REPORT.

To the Most Honourable the Marquis of Salisbury, Secretary of State for India.

MY LORD MARQUIS,

India Office, 28th July 1874.

I have the honour to submit to your Lordship the following Report on Railways in India for the year 1873-74, showing the progress which has been made in their construction, together with the capital expended on them, and the results of the working of those which are open for traffic.

- 2. At the commencement of last year, 5,384 miles of railway were open. A length of 483 miles has been added since that time, 312 miles during the year 1873, and 171 miles in the present year, making a total length of 5,872 miles, upon which traffic is now carried. Of this, 727 miles consist of double lines, and 5,141 of single, 5,725 miles being constructed on the broad or 5' 6" gauge, 28 on a four-feet, and 115 on the narrow or metre gauge. There are now in course of execution 1,033 miles of the metre and 816 of the 5' 6" gauge; and 168 miles of the Great Southern are about to be converted to the metre gauge.
- 3. The principal part of the additional extent opened, viz., 229 miles, belongs to the lines in Oude and Rohilkund. These provinces are now supplied with 523 miles of railway. The system extends from Moradabad on the west to Buxar on the east, and joins the East Indian Railway by means of branches at Allyghur and Cawnpore, where bridges are being constructed over the river Ganges; and at Benarcs and Buxar, where the communication will be effected by ferries. It is in contemplation to continue the present western extremity at Moradabad to some point, probably Saharunpoor, on the existing railway between Delhi and Lahore.
- 4. Of the Rajpootana State Railways, 90 miles have also been completed. The section from Delhi to Rewaree, with a branch to the Furrucknugger Salt Works, in all $58\frac{1}{2}$ miles, was opened for salt traffic in February, and for ordinary traffic in July; and the Agra and Bhurtpore section, 32 miles in length, was opened in August last. The progress on the other portions of this system is satisfactory, its completion being dependent upon the large bridges, of which there are several. The revised estimates for these lines show that the cost will now amount to 1,452,000l, or 5,800l. per mile.
- 5. As an instance of cheap and rapid construction, the Dakore branch of the Bombay, Baroda and Central India Railway may be mentioned. The line was commenced in November last, and was opened for passenger traffic on the 8th April. It has cost about 4,000*l*. per mile. It was of course an easy line to construct, but the materials were provided from this country, and the works, which were on the 5'6" with 60 lb. rails scale, could not have been completed in so short a time without great energy on the part of the chief engineer, Mr. Mathew, and his staff.
- 6. Very satisfactory progress has been made in the Nizam's State Railway, the operations on which have been conducted with considerable energy and skill. The greater part of the line is now ready for the rails, many miles of which have been laid, and it is expected that above 100 miles will be fit to receive an engine by the end of the present year.
- 7. Amongst the important engineering works completed during the year must be noticed the great viaduct over the Kistnah River. Uninterrupted railway communication is thus established between Madras and Bombay. The bridge, which was designed by Mr. George Berkley, and constructed under the superintendence of Mr. Lindsley, consists of 36 openings of 100 feet span in the clear, or 107 feet

received the Royal assent. The provisions thereof at once come into operation. affairs in India have been conducted under one management for the last six months.

SHIPMENTS ON ACCOUNT OF THE RAILWAYS IN 1873.

Shipments.

14. During the year 118,245 tons of materials for the construction and maintenance of the railways, exclusive of 10 locomotives and 85,499 tons of fuel have been shipped to India. The value of the goods was 1,448,254l., and of the coal, coke, and patent fuel, 116,410l.; and it cost 310,549l. to send them to their destinations. It will be observed that the freights to Bombay this year were much higher than those to Calcutta. This, combined with the high price of coal in this country, placed the west coast lines to a greater disadvantage even than usual with respect to the cost of working as compared with the East Indian and Eastern Bengal Railways. Of the above quantities, 59,896 tons, of the value of 789,195l., were sent out for the State lines. Two ships were lost, laden with goods for the Great Indian Peninsula, and the Bombay, Baroda and Central India Railways, of the value of 2,814l. and 2,604l. respectively. Both cargoes were fully insured.

ber 1873 was 62,318, as compared with 61,940 on the same day the year before. Of these, 56,597 consisted of shareholders or stockholders registered in England and 900 registered in India. Of the latter, 421 only were natives. The remaining 4,821 are holders of debentures and debenture stock. The total amount of capital issued at the same date was 94,720,000*l*., of which 1,282,000*l*. had been subscribed in India.

PERSONS EMPLOYED ON THE RAILWAYS.

16. It appears from the following table that on the 30th September 1873 the number of persons employed in working the railways, including the Indus Flotilla, connected with the Scinde and Punjab systems, was 75,661. Of these, 2,990, or 3.95 per cent., were Europeans; 2,072, or 2.73, were East Indians, and the rest natives. Efforts continue to be made to train natives to fill positions, such as those held by engineers, engine-drivers, fitters, &c., which have usually been held by Europeans sent out from this country; so that, while the proportion of Europeans to natives is small, still further reduction may in time be expected in the number of the former.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE.

Expenditure during year 1873.

17. A sum of 4,010,343l. has been expended on the construction of railways during the year 1873, 2,027,337l. by the Government on State lines, and 1,983,009l. by the guaranteed companies. Of this amount, 1,469,310l. was expended in England,—441,282l. by the Government, and 1,028,028l. by the companies,—and 2,541,033l. in India, 1,586,052l. on State lines and 954,981l. on guaranteed lines. The companies commenced the year with a balance of 3,565,447l. and left off with one of 2,797,435l.

Total expenditure. 18. The whole expenditure on railways in India up to the end of 1873 from the commencement of operations in 1850 has been 97,816,291*l*., of which 92,417,739*l*. consists of guaranteed capital, and 5,398,552*l*. has been expended direct by Government. The amount expended in each year by the companies is given in a statement which follows. The manner in which such expenditure has been divided amongst the various items comprising the construction accounts is also stated below.

Capital raised by companies.

19. The railway companies had raised up to the end of the official year, viz., the 31st March, a sum of 94,725,815*l*., which is divided, as follows, into share capital, debentures, and debenture stock:—

20. It will thus be seen that at the present time $82,893,\overline{790l}$ is receiving interest at 5 per cent., 1,349,970l at $4\frac{1}{4}$, 4,132,450l at $4\frac{1}{2}$, 1,302,550 at $4\frac{1}{4}$, and 4,516,528l at 4 per cent. per annum. The sum of 530,527l not bearing interest consists of premiums upon shares or stock which were issued above par. I say at the present time, for the rates of interest on the borrowed capital have varied, and will still vary. During the past year, debentures which were originally issued at 5 per cent. have been renewed at 4. The rate at which debenture stock may hereafter be issued will also depend upon the state of the money market.

Note.—The total expenditure in India in each year as shown in the above Statement will not be found to coincide with that shown in the Indian Finance and Revenue Accounts, owing to the fact that the transfers of expenditure to Revenue Account can at present only be made in the books in this country on receipt of the half-yearly Appropriation Statements to June and December, instead of being apportioned each month, as in the Indian Books.

Note.—Before leaving the subject of Capital, I may mention that after my last Report had been printed and distributed I discovered that an error had been made in the calculation as to the mileage cost of the East Indian Railway in pp. 23-25. Instead of coming out at 12,250*l.*, to which, after eliminating certain extraordinary and unavoidable expenses, I had brought the cost per mile of single line, it should have been 12,606*l*.

ACCIDENTS.

21. The total number of accidents to passenger trains officially reported during the year was 258, of which 13 were caused by collisions, 20 by trains getting off the proper line, 26 by fires, 165 by cattle trespassing, and 34 by other and minor causes. The number of persons injured was 438. Of these, 96 were passengers, 236 railway servants, and the rest trespassers. There were 166 deaths, 13 passengers, 74 railway servants, and 79 trespassers. In the previous year the number killed was 211, of whom 9 were passengers and 154 servants. Last year three passengers lost their lives through accidents beyond their control, and 54 were injured in the same way. In like manner two railway servants were killed and

C

28 injured, 72 having been killed and 134 injured by causes which they might have avoided.

22. The most serious accident occurred on the Great Indian Peninsula Railway, near Barsee Road, on the night of the 21st September, when two passengers were killed and ten much injured. It was caused by a defect in the road produced by a washing away of ballast from under the rails and sleepers. "The rails thus deprived of support, either broke under the weight of the engine or bent so much as to cause it to leave the road and strike the masonry of the drain, which it partially carried away, eventually coming to a stand a few yards beyond. The tender, road van, and six leading 3rd class carriages were smashed to pieces, the five vehicles being piled on the top of one another.

23. The receipts of the railways during the year 1873, after paying all expenses, Net receipts. amounted to 3,185,069l., being 315,846l. in excess of the previous year.

24. The gross receipts were 6,742,790l., compared with 6,351,614l. of 1872, and Gross rethe expenses 3,557,7211., or 53 per cent., compared with 3,482,3941., or 55 per cent.

25. The revenue for each of the last five years and the amounts paid for Annual reguaranteed interest in each year have been as follows:-

26. It will thus be seen that the net amount borne by the state has in the five years averaged 1,550,996l. per annum, and that while in the first year of the five the deficiency was 1,492,919l., in the last it was 1,428,442l.

27. When it is borne in mind that during this time the open mileage has been

increased by about 1,000 miles these results are disappointing.

28. It may be observed, however, that trade for the last few years has not been Trade since in a satisfactory or flourishing state. The imports of merchandise show an actual 1869. falling off.

29. The want of proper access to many of the stations on the lines is also one Causes of cause of the slow progress which has hitherto been made in the development of the slow protraffic. When this deficiency has been supplied, and when feeders to the existing gress. lines are constructed, a marked improvement will probably appear.

- 30. The East Indian Railway, for example, will very likely receive a considerable amount of traffic from the Oude and Rohilkund Railway. The Great Indian Peninsula will be fed by the Indore line, and the Bombay, Baroda, and Central India by the branches to Patree and Dakore, lately constructed at a moderate cost.
- 31. An enlightened system of management is, however, also required to promote success. A reference to the statements regarding the traffic and working in a following part of this report will show on what lines there is most room for improvement.
- 32. The following tables give the revenue of each railway for the last two years, and the guaranteed interest paid to each company.

TRAFFIC AND WORKING.

33. The printed statements given on pp. 29-40 present full details of the traffic and working of the railways during the year 1873. I regret, however, that the failure of the agency of the Oude and Rohilkund Company to furnish the usual statistical returns causes some of the statements to be incomplete. tions also cannot, necessarily, be so exact as they otherwise would have been, and strictly accurate comparisons of general results are rendered impossible.

Passenger traffic.

34. It will be seen that 22,243,220 passengers of all classes and 14,584 season ticket holders were carried by upwards of 70,300 trains, and that the number of Goodstraffic. miles travelled by these trains was 5,627,183. The goods conveyed amounted to 3,266,062 tons of merchandize and 669,826 tons of minerals, which were placedin 111,000 trains, and the miles travelled by these trains were 9,020,705 and 200,917 respectively.

Expenses.

35. The cost of doing this work amounted to 3,491,1581., being 25.31. per train. and 4.46s. per train mile.

36. The gross receipts, exclusive of the Indus Flotilla, amounted to 6,671,6761.

being 48:34l. per train, and 7:82s. per train mile.

37. The receipts from passengers last year, including the Indus Flotilla, were 2,194,607*l*., compared with 2,085,340*l*. of the year 1872. The receipts from goods were 4,292,005l., compared with 3,964,614l. of the previous year.

38. The number of passengers carried last year was nearly 2,000,000 in excess of the previous year. The usual proportion of classes is preserved, but the absence of the Oude and Rohilkund returns prevents the exact ratio being arrived at.

39. Comparing last year's returns with those of 1869, five years ago, the results are as follows, viz.:-

40. The goods traffic last year exceeded the amounts conveyed in 1872 by 336,465 tons, and that of 1869 by 230,524 tons only, the receipts in 1873 being 4,292,000*l*. compared with 3,705,364*l*. in 1869.

41. The passenger traffic has thus been increasing at the rate of about 1,231,000 in numbers, and 139,6981. in receipts yearly. The goods traffic fluctuates very much, and on the average has only increased in amount at the rate of 46,100 tons while the receipts have increased at the rate of 115,327*l*, per annum.

42. This cannot be regarded as satisfactory progress, especially when the

increased mileage is borne in mind.

43. Very useful results are gained by comparing the working of one line with another; for after making every allowance for variety of circumstances, a great deal will be found to depend upon management, in which, of course, must be included a fair and accommodating tariff of rates and fares. It is easy to show in one case that the cost of fuel is much greater, and in another that the up and down traffic of a line is very unequal as compared with others, but if it can be shown that the train loads on one are much less than on another, that the dead weight compared with the paying load is higher, and that the average cost of maintenance per train mile is greater, there is proof that one is under more skilful or energetic

management than another. I would draw particular attention to the discrepancies and disparities in these items of expenditure on the different lines, which are similar in character, and which need not necessarily show such diversity; and I would remark generally that the careful and vigilant attention of all those concerned in the management of the railways is urgently required to improve receipts and to diminish expenditure. In some circumstances the incentive of self-interest may be advantageously employed to produce good results. As an example of what care, stimulated by the hope of reward, will Expenditure effect, it may be mentioned that during the last three years, when bonuses on a on different effect, it may be mentioned that during the last three years, when bonuses on a on different effect. regulated scale have been given to firemen and drivers on the East Indian Rail- lines. way for economy in the use of fuel, the average consumption of fuel per engine mile fell from 61\frac{1}{3} lbs. to 46\frac{1}{3} lbs., showing a saving of 15 lbs. per mile. The whole amount saved during this period was, according to the report of the locomotive superintendent, 133,922 tons, which at 10s. per ton would represent 66,9611. The amount paid to the drivers and firemen was about 7801.

44. In referring to the management of the East Indian Railway, the Government bear the following testimony,—" the rates for the carriage of certain staples " have been reduced; local agencies have been established in some places as an " experimental measure; tables of vernacular rates have been prepared for all " stations and have been circulated in the districts. Overcharges and claims are promptly settled and goods are rapidly delivered." This was written before the

work in connection with the movement of grain began.

45. The most striking feature in the traffic of the years 1873 and 1874 is the Traffic in very large movement of grain to those stations on the East Indian and Eastern grain during Bengal Railways which are situated in, or which are close to, the districts where 1873 and scarcity existed. This movement has had only a trifling effect upon the receipts of the year to which this report relates, but it has had a great influence over the results of the current half-year. During the year 1872, the quantity of grain conveyed on the East Indian, Eastern Bengal, and Punjab and Delhi Railways amounted to 254,213 tons. In 1873 it rose to 477,528 tons. The traffic was also stimulated by the reduction in the rate of conveyance, while the railway receipts were unaffected by the lower charge, in consequence of the Government making up the difference between that and the usual rate. During the first five months of the present year about 544,233 tons of food grains have been conveyed by railway from Calcutta and from the Punjab to the famine-stricken districts. By no other means, probably, could so large a quantity have been transported from one part of India to another. Additional proof is thus given of the great importance of railway communication. Without it the exertions of Government and the outlay incurred must have been increased tenfold. With railways and a well-conceived system of irrigation, famines may become unknown, although seasons of scarcity may occasionally occur. In other staples, such as cotton, sugar, hides, &c., the traffic has diminished, and piece-goods have been nearly stationary. Salt increased on all the lines, except the Great Southern of India, and the jute conveyed on the Eastern Bengal Railway rose from 103,691 tons in 1872 to 124,049 tons in

46. We have our holidays, and royal visitors, and festive gatherings in this How traffic country to produce traffic on the railways. In India the same things occur, but is affected. there are also religious pilgrimages and festivals and certain customs peculiar to the country, which, as affecting the traffic, it may be worth while to mention. During the past year the passenger traffic on the lines in Western India has been less, in consequence of the suspension of marriages and the absence of marriage feasts, the year 1872-73 being the one out of every twelfth year in which no marriages take place amongst Hindoos living between the rivers Kistna and Godavery. Another example was a great bathing festival at the Ganges on the occasion of the eclipse of the moon, when special trains on the Oude and Rohileund Railway brought large numbers to the river.

47. As experience is gained various contrivances are suggested for improving Contrivances the comfort and convenience and for meeting the requirements of passengers. An for giving apparatus for cooling carriages in the hottest weather is now fixed to a certain comfort to number in each train. Several plans have been tried, and after trial the best will be adopted. Tinted glass in the windows has also been found to give relief from the glare. The accommodation provided for sleeping during long journeys and other conveniences help to reduce the fatigue of travelling in a tropical climate.

Rates and fares on State lines. The greatest enemy to comfort is the dust, which is to a certain extent subdued by the tatties used for cooling the sides of the carriages.

48. On the State Railways which have been opened in Raipootana a novel prin-

48. On the State Railways which have been opened in Rajpootana a novel principle is being tried in fixing the rates and fares. Instead of making the charge depend upon a mileage rate, a station to station rate is adopted, irrespective of actual mileage, and a low scale is taken. With regard to goods, they are divided into three classes only, a special class, however, being provided below the ordinary lowest class to which articles in any of the other classes may be transferred, if desirable.

SUMMARY.

49. There are now open in India 5,872 miles of railway, which have cost about 97,000,000*l*., giving an average expenditure of 16,536*l*. a mile. Of this length, 727 miles are laid with a double line, and 5,725 miles on the 5 ft. 6 in. gauge. A further extent of 1,850 miles is now in course of execution, of which 817 miles will be on the 5 ft. 6 in. and 1,033 on the metre gauge. It has lately been decided that the Indus Valley line shall be constructed on the 5 ft. 6 in. instead of on the narrow gauge. During last year 312 miles of additional line were opened.

50. The quantity of materials sent out from this country last year amounted to 118,670 tons, exclusive of 10 locomotives and 85,499 tons of fuel. The Government were the chief consignors, having shipped nearly 60,000 tons for the State railways. Since the commencement of railway operations in India about 4,700,000 tons of materials have been despatched to that country, of the value of

31,150,000%.

51. The proprietors of Indian railway securities numbered 62,318 on the 1st January, being only 378 in addition to the previous year. Of these, 56,597 were shareholders registered in England, and 4,821 were holders of debenture bonds or stock. Only 900 shareholders reside in India, of whom 421, or '67 per cent. of the whole, are natives.

52. Upwards of 4,000,000*l*. was expended in the construction of railways during the year 1873, the expenditure being nearly equally divided between the Government and the companies. The whole amount of guaranteed capital which had been raised to the 31st March last was 94,725,000*l*., of which 92,417,000*l*. had been expended. The sum expended direct by the Government amounted to 5,398,000*l*., making a total expenditure of upwards of 100,000,000*l*.

53. The net revenue derived from the railways amounted to 3,185,000*l*., being upwards of 315,000*l*. in excess of the previous year. The gross receipts were 6,742,000*l*. compared with 6,351,000*l*., and the expenses 3,557,000*l*. compared with 3,482,394*l*. The guaranteed interest advanced by the Government was 1,428,442*l*.

in excess of the revenue.

54. The passenger traffic increased from 20,332,823 in 1872 to 22,243,220, and produced 2,194,515*l*. instead of 2,085,942*l*. The goods amounted to 3,266,062 and the minerals to 669,826 tons, and the receipts were 4,294,160*l*. compared with 3,964,614*l*. The miscellaneous traffic was 254,114*l*. as against 301,061*l*.

55. The expenses of maintenance amounted to 786,453l. and of working to 2,771,268l., being at the rate of 53 per cent. of the gross receipts as compared with 55 per cent. in the previous year. On the East Indian the rate was 38. On the Scinde, Punjab, and Delhi it was 69. The number of trains run was 137,406 compared with 155,594 of the previous year. The train mileage was 15,650,597 compared with 14,543,862. The train mileage receipts averaged 8.52s.; the expenses 4.46s.

56. The conclusions to be drawn from the results of last year's operations are, that the normal condition of the railways is, under existing circumstances, one of slow progress; that the railways are capable of doing more work; that with branches and good roads judiciously laid out traffic will increase; that in most cases a reduction in expenditure is feasible; that with proper care and economy and an enlightened management the majority of the lines would become more profitable

and probably remunerative.

APPENDIX BY MR. A. M. RENDEL.

The following tables are prepared on the basis of those published as an appendix to

the Annual Reports for 1871 and 1872.

Actual expenditure only during the half year is included in working expenses, no notice being taken of sums put apart out of the revenue of the half for renewals or repairs to be done in future half. In the case of the Madras the sum charged to the half year for the renewal of the Cheyair Bridge is excluded.

The Government returns do not yet give passenger and goods mileage separately. They have been obtained separately from the Companies' Reports, or on application.

Sundry receipts, demurrage, electric telegraph and ferry profits are treated as a credit to working expenses; that is, they are deducted from them, leaving on the receipt side only receipts for the actual transport of passengers and goods by railway.
