before, discarded their turbans and shoes in sorrow for they heard that two of their loved leaders had been suddenly deported. And. after the old Indian fashion, they went unarmed and bare-headed towards the Deputy Commissioner's house to pray for the release of their leaders. They were fired at, some were killed and a number wounded. But I shall not here deal with the circumstances of or the necessity for this firing. Again the temper of the crowd changed, and as is the way. with crowds, it rapidly went to the other extreme. The passion for vengeance took possession of it and some parts of the mob committed those excesses for which we Indians cannot but hang our heads in shame. Whatever the treatment they had been subjected to, whatever the provocation offered, nothing can justify the murders which they committed, the shameful assault which they perpetrated on a defenceless woman, the arson and plunder of which they were guilty.

Yet again, the mood changed, After two or three hours of madness, the people, or rather such of them as had been guilty of the outrages, recovered control of themselves. They saw the folly of their doings and, without the intervention of the police or military, of themselves stopped the destruction.

Such was the behaviour of the people of this city on those fateful days. The psychology of a crowd is a difficult thing to fathom, but I cannot but think that the history of those days would have been differently written if an attempt had been made to appreciate the view point of the people.

Let us now consider some of the doings of the officials and the spirit which actuated them. They did not appreciate the inner significance of Satyagraha or the hartal. To them it was all a vast conspiracy, the forerunner of a second mutiny. They did not care to see what troubled the people, they did not search for the causes of this mighty movement. They looked upon the closing of shops and the meetings and the demonstrations . as a personal insult to them. Even the fraternisation of Hindus and Moslems was anathema, an act in the great conspiracy. We all know what it is in this country for a body of men to walk bare-headed and bare-footed. It is the sign of deep grief, a token of a great calamity. But our rulers neither understand nor care to study the feelings and emotions of those whom they look upon as a subject race. In his evidence before Lord Hunter's Committee, Mr. Miles Irving, who was Deputy Commissioner of Amritsar at the time, was asked about the people who were proceeding to his house on He stated :-the 10th.

> "Yes, they were coming to my house, I understood. They were coming not to make any ordinary protest: When people come, they come properly clad, but these men had put off their *pugrees* and shoes and they intended violence.

Presidential Address. Qnestion —(That was humbly suggested by Sir Chimanlal Setalvad.) It might have been the sign of mourning?

Answers.—"If it was mourning, it was violent mourning."

So, Mr. Miles Irving, after a life-time spent in the Indian Civil Service, thinks that the taking off of turbans and shoes is a sign of coming violence. Ignorance of the habits of a people is never excusable in one whose duty it is to govern them. It becomes criminal when it leads to grave consequences.

The sudden deportation of Drs. Kitchlew and Satyapal was a typical act of our administrators. Having convinced themselves that there was revolution in the air, that conspiracies were being hatched, that the wonderful calm of the 6th and 9th of April hid strange currents underneath, they took the only step which appeals to the mind of a bureaucrat. They knew that this would greatly upset the people, they knew that there might be trouble, but what matter? Could they not crush them with the "ample resources" at their disposal? It did not strike them that the people could be reasoned with or could be conciliated. Nor did they think of having recourse to the ordinary law courts of the country. They do not believe in the intricacies or the delays of the law. They believe in making themselves the judges and meting out swift and stern justice to their opponents.

The Jallianwala Bagh — But saddest and most revealing of all was the great tragedy which occurred here on the Vaisaki day. No Indian and no true Englishman can hear the story of the Khuni Bagh, as it is now aptly called, without a sickening feeling of horror. Our freind Mr. C, F. Andrews, to whom this province and our country is so much indebted, has described it, "as a cold and calculated massacre". He says "I have gone into every single detail with all the care and thoroughness that a personal investigation could command and it remains to me an unspeakable disgrace, indefensible, unpardonable, inexcusable." Such is the verdict of an Englishman. What words, follow delegates, can I use to express your feelings and mine whose kith and kin were mercilessly shot down by the hundred in cold blood? Well may we grieve in the words of the Persian poet:—

. The facts of this incident are before you, they have largely been admitted by the authorities. But I am not aware of any condemnation from the authorities. I do not know of any high official who has protested against this grime cocurrence. That is a revelation of official mentality which staggers me. General Dyer, the author of the deed, has almost boasted of his achievement. He has sought to justify it. To him it was a "merciful act" to fire without warning on an inoffensive crowd because it might have made fun of him if he had refrained from doing so. He admits that he could have dispersed it without firing but that would have been derogatory to his dignity as a defender of law and order. And so, in order to maintain his self-respect, he thought it his duty to "fire and fire well" till his ammunition was exhausted and 2,000 persons lay dead and wounded. (Shame, Shame). There ended his duty. It was none of his business, he tells us, to look after the dead and wounded. (Shame, Shame). It was no one's business. The defenders of law and order had won a great victory, they had crushed the great rebellion. (Shame). What more was needed? 🚙

This is the deed which received the benedictions of Sir Michael O'Dwyer (Shame). This is the deed which has been defended by official after official before Lord Hunter's Committee. The plea of necessity is raised, the plea that the massacre produced a good effect on the surrounding districts. We have heard of these excuses before when Lovain was razed to the ground; when atrocities were committed at Dinant and Termonde. For these crimes against humanity the ex-Kaiser and his underlings are going to be tried. But General Dyer is secure (shame, shame). His late chief has blessed him and his colleagues in the civil and military administration of this country stand. by him and applaud his deed (cries of "shame for both").

Crawling.—The shooting in the Jallianwala Bagh was not the only feat which General Dyer performed. His subsequent conduct was no less revealing of his perverted state of mind. He tells us that he "searched his brain" for a new punishment, a new terror for the people—something, as General Hudson put it in the Imperial Council, to "strike the imagination." And the punishment that was devised did credit to General Dyer's ingenuity and ferocity. It was worthy of the days of the Inquisition. All Indians who happened to pass through a certain lane were forced to crawl on their bellies likes worms (cries of shame, shame). This was the punishment meted out to all innocent and peaceful men who went that way, and why? Because some hooligans had attacked Miss Sherwood in the lane some days before. No better methods could have been devised to humble the people to the dust.

Of the other measures taken in Amritsar by General Dyer—the flogging in public places, the enforced salaaming, the cruel treatment of the best and most respected citizens—I shall not say much. They all tell the same tale of brutal terrorism, the attempt to crush the spirit of the people.

Lahore.—Then we come to Lahore. General Dyer was not the only apostle of this cult. There were many others who tried to rival his exploits in the other districts under Martial Law. Lt.-Col. Frank Johnson, (cries of shame, shame) the expert from Bechuanaland, pursued the policy of "thoroughness" in the Lahore area. A "false and malicious " rumour that

the Government intended to interfere with the marriage customs of the people was contradicted by an official communique from Simla and the contradiction was given due publicity. The rumour was set down as a base lie and a Mohammadan marriage was arranged in a village not far from Lahore. It so happened that the whole marriage party, including the bridegroom, the priest and the guests, were flogged for having dared to assemble together during the Martial Law days. Col. Johnson has now been pleased to express his regret for this flogging and to tell us that it was due to the absence of tact in the official concerned. He himself exercised this "blessed virtue" (this virtue of tact) by arresting 500 students and the professors of the Sanatan Dharma College and confining them in the fort because a Martial Law notice was damaged by some unknown person. (Cries of Shame, Shame). He welcomed the opportunity of doing so, he "was looking for it." He tells us that he was waiting for an opportunity to bring home to the people the power of the Martial Law. To him a walk of 16 miles daily for the students for three weeks in the scorching Lahore sun of April and May was no hardship. (Cries of Shame, Shame). It was "ordinary physical training of a mild form." But perhaps the most noticeable example of the tact and mentality of Col. Johnson was his order prohibiting more than two Indians from walking abreast. (Cries of Shame, Shame). He tells us :---

> "If more than two natives come and do not give way to a European, that is likely to lead to breach of the peace."

Question.—Who would commit the breach of the peace, the European ?

Answer. - Undoubtedly.

Question.—You think he would be justified in doing so ?

. . . . .

Answer.—Certainly.

And yet we are told of equal partnership in the Empire and are asked to rejoice over the peace which has given this to us! (A voice "don't believe them") (Loud cries of Shame, Shame).

Gujranwala.—In Gujranwala Col. O'Brien held sway, serene in the knowledge that he could do what he wished without let or hindrance. The Chief Secretary to the Punjab Government had assured him; even prior to Martial Law, that his actions would be subsequently validated. This simple fact furnishes a more illuminating commentary on the new Indemnity Act than all the learned arguments of Sir George Lowndes in the Imperial Council. We can now understand the wholehearted support given to the measure by the Hon'ble the Chief Secretary to the Punjab Government and appreciate the wisdom of the provision in the Act which throws on the complainant the burden of proving want of good faith in the accused officialwhen he is armed with a certificate from a Secretary to the Government.

One of the steps taken by Col. O'Brien on the assurance of the Chief Secretary was to arrest Gauhar Singh, a lambardar, aged 60 years. Col. O'Brien states: "Gauhar Singh himself had committed no offence but his two sons were wanted by the police and they were not forthcoming and that was why their old father was arrested. He told us that he did not know where his sons had gone. An order was also passed confiscating his

с, <sup>с</sup>,

property. The order stated that until the arrest of Gauhar Singh's sons his property would be confiscated, that he be dismissed from the post of lambardar, and any one touching his property or cutting his crops would be shot." No comment from me is necessary.

In Gujranwala, as you are all aware, the gentle art of bombing from aeroplanes was practised, a bomb being actually dropped on a school boarding house full of boys. (Cries of Shame, Shame). The manner in which bombs were dropped may be gathered from Lt. Dodkin's statement. He says; "I saw twenty or thirty people in a field talking to one another and dropped bombs on them. I did not know who they were, whether they had assembled for an unlawful purpose, but I bombed as my orders were to disperse crowds." (Cries of Shame, Shame).

Another part of this district has come to be known as the Bosworth Smith area in memory of the horrors it underwent under the rule of a member of the Indian Civil Service who for years past was in disgrace with the Punjab Government but was selected as specially qualified to administer Martial Law justice, and has since been rewarded by promotion.

Kasur .-- In Kasur Capt. Doveton evolved fancy and novel punishments for the people and sought to teach them how to observe the ancient customs of India by touching the ground with their foreheads. He also had men stripped and flogged in the presence of prostitutes. His brother officer Lt. Col. MacRae meanwhile amused himself by having school boys flogged in public in order to set an example to all evil-doers. The bigger boys were picked cut at random, perhaps because they could bear the whipping. better. They were not guilty of any offence, "it was their misfortune", Col. MacRae tells us, and I take it that the punishment he awarded was in good faith. All the male inhabitants, boys and men, ten thousand in number, had to present themselves for the identification parade. The men arrested, 150 ; in number, were put in a cage placed on the station platform, and a public gallows was erected, entirely at the instance of the Punjab Government, before any one was tried or condemned to death-so Col. MacRae informs us. ÷1. ۰.

Hindu-Muslim Unity --- Besides the attempt to terrorize the people, \* the Punjab officials aimed a blow at the most valuable asset of our political life, the union between Hindus and Mohammadans. You are aware, fellow delegates, of the pathetic scenes of fraternization between Hindus and Muslims which took place during the recent disturbances at Delhi, Lahore and other places accompanied with shouts of Hindu Musalman ki jai. These expressions of fellowship in a common trouble were treated by the Punjab officials as heinous crimes amounting to open rebellion and waging war against the King, and a new offence was created which was defined as "fraternization of Hindus and Mohammadans against the Government by law established " (shame, shame). One of the most shameful acts of the Martial Law authorities was to ridicule the Hindu-Muslim entente publicly in various ways. The admission of Hindus to the Mohammadan mosques and of Mohammadans to the Hindu temples, the drinking of water or sherbet from out of the same glass by Hindu and Mohammadan were unmistakable signs of a far deeper union of the two than could be looked upon with equanimity by those who were interested in keeping them apart. And an

attempt was made under official inspiration during the closing days of Martial Law to found separate political associations or Sabhus for Hindus, Mortainmadans and Sikhs. I do not know what progress has been made in this direction but I trust that my fellow countrymen of all communities will refrain from swallowing this fatal bait.

refrain from swallowing this fatal bait. I have referred you, fellow delegates, to a very few of the admitted facts. It is not possible for me here to go into all the harrowing details of the numerous at sociales committed in the name of law, and order. For these you will have to wait for the report of your Commissioners, and, the evidence they are collecting. Meanwhile I would beg of you to read earefully the evidence which has been tendered before Lord Hunter's Committee. I -would request you to note the overbearing attitude of the official witnesses and their afrogance to the Indian members of the committee. That will give you a great insight into the official mind than any words of mine can convey. That will give you some idea of what our brethren in the Punjab have had to go through. And I would have you remember that these very men, were the officers who presided over the Martial Law Summary Courts, who dispensed justice and inflicted heavy punishments and flogging.

Necessity for Martial Law - The question of the necessity or otherwise of the application of Martial Law to the situation which arose in April last is a question on which also we must await the considered opinion of our Commissioners on all the evidence taken by them and that tendered before Lord Hunter's Committee. The Government case has been put as high as it possibly could be before the latter so far as the opinion of the authorities as to the real nature of the disturbances, and their apprehensions at the time as to what they might eventually lead to, are concerned. The pointies whether their opinion and apprehensions were based on facts or were the result of panic. I shall abstain from embarrassing either our own Commissioners or Lord Hunter's Committee by offering at this stage any definite opinion of my own for your acceptance. But I think I am fully. within my rights in pointing out that the question is not so much whether there was necessity for the application of Martial Law at any time as whether it was necessary when it was actually applied. It may be that Martial Law could be justified if it had been introduced at the time when the disturbances were actually going on, but it is an admitted fact that it was not so applied. What was done was to call on the military to help the civil administration, which is well within the discretion of every magistrate under our Criminal Law, but is very different from Martial Law. Whether or not it was necessary to hand over the entire civil administration to the military on the dates on which the Martial Law Ordinance and notifications relating to each district were issued is the real question before your Commissioners as well as Lord Hunter's Committee. I shall content myself with laying before you the official view. Mr. Kitchen, the Commissioner of Lahore Division, has stated that Martial Law was not wanted for the purpose of recovering control but in order to prevent the spread of infection, and specially .for the speedy trial of the numerous persons who had been arrested. Mr. Miles Inving tells us that the recessity for the continuance of Martial Law\_did not depend on anything that happened in his district. It depended situation on the frontier. General Dyer on outside factors, on the

tells us that the city of Amritsar was a "model of law and order" after the 13th April

Whatever the finding of your Commissioners and Lord Hunter's Committee as to the initial necessity for Martial Law may be, there is not the slightest doubt, on the admissions made by the official witnesses before. Lord Hunter's Committee, that there was absolutely no justification for keeping it . in force for the unconscionable length of time during which its horrors con-. tinued to be perpetrated. Admittedly it was not required to maintain law. and order and the only justification pleaded, besides the old story of the dangers arising from the proximity of the frontier, is that it enabled the offenders to be brought to speedy justice. But the Government had ample powers under the statute law to constitute special tribunals for the trial of offenders and these would not have taken much longer to dispose of the cases - than the Martial Commissions and Summary Courts did. The only difference would have been that people would have been saved the sufferings and indig-•nities to which they were subjected under cover of Martial Law and that the accused would have had the advantage of defending themselves by counsel of their choice. The trend of the whole official evidence before Lord Hunter's Committee is that Martial Law was not required to meet the imme-- diate necessities of the administration but merely for the purpose of striking terror into the hearts of the people, so as to avoid possible trouble in the future. I am of course not aware what secrets of state have been imparted to the .Hunter Committee in camera by the Chief Secretary to the Punjab Government and General Hudson. But so far as the open proceedings before the Committee go I can affirm with confidence that it was a gross abuse of Martial - Law for which all concerned are liable to answer.

Martial Law Cases .- I do not intend discussing any of the hundreds • • of cases disposed of by the Martial Law Commissions and the Summary and Area Courts. They have caused the greatest misery to the people, the suffering which endures for months. Hundreds have remained in jail, many tor having done what no honest man need be ashamed of. To day I am happy to say that for many this suffering has ended. You will have some idea of the sentences inflicted when I tell you that 108 persons were sentenced to death and the aggregate sentences of imprisonment amounted to the stupendous total of 7,371 years and 5 months (allowing 20 years for a sentence of transportation for life). The figures for whippings, forfeitures, fines and impositions on villages and towns are not yet fully available. Those I have given for imprisonments have been compiled from the official statements presented to the Imperial Council. I am told that even these figures are incomplete and that the official statements do not contain many cases. Many of these sentences have been largely reduced by the present Lieutenant Governor. Clemency was shown where justice was needed. Injustice cannot be tempered with mercy. ,Sir Edward Maclagan is a kindly gentleman who has tried to mitigate the rigours of his predecessor's regime but he has not had the courage or the wisdom to break through the evil traditions he has inherited.

Sir Michæl O'Dwyer's Responsibility (Loud cries of shame, shame).—Such, in briefest outline, is the story of the Punjab. The responsibility of Sir Michæl O'Dwyer for much that occurred here is admitted and established beyond doubt. I have endeavoured to show you the whole trend

of his administration. It would appear that he was striving to make the Punjab a kind of Ulster in relation to the rest of India, a bulwark of reaction against all reform. "We now seem to be drifting into what is known as Birrellism in Ireland," he complained, " trucking to the extremists, encouraging the idea that we are going to hand over the administration to them." And even in his memorandum on the referms he could not help lamenting that the Punjab politicians, "hitherto quiescent, were encouraged to assert themselves, and to come into line with other Provinces." To him there was little difference between a constitutional agitator and an anarchist. For both he had the same remedy-repression. But the remedy failed him and but increased the disease. ~ And then he played his master card and brought in Martial Law to kill once for all the breed that agitates. He has failedagain in his endeavour, but his policy has resulted in death for many and in utmost misery for thousands. For that he is fully responsible. He is responsible for the action of General Dyer and his military.colleagues in Amritsar; he is also responsible for the doings of his subordinates in the other districts under Martial Law. (A voice; "Have him impeached. Impeach him."

Lord Cheimsford's Responsibility .- But what shall we say of Lord Chelmsford ? He must have known, or ought to have known, what was The Congress Committee repeatedly drew his happening in the Punjab. attention to it. Did he seek to interfere or cut short the agony? Has he. received or considered any representation from this afflicted province presented to him from any-sources which are not strictly official? Has he shown us any sympathy? Has he even been into the heart of the province to acquaint himself by personal enquiry on the spot concerning the tragedies which have taken place ? We have not even heard that his " heart has bled for Amritsar ". Lord Chelmsford occupies a very exalted position. He has received that position at the hands of his King and as a trust from the English people. How has he served his King and fulfilled this trust ? Has he faithfully and adequately discharged his duty to his King and to his fellow countrymen by his persistent refusal to listen or to interfere, by his aloofness and by his absence from the scene of these happenings, when hundreds of His Majesty's subjects were done to death by the military and thousands put to shameful indignity ? (A voice: "what does he care"?) (cries of shame, shame).

Englishmen are, I believe, proud of the justice of British rule and zealous of their reputation. May I not ask them to consider whether Lord Chelmsford has shown himself as an active guardian of their honour and worthy of the trust which they had reposed in him? Indians seek for justice at the hands of the British Democracy. Will they tolerate this "frightfulness" in India and shield the authors of it? That is the acid test of British policy in India. On the answer to that depends the future good will of the Indian people.

The Lesson of the Punjab — Fellow delegates, I have ventured to trespass on your time to a considerable extent in dealing with the Punjab and the other matters which have acquired a special significance on account of the recent disturbances. Much has of late been said and written about the Punjab, much still remains. But the lessons which the crowded events of the year have to teach us and the English people are clear. To us they

point to the path of steadfast endeavour, the path of -sacrifice and patient ordeal. That is the only way to reach our goal. To Englishmen they teach the oft-repeated truth that tyranny degrades those who exercise it as much as those who suffer under it. And so it is that England, of old the champion of liberty, assumes a different guise in parts of her own dominions. England went to war to fight for the freedom of small nationalities, and yet a big nation under her sway continues to be unfree. In Belgium the German doings were condemned, but in India we still have the pure milk of Prussianism. And the man governed by the Prussian idea is much the same whether he is in the west or if the east. The logic of force is the only argument which appeals to him; military necessity justifies all severities. The object is always to strike terror and an act bowever "frightful" appears to him "merciful". Ordinary morality and humanity do not influence him and cruelty itself becomes laudable. It is for England to learn the lesson and put an end to conditions which permit these occurences in her own dominions. If our lives and honour are to remain at the mercy of an irres-. ponsible executive and military, if the ordinary right of human beings are denied to us, then all talk of reform is a mockery. (Hear, Hear) Constitutional reform without free citizenship is like rich attire on a dead body. Better to breathe God's free air in rags than be a corpse in the finest raiment. (Hear, Hear).

The Government of India Act. — I shall now proceed to consider the now Reforms Act which has just been ushered into an expectant world after much travail and bitter controversy. We have been told by its sponsors in Parliament that it is a great measure, unique in English history, and that it gives us extensive powers. Some of our countrymen have welcomed it with open arms, others have condemned it. It is for this Congress now to consider it and formulate the country's verdict.

It has to be remembered that the situation which this Congress has to deal with is very different to what it was when the Special and Delhi Congress met last year. Those Congresses had various schemes and proposals before them and it was open to them to accept such as appealed to them in the best interests of the country and reject others. The Montagu-Chelmsford proposals have now blossomed into an Act of Parliament and we must approach its provisions with all the respect due to the expressed will of Parliament which has been assented to by the Sovereign. The passing ot the Act and the prospect of its being put into operation at an early date impose upon us here assembled the duty of examining its provisions with a view to laying down the policy for the country and the working of the electoral, political and administrative machinery, old and It does not however impose upon the Congress the duty to accept nor new. does it confer upon the Congress the power to reject the measures which "Farliament has decided to introduce and carry out. In my humble opinion neither the report of the Joint Parliament Committee nor the proceedings of Parliament when it enacted the Bill into law furnish any reasons for the Congress to reconsider and revise the verdict it gave-last year on the true requirements of the country. (Hear, Hear). In certain respects those requirements have been partially met, in others they have not been given the. weight due to them either for reasons which do not appeal to us or for no reasons at all. The Act is not based on the wishes of the people of India and

its provisions fall short of the minimum demands made by the Congress. But let us not be little the good that the Act does us! We must recognise that it gives us some power and opens out new avenues of service for us which had hitherto been closed to Indians. I venture to think that our clear duty in those circumstances is to make the most of what we have got and at the same time to continue to press for what is our due. (Hear, Hear). As Mr. Ramsay MacDonald has said : "take advantage of whatever reforms are introduced into the Government of the country; lay down a fuller and a juster programme for the nation and let every one concerned know that you consider yourselves bound by none of the provisions to which you have taken exception, and go on using your influence to get what you want." Mr. Montagu has laboured strenuously for us and we must express our appreciation of his work and his sincere desire to advance our national aspirations. He has expressed the apprehension that agitation would not hasten the transference of power but might delay it. Lord Middleton in the House of Lords has gone further and - declared that "the continuance of agitation in order to obtain further concessions would be absolutely fatal to the future of India." We cannot share Mr. Montagu's apprehensions because of the faith in us, and as for Lord . Middleton's warning we may ignore it in the assurance that the future of India does not rest in his Lordship's hand. In the course of the same debate Lord Meston was able from his own personal experience to assure the House of Lords that the "agitaticn in India was only evidence of scmething deeper. The spirit of rationalism bred in the soul and nurtured by cur methods and our • example lay below the whole political movement in India today, That spirit was spreading sapidly through all classes." This spirit of nationalism cannot rest content unless all cur demands are acceded to. Therefore I would beg of you to work the new reforms, utilize them for the betterment of the country and continue to press and agitate for our full demands.

The Leclaration of Rights.—The Act, as I have said, gives us some power, but it does not give us free citizenship or the power to check the misuse by the executive of the functions of law and order. It ignores the insistent demand of the country for a Declaration of Rights. This demand was clearly formulated by the Special Congress at Bombay and it was reiterated at Delhi last year. Subsequent events, have but emphasised the necessity for it. No constitution can meet our needs unless it is accompanied with a guarantee and a clear declaration of our elementary rights which have recently been so ruthlessly violated in the Punjab. No Indian can be blind to the fact that the protection of our fundamental civic liberties is a matter of the most urgent consequence. No stateman can shut his eyes to the supreme moral necessity of securing the faith of the Indian people in the inviolability of their rights of citizenship.

• Our demand' for a Declaration of Rights was placed before the Parliamentary Joint Committee. It was ably pressed before them by our deputation, but the committee did not give it even the courtesy of a brief notice in their report. We are thus left in the dark as to the reasons why this most natural demand has not been acceded to.

Without these rights, as some of the most distinguished publicists in England have stated recently in a manifesto, "British freedom is a mockery." It is obvious that all these traditional rights have been set at nought in India by the combined operation of the Indian D. O. R. A., the numerous repressive measures on our statute book and the cult of Martial Law.

.

History teaches us that wherever the liberties of a people have placed at the mercy of an executive possessing the power to been enact all the law it wanted, the advent of self government has been preceded or accompanied by a statutory declaration of rights. This is what we find in most of the continental constitutions of Europe and in the American constitution. Even in respect of India, the British Parliament has in the past expressed a desire to protect the fundamental liberties As early as 1833, when Parliament first set itself to reof the people. constitute the Indian legislature, it specifically limited the power of this body by a historic clause, the full meaning of which has often been ignored by the Indian Government and the Indian courts. The Indian legislature, it declared, is to have no power "to make any law affecting the authority of Parliament or any part of the ancient laws of the constitution of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland whereon may depend in any degree the allegiance of any person to the Crown of: the United Kingdom," But notwithstanding this the steady tendency of the executive in India has been to ignore the implications of this limitation of the Indian legislature. The Congress has rightly therefore been on its guard against this danger which lay in the proposals for reform. In considering these proposals and in suggesting modifications to them, it has insisted -upon one essential condition, that whatever the scheme of reforms may be, it should include as an indispensable part thereof a Decleration of Indian Rights. Judging from Indian conditions alone, it is imperative for this Congress to state, that without a repeal of the existing repressive laws and a guarantee of the future inviolability of our civic rights, no reforms , in the constitutional machinery of the country can be regarded as satisfying our immediate requirements. They will not lesson the risks or the rigours of any future reign of terror, that might at any time be inaugurated in the country by a panic-stricken executive.

~ 6 It has been said that a demand for the declaration of Indian rights is unsupported by constitutional precedent within the Empire and inconsistent with a demand for full Home Rule. But we are still very far from full Home Rule, even under the new dispensation, and the bureaucratic agents of Parliament in India would still be in practically uncontrolled exercise of the power to suspend and suppress civic liberties. But even if India gets full Home Rule within the Empire, it is difficult to see why a Declaration of Indian Rights should necessarily be considered inconsistent with the demand for full legislative powers, for the India ... assemblies. It is true that in many British constitutions conferring full. responsible government, the need of specific guarantees has not been felt owing to the protection afforded by the great principles flowing from the rule of Common Law I have referred to above. But in cases where it was found that the tendency of the executive to encroach upon fundamental liberties was pronounced, the necessity of imposing limitations on the powers of even such responsible legislatures has been recognised and acted upon. I hall here only cite the latetest example of this kind, which occurred when the late Liberal Government passed the Irish Home Rule Act. Section 4 of this Act provides, among other things :--

or property, without due process of law, or may be denied the equal protection of the law, or whereby private property may be taken without just compensation.

Any law made in contravention of this section shall be void."

It may be stated in this connection that the American Commonwealth has made a special feature of this Declaration of Rights, both in the Federal and in the State Constitutions. At the time when the Federal Constitution was originally framed, at the conclusion of the War of Independence, the proposal to embody a Declaration of Rights in the Constitution was discussed. This was given up owing to the delay involved in settling its terms in time for the Convention, but within a few years the necessity for doing so became apparent and the constitution. was so amended as to include the Declaration of Rights. The terms of the declaration are far wider than those asked for by the Indian National Congress, which, in fact, has only adopted some of the important clauses of that section in the American Constitution.

The latest and the most instructive instance is that of the Philippines. The United States have not only conferred self-government on them at the earliest possible opportunity but have granted to them, under the constitution established by the Jones Law, a Declaration of Rights similar to their own.

General.—Coming to the provisions of the new Act, we find that a considerable part of this measure is in the nature of a blank cheque. The filling up of this cheque is left to the Executive Government of India, subject to the supervision of the Secretary of State. This process may make or mar whatever benefits are intended to be conferred by the very large number of proposals which are subject to the extensive rule-making powers provided under the Act. There are yet further commissions or committees to come, and further investigations to be made in order to settle details. It is on the completion of this work that the Act will be fully put in operation.

· · ·

Announcement of August 20th.-The joint Committee of the Houses of Parliament have, no doubt, made improvements in some of the provisions of the original Bill. But, as they themselves declare, they have definitely accepted the substantial parts of the Bill and of the scheme of the Montagu-Chelmsford Report which it embodied, as conceived in the spirit and as interpreting with "scrupulous accuracy" the policy of His Majesty's Government, announced on the 20th August, 1917. The Congress at Calcutta in 1917 pronounced the country's view on the policy of this announcement, the special Congress in Bombay in August 1918 voiced our opinion on the Reform Report scheme, while the Delhi Congress in December last, at the -conclusion of the great war, declared the demands of the country for freedom, justice and self-determination. But at every stage of evolution of this constitutional enactment, the right of the people of India or of the Congress to have the guiding voice in the settlement of their own self-governing institutions has not only been ignored, but has been definitely declared not to exist.

The Joint Committee of Parliament who, it was hoped, would improve the spirit of the Bill, took as narrow a view of the scope and policy of the Bill as the Government of India desired them to do in their latest representations. They have no doubt endorsed cordially the policy of the eventual realisation of responsible self-government in India, but they have denied that India is at present fit for it and they have declared that the announcement did not give any promise of even "the grant of partial responsibility" at present. They have also repudiated our demand for the application of the principle of self-determination. The Bill seeks to provide, according to the Joint Committee, the solution for the problem enunciated in the declaration of His Majesty's Government of the 20th August, 1917, which is described to be "to design the first stage in a measured progress towards responsible government." The nature and scope of this first stage, they say, have been misunderstood by the critics of the scheme. "Its critics forget," we are told, "that the announcement spoke of a substantial step in the direction of the gradual development of self-governing institutions, not of the partial introduction of responsible government; and it is this distinction which justifies the method by which the bill imposes responsibility both on Ministers to the Legislative Council and on the members of the Legislative Council to their constituents, for the results of that part of the administration which is transferred to their charge." The hesitation and the reserve, the suspicion and the caution that have thus characterised their report, seriously impair the value of their final proposals, which otherwise could have been improved and liberalised by them,\* without risk to the peace, safety or tranquillity of India. The extent to which this narrow spirit has pervaded their report is clearly indicated in its initial paragraphs. The Joint Committee, evidently under Lord Selborne's guidance, decided to expand the preamble to the Act, so as to bring all the qualifying clauses and restrictive conditions of the 20th August announcement within 'its compass in order to give "equal value" to all the parts thereof. This expansion, however, has had one good effect, evidently due, as paragraph 7 of the report indicates but does not admit, to the strong presentation of the Congress case by our deputation before the Committee. The preamble has substituted Parliament in place of the Indian and the British Government as the authority upon whom responsibility lies for the welfare and advancement of the Indian people. \_ The Joint Committee has acted on the assumption that the Bill is only intended to give the Indian people an opportunity " a generous opportunity"-whatever that may mean-"or learning the actual business of Government." Their constant anxiety has been to preserve as the essential feature of the Bill, the guardianship of the peace and the responsibility for the duties of administration during this period in the hands of the Governor-General in Council. This has seriously affected the attempts, which they have in other ways made to remove defects in the original scheme of the I shall refer only to a few examples in this connection. Bill. 

Grand Committees and Legislation by Ordinance. - The plan proposed in the original Bill was to empower the Governor or Governor-General to certify what he, deemed essential proposals of legislation or essential supplies and to get them enacted or passed through the machinery of an official bloc. The machinery was to, consist of a Grand Committee in the provinces and of the Council of State in the Central Legislature. This plan was found so reactionary and objectionable that the Joint Committee rightly decided on finally abandoning it. This is a matter of some satisfaction to and the second secon

x :,-

the Congress and its deputation who laid stress on the positively retrogressive character of this part of the scheme. Lord Meston had finally to acknowledge that the institution of Grand Committees would, in fact, reduce in certain respects some of the existing powers of the present Provincial Council. It was indeed believed, until the Joint Committee's Report was actually published that the alternative machinery which would be set up for the purpose of securing emergency or essential legislation or supplies would be a somewhat extended variation of what the Congress actually proposed at the Special Session in Bombay in 1918, viz., that of making temporary Ordinances. The Moderate deputation had, however, expressed their willingness to support the original Grand Committee and the Council of State scheme. The London *Times* which made a forecast of the report before it was issued stated the position in the following terms:--

> "The alternative in contemplation is to give a wider range to the power residing in the Governor-General, in cases of emergency, to make ordinances which have the force of law for a period of not more than six months. During this time, if permanence were deemed necessary, the Bill would again come before the Provincial Legislature, and in the event of a second rejection the question would be referred to the Secretary of State, who would take the advice thereon of the Parliamentary Select Committee. This would mean much coming to London of Indian deputations to give evidence or influence opinion, and would operate in a sense against the principle, at the root of self-government, that . Indian affairs should be decided as far as possible in India. But the politicians tell us that that principle cannot be too dogmatically applied so long as the Executive can on occasions disregard the Legislature. It is desirable to see the detail of the plan before definite opinions are formed as to its merits compared with the Grand Committee method. But this, at least, may be said: wherever in the British Dominions the Executive is in a permanent minority in the Legislature, essential laws are secured through ordinance-making powers, and the final decision as to their permanence rests with his Majesty's Government in London, usually through the agency of the Secretary of State for the Colonies,"

In spite of such considerations, the Joint Committee finally decided to give power to the head of the Indian executive to enact permanent laws, without even a definite prior sanction by the Secretary of State and subject only to his subsequent ratification or disallowance. The final proposals in this behalf that have now received Parliamentary assent are bound to cause disappointment over the whole country.

Fellow delegates, much as I appreciate the abandonment of the Grand Committee and of the original plan for the constitution of the Council of State, much as I value the passing away of the fictitious and unreal procedure therein involved, I cannot reconcile myself to the idea that a single individual, be he the wisest and most responsible man on earth, should be invested, even in an emergency, with the power to enact laws affecting a fifth of the human race. We have had only too bitter an experience of the truth, which Lord Morley has crystallized in one of his

aphorisms, that "Public Safety, Social Order and similar phrases easily become but fair names for a Reign of Terror". I do not ignore the fact that assurances were given by Mr. Montagu in the House of Commons and recommendations have been made by the Joint Committee, that the exercise of this power by the Governor or Governor-General would be subject to the scrutiny both of the Secretary of State and of a Standing Committee of the House of Commons. I am aware that Mr. Montagu has stated, that all important cases would be brought up before the House by the Indian Secretary and would be made, whenever he deemed it needful, matter of debate or resolution by the House. But we know what all such invitations for the voluntary interest of Parliament amount to. There is no statutory guarantee that only the Parliament or the House of Commons-not the Minister of the Crown, who is usually and necessarily the mouthpiece of the Governor-General-shall, during the transition period, sanction laws which the Indian Legislature may have wrongly refused to enact. Unless this is provided, the risk of the abuse of what are called reserved powers will remain very real. It has also been argued that the very magnitude of the powers thus lodged in the hands of the Governors and Governor-General would operate as a check against their frequent exercise, and it is also contended that the tension that may be produced by its abuse may develop situations which would result in its disuse or abolition. If the power thus given is not to be exercised or if its exercise will lead to its abolition, there is no necessity whatever to provide for it. However this may be, so far as our present situation goes, our experience of the Goverment of India's responsibility or responsiveness to public opinion is most disheartening. Verbal assurances by well meaning politicians have not availed against the wilful misapplication of existing powers, nor have understandings and conventions availed us against the determination of obstinate bureaucrats to over-ride them. Weapons of repression, which had been in disuse and had rusted for a century, have been taken out of their ancient armoury and employed with a rigour of which the Punjab has borne the brunt. Coercive powers intended for war purposes have been deliberately perverted for suppressing normal and legitimate political activity or agitation. We have known how even resolutions of the House of Commons have been treated as inconsequential ipse dixits of a faroff assembly. It is indeed surprising that with his intimate knowledge of the past record of the Indian Government, Mr. Montagu should have seriously contended that the statutory protection of Parliament on this most important matter should be left to understanding, especially when some other matters of less consequence have been made to depend for their validity or their continuance on a vote of either House of Parliament under the very Act. It was possible in 1913 for a reactionary House of Lords to protect the interests of the bureaucracy and veto the over-due reform of providing the United Provinces with an Executive Council. Even a most liberal House of Commons may find it very difficult, except with the consent of the Indian Secretary, to veto as of right under the present statute an obnoxious repressive measure which the Indian Executive may have carried over the heads of the representative legislative authority in the land.

Well, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have dealt with the Grand Committee procedure and then I go on to discuss the question of the powers of the Governor and the Governor General. I shall not trouble you by reading it. I am now simply commending most of the rest of my address to your notice. I will not take up your time, because you have got copies of my speech and you can read it at your leisure. But I shall only read to you some passages which I consider of some importance and which ought to be read.

Powers of Governors and the Governor-General - The sum total of the reserved powers in the hands of the Government or Governor-General in respect of legislation is indeed enormous. In the first place, he has the usual power of vetoing a law passed by the legislature. He has also . another power given to him under the new Reform Act to stop the progress of a Bill in the Legislature and even prevent the discussion of the whole or any part of a Bill, if he thinks that it effects the safety or tranquility of any part of a province. And then, in addition to all this, he has the power to enact affirmatively, over-riding the opposition of the Legislature, any law. on the same ground subject to the subsequent sanction of the Secretary of State. We are deeply grateful to Colonel Wedgwood and Mr. Ben Spoor and other British friends, who put forward the Congress case before the House of Commons, in this and in other respects. The amendment proposed by Colonel Wedgwood, to permit at least a free discussion of Bills and motions in all cases by the legislature concerned, was opposed by Mr. Montagu and rejected by the House. In the result, we have only to trust to the extragood sense and statesmanship of the new race of governors we are promised. and to the increased interest in Indian affairs which the House of Commons is expected to evince in future.

The Budget.—If the power of the Governors and the Governor-General in legislation are so wide and unrestricted, their powers in regard to the Budget appear to me on close examination nearly as wide and farreaching. The decision of the Joint Committee to reject the scheme of separate purses in the provinces is no doubt a just and correct one, based on the practical unworkability agd unsoundness of the proposals made, but I cannot say that the alternative procedure they have now settled with the approval of Parliament is in any way consistent with the existence of a really affective budget right in the Legislative Council. The operative part of the new scheme is as follows :—

> "They advice that, if the Governor in the course of preparing either his first or any subsequent budget finds that there is likely to be a serious or protracted difference of opinion between the executive council and his ministers on this subject, he should be empowered at once to make an allocation of revenue and balance between the reserved and transferred subjects, which would continue for at least the whole life of the existing legislative council."

It will be remembered thas it is the power not to "direct" but to influence and eventually to control the policy of reserved subjects, through the Budget, that was all along demanded by us and was believed to have been conceded by the Reform scheme. In this matter there existed no difference of opinion whatever between the several sections of progressive. Indians. In the Bombay Moderates' memorandum this was the position

-

expected to result from the Budget proposals in the original Reform scheme. The Government of India were alarmed at this possibility and in connequence propounded their separate purses scheme, which has now been abandoned. It was at this time that Sir Sankaran Nair wrote his masterly dissenting minutes, for which, and for the courageous attitude he took up on the Punjab question, the country will ever remain grateful. In the course of one of these minutes he accurately described the popular attitude towards the Budget proposals in the following words :--

> "Nothwithstanding much that could be said against the Reforms Report scheme, a number of critics rallied to its support for the reasons, among others, that it provided for a unified budget and for its being voted by the Legislature......The control by the Legislature must in any event be regarded as indispensable if the Reforms are to be worth anything in the eye of even the supporters of the scheme."

It is exactly this right and power in respect of reserved subjects that the Joint Committee have definitely negatived. They say:—

"The budget should not be capable of being used as a means for enabling ministers or a majority of the Legislative Council to direct the policy of reserved subjects; but on the other hand the Executive Council should be helpful to ministers in their desire to develop the departments entrusted to their care."

Thus, not only can the Governor settle the Budget of a province for three years if he anticipates trouble, not only can he prevent the minister or the legislature from making any attempt to direct the policy of reserved subjects, even if they involve extra expenditure or taxation, but in regard to all financial matters the authority of the Governor or Governor-General has been made by the Committee as complete and unfettered as it might be. Their report says; "The Committee desire it to be made perfectly clear that this power is real and that its exercise should not be regarded as unusual or arbitrary."

**Some Improvements.**—It must in fairness be admitted that the scheme has been improved in several directions by the Joint Committee. Of these improvements the addition of two more Indian members to the Viceroy's Executive Council is an appreciable one.

I would also draw special attention to the recommendations which relate to the revision of the existing Land Revenue assessments and policy in India. The declaration of policy by the Joint Committee on this sore and vexed question in the following words will, I sincerely hope, soon lead to some appreciable alleviation of the arbitrary and so often unbearable burdens which the present system imposes on the proverty-stricken Indian ryot:—

"The Committee are impressed by the objections raised by many witnesses to the the manner in which certain classes of taxation can be laid upon the people of India by executive action without, in some cases, any statutory limitation of rates and, in other cases, any adequate prescription by statute of the methods of assessment. They consider that the imposition of new burdens should be gradually brought more within the purview of the legislature."

Division of Functions.-I do not propose to weary you by going through the lists of reserved and transferred subjects as finally settled by the Joint Committee, which we may presume will be incorporated in the regulations soon to be laid before Parliament under the new Act. I am convinced that the Congress was fully justified in pressing on Parliament the demand of the country for immediate full provincial autonomy, and that it would have failed in its duty if it had refrained from so doing. But as dyarchy has come to stay in our Provincial Governments, until we are able to supersede it by full provincial autonomy, I may just as well refer to two subjects, in which the so-called transference of increased power has been hailed in some quarters as a great concession in itself. Thanks to the report of the Featham Committee and the dissenting minute of Sir Sankaran Nair, the Government of India's retrogressive proposals about Education and Industry have been vetoed. But in spite of this the amount of popular initiative or control in either of these departments is not in the result so very great as might be supposed. Education, for instance, is a transferred subject, but it is subject to the condition that all new universities, the old universities of Benares and Calcutta, Chiefs' Colleges. and European schools, secondary education in Bengal and the Central Scientific and Industrial Research Institutes, are not to be transferred. All this constitutes a diminution in the area of control of a subject admitted to be eminently fit for transference to ministerial responsibility and popular control. Again, that part of educational administration, which would involve the odious duties of compulsion and taxation. viz., free primary education, is severely left to the minister to manage without the slightest prospect of his hoping for financial relief from the reserved departments or their ample revenues.

Similarly though agriculture is a transferred subject, the benefit derivable from the transfer is substantially lessened by the fact that irrigation, water storage as well as Land Revenue will be reserved. Again, the development of Industries is to be a transferred subject, but factories and mines, railways, shipping and navigation including waterways, ports and customs, currency and coinage, are to be reserved subjects. It must tax the brains of all ordinary men to find what discernable development of industries can exist without factories and the facilities provided by the departments not transferred,

Fiscal Autonomy.—A connected subject with that of industries, on which some of us are prone to over-rate the concession made, is what is claimed to be the partial grant of fiscal autonomy. Fiscal autonomy in its strict sense has reference to the tariff and customs arrangements by which the Government regulates the commerce of the country and also raises revenue out of the country's trade. It is in respect of this that we have long claimed our right to levy duties or impose restriction in the interests of India's well-being and to be free from the dictation of the Imperial Government so often made in the interests of British capital and commerce. Whether anything approaching this right is likely to be

۰.

secured by the recommendations of the Joint Committee has to be judged by the following passage of their report :---

٠.

"Nothing is more likely to endanger the good relations between India and Great Britain than a belief that India's fiscal policy is . dictated from Whitehall in the interests of the trade of Great Britain. That such a belief exists at the moment there can be no doubt. That there ought to be no room for it in the future is equally clear.....In the opinion of the Committee, therefore, the Secretary of State should as far as possible avoid interference on this subject when the Government of India and its Legislature are in agreement, and they think that his intervention when it does take place, should be limited to safe-guarding the international obligations of the Empire or any fiscal arrangements within the Empire to which His Majesty's Government is a party."

Anxious as I am to commend the just and generous spirit in which the Joint Committee have tried to solve this question, I am unable to regard their recommendation as anything more than a pious hope. It is clear that unless and until we get responsible government real fiscal autonomy cannot exist.

Periodical Parliamentary Enquiry.-The Congress demand for therealisation of responsible government within a definite time-limit was not acceded to, when the Montagu-Chelmsford scheme was framed, and in its place there was provided a series of enquiries at the end of 5 and 10 years respectively for the further transference of provincial subjectsto popular control. Some of our countrymen welcomed these enquiries, because they looked like the old periodical Parlimentary enquiries into Indian affairs, which the Congress had asked to be revived in its earlier years. They also hoped successfully to survive the test and investigation that would be made and, like Oliver Twist, to go forward again and ask. for more. The injustice of submitting a nation's birthright to the jurisdiction and decisions of an outside body or committee was, on the other hand, deeply resented by many others, who felt that any such submission to jurisdiction and consequent acceptance of verdict would be essentially wrong and unworthy of the self-respect of Indians. India's national selfrealisation became so evident and overwhelming during the anti-Rowlatt, Bill agitation that the Government of India was greatly alarmed and instructed Lord Meston to ask for the withdrawal of the promise of the 5 year revisions. Lord Meston fixed the period for the next revision at the minimum of ten years, and it is a matter for disappointment that the Joint Committee have accepted the view. They have omitted the clause in the Bill relating to the 5 year revision and have provided only for an enquiry after ten years. I do not attach much importance to these periodical examinations, so wounding to our self-respect and so susceptable of being used by the bureaucracy for its own purposes. But the fixing of the "ten. year limit is significant as showng the temper of those who finally shaped the scheme.

**Central Government**.—Perhaps the most serious omission in the Act as finally passed by both houses, is that it fails to provide for any

transference of administrative or political powers to the representatives of the people in the Central Government. Except for the addition of two Indian members to the Viceroy's Executive Council and an expansion of the Central Legislature into chambers with a preponderance of elected members, the powers and functions of the Governor-General-in-Council in all matters are maintained as effectively as they have been till now. Even on the narrow principles laid down by the Joint Committee, there existed no ground to withhold the grant of some powers to the Central Legislature in respect of the Budget and in some spheres of administration. It is remarkable and significant too that their report has neither endorsed nor rejected any of the untenable grounds on which the Government of India repeatedly urged that the Central Government should be left entirely untouched. Nor have they dealt with the repeated demand pressed before them by nearly all the Indian deputations that the element of responsibility, the keystone of the new fabric. should be introduced in the Central Government also if the scheme is to have a fair trial.

## Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, I come to

Woman Suffrage.—A feature of the Act which has disappointed me much is the failure to do justice to the political rights of Indian women. I had hoped that Parliament would profit by the lesson of the woman suffrage agitation in England, but they have repeated the mistake of the Franchise Committee. The justice of the claim was recognised and the flimsiest of arguments were advanced in favour of delay. I trust that Indian men will come to the rescue of their sisters and hasten the day of their enfranchisement.

The Enfranchisement of Labour and the Masses.—Another unsatisfactory feature of the Act is the attitude shown towards the enfranchisement of the masses and the wage-earning classes. The Joint Committee have limited the total number of people enfranchised to about 1.5 per cent of the population. Mr. Montagu welcomed trade unionism in India but added that industrial labour had as yet attained a very small development. He did not choose to tell us how India's industrial development has been obstructed by the British Indian Government. Nor did he refer to the 80 per cent of our people who depend on agriculture. To the kisan delegates present here, I am glad to see in their hundreds, who represent the great agricultural proletariat of this country, and to the labour delegates, this Congress owes a special duty. We have to see to their enfranchisement and to the improvement of the their hard conditions of life.

These, fellow delegates, are the reforms which have been granted to us. There is little reason for us to be enthusiastic over them but we must take them for what they are worth. We shall not lag behind others in extracting all the good there is in them, but we are not prepared to surrender our demands in consideration for the enforced schooling and periodical examinations provided for us. We cannot, and we will not, rest content till we gain the full measure of that demand.

**Commissions in the Army and Navy.**—But what would reforms, however substantial, avail us if they are confined to the civil administration of the country. The most perfect machinery of self-government cannot endure for a day if it does not rest on the solid toundation of selfdefence. The most generous Parliamentary grant of full responsible government cannot subsist without the corresponding grant to us of the power to

defend ourselves, of the right to bear arms in defence of our motherland, of the right to possess our own army and navy, manned, officered and controlled by our own countrymen. Theories of a world peace, of a League of Nations and the right of small nationalities, are all attractive in their way, though they seem now to recede futher away than ever from practical realisation. But they cannot justify the continued emasculation of an ancient nation which her political subjection has brought upon her. Notwithstanding the activity displayed in the starting of political reforms, the delay and reluctance shown in the recognition and the grant of India's right to enlist her youth and manhood in the service of her army and navy, in the highest as in the lowest ranks, is indeed deplorable. We are all thankful in this connection to our distinguished fellow-countrymen, Sir Abbas Ali Baig and Sir K. G. Gupta, who have pointedly noticed this serious deficiency in the scheme for the speedy grant of self-government to India. It is also gratifying to note that Mr. Montagu has shown a readier tendency to recognize the importance of urgent reform in this respect than he was disposed to show either in the Reform Report, or in the most disappointing steps that he has taken in regard to military and naval commissions for Indians. We must not deny to India," he said in his concluding speech on the Bill in Parliament, "self-government because she cannot take her proper share in her own defence and then deny Indians the opportunity of learning to defend themselves. These are problems of which Parliament assumes responsibility by the passage of this Bill." Will Parliament, then, take immediate steps to fulfil this responsibility?

The Khilafat Question.—I now turn to a question of supreme importance to our Mohammadan brothers and, for that reason, of equal importance to all Indians. I mean the Khilafat question. It is impossible for one part of the nation to stand aloof while the other part is suffering from a serious grievance. This was clearly shown when the vast majority of non-Muslims made common cause with the Muslims and abstained from participating in the recent peace celebrations in India. No words of mine are necessary to emphasize the obvious duty of this Congress to give the question its best consideration.

The entry of Turkey in the war was a most momentous event from the Indian Muslims' point of view. They felt no inconsiderable misgivings about their attitude when they saw that an issue had arisen, which seemedto involve a conflict between their loyalty to their King and country and duty to the religious head of the Islamic world. But these doubts were happily shortlived and the Indian Mohammadans cheerfully cast in their lot with the British Empire when the memorable announcement of the 2nd November, 1914, was made by Lord Hardinge, securing to the Mohammadans complete immunity from any interference with their religious ' feelings. This announcement was followed by similar assurances from other British statesmen. Mr. Lloyd George in his famous speech of the 5th January, 1914, said, "Nor are we fighting to deprive Turkey of its capital or of the rich and renowned lands of Asia Minor and Thrace which are " predominently Turkish in race."

The war has ended in complete victory for the allied arms. Moslem India, nay United India, demands that full effect be given to these assurances. Apart from the promises and pledges given to His Majesty's Muslim subjects they have the right to demand the application of the principle of self-determination to the component parts of the Turkish Empire in the same way as it has been applied to Poland and the Yugo-Slav. What reason is there for a different treatment of Mesopotamia and Syria, where the population is almost entirely Muslim in faith, or of Palestine and Armenia, where Muslims are more numerous than the followers of any other religion?

As to who is the rightful *Khalifat-ul-Islam*, it is unnecessary for me to enter into historical or religious considerations. Lord Robert Cecil has admitted in the House of Commons that "His Majesty's Government have never departed from the attitude that the question of Khilafat is one for Muslim opinion alone to decide." Muslim opinion has now decided it, in a manner, which leaves no possible doubt, in favour of the Sultan of Turkey. With Arabia independent, with foreign powers governing Mesopotamia, Syria and Armenia in the guise of mandatories, with Palestine restored to the Jews, with the Greeks securely lodged in Smyrna and the hinterland, with Constantinople itself internationalized, what I ask is the position of the *Khalifat-ul-Islam*? Fellow delegates, it is a serious question demanding your most earnest attention.

Indians Over-seas.—It has been our unfortunate duty from year to year of late to discuss the questions affecting the status of our countrymen who, trusting to the protection that British citizenship should ensure to them, have gone to the different parts of the British Dominions in pursuit of trade or employment.

Among these South Africa has claimed the largest part of public attention. There, our countrymen have exhibited in the face of heavy odds, qualities of orderly and constitutional resistance, endurance and pluck which make us feel proud as a nation. We had hoped that after the struggle they carried on for eight years involving great sacrifice and entailing imprisonment of thousands of innocent men, there would de honourable peace for them. But it was not to be. Their European rivals in trade have set up a vehement and virulent agitation against them which may end in disaster to them if we do not do our duty. Fortunately, both the Government of India and the Secretary of State are on the alert. And we may hope that at the very least the new Act just passed by the South African Legislature will be repealed or so amended as not to diminish the rights existing at the time of the Smuts-Gandhi settlement. All India will anxiously await the result of Sir Benjamin Robertson's mission to South Africa. We may derive further consolation from the fact that our good friend Mr. C. F. Andrews is on his way to South Africa to assist our countrymen there. The Imperial Citizenship Association deserves our congratulations for arranging Mr. Andrews' visit. As you are aware Mr. Andrews was requested on his way to visit East Africa. His cable to Mr. Gandhi from East Africa is alarming and shows that the greed and the prejudice of the European trader and speculator will make him compass the ruin of the Indian settlers in East Africa even by employing dishonest means. The history of East Africa is a history of peaceful development by our countrymen without the gun and the brandy bottle. The Indian trader who has gone to East Africa

•

has been on the friendliest terms with the Africans and has raised their oulture without making any boast of civilizing them. It is a libel to say that our traders have brought about moral depravity. Let us hope that the Government of India will tell the anti-Indian agitators in unmistakable language that the rights of the Indians in East Arica are not to be interfered with in any way whatsoever. In your name I assure our countrymen of our warm sympathy and support in their struggle to defeat this utterly unscrupulous and interested agitation.

Then there remains the question of indentured labour, We may congratulate the Government of India and ourselves that on this question there is no division of opinion. The system of indentured labour is gone for I trust that Lord Chelmsford's assurance that the Fiji indentures ever. will be cancelled in the beginning of the new year will be fulfilled and that an announcement to that effect will be made before the year is out. It would be wrong of me not to mention Sir George Barnes' name in this con-These questions come under his department. And thanks to nection. Mr. Andrews' exposure and Sir George Barnes' sympathetic attitude we shall soon see our countrymen in Fiji freed from the curse. The natural corollary to this must be the termination of Indian indenture in the other parts of the dominions also.

Swadeshi.—From matters which require political action I come to that which in its one aspect requires no political or legal action, yet which is one that is fraught with the greatest consequences for good. I refer to Swadeshi. Mr. Gandhi has made this question his own. He would, if he could, revive the ancient industry of hand-spinning and make the country self-supporting. Modern economists may doubt the success of the scheme in this age of machinery. But Mr. Gandhi's scheme is one in which there is no waste and if it becomes popular it bids fair to solve the problem of finding a subsidiary occupation to agriculture. Seventy-three per cent. of our population is agricultural. No agricultural population can exlst without a supplementary industry. If our women were to take to hand-spinning and if hand-weaving became fashionable as before, without a big organization and without a large outlay of money, we can not only produce sufficient cloth for our wants but provide the peasantry with an auxiliary industry! I commend the scheme to the attention of the delegates.

Other Subjects.—I have trespassed enough on your indulgence. Yet I have not touched many important problems which vitally affect the future of our country. I have not considered the question of education with which is bound up all hope of future progress, nor have I dealt with industries or the terrible poverty of the people. The Universities and the Industries Commissions have done good work in 'their respective spheres, but true reform can only be effected when the full control of these departments is put in the hands of the representatives of the people, who alone can understand and supply the needs of the country. Resolutions on these subjects will, I doubt not, be laid before you for your acceptance. They will be moved by eminent speakers, far more competent to deal with their special subjects than I can presume to be.

Mr. B. G. Horniman.—But by your leave, I shall say a few words about a friend of India who has suffered because of the love he bore our country. This Congress needs no words of mine to inform it of the many and varied services, which Mr. B. G. Horniman has rendered to our cause. (Hear, Hear). We are a grateful nation and our friends are not so many that we can afford to forget or lose any of them. Mr. Horniman, as you are aware, was removed from a bed of sickness and without any respite made to leave the country. (Hear, Hear). That is the way of the bureaucracy. Charges of a gross nature nave been made against him in the House of Commons and elsewhere. They have been contradicted and proved to be false, but there has been no withdrawal of them, nor has Mr. Horniman been permitted to return. In England he is devoting himself to our cause, but that is poor consolation for us, who miss his wise counsel and his sturdy independence.

**Conclusion**.—Fellow delegates, I have had my say. It is for you now to deliberate on the many problems which await solution. Yours is a tremendous responsibility. India is entering upon a new phase of her existence and her future is in your keeping. It is for you to decide what is the best and the quickest way for us to reach our goal.

But what is our ultimate goal? We want freedom of thought, freedom of action, freedom to fashion our own destiny and build up an India-suited to the genius of her people. We do not wish to make of India a cheap and slavish imitation of the west. We have so far sought to liberalise our government on the western model. Whether that will satisfy us in the future I cannot say. But let us bear in mind that western democracy has not proved a panacea for all ills; it has not yet solved the problems which surround us. Europe is torn asunder by the conflict between labour and capital, and the proletariat is raising its head against the rule of the classes. It may be that when we get the power to mould our institutions, we shall evolve a system of government, which will blend all that is best in the east and west. Meanwhile, let is beware of the errors of the west and at the same time cast out the evil customs and traditions which have clung to us. We must aim at an India where all are free and have the fullest opportunities of development; where women have ceased to be in bondage, and rigours of the caste system have disappeared; where there are no privileged classes or communities; where education is free and open to all; where the capitalist and the landlord do not oppress the labourer and the ryot; where labour is respected and well paid, and poverty, the nightmare of the present generation, is a thing of the past. Life will then be worth living in this country, it will be inspired by joy and hope, and the terrible misery we see around, us will become a bad dream which has faded away from our memory, on our awakening to welcome the morning sun.

But that day is yet distant. We have still a difficult path, full of obstacles and pitfalls before us. Let us march ahead with truth for our guide and courage our watchward and before long we shall reach the promised land. (Lord and prolonged cheers).

## ELECTION OF THE MEMBERS OF THE SUBJECTS COMMITTEE.

Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra said:-Ladies and Gentlemen. The election of the Members of the Subjects Committee by the various provinces will take place in this pandal just now by the delegates of the various provinces in the blocks which are allotted to them, except the election of Bengal, which will take place at the Baijnath High School, where the Bengal delegates are. The Subjects Committee Meeting will take place in this pandal here at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning. The All-India Congress Committee meeting which was announced yesterday to meet here half an hour, after the present congress is now adjourned till a half past ten to-morrow morning here in this pandal or in the shamiana which is close by, that is half an hour before the meeting of the subjects Committee. The session of the Congress meets the day after to-morrow here in this pandal at 11 o'clock. The Social Conference meets to-morrow in this pandal in the evening at 6 o'clock The All-India Temperence Conference will be held to-morrow in the Temperence Hall at 6 p. m. at which the Hon'ble Pundit Madan Mohan Malaviya will preside.

The Congress then adjourned till Monday, the 29th December 1919.

#### SECOND DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

#### (29th December 1919).

The proceedings commenced with the singing of the national songs by Shrimati Prasanni Devi of Jullunder, Mrs. Sarala Devi Chaudhrani's party and others.

Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra then read out the messages of sympathy which had been received by the Congress. In doing so he said :--

Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen, I have now to place before you the various messages of sympathy which have been received by the President of the Indian National Congress. Of the various messages which have been received, the first message which I will place before you is the message from our dear brethren, Messrs Mahommed Ali and Shaukat Ali; they have wired that they have been released and they say that if their mother is well they will reach Amritsar tomorrow morning. They also pray to God that He might guide our counsel. I will now read their telegram :—"If mother well reach Amritsar 30th morning, Pray God guide your counsel." (The message was translated into Hindi by Pundit Ji). The message was received with great acclamation.

The second telegram which I have to place before you is a message from our brethren in Canada. They say "We representative Hindustanis from Canada under auspicious Khalsa Diwan Society greeting, consider Reform Act. (The telegram is a long one and I need not read the whole of it before you).

Then we have received a message which if you will kindy keep silence I will read the whole of it. It is from Maharshi Rabindranath Tagore. It is as follows :---

Light the signal for us, Father, who have strayed away from Thee.

Our dwelling is among ruins haunted by lowering shades of fear.

- Our heart is bent under the load of despair and we insult Thee when we grovel to dust at every favour or threat that mocks our manhood.
- For thus is desecrated the dignity of Thee in us Thy children, for thus we put out the light and in our abject fear make it seem that our orphaned world is blind and Godless.
- Yet I can never believe that You are lost to us, my King, though our poverty is great and deep our shame.
- Your will works behind a veil of despair and in Your own time opens the gate of the Impossible.
- You come as unto Your own house into the unprepared hall on the unexpected day,
- Dark ruins at Your touch become like a bud nourishing unseen in its bosom the fruition of fulfilment.

Therefore, I still have hope, not that the wreeks will be mended, but that a new world will arise.

If it is Thy will let us rush into the thick of coflicts and hurts.

Only give us Thy own weapon, my Master, the power to suffer and to trust.

Honour us with difficult duties and pain that is hard to bear.

Summon us to efforts whose fruit is not in success and to errands which fail and yet find their prize.

And at the end of our task let us proudly bring before Thee our scars and lay at Thy feet the soul that is ever Free and Life that is deathless.

Then, we have received a message from Mr. Adamson, Chairman of the British Labour Party. He says "The British Parliamentary Labour Party in sending fraternal greetings to the Indian National Congress wish to assure the Indian people of its fullest sympathy and support in the continuance of the struggle for achievement of complete self-government within the Empire; whilst recogising the inadequacy of the Montagu' reforms British labour trusts that a new era for India is dawning and will do its utmost to secure for her at earliest moment political and economic freedom. We take this opportunity of conveying to the Congress our appreciation of the very valuable services rendered by the Congress delegates and in particular its General Secretary the Hon'ble Mr. V.J. Patel, in assisting us to a fuller knowledge of the justice of India's claims to complete self-government. Adamson, Chairman."

The next message which I have to place before you is a message from the International Women Sufferance Alliance:—

"International Women Sufferage Alliance representing twenty-six countries trusts National Congress will vote solidly for women's sufferage in India".

Then we have a message from Mrs. Sarojini Naidu:----

"I carnestly pray that the scene of murder in the city of the Golden Temple will prove a true shrine of the reconciliation, reunite all devoted patriotic ideals and energies in an invincible fellowship of self-less national service. The measure of our unity is the sole authentic measure of our real worth and power to serve' India trustfully and fearlessly to defend her right, avenge her wrongs and see her high on the federation of strong free nations".

The last message is from our dear Lala Lajpat Rai. The mersage is from New York, United States of America:—

"Congratulations. Best wishes for whole-hearted loyal co-operation on return. Hindu-Mohammadan unity must form basis of all future work".

The time at our disposal is very little and I cannot read to you the innumerable messages which have been received; it will be sufficient if I read the names of those individuals who have kindly sent us a message of sympathy and of good wishes: - Messrs. These are all, Sir, the various messages which we have received.

The President:--- ! put before the congress the following resolution:---

## Resolution I—Royal Clemency.

1.—This Congress tenders its respectful thanks to His Majesty the King Emperor for his gracious Proclamation dated the 23rd December 1919, and welcomes the announcement that His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, will visit India next winter and assures him of a warm reception by the people of this country.

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

# Resolution II—Indians in South Africa.

Mahatmta M. K. Gandhi.—(Mahatma Gandhi first made a speech in Hindi on the resolution). A summary of which is as follows:—

# Speech of Mahatma M. K. Gandhi.

Mahatma Gandhi rose amid tremondous cheering and in proposing the second resolution said the resolution entrusted to him was a very important one. All the Indians were agreed that India was entitled to responsible Government. If that was so, they must render help to their brothers and sisters who were at that time suffering in South Africa. The atrocities to which their brethren in the Punjab had been subjected this year were heart-rending, and there was not a man in India who did not sympathize with them in their troubles. But the conditions in South and East Africa were still worse and domanded their immediate attention. Mahatma Gandhi traced the introduction of the Indentured system to the request of the whitemen of Natal in South Africa to the India Government for Indian labour. That system, he was bound to say, was enormously worse than life in the Indian jails. Sir William Hunter had called it a system of Elavery. Under this system their brethren had gone to South Africa. The success of Indians in trade had given rise to those tyrannies under which they were now suffering. Their trade was crushed: It was ruled that indentured labourers could not enter into trade but must live under indenture. It was said that Indians were of dirty habits, and being of a different civilization from the whitemen's the latter could not live with them. False charges were laid againt them and it was, tried to send them, tark to India. South Africa was the place where the Indians had fought in order to keep up the honour of their country and twenty thousand men had to go to jail for it. The result was that they were allowed to remain there. In 1914 several privileges were granted to the Indians. Similar was the case of Transvaal. The Indians there wanted proprietory rights and rights of trade, but these were denied to them. They wanted the Indian Government to secure these rights for them and to use means to maintain the honour of India. The second part of the resolution related to East Africa. There the people had not gone under indenture, but for pruposes of trade. Several Mohamedan brothren had gone to Zanzibar and had succeeded so well in trade that even the Africans had come under their influence. They had to cross wild, dense and dengerous jungles to reach those places and began by means of love with the natives to trade there. After a time the whitemen too plucked courage to go to those places. They then called the Indians for their help Our Sikh brethren went to Uganda etc; and it was through Indian labour that the construction of Railway was made possible there. After all this the Whitemen wanted to turn the Indians out of the place which they had made habitable with their labour. Mahatma Gandhi proceeded to say that they asked the Indian Government, who was a trustee for India. and the Indian National Congress, which was a representative body, to interfere in the matter and to save their suffering Indian brethren in Africa.

## (For full speech see Urdu supplement.)

Mahatma Gandhi then read the resolution which was as follows:---

- (a) This Congress protests against the attempt being made in South Africa and particularly the Transvaal to deprive the Indian settlers of the right of property and trade hitherto enjoyed by them and trusts that the Government of India will secure the repeal of the recently enacted legislation and otherwise ensure the protection of the status of the Indian settlers in South Africa.
- (b) This Congress is of opinion that the anti-Indian agitation now going on in East Africa is utterly unscrupulous and trusts that the Government of India will safeguard the right of free and unrestricted emirgration from India to East Africa and the full civic and political rights of the Indian settlers in East Africa including the East African territory conquered from Germany.

Mahatma M. K. Gandhi speaking in English said:—This is the letter addressed to the Congress by Mr. C. F. Andrews. As you know, he was at the time in East Africa investigating the position there. He writes:—

Gentlemen of the Indian National Congress. You will understand the deep pain and indignation which the following challenge to Indian residents in East Africa on the part of the European settlers has caused me. I enclose at the end of this letter a copy of the two principal documents dealing with the subject. My indignation has grown deeper still since I have seen with my own eyes how unjustified the attack on Indian moral character has been. If the challenge had been made merely on economic grounds the attack could have been made met without any feeling of resentment. There is no dishonour in being called more industrious and thrifty than other people, and hitherto this has been the only ground openly alleged for refusing Indian immigration. But this new challenge from East Africa is of an entirely different nature. Here the main line of attack is against the Indian moral character itself. It is broadly stated the Indian moral depravity is so great that Indians cannot be allowed to contaminate the Africans any longer. Let me quote from the two main documents which have levelled this gross charge against us. The first is declaration of the Convention of Associations of East Africa, the most important non-official body of Europeans in the country which has often gone by the name of the Whiteman's Parliament. The declaration begins as follows:-This convention wishes to point out to the Government that during the discussion of a petition regarding Indians as also those affecting the native peoples of this country they had the assistance of four missionaries, one being a Roman Catholic and three being from the Missionary Conference which was sitting in Nairobi at the same time as the Convention. It proceeds in this way. That whereas our national ideals of enlightenment and progress are crystallised in our Christian western civilsation and it is our duty to make sure that the best contained therein is readily available for the needs of awakening Africa and whereas the maintenance of this country depends entirely on the prestige and force of character of the whitemen and whereas certain Indians have entered this country as traders, clerks and assistants and whereas these people follow in all things a civilisation which is Eastern and in many respects repugnant to ours, (here then is the main charge stated in somewhat crude language. It is more openly explained in the conclusion), The declaration proceeds "we conceive short of the retrocession of the territory to Germany, of no transaction more immoral and more certain to recoil on our heads than the betrayal to the Asiatic of a section of the African peoples whose destinies have fallen into our hands and who at present are unable to protect themselves. We submit that to buy off Indians' or other agitation at the expense of the natives of Africa would be a policy neither wise nor honourable."

The second document is of even greater practical significance. It is to all intents and purposes an official record; it forms part of the report of the economic commission which was presided over by one of the leading Government officials, The findings were unamious. I quote the following:-

There are again (I am quoting from the declaration) unfortunately reasons of even greater weight against all Indian immigration into the sor indeed any part of Africa. Physically the Indian is not a wholesome influence because of his unnameable repugnance to sanitation and hygiene. The moral depravity of the Indian is equally damaging to the African who in his natural state is at least innocent of the worst vices of the East. The Indian is the inciter to crime as well as to violence. It is our • firm conviction that the justification of our occupation of this country lies in our ability to adapt the native to our own civilisation. If we further complicate this task by continuing to expose the African to the demoralising influence of the Asiatic as distinct from European philosophy we shall be guilty of a breach of trust."

The only minority report on the Indian question (Mr. Andrews proceeds) was an additional note of Mr. Cobb. He states that the quotation which he makes about Indians was drafted by the whole body of the commission but was omitted at the last meeting. But Mr. Cobb would not be satisfied with its ommission, and inserts it under his own signature as a note. It is significantly similar to the declaration of the convention of associations, and proves that there is practically no difference between the official and the non-official view of Indian morality among Europeans generally. Mr. Cobb's quotation which you might as well have is as follows:—" We the Commissioners have already stated in chapter VII what we submit are final reasons against the betrayal to the Asiatic of any section of the African peoples, the responsibility of whose destinies has fallen into our hands. Short of the India requires an outlet there are vast empty spaces in Asia awaiting development to which it might now be practicable for her to apply her energies."

Gentlemen of the Congress, (Mr. Andrews concludes), if there had been any valid ground for this attack upon the moral character of the Indian community, I should not have hesitated to expose the facts. On a former occassion in Fiji I had to do this very thing; we had Indians labouring under the indenture system. I did not shrink then as you all know from telling you the plain unvarnished truth, but here after the most careful examination on the spot I am convinced that the attack is groundless in its main challenge. I have found the young Guzeratis who now form the main body of those that have come from India to East. Africa leading a domestic and social life which taken as a whole is a credit to their motherland. I cannot do more in this letter than state emphatically this conclusion to which I have come. If it had been possible for me I should have returned myself to lay before you the whole matter: but I must proceed immediately to South Africa. I trust you yourselves gentlemen, will accept the challenge and uphold the character of the children of the motherland. I trust also that you will protest both at the Congress itself and at the All-India Muslim League and throughout the length and breadth of India against this deliberate policy of excluding Indians on the ground of moral unfitness from the whole of Africa."

I commend both the resolutions to the Congress, and I hope and I have not the slightest doubt that the Congress will take up the challenge and return the reply that is deserved by the Europeans in East Africa. Mr. Nadirshaw Cama (East Africa) seconded the resolution in an l r l u speech.

## Speech of Mr. Cama.

Mr. Nadir Shah Cama in Seconding Mahatma Gandhi's resolution gave further details of the iniquities heaped upon the Indians in South and East Africa, how the system of finger impressions of the Indians; like criminals, was introduced, how a £ 3/-tax on indentured men was levied, how they had been deprived of their trade and how even purchase of land by Indian Companies was refused. During the course of the struggle thirty thousand Indians out of a hundred thousand had gone willingly to jail to save Indian honour. The troubles of the Indians were innumerable. On the railway they were treated like sheep, they were not allowed to travel on the tramway so much so that an Indian had been thrown out of a moving tram car, because he was an Indian, and had died. As long as India did not obtain Swaraj the condition of the Indians in Africa was bound to continue as before.

The President announced at this stage that Lala Dunichand had been released and would be in Amritsar the following day. The announcement was received with great acclamation.

#### Speech of Mr. Nataranjan.

Mr. K. Nataranjan; in further supporting the resolution said:—Ladies and Gentlemen, the resolution has been placed before you so comprehensively and elequently by the one man who can speak with great authority on the subject. Mr. Gandhi, that I do not think it necessary for me to add many words in support of this proposition, especially because I am just now going away to Bombay. I have come here simply to show my sympathy and to support this resolution which has been placed before you so fully. Thank you very much.

#### Speech of Mr. S. V. Thakkur.

Mr. S. V. Thakkur (East Africa) further supporting the resolution said :---

Mr. President, brother delegates, ladies and gentlemen, in East Africa today the foundation of injustice and usurpation is being laid by the white community who claim the right of morality and civilisation. Their civilisation has been empty, as you have seen in the message of Mr. Andrews from East Africa. What they say against the Indian today is that he dominates the native whom the white man means to bring up to the standard of European civilisation. It is not the Indian who stands in the way of the civilising influence of the whiteman. The Indian has gone to the remotest corner of the country, has been trading with the native for hundreds of years past and is helping to bring his produce on the market for purposes of export. The Indian supplies the needs of the native. It is the Indian who supplies all the clerical staff of the Government, all

c

the professional men and all the European merchants as well. It is the Indian artisan who has been responsible for building the Uganda Railway the main artery of communication in the whole of the protectorate and also for the advent of the white man in the country. Had it not been for the Uganda railway, the capital of East Africa, Nairobi, would not have been built up to-day. Had it not been for the enterprising spirit of Mr. Jeevanjee, who was the only contractor who volunteered to build the railway, East Africa would not have been in existence to day. Ladies and gentlemen, the Indian even of to-day is responsible for building the home of the white men. Against that Indian the European who wants only to grab unearned increment without sweating for it puts forth his right, which is backed up by the might in England, to remove poor Indian from the country. The European has no better claim to that country than the Indian. The Indian has been the poincer in every respect in that country. He has been carrying on the trade peacefully. Every inch of land posessed by the Indian in that country is under cultivation, while you will see Europeans who came out twenty years ago in the highlands of East Africa which they claim to make a whiteman's colony, have hardly developed one hundredth of their holdings. (Shame, shame). They are only waiting for the time to grab money by way of speculation. They are never going to develop the country; they do not mean it in earnest; and they claim sympathy from agitators in South Africa. The South African is predominant in that country, and with his predominance on the legislative and Municipal Councils he wants everything to go his own way as things did in South Africa. Two things which are mainly against us in that country and which go a great deal against our just rights are the Crown Land Ordinance which effects the alienation of all lands in that country. Under that ordinance, which was enacted in 1915, the Governor has the power to veto sales, transfers, mortgages and even tenancy relations between members of two different communities, the Europeans and the Indians. That power of veto is invariably exercised in the case of an Indian trying to possess land in the main arteries of trade in Nairobi. I have got a number of instances into which I do not wish to go now as the time-limit is very short. Coupled with the Crown Lands Ordinance is the new Segregation of Races Bill which is being introduced. After the Segregation of Races Bill comes into force, the effect of the two legislations combined will be to drive the Indian away from trade, from settlement, from possessing even residential properties in the most healthy parts of the towns. Not only that, but the Indian will be economically squeezed out by the effect of these two legislations (shame, shame). Then, the most important question is how are we to safeguard against these unjust laws that are being proclaimed in that country? Commander Wedgewood asked Col. Amery in the House of Commons as regards the representation of Indians on the legislative and municipal bodies of East Africa. Col. Amery replied that effective representation would be granted to the Indian community. But see how this was put into practice. ſn August this year, the Electoral Representation Bill was granted to the European community. According to that law 22 seats on the Legislative Council have been allotted to Europeans 11 being non-official members of the European community and 11 official Europeans, while two nominated seats have been allotted to us. You can fancy, gentlemen, who would be nominated members, who are usually considered to be the instruments of the Government, are capable of doing anything to safeguard the interests of the community which stands in a majority of three to one in that country. On the municipal

tody there are 12 seats which are given to the European community by election and the president and chairman of the municipal body is an official. Against that up to last year, although the Indian community had a right of election, this year they have been deprived of it and two nominated Indians are going to be sent there; but the Indians have refused to go on that body by nomination (Hear, Hear). The Indians refused to accept nomination on the legislative councils, as they have no voice in the executive of that government. You can fancy, gentlemen, what the white community is capable of doing with all the laws at their support. In the Soldiers' Settlement Scheme no provision has been made for the Indian. The Indian fought the Empire's battles in all the theatres of war. He fought for the . conquest of German East Africa and he has been mainly responsible for that conquest; and when the Indian community urged for a share in the Soldiers' Settlement Scneme the Government flatly refused say that there was no land available for them. (Shame, shame). If the Indian wants to claim any rights, he may as well go to India. I do not propose to take up any more of your time, and I commend the resolution to your support. (Hear, hear).

## Speech of Mr. Anantani.

# Mr. Anantani (East Africa-Supporting the resolution said:-

Mr. President, ladies and gentlemen, I do not consider it is at all necessary for me to say anything further in requesting you to pass the resolution moved by no less a personality than Mahatmaji Gandhi and supported by my two predecessors. They have told what they had to 'say, but as a representative of Zanzibar and the occupied territory of East Africa from Germany, I will tell you only in a few words that I have got up to support this resolution not as a matter of formality only. It is to day that the gratitude of so many thousands of our follow-countrymen in East Africa goes out, first to the Indian by birth and secondly to the Indian by adoption, Mahatma Gandhi and Rev. C. F. Andrews, (cheers) who have made a personal study of the subject; and if Mahatma Gandhi was one day Gandhi the Great of South Africa, I do not know but he will be called today Gandhi the Great of the whole of Africa. (Hear, hear.) My predecessors have told you what they had to say, but I have to say only' a few words. They have placed before you the facts, they have placed before you the grievances and I do not want to take up any more of your time. But I will tell you the words of the most responsible statesman in the United Kingdom, becaues it is not to the advantage of the whites that the speeches made by Mahatma Gandhi should be quoted, because his speeches I have learned are only quoted when they are of advantage to them; and therefore I will tell you what the Rt. Hon'ble Mr. Winston Churchill, once Under-Secretary, has said about the enterprise of Indians in East Africa. He says "It is the Indian trader who penetrating and maintaining himself in all sorts of places to which no white man could go or in which no white man could earn a living has more than any one else developed the carly beginnings of trade and opened up the first slender means of East Africa". And it is that Indian by whose capital and by whose enterprise and by whose assistance to the Empire in the days of stress that East Arrica was developed, that British East Africa was preserved and German East Africa won during the war; it is from that country to day that we are on the verge of being kicked out-on what ground?

on the ground of moral depravity. I am sure Lord Sinha, if he would be gracious enough to visit East Africa, would also be considered morally depraved by the white settlers in East Africa. (Shame, shame.) At the Imperial Conference and in the House of Lords, we were told that we are parts of the Empire. I tell you what do you want to do with the Empire minus the Indians in the Empire? We may be said to be anything; but when slavery was abolished it was the Indians of Zanzibar who abolished slavery first. The Bartle Frere commission first went to the Sultans of East Africa and asked them to abolish slavery; the sultans were obsolutely against it then because it was by slavery alone that East Africa could be developed. But when the first proclamation from British was issued it was Mr. Jamal who released thousands of slaves, not by spoiling the honour of their women as in Fiji, not by turning them away foodless and homeless as in South Africa, but by giving them maintenance that would last for years; and it was after this that the British were able to establish themselves intheir present predominance. I want to tell you this, that but for the existence of Indians in East Africa the present predominance of Great Britain there would be a mere impossibility.

One word more, Sir, and I have done. When we came from East Africa we never dreamt that our cause would so soon be taken up by so august an assembly as the Indian National Congress. But when we first visited the Pandal the masterly reference made by bour President in his speech to the condition of Indians overseas was a veritable casis to us in the dark desert of desperation and it is now the sentiments of gratitude of so many thousands of Indians in East Africa that I want to place before you. I wish to thank you all today and to request that you make this a matter of your study and see that our grievances are redressed and then and then only we could boast of having built up a nation. With these few words, Sir, I request you to pass this resolution with acclamation. (Hear, hear.)

**President**:—This resolution which has been read out to you by Mr. Gandhi has been sufficiently discussed by the subsequent speakers. I now put it to vote.

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

## Resolution III.—Fiji Indentures.

Hon. Pundit Madan Mohan Malaviya then moved :—

(a). This Congress views with greatful satisfaction the Viceregal declaration that the existing indentures in Fiji are likely to be cancelled at the end of the current year and hopes that a final declaration to that effect will be made by the Government of India before the end of the year and this Congress further hopes that indentured emigration in any form whatsoever whether under the same or another name will never be renewed.

- (b). This Congress places on record its grateful appreciation of the valuable and selfless services rendered by Mr. C. F. Andrews to the afflicted in the Punjab, to the cause of indentured Indians.
  - in Fiji and elsewhere and the services being rendered to the. Indian settlers in East and South Africa.

(The Pundit Ji made a speech in Hindi).

# Speech of The Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya.

In proposing the above resolution, the Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya made a highly touching and pathetic speech in Urdu, which brought tears to the eyes, not only of the speaker himself but many of the audience were seen weeping. The speaker described how the system of indentured labour was a relic of the old slave trade, how under that system unwary Indians were entrapped and sent out to foreign countries, where they were bound to serve a single master for five years without the least objection. how their life was made miserable in thuse countries, how on the slightest pretext they were mercilssly whipped. how Indians had jumped overboard to escape that but in vain. The worst part of the whole disgraceful affair was that one Indian woman was made to serve four men. Indian women who had sacrified their lives for their honour, who had preferred death to dishonour any whose deeds of heroism were being sung with pride to this day, were made to submit to this immoral, inhuman and debasing fate under the Indentured system, and there was none to hear their wailings. It was due to the agitation set up by their brother Mohandas Gandhi and the efforts of their late brother Gokhale that their had been some amelioration in their condition. They were thankful to His Excellency Lord Hardinge who had agreed to stop that system. It was reassuring to learn from the Viceloy that since the 30th July 1917 there had been no new victim of this system, and that at the end of this year all indentuced labourers in Fiji would be released. The Indians must now see to it that this system has no chance of being introduced again in any shape or form. Honestly speaking their own country was wide enough to accommodate every body. The Indians claimed to have responsible Government, but so long as Indians were known as coolies in foreign countries, it was impossible to attain Swaraj. The speaker than recognised the services rendered by Mr. Andrews in the Punjab, Fiji, South Africa and other places in suitable terms.

## Speech of Hon'ble B. N. Sarma.

The Hon'ble Mr. B. N Sarma supporting the resolution said:-

Mr. President, brother and sister delegates, ladies and Gentlemen, I am glad that the Indian National Congress has given the subject of interimperial and international problems a pre-eminent place in its programme. It is but just that this parliament of the people of India (hear, hear) should discharge the primary function of protecting Indian interests in interimperial and inter-national problems and in the solution of those problems. Until we are given full self-government and until the Government of India Council becomes the Parliament of the Indian people, nowhere else can this subject be discussed with that freedom, with that fulness and with that dispassionate candour which the subject deserves. Friends, we are only a component part of the League of Nations, whatever subordinate part we may

be distined to play in it for a little while. But we must realise that we have full responsibility and we must urge the members who represent us in the League of Nations to do their duty by the Indian people. even though such members may be selected by the Government of India or His Majesty's Secretary of State. And what is our message to them in respect of South Africa? What is our message to them in respect of colonial migration? The first part of this resolution deals with the expression of our satisfaction that the Government of India have seen their way to acknowledge the correctness of our claim that no one shall be allowed to proceed from India to Fiji or any other colony until and unless he is given exactly the same social and political vote as any white settler in that colony or protectorate. Our thanks in respect, of the migration to Fiji and the settlers therein, and our earnest gratitude are due to Mr. Andrews and Mahatma Gandhi in this respect; and may I couple with those two, the name of Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya (cheers), because 1 know some of the history during the last three years whereby Mr. Ardrews and Mr. Gandbi have been able to convert the Government of India and His Excellency the Viceroy to their views. I know that when Mr. Andrews approached the viceregal throne and the Government of India on this subject he was treated very coldly. But his fearless attack and his adherence to truth and right principle converted Lord Chelmsford to his view. when Lord Chelmsford was convinced of the enormity and gravity of the situation; and may I say, Sir, that we have very many quarrels with Lcrd Chelmsford-he has to explain to us the attitude which he has taken upon several questions, but it is only right that we should appreciate him when he has done right and this is one of the subjects on which he has done right; and if he has succeeded in winning the applause of the Indian people, it is due to Mr. Andrews and Mr. Gandhi. Now, Sir, may I say a word with regard to this inter-imperial problem? I say that I address my remarks not so much to the Government of India as to the Parliament and the British people, and the other members of the League of Nations. Remember that Indian soldiers were employ  $\epsilon$ d in winning the last victory. Remember also that the handful of colonials in South Africa and in East Africa and in Australia and in Canada cannot hold their positions without Indian help. (Hear, hear.) Remember also that Indian money and Indian soldiers are placed on a war footing not so much for the defence of India as for imperial purposes; and hereafter in our next budget we shall be asked to vote for money for these purposes; but we warn the peoples of England and other countries that unless Indians are given exactly the same rights, political and social, in East Africa and in South Africa and elsewhere, the Parliament of India, the Government of India Ccuncil, and let us hope the Government of India themselves, will refuse to permit one anna of Indian money to be employed for the purpose or one Indian soldier to be employed outside the Indian frontier for the purpose. This a warning we give on behalf the people of India to Great Britain, to the United Kingdom and to the members of the League of Nations. I hope, therefore, that this resolution will be carried with acclamation, especially when we know of the wonderful record of services rendered by Mr. Andrews and Mahatma Gandhi.

# Mr. Bhawani Dayal supported the resolution in a Hindi speech.

# ` Speech of Mr. Bhawani Dyal',

Mr. Bhawani Dyal (Behar) further supported the resolution in a speech in Urdu in the course of which he said Indians in foreign countries were being subjected to disgraceful treatment. They were as much sons of Mothers India as others. They were looking up to her for help, and were ready to sacrifice themselves for her and were entitled to the same amount of attention and regard as those in India. He thanked Mr. Andrews for his uniform help to the Indians through thick and thin. Such were the selfless souls, who were an honour to their own nation and country. \*

The resolution was put and carried.

The Congress adjourned at this stage till 12 o'clock the next day (Tuesday 30-12-19).

### THIRD DAY'S PROCEEDINGS,

### Tuesday, 30th December 1919.

The Congress re-assembled at 11 o'clock on Tuesday the 30th December 1919 in the pandal. The proceedings of the Congress actually began at 12 noon with a song sung by Srimati Sarala Devi Chaudhrani and a number of young ladies. Pundit Budh Dev then sung another song in Hindi.

Before commencing the business of the day, the President said :---

Ladies and Gentlemen, before we begin the proceedings of the day, I wish to address a few words to the members of the press present here. It has been a source of great disappointment and pain to me that certain papers have reported the proceedings of the Subjects Committee (Cries of Shame) which, I say, is nothing short of a breach of confidence. (Hear, Hear). Either some member of the press who was not also a member of the Subjects Committee gained entrance into the Subjects Committee tent without permission, which itself was a most reprehensible thing to do, or some member of the press who was also a member of the Subjects Committee, has been guilty of disclosing the confidence that was reposed in him. In either case I shall feel it my duty, if any further reports are published of what happens in the Subjects Committee, to exclude the members of the press from this congress. (Hear, Hear).

The Editor, Shakti, who was sitting with the press reporters, rose and said: Mr. President, may I address something on behalf of the press?

The President:-You have no right.

۰.

I will take up the 5th resolution as printed on the agenda.

Resolution IV—Congress Sub-Committee on Disorders. Mr. B. Chakravarti (Bengal) in moving the resolution said:—

### The Speech of Mr. B. Chakravarti. (Bengal)

Mr. President, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the honour to place before you this resolution which has been placed in my a charge:—

> "That having regard to the correspondence between His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab and the Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya, this Congress is of opinion that H. H. the Lieutenant-Governor's action in not permitting even a few of the Punjab leaders undergoing imprisonment, to attend and sit in the committee room even as prisoners under custody to assist and instruct counsel in the same manner as the Government counsel instructed by the official whose conduct was under investigation of the Disorders Inquiry Committee, constitutes a serioue injustice and that it left no other course open to the Sub-Committee of the Congress to take than the one taken by it;

this Congress therefore endorses and approves of the firm and dignified action taken by the Sub-Committee and in appointing Commissioners to make an investigation and submit a report."

Ladies and Gentlemen, in order to make this resolution intelligible to you I am afraid you must possess your soul in a little patience. In order, I say, to make this resolution intelligible to you, I shall very briefly relate to you the action which was taken in connection with the deplorable incidents which happened in April last in the Punjab. As soon as the facts came to the knowledge of the members of the All-India Congress Committee, a meeting of the All-India Congress Committee was held and a Sub-Committee was appointed for the purpose of taking certain steps in connection with the disorders  $\cdot$ that had taken place. The All-India Congress Committee offered to take other steps, and I shall relate them at the present moment. Well, the Sub-Committee was charged with certain steps to be taken in connection with the disorders, as I have already said. The All-India Congress Committee asked for a Royal Commission for the purpose of a full enquiry into the deplorable. incidents which took place. The Sub-Committee failed in getting a Commission of that character, but a Committee was appointed, as you know, by the Government of India. I am not here to discuss whether the Committee ought to have been appointed as it is or ought to have been constituted otherwise. But the Sub-Committee was appointed for the purpose of investigating the facts, and also, I take it, for the purpose of ascertaining the truth, for the purpose of ascertaining whether the complaint made on behalf of the people was right. whether the whole action was unwarranted or whether the version of the Gov-. ernment was wight that it was necessary to take the steps which they had taken for the purpose of quelling a rebellion, as it was said. However, that may be, the Sub-Committee wanted permission to appear before the Hunter Committee, as it has since been called, and permission was given under certain restric-The counsel, my friends Mr. C.R. Dass and Pundit Madan tions. Mohan Malaviya appeared for some time before the Hunter Committee. Their object was to assist the Committee in ascertaining the truth and they could only do so, if in point of fact facilities were afforded to them for the purpose of sifting the facts brought before the Disorders Inquiry Committee. One of the things which it was necessary for them to do was to cross-examine witnesses. You are aware that, in point of fact, statments were made by witnesses beforehand in writing which came into the hands of the Hunter Committee No copies were given to the counsel appearing for the Congress Sub-Committee. Further, very limited power was given to the counsel......

> (At this stage the news of the arrival of Lala Dunichand after his , release produced loud and enthusiastic cheering and shouts of of "Bharatmata ki jai" and "Bande Mataram" with the result that the speaker hal to stop for some time until Lala Dunichand actually came to the platform. On arrival Lala Dunichand was profusely garlanded and made to stand in the rostrum. He received an enthusiastic ovation which he acknowledged by bowing before the large audience.)

Continuing, Mr. Chakravarti said:—Ladies and Gentlemen, as I was going to say, the Counsel appearing on behalf of the All-India Congress Committee desired that they should be allowed to have copies of the statements made by the official witnesses beforehand and further that the victims, one of them is Lala Dunichand who has just appeared before you, should be allowed to come and sit in the committee room and instruct counsel for the purpose of examining the official witnesses. What justice is this? Although the Government was represented by counsel, although, the Government counsel had access to all the written material, although Government officials whose conduct was under investigation were the allowed to remain in the committee room, your counsel were denied the right to receive instructions from their clients then in custody, and the modest request that was made was this, that they should be brought into the Committee room in custody and then taken to jail again: otherwise it was impossible to carry on the investigation to any useful purpose. It was impossible for your counsel to know the truth. and if the object of the Hunter Committee was to ascertain the truth, I fail to understand why this request was denied. An appeal was made to the Local Government, and they refused it. A further appeal was made to the Hunter Committee itself. That failed. Then my friend Pundit Malaviya had an interview with His Lordship Lord Hunter. Fcr nearly two hours my friend Pundit Malaviya tried to persuade Lord Hunter in regard to the necessity of the Inquiry Committee to interfere and recommend to the Local Government, the Punjab Government, to allow these gentlemen to be brought in custody in the committee room during the time that the official witnesses were being cross-examined. That also was denied. Under those circumstances, they elected to retire and no selfrespecting person could have taken any other course, and they decided that there should be an Inquiry Committee on behalf of the congress itself, and your President the Hon'ble Pandit Motilal Nehru, Mahatma Gandhi, Pundit Malaviya, Mr. Abbas Tyabji, Mr. C. R. Dass and Mr. Fazal Haq were appointed members of the Committee, as Commissioners to enquire. Later on, Pundit Motilal Nehru, your present President, then president-elect. had to resign. Lonly say that in point of fact the work which has been done by this Committee, and you will see it when the report comes out, has been done excellently well.

What your resolution therefore says is this. "That this congress is of opinion that H. H. the Lieutenant Governor's action in not permitting even a few of the Punjab leaders undergoing imprisonment to attend and sit in the committee room even as prisoners under custody to assist and instruct counsel in the same manner as the Government counsel was instructed by the officials whose conduct was under investigation of the Disorders Inquiry Committee, constitutes a serious injustice". That is the first proposition, that is to say, the Local Government, especially the head of the local Government, His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of the Punjab, was not justified in taking the course that he did. Then the resolution goes on to say that it left no other course open to the Sub-Committee to take than the one taken by you. After that, as I have said, no solf-respecting person could have continued to appear before the Hunter Committee.

Ladies and Gentlemen, it has been suggested in some quarters that we were wrong, the members of the Sub-Committee were wrong, that the All-India Congress Committee were wrong in taking the course that they did, that we ought not to have boycotted it. If any of these gentlemen were there for the purpose of eliciting the truth—and it was impossible to elicit

the truth under the conditions imposed upon the gentlemen appearing before the Hunter Committee-I see no use of remaining there and it might have been used for the purpose of telling that the investigation was carried on in the presence of the popular party, in the presence of the counsel on behalf of the Congress, and therefore, in point of fact, we have had every opportunity of sifting the facts presented to them. I therefore ask you to endorse and approve of the action taken by the sub-committee in deciding to appoint Commissioners for the purpose of holding an enquiry on behalf of the Congress After having done that, I have only one word to say, and I have done, and it is this, I hope and trust that you will not only approve of the conduct of the Sub-committee, you will not only endorse the course taken by it, but you will, one and all, thank these gentlemen who sat on the Inquiry Committee as Commissioners for their sacrifices, for the devotion they have shown to the cause of the country, and the time and labour they have expended in ascertaining the evidence and sifting that evidence and in preparing a report which they are now preparing and which will be presented to the Congress at the right time. I have nothing more to say. (Loud cheers.)

Rai Sahib Lala Ruchi Ram Sahni (Punjab) seconded the Resolution in Urdu.

Speech of R. S. Ruchi Ram Sahni.

Rai Sahib Lala Ruchi Ram Sahni (Punjab) in supporting the above resolution said he was one of those who were in favour of producing evidence before the Hunter Committee. In view, however, of what had happened subsequently he agreed that the Congress Sub-Committee was right in refusing to produce evidence. It was after a serious discussion of 17 hours that the question had been decided. In the meantime regotiations had gone on between the Lieutenant-Governor and Mr. Andrews, Mahatma Gandhi and Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya and the only point conceded was that the man whose evidence was being recorded might be released on parol. The Congress request, however; was that when evidence was being given as to affairs of a particular place the leaders of that place might be allowed, if only as prisoners to attend and to instruct their counsel but the Lieutenant-Governor did not agree to this although even the worst criminals and murderers had that right under the law. The Congress Sub-Committee under the circumstances had no option but to decide as it did and it decided wisely and deserved the thanks of the whole country. ٠.

Maulana Fazlur Rahman (U. P.) supported the Resolution in Urdu.

Speech of Maulana Fazl-ur-Rahman.

Maulna Fazl-ur-Rahman (U. P.) in further supporting the resolution - spoke in Urdu and said repression had reached its zenith in the Punjab in Martial Law days. People were shot down, the helpless men of Gujranwala bombed from aeroplanes and counsel from outside prohibited from entering the Punjab to defend the victims of tyranny and oppression, publication of papers was stopped so that O'Dwyerian atrocities might not be revealed to the outer world. After long and strenous efforts the Hunter Committee was at last appointed, and it was hoped Britain would after all do justice to India, but that hope too was a dream and a delusion. The people were not given the right of appearing before the Committee and defending themselves. The Congress Sub-Committee had then no alternative but to refuse to 'co-operate with that Committee, and that was the only wise decision possible.

The Resolution was then put to the vote and carried by a large majority.

The President:—Ladies and Gentlemen, I now call upon Mahatma Gandhi to move the next Resolution No. 6 on the Agenda.

### Resolution V—Condemnation of Mob Excesses.

"This Congress while fully recognising the grave provocation that led to a sudden outburst of mob frenzy, deeply regrets and condemns the excesses committed in certain parts of the Punjab and Gujerat resulting in the loss of lives and injury to person and property during the month of April last".

Mahatma Gandhi when coming to the speaker's tribune, was accorded a warm and enthusiastic ovation and shouts of "Mahatma Gandhi ki jai," and "Bande Mataram" which continued for some time. He then begged the audience to be allowed to address them sitting owing to his weak state of health. A chair was then provided near the speaker's rostrum, and taking his seat Mahatma Gandhi addressed the audience first in Hindi.

#### Speech of Mahatma Gandhi.

In proposing the fifth resolution Mahatma Gandhi made a speech in Hindi after which he expressed almost the same sentiments in English for the benefit of those who could not follow his Hindi speech. He said he was bound to condemn mob excesses. He admitted that these were committed under grave provocation given by Government, but he wanted that even in grave provocation they should not lose their heads? He wanted true Satyagraha of them. To restrain anger and to bear troubles was the real Satyagraha. They wanted India to be a land of Rishis. If so, they should enthusiastically support the resolution and admit their own excesses, and India was bound to progress even in a year.

Mahatma Gandhi then addressed a few words in English. for the benefit of these who could not follow his Hindi speech. He said:—

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, those friends who have not been able to understand the few words that I have spoken in the national tongue of India will please recognise if they can the solemnity of the occasion and the gravity of the situation that faces us. I daresay before this assembly, and before those who occupy the seats of prominence on the platform, I daresay to them that there is no greater resolution before this Congress than this resolution. The whole key to, success in the future lies in your hearty acceptance of this resolution, in your hearty recognition of the truth underlying this resolution and acting up to it. To the extent that we fail in recognising the eternal truth that underlies this resolution, to that extent we are bound to fail. I say that if there had been no violence on our part-we have abundant proof of it and I can produce before you chapter and verse from Virangam, from Ahmedabad and from Bombay' that there was violence on our part intended and committed-I agree that there was grave provocation given by the Government in arresting. Dr. Kitchlew and Dr. Satyapal and in arresting me who was bent on a mission of peace at the invitation of Dr. Satyapal and Swamiji (Hear, Hear), these troubles would not have arisen. But the Government went mad at the time; we went mad also at the time. I say do not return madness with madness, but return madness with sanity and the whole situation will be yours. (Hear, Hear and loud applause).

Swami Shraddhananda seconded the resolution in Hindi.

### Speech of Swaml Shraddhananda.

Swami Shraddhananda supported the resolution in Hindi. He said Indians 'must be true to their own civilzation and not copy Western civilization in mob-rule. Without their own civilization they would not care even for Swaraj. They should meet hatred by love, falsehood by truth, and violence by nonviolence. Their excesses necessitated penance. They, should admit their faults and do penance for them. Only thus could they purge themselves of their sins.

At about 1 o'clock when Swami Shraddhananda was seconding the resolution Dewan Mangal Sen, one of the released prisoners, arrived in the pandal. He was garlanded and made to stand before the audience who cheered him very enthusiastically.

The Hon'ble Rai Bahadur Bhagat Ram (Punjab) supported the resolution in Urdu.

### Speech of R. B. Raizada Bhagat Ram.

R.B. Raizada Bhagat Ram (Punjab) in further supporting the resolution said he put before them a legal point. They were now before the tribunal of nations not as accused persons, but as complainants and it behaved them to disclose all true facts in order to ensure a thorough consideration of their case and an impartial judgment.

Babu Bepin Chandra Pal (Bengal) who on rising to address the assembly received a grand ovation, in further supporting the resolution said :--

### Speech of Babu Bepinchandra Pal.

Mr. President. Brother and Sister delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have been asked to support this resolution, and I do so with the greatest pleasure. (Hear, hear.) If this resolution had simply regretted and condemned the excesses committed by our own people in certain parts of the Punjab and Gujerat, I would have stoutly opposed such expressions of regret. and condemnation. But I support this resolution because it is more than a colourless expression of regret or condemnation of what our own people did. It is also an indication of the responsibility of those who provoked a peaceful people into a sudden outburst of frenzy. (Loud cheers). There is a flaw in all human associations. If you stand before me, as you know, there are in every man a combination of three elements. We are all brutes; brutal; we are all men, human; we are also divine and Godly, and if you bring the brute that is in you in your relations with me out before you, the brute in me responds to the brute in you. If you come to me as a man, the man in me responds to your manhood, and if you come to me as a God, my latent, my sleeping God. is awakened and my God meets your God and makes a heaven of earth. (Hear, hear.) Now even our people had committed things which they ought not to have committed. We know that they did things which in their cooler moments they would never have done. They have suffered long, they have sufferred in silence, they have crawled on earth like vermin, for how many days you and I know. But the worm turns, and if the worm turns in a sudden outburst of frenzy, we regret the frenzy, we condemn, the God in us condemns the cutburst, but at the same time we hold you responsible for having converted a nation that had controlled by centuries of discipline and culture, we condemn you for converting that nation into a nation of brutes. (Hear, hear.) Thank God, thank God, that conversion is not yet complete (Laughter). Thank God we have not yet been completely brutalised by contact with the brutal methods of those who have held political sway over us, and the evidence that we have not been completely brutalised is this resolution. (Hear, hear.) Here is the evidence. We do not want to return evil for evil. That does not mean that we shall not chastise. We shall When God wants us to chastise. (Hear, hear.) We shall chastise, when ? chastise as God chastises us in leve for the good of you and the whole world. (Hear, hear.) We shall not submit to wrong, but we shall not return wrong for wrong (Hear, hear), and our determination that we shall not return wrong for wrong is proved by this resolution (Hear, Hear,)

One word more, my dear friends. I do not know how you look upon this resolution, but when I was sitting there it came to me that this Congress may go down to history as the Victory Congress (Hear, hear), not the victory of the allies over Germany (Loud laughter), but the victory of Indian public opinion, the victory of the legitimate rights and claims of the Indian people over bureaucratic pretensions. (Hear, Hear). You are victorious to-day. Lala Dunichand, Dewan Mangal Sen, my old friend Lala Harkishanlal, Pundit Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry, are all evidences of your victory. (Hear, Muhammed Ali and Shaukat Ali are proofs of your victory, (Hear, Hear). Hear), and well-will you excuse this personal reference (Loud applause and laughter) by no means to be compared to the great victors there, but I too represent a little victory (Laughter), because, you know, after I left Calcutta after having given due notice to whom it concerns that I was coming to Amritsar, an order withdrawing the externment, dated the 18th of December, has been published in the Government communique ten days after on the 28th December (Laughter). That too is a victory. (Laughter). If I had not come, the order would have heen communicated to me on the 25th so that I might not come. Now all these are signs of our victory. The proclamation, the gracious proclamation is a sign of the victory of the justice and the. righteousness of India's cause over the unrighteous repression of England. Therefore, I say, Mr. President, we meet in a victory Congress to-day, and in the day of your victory, can you not be humble in spirit, in the day of your dawning freedom,-God knows how long it will last,-but in the day of your dawning freedom with the shackles removed from your ankle, even if it be for a day, and when your hearts are going out in a tidal wave of gratitude to Him, who is the king of all kings, (Hear, Hear), will you not be humble in spirit to-day, will you not look back upon the events that have led to this victory, and looking back on these events will you not note your little lapses and your little temptations, or little falling off from the high ideal of your own national civilization and your national culture? This resolution is a confession of our weakness in the moment of our strength. If it was moment of weakness, then I would not support this resolution because it would add to the weakness prevailing in the country, but we are strong now and can afford. to confess our weakness (Laughter). Therefore, I say, Ladies and Gent lemen. in the humility of spirit, in spirit of truth, in your loyalty to your civilization. and your culture, of which both the previous speakers have spoken, I commend this resolution to you and I hope you will carry it with acclamation. (Loud applause).

The Hon'ble Pundit Madan Mohan Malaviya on behalf of the President then put the resolution to the vote, which was carried by a large majority.

Resolution No. VI.—Demand for Genl. Dyer being relieved of Command.

Mrs. Annie Basant who on rising was received with loud cheers in moving the following resolution said :--

### Speech of Mrs. Annie Besant.

• Mr. President, Brother and sister delegates, the following resolution has been put into my hands to move :--

"That, in view of the fact that neither the Hunter Committee nor the Congress Commission has finished to examination of witnesses

and issued its report, this congress, while expressing its horror and indignation at the revelations already made and condemnation of the atrocities admitted, refrains from urging any definite

steps to be taken against the offenders, yet having regard to the cold-blooded, calculated massacre of innocent men and children, an act without parallel in modern times, it urges upon the Government of India and the Secretary of State that as a preliminary to legal proceedings being taken against him, General Dyer should be immediately relieved of his command.

Resolved further that this congress desires to place it on record that in its opinion the Government of India and the Punjab Government must, in any event be held responsible for the inexcusable delay in placing an authoritative statement of the massacre of Jallianwala Bagh before the public and His Majesty's Government."

The last paragraph of the Resolution can be dismissed in a couple of sentences. Some of us in England, at the time when this massacre occurred, heard nothing about it. Months elapsed until in the Supreme Council Sir William Vincent told us that some 300 people had been slain in the Punjab. It was entirely due to the Seva Samiti of Allahabad and to the questions put by Pundit Madan Mohan Malaviya (Hear, Hear) in the Supreme Council, that we got a glimpse of the horrors that had cocurred. Surely we have the right to blame the Government of India and the Government of the Punjab for hiding from the Supreme Government the atrocities that had been perpetrated in this land.

The other part of the resolution naturally divides itself into two. One the denunciation of the horrible atrocities that have occurred-not from the testimony of others, but from the lips of the criminals who inflicted them (Hear, Hear). We do not in any way indict General Dyer and otners, who are not mentioned, on testimony given by others. We indict them on their own words, spoken with a shamelessness that did not realise 'apparently the criminality of what had happened, but spoke it out in public as though nothing had been done. We say that under those conditions in deference to the feeling of the people, the people who had been outraged by what had occurred, that General Dyer should be relieved of his command. Now there are two kinds of offences, private and public. Where a private wrong is done, where an offence is committed against an individual, there the individual has the right to forgive and forget the injuries inflicted. But where a crime has been committed against the helpless and the defenceless, where armed force has been used against an unresisting and harmless crowd, where the massacre only stopped when the ammunition was exhausted (cries of "shame, shame"), when in a closed space whence none could escape the General Commanding directed the fire on the outlets of the closed space, until they were choked with the bodies of the dead and of the dying (cries of "shame"), then it is not a private wrong to be forgiven but a public wrong to be punished (Hear, Hear). And we have the right to appeal to British justice to judge the criminals who have thus abused their trust (Hear, Hear). For an army among an unarmed nation, men with weapons of modern warfare, with machine guns and aeroplanes and rifles against a people, disarmed for forty years, if they are to be allowed to commit a crime like this without the

interference of Britain who places them in this land, then I ask you, whither has justice disappeared if this crime does not appeal to it to protect the helpless and weak. And so we ask that General Dyer may be relieved of his command. It is a small request (Hear, Hear). It is but a little conces-. Figh to the outraged feelings of the whole nation. A man who deliberately went to that place to inflict what he dared to call a lesson on the Indian people, that man should be taken away from the scene of the atrocities that he committed. Let him go to his own country so that his own countrymen may judge, and vindicate India's trust in British justice. (Hear, Hear). But while I am bound to say that, which not to say would be to fail in public duty, may I add to that some other words appealing to you, who alone can make peace between two great nations, to use what you alone can do? Forgive the frightful wrongs inflicted, so that the blocdshed in the Jallianwala Bagh may not cry up to heaven for vengeance, but may link the people together more than anything else could have done, and serve as a very river of immortality for the peace proclaimed between two great nations; for as long as in our hearts anger reigns, as long as in our hearts desire for revenge exists, there will be no real peace between Great Britain and India. Leave to Britain the duty of the punishment of your wrongs, and remember to-day the Emperor has sent a message of peace, not only peace but guarantees of peace, in the freedom to which he has restored the unjustly convicted and wronged among your own people. I would not dare to appeal for forgiveness, personal forgiveness, to any other nation than your own. The wrong is too terrible, the outrages the worst, the humiliations inflicted worse than death (Hear, Hear). They are the shames that have been put upon this race, the proudest race in all the world. And I venture to say to you "Forgive", it is because anything else will leave a remnant of bitterness which will prevent the dawn to-day of freedom, becoming the noon-tide sun of life and blessing to the world. But I believe with you that you, the representatives of the Indian nation, you who gave birth to the Lord Buddha, that you are able to forgive. And so in the name of the nation to which my body belongs, speaking to you whom I love as my adopted motherland (Hear, Hear). I ask you in demanding . justice, do, not forget to purge all bearts of hatred. So shall the Congress be, not only what Mr. Bepin Chandra Pal called it, a Congress of Victory, but what is even nobler, more divine, a Congress of Peace between the two greatest nations in the world. (Loud applause).

# Speech of Lok. Bal Gangadhar Tilak.

Lok, Bal Gangadhar Tilak (Bombay) who was received with loud cheers and shouts of "Tilak Maharaj ki jai" in seconding the resolution said:—

Mr. President, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, it does not require more than a few words from me to commend this resolution for your adoption. I was in England when a strong sentiment of anger and rage prevailed there for the trial of Kaiser. His action was interpreted to mean the muider of innecent women and children, and there was such a strong feeling 'against him that the people of England demanded his trial in

England,—and I read in one of the papers,—by a jury consisting of the widows of these slain in the war. Now compared to that feeling, the resolution before you' is very mild indeed (Hear, Hear). It points out, I think, the difference between the mental condition and the spiritual condition that prevails in England and in India. We have simply asked for the recall of General Dyer. Not trial as yet, not impeachment as yet; and why ? Because our enquiries are yet incomplete as stated in the first part of the resolution.' But it does not mean that our indignation is less than what the English people felt in those days against Kaiser. Any man in authority abusing his power is much more guilty if he abuses it deliberately and in cold blood than a man under provocation (Hear, Hear). Let me tell you, ladies and gentlemen, I have to suppress my sentiment in indignation at present. I want to speak a good deal, but feel that we must curb our rage and anger and wait until reports of the Hunter Commission and your own Commission are out. Probably, you will accuse me of moderation, I know (Laughter), but our rage and anger have sometimes to be curbed until we are able to let them out with greater effect. (Hear, Hear). And that is my excuse for asking you to adopt this resolution as it stands; not that I feel less than any one of you about the outrages committed here. They are unparalleled in the history of the world (Hear, Hear). A king exists for the protection of the subjects, not for the massacre of his subjects (Hear, Hear), and where a greater power is entrusted to an individual for the protection of the subject, greater is his responsibility, greater is his position, greater is his pay also (laughter). All those are abused in the present case, and it is but meet that we should ask for their impeachment, not in London, but in the Jallianwala Bagh. itself (Hear, Hear and Applause), and if need be, they must be punished in that Bagh as well. Some may say that they should not be allowed to come to India. I think they ought to be allowed to come to India, why ?- to take their trial and to suffer the punishment here which they deserve. My sentiment is very strong on the point, and I compare it to the sentiment which prevailed in England against Kaiser after the war which I witnessed there. That was strong. Well, what is the act of Kaiser compared to the atrocious acts committed under the martial law? Kaiser was at war with the world. Our Government professes that it was at war with the people, because the people were in rebellion. Nothing of that kind. It is an absolute lie to say that the people of the Punjab were in rebellion (Hear, Hear). I do not admit it for a moment, and I do not think any one of you will admit it (Cries of 'no, no'). People have been massacred in cold blood in order to terrify them, as my friend 'Pundit 'Malaviya' said in the Legislative Council (Cries of shame'). Now if such an act is ever allowed in any civilised country, I must say their civilization deserves to be condemned. It is no civilization. It has never been the practice in any other country, and I tell you that if this state of things had prevailed in England, if these atrocities had been committed in England, the English people would not have waited for nine months to bring the offenders to trial. The whole thing would have been disposed of in a month; there would have been questions in Parliament, there would have been debates in Parliament, and no ministry would have considered its existence safe without bringing these culprits to their trial (Hear, Hear). Unfortunately, we are six thousand miles away, and our Government

is not democratic. The result is that those that are in power feel that they have a kind of immunity engendered by this distance and by the despotie power which they enjoy. I have very little to say, because I think if I go on in this strain I do not know whether I myself may not be led away, and I must beg ycur pardon for not dilating too much on this subject. You feel as much as I feel, and I have no doubt that you will carry this mild resolution, as I call it, with acclamation and lend your support to it in the hope that another resolution will be placed before you in a Special Congress to be held after the reports are out (Hear, Hear) and that full justice will be done to this subject and also to the subjects of His Majesty in the Punjab, (Loud cheers.)

#### Speech of Babu Jitendra Lai Bannerjee.

٠.

Babu Jitendra Lal Bannerjee (Bengal) who was accorded a warm cheering, in supporting the resolution, said:---

Mr. President, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen. In coming to address you tc-day, I have a strange and rather uncomfortable feeling as of a sinner strayed amongst a company of saints. Only a little while before Mahatma Gandhi preached to you about the necessity of restraining anger and meeting Latred by love. Swami Shraddhananda followed suit; and even Babu Bepin Chandra Pal; catching the contagion of saintliness from close neighbourhood (laughter) preached the duty of invoking the divinity . within us to meet the brute cutside. All this is very nice; only I cannot rise to the height of spiritual greatness. Being a sinner myself, very human, a frail man of flesh and blocd, with the natural frailties of humanity, I cannot subscribe to their exalted sentiments. Rather in my unregenerate heart I cry out, "O, for an hour of just and inexorable despotism to sweep away the figments of constitution and proceed straight to the punishment : O, for a king like Ahasuerus who would set up a scaffold of the guilty". 30 cubits high on which to hang General Dyer even as Raman was hanged in the ancient days". But we are told that this thing is not to be. We are told that constitutional difficulties intervene. Also we are told that there is the question of evidence and when our leaders have decided in one way, I should not like to press in the opposite direction. When Mahatma Gandhi and Swami Shraddhananda, Pundit Madan Mohan Malaviya and Pundit Motilal Nehuu, men who have worked and suffered for the Punjab, when they advise you in one way, who am I who can only talk and who has done and suffered nothing-who am I to raise my feeble voice against that? Yet sometimes I ask-"do these considerations apply to General Dyer"? Can we not say of him "thou are convicted out, of thy own mouth, thou shalt be punished not on the testimony of thy victims but upon the testimony which God made thee foolish enough and shameless enough to utter in the ears of humanity". Gentlemen, if General Dyer-fitly so named, for has he not dyed the Punjab with the blocd of the innocent?--- if General Dyer is not to be convicted for his offences, let him be convicted for his shameless boasting of his offences-if not for his misdeeds in the past at least for his gloating and rejoicing over his enormities (Hear, Hear). Gentlemen, you who witnessed the living horrors of Jallianwala, you who watched, waited

and suffered while the callous soldiers led by their callous and brutal chief fired volley upon volley against an innocent and panic-stricken crowd, you who saw the dead lie piled in the narrow lanes and heard the wounded groaning and crying for water all through the live-long night while none dared to come to their succour-to ycu I need not dilate upon the atrocities of this heroic English General. Still, some few points occur to my memory to which I shall briefly direct your attention. For one thing, it cannot be said-no one can pretend this-General Dyer himself did not pretend-that he had any overwhelming military necessity for what he did. He said 'I dispersed the meeting', Why? 'Because I thought the people were flouting the military authorities. Thus 500 men were to be killed, not for any offence, but for the imaginary offence of flouting the imaginary authority of this butcher General (Cries of Shame). But he went further than this. He said, 'I could have dispersed the crowd without resorting to firing'. Why then did you not do that? 'Because otherwise people would have returned and laughed at me. We have been told that a cat may look at a king; but eventually under the civilized British dispensation people may not laugh at General Dyer or the punishment will be death, not of this or that one man but wholesale massacre. But there was something more than that. He himself has said it was not the size of the orowd-it was not the contumacy of the crowd,-I had made up my mind to fire. If you did ,that, were you not a deliberate murderer and should you not therefore have been hanged long before this? (Here, Here). In sparing your life have not the Indian Government and the Punjab Government been accessories of the murders of these people? But more than this, gentlemen. He says I had made up my mind; and I began to fire. When did you begin to fire? When the people were running away, when the meeting was dispersed. Such is the bravery of this gallant English commander, representative of a noble and christian civilisation. He began to fire when the crowd was dispersing; he fired and fired well. That is how he gloated over his deeds before the Hunter Committee even as a ghoul, which we are told, feeds and delights in feeding upon blood. And this ghoulish General (A Voice. "He is a coward") is even now left free to work his will upon another such crowd in another part of India. What is there to prevent him from doing 'that? And yet, in spite of these repeated and multiplied enormities the name of this General will be thrice blessed in the history of the land. Under his transforming hand the bare field of Jallianwala Bagh has been converted into a holy place of pilgrimage. In years to come pilgrims from distant parts of the country will come to this sacred field even as I and so many others Have done; they will visit the sacred land; they will put upon their heads the blood-stained dust of Jallianwala Bagh and they will derive from it an inspiration of ennobling patriotism, lessons of common humanity and of common Indianhood. In history it will be written with letters of fire that upon this field of Jallianwala, consecrated by blood and tears, liberty was reborn (Loud (cheers). Upon this holy Bisakhi day of 1919 a new era dawned upon India an era when the people who had suffered long and cruelly, felt qualified for freedom by their long chastening of sorrow. Such will be the indirect and remote consequence of General Dyer's action. And yet, these • are but hyperbolic statements-they cannot and will not stop the bleeding wound of the Punjab. Brethren of the Punjab, now shall we make you

,

understand what we men of a different speech and coming from a distant and remote corner of India, what we felt and what we still feel for your manifold and multiplied woes. Oh, be assured that when your innocent blood flowed in Jallianwala, our hearts too bled in silent sympathy and sorrow. Your humiliation was ours, your pain and anguish was ours—just as God willing, we will share in your triumph and in your rejoicing when the day of triumph and rejoicing arrives at last. In the meantime while thinking of and brooding upon these wrongs of yours, while the horrors of last April poison our food by day and weigh like a nightmare upon our hearts by night, we cry out, in the agony and anguish of our soul, How long, O Lord, How long? When will these inquities cease? And when O when, will the full blazing sun of independence shine again upon this beloved land of ours.

# Speech of Mr. T.V. Gopalswam! Mudallar (Madras.)

Mr. T.V. Gopalswami Mudaliar (Madras) in further supporting the resolution said:-

Mr. President, Brother and Sister delegates and friends, I deem it a privilege and an honour to associate myself with this resolution which involves the condemnation of the heinous atrocities that were committed in the Punjab by the bureaucracy in the name of peace and order, and I take this opportunity to pay my humble tribute and homage to those of our country. men who have fallen victims in this terrible tragedy and have thus become martyrs in the cause of our motherland (Hear, Hear). We, in Madras. have tried our humble best to do our duty by them, and if in this time of scarcity and trouble we have not been able to do what we expected to do, and what we ought to have done, I implore my sisters and brothers of the Punjab to pardon us and take our heart for the deed. While in April last we heard of the deportation of Dr. Kitchlew and Dr. Satyapal and others, who had been appointed Secretaries and other Office-bearers of this great National Assembly, under the Defence of India Act, at a time when the war had practically ended, we reasonably apprehended that the motive of the Government in doing so was to stifle all political agitation and to deal a death-blow to the Indian National Congress. When again we heard of the rioting and the indiscriminate massacres here and elsewhere, we were extremely anxious to get further details. As you all know, all news from the Punjab was completely shut out (Cries of shame), and our revered brother, Lala GoverdhanDar, whose absence we deplore to-day very much (Cries of Shame) was in our midst for a couple of days and gave us a bit of first-hand information. He was at once arrested and marched to the Punjab from Madras and action was taken against him. Then we had no other alternative but to hold protest meetings in one of which I had occasion to describe in some detail the use of machine guns and aeroplane bombs and the indiscriminate massacres that ensued as a consequence. A few days afterwards I was called by the Commissioner of Police of Madras City and told by him that when it was all peace and quiet in Madras, I should not have referred to the incidents in the Punjab and excited the feelings of thousands of people who formed the audience and that I was wrong in describing the Calcutta incidents ignoring the Government communique on that point. My answer

naturally was..........(At this stage the speaker was very much interrupted as he was apparently inaudible to the vast audience).

My answer naturally was that the time was long past when the bureaucracy could successfully attempt to divide province from province, and people from people and that we had already learnt to regard all Indians as our brothers, and whatever calamity befell the Punjab we considered that the same calamity had befallen us also, and that with regard to the Calcutta incidents, I preferred to rely upon the version of Mr. Chakravarti who was on the spot and who had thrice declined a High Court Judgeship, in preference to the version of the Government which was based merely upon police reports.

Mr. Dass: Mr. Chakravarti was on the eve of being shot.

Mr. Gopalswami Mudaliar: Our prognostications then that these indiscriminate massacres were due not to the Satyagraha movement, but to the misguided and foolhardy action of the bureaucracy turned out to be more than true by the subsequent revelations. And it is now conceded on all hands, and even the Tory papers in England who have no sympathy for India, take the view that these atrocious massacres are unparalleled in 'the history of any civilized administration. In these circumstances we asked for a Royal Commission of Enquiry with the result that we had a Hunter Committee, which is a mere creature of the Viceroy, and even before this Committee entered upon its enquiry the Government of India got the Indemnity Act passed, which was intended to defend their own officers and save .their so-called prestige. Is it prestige, I ask, to defend the act of an all-powerful, merciless, obstinate and vindictive bureaucracy against a helpless, powerless, panic-striken, humiliated people? It may be so in the bureaucratic circle in India, but in the world outside it will not be considered as honourable tactics but will be put down to cowardice of the meanest type. I again ask what is there in the ammended Government of India to prevent a recurrence of these sad events ? '(At this stage the President struck the gong to inform the speaker that his time was over).

Mr. Gopalawami Mudaliar. I will finish my speech in a minute.

Ladies and Gentlemen, it is therefore our duty to carry on a persistent agitation, till we get our fundamental rights safeguarded under a full responsible Government. God grant it, Sir, that the blood wantonly and brutally shed in this sacred land of the five rivers shall not be in vain. From every drop of blood so ruthlessly and mercilessly shed in the Jallianwala Bagh and elsewhere shall arise a thousand martyrs yet more courageous, yet more self-sacrifising, than we of our generation, who will carry on the battle of treedom of our Motherland, yet more undaunted, according to our Congress ideals, and restore her to her rightful place in the world of nations far loftier and far more truly beneficial to humanity than any, which the present western nations of bogus civilization can boast of. (Loud cheers).

# Speech of Mr. Gholam Yaseen.

Mr. Gholam Yaseen (Punjab) in further supporting the resolution said :--

Mr. President and Gentlemen, in supporting the resolution on behalf of the Punjab (Cries of Urdu, Urdu, and Hindi, Hindi), I would ask the indulgence of the House. (The speaker was very much interrupted by cries of Hindi and Urdu and was not allowed to speak, in English. Consequently he addressed in Urdu).

> Mr. Gulam Yaseen in further supporting the resolution in Urdu condemned the action of General Dyer and his unrepentent attitude even nine months after the incident before the Hunter Committee in an answer to a question by Justice Rankin. It was a peculiar theory with him that India was a land of salaams. From a man filled with such a vanity the emanation of the 'Crawling order' was no wonder. Sir Edward Maclagan, since he assumed the reins of Government had introduced a new policy of sympathy which was essential to make the relations between the Government and the people as cordial as they once used to be. That policy, however, could not bear fruit as long as General Dyer was not called to account for his misdeeds in The Royal Proclamation wanted better mutual Amritsar relations between the Government officials and the people, but the first essential for it was that Dyer should be relieved, of his command. The view in America on his evidence and his brutal deeds was that he was totally unfit to wear British uniform any longer.

The Resolution was then put to the vote and carried with great acclamation.

Resolution No. VII.—Demand for Sir Michael O'Dwyer being relieved of his duties.

The President:--We will now take Resolution No. VIII on the agenda :--

"In view of the oppressive regime of Sir Michael O'Dwyer in the Punjab and the admitted fact brought out before the Hunter Committee that he approved of and endorsed General Dyer's massacre at the Jallianwala Bagh, this Congress calls upon His Majesty's Government to relieve Sir Michael O'Dwyer of his present duties in this country as a member of the Army Commission as a preliminary to necessary legal action being taken against him."

Speech of Ral Sahib Ruchl Ram Sahnl.

Rai Sahib Ruchi Ram Sahni (Punjab) in moving the resolution spoke in Urdu.

(When the speaker was addressing, the news of the arrival of Ali Brothers and Maulana Abdul Bari spread with lightning rapidity in the pandal and great enthusiasm prevailed. The speaker had to stop for sometime until the Ali Brothers came to the dais and took their seats. As soon as they arrived, the whole audier ce including the President and gentlemen on the dais stord up and greeted them. On arrival the Ali Brothers were made to stand on the dais and were profusely garlanded and people cheered with enthusissm for minutes together. Both the Brothers acknowledged the greetings of the vast assembly by frequently bowing in oriental fashion. There were loud cries of "Mahommed Ali Shaukat Ali ki jai", "Hindu-Mussalman" ki jai" and "Bharatmata ki jai").

> Rai Sahib Lala Ruchi Ram Sahni (Punjab) moved the seventh resolution in Urdu. In the course of his speech he said Lala Harkishen Lal had had to pay for his evidence before the Industrial Commission. Three council members had been taken to task by the Lt. Governor for having joined a meeting to protest against S. Sunder Singh Majithia not signing the famous memorandum of the nineteen on Reforms. He detailed what oppressive methods had been employed to enlist recruits. The old regime of oppression and tyranny had however passed now and they were thankful for the Royal Proclamation and every one was now locking forward to justice. He hoped O'Dwyer would now be called to occount for his atrocities.

Bhai Sardul Singh (Punjab) who was to second the resolution was not present, and consequently Mr. Golam Mohyyud Din (Punjab) seconded the resolution in Urdu.

### speech of Maulvi Gulam Mohyyud Din.

Maulvi Gulam Mohyyud Din (Punjab) in seconding the resolution said O'Dwyer's oppression and tyranny here were taking place at a time when the Punjabees were sacrifising and laying down their lives ungrudgingly in France to save England from perpetual slavery and bondage. Now that His Majesty had by his Royal Proclamation won the hearts of Indians, were they not entitled to ask that the man who had misused his power and authority and that the General whose duty it was to protect the subject, who had instead massacred Indians by means of machine guns, should be called to account? No doubt Sir Michael wanted to crush the educated classes so that they should never be able to raise their heads again, he had been bent on uprooting all idea of literty and self-respect, but they must tell all whom it may concern that these notions of liberty and self-respect as well as of Hindu-Moslem unity had become so deep-rooted in the hearts of the people that it was now impossible to uproot them and that the greater the oppression the deeper will they sink in the hearts of the people. He appealed to the British Ministers that the man who treated the Punjab so badly-the

Punjab which had to supply 50 per cents of recruits to the Indian Army—was not fit to be appointed President of a commission which concerned the army and the Punjab

Swami Shardhanand in Hindi and Pundit Madan Mohan Malayiya, in English then announced that the Ali Brothers and Maulana Abdul, Bari had been appointed delegates of the Congress. The announcement was received with great acclamation.

## Speech of Maulana Shaukat All.

Maulana Shaukat Ali on rising to support the resolution was vociferously cheered. There were then loud cries of Hindi, Urdu and English. Mr. aukat Ali, however, spoke in Urdu.

> Mr. Shaukat Ali said when he heard that in the Jallianwala Bagh Hindu-Moslém bloed had run in a common stream and that two thousand or more of them had been massacred, they (the Brothers) had taken that as a sign of victory for India. He acknowledged that the Moslems were bound to their Hindu brethren for the deep sympathy the Hindus had shown to them in their hour of affliction, and as long as they lived, as long as they believed in the God and-their-Prophet, the Moslems could never forget the great obligation under which the Hindus had placed them.

Maulana Mahommed Ali then rose to support the resolution. He was given a grand ovation and there were loud cries of Hindi, Urdu and English. Some from the assembly said 'One brother had spoken in Urdu, the other should speak in English for the benefit of those who could not follow the Urdu speech). Mr. Mahommed Ali, however, first spoke in Urdu and then in English.

# Speech of Maulana Mohammed All.

Maulana Mohammad Ali in the course of his speech in Urdu said (ironically, of course) that it would be the height of ungratefulness not to recognise O'Dwyer and Dyer as their greatest benefactors, for was it not they who had made possible such huge processions and such monstrous gatherings the like of which they had never witnessed, before. Last year influenza had taken away hundreds of thousands of people. What if a couple of thousands had been killed in, the Jallianwala Bagh. It was there that the foundation of Hindu-Moslem unity had been firmly laid.

Now, if you will permit me, Ladies and Gentlemen, I should like to say a few words in English. What I have been saying in Urdu is this.

I have to-day with my own eyes witnessed a scene the like of which I have never seen before (Hear, Hear), I see an enormous-I will not say an assembly -- it looks like a mass meeting. To whom do we owe all thi? Is it not to the great warrior who stopped shooting not for mercy's sake but when the ammunition ran short. (Loud cries of shame). The man while he was coming from Rambagh made up his mind to fire and fired strong. He has fired not only on those people but fired into our hearts. He has created a new fire and out of that new fire a nation of Hindus and Mohammedans is being created before you to-day. He has forged a new nation, a strong nation, a nation that will henceforth, God willing, fear God alone and no man on (Hear, Hear). Mr. President, Sisters and Brothers, I speak not in earth. anger hecause times have passed when we could be angry. We cannot afford to be angry when we have got to create the distinies of a new-born nation. We have got to think in calmness and to act with vigour. You were passing resolutions here, but unless words have lost their meaning you must not call them resolutions, unless you really 'resolve' to do something. If you put down something on paper, paper means nothing. We are not a Government that can issue paper currency of any value. If you really pass a resolution it means that you, each one of you, man, woman and whospever votes for a certain resolution makes up his mind or her mind that it is your eternal determination that you will not rest, that you will not leave this place and forget what you heard and talked to each other. The resolution now before you considered in a narrow spirit is a resolution condemning two men. After all, we have had so many tyrants in the world that the condemnation of two such men even in such a great national 'assembly like this can have very little value unless you resolve within your minds at the same time that you have determined henceforward that you will not tolerate tyranity any longer (Hear, Hear). Sisters and Brothers, I am not a hero (Cries of "You are"), honestly I am a very human person, I have more weaknesses probably than any of you. I may tell you that I have felt the rigours of internment and still more the rigours of prison life although I had not to grind,-and Dr. Kitchlew says that even there he was made a leader to organise the gangs of coolier. But now that I have been released, my brother has been released, and so many Hindus and Mohammedans have been released, I would make just one personal appeal-to you, and it is this. The crow-bars with which you have razed to the ground the bastilles of India, we, those who were prisoners here, those who were rotting in jails, we shall not ask you, nay, we shall not tolerate, if out of those crow-bars you make chains for your own selves. Therefore, whether it is an act of clemency, or you may call it an act of tardy justice, whatever it may be, take it out of your mind entirely when you consider the destinies of India (Hear, Hear). I have known the great Gokhale at one time-God rest his soul. I have been told by men of his own Council that probably throughout his life he never ceased to regret one of his acts, an unkindly act it was, when he consented to the passing of the Press Act in order to get out of internment camps and jails eight Indian patriots. Now I have been a journalist and all this time when I could see the rigours of the Press Act I had before my mind's eye those eight Indian patriots who were released. At first I said, much better let us have the Press Act than those eight men rotting in jail.' Now I think I myself have rotted in jail and I have some right to say to you, let us go back to prison, let my brother Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry go back to Betul

.

prison, let Lala Harkishanlal go back to prison, let Dr. Kitchlew go back to prison, nay let all be hanged if necessary.-I am a diabetic and I would much rather die as an ordinary person than as a very unsavoury diabetic patient; after all we have all got to die. I say, let us rather die and care not for our families, if by being taken away by anything, whether it is an act of tardy justice, whether it is a clap-trap or a camouflage, whatever it is, do not forget, for God's sake, for the sake of this country that you love, do not for that sake, bear this in mind while you are considering the future constitution of this country, where you have to consider the rights not only of many millions now but of the unborn millions ,(Hear, Hear). Therefore, let us go back if necessary, to prison rather than that you should menacle India and leave India in chains and the liberty of even the meanest Indian taken by a Dyer or a O'Dwyer, a Montagu or a Chelmsford, howsoever exalted he may be (Hear, Hear). 1 speak not disrespectfully of those men who have authority over us, I speak not disrespectfully of them, I am really by instinct convervative in these matters. I believe in theooracy. That is my sovereign. I say God is my sovereign first. God made me just as free as He made George V. Therefore if any of his servants are going to keep all the rights of free men and free women of India-after all your women have been dragged by the police at the orders of men who did not know where the orders were placed-I say let not Indian rights be merely the sport and plaything of those men who treat the whole thing as a tremendous joke, no matter what happens to us, our families, our friends, and our country. This is my personal appeal to you. We are not here to bend the knee and say free us from jails, free us from prisons, free us from gallows for which we are meant as Vernian. I am not here appealing for that. I am not asking for the freedom of some so that the rest of you may go as bond-slaves. I speak in the name of this country, the liberty of which is dearer than the liberty of the most exalted amongt us. I will go to jail for the ninth time. Let Mr. Tilak be sent to prison for the third time, if necessary. Let me be interned for life-time if necessary. Let Mrs. Besant be interned again or hanged even by the roots of her hair in her old age if necessary. But let Indians be free, let no man say to an Indian, man or woman, thou art a born slave. (Loud applause).

After Mr. Mohammed Ali concluded his speech, Swami Shraddhananda called for three cneers for Mr. Mahommed Ali which were very enthusiastically responded to.

The Congress then adjourned till 11 o'clock next day, the 31st December 1919.

### FOURTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Wednesday, 31st December 1919.

The Congress re-assembled at 11 o'clock as announced on the previous evening. The business however was not commenced till 11-30 a.m. Mrs. Besant then rose and said:—

The President has sent word to me that he will be late by a few minutes and has therefore requested that in his absence Mr. Abbas Tyabji should take the chair, and as desired by the President, I propose that Mr. Abbas Tyabji do take the chair.

Pundit Rambhuj Dutt Choudhry then interpreted the above speech of Mrs. Besant in Hindi.

After the proposition was put and carried, Mr. Abbas Tyabji took the chair at about 11-35 a.m. in the absence of the President, the Hon'ble Pundit Motilal Nehru.

Mis. Annie Besant then read the following poem sent by Mrs. Sarojini Naidu. Before reading the poem Mrs. Bseant said;—

Friends, I have here a very short poem sent by Mrs. Sarojini Naidu to your Congress in Amritsar dealing with the position of the Punjab. As it is very short I will read it turning in your direction (facing the people on the platform) a second time, and first on the other (facing the assembly).

### MOTTO.

"BY LOVE SERVE ONE ANOTHER." All-India National Congress, Amritsar.

#### The Punjab 1919.

How shall our love console thee.

Or assuage thy hapless woe,

How shall our grief requite,

The hearts that scourge thee

And the hands that smite

Thy beauty with their rods of bitter rage?

Lol let our sorrow be thy battle gage.

To wreck the terror of the tyrant's might Who mocks with ribald wrath thy tragic plight

And stains with shame thy radiant heritage.

O beatiful! O broken ! And betrayed !

O mournful queen ! O martyred Draupadi ! Endure thou still

SAROJINI NAIDU.

The poem was received with loud applause.

After the poem was read, the proceedings came to a standstill and no business was taken in hand for a few minutes. Therefore at about 12 o'clock, Mr. S. Satyamurti from Madras, who was occupying a seat on the dais rose and said in an excited manner, Mr. President, I rise to a point of order. We have come here to do business from hundreds of miles away. We have already been kept here till the 31st.

A delegate from the block alloted to Andhras also said something in an excited manner about the delay in commencing the business which was not audible at the reporters' table owing to the great noise that prevailed then.

Pundit RambhajDutt Choudhry then rose and announced in Hindi that Dr. Satyapal will move the fourth resolution on the agenda of the 30th December 1919 which ran as follows:---

# Resolution VIII.— Appreciation of Sir Sankaran Nair's Resignation.

This this Congress places on record its grateful appreciation of the action taken by Sir Sankaran Nair in resigning his office as member of the Executive Council of the Governor General of India as a protest against the policy pursued by the Government of India and the Government of the Punjab in promulgating and maintaining Martial Law administration in the Punjab in supersession of the ordinary Courts of Justice in the Province.

Dr. Satyapal in moving the above resolution spoke in Urdu.

### · Speech of Dr. Satyapal (Amritsar).

Dr. Satyapal in proposing the above resolution spoke in Urdu and said new weapons were being forged every day to keep back the 32 crores of Indians from liberty. At one time came the Press Act, then the Defence of India Act and last of all the Rowlatt Act. People cried themselves hearse against that black Act, but instead of heeding their cries that lawless law-the Martial Law, opposed alike to the Divine and human laws-was sprung upon the Punjab. Could his Punjabi brethren ever forget that law under cover of which feelings were being roused against Indians, even Indian women were made to crawl on their bellies. people were publicly flogged in thoroughfares? The Punjabees. he was sure, could never forget a law under which 1500 men had been herded into jails like so many beasts and fed like them, under which the Punjabees whose blood had flowed like water in the defence of the Empire and for the honour of their King, were so inhumanly treated in Amritsar as to be deprived even of water and light; of the latter, because perhaps, the Martial Law could live only in darkeness. That Martial Law even the coming generations of India would remember with horror. It was at this juncture that that worthy son of Mother Bharat Sir Sankaran Nair could not tolerate this negation of all law which was against his conscience and self-respect and though a member of the Excutive Ccuncil of the Governor General he was as helpless against the united force and power of the bureaucracy as any other Indian and had no other alternative left to him as a protest but to resign his seat on the Council which he gladly did, and that was the only course a self-respecting Indian could adopt.

# (For full speech see Urdu Supplement.)

In seconding the resolution moved by Dr. Satyapal in Urdu, Mr. N. S. Ramaswamy Igengar (Madras) said:—

### Speech of Mr. lyengar.

Mr. President, Sisters and Brothers of India, I consider it a great privilege and an honour that for certain reasons I am here to second this resolution. It may be said that coming from the province of Madras which gave birth to Sir Sankaran Nair (Applause) I am actuated by considerations of provincial patriotism; but I intend to put them on a higher ground. for Madras is not now the distant Madras but a part of India (Hear, Hear) and that claim and that privilege has not been bought by our blood, but by the blood of that country wherefrom the civilization of the South flowed. The land of the five rivers (Hear, Hear), sacred in our traditions and treasured in our inmost hearts, the blood of those Rishis that was shed on the banks of the great rivers, went out into the South, and if you want an ideal of the product of the combination of the south and the North you cannot pitch upon a higher personage than Sankaran Nair who combines in him all those qualities of the Hindu, of the Mussulman. of the Parsi, and even of the fighting Sikh and he was fighting oftener for others than for himself (Hear, Hear). Well, · Sir Sankaran Nair belongs to the Kshatriya caste, and you know what part the Kashtriya has played in the past of our country. Well, it is impossible to speak of the great work that he has done inside the official chambers. It was said by a great Judge of the Bombay High Court that the man within the fort was as much helping as the man outside the fort, and Sir Sankaran. Nair during all the time that he occupied any official seat never budged one inch from that true position which I would wish all Indian leaders take, never give up the principles, the liberties and the freedom of his country for satisfying any temporary fancy or buying peace at a cheep cost. (Hear, Hear). If Sir Sankaran Nair had cared, he would not have been a mere Sir Sankaran Nair; he might have been a Lord Sankaran Nair of a big province; he would have been ushered into the street as a big man with . cavalcade behind and in front of him to the fanfire of trumpets. But Sir Sankaran Nair stood like a lion in the middle of the Council Chamber, surrounded till the last by officials of the stamp, of the delicacy, of the courtesy of Sir William Vincent (shame, shame). Now, Lord Chelmsford was a Military man. England has got a curious way of picking up its vicercys (laughter). Pressed by war conditions, just as waitresses in the London hotels took to military profession, they picked up from the ranks of the military, Lord Chelmsford (loud laughter). But they counted without the host. They thought that the Indian was not capable of standing up for right, of standing up for justice, of standing up for righteousness. Do you

think the heart of India, the young portion of India, would have condescended to pass without murmur the resolution of yesterday about mob frenzy, about grave provocation, about insult, about things of that sort? Well, we come from a higher pedestal. The services of Sir Sankaran Nair deserve your thanks. It was said in a different quarter under a pledge of secrecy which I do not desire to break, that we must raise statues in our country, in our villages, that we must place statues of Edwin Samuel Mantagu. We'll begin with the idol of our own countrymen by all means. If you want an idol of Mr. Montagu, I tell you it is an idol with feet of clay.

Well, we know that before Sir Sankaran Nair became the Advocate General of Madras, for that was his first step, he was a Government pleader and a brilliant prosecutor in the Sivakasy riots. Before he was appointed Advocate General, he had the boldless, he had the courage, to write in one of the most brilliant influential monthlies of England,-I believe it was the Contemporary Review,—protesting against the manner in which distinction was shown with regard to the dispensation of justice as between' Erglishmen and Indians. You know the old story, all lawyers know it, how when the soldier kills an Indian coolie he suffers from an enlarged spleen, and the British jurist lets him off with a fine of Rs. 25 or Rs. 50 (Loud laughter). They would hang him for murder if he was an Indian. Now Sir Sankaran Nair protested against that sort of thing. There was a howl of indignation. The great British conscience which is sleeping in its innermost slumbers, when it hears of 1,650 shots that were fired on an inoffensive, unarmed, unresisting mob; on poor, helpless and unarmed men and women with little ones in their hands, the British conscience has not been roused by these massacres, by that bloodsoed of Jallianwala Bagh-the place where the future Indian Nation is being born at present (Hear, Hear). Well, that British conscience represented by the higher bigger bodies was at work and they said that to appoint such a man as Sir Sankaran Nair as one of His Maiesty's Judges was nothing less than a crime. But there was one great man with a big head but not with a sufficiently responsive heart, and I know as a matter of fact the position of . the Advocate General of Madras was offered to Sir Sankaran Nair in the name of Lord Morley, whom we would rather like to associate with his brilliant books than with a little bit of reform about. which reference was made. At the Congress at Madras we welcomed that child, but which afterwards turned out to be a monster, I mean the Morley-Minto Reform as you call it. Well, Sankaran Nair became the Advocate General. , Within a short time he was taken to the position of one of His Majesty's Judges in the Madras High Court and we, who are engaged in the profession of law, trying our best to buy liberty, trying to secure justice for the brown and black portion of the human race, we know full well that his position in the Madras High Court was characterised by an amount of independence, an amount of probity that can well stand comparison with the greatest English jurists that have left England to dispense justice in a foreign soil. (Hear, Hear). After that, protests, murmurs, whispers,-we have got accustomed to whispers even in our own camps now a days—were heard and they said that the world would come to an end, that the British dominion would do something dreadful, for Sankaran Nair not merely dispensed justice but the began to dispensed justice from the higher position of a member of the Executive Council of

His Excellency the Viceroy. It was a great step because many had said that if he had entered into the inmost chambers of the Indian Government, something dreadful would happen, some electric current would be at work and the vibration would work in such a way that the beautiful edifice of the bureaucratic Government of India might come down like a pack of cards. Well, grave dangers were apprehended and Sir Sankaran Nair's position was not an easy matter. He had to succeed a most sociable, a most genial and a most engaging member, Sir Ali Imam, who had the discourtesy at the final 'At Home' that was given to him when leaving the other day his province as an executive Councillor to become the Prime Minister of His Imperial Majesty-Imperious would perhaps be a more suitable word-His Exalted Highness the Nizam of Hyderabad, referred to the dissenting minute of Sir Sankaran Nair and said that it would be consigned to its proper place, but Sir Sankaran Nair was above your ordinary minutes including the dissenting minutes. He had pleaded for the poor of the Kaira district, for a better revenue policy and that elicited that uncharitable remark from one of our own countrymen. (Shame). You all know how Sir Sankaran Nair when he was in the Executive Council in charge of the Education Department worked in the interests of the country, we know full well how he did his best for the good of his country, but he was in a wrong place, still he tried his best to oil the wheels of the administration to see how far he could help his countrymen, and all his labours ended in the inauguration of the Patna and other Universities. But more important than his work as an Education Member, was his value as a valiant Indian fighting for his rights in the inmost Chamber surrounded by, I shall not say a hostile,—set of people but by an unsympathetic set of people, or I shall even not use that expression, but by a set of people who could not see eye to eye with him, his position was of the gravest character, and during all the time that he wielded his office as an executive councillor' in the Government of India, his conduct and his measures were characterised by an amount of bravery, by an amount of valiance, by adherence to the principles of righteousness and propriety scarcely paralleled in the annals of any Government in the world.

Now, Sir Sankaran Nair was there. We in Madras found fault with him that he had not put up a fight on the Rowlatt Bill. Well, one who has studied any constitution, one who has got any acquaintance at least in theory, for the present we have got to be acquainted only in theory and I am sure it will be in practice also and very shortly too,-one who knows the machinery of the Government, will understand how little it is possible for a single man to oppose any Act or Bill sanctioned by all others and intended to be carried out as a mandate or an alleged mandate from a superior authority. Sir Sankaran Nair, I daresay, must have passed many sleepless nights, he must have tried his best to avert this dangerous Bill known as the first Rowlatt Act. They are going to have a second instalment of it and most of us know what it is. Now the Rowlatt Act was immediately followed by the more practical method; the Act was followed by a fact, the fact of Martial Law in the The Viceroy of India, the representative of His Imperial Majesty Punjab. in this country, did not choose to visit those particular spots or places, though during the period that martial law or the after-effects of it were so patent, His Excellency Lord Chelms ford passed on to Rawalpindi to make proper arrangements to meet the Afghan on Indian soil. Well, your countryman,

your councillor, unaided, unhelp d, and unsympathised by those officials with whom he was working, came up to the Punjab and saw with his own eyes what had been done in the name of order, in the name of public safety, and in the name of that bigger word public tranquillity, he saw facts for himself and then the Indian conscience aware of the truth and righteousness of its He cared not that much for the office of executive position asserted itself. council member. Mind you it is the highest office that is in the power of the Crown now to give to Indians in this country of ours. He went home. He regretted the day when they passed the order sanctioning Martial law in the Punjab, and he, I daresay, must have had a long consultation. He was a brilliant advocate. He must have advocated for those who had been wronged but his advocacy fell on deaf ears. Well, his pleading was in vain. He must have expostulated with them, he must have remonstrated with them within the bounds of decoum and the rights of his office, but finding that his remonstrances, his persuasions, were all futile, he took the one manly step which I would call upon all my countrymen to respect and to imitate. Care not for pelf, for petty pelf, care not for honour or office when a principle is at stake. (Cheers).

(At this stage about 12.20 the President arrived and occupied the chair and the speaker stopped for some minutes until the President had actually taken his seat).

Continuing Mr. Ramaswami 'Iyenger said:—Pardon me, Ladies and Gentlemen, I wanted to do honour to the non-official Governor General of India Pundit Motilal Nehru (Hear, Hear). There was temporary vacation of office, but you know there cannot be a vacation of office, for the office is ever living and as our dear President came back I paused for a while.

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, Sir Sankaran Nair, unlike his efficial boss or superior the Viceroy of India, visited the Punjab and was satisfied with the right position that he took, namely, that Martial law was unnecessary, improper, unjust, uncalled for and unrequired. So what did he do as an Indian gentleman? 'He resigned his position, and if you believe dame old rumour, it says that there was much of a request, much of those attempts to compromise with which we are not unaccustomed even in our non-official camps, but yet Sir Sankaran Nair, like the true Kshatriya of old, stood for the fight, stood for the redress of wrong, and did not budge one inch in spite of the official smiles that were cast upon him. If he only had the unmanliness, he would have withdrawn bis resignation. But he insisted upon it and what do you see the Government of India are doing. If an ordinary Governmental efficer who had put in 35 years' service on a heavy salary has done his best to take as much 'income 'out of India and had gone Home and retired for another fifty years to draw a bigger pension than he ever drew as a salary, he is always complimented with some fine expression of thanks in a Gazette extraordinary or ordinary. But Lord Chelmsford belongs to the military race, he belong to the military profession; be was a military officer, and he is always curt, brief, concise, and to the roint. So instead of recognising the work of Sir Sankaran Nair not merely in the Vicengal Council but as one of His Majesty's Judges in Madras, instead of recignising his long and meritorious work, he was summarily dismissed in

that big viceregal pronouncement which was to usher that brilliant debate, unparaleled for courtesy, unparalleled for decorum unparalleled for those parliamentary amenities with which we associate the English Parliament (Shame). He said Sir Sankaran Nair has resigned, and for very honourable reasons. We must be thankful to His Excellency Lord Chelmsford even for these small favours, even as we are going to be thankful for that little disappointing Act that was passed on the 24th of December last. There is not even an appreciation for all the work that he did, and Sir Sankaran Nair resigned his job, and he went out like you or I, as a nobody for a time. He left India and went to England I daresay, in spite of his domestic and personal inconveniences, so that he may be in a position to focus on the British public, not the British public at large, but those who are responsible for the wielding of Britain's affairs, an insight into these terrible tragedies which it is impossible for a man to talk about without feelings of horror and indignation. Now, Sir Sankaran Nair placed matters before the British public, and if you get a few crumbs thrown to you day by day like sweets to children, the release of Lala Dunichand on one day, of Lala Harkishanlal on the other day, of Pundit Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry on the third day and of some other people on another day, it is all practically due to that single fact that in the conclave of authority there was one man of yours who was prepared to stand for the country that gave him birth (Here, Hear). (At this stage the speaker was slightly interruped as one from the audience asked him some question which was not audible )

Cotinuing Mr. Ramaswami Ayyangar said: Now, I beg your pardon, Sir, any question should come cutside this pandal and not here please).

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have recounted the services of Sir Sankaran Nair, and under these circumstances, I daresay this resolution you will pass with unanimity, and if you are not able to buy statues, at least buy a copy of protrait of Sir Sankaran Nair, hang it in your house and point out to your children, and to the childern yet to be born, and point him out to be an Indian who was proud to be basking not under smiles of official favours but even under official frowns (Hear, Hear).

## Speech of Mr. W. T. Halal.

'Mr. W. T. Halai (Bombay) in supporting the resolution said:---

Mr. President: Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen. The Resolution that has been placed in my hands for your acceptance and which has been so ably proposed and seconded runs with a little correction as follows:—

> "That this Congress places on record its grateful appreciation of the action taken by Sir Sankaran Nair in resigning his office as member of the Executive Council of the Governor General of India as a protest against the policy pursued by the Government of India and the Government of the Punjab in promulgating and maintaining Martial law in the Punjab in supersession of the ordinary Courts of Justice in the province."

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, although the Resolution is plain enough, I want to say a word over it. This resolution which I am going to support  $\smallsetminus$ and which I offer you for your acceptance leads us to where British justice is. Here people in the Punjab had the Martial law. The Government wanted to rule India with Martial law. They forgot, it seems, all principles of equity, they forgot themselves and we did not know whether we were being ruled by men or by beasts. We belong, Ladies and Gentlemen, to the Kshatriya race. The Government at the time forgot that they were ruling over men; they forgot also that they were ruling over Kabatriyas. The Kabatriyas are a martial race. Now speaking for my small Bhatia community which has got 24,000 women, in the words of Todd, rather than allow chastity to be molested. the 24,000 women of my community in order to protect their honour and chastity went on the funeral pyre. Here under the Martial law, I am told what did they do? How did they protect the chastity of these sisters of ours? At some places I am told that they made women stand naked and asked soldiers to face them and stand against them (cries of shame). Was this British justice? Was this the administration of Martial law? The late Mr. Justice Tyabji whose revered memory I have always got in my heart, always used to advise us 'Children, have faith in British justice.' Unfortunately he is not in the land of the living to-day. After having presided over three Indian National Congresses, were he living, what would he have told us in the face of this? Would he have told us that we must have faith in this sort of British justice? Mind you, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have the fullest faith in British justice, but not in this sort of administration of Martial law of which we recently had bitter experience. Sir Sankaran Nair also belongs to the same Kshatriya race. Could you expect him to stick to his chair for a paltry emolument when the chastity of our\_women was pulled up like this? Therefore the most honourable course left open to Sir Sankaran Nair was to chuck off his office. Well, I think he has chucked off his office for good, because his chucking off of his office has convinced the British public that he was right, and because of this they have placed him before Lord Chelmsford in the India Council. I was told by one of my friends, who had at one time the privilege of being in the presence of the present Viceroy Lord Chelmsford, Sir Sankaran Nair and some members of the Council, that they were discussing either this subject or some other subject, and they began to talk in such a fashion that two or three times His Excellency the Viceroy asked Sir Sankaran Nair, 'Sir Sankaran Nair, won't you pronounce your opinion once, twice, thrice, four times, but they were talking such a thing that I am told that Sir Sankaran Nair fully and frankly told him 'Oh, but Your Excellency is talking such rot'. As a Kshatriya ycu could not expect anything else from him, but what he frankly said as a Kshatriya he put into practice by resigning his office. The only thing, as sons of India, that we can do for him is to honour him by passing this resolution and placing on record the considered opinion of the country that his action is approved not only by the whole of India but by the whole of the civilized world (Hear, Hear).

The resolution was then put and carried unanimously.

Pandit Gokarn Nath Misra then moved the following resolution and addressed in Hindi. Before reading out the resolution, he said:—

### Resolution IX—Condolences for and memorial to Jallianwala Martyrs.

- (a) "This Corgress offers its repectful condolence to the relatives of those persons, whether English or Indian, who were killed and sympathy for those who were wounded or incapacitated during the April disturbances.
- (b) This Congress further resolves that the site known as Jallianwala Bagh in Amritsar be acquired for the Nation and be registered in the names of the Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya and the Hon'ble Pandit Motilal Nehru as Trustees and that it be used as a Memorial to perpetuate the memory of those who were killed or wounded on the 13th day of April last during the massacre by General Dyer, and in order to give effect to the intention of the Congress, the following be appointed a Committee :--
  - (1) The Hon'ble Pandit, Madan Mohan Malaviya.
  - (2) The Hon'ble Pandit Motilal Nehru,
  - (3) Mahatma M. K. Gandhi.
  - (4) Swami Shraddhananda.
  - (5) Lala Girdharilal
  - (6) Dr. Kitchlew, and
  - (7) Lala Harkishanlal, with power to add to their number,

to devise the best method of perpetuating the memory of the dead, to have a proper scheme of trust prepared and to collect subscriptions for the purpose and otherwise to carry out the object of the Trust."

### Speech of Pandit Gokarn Nath Misra.

Pandit Gokarn Nath Misra (U. P.) Secretary, All-India Congress Committee in proposing the above resolution said the black deed perpetrated by General Dyer in the Jallianwala Bagh on the 13th April (1919) was the blackest in the history of India, and if he (General Dyer) honestly thought over it, he would himself have to hang down his head in shame. When the news of this dark deed reached England and America, there was universal condemnation of it as a shameful act coming from a responsible officer of the Crown. To those who lost their lives in the Jallianwala Bagh and whose souls must now be hovering about in that Pandal, the Indians owed to raise a memorial so that a foundation of national progress might be laid. It was proposed therefore, to purchase the spot which had that day been flooded with blood of the martyrs and raise a national memorial there. He hoped all would agree to the resolution.

### Speech of Mr. Harl Sarvottamarao.

In seconding the resolution, Mr. Hari Sarvottamarao (Madras) said:---

Mr. President, Brother and Sister Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen. I wish I could have spoken to you in the tongue of your Province: Iam sorry I cannot do it. You take the heart for the fact. This land of the Punjab has been a land of memorials to the spirit of India. Coming as I do, from the Andhra Desha where we have had the best characterisation of Draupadi, I claim I have a right to speak on behalf of this Jallianwala Bagh Memorial. Draupadi was the very embediment of the spirit of India during a time of trouble, during a time of turmoil, during a time of Adharma, during a time of the conflict of Dharma and Adharma. In this land of Draupadi, in this land of sacrifice we have again this practical sacrifice for Dharma for the resuscitation of the greatness of India, of this anscient hoary land of Bharatvarsha. The herces that fell at Jallianwala Bagh have to be remembered for ever. The Jallianwala Bagh is not mere earth. It is not a mere soil, it is not a mere place that will be resorted to hereafter for things which are not holy. It is the place wherefrom all India shall carry the sacred emblem of sacrifice. The Mother earth is the embodiment of those who have fallen there as sacrifice to the greatness of our land. I therefore feel that the memorial that should be raised at the Jallianwala Bagh should be in consonance with the greatness of our land, with the sole embodiment of the Dharma for which the Punjab stands as an emblem in history from times immemorial up to the present-day. For this purpose what is it that this Resolution asks? It\_asks that we do appoint two greatest men of the Punjab and the United Provinces, the two greatest men who have done immense service at this juncture to be trustees and there is a Committee appointed to further work it out. I hope you will agree with me that this Committee will do the needful in the matter. There is another part of the resolution to which I should also refer and that is the first part. What does it say? It says that we offer our respectful condolence to the relatives of the persons killed, whether English or Indian, and sympathy to those wounded or incapacitated during the April disturbances. That is the spirit of India. We need not tarry upon that portion long. It is the essence of Indian civilisation to offer not merely respectful condolence but our hearts go to those who are suffering. I therefore feel proud in seconding the resolution that has been so ably moved by my friend.

Seth Mavji Govindji (Bombay) supported the resolution and spoke in Hindi

### Speech of Seth Mavji Bhai.

In supporting the above resolution Seth Mavji Bhai (Gujrat) said there was not a man whose blood would not boil at the rememberance of the horrible events that had been taking place during the past nine or ten months. India was a big country and all of them lived in different provinces, but when they had heard of the oppression in the Punjab, their hearts were all there. He hoped there would be raised a temple of the nation in the Jallianwala Bagh, and all would help towards its construction. As for Bombay, he was prepared to say, she would not lag behind her sister provinces in that noble work.

Dr. Choithram further supported the resolution and addressed the assembly in Urdu.

### Speech of Dr. Cholth Ram.

Dr. Choith Ram (Sindh) in giving his further support said that their one tie with the people of the Punjab was that only a century back their ancestors had lived in the Punjab and the other was that they were the devotees of the Great Guru Nanak and Guru Govind. No O'Dwyer, Dyer or Johnson could now stem the tide of liberty that had set in. Even Lord Chelmsford could not turn it back. They must raise a national temple in Amritsar and make it a double pilgrimage, where Hindus, Moslems, Christians, Parsis should all join in bowing their heads in reverence.

### Speech of Professor Mohun C. R. D. Naidu, B.A.

Professor Mohan C. R. D. Naidu, B. A., (Madras) in further supporting the resolution, said:—

Sisters and Brothers,

I enjoy today a great privilege to stand here in this august assembly and address you in connection with the resolution about the memorial to be erected in Jallianwalla Bagh, for, I was myself present there on that terrible and historic day of the 13th of April 1919, when an innocent multitude was fired upon and many were killed without giving occasion for any provocation, assembled as they were, without the least idea of resistance or rebellion.

In the dim twilight of the evening hours there come the distant voices of the innocent dead, voices that send a clear and distinct message to us and through us to the nation abroad. I do not stand here as a political representative but as an educationist, as a health preacher going from school to school and college to college preaching the gospel of love. I propose that this message must go from this sacred city of the Sikhs to the whole nation abroad.

What is that message? It is the message from India to the civilised nations of the world. After a great travail of suffering and sacrifice, European civilisation has given birth to that well-known political ideal—Self-determination. As we propose to build a temple on the sacred grounds of Jallianwala Bagh, it will stand for an ideal of the East—the ideal of self realisation, and not self determination, for the well-being of the motherland and the peace of the world. I have taken up the idea of carrying the message of peace to the nations of the world and Jallianwala Bagh will be the proudest monument to stand for the peace of the world.

It is not through cheers and claps you should carry this resolution but by purchasing a handful of the soil for hundreds and thousands and building a temple of self-realisation for the good of the motherland and the peace of the world.

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

On behalf of the President, Pandit Gokarn Nath Misra put the following resolutions:---

# Resolution X-Repeal of the Rowlatt Act.

"This Congress is of opinion that it is impossible to have real peace in India until the legislation popularly known as the Rowlatt Act which was passed in the face of the unanimous opposition in the country is repealed and it therefore respectfully urges upon the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India to advise His Majesty to veto the said Act or otherwise to secure its repeal.

## (Put from the Chair.)

# Resolution XI-The Indemnity Act.

"This Congress enters its emphatic protest against the action of the Government of India in prematurely passing the Indemnity Bill even though the acts in respect of which indemnity was granted were to be the subject of investigation by an official inquiry and in spite of the strong opposition by the Press, numerous public bodies and the non-official members of the Imperial Legislative Council.

#### (From the Chair.)

### Resolution XII—The Royal Amnesty.

"In view of the fact that full effect has not yet been given to the general Amnesty clause of the Gracious Proclamation of His Majesty the King-Emperor and that the persons in the Punjab tried by the Martial Law Commissioners, the summary :Courts, the area officers, and the tribunals constituted under the Defence of India Act and the detenues, deportees and all the political prisoners in Bengal and other parts of India including the Andamans have not been released, this Congress expresses the earnest hope and trusts that the fullest effect will immediately be given to the letter and spirit of the Royal Command.

### (From the Chair.)

Each of the Resolutions was put separately and carried with great acclamation.

At about 1-30 p.m. Pandit Gokarn Nath Misra announced that a wire had been received saying that Lala Lajpatrai had left America for England *en route* to India. The announcement was very enthusiastically received by the vast assembly.

The President:—I will now call upon Mr. Syed Hussain to move the resolution No. 9.

In moving the resolution regarding the re-call of Lord Chelmsford, Mr. Syed Hussain said:—

### Speech of Mr. Syed Hussain. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen.

The resolution that I have been asked to move was in the name of Mr C. R. Das, but I have been asked to propose it and I shall read it out to you.

## Resolution XIII—Recall of Lord Chelmsford.

"In view of the fact that Lord Chelmsford has completely forfeited the confidence of the people of this country, this Congress humbly beseeches His Imperial Majesty to be graciously pleased immediately to recall His Excellency."

#### Ladies and Gentlemen,

A number of resolutions have been carried in Congress unanimously but I make bold to say that so far as this particular resolution is concerned there is not one man, woman or child in this vast assembly or, for the matter of that, outside this assembly who does not heartily endorse this. I should like to draw your attention to the terms of the Resolution and I undertake to say that the terms of the Resolution represent no more than a bare statement of facts. The resolution says:-In view of the fact that Lord Chelmsford has completely forfeited the confidence of the people of this country. That is a bare statement of facts and it is absolutely necessary in the national interests that we should put that fact on record. After nearly serving the whole term of His Viceroyalty, Lord Chelmsford to-day is in this unenviable position that there is not a solitary soul of the vast Indian population who attaches the remotest confidence to His Excellency. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, what are the circumstances, what are the facts and the record of the Administration of Lord Chelmsford that has made this situation possible? The facts and the record, I take it, are sufficiently wellknown—unhappily too well-known to most of us, but it is necessary so that

each one of you may vote on this resolution with a complete understanding of its purport that I should, as briefly as possible. recapitulate some of the items of the Administrative record of Lord Chelmsford. Before I go into that I should like to sum up some of the general facts in regard to that administration and that, Ladies and Gentleman, is an aspect of the matter which ycu cannot separate from the personality of Lord Chelmsford. During the chequered history of India under British Rule, we have had all kinds of Viceroys and Governors General; We have had good men and bad men and indifferent men, but I have no hesitation in saying that you have not had any single viceroy in this country who was more completely unfitted for that exalted office (Hear, Hear, and Shame, Shame) alike on the score of ability, alike on the score of want of imagination, alike on the score of want of insight, alike on the score of all those qualities that go to make up a.good and efficient Viceroy. Lord Chelmsford stands condemned as a failure by his own record. (Hear, Hear). Not only that, Ladies and Gentlemen, but it is an unimpeachable fact that will take its proper place in history in due time, Lord Chelmsford has more than failed in many directions, he has failed in many ways, his record of Viceroyalty is the very negation of. what a Viceregal record should have been (Hear, Hear). Ostensibly, in this country, as a representative of the King-Emperor, Lord Chelmsford has signally failed to manifest any vestige of that sympathy and that attitude towards the public of this country that one is wont to associate with His

Majesty. How he came to be appointed a Viceroy is a mystery which has not yet been solved. You may remember, Ladies and Gentlemen, that when the announcoment was made that Lord Chelmsford had been appointed Viceroy and Governor General of India, a certain paper not unknown to you, the Bombay Chronicle, rather put it as the heading of its leading article "Who is this Lord Chelmsford." That querry "Who is this Lord Chelmsford" appeared to have given mortal offence to many people who seemed to have heard of Lord Chelmsford unlike the vast majority of the population of this country. Lord Chelmsford very soon began to acquire a fame from such obscure origin-a very unenviable kind of fame-and notoriety for himself. From the very first day of His Viceroyalty, his administration has been characterised by a total lack of sympathy for the people of this country, by a total lack of any understanding of their just and legitimate national aspirations and by a total lack even of that kind of ability which one used to associate with Lord Curzon who was also an unpopular Viceroy of his time; so that alike on the score of sympathy and on the score of ability, Lord Chelmsford has been a failure. I am not aware, Ladies and Gentlemen, of one single original idea or of one single policy which Lord Chelmsford has allowed to be evolved from his own inner consciousness. From first to last, Lord Chelmsford has taken his cue and his inspiration from the surrounding bureaucracy, from first to last he has played down to the worst traditions of that bureaucracy, and what is the result? The result is that today after a number of years of administration and at a time, mind ycu, when by all admitted testimony, at a time, when the people of India were predisposed, as they had never been before, to good will for the British connection, Lord Chelmsford has brought this country to the verge of desperation so far as the continued maintenance of British connection is concerned. I would like you to hark back for a moment to those days when Lord Hardinge was bidding goodbye to India. There if you like we had not only a Viceroy but a Stateman (Hear, Hear), and Lord Hardinge brought this country to a state of contentment that perhaps has nover been exceeded, having regard to all the circumstances attending the previous Viceroyalty. What did Lord Chelmsford do? His business should have been to carry on the Hardinge tradition, to complete the beneficent work of Lord Hardinge alike for the benefit of India and the British Empire. What Lord Chelmsford has actually succeeded in doing has been to undo the work of Lord Hardinge equally to the detriment of India, and of the British Empire (Shame). These are. Ladies and Gentlemen, the broad facts, and I undertake to say, the incontravertible facts-in regard to Lord Chelmsford's Viceroyalty., If I were to go into an analysis of his administrative record, I could make my case even more complete and damaging than it is. But it is absolutely necessary that you should bear in mind one or two facts in regard to Lord Chelmsford. There have been other Vicercys who have been unpopular in respect of some one policy or the other. Lord Curzon, for instance, did many things which undoubtedly were conducive to the good of the country, although he also did many things which evcked the most intense hostility from the people of this ccuntry, but Lord Chelmsford enjoys the unique privilege of not having done one single stroke of work that was calculated to do any good to the peop'e of this country or that was regarded by them otherwise than as an insult or outrage upon the Indian public opinion. I am very much sfraid, Ladies and Gentlemen, that Lord Chelmsford is going

to have a kind of undeserved immortality thrust upon him. His name, as you are aware, has been linked up with that of Mr. Montagu in regard to Montagu Chelmsford Reform Scheme. All I can say is that if Lord Chelmsford allowed his name to appear as a co-signatory to the joint scheme, it was less from choice than from necessity. I think, it was Mr. Montagu's persuasive elequence rather than any innate conviction on the part of Lord Chelmsford that was responsible for having had his signature to that scheme because, ladies and Gentlemen, as you are aware, Lord Chelmsford took the earliest opportunity that he consistently could with his position to back ou: of those commitments which his signature involved (Hear, Hear). Now you know the despatch of March the 5th. in which Lord Chelmsford did all he could to throw Mr. Montagu overboard and to whittle down the Joint Repor. as far as he possibly could. After that, as you know, he despatched ar ambassador to represent him and the Government of India before the Join: Committee and that ambassader; who is now Lord Meston of Agra, had to be torn into bits by Mr. Montagu from his place in the Joint Committee so that even in regard to that one administrative or constitutional event in respect of which Lord Chelmsford's name is likely to go down to posterity. there is good reason to believe that, as I have said, the greatness that is likely to be thrust upon him is an entirely undeserved one. Apart from that. Ladies and Gentlemen, there is corroborative evidence that Lord Chelmsford from beginning to end has not believed in Indian progress, has not wished to have the administrative insitutions of India liberalised; he has shown no sympathy for the aspirations of the people of this country and he has not believed in the modern forms of representative government. In the very early days of his Viceroyaty Lord Chelmsford , was responsible for inaugurating a repressive policy in regard to Indian administration. That policy. Ladies and gentlemen, had many aspects to it and if I have the time, I could take you through them, in a detailed way. But let me just recall to youminds that it is a unique fact that during the few years of Lord Chelmsford's almost every single great Indian, almost every single viceroyalty leader of the Indian people, Hindu or Mahommedan, man or woman, has been penalised and victimised by the Government of Lord Chelmsford (Shame). Mr Tilak had to suffer in that way; Mrs. Beasant had to suffer in that way. and almost every body had to suffer in that way, and last but not the least. that great and magnificent friend of India.Mr. B.G. Horniman (Loud Applause) was deported, I have good reason to know, under the inspiration of Simla. and not of Bofnbay (Hear, Hear). It was not Sir George Lloyd, the Governor of Bombay, who wanted to send Mr. Horniman out of this country in the disgraceful manner in which he was sent out, but it was Lord Chelmsford and his advisors who inspired, if they did not actually order; that particular thing So that every single friend of India has suffered, who was of any consequence under the regime of Lord Chelmsford. In the same way, if you look in other directions, if you look at the treatment accorded to the Indian Press and if you look at the treatment accorded to the Indian people, if you look at the treatment accorded to their leaders you will find that we have got one unmitigated record of repression, want of ability, want of vision, and want of understanding on the part of Lord Chelmsford, and the climax of that policy. the climax of that attitude, the climax of that whole course of administration was found to be reflected in what transpired in the Punjab during the last

few months. It has been very rightly said that Sir Michael O'Dwyer was largely responsible for all that happened in the Punjab, but, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have no hesitation in saying that Lord Chelmsford, as Viceroy' of India. fully shares the responsibility for all those atrocities that were perpetrated in the Punjab (Hear, Hear; Shame, Shame). As representative of the King Emperor it was open to Lord Chelmsford, if he had had the conviction and if he had had the moral courage, he could have stayed the hands of Sir Michael O'Dwyer, but what do we find? Lord Chelmsford not only gave him a blank cheque but backed him up from beginning to end with the whole' authority of his position and his government. After that it is impossible to deny that Lord Chelmsford must be bracketed with Sir Michael O'Dwyer for all that transpired in the Punjab and let us make sure that the full responsibility for his share of the business is firmly settled upon his shoulder.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I do not want to detain you, but as I have said, things have come to a pass where it is no more than a bare statement of facts to say that Lord Chelmsford had completely forfeited the confidence of the people of this country, and if that is a fact, as I believe it to be an undeniable fact, then the least we can do to-day in the Indian National Congress (A voice:--Have him impeached) speaking in the name of the people of India is to ask His Majesty to recall Lord Chelmsford immediately and to send out some other man who may be worthy of that exalted position. (Hear, Hear) There is, Ladies and Gentlemen, one more reason why you should pass this resolution unanimously and with acclamation, and that reason is that as you have been told, we are on the threshold of a new administrative era in this country. Now, as you are aware, a Royal Proclamation has been issued calling upon the people and the officials to co-operate with a view to making the Reforms a success. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, if His Majesty's Government believe in the reforms, if His Majesty's Government believe in the possibility of those reforms being made a success, if His Majesty's Government and the British people really believe in such a thing as the dawning of a new era in this country, then I say it is their first duty to get rid of Lord Chelmsford from this country, (Hcar, Hear) because those reforms are not likely to have the ghost of a chance of being worked out decently, much less successfully so long as that entirely illiberal viceroy continues to occupy the position in which he is. So that from every conceivable point of view, from the point of view of justice, from the point of view of historical truth, from the point of view of the future of our own country, and its progressive and its representative institutions, the first thing that we have got to concentrate upon is to see that Lord Cheimsford goes out of India at the earliest possible moment (Hear, Hear) and I think that object is likely to be better served and perhaps more quickly served by the Indian National Congress speaking with all the authority of the Indian People behind it, and demanding as we propose by this resolution, that Lord Chelmsford should immediately be recalled (Hear, Hear. and Loud Applause.)

## Speech of Mr. Kasturi Ranga Ayengar.

In seconding the resolution Mr. Kasturi Ranga Ayengar (Madras) raid, Mr. President, Brother Delegates, Lad es and Gentlemen. I beg to second the resolution and I do so with all my heart. In doing so, I am only expressing the united voice of intelligent thirking and patriotic Indians all over the country. Their opinion of Lord Chelmsford and of the many acts of mal-administration with which his Viceroyalty has become associated has found expression in the resolution passed in numerous public meetings of various political associations. At the time when Lord Chelmsford was appointed Viceroy public expectation was not very high regarding his administrative capacity. His previous career had not shown that he was possessed of the capacity required in one who was to hold the high office of He was comparatively an obscure person having once held . the Viceroy. one of the governorships in the commonwealth of Australia and was then holding the rank of a subordinate Military officer. His appointment was as much a surprise to him as it was to the general public and the news of his appointment was received with a feeling of wide disappointment. (At this stage, as Mr. K. R. Ayengar was unable to speak louder the audience seated at a distance could not hear him and began creating a noise. Mr. Ayengar suggested to the President that perhaps it would be convenient to hand over what he had written to the reporters. Eventually Mr. Hari Sarvottamrao (Madras) read the speech of Mr. Ayengar which proceeded as follows:-

I know this as I had to write about it at the time. When I gave . expression to this view in my paper at the time [ was informed at the instance. I believe of Lord Hardinge the Viceroy, that there were great possibilities in Lord Chelmsford, that he was a descendent of a great Lord Chancellor, was imbued with the principles of justice and constitutional rights, and was deeply interested in the development of Industrial conditions and had much of the equipment of a good Viceroy. It was an irony of fate that my distinguished informant who was then holding a high office in the Councils of the Government had himself to resign it as a protest and because he could not concur in the repressing and unjust acts of Lord Chelmsford's administration. This is not the time to give a review of Lord Chelmsfold's administration. The salient facts of his administration are well-known. The first occasion when he showed that he was a reactionary administrator was when the press deputation waited upon him to represent the oppressive manner in which the provisions of the Indian Press Act were being worked throughout the country. Lord Chelmsford in his speech in reply to the deputation took the most prejudiced, narrow and one-sided view of the matter, gave his wholehearted support to the highhanded action of the executive officials and went out of his way to criticise the observations of a learned Judge of a High Court who was an Indian and acting Chief Justice for his views on the provisions of the Indian Press Act. It is indeed one of the darkest blots in the career of Lord Chelmsford as Viceroy that he inaugurated a policy of unbridled repression of the organs of Indian opinion in the country resulting in the attempted suppression of incopendent political thought and activity. The latest achievement of Lord Chelmsford's Government in this direction is, I have good authority for stating, the forbidding even of Local Governments from relaxing the rigours of the Indian Press Act. What is now known as the Rowlatt Act, the circumstances which gave it birth and the disastrous consequences which had followed it are matters of contemporary history which are, I have no doubt, very fresh in the minds of all of us. The appointment of the Rowlatt Commission was in order to furnish an ostensible ground for the enactment of a repressive law of a most oppressive character which has no parallel in the. history of modern civilised countries. Public opinion throughout the country was flouted, discredited and set at naught in the enactment of this pernicious The whole of educated India was ranged against it. piece of legislation.

In the Indian Legislative Council a vigorous, just and unanimous opposition was presented by the Indian members and the passing of the obnoxious measures was followed by the resignation in protest of several of its members who are. among the most trusted leaders and exponents of Indian opinion. It was the Rowlatt Act which was passed in the teeth of the reasoned opposition and the protest of the Indian public that set the whole country aflame with The Indian members did their duty manfully indignation and resentment. by their fellow countrymen and the Government of Lord Chelmsford in warning the latter of the consequences of passing an iniquitous measure. The public agitation which followed was a natural, legitimate and inevitable The tragic and most deplorable occurrence in the Punjab and consequence. elsewhere was the sequel. Lord Chelmsford in his speech last 'September at the Legislative Council instead of thanking Indian members for the patriotic action in warning the Government of the probable consequences of passing the Rowlatt Act actually had the amazing hardihood of accusing the Indian members of having made good their threat of virtually instigating the people to commit acts of violence and the excesses which formed the pretext for the Proclamation of Martial Law. This was a most unwarranted and improper assertion and accusation on the part of the person holding the high office of Viceroy. Lord Chelmsford's action in proclaiming Martial Law without sufficient grounds and continuing it, giving occasion to the numerous acts of oppression, tyranny and massacre is too well known. Our distinguished countryman Sir Sankaran Nair's resignation has shown the country in a clear light the utter want of justification for those acts. That Sir Sankaran Nair's resignation far from being received in an unfavourable light by His Majesty's Government is tacitly approved by them is clear from the fact of his being now invited almost immediately after the resignation to occupy a seat in the Secretary of State's Council. Lord Chelmsford by his own statment in the Council has admitted that he gave a carte blanche to the heads of all provincial Governments to do what they pleased to quell disorders in the country and promised complete protection to them for all the drastic action which they took. In none of his speeches has he shown or expressed a ray of sympathy with the unfortunate victims of brutal outrages, victims including unarmed men, women and children, and whose innocence has been all along patent and was finally obliged to be officially admitted. On the other hand his utterances have shown that he was imbued with a spirit of Militarism, which is entirely foreign to a humane and righteous administration. The most unpardonable of Lord Chelmford's acts in relation. to the Punjab occurrences is his refusal to suspend the execution of the eighteen accused who were sentenced by the Martial Law Tribunals. He refused to suspend the sentences of hanging of several others and it was a timely and humane intervention of Mr. Montagu. the Secretary of State, that saved such other innocent lives. I know that there are a few gentlemen in this vast gathering who are oppressed with such a sense of responsibility in regard to passing a resolution of recall that they would wait for the publication of the report of the Hunter Committee and the Congress Sub-Committee. • It would tax all their ingenuity and benevolent judgment to justify or extenuate this atrocious refusal to suspend the execution of sentences of the 18 persons who were hanged and of the others who were saved by the Secre ary of State's intervention. We have now a fresh proof of the gross and

culpable neglect of duty of Lord Chelmsford and his Government, in the fact that the details of the frightful tragedy of the Jallianwala massacre has not been communicated to His Majesty's Government even nine months after it occurred. The whole country is ringing with cries of indignation and resentment at the monstrous cruelty and ferocity of the British officers concerned, and yet Lord Chelmsford has not shown the slightest sympathy of having been touched by it. He has not cared to visit the Punjab to endeavour to acquaint himself with the actual conditions and to show sympathy to the victims or their families. On the other hand he has been showing extreme solicitude for the officers who committed the atrocities and by an Act of indemnity which was opposed to all principles of justice and fair play has attempted to screen and whitewash men some of whom have shown themselves to be monsters in human form. In the light of the facts and circumstances which are absolutely undisputed with regard to his administration as Viceroy, Lord Chelmsford has rendered himself liable to a much severer condemnation than is involved in the resolution demanding his recall. The Congress would be failing in its duty and would forfeit the right to be called a true exponent of the people's voice in the country if it does not pass the resolution which has been worded in a mild form. The country has already given: its judgment as to the Viceroy in an unmistakeable manner. One of the distinguished leaders whose sobriety and sense of responsibility is unquestionable, has characterised Lord Chelmsford in a public meeting recently held, as the curse of the country. It would be an act of supreme unwisdom on the part of His Majesty's Government to allow Lord Chelmsford to continue in office at the time of inauguration of the new reforms. .: Whatever value, there may be in the reforms it would be ridiculous that a Viceroy, who has done his best to obstruct and whittle them down, should be given the privilege of introducing them and he vested with the power of diminishing their utility in various ways. 1 will here conclude by saying that the matter of administration of Lord Chelmsford brings forcibly to the front the question as to whether the appointment of the Governors and the Governor-General should in future be left to the uncontrolled discretion of the Ministers in England and whether they should not be controlled by the influence of popular opinion in the country which they are called to rule. In these days when the principle of self determination is being applied to the nations and people are getting increasing recognition, not only the appointment but also the continuance of their tenure should depend upon the opinion of the people concerned. This is a matter which I commend to the earnest consideration of the Congress in addition to placing this resolution for your acceptance. 🦯

## Speech of Mr. B. N. Sarma.

## Mr. B. N. Sarma (Madras) said :--

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen;—If I rise to speak on this resolution, it is because—(Cries of Urdu, Urdu and Hindi, Hindi), I am sorry that I have not been able to pick up the languages of upper India though I have taken some steps in that direction, and therefore it is my misfortune that I shall have to address you in English, a language many of you may not understand.

Brothers, and Sisters, If I rise to speak on this resolution it is because that I feel on the eve of the introduction of responsible Government and when an important question as this is being debated we should rise to the highest traditions of the House, look dispassionately at the question from both sides and that come to a verdict, be it unanimous or by a vast or overwhelming majority. I understand and appreciate the horror and indignation at the apathy displayed both by the recent Punjab Administration and the Government of India with regard to the events which took place in the Punjab. If this resolution had been rested upon the administration of Lord Chelmsford's Government with reference to the Punjab I should have wished that it should be postponed for a couple of months so that we may be able to know what the explanation is. (Cries of 'No No')' and I might have seen eye to eye with you but by passing a resolution yesterday that you will hold your judgment in suspense you have to a certain extent precluded yourselves from alluding to that subject at great length and you have chosen to attack the administration of Lord Chelmsford on other grounds. I might tell you at once that it has been my misfortune from August 1916 to have been a severe critic of the administration of the Government of India and its measures. I have not been able to see eye to eye with many of the measures of legislation of the Government. (Hear, Hear). I had to oppose the grant of 100 Millions of pounds in so far as it had to be done by borrowing money unless representative institutions were conceeded to us. (Hear, Hear). I had the privilege of befriending Pandit Malaviya in that respect. I had to oppose a grant of 45 Million pounds later on the same ground. (Hear, Hear). I had to oppose the Rowlatt Act and I had the privilege, and I take pride in it, that 1 could, do something for the people of the Punjab in opposing the Indemnity 'Act in the form in which it took shape (Hear, Hear). But saying that much I do demur to the assertion that Lord Chelmsford's administration has been a failure throughout and in every respect. (Hear, Hear). If you say that balancing both sides you arrive at an unfavourable conclusion I may not quarrel with you. You may be right but fearing lest it should not be said in this House when there are some who have been associated with that administration for three years, there was none who could point out what had to be appreciated or be thankful for. I leave it to you to judge for. I leave it to you to judge for yourselves (an interruption, a voice from the Platform and some confusion). It may be your opinion. I have not the slightest objection to your holding it. Let us remember that this Viceroy has had the most troublous period of any of the Viceroys that have ever ruled here. He had to assist in the carrying out of a war during four years. He had pestilence to fight against. He had most difficult monetary and currency problems to solve (again interruption). I am only putting to you facts. I am not here to justify his action or to defend his policy. I am going to put both sides

of the picture because it is necessary in order to arrive at a judgment that you should hear both sides, or what may possibly be said in favour of the Viceroy. times (Sit down please, we have had encugh of it). He did oppose vested interests by fighting with vested interests and getting for you an introduction of a new principle, the right to impose import duties upon cotton goods entering India, though it was at the risk of creating a Cabinet crisis. Remember, friends, he would have done more and removed the Excise duties of Government which could not do it. Then, again, take the case of the introduction of the principle of detending Indian interests., He did introduce a new principle that India has a right to protect her own industries even though a duty may be imposed as against the world and against the rest of the British Empire. We may quarrel with the exact measure as I did quarrel but in the recent Raw, Hides and Skins Act which may or may not be defensible there is the introduction of the principle for the first time in the history of the Indian Governnment that India can and ought to protect her own industries, even though such measures may be against the wishes or interests of Great Britain or the rest of the world. Then again friends, in the case of railway policy, mark you, there might have been a possibility of East India Railway Company being handed over wholesale to Company administration. I do not say that the Government of India succeeded in completely stopping it but I know that the Goverment of India were in favour of a reconsideration of the question and have postponed that catastrophe. (Hear, Hear). Therefore, on financial question, Lord Chelmsford's Government has fought for the interest of India. Whether they succeeded or not is a different matter, (Laughter).

Now coming to the question of Industry, after the report of Industrial commission was submitted he took steps to see that those recommendations matured into plans and a special officer was appointed to get reports from -Provincial Governments. (A voice, "Sit Down please"). On the question of Patna University, although he did support Sir Sankaran Nair and although the original measure affecting Patna was of a most retrograde kind he was one of those Governors-General who has the unhappy knack of relying a little too much upon the Ministers in charge of the portfolio and that has been his When Sir Sarkaran Nair resisted the Patna misfortune (Hear, Hear). University reactionary measure Lord Chelmsford did support him in modifying it by introducing the elements of majority electorate in that Council and he is trying his level best to improve it on the model of Calcutta University. Then, friends, he has supported your Boy Scouts Movement and he has fought for . Commissions in the Army for you. Well, he tried to get commission in the Army for you. (At this stage the speaker had to pause for a few moments as Pandit Malaviya and Mahatma Gandhi arrived in the Pandal). Continuing Mr. Sharma said, although 1 knew that War Office was obstinately bent upon doing nothing and he had to overrule sometimes his Military officers in regard to questions of Boy Scouts Movement.

With regard to Reforms, it must be said that he is a conservative liberal. He was one of those cautious statesmen that want to do good to the country, but is terribly timid as to where it would lead to. When Mr. Montagu was here, Lord Chelmsford was influenced by the superior intellect of Mr. Montagu. When Mr Montagu left this country and when Sir William Meyer

left the country and there was a new batch of advisors, he thought he would be doing the right thing if he modified the Reform Scheme a bit.' However, the moment the Joint Committee reported against these recommendations, he did not in a fit of anger or disappointment say "I shall resign,' I shall not have anything to do with it." On the other hand, he telegraphed his congratulations to Mr. Montagu upon that report and asked him to get the bill passed into law immediately. There you see, the vicissitudes of his mind meaning to do well but being pulled up by his advisors and readily yielding to them. However, that is the position, this much must be said in his favour. When there were five Provincial Governors who were against the introduction of any responsibility even into the Provinces, he and his Government stood out and we do not know what would have been the result, if the Government of India had protested even with regard to the principle. That is what may be said in his favour, on some of the questions of the day.

Now regarding Punjab, friends, I had the misfortune to tell His Excellency that at no time during the British Sovereignty has the Administration of Justice been brought into such contempt as during the last few months owing to the events of the Punjab and I remain still of the same opinion. I asked sometimes for a little sympathy, but he said to me once that he did not believe in sympathetic words which he would not be able to carry out, but that to show by deeds and actions that he means to do well by the people. Whether he does that or not is a separate matter. But there you have a type of mind, I may say, unprepared somewhat for an administration of such a large empire like this (Hear, Hear). That is a weakness no doubt, that we must confess in his character. With regard to the Punjab, His Excellency's motto seems to be to leave Provincial Administration to deal with suppression of disorders and to call them 'to account when the whole thing is over. He seems to say, "I shall not change the current in the middle of the stream. I shall allow the thing to go on." Otherwise, it is inexplicable to me as to why His Excellency has not gone to Punjab and tried to enquire for himself. That is a phase extremely regrettable but he would say "Who are my ears ?---the C.I.D. and Local Administration---and even if I went I would not be able to learn anything there and so I should institute an impartial commission and after that commission pronounces its findings I shall take action." (At this stage there were cries, confusion and continued interruption and voices, 'Close, Close'. I wish to point out that they are some of the aspects on which Chelmsford's Administration had not been that colossal failure which it has been represented to be. Remember, friends, that he courted the odium of the Anglo-Indian Community by releasing Mrs. Beasant and snubbing Lord Pentland (Cries of 'No. No') though he was not in any way responsible for that. Therefore as far as I am concerned, if you had rested the resolution on Punjab events I would not have had a quarrel, but having taken that off your feet I regret to say I do not agree that on any other point his administration was such a failure as it has been suggested.

### Speech of Mr. S. R. Bomanji.

Mr. S, R. Bomanji (Bombay) in opposing Mr. Sarma and supporting the resolution said:—Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, I was put on this resolution to support it, but I have a different function to perform. I will

first start by meeting some of the accusations that Mr. Sarma had the hardibood to come here and level against you for passing this resolution. w(Heat. Hear). In a way, my work is very simple. Mr. Sarma had not one word i positive facts to urge in support of his contention about the success of Loud 17 Chelmsford's Viceroyalty, nor could he point out one specific administrativo action of Lord Chelmsford which he could support. It seems to me, Ladies and Gentlemen, and I make bold to say, that Mr. Saima is the only one man in this vast assembly who has got one word to say (Hear, Hear), for Lord Chelmsford. I will go further and I assure you, unless I am misreading the sentiments of the people of India as a whole that there is not one man, woman or child who will support Mr. Sarma. (Cries of 'No, No'). Ladies and Gentlemen, I make bold to say that I do not question the honesty of purpose of Mr. Sarma, but 1 am sorry for Mr. Sarma's misdirected zeal and I have no doubt that he speaks from the bottom of his heart and he is sincere in what he says, but that must not set him out from being attacked on the stand that he has taken altogether against the wishes - and the sentiments of the people of India.

Now, what does Mr. Sarma want to tell you and what does he want on behalf of Lord Chelmsford? He says first that Lord Chelmsford introduced Excise duties. I dispute every word of it. (Hear, Hear). We in Bombay know more about Excise duties than Mr. Sarma, and 1 say this with due deference, to him. The Excise duty on cotton was thought of and the question of Excise duty on cotton goods was first moved by Lord Hardinge (Hear, Hear) and the despatches with regard to Excise duties were already sent Home by Lord Hardinge and Lord Chelmsford only signed the last decree as it were, in the same way as Lord Ampthill was responsible for the Partition of Bengal. You cannot say that because Lord Ampthill signed the Partition of Bengal, he was responsible for the Partition of Bengal. In the same way, I say Lord Chelmsford was not responsible for the Excise duties.

Then he talked of the great perference that was introduced in India in regard to the protection of industries. Ladies and Gentlemen, I do not want to speak on this subject, because, it is a very highly important subject dealing with industries and I have mentioned this matter in my evidence Industrial Conference and I am very glad that before this before assemb'y Mr. Sarma has given me an opportunity of exposing the fallacy of this argument, that is urged by Sir Thomas Holland. What are these Excise duties that you have been given. Ladies and Gentlemen, who were the great consumers of leather? America. To-day, you are given a preference duty of 10 and 15 per cent. in favour of England and the colonies against America Germany and France. What does it result in. It means this, that England imports your leather and pockets all the profits by selling it to America, Germany, and France which would have otherwise gone into your pockets (Cries of Shame). This is Mr. Sarma's preferential tariff. (Hear, Hear). Then, Mr. Sarma mentioned something about East India Railway Company. If every member had taken part as my friend Sir Ebrahim Rahimtoolla took up in the Legislative Council that question would have been settled for us and the contract even for five years would not have been given to the same company.

Then Mr. Sarma advanced another reason about the hundred Million sterling grant. I say it was exacted from you and again if your Indian representatives in the Council had stuck to their guns the hundred Millions would never have been granted. But, may I ask Mr. Sarma another thing with regard to the imposition of restrictions on the import of gold and silver during the war. (Turning to Mr. Sarma:—Will you answer me, Mr. Sarma, will you point out to me one country in the world which imposes restrictions on the import of gold and silver? Is there any other country?

Mr. B. N. Sarma:-The Secretary of State will answer you.

M. Bomanji:—Ladies and Gentlemen, every country in the world puts an export duty on gold and silver, but there is no import duty on gold and silver. Here ycu are trying to stop the importation of gold and silver into the country and India is the only ccuntry that does it.

Then Mr. Sarma tells us that Lord Chelmsford could not do anything for you because there was the war on (Laughter), there was famine and there was pestilence and that there were monetary troubles. Supposing we admit Mr. Sarma's arguments, what did he do with regard to famine, what did he do with regard to pestilence? You are all aware that preventive measures to stop influenza were not taken in time. Your millions of people died before any attempt was seriously made to give them any help (Shame), and this is one of the points that Mr. Sarma has to urge in favour of Lord Chelmsford.

There is another very serious matter which will appeal to my Bengal friends, and that is about the monetary good that Lord Chelmsford has done. Ladies and Gentlemen, you are aware that during the war the European Scotch merchants of Bengal made the greatest money out of the gunny What was that gunny trade? If you will remember, Ladies and trade. Gentlemen, my brother delegates from Bengal will bear me out, that Jute before the War had never ruled anything under Rs. 16/- per maund, By shutting out the export of raw jute to countries like Dundee and America, what happened? There was a glut of jute in the Calcutta Market. This was created for the special benefit of the Jute manufacturers, the Hesian manufacturers of Calcutta. What was the result? You find that in two years the whole of the Jue peasantry of Bengal was absolutely reduced to starvation, because the price of Jute declined to Rs. 5/- and Rs. 6/-. In the history of Jute trade of Bengal the price of Jute had never come down to such a ridiculously low figure as Rs. 5/- and Rs. 6/-, and for this Mr. Sarma says that we have to be thankful to Lord Chelmsford's industrial policy and activity.

There is another thing, Lidies and Gentlemen. Here was the one man ih India who stood to his guns with regard to the Punjab affairs. Sir Sinkar Nair told me that, if we pass a resolution censuring Lord Chelmsford he is with us. We all know what he did. There was Sir Sankaran who had to tender his resignation, because of the hostile criticism that he found prevailing in the Council and not one in the Council stood by him. If Lord Chelmsford had backed him up, do you think that Sir Sankaran Nair's services would have been lost to us? What have you got to say to that Mr. Sarma? (Laugter).

Then another great point that Mr. Sarma wants to urge on behalf of Lord Chelmsford is that when he found that the Reforms Act was passed, he sent a telegram on the 35th (Am I right Mr. Sarma?) Mr. Sarma:-Before it was taken up.

Mr. Bomanji:—I beg your pardon. When Lord Chelmsford found that he was being defeated, that he was being disgraced in the whole of parliament of England as well as in the world, Lord Chelmsford said Oh, I am quite prepared to work the Reforms'. This is a great point in his favour.

Then, Mr. Sarma alludes to some private conversation, which we are not entitled to know (Hear, Hear) and tells us about Lord Chelmsford's sympathy. Can you point out to me one specific act of sympathy? (Cries of 'No, No'). Can you point out one single act of his sympathy for the people of this country? (A voice:--"Yes, the Rowlatt Acts").

Then the last thing that Mr. Sarma urged in defence of Lord Chelmsford was that he gave us the Hunter Commission. Believe me, Ladies and Gentlemen, that Lord Chelmsford had nothing to do in the appointment of the Hunter Commission. We were asking, both the Moderates as well as the members of the Congress deputation, I must say to their credit, were absolutely worrying the life of Mr. Montagu and asking for amnesty, and they said 'if our people are really guilty, let them be tried rather than getting an amnesty like this,' We demanded a Commission. That Commission was opposed by Lord Chelmsford at the start. I have reason to know that (Cries of shame). It was because Mr. Montagu was firm, backed up as he was by our Indian Deputations, both the Moderates as well the others, that Mr. Montagu forced the Commission on the Government of India much against Lord Chelmsford's will.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I have done with Mr. Sarma's arguments. I do not think it is necessary for me to detain you long on this Resolution, but I will say this In this resolution you say that Lord Chelmsford has completely forfeited the confidence and has disgraced the trust reposed in him by his own Sovereign (Hear, Hear) and the people of England in having ruled India in the way he did. (Shame). He has diagraced the name of England, and he has forfeited the trust that was reposed in him by the people of India and by the Sovereign of his own country. Ladies and Gentlemen, I go further and say that it is a desecration of the Montagu Chelmsford Report to associate the name of Lord Chelmsford with that Report at all. (Hear, Hear). He had no more to do with the Montagu-Chelmsford Reforms than you and I had; and I say that Montagu's name should be enthroned in your hearts with reverence and gratitude. I am not going to allow Lord Chelmsford to share one iota of the thanks and gratitude of the people of India. With these remarks, Ladies and Gentlemen, I beg with the greatest pleasure to second this resolution. (Hear, Hear and Applause).

Dr. Kitchlew (Amritsar) further supported the resolution in Urdu.

# Speech of Dr. Salf-ud-Din Kitchlew.

Dr. Saif-ud-Din Kitchlew, in supporting the resolution said he had intended to listen quietly to the speeches of the guests rather than inflict his own on them, but the speech of Mr. B. N. Sarma had forced him to come forward. He (the speaker) considered it a sin to praise one who had intentionally tried hard to raise obstacles in the way of Indian liberty. He thought the resolution had not been couched in sufficiently strong words. Lord Chelmsford should not only be recalled, but should be impeached as well. Lord Chelmsford was the man who had passed the Rowlett Act in the teeth of unanimous popular opposition, he was the man who had publicly snubbed Pandit Malaviya ji in the Council chamber; it was he who had tried to go beck on his report on the Reform Scheme. Such a man was totally unfit to be the representative of the Sovereign. If the people were not prepared to call him to account, the least they could do was to pass the resolution about his recall.

### Speech of Babu Jitendralal Bannerjee.

Babu Jitendralal Bannerjee (Bengal) in supporting the resolution said:-

Mr. President, Brother delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I had been asked by the President originally to oppose Mr. Sarma, but that work I now think is one of super-arrogation. Mr. Sarma's slight amendment, if it was an amendment at all, now lies upon the floor bruised, thrashed, torn to pieces, overwhelmed beneath the united ridicule and opposition of the whole House. (Hear, Hear). In this vast assembly comprising leaders of several provinces, comprising the mass of the Punjab, there is none to do reverence to Lord Chelmsford excepting the solitary figure of Mr. Sarma. (loud laughter). But though Mr. Sarma's support will not avail Lord Chelmsford, yet, gentlemen, I must tell you that in one little point I am in agreement with Mr. Sarma, strange, as it may seem to sound. Mr. Sarma does not like this resolution, no more do I. Only Mr. Sarma thinks that the resolution is too strong; I think that the resolution is too weak, too mild, too halting, too much of milk-and-water business, too overflowing with that milk of human kindness with which we are said to be endowed, much to our gratitude, but much, to my mind, to our humiliation and shame. Left to myself, I would have said, not that you should be able to demand the recall of Lord Chelmsford, but that you should ask for the dismissal of this faithless Minister, nay, not his mere dismissal but his. impéachment before the High Court of Parliament for high crimes and misdemeanours against all the laws of humanity, against all the canons of sivilisation, culture, and refinment.

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, what is Mr. Sarma's argument? He began by saying that he had always to oppose Lord Chelmsford, that he had never seen eye to eye with Lord Chelmsford and things of that sort. My question is, why are you not logical? Why can you not crown this glorious character by supporting this resolution? (Laughter). If during the last four years you have consistently and publicly opposed Lord Chelmsford, what miracle has happened that you now come here to support him? (A voice:—'Martial Law'). But one of Mr. Sarma's arguments is what I should call a thistle but of course Mr. Sarma is an honourable man and I should not like to attribute such expressions to him. What is his first argument? He said he had a private conversation with Lord Chelmsford. Not being high individuals, not being imperial Councillors, we of course have no means of having private conversations with Lord Chelmsford. (Laughter). Of that high privilege we are bereft, but what was the substance of this private conversation? The substance was that Lord Chelmsford did not believe in sympathetic words. We well appreciate. we well know, that he did not believe in sympathetic acts and words but he believed in sympathetic deeds. What are these sympathetic acts of Lord Chelmsford ? Are they the Rowlatt Act? Тя it the Indomnity Act? Is it his connivance at the massacre at the Jallianwala Bagh? Are these the sympathetic acts of Lord Chelmsford which we must remember and forget his unsympathetic words? But there was nothing more. Mr. Sarma is an astute debator and is seldom at the end of his resources. He has other arguments in stock. What are those? Lord Chelmsford, says Mr. Sarma, so far as Provincial administration is concerned, believes in leaving it to the Provincial Governors and when all is said and done then to do something very fearful and frightful. Yes, that certainly is a very convenient policy. Let blood be shed in rivers; let atrocities be perpretated in Jallianwala Bagh; let innocent men in Kasur and Gujerat be interned; let every act of murder, and horror, and atrocity be performed and when all is quiet when the victims are in their graves, when the groans of the dying cannot be heard in the ears, then will come something frightful, frightfully intangible, frightfully impalpable, of which Mr. Sarma may have some Mahatmic inspiration but of which we find no tangible traces (Laughter).

Well, Gentlemen, Mr. Sarma asked me to say if Lord Chelmsford had not done anything worthy of our appreciation? That I should s+y, Mr. President, is very much beside the point. The question is not whether this man during the last four years did or did not do one single thing worthy of our appreciation, but the question is, has he or has he not forfeited our confidence. That is what the resolution says (Hear, Hear), We say he has forfeited our confidence and then can any one with his hand upon his heart declare that Lord Chelmsford does possess the confidence of the people of India (Cries of 'No, No'). What are the charges against him? I shall simply enumerate them. That will be sufficient to condemn any human being in the eyes of the civilised world (Hear, Hear). He has been guilty of all this policy of internment and externment under his frightful rule. Even today, in Bengal more than 15.000 young men are rotting in all jails, (Cries of Shame. Shame), without any charge being brought home against them, without any charge being formulated against them, without any trial, open or secret, held against them. That has been the result of Lord Chelmsford's policy. He has been guilty of passing the Rowlatt Act which has been well described as the blackest and most obnoxious measure that has been entered in the Statute Book of the country. That is sufficient by itself to damn Lord Chelmsford in the eyes of the civilised world. I shall not refer to the Punjab matter here. That will come in for further consideration (Hear, Hear), at the Special Congress, I am told, but in the meantime ' and before deciding upon Lord Chelmsford's precise share in the Punjab atrocities I would like to point out that there is one fact which can be remembered against him and what is that. Those things occurred in April last (Hear, Hear). Nine months. afterwards the Secretary of State comes and. tells you that he has received no information on the subject from his Viceroy of India. (Cries of Shame, Shame). What sort of conduct do you call that? I say that is the blackest and the most perfidious act of which the meanest of human beings can be guilty. This withholding of information, this suppression of facts, quite apart from his share in the horrors of Jallianwala Bagh is itself sufficient to secure his impeachment. Well, Ladies and Geatlemen, we do not know whether this impeachment will come or not. The fact of the impeachment rests with the Commons of Great Britian. We do not know whether the English people will rise to the height of the occasion, whether they will avail themselves of the opportunity that God has given to them to redeem their humanity in the sight of the world, but this we know that, whether he is impeached by the Commons of Great Britian or not, he will be impeached before the Bar of Humanity by the unanimous verdict of history and of the civilised world. With these few words, I support the resolution.

Mr. Maqbool Mahmood (Amrits ir) supported the resolution in Urdu.

#### Speech of Mr. Maqbool Mahmood.

In a strong speech in Urdu Mr. Maqbool Mahmood said at the time when India was shedding her life-blood on the battle-fields of France and Flanders for the defence of England, and the liberty of the world, England's representative (Lord Chelmsford) was ergaged in forging fresh fetters for India. He tried to go back on his own Reform Scheme. That he had no sympathy with the people was apparent from the fact that he did not care even to visit Amritsar during the Martial Law days. Such a man was unworthy of being the King's representative, and must be recalled.

I do not touch them with a pair of tongs and therefore I refuse to commend this resolution to you on my behalf, because I know Lord Chelmsford has been responsible for excluding and restricting my humble services to my country in the Punjab and Delhi during the last few years. (Shame). And therefore I will not say anying about it. I leave him to the judgment of my people. I leave him to the judgment of history if history condescends to take any notice of him.] (Laughter) and I leave him to the judgment of his conscience in the quietude of his retirement in England and to his God (Loud Cheers).

# Speech of Mr. S. Satyamurthi.

Mr. S. Satyamurthi (Madras) in supporting the resolution said:—

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, I know the futile and factious opposition of my friend Mr. Sarma to this proposition, and I feel that no more speeches are needed to show that his opposition was the most futile and factious that was ever put up for any proposition. But, Sir, he comes from Madras, so do I; and I am anxious that this Congress should not understand that Madras shares to any degree or extent the feelings or sentiments of Mr. Sarma (Hear, Hear). On the other hand, I am anxious to assure (Mr. Harisarvottamarao:—The Andhras also share your views).

Mr. Satyamurthi :--I am anxious to assure you, Mr. President and Brother Delegates, on behalf of Madras that we are unanimous with the rest of the country in demanding the immediate recall, aye, the impeachment of this arch-offender Lord Chelmsford (Laughter) and will only tell this House, Mr. President, with your leave that when Lord Chelmsford did us the uninvited honour of being our guest, our premier Club, the Madras Cosmopolitan Club, on the motion of our distinguished leader Mr. Kasturiranga Ayyangar refused to entertain him even at a social entertainment (Hear, Hear) and the Madras Provincial Committee refused to extend to him the customary courtesy of an address and the Madras Mahajana Sabha even with the help of Mr. Sarma, was able to vote a bald address of welcome. Therefore I think this House will be well justified in drawing the inference that Mr. Sarma stands by himself, all alone on a solitary pedestal of sympathy with Lord Chelmsford (Laughter).

Mr. B. N. Sarma :- Mr. President, I have to make a correction. I said I would not mix up the question of the Punjab. I put it on other grounds.

Mr. Satyamurthi:—Mr. President, I was coming to that. I leave the Punjab on one side altogether. Leaving that I still convict Lord Chelmsford, and I ask you to do it because he has been the most miserable failure among

all the Viceroys which England sent out to India. We have had bad Governors-General like Warren Hastings and Lord Dalhousie and the rest of them. But I venture to submit, Sir, that Lord Chelmsford beats the record of all of them. He has dared in spite of the dawn of the Twentieth Century to repeat deeds which his predecessors did 50 years ago." The application of the Press Act has been so rigorous that in point of fact you find that in every part of the country almost every Indian paper has had to give security and in addition to that many papers which were struggling papers did die out. Now, as regards the externment, take the case of Mr. Horniman. Mr. Horniman was sent away from your country notwithstanding the fact that the Governor of Bombay was opposed to it. Speech of The Honble Pandit-Madan Mohan Malaviya.

#### APPEAL FOR A NATIONAL MEMORIAL.

The Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya in the course of a very touching appeal for building a National Memorial at the-Jallian wala Bagh, where thousands of Hindus and Moslems had been shot dead said, he asked the audience to give a practical shape to their resolution of raising a Memorial. He said hewanted to clear any misunderstanding that might be lurking in any mind. They had decided to raise the Memorial not from any narrow motive. It was not to keep alive the dark deeds of General Dyer. They wanted it to be a Memorial to the Hindu-Moslem unity that had sprung out of the intermingling of Hindu and Moslem blood on that field of carnage. They wanted it tobe a place of pilgrimage where every pilgrim would recall to his mind how the thousands of unarmed, innocent brethren assembled there had been shot down by Dyer's bullets, even in the act of running away for their lives, how Hindu and Moslem-

• • •

blood had run in one single stream, how their bodies had been piled one upon the other, how innocent children had been shot down, how infants in the arms of their fathers had met their deaths. It was a nation that was now weeping and grievings for them. Still Pandit Malaviyaji warned people in the projected scheme of the Memorial not to entertain any feeling of hatred or enmity towards any one. Their tormentors had been instruments in the hands of others.

It was reassuring, informed Pandit Ji, that the purchase of the Jallianwala Bagh to the extent of -/14/9; in the rupee and he had every hope that for the had been effected remaining Rs. -/1/3 it might be settled soon or might even have been settled by that time. They would have to pay 5 lace for the land and require another 5 lacs to build the Memorial. He doubted not that that amount would be forthing very soon. The suffering of the Martial Law days had brought vividly to the mind of every one that all Indians, be they Parsis, Christians, Moslems or Hindus, were brethren among themselves. The bullets had shown no respect either for a Hindu or a Mohammadan, Hindus and Moslems had been handcuffed together to Innocent people had been ridicule Hindu-Moslem unity. arrested and put into cages and condemned cells. Their honour was then at the mercy of even ordinary constables. Of all this Jallianwala Bagh would stand as a living monument for all It will also remind them that Hindus and Moslems were time. equal sufferers. God had granted them this occasion to unite. against which unity, no injustice could stand. Pandit Ji then announced that Mr. Bomanji of Bombay had promised Rs. 25,000/and Lala Harkishen Lal of Punjab Rs. 10,000/- for the Memorial. After this, money began to flow like water and over a lac was contributed in a short time.

# FIFTH DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

# (Thursday, 1st January 1920.)

The Congress re-assembled after 11 a.m. As announced on the previous evening, visitors and the bulk of the members of the Reception Committee were not allowed entry in the pandal and therefore there was a distinct fall in the attendance.

Sister Balambil (Madras) sung a poem in Tamil from the Mahabharata.

## Speech of The Hon'ble Pandit Gokaran Nath Misra.

Pandit Gokaran Nath Misra then rcse and said:-

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have to place before you the various telegrams of good wishes which we have received after the opening day of the session of the Congress. Two of those I will read before you and with regard to the rest I will only read out the names. It is a great satisfaction to us that we are now getting the blessings of the religious leaders. The other day you saw Maulana Abdul Bari of Lucknow, one of the Musalman leaders, joining the Congress. Now we have a telegram of good wishes from His Holiness Shri Shankaracharya of Karvir Pith (Bombay). The telegram from His Holiness reads as follows:—

"Suggest the Congress should pass a resolution on export of milch cattle it being extremely harmful to the country. The Congress should also request Government to stop such export. We wish you success."

The second telegram which I have to place before you is from the British Congress Committee which runs as follows:—

> "Congratulations, wish success, cable Congress resolutions demanding powers of self-government making impossible repetition recent horrors."

The other [telegrams are from Mr. A. K. Fazl-ul-Haq, Mr. Ranga Chari, Mr. Ram Chandra Sharma, etc. etc.

Then we have received various-other telegrams wishing welcome to our leaders who have been recently released.

After this, Gentlemen, the President has asked me to announce that Mr. Das will move the most important resolution on the reforms.

# Resolution XIV-Self-Government-Reforms.

# Speech of Mr. C. R. Das,

In proposing Resolution No. XIV Mr. C. R. Das (Bengal) spoke as follows:-

Mr. President, Ladies and gentlemen,

I have great pleasure in proposing the first resolution which stands on to-day's agenda. I will read to you the resolution, but as I am aware "That this Congress reiterates its declaration of last year that India is fit for full Responsible Government and repudiates all assumptions and assertions to the contrary wherever made." (Hear. Hear).

I might simply tell you that this is the resolution which you passed in Calcutta in the year 1917. That is the resolution which you passed in Bombay in 1918 and that is also the resolution which you passed at Delhi in December 1918. I shall simply ask you to pass it this year also.

The second part of it is this:-----

"That this Congress adheres to the resolutions passed at the Delhi Congress regarding Contitutional Reforms and is of opinion that the Reforms Act is inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing."

(Hear, Hear).

This part of the Resolution merely asks you to say what you said in Bombay and at Delbi of the Reforms Scheme. It carries you no further than that.

Then the third part of the resolution is this:----

"That this Congress further urges that Parliament should take early steps to establish full Responsible Government in India in accordance with the principle of self-determination." (Hear, Hear).

If it is necessary to point out how it is justified. I will merely say this that it follows from the other two resolutions. It follows from your fitness for full Responsible Government and it follows from the second proposition that you declared the Reforms Act to be unsatisfactory, inadequate and disappointing.

With these words I shall commend this resolution for your acceptance reserving to myself the right of speaking in reply. (Hear, Hear).

#### Speech of Lok. Balgangadhar Tilak.

Lok. B. G. Tilak (Bombay) who on rising to second the resolution was received with loud cries of 'Bande Matram' and 'Tilak Maharaj ki Jai,' said:---

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have been asked, and I have also the pleasure of seconding the resolution which has been proposed to you by my friend Mr. C. R. Das. As there are several amendments to be moved to that resolution I do not wish now to explain it. but I shall reserve the right of making my speech later and say what I have to say after the amendments are moved. So you will please excuse me, and I am not going to say anything now but reserve my speech until after the amendments are moved. With these few words I second the resolution.

# (Mr. Tilak then left the rostrum and went up to the President and had a conversation with him for a few seconds. He returned again to the rostrum and addressed the audience as follow:----

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I hope by this time you have all got copies of the resolution, and I want to say a few words in seconding it. Originally, I thought that I would be allowed only to second it and reserve my speech. The President thinks that I cannot do it, but that I must give my reasons for seconding this proposition and that I shall be allowed an opportunity to speak to the amendments after they are moved. So, in obedience to the ruling which he has given, I want to say a few words as to the merits of the resolution now before you.

Ladies and Gentlemen, this is a very important resolution, for this We have been demanding self-government for India and a scheme reason. was framed by the Congress which incorporated the minimum that we wanted. Our demand was two-fold; the minimum demand is the first step coupled with a request that full self-government should be granted to India within fifteen years. That is what we resolved in Delhi, that is what we resolved in Bombay; of course the Delhi resolution went a little further, but that is what we resolved partly at least at Calcutta and Lucknow. Now after the Reforms Act the time has come when we should review what we demanded, how much of it has been granted and whether we should revise the resolutions previously passed so as to place before the public what we now exactly want, and that is done in this resolution. You know that at Delhi we passed a resolution like this that this Congress declares that the people of India are fit for responsible Government, and repudiates the assumption to the contrary contained in the Report on Indian Constitutional Reforms. That was the resolution that we passed, and this was in connection with the Montagu-Chelmsford reform. We have always repudiated the assumption that we are not fit for self-government just now. The Congress has repeatedly declared that we are fit for full responsible self-government now. That was contradicted in the Montagu Chelmsford Report. But we passed a resolution at Delhi that we are fit even now, at the present moment, we are fit for full responsible self-government. (Hear, Hear). Now "that again has been denied un Mr. Montagu's speech in Parliament. What he said is that this Act has been introduced to educate us, to prepare us for full responsible self-government, evidently meaning thereby that we are not fit for it now. So a repetition of that assertion makes it necessary, for us to-day, to reiterate our declaration at Delhi, and that is what is done in the first, part of this resolution, viz, "that this Corgress reiterates its declaration of last year that India is fit for full relponsible Government and repudiates all assumptions and assertions to the contrary wherever made." That is the first. It is only a reiteration, a reaffirmation of the resolution passed at Delhi. Nothing more. It is not a new subject introduced to you this year. The only necessity for reiterating it is to condradict the assumptions and assertions that have been repeated by our opponents and therefore we reiterate them. I have only to give reasons no tin support of the contents of that paragraph but only for the purpose of reiterating it, and our reason for it is that these contrary assumptions being repeated, we repeat our assertion. There is nothing more to be said on that point. I do not think there is any difference of opinion as regards its contents, but it is necessary to reiterate, otherwise it will be assumed that we have quietly swallowed the assertions of the contrary assumptions. That is my reason for the first.

Then the second paragraph is 'that this Congress adheres to the resolutions passed at the Delhi Congress regarding Constitutional Reforms and is of opinion that the Reforms Act is "inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing." Now these three words inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing' are taken from the old resolution. There is not one word new in it. Disappointing' is an old word; 'unsatisfactory' is an old word. and 'inadequate' is an old word already used in previous resolutions. They are not to be discussed now, but one reason I want to give you is this for repeating it here. We said that the Reform Scheme as given in Mr. Montagu's Report was disappointing. We said that in Bombay and at Delhi. But now what has occurred? The Act which is passed is in certain respects an advance on that scheme, but it does not come up to what we proposed. So this description 'inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing' still remains. It is again an old assertion, not a new one. Some people would like to take away the word 'disappointing', but if we have used it already twice, I see no reason, in fact, nothing has occured in the interim to justify us in taking out that word. So the description is correct. The Act is disappointing. What does that word 'disappointing' mean? . It means that it falls short of our expectations, and it does fall short of the minimum that we wanted and the description is an accurate one, and we still adhere to the resolution passed at Delhi about the minimum that we wanted. This is merely a recapitulation of the previous resolution. Nothing more than that. So the second paragraph is "that this Congress adheres to the resolutions passed at the Delhi Congress regarding Constitutional Reforms and is of opinion that the Reforms Act is "inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing." I do not think you require any further explanation on that point, because we have again merely a repetition of what we said in previous years.

We come now to the the third paragraph. That is a question about what you are going to do. Are you going to accept the Reform Scheme as a solution of the question either as final or for some years to come. The third part of the resolution relates to it. You have declared that the Act is disappointing; what are you going to do? There are two proposals in the field accept it and co-operate, and with the co-operation of the authorities, work it on for ten years and then after ten years the operation of the Act will be reviewed and some other steps may be taken after ten years. That is what the Act says. Now, we do not accept it. The third part of the resolution says that we desire Parliament to take, the earliest opportunity of granting full self-government to India. We are not satisfied with it, we do not want to wait for ten years. We want to continue our agitation for the full responsible Government of India and shall not be satisfied with the few crumbs thrown to us in order to satisfy our hunger for the time being. Our hnnger is not satisfied. We are going to work and not be content with the single morsel which has been given to us. The proposal is, rather I may say, the object is that something has been given to you, you go on working to demonstrate your capacity, and when you have demonstrated your capacity to the satisfaction of the bureaucracy, then you can claim something more. We do not want the bureaucracy to be judge

in this affair. Our capacity we know. We say we are capaple, we are fit, to have full responsible Governmert just now. (Hear, Hear) And if we are fis just now, why should we wait for ten years? (Hear, Hear). We will work the Act, we are going to work the Act, for the purpose of securing full respons ble Government. (Hear, Hear) No doubt about it that anything it. No doubt we shall utilise that will help us in our egitation about i'; no difference of opinion about i'; but to talk of this Act, this meagre measure, as satisfying our hunger, and as giving us work for ten years is also idle talk. My objection to this is that something has been thrown to us, some small bone, and what the Government expects us to do is that we shall spend ten years more in just a little satisfaction or more satisfaction but we shall spend the next ten years in licking that lit le piece of bone that has been, thrown to us. We shall not do it, not that we do not want to use it but, we refuse to be contended for ten years more, with what has been given to us, and, if you really accept that with fulsome praise, what would the world think of you? You know that the present Act is not the result of your agitation. It is a mistake to suppose that it has come to us as a result of our agitation. Mr. Montagu himself has said that plainly, not I alope; it is the result of world circumstances (Hear, Hear). There was the war, the other nations were asked to come and help the Allies, specially America, and the United States, and then it was quite necessary to show to the world that the British were prepared to treat their subject nations with some liberality and generosity. (Hear, Hear). That was the origin and the causes of that proclamation of the 10th August 1917. It was a camouflage and they had to act, up to it, and they have carried out that resolution in a half hearted way now, that the war has come to an end. You must not, therefore, look to what is going on in this country alone, but you must see what the world, opinion is. If you persist in saying that you are not satisfied, with the Act, I daresay in the. next five years circumstances will arise which will compel the British. Parliament to grant you full responsible Government, (Hear, Hear, and loud applause). That is the point. We do not say we are satisfied. We do not say you have given us a good, deal, and, that we shall go on working and proving our capacity, we do not want anything of the kind. We are not satisfied. We are disappointed. We claim full responsible Government and we shall use this Act for that purpose. That is our position. Now you may be told this is a very good Act. You are not able to walk. This Act will be utilised, or you ought to utilize it, for enabling you to walk on the road. We deny that assertion. We say we are able to walk. We do not merely want an opportunity to demonstrate our capacity. We shall use it, but we shall never be satisfied. That is the position, and that position is enunciated in this resolution that this Corgress further urges that Parliament should take early steps to establish full responsible, Government in India in accordance with the principle of self-determiation.

Now let me say a few words about self-determination. Not only do we want full responsible Government, but we want it in accordance with the principle of self-determination; that means the determination of the people of India as voiced by the resolutions of the Gongress passed by a majority (in this Congress. That is what I understand self-determination to mean otherwise self-determination would mean anything that we don't want. You' know i when the deputations went to England everybody claimed to be a

121

representative of India. The Moderates deputation claimed that they were the wisest of all and as the wise men of Irdia they went there to advise the British public as to what should be done and what should not be done in in connection with the reforms. I had an opportunity and I repudiated all that. I said wisdom in this twentieth century means capacity to connince the majority of your countrymen (Hear, Hear). Wisdom has no absolute meaning in politics; we are not comparing intelligences by some fictitious standard and say that this man is wiser than the other. One who carries the majority of his countrymen with him is a wise democrat. This is my definition of wisdom; and so self-determination does not mean the determination of a wise man only but a determination of the majority of the people of the country. So this word must occur there. The principle of self-determination is now acknowledged by all in western countries. When they wanted to settle the fate of the Poles, the Jugo Slavs and other European subordinate nationalities, they wanted to apply to them all this principle. Take a plebescite if you have not an organization, a representative organization like the Congress and the Moslem League, the only other way of determining will be to take a plebescite. But I found actually in England that this principle was to a certain extent at least questioned by some of the deputation that went over there, not the congress deputation but the other deputations. So it is quite necessary (The speaker at this time was facing the people on the platform, and he was apparently inaudible to the majority of the people in the pandal. Accordingly voices this side please, this side please were heard).

Lok. Tilak: What is it, Sir?

Voices again: This side please, this side please.

Lok. Tilak: I am sorry I have not got four mouths. I cannot speak to all of you at one and the same time. I am not a Brahmá, much less a Trimurthi.

Now coming to the subject, what we want to assert in this is not new. There is a resolution regarding self-determination passed at Delhi and in Bombay. We want full responsible Government in accordance with the principle of self-determination, and may I tell you that at a mass meeting held in London of the British citizens a resolution was passed that the earliest opportunity should be taken by Parliament to grant to India self-government on the principle of self-determination. I shall read to you the resolution, "that this mass meeting of British citizens holding that the existence of the British Commonwealth is dependent upon a right of self-government being -conferred on such of the Nations within its boundary, hereby declares that the Indian people are entitled to receive at the earliest opportunity full right to self-determination" (Hear, Hear), This resolution was passed unanimously at the mass meeting of British, citizens held in the great Albert Hall, London. I believe it was passed on the 26th of October last., It is not very old. Now the British people are determined and resolved to grant you self-government at the earliest opportunity in accordance with the principle of self-determintion and I may tell you that this resolution was moved by my friend Mr.\* Jamnadas and seconded or supported by Mrs. Besant, and by myself and it was unanimously passed. (Hear, Hear). We are all agreed on this point that parliament should take the earliest opportunity to grant us full responsible Government in accordance with the principle of self-determination. That is,

the decision the British people have come to in this matter. That is what we want here, and that is what is embodied in the third para of this resolution, viz. what this Congress further urges that Parliament should take early steps to establish full responsible Government in India in accordance with the principle of self-determination. That is what the British people have ratified at the mass meeting at our request. And this is now embodied in the third paragraph of the resolution before you.

Now there are one or two questions. What are you going to do with the Act? The answer is yes. we are going to use it; we are not satisfied with it but we are going to use it. But are you going to use it with a fulsome praise of what is given. The point is this that there is no difference of opinion as regards using it. Are you going to thank with an Arati in your hand? Are you doing to say "we are prepared to co-operate, we are prepared to aid; we are prepared to be satisfied for ten years more, or merely use it. But what does Mr. Montagu want us? He wants us to use it. The whole question is whether we want to use it or not; and we have deliberately omitted that part in this resolution, because it goes without saying that every statute of Parliament will be obeyed in this country (Hear, Hear). It is not necessary to say that we shall utilise it. It means this. Will you obey the Parliament? Will you obey the sovereign authority in the land? Do you want an affirmative answer to that question? It goes without saying that if you are loyal subjects of the British Nation, every Act that is passed by Parliament is binding upon us and we are prepared to carry out its provisions loyally; but we must always be demanding more. That does not conflict with our loyalty but when you come and say "Oh yes, we are prepared to obey Parliament" it means that sometimes you are prepared to disobey the Parliament (Laughter). We go to Parliament; we ask for a legislation; we get it and we shall make it the basis of further agitation. That is our attitude. We get a bit of what we want; we shall make use of it and always go on agitating for more. That is our duty.

Now the second part of it is whether we should thank Mr. Montagu. I have no objection to thank anybody. If you wish, those amendments will be moved before you, but I am not very particular about thanking. We are in the habit of thanking for every little thing. A man gives you a slap in the face, and you say 'Oh, thank you' (laughter), and you express your satisfaction without showing any mark on your cheek. I do not want to do anything of the kind. However, it is left to you. The an endments will be moved, and it will be for you to decide which of the amendments is in strict consonance with the principles I have enunciated. I am quite prepared to take your verdict on that. There is no quarrel, but the principles enunciated in these resolutions are the most important of all (A voice:---'certainly'). We want now clearly to declare not only here, but to the whole world, that we are not satisfied with the Act. We want to continue our agitation; we want to utilise it to the best possible advantage and continue to demand more. We want to ask the rest of the world to know that this is the exact state of our feeling. Any exaggeration in the matter is likely to mislead the civilized nations of the world (Hear, Hear). Take care of that. Don't be too generous, too kind, too humane, to accept with a fulsome dose of thanks what little has been thrown to you now. That is the

object. This has been left in tact in these three paragraphs, but if you want, I say, as a seconder, we shall be prepared to accept any reasonable amendment on those two points, but none on the first three. That is our position. As I said, the President has been kind enough to give me an opportunity to speak on these amendments, and so I don't want to say anything more just now, and I commend the resolution to your acceptance. (Loud Applause).

Mahatma Gandhi then rose amidst loud and prolonged cheers and came up to the rostrum to move his amendment. Owing to his weak health he was provided with a chair near the rostrum and with the permission of the audience he addressed them sitting. As soon as Mahatma Gandhi took his seat near the rostrum, a few from the audience sitting on the eastern wing said:—'We can't see you, Sir.'

Mahatma Gandhi:—Can't see me? I am sorry.

# Speech of Mahatma Gandhi.

In moving his amendment Mahatma Gandhi first spoke in Hindi and warned the audience not to vote blindly for this or that amendment, because it was moved by this or that man, but think independently and vote only in consonance with the dictates of their conscience. Almost the whole of Mahatma Gandhi's speech was then reproduced in English by himself, and need not be summarised here.

After concluding his address in Hindi, Mahatma Gandhi spoke in English as follows:—

#### My dear triends,

I have done with Hindi, and by the indulgence of the President of this Congress who has laboured for us throughout all these anxious days in the midst of the greatest difficulties of which you can have no conception, I shall occupy a little more of your time and make a final appeal to those friends who have not been able to follow me in this matter. You have heard those who spoke in English. I do not need to read my amendment to them, You have seen the amendment that stands in my name. I want to give you the fullest assurance that nothing could have pleased me more than not to have appeared before you in order to divide this House, but when I found that duty demanded of me that I should say a word, even against revered countrymen of mine, even against those who have sacrificed themselves for the sake of the country, when I found that they did not make sufficient appeal to my head or to my heart, and when I felt that an acceptance of the position that underlay their proposition would mean something not good for the country, I felt I at least should have my own say and make my own position clear to the country. Throughout my life I have understood the principle of compromise; I have understood the spirit of democracy. I yield to no one in my both these things, but throughout my life I have also found that thire come

regard for occasions in a man's life who wants to regulate his life according to the voice of his own conscience, according to the innutable laws of God as he understands them; I s y there come occasions in the life of such a man when he must grasp and embrace, as he would embrace a brother parting with his dearest friends, and that time stared me in the face two days ago. It is not a matter of removing a word here and a word there. If I could have managed to have the word 'disappointing', believe me, I would not have arisen before this audience, wasted your time and my Nation's valuable time in higgling over a word, I say to you it is not right to have the word 'disappointing'. You saw an amendment in my name yesterday which I have withdrawn. It expressed my opinion in more graceful language: I do not claim any better knowledge of English on that account, but I had pinned my heart on it, and that is my estimation of my own phraseology. I contend that that amendment expresses the same thing in more graceful language, but I say to myself, and I said to myself yesterday "never mind the grace, if you can get the substance in another language, you shall take it." I have therefore, taken those three paragraphs in the resolution in their entirety with the exception of the adjective 'disappointing', because that also entirely represents my feeling, I do believe with Tilak Maharaj, Mr. Das and all the other friends that we are fit for responsible Government fully to-day (Hear, Hear). I do believe that what we are getting falls far short of the Congress ideal (Hear, Hear). I do believe that at the earliest possible moment we should have responsible Government. I am in accord with them. What then? All that is gone. But how are we to build our future? That is a question to which they addressed themselves and I addressed myself, and their conclusion was, let the country go as it will. We shall not give the lead to the country from this platfor n. What was the meaning of it? The meaning as I gave to it was, our policy must be obstructive, 'co-operation', yes, but in the mind, it shall not be in the air. If there is to be co-opertion under definite conditions, then I say let us lay down those conditions. But let us make our point perfectly clear. Their position again was, why should we thank a servant of ours? After all, who is Mr. Montagu? He is our servant. If he has done a little bit of his duty, why do you want to thank him. It is an attitude you may sympathise with sometimes, but I say to this great audience that that is not an attitude which i- worthy of yourselves. If in the heart of your hearts you can say that Mr. Montagu throughout his career as Secretary of State for India, has done one thing. namely, he has overborne the opposition led by Lord Sydenham against this Bill and he has resisted all ercroachments upon the liberal provisions, lew enough I admit, but liberal provisions of that Bill, then I say to that extent and that extent only, Mr. Montagu deserves our whole-hearted thanks. (Hear, Hear and Cheers) That is all that my amendment means.

My amendment also means that we may not say these reforms are disappointing in the sense in which that word is used there. I suggest to you that if a man comes to me and disappoints me, I do not co-operate with him. It I get a sour loaf I reject it; I don't take it. But if I get a loaf which is not enough or which does not contain sufficient condiments in it, I shall see to it that I get condiments to it at a later stage, but I take a bite; then it is not disappointing. Therefore my amendment means nothing more and nothing less then that. We should stare the situation in the face as it exists before the country to-day, and if, as I say, Tilak Maharaj tells you that we are going to make use of the Reform Act, as he must, and as he has already told Mr. Montagu, as he has teld the country, that we are going to take the fullest advantage of the reforms, then I say be true to yourselves, be true to the country and tell the country you are going to do it. But if you want to say, after having gone there, you shall put any obstruction, say But on the question of the propriety of obstruction, I say, that the that also. Indian culture demands that we shall trust the man who extends the hand of fellowship. The King-Emperor has extended the hand of fellowship. (Hear, Hear). I suggest to you that Mr. Montagu has extended the hand of fellowship, and if he has extended the hand of fellowship do not reject his advance. Indian culture demands trust, and full trust, and if we are sufficiently manly, we shall not be afraid of the future, but face the future in a manly manner and say 'Allright, Mr. Montagu, allright, all officials of 'the bureaucracy, we are going to trust you; we shall put you in a corner, and when you resist us, when you resist the advance of the country, you shall do so at your peril.' That is the manly attitude that I I suggest to you. I therefore say you are bound that, if in the heart of your hearts you consider that these reforms enable you to advance further to your goal, if you believe that these reforms can be used as a stepping-stone to the full Responsible Government, then I say, give Mr. Montagu his due and tell him 'we thank you.' But if you say to Mr. Montagu 'we thank you,' the. corollary to that is that we shall co-operate with him. If you say to Mr. Montagu 'we do not thank you, we know what your reforms are, we know your intentions, we shall frustrate those intentions by obstructing you at every stage'; if that is your position, make it clear before the world and work for it. I shall challenge that position, and I shall go across from one end of India to the other and say we shall fail in our culture, we shall fall from our position if we do not, do our duty that that culture demands, if we do not respond to the hand that has been extended to us. I decline to distrust him, and I say we shall co-operate in so far as the country's good is advanced. We shall obstruct you, we shall fail you, we shall defeat your purpose, if your purpose is in any shape or form to diminish the glory of India. That is the amendment that I have come to place before you. I again appeal to Tilak Maharaj, and I appeal to Mr. Das and to every one of you, not on the strength of my service-it counts for nothing, not on the strength of my experience-but on the strength of inexorable logic. If you accept your own civilization, I ask the author of the commentaries on Bhagvat Gita, if he accepts the teachings of Bhagvat Gita,-then let him extend the hand of fellowship to Mr. Montagu (Hear, Hear and Applause.)

# Speech of The Hon ble Pundit Gokarn Nath.

At this stage Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra rose and said:---

Ladies and Gentlemen:—In the agenda which is before you there is a mistake so far as the amendment moved by Mahatina Gandhi is concerned. The amendment of which he had given us notice and which I sent to the press contained two clauses. Clause 1 was for omitting the word 'disappointing' in clause (b) of Mr. Das's resolution, and adding a second clause which you find printed here. The press have made a mistake, and they have not printed the first part of the amend nent. Therefore I bring this matter to your notice so that any misapprehension in the minds of those present here might be removed. I have sent for the original amendment to show it to the President. The whole amendment as sent by Mahatma Gandhi is as follows: --

In clause (b) of Resolution No. XIV which stands in the name of my friend Mr. Das......

(The President here asked Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra to read the whole resolution).

Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra:—I am asked, Ladies and Gentlemen, by the President to read before you the whole of the resolution as it stands with Mahatma Gandhi's amendment, It reads as follows:—

- (a) That this Congress reiterates its declaration of last year that India is fit for full responsible Government and repudiates all essumptions and assertions to the contrary wherever made.
- (b) 'That this Congress adheres to the resolutions passed at the Delhi Congress regarding Constitutional Reforms and is of opinion that the Reforms Acts is inadequate and unsatisfactory.
- (c) That this Congress further urges that Parliament should take early steps to establish full Responsible Government in India. in accordance with the principles of self-determination.

To this add clause (d) which is as follows:-

(d) Pending such introduction, this Congress begs loyally to respond to the sentiments expressed in the Royal Proclamation, namely, "Let the new era begin with a common determination among my people and my officers to work together for a common purpose, and trust that both the authorities and the people will co-operate so to work the reforms as to secure the early establishment of full Responsible Government," and this Congress offers its warmest thanks to the Right Hon. E. S. Montagu for his labours in connection with them.

This is how the resolution would stand after the amendment proposed by Mahatma Gandhiji.

# Speech of Mr. Mahomed All Jinnah.

Mr. Mahomed Ali Jinnah (Bombay) in supporting the amendment moved by Mahatma Gandhi said:---

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, I can tell you that it is a matter of great regret that I have to stand before you to-day, and support this amendment and divide this House. It is, as you will see, very painful, that we should find men of the position like that of Lok. Tilak and Mr. Das taking one view and Mahatma Gandhi and Pundit Malaviya taking another view. I want you, therefore, to realise the gravity of the situation, and the responsibility is upon you for whatever verdict you may declare to-day here.

Sir, this question is one of vital importance, and it is demonstrated by the mere fact that eminent leaders of ours are taking different views. Now let us consider what is the issue before us. We have no objection whatsoever to this Congress declaring that we are fit for responsible Government (Hear, There is no dispute about it. Lok. Tilak was at great pains to impress upon you that you should declare 'it and he is right. Let me tell you there is no dispute on that proposition at all. Now dismiss that from your minds. We are all agreed on it. Also there is no dispute that we want responsible Government to be established in Irdia at an early date. There is no dispute on that part of the proposition either. Dismiss that also from your minds. The portion with regard to which there is a serious dispute is the portion' which I will read to you. "That this Congress adheres to the resolutions passed at the Delhi Congress regarding Constitutional Reforms."-I have no objection to it;--- "and is of opinion that the Reform Act is inadequate, unsatisfactory and dis 1 pointing.' Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, if we stop here simply saying that the Reform Act is inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing, what is your opinion with regard to the working of this Act? Are you going simply to pass a resolution expressing your dissatisfaction that it is inadequate, that it is disappinting and say nothing more. We have got the Act. The Act has been passed, and the King Emperor by His Proclamation has appealed both to his officials and the people of this country to work this Act so that the goal, which is now the common goal laid down by his Proclamation and laid down by us in our resolution, viz. the attainment of complete responsible Government should be accomplished as soon as possible. His Proclamation says that you must work together. What is your answer? Mr. Das in his resolution gives no answer. I had not the pleasure of hearing this speech because I was late, but I believe that I can take Lok. Tilak as good a representative of that party as you can possibly have. What does Lok. Tilak say? He himself-I speak with the utmost deference for Lok. Tilak; I hope that I shall not be misunderstood in any way (A Voice:--- 'Thank you, sir') he himself sent a telegram on his way from Bombay to Amritsar and what was that telegram.

He conveyed on behalf of himself, his Home Rule League and the people of India to the Viceroy and the Secretary of State responsive co-operation with the authorities ..... (A Voice:- "Mark the words"):- Another Voice:- ", No more co-operation with the bureaucracy"). Yes, I have marked the words. I think I understand English a little. Lok. Tilak says that it is true., Some advocate of his here says "Mark the words." Well, mark the words, ladies and gentlemen. Now Lok. Tilak comes on this platform and has told you that we want to use this Act, make the fullest use of it, we will get into the Legislative Courcils, we will accept the Ministerships, in fact we shall make the fullest possible use of it, says he. But may I know in the name of Heaven, may I know in the name of every thirg that is -acred, why does not the Congress say so in its resolution and give a true lead to thousands who are outside waiting to know your opinion? (Hear, Hear). Why not, if you mean that, if that is your honest opinion, why should you deprive your countrymen outside who have locked upon the Indian National Congress as the final word of your best intellect in the country, why not give them the advantage of your opinion? Sir, on the other hand, I have no hesitation in saying on this platform that there is a school in this country whose intention is to obstruct and not to work the reforms. (Cries of 'No, No'). I make bold to say that. (Cries of 'Oh, No'). Very well, I am very pleased indeed, that the opinion of this

Hear).

House at least is that you want to co-operate. (Cries of Yes, yes). Very well, I am delighted. I am very pleased that you, want to co-operate. Sir, I do not wish to take up your time unnecessarily. I do not wish to go into the details of this Reforms Act, but I can tell you one thing, and it is this. I have to the best of my abilities tried to study the Reform Act, and I have no hesitation in saying this, that if we take the opportunities, if we take the advantages which are placed in our hands by this Act, I have every hope that notwithstanding the statutory period fixed for the ten years enquiry, we shall have that enquiry earlier. (Hear, Hear). (Another voice:--'Doubtful'). Ladies and Gentlemen, once your electorates, which mean five million voters, are formed, once your electerates have sent their representatives, into the various councils, once our countrymen have taken up the ministerships, and if that Act which places, as I say, such opportunities and advantages in our way is worked properly, then L say it will be impossible to resist the enquiry being held earlier. Therefore, I beg of you, I press upon you, with all the energy, with all the earnestness that I can command, to give your verdict from this platform that you mean to cc-operate. (n) -

Now let us see what is Mahatma' 'Gandhi's - amendment? What objection can you take to it. If you will follow the amendment of Mahatma Gandhi you will see that it says "pending such introduction" what introduction? "Pending the introduction of full Responsible Government" which we say should be established at the earliest possible date; 'pending such intro tction, this Congress begs loyally to respond to the sentiments expressed in the Royal Preclamation, namely "let the new era' begin with a common determination among my people and my officers to work together for a common purpose"... What is the common purpose ? the establishment of full Responsible Government at an early date. (A, voice:---,"No early date"). Read the proclamation. Your definition of early date may be six months. Their, definition may be ten years. (A voice;--"It may be a hundred years"). But mark the words, it is for that purpose I am not stating the period now. Then, the amendment of Mahatma Gandhi wants the Indian National Congress to express its opinion so for as the people of this country are concerned, and what is that? "and trusts that both the authorities and the people will co-operate so to work the reforms," Mark the words please, "so to work the reforms"-as to do what? as to secure the full Responsible. Government being established.-I ask'you this question, do you object to work the Reforms so as to make the -establishment of full Responsible Government as early as possible? (Cries of 'No, No'). Then why not say so ? 10 Lesay when a man hesitates or shirks to express his, opinion, there must be something at the back of it., (Cries of 'Nothing behind', 'No, No'). Then why not say so honestly? (A voice:-Diplomacy). There is no diplomacy. There is shirking (Cries of 'No, No'). -(At this stage there was interruption and confusion from all sides for a féw seconds).

Continuing the speaker said:—I want you to consider the question carefully. What can be the object of merely saying that the Act is inadequate. only dispute is whether it should form part of the resolution or not. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have nothing more to say on that point, and I leave it to your judgment, to your good sense. Whether I am right or whether I am wrong (A Voice:—You are wrong). Well, all I can say is that it is the vote of this House that has to decide it. I have placed before you what I consider to be the right course to adopt, and I am entirely in the same position as Mahatma Gandhi. Either I am unable to make myself understood or I am wrong, one or the other.

Now with regard to the other part, regarding the question of giving 1. 14 thanks to Mr. Montagu, Ladies and Gentlemen, you know perfectly well that I have not been unnecessarily guilty of expressing my thanks to officials or to the Government. (Hear, Hear) I entirely agree with those who hold that the thanks of the Indian National Congress are not to be given away cheaply, (Hear, Hear). I entirely agree with it, and I say that when this Assembly, when the Indian National Congress, expresses its thanks to a person, it should be a matter of the greatest honour to that person-I do not care how high he is (Hear, Hear and a voice:-"Certainly")., But we have to consider whether the person to whom you are asked to thank deserves your thanks or not, and that is the only question and the sole test before you. Lok. Tilak says, you-may-thank him. No, that is not the (Hear, Hear) question, not that you may thank him, but does he deserve your thanks? I am no friend of Mr. Montagu. I characterised his proposals before, the Joint Committee as proposals based on timidity and prejudice (Hear, Hear). Some of you are aware that I had actually a touch fight with Mr. Montagu and Mr. Montagu characterised me in the Joint Committee by putting the question. "It is not a fact that you never agree with the Government" (Hear, Hear). Therefore, I am no friend of Mr. Montagu. But, Sir, I believe in one principle, and that is, whether a man is my friend or my opponent, when he has done something for which he deserves thanks, I am willing to raise my hat to him (Hear, Hear). Let this Indian National Congress rise to that height and express its thanks for what he has done. Do not be carried away by saying that because he is the Secretary of State why should the Congress thank him; we do not want-to thank the officials at all; do not be carried away by that. I say I have no doubt in my mind that Mr. Montagu has laboured in a manner, which I tell you from my own personal knowledge, no other Englishman has laboured for the reforms for India. (Hear, Hear) Believe me, I know it not from him, but from independent sources, that Mr. Montagu had the greatest difficulty ſ put in his way from every direction, and I tell you it would have been impossible for any other man in England to-day to go as for as Mr. Montagu Now are you or are you not going to thank Mr. Montagu? has gone. Mind you, for what? Not universal thanks, not general thanks, but simply confine to one specific matter, viz. the Reforms. We do not say that Mr. Montague has said or done everything that we liked. Mr. Montagu is still on his judgment, and he has still to go through that test and get the judgment in his favcur with regard to the Punjab situation. (Hear, Hear). I hope and trust that Mr. Montagu—may God give him strength, may God give him the right sense of justice,-I hope and trust that Mr. Montagu will rise like the greatest Englishman that has ever lived and see that the wrongs of the Punjab are avenged to the fullest. (Hear, Hear) A voice:-Then you can thank him). We are not thanking him for that now. We

are not thanking him for anything else. We are simply confining ourselves to one particular point about which we have got sufficient evience. Ladies and Gentlemen, you may ask any member of the various deputations or the Congress deputation, nobody will deny that Mr. Montagu has done his test. Even those who are not quite as ready as I am to give him thanks, even those people say that it is perfectly true that Mr. Montagu overcame a tremendous opposition in England and he defeated it. That is true. They also say that he defeated the despatch of the Government of India of the 5th March, and you know that despatch. It was, as I say, a most reactionery despatch and which you know has been thrown into the waste paper, basket by the Joint Goumittee. So even those who are not as ready as I am, admit the negative Work that Mr. Montagu has done.

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, I do not wish to take up your time. It is now for you to decide whether we are doing very wrong under these circumstances to express our thanks to Mr. Montagu for what he has dore in connection with the reforms only. I pray, Sir, that on this occasion this House will come to the right verdict, because, remember, your lead is the lead which the country must follow and is anxiously awaiting. (Hear, Hear and Loud Applause).

### Speech of Mrs. Annle Besant.

Mrs. Annie Besant (Madras) who, on rising received a grand and enthusiastic reception, moved the following amendment to Mr. Das's-Resolution:—

In moving the amendment Mrs. Besant said:---

Brother Delegates. I come before you this morning to place another amendment, taking up the position, held by many people in this country, whether or not they are largely represented here, the position spoken of and alluded to by Lok. Tilak as that of the opposition party. I understand he said that that party was willing to work on for ten years, leaving things as they are to day. I desire to state to you that, so far as I and many others are concerned, we do not trouble our heads about the so-called ten years' limit. We were told in the Joint Committee that there was nothing in the Bill to prevent further subjects being transferred to Indian Ministers, as it was thought well to transfer them, and Mr. Montagu stated that India's path to full self-Government is merely a matter of time, entirely dependent on Indians themselves. That is the position that I take up, I do not want any limit of time now to be put into an Act 'of parliament., I wanted that some years ago, but not to-day, because the world is changing, the great tide of democracy is sweeping over it, and I do not believe it possible that India shall fail to attain self-Government more quickly than most of you perchance may dream, if India only is true to herself and utilises the powers put into her hands by the present Reform Act.

New I ask your permission to speak to you with perfect frankness as a friend to a friend. I agree with Mr. Jinnah that a definite lead should have been given by this Congress to guide the country along a practical path. It seems to me that the time has gone by for resolutions vaguely stating that early steps should be taken to establish full Responsible Government. The time for this was when we were all at one following the great ideal accepted by us all. , This Act does not fulfil our ideal. 'That is true.' But it makes it possible of attainment by bringing it down from the realms of tas ideal to one of the great political questions of the day. Self-government or Home Rule is the goal towards which we move, and we require to know the shortest road, which will lead us to realise that ideal completely. Now it seems to me that we are face to face to-day with a problem more vital than has ever confronted this country before, and the steps we take will go far towards solving the problem to the common good of India and Great Britain or for serious injury to both. There are only two ways of transferring power from the hands of an Autocrat to the hands of a Democrat, and those two ways are, on the one side Reforms, and on the other side revolution. Four great European autocracies as I said some time ago, existed before the war-all great European autocracies-Russia, Germany, Australia in Europe and the autocracy of Great Britain in India. Three of these have fallen by violent revolution marked by the frantic excesses of the nations that, accustomed to tyranny, were not able to utilise their new-born freedom. To repeat that lesson in India none of us desire; but if you will not have 'violent revolution, you must have gradual reform. There is no other way, large reforms, swiftly succeeding reforms, but not the whole of it at once. Never before in the whole world's long history has an autocrat decended from the throne to bestow the beginning of liberty on the nation over which  $le h \in ld$  autocratics way. When England won her liberty, the first steps of it were marked by the execution of one king and the exile of his successor. Revolutions of violence marked the passage of the power from the automat to a very limited number of people. But now willingly and lovingly our autocrat sends us a Proclamation saysing to his people there is the gateway for you to constitutional Government and to freedom; not by violence, not by revolution; but by the request of the ruler to his officials and to his Indian people to co-operat-, thus meaning to destroy autocracy in India and to begin constitutional You say that this Act is inadequate. Indequate in what sense? liberty. These words are vague. When all night long in darkness and in anxiety you have watched the coming of light, do you, when the first rosy clouds proclaim the coming of the dawn and the first rays of the sun rise above the horizon, do you call out the dawn is inadequate because it has not the force, it has not the splendour of the Noonday Sun? Do you expect the sun to leap from the horizon to the zenith at a single bound? Do you expect to pass power from autorcacy to democracy without a single intervening step, in order to have transition and not struggle with the classes opposed to each other and Nation at grip with nation for the first time, and rightly for the first time in India? India can win her freedom, her ŧ

equal partnership in the Empire, by the happy road of peace. If that can be won, surely is it worth your while to say that it is inadequate? But do you realise that it was this Act or nothing that you were Would ycu prefer to have remained under the going to have? Autocracy unfettered rather than take this great instalment of liberty That is the question that I put to you. That which is your right? is the question I ask you to answer in a way different from this resolution. lagree with the first clause that India is fit for full Responsible Government. I have quoted it time after time, I have inserted it in article after article, on platform after platform before it became the popular cry of the great party in this country. (Hear, Hear). I agree that early steps should be taken to establish full Responsible Government in India according to the principle of self-determination. They quoted the Bombay and Delhi resolutions. Those who talk of it omit the condition that we should have representative institutions accepted as the voice of India. That is made precedent of all self-Govern-First have somebody that represents ing Self Determination in Europe. the people and is accepted by all. That is a precedent for the self-Determination of a Nation, and that does not yet exist. We shall have it when these reforms are carried out, but that is the first and necessary step. You will say that the electorate is small, five million against a few hundred thousands now. Now a small electorate is an advantage, compared to your thronging millions of people, but it is a huge step when regarded in comparison with the numbers that exist now. Every graduate of seven years' standing is to have a vote. Is that unsatisfactory? I am going to trouble you with a few details, because unless you know what the Act gives you,-am I wrong in thinking that many of you have not seen it?-how are you going to record your vote? How can you decide to brand the Act with these epithets, unless you have studied those provisions and so are in a position to judge? I do not regret the divisions amongst us, if they are healthy. When you put your ideal into practice, there must arise divisions, and why should I shrink from saying that I do not agree with some of the leaders here? I do not regret the divisions. I am glad of them, because if we are all to be parrots calling out the catchwords of a few individuals, where is the free Indian Nation? (Hear, Hear). Hence now that we have come into what is really parliamentary work, you must understand the difficulties, you must take the conditions into consideration, disagree with each other, argue with each other, but do not, if you can help it, shout each other down. But you are willing to listen to me, showing that you are willing to hear both sides. (Hear, Hear). But I believe that I represent here a very small minority. I don't mind it. (Hear, Hear). I have been in small minorities many a time in my life and come out at the top at the end. (Cheers). Now I shall tell you very briefly, if you are patient enough, what we have gained. First, what have we gained as regard the provinces? We have gained nearly everything we have asked for. (Cries of 'No, No'). I believe I know this thing almost by heart, because first I read the original report, then I read the draft Bill and I attended all the sittings of the Joint Committee and I know what the Act confers. Now there are two or three words of mine which my opponents are fond of quoting, I will answer why. I thought that the Montagu-Chelmsford Report was unworthy of England to give and of India to accept. But why do I ask you now to accept the

Act. Because this Act is not the Montagu-Chelmsford Report. (Hear, Hear). I cannot stand saying to you over and over again the same thing when the circumstances are changed. In the first article [ gave a list of the amendments that would make the Bill a substantial step. That is always ignorned. Those amendments have been largely incorporated here, and I say that this Bill is worthy of England to give and of India to receive. (Hear, Hear and Cries of 'No, No'). I do not mind anybody calling 'No, No'. When one party can call Hear, Hear' the other party has a right to say 'No, No'. (Laughter), and it helps me because it shows where my argument has gone wrong. Now my amendment is as follows:—

> "That this Congress welcomes the Reforms Act as opening the gateway of freedom to the Indian Nation and as giving her power to walk on her own feet along the road to Responsible Government, thus forming the first substantial stage of that road, and it earnestly begs the people to take the utmost advantage of its provisions so as to reach the goal in the shortest possible time. It places also on record its gratitude to Mr. Montagu and Lord Sinha for their strenuous work against the greatest difficulties both in India and Great Britain."

I have called it the gateway to Freedom so that you can walk along the road to it. Do you think me so very perverse as to suppose that it did any more? As I said to the Joint Committee, and was blamed for saying, I don't want a complete cut and dried scheme of the West imposed on the people of India. I believe it is better to give you the power and leave you to shape the details of your constitution in your own way. You have got a past behind you. You are not a new Nation like the South African Union. You have traditions. They had none. S) also the English. I believe you will make a better Government, based on your own histroy, on your own past and on your own method of choosing and electing than have a copy of the one prevalent in Westminster, which will not make you free men for yourselves. That is why I do not think the Act unsatisfactory. I think it is well that you should have the power and the duty of framing your own free institutions, according to your own will. and I quote to you, what I have often quoted in England, a phrase; "If you would know what England can do in the future, see what England has done in the past." I say to you, the Indian people, with an immemorial antiquity, if you want to know what India can do; see what India has done in the past.

Hence, I will take what is given and shall ask you to say what the next step should be. Now what has it done? First, in your provinces it has given to you an Assembly of 100 elected members and 40 nominated members of which only 20 may be officials, a majority of 100 to 40. Even if every non-elected member is not favourable to you, you should be able to use power for your own purposes.

Then what is the Government apart from the Legislative body<sup>3</sup> A council with one Indian and one Briton in the Executive Government. Then comes the Executive Government; it is made up of the Council one to one and two Indian Ministers. They are to consult together, argue together,

and they are to discuss every question, reserved as well as transferred, as one body and the Governor is told to foster and encourage full discussion" so that each part of the Government may supplement the other. Do youmean to say that in a question of dispute one Councillor and two Indians cannot hold their own against one Briton if the interest of the country is concerned in it? I will not do your Ministers the injustice of supposing that even a majority of three to one is nothing to enable them to gain their way. If their arguments are sound, then the Governor has no more power to compel the Minister than to compel the Executive Council, He was able under the draft Bill to coerce his Ministers. New he may only overrice them when he is able to override the Council also; and that exists in every self-Governing Dominion. It is the prerogrative of the Crown. They were unequal in status in the draft Bill. They are equal in status now and one power which you have in the Minister which you have not in the Council is that you vote the salary of the Minister now. Before it was not placed on the estimate and if your electorate is strong, if they know what they want, then your Council will not vote for the salary of a Minister who betrays his country or shows weakness, in his work. Then I will ask. you to notice how you can bring your weight against the Governor himself. The question arises.....

(Mrs. Besant had turned her back to the audience and was addressing the people on the dais. The audience becoming very impatient began to clap their hands for a little while).

Mrs. Besant: Mr. President, do you call me to time?

Mr. President: No.

At this stage voices of 'this side, this side' were heard from the audience.

Mrs. Besant:—I cannot talk all round at the same time. I know it is very awkward, friends. You should not be so impatient. So many of you are here. How can I get out of the difficulty? I am very sorry I know it is very very awkward.

Continuing Mrs. Besant said:--The point that I was going to put to you is this. Suppose your Minister wants something that the Governor does not like, then the Governor is to tell the Minister what he thinks, and if the Minister persists, the Governor may stand out of his way. I tell you one exception, because it says you make mistakes and so will the Assembly, but, it is only by mistakes that experience and the sense of responsibility grow. Suppose a Governor says "this is a vital matter, I cannot allow you to do what you want." The next thing is somebody else from the Council will take the place of the Minister. I submit that it will be the duty of the Council to refuse to give another Minister to the Governor and leave him face to face with a united Council stancing at the back of their Minister whose advice he rejected. Then he can dissolve the Council. But you can have a similar Council again. The electorate is then appealed to, and then, the Committee's Report goes on to say, "If the New Minister support the view of his predecessor the committee hopes that the Governor will try to agree with the views for which the Council was dissolved." You say, suppose he is

obstinate. Then he will be broken down. That will be the end. Y u want to get liberty without struggle, without effort, without firmness. You cannot. You must be ready to resist; you must be ready to struggle, but. your pople must be behind you. If you do that, you may be quite sure that England which does not always trouble about Indian questions, will find some work for the Government who will not yield to their advice. Pass from that and take the subjects given to you You have Education, Agriculture, Public Works and Sanitation, and there you have all the subjects on which the life of your people depends. Others have land-revenue, but it must be put on a statutory basis before being handed over to the Ministers. All the subjects, they say, on which taxation turns, must be brought under the perview of the Legislature. You ask for power over the budget. You vote estimates with a reservation. Mr. Montagu said that he wa's giving the Indian Councils more power over estimates then the House of Commons had. It is for you to use your power and take the opportunity that is given to you. Take another point, fiscal autonomy. The Act has given the same fical autonomy enjoyed by Great Britain, Canada, Australia. New Zealand and South Africa. You want more. Why do you say it is not on the statute? It is not on the statute anywhere else in the British Empire. It is established by one of those conventions and you cannot have it by statute. If you have it in the statute it limits the power of the Parliament, and it limits the power of the Crown. In giving you"the same freedom in economic matters that you have in S-lf-Governing Dominions you have as much as any other part of the British Empire has, but you may say, af er all, "What about the other side, what about the Central Government'? I should have said that the Grand Committees are abolished. There, autocracy nominally remains ......

(At this stage there was considerable noise and confusion as the audience could not apparently hear what the speaker was saying).

The Hon'ble Pandit Malaviya:—Gentlemen, I beg of you to keep patience. On an important matter like this. don't you want to hear what Mrs. Besant wants to tell you? I hope you will be patient......

- A delegate from the auidence: Ninety percent of the delegates are on this side. If we can't hear what is the use?

Mrs. Besant:-Now with regard to the Central Government the position is this. You have a legislative Assembly with a very large majority of five to two. You have a Council of State of sixty people, twenty of whom are officials and forty of them are either elected or nominated. The danger lies in the number being either elected or nominated, and that is decided by rules. Those rules you will be looking for during the next few months. The question depends on the rules instead of the statute because a rule is more readily changed. If you have any elected majority there, then your path is clear and that is made a provision for in the Statute. Supposing it is said that the Governor cannot pass a Bill that he thinks necessary for good Government, then he may pass it in his Council. I heard it said that be could do it himself. There is no such provision. He must do it in Council where at least three members are to be Indians. Sir Sankaran Nair said before the Committee that if there were three members of the Executive Council given, he would rather have them than Ministers. Supposing a

Governor is able to pass a coercive measure through the Council. It has to go over to England and laid before the Standing Committee on Indian affairs there to be scrutinised with all the circumstarces, and reasons leading to its, passage. Then it has to go through two Houses of Parliament, then to receive the King's assent and until it does so, the law is not valid. You have, already the power of the Ordinance. If you say that Parliament has no right to suspend Members, we can only say that it has power to suspend a member of the Parliament of England and you can hardly ask for more as long as you remain in the British Commonwealth. Supposing an emergency occurs, then it is that the Governor General may act, but the act may be disallowed by the Kirg. I say that three Indian Ministers in the Council with a majority in the elected Assembly of five to two, with a Council of State which is better than the House of Lords which they are putting up with in England, the power of the autocracy is broken. I submit to you, then, that the powers in the Provincial Assembly and in the Central Government, if you call these as crumbs thrown to you, such a characterisation is not in accord with the facts. This is what [ venture to submit to you to-day. You may charge the circumstance by your own will in the provinces. In the Central Government it depends upon you to make autocracy impossible in the future.

Then you may say why thank Mr. Montagu? Because he deserves your thanks. 'Because he fought your battles. People speak here as though some excuse is necessary for being a friend of Mr. Montagu. I have no right to call him my friend. Mr. Montagu is the friend of India, and therefore 1 should be proud of that title. He is not my friend as far as I know, but I know that this great Englishman deserves your gratitude. Whether you regard him as your servant or not, remember that in this Bill the estimate of the India Office is taken away from your shoulders and put on the British estimates. Britain pays for that and not you. He is only your servant as every Minister is your servant. having to do your own will, but in this case unpaid by you. Whether he is a servant or not, if he has helped ycu to win liberty, if he has struggled against overwhelming odds in order to help you to win freedom, are you, the Indian people, known as a grateful people to refuse a graceful word of thanks to this Minister who has really made you free? Why should you leave out Lord Sinha, a man who has been fighting your battle in exile, none to help him, none to consult with? You know how these men feel about you. Do you realise that they are looking to you for some recognition of their long struggle amidst their unpopularity amongst the whole official class of , - their own people here and in England? Do you realise that in the Cabinet Mr. Montagu is opposed? Do you realise that the Bill would have been thrown ont there, if he had given you all that he wanted to give you? As long as you are a part of the Commonwealth of the Empire, you must ' co-operate with the Britons. If you are independent, of course, no. If you broke the tie, of course, no. But as long as you acknowledge your place in the great Commonwealth of free Nations into which you are coming now, you must co-operate. It is going to be your own Government. It is going to be your own people, who will rule the land and I know that, although some of you may not care to hear me now, even though you know how I have worked for you here and in England. I know despite the few gathered

here as compared with the mass of the Indian people. I know a few years hence you will do justice to Mr. Montagu and Lord Sil na and it will be a shame if you do not thank them for the work they have done for you. (Loud Applause)

Ladies and Gentlemen, if you do not hear the opposite view, you are not fit to enjoy self Government. (Hear, Hear). Yau must be prepared to tolerate the opposite view. That is the principle of free representative Government. (Hear, Hear).

. . . Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, after the masterly and lucid explanation of Mrs. Besant, it is useless for me to traverse the ground of the reforms. I shall say this that at the Congress at Delhi and at Bombay, you were probably justified in saying that the reforms were inadequate and unsatisfactory, but as I say, with Mrs. Besant this Act is not the Report. It is a great advance on the Report, and we will be stultifying ourselves, we sha'l not be rising to the enormous opportunities opened out to us, if we do not recognise in the fullest terms the advance that this Act is upon the Report. Mrs. Besant has been at great pains, and if you only. had listened to her quietly you would have been certainly pleased to notice the great advance clause by -clause that Mrs. Besant explained to you, But unfortunately you had not the patience, and I tell you, gentlemen, if you refuse to examine the Act -clause by clause, if you refuse to see the difference between the Report and the Act, you will never understand the great advance that this Act is upon the Report. 1

A Voice;—We cannot see it.

Mr. Bomanji:-Then I am sorry for you. That is all I can tell you. Ladies and Gentlemen, I yield to none of you in saying that we were under a system of Government which could not be tolerated any day longer, but let us be sensible practical men of the world. You are given now something and you can co-operate with the Government and work in the spirit in which it is given to you. Let me tell you one special trait of the English character. An Englishman will fight with you, will obstruct ycu, will impede you, but when he hears the word of his sovereign, the command and the order of his sovereign, he will put aside all his personal prejudices, his personal feelings, and I am sure that he will co-operate with you if you will only have the spirit and the commonsense to co-operate with him. Then, if you find that he does not co-operate, it will be time enough for you to obstruct as some of my friends over there (pointing to his right) are going to obstruct the reforms. I think it is a wrong attitude I say the time will come in about twelve months when you will see how the Act is worked. Then will be time for you to obstruct in working the Act. The one duty that is enjoined upon us to day is to heartily co-operate, embrace the opportunities opened out to us which we had never to this time, and you will be doing to yourself and the country enormous harm if you do not co-operate, and it is because I feel that some of you are being misled I am here to voice against some of your misleading wishes and sentiments.

There is another point, gentlemen. I do not want to detain you because we have to get through a lot of business, but I will say this, that we have not yet realised the enormous obligation that Mr. Montagu has laid you under. Ladies and Gentlemen, he has been abused, he ha; been reviled, as no other Englishman has been who has done service to you. 'His own nationality has been exposed. He has been called a Jew; and some people went so far as to say, 'he is throwing away India, what the dickens does he care; he is only a Jew'. He has been called a thousand names. This man has suffered for you, and I think it would be urgrateful on your part not to recognise his valuable services. Even in India those wretched rags of the "Englishman" and the "Statesman" have abused him very vehemently. It was the meanest and the most . scurrilous attack that any newspaper of respectability could make. You may differ from him, but you have no right to question the man's nationality, to cast aspersions on his character, and it is only right, ladies and gentlemen, that in this Congress you should resent any such scurrilous attack on his character as both the 'Englishman' and the 'Statesman' have done and disgraced the name of English journalism.

Then about thanking Lord Sinha. Let us put aside our personal feelings. He is one of our countrymen under failing hea'th, under successive personal and family bereavements. He has stuck to his guns much against his own wish, much against the wish of his doctors, and he has stood by you, and you have not a word of thanks for your own man, What encouragement, I ask you, is it to any one of you to try and do his duty in a foreign land when the man is stricken down with failing health and when he has personal bereavements in the famil7. Gentlemen, bear this in mind, if you refuse to pass this resolution, I am afraid you are not putting any discredit on Lord Sinha, but you are throwing discredit on yourselves. I have nothing more to say beyond adding that with the greatest pleasure I second this amendment. (Applause),

#### Speech of Babu Bepin Chandra Pal.

Battu Bepin Chandra Pal (Bengal) moved a third amendment adding the following clause to the original motion:---

(d) This Congress, in the meanwhile recommends that the provisions of the Reform Act be used, as far as possible, with a view to secure full Responsible Government at an early date, and it desires to record its thanks to Mr. Montagu for his labours in connection with the reforms."

In proposing the amendment Babu Bepin Chandra Pal said:-

Mr. President, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, I regre, if ever I regretted in my life, that in the days of my youth I did not utilise the opportunities that I had of learning Persian, Urdu or even Hindi (laughter), because to tell you sincerely, I should have been exceedingly glad to be able to speak to you in the language of our nation (Hear, Hear), and I believe that it would have been easier for me and easier for you also to understand the significance of the work that is before us if it were possible for me to speak your own language. But I hope some one who will follow me will explain the position with all the warmth of feeling that he can command, with all the sincerity of his heart and with all his strength in your own vernacular to you.

Now, Brother Delegates, the situation before us is this. My friend Mr. Das at the request of the Subjects Committee proposed a certain resolution to you. There were differences of opinion among us, and notices were given of amendments to be proposed at the open congress by Mrs. Besant and Yesterday we seriously considered the position among Mahatma Gandhi. a few of our own friends. We consulted Mahatma Gandhi and tried to find out if it was possible or not consistently with his loyalty to truth and his own conscience and. consistently with our loyalty to truth and our own conscience to come to a common understanding. (Hear, Hear). I regret to say or rather I am happy to say, that we could not come to. Why am I happy to say, because in a matter where truth and conscience are concerned, n'either Mahatma Gandhi nor the least amongst us can give in (Hear, Hear), but we have learnt some little wisdom : rom the conversation we had with Mahatma Gandhi. In our talks with him we discovered that there were other points of view, not only personal to Mahatma Gandhi, but points of view in which perhaps a very substantial number of our brother delégates entirely share, and with regard to those points of view we thought that it might be necessary, if it is agreeable to you, to amend a little the original position which the Subjects Committee took up, and my amendment is exactly on that point. Now what is that amendment? That amendment runs thus. I am sorry we could not avail our elves of the generous hespitality of the Reception Committee to get our amendment printed (laughter), so I have it only type written.

Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra:---It was never sent to us.

Bibu Bepin Chandra Pal:—I do not blame you. I blame myself that I could not avail myself of the generous hospitality of the Reception Committee.

Now, you have heard Mr. Das's resolution. At the end of that resolution I beg, with your permission, to add the following clause:--"That this Congress, in the meanwhile, recommends that the provisions of the Reform Act be used as far as possible with a view to secure full Responsible Government at an early date? That is the first part of my amendment, and this part I propose to add to Mr. Das's original Resolution, because it has com's to our knowledge that that resolution is liable to misinterpretation. It has been asked, what lead are you going to give to the country in the matter of the Reform Act. If you, gentlemen, accept this amendment. the lead that you give to the country is this, namely, that the country is not to beycout the reforms firstly; secondly, that the country is to use the reforms. so far as the reforms will lend themselves to such use, and use the reforms. for what purpose ? For the object of attaining complete Responsible Government at an early date. Now that is the position, that is the lead that I beg of you to give to the country. It has been said, how are we going to work the reforms, how are we to use the reforms. My imagination cannot conceive every possible and impossible way in which the reforms may be used for the establishment of Responsible Government. But so far as my imagination goes, I think there is a little way in which you can use them. I want you to contest every seat (Hear, Hear). With whom ?- With those who are likely to support the bureaucracy. (Hear, Hear). I want you to vote and induce those who are about you, over whom you have influence in your constituencies, to come to the polls not in their tens, not in their hundreds, but in their thousands-(Hear, Hear). I want you to go about among the people and tell them that you have got this franchise, you have to educate them in the great principles, with this franchise you have to educate them in the great principles, the great policies, that are before the country; and having done this, if you are fortunate enough.-I do not trust yet,-but if you are fortunate enough to secure a majority in the council, you can do one thing. You can try to force your will upon the executive. At present the Governor is supreme. I, in my humble opinion, am a-what shall I say,-well, a poor pennya-liner; I am neither a distinguished lawyer nor anything else. But 🔍 as I read this Act, it seems to me that the power of the Governor in the provinces has been made more autocratic than it is now (Hear, Hear). I will tell you how. At present the Governor of Bombay or Bengal is only one member of the corporation called his Council. Ordinarily he has to be controlled, he has to submit himself to the votes of his other councillors. In the provinces the Governor can make no law, he has to obey the Legislative Council. But under the new Act, if I have been able to read it correctly, the Governor is one of his executive council so far as reserved subjects are concerned. So far as the transferred subjects are concerned, great rights in a tidal wave of liberalism and sympathy have been conferred upon you, and in regard to the transerred subjects, the Governor is supreme. He can reinstate the budget; he can dismiss his Minister; he can reinstate a Bill. on his own authority that may be thrown out by say the Bengal Council which has a non-official majority. He has to go up to the highest quarter. Now in regard to these things, it seems to me that the power of the Governor is made a little more autocratic than what it is now. What can we do?. If we have a majority in the Councils we shall works there are

upon the course of administration and legislation in this country (Hear, Hear) and what will be the effect? The effect will be one of two things. The Governor will have to submit to the demands, the dictates, the commands of his Council. If he does it-he is not bound by law to do it-but if he does it we follow parliamentary traditions. If the Governor is forced to submit himself to our wishes successively for three years, we follow the unwritten law upon which the British parliamentary constitution is based. We can appeal to this tradition and make his power less powerful, less frightful than what it is now. This is one, way. The other way is, suppose the Governor refuses, then will come, sir, obstruction. If the Governor accepts our wishes, there will be co-operation, but if the Governor rejects the wishes of the majority of his council, then there must necessarily be obstruction (Hear, Hear). Now the two words 'co-operation' and 'obstruction' in a matter like this do not destroy each other. We shall obstruct surely when the interests of the country demand obstruction. We shall help, we shall co-operate; when such co-operation will mean the submission of the will of the Governor to the will of the peoples' representatives. (Hear. Hear). Why are we fighting over thes words? There is neither obstruction nor co operation in my resolution. You may ask, why don't you accept co-operation' why don't you accept Mahatma Gandhi's amendment; and I will brit fly tell you my reason. My first objection to Mahatma Gandhi's amendment is this; he brings the Royal Proclamation into his amendment (Hear, Hear). I object to the incorporation of any statement made in the Royal Message for which we have to thank His Majesty for his gracious message, and we have decided not to say anything ungracious about that Proclamation anywhere else. What is that Proclamation? The new era. Do you accept the passing of the Reform Act as a new era? (Cries of No, No). Now Mahatma Gandhi wants to delete the words 'disappointing, inadequate and unsatisfactory'. Well, I will delete the word 'disappointing' for the present. Then come the words inadequate and unsatisfactory'. I have yet to go back to school and open the dictionary of the English language to understand that a thing which is inadequate and unsatisfactory can be the beginning of a new era (Hear, Hear). What is the meaning of 'inadequate? It is not a personal feeling, it is not that I wanted something and I have not got it. It is not that I wanted a bomb from Mr. Montagu as a X'mas gift and he has not sent it. No, I did not want anything of the kind. 'Inadequate' does not refer to our President. Inadequate does not refer to Mahatma Gandhi, inadequate does notreier even to your own sentiments. Inadequate refers to the condition of things in India and in the world. Therefore, we say that in the state of things that exist in India, this Act does not meet the requirements of the situation. And I want to know that if a thing does not meet the requirements of the situation, can we call it as introducing a new era. If that is your meaning, you are welcome to put that meaning on it. So far as my poor intellect and my poor knowledge of the English language goes, I think 'inadequate' cannot refer to the inauguration of a new era. Then comes the word 'unsatisfactory'. 'Inadequate' is an impersonal expression. It refers to conditions. 'Unsatisfactory' has reference to what we desire, what the manhood of India desires, what the womanhocd of India desires. what the culture and civilization of India 'Unsatisfactory' has reference to that. We are agreed; even desires. Mahatma Gandhi would admit that it is inadequate; he would admit that it

IN unsatisfactory. Then why not admit that it is disappointing. There is only one reason in the case of any other person, that the reasons might have been attributed or conceived. In the case of such a transparently sincered man as Mahatma Gandhi is, the only rational interpretation of the idea to delete the word disappointing is this. Mahatma Gandhi did not expect anything better than this Bill from the Government (Hear, Hear). That is the only interpretation.

Now, Sir, what about co-operation. We object to co-operation. We are asked to co-operate; for what? For a common purpose. Now co-operation implies two parties. We are to co-operate together with the British. For what? For a common purpose? What, pray, is your own purpose? You have set your seal upon that purpose in three successive sessions of the Indian National Congress. Your purpose is the attainment as quickly as possible by evolutionery means, by constitutional means, full Responsible Government in the country. What is the purpose of the Bill? What is the object of the Bill? Do you get the object of the Bill? No. 1 generally am not given to quoting. I am not a lawyer, but I will for once quote the Joint Committee's Report. The Report says of you "Its critics forget that the announcement of the 20th August 1917 spoke of a substantial step in the direction of the gradual development of self-governing institutions with a view to progressive realisation of responsible Government and not-(mark, ladies and gentlemen, what follows)-and not of the partial introduction of responsible Government" Now I believe that if any body can speak with authority as regards the intentions of the Act, that body is the Joint Committee, and we have the authority of the Joint Committee which says that this Bill does not intend to even partially establish responsible Government. What then have you got? Not a step -- towards what? towards the development of self-governing institutions. The hand touches the pen and the pen touches the paper. This is the way. Development of self-governing institutions, we had heard it in the days of my youth, in 1880, in Lord Ripon's memorable resolutions on self-Government. Where is it to-day? The Montagu-Chelmford Report says it has not been worked out. What guarantee is there that it will not be another forty years before even partial Therefore I say this Act is inadequate, responsible Government is given. this Act is unsatisfactory, and this Act is disappointing. At the same time we do not propose, like foolish men and women. to allow those who are not with us to exploit the new agencies and the new situation' for their own sectional, personal profit and preferment. We shall contest every seat. Let all those whom it may concern note it. (Laughter). We shall fight, where conscience, truth and the interest of our country demand, every measure of the Government of the country (Hear, Hear). We shall co-operate with the Government where co-operation means the advancement of our common cause. We shall not co-operate with the Government where co-operation means something else. This, is our position, and I think my amendment removes clearly the little doubt that had been raised in some quarters whether we are going to boycott these reforms or not."

One word more. Now as regards thanks, I don't mind it. I don't mind giving thanks to anybody. Give thanks to Mr. Montagu. Why should you now? It may be said, this is a thing which you call inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing, why should you thank him? Yes, Yes, Yes, I came very recently from England, and when I had my landlady's daugher bringing me the bitterest cup of tea, I had to say 'No, thanks'. (Loud laughter). So I am fully prepared with all the courtesy of my nature a an Indian and with all the knowledge of the English customs, to bend my head and tell Mr. Montagu 'No, thanks'. 'No, thanks' does not mean I don't thank you. It means, not that I don't accept your offer, but I thank you for the trouble that you have taken in the matter. Therefore we shall not be chary, we shall not be miserly in giving thanks.

There is another reason why I want to give thanks. Thanks precede—these are English ways, not mine, not Mahatma Gandhi's—thanks precede expectation of favours to come. We thank those in England, I mean, we thank none here; we bend cur head; we salute him, we take the dust off his feet; but we never say thanks, but thanking is there and thanking means rejection as well as expectations of favours to come. You can send thanks to Mr. Mantagu and, if you please, thank also Lord Sinha of Raipur. I do not object to it, but it is not in my amendment (Laughter).

Now, sir, I need not labour this question, but I will only add one word. I refuse to mention anything of His Majesty's gracious Proclamation in the records of this Congress except what has already been mentioned in the first resolution, and why? Because this Proclamation which calls upon -us and His Majesty's officers to co-operate with one another in the pursuit of the common object openly in so many words repudiates your claims to fitness to govern yourself at this moment (Hear, Hear). You are to be in the leading strings, and you are to use these powers, and if you prove good boys, you are given a tiny blunt knife now to play with, and if that knifes does not cut your finger or anybody else's throat, you will have a bigger dagger to-morrow. That is what this means. I am prepared to thank anybody for anything (A Voice:---not for the reforms), it does not matter, but I am not prepared to cite His Majesty's Preclamation as our new Magna Charta. I am not prepared to take our stand upon His Majesty's appeal, though it is made in the name of His Majesty (Hear, Hear) . We know it is an appeal made by his ministers, by the spokesmen of the British bureaucracy in India, the representatives of the British plutocracy in India. That is the Proclamation. 1 refuse to accept to cite, I refuse to take my stand upon the Proclamation. We have loyally thanked His Majesty for his gracious sentiments, and that ought to be enough for Hi3 Majesty and for us, and I refuse to incorporate it in any amendment or resolution of ours. My amendment finally runs:---

"That this Congress in the meanwhile", in the meanwhile means before full Responsible Government is given, "recommends that the provisions of the Reforms Act be used as far as possible with a view to secure full Responsible Government at an early date, and it desires to record its thanks to the Right Hon. E. S. Montagu for his labours in connection with the Constitutional Reforms".

With these words, Mr. President, Brother and sister Delegates, I commend this amendment to your acceptance. (Loud Applause).

# Maulana Muhammad Ali snpported the amendment in an Urdu speech.

### Speech of Maulana Muhammad All-

Maulana Muhammad Ali in seconding the amendment said although he was not yet in a mood to thank for he had still a grievance that all prisoners had not been released, still they must thank for the good things given them, but manfully and not like slaves. Mr. C. R. Dass had told him in the morning that if the resolution were passed in the form which the Moslem League had adopted for it he would be prepared to agree to it, while Mahatma Gandhi had also liked that form, If that was the case the speaker could not see where lay the difficulty. They should devise a formula which should be acceptable to all. Personally he (the speaker) was for using the Reform Scheme, and he was of opinion that to the extent that the Civil Service acted in good faith the people should be ready to co-operate with it. The audience should think independently for themselves and vote according to their own consciences irrespective of the person from whom this or that thing came. They should look: to the thing itself not to its source.

#### Speech of Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra.

Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra said:—The President has asked me to say that as the time at our disposal is very little, he will allow in the case of the movers of the various amendments and of the principal resolutions a littlemore time, but ordinarily the time that will be allotted to each speaker will be only five minutes (Hear, Hear). (A Voice:—Only two minutes should be allowed).

Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra:—There is a voice that only two minutes should be allowed, but the President allows five minutes.

#### Speech of Mr. S. Satyamurti.

Mr. S. Satyamurti (Madras) in supporting the resolution moved by Mr. Das said.

Mr, President, Brother and Sister Delegates, I rise to support the resolution moved by my friend Mr. Das as it stands on the agenda paper. Before I proceed, Sir. to give my reasons in support of the resolution, may I, with your leave, try to answer a few of the arguments advanced by Mahatma-Gandhi in support of his amendment. He is anxious that this Congressshould omit the word 'disappointing' from the resolution as it stands. I trust you will not do it, and I will give my reasons. For one thing, friends, we are only repeating in this resolution what we have 'said at two previoussessions of the Congress that the scheme was disappointing and unsatisfactory. I may also remind this House that at Delhi after a strenuous and long discussion the Congress threw out an amendment one of whose objects was (A voice: the scheme too) to get the word 'disappointing' omitted. I hear a voice 'the scheme too. My answer is, look at the Memorandum of the Congress deputation, and you will see in one of the appendices that there are fifty points in which the Bill was worse than the scheme, and I submit that the Act is no improvement on the scheme, certainly there is no improvement in the Act which can justify the removal of the word 'disappointing' from our resolution. I also suggest for your consideration. friends, that the use of the word 'disappointing' is but a statement of fact. Are you, or are you not. disappointed? Frankly I am, because I did expect that after a war lasting  $4\frac{1}{2}$  years in which England proclaimed from the housetops that she fought for freedom, justice and self-determination (Hear, Hear) for all Nations, East and West, that her statesmen would rise to the occasion and apply to the nations, India, Ireland and Egypt which belong to her own Empire, those very principles which she is anxious that Germany, Russia and Turkey ought to apply to the small nationalities of their Empires. I did expect more. I am therefore disappointed, but I ask you, my friends. to say with me that you are disappointed. Further, your deputation in England has called the scheme disappointing and the Labour Party has called it disappointing. What has happened in this country that you should now formally disown your own deputies whom you sent to England and say that the scheme is not disappointing? I say that it is the highest compliment I can pay to the British Nation to say that it is disappointing. I also say, Mr. President and Brother Delegates, that if after this discussion you omit the word 'disappointing ' you will be doing the greatest disservice to our country (Hear, Hear). The eyes of the civilised world are upon us to-day and they are anxiously watching to know how India receives the scheme. The moment you say you are not disappointed which will be the result of voting in favour of Mahatma Gandhi's amendment, the obvious inference of the civilized world will justifiably be that you are satisfied with the scheme. I therefore submit

Mahatma Gandhi then asks us to use the word 'co-operation' with I wish to give my reasons why we cannot use the regard to the scheme. word 'co-operation'. Because, Sir, co-operation implies that two parties should work together. and so far as we have seen the cofficials in this country, with some exceptions, and the European community in this country, have protested that they will not work the scheme, and they have not yet loyally responded to the King's Proclamation and come forward and said 'we will work the scheme and co-operate' (Hear, Hear). I am against this Indian National Congress committing the Nation to one-sided co-operation (Hear, Hear). More than that, Sir. I do not desire this Congress to take any responsibility for the success or the failure of this scheme, because the scheme of Dyarchy is unheard of in the history of the world. Mr. Montagu way greatly in favour of it, but I refuse to commit my Nation to co-operate with the scheme, because then you take the responsiblity for the success or the failure of the scheme. Last but not least, I submit for your consideration that if you offer to co-aperate, you impliedly offer to have your fitness for self-Government, which you have affirmed previously, tested by the success or the failure of the scheme. I, as an Indian, refuse to have any argument advanced

with some confidence that you will throw out that amendment unanimously.

about my fitness. I consider I am fit. and there is no question about it. I do not propose to admit any question myself. For these three reasons, Sir, we cannot use the word co-opertion'.

Now with regard to the first clause of the resolution, I wish it were possible, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, that we need not say that we are fit, but the slave-consciousness in our minds is so great that I have been pained to hear even among our own folk some people seriously asking 'are we fit.' I therefore think that this Indian National Congress should proclaim to all whom it may concern that we are fit for full Responsible Government not to-morrow, but to-day, not to-night, but just now (Hear, Hear). I may also submit for your consideration, that the average Britisher has no doubt in his own mind about the fitness of India for Responsible Government. The Imperialist who is bloated with the consciousness of the Empire on which the sun never sets my differ but rather, as I have seen Mr. President and Brother Delegates, the average Britisher appreciates the Frenchman's cynical joke that the sun never sets on the British Empire because God Almighty cannot trust the Britisher outside his own Empire. I will not labour this aspect of the question, because, friends, I consider it is an insult on the part of the Nations of Europe whose forefathers were roaming as savages in forests at a time when our forefathers had a well perfected civilization and culture which is the admiration, the envy and the despair of the civilized world to-day. (Hear, Hear). Mr. Bomanjee joined issue with us and said, how can you call the scheme inadequate? On this matter, friends, I desire that we must keep our minds clear. Our demand for self-Government is not based on our demand for office or power. We want that in India we ought to have Government of the people, by the people and for the people, and that is why we want self Government, and I submit for your consideration some of the reasons why the scheme is inadequate. Once the richest country in the world whose riches compelled poets to talk of the wealth of Ormuz and of Ind, India is the poorest country in the world to-day with all the material disadvantages of her constant liability to disease, famine and poverty and her want of education, and she has an average income of less than one anna per head per day which has been officially admitted, and the result of that has been that, throughout the last century we had 31 famines in this country resulting in the lors of 31 millions of human lives. Friends, the average life of the Indian to day is 23 years. God gave man/ three score and ten, but thanks to various causes, to day the average Indian lives but one score and three. These are reasons which compel us to demand complete Responsible Government. Montagn will not give us power to change all this. The power to change all these things demands the power of the purse complete and unfettered, which we do not get under these Acts. Last year the Government of India were so alive to the imperious needs of the country that of a revenue of  $81\frac{1}{2}$  millions sterling, they set apart the colossal sum of 41<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> millions for the Army and Navy of British India, and the 'magnificent anm' of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  millions for the education of 315 millions, only 6 percent. of whom are literate, and the equally magnificent sum of  $2\frac{1}{2}$ millions for the sanitation of a people who lest 6 millions from influenza last year when the whole world lost but 12 millions. These are reasons,

friends, why we consider the scheme inadequate. More than that. So long as India is not fully and completely self-governing, we connot help being in our own country and elsewhere helots and slaves. That is why I call this scheme inadequate.

The last clause of the resolution makes the demand for complete, Responsible Government. On this matter I desire to say only this. Provided we all Indians are united and demand self-Government with one voice, complete and immediate, there is no power on earth, believe me, not even Great Britain, which can stand in the way of our attaining that freedom (Hear, Hear). I therefore ask you to make that demand unanimously and unflinchingly.

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, on the amendment moved by Mr. Pal, I desire to say only two words. If Mr. Montagu wants the thanks as Mr. Pal expressed them, I will not quarrel. As regards the other question as to using the scheme or working the scheme, I submit for your respectful consideration whether this Congress need say that at all. After all, the Act becomes part of the constitution of the law of the land, and unless this Congress taking upon itself a very serious responsibility, ask the country to boycott the Councils, we are not going to do that. I therefore suggest that we can well leave it to our people to do what they like, but I refuse to give any guarantee to anybody that once I get into these Councils I am going to do this or that, I will use all opportunities in every way, including obstruction, provided I can use it for the advancement of my country in the only direction which, I think, will help in achieving early and complete self-Government. I therefore commend the resolution to your acceptance, and ask you to reject all the amendments.

One word more, and I am done, friends. We, Nationalists, are often accused of being impatient. We are not. We have waited long enough. One century and a half is a long period in the history of any Nation. We are tired, we refuse to wait, and we are not going to be frightened by any and I will only conclude by saying, not in my language, but in the ancient language of our country.

So, my friends, I would ask you to vote for the resolution and show to the world that we do not propose to take one inch back till we realise the immortal nectar of self-government. (Loud and prolonged cheers).

## Speech of Maulana Hasrat Mohanl.

Maulana Hasrat Mohani in opposing the amendment said he thought there was no occasion for thankfulness. They had only been given the minimum which was inevitable, and could not be helped. Mr. Montagu had once said that the question of Indian liberty would be decided on the battlefields of Frcane Indians had stord even that test well, and had supplied 15 hundred crores of money and less of men for the war. Now that the war was over, and all countries—even the savages of Arabia and the German colonics—were obtaining liberty, could India alone remain content with the concessions granted and deem them as sufficient?

#### Speech of Mr. T. Prakasam.

Mr. T. Prakasam (Madras), in supporting Mr. Dass' proposition as amended by Mr. Fal said:-Mr. President, Sister and Brother Delegates. The fight has been going on on the word 'disappointing' that appears in the resolution moved by my learned friend Mr. Dass. The word 'disappointing' has been taken exception to by no less a person than Mahatma Gandhiji, and it is a very difficult matter when exception is taken by one like hint on the simple word 'disappointing.' 'Disappointing' is the word which every one of us will use. When this Congress solemnly demanded full Responsible Government, when this Congress solemnly demanded full Provincial Autonemy, when this Congress solemnly demanded at least partial autonomy in the Central Government, all parties, Sir, Mcderates and Nationalists as well as others, everybody that went up to England domanded partial autonomy in the Central Government. Well, Sir, what have we been given? We asked for control of the purse. We asked for the Minister who would be responsible to the people. What have we been given? We are told that there is no provincial autonomy, we are told that there is no control of the purse anywhere, There is a joint purse. We are told that the Minister is one great man who could be dismissed by the Governor himself when even a Civil Servant could not be dismissed by a Governor (Hear, Hear). Sir, when this is the answer given to us by the Brirish Parliament when it is admitted that the scheme is inadequate and unsatisfactory, I beg of you to consider whether it is in any way wrong to say that it is disappointing.

I therefore say that we are perfectly justified in using the word 'disappointing.'

Then the dispute has turred on the use of the word 'co operation.' Mr. Jinnah with all seriousness has stated in this Heuse if you do not use the word 'co-operation,' I must say there is a school of obstructionists in this country who will not co-operate.' I admit, Sir, that there is a school of obstructionists in this House who can keep company with Mr. Jinnah. Now Mr. Jinnah resigned his high effice in the Viceroy's Council when he could not agree with the Rowlatt Act. If that is an obstruction, we say, Sir, we are obstructionists in the sense that we 'belong' to that school. We do not hesitate to say that if that is the obstruction which Mr. Jinnah means, we belong to that school; we do obstruct in that manner. Well, the Hon'ble Pundit Malaviya has been obstructing the Bureaucracy whenever he thought that the Government was doirg wrorg. He has done it even before the Hunter Committee. Well, Sir, we shall be obstructionists only in that sense. There is no other school of obstructionists in this House so far as that matter goes. To my mind, there is the greatest darger if you use the word co-operation', there is the greatest trouble if you use the word 'co-operation.' If you only look into the pages of a chronicle the struggles of the British people themselves for the use of such word, you will see that they had to regret, they had to repent, they had been macked at when the occasion arcse. So. it seems to me, Sir, that it is advisable, when we are struggling hard, we should not use the word 'co-operation', because it is liable to be misunderstood, it is liable to be misinterpreted. We have no objection to use the reforms; we have no objection to co-operate with the Government so long as it is reasonable. We will do our best to bring the Government to the proper attitude if it is unreasonable by every means which we can possibly command. Here is Mahatma Gandhiji, the leader of the Satyagraha movement. Well, whenever the Government has to be brought to its senses he leads the country. How -could he say that we should use the word 'co-opertion' urqualified. With these few words, Sir, I would request the whole House to accept Mr. Das's proposition as amended by Mr Pal. (Applause).

#### Speech of Mr. P. K. Telang.

Mr. P. K. Telang (Bembay) in supporting Mrs. Besant's amondment said:-

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen. I stand before you to support the amendment moved by Mrs. Besant. You have heard cogently put before you all that can be said in support of the Bill which has now become an Act. She has told you how it is an advance not only on the present system of G vernment but also on the Scheme as it was put before us in the Montagu-Chelmsford Report and also on the Bill that was before the Joint Committee and the Parliament. I don't want to go much into the discussion of those propositions which require close study and thinking. I am one of those who desire that the Bill should be taken, as Mrs. Besant has put it, as the opening of the door-way to freedom, and I agree with her that the attitude of mind with which we approach the working of that Bill should be one of enthusiasm, so that we may take it as an instrument of progress and not be thinking of it as an obstruction in our way. I think that if the Act is used in that way it will lead us sooner to the goal of complete Self-Government , than the mere grant of power in an Act. I feel that if the powers which you have been given, if the opportunities which are placed before us are used properly, we shall be able to acquire self-Government in the only way in which it can be said to be properly acquired, and I think that we must approach the subject in a spirit of enthusiasm, and that is why it is necessary to give the lead to the Nation, to give the lead to the electorates and the peoples who will go into Councils to work the Bill in the proper spirit. If we look upon it merely as an obstruction which has to be removed, as something which we have to take more or less on sufference, I am afraid we shall not make the best of the Bill at all. I want that we should go into the Councils and go before the country with our minds made up to work every part of the Bill, to seize every part of the Bill and carry it further and seize every opportunity that is placed in our hands and use it to the best advantage. In that way, I think, we shall reach our goal sooner than

the stated period of ten years even though there may not be an Act which definitely puts forward those powers as actually granted. We will have the actuality of the powers sooner even though we may not have the statutory enactments conferring the Act upon us. It is for these reasonswe feel that in this Congress and outside, the Bill should be welcomed as a step in advance to be used for further progress, and not merely turned over as one which was inadequate and which did not give all that was demanded and which in no way satisfied us or positively disaprointed us. That is why I support this amendment, and I hope that you will accept it, though I have not much hope in that way. (Applause).

Pundit Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry (Punjab) speaking in Urdu supported: the original motion.

(When Pundit Rambhaj Dutt Chcudhry was addressing the assembly, the President vacated the chair, and the Hon'ble Pundit Madan Mohan. Malaviya occupied the presidential chair for a few minutes).

#### Speech of Pandit Rambhaj Dutt Chaudhri.

Pandit Rambhaj Dutt Chaudhri (Punjab) in supporting the amendment said there was no doubt they had got very little of what they wanted. There were two courses open to them. Either they should reject what was given or accept it. If they accepted they should thank the donors. He was of opinion that they should accept what was given and struggle for more.

#### 'Speech of Mr. C. S. Ranga lyer.

Mr. C. S. Ranga Iyer (Lucknow) in supporting the amendment of Mahatma Gandhi said;—

Mr. President, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, I consider it a great privilege to support Mahatma Gandhi. The Resolution that. Mahatma Gandhi has amended is certainly of an important character, and it. is common ground between us, the party of Mr. Das and those for whom Mahatma Gandhi speaks, that the Reforms are both inadequate and unsatisfactory, but I do not consider it 'disappointing,' as they do, and if you will ask. me why, it is because I believe that Nations by themselves are made. It is. because, as Mr. Pal said in one of his Lucknow speeches, I believe that Reforms. do not come from other Nations. I did not expect even this much, ladies and gentlemen, from the British Bureaucracy. or as Mr. Pal would put it, the British Plutocracy, and as I did not expect this much I am not disappointed. 'Blessed are they who have no expectations, for they shall not be disappointed. Such being the case, I cannot understand why my distinguished friend Mr. Das should be a party to the inclusion of the word 'disappointing' in this resolution, because Mr. Pal, I remember, said at the Calcutta Congress that he would take his stand on 'Nations by themselves are made,' that every Nation, like every man, is the architect of its own fortune. Such being the case, I say it looks inconsistent to include the word 'disappointing' in this resolution.

Now coming to the other aspect, the use of the word 'co-operation.' Sir, Mr. Pal said in the speech that he delivered a little while ago, we shall co-operate with the Government when co-operation means the advancement of the common cause. I say that is exactly what Mahatma Gandhi wants, that is exactly what his amendment implies. The amendment says 'to work together for a common purpose,' to work with the Government when they are prepared to work with us. Mr. Pal will admit that Mahatma Gandhi yields to no body in India so far as obstruction to Government is concerned. When it is necessary to obstruct the Government, Mr. Gandhi will be the first man to obstruct it by means of his powerful weapon Passive Resistance and Satyagraha. (Hear, Hear).

But are you going to be untrue to your culture, to your civilization? His Majesty the King has made the Proclamation; His Majesty the King Emperor has called upon the people of India as well as the British officers in India to co-operate, and you in Congress assembled adopted unanimously a resolution expressing grateful thanks in connection with His Majesty's Proclamation. I ask you, Ladies and Gentlemen, are you going to act consistently with the resolution that you have adopted or are you going to be inconsistent? If you are going to be consistent, then you cannot adopt the resolution of Mr. Dasas it stands, unamended. It is necessary, if you are going to be consistent, to adopt the exact wording of the amendment which Mahatma Gandhihas placed before The announcement was made in connection with the Reforms question, you. and therefore there is no use saying it is the Ministerial advice that we object to, it is the Proclamation that we welcome. The Proclamation is based on Ministerial advice, and if you welcome the Proclamation, how on earth can you go and talk of the Ministerial advice. The Ministerial advice is not before us, and therefore this Congress will be unjustified, this Congress will be allowing its imagination to run riot if it is goes against the Preclamation when it has once welcomed it: And on the question of co-operation this resolution lays down that co-operation should be mutual, responsive, as Lok. Tilak said (Hear, Hear), and when co-operation ceases to be mutual, when we miss the mutuality in co-operation, I say, we will leave no stone unturned to reach the desired goal. (Hear, Hear).

#### Speech of Dr. B. Pattabhi Sitaramayya.

Dr. B. Pattabhi Sitaramayya (Masulipatam) in supporting the amendment of Mahatma Gandhi said :—

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, I rejoice to think that we are nearing a satisfactory solution of this difficult question. You may gather that by this time the truncated resolution of Mr. C.R. Das stands doomed and that we must still erect a small crest over it in order to give it a certain fulness and completion. I take it too that Babu Bepin Chandra Pal's amendment is but a feeler thrown out preliminary to its acceptance by the mover of the substantive proposition. Let me then proceed to tell you straightaway that I appear before you to support Mahatma Gandhi's amendment. We are glad that the two issues it embodies have been generally conceded by Babu Bepin Chandra Pal and that the fight now centres round words—not ideas. Accordingly, let us see whether the word 'disappointing' is appropriate. You are disappointed when your hopes are blasted or belated. Did you ever hope that you would get more than what you have got. If so, what did you base those hopes on?—on the announcement of the 20th August 1917 with its steps and stages, on the proposals of Mr. Montagu, with their checks and balances, or on the pledges and proclamations with which British rule in India has all along been punctuated? There was no hope, there is no disappoinment. I leave that there.

Then Mahatma Gandhi has been taken to task for quoting from the Royal Preclamation for using the words'New Era'. But Ladies and Gentlemen, read his amendment, and you will see that he merely quotes a passage from the Proclamation to amplify the character of the co-operation he is suggesting. You know, Ladies and Gentlemen, that Mr. Tilak has offered his 'responsive co-operation'. That is epigrammatic, and Mahatma Gandhi is only elaborating it and trying to show that the co operation is to be not one-sided but mutual. Mahatma Gandhi's 'cc-operation ' has been analysed and examined and he has been unjustly taken to task for it. Ladies and Gentlemen, please read the amendment, and you will find that he only trusts that the people and the authorities will co-operate with each other. If the latter offer co-operation, then we will co-operate. Co-operation begets co-operation, but obstruction, you may rest assured, would beget obstruction. We make no secret of it.

Lastly, I would point out that Mr. Tilak has sent a cablegram to London and to H. E. the Viceroy offering thanks and co-operation-in what capacity? Not as an individual, but as the President of his Home Rule League, and on behalf of the people of India. Now I ask, sir, if thanks and responsive co operation are to be offered in the name of the people of India, who is or who are to offer them? Is it not this Assembly, which is the accredited and admitted representative of the 312 millions of people in India that ought to do so? Where an individual does it, it is imperative that unless you choose to disown his views, we in this Congress should adopt Mahatma Gandhi's amendment. (Hear, Hear).

Mr. Chandra Bansi Sahai (Behar) spoke in Hindi, in favour of the original motion.

#### Speech of Mr, Chandar Bansi sahai.

Mr. Chandar Bansi Sahai of Bihar looked upon the whole Reform

Scheme as a huge sham or a toy. They had been given nothing under it. They wanted power over the police and C. I. D. so that a recurrence of Martial Law should become impossible, but they had not been given that. 'They could not be satisfied as long as they were not given responsible Departments. As Mr. Pal had said they would accept good things with 'thanks' and reject the rest with 'No, thanks.'

### Speech of The Hon'ble Pandit Madan Malaviya.

The Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya strongly supported Mahatma Gandhi's amendment and spoke a few words in Hindi, after which he spoke at length in English and amplified almost all the sentiments he had expressed in Hindi.

The Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya, in supporting the amendment of Mahatma Gandhi said:---

Mr. Président, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen, I come here to offer my whole-hearted support to the proposal of Mahatma Gandhi that we should remove the word 'disappointing' from the second part of clause (2) of the Resolution moved by Mr. Das, and also that we should add at the end of the Resolution as it stands the paragraph which Mahatma Gandhi has read to you. That paragraph is as follows:-"Pending", after expressing your disratisfaction with the Act that has been passed, the paragraph winds up in the only way in which it can reasonably wind up consistently with the sentiments that you have all expressed, and says "Pending such introduction of full Responsible Government, this Congress begs loyalty to respond to the sentiments expressed in the Royal Preclamation, namely, let New Era' namely the new change that is introduced, it does not mean necessarily an era of bliss and happiness as some friends imagine, 'let the era begin with a common determination among my people and my officers to work together for a common purpose and trusts that both the authorities and the people', not the people alone, 'but both the authorities and the people will co-operate so to work the reforms as to secure the earlyestablishment of full Responsible Government, and this Congress offers its warmest thanks to the Right Hon'ble Mr. E. S. Montagu for his labours in connection with them."

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, I will try to be as brief as the circumstances permit. The word 'disappointing' is used there to intensify your dissatisfaction with what has been done, because the words 'inadequate and unsatisfactory' clearly indicate that you do not accept the position that what has been done is satisfactory or that it meets the requirements of the situation. About that we are practically all of us agreed. The use of the word 'disappointing' was objected to by Mahatma Gandhi because it unnecessarily intensifies the dissatisfaction. I will not deal with it any more. It is not, I take it, I venture to say, that it is not an essential part of the proposition which has been put before you by Mahatma Gandhi (Hear, Hear) by the omission of it, but I venture to say that he only wanted to indicate that, while we were dissatisfied, while we considered that the reform proposals introduced were not adequate, we need not go to indicate a spirit of greater dissatisfaction and including something of hositility to them, but I will pass that by. The main proposition put before you is that which expresses your desire to co-operate with the authorities in making the reforms a success. I ask you, Ladies and Gentlemen, I ask my esteemed friends who have proposed this resolution and supported it, do you in fact, in truth, in reality, desire to co-operate with the authorities to make the reforms a success or do you not? Will you try to educate the electorates? Will you seek elections? Will you try to train the electorates? Will you try to educate

the electorates? Will you try to form electoral units? Will you go about to educate the people about points which are of importance to the country? Will you be elected or ask friends to elect you as members of the Council? Will you sit in the Councils as officers of Government? Will you discuss matters with them? If you do all that, will that not mean in plain simplelanguage co-operation with the authorities? (Hear, Hear). I was surprised, I should not say I was surprised, really I was amused to think that anybody should imagine when a proposition like that came from my esteemed brother Mahatma Gandhi, that he wanted to exclude the idea of obstruction or (Hear, Hear). Is there a man opposition when duty would demand it. living in the country who has offered his soul-force or whole-hearted opposition to what is considered in a greater manner than Mahatma Gandhi? Did he not offer opposition to the Rowlatt Act or to any other measure that he considered to be wrong and detrimental to the best interests of the country? Why, then, imagine that the use of the word 'co-operate' can possibly mean when it proceeds from him, a submissiveness, a desire to submit to anything that the authorities would do? He is the last man to submit to anything which he considers to be wrong. Others have been co-operating with the Government, obstructing it, offering their whole-hearted opposition, tomeasures which they considered wrong, but yet they have been co-operating with the Government. It is impossible for any of us who want to take any part in the working out of this Reforms Act to honestly say,-I do not mean any offence to any one-it is impossible for any of us to honestly say that hewill not co-operate with the authorities. Without meaning any offence, without meaning any disrespect to any one, I say it again that you will be Why not then have the fairness to say that you will cc-operating. co-operate?

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, let me give you one reason why I think. Mahatma Gandhi thought, and I agreed with him, that we should frankly say that we shall co-operate. You are not to look at the Reforms Act by itself, you have to look at the Reforms Act with the Proclamation of His Gracious Majesty, and His Majesty was not bound to issue a Proclamation. He was advised to issue it, and he accepted that advice, and he had laid particular. stress upon this desire that you should co-operate and his officers should Has he spoken to you alone? co-operate with you. No. He has told his officers that they are to act in a better manner in future. Let medraw your attention to only one or two sentences from his Proclamation. He says:--- 'In the march towards the goal, there will be need of perseverence and of mutual forbearance between all sections and races of my people in India." He knows that past reforms have not been satisfactory. In His Royal way he asks his officers and the people to build a new future, a brighter, happier future. He therefore asks his officers and his people to co-operate. He says "I trust, I rely on the leaders of the people, the Ministers of the future, to face the responsibility, to endure misrepresentation and to sacrifice much for: the common interest of the State and while retaining the confidence of the legislatures, to co-operate with my officers for the common good," mark the words 'for the common good' and not to serve the Bureaucracy as was. suggested (Hear, Hear), not to pander to the Bureaucracy when they are wrong, but to co-operate with them when they are right and when they are honestly labouring for the good of the people, as many members of the bureaucracy

have laboured in the past and will labour in the future, "to co-operate with my officers for the common good," in sinking what? Not principles, but "in sinking unessential differences and in maintaining the essential standard of a just and generous Government." Does His Majesty ask you to sacrifice principles? Does His Majesty ask you to be subservient to the bureaucracy?. The Proclamation would not have received his Royal Seal if that was the case. He asks you to co-operate for the good of your own people, and that co-operation includes, I say it, Mahatma Gandhi knows it and he would say it but he does not need say it bacause his life eloquently proves it, that co-operation in cludes the fullest, the strongest, the most unbending opposition and obstruction to the bureaucracy when they are wrong (Hear, Hear).

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, there is one other thing that I want to refer to. It was for this reason that Mahatma Gandhi introduced a reference to the Proclamation. It is fair for us to know what the conditions are. The bureaucracy is not going to be dismissed. They are still in possession of power. They are the men who will, who can, mar or make or contribute to the success or the failure of the scheme. Is it not our duty to the country to avoid all unnecessary friction, to promote good understanding howsoever and wheresoever we can, in order to promote the good of the country? That was the object of introducing this clause.

I will pass on to the next. The next point that I wish to refer to is that the Reform Act as passed does constitute a substantial step in the direction of Responsible Government. That is not in the amendment, but in order that you should appreciate the ameniment I wish to draw your attention to It is said that you would not be consistent with your Resolutions passed it. at Bombay and at Delhi it you did not use the word 'disappointing'. My friends have the courage, they have the fairness, to face the truth. At Bombay and at Delhi the Scheme was the Montagu-Chelmsford Scheme. You put for ward many amendments. You said the Grard Jommittee should ge. The Grand Committee has gone. You said the Council of State should either go or have a majority of elected members. That has been accepted. Resposibility has been introduced. Ministers will be in charge of several subjects. No doubt we have not got full provincial autonomy, but what has been given does not require minimising. It requires recognition, fair and frank recogni-Such recognition will not stand in the way of our asking for more tion. to-morrow, to-day, at this moment. I should like to ask that several of the subjects should be transferred. I should like to emphasize that there should be a Declaration of Rights to ensure that there shall be no repetition of the wicked acts which were performed in the Punjab. I should like to emphasise that in the Central Government an element of responsibility should be introduced at once. But while saying so, let us not shut our eyes to what has been done. What has been done requires recognition. Think of the present position and think of the changes that have been introduced, and you will find that there is much reason to feel grateful to Mr. Montagu and its those who have helped him. Now the greatest part of the most valuable element. in the Reform Act is the constitution of electorates. Five millions of people are to exercise the vote in electing members of Council. That itself is the biggest point in the Reform Scheme. Let us go about educating the electorate, and,

as Mr. Montagu said in his admirable speech on the third reading, 'we can widen the door much before the time contemplated in the Reform Act.'

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, that brings me also to the question of expressing our gratitude to Mr. Montagu. Do you realise what the position was before the Reform proposals were undertaken? Do you realise what the position will be now? The King has made no exaggerated estimate. of the He says in his Proclamation that the Act has now become law and Act. trusts that the elected representatives of the people will have a definite share in the Government and points the way to full Responsible Government. His Majesty does not say that it gives you even a substantial share. He knows that points the way to full Responsible Government, and he says it is a\_ definite step on the road to Responsible Government. Can anybody question it? Can apybody doubt it? If that is so, remember the difficulties which Mr. Montagu had to face. To Mr. Montagu it may not be a matter of very great satisfaction that he should receive the thanks of even the Indian National Congress when they are given after so much discussion and in this grudging spirit, but we owe it to ourselves, we owe it to our conscience. we should express our gratitude for all the earnest and honest labours Mr. Montagu has undergone in order to pilot the reforms as passed, and remember, Ladies and Gentlemen, the spirit which animated him and his colleagues was fully portrayed in his speech on the third reading to which I just referred. And what did he say there? He told you that it is not necessary that the Commission should come after ten years. It might come earlier. said he, and I hope, and I am sure you all hope, that it will come earlier. Ten years is too long a period to wait for the changes which we consider to be essential. Let us start all agitation, we have already started it in the discussion we are having for a further essential change, but let us frankly and whole-heartedly acknowledge the good that has been done. Mr-Montagu has done us real good for which India has reason to be grateful to him. Remember, he also pointed out that this was a transitional scheme. That fact has been overlooked. ' My friends, when you are down with plague. and when you are saved from it, the 'treatment has to be careful. Think of the bureaucratic domination under which you have been placed so long. We want to get out of it. Let us get the first essential condition which will enable us to get out of it. Think of the opposition which Mr. Montagu had to face, from the Provincial Governors, from the Government of India, from members of the British Cabinet, from members of the House of Commons and from a great section of the British public, and then you will appreciate what amount of gratitude we owe to him I will not dwell longer on it, because it seems to me a matter of sorrow, and I would not use a stronger expression, that instead of feeling grateful to Mr. Montagu we should be displaying such a small-minded spirit as to be discussing whether we should offer our thanks to him or not. I would not say more, but I hope that we shall all unite together heartily in expressing the debt that we owe to-Mr. Montagu.

One word more. We cannot forget Lord Sinha. I am proud of his achievement. Remember what has been done. Mr. Montagu got him appointed to the House of Lords, not a personal friendship. It was a compliment to India, and it was done in order to help India to obtain what Mr. Montagu desired, she should get. He placed Lord, Sinha there in the

÷,

midst of that conservative House of Lords. We have every reason to feel proud of the excellent manner in which he discharged the duties of his high office and won the encomiums of the House of Lords. Can we forget the earnest, anxious thought and labour which he has bestowed upon it? I am sure, though the resolution may not contain his name, he has endeared his name to us all by the services he has rendered to this country.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I will not dwell longer on the Resolution. I have said this in order to show that the amendment moved by my esteemed friend Mahatma Gandhi is absolutely sound and correct and rests on an unassailable basis, but I do not want that we should divide over such a matter (Hear, Hear). I do feel at this juncture that, when the Congress has been such a success, when the recent events have broken the hearts of so many people, when we want that our national strength should grow, it would be a calamity, it would be a misfortune, if we should divide over a question like this. Mahatma Gandhi is the last man to wish that there should be any division. He spoke to you straight and frankly with the honestest conviction because he felt it his duty to place his ideas before you. I have endeavoured in my own humble way to perform the same task, but I am sure that by this time some arrangement has been arrived at which will enable us to avoid a division. (Hear, Hear and Loud Applause.)

> (There was a pause at this stage when Pundit Malaviya went up to the President and some of the leaders and held a consultation with them for a few minutes).

After consulting the President and some of the leaders, the Hon'ble Pundit M. M. Malaviya stepped into the rostrum again and said:----

Ladies and Gentlemen. It is a matter of great satisfaction to me, and I am sure it will be to all of you (A voice:—Certainly) to know that a compromise has been arrived at (Voices:—Certainly and Hear, Hear). You know that when the matter was in the hands of Mahatma Gandhi and Lok. Tilak and Mr. Das you could not expect anything different.

Pundit Malaviya at this stage, turning to Mrs. Besant asked: Have I your permission to include your name also?

Mrs. Besant: Let me see the resolution.

Pundit Malaviya then went up to Mrs. Besant, and, the letter evidently having declined to join the compromise, returned to the rostrum and proceeded:—

Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, compromises are not always satisfactory. Each side has to give up something and that is the only basis upon which you can agree. I am sure Mahatma Gandhi did desire, as he expressed to you, to express our feelings in the language which he had used in his amendment, and there are other friends like Lok. Tilak, and Mr. Dass who desired to limit the expressions of there feelings to what they had put forward, and Mr. Pal also tried to come to a solution which might be satisfactory. But now the thing that has been agreed to contains two elements which are essential, namely a promise of co-operation and an expression of our gratitude to Mr. Montagu. I will not take up much of your time, but I will read the resolution with the proviso, which has heen agreed should be added to Mr. Das's Resolution. I am not putting the Resolution to the vote. Mrs. Besant's amendment has to be put to the vote, but I am only informing you of what happened, if I am so desired by the President, and I will formally put the two propositions before you, namely Mrs. Besant's amendment and then the main proposition. The main proposition by agreement between Mahatma Gandhi. Lok. Tilak and Mr. Das and others will stand thus:—

"Pending such introduction", this will be the fourth clause, "Pending such introduction, this Congress trusts that, so far as may be possible, the people will so work the reforms as to secure an early establishment of full Responsible Government, and this Congress offers thanks to the Right Hon'ble Mr. E. S. Montagu for his labours in connection with the reforms". (Hear, Hear).

Ladies and Gentlemen, I have done. I am sure that you will all agree that such agreement which has been arrived at expresses in substance what we wanted, and I therefore need not detain you any longer. I am sure we shall agree that it is satisfactory.

(At this stage Pundit Malaviya proceeded to speak in Hindi when Mr. Dass interrupted and said).

Mr. Das: You will add to the difficulties of the situation.

Mr. C. R. Das: Please do not add to the difficulties.....

Mr. Jinnah: Mr. President, I rise to a point of order. There is the amendment before the Assembly, It is for the delegates now to accept it or not. I say there should be no speeches, but let the question be decided . upon by the delegates, let vote be taken on it one way or the other.

Pundit Malaviya:—[was not going to make any speech. I was only going to tell them in Hindi that a speech was not necessary in view of the compromise.

#### Speech of Mr. C. R. Dass.

Mr. C. R. Das (Bengal) who, in moving the original proposition, had . reserved his right to reply, said:-

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, I want to keep you only for one minute. A compromise has been arrived at. The Hon'ble Pundit Madan Mohan Malaviya has told you that there are two points, co-operation and thanks, but so far as co-operation is concerned the view with which I have compromised it is this, that co-operation when necessary to advance our cause, but obstruction when that is necessary for the advancement of our cause (Hear, Hear). The words are simply these 'that we work the reforms so far as it may be possible, for the early establishment of full Responsible Government (Hear, Hear). We are not opposed to co-operation if co-operation helps us to attain that. We are not opposed to obstruction, plain, downright obstruction, when that helps to attain our political goal (Hear, Hear). With these words, I ask you. Ladies and Gentlemen, to accept this compromise. (Hear, Hear and loud applause).

(At this stage several delegates asked Mr. Das to read the whole resolution).

Mr. C. R. Das:—Ladies and Gentlemen, I am asked to read to you the resolution which we want you to accept. It reads thus. The three propositions which I moved this morning remain just as they are with the word 'disappointing' (Hear, Hear). At the end of those three propositions we say this:—" Pending such introduction,"—that is the introduction of complete Responsible Government,—"Pending such introduction this Congress trusts that so far as may be possible, the people will so work the reforms as to secure the early establishment of full Responsible Government; and this Congress offers its thanks to the Right Hon'ble Mr. Montagu for his labours in connection with the reforms."

This is to be added to the three proposition which stand on the agenda.

#### Speech of The Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya.

The Hon'ble Pundit Madan Mohan Malaviya:—Ladies and Gentlemen, I first put by direction of the President, the amendment of Mrs. Besant to you. "That this, Congress welcomes the Reform Act as opening the gateway of freedom to the Indian Nation and as giving her power to walk on her own feet along the, road, to Responsible Government, thus forming a substantial stage on that road, and it earnestly begs the people to take the utmost advantage of its provisions so as to reach the goal in the shortest possible time. It places also on record its gratitude to Mr. Montagu and Lord Sinha for their strenuous work against greatest difficulties, both in India and Great Britain",

The amendment was then put to the vote and lost, only a handful voting in favour of Mrs. Besant.

The compromised resolution was then put to the vote and carried.

### Resolution No. XV-Khilafat.

"This Congress respectfully protests against the hostile attitude of some of the British Ministers towards the Turkish and Khilafat question as disclosed by their utterances and most earnestly appeals to and urges upon His Majesty's Government to settle the Turkish question in accordance with the just and legitimate sentiments of Indian Mussalmans and the solemn pledges of the Prime Minister without which there will be no real contentment among the people of India."

### Speech of Babu Bepin Chandra Pal.

Babu Bepin Chandra Pal (Bengal) in proposing the resolution regarding the Khilafat question said:—

Mr. President, Brother and sister delegates. I have been asked by the Subjects Committee to place a very important resolution before you for your consideration, and as the time before us is very short, I will not detain you for any length of time. The resolution is this:—"This Congress respectfully protes is against the hostile attitude of some of the British Ministers towards the Turkish and Khilafat question as disclosed by their utterances and most, earnestly appeals to and urges upon His Majesty's Government to settle the ... Turkish question in accordance with the just and legitimate sentiments of Indian Mussalmans and the solemn pledges of the Prime Minister without which there will be no real contentment among the people of India." This, is the resolution that has been entrusted to me. The country has unanimously Hindu and Mussalman, raised its voice against any attempt by the British Bureaucracy to dismember the Turkish Empire. The resolution speaks of Mussulmans and Hindus in India. I go further. If, as I said some time ago in Calcutta, there was not a single Mahomedan in India, and if even a single Mussulman had not raised bis voice against the destruction of the integrity of the Ottoman Empire, I would have protested against it (Hear, Hear). My Mahomedan friends oppose it on religious grounds. I oppose it

on high political grounds. I oppose it in the interest of world-peace and world-freedom. It has been said that the Turk is a tyrant. Mr. Gladstone and the rest of them made or tried to make out a very strong case for the expulsion of the Ottoman from Europe on the ground of the Armenian massacres, on the ground of the oppression of the Christian subjects of Turkey by Mussulman subjects and Turkish officials. When I am reminded of it, I am reminded of another episode that happened two thousand years ago in Gallili when a woman was caught in the act of adultery. She was brought to Jesus and he was asked, "Lord, what shall we do with her"? The law says that when a woman is caught in the act of adultery she shou'd be stoned to death, and do you remember what Jesus replied? Juses said, "he who is sinless amongst you should cast the first stone." When I bear of the references to Turkish tyranny my reply is the same. He who is the sinless amongst you, England, France, Italy, and Belgium the last though not the least of it, he who is sinless among you let him cast the first stone.

I have another ground and it is this. The dismemberment of Turkey is a distinct violation of every principle for which this war was professedly fought. I have the authority of the Foreign Secretary, Secretary Lansing of the United States of America to say that 'the big powers"-mark these words, they are a commentary on the benevolent policy of the big powers,---"the big powers who sat round the peace table at Versailles have simply gone ahead and arranged the world to suit themselves. England and France particularly have got out of the treaty everything that they wanted." "England and France particularly" mark the words, this is not what I say. This was reported to the Foreign Relations Committee of the United States Senate by William Bulley and this was not contradicted by Lansing. Lansing says England and France particularly have got out of the treaty everything they wanted and the League of Nations can do nothing to alter any of the unjust clauses of the treaty except by the unanimous consent of the members of the League and the great Powers will never give their consent to changes in the interest of the weaker peoples". Now this is the policy which lies at the back of the disruption of the Ottoman Power. It is not only an attempt on the integrity of the Ottoman, but indirectly it is an attempt on I want the Ottoman Empire to remain in the integrity of Asia. Europe as a representative of Asiatic and especially Islamic culture. I want all the Mcslem Governments and Independent States between Europe and India to remain independent for their independence will bring in new hope

and inspiration of National freedom in India (Hear, Hear). I want them to remain there, because if they are eliminated from San Francisco to Burma the whole world will be brought under the benign influence of Christian diplomacy and Christian imperialism (Hear, Hear). Therefore, I say it is not merely a religious question. With my friends it is a religious question, a gital religious question. With me it is a political question, a question that involves the future of India, a question that involves the future of Asia, and a question that involves the future peace of the world (Hear, Hear). For this reason I commend this resolution to your acceptance. (Hear, Hear and Loud Applause).

Pundit Rambhaj Dut: Choudhry (Punjab) then seconded the resolution in Hindi.

#### Speech of Pandit Rambhaj Dutt Choudhry.

In seconding the resolution Pandit Rambhaj Dutt Chaudhry (Punjab) said that to a Moslem any lowering of the status of the Khalifa was worse than death, and if Moslem feelings were ignored there would be strong discontent in India. The Hindus were bound as brethren to feel for the Moslems and it was also their duty as British objects to tell the King Emperor and his Ministers that any disregard of Moslem feelings in the matter was bound to give rise to bitter discontent. What the Moslems wanted was that their holy places should not be made over to non-Moslems. The Moslems still believed that Great Britain would help them and they should not be disabused on this behalf.

Mr. Sant Dass (Sind) supported the resolution in Urdu.

#### Speech of Mr. Sant Dass.

- Mr. Sant Das (Sindh) in further supporting the resolution said he came from a Province where there were 22 lacs of Moslems out of a population of 39 lacs and he was bound to say that the feeling among them over the Khilafat question was very bitter. He had seen a meeting of 8,000 Moslems who were actually mourning, weeping and crying bitterly, and it would be the height of impolicy to ignore their feeling.

### Speech of Mr. Srish Chandra Chatterjee.

Mr. Srish Chandra Chatterjee (Bengal):-Ladies and Gentlemen, 1 cordially support the resolution so eloquently placed before you by Mr. Pal.

Pundit Gokaran Nath Misra said:—Mrs. Hasrat Mohani will address the Congress on the Khilafat question. Mrs. Hasrat Mohani then stepped into the rostrum and addressed in Urdu in support of the resolution.

### Speech of Begum Hasrat Mohani.

Begum Hasrat Mohani (wife of Maulana Hasrat Mohani) in still further supporting the resolution said that the Sultan of , Turkey was the Khalifa of Moslems and as such bound to look after and protect the holy places of Islam. The Allies had , however, decided that Constantinople which was the key to Asia should come to their hands. They professed not to interfere with the Khilafat question, and yet they went on interfering. Mr. Lloyd George, the British Prime Minister, had promised that Thracs and Asia Minor shall remain with Turkey. People had ceased to have faith in the English Ministry. She said openly that the Moslems could not telerate even an inch of the land of Jaziratul Arab, Phillistine and Mesopotamia remaining in the hands of the English. Otherwise Moslems would make it a point not to help them by joining in the army or giving any monetary help and the Hindus must sympathise with the Moslems.

(The resolution was put and carried unanimously.)

Pundit Gokaran Nath Misra:—Gentlemen, the President has now desired me to put the various resolutions which are on the agenda paper to be put from the Chair. There are two resolutions which are to be moved and seconded before the audience, but those two also will now be put from the Chair. Resolution No. 16 will stand over. That will not be put from the Chair because it deals with various contentious matters. Please come to resolution No. XVII.

#### Resolution XVII—Swadeshi.

"This Congress is of opinion that the promotion of Swadeshi movement to its utmost extent is essential for national progress and prosperity and as over 73 per cent, of the population of India is agricultural and poor, the Congress particularly recommends a revival of the ancient industry of hand-spinning and hand weaving."

(The resolution was put and carried unanimously,)

### Resolution XVIII—Exportation of Milch Cows.

The next resolution is No. XVIII Re.—Exportation of Milch Cows. "This Congress is of opinion that, in view of the serious economic danger to country caused by the exportation to foreign country of milch cows and breeding bullccks, the Government should take immediate steps to prohibit such exportation."

(This resolution was put and carried unanimously.).

# Resolution XIX—Appreciation of Labour Party's Service.

"This Congress records its grateful appreciation of the valuable services rendered by the Labour Party in and outside the Parliament through its office bearers, through its organization, its prominent members and the Daily and Weekly Press and specially Mr. Ben Spoor the accredited representative of the party in the Parliament for Indian affairs, by generally supporting the cause of self-government for India and particularly by pressing the Congress view about the Indian Political Reforms on the Joint Select Committee and on the occasion of the passage of the Government of India Bill in the Parliament, for its full sympathy with the demand for full Responsible Government in India and its generous assurance to advance it through its power and influence."

-The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

#### Resolution XX—Support of Labour Unions.

"This Congress urges its Provincial Committees and other affiliated associations to promote Labour Unions throughout the country with the view of improving social, economic and political conditions of the labouring classes and securing for them a fair standard of living and a proper place in the body politic of India."

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution XXI—Journal 'India'.

"This Congress notes with satisfaction that it has been agreed by the Board of Directors of the Journal 'India' that it shall represent the views of the Congress and refers the recommendations contained in the Report of the Congress Deputation for the extension and improvement of the said Journal to the All-India Congress Committee".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution XXII—Propaganda work abroad.

•This Congress is emphatically of opinion that the time has arrived for establishing a permanent mission for its own propagandist work in England and elsewhere; and appoints a committee of the following gentlemen to collect the necessary funds for the purpose and to select the personnel of the mission for the first year:—

1. Lok. B. G. Tilak (Convener).

2. Mr. S. Kasturi Ranga Iyengar.

3. Mr. T. Prakasam.

4. Mr. B. Chakravarty.

5. Maulana Mahommed Ali.

6. Mr. S. R. Bomanji.

7. Lala Lajpat Rai.

8. Mr. G. S. Khaparde.

9. Mr. Syed Hassan Imam.

Please note that we have added two more names, the Hon'ble Mr. K. V. Rangaswami Iyengar and Pundit Rambhuj Dutt Choudhry. The committee will now consist of all members.

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

Resolution No. XXIII—Lala Lojpat Rai's work in America.

"This Congress thankfully recognises the valuable services rendered by Lala Lajpat Rai to the cause of the country by his earnest and self-sacrificing efforts of constitutional agitation in the United States of America by representing the view of the Congress before proper authorities in America in the matter of the demand for self-Government and self-determination for India and requests Lala Lajpat Rai to continue his efforts as before."

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

#### Resolution No. XXIV—Congress Deputation.

"This Congress conveys its warmest thanks to the members of the Congress Deputation for their strenuous labours in the cause of the Congress in England".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

#### Resolution No. XXV-British Congress Committee.

'This Congress thankfully records its appreciation of the assistance given by the British Congress Committee and especially Dr. Clark, Dr. Rutherford, Mr. Halford Knight and Mr. J. M. Parikh to the Congress Deputation in its work in England and views with entire satisfaction the reorganization of the Committee as an executive body of the Congress pledged to carry on the Congress propaganda in England."

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution No. XXVI—Discontinuance of slaughte of Cows.

This will be in substitution of the printed resolution on the agenda.

"This Congress gratefully welcomes the resolution of the All-India Mcslem League recommending the discontinuance of the slaughter of cows in India on the Bakr-id festival removing as it does a cause of great offence to the universal Hindu sentiment and recognises the resolution as one of the greatest steps on the part of Indian Mussulmans towards complete unity between Hindus and Mahommedans and trusts that the Hindus will-fully reciprocate the good feelings of their Mahommedan brethren indicated by their generous resolution".

This resolution was put and carried unanimously, the whole audience standing, with cries of 'Hindu Mussulman ki jai'.

# **Resolution No.** XXVII.—Maltreatment of University and school students.

"This Congress records its condemnation of the unjust treatment meted out to University and School students in the Punjab under the direct or indirect instruction of Martial Law authorities, and hopes that immediate steps will be taken by Local Government to cancel all punishments awarded against students without trial".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution No. XXVIII—Cancellation of Indemnity.

"This Congress strongly urges that the Punjab and Bombay Governments and the Government of India should be requested to immediately cancel the orders passed under sections 15-A. and 25 A. and B. of the Police Act V. of 1861, levying certain indemnities for the injury done to person and property in various places in the Punjab and the Bombay Presidency inasmuch as these orders were inequitable and uncalled for."

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

#### Resolution No. XXIX—Ayurvedic and Unani systems of medicine.

"This Congress re-affirms the following resolution passed at the Delhi session of the Indian National Congress.

"That recognising the comparatively wide prevalence of the Ayurvedic and Unani Systems of medicine in India and their undeniable claims to usefulness, this Congress strongly recommends to the Government of India the eminent desirability of taking definite steps to secure to them the advantages vouchsafed to the western system under the present administrative policy of the Government.

That the consideration of the opinions of the Local Governments with respect to placing the indigenous systems of medicine on a satisfactory basis as revealed in the summary laid before the Imperial Legislative Council at Simla this year, should be postponed pending a thorough enquiry by a mixed committee of representative Vaidyas, Hakims, their sympathisers and experts and such other medical practitioners as may be nominated by the Government".

The resolution-was put and carried unanimously.

#### Resolution No. XXX-The Indian Press Act.

"This Congress demands the immediate repeal of the Indian Press Act".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution No. XXXI-Deportation of Mr. B. G. Horniman.

"This Congress places on record its emphatic disapproval of the wholly unjustifiable deportation of Mr. B. G. Horniman and urges on the Viceroy the immediate cancellation of the order".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

# Resolution No. XXXII—Railway Administration.

"This Congress calls upon the different Railway administrations and the Indian Railway Board to ameliorate the admitted and pressing grievances of third and intermediate class passengers throughout India and to investigate with a view to granting immediate relief the allegations regarding partiality in the regulation of the goods traffic "

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution No XXXIII—Revenue Policy of Government.

"This Corgress is of opinion that the time has arrived when the Revenue policy of the different provinces should be re-examined, and as a preliminary towards that end the Congress directs the All-India Congress Committee to investigate the systems of Revenue in vogue in different provinces and the condition of the peasantry affected by them by such agency as they may think it".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

#### Resolution No. XXXIV - Delhi, a Regulation Province.

"This Corgress re affirms the resolution No. VII passed at the 33rd Session of the Indian National Congress held at Delhi, i.e.

"That this Congress strongly recommends that Delhi should be constituted into a Regulation Province, that it should have a Legislative Council to assist the Chief Commissioner and that it should have at least --- representatives in the Legislative Assembly".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution No. XXXV-Reforms for Ajmer-Merwara.

"This Congress regrets that the recommendation made in resolution No. VIII of the last Congress on behalf of Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana has found no place in the Indian Reforms Act, and trusts that the Government of India will take necessary steps to raise its status to that of a Regulated Province in terms of para 198 of the Montagu-Chelmsford Report on Constitutional Reforms simultaneously with the reformed Councils in other parts of British India and that at least two seats on the Legi-lative Assembly be alloted to Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana out of the additional seats provided by the Joint Parliamentary Committee on the Reform Bill."

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

## Resolution No. XXXVI-Reforms for Burma.

"This Congress considers that there is no justification for the exclusion of Burma from the operation of the new Government of India Act and is of opinion that in accordance with the wishes of the people of Burma, the same reforms as applied to the major provinces should also be applied to Burma."

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

### Resolution XXXVII-Recovery of Congress Moneys.

"This Congress authorises the following gentlemen to take such action at law or otherwise as may be deemed necessary for the purpose of recovering the moneys being the balance of funds collected for purposes connected with the Congress now in the hands of divers gentlemen in different provinces.

1. The Hon'ble Mr. V. J. Patel of Bombay.

2. The Hon'ble Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra of Lucknow.

3. Dr. M. A. Ansari of Delhi.

The resclution was put and carried unanimously.

Resolution XXXVIII—Audit of Reception Committees' Accounts.

"This Congress directs the All-India Congress Committee to go into the question of the submission by the Reception Committee of each Congress Session of an Audited Report of their receipts and expenses to the All-India Congress Committee and transferring any balance left in their hands to the maid Committee".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

Resolution XXXIX—Representation of Delhi-Merwara and British Rajputana.

•This Congress resolves that the representation of the Delhi-Merwara and British Rajputana Province on the All India Congress Committee and on the Subjects Committee be raised from 5 to 6 and that 4 out of the 6 representatives should be elected by the enclave of Delhi and the remaining 2 by Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana.

That in accordance with this resolution the following changes be made in Articles XIII and XXIV of the Constitution of the Indian National Congress organization:—

- 1. In article XIII for "5 representatives of Delhi, Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana" read "6 representatives of Delhi, Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana".
- In Article XXIV for not more than 5 representatives of Delhi," Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana, read "not more than 6 representatives of Delhi, Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana".

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

## Resolution XVI.—Declaration of Rights. (Previoualy left over).

"This Congress is emphatically of opinion that in the immediate and imperative interest of this country as well as of the British Empire a statute should be forthwith passed by the Imperial Parliament to guarantee the civil rights of His Majesty's Indian subjects and embodying the following provisions:

> (1) British India is one and indivisible and all political power is inherent in the people thereof to the same extent as in any other people or nation of the British Empire.

(2) That all Indian subjects of His Majesty and all the subjects naturalised or resident in India are equal before the law, and there shall be no penal or administrative law in force in this country, whether substantive cr procedural, of a discriminative nature.

(3) That no Indian subject of His Majesty shall be liable to suffer in liberty, life, property or in respect of free speech or writing or of the right of association except under sentence by an ordinary court of Justice and as a result of lawful and open trial.

(4) That every Indian subject shall be entitled to bear arms subject to the purchase of a license as in Great Britain, and that the right shall not be taken away save by a sentence of an ordinary Court of Justice,

- (5) That the Press shall be free and that no license or security shall be demanded on the registration of a press or a newspaper.
- (6) That corporal punishment shall not be inflicted on any subject of His Majesty save under conditions applying equally to all other British subjects.
- (7) That all laws, ordinances and regulations now or hereafter in existence that are any wise inconsistent with the provisions of this statute shall be void and of no validity whatever."

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

[Note :-Clause (7) in the agenda was omitted and clause (8) stands as No. (7)].

Resolution XL—Appointment of General Secretaries. This Congress appoints as General Secretaries for 1920:—

- 1. The Hon'ble Mr, V. J. Patel.
- 2. The Hon'ble Pundit Gokaran Nath Misra, and
- 3. Dr. M. A. Ansari.

The resolution was put and carried unanimously.

#### Resolution XLI-Next Congress.

• That the next Congress do meet at Nagpur in December 1920:-

Dr. M. onjee, on behalf of Nagpur, invited the Congress to Nagpur which was received with great applause. (A delegate from the audience apparently from C. P. suggested the deletion of the word 'Nagpur' from the resolution because of the Special Congress.)

Pundit Gokarn Nath Misra then read out the names of the members of the All-India Congress Committee.

### Speech of Dewan Bahadur V. P. Madhavrao.

Dewan Bahadur V.P. Madhavrao, thanking on behalf of the delegates, Swami Shradhanad and Members of the Reception Committee said:-Mr. President, Brother Delegates, Ladies and Gentlemen. On behalf of the thousands of delegates who have assembled here from all parts of India and who have enjoyed the generous hospitality of the Reception Committee I desire to thank the Chairman and members of the Reception Committee (Hear, Hear). When blow after blow fell on the Punjab from the official hands, they thought the venue of the Congress might have to be changed, but Amritsar overcame almost insurmountable obstacles in the way and had earned the distinction of having held the most successful, the most numerously attended and epoch-making Congress. Not a little of the success was due to the indefatigable exertions of the members of the Reception Committee, and I desire to make a special montion of the selfless work of Swami .Shradhanand (Loud cheers) whose name is one to conjure with in Northern India, ably and willingly assisted by the Secretaries and officebearers and members, and in spite of the sorrow and suffering of Amritsar. Swami Shradhanand has given one more proof, if proof were needed, of India's supreme fitness for full Responsible Government. (Hear, Hear). The delegates came to Amritsar as pilgrims and return, I am sure, with a fresh determination to make India a Nation among the nations of the world. (Hear, Hear). I ask you, Brother and Sister delegates, to pass a hearty vote of thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Reception Committee. (Loud cheers). I also wish to express our cordial appreciation' of the devoted and willing services rendered by the Volunteers. (Hear, Hear). They have fully justified the high hopes we all have of the youth of India.

A hearty vote of thanks was passed to Swami Shradhanand and the members of the Reception Committee amidst prolonged and loud cheers.

Swami Shradhananda in acknowledging the thanks ra'e a lengthy speech in Hindi.

Speech of Swam! Shradhananda.

Smami Shraddha Nand Chairman of the Reception Committee then begged the guests to overlook the shortcomings of the Com-· mittee. The inclemency of weather, said he, had upset all their

arrangements. He had already been indebted to the variousprovinces for the very substantial help they had given to the people. of the Punjab. To the Punjabees the advent of the National. Assembly was a novel experience and they begged to be excused . for any mistakes they might have committed through ignorance. He assured them that their brethren of the Punjab had been heart and soul in their service. Swami Shraddha Nand then thanked the workers of the Reception Committee for the proof of immense zeal and devotion they had given, each in his own way, of the solid and untiring services they had rendered to make the session successful. To the Marwari community and to other well disposed people of Amritear he was deeply grateful for the generous spirit of hospitality with which they had spontaneously come forward to accommodate as many guests as they could with board and lodging. He particularly thanked P. Venkatesh Narain, P. Kapila Deva Malaviya and Narbada Parshed for the stupendous help they had given him on behalf. of the Allahabad Sewa Samiti in the distribution of relief in Amritsar. He appealed to those yourgmen on whom new responsibilities had fallen to work faithfully for the uplift of their country, and he doubted not victory was theirs in the end.

#### Speech of Dr. Satyapal.

Dr. Satyapal (Amritsar) said his was a pleasant duty to offer thanks on behalf of the whole of the Punjab to Pandit Motilal Nehru the worthy President of that Session of the Congress. When terror reigned supreme and when atrocities of Martial Law were in full swing, Swami Saraddhananda, Pandit Motilal Nehru and Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya had come on the scene and helped the people of the Punjab to a very great extent. But for them, not only would it have been impossible to hold the session here, but the spirit of the Punjab had been so considerably cowed down that for generations political agitation in , the Punjab would have been an unknown thing. He warmly, sincerely and profusely, thanked those gentlemen and their colleagues who worked along with them to help the distressed He also offered his thanks to Mahatma and afflicted Punjab. Gandbi for the invaluable help rendered. He thanked-Lokmanya Tilak Ji and Mrs. Besant. He once more thanked all those gentlemen for the trcuble taken by them to attend that session and to make it such a brilliant success.

The President was then garlanded. Dr. Kitchlew on behalf of the President then read out the concluding address of the President in Urdu which ran as follows:---(See Urdu supplement).

After the Urdu address was over, Dr. Kitchlew read the President's conoluding address in English which ran as follows:----

Fellow Delegates, before I say anything in reply to the flattering words, the over-generous terms, in which Dr. Satyapal and others have referred to me and my humble services in your cause, I have to apologise to you for not being able to address you myself, as I should have liked to have done, as you are aware, the loss of my voice has severely handicapped me in fulfilling my duties towards you. It has been a great sorrow to me, that on this occasion when you gave me this great opportunity of serving you, bodily infirmity should have compelled me to fall short of the ideal I had set before me. Fellow delegates, for the praises you have given me, for the kindness and the indulgence you have treated me with, for the co-operation you have shown to me; I thank you. It is due to your patriotism, your cheerful acceptance of all the suffering that a long stay in this season, in a strange city, is bound to cause, that this Congress has been the unprecedented success that even its opponents declare it to be. The number of delegates and visitors, who have this year flooked to the standard

of the Congress has beaten all previous records. Want of accommodation unfortunately made it necessary to stop the registration of delegates at an early date. It is to the great oredit of these unregistered delegates that they have recognised the necessities of the situation and have refrained from pressing this grievance out of their sense of patriotism. It is to the growing feeling of sacrifice this readiness to accept pain, that makes me hopeful and confident of the great future of our Motherland. In this Province, the holy , land of the Runjab, in the ever, memorable, year 1919, strange things have come to pass. We have seen on the side of the people the expression of a feeling of unity, a desire to act corporately, a will to do service in the common cause ir the face of tremendous rdds. Out of evil cometh good and out of , the helifine "grater, which this fair land has passed buy b then forged the iron bouds of unity which its enemies will try in vain to break. The union among the various communities of this great country, which our greatest men and women have been trying to bring about, is at last an accomplished fact and, God willing, will never again be broken. Our Mahommedan brothers in the Muslim League assembled have generously, I may say nobly, adopted a resolution calling upon their co-religionists to abandon the sacrifice of cows at the Bakrid festival, which has been in the past a fruitful source of trouble and have thus advaned the cause very substantially. The first fruits of the union are already, visible on the horisone. The rest will follow in quick succession if only we take care to concentrate ourselves on that. Duty must be done for duty's sake, The fruits will take care of themselves. Fellow Belegates, the outstanding feature of this session has been the great discussion which you have witnessed in the open Congress to day, a feature which has been conspicuous by its absence in our, past deliberations. The disac vantages and the inconvenieces which this procedure entails in the existing state of our constitution-are obvicus enough, but the spirit which lies behind , these differences, of cpinion is one to rejuice at, showing Jas it does how every individual among us is becoming more and more keen in the causes of our beloved country, and, what is more, how each one of us, while not forsaking his individual opinions and beliefs, is yet willing to work in co-repristion with the others in this great assembly for the good of the country. I quite egree with Mrs. Besant that I this is the true spirit of demccracy which as it grows may ultimately necessitate some changes in our Constitution, the practical inconveniences of which have been partially brought home to you today. To Swami Shradhanand, the Chairman of the Reception Committee and the members of the Committee and the many volunteers, I offer my greatest thanks, in which I feel sure you will all join with me. Under Swamiji's guidance they have laboured assiduously and have greatly contributed to the unique success of this Congress. Fellow delegates, the work that lies before us the spreaching of this spirit of organized lemocracy, which I have spoken throughout the length and breadth of this country, until not an individual is left without an active desire to do his share in the great work of the uplift of this great and aboient land. It is for you to carry, the message of hope in every 'nook and corner, for, in spite of the atmosphere of gloom that has surrounded us in this dity of martyrdom, I see a very bright prospect before us. Oh this New Years' day, let us, make this sacred resolve. Hard work is needed, but I am confident that each and every one of us will it his very best with a single-minded

devotion to the cause of the country that is so dear to us. In this confident hope I bid you farewell and trust we shall meet again under happier auspices. Fellow delegates, I once again thank you for the courtesy that you have extended to me and all the kindness you have shown me.

# APPENDIX "A.

# Resolutions of the 34th Session of the Indian National Congress held at Amritsar on the 29th, 30th and 31st December 1919, and 1st January 1920.

I.—This Congress tenders its respectful thanks to His Majesty the King Emperor for His Gracious Proclamation dated the 23rd of December, 1919, and welcomes the announcement that His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, will visit India next winter and assures him of a warm reception by the people of this country.

## Passed unanimously.

II —(1) This Congress protests against the attempt being made in South Africa and particularly the Transvaal to deprive the Indian settlers of the rights of property and trade hitherto enjoyed by them, and trusts that the Government of India will secure the repeal of the recently enacted legislation and otherwise ensure the protection of the status of the Indian settlers in South Africa.

(2) This Congress is of opinion that the anti-Indian agitation now going on in East Africa is utterly unscrupulous and trusts that the Government of India will safeguard the right of free and unrestricted emigration from India to East Africa and the full civil and political rights of the Indian settlers in East Africa including the East African territory conquered from Germany.

#### Passed unanimously.

III.—This Congress views with grateful satisfaction the Viceregal declaration that the existing indentures in Fiji are likely to be cancelled at the end of the current year, and hopes that a final declaration to that effect will be made by the Government of India before the end of the year and this Congress further hopes that indentured emigration in any form whatsoever whether under the same or another name will never be renewed.

(2) This Congress places on record its grateful appreciation of the valuable and selfless services rendered by Mr. C. F. Andrews to the afflicted in the Punjab, to the cause of indentured Indians in Fiji and elsewhere and the services being rendered to the Indian settlers in East and South Africa.

#### Passed unanimously.

IV.—That, having regard to the correspondence between His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab and the Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya and Mahatma M. K. Gandhi, and between Lord Hunter and the Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya, this Congress is of opinion that H. H. the Lieutenant-Governor's action is not permitting even a few of the Punjab leaders undergoing imprisonment to attend and sit in the Committee room even as prisoners under custody to assist and instruct Counsel in the same manner as the Government Counsel was instructed by the officials whose conduct was under investigation of the Disorders Inquiry Committee, constitutes a serious injustice and that it left no other course open to the Sub-Committee of the Congress to take than the one taken by it; this Congress therefore endorses and approves of the firm and dignified action taken by he Sub-Committee and its appointing Committee to make an investigation

and submit a report.

#### Passed unanimously.

V.—This Congress while fully recognizing the grave provocation that led to a sudden outburst of mob frenzy, deeply regrets and condemus the excesses committed in certain parts of the Punjab and Gujerat resulting in the loss of lives and injury to person and property during the month of April last.

#### Carried by a large majority.

VI.—That, in view of the fact that neither the Hunter Committee nor the Congress Commission has finished its examination of witnesses and issued its report, this Congress, while expressing its horror and indignation at the revelations already made and condemnation of the atocities admitted, refrains from urging any definite steps to be taken against the offenders; yet, having regard to the cold-blooded, calculated massacre of innocent men and children, an act without parallel in modern times, it urges upon the Government of India and the Secretary of State that, as a preliminary to legal proceedings being taken, against him, General Dyer should be immediately relieved of his:command.

Resolved further that this Congress desires to place it on record that in its opinion the Government of India and the Punjab Government must in any event be held responsible for the inexcusable delay in placing an authoritative statement of the massacre of the Jallianwala Bagh before the public and His Majesty's Government.

#### Passed unanimously.

VII.—In view of the oppressive regime of Sir Michael O'Dwyer in the Punjab and the admitted fact brought out before Hunter Committee, that he approved of and endorsed General Dyer's massacre at the Jallianwala "Bagh, this Congress calls upon His Majesty's Government to relieve Sir Michael O'Dwyer of his present duties in this country as a member of the Army Commission, as a preliminary to necessary legal action being taken against him.

## Pessed unanimously.

VIII.—That this Congress places on record its grateful appreciation of the action taken by Sir Sankaran Nair in resigning his office as member of the Executive Council of the Governor-General of India, as a protest against the policy pursued by the Government of India and the Government of the Punjab in promulgating and muintaining Martial Law administration in the Punjab in supersession of the ordinary Courts of Justice in the Province.

Passed unanimously.

IX.—(1) This Congress offers its respectful condolence to the relatives of those persons whether English or Indian who were killed, and sympathy to those who were wounded or incapacitated during the April disturbances. (2) This Congress further resolves that the site known as Jallianwaia Bagh in Amritsar be acquired for the Nation and be registered in the names of the Hon'ble Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya and the Hon'ble Pandit Moti Lal Nehru as trustees, and that it be used as a memorial to perpetuate the memory of those who were killed or wounded on the 13th day of April . • last during the massacre by General Dyer, and in order to give effect to the intention of the Congress the following are appointed a Committee:---

3. Mahatma M. K. Gandhi.

with power to add to the number, to devise the best method of perpetuating the memory of the dead, to have a proper scheme of Trust prepared and to collect subscriptions for the purpose and otherwise to carry out the object of the Trust.

#### Passed unanimously.

X.—This Congress is of opinion that it is impossible to have real peace in India until the legislation popularly known as the Rowlatt Act which was passed in the face of unanimous opposition in the country is repealed, and it therefore respectfully urges upon the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of S ate for India to advise His Majesty to veto the said Act or otherwise to secure its repeal.

#### Passed unanimously.

XI—This Congress enters its emphatic protest against the action of the Government of India in prematurely passing the Indemnity Bill even though the acts in respect of which Indemnity was granted were to be the subject of investigation by an official inquiry, and in spite of the strong opposition by the Press, numerous public budies and the non-official members of the Imperial Legislative Council.

#### Passed unanimously.

XII—In view of the fact that full effect has not yet been given to the general amnesty clause of the Gracious Proclamation of His Majesty the King Emperor and that the persons in the Punjab tried by the Martial Law Commissioners, the Summary Courts, the Area officers and the tribunals constituted under the Defence of India Act, and the detenues, deportees and all political prisoners in Bengal and other parts of India including the Andamans have not been released, this Congress expresses the earnest hope and trusts that the fullest effect will immediately be given to the letter and spirit of Royal -Command.

Passed unanimpusty.

XIII—In view of the fact that Lord Chelmsford has completely forfeited the confidence of the people of this country, this Congress humbly beseeches His Imperial Majesty to be graciously pleased immediately to recall His Excellency,

#### Passed unanimously.

XIV-(a) That this Congress reiterates its declariton of last year that India is fit for full Responsible Government and repudiates all assumptions and assertions to the contrary wherever made.

(b) That this Congress adheres to the resolutions passed at the Delhi Congress regarding Constitutional Reforms and is of opinion that the Reforms Act is inadequate, unsatisfactory and disappointing.

(c) That this Congress further urges that Parliament should take early steps to establish full Responsible Government in India in accordance with the principle of Self-Determination.

(d) Pending such introduction this Congress trusts that so far as may be possible the people will so work the Reforms as to secure an early establishment of full Respensible Government, and this Congress offers its thanks to the Right Hon'ble E.S. Montagu for his labours in connection with the Reforms.

## Passed unanimously.

XV-This Congress respectfully protests against the hostile attitude of some of the British Ministers towards the Turkish and Khilafat question as disclosed by their utterances and most earnestly appeals to and urges upon His Majesty's Government to settle the Turkish question in accordance with the just and legitimate sentiments of Indian Mussalmans and the solemn pledges of the Prime Minister without which there will be no real contentment among the people of India.

## Passed unanimously.

XVI—This Congress is emphatically of opinion that in the immediate and imperative interest of this country as well as of the whole Britsh Empire a Statute should be forthwith passed by the Imperial Parliament to guarantee the civil rights of His Majesty's Indian subjects and embodying the following provisions:—

(1)—British India is one and indivisible and all political power is inherent in the people thereof to the same extent as in any other people or nation of the British Empire.

(2)—That all Indian subjects of His Majesty and all the subjects naturalised or resident in India are equal before the law, and there shall be no penal or administrative law in force in this country, whether substantive or procedural, of a discriminative nature.

(3)—That no Indian subject of His Majesty shall be liable to suffer in liberty, life, property or in respect of free speech or writing or of the right of association, except under sentence by an ordinary Court of Justice and as a result of lawful and open trial.

. .

(4)—That every Indian ubject shall be entitled to bear arms subject to the purchase of a license as in Great Britain, and that the right shall not taken away save by a sentence of an ordinary Court of Justice.

(5)—That the Press free and that no license or security shall be demanded on the registration a press or a newspaper.

(6)—That corporal punishment shall not be inflicted on any subject of His Majesty save under conditions' applying equily to all other British subjects,

(7)-That all laws, ordinances and regulations now or hereafter in existence, that are any wise inconsistent with the provisions of this Statute shall be void and of no validity whatever.

## Passed unanimously.

XVII—This Congress is of opinion that the promotion of Swadeshi movement to its utmost extent is essential for national progress and prosperity and as over 73 per cent, of the population of India is agricultural and poor, the Congress particularly recommends a revival of the ancient industry of hand-spinning and hand weaving.

#### Passed unanimously.

X11—This Congress is of opinion that, in view of the serious economic danger to the country caused by the exportation to foreign countries of milch cows and breeding bullocks, the Government should take immediate steps to prohibit such exportation.

#### Passed unanimously.

XIX—This Congress records its grateful appreciation of the valuable services rendered by the Labour Party in and outside the Parliament through its office bearers, through its organization, its prominent members and the Daily and Weekly Press and specially Mr. Ben Spoor the accredited representative of the party in the Parliament for Indian affairs, by generally supporting the cause of self-government for India and particularly by pressing the Congress view about the Indian Political Reforms on the Joint Select Committee and on the occasion of the passage of the Government of India Bill in the Parliament, for its full sympathy with the demand for full Responsible Government in India and its generous assurance to advance it through its power and influence.

#### Passed unanimously.

XX—This Congress urges its Provincial Committees and other affiliated associations to promote Labour Unions throughout the country with the view of improving social, economic and political conditions of the labouring classes and securing for them a fair standard of living and a proper place in the body politic of India."

#### Passed unanimously.

XXI.—This Congress notes with satisfaction that it has been agreed by the Board of Directors of the Journal 'India' that it shall represent the views of the Congress and refers the recommendations contained in the Report of the Congress Deputation for the extension and improvement of the said Journal to the All-India Congress Committee.

#### Passed unanimously.

XXII—This Congress is emphatically of opinion that the time has arrived for establishing a permanent mission for its own propagandist work in England and elsewhere; and appoints a committee of the following gentlemen to collect the necessary funds for the purpose and to select the personnel of the mission for the first year:—

XXIII—This Congress thankfully recognises the valuable services rendered by Lala Lejpat Rai to the cause of the country by his earnest and selfsacrificing efforts of constitutional agitation in the United States of America by represent ng the view of the Corgress before proper authorities in America in the matter of the demand for self-Government and self-determination for India and requests Lala Lajpat Rai to continue his efforts as before.

Passed unanimously.

XXIV—This Congress conveys its warmest thanks to the members of the Corgress Deputation for their strenuous labours in the cause of the Congress in England".

Passed unanimously.

XXV—This Congress thankfully records its appreciation of the assistance given by the British Congress Committee and especially Dr. Clark, Dr. Rutherford. Mr. Halford Knight and Mr. J. M. Parikh to the Congress Deputation in its work in England and views with entire satisfaction the reorganization of the Committee as an expucutive body of the Congress pledged to carry on the Congress propaganda in England.

#### Passed unanimously.

XXVI-This Congress gratefully welcomes the resolution of the All-India Mcslem League recommending the discontinuance of the slaughter of cows in India on the Bakr id festival removing as it does a cause of great offence to the universal Hindu sentiment and recognises the resolution as one of the greatest steps on the part of Indian Mussulmans towards complete unity between Hindus and Mahommedans and trusts that the Hindus will fully reciprecate the good feelings of their Mahemmedan brethren indicated by their generous resolution. XXVI:—This Congress records its condemnation of the unjust treatment meted out to University and School students in the Punjab under the direct or indirect instruction of Martial Law authorities, and hopes that immediate steps will be taken by Lccal Government to cancel all punishments awarded against students without trial.

#### Passed unanimously.

XXVIII—This Congress strongly urges that the Punjab and Bombay Governments and the Government of India should be requested to immediately cancel the orders passed under sections 15 A. and 25 A. and B. of the Police Act V of 1861, levying certain indemnities for the injury done to person and property in various places in the Punjab and the Bombay Fresidency inasmuch as these orders were inequitable and uncalled for.

#### Passed unanimously.

XXIX—This Congress re-affirms the following' resolution passed at the Delhi session of the Indian National Congress.

"That recognising the comparatively wide prevalence of the Ayurvedic and Unani Systems of medicine in India and their undeniable claims to usefulness, this Congress strongly recommends to the Government of India the eminent desirability of taking definite steps to secure to them the advantages vouchsafed to the western system under the present administrative policy of the Government.

That the consideration of the opinions of the Local Governments with respect to placing the indigenous systems of medicine on a satisfactory basis as revealed in the summary laid before the Imperial Legislative Council at Simla this year, should be postponed pending a thorough enquiry by a mixed committee of representative Vaidyas, Hakims, their sympathisers and experts and such other medical practitioners as may be nominated by the Government".

#### Passed unanimously.

XXX—This Congress demands the immediate repeal of the Indian Press Act".

## Possed unanimously

XXXI—This Congress places on record its emphatic disapproval of the wholly unjustifiable deportation of Mr. B. G. Horniman and urges on the Viceroy the immediate cancellation of the order.

Passed unanimously.

Passed unanimovsly.

XXXII—This Congress calls upon the different Railway administrations and the Indian Railway Board to ameliorate the admitted and pressing grievarces of third and intermediate class passengers throughout India and to investigate with a view to granting immediate relief the allegations regarding, partiality in the regulation of the goods traffic. XXXIII—This Congress is of opinion that the time has arrived when the Revenue policy of the different provinces should be re-examined, and as a preliminary towards that end the Congress directs the All-India Congress Committee to investigate the systems of Revenue in vogue in different provinces and the condition of the peasantry affected by them by such agency as they may think it.

## Passed unanimously.

XXXIV-This Congress re-affirms the resolution No. VII passed at the 33rd Session of the Indian National Congress held at Delhi, i.e.

"That this Congress strongly recommends that Delhi should be constituted into a Regulation Province, that it should have a Legislative Council to assist the Chief Commissioner and that it should have at least two representatives in the Legislative Assembly.

## Passed unanimously.

XXXV - This Congress regrets that the recommendation made in resolution No. VIII of the last Congress on behalf of Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana has found no place in the Indian Reforms Act, and trusts that the Government of India will take necessary steps to raise its status to that of a Regulated Province in terms of para 198 of the Montagu-Chelmsford Report on Constitutional Reforms simultaneously with the reformed Councils in other parts of British India and that at least two seats on the Legislative Assembly be alloted to Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana out of the additional seats provided by the Joint Parliamentary Committee on the Reform Bill.

#### Passed unanimously.

XXXVI—This Congress considers that there is no justification for the exclusion of Burma from the operation of the new Government of India Act and is of opinion that in accordance with the wishes of the people of Burma, the same reforms as applied to the major provinces should also be applied to Burma.

#### Passed unanimously.

XXXVII—This Congress authorises the following gentlemen to take such action at law or otherwise as may be deemed necessary for the purpose of recovering the moneys being the balance of funds collected for purposes connected with the Congress now in the hands of divers gentlemen in different provinces.

, XXIX—This Congress resolves that the representation of the Delhi-Merwara and British Rajputana Province on the All-India Congress Committee and on the Subjects Committee be raised from 5 to 6 and that 4 out of the 6 representatives should be elected by the enclave of Delhi and the remaining 2 by Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana.

That in accordance with this resolution the following changes be made in Articles XIII and XXIV of the Constitution of the Indian National Congress organization:—

- 1. In article XIII for "5 representatives of Delhi, Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana" read "6 representatives of Delhi, Ajmer-\* Merwara and British Rajputana".
- In Article XXIV for not more than 5 representatives of Delhi, Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana, read "not more than 6 representatives of Delhi, Ajmer-Merwara and British Rajputana.

1. Delegates' lists are incomplete. Declaration forms from a large number of delegates have not been collected.

2. Some furniture, Pandal material and other miscellaneous articles still remain to be sold.

3. It has been brought to my notice that Mr. Hansraj Bhandari, Bar-at-Law of Rawalpindi and Mr. Mukanda Lal Vakil of Firozpur still owe some money for collections made by them for the Reception Committee but no correspondence with the former is traceable in the office.

4. The following accounts remain unsettled :---

(1) Messrs Bond Bros. for the construction of Pandal.

(2) Messrs, Hari Ram & Bros, Paper Merchants, for supply of paper etc.

(3) Amount due to All India Congress Committee for their share of the sale proceeds of combined Reception Committee and delegate tickets.

5 Out of the sum of Rs 400/-/- shown as paid to Auditor in the income and expenditure statement Rs. 250/-/- have not yet been paid and consequently cash balance in hand is Rs. 1247/9/5. This sum of Rs. 250/- should also be included as a liability in balance sheet.
