BIBLIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

GENERAL HISTORIES AND BIBLIOGRAPHIES

The forthcoming Volume VIII of *The Cambridge History of the British Empire* will probably supersede the present standard histories of South Africa, both in general narrative and in the comprehensive bibliographical sections. At the time of writing (1932), there is S. Mendelssohn's *South African Bibliography* (2 vols., 1910), whilst the most useful single volume history is that of E. A. Walker (1928). The volumes of G. M. Theal and Sir George Cory suffer from lack of interpretative insight, and from a tendency to present the detailed annals, rather than the historical development, of South Africa. F. R. Cana's *South Africa from the Great Trek to the Union* (1909) is a useful guide for the general reader.

SPECIAL SUBJECTS

South African Pre-History is surveyed in the following works : J. P. Johnson : *Stone Implements of South Africa* (1908), and *The Prehistoric Period in South Africa* (1912); M. C. Burkitt : *South Africa's Past in Stone and Paint* (1928). On the Bushman paintings, reference may be made to the volume by H. M. Tongue (1909), and for the Zimbabwe ruins, to G. Caton-Thompson : *Zimbabwe Culture* (1931).

Some of the more important works on the Native

Races, and on the history of Native Policy in South Africa are :

G. W. Stow : *The Native Races of South Africa* (1910) ; S. M. Molema : *The Bantu, Past and Present* (1920) ; C. G. Seligman : *Races of Africa* (Home University Library, 1930) ; H. A. Stayt : *The Bavenda* (1931) ; J. H. Soga : *The Ama-Xosa : Life and Customs* (1932) ; and E. H. Brooke's : *History of Native Policy in South Africa* (1924).

Prof. W. M. Macmillan has written two important books on the treatment of the "Coloured," and Native, peoples in the first half of the nineteenth century, viz. : *The Cape Colour Problem*, and *Bantu, Boer and Briton* (1927-9). See also J. du Plessis : *Christian Missions in South Africa* (1911). For the latest judgment on the Great Trek, the student may be referred to : A. F. Hattersley, in *History*, XVI, pp. 50-4.

Special aspects of South African history are surveyed in the following works : G. W. Eybers : *Select Constitutional Documents Illustrating South African History 1795-1910* (1918) ; A. P. Newton : *Select Documents relating to the Unification of South Africa* (1924) ; C. Headlam : *The Milner Papers : South Africa* (1931) ; *The Times History of the War in South Africa* (7 vols., 1900-9) ; E. H. Walton : *Inner History of the National Convention* (1912) ; and John Buchan : *History of the South African Forces in France* (1920).

A few biographies only can be mentioned. There are good lives of Piet Retief, by G. S. Preller ; Sir George Grey, by G. C. Henderson ; J. C. Molteno, by P. A. Molteno ; Sir B. Frere, by W. B. Worsfold ; Cecil Rhodes, by Basil Williams ; and by J. G. McDonald ; Jan Hofmeyr, by J. H. Hofmeyr ; Sir S. Jameson, by Ian Colvin ; General Botha,

by Earl Buxton ; and Lord de Villiers, by E. A. Walker. To these may be added : Sir Harry Smith's *Autobiography* (1903) and the *Memoirs of Paul Kruger* (2 vols., 1902).

MISCELLANEOUS WORKS

An excellent *Historical Atlas of South Africa* has been produced by Prof. Walker. J. H. Hofmeyr's *South Africa* (1931) interprets the Union in a valuable and suggestive way. For Rhodesia, the student may refer to H. M. Hole : *The Making of Rhodesia* (1926). On the subject of social life, the general reader will find instruction in : A. P. Trotter : *The Old Cape Colony* (1908) ; C. G. Botha : *Social Life in the Cape Colony in the 18th Century* (1927) ; D. Fairbridge : *Letters from the Cape by Lady Duff Gordon* (1927), and *Historic Houses of South Africa* (1922).

The Van Riebeeck Society (Cape Town) reprints annually old books and documents relating to the history of the Union, the majority with an English translation from the original Dutch or German.

General Smuts's book *Africa and Some World Problems* (1930) throws light on the outlook of the South African Party leader on many of South Africa's urgent problems.

The standpoint of General Smuts has been criticized, and his conclusions challenged, by J. H. Oldham, in *White and Black in Africa* (1930). The student should also refer to J. S. Huxley, *Africa View* (1931).

A somewhat disparaging, but provocative and stimulating view of Afrikaner ideals, is that of Leonard Barnes, in *Caliban in Africa* (1930).

On the subject of the Afrikaans language and culture, the English reader may refer to the *Union*
