SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the Administration of the Local Boards in the Northern Division for the year 1896-97 together with the following statistical returns compiled in my office in the prescribed form:—

2. I also append the reports, as per margin, submitted by the Collectors and Presidents of the different Boards.

STATEMENT NO. I.

3. The area remained unchanged during the year. The population has been shown according to the Imperial Census of 1891.

4. No change was made in the number and constitution of the Boards, which stood the same as last year, viz. 6 District Boards and 40 Taluka Boards, the former being presided over by the Collector of the District, and the latter by the Assistant or Deputy Collector in charge of the taluka. The elective franchise has been conferred upon all the Local Boards in the Division except those in the Panch Mahals, owing to the backward condition of that district.

5. Of the total number of members on the Boards, 11 are *ex-officio*, 391 nominated and 328 elected. Of these, 183 were officials and 542 non-officials against 191 officials and 539 non-officials. The proportion of Europeans and Natives remained the same, viz., 39 Europeans and Eurasians and 691 Natives.

6. The triennial term of the Local Boards in the Broach District having expired on the 31st March 1897, they were reconstituted during the year under report. The interest evinced in the election of members may be judged from the figures given in the following table:—

7. It will be seen that there was more interest taken among competitors in seeking for seats, than among the electors in returning them. This is on account of the local importance which in some degree attaches itself to a member of the Board. In the Broach Taluka there were no less than 30 candidates for 6 seats, but the proportion of electors who came to the poll (27·2 per cent.) is disappointing, although it compares favourably with the last election, when the percentage of voters was 17·0.

8. The following table shows the number of meetings held in each district, the number of official and non-official members on the Boards and the average attendance :—

9. The number of meetings held by the several Boards was 201 during the year against 229 in the preceding year.

The decrease of 28 meetings is distributed over all the districts in the Division. The average attendance of the non-official members shows a slight improvement in all the districts except Kaira and Thána, where there is a decline. There has also been a decline in the total average attendance in Kaira and Thána, but in the other districts it has improved more or less. In Gogha, the average attendance of all the members was 5·3, *i.e.* less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the members required to form a quorum. This apparent anomaly is explained to be due to the inclusion of 2 meetings adjourned for want of a quorum. It is not always the practice to record the attendance at meetings which cannot do business for want of a quorum, but this should certainly be done, for a member has a right to have his attendance registered whether there is a quorum or not. The inclusion of these meetings would bring to notice the waste of time and delay caused by the failure of members to attend regularly. The Taluka Local Boards of Parántij, Nadiád, Jambusar, Chorási, Sálsette, Váda, Kalyán, Máhim and Bhiwndi held less than 4 meetings during the year. The explanation furnished is that in many cases business is transacted by circulating papers under Section 34 of the Local Boards Act among members instead of convening meetings, and that it was not necessary to hold more meetings. The attention of the Boards will, however, be drawn to the advisability of holding at least 4 meetings.

10. The District Local Boards held 19 meetings against 18 last year. The number of meetings and the average attendance were as per margin. There has been a general falling off in the attendance of members, especially in Thána and Kaira. The orders regarding the holding of half-yearly meetings were complied with in all districts.

#### STATEMENT NO. II.

11. The total income of the several Local Boards amounted to Rs. 12,83,468-1-5 against Rs. 14,27,355-2-5 last year; showing a decrease

of Rs. 1,43,887-1-0. Adding to the total income the balance of Rs. 7,63,500-1-10 at the commencement of the year, the sum available for expenditure during the year was Rs. 20,16,968-3-3 against Rs. 21,31,507-9-0 in the preceding year.

13. VI.—*Provincial Rates.*—The realizations under this head, which constitute the principal source of income of the Local Boards, are derived from the net proceeds of the one-anna cess levied under the Bombay Local Fund Acts of 1869 and 1884. 14. As compared with the previous year there is a decrease of Rs. 1,44,318-5-9. The decrease is contributed by all the districts. The largest contributor is Broach, where the decrease amounts to Rs. 1,27,035-8-9, which is due to no deferred instalments of land revenue having been realized as in the previous year. In Surat (Rs. 12,637-15-3) and Ahmedabad (Rs. 2,395-12-3) the decrease is attributed to no arrears of land revenue having been recovered during the year as in the past year. In Surat it is also explained that no instalments of the revenue demand were paid in advance in consequence of the unfavourable season. In Thána the decrease of Rs. 1,280-7-9 is stated to be due to the fact that a portion of land revenue due in the year was recovered after the close of the year. In the Panch Maháls the decrease is said to be due to a slight fall in the revenue demand. In Kaira the decrease is very small and calls for no remark.

15. XIX.—*Education.*—There is an increase of Rs. 2,042-3-4 in the income under this head as compared with the preceding year. The chief contributor is Ahmedabad, where the increase amounts to Rs. 1,540-1-8 and is stated to be due to the contribution towards a school for 1895-96 having been received during the year under report. The increase in the other districts is very small and calls for no explanation.

16. *XX—Medical.*—The total receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 9,080-1-11, showing a decrease of Rs. 3,498-7-6. The decrease occurs chiefly in Broach, where the sale-proceeds of a Government promissory note belonging to a dispensary were credited under this head in the previous year, whereas no such sale was effected during the year under report.

17. *XXXII—Civil Works.*—The principal items credited to this head are receipts from ferries and tolls on roads, and contributions from private persons. The total income amounted to Rs. 1,80,231-15-8 against Rs. 2,04,847-14-4 in the preceding year and exhibits a decrease of Rs. 24,615-14-8, which is chiefly due to smaller contributions and to a decrease in the realizations from ferries and tolls.

18. *Toll Collections.*—The receipts under this sub-head amounted to Rs. 1,34,559-12-3 against Rs. 1,47,883-15-4, showing a decrease of Rs. 13,324-3-1. All the districts except Ahmedabad share in the decrease, but Thána is the largest contributor. In Broach and Thána it is attributed to smaller bids received from the contractors, and in Kaira, Panch Maháls and Surat to a falling off in the receipts. In Surat the falling off is attributed to decreased traffic on account of the plague, as the villagers were chary of admitting outsiders into their villages.

19. *XXXII.—Civil Works—Miscellaneous.*—The receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 6,980-9-5 showing an increase of Rs. 6,124-9-2 due to the sale-proceeds of trees, grass, &c., which were hitherto credited to I—Land Revenue, having been transferred to this head under Government Resolution No. 5130, dated 22nd September 1897.

20. *Contributions under XXXII Civil Works.*—The decrease (Rs. 17,308 4-6) under "Contributions" occurs chiefly in Ahmedabad and Surat, and is due to the receipt of smaller contributions from private individuals.

21. *Contributions.*—The increase under this head amounts to Rs. 32,734-9-10 and is contributed by all the districts except Kaira. It is due to increased Government grants for water-supply, village sanitation and school buildings and to larger receipts from fees for permission to quarry.

24. *Cattle-pound Receipts.*—The receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 23,258-10-2 against Rs. 24,209-4-0 in the preceding year. The decrease of Rs. 950-9-10 is due to a smaller number of cattle having been impounded.

*Debt.*—The total amount of debt amounts to Rs. 2,611 against Rs. 1,558-12-7 last year, and is due to a larger sum having been received in Surat on account of deposits.

The large decrease in Broach as compared with last year is due to the recovery, in the preceding year, of the land-revenue instalments due in 1894-95 as noted in last year's report.

26. The total expenditure amounted to Rs. 13,37,433-15-5 as against Rs. 13,71,307-7-2 in the preceding year, and exhibits a decrease of Rs. 33,873-7-9. The following table shows the principal items of expenditure as compared with the previous year :—

27. *Administration.*—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 33,397-2-9 or Rs. 4,044-0-8 less than that incurred in the previous year. The expenditure under this head includes, as usual, charges on account of establishments entertained by the several Local Boards under Section 38 of the Local Boards Act, as also the pay and allowances of clerks employed on Local Fund work in the offices of the Divisional Commissioner, the Collectors, the Accountant General and the Educational Inspectors. The largest decrease amounting to Rs. 3,358-1-2 occurs in the Thána District and is due to the contributions for two years on account of the establishments entertained in the Collector's and Commissioner's Office having been debited in the preceding year. The decrease in the other districts is small and calls for no explanation.

28. *Education*.—The total expenditure under this head (Rs. 4,25,342-14-6) exceeded that of the previous year (Rs. 4,12,508-9-6) by Rs. 12,834-5-0. The details of expenditure are given below :—

The increase is distributed over all the districts except the Panch Maháls, where there is a decrease of Rs. 17-10-6 only. The chief contributors are Ahmedabad, Kaira, Broach and Surat, and the increase is due to the pay of the trained teachers being raised in accordance with the orders of Government, and to the number of teachers in Kaira and Surat having been increased. The increase in Thána is small.

The net increase of Rs. 2,248-12-8 is distributed over all the districts except Ahmedabad, Kaira and Thána. The chief contributors are Broach and Surat. In Surat it is partly due to expenditure (Rs. 1,628) incurred on account of the Bubonic Plague and partly to the fact that in some dispensaries more medicines were indented for than ordinarily. In Broach it is explained to be due to the travelling dispensaries opened during the year. In Panch Maháls the increase is due to account adjustments. The decrease under this head in Ahmedabad, Kaira and Thána is trifling and calls for no remark.

The increase of Rs. 929-11-6 is principally due to the contributions made by the Ahmedabad and Kaira Local Boards to the veterinary hospitals and to the charges incurred in Broach for medicines supplied to several talukas to prevent the spread of cattle-disease.

31. *Stationery and Printing*.—The expenditure under this head includes charges for stationery purchased for office use and printing forms, &c. The

total amount expended during the year is Rs. 2,812-12-9 against Rs. 3,238-12-10, showing a decrease of Rs. 426-0-1. The decrease chiefly occurs in Thána, where less expenditure was incurred on account of printing charges.

32. *Miscellaneous.*—The charges on account of dharmshála and staging bungalow establishments, petty establishments maintained by Local Boards and contributions to Municipalities under Section 47 of the Local Boards Act are included under this head. The expenditure rose to Rs. 19,699-13-8 from Rs. 14,353-10-6 last year. The increase of Rs. 5,346-3-2 occurs mainly in Ahmedabad and Broach. In Ahmedabad (Rs. 4,621-6-6) it is due to a larger amount having to be paid to the Ahmedabad Municipality under Section 47 of the Act. In Broach the increase is nominal and is due to account adjustments made by the Accountant General last year.

33. The charges on account of petty establishments shown under this head amount to Rs. 9,314-9-0, out of which Rs. 3,855-12-8 were spent on account of the pay and contingencies of establishments entertained to watch and clean staging bungalows, dharmshálas, &c., in charge of Local Boards. The remaining sum of Rs. 5,458-12-8 was expended as detailed below:—

In this district also there seems a tendency to spend money on new roads which the Board will not be able to keep in repair.

38. The expenditure under the head water-works and water-supply amounted to Rs. 1,96,900-1-9 against Rs. 1,79,492-13-8 in the preceding year. The details of the works carried out are contained in Statement No. IV.

39. *Contributions to other Boards.*—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 14,590-8-11 as compared with Rs. 6,913-11-9 in the preceding year. The net increase of Rs. 7,676-13-2 is contributed by all the districts and is partly due to the contributions towards village sanitation in Ahmedabad, Broach, Surat and Thána having been credited under this head. In the Panch Maháls a special grant of Rs. 2,000 was made to the Godhra Municipality towards the construction of a dharmshála, and in Surat Rs. 2,000 were paid as the first instalment of the sum of Rs. 10,000 which the Board has agreed to contribute to the Broach District Local Board towards the reconstruction of a bridge over the Kim river: *vide* Government Resolution No. 4484, dated 9th October 1896.

40. *Debt.*—The expenditure under this head has risen to Rs. 30,756-13-6 from Rs. 29,986-1-9 in the past year. The increase is due to the repayment of deposits made by contractors. The last instalment of the Hope Bridge loan in Surat was paid during the year under report, and it is satisfactory to note that this long-standing debt has now been completely liquidated.

41. *Interest on Debt.*—This item represents the amount of interest paid by the Local Boards of Ahmedabad and Surat on the balance of loans advanced to them.

42. *Balance.*—The actual balance at the end of the year was Rs. 7,09,534-3-10 against Rs. 7,63,500-1-10 at the end of the previous year. The balances at the credit of the several Local Boards are as under :—

The closing balances in Ahmedabad, Broach and Surat show a reduction, especially in Broach; but in Kaira, Panch Maháls and Thána they are larger than those of the previous year. In all the districts, the balances exceed the

minimum fixed by Government in their Resolution No. 107, dated 8th January 1896. In order to enable me to see that balances are not unnecessarily accumulated, and the wishes of Government complied with as far as possible, I have issued a circular to the Collectors in the Division, inviting their particular attention to the subject, and calling for a report, by the 10th January in each year, showing the balance expected to remain unutilized on the 31st March following.

45. The above table shows that out of the total expenditure of Rs. 1,96,900-1-9 on water-supply, Rs. 44,111-12-1 were spent on 81 new tanks and Rs. 79,018-12-5 on 291 new wells. The expenditure on improving existing sources of water-supply amounted to Rs. 73,769-9-3. Rs. 292-6-7 were spent in the Surat District on sanitary arrangements at the Bodhan Fair held on account of the Sinhast year and Rs. 144-11-6 were spent in providing lamps on the road from Jalálpor to the Navsári Railway Station for the convenience of the rural population. Rs. 504-5-0 were spent in the Thána District on conservancy of towns and villages. In the Ahmedabad, Panch Maháls and Thána districts

Rs. 106-13-8 were spent on improving village sites. Although the expenditure on village sanitation is small, a good deal of steady work is being done in the rural tracts under the directions of the District officers in removing prickly-pear and improving the sanitary condition of the villages for which no charges have had to be paid by the Boards. As usual, much attention has been devoted to the destruction of rank vegetation and removal of manure heaps from the vicinity of the sources of water-supply and other objectionable places.

46. As required by Government Resolution No. 779, dated 30th January 1890, I submit herewith the notes of the several Executive Engineers in the Division, showing the original cost, mileage and the present condition of the Local Fund roads in their respective charges.

47. The following is a brief summary of the working, in the several districts, of Rule 2 of the Local Boards' Rules as to the appointment of a works committee for the inspection of works in progress. In Ahmedabad all the Taluka Local Boards except Modasa have appointed works committees consisting mostly of non-official members who are reported to have discharged their duty satisfactorily. In some cases the terms of these committees expire with those of the Boards and in some cases the committees are reconstituted every year. The District Local Board has also a works committee, which consists of the Taluka Local Board members elected for the District Local Board under Section 7A of the Act, who inspect the works of the District Local Board in progress in their respective talukas. Almost all the works, however, undertaken by the District Local Board are being carried out by Public Works Agency under the supervision of the Executive Engineer.

In Kaira a works committee exists in every taluka. For facilitating supervision each taluka is divided into a certain number of groups and the committee contains as many members as there are groups. Each member is assigned a particular group and is informed whenever a work is to commence in that area. All bills, whether for materials or labour, are not paid unless signed by the member of the group concerned. The Collector does not state whether there is a works committee for the District Local Board.

In the Panch Mahals no works committees have hitherto been appointed either by the District or the Taluka Local Boards for the inspection of the works in progress, as this duty is performed by the President and Vice-Presidents, but a Managing Committee has been appointed by the former for the conduct of general detailed business. It is reported that steps are in progress to appoint such committees, and to frame such rules for the guidance of the Board on the lines of the Surat Local Board Code as may suit the requirements of the district. A register of the works and buildings in charge of the Board is kept.

In Broach, works committee were appointed for every taluka to supervise the works carried on within their charges. Both elected and nominated official members, specially the Mamlatdar and the head karkun, have been included in each of the committees.

In Surat, works committees were appointed in every taluka and works distributed to them for inspection. It is reported that the members are taking more interest in their inspection duty since the vernacular translation of the Surat Local Boards Code has been supplied to them gratis.

In Thana no works committees have been appointed by the District Board since 1892, when the powers and duties of the pre-existing committees were delegated to, and vested in, the President. The District Local Board, Thana, proposes to consider the question of returning to the old constitution. As regards the committees of Taluka Local Boards, the Collector states that the necessary information is not available for the year under report, and he proposes to supply it in next year's report.

48. In accordance with the orders of Government conveyed in paragraph 15 of their Resolution No. 3179, dated 30th July 1895, a brief review is given below of the progress made during the year in each of the districts of this Division in material improvements.

*Ahmedabad.*—No important works were undertaken during the year. The principal works carried out are (1) re-making the road from Ahmedabad to Dholka up to mile 8 (Rs. 6,924); (2) metalling portion of the Bareja road from Jamálpur Gate to Chándola and thence to Astodia (Rs. 3,388), and (3) constructing a causeway across the Bhogáwá between the Fedra Bridge and Gundi (Rs. 4,425). Several other useful works for the improvement of communications were also carried out, while two school buildings were completed during the year. The cost of repairing roads forms a very heavy burden, and naturally tends to increase from year to year. The charges on this account have risen to Rs. 52,492 against Rs. 47,053 last year.

With the help of the liberal grants made by Government, considerable progress has been made in improving the water-supply, which is one of the most striking features of the year's administration. The expenditure under this head (Rs. 43,662) exceeded that of the previous year by Rs. 16,177. Seven new tanks and 57 new wells were constructed at a cost of Rs. 4,679 and Rs. 10,671 respectively, while 52 wells and 75 tanks and other existing sources of water-supply were repaired at an outlay of Rs. 28,312.

*Kaira.*—The Local Boards of Kaira, besides spending Rs. 54,853 in repairing and maintaining existing made roads and improving rural cart tracks, spent Rs. 1,895 on metalling the important road from Nadiád to Kapadvanj, which has now been wholly metalled, and is in good order. As usual the water-supply has received considerable attention. Fifty new wells were built and 73 existing sources of water-supply were repaired, the total cost of which amounted to Rs. 36,831. Nine new school-houses were also built at a cost of Rs. 5,728. During the year the District Local Board of Kaira maintained two veterinary institutions—one stationary at Nadiád and one itinerating throughout the districts—with the help of contributions towards their cost from the Nadiád Municipality and the Nadiád Agricultural Association, and a grant-in-aid from Government. These institutions continue to do good work, and treated 2,407 animals during the year against 2,499 in the previous year.

*Panch Maháls.*—The expenditure of the Boards amounted to Rs. 68,917, or Rs. 31,626 less than the preceding year owing to a large portion of the accumulated balance having been fully utilized in the previous year. No new works of importance were undertaken except the metalling of the Godhra-Shera road at a cost of Rs. 2,163. Further expenditure on the road was abandoned in consequence of this road as well as the Sunth road having been provincialized from 1st April 1897 under Government Resolution No. 7 C. W. 41, dated 30th July 1896, Public Works Department. Rs. 13,806 were spent on repairing and maintaining existing roads, and Rs. 1,336 were expended on original civil buildings, which consisted of 3 schools, 2 teachers' quarters and one gallery to a school-house.

A sum of Rs. 8,811 was spent on water-supply, in the improvement of which good progress has been made. Eight tanks and 30 new wells were built during the year, while 30 wells and 36 tanks were repaired.

*Broach.*—The following works of importance were undertaken during the year by the Boards in the Broach District at an outlay of Rs. 21,804:—

- (1) Broach-Jhadeshver road.
- (2) Metalling first two miles of Dehgám road.
- (3) Cross road between Dehgám and Kukerváda.
- (4) Improving mile No. 12 of the Broach-Jambusar road.

Two most useful bridges on the Jhadeshver-Sukaltirth road have been constructed at a total cost of Rs. 4,550 and the project for a third one is under preparation, which when completed will tend to make the Broach-Sukaltirth road passable during the monsoon. The Derol-Vágra road has also been improved. A bridge over the Khandáli dip in the second mile of this road coming from Vágra was completed at a cost of Rs. 2,635 and another bridge on the same road across the Bhukhi river is being constructed; the total expenditure on this work this year amounted to Rs. 6,173. The most important undertaking commenced during

the year was the construction of the Kim bridge at Sahol, on which Rs. 4,906 were expended. The work is estimated to cost about Rs. 35,000. As the bridge connects the Surat and Broach districts, and will be useful to the people of the adjoining villages of the former district, the Surat District Local Board have agreed to contribute Rs. 10,000 towards its construction.

No new school-houses were built, but three old ones were enlarged at a cost of Rs. 2,755.

No less than Rs. 64,325 were spent on account of water-works as compared with Rs. 37,584 in the preceding year; 59 new tanks were excavated and 33 new wells were built at a cost of Rs. 56,932, while 35 existing sources of water-supply were repaired at an outlay of Rs. 7,392.

*Surat.*—The total expenditure during the year amounted to Rs. 2,86,010, of which Rs. 1,39,407 were spent on civil works. Of the latter sum, Rs. 27,119 were expended on new roads and improving communications by the construction of culverts, &c. A sum of Rs. 8,935 was expended on the Udváda road, which has been constructed solely at the expense of Bai Motlibai. This road has now been completed and was opened for traffic during the year under report. The complaint about the instability of the bridge No. 19 on the Bulsar-Dharapur road was removed by its reconstruction at a cost of Rs. 1,785. The progress of the Ránder-Bhesan road was hampered by the outbreak of plague in Ránder, and this has also retarded the progress of the road from the Jaferali Gate to the Pársi Tower of Silence at Káthodra which is being constructed at the cost of Báí Dinbái Petit and on which Rs. 3,445 were spent during the year. The charges on account of repairs to communications amounted to the large sum of Rs. 68,102, being Rs. 11,049 more than the previous year.

Rs. 26,163 were spent on water-supply. Five new tanks and 41 new wells at an outlay of Rs. 12,111 were built, while 80 wells, 15 tanks and one water-course were repaired at a cost of Rs. 12,043.

*Thána.*—The expenditure in this district amounted to Rs. 2,06,986 against Rs. 2,17,396 last year, and shows a decrease of Rs. 10,410. The expenditure on civil works amounted to Rs. 1,25,630, and of this sum no less than Rs. 71,307-1-8 were expended on repairs to communications. No new works of importance were undertaken by the Board, except the following:—

1. Road from Vevji to Umbargaon.
2. Road from Ambádi to Wagreshwari.

Amongst the other minor works carried out during the year are 5 schools, 1 dharmshála and a dead-house for the dispensary at Chinchni, which were constructed at a cost of Rs. 5,527. The improvement of the water-supply continues to make steady progress. Two new tanks and 75 new wells were constructed, and 7 tanks and 35 wells were repaired, at a total cost of Rs. 17,106. The Collector remarks that the plague and scarcity threw a considerable burden on the resources of the District Board during the hot weather; but as most of the expenditure was met from Provincial advances, or incurred in April and May, the charges on this account will have to be shown in next year's report.

49. *Execution and supervision of works.*—The present arrangements for the execution and supervision of the works carried out by the District Boards, and of the experiences under which the existing system has been developed, are briefly as under:—

The works undertaken by the Boards are carried out either by Public Works Agency or Civil Agency, and the existing system is regulated by the Bombay Local Boards Act I of 1884 and the rules framed thereunder by which—

- (1) Works costing Rs. 500 and less are executed by the Boards who make their own plans and estimates.
- (2) Works costing over Rs. 500 and up to Rs. 2,500 are also executed by the Boards, but the plans and estimates are prepared and approved by the Public Works Department at a charge of 2½ per cent. on the cost of the work.



- (3) Works costing over Rs. 2,500 are executed by the Public Works Department at a charge of 12 per cent. on the cost of the work.
- (4) In the case of roads the cost of which is to exceed Rs. 50 per mile, the plans and estimates are prepared and approved by the Public Works Department at a charge of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on the cost of the work.

The works to be entrusted to Public Works Agency are usually determined by the amount of the estimate and the professional skill required ; but the Boards may, if they think fit, get any of the works referred to in clauses (1) and (2) executed by that Agency at the usual charge of 12 per cent.

Generally all works provided for by the District Boards are carried out by Public Works Agency, while such of the works as are to be carried out by the Táluka Boards, if not entrusted to Public Works Agency, are constructed by the Boards themselves either departmentally or by contract.

To assist the Táluka Boards in carrying out the works to be undertaken by them, overseers are employed. In some districts there is an overseer for each táluka who draws up plans and estimates, and professionally superintends the execution of works. Works Committees are also appointed for the inspection of the works in progress, and in connection with the appointment and working of these Committees a reference is requested to paragraph 47 above and also to this office letter to Government, No. 5332, dated 22nd December 1897, in which a radical change in the Works Committees is proposed for village works.

Profiting by the experience of several years, the Surat District Board has drawn up and adopted a code of rules for the regulation of the minor details of Local Fund administration and the execution of works, and its most distinctive feature is the attempt to awaken interest in the conduct of works by the villagers themselves, who are encouraged to supervise the works carried out in their villages. This code, a copy of which has been submitted to Government, has been found to work well and is calculated to result in the outturn of good work besides preventing wasteful expenditure and ensuring proper economy. The other Local Boards in this Division have been asked to consider the desirability of adopting the code. The Kaira, Broach and Thána Boards have already adopted it with a few modifications, while the matter is still under consideration by the Ahmedabad and Panch Maháls Boards.

50. On the whole, if public spirit is a plant of slow growth in the municipal towns, it is still more so in the rural areas, where there is less solidarity of interest. The idea of self-government within the village is familiar, but any attempt to adjudicate from outside between the claims of various villages, or to subordinate the special demands of each to some common object, such as a trunk road, is novel and distasteful. It is not too much to say that the ordinary member of a Local Board limits his view of duty to getting something for his own village. On the other hand, as the various social sections are not in such close collision, there is far less spirit of faction than in the Municipality,—in fact, there is none at all. On the whole, therefore, it may be said there is less quarrelling and intrigue, but also less interest in the management of affairs. Both the framing and daily working of the machinery is, as a rule, left to the Government officials. The year under report was marked by depression due to short crops and to plague. The income decreased, and with it decreased the expenditure on civil works, though not, it is satisfactory to note, on water-works. Such fluctuations are unavoidable, and it only remains to hope that the cycle of indifferent seasons may soon be followed by compensatory good ones.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the annual report on the administration of the Local Boards in the Central Division for the year 1896-97 together with the usual statistical statements Nos. I to IV compiled in the prescribed form.

## STATEMENT NO. I.—CONSTITUTION OF THE BOARDS.

2. The constitution of the Boards underwent no material change during the year, there being, as in the previous year, 6 District Boards and 65 Taluka Local Boards. The total area however shows an increase of 505.9 square miles. This increase is due to the area of the Taluka Local Boards in Khándesh having been shown this year according to the figures given in the tables of the financial and commercial statistics, as directed in Government Resolution No. 3060, Revenue Department, dated 24th April 1897. The figures of area in other districts should have been similarly revised. But the orders have apparently been overlooked and the attention of the Collectors will be drawn to the aforesaid Government Resolution. The population remains the same as shown in the previous year. As contrasted with the previous year the total number of members in the year under report shows an increase of two,—one in the number of official and the other in the number of non-official members. The increase is due to the correction of the error noticed in the case of the Ahmednagar district in the last year's report.

3. Of the total number of 1,214 members, 6 are *ex-officio* in the Peint taluka of the Násik district where the elective system has not been introduced owing to the backward condition of the population, 640 nominated and 568 elected. The number of official and non-official members is 272 and 942 against 280 and 932 respectively in the preceding year. The variations are principally due to vacancies arising from the resignation, &c., of official members having been filled up by the appointment of non-official ones.

4. The subjoined table shows the number of meetings held in each district, the number of official and non-official members on the Boards and the average attendance of members at meetings.

5. The total number of meetings held in the year under report was 338 against 397 in the previous year. The provisions of the law regarding the holding of half-yearly meetings were complied with by all the District and Taluka Local Boards.

6. Judging from the figures representing the average attendance of members for each district during the current and the previous years a slight improvement is noticeable in the case of official members. But it is more than counterbalanced by the falling off as regards the non-officials. The retrograde movement was however seemingly due to temporary causes traceable probably to the existence of famine and plague and it is hoped that future years will show better results.

7. The average attendance of official and non-official members shown against the District and Taluka Local Boards has been obtained by adding up the figures showing actual attendance at all the meetings and dividing the total thus obtained by the total number of meetings, or if the figures of actual attendance are not available, by multiplying the average attendance at each meeting by the number of meetings held in the case of each Local Board and dividing the sum total of the products so obtained by the aggregate number of meetings held in the district, as directed in paragraph 4 of Government Resolution, General Department, No. 2843 dated 25th May last.

The average for the division has been obtained by dividing the total of the district averages by the number of the districts in the division.

#### STATEMENT No. II.—INCOME.

8. The total income of the several Boards from all sources amounted to Rs. 14,01,543-10-2 against Rs. 14,87,340-9-1 in the preceding year showing a decrease of Rs. 85,796-14-11. Adding to the total income the balance of Rs. 7,14,237-0-5 at the commencement of the year the sum available for expenditure during the year was Rs. 21,15,780-10-7 against Rs. 23,67,482-8-6 in the previous year. 9. *I.—Land Revenue.*—The receipts under this head chiefly represent sale-proceeds of trees, grass and loppings of road-side trees. The total realizations amounted to Rs. 2,170-9-6 against Rs. 9,064-11-2 in the previous year. The decrease which amounts to Rs. 6,894-1-8 is mainly due to lesser receipts in all the districts of the division except Ahmednagar but more particularly in Khândesh and Sátára.

As directed by Government in paragraph 13 of their review of the Local Board Administration Reports for the last year the question whether the sale-proceeds of road-side trees and their loppings should be credited to I.—Land Revenue or XXV.—Miscellaneous or XXXII.—Civil Works is under consideration by the Commissioners of divisions and it is not possible to introduce any change of practice in this year's report.

10. *VI—Provincial Rates.*—The income under this head is derived from the net proceeds of the one-anna cess levied under the Bombay Local Funds Acts and constitutes the principal source of revenue. The total realizations as compared with the figures of the previous year show a decrease of Rs. 66,015-14-5. The following table shows the proportion of the net receipts from the one-anna cess to the total income and the incidence of the cess per head of population :—

The receipts have decreased in all the districts of the division except Sátára where they have slightly increased. The decrease is due to the postponement of revenue collections on account of famine.

11. *XII—Interest.*—The receipts under this head are on account of interest on Government securities belonging to dispensaries and amounted to Rs. 146-10-2 in the year under report. The receipts are the same as last year, viz., Rs. 76-13-0 in Násik and Rs. 69-13-2 in Sholápur.

12. *XVII—Police.*—The income under this head represents receipts under the Cattle Pounds Acts and amounted to Rs. 1,03,306-2-10 against Rs. 1,14,537-1-11 in the previous year showing a decrease of Rs. 11,230-15-1. The decrease is noticeable in all the districts of the division except Poona where there is a slight increase and is mainly due to a smaller number of cattle having been impounded by the Forest Department from Government forests which were left open for public grazing on account of the famine.

13. *XIX—Education.*—The receipts under this head fell from Rs. 48,057-5-2 in the previous year to Rs. 47,894-15-0 in the year under report showing a decrease of Rs. 162-6-2. The decrease is comparatively small, and being made up of a number of fluctuating items is incapable of explanation. The total receipts are made up as follows :—

17 roads, 3 inspection bungalows, survey of 5 roads, 1 over-bridge, 1 ferry-boat, 2 wells, and compensation for land taken up for 2 roads.

The remaining amount of Rs. 64,924-10-0 was spent on repairs to 21 roads and 4 travellers' bungalows and on watering and preserving trees.

Out of the outlay of Rs. 11,719-13-0 by the Civil agency Rs. 6,731-2-6 were spent on the following works:—

The amount of Rs. 11,656-14-10 expended through the Public Works agency was spent on the construction of school-buildings.

##### *Communications.*

Of the total outlay of Rs. 33,304-4-5 by the Civil agency, Rs. 11,767-11-0 were spent on original works such as the improvement of local roads, opening of small ones and constructing 13 dharmshálas, and Rs. 21,536-9-5 on repairs.

Brief sketch of material progress (paragraph 15 of Government Resolution, General Department, No. 3179 dated 30th November 1895).

*Ahmednagar.*

40. As observed in the report for the last year the extent of material progress must be gauged by the expenditure on (a) buildings, (b) communications and (c) water-supply, and it appears that the proportion of the expenditure on each of these heads to the total expenditure is as follows:—

(a) Buildings ... ..	3 per cent.
(b) Communications ... ..	19 do.
(c) Water-supply ... ..	6 do.

Taking the expenditure on original works alone into consideration it comes to 28 per cent. of the total expenditure and this is what may be said to represent material progress. The principal works constructed are—

- (1) The Nevása-Shevgaon-Bodhegaon road.
- (2) The Kharda-Shrigonda road.
- (3) The Párner-Pánoli road.
- (4) Four miles of the Nagar-Mirajgaon-Karmála road.

Besides these 13 school-houses and 36 dharmshálas were constructed and 72 wells sunk.

*Khándesh.*

The Collector has given an excellent sketch of the requirements of the district and the progress made during the year. I quote it below in full:—

“There has, I am afraid, not been much material progress during the past year in the Local Fund works that we were most interested in. Owing to the famine we thought it right to withdraw money from the bridges and culverts of roads that we were most anxious to finish and to devote it to earth-work on roads to which we attached but secondary importance. Still such as it was I will attempt to describe it.

“The ‘ultimate requirements of the district’ and ‘how far they have been met in the past’ are the two points I ought to deal with first. But I have a difficulty in doing so. For as one want is satisfied, another arises. The work which seems far out of our reach to-day may be within the range of practical politics 20 years hence: and the opening of a new railway may make roads necessary that no one had thought of till then.

“I will endeavour to show the state of things with which we began the year, and show what we did in the year, and what we intend doing in the near future. And in putting this down I will use, as a basis, the report I sent you two years ago.

“In far the greater part of Khándesh the water is good and ample: wells and streams abound. The country roads are very fairly supplied with dharmshálas. The stone-built villages in the plains almost always have their chávdis. And except Chálisgaon, which does not much require it, every táluka station has got a dispensary.

“The great want of the district is undoubtedly more roads. And next after that I would put more school-houses.

“A.—I will take the roads first \* \* \* \* \* In the long stretch of North Tápti country which ought to have a road running from the Rájpipla boundary through Taloda, Sháháda, Shirpur, Chopda, Yával, Ráver and so on towards Barbánpur, nothing of the sort has been begun yet. Nor has anything yet been done in the way of continuing the road from the Sailbári Ghát between us and Násik northwards through Pimpalner to Nandurbár.

“A glance at the map must show what a pressing need there is for more roads in Khándesh. And the works on which had there been no famine we would have spent as much money as we could, are the roads from Amalner to the Tápti, from the Tápti to Chopda, from Amalner to Párola and from Jalgaon to Bhusával. Something was done on all of these, though not nearly so much as we had wished. For the famine compelled us to spend money on three other roads where employment was badly needed: Nandurbár to Taloda: Sindkheda eastwards to Gorána: Bodwad to Edlabad. All three will, no doubt, be useful: the first and the third are indeed feeders to railway stations. But it would have been much more satisfactory to have completed those we had in hand, than to begin new ones. The completion of the 7 roads mentioned above will take several years: so that the completion of them and then the construction of a road from the Sailbári Ghát (in Násik) to Nandurbár, of a road from Bodwad through Jámner to Mhasawad, and of a great trans-Tápti road from Sagbára in the west to Barbánpur in the east, is quite a sufficient programme to occupy the Board for very many years to come.

“Besides working at the new roads described above we have done something towards metalling the more heavily worked of the existing murum ones. The process is a gradual one and I cannot tell at this moment the exact number of miles so metalled. But the roads are the Chálisgaon-Outram-Ghát road: the Songir-Nandurbár road: the Jalgaon-Dharangaon road: the Sákri-Pimpalner road: the Erandol-Dharangaon road: and the Jalgaon-Jámner road. It is good economy to metal these, as murum cuts up so deeply after heavy rain.

“B.—*Village school-houses.*—I take them next, because, as I said, the district is badly off for village school-houses; they are the great want next to roads.

“Out of the 339 Local Board schools of all grades, only 152, have even now school-houses of their own—47 sitting in rented houses and the rest in chávdis and dharmshálas. In the year just past we have been able to spend Rs. 12,000 odd on 8 new village school-houses and on additions and alterations to existing ones. But there is a deal still to be done in the way of building school-houses.

“C.—The new dispensary at Jámner was pushed on almost to completion. Every táluka station but Chálisgaon now has one. But several are required in places which are not táluka stations, *e. g.*, Edlabád, Nizámpur and Dhadgaon.

“Of *veterinary dispensary buildings* three are required as soon as we can provide them: and one,—the one at Dhulia,—was almost completed during the year. Some day or other

I suppose every *táluka* and *mahál* station will have its veterinary dispensary. For the present our programme does not extend beyond one at Jalgaon and one at Bhadgaon.

"D.—With *chávdís* the villages of the *Khándesh* plain are well supplied. But of course a certain number become ruinous in course of time, and have to be pulled down and rebuilt. In this year we built or rebuilt 55, and began 3 more.

"The *Bhil* settlements along the *Sátpuras* and in Western *Khándesh* have no *chávdís*. But then they do not require any.

"E.—In a climate where for three-fourths of the year a man is quite happy under a tree, *dharmshálas* are not a pressing need. But such as the need is, I think, it has been very fairly met. And in 1896-97 we completed 10 new ones, and began another one.

"F.—The flat open country, *i. e.*, the great bulk of the district, has good water and no scarcity of *wells*. It is in the western more rugged *tálukas* of *Pimpálner*, *Nandurbár*, *Taloda* and *Shaháda* and along the base of the *Sátpuras* eastwards that new wells are specially required. Sixty-two wells were worked at during the year and 55 of them actually finished."

#### *Násik.*

The expenditure on original works under the three heads of buildings, communications and water-supply amounted to 4, 7 and 5 per cent. of the total expenditure. The principal works constructed are—

5 school-houses.

1 causeway across the *Nasardi* river on the *Násik-Trimbak* road.

In addition to these 1 tank was dug and 61 wells sunk.

#### *Poona.*

The expenditure on original works under the three heads of buildings, communications and water-supply amounted to 2, 4 and 5 per cent. of the total expenditure. The principal works constructed were 5 school-houses and 13 *dharmshálas*. In addition to these 1 tank was dug and 60 wells sunk.

#### *Sátára.*

The expenditure on original works under the three heads of buildings, communications and water-supply amounted to 5, 7 and 4 per cent. of the total expenditure. The principal works constructed were—

9 school-houses.

8 *chávdís*.

6 *dharmshálas*.

Improvements of the existing roads and opening of a few small ones.

Besides these, 21 wells were newly sunk and the sinking of 4 wells was completed and 12 *héls* were constructed.

#### *Sholápur.*

The expenditure on original works under the three heads of buildings, communications and water-supply amounted to 2, 9 and 6 per cent. of the total expenditure. The principal works constructed during the year were—

3 school-houses.

17 *chávdís*.

11 *dharmshálas*.

3 roads.

1 ferry boat.

Besides these, 50 wells were sunk.

Brief notice of the working of rule 2 of the Local Boards Rules (paragraph 16 of Government Resolution No. 2343, General Department, dated 25th May 1897).

41. As regards the working of rule 2 of the Local Board Rules it appears that works committees have been appointed and do exist in theory in most



places. But the non-official members of these committees are, as a rule, apathetic and show little interest in their work. The inspection of works is usually left to the official members and this is bound to be the case as long as people fail to appreciate the public spirit which alone induces men to devote a portion of their time and attention disinterestedly to works of public utility. The members know that supineness and neglect on their part, so long as they do not involve them in any civil or criminal proceeding, are not likely to lead to any serious consequence beyond perhaps a general adverse remark in a district officer's report or a Government Resolution and no amount of rules or orders, which may or may not be obeyed, is likely to produce any better results. The rules of the Surat Local Board referred to by Government might of course be tried. But I have little faith that they will prove of much practical use.

42. It is not possible in this report to give effect to the instructions of the Government of India referred to in paragraph 1 of Government Resolution No. 4876, General Department, dated 8th instant, which was only received on the 18th idem when the report had been almost completed.

43. As required by Government Resolution No. 779 dated 30th January 1890 I append notes in original received from the Executive Engineers showing the original cost, the milcage and the present condition of the Local Fund roads in their respective charges.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the working of the Local Boards in the Southern Division for the year 1896-97 and to append the prescribed statements as per margin.\* The report was due to Government on the 15th August last, and the delay has been caused by the late submission of the Dhárwar Collector's report which reached me on the 5th ultimo.

\* I.—Showing the constitution of the Local Boards.

II.—Showing the income of the Local Boards.

III.—Showing the expenditure of the Local Boards.

IV.—Showing the details of works for the improvement of sanitation.

## STATEMENT No. I.

2. The population has been shown according to the Imperial Census of 1891. In the area there is a slight change on account of corrections made by the Revision Survey in Kolába. There was no alteration in the number of Boards or in their constitution, there being, as in 1895-96, six District and fifty Taluka Local Boards. Of the 898 members, 486 were nominated, 397 elected, and 15 *ex-officio* (in Kánara) as in the preceding year.

3. The elective franchise was in force in the whole Division except the six talukas of Kánara noted in the margin, where the only elected members are those returned by the municipalities under Section 6 (a) of the Local Boards Act. The total number of meetings held was (331),—one less than the number for the preceding year. All the District Local Boards complied with the rule regarding half-yearly meetings. Out of the 21 meetings held in the aggregate, 14 were general and 7 special. The average attendance at the meetings is given below:—

Except in the Rát nagiri District the figures show a falling off in attendance. The number of meetings held by the Taluka Local Boards of Belgaum, Chikodi, Athni, Khánápur, Dhárwár, Siddápur, Panvel and Mán gaon was below the minimum (4) prescribed by Government in their Resolution No. 2843, dated the 25th May 1897. Of the remaining Taluka Local Boards that of Rájápur held the largest number of meetings.

4. In respect to average attendance at the Taluka Local Board meetings, Alibag shows most satisfactory results, cent. per cent. members being present. In this respect the Chikodi Board appears to be incapable of attaining any improvement, as is shown by figures noted in the margin. This failing on the part of the Board was noticed by Government in their Resolution No. 2628 of 13th July 1894 and is due to want of interest on the part of the 15 non-official members, of whom only three on an average were present at the meetings. The average attendance (official and non-official) at each meeting for the whole Division and for each district, both for the year under report and for 1895-96, is given below :—

Improvement is observable in non-official attendance in Kolaba and Ratnagiri, but in Dharwar there is a decided deterioration. The average for the Division stands very much the same as in the preceding year. In all the districts, the average attendance was either wrongly calculated or was not given at all, and had, therefore, to be calculated in this office. The attention of the Collector is being drawn to the matter.

As regards the Managing Committee of the Dharwar District Local Board, the Collector remarks that its working was unsatisfactory mainly through want of tact and judgment on the part of the late chairman, Rao Bahadur R. S. Jayakar, who was unable to pull on well with the other members of the Committee. On his taking leave in February last, Rao Saheb R. S. Malapur was elected chairman; and since then there has been, according to Mr. Cappel, some improvement in the disposal of business by the Committee.

5. The year opened with a divisional balance of Rs. 6,97,717-6-1. The subjoined table contrasts the receipts of the year under the several heads of income.

There is an aggregate decrease of Rs. 95,148-3-7, which has principally occurred under the heads of "VI—Provincial Rates" and "Contributions." Under the former the cause has been the unfavourable nature of the season on account of which the amount of Land Revenue outstanding on 31st March 1897 was much larger than on the corresponding date of the preceding year. The decline under "Contributions" is due to the non-receipt, in Bijapur, of the special Provincial grant for the improvement of water-supply and sanitation, which during the year under report amounted to Rs. 1,666 as against Rs. 11,426 in 1895-96. Belgaum has similarly shared in the decrease on account of the Provincial grants for school buildings having fallen during the year by Rs. 8,636. The variations under the several heads of income are explained below:—

*I—Land Revenue.*—The decrease is nominal, being due to the items under this head having been transferred this year to "XXXII. Civil Works—Miscellaneous" under instructions from the Accountant General.

*VI—Provincial Rates.*—The realizations under this head comprise the net proceeds of the one-anna cess. As has already been observed above, the large decrease is due to the non-collection, by the 31st March, of a larger proportion than usual of the land-revenue instalments owing to the presence of famine.

*XVII—Police.*—The proceeds under this head represent the net proceeds of the working of the Cattle Trespass Act. In October last the Collector of Bijapur reported that the price of karbi had become quintupled and that numbers of cattle were being brought to the cattle-pounds and left there unclaimed. He was directed to let such cattle loose and allow them to shift for themselves. A large number of cattle in the affected areas of Bijapur and other districts died or were killed or were taken away elsewhere for pasture. It is to these circumstances that the decrease in cattle-pound receipts is chiefly due.

*XIX—Education.*—The revenue realized under this head does not include the one-third share of the one-anna cess. The augmented receipts amounting to Rs. 2,086 are due to increased attendance at schools in some districts, to an extra grant of Rs. 1,800 made by the Belgaum District Local Board (General) out of its Public Works portion, and to larger sales of furniture in the Ratnágiri School of Industry. *XX—Medical.*—The total receipts under this head aggregated Rs. 6,682-7-2 as against Rs. 7,725-14-6 in the preceding year, showing a falling off of Rs. 1,043-7-4. The income under this head consists of contributions from municipalities for the maintenance of vaccination establishments and of hospital and dispensary receipts. There is an increase only in Belgaum and Dhárwar, due in the former to an additional grant of Rs. 300 for expenditure in the Chikodi and Khánápuri Local Board dispensaries and in the latter to a grant made for the establishment of a dispensary at Kalghatgi and to better working of the hospital stoppage rules. The decrease in Bijapur was only nominal, being caused by a wrong adjustment, during the year, of Rs. 1,742 on account of the pay of vaccination establishment recovered in the preceding year.

*XXI—Scientific and other Minor Departments.*—The increase (Rs. 333-11-3) is caused by the entertainment, during the year, in the Belgaum District, of an Itinerating Veterinary Assistant whose appointment was vacant during the preceding year.

*XXV—Miscellaneous.*—The gross rise, under this head, of Rs. 580-6-3 is due to items of a fluctuating nature, such as sale-proceeds of fruits, staging bungalow receipts, and sale of old stores and materials.

*XXXII—Civil Works.*—The aggregate decrease under "Civil Works" amounts to Rs. 7,725-14-7, which has occurred under the sub-head "Contributions." The total revenue of Rs. 1,29,467-8-8 under civil works in charge of civil officers was composed of the following items:—

Under "Tolls" there is a decrease in all districts except Belgaum and Dhárwár, which respectively show an increase of Rs. 2,646-10-0 and Rs. 669-11-10. It is due in Belgaum to the establishment of an additional toll-bar at Nipal on the Nipáni-Mahalingpur road, and to higher bids received for some of the existing toll-bars. The increase in the Dhárwár District is not accounted for. The net decrease under tolls for the Division is Rs. 369-5-2.

The increase of Rs. 901-11-3 under "Miscellaneous" is due to the transfer, during the year under report to this head, of the sale-proceeds of trees, grass, &c., and other fluctuating items as per instructions from the Accountant General. (*Vide* remarks against I. Land Revenue.)

*Debt.*—The increase under this head is owing to the excess of Rs. 20,000 over the instalment drawn in 1895-96 (Rs. 60,000) of the Provincial loan sanctioned by Government for the Dhārwar District Local Board in their Resolution No. 1043, dated 26th March 1895, Financial Department.

*Incidence.*—The incidence of taxation and that of income per head of population for the Division were 1 anna 11-16 pies and 4 annas 7-5 pies respectively against 2 annas 1 pie and 4 annas 2 pies in the preceding year.

5. The total expenditure incurred during the year by the several Boards was Rs. 13,46,145-9-5 as compared with Rs. 11,43,439-10-2 spent in 1895-96. The increase was chiefly due to charges on account of famine, full details of which are not given by the Collectors concerned. The net increase of Rs. 2,02,705-15-3 shown above is shared by the several District Boards as shown in the margin. The causes of increase and decrease under each head of expenditure are detailed below.

18. *Administration.*—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 34,060-4-7, as under:—

(a) Rs. 10,612-5-0 and Rs. 4,198-8-5 were spent, respectively, on the salaries of establishments and on office contingencies by the several Boards as contrasted with Rs. 14,308-13-0 and Rs. 5,007-12-1 in the preceding year.

(b) Rs. 19,249-7-2 were expended during the year against Rs. 19,116-1-2 in 1895-96 on account of establishments in Government offices of control, viz., those of the Collectors, the Educational Inspector, S. D., and the Commissioner, S. D. This expenditure includes also fees payable for the audit of Local Fund accounts in the office of the Accountant General.

22. *Education.*—The gross expenditure under this head aggregated Rs. 4,45,400-10-2 against Rs. 4,43,702-1-10, showing an increase of Rs. 1,698-8-4. The details of the former item are:—

(a) Rs. 9,662-11-2 on account of the Ratnágiri School of Industry.

(b) Rs. 206 charges on account of a secondary school in Dhárwár.

(c) Rs. 3,77,994-5-5 on account of establishment charges of primary schools.

There is an increase of Rs. 3,879-1-4 under this head, which is partly due to increments sanctioned to the salaries of low-paid teachers in the Dhárwár District. The number of primary and secondary schools maintained by the several Local Boards during the year 1896-97 as well as in the previous year is contrasted in the following table:—

(e) Rs. 11,217-8-2 on account of scholarships awarded to students attending training colleges, special schools and middle and primary schools. The increase under this head is too small to need explanation.

(f) Rs. 25,290-3-1—*Miscellaneous*.—The aggregate expenditure under this head fell by Rs. 2,855-3-11 on account of reduced purchase of timber for the Ratnágiri School of Industry. It includes rent of school-houses, cost of furniture, books, &c., purchased, contingent charges connected with Local Board Schools, the price of timber and other materials required for the workshop branch of the Ratnágiri School of Industry and some other items of a fluctuating nature.

(g) Rs. 577-4-11—“*Refunds*”.—The decrease of Rs. 92-11-7 under this head is insignificant.

The vaccination figures (Rs. 31,393-3-2) show a decrease of Rs. 2,732-15-2 but it must be remembered that the charges under this head of 1895-96 included nearly Rs. 3,000, an item of mere adjustment in Kánara.

The sanitation charges (Rs. 1,390-11-11) increased during the year by Rs. 1,209-2-2, the excess being mainly due to the following causes :—

- (1) Purchase of cholera medicines (Rs. 130-15-9) in Belgaum.
- (2) Pay and travelling allowance paid to Hospital Assistants on cholera duty and purchase of permanganate of potash (Rs. 1,148-5-1) in Bijápur.

26—*Scientific and other Minor Departments.*—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 4,946-13-2 against Rs. 2,835-0-6 in 1895-96. The excess of Rs. 2,111-12-8 was caused by the entertainment of Itinerating Veterinary Assistants in the Belgauñ, Kolába and Ratnágiri districts.

30—*Stationery and Printing.*—Under this head the expenditure fell from Rs. 3,288-4-9 to Rs. 2,589-6-4 during the year under report, the decrease being due to diminished use of printed forms.

32—*Famine Relief.*—The Collectors have followed different methods in treating expenditure incurred in connection with famine relief. In the district of Belgaum, charges on account of test relief works amounting to Rs. 8,652-11-3 have been shown under "Civil Works." In the Dhárwár District Rs. 1,39,477-10-3 were spent during the year on the execution of ordinary works in order to afford employment to the needy; but the Collector states that as these works were not carried out on Famine Code conditions, their cost is exhibited under "Civil Works." The Collector further adds that the amount of Rs. 1,39,477-10-3 does not represent the total amount of expenditure incurred in his district, as several bills were delayed in their adjustment until after the close of the year on account of neglect in the Huzár Account Office. The Collector of Ratnágiri has treated similarly an item of Rs. 119-1-1 representing the charges incurred on account of test relief works. Thus the amount actually debited to famine relief during the year is only Rs. 11,712-12-3 incurred in the Bijápur District on account of test relief works, while the total amount contributed to famine relief, excluding the charges delayed in payment in the Dhárwár District, was Rs. 1,59,962-2 10.

*Debt and Interest on Debt.*—Of the total amount of Rs. 36,974-15-2 shown under "Debt", Rs. 3,140-13-4 were paid by the Bijápur District Local Board in liquidation of the loan of Rs. 50,000 granted by Government to that Board to meet the expenditure in the famine of 1876-77 on the Begam tank at Bijápur and Rs. 21,814-1-10 by the Ratnágiri District Local Board in repayment of the loan made to that Board by Government for the construction of the Ambághát and subsidiary roads. The balance of the loans due by the said Boards on 31st March 1897 was respectively Rs. 12,681-7-8 and Rs. 15,519-12-7. The increase of Rs. 11,870 under "Deposits and Advances" is due to the amounts of permanent advance of certain Local Boards in the districts of Belgaum, Bijápur, Dhárwár and Kolába having been increased during the year under report to enable them to pay promptly the wages of labourers employed on test relief works. In the districts of Bijápur and Ratnágiri the difference between the actual and the minimum prescribed by Government Resolution No. 107, dated 8th January 1896, is too small to need explanation. In regard to Kánara and Kolába, there has been a slight improvement. The excess is reported to be mainly due in both the districts to some of the works budgetted for in 1896-97 not having been completed within the year. The large excess balance in Belgaum has also been utilized since the close of the year, the Collector reporting that a sum of Rs. 24,598 has been appropriated by a supplementary budget. The District Board of Dhárwár has been doing its best to provide work for famine relief, and the Collector reports that the balance on 31st March 1897 has since been substantially reduced on account of famine works undertaken in the affected parts of his district.

On receipt of Government Resolution No. 2843, dated 25th May last, General Department, the opinions of the Collectors in this Division were called for as to the earliest date that can be fixed for reporting balances that will remain unutilized on 31st March following. The Collectors of Belgaum, Bijápur, Kánara and Kolába state that it is not possible to submit the information before the 10th February. The Collectors of Dhárwár and Ratnágiri on the other hand think that they can submit the required report in the second or third week of January. The reasons assigned in favour of a later date are that the cess collections are made between January and March, and it is not practicable for the Boards to know till March the amount of actual realizations. I think such collections can be fairly estimated on the averages of the past five years and the probable excess balances provided against. This matter will form the subject of a separate report.

The above table will show that as in past years the highest percentage of education was in Ratnágiri and on medical objects in Kánara. As regards expenditure on public works, the percentage is less than in 1895-96 in the districts of Belgaum, Bijapur and Ratnágiri. In Kolába it is 51.2 as against 46.9 in the previous year. Thus the large increase in the divisional average is solely due to increased outlay by the Dhárwár District Board on the construction of public works for famine relief. Compared with other districts the percentage of expenditure on administration is highest in Kolába. However, the divisional percentage of expenditure under that head is less than that in the previous year, being 2.53 against 3.36.

It is satisfactory to observe an increase of nearly 40 per cent. in the divisional total. As will appear from the details in Statement No. IV, 45 per cent. of the aggregate expenditure under the head of sanitation was incurred in the Dhárwár Collectorate. Of the other districts, Belgaum and Bijapur spent less, and Kánara, Kolába and Ratnágiri spent more than they respectively did in the previous year.

In respect to the construction of original water-works, the Boards were handicapped on account of famine. In all, 20 new tanks and 160 new wells were constructed during the year at an aggregate expenditure of Rs. 58,116-15-4 as compared with 20 tanks and 202 new wells costing Rs. 67,853-12-9 in the previous year. In anticipation of a scarcity of water-supply, the attention of the Collector was early directed to the improvement of the existing water-works. The number of such works repaired during the year was as per margin.

10. The progress in material improvement has as in previous years, been slow but steady. More money was, no doubt, expended on public works, but as regards educational and medical objects the outlay incurred was less than in the previous year. The leading particulars regarding different heads are as under:—

*Communications.*—In the Belgaum District out of the total outlay (Rs. 31,294-9-2) incurred on original works, Rs. 30,469-8-10 were expended on new roads. The principal roads constructed during the year were Kudchi-Terdal road, Kagwad-Athni-Shedbal road and Sutgatti-Belgaum-Kaládgi road. In the Bijápur District four important roads, *viz.*, Bijápur-Sindgi, Bijápur-Bágevádi *via* Mangoli, Almel-Pandharpur portion from Almel to Indi and Bágevádi-Telgi, were improved at an aggregate cost of Rs. 29,015-4-1, and Rs. 20,510-5-5 were spent on repairs of existing roads. In the Dhárwár District, six important roads named in the margin, involving an expenditure of Rs. 1,08,594, were undertaken during the year under report. In the Kánara District Rs. 7,236-3-11 were spent on original communications, such as special repairs to important roads, culverts on district and village roads, reconstruction of bridges and the like. The Collector of Kánara observes that the roads in his districts are especially expensive to keep up, owing to the heavy rainfall and violent rushes of water during periods of violent storms, and that the Local Funds are handicapped by the large area of land under forest which in other districts would be cultivated and contribute to Local Funds. He states that in common justice the Forest Department should pay one-anna cess on their income, which is about eight lákhs, as they use Local Fund roads and practically pay nothing beyond a small sum of about Rs. 1,500, though the enormous timber loads wear away the roads more than any other kind of traffic. He adds that had the eight lákhs' income of the Forest Department been land revenue, the additional Local Fund income from it would have been about Rs. 53,000. The important road works under construction during the year in the Kolába District were the continuations of the Pen-Panvel road and the Purar-Phalni road. In the Ratnágiri District the important work undertaken was a bridge at Dhamapur on the Múlván-Kudal road. Maintenance of existing roads was duly attended to in all the districts.

1. Improvement of Pála-Bádámi road.  
 2. Navalgund-Ron road.

*Water-supply, Improvement of Village Sites, &c.*—Improvement of water-supply was paid attention to in all the districts. Twenty new tanks were dug, 160 new wells sunk and 614 existing sources of water-supply were either repaired or improved. A reference is solicited to Statement IV, which contains information regarding water-supply in detail. Removal of prickly-pear and rank vegetation received attention in 13 villages (11 in Dhárwár and 2 in Belgaum) at a cost of Rs. 3,535 against Rs. 2,215 in the previous year. Rs. 629 against Rs. 719 in 1895-96 were spent on keeping roads clean and watering them in the towns of Ankola, Siddápur, Bilgi, Supa and Yellápur in the Kánara District, where there are no municipalities.

*School and other Buildings.*—The number of new school and other buildings such as chávdis, dharmshálas, &c., was 15 and 27 as against 19 and 33 in the preceding year. The total expenditure incurred on such buildings was Rs. 36,888 against Rs. 30,417 in 1895-96. Due attention was paid to the repairs of the existing buildings.

*Medical Objects.*—During the year under report a veterinary dispensary was opened at Álibág and ordinary dispensaries at Guledgud and Kalghatgi. Dispensaries are reported to be urgently needed at Bádámi and Hungund in the Bijápur District and at Karjat in the Kolába District.

It will appear from the remarks recorded above that Dhárwár has achieved more real progress during the year than any other district.

11. In paragraph 16 of their Resolution No. 2843, dated the 25th May last, Government have recommended to the attention of other Boards the code of rules adopted by the District Local Board of Surat for the execution of works and other matters under the control of the Board. Copies of the rules have since been obtained and are under consideration by each of the Boards. In Belgaum, Bijápur, Dhárwár and Kánara, the Táluka Local Boards have each a works committee, and all works in those districts are carried out through the Táluka Local Boards. In Kolába the District Local Board has a works committee of its own, but now none such appear to be in existence in the tálukas. In Ratnágiri both the District and Táluka Boards have committees of their own. As regards the working of the committees, the Collector of Belgaum states that the members go out once a quarter to inspect some works in progress in the neighbourhood of their houses, but that the responsibility for carrying out and superintending Local Fund works devolves mainly on the Vice Presidents, who are the Mámlatdárs of the tálukas, and are aided by maistries employed under them. The Local Fund overseer, who is directly subordinate to the District Local Board, prepares plans and estimates and also inspects works carried out by Táluka Boards. In Bijápur the Collector reports that the members of the works committees inspect works in progress once in every month. In Dhárwár, as pointed out by the Collector, complaints are frequent concerning the unsatisfactory character of works executed by the Local Boards Establishment, and instances have been found in which no efficient supervision was exercised by the members of the works committees. In Kánara, the members of works committees have parts of tálukas assigned to them, in which they are supposed to inspect works in progress, and on the completion of the works they give completion certificates. In Kolába a works committee was appointed for the year under report, but it is to be regretted that it did not meet even once. The Collector observes that there is no indication of the development of non-official interest in this direction. As regards Ratnágiri, the works committee of the District Board has no executive duties, as its works are always carried out by the Executive Engineer. It leaves petty works to be done by the Táluka Boards themselves out of their own funds, sometimes making them a contribution. It also examines the estimates and plans sent up by the Táluka Boards, sanctions re-appropriations made by them and relieves the District Board of their miscellaneous duties. The Collector reports that the functions of works committees in different tálukas vary slightly, but that on the whole the arrangements made everywhere for the proper supervision of the overseers are convenient and satisfactory. The District Board has

framed rules for the guidance of overseers and mukádamas which appear to have been working well. The orders of Government requiring each Local Board to maintain a register of all works and buildings in its charge, &c., are being attended to.

12. The remarks recorded by the several Collectors as regards the working of the Boards in their respective districts are as under :—

As regards the Belgaum Boards, Mr. Woodward observes that the working of the several Boards during the year was not wholly satisfactory. He says that the attendance at meetings was generally poor, even worse than in the preceding year, and that few of the non-official members can truthfully be said to have shown much interest in their duties. The Collector of Bijápur states that the working of the Boards in his district was satisfactory, and that members seem to take interest in the administration. He specially mentions the names of Ráo Sáheb Raghavendraráo Krishna, Vice-President of the District Board, and Messrs. P. A. Desái, Balwantráo Rámchandra and Basangowda Sadashivgowda for the zeal and energy they displayed in carrying out several reforms. All the Táluka Local Boards in the Dhárwár District have official Vice-Presidents except Dhárwár, Karáji, Bankápur, and Hángal. The Collector does not speak favourably of the Vice-Presidents of Bankápur and Hángal, and remarks that the Kalghatgi Board is, as a whole, not efficient and requires close supervision. He recommends Ráo Sáheb Málápur, Vice-President of the District Local Board and Chairman of the Managing Committee, for the interest he takes in his work and for his active and efficient discharge of his duties. The Collector of Káuara mentions prominently the names of Ráo Sáheb Náráyanráo Udiavar and Messrs. Shivrám Subráo Nagrakattee, Bapaya Mhal Pai and Venkatráo Gurooráo Nadig as taking interest in Local Fund matters. The Collector of Kolába does not make any remarks about the working of the Boards in his district. The Collector of Ratnágiri specially mentions Mr. Anant Yeshwant Prabhu Desái, Vice-President of the Kájápur Táluka Local Board, Mr. V. H. Barve, Vice-President of the Dápoli Board, and Ráo Sáheb R. B. Patki, Vice-President of the Chiplún Board, for the good work they have done. He does not regard the working of the Boards of the Khed and Sangameshwar tálukas as satisfactory.

13. In conclusion, I have the pleasure to record that both in the performance of their ordinary functions and of their special duties which devolved on them on account of famine, the Boards have not been found wanting in their willingness to co-operate with Government in whatever action was deemed necessary.

The Commissioner in Sind has the honour to submit the Annual Report on the Administration of the Local Boards in the Province of Sind for the year ending 31st March 1897, together with the Statistical Tables Nos. I to IV compiled in his office.

2. The following table gives the dates of receipt of reports from the Collectors and Deputy Commissioners, and of their final replies to references made for further information or explanation :—

## STATEMENT NO. I—CONSTITUTION OF BOARDS AND MEMBERS.

3. The number of Local Boards remained the same as last year, *viz.*, 5 District and 46 Taluka Local Boards. The Collectors and Deputy Commissioners preside over the District Boards, and the Assistant or Deputy Collectors in charge of talukas over the Taluka Boards, excepting those of Jacobabad and Shikarpur in the Upper Sind Frontier District, which are presided over by the Mukhtiarkars of the talukas concerned.

4. The area and boundaries of the Boards remained unchanged in the year under report.

5. The elective system obtains in the districts of Karachi, Hyderabad and Shikarpur, also in the taluka of Mirpur Khas and certain other villages transferred to Thar and Parkar from the Hyderabad District. But in the rest of Thar and Parkar and the Upper Sind Frontier District the elective franchise has not been applied, and the Boards consist of nominated members only.

6. The number of nominated as well as elected members remained the same as in the previous year.

7. The number of meetings held during the year was 331 against 390 in the last year, showing a decrease of 59, which occurred in all the 5 districts, but chiefly in the Shikarpur District, where only 109 meetings were held as against 148 in the previous year. The decrease is due to the prevalence of the plague which made it inconvenient to convene meetings; but the provisions of Section 34 of the Act were more largely availed of, and business was transacted by circulating papers among the members. Half-yearly meetings were held by all the District Boards, and excepting at Jacobabad all the Taluka Boards also held a sufficient number of meetings. The attention of the President of the Jacobabad Board has been invited to this matter.

8. The slight decrease which occurs in the average attendance of members is due to Upper Sind Frontier District.

The average attendance for each district and the province has been arrived at, as usual, by multiplying the average attendance at each meeting by the number of meetings held and dividing the product by the aggregate number of meetings held.

9. *I.—Land Revenue.*—To maintain uniformity in the mode of classification of certain items of income and expenditure, as desired by Government in their Resolution No. 2843 of 25th May 1897 (General Department), the sale-proceeds of road-side trees and their loppings have been credited to “32.—Civil Works—Miscellaneous,” a head in Statement No. II (Revenue) which corresponds with “45.—Civil Works—Communications” in Statement No. III, in which expenditure on arboriculture connected with roads is included as directed by Government in paragraph 8 of their Resolution.

10. *VI.—Provincial Rates.*—The realizations under this head, which constitute the principal source of income of the Local Boards, amounted to Rs. 4,68,359-2-7 as against Rs. 5,23,042-5-9 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 59,683-3-2. This decrease is shared by all the districts. In the Karachi and Upper Sind Frontier Districts the decrease is stated to be due partly to insufficiency of water-supply and partly to the fact that the collections in 1895-96 included the postponed rabi instalments of 1894-95. In the Hyderabad District it is chiefly attributable to the non-collection of Land Revenue instalments from several zamindárs who had left their native places on account of the bubonic plague. In Shikarpur it is stated to be due to the rabi crop having been greatly affected owing to the unfavourable inundation. The Thar and Parkar District shows a decrease of Rs. 40-6-0 only which needs no explanation.

11. *XII.—Interest.*—The income under this head amounted to Rs. 1,913-10-6 as against Rs. 1,805-0-2 in the previous year. It is derived from investments in Government paper of surplus balances of dispensaries and balances of certain defunct minor Municipalities in the Thar and Parkar District, abolished in 1878, made over to the Local Boards to defray expenditure on certain specified objects. The increase of Rs. 108-10-4 as compared with the receipts for the previous year is chiefly due to a further investment by the Karachi Board of Rs. 2,800 belonging to the Sujawal Dispensary Fund.

12. *XVII.—Police.*—The total receipts amounted to Rs. 33,174-10-2 as compared with Rs. 31,083-4-10 in the previous year, showing a net increase of Rs. 2,091-5-4. The increase, which is contributed by the districts of Shikarpur, Thar and Parkar and Upper Sind Frontier, is ascribed in Shikarpur to the opening of additional pounds, in Thar and Parkar to the Makhi Dhand pound opened in the previous year in connection with the measures taken for the suppression of outlawry, in the Sanghar Taluka having worked for 5½ months during the year under report, whereas in the previous year it worked for a fortnight only, and in the Upper Sind Frontier to a larger number of cattle having been impounded during the year under report. The decrease of Rs. 1,339-7-4 and Rs. 1,272-5-5, which occurred in the Karachi and Hyderabad Districts respectively, is attributed by the Collectors to the impounding of fewer cattle during the year, probably due to decrease in cultivation owing to the insufficiency of water-supply.

As compared with the previous year there is a net increase of Rs. 2,299-7-11 due to realizations from the sale of articles manufactured in the Industrial Schools of the Naushahro Division in the Hyderabad District which for the first time appears in the credit account, the school having been transferred to the list of Local Board Schools from the 1st June 1896.

17. As compared with the previous year the figures given under the first two items show an increase of Rs. 2,065-11-11, and the latter two, a decrease of Rs. 3,401-2-4. The former is due to improvements in gardens and the latter to (1) several important fairs having been stopped owing to the bubonic plague and (2) to smaller realizations from zamindárs on account of seed, &c., advanced to them for experimental cultivation.

18. *XXV.—Miscellaneous.*—The receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 6,654-14-8 or Rs. 979-13-0 more than the previous year. They include fees for staging bungalows, seráis, sale-proceeds of old stores and materials and other items of a fluctuating nature.

19. *XXXII.—Civil Works.*—The receipts rose from Rs. 77,586-12-1 to Rs. 85,640-5-7, as per details subjoined :—

26. XVIII.—Administration.—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 24,130-8-1. As compared with the previous year there is an increase of Rs. 1,378-8-1, which occurred in Hyderabad, Shikárpur and Upper Sind Frontier Districts owing to more having been spent on contingencies and establishment in Local Fund Offices than last year.

27. XX.—Police.—No expenditure was incurred under this head during the year under report or in the previous year.

28. XXII.—Education.—The total expenditure under this head was Rs. 2,44,261-1-6 against Rs. 2,57,021-0-6, or Rs. 12,759-15-0 less than in the previous year. The decrease occurred in all the districts and is chiefly due to (1) discontinuance of proficiency and capitation allowances, (2) schools doing no useful work having been discarded, (3) highly paid teachers having been replaced by lower paid ones, (4) less expenditure having been incurred under grant to indigenous schools, &c., &c.

29. *XXIV.—Medical.*—The expenditure under this head comprises the following items:—

30. As compared with the figures of the previous year, there is a net increase of Rs. 6,598-7-4, which is brought about by an aggregate increase of Rs. 12,395-11-4 in the Karáchi, Shikárpur and Upper Sind Frontier Districts, and a total decrease of Rs. 5,797-4-0 in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts. The increase occurs chiefly in the Karáchi District, where a sum of Rs. 11,055-8-0 belonging to the Jati Dispensary Fund was debited to that dispensary and sent to the Accountant General, Bombay, for investment. The rise of the increase is attributed to more expenditure having been incurred on sanitary measures owing to the prevalence of the bubonic plague in Sind.

31. The decrease occurs in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts owing to less expenditure having been incurred under the head "Hospitals and Dispensaries" in the year under report than in the previous year.

32. *XXVI.—Scientific and other Minor Departments.*—The expenditure under this head rose from Rs. 45,132-10-10 to Rs. 52,461-15-0, giving a net increase of Rs. 7,329-4-2, of which the details are stated below:—

33. From these figures it will appear that the increase is shared by all the districts excepting the Shikárpur District, which shows a decrease of Rs. 7,421-9-9.

34. The increase in Karáchi and Thar and Párkar Districts is due to the amount spent on gardens, &c., shown under "Petty Establishment and Charges" having now been transferred under this head. In the Upper Sind Frontier District it is due to the contribution paid by the Shikárpur District Local Board for the horse show held at Jacobabad during the year under report. The same cause accounts for the greater portion of the decrease in the Shikárpur District. The services of the Itinerating Veterinary Graduate were also dispensed with in the Shikárpur District from 1st August 1896 which accounts for some of the decrease. The increase in the Hyderabad District chiefly occurs in the following items:—

(1) *Horse and Cattle Shows.*—More prizes having been paid in the year under report than in the previous year.

(2) *Botanical and other Public Gardens.*—The maintenance of new gardens in Nausbahro and Guni and partly to the increased expenditure on gardens at Tando Bāgo, Moro and Kandiāro.

(3) *Bull and Stallion Charges*.—Charges on account of "Spero," "Madina" and "Billy" having been paid for the whole year, whereas in 1895-96 they were maintained only for a short period in the latter part of that year.

35. *XXX.—Stationery and Printing*.—The expenditure under this head amounted to Rs. 3,665-3-0 against Rs. 1,933-13-1 in the preceding year.

36. The increase of Rs. 1,731-5-11 is attributable to more having been paid on account of printing and advertising during the year under report.

37. *XXXII.—Miscellaneous*.—The expenditure on account of establishments for travellers' bungalows, &c., amounted to Rs. 4,692-13-9 against Rs. 4,322-2-9 in the previous year. The details are given in the subjoined table:—

38. The increase chiefly occurred in the Karachi and Shikarpur Districts and is due to additional establishment entertained for musafir-khanas in the latter and purchase of cots for dharamshalas, &c., in the former district.

39. The expenditure under other petty establishments amounted to Rs. 15,144-15-3 against Rs. 57,058-5-10. The large decrease appearing under this item is due chiefly to the cost of permanent establishment for planting and preservation of road-side trees having this year been shown under "45.—Civil Works" as per Government Resolution No. 2843, dated the 25th May 1897, instead of under this head, as was shown last year.

40. Were it not for this transfer, there would have been an increase of Rs. 3,782-2-5 under this sub-head, of which Rs. 3,670-15-10 occurring in the Karachi District is due to the entertainment of nakedars for the registration of trade between Joongshai and Bughiar and to the increase in the expenditure of the Syedpur Tanka Ferry; and Rs. 111-2-7 is on account of an additional well-worker having been entertained in the Nasirabad Taluka (Shikarpur District) at a cost of Rs. 9 per mensem.

41. The expenditure under miscellaneous and unforeseen charges amounted to Rs. 9,313-10-1 against Rs. 2,665-13-8 in the previous year. It includes charges on account of the following items:—

- (1) Contributions paid to Municipalities under Section 47 of the Bombay Local Boards Act.
- (2) Ferry charges.
- (3) Construction of huts for health camps and purchase of disinfectants, &c., in connection with the bubonic plague.

The large increase under this item is due to sub-head No. 3 noted above.

42. *Civil Works*.—The total expenditure under this head rose from Rs. 4,29,363-12-10 to Rs. 4,37,514-7-0, showing an increase of Rs. 8,150-10-2. Of the total expenditure, Rs. 3,73,766-9-11 and Rs. 63,747-13-1 were spent on works carried out by Civil and Public Works Department Agency, respectively. Details are given in the subjoined table:—

45. On comparison with the figures for 1895-96, it will appear that the total receipts during the year fell from Rs. 9,30,311-12-6 to Rs. 8,74,727-14-6. The receipts of the Karachi, Shikarpur and Upper Sind Frontier Districts did not cover the actual expenditure incurred during the year under review owing to a much larger amount having been spent on public works, but the expenditure in Hyderabad and Thar and Parkar Districts was more than covered by their receipts. The closing balance of the Hyderabad, Thar and Parkar, and Upper Sind Frontier Districts have increased, but that of the Karachi and Shikarpur Districts stands in the aggregate Rs. 55,318-6-8 less than what it was on 31st March 1896. These balances would have been much less had not Government directed the stoppage of all but emergent works owing to financial pressure.

47. The total expenditure was less by Rs. 11,787-14-2 than that in the previous year; the decrease occurred in the Hyderabad, Shikarpur and Upper Sind Frontier Districts chiefly under the head "Improvement of water-supply." Of the total sum shown under "Water-supply," Rs. 20,762-8-9 were spent on original works, such as wells, tanks, &c., and Rs. 13,791-8-11 on improvement to the existing sources of water-supply; besides this a sum of Rs. 1,424-5-10 was spent in entertaining watchmen for guarding the sources of drinking water. No expenditure was incurred by any of the Boards in the province on improving village sites, &c., but a sum of Rs. 1,018-2-8 was incurred in the removal of prickly-pear and rank vegetation during the year against Rs. 638-8-7 in the previous year.

48. It will be noticed in the table under paragraph 22 of this report that the District Boards availed themselves, in the year under report, of a Government grant of Rs. 1,558 for the improvement of the water-supply against a sum of Rs. 7,300 in the preceding year.

49. Excepting a few roads, which have been transferred to the charge of the Executive Engineer, Fuleli Canals, in the Hyderabad District, the roads are in charge of the Mukhtyárkars, who under the orders of the Assistant Collectors carry out all repairs to them. The Chief Engineer, Indus Right Bank, and Superintending Engineer, Indus Left Bank Divisions' Nos. 1745 and 2401, dated 3rd and 13th August 1897, respectively, and the statement furnished by the Executive Engineer, Fuleli Division, regarding Local Fund roads in his charge, are appended as required by Government in their Resolution No. 779 of the 30th January 1890.

50. The reports from the several Collectors and Presidents of the District Local Boards in Sind are also appended.

51. The following resumé of the reports of the Collectors and Presidents of the District Local Boards in the province, showing the progress made in material improvements and describing the more important works undertaken, is added in reference to the orders contained in paragraph 15 of Government Resolution No. 3179 of the 30th July 1895.

4. A sum of Rs. 608-7-0 was spent on constructing a new road from Kandiáro to the Rajo Dahiri Railway Station.

5. Some additions were made to the Female Training College, Hyderabad, at a cost of Rs. 622-5-1.

53. In the Shikárpur District a tank was dug by the Kákar Táluka Board and 34 wells and one water trough and one cistern were constructed, and 78 wells and 8 tanks were cleared during the year of report against only 38 wells constructed and one tank dug during the preceding year. The increase is very satisfactory. The Táluka Local Board of Kákar and Mehar spent Rs. 300 in maintaining their conservancy establishment for the towns of Mehar and Khairpur Nathanshah.

54. In the Thar and Párkar District, five bridges were constructed on the road from Umarkot to Sufi at an aggregate cost of Rs. 1,837, and Rs. 5,006-4-9 were spent in constructing bridges and repairing the road along the bank of the Mithrau Canal. The former work is intended to facilitate traffic between Umarkot and Shadi Pali and through latter communication with the Railway Station at Shadi Pali. A sum of Rs. 292-14-5 was spent in constructing a bridge on the karia of Sudhir Fakir on the road from Kandiari to Pándo Mitha Khán and Rs. 2,618-9-11 were spent in constructing a traveller's bungalow at Sánghar. A school-house was also constructed at Kantio in Cháchra Táluka at a cost of Rs. 358 and a well at Bantheri in táluka Khipra at a cost of Rs. 432.

55. The following works were undertaken in the Upper Sind Frontier District :—

*Communications.*

Twenty-one bridges costing Rs. 8,543-14-7 ; one mile of the Jacobabad-Shikárpur road was embanked at an outlay of Rs. 615 ; 986 miles of road and 110 bridges were repaired at a cost of Rs. 16,747-11-0.

The work of planting and preservation of trees also received attention and Rs. 3,894-5-0 were spent on it.

*Water-supply and Water-works.*

The tank at Ghári Khyro was widened and deepened at a cost of Rs. 662-5-9, and the existing sources of water-supply were improved at an outlay of Rs. 2,018-1-3.

*Miscellaneous Public Improvements.*

Improvements to 16 camping grounds were carried out at a cost of Rs. 1,445-10-5.

*Public Buildings.*

Rs. 387 were expended for additions to the musáfirkhána at Mahár.

Additions to the existing school-building were carried out at an outlay of Rs. 391-15-9.

The total outlay on material improvements in this district was Rs. 34,705-15-9.

From the above it will be seen that the Boards are doing useful work and that the improvement of the water-supply and sanitation is not being lost sight of.

*P. S.*—Since the above was written, Government Resolution No. 4876 of 8th September has been received and the following summary is furnished of the present arrangements as regards the execution and supervision of works carried out by the District and Taluka Local Boards :—

Works are carried out either by contract or departmentally. Those costing over Rs. 2,500 are carried out by Public Works agency, and others, by Local Boards themselves, excepting in the case of works requiring professional skill, which, though costing under Rs. 2,500, are done by the Public Works Department in case the Boards have no overseers or other professional men in their employ. All District Local Boards in the province, excepting those of Karachi, employ overseers for the purpose of preparation of plans and estimates for original as well as repair works, and for execution of such works. Plans and estimates for works costing over Rs. 500 are in each case approved by the Public Works Department for which a fee of one rupee per cent. on the estimated cost of the works is charged by them. By the employment of professional overseers by Local Boards, the Boards save the 12 per cent. payable for every work done through Public Works agency.

Taluka Boards also appoint a Works Committee who supervise works in progress and attest the certificates of completion of the works. Experience has shown that non-official members take very little interest in the carrying out of works undertaken by the Boards, and hence the work of supervision falls chiefly on the Mukhtyarkars. The Presidents of the District Local Boards, *i.e.* the Collectors and Deputy Commissioners, and the Presidents of the Taluka Boards, *i.e.* Assistant and Deputy Collectors, also inspect the works during the touring season and largely supply the initiative in works of improvement.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit my report on the Administration of the Local Boards in this district for the year 1896-97, together with the Statements I to IV, and to offer the following remarks on the same.

Local Boards' Administration Report for 1896-97.

## STATEMENT I.

2. The population and the area of the district and the number of members of the several Boards are the same as last year, and there has been no change in the constitution of the Boards during the year.

3. The number of meetings held was 44 against 53 in the previous year, showing a decrease of 9, as detailed below:—

The decrease is due to the fact that owing to the prevalence of the plague the business was transacted by circulating papers. There is an increase of 43 in the average attendance of the members, which may be considered satisfactory.

## STATEMENT II.

4. The opening balance on 1st April 1896 was Rs. 1,20,472-2-4 for the whole district.

5. VI.—*Provincial Rates—Local Rates.*—Receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 69,372-4-8 against Rs. 86,910-9-6 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 17,538-4-10, which is due partly to insufficiency of water-supply and partly to the fact that the collections in 1895-96 included the postponed rabi instalments of 1894-95.

6. XII.—*Interest on Dispensary Securities.*—Under this head there is an increase of Rs. 91-6-4, the receipts during the year being Rs. 143-12-4 against Rs. 52-6-0 in the previous year. The increase is due to a further investment of Rs. 2,800 belonging to the Sujáwal Dispensary Fund. The interest realized last year was that accrued on the Government Promissory Notes of Rs. 1,500 belonging to the Jerruck and Tháno Bula Khán Dispensary Funds.

7. *XVII—Police.—Receipts under Cattle Trespass Act.*—Receipts under this head amount to Rs. 2,019-10-5 against Rs. 3,359-1-9 in the previous year. It is difficult to assign any specific cause for this decrease, but it was probably due to decrease in cultivation owing to insufficiency of water-supply.

8. *XIX—Education.*—Receipts under this head amount to Rs. 1,342-5-7 against Rs. 1,377-8-1, showing a decrease of Rs. 35-2-6, which may be attributed to ordinary fluctuations.

9. *XX—Medical.—Hospitals and Dispensaries.*—Rs. 525-8-6 against Rs. 15-9-9. The increase is due to the unexpended balance of Rs. 419-4-6 out of the sums sent to the Accountant General for investment, having been returned by him and credited to this head.

*Contributions, Rs. 1,621-0-0.*—This sum consists of Rs. 121, being Kotri Municipal contribution towards the cost of vaccination, and Rs. 1,500 Karáchi Municipal contribution towards the maintenance of the Karáchi Veterinary Dispensary.

*Miscellaneous, Rs. 8-2-7.*—This amount represents the sale-proceeds of old stores, &c. Receipts under this head last year were Rs. 3-8-9, showing an increase of Rs. 4-9-10.

10. *XXI—Scientific and other Minor Departments—Botanical and other Public Garden Receipts, Rs. 202-9-0.*—This represents sale-proceeds of fruit and vegetables in gardens not connected with roads.

11. *Veterinary Receipts, Rs. 162-8-8.*—This amount consists of Rs. 160-14-0 on account of fees recovered for treatment of horses at the Veterinary Dispensary, and Rs. 1-10-8 on account of refund of travelling allowance.

12. *Other Exhibitions or Fairs.*—Rs. 11-3-0 against Rs. 306-8-4 in the previous year. The decrease of Rs. 295-5-4 is due to several of the important fairs having been stopped owing to the plague.

13. *XXV—Miscellaneous Receipts.*—Receipts under this head amount to Rs. 3,526-15-3 including a sum of Rs. 2,000 which was advanced from Local Funds for operations connected with the plague and subsequently recovered and credited to this head. Deducting this amount, the ordinary receipts of the year amount to Rs. 1,526-15-3 against Rs. 3,481-5-1 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 1,954-5-10, which is due first to the abolition of the travellers' bungalow at Karáchi, second to the transfer of sale-proceeds of road-side trees and the produce realized from nurseries and plantations connected with roads to "32. Civil Works," sub-head "Miscellaneous," and third to the transfer of the produce of other gardens and plantations to "Botanical and other Public Garden Receipts" subordinate to "XXI—Scientific and other Minor Departments."

The total expenditure on account of works and repairs both by Civil and Public Works agencies amounts to Rs. 96,888-11-6 against Rs. 90,826-0-10, showing an increase of Rs. 6,062-10-8 which is chiefly due to the transfer to this head of the charges of the permanent establishment for planting and preservation of road-side trees.

36. *Contribution to Provincial, Rs. 415-0-0.*—This is the usual contribution on account of repairs to Bagotoro road.

37. *Contributions to other Boards, Rs. 1,300-0-0.*

This represents Rs. 1,300 contributed by the Táluka Board, Sháhbandar-Jati, towards the Sháhbandar-Jati Medical Relief Fund.

38. The total receipts of the year including balance amounted to Rs. 2,99,994-11-8 and the expenditure to Rs. 2,03,401-10-8, leaving a closing balance of Rs. 96,593-1-0. The balance at the close of the year would have been much smaller if Government had not directed the stoppage of works owing to the financial pressure.

The show at Talhár was held on the 8th February 1897 and the two following days and was pronounced a great success. The brood mares and fillies were most favourably commented on, and a large proportion of horse stock judged suitable for police purposes. The number of horses exhibited was 758 against 678 last year. 11 remounts were purchased for the police and four purchases were made by private individuals and dealers. A sum of Rs. 3,187 was given away in prizes and Rs. 713 was spent on account of miscellaneous expenses incidental to the arrangement and installation of the show. A sum of Rs. 555-23 was spent on sanitary arrangements on fairs this year against Rs. 576-12-9 last year.

*Veterinary Charges.*

The total expenditure incurred under this head amounted to Rs. 2,772-11-0 against Rs. 2,799-1-1 last year. Government contributed Rs. 775 towards the maintenance of the Veterinary Dispensary and the amount has been shown under the head of provincial contributions.

The number of in-patients rose from 241 to 276 and of out-patients from 1,019 to 1,049. Out of those treated,—

The dispensary has completed the fourth year of its existence, and worked well. It is still located in a hired building. This has been personally inspected and approved of by the Superintendent, Civil Veterinary Department. Plans and estimates for the new building have been prepared. Its construction would have been taken in hand during the year, but owing to the prevalence of famine in the Presidency the work has been postponed.

*Bull and Stallion Charges.*

The expenditure under this head was Rs. 1,996-7-11 against Rs. 907-12-5 last year. The increase may be explained as follows. Charges on account of 'Spero,' 'Madina' and 'Billy' have been paid for the whole year, whereas in 1895-96 small expenditure had been incurred on their account, as the animals had arrived in the latter part of that year. Charges on account of 'Maxim' have been paid during the year under report, as the stallion was received here in 1896-97. I have the honour to submit my report on the Administration of the Local Boards in this district for the year 1896-97 together with the Statements I to IV.

STATEMENT I.

2. The population and area of the district and the number of members of the several Boards are the same as last year, and there has been no change in the constitution of the Boards during the year.

3. The number of meetings held was 109 against 148 in the previous year, showing a decrease of 39, as shown below :—

The business of the several Boards is transacted with the aid of the Managing Committee in the case of the District Board and Works Committees in the case of Táluka Local Boards.

In 15 cases the provisions of Section 34 were availed of by circulating propositions for the sanction of the Board, as it is very inconvenient to keep proposals till the next meeting of the Board, which according to rules is held twice a year.

#### STATEMENT II.

##### *Income.*

4. The year opened with a balance of Rs. 79,216-1-10 for the district.

5. *I.—Land Revenue.*—Receipts from sale-proceeds of trees, grass, &c., amounted in the year under report to Rs. 1,576-4-3 against Rs. 1,887-9-6 in the previous year.

Under orders contained in the Commissioner's No. 3384 of 5th July 1897 these receipts are shown under "32. Civil Works—Miscellaneous."

6. *Provincial Rates—Local Rates.*—Receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 1,89,954-3-5 against Rs. 2,03,930-15-3, showing a decrease of Rs. 13,976-11-10, which is due to unfavourable inundation of 1895-96 which greatly affected the rabi collections. The receipts under this head chiefly depend upon Land Revenue collections. The real receipts under this head are Rs. 1,76,602-3-5, but a sum of Rs. 13,852 due from the District Board to other Boards has been added to the dispensary receipts and Veterinary Dispensary and District Board Education receipts under orders from the Accountant General; and as the adjustment could not be made in terms of Government Resolutions Nos. 3847 and 5543, dated respectively the 5th June 1891 and 3rd July 1892, it became necessary to simply show a credit here and debit elsewhere, *viz.*, "Contributions."

7. *XII—Interest on Securities belonging to Dispensaries.*—This amounted to Rs. 87-4-8, which is the same as in the previous year. It represents the interest on Government Loan Notes belonging to Mehar and Dokri dispensaries.

8. *XVII—Police.*—Under this head are shown receipts under the Cattle Trespass Act, which amounted in 1896-97 to Rs. 14,357-10-2 against Rs. 11,088-8-0 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 3,269-2-2, which is due to additional cattle pounds having been opened during the year.

9. *XIX—Education.*—Receipts under this head amount to Rs. 494-5-10 against Rs. 1,202-2-9, showing a decrease of Rs. 707-12-11, which is due to the fact that no commission was realized in the year of report on the value of books purchased from Local Funds as was the case in the preceding year.

The school fees, which are included in the above sum of Rs. 494-5-10, amounted to Rs. 217-13-6 against Rs. 217-14-0 in the previous year. The decrease of 6 pies calls for no explanation.

10. *XX—Medical.* (a) Receipts on account of hospital stoppages amount to Rs. 574-2-9 against Rs. 542-13-6 in the previous year. The increase of Rs. 31-5-3 may be attributed to the dispensaries having been more freely resorted to during the year under report. No new dispensaries were opened during the year, but proposals to build new dispensaries at Ghotki and Rato-dero were sanctioned, and the works would be commenced in the current year.

The decrease is in a great measure due to the purchase of Diploma Examination books for the veterinary student in 1895-96.

The Training College supplied 7 trained men for employment as masters. There were 107 trained men employed as teachers in the Primary Local Board Schools, making a total of 114. Of these 5 died and 2 retired on invalid pension, leaving 107 as before. Of these 7 were transferred to municipal schools, leaving the number of trained men on the roll to 100. The Municipalities should, I think, be required to pay something towards the cost of training the masters, as they have been making use of them of late. I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report on the working of the Local Boards in this district for the year ending 31st March 1897 together with the four statements marginally noted.

STATEMENT I—CONSTITUTION.

2. With the exception of the Mirpur Board transferred from the Hyderabad Collectorate with effect from the 1st August 1894, the District and Táluka Local Boards were constituted under Government Resolution No. 1293, dated 12th February 1885, as modified by Government Resolution No. 4389, dated 29th June 1891.

3. The total population and area within the limits of the district shown in columns 4 and 5 is the same as shown last year, the area and population of the municipal towns of Umarkot and Mithi having been omitted from these columns.

4. The total number of members constituting the several Boards has been the same as last year, *viz.* 68, of whom 60 are nominated and 8 elected. The extension of the elective franchise to this district (exclusive of Mirpur Khás) was not considered expedient owing to the comparatively backward condition of the people, and from what I have seen of the members I think it will be advisable for at least some years to come to adhere to the present arrangement. Of the 8 elected members 6 were returned on the Mirpur Board, in which táluka the elective system is in force; the other two are representatives of the municipalities of Umarkot and Mithi.

5. The number of meetings held during the year under report was sufficient in consideration of the work to be done. The funds at the disposal of the Táluka Local Boards were so insignificant that it was not necessary to hold many meetings. The provisions of Section 34 of the Act were also availed of on 12 occasions for the circulation of propositions among the members of the District Board. The business of the Board is practically carried on by the official members. The non-official members take comparatively little interest in their duties, but content themselves generally with attending the meetings and agreeing to the proposals brought forward by the official members, who have worked satisfactorily.

6. The inadequate attendance of members at the meetings is to be accounted for in a measure by the fact that some of the members reside at long distances from the head-quarter station.

## STATEMENT II.

7. The year opened with a balance of Rs. 20,472-11-9. The income of the several Boards during the year amounted to Rs. 76,752-12-4. The total amount at the disposal of the Boards was thus Rs. 97,225-8-1. The items of income and the reasons for increases and decreases as compared with the last year are given below.

*VI.—Provincial Rates.*

8. The receipts under this head amounted to Rs. 48,238-2-0 as against Rs. 48,278-8-0 in the previous year, showing a decrease of Rs. 40-6-0 only, which needs no explanation.

*XII.—Interest.*

9. The sum of Rs. 715-11-2 is on account of the interest on the closing balances of certain minor municipalities which have been abolished. These balances were invested in Government paper, and the interest is annually credited to Local Funds in consideration of which the Local Board have undertaken to maintain certain institutions in the villages concerned. The sum of Rs. 52-2-8 against dispensaries under the same head is on account of interest on Rs. 1,500 invested in Government paper for Cháchra Dispensary at 31½ per cent.

10. *XVII—Police—Receipts under Cattle Trespass Act.*—The receipts under this head amount to Rs. 6,818-10-9 as against Rs. 5,605-4-2 in the previous year, showing an increase of Rs. 1,213-6-7, which is chiefly (a) due to larger receipts under this head in Sámghar Táluka owing to the opening of a pound in the Makhi Dhand in connection with measures taken for the suppression of outlawry. This existed for 5½ months during the year under report, whereas at the close of the previous year it had worked for a fortnight only; (b) to the abundance of fodder in the Umarnkot Táluka, owing to which cattle were not sent to the desert.

11. *XIX—Education.*—The sum of Rs. 58-4-0 is on account of fees levied in Khán and Mirpur schools in the táluka of Mirpur Khás. In other tálukas of this district no regular school fees are levied, as the district is generally in a backward condition as compared to other parts of Sind. The question has recently been before the Boards in connection with a proposal by Mr. E. Giles to levy fees, but they have all expressed their strong disinclination to do so.

As compared with the last year's figures there is a decrease of Rs. 93-15-3 only, which is chiefly due to larger actual balances during the year 1895-96 than in the year under report.

14. *XX—Medical Contributions, Rs. 66.*—This sum was received from the Umarkot and Mithi Municipalities towards vaccination charges under orders conveyed in Government Resolution No. 975, dated 14th March 1891, General Department.

15. *XXI—Scientific and other Minor Departments.*—The decrease of Rs. 140-12-0 under garden receipts as compared with the last year's figures is due to higher bids received for garden produce during the year 1895-96.

16. *Veterinary Receipts—Rs. 890-6-3.*—Mr. Sheikh Ahmed Mahomed Ismail, who joined the Veterinary College on the condition that on finishing his course at the college he would serve this district for a period of not less than three years on a salary of Rs. 50 per mensem and that he would undertake to refund to the Board all the expenses incurred by them in the event of relinquishing his post before the expiration of the prescribed period, obtained a diploma in May 1896 and declined to serve the Board as agreed upon by him, and refunded the sum of Rs. 727-5-11 out of the total sum of Rs. 890-6-3, being the amount incurred by the Board on account of his pay, contingencies, &c. The balance of Rs. 163-0-4 was received from Mr. Manukram Jethmal, who was sent in place of Mr. Sheikh Ahmed on the same conditions and also left the college without permission in October last, having received instruction for three months only. This student was therefore made to refund the above amount.

22. The incidence of taxation and that of income per head of population is shown against each Board. As desired in your No. 1733, dated the 6th August 1895, I here mention the progress made in material improvements in this district during the year under report :—Five bridges were constructed on the road from Umarkot to Sufi at an aggregate cost of Rs. 1,837 in order to facilitate traffic between Umarkot and Shádipalli and Rs. 5,006-4-9 were spent in constructing bridges and repairing the road along the bank of the Mithrau Canal to facilitate communication with the railway at Shádipali. A sum of Rs. 292-14-5 was spent in constructing a bridge on the karia of Sudhir Fakir on the road from Kandiari to Tando Mitha Khan and Rs. 2,618-9-11 were spent in constructing a travellers' bungalow at Sanghar. A school-house was constructed at Kantio in Cháchra Taluka at a cost of Rs. 358 and a well at Bantheri in taluka Khipra at a cost of Rs. 432.

44. The opening balance of the District and Táluka Board on the 1st April 1896 amounted to Rs. 20,472-11-9 and the income during the year under report amounted to Rs. 76,752-12-4, making a total of Rs. 97,225-8-1. The expenditure of the year amounted to Rs. 64,996-14-7, leaving a closing balance of Rs. 32,228-9-6. The maximum balance for this district is fixed at Rs. 8,000, whereas the balance on the 1st April 1897 amounted to Rs. 32,228-9-6. The excess is due to the orders of Government regarding economy in all branches of the administration and to several works provided for in the Budget for 1896-97 having been suspended under Government Resolution No.  $\frac{1556}{1005}$ , dated the 18th March 1897, in order to meet possible expenditure in towns in case the plague appeared in this district. The works have, however, again been provided in the current year's Budget.

## STATEMENT IV—SANITATION.

45. In the year under report one well was sunk and 28 wells repaired.

46. Although the district remained happily free from plague, practically it has been found necessary to incur certain expenses in connection therewith. During the year, Rs. 120-0-10 have been disbursed, as mentioned in paragraph 41, for the construction of "landhis" at Mirpur Khás. But this does not represent the total expenditure of the year, as "landhis" at Khipra and Shádipalli were constructed and have yet to be paid for. Moreover, owing to the outbreak of plague in Cutch Mándvi and its neighbourhood, it was found necessary to establish a number of camps of observation along the border to intercept travellers crossing the Ran of Cutch, and these have yet to be paid for. Rs. 237-8-6 on account of medicines were expended in connection with the plague as mentioned in paragraph 30, which, however, does not represent the total expenditure on this account, as other charges have been met since the close of the year.

47. Not as yet having had charge of the district during the tour season I have had few opportunities of personally inspecting works carried out by the Local Fund Department, but the few I have seen, appeared satisfactory: The office establishment has worked well under Mr. Ghanshamdás as Local Fund Accountant, regarding whom I can fully endorse Mr. Lucas' favourable opinion given in paragraph 42 of my report last year.

SIR,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Administration Report on the working of the Local Boards in the Upper Sind Frontier District for the year 1896-97, together with the statistical Tables I to IV in the form prescribed by the Government of India.

## STATEMENT I.

2. This statement shows the strength of each Local Board, the number of meetings held, and the average attendance at each. The Local Boards of this district are constituted in accordance with Government Resolution No. 9547, dated the 3rd December 1884.

3. The total population and the area of the district are the same as shown last year.

4. The number of meetings held during the year were sufficient, except in Jacobabad Taluka. The attention of the President of the Board is invited to this deficiency, which it is hoped will not be noticed in the next year.

5. The District Local Board held two half-yearly meetings. On 19 occasions the provisions of Section 34 of the Local Boards Act were availed of.

6. The business of the Board is as usual carried on by the official members; the others do little more than attend meetings and acquiesce in the proposals placed before them, though they occasionally suggest new works such as wells, but they do no supervision of works in progress and are entirely apathetic.

- (1) The decrease in the grant to school buildings is partly due to Government having stopped any further payments owing to financial embarrassment—*vide* Government Resolution No. 7 of 4th January 1897, Educational Department—and partly to the construction of fewer buildings.
- (2) The fishery receipts show a falling off, which is due to the unfavourable inundation during the year under report.
- (3) Sand and Quarry Fees.—This is of a fluctuating nature and calls for no explanation.
- (4) Grant for Horse Shows.—The Sind Horse Show is held at Jacobabad and Shikárpur every alternate year. During the year under report it was held at Jacobabad, where it will in future be held, and the Government grant was therefore credited to this district. Last year it was paid to the Shikárpur District.
- (b) From other Boards.—Under this head are shown grants to the following dispensaries paid from Local Funds :—

20. The income of the year from all sources was Rs. 80,710-10-7 as against Rs. 85,852-9-9, which when added to the closing balance of the last year, Rs. 57,656-11-6, gave a total of Rs. 1,38,367-6-1.

21. The incidence of taxation and that of income per head of population is shown against each Board. The incidence of taxation on the whole district population is Re. 0-4-11 and the incidence of income (excluding opening balance) is Re. 0-8-0. This shows a decrease of 9 pies in the former and 6 pies in the latter as contrasted with the preceding year.

32. The sum of Rs. 1,578-12-8 shown under the sub-head "Establishment and Contingencies" appertaining to "Public Works" subordinate to "45. Civil Works in charge of Civil Officers" represents the pay, travelling allowance and contingencies of the overseer's establishment. I may remark that the overseer has not only been useful for inspecting works, but prepares plans and estimates and thereby saves the Board from the 12 per cent. charges of the Public Works Department. I would here further observe that the works under each Board in my district are inspected also by Works Committees appointed for each Táluka Local Board in terms of Rule 2 of the Local Board rules consisting of not less than 5 members. The several works in progress in each táluka are inspected by them, or the Presidents or Vice-Presidents of the Boards requesting them to do so. In consequence of the members being very illiterate, however, the measurement of works and such kind of assistance as is given to the Mukhtyárkar, in the Jerruck Division for instance, cannot be applied here at present.

33. The sum of Rs. 1,690-7-0 shown under "Tools and Plant" represents the cost of a well-boring apparatus purchased by the Board with a view to test the soil before actually undertaking the construction of any well.

34. The total expenditure on civil works amounted to Rs. 40,273-3-6 as against Rs. 35,323-6-10 last year, showing an increase of Rs. 4,941-12-8. The

expenditure on planting and preservation of road-side trees, which during 1895-96 was shown under "Petty Establishments" subordinate to "32. Miscellaneous," has during the year under report been shown under "Communications Repairs" subordinate to "45. Civil Works" as explained in paragraph 31 above. In view of the prevailing famine, several works, which were provided in the Budget estimate of the year, were held in abeyance in order to reserve as large a balance in the treasury as possible, as desired by Government in their Resolution No. 4046, dated 28th November 1896.

35. The sum of Rs. 100 shown under "Contributions to other Boards" represents contribution to the Zoological Garden, Karáchi.

36. The entire expenditure of the year was Rs. 76,731-2-0 as against Rs. 68,913-10-1 last year, leaving a balance of Rs. 61,636-4-1 at the close of the year.

#### STATEMENT IV.

37. This statement shows the number and cost of new tanks and wells dug or sunk and other sources of water-supply repaired by each Board, and requires no comment.

38. The Village Sanitation Act is not in force in any of the villages in this district.

39. No special grants were made by Government during the year for water-supply works in this district.

40. The progress made in material improvements in this district during the year under report is detailed below:—

#### *Communications.*

Twenty-one bridges costing Rs. 8,543-14-7 were constructed in the district. One mile of the Jacobabad-Shikárpur road was embanked at an outlay of Rs. 615. 986 miles of roads and 110 bridges were repaired at a cost of Rs. 16,747-11-0. The work of planting and preservation of trees also received attention, and Rs. 3,894-5-0 were spent on it.

#### *Water-supply and Water Works.*

The tank at Garhi Khyro was widened and deepened at a cost of Rs. 662-5-9, and the existing sources of water-supply were improved at an outlay of Rs. 2,018-1-3.

#### *Miscellaneous Public Improvements.*

Improvements to 16 camping grounds were carried out at a cost of Rs. 1,445-10-5.

#### *Public Buildings.*

Rs. 387 were expended for additions to the musáfirkhána at Mahád.

Additions to the existing school building were carried out at an outlay of Rs. 391-15-9. The total outlay on material improvements in the district was Rs. 34,705-15-9.

41. The work of the Local Fund office has been carried on by Mr. Narain-sing, at present Acting Head Clerk, with his usual care and ability and knowledge of detail. As he is the next senior now for promotion, it is anticipated that his services may not be available for this district for very long. I would therefore take this opportunity of noting these services, and remarking that, especially with regard to the Horse Show, he will be much missed.
