Despatches to England, Vol 16, pp. 1-5.*]

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONOURABLE THE UNITED COMPANY
OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND
TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

The Unfortunate Occasion of this Unexpected Address from us is to advise your Honours of the Loss of your valuable settlement of Madrass which to our Unspeakable Concern is now in the possession of our Enemys the French. As the Gentlemen there seem to think the absence of his Majesties squadron (which they no doubt depended upon for Assurance) greatly conduced to this Misfortune, We shall give an Account [of] what we know for certainty of their Motions only; and leave your Ho[nours] to form Judgement without presuming to give any of our own.

The 29th. April M^r. Barnet departed this Life at [this] Place when all the ships were here or near us, but the Winchester [Lord] Thomas Bertie who was Expected daily from Bombay and arrived [the] 25th. May. from which time Captain Peyton who then commanded [the] squadron as Senior Captain determined on going to refit his ship the Medway which was very leaky at Trancomalay Bay, on the Islands of Zeylone and to take the whole squardon with him. The 30th. your Honours ship the Princess Mary arrived on whom we had Orders to s[en]d to Madrass what Bales we had ready and to receive from Lord Thomas Bertie sixty (60) chests of Treasure brought from Bombay on your Honours account, to keep what we wanted for the Use of this settlement and to send the remainder on the Princess Mary but not to detain her longer in our Road than the squadron staid there In pursuance of which we [have] kept sixteen (16) Chests here and loaded the remainder on that ship and prevailed on Captain Payton to stay till the 9th. June, but it hapning to blow very fresh at that time we could not load more than Two hundred and Twenty two (222) Bales, which as it has since proved was [very] fortunate. The 9th. she sailed for Madrass under Convoy of his Majesties ship the Lively as did the rest of the squadron for Trancomalay. On the 17th. Captain Payton wrote M^r. Hinde from Negapatam that as they were Just got to the Bay, the Preston's Bow sprit was sprung and she cou'd Carry no sail, for [which] reason they were oblig'd to Bare away for that Place in order to refit her and than [to proceed for] Trincomalay. On the 25th. at day Break fr[om the] Mast head [in Negap]atam Road they [made] several ships [in . . .] out and [found them to] be (9) Nine French ships but the Winds being very light, they cou'd not get up with each other till half past four in the Evening, at which time a[n] Engagement began and lasted till about seven when it grew dark, the next Morning they were near one another and continued so all the day, At Fo[ur] in the afternoon Captain Peyton summoned a Council of Warr, where it was agreed not to Engage the Enemy but to proceed for Trancomalay Bay, [as] the French did for Pondicherry and arrived there the 27th. In the English squadron where fourteen killed and Forty six wounded, but not One killed or hurt on the Medway. On the French side we cannot learn the[se] particulars for any Certainty. Their squadron consisted of the Achilles [a] seventy Gun ship, six company's ships and Two Country ships. The Achilles with three of them left Europe together in April was Twelve Months. Two of them were returning ships detained at the Islands for this Purpose and all Reinforced as much as they could there, Captain Peyton kept the squadron at Trancomalay till the beginning of August when he came on the Coast and appeared off Negapatam the 6th. The French squadon consisting of Eight ships (One being

gone to Bengal and is since lost in that River with two hundred & Eighty (280) Europeans) Weighed from Pondicherry the 24th. July for the southward, and [was] then in that Road, stood out to meet the English squadron which stood the southward from them, and the French then returned, the 7th. both squadrons did the same, as likewise the 8th. and 9th. The 10th. the English disappeared on which the French returned, and on the 13th. Anchored in Pondicherry Road. The 17th. the Eight ships Weighed for Madrass Road where they arrived the 18th. and Fired on the Princess Mary, which was returned from the ship and from the Fort. Each ship gave her a broad side as she stood to the Northward and another as she returned, and the[n] stood to the southward again. We are since informed they had Two [Na]tives for this Expedition, One was to make a Plea with the Country Government that the English Committed the first Hostility's Ashoar and the oth[er] to see if Captain Peyton woud come to our Assistance or not. The 23rd. Captain Peyton with the Squadron stood into Pullicat Road where [he] sent his Lieutenant Mr. Weeims on board a vessel in the Road who there told of all the Circumstances of their Attacking the Princess M[ary] and of their then being between Madras and Pondicherry, on wh[ich] he disappeared and has never since been heard of, or from, by any of the English though their has no [Cost] or Pains been spared for that Purpose, as may Easily be imagined from the since Mellancholly cituat[ion] of Affairs on this Coast. The last letter that was received from any One belonging to the squadron was from Captain Payton to Govern^r. Mo[rse] dated the 4th. August when he was Just come out from refitting. This Unhappy conduct of his so animated our Enemy's, That they deter[m]ined on attacking Fort St. George. We call it unhappy because it has [triumphed] in its consequences, though what reasons Captain Peyton [should have] had for this P[ro]ceeding we know not. Accordingly the [*a few words lost*] Weighed again for Pondicherry. They landed their Men at St. Thome and thereabouts, and the 5th. began the attack cheifly depending upon their shells. The 10th. the Town surrenderd but on what Terms as we are not perfectly Informed, we shall not presume to trouble your Honour's with Flying Reports. We are pretty well assured there are as yet no Terms Complyed with and that Monsieur De Preminil is gone there from Pondicherry to command the Garrison. The 2^d. Instant the seven French ships in the Road haveing taken what Quantity of Money, Goods, Ammunition and stores they thought proper were to sail the 3^d. for Pondicherry and from thence immediately hither to Attack this Place, but it pleased God that Night and the next Morning it Blew so hard as to Founder the DucdeOrleans their second ship in force & Two more. The Achilles of seventy Guns, the Commodores and only ship of considerable Force either Cut away, or lost all her Masts, as did the three others so that Twelve hundred (1200) Men have perished and the whole squadron is Utterly disabled and their Design against this place renderd Impracticable for the present though it is the opinion of most of our officers that had they Come we shou'd have taken up more of their Time than they had to spare. We have about Twenty of the King's people that were left ashoar sick who have put our Gunroom in Excellent Order some of the People came to us from Madrass though not many. The additions and alterations to our Fort within this Twelve month have made [it] Infinitely more secure than it was. We have full six months Provision of all kinds in the Fort so that we doubt not we should have been [able] to make a defence for a Considerable Time had they come. They now Talk of Comeing to Us by Land. In which case We bless God we are no ways Apprehensive but with the Common Protection of Providence we [shall] be able to Defend and secure this place till we are releived, for which Purpose We assure your Honours our Utmost Endeavours shall be Us[ed]. Your Honours vessels the Meirmaid and Advice Snow were both taken [by] the French squadron in Madrass Road and both lost in the Storm. The Princess Mary was skuttled and run into the surf, but is since got off by the French; The Sumatra and Brilliant from the West Coast passed by this Road the 19th. August, They were near Enough for us to see they had Colours out, and we knowing the French squadron was off Conimere or thereabouts made a Waft of our Flag for six hour's and Fired a Gun which the Masters say they did not see, and sailed on into the squadron, w^{ch}. haveing English Colours they took for ours, and were lost but had Time

to Throw their Papers Overboard. It must Naturally appear to your Honour's and indeed to all the World a very Extraordinary circumstance that the Nabob and Country Government should permit our Enemies to Take this Advantage of us, When it has been obedience to their Commands and for the Peace and Welfare of their Country alone That [had prevented] the English along while from Acting in the same manner by [the French] and thereby putting it out of their power to give us this [. . .] answer to which the French say they had the Nabob's permission [for comm] itting these Hostillitys Ashoar and do not scruple to declare publicly they gave him One hundred Thousand (100,000) Pagodas for the Liberty of so doing and when they landed their people they produced his Perwanah which met with Universal Credit though the Nabob now disown's his haveing granted [and] Your Honours may be sure all Methods that can be thought of have been used to Represent to the Nabob the Monstrous Injustice as well as Ill Pollicy of this his Proceeding to which he replies he never gave them any such Liberty. That his son was going to the Assistance of Madrass, but it was given up before he could get thither and assures [us] he will Joyn with the English to Destroy Pondicherry. This was the Substance of his Letter in Answer to M^r. Hinde's Remonstrances to him And assures us of his Assistance though at the same time he Carry's [on] a Close Correspondance with the French and Expects no doubt his share of the Booty. In which respect It is Possible he may be disapointed. We shall not fail to keep on good Terms with him though we cannot Flatter our selves with hopes of much if any Assistance from him as nothing of that Nature has yet appeared in Consequence of his Repeated Promises though we have been in daily Expectation of our Enemys appearing against us. as no doubt they would before now had not many Unforeseen Circumstances Concurr'd to keep them much longer at Madrass than they or we could have Expected, after the surrendry of that Place, and at last this for us most Fortunate Storm which we look upon as a Distinguishing Mark of Providen[ce] in our Favour that greatly Encourages us under our present difficulty's, the particulars of which We shall not take up your Honours leisure with as it is not now in your Power to relieve us in Time, but we have wrote to Bengall and Bombay for that purpose and hope they will have regard enough to your Honours Interest to succour us speedily.

On the 25th. August arriv'd at Mayhee three French ships One Called the Centaur of seventy Guns being of Equal Force and bur[sed] with the Achilles, One of Forty and another of Twenty Guns, which th[ree] ships arrived at Pondicherry the 27th. of September and sailed from [thence] the 14th. Instant. Four that came out of Europe in Company with them [are] said to be gone for China. We have no News of the Arrival of any [Your] Honours Ships in India. We hear from Mocha that M^r. Adair dyed at Beetbforckee as did Captain Wells of the Pelham at Bombay. We have [now] no News from Bengall this Season. The Meirmaids Packet coming from thence fell into the Enemys hands in Madrass Road. The Sumatra is heard designed from Pondicherry for Europe, where the shatter'd Rema[ins] of Monsieur La Bourdonnais squadron is Bound or the above three [ships] we cannot learn as yet. Fifty of the Millitary belonging to Madrass perished on the Three ships that were lost, the remainder [sent ashoar] and relieved them as the people themselves say for being [. . .] them in the Storm. There was not only a Great deal of [. . . ta]ken out of Madrass on board those three ships but a good [. . .] was lost at the same Time going to Pondicherry in open [. . .].

The Intercourse of Letters between Madrass and this Place have been stop'd ever since the Town was Invested Only three from Governour Morse to M^r. Hinde haveing come out as yet, from thence, and the fear of their being Intercepted Occasions their being wrote only in General Terms so that we know not for Certainty on what Footing the Gentlemen there are, but M^r. Morse writes that M^r. De Jong the Dutch Governour of Pullicat refused giveing the Women and Children his Protection and sent them all back again which was a great Inconveniency to the Place. M^r. Marsan the Governour at Negapatam has been more humane and has taken all the Familys from this place under his protection and Treats them with great humanity. Immediately on hearing Madrass had surrendered We came to a Resolution of stopping the Investment, as your Cash was very low indeed about Ten

thousand (10,000) Pagodas only, though the Merchants have had no Advances since we received the silver mentioned above from Bombay which was the beginning of June, notwithstanding which and many other Impediments which your Honours may be more fully apprized of hereafter from our Letters between Madrass and here We have about one thousand Five hundred (1500) Bales, and shall in January be able to make them up One thousand Eight hundred (1800) to Load a ship please God we have any come to us, and had we Money We could provide much more.

John Crabb Quarter Master of one of his Majesties ships haveing a little Money and being desirous to secure it, We have received into your Honours Cash One hundred and Ninety (190) Pagodas for which we have given him Certificates of the Receipt and request he may be paid in England the Amount of the same.

SUPPLEMENT

Since writing the above we have received a Letter signed by Governour Morse and the Gentlemen at Madrass Copy of which we send Inclosed in this Packet. In it is Mentioned Articles of Capitulation for the Ransom of that place which is all we yet know and thought proper to advise your Honours of it, What the Terms are we know not but they are very Ill kept by Monseieur Dupleix the Governour of Pondicherry who sent out Three hundred (300) Men to surprize them on the Way, which they did and have Carried them all Prisoners of War into Pondicherry. The Three ships that we advise above to be sailed from Pondicherry are returned with Two of the Disabled Ships, so that are now in that Road and the off in Five ships compleatly Riggd, and Five Disabled besides Small Vessels. We are with the Utmost Fidelity and Respect.

LETTER TO W. HOOK DATED OCTOBER [17] 1746. [*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 16, p. 6*]

TO M^r. WALTER HOOK
MASTER OF THE PORTOBELLO SLOOP.

SIR

You are hereby Orderd Wind & Weather permitting imed[iately] on the Receipt of this to Weigh Anchor & make the best of your Way to the Cape of Good Hope where if you meet with any of the Honble Companys Shipp[ing] you are to advise them that Fort S^t. George is taken by the French & after any other Circumstances you know of the Enemys Shipping that may be of Service to them If any safe Conveyance is upon Departure you are to Send by them the Packet directed to the Honble Court of Directors Marked N^o. [1] If not leave it with some Trusty Person to Forward it when you [are gone]. We direct you not to stay longer on shoar than Four or Five days & then proceed to S^t. Helena where you are to deliver to the Governour of that p[lace] the packet markd N^o. 2, to stay there not above 4 or 5 days more and then proceed to the First Port you can fetch in Great Britain or Ireland and there send your packet N^o. 3 as d[ire]cted by the General Post. If the first Port be in Ireland you are Ordered as Soon as you have landed your packet to proceed for the first port in England and there land the packet N^o. 4 and send it by the General Post adviseing by a Letter directed to Christoph Mole Esq^r. Secretary to the Honble East India Company of your Arrival and wherefrom and then make the best of your Way into the River Thames where you will receive Orders from our Honble Masters. If [you meet with] any Men of War bound for England put N^o. 3 on board [. . .] landing it. We order you not to Carry any Trade with [. . .] That you keep a Particular good Look out for fe[ar of] Enemy's, That you avoid as much as Possible the Track the French ships go in to the Maurutius, and If there are no English Ships at the Cape leave a Letter directed to the Commanding Officer of any English Ship Adviseing them of your voyage and of the meaning of it, Keep the Packets always slung and be sure heave them over board If you fall in with an Enemy. We wish you a Good Voyage and are

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY, DATED JANUARY 10, 1747. [*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 16, pp. 7-10*].

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE
HONBLE THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND,
TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

Our last Address bore date the 17th. October and went by your Honours sloop the Porto bello which sailed from Negapatam the 22^d. In this Packet comes a Fifth copy of that Letter, Since that Time your Honours Affairs on this Coast have continued in the same Uncertain Posture As we have not been so fortunate as to receive Eithr Letters or Succours from Bengall though so near us and to Windward and we have been very Importunate in our Letters on this occasion, The only Alterations in our favour Since we wrote you last Is that we have prevailed wth. the Country Government to declare in our favour and in consequence of it the Nabob

sent his Son Mahomed Ally Can with about Two thousand Horse to our Assistance the beginning of last Mouth notwithstanding which the French thought proper the 8th. ultimo to Come against us with their Whole Force from Pondicherry when we made the best Defence we were able, and notwithstanding they got as far as the Garden House We had the good Fortune on the 9th. to drive them out and Compel them to a very Precipitate Retreat, In which they had killed and Wounded by the best [. . .] We can get upwards of a hundred and seventy of their [Men wounded] left behind two Mortars all their Ammunition & Camp [Furniture &] Everything they brought but the Arms they bore and some of them and our Loss was very Inconsiderable. The 20th. We are advised they fitted out a Force by sea to [sur]prize us that way but Providence disapointed them, Some of their [boats] were drove ashoar and their Ammunition all spoiled which reduced them to a Necessity of laying aside their Design and putting ba[ck] into AriaCopang River. The 31st. We had a skirmish by land in [which] we again Obtained an Advantage over them, and had we even then been succoured your Honours Affairs woud have been in all humble probability Restored in a great Measure If not altogether the [Wind] was so well disposed towards us, but as yet we have not had a[ll] or any Assistance from Bengall since Madrass was taken now 4 m[onths] The Nabobs Eldest Son Mahofoz Cawn is now Joyned his Brother the Expence of the Camp amounts to Upwards of six thousand Rupees ₹ day and they with reason grow Extreemly Impatient and we fear will Quit our Interest. If some ships do not Appear soon to ass[ist] us, Shipping of all Nations have long since been on the Coast, and [to] our Great Concern and Uneasiness four of the French Squadron are Returned and are now at Pondicherry, one of them the Centaur [the] best ship they have had in India, and Five more ships in that Road in all Nine, and it is this that Renders our Scituation so Precarious and for which reason we send this away in a hurry to Tranquebar least we should be besieged and deprived of an Opportunity of so [doing] With it we send our Consultations from the Loss of Madrass which contain a Journal of what we have done for the Preservation of our settlement for which our Utmost Endeavours have been Employed we hope it will meet with your Honours approval. We shall [only] Add we think it somewhat unkind in our Countrymen and Few servants to have abandoned us, and that we will do all we can under these discouraging Circumstances and Trust to Providence [for the] Event. Hitherto we have been but at a small Expence our Presents [to] the Country Government not Exceeding above Three thousand 3000 a Trifle not worth mentioning in Proportion to the Expence thereat and the Disquiet it has given our Enemy's who are trying all possible Methods to make up Affairs with them, and the above Circu[m]stances greatly Facillitate their Negotiations as they clog the Works of ours. We have in General Terms promised in your Honours [. . .] that we will not be ungrateful for any favours The Natives [may care] to show us.

Whilst the above was writeing a Message Came from the Nabobs Sons adviseing that their Father was actually treating with the French and that Four Prisoners were sent to Pondicherry from Arcot, wth. Renders our Affairs so Precarious that we shall only advise your Honours of the Arrival of what shipping is Come to our Knowledge and send this Away in hopes of haveing an Opportunity of writeing again by this ship a Day or Two hence. In the mean time We shall Use all possible Methods with the Nabob and his sons to have regard to our Interest according to their Repeated Promises and to procure the Restitution of Madrass as one of the Terms if Possible which they still promise as well as our Security though their Council's are so Influenced by Immediate Gain that there is no depending upon them.

On 23^d. October Commodore Griffin in the Princess Mary and with the Pearl arrived at Atcheen and sailed from thence for Ballasore the 2^d. of November to Joyn his Majesties Squadron who were all safe in that River the beginning of September, The 5th. Novemb^r. the Brittanica Captain Somner put into Madrass but got Clear as soon as he found out his Mistake and we hear since he is at Galle whither we have sent him Orders to come here. The Houghton Captain Worth went to Bencoolen and from thence Endeavoured to get to Madrass but fell to Leeward and

Came here the 5th. December and on hearing Madrass was taken he went away at Eleven at Night Contrary to Orders and we Fireing at him, without sending us the Packet or Intelligence of any kind whatever which disheartened our Garrison Extreemly in the Necessitous Condition we must be in and greatly Encourag'd our Enemy's. On the 28th. and 30th. September The Marlborough and Montford arrived at Bengall as did the Salisbury the 10th. October. The Ilchester arrived at Anjengo the 6th. of October. The Warwick arrived at Bombay the 19th. November and Severn from Mocha the 27th. The Essex Sailed from thence for Great Britain the 16th. September last fully loaded with Coffee, and the Pelham at the same Time who was dispatch'd to be filled up at Tellicherry left that place the 10th. October. The Somerset and Dragon were Safe in the Streights of Sunda and all was well at the West Coast when the Houghton left that place.

We hear from Pondicherry that the S^t. Louis is loading for Europe and the Princess Mary for the Islands. M^r. Morse Monson, Stratton, and Savage are there [M^r. Eyre] at Tranquebar, M^r. Harris here, and M^r. Fowke at Pullicat [Several] of the Inferiour Serv^{ts}. are here whom we are obliged to [. . .] for or they could not Subsist. M^r. John Pybus being[near at] hand We have Employ'd him in the Secretary's office and take the liberty of recommending him [to] your Honours Favour. The French have made a most Advantageous Use of last Month and this haveing in that Time brought every thing away from Madrass that is Valuable or Useful for the defence of Pondicherry without any Molestation and stockd themselves with Grain from that Place which was much wanted at their own. On the receipt of a letter from the President & Council before they left Madrass desireing us [to] send the Proper Orders as they could not, to the Northern Settlements [of] Shipping, We directed the Gentlemen at Vizagapatam to send what [things] they had hither, provided any of your shipping called there under [pro]per Convoy and at Ingeram to send them likewise provided they have not already sent them to Bengall as the Gentlemen there had adv[anced] them but to Act discretionally in Case of any Enemies appearing [there] then there was none at each place they have about (800) Eight hun[dred] Bales white and Brown and we have about seventeen hundred [1700] which we wish we may have Tonnage for. We shall now Concl[ude] with assuring your Honours We have omitted nothing that Occurs to us for the Preservation of the Settlement and we Bless God our Endeavours hitherto have been crowned with as much success [as the] Warmest Expectations Cou'd hope for. We wish we may be relieved [for the] Time for we were always Ill provided and now in the Utmost want of almost Every thing. We hope to have the pleasure to advise you [in] this ship of the Arrival of the squadron on the Coast and are in the meantime with the Utmost Fidellity and Respect.

POSTSCRIPT

Since Closeing the above we have News from Vizagapatam by a Boat arrived at Pullicat that M^r. Prince there has sent with Salt Petre and Rice for the Use of this Settlement, That the Kent was arrived there for theirs and the Ingeram Bales and Sailed again for Bengall the 25th. Ultimo. That the Medway had carried away her Main Mast in heaveing down. That six ships woud be ready to sail the Neeps between the full and Change in December. That they waited with great Impatience for Commodore Griffins arrival. Since this M^r. Prince writes that he has News the

Commodore arrived the 7th. December at Connika near Ballasore, that we imagine the 6 ships must have Joyned in 5 or 6 days after that or that we may Expect to see them every hour on the Coast. By this it is plain the Gentlemen at the Bay have not had the least thought of us nor have we yet received a Letter. We hope it will be Possible to keep the Nabob in humour a little longer, If that can be done or any Method Used to Preserve this Place till we are Succoured, we hope in our next to Advise your Honours that Madrass is in your Possession again on reasonable Terms. Some Expence must be depended upon when such large Negotiations are Transacting with so lucrative a Government as the Moors are well known to be We are.

SIR

The Two Packets, for our Honble Masters together [with] all the Letters we gave you Yesterday, We desire you will not send [on] board the Danes ship till you go your self and if you can get any to put them under another Cover and Directed in Danes to some [Danish] Gentlemen at Copenhagen you will do well, which you may take of [at] Pleasure, and in case of any Enemy give them to some of the offic[ers] of the ship to keep in their Chest for fear of yours being search'd [If] you call at S^t. Hellena please to let the Governour there know you ha[ve] such Packetts and if he thinks proper to Open them to take dup[licate] let him (provided there is Time) but by no means leave them behind. If you meet with any of our Men of War in the channel or any other part of the Passage bound to England please to put them on board or If you quit the ship always take them with you provided you are proceeding on your Voyage, If not recommend them to the Br[itish] Minister at Copenhagen. Whose ever Possession they are in while [at] Sea, We desire they may always be kept Slung to a Weight and [be] ready to throw Overboard Rather than they shoud Fall into the French hands. We wish you a good voyage and are.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY DATED MAY 2, 1747.

[*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 16, pages 13-33.*]

TO THE HONOURABLE COURT OF DIRECTORS
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONOURABLE UNITED COMPANY OF
MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

The last Opportunity We had to Address Your Honours, was under date, the 18th. Janry which was by a Danes ship, that sail'd from Tranquebar the 23^d: of that Month, Duplicate whereof, We send in this Packet. This Waits on you by the Britannia, who Imported here the 22^d: of February, in Consequence of Our Orders sent the Commander when at Gallee; Which ship We have for several Motives, that We imagine Conduce to your Honours Interest, thought fit to dispatch home, tho' so late; We could wish it were at a properer season; but as We have been at the utmost Inconveniency to find room to stow the large quantity of Bales We have on hand, & as We conceive it may be an Infinite Advantage & Satisfaction to your Honours to have them in Europe at this Juncture, and more especially from a place, there has been so great reason to despair of, on these material Considerations, together with the risque they may again be expos'd to, by the same Accidents that have happen'd, We are of Opinion Your Honours cannot disapprove of Our sending her away, at this Unusual time. We have therefore laden on her seventeen hundred Eighty four Bales amounting as R Invoice to Pag^s. 144474. 6. 20. which We sincerely wish may arrive safe wth: You as We do that the Gentlemen at the Bay had according to Our repeated [requests] furnish'd Us with an earlier Convey [instructions in] which they might have sent up the private Consignments for the Coast, & great returns might have been made, whereas the Insurance ceases in February, & none or little [is] come by this ship.

Since Our last Account of the Melan[choly] situation of this settlement, which must Certainly have appear'd to be very Precarious. We had the Misfortune to be reduc'd to almost inevitable Dangers for as Our security chiefly depended on the Assis[tance] of the Moors; We were soon brought to the utmost Extremity by being abandon'd by them: notwithstanding all the Arguments & Persuasions that could possibly be us'd on Our parts, to Continue them [in] Our Interests; but the long delay of Our ships, [with] the uncertainty of their Coming at all; & the frequent Offers & Proposals they receiv'd from the French [which] arose to five Lack of Rupees, made all our Endeavours prove fruitless, as We could by no means think of making such Offers, & if We could, they would [have] still outbid Us; having this Advantage of Us, that if they did not perform their Promises, they could [rather] be on worse Terms than they were, whereas We must literally have perform'd all Ours; upon the whole [on] the 14th: February, both their Armies decamp'd, lea[ving] us wholly to Ourselves; In which destitute Circumstances the French on the last of February came of Pondicherry, & on the 1st: March made another attempt upon Us by Land, bringing with them [a] Force considerably superior to any yet sent, or [We] could equal in more than a Quarter part, nevertheless, on their approaching near the Bounds, [We] sent out all Our Peons, with One hundred Europeans Military, two hundred Topasses, & some Artillery [in order] to repell them, if possible, at least [to delay] their Entrance for awhile; in hopes [of] doing them some Mischief, & that every Hour might produce something in Our Favour, which as providence Ordain'd, it answer'd Our Intentions so well, that though We cou'd not defeat Them, Our Party engag'd Them so warmly, that We had the good Fortune to keep them from crossing Kunnar River, all that Day, & to do them Considerable Damage, but Night coming on, & Our People no ways equal, to keep the field against such a superior Force, were constrain'd to retire to the Fort, by which means, the Enemy had an open Field all that Night, when, & on the 2^d: in the Morning early they march'd with all their Troops to the Garden House, from whence, it would have been impracticable for Us to have drove them away: but it happen'd very fortunately before they had Time to raise any Batteries, or to

do much Damage in the Bounds; We had the inexpressible Joy & satisfaction to discover Nine sail in the Offing, which prov'd to be his Majesty's squadron under the Command of Commodore Griffin; this, for Us most Welcome sight, made them quit their Quarters, & betake to Flight immediately, which they did so speedily, that though We had Eight hundred Men landed with the utmost Expedition by the Commodore, In order to cut them off in their Retreat, yet they were got so far on their Way, that it was in vain to pursue them: altho' their stay at the Gardens was very short, they took care to do as much mischief as they could in the time, and burnt several Houses about the Bounds but as these Damages are nothing in Comparison to the ill Consequences that might have attended Us had they continued longer, even one day more. We have reason to Bless God for appearing this once more so manifestly & Critically in our Favour.

After having given you this Account of Our most happy Escape from the Eminent Danger We have been in, We shall now turn to acknowledge the receipt of your several Favours that have come [to] Our Hands, & then proceed to Address You under the Proper heads.

By the Britannia We receiv'd Your General to the President & Council of Fort S^t. George of the 7th. May 1746, & by his Majesty's ship Princess Mary from the Bay, We had transmitted Us, those of the 10th. Janry 1745, & of the 27th. March, & 4th. April 1746, with a Copy of what wrote under date 20th. March 1744, We have also receiv'd Your Honours favour of the 14th. Nov^r. by the Lapwing & Duplicates of those by the Norfolk & Bombay Castle, with M^r. Mole's Letters of the 12th. 26th. of August, and 6th. of November, the Contents of all which shall be duly observ'd, & replied to, in their respective places.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING

Out of the several ships that were Consign'd to this Coast, by the List given Us in Your Letter of the 10th. Janry 1745, & in other Letters since, The Houghton & Britannia have been the only two that have touch'd at it, of whom We have before advis'd You, The former We have reason to believe by an Account a Dutch Man gave Us of meeting an English ship near that Place, is g[oin]g to Batavia.

The Princess Amelia bund for Ben[gal] We are concern'd to inform you had the Misfortune to fall into the Enemy's Hands on the 16th. of Febry [by] going into Madrass road, where by the artf[ul] Means of the French, they decoy'd the Commander [to] send his Packet ashore, & afterwards seized the ship, where she still remains, but so close under the Fort Guns there is no getting her away: this Unfortunate Capture gave a Cruel turn to Affairs on this Coast, by furnishing the French with Money, and all kind of Necessaries to tempt the Moors over to their Interest.

The Marlborough, Montford, & Salisbury that arriv'd at Bengal, We are inform'd from the Presid^t. & Council there, were dispatch'd from thence to Europe fully Laden the 27th. February.

The Princess of Wales was parted with by the Lynn, in a high Latitude off the Cape; which last arriv'd at Anjengo the 19th. February, the former We are inform'd by a Country ship, that Arriv'd here a few Days past, was seen going up the River at Bengal on the 18th. Ultimo.

From the President & Council of Bombay We are advis'd that Your Honours West Coast ship the Princess Augusta taken by Angria some time since, is ransom'd by them, for the sum of Eight thousand 8000 Rupees, exclusive of some other Charges.

We have likewise the Pleasure to advise Your Honours that the Brilliant Snow who Unluckily fell into the Hands of the French some Months past, was retaken a few days ago, by his Majesty's Squadron; as she was coming to Pondicherry from the Islands, & We have since purchas'd Her on Your Honours Account for Rupees 7150 seven thousand One hundred & fifty.

When this Vessel left the Isles there were there Eight French ships, out of which, the [Ac]billes with another, was to sail for Europe soon after, [to carry] Mons^r. De La Bourdonnais with them who was reliev'd there by Mons^r. S^t. David We send in the Packet a List of all the ships the French have in India.

From the Chief & Council at Tellicherry We hear that the Severn, Warwick & Ilchester arriv'd there in [Order] to be fill'd up for Europe, but on Our sending Notice of the Enemy's five ships being bound for that Coast, they were dispatch'd to the Northward the 22^d. of Febry, with One thousand Candies of Pepper, in part of their Lading, & soon after their Departure the Enemies ships appear'd, & were at Mahie by our last Accounts.

We have wth. much Pleasure read of the safe return of the ships mention'd in Your Letter of the 10th. Janry 1745, as we do of the Arrival of the several ships mention'd in Your Honours Letter of the 14th. November last.

We have remark'd the Secret Committee for the last year, as specified to Us in the above Letter & should be entirely obedient to the Orders receiv'd from Them; the [letter] directed for the President having fallen into M^r. Floyer's Hands, He will do himself the Honour to answer.

We likewise Observe the Directions given [Us] therein relating to the Severn, but have not had it in Our Power to Comply with any Part of them.

The Favour M^r. James Lauder has merited from You in Your Letter of the 4th. April, for the early Intelligence he gave of the Spanish Men of War, shall be regulated by Us, whenever He comes this Way.

In the 4th. Paragraph of Your Letter of the May last, you are pleas'd to direct, that when any of the Captains of your ships do not Comply with Their Instructions to all such before Us, & remind Them of their Duty, which [is to] be obey'd, whenever Occasion may require.

In the 14th. Paragraph you advise of having sent us a fresh Calculate of Tonnage, for the several specimens of Goods [gener]ally sent from India, which We have received & find very usefull [*a few words lost*] Business being begun upon here, We have enclos'd an Indent of those Particulars likewise.

The Methods lain down to Us in the 9th. Paragraph of Your Letter under the 20th. March 1744 for Weigh^s. of Lead, Iron, Copper & Elephants Teeth, shall be practis'd accordingly, for the better Judging of any Deficiencies that may arise in any of those Articles.

The Manner given Us in the 7th. & 8th. Paragraphs of the preceeding Letter, relating to the acco^t. remains of several Particulars, as mention'd therein, shall be properly observ'd by Us for the time to come.

Whatever Cloth may appear to be Milldew'd We will endeavour to recover in the Manner you appoint.

We have notify'd your Indulgence of four Pence in a Pagoda to all such as may have a Mind to pay Money into your Cash for Bills or Exchange or Certificates; In Consequence of which, whatever Money is receiv'd before the Departure of this ship, will be accounted for at that Rate, & proper Advice thereof will be annex'd at the Foot of this Letter, thô We imagine it will be but a small Sum.

The Licenc'd silver, Coral &c^a. Consign'd for this Coast by the ships, Marlborough, Montford, & Salisbury having been carried to Bengal the President & Council there have thought fit to detain, till they receive the several Persons Directions, to whom they are Consign'd.

In the 16th. Paragraph of Your General of 7th. May last, You seem'd inclin'd to think that the Deficiency of silver by your ships, had been Occasion'd by some Fraud or slight of hand in the Black People that are Employ'd in weighing it off, We shall therefore carefully inspect into that Matter.

We are sorry for the Loss you have sustain'd on that Account, & particularly for that mention'd in the 23^d. Paragraph relating to the York; but as that Affair was manag'd at Fort S^t. George, We fear it will be difficult for Us to dive into it.

Whenever there is Occasion to dispose of [our] silver Your Honours may depend upon Our doing it to [our] most Advantage, & if the Nabob or any other make their Application for any, We shall insist upon Prior Payment as you desire.

As soon as ever We are furnish'd with more silver than what is absolutely necessary for the Carrying on Your Business at this Place We shall immediately embrace the Opportunity to Comply with Your Directions in sending the surplus to Bengal.

Should the supra Cargoes of the Port [. . .] be able to purchase a larger Quantity of Coffee, than her Loading, & draw any Bills on Us, We shall agreeably to Your Honours Direction, accept them, & shall pay all due regard to Your Orders about sending it [home].

THIRDLY INVESTMENT

When the Admiral Vernon left this Place [. . .] Feb̄ry was twelve Months, We had left of the former [Year's] Investment, four hundred sixteen Bales.

We have since provided upwards of sixteen hundred, & had it pleas'd God to bless Us with Peace, [had] We been furnish'd with Pagodas, We could have procur'd almost any Quantity, As it was, We were oblig'd to call in the Merchants Ballances to support the Garrison.

The President & Council of Bengal, on hear[ing] of the Loss of Madrass; thought proper to send your ship [Kent] to Vizagapatam, to fetch away them, & also the Ingeram Bales that they might be sent home, by the ships dispatch'd from their Place, but those at Ingeram not arriving in time, she was return'd with only [. . .] Hundred Bales from Vizagapatam.

His Majesty's ship Lively arriving at that Place, sometime after, in order to Convoy the Kent back to Bengal; M^r. Prince took the Opportunity to send in Company with her a sloop, with One hundred & Twelve Bales, that arriv'd there from Ingeram.

We have since receiv'd from M^r. Saunders six hundred Eighty Eight Bales, as likewise Eighty two provided by M^r. Andrews at Ganjam part of which you will receive on this ship.

We had great satisfaction in reading the 8th. Paragraph of Your Honours Letter dated 10th. Jan^{ry}. 1745 that the large Quantity of Goods sent from this Coast that Season were very acceptable to You, as We have in Your Favour of the 14th. November, that those of that Season were likewise so, & We hope what you will receive by this ship will meet with the same Good Fortune, as they are full as good, & something Cheaper, though they have often mov'd in Our Troubles, which may make them look worse to the Eye.

We shall endeavour to procure what Quantity We can get of good Cloth, & as Cheap as possible, & We hope with a little Assistance from the Northern Settlements to be able to dispatch a ship home to Your Honours in September.

Since the Arrival of the Britania, We came to a resolution to begin upon an Investment with all possible Expedition, but We have not been able to procure Pagodas, or any Gold to make them with, When We are, We shall be guided by Your List Inclos'd in your Letter of the 27th. March 1746 as well as by your Directions in the 29th. Paragraph of your General under the 7th. May after & this Leads Us to advise Your Honours We have Open'd both a Gold & silver Mint at Cuddalore, as well to reap what little Benefit may at present arise, as to maintain Your right to it with the Country Government; M^r. Foxall Your Assay Master is come hither with all the People & Materials He could save out of the Mint at Madras: The Dutch had begun to make Overtures with the Government to supplant Us, but We have prevented them in time.

Our Competitors in Purchasing Cloth as mention'd in the 26th. Paragraph of Your Letter of the 7th May 1746, have of late been entirely the Dutch & Danes: The French having been quite out of the Question, all the last year, & have scarce

sent home a piece of Cloth, beside what they took from Ma[drass] The Danes, expected two ships the last year, thô one is not arriv'd: They do Us more harm in introducing bad Goods than in the Quantity they provide. that the Dutch are every Year falling into Our Sortment yet if We are but supplied with Money, We doubt not but We shall be able to supply Your Honours with a large quantity.

We shall transmit Your Directions to the Northern Factories, as mention'd in Your 2 [7th] Paragraph; by the first Opportunity We sent two Chests of Rupees to Vizagapatam, & shall send some Madrass Pagodas to Ingeram, as soon as We can get Gold to coin them.

We have acquainted Our Merchants with Your Orders in the 28th. Paragraph relating to the Outstanding Ballances, who by no means Objec[t to] the Justice of paying them, but plead the Harduess [of] the Times, which has some Truth in it at present thô their Ballances ought to have been paid before these times came on, upon the whole as Your Honours have permitted a Reasonable time to be allow'd them that they may not be distress'd We have consented to their paying in the same in Six Months.

We have taken Notice of the Goods over wanting by the several ships as mention'd in the 44th. Paragraph, & shall make all due Enquiry if Your Honours may receive satisfaction for it.

We observe Your Directions in the 47th. Paragraph Concerning Vencata Ramah which shall be properly re[gard]ed and due Obligations taken for that as well as [any] other Payments that may be made on Your Honours [account].

The Dimittys by this Ship are near of [that] fineness as what sent last, which is Occasion'd by [their] having been Provided before Your Orders came to [hand] about them, but shall take care to Observe Your Directions in th[ose] We provide for this Year.

There is only one Măcao ship come in here this year, & has brought little or no Teas When We have an Opportunity of purchasing any We shall follow Your Directions & give all Encouragement to the bringing a Quantity here of that Commodity.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT

The Situation of this Province as to any differences or Incursions that have been made by the Marattaes has remain'd in Tolerable Peace & Tranquillity for this last Year & had We not been reduc'd to numerous Inconveniencies by the Unfortunate Blow We have receiv'd from the French, We might in all Probability have reap'd a great Advantage from it.

We find from several Instances in Our late Misfortunes, that the Nabob & other Principal Persons of this Country are of such an extream lucrative Disposition, that there is no hopes of Fixing them stedfast in Our Interest by any other Method but by the Force of Money, & that they are so exceeding Avaritious, (Occasion'd by the large Proffers they have receiv'd from the French) that nothing less than Lacks will go near to Satisfie them.

These are such large Sums beyond what We think in Our Power to dispose of, that We never attempted to make them any such Offers, but as a Means to encourage them in Our Cause, We have several Times promis'd Them in General Terms that Your Honours will not be Ungratefull for any substantial service We may receive from them, which with some small presents We may make as a Pledge of Our sincerity, We hope will have the Desir'd Effect & procure their Assistance when requir'd.

The Presents that We made Them, whilst the Nabob's two Armies were encamped without Our Bounds for near three Months at an Expence of upwards of Six thousand Rupees ₹ Day, in our Defence, did not Amount to above forty thousand (40,000) Rupees, which in Ccmparison to the service they were of, in defeating the French in their Attempt upon this Place, on the 9th. of Dec^r. We are of Opinion You will allow to be very inconsiderable, & therefore persuade Ourselves

it will meet with Your approval: We endeavoured to keep them longer with Us for Our Security, as We daily expected his Majestys Squadron; & M^r. Hinde offer'd them two thousand (2000) Rupees ₹ Day to stay only ten Da[ys] but he could not prevail on Them.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS AND REVENUES

On Our request, the President & Council sent their Engineer M^r. Smith, to survey Our Works, & to represent what Alterations were necessary to be made to Them, In Consequence of his Report thereof, as enter'd in Consultation of the 30th. August 1745, & of another Report deliver'd in, the 11th. March last, by a Person recommended to Us to be skill'd in Fortifications: We have built a new Bastion to the South West of the Fort, which before was thought quite Useless & incapable of Defence; We have also nearly Compleated the Ditch, & have thicken'd the Parapets round the Fort to near Six Feet, also erected a Casern witbin, Bomb Proof: all which was represented to be absolutely necessary, & We have since found as greatly tended to the security of the Garrison. The Expences of these several Articles, you will be informed of by the Consultation at that time.

By the Advice & Opinion of Commodore Griffin, as well as some others, with whom We have Consulted, We are now at Work on Enlarging the [Ditch] to 100 feet broad, & making a Hornwork & Cover'd Work to the Northward, & some other Works to the East, and West; which We are informed will be a very great Addition to the strength of the Fort, as will [most] fully appear to Your Honours by a report delivered in by M^r. George Jones, Copy whereof comes Enclosed; If We have but a sufficient Number of [Men] to defend against any further Attempts, that may in all Likelyhood be made against Us, as soon as the Squadron leaves Us, which they will be oblig'd to do, before the Commencing of the Monsoon, if not sooner.

The Plan and Estimate of this Design will be sent you in this Packet, the Cost of which amounts to Pagodas Eighty five thousand, seven hundred & thirty (85730 P^a.) and We shall be pleas'd to find it proves agreeable to you.

The Carrying on this Work, as well as all others, We shall be carefull that the Work be well perform'd & the Materials good, & shall appoint proper Persons to Oversee it, that Your Honours Money may be laid out to the best Advantage, & for Expedition, We have sent to the Villages about Madrass, to get whatever Workmen belonged to that Place, Promising them a small Encouragement for their trouble in Coming down; & We have been pretty successfull therein; at present Our Thoughts are entirely bent upon this Work, & We hope the same will be greatly forwarded before the Squadron leaves the Coast.

For the Reasons given by Our Military Officers in the Report in Consultation of the 17th. November, We have Pull'd down all the Houses in Tevenapatam, & other places, that were within four hundred (400) yards of the Fort, & the Hospital being within that Compass, shared the like fate.

As We were at a great loss for Room to accommodate the Commodore, and several Officers of the Squadron, The Garden House being at too great a Distance, & very Inconvenient for them, We have therefore purchased a House of two thousand (2000) Pagodas for that Use, as well as for many other Occasions.

We are sorry to acquaint you We have been depriv'd of an Engineer by the Death of M^r. Smith, who died at Madrass just at the time He was most wanted, being on the second Day the French were before that Place, We therefore hope Your Honours will supply Us with another.

The Customs of this Place have decreased [since] the last year from having little or no Importation the whole Time, the French Squadron arriving upon the Coast in the Month of June, & stay'd the Year out.

There having been a great scarcity of Grain, the last Season, We thought proper to take [away] the Customs thereon, for a while, the reasons for [which] will appear in Consultation of the 8th: January [1747] since the Arrival of his Majesty's Squadron, [have] had large supplies, that Duty is now Collected [again].

The several Farms as mention'd in [the] Books, are Continued at the same rent as usu[al] but the Cowles of the Arrack Farm, Beetle & Toba[cco] Farm, and Weighing and Measuring Duties, having Expir'd, & the Persons who had Them, rejecting to [keep] Them; We have lett those Farms to other People as Your Honours will see by Consultation of the 31st: Ju[. . .]

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, MILITARY OFFICERS, & THEIR ACCOUNTS

We are sorry to begin this Head with acquainting Your Honours of the Death of Our Governour M^r. Hinde, who departed this Life the 14th. ultimo upon which, We met the next Morning in Consulla[tion] where, upon M^r. Croke's Delivering in a Representation, as Enter'd after that Consultation, desiring [to] be excus'd upon account of his Age, & Ill State [of] Health: it devolv'd upon M^r. Charles Floyer, who accordingly took the Charge upon Him.

He begs leave to assure Your Honours that no Care of His, shall be wanting to promote [*One line lost*].

M^r. William Holt chusing to keep his Employ of Customer at Cuddalore, M^r. Alexander Wynch is appointed Paymaster, & M^r. Thomas Cooke Jun^r: takes Charge of the Storehouse.

Since the date of Our last, Governour Morse & M^r. Monson remov'd from Pondicherry to Tranquebar from whence the Latter took his Passage home, by a Danes Ship; The former with M^r. Eyre remains there, Mess^{rs}. Harris, & Savage are now here; M^r. Fowke gone to the Bay, & M^r. Stratton We hear is gone for England on one of the returning ships from Bengal.

Several of your servants are here, the younger of them, We have kept a General Table for, as they must otherwise have been at a great Loss for a subsistence, being entirely out of pay, ever since Madrass was taken.

For the Conveniency of pursuing the Business of the Mint, We have entertain'd M^r. Sidney Foxall Assay Master, at his usual salary and Allowances, who also hopes to be Confirm'd by you.

Out of the several Writers sent out for this Coast by the last ships, only Mess^{rs}. Turner, Vansittart, & Duncombe have arriv'd, whom We have entertain'd & Employ'd, as Directed.

As We had great Occasion for some Writing Assistants, We have Entertain'd Mess^{rs}. William Smyth King, John Pybus, and Edmund Maskelyne as Monthly Writers, at Ten Pagodas (10) ~~per~~ Menses, till they can be Confirm'd by Your Honours in their former Standing.

M^r. John Pybus having since Desir'd to quit the service, in order to go for Europe, We have granted him the same.

We shall employ more good Hands when We can get them, there being a great deal of Business to be done, by a few Persons.

M^r. Samuel Parkes having been inform'd of the station Your Honours have appointed Him, he left this Place for Bengal, a few days past, by whom We forwarded the Packet for that Place that came [on] the Lapwing.

M^r: John Hallyburton being Exchang'd, came in, as Early as he could to Us in October, & has since been very serviceable, particularly the first time the French came against this Place, when he was [sent] by Us, to the Nabobs's Camp, to signifie Our Instructions to Him, which he perform'd much to Our Advantage which induces Us to recommend him to you, that he may be rewarded in what manner you think fit as he is at present quite out pay.

Most part of the Military that could escape out of Madrass have come here, whom We have taken into service.

The Officers are all with Us, who offering their service, as we were much in want of them, We have Continued them in their former Commissions, and the Lieutenants having behav'd very well here in the two Actions with the Enemy, We take the Liberty to recommend Them to Your Honours to have Captains Commissions Conferr'd on them.

The Inferiour Officers, and Military as well as those in the Gunroom, We have rewarded with Cloathing as more fully set forth in Our Consultation of the 2 [. . .] March.

Mr. Robert Clive Writer in the service being [of] a Martial Disposition, and having acted as a Volunteer in Our late Engagements, We have Granted him an Ensign's Commission, upon his Application for the same.

The Number of Military in this Garrison, [we] think necessary to represent, was [at all] Times very insufficient for the Defence of Madrass much more so at this Juncture: Our Enemies Garrison at Pondicherry being so Superior to Us, they can sally out a thousand Europeans at any time, & Commit any Damages they please about Us, for want of a proper Number to Oppose them. We therefore request you will take this into your serious Consideration, & that you will supply Us with as many as appear to be Necessary.

We likewise think it not improper to signifie to you, that an Experienc'd Head Officer will be of Infinite Service to Us.

Of the Eleven Recruits that were sent on this Ship, six have died, & only five liv'd to Come to Us, since which, We receiv'd a Welcome supply by the Lapwing of thirty Men, who have all arriv'd in good health.

From the want of Military, We have been oblig'd to take into service, about 3000 Peons for the Security of the Place, & Defence of the Bounds; but since the Arrival of the Men of War, we have discharg'd a few of Them, thinking it absolutely Necessary to keep up a great Part of Them, otherwise We should be liable to daily Insults from the French Peons.

We have wrote to Bombay for several succours, & more particularly for 2, or 300 Military, & six hundred Arabs, which We expect will be with Us as soon as the season will admit, if they can be spar'd.

If We find Mr. Hyde Parker merits the Promotion, you have directed; the same shall be conferr'd on him.

The Reverend Mr. Francis Fordyce arriving here from the West Coast, We have entertain'd him as Chaplain, on the Usual Terms, from the first Ultimo, We shall also entertain the Reverend Mr. Rider when He arrives.

If Cap^t. Francis Cheyne shou'd offer to pay and Money into your Cash, towards the Discharge of his Bond, We shall receive the same, and grant him the usual Certificates, & in case of his Death, We shall follow Your Directions.

SEVENTHLY ACCOUNTS

We are infinitely Concern'd among other Misfortunes, to acquaint you, that all the Books and Papers relating to your Honours affairs at Madrass, have met with the like Fate of that settlement, & are in possession of the French; which not only Greet Us, that they should fall under their Inspection, but renders Us at a great Loss to find out the Several Credits that are due to you; In which Circumstance, We shall make it Our Business from time to time to get the best Insight of, By Examination of the Conicoplys, who are now beginning to come [here] daily; and whatever Ballances We can find [on] shall be duly received & accounted for.

The State of Expences of this Garrison, and likewise the Debts outstanding in Our last Books Your Honours will be acquainted with, from [the] List inclos'd.

EIGHTHLY OF THE WEST COAST

We have not as yet any advices from that Place, but as We apprehended they might be in Want [of] Necessaries, they having receiv'd none from this Coast [for] long time, We had freighted the ship Success as R Consultation of the 27th. Febr'y, in order to send them the [usual] supplies; which ship, having, (after she had taken [down] her Loading of Rice at Vizagapatam) unluckily spru[ng a] Leak, has occasion'd the Loss of her Passage.

We purpose in few Days to dispatch the Lap[wing] with what Bales she can take in, and a few Necessaries for the Factory there, & shall send them a further [Supply] by the Fanny sloop a short time after; which as she [will] return in August it will give Us an Opportuni[ty of] hearing from thence, & advising Your Honours [of] the State of that Garrison.

NINTHLY TOUCHING THE CHA[R]TERPARTY

The Charter among other Papers fell into [the] Hands of the French; but We have a Copy here, which belongs to M^r. Hinde, which We shall keep by Us.

TENTHLY CONCERNING THE FRENCH & OTHER EUROPEAN NATIONS IN INDIA

The Proceedings of the French both at Madrass & Pondicherry have in General been so Cruel, & Inhumane, that they seem rather to imitate a Persecution than a War. They have refus'd the Commodore to Exchange a single Prisoner, notwithstanding the several they Owe Us: and We have some of theirs; and on a sudden drove away all the Women and Children that had Liberty to stay at the Mount, plundering them of everything they had, and afterwards set Fire to their houses, and this at a time, when they were preparing to come against this Place.

They have been very busy in fortifying the White Town in Madrass, & have nearly destroy'd the Black.

By the best Accounts We learn from their own People they have deserted here, they have 1300 Europeans in Garrison at Pondicherry, & about 400 in Madrass, besides a large Number of Peons, & Coffrees at each Place. Indeed they have so many People that We may hope their Numbers alone will tend to their Destruction, as they are already in great scarcity of Provisions.

We are not at present in a thorough Capacity to make any material Attempts against Them, but so soon as We may be better enabled by a Reinforcement of the squadron, or otherwise; M^r. Griffin has assur'd Us that no Industry or Endeavours shall be wanting on his Part, to revenge Our past Injuries to the utmost in his Power.

ELEVENTHLY OF HIS BRITANNICK MAJESTY'S SQUADRON

We have wrote Your Honours before, that the Commodore arriv'd at this Place with his squadron on the 2^d. March Consisting of the following ships; The Princess Mary, Medway, Harwick, Winchester, Pearl, Preston, Medway's Prize, & Lively; besides a Brigantine, fitted out for a fireship. He still remains here, & keeps One ship off Madrass to prevent the Neptune & Princess Amelia from slipping away; Others off Pondicherry and to the Southward: We should do that Gentlemen a great piece of Injustice, if We did not mention him to Your Honours, he is every Way worthy of the Post he bears, & has the Company's Interest intirely at heart; he only wants a Reinforcement to arrive soon, that he may have an Opportunity of putting Your Honours affairs in a better situation: than they are at present, & has often offer'd his advice and service to Us, whenever We shall have need of it.

SUPPLEMENT

The 30th. Ultimo We receiv'd Advice that the Exeter Cap^t. Weston, was prevented going into Madrass Road on the 20th. past, by his Majesty's ship the Pearl, she sail'd from the Cape on the 29th. November, and has been ever since beating about at sea: We hear she had buried 14 Men, & had 87 sick on board, & that she sail'd away for the Bay. We could wish she had waited for Our Orders, as the Supplies she might have brought, would have been of great service to Us.

The Original Bill of Lading for the Goods Consign'd to Bengal Presidency, by the Britannia was deliver'd to Our late Deputy Governour, & We doubt not was Carefully laid up by him; but as the Gentlemen that have had Inspection of his

Papers, have not been able to meet with it, We have been oblig'd therefore to Endorse the Copy Cap^t. Somner had of the Same, and hope Your Honours will have regard to the Unforeseen Circumstance, that has Occasion'd this Accident.

We must observe to Your Honours, that as all the Coral Books, amongst the rest, were lost with Madrass, & likewise several of the Diamond Merchants Invoices, We cannot particularly Specify, for what Ch[ests] of Coral returns are now made, And We are likewise to beg [of] Your Indulgence for any small Omissions or Irregularities which may happen in these Dispatches, We not having been so immediately Conversant in Business of this Nature.

There having been some stores deficient by this ship, as mention'd in Consultation of the 29th. Ultimo, We have Endors'd the back of the Bill of Lading, that the Owners may Account with you for it.

Commodore Griffin having deliver'd Us Bills on the Hon^{ble} Commissioners of the Navy for the Amount of fifteen Hundred (1500) Dollars paid out of your Cash for the Use of his Majesty's squadron, We have Enclosed One of them in this Packet with a Letter of Advice thereof.

We have drawn on Your Honours by this ship a Bill of Exchange for 40 Pounds Sterling payable to Ann Reynolds or Order being the value of One Hundred (100) Pagodas receiv'd into Your Cash of Ensign Thomas Langford at 8 shill^{rs}. ₹ Pagoda.

The Diamonds & precious stones that are laden on this ship in return for Coral and on other Accounts Amounts to Pagodas 68243. 1. 72. As ₹ particulars, in the register, Inclosed in this Packet.

Upon making up the Cash Acc^t. the 15th. April upon M^r. Hinde's Death, there was then a Ballance due to him, of P^s. 1839. 18. 18. which is Occasion'd by Our not being able to get Gold to Coin Pagodas.

We sincerely Wish this ship a safe and speedy Voyage, and beg leave to assure that We are

TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

We address'd Your Honours under the 2^d. Instant by the ship Britannia who Sail'd hence the 4th. following. This waits on your Honours by your Ship [Lapwing] who we now dispatch to Bencoolen agreeable [to the instruc]tions receiv'd by Her with two hundred Bales of [Broad cloth] And some necessary supplies for that Place, the [. . .] We have directed the Deputy Governour & Council [. . .] & fill her up with Pepper, & to dispatch her home [as soon] as possible after Her Arrival.

We have Inclos'd in this Packet Duplicate of Our last Letter, and likewise all other Material papers by the Britannia, as mentiond in the accompanying List.

The Council of War held on the 29th. Mr. William Belsches Agent for the Sick and Wounded of his Majesty's Squadron having delivered in his Accounts attested by the Commodore for the time being, We have Enclos'd them to you, having paid Him the several Amounts, being ^{Pag^s. 1^s.} in all, 2984. 12. and have debted Account Currant London for the same, as We have likewise done for Sundry Stores supply'd this ship by the Request of Cap^t. Cheyne, Amounting to Pagodas 645. 17. 2.

We being lately advis'd that Ensign Van Franken was very busy among the French after the Surrendry of Madrass, and did actually give Mons^r. De La Bourdonnais a Plan of the Town; for This, & other Misdemeanours by Him Committed, We have dismiss'd Him from Your Honours service, & sent him to Europe on the Lapwing. The Cap^t. having strict Orders not to let him go on Shore, at any Place She may touch at.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY, PATED AUGUST 19, 1747. [*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 16, pp. 45-49.*]

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONOURABLE
THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND
TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

Our last advices to your Honours bore date the 15th. May Duplicate whereof you will receive in this Packet.

On the 28th. following arrived in this road from Bombay the ships Severn, Warwick and Ilchester together with the Princess Augusta lately ransomed, the former of which having dispatches for Europe & being in readiness to proceed agreeable thereto. We make use of the opportunity to address your Honours by her.

We must therefore begin with acquainting you that in consequence of the applications we made to the President & Council of Bombay, We have received by the foregoing ships a Reinforce^t. of 370 Men as Likewise some large Cannon and many other articles that we were much in need of, and for which we are greatly obliged to them as we persuade ourselves they assisted us to the utmost Extent the safety of their own Garrison would admit, though least your Honours may Entertain too great an opinion of this additional strength. We must observe that there were only seventy Europeans in the whole Reinforcement. We have since had sent us from the Gentlemen at Tellicherry a further Recruit of 225 Seapoys who Came Overland and arrived safe with us a month past.

We are sorry to acquaint your Honours that notwithstanding the supply above-mentioned we have not above 300 able bodied Europeans in Garrison, and by the best accounts we can get the French are resolved to attack us as soon as M^r. Griffin goes off the Coast, they can bring against us from twelve to fourteen hundred Europeans and they are too sensible of the disadvantage this Place is to them to let us remain quiet. In short the Case is this and the Enemy knows it full well that if they are not Masters of this Place before the month of January in all likelihood Pondicherry will then be Lost & Madrass will fall of Course, We have a large Number of Topasses & Peons, but little is to be expected from them, further than to relieve the Europeans in mounting Guard & going the rounds.

In this packet your Honours will receive a Plan of the Fort and the whole design of the Works on hand about it, We have proceeded on it as far as possible the Time would admit and considering it as a Large undertaking we think we have made a tolerable progress therein.

On the 19th. Ult^o. we met at a Council of war the Resolution of which we have Enclosed to you in this Packet wherein you will observe it was the decree of the Council to Erect a Battery at the Burying Ground and to fortify the Points in Tevenepatnam for the present defence of the Place, the same was therefore set about immediately and is now clearly compleated, as also to Clear all Teve[na]patam the remainder of the Coleway & the houses about the washers Town & also to Levell the Banks of the Great Tank there.

Having remarked to you in our Letter by the [ship] Britannia the want of an Experienced head Officer and our Milit[ary] being since Increased by the arrival of the Bombay Forces and the whole being divided into five bodies, We at Length found the appointment of such a Person become absolutely necessary for the better regulating the Garrison; We therefore in this Case applyed to M^r. Griffin to know if he could recommend any Person in his squadron proper for that Charge. On which he was so kind to oblige us with the offer of the Captain of Marines belonging to his own Ship Captain George Gibson, whom he had always Esteem'd as a capable and experienced Officer. We accordingly thank'd the Commodore for this favour and afterwards prevailed on that Gentlemen to accept of being Captain Commandant of the Garrison for the present Time, and we have given him a Commission to act in that Capacity.

We have Likewise from the want of Officers in general been obliged to prevail on several of the young Gentlemen that were Writers at Madrass to take up Ensign's Commissions and to Qualify themselves accordingly.

We are also upon regulating our Train of Artillery having put them under the Command of M^r. George Jones whom We purpose shall act with a Commission and have appointed Ensigns to assist him.

The near approach of the season in which We shall be left to ourselves has lately occasioned us to Examine into the whole strength of our Garrison which as we have already notified to you is not above 300 Effective Europeans, as our Chiefest Dependance were on them and they being very inconsiderable to the Number the Enemy can at any Time produce against us, We thought it not improper to make representation of these our Circumstances to the Commodore, a Copy of our Letter on this subject with his answer waits on your Honours in this Packet.

For want of money we have been able to do but little towards an Investment nor indeed have we proper Places to Cure it in, with what remains of last years we have 800 Bales white & Brown which we shall secure in the Warwick & Princess Augusta, and send them to Bengal if we are advised the Coast is clear, that of the Northern Factories we likewise fear has greatly suffered by being deprived of a Large supply of money We sent them by a ship that we hear has overshot her Port & is supposed to have proceeded for Bengall, it is a matter of real Concern to us that we have not a more agreeable account to Give you on this subject.

We could also wish it had been in our Power to have Complied with your Honour's Directions in remitting any Quantity of Treasure to the Bay, as we have received very importunate requests from the President & Council there for the same but the considerable Charge of our Garrison & Buildings, as well as many other material Expences has rendered our Necessities so pressing that we were no ways in a Capacity to assist them therein as otherwise we should with the greatest alacrity.

On the 18th. June arrived in this Road your Honour's Snow Swift from England & S^t. Helena, she has since been on a Cruize off Zeylone from whence she is returned & is now with us.

The Houghton Cap^t. Worth we are informed arrived at Bengall on the 5th. April having gone to Bencoolen after her departure from hence she proceeded from that place to the Bay, the Gentlemen there on his arrival having thought proper to require his reasons for Leaving us in the manner we have before advised you which he having deliver'd to them, and a Copy thereof being sent us, We inclose them to your Honours with a Couple of Consultations that were held on board on that occasion, In the former of which he makes use of a Caution suspecting this to be a French Garrison and that the Letters he received from M^r. Hinde were counterfeited but no mention of this appearing in his Consultation We rather beleive he acquired this Plea from the Circumstances of the Capture of the Princess Amelia, We doubt not your Honours will form a right Judgement thereon.

The Bombay Castle Cap^t. Brown likewise arrived here on the 1st. Instant from Bencoolen and brought us advices from that settlement under the 2nd. Ult^o. at which Time the Lapwing was taking her Pepper for Europe and Every thing was well with them.

The Treasure and Stores consigned for Madrass & Bengall by this ship We have received ashore which are very serviceable to our Occasions.

The Norfolk we are advised arrived safe at Bencoolen where meeting with Advices that Benjar was blocked up by the Dutch and no English Vessel permitted to go there, the Gentlemen at Fort Marlbrô thought proper to alter her Voyage to China to which Place she accordingly proceeded.

The Warwick & Ilchester having fallen under our orders on their arrival from Bombay, seeing no immediate Occasion for them in your Honour's Service led us to Consider the Assistance they might be of to serve in his Majesties squadron and upon the reflection of the Large sea force the Enemy is known to have in India as likewise the Probability there is that they will Exert themselves to the utmost to disable our squadron on the preservation of which the Company's Interest & the Nation's honour are so deeply Concerned, & as it might farther be imagined that this would be a critical year in which Large Events might be Expected, For these Reasons We thought we Could not Employ them better at this Juncture than in putting them under the Direction of the Commodore, and accordingly came to a resolution of so doing as we have since done the Princess Augusta and Bombay Castle, and We hope your Honours will accept the f[or]going Motives for our justification herein, the Warwick is since returned over to our Service.

We have received into your Cash the sum of 600 Pagodas of Silas Foster and have given Bills on your Honours for the amount at 7 : 8 in favour of Jane Foster or order.

The Diamonds Registered by this Ship amount to Pagodas 12980. 25. 32 as per the accompanying Account thereof.

We daily look out for the arrival of this year's shipping and have the honour to remain with the utmost fidelity and Respect

HONOURABLE

Our last Address to your Honours was by the Severn Cap^t. Collier she sail'd from hence the 20th. ultimo.

Agreeable to what We wrote your Hon^s. by that ship we have since Loaded on the Princess Augusta 485 Bales and on the Warwick 411, the former sail'd for the West Coast the 3rd. Ins^t. as did the other for Bengal on the 13th. when Cap^t. Misenor being very ill could not proceed on the ship, He dyed the Night of her Departure & M^r. Ward her chief Mate has now the Command of her.

The Ilchester sail'd in Company with the squadron from hence the 20th. Ins^t. as did the Bombay Castle the first will be Dispatch'd by M^r. Griffin at our Desire agreeable to the Directions we receiv'd from Bombay by that ship, the other remains in his Majesty's service.

Two days past We receiv'd Advice that the Boneta sloop belonging to your Honours arriv'd at Tellicherry from Bombay the 2nd. Ins^t., she brings Advice that the Portfield Cap^t. D'Abbardie was safe arriv'd at Mocha, but no other ship from Europe, & none arriv'd at Bombay the 21st. August.

The President & Council at Bengal Advise us they are sending up the Princess of Wales with a supply of men & stores for the Garrison, both which will be serviceable to us but as it now grows Late we wish no Accid^t. has happen'd to her, two ships are arriv'd here with Rice from that place & We daily expect others, so that we cannot be in want of that necessary Article before we may Expect a further supply in January.

It is reported that Mons^r. La Bourdonnais is certainly gone for Europe from the Islands wth. five ships under his Command & that the Phoenix is laid up as unfit for service.

Three of the four ships that Winterd at Goa were at Mangalore the 11th. Ins^t. Loading with Rice there suppos'd as a supply for Pondicherry, the other We believe was not in a condition to Come out with them.

We have the pleasure to advise your Honours that the Late Princess Mary is lost at Gogo with a Loading of Rice, but most of her Men are sav'd.

The Success sloop sail'd from Bencoolen the 1st. August & arriv'd here the 12th. Ins^t. the Master advises your Honours ship the Lapwing sail'd for England the 6th. July & acquaints us that five Days after he Left Bencoolen he saw a large ship at a Distance which he Beleives to be your Hon^{rs}. store ship for that place.

The Brilliant Snow sail'd from hence for that port with stores the 20th. Ins^t.

We are sorry we cannot acquaint your Honours of the arrival of any of the outward bound shipping, at present we have no news of them, but hope they are safe arriv'd at the Bay.

Upon Nozerjung coming to these Parts we sent a Vakeel to him to Desire his Assistance, he has been well rec'd at the Camp, & we are in great hopes that a body of his Troops will soon arrive here to protect us, altho this will be very expensive to your Honours, yet We think you cannot Disapprove of it, it being the only means left for the security of this place, as we have already advis'd your Honours Commodore Griffin Left this place the 20th, with his Majesty's squadron.

This being the material of what has happen'd since our last We beg Leave to remain with all sincerity & Respect.

POSTSCRIPT

Since closing our foregoing advices to your Honours We have receiv'd Letters from Vizagapatam informing of the Arrival of the Oxford Cap^t. Thomas Stevens at that place on the 29th. Ult^o., he made the Coast on the 25th. & was happily inform'd of the Loss of Madrass by a Cattamaran that went off to him from St. Thomê, on his arriving at Vizagapatam & hearing of some French shipping at Ballasore he resolv'd on coming hither immediately, but a Country ship nam'd the Fanny calling in there from Bengal, & Advising that all was safe there, he thereupon alter'd his resolution to proceed thither, upon which the Chief & Council thought necessary to order him to Land his paquet & Military as Likewise 50 pipes of Madeira wine in order to Transmit them to us by the Princess of Wales then hourly Expected from Bengall bound to this place.

The Cap^t. of the Fanny informs us that he past Madrass & his Majesties squadron were all there, that the Neptune was then in a blaze & he beleives the Princess Amelia has e'er this met with the same fate or drove ashore.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY, DATED FEBRUARY 13, 1743. [*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 16, pp. 54-81.*]

TO THE HON^{BLE} THE COURT OF DIRECTORS
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE UNITED COMPANY OF
MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND
TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

1. Our last general Address to your Honours bore date 2^d. May last and went by the ship Britannia, who sailed hence the 4th. following. We have since done Ourselves the Honour to address You by the several Opportunities hereafter mentioned. By the Lapwing under date the 15th. May, by the Severn dated 19th. August, and by a Danes ship from Tranquebar of the 26th. September.

2. This waits on your Honours by the ship Warwick whom the President & Council of Bengall having laden for Europe have order'd to call here, on purpose to take in such Packetts & Advices, as We might have Occasion to send by her, which being the only Opportunity We hope for this season, We make use of it to give You the needfull Occurrences of the past year under the Established heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING

3. The first thing that presents itself to Us under this head is the Capture of the Anson, Captain Foulis by two french Privateers named the Apollo and Anglesea, just as she was going into Bombay on the 2^d. September, but making a brave defence for the space of two hours and a half, she had the good Fortune to save her Treasure & Packetts, before she struck, by the means of a Boat that put on board her, & carried them into Bombay.

4. The Portfield from Mocha very [. . .] escaped them a few days before by M^r. Wake's se [. . .] Boats to tow her into Bassein.

5. Shortly after the Receipt of this news W[e] had the additional Concern to hear of the Heathcote being lost upon the Island of Socotra as She was outward bound but that most of her men, and about Fourteen thousand Dollars were saved out of her.

6. The Sloop Success belonging to your honours that was sent hither with advices from the West Coast, drove on shore here on the 6th. December by stress of Weather.

7. The Warwick and Ilchester having been discharged by the Commodore from the service of the squadron by Reason of their being weakly manned, We thereupon loaded on the former our Remaining Bales and dispatched her to Bengall, the latter We thought proper to send to Anjengo, in Consequence of the Directions recd from the President & Council of Bombay, from when she sailed to Europe fully loaded on the 12th. December.

8. The Princess Augusta We dispatched to the West Coast on the 2^d. September with four hundred & Eighty Five Bales to be forwarded to Europe by any Tonnage that might offer them thence, directing the Deputy Gov^r: & Council to put on board her (after the delivery of her Bales) a Chest of Treasure on your Honour's Account, & to send her to Batavia for a Loading of Timber and Planks, & then to return hither, which We are in daily Expectation of.

9. The Brilliant We have spared on a private service to the Commodore.

10. Your honour's Snow George, arrived at Anjengo the 8 October, and at this place the 30. December, By her We receiv'd your Letter of the 15 April, adviseing of the Secret Committee for the Current year, whose orders shall be strictly obey'd by us on all Occasions.

11. Commodore Griffin with the Squadron left this Place on the 20 September, and sailed to the Northward, on the 27. We heard of his being off Madrass, and that He had sent the Neptune in a Blaze, and had desigus of doing the like by the Princess Amelia, but the Weather not favouring his Intentions. He could only cause her to run on shore, and then left her, putting out to sea with the squadron, after which she gott off again, and came down to Pondicherry, where after a fortnight's stay, and taking in about 1200 Bales of Blue & white Cloth, She slipped out of the Road at night and is supposed to be gone for the Islands.

12. The Commodore after keeping the sea with part of the squadron during the course of the Monsoon, came into the Road on the 11. November in the Princess Mary together with the Medway & Pearl, the two latter of which ships having very sickly Company's she was obliged to land a great number of them, so many as even to render the ships unfitt for service, in which extremity He made Application to Us to spare him a Reinforcement of Men out of the Garrison as will more fully appear to your honour's in our Consultation of the 16 November.

13. In the same Consultation Your Honours will please to observe that the Bombay Castle was a second time put under his Direction.

14. The Oxford Captain Tho: Stevens arriv'd at Vizagapatam on the 29. August where after landing his Packetts for Madrass Presidency and 40 Pipes of Madeira by order of the Chief and Council there, He then proceeded to the Bay from whence she arrived here on the 15. Ult. and We have come to a Resolution of dispatching her to the West Coast with supplies for that settlement, and afterwards to proceed to Batavia for a loading of Arrack, and lower masts and Anchors for the service of the squadron, and purpose to have her ready to sail with this ship.

15. On the 23^d. December arrived at Ballasore your Honours ships Eastcourt, Cæsar, Winchelsea, Colchester and Benjamin, under convoy of his Majesty's ships Exeter York and Eltham, where hearing of the squadron, and situation of the Coast, all but the Eastcourt and Cæsar proceeded hither, and have been all with Us, By those ships We received your Honour's Favours under the 16. Janry & 18. Feby 1746 and by the Princess of Wales came to hand that of the 6th. June.

16. Your Honours ship Exeter has likewise arriv'd here from Bengall whom together with the Winchelsea & Benjamin We have added to the strength of his Majesty's squadron by putting them under the Direction of the Commodore, He having intimated his Occasion for them.

17. The Colchester sailed again the 11th. instant for Bengall having order'd her to touch at Vizagapatam to land some treasure and stores sent by her for their Use.

18. We have great hopes of the speedy Arrival of the Reinforcement of shipping mentioned first from M^r. Bouchier at Anjengo and afterwards from M^r. Wake, which He rec^d from the Chief at Bussorah, the former of which came to hand the 16. Janry. & the latter the 10th. instant.

19. Since our Advices to your Honours & Britannia We have granted the usual Certificates to Captain Thomas Harry for the sum of 560 Pagodas, also to Captain Jedd for the sum of 700 Pagodas being so much rec^d of them into your Cash, on Acc^t. of their outward Bound Priviledge.

20. We have also enclosed in this Packett the Receipts of Captain Thomas Harry and Captain Thomas Stevens the former being for 800 & the latter for a 1000 Pagodas supplied them with on Acc^t. of the CharterParty of ships Prss of Wales and Oxford.

21. We are likewise to advise of having granted two setts of Certificates to Captain Thomas Stevens, One of which for the sum of 100 Pagodas paid in by him on Acc^t. of the Estate of Baker Townsend the other for the sum of Eighty six Pagodas, amount of the estate of Joseph Tarboton as specified in the said certificates.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE
DISPOSED OF AT ANOTHER

22. The Norfolk importing at Fort Marlbrô designing for Banjar, but afterwards for China, The Governour & Council of Fort Marlbro transported the Copper, Pitch and Tarr brought out by that ship on board the Bombay Castle, Capt. Brown, and consigned them to Bengall as by Letters rec^d from that settlement N^o. 57 & 58. which ship being afterwards order'd by them to this Place, We immediately landed such part of it as the Commander did not require for the present Kentledge of the ship, she being immediately order'd in the service of the squadron, and soon after employed on a Cruize so We had not opportunity of lading the Remainder till the 3^d. instant, when an Order was tender'd Captain Brown for that Purpose: of that part that was landed on her Arrival We disposed of upwards of 61 Candy at this Place and the Residue We consigned to the Gentlemen at the Bay by the Warwick, the Pitch and Tarr We detained at this Place for the supply of his Majesty's squadron, who were much in want of it.

We have since caused them to be taken down and such Part of it as may not appear to be damaged, may be repacked in order to be farther'd to the Bay by the first proper Conveyance, & what ever part is damaged We have resolved to keep for the Package of the Bales.

The President & Council of Bengall having apply'd to Us as & Letter rec^d N^o. 41. to procure them 400 Tonns of Redwood We accordingly contracted for the same to be deliver'd at Dougarassapatam, where it has been ready provided ever since August last, but as yet We have not been able to procure any Tonnage for it.

Out of the 100 Pipes of Madeira consigned to Madrass Presidency & Oxford, Forty were landed at Vizagapatam Twelve of which We received by the Prss of Wales, and Twenty more were laden on the Fort S^t. George a Country ship that was then coming hither, but being chased off Madrass by one of his Majesty's ships, and believing her to be the Prss Amelia, she bore away for the Eastward, and has never yett arrived. 8 Pipes were detained at Vizagapatam for their Occasions, the other 60 We have rec^d from Bengall by the Oxford and is safely landed with Us, what part is sold of it has been at the Rate of 50 Pagodas & Pipe, and We believe will be shortly all disposed of.

After disposing of as much of the Broad Cloth rec^d by the Britannia as the Demands of this Place required We forwarded the Remainder to Bengall on the ship Jenny in September last, since which We have been informed by the President

& Council that a great part of it proved considerably damaged as by their Account thereof enclosed. We have made due Enquiry into that matter, and have all Reason to suppose it must have been damaged in England as by the Committee of this Board's Report, as enter'd after Consultation of the 30th. Ultimo.

THIRDLY OF THE INVESTMENT

Since the Britannia's Dispatch to your Hon^{rs}: We have laden on ship Lapwing 200 Bales We have since laden on the Princess Augusta for the West Coast 485 Bales and on the Warwick for Bengall 411 and We have now 22 remaining, the Reason for a part of them being sent to the Bay unwasht was occasion'd by the Alarms of the French which hinder'd Us from having them cured as usual, and our Beating Godown and other Conveniencies being at that time pulled down.

The 11th. May last We took into Consideration the state of the Investment and agreed to make some Advances therein as the Ballance of Cash and Quantity of Treasure unsold was to a pretty large Amount The Merchants were called in and discoursed on the subject of the Investm^t. endeavouring to abate the Prices which they agreed to a Pagoda and a half ₹ Corge which as We thought they might very well afford considering the cheapness of Cotton and the little Demand at that time from our Enemies We pressed them to a further Abatement as some other Merchants made proposals to provide at a still cheaper Rate, Upon due Examination of their several proposals, finding those of Andiapa's sett to be as Reasonable and cheap as of those who sett in Opposition to him, as He had greatly recommended himself the two past years, and being better acquainted in the Business, likewise a Man of more credit, It was thought more for our Hon^{ble} Master's Interest to continue it to them, No certain Number of Bales was agreed for as they promised they would lett Us have to as large an amount as We would advance them for. They were accordingly advanced as much as We thought We could then well spare, and the several Prices they agreed for mentioned in Consultation of the same day. We were soon after obliged to desist from making them further advances as We were disappointed in the ship's Arrival with the Treasure intended Us. We had the finest prospect of making a large Investment had We been so happy as to receive the intended supply, for the Merchants assured Us they could provide to As large an Amount as We thought proper to employ them in As there is little Likelihood of our engaging further in the Investment till the Heat of the War is abated and We are more in Cash, We have thought proper very shortly to make a Demand on the Merchants for their Ballances, the Accounts whereof come to your Hon^{rs}. Enclosed.

The Ballances due from the Old Sett of Merchants have been demanded of them, the major part of which being due from Mootal, who is now negotiating Affairs with the Country Government, We have not yett been able to receive them but shall not fail of bringing them to Compliance the first Opportunity.

We flatterd Ourselves with the hopes of getting a good number of Bales from the Northern Settlements, but their being disappointed of a supply of Money intended them by the Jenny who passed their Port, We were deprived of that satisfaction, and not being able to supply them with any since except 20,000 Rupees sent them by the Colchester to defray the Expences of their Factories, We have recommended them to the Care of the Gov^r: & Council of Fort William to send them the necessary supplies of Money for carrying on the Investment at those settlements, as they seem to be little engaged in the War, and as We are sensible of how great Advantage It must be to the Hon^{ble} Company to receive an Investment of Coast Goods. We have no particular Account of the number of Bales they have laden on the Houghton, We must therefore beg Leave to refer your Honours to the Advices you'll receive from Bengall. Ten Bales of Ingeram Goods of the year 1746 being found damaged, which was occasioned by the Leakiness of the Vessel they were sent upon, and as We were well persuaded of M^r. Saunders's having provided the Best Conveyance He could, We agreed to take them on the Com^{py}'s Account.

Having a large Quantity of Torn and damaged Cloth at the time of the Loss of Madrass, which We had applyed to the President & Council for their Directions

about as by Letter of the 3^d. June 1746. but not receiving any, the Warehouse-keeper reminded M^r. Hinde of it, but He falling sick soon after, occasioned it to be deferred till 19. Aug^t: when the Warehousekeeper represented it to the Board. It was thought more for your Honour's Interest to dispose of the same at Outery, and accordingly came to a Resolution of so doing; but the ships that were then with Us, leaving Us very suddenly, as We depended on the Captains of them to be purchasers of it, and being deprived of that Opportunity We have deferred the same till now, and intend to dispose of it after the Dispatch of this ship.

We take Liberty to assure your Honours of our assiduous Care, that whatever part of the Investment shall ever fall in our way to procure, shall be made up of the most substantial Manufactures, at the lowest Prices & sorted to the best Advantage; The Success We have been so happy to meet with the past years, encourages Us to hope for a continuance in so valuable a part of the Nation's Trade, which 'twill be our utmost happiness to preserve and prosecute to the utmost.

Vencattah Ramah has made Application to Us concerning the Fine order'd by your Hon^{rs}. to be repaid him, but as He did not apply to Us in Person We excused Ourselves from a Compliance, not being certain, but that He may have since incurred Debts to the Hon^{ble} Company therefore till he appears personally We shall defer answering his Demand.

FOURTHLY OF THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT

The 26. September last We acquainted your Honours that We had sent a Vakeel to Nauzir Jong, son to Nizam, He being at that time about the distance of 15 days Journey from us. The design of this was to pay a Compliment to him with a small Present, and to advise him that We were preparing to send two Gentlemen to him, with such a Present as our Circumstances would admit of, as soon as He was pleased to send a safe Convoy for them, the Roads being at that time much infested with French Peons.

Our Vakeel sett out from hence in the Month of June, and was to pave the way towards procuring Two thousand Horsemen with proper Officer to secure Us for 3 or 4 Months during the Monsoon, but Nauzir Jong instead of coming to Arcott as was at first talked of, went further off, and delay'd making any Agreement on this Affair, nor would He send a Convoy for the two Gentlemen We design'd to send up to him. At last in the month of November Our Vakeel made an Agreement with him for 3 Lacks of Rupees for the above mention'd Troops, but He soon after took the said Agreement away, and insisted upon 10 Lacks, there was afterwards a second Agreement made for 5 lacks of Rup^s. but as a Part of the Money was to be paid in hand before He would send his Troops, and We being bare of money, that also dropt, which We are not sorry for, and Nauzir Jong being sent for by his father, He dismiss'd our Vakeel in a handsome manner as He writes; for a more particular Account of this Affair, We beg Leave to refer your Honours to the Country Letter Book, and to our Consultations of the 31st. August, and 5th. October.

Our Vakeel's last Letter advises that He has taken into your Hon^{rs}. Service 300 Good Horsemen with their proper Officers, and has made an Agreem^t. with them as to their pay to serve Us 4 Month's. His L^re & Agreem^t. are enter'd in the Country Letter Book: He also writes that He expects to be here in a few Days himself for the Embassy as mention'd in Consultation of the 16th. Janry.

We are glad to advise your Honours that this Expedition will turn out considerably cheaper than what We expected, for if the two Gentlemen had gone up to him, they must have carried a Considerable Present with them, and their Charges would have run very high; M^r. Beawes remained here a whole season at our desire, We therefore tho^t: it but reasonable to defray his Expences while here, as more fully sett forth in Consultation of the 31st. October, as also to pay Capt. Crompton the Expences He was at in preparing himself for the Embassy as mention'd in Consultation of the 16th. Janry.

As our Vakeel had enter'd into an Agreem^t. for the above mention'd Horsemen We thought it was to y^r. credit to stand to it, the Breaking thro^u it at this Time

might have proved of ill Consequence to the Honble Compy and We doubt not, they will be of service to Us, if they are not, We shall endeavour to rid Ourselves of them as soon as possible.

We must assure your Hon^{rs}. that but little Dependance is to be put in the Arcott Government and indeed was the Chief Reason of our applying first to Nizam: however We must keep fair with the Nabob, who We hear has a Grant for this Province for 5 years longer.

It is wrote from Arcott that the Morattas are within a few days Journey of that Place.

Mr. Dupleix has applied to the Nabob to request He will make peace between the two Nations on this Coast.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS & REVENUES

We are carrying on the Works near the Fort agreeable to the Plan forwarded to your Honours and have made tolerable Progress therein, having finished the Moat quite round, which is now 100 Foot wide, & have run up the Hornwork as high as the turning of Arches for the Cazerns, which and the Lunette to the Westward are the Works now on hand, in which all due Care is taken to have them done well & soon. The Direction of these Works is under M^r. Geo: Jones and his Assistants.

Agreeable to the Opinion of the Officers &^{os}. in a Council of War of the 29th. April, all the Houses in Tevenapatam & the Collaway were pulled down to the Distance of 800 Yards, when there being but few remaining in either of these Villages, It was tho^t: proper in another Council of the 19th. July, that as the pulling down of those few would be attended with but little Expencc, & might contribute greatly to the security of the Fort, as the Enemy would thereby be hinder'd from any Cover for a Considerable Distance that they too should be pulled down.

M^r. Croke, Cap^t. Morgan and several Others having desired that they might be paid for their Houses that were pulled down, which We not being in a Capacity to do having so little money, We have therefore, deferred the paying of them, till We are in Cash sufficient to pay for all.

The Out Points in Tevenapatam not being thought in the Council of War of the 19 July capable of making any long Defense, It was agreed therein to strengthen them in the best manner the Time would permitt of, and a new Battery to be erected at the Burying Place, since which a Fascine Battery at the seaside at the S^o. East End of Tevenapatam, and another along the Lines from the Burying Ground have been represented very necessary We have accordingly built them.

The S^o. West Corner of the Fort not being in a proper Condition, the scarp Wall not being carried on so far as it should, as ~~at~~ Consultation of the 30th. July, It was then Agreed to erect there a strong Battery with Fascines, & to put the heavy Cannon that came from Bombay on it. In this and all other parts of the Fortification, We beg Leave to acquaint your Honours that due Care has been taken that all are done well and with all Frugality; but are sorry to say that for want of skillfull people We are liable to do many things that might not be tho^t. quite so necessary but We have no ways been wanting to gett the best Advice We possibly could, and without Which, none of these Works have been sett about.

A Good House being offer'd for sale at Porto Novo, and as We were obliged (those formerly belonging to the Company there being quite demolish'd) to pay Rent for One for the Gentleman, that resides there, We therefore Agreed as ~~at~~ Consultation of the 7th. Jañry. to purchase the same, which We hope your Honours will approve of.

We have been obliged to make a Considerable number of sheds & Guard Rooms for our Military & Peons, which and the pulling down the Houses has proved very expensive, but as it was absolutely necessary, We hope your Honours will approve of it.

The Sea Customs of Cuddalore are encreas'd 1201. 32. 12. which is occasion'd by an Importation of Raw Silk and other Goods more than the former Year.

The Land Customs of Cuddalore are decreas'd this year 607. 10. 64 which is occasion'd by the Duty being taken off the Grain, to give Encouragement to the Country People to bring it in, during the late Scarcity.

The Sea and Land Customs of Tevenaptm are increas'd 1954. 32. 30. this year which is owing to a greater Importation of Coral and Raw Silk, which has scarcely ever been usual in former Years.

The Farms, none of them being Expir'd remain in the same hands as last year.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, MILITARY, OFFICERS, & THEIR ACCOUNTS.

The several Employments at this Board continue with the same Persons, as when We wrote your Hon^{rs}. G Britannia.

The Gen^l. Table that was allowed to be kept for the support of the younger servants that arriv'd here from Madrass was taken off upon many of them going away and others being entertain'd in the service of this settlement.

By the Bombay Castle arrived Mr. William Read, whom We have entertain'd as your Honours directed and station'd him under the Secretary.

The Rev^d. Mr. William Rider, who came out from Europe on the aforesaid ship, hearing of the Accident that had befallen Madrass, when at Bencoolen, obtain'd the Dep^y. Gov^r. & Council's Permission to continue there they having no One of that Cloth then with them; but as We have since been informed of a Chaplain's coming out for that place by the Grantham, We have desired He may be sent hither.

Upon the great Occasion We had for Officers We have granted Ensign's Commissions to Mess^{rs}. Philip Bulkeley, Edmund Maskelyne, John Duncombe, John Wright, Sam^l. Smith, Jn^o. Harding, & Jos^a. Cheesebrough. The two former of whom were covenanted servants at Mad^a. and have only accepted to act in that Capacity, till such Time your Honours pleasure be known regarding to them. The third came out in the Com^pys service to this Place but being desirous of serving in the Military for the pres^t. He was granted an Ensign's Commission upon promise that it should be no Prejudice to his standing in the service.

Mr. Morse & Mr. Percival having been Exchang'd by the Commodore for Mons^r. Le Ris, the Gov^r. of Mahie, & Mons^r. Le Riche Commandant of Carrical, who were both bro^t. in, and detained as Prisoners of War at this Place are now resideing with Us. Mr. Morse arriv'd on the 2^d. August & has been very assisting in his Advice to Us in such of your Hon^{rs}. Affairs, as We were unacquainted with.

Mess^{rs}. Eyre and Harris remain at Tranquebar Mr. Savage here and Mr. Edward Fowke proceeds for Europe on this ship.

For the Conveniency of receiving Advices of any of the Enemy's shipping that may touch on the Coast, We have appointed Mr. Cha^s. Nicholls to reside at Negapatam Mr. Henry Cope at Porto Novo, & Mr. Alex. Band at Pullacat.

By the Winchelsea, who arrived here the 13th. Ult. came Stringer Lawrence Esq^r. whom your Hon^{rs}. appointed to be Major of the Forces on this Coast. On the 18th. the Military Forces of the Garrison were drawn up, at the Head of which He was presented with a Commission.

The several Ensigns that your Hon^{rs}. mention to have proceeded with him are likewise all arriv'd, and entertained agreeable to your Direction.

Captain Geo. Gibson whom We had appointed Captain Commandant till such time We were supplied with a superiour Officer from Europe, on M. Lawrence's Arrival, and taking charge of the Garrison, receiv'd our Acknowledgements for his good service.

By the Oxford, Winchelsea, Colchester and Benjamin We received 93 Recruits, which except 11 the Chief and Council detained at Vizagapa'am were all that lived to Us by those Ships.

Lieutenant Jn^o. Holland being order'd by your Honours to remove to Bengall, He has thereupon resigned the Company He had with Us to the Major's Command, but as there is a Prospect of coming to some Action with the Enemy before long, He is desirous to continue with Us as a supernumerary Lieutenant to assist therein, after which He purposes to proceed agreeable to your Honour's Appointment.

In Regard to the present strength of our Garrison We presume your Honours will be perfectly acquainted with it by the severall Rolls enclosed in the Packett We need therefore only recommend to your Hon^{rs}. to send Us such a further Reinforcement as may appear necessary.

Agreable to the Representation made in the Officers Report of the 1st. May as enter'd in Consultation of the 5th. of that Month, We have for the Reasons as therein specified introduced Martial Law in the Garrison as We found it became absolutely necessary at this Juncture, and have accordingly given a Commission to Major Lawrence to sett as President at all Courts Martial, and to pass sentence, and execute agreable thereto. We have also commission'd Ensign James Cope to act as Judge Advocate, agreable to a power He has from England for that purpose, wherein We flatter Ourselves with the hopes of your Hon^{rs}. Aprobation.

In our Advices by the Severn, We advised your Hon^{rs}. of having regulated the Gunroom Crew, by turning them into an Artillery Company, & putting them under the Command of Lieutenant George Jones, & sundry Ensigns, We have therefore nothing to add relating to them but that they continue under the same Regulation.

By the foregoing ship We likewise inform'd your Hon^{rs}. of the Reinforcement and Succours, We had received from Bombay and Tellicherry; since then We have also been supplied with a Detachment of 113 Europeans from Bengall, including Officers, for which We were greatly beholden to them.

The severall Officers of those Detachm^{ts}. being on Command We have been obliged to allow them their Table, as We are informed, is usual in such Cases.

The Cloathing the Military shall be made over to the Lieutenants of the severall Companies agreable to your Honours Directions.

We shall not fail to comply with y^r. Hon^{rs}. Orders relating to the Diet money you have appointed for the severall Officers.

M^r. Thomas Cooke Jun^r. having relinquished his Employ of Secretary for the Reasons given in Consultation of the 7th Jan^y, We have thereupon entertained M^r. Cha^s. Bouchier in that station at the same salary and Allowances as is due to his standing.

SEVENTHLY OF ACCOUNTS.

Such of the Madrass Conicoplys as are arrived with Us, were called before the Board on the 30th. June when being examined regarding your Hon^{rs}: Accounts at that settlement, they acquainted Us, that in the Confusion of Affairs when the French were at Mad^r. the Books & Cadjans were all seized and lost, so that they could give Us no Acc^t. of them, We shall not fail as Opportunity offers to make Enquiry after them, and advise you of all that We know concerning them.

The Books not being arriv'd from the Northern Factories, till a few days past, We have not been capable of making the proper Adjustments in time to send them by this Opportunity: but presume your Hon^{rs}. will have a Copy of them from Bengall.

In this Packett your Hon^{rs}: will receive our General Books closed in April last, with what other Books and Papers may give you any light into the situation of your Affairs at this settlement, a list whereof is Enclosed.

EIGHTHLY OF THE WEST COAST

The last Advice We recd from that settlement was by the sloop Success, who arrived here the 12th. September, & bore date the 16 & 29. July, in which they advise of having dispatched the Lapwing to your Honours on the 5th. of that month, having laden on board her 53. Tonns of Pepper, that being all she could take in, and had about 600 Tonns remaining for any other Tonnage that might offer.

They mention to have been in perfect Peace with the Country about them, and should do all in their power to preserve it.

We have taken sundry Opportunities to supply them, agreeable to their Indents, and are now sending to them a Quantity of Rice and other Articles by the Oxford and We beg Leave to assure your Hon^{rs}. We shall always be mindfull to assist them to the Utmost in our Power.

In their Letter to Us dated the first of July they represent they were greatly in want of Military, and as such were obliged to detain 20 Recruits, that came out on the Bombay Castle, and have since requested Us to procure them two or three hundred Peons from this Coast, who, they are of Opinion might be of service to them in their present Extremity, but their Religion, Marriages and Aversion to their coast were such Obstacles that We could not prevail on any of them to go thither: We have nevertheless engaged to supply them with some Military Recruits as soon as We could better spare them.

They have likewise intimated to Us the Want of an Engineer for the Direction of such Works as might be necessary at this Juncture for their Place, which as We are equally in want of with them, We must refer it to your Honours to furnish them therewith.

M^r. Cha^s. Hampton whom your Hon^{rs}. had order'd to remove from Bengall thither was sent here on the ship Fanny, and afterwards proceeded on that ship.

NINTHLY TOUCHING THE CHARTER

We have nothing more to say to your Hon^{rs} under this Head than what We have mention'd in our former Letters.

TENTHLY CONCERNING THE FRENCH AND OTHER EUROPEAN NATIONS IN INDIA

The 19th. August We wrote a Letter to Galenus Meisen Esq^r. Raad Extraordinary of the Nether lands India, Gov^r. of Negapatam and the Gentlemen of Council, in regard to the Factory House belonging to the said Company standing in Tevanapatam Town, which is at about the distance of 700 yards from our Fort to the Northward, and within the space agreed to be levell'd by the Gen^l. Council of War held the 29th. April desiring their Permission to levell the Walls of the Compound, and that the House might be put in such a Condition as to prevent our being annoyed from it; "In answer to which they wrote Us the 9th following that the "same Motives; that induce Us to use all proper Methods for the Preservation of Fort "S^t. David, oblige them to maintain their Right and Property in the said Factory, "which they can by no means give up without a special Order from their superiours "at Batavia." The Case standing thus We have not attempted any Encroachment on what they call their Right and Property, and have only upon this Article to recommend it to your Honours Consideration of how great Inconvenience a Dutch Factory within so small a Distance of our Fort may be, not only as it obstructs the use, & Intentions of the Hornwork to the Northward, but likewise How unsatisfactory it is to the Honble Compy to have a foreign settlement in the Center of their Limits, wherein they claim the same Rights and Priviledges as We do Ourselves; They indeed pay a small Duty to the Compy of 2½ % Cent on Goods Exported or Imported by them, which by no means arises to an Equivalent for the Influence they may have in future over our Actions.

The strength of the French Garrisons by the best Intelligences We have of them is that they have 1300 Europeans in Pondicherry, 400 in Madrass, & 100 in Kariccall, besides which a large number of Topasses Coffrees & Sepoys, who are disciplin'd and are of great service to them.

The French hearing of some Accident befalling our squadron at Tranco-mallay took the Opportunity of preparing to attack this place, which We having timely Notice of, at a Council of War held by the then Officers of the Garrison this 25th. December, Every thing was agreed on that could be thought material for our Defense: Accordingly. on the 6. Ult Mons^r: Dupleix came at the head of all the Forces He could collect together, & encamp'd within 4 Miles of our Limits, and it being Moon Light We expected He would have attack'd our Out Towns that night, but as they were preparing for it in the Morning, Commodore Griffin came into the

Road wth. 3 of his Majesty's Ships and the Bombay Castle At the sight of them, together with a signal being given from Pondicherry, the Enemy retir'd home again, & it was not in our power to hurt them in their Retreat; For a more particular Account of this Affair We beg Leave to refer your Hon^{rs}. to Consultation of the 7th. Ultimo.

By the best Advices We have from the other coast, there remains there at present only two French Ships supposed to be the Apollo and Anglesea Privateers; They were off Anjengo the 10th. Ult. and had intercepted a Pattamar Boat of M^r. Bourchier's. The Centaur, Mars and Brilliant, whom We advised your Hon^{rs}. had sail'd for the Malabar Coast from Pondicherry in Janry was twelve months winter'd at Goa, where having clean'd & Refitted they proceeded to Mahie and Manjelore in September last, the latter of which Places they left on the 20th. of that Month, having taken in their Loadings of Rice, and some Sepoys, by which We suppose they had been destined to this Coast, but having not heard from them since We presume they are at the Islands.

The Prss Mary, who was in Company with those ships on the Malabar Coast, we are informed was founder'd off of Gogo, but most of her Men saved, and We hear are since gott to Mahie.

The 4. Ult: arrived in Pondicherry a French ship named the Cibeles; she is said to come from Europe, but last from the Islands, and sailed in 4 days afterwards supposed for the same place, she brought them Intelligence of their Fleet design'd for India, but whether she parted Company before or after Admiral Anson's Engagement with them, We are yett to learn.

We are advised from Bombay and Anjengo of the Defeat of a French Fleet design'd for these Parts by Admiral Anson, and of the Reinforcement your Hon^{rs}. are sending to Us.

Mons^r: Dupleix immediately after their Retreat the Beginning of December, wrote the Nabob of the Province to interpose, and make up differences between Us. We hear He is making Preparations for the defensive, As We on our part are making preparations for the Offensive.

ELEVENTHLY CONCERNING HIS BRITANNICK MAJESTY'S SQUADRON, & MONIES
ADVANCED ON THAT ACCOUNT

M^r. Rosewell the late Agent Victualer left this place for Bengall the 15th. June, without giving any notice of his Departure, and ab^t. 4 Months after We recd Several Acc^{ts}. relating to the squadron for what had been supplied them at Fort St. George the year before upon which We wrote to the President and Council of Bengall acquainting them with it, and to desire they would send up M^r. Rosewell to settle those Acc^{ts}. as Cap^t. Peyton declared it could not be done without He was present; Their Answer to Us and M^r. Rosewell's Representation is enclos'd in this Packett, to which We beg Leave to refer your Hon^{rs}.

When Cap^t. Peyton comes from the southward We will talk with him on this Affair, and take M^r. Morse's Advice in it, and advise your Hon^{rs}. further by [the] next Conveyance.

We have supplied our surgeon w^h. the sum of Pag^s. 4261. 34 which He requested of Us for the use of his Majesty's Hospital from the 2^d March last to the [. . .] ult. and enclosed We send your Hon^{rs}. Ticketts and Acc^{ts}. for that Amount, also the Duplicates of those ₹ Lapwing.

In this Packett y^r. Hon^{rs}. will receive M^r. Robinson's Bills on the Hon^{ble} Commissioners of the Navy for 1500 Dollars supplied him with the 28 of May last for the service of his Majesty's squadron.

The 11th. ultimo his Majesty's ships Exeter and York arrived here, and joined the Commodore as did the Eltham the 13th.

There remains at Anchor in this Road The following ships under the Command of Commodore Griffin, Viz^t. The Prss Mary, Preston, Pearl & Eltham: likewise the Bombay Castle, Winchelsea & Exeter belongⁿ. to the Hon^{ble} Company.

The Remaining Part of the squadron are upon different services on or about the Coast.

We must acquaint your Hon^{rs}. that We cannot sufficiently write in praise of Worthy M^r. Griffin He saw full well the dangers We were exposed to, should He leave the Coast, and therefore generously resolved to stay upon it the whole monsoon, and to be near at hand should the Enemy make an Attempt upon Us: He accordingly sail'd to the Northward with all the squadron the 20th. September, and return'd here again the 18. October, but the Wind blowing very fresh & the Current running strong He did not anchor but made out to sea: the 11. November the Commodore appear'd again in Company with the Medway and Pearl, the other ships of his squadron not joining him from the Time He was here last: However this did not at all discourage him, He sail'd again the 16th. with the above mention'd ships, and return'd here again with them the 26th. and two days after leaving the Medway as a Guard ship to Us, He sail'd with the Pearl to the Place of Rendezvous in quest of the Rest of his squadron.

The 4 December his Majesty's Fireship the Fago, arriv'd here from Vigagapatam, where she had been sent by the Commodore to refitt, but it blowing fresh and a high sea, she parted two Cables and at night the Medway did the same, and was obliged to go out of the Road. The next day We gott Anchors and Cables on board the Fireship, but the Wind increasing and she being an Old crazy Vessal, she came on shore the 7th. at Noon, but all her people were sav'd.

Upon the Medway's Arrival at Trancomalay in a very shatter'd Condition Commodore Griffin immediately dispatched the Harwich to Us, and she arriv'd here the 2^d. Janry.

Some time before this the Enemy gave out, that some of our ships were lost and others disabled, which made them think it a proper Opportunity to come against Us, They accordingly did agreable to the Acc^s. already given your Hon^{rs}. in '94 Paragraph foregoing. This is the second Time that Commodore Griffin has come in to a day to our Assistance. The first time was the saving the Fort; this last, of al[1] our Out Towns, and Villages; for against such a superior Body of Force, We could only expect to keep the Fort & Tevenap^m. wth. We judge We might have been able to have done, at least the Latter for a considerable Time; The first We were in no pain about.

We take the Liberty to recommend Commodore Griffin to your particular Notice as a Gentlemen worthy your sincere Regard, and We must assure you No one could have acted more for your Interest, than He has done in every Respect for the Good of your service, ever since He has been in India, and still resolves to maintain your Credit. He has now been within a few days of One year in guarding this place, now of the utmost Consequence to your Hon^{rs}. & M^r. Griffin is very sensible of it.

SUPPLEMENT

This ship arriving here on the 3^d. Ins^t. On the 4th. We recd a Letter from Capt. Ward signifying the Expiration of his Charter Party Time on y^e. 31st. Ultimo, and afterwards in another Letter of the 8th. that he was ready for sailing. Upon which as We were of Opinion, it would be a great satisfaction to your Hon^{rs}. to receive by her the Packetts and Advice of this settlement, which were then preparing, and within four or five days of being ready, We thought proper to agree in your hon^{rs}. Name that the usual Demorage should be allow'd his Owners in such Cases, and We hope the Reasons We had for so doing will sufficiently vindicate our Proceeding therein.

The Diamonds & Precious stones that are register'd by this ship in return for Coral & other Acc^{ts}. amount to One hundred seventeen thousand, Two hundred Forty four Pagodas, Thirty four Fonams & seventy One Cash, (117244. 34. 71) as P particulars in the Register enclos'd in this Packett.

No One having applied to Us for Bills of Exchange We have made no Draughts on y^r. Hon^{rs}. by this ship.

We sincerely wish her a safe and speedy Passage to your Hon^{rs}. and beg leave to assure you that We are wth. the utmost Fidelity & Respect.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY, DATED APRIL 25, 1748. [*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 16, pp. 91-97.*]

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS,
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONBLE THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND
TRADEING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE.

1. By the Warwick who sail'd hence the 15th. February We had the Honour to Address you under the 13th: of that Month, since when we have the Pleasure to acquaint you of the arrival h[ere] of your ships Porto Bello, Prince William, & True Briton the 30th: Ult^o: as did your Snow the Swallow the 11th. Inst^t: The three former from Gallee, where they touched in Consequence of some Orders they received from the Secret Committee, and there waited according to Our Directions in a Letter lodged there for the Commanders of any of the Outward Bound shipping, till the Commodore sent the Harwich to Convoy them hither, and the latter is come from Batavia, having delivered the Pacquets she brought out for that place. We have also Landed the 14 Chests of Treasure that came on the Swallow. By private Advices from Batavia by this Vessell, We learn the Princess Augusta sail'd thence for this Port the 23^d. Janry, and the Brilliant was to sail soon after the Snow likewise for this Place.

2. The Tryal arrived at Vizagapatam, having touch'd no where in her Passage from Europe, the 10th. Febry. and sailed again the next Day for Bengal, and We are advised she arrived safe there the 19th. February.

3. Your Commands by these several Conveyances have been all duely reced and shall be strictly observed, Immediately on Receipt of them Major Stringer Lawrence took his seat at the Board as Third of Council, and He with the Rest of the Gentlemen of Council desire your Honour's Acceptance of their sincere Acknowledgements for the Favours you have conferred on them in confirm^g. them in their several Stations, and allowing them the same appointments, as were Enjoyed by the Gentlemen of Council at Madras.

4. Your Honours Direct that in regard to Major Lawrence's Allowances, they be on the same footing as Major Knipe Enjoyed. We must take the Liberty to acquaint you that Gentleman having Borrowed Money of the Company in England, and Dying soon after his arrival in Madras, he received no Pay there, nor can We get certain Information of what was to be allowed him. We have therefore settled his salary as Major at £ 300 ꝯ Annum, and Pagodas 50 ꝯ Month for other allowances, besides £ 70 ꝯ Ann as third in Council, which We hope your Hon^r. will approve of, and We must assure you he takes a great deal of pains in Training up the Military, and makeing the several Dispositions necessary; already this Garrison is in better Order than could well be expected, considering the short time that Gentleman has been with Us.

5. Agreeable to the Liberty you were pleased to Indulge us with [in] taking in such of the Gentlemen who were your servants at Madras, as we might think proper We have accordingly entertained the following; Mess^{rs}. Matthew Empson, William Smyth King, Hugh Harris, & John Trenwith, to whom we have given the same standing they were in at Madras, as also the Interval time since the takeing of that settlement, none of them Careing to accept of it without that time; and We have promis'd the same to Mess^{rs}: Clive, Bulkely and Maskelyne, who now Act as Ensigns, by which they are of more service at present to your Honours than if they assisted in any of the Offices, as we stand so much in need of Officers, and We hope what we have done will meet with your Honour's Approbation; The other Gentlemen who are not herein mentioned have Declined at present Entering into the Service.

6. In Obedience to your Orders noqa procuring an Investment, We immediately sent for the Merchants, and discoursed with them concerning the same, and We have the satisfaction to acquaint you they have promised to have ready by September about 3000 Bales or more of the several sorts mentioned in your List, provided We can make them sufficient Advances, part of which according to your Directions

We intend to Load the Porto Bello with, and dispatch her to your Honours some time in Septem̄ She is now under the Direction of M^r. Griffin, He having requested of us the use of her for a short time. We hope we shall have a sufficient quantity of Bales for another ship if the Merchants stand to their promises. But as we have no Beating Godown and but few Washers, we fear we shall not be able to get this Quantity cured, but We will use our Utmost Endeavours to procure all the Washers we can, and must make shift at present to beat the Cloth in a Godown that was Built for Grain last year, as the setting about Building a proper Place at this Juncture would take off too many hands besides materials from the Horn work which we are intent upon finishing with all Expedition.

7. As soon as we had Landed the several Articles we had need of from the Prince William we Dispatchd her for Bengal on the 13th. Inst^t: with 20 Chests of Rupees, a much smaller supply than we intended to send by her, but having information of the near approach of the Morattas to the settlement of Calcutta, we thought she might be of greater service in lying as a Guardship. The True Briton we detain'd till the 23^d. of April, when she [sail]'d with 20 Chests more, By her we sent a supply of Money, Wares & Stores for the Northern Settlements, and we hope to get a Quantity of good Cloth from Vizagapatam & Ingeram by the Month of September. The Gentlemen there shall have all manner of Encouragement from us to forward their Investment, and We wish it had been in Our power to have supplied them before.

8. Cap^t: Norton Hutchinson has not as yet offered to pay any Money into your Honour's Cash on Account of his Respondentia on the Swallow, but if he should we shall not fail to grant him Certificates for the same, and observe your Directions in case of his Deccase.

9. Your Honour's Orders in regard to any Money offered to be paid into your Cash shall be punctually observed.

10. On the 18th: March arrived our Vakeel from Nauzir Jing, in Our last we advised your Honours He had taken into the Company's service 300 Horsemen to serve us 3 Months; As soon as the Governour had received Advice of the agreement he wrote to the Vakeel that if he was not under the strictest Obligation to bring them down with him, he must save the Company that Expençe; He accordingly made up the matter and brought none with him. By him came Letter^s. from Nauzir Jing and other Great Men, wherein they make large promises of Friendship: Nauzir Jing has also sent several Phirmaunds to be delivered to the several Poligars and Kiledars of this Province to assist us wth. Provisions and everything we may have Occasion for. He has also wrote to the Nabob of Arcot to assist Us, and We have reason to think not only Him, but the Country throughout wish well to Us, there having been a stagnation of Trade Inland ever since Madras has been taken. By Our next We will advise your Honours of the Expençe of this Expedition which is but small, considering the Greatness of the Person we applied to.

11. It is with great Concern We are to acquaint your Honours of the Death of M^r. Jackson here the 20 Ultimo, as also of your Assay Master M^r. Foxall on the 4th. Instant, by which we are reduced to the necessity of trusting to the shroffs for the goodness of the Pagodas; As there is not now one person amongst us that has the least knowledge of that Business; We therefore hope Your Honours will think proper to send us ou[t] as soon as possible a Person qualified for Transacting the Business of the Mint, with an Assistant to succeed In case [of] an Accident to prevent in future the [neces]sity we are now drove [of] depending entirely upon the Black people. It is at present [under] the Inspection of M^r. William Holt, who as he Resides at Cudd[alore] can have a better Eye [over] the Minters.

12. As Our Enemies are furnished with a Troop of Horse by which they have greatly the Advantage of us in sending our Parties thereof, that make frequent Incursions near our Limits, & the Adjacent Villages. We have thought it absolutely necessary wth. the Opinion of Major Lawrence and several of the Officers to Raise a Troop also in your service, and have Granted Commissions to Lieutenant Gingins and M^r. Hallyburton to act as Lieutenants, & One to Ensign Cheesborough

to be a Cornett, these being the properest persons. We have only been able to provide Horses and Accouterments for 30 Men, but we daily expect more Horses from the Country, and hope in a short time to make up this number One Hundred.

13. As all the Books and papers were lost at Madras, We desire your Honours will be pleased to send us a Copy of the last sett of General Books that went home from that place, as also Copy's of such papers and Accounts as you think proper, that may serve to Direct Us in the method your Accounts are kept, as well to be of service in settling and adjusting any Accounts Relating to that settlement with the Merchants and others, though in the interim We shall not be wanting to get what light we can from the Conicoply's late of that place, but they represent to us that they lost all their Cadjans wherein they kept the Company's Accounts at the taking of that place and this leads us to acquaint your Honours that being in the Greatest Necessity for a Person to Act as Sub Accomptant as none of your Covenanted servants think themselves qualified for that post, and it will require One of some Experience to bring the Accounts & Books into the same method they were carried on at Madras, We have thought proper to appoint M^r. Charles Hopkins to that Employ^{mt}. as we are informed he was the person that kept the Books the latter part of the time at Madras, and as he did not chuse to accept of it without some other Encouragement than what is usually allowed to a person in that station, We have nominated him a Factor, which we hope will meet with your Honours Approbation and that you will confirm him therein.

14. We are in hopes of sending your Honours by the Porto Bello some of the Chintz, that was in the hands of the painters, and was preserved by th[em] from the French, which are now finishing, having advanced them Money for that purpose.

15. Coja Mirza to whom the President & Council of Fort S^t. George advanced 4000 Pagodas for purchasing the Chay Goods, has at length Delivered the Amount thereof in the proper sortments which are safely Landed at Vizagapatam.

16. Our Merchants at last by frequently demanding it of them are about to pay one third of their Old Ballance, and have promised we shall have the Remainder in less than three Months. We should not have Granted them so much more time, but as they have Engaged in the Investment this year, we thought the Indulging them in such a Trifle might be an Encouragement to them to Exert themselves, and to bring in the best of Cloth.

17. Agreeable to your Directions to sett clearly before your Honours, what Demands may be on the Honble Company for Money Reced into their Cash, or due from them at Madras. We now enclose a List of some Bonds that were Granted by the late President & Council of that place and Bills which they allow to be just But we are inform'd there are several other persons, who are in Different parts of India that have also Bonds, which when we can get an Account of We shall not fail to advise you thereof, and besides these several have been transmitted home, which we doubt not but you have seen.

18. We have also a petition from John Gray formerly Master Carpenter of Madras, representing that upon the arrival of the French squadron the Garrison stores were immediately look'd into, and among many Deficiency's found therein, it was thought necessary to sett about makeing a Great number of Gun Carraiges, besides many other useful things in his way of Business; and though he often press'd the storekeeper for an Advance of Money to Enable him to carry on the Work he could get none, and not willing to appear troublesome, he borrow'd Money from sundry Gentlemen, Inhabitants of Madras, to forward this Work with the utmost Expedition; for which his Bonds run on at Interest from the time he took up the Money; and as his Creditors expected we should reimburse him the whole sum so laid out by him at Madras. They have hitherto been easy with him, but on his being told we could pay no Debts contracted at Madras without your Honour's Liberty for the same; they now press upon him for pa[y]ment of their just Demands which makes the Man very uncasy. He had a General good Character at Madras, and we assure your Honours he has been very Diligent & Usefull [to Us] so that we take the [Liberty to] Recommend him to you for payment of the Principal with [Interest] of his just and Reasonable Demand; in the meantime not to [Discou]rage.

so usefull a man to this Garrison we shall Advance [him] a sum of Money to Enable him to carry on the necessary Business wth. spirit and Vigour, as he seems much to be cast down with the Disappointments he has met with, a Copy of his Petition comes enclosed in the Pacquet.

19. Also one from Peter Dencker, a person who by Order of the Governour & Council supplied the whole Garrison of Madras with Provision^s. and laid in a sufficient quantity of the same from the 18th. August, the first time the French went there (when all the people who gave Diet to the Military &c^t. ran away) till the 7th. Septem^r, And as it seems to be much of the same Nature as the foregoing One, and the poor Man is now Reduced to necessitous Circumstances. We have also taken the Liberty to Recommend him to your Honours for the payment of the Money due to him with the Interest thereon.

20. A few Days past we reced a Letter from the Governour & C^a. of Negapatam, a Copy of which you will receive in this Vessells pacquet acquainting us with some Orders they had received from their superiour's at Batavia, to do all possible Damage to the French in these parts, both by Sea & Land, and on the other part to keep up the strictest Correspondence with Us: to which end they had Dispatch'd the necessary Orders to all their subordinate settlements, as did We to Our's, and forwarded a Copy thereof to Bengal, and We shall strictly observe the same.

The George Snow carried our last Advices to your Honours a Duplicate of which you will receive in this ship's Packet; And it is now with the utmost satisfaction that we are to acquaint you of the arrival here of all your ships, as well as those belonging to His Majestys under Adm^l: Boscawen in safety the time when is as follows.

The Scarborough Duke of Dorset, Wa[ger] and Hardwicke as soon as they had delivered the King's stores [and] what they had on board for this Presidency, were immediately dispatched for China, The Scarborough the 8: July, The Duke of Dorset the 11th. The Wager and Hardwicke the 23^d. and we hope will not be too late to gain their Passages; The Edgcote and Admiral Vernon of the four that

came with Admiral Boscawen and designed also for China, he discharged soon after his arrival here, but as the watering & victualing his Fleet and landing his Artillery employed all our Boats & Cattamorans, we could not possibly dispatch them till the 29th. of last month; The remaining two when the Admiral has no further service for them shall also follow them, as will the Delawar the next month, there is a quantity of Sandal wood ready for her at Tellicherry, from thence she goes to Benjar & so to China agreeable to your Honours Directions.

This goes by the Benjamin bound to Bencoolen on whom we have laden 200 Bales and 22 Candy, three maunds fifteen Pounds of Redwood amounting to Pag^o. 15159. 16. 6 as ₹ Invoice & Bill of Lading inclosed, She carries some few supplies for that Place, and the Deputy Governour & Council have our directions to fill her up with Pepper and dispatch her to your Honours as soon as possible. We wish it had been in our power to have fulfilled our promise of loading home another ship at this season, but upon our calling for the Merchants and reprimanding them for their dilatoriness in bringing in the Cloth and that they would not keep up to what they promised of providing 3000 Bales by September, they replied that they might by mistake have said that number, but they never meant above 1500, that they had met with great difficulty in providing what was already brought in from the troubles in the Country occasioned by the death of the Mogul & Nizam but their utmost endeavours should not be wanting to forward the Investment as much as lay in their Power; At present they have only bro^t: in 770 Bales and they promise a considerable number against January but as they have deceived us once we shall not name any certain number to your Honours but beg leave to assure you we shall not be wanting often to call upon them to put them in mind of their promise.

Agreeable to your Honours directions we should have dispatched your Ship Lapwing to the Bay with a supply of Rupees but the 10th. June two days after her arrival appeared in sight eight French Ships, who stood for our Road till we could discover their Hulls very plain when they hawled off to the Eastward and kept a good Offing till sun set, at which time they tacked and stood to the southward, but this was only a Feint, for as soon as it was dark they tacked again and stood to the Northward, at this time M^r. Griffin was at an anchor in our road in the Princess Mary with the Exeter York, Harwich, Preston, Eltham Pearl, Medway's Prize & Lively besides the Winchelsea, Bombay Ca[stle] & Exeter belonging to your Honours and about eleven that night weighed and stood to the Northward to prevent their getting into Pondicherry. which they never attempted but went to Madrass, where they landed some Military and Treasure, the quantity we can't be certain of, and after about two hours stay sailed away again leaving the Princess Emelia who was an Hospital Ship & a sloop beh[ind] them, All the next day M^r. Griffin lay off Pondicherry but seeing nothing of the Enemy the next night sailed for Madrass, where arriving too late, he thought it properest to return back and arrived here again the 23^d.

As there was no Certainty which way these ships had bent their Course and Bengal being as likely a place for them to go to as any, we thought it most prudent to desist from sending any supplies thither till we could learn that place was in safety, and that we might be speedily advised thereof, the Admiral when he was at Madrass, dispatched the Lively to Bengal and ordered her to return immediately, but she not being yet arrived from thence and having rec^d. intelligence from Vizagapatam the 19: Ult^o: that they had been at Ballasore the 22^d: June, we immediately resolved upon dispatching the Exeter and Winchelsea with a supply of Rupees and they accordingly sailed the 25th. from Pondicherry road under Convoy of His Majesty's ships Apollo & Medway's prize with seventy five chests for Bengal also 32000 Madrass Pagodas and two Chests of Rupees for the Northern settlements and we hope in few days to send them the Porto Bello & Bombay Castle with seventy five chests more which will be as much as we can possibly spare them out of our present stock, which will consist of about One hundred and forty Chests after their next supply is gone, to answer the demands of the Camp, Fortifications Advances to our Merchants and several other Charges. The Lapwing being wanted for a private expenditure we beg leave to refer your Honours to the President for particulars thereof.

The French at Pondicherry as soon as they found our Fleet was sailed and imagining they must be gone in pursuit of theirs, thought it a very proper time to make an Attempt on Cuddalore and accordingly the 16 : June at night they marched out to the number of about 2000 Men Blacks & Whites ; The next morning we had intelligence they were marching to the southward and about noon that they were due West of us about four Miles distance from the Bounds hedge and from some deserters that came in we learnt that their number of Europeans was 900 and that they intended to attack Cuddalore that night, upon which the Major ordered a party of seapoys thither [late] in the Evening went himself About a quarter past nine they ma[de] a very brisk attack, but met with so warm a reception that in less [than] an hour they retreated with the loss of their Commanding Officer [and] 30 Europeans and fifty B[locks] besides a great number that deserted [them] we were afterwards informed, and could we as easily have sent thither a field piece or two as the party of Men there would have been great slaughter made of them. This was so unexpected a repulse to them as we had given out that we intended to abandon it on their approach that they were quite disheartned from making any further Attempts at that time & so the next day they returned back again to Pondicherry.

As soon as our Forces were landed from the Fleet they immediately encamped to the Eastward of the Garden house where they continued till all the Baggage and the Train was landed when your Honours Troops under the Command of Major Lawrence joined them, and the 8 : Ult^o : they set out for Pondicherry but were obliged to make very short marches on account of their Baggage, that it was the 12 : before they got to a small Fort of the Enemys named Areacopang about three miles to the southward of Pondicherry which was so well fortified by fascine Batteries and other works they had thrown up there that it was the 19th. before they got possession thereof. Whilst they were before this place, the Enemy one morning attack'd our Trenches upon which our people gave way and very unfortunately our brave Major and one Cap^t. Bruce of the Independent Companies by their people leaving them were made prisoners and we should have suffered considerably had not Cap^t. Hollond (from whom we are afraid we shall have no more service this season as he has received a musket shot in his shoulder) with a great deal of briskness rallied our people, who upon giving one smart fire drove the Enemy quite away and took several Prisoners ; We have since received a letter from the Major, who says he rec^d. no hurt in the action and that they meet with extream good treatment. We have also been so unfortunate as to lose M^r. John Hallyburton to whom as we before acquainted your Honours we had given a Commission to be Lieutenant of the Troop of Horse and of which he was very deserving, for he took infinite trouble in disciplining the Troop and shewed himself very active in the field : It was by one of our own seapoys that he had the misfortune to be killed, who shot him upon his reprimanding him for some offence of which the poor Gentleman died the next day, and the Villain did not live so long for his Comrades that stood by him cut him to pieces immediately. When he had got possession of Areacopang after a stay there of a few days, they marched round to the westward and are since gone to the Northward where they are landing their heavy Artillery and carrying on their Approach[es].

On the 7th. May returned here your Honours ship Princess Augusta from Batavia who brought us a supply of Timber & Plank as also Arrack for the Garrison which was provided by Mess^{rs}. Harrison & Parsons, who [when] hearing of Cap^t. Jacobs's death and M^r. Lesley's (the Chief mate) being a stranger took upon them the execution of our Instructions to Cap^t. Jacobs and loaded her accordingly thereto. Upon her arrival here finding M^r. Lesley very unfit for the command we conferred it on Cap^t. Michael Collings an experienced and good seaman. On the 23 : June the Brilliant Snow returned here again who is gone on another private Cruize and on the 16. Ult^o : arrived here the Oxford from Batavia with the stores she was sent for from thence, for the use of his Majesty's ships and this Garrison.

The Ships Porto Beilo Prince William & True Briton having brought us several Packets from your Honours for the Presidency of Bombay which not caring to trust overland in these precarious times and no sea Conveyance offering we

came to a resolution to dispatch the Tryall Snow with them who accordingly sailed the 11th. June and by letters from thence of the 8 : Ult^o. : we are informed she arrived there the 5th. and that by advices rec^d. by the Rose Galley who arrived there that day from Mocha they were acquainted that the Essex imported there the 9th. July.

Your Honours orders relating to not suffering a Romish Church or their Preists within our Bounds, should have been immediately put in execution, but after some consideration we found it would be attended with very ill Consequences at this juncture having 529 Topasses in Garrison and were we to turn the two preists out not one would remain with us and we beg leave to advise your Honours the Officers assure us they behaved very well in all the actions against the Enemy particularly in the last at Cuddalore of which Major Lawrence was an Eye witness and it was his opinion (although he is not here to confirm it) that we ought not to run the risque of losing such a part of the Garrison whom we think much he attached to this place by living long in it and the greatest part of them having Families here: We have not lost one by desertion which could not have been prevented from some of the Outposts had they been so inclined: The Enemy at Pondicherry would have gladly rec^d. them which would have distressed us very much, upon the whole we hope we shall not be censured for not complying with this order as we are of opinion it would have proved of the highest ill Consequence to have put the same in execution at this Juncture when we are so much in want of Men. But as soon as we are furnished with a sufficient number of Europeans we shall not then hesitate at putting your orders into immediate Execution.

We have acquainted Mr. Lenox with that Paragraph of your letter relating to [him] and he intends to take his passage accordingly home in January.

Agreeable to your directions we have sent [for] the Madrass Merchants to come and settle their Accounts and [they] write us that they will be here shortly, and we have the satisfaction to acquaint your Honours that of the Ballance that was due to you from our old set of Merchants by continually pressing them for payment we have reduced it to a very small sum which will be paid within this month.

In our letter by the George we acquainted your Honours of the necessity we were put to for a person to act as Sub Accountant and as Mr. Hopkins transacted Business of that Station at Madrass and could put our Books into some method we had appoint'd him as such and nominated him as a Factor, but after the departure of that Vessel by a fit of Illness seizing Mr. Hopkins that obliged him to keep at home for some weeks, we were reduced to the same Inconvenience as before of having no body to go on with our Books and at the same time finding that the employ he had of taking Care of the Boats, when the Fleet arrived would take up so much of his time as to allow him very little to transact the Business of the Office, he desired we would excuse him therefrom, and fix upon somebody else upon which understanding that Mr. John Duncome was experienced in Book keeping, we appointed him to the employ of Sub Accountant & ordered Mr. Hopkins to be struck off the List of Servants.

We have acquainted the Gentlemen to the Northward of your Honours appointment of them to this Board and we expect Mess^{rs}. Prince & Westcott by the first Conveyance, M^r. Saunders has requested leave to stay to settle his Affairs & M^r. Goodere is left for the present in Charge of your Affairs at Vizagapatam.

OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE.

We addressed your Honours last by the Benjamin under the 2^d : Ult^o : which ship we then dispatched with Two hundred 200 Bales and Redwood to the West Coast to be filled up there, as we now do your ship Oxford to the Malabar Coast to compleat Her Tonage having put on board her three Hundred 300 Bales and thirty 30 Tons of Redwood as & Invoice & Bill of Lading.

Mess^{rs} : Prince and Westcott having arrived here the 28 : Ult^o : they accordingly the 30th : took their seats at the Board and the prescribed oath.

Since the departure of the Benjamin we have been applied to by the Reverend Father Severini Superiour of the Romish Church at Madrass for the payment of a Bond for six thousand 6000 Pagodas given by the late President & Council of that place for so much received into our Cash there on account of the Orphans but as your Honours direct that none of those demands be discharged till further orders we have let him know the same, As also M^{rs}. Madeiros, from whom a few days past we received a letter to the same effect concerning the three Bonds mentioned by your Honours in your letter of the 20. January 1747 and also as you directed that when you shall think proper to order them to be discharged, that it shall be done on the Coast and not in Bengal.

By this time we were in great hopes to have had the pleasure of acquainting your Honours of our Forces having subdued Pondicherry, but from the lateness of the Season and the Sickness of our People, One thousand of which being now in the Hospital The General has been obliged to raise the seige and the Forces arrived here the 7 : Instant.

With this ship will sail the Delawar for Tellicherry. The Porto Bello we dispatched the 4 : Sep^r: to the Bay with a supply of Treasure and the Bombay Castle followed her the 30th: with a further supply. The Lapwing has also returned from her private expedition & sailed for the Bay the 6 : instant.

Captain Thomas Stevens having taken out of the Cash consigned to him by us two thousand 2000 Rix Dollars at Batavia on the Terms of ship Oxford's Charterparty ; Inclosed we send your Honours his receipt for the same, as also his first receipt for three thousand five hundred 3500 Pagodas received on the same account here and we are also to acquaint your Honours that we have granted Certificates to that Gentleman for one hundred & twenty 120 Pagodas received of him into your Cash here on account of the Estate of Cap^t: Rob^t: Misenor late of ship Warwick deceased. HONOURABLE

The President having acquainted us with his intention to dispatch the Swift Snow to your Honours in few days, we now take the opportunity of sending you by her a duplicate of our last address by your ship Oxford whom we dispatched the 11th : instant to be filled up on the Malabar Coast, as you will observe therein, As also of our having been so unfortunate as to be obliged to raise the seige of Pondicherry, a more particular account of which we suppose General Boscawen will transmit you, therefore beg leave to refer you thereto.

In our letter by the Benjamin of the 2^d : Sep^r. a Triplicate of which we now enclose, we acquainted your Honours of the misfortune we had met with in losing our Major, who was taken Prisoner by the Enemy at Areacopang as also of the Fate poor M^r. Hallyburton met with. In the several Skirmishes since with the Enemy Lieutenant Browne of the Bengall Detachment has been killed and Ensign Wright of the Bombay Detachment and by the inclosed return you will observe the number of Men we have lost on this expedition. There is an exchange of Prisoners on foot between the Gen^l. & M^r. Dupleix who is very ready to exchange all but Major Lawrence, as he is pretty well acquainted with the use that Gentleman is of to Us, but as the General has returned him for answer that unless he is exchanged none of the rest shall, but be sent to Europe, we hope that may have an effect upon him and induce him to favour us with the Major again : Cap^t : Morgan having laid down on acc^t : of his Age and Infirmities Cap^t : Hollond acts at present as Commandant being pretty well recovered of the wound he received at Areaopang.

It is the opinion of most People residing here that we have no Authority by the Copy of the Charter now with us to erect a Civil Court in this place as it was designed for the City of Madrassapatnam and now in the name of the Gov^r: & Council of that place therefore we beg your Honours will please to set us right in this affair as soon as possible.

On the 13th. instant imported with us the Colchester from Bengal with a supply of Rice, Wheat & Saltpetre and as His Majesty's ships are now taking in supplies of Water & Provisions against they leave the Coast, We have as yet not been able to take out any of her loading as the Boats are all employed by them, but we shall do it as expeditiously as possible.

On M^r. Wynch's return from Camp M^r. Prince was appointed to the Employment of Paymaster, M^r. Wynch Import Warehousekeeper & Sea & Land Cust^r. of Tevenepatam, M^r. Westcott Storek^r. & Scavenger, M^r. Saunders to the Chiefship of Vizagapatam, M^r. Goodere Resident at Ingeram, M^r. Churchey second of Council of Vizagapatam & M^r. Banks third.

M^r. Charles Nicholls whom we sent to reside at Negapatam to send advices dying there in July last, We supplied his place with one M^r. Peter S^t. Paul who came out in M^r: Boscawen's fleet he being very well qualified for such a post as he is master of several languages.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY, DATED JANUARY 16, 1749.

[*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 17, pp. 1—4.*]

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS FOR AFFAIRS
OF THE HONOURABLE THE UNITED COMPANY OF
MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

Your Ship Lapwing having been compleatly loaded by the President and Council of Fort William and ordered to call here for any Advices we might have to send to your Honours is the occasion of our addressing you at Present, which we beg leave to defer doing under the Establishd Heads till the latter end of the Month when we purpose to dispatch to you either the Ships Porto Bello and True Briton or the Winchelsea with a loading from hence and shall then also send our Annual Books and Papers. But as neither are yet arriv'd with us from the Bay (notwithstanding they all left it before the Lapwing) and one or the other (as we have not sufficient Tonnage here for them all) must be sent to Tillicherry, where there will be Pepper enough to Compleat their loading with, and from whence they may be dispatch'd this Season, we apprehend it must be the two former, as the latter is ordered to call at Vizagapatam for what Bales may be there from whence we imagine it may be some time before she arrives and afterwards the unloading of her will detain her some days longer which we fear will make it so late as to endanger her losing her Passage round Ceyloan or else we should resolve upon sending her thither as by keeping the other two here we might divide the Risque of the Tonnage to be sent from hence, which being of greater value than the Pepper we think ought to be first considered.

Upon receipt of your Honours letter of the 10th. May last overland advising of the Cessation of Arms and the Preliminary Articles being signed for the restoring a General Peace and the Admirals acquainting us that he should upon the return of your Ships after the Monsoon deliver them over to Us. As we shall have so much Tonnage upon our Hands and the President and Council of Bombay wrote us there would be upwards of twelve hundred Tons of Surplus Pepper on the Malabar Coast for any Ships we or the Gentlemen in Bengall might have to send to take it in, We accordingly came to a resolution to send the Colchester round thither and after having put on board her some Redwood and Saltpetre she saild for Tellicherry the 21st: Ult^o: from whence we receivd advice the 8th. inst^t: that the Delamar arriv'd there the 19th. Nov^r. where she took in three hundred Candies of Sandal Wood and the 1 Ultimo saild on her inte[n]ded voyage. The 3^d. the Orford and Stretham arrivd there from Bombay the former of which was dispatchd the next day to Anjengo to fill up and the latter saild the 16th. following for Bombay with Pepper.

The day after the receipt of the News of the Cessation of Arms &c^a. and His Majesty's Proclamation thereof General Boscawen sent an Acco^t: of the same to M^r. Dupleix whereupon Major Lawrence and Capⁿ. Bruce that was taken Prisoner with him were permitted to give their Paroles & come hither and upon the Arrival of the Favourete with them the 7 instant, who brought a Confirmation of the same all the Prisoners they had there belonging to us were sent hither and the Major has again taken Charge of the Garrison which we had deliver'd to Cap^t. Holland as being the Oldest Officer (Capⁿ. Morgan having laid down the service on Account of Age and Infirmities) and Constituted him Commandant at the same allowances as were granted to Capⁿ. Gibson, but he having now deliverd up the same again and there being at present no prospect of any further Action here he purposes to proceed to Bengal by the first Conveyance that offers to take the Command of the Company your Honours have order'd him there. The Vacancy made by Capⁿ. Morgan we fill'd up with M^r. William Henry Southby who was a Lieutenant of Mariners in his Majestys Service upon the Generals recommendation of him for the same and that made by Capⁿ. Gingsins being appointed of the Troop of Horse, as M^r. John

Scrimsaun was the next Senior Officer we gave him the Compy but with this Proviso, that should your Honours not think proper to continue the Troop that he should resign the same to Capⁿ. Gingsins again, And in his room have appointed M^r. James Cope a Lieutenant as well as Adjutant as an Encouragement for the Pains he takes in disciplining the Military and we are inform'd that is the Post he bore whⁿ. in His Majesty's Service; Being in need also of an Officer that had some knowledge in the Train Duty, we have given a Commission to one Peter Nost who bore the Station of a Bombardier in His Majesty's Train of Artillery and has been bred up in that branch from his Infancy, though at present he acts as an Ensign of the Military, but we purpose shortly to remove him to our Train of Artillery and make him a Lieutenant which we hope will meet with your Honours Approbation.

The Number of Bales we shall have to send your Honours will be about 1500 Besides 500 sent on Ships Benjamin & Oxford and we think are of a pretty good manufacture, though we have been oblig'd to advance the prices of some of the Sortments two Pagodas ₹ Corge more than we at first contracted for, as the Cloth the Merchants brought in was very bad the reason of which was owing they alleged to the troubles in the Country from the Morattas and the prices of Cotton being rais'd Wherefore we thought it was better to allow them something more for good Cloth, than to receive what they brought in at the prices we at first agreed with them for; We should have far exceeded this Number of Bales as we had no Competitors (the French being quite still and the Dutch doing scarce any thing) could we have supply'd the Merchants according to their Desires, But the prodigious Expences we have been at lately kept us from making them any large advances as we are not certain how long it will be before we shall receive another supply and we are unwilling to leave Ourselves quite bare of Cash, As we have so many demands to answer. But as soon as any Ships arrive with us, we shall advance them largely.

We mention'd to your Honours in a former Letter that we had acquainted M^r. Lenox with what you had signified to us concerning him and that he purpos'd to return to Europe this Season, but he has lately requested of us that he might remain in India some time longer as having not been able to collect in his Effects and dispose of some others which from the expected peace, he has now the hopes of accomplishing, and as the representation made to your Honours was we are well persuaded without any foundation of Truth we believ'd therefore you would not disapprove of our gratifying M^r. Lenox in what he has desir'd.

Inclos'd in this Packet we send your Honours an Account of the Expences of the Expedition against Pondicherry amounting to Pag^s: 94558. 19. 75 As also a List of Stores that were expended and thereby rendered useless which we wrote a Letter to General Boscawen and desir'd he wou'd reimburse us a Copy of his Answer thereto and what we wrote him on this Subject are also inclos'd.

Upon his representing to us also that the Subsistance Money granted by his Majesty to his Troops in Quarters was not near sufficient to maintain them in these parts where Provisions are so dear and delivering in at the same time a List of what further Allowance ₹ Month should be made [to] the several Officers and Private Men we accordingly granted the same as there was great discontent amongst them and inclos'd your Honours a Copy of the said List.

Since writing the foregoing arriv'd here your Honours Ships Porto Bello & True Briton [*a few words lost*] the latter and shall send her to take in the Pepper at Tellicherry, but should the Winchelsea come in before she sails we shall transport the Bales she brings to the True Briton and Porto Bello and dispatch her to Tellicherry for the reasons given in the first part of this letter.

We can't by this Ship comply with your Honours Orders in regard to sending you by every Conveyance an account of your quick Stock remaining upon hand, as we have not yet receiv'd those Accounts from the Subordinates but shall not fail so to do by the first Conveyance after we are furnish'd therewith.

HONOURABLE

Since our last General advices to your Honours under the usual Heads by the Warwick We have address'd You by the following Conveyances Viz^t. By the George Snow the 25 April By the Benjamin the 2^d. September By the Oxford the 11 Oct^r. By the Swift Snow the 17 of the same month and by the Lapwing the 16 ultimo, Duplicates and Triplicates of most of which have also been transmitted You, And having now compleatly loaded your Ship Porto Bello we shall give You an Account of all transactions in your Affairs on this Coast for the last Year.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING

2. We have already advis'd Your Honours of the Arrival of all your Ships here under the Convoy of Admiral Boscawen as also of the four ships design'd for China and of their Departure for that Place, We are therefore now to acquaint You that the 28 Ultimo imported here His Majestys Ship the Tartar as did Your Ship Pelham on the 3 Instant by these Conveyances We Receiv'd your Hon^{rs}. Letters of the 18th. May and 27 June and shall follow the Orders therein contained. The latter parted Company with the Sommerset the 15 December in a hard Gale of wind, and as we have not yet seen her here, We imagine she must be gone directly for Bengal, As most of the Squadron are now a refitting at Crankanella Bay. The Pelham is gone thither to deliver to them the Kings stores which she brought out, and after she has Clean'd which the Captain represented to be absolutely necessary, will return here again and wait till the proper Season for proceeding to China when we shall dispatch her thither agreeable to your Honours Directions.

As also the two Ships that came out with M^r. Boscawen which will be deliver'd over to us by that time, but which cou'd not be done on his first arrival here as we have already inform'd your Honours.

3. On the Pelham arriv'd Mess Mandeville & Goodere Supracargoes of the Delawar at their desire the Factory Stores & presents design'd for Benjar were landed here, upon that Ships going to Crankanella Bay we had some design of sending the Supracargoes on this Ship to Benjar first with the presents design'd for the Sultan there But as their Instructions are to go thro: the Streights of Balla, and not to stay there after the 20 June or the 30th. at farthest, We are inform'd it is not to be done and may endanger the loss of the Pelhams passage to China.

4. By the Lapwing we advis'd your Honours that our design was either to send the Winchelsea or Porto Bello & True Briton to be fill'd up on the Malabar Coast and intended it to be the former if she arrivd in time from the Northward as

we should have about Tonnage enough for the other two. But as she not being come the 23 ultimo, as the Season grew late to go round Ceyloan and to be dispatch'd from Tellicherry afterwards, we come to a Resolution of sending the True Briton thither, who accordingly sail'd the 27th. As by this we brought upon ourselves so much Tonnage more to compleat than we first expected, that we might in some measure fill up the same We pack'd all the Brown Cloth we had in the Warehouse and took in as much more as we could get that Measur'd Sixty nine Covids being sensible, that the advantage would be considerably greater to your Honours to have both Ships sent home though with the cloth uncur'd, than to have one Remain here upon Demorage and should have had near sufficient Tonnage for them including Salt Petre and Redwood But the Winchelsea who arriv'd here the 7th. last from Ingeram to our great surprize brought only 314 Bales of Calicoes from that place & Vizagapatam from whence we had good reason to expect we shou'd have receiv'd Seven hundred and reckond upon that Number, but two hundred Bales that were sending from Ingeram Factory down the River in large boats had the misfortune to be so much wetted by the Rains that they were oblig'd to be return'd again And Although we gave your Honours hopes that we shou'd be able to send two Ships from hence, Several Accidents have happn'd to prevent it. The[y] being disappointed of so many Bales from the Northward and the Winchelsea's long Passage from Bengal are the Chief ones for had she arriv'd in time we could have sent the two small Ships home from hence and not to the Malabar Coast for Pepper. But we are now sorry to acquaint your Honours that finding our Tonnage fall so very short as 700 Bales and of them 442 are Brown we are under a necessity of keeping the Ship Winchelsea some time longer in India, and that she may not be unemploy'd we design to send her in a few days to Tillicherry to bring hither some Pepper and the Timber and Plank that is laying there and which we are much in want of for Making Gun Carriages, on her return which we hope will be some time in May we design to dispatch her home to you fully loaden with white Bales, and with the Pepper she may bring be enabled to send another of your Ships in September, as this seems to be what will turn out, most to your Honours advantage in the unhappy Situation Affairs are at present, we hope your Honours will approve thereof.

5. We beg leave to remark to your Honours that had the Gentlemen in Bengal comply'd with our request, of sending the Porto Bello to the Northward to take in the Bales there As by our Letter to them by the said Ship, and the President also lays before the Board two Letters he wrote to M^r. Barwell to the same purpose and desiring she might be dispatcht as soon as the Season would permit we should have had her early and sent the Winchelsea to Tellicherry instead of the True Briton when we cou'd have loaded home from hence.

6. The Oxford and Colchester both which Ships we have before acquainted Your Honours are sent to Tellicherry to take in their Loadings there, by the last advices recd from thence had been in sight of that Place three Days but a strong Current and the Wind against them prevented their getting into that Road. The rest of your Ships in these parts that came out with M^r. Boscawen are some at Crankanella Bay some at Galla having pass'd Crankanella by hard weather, And the Royal Duke & Elizabeth are now at Bombay to which place they were sent by the Admiral with His Majesty's Ships Exeter, Harwich & Eltham As have also the Royal George & Rhoda to Bengal for supplys for the Fleet, and by a Country Ship that arriv'd here a few days past we have recd information she met them going up the River the 22 ultimo. The Bombay Castle we wrote your Honours we Intended, we Dispatcht to the Bay the 1st. Oct. with a supply of Broad Cloth and Treasure where she arrivd in safety and we are by private advices inform'd is to be dispatch'd with the Exeter & Eastcourt to your Honours this Season: The Prince William not having been so long in India and they not furnish'd with a Loading for her we hear they Purpose to send her on a Country Voyage to Surrat and the Swallow Snow sail'd from thence the 22 November for England from Bombay we are advis'd that the Essex sail'd from thence the 6 of November, & that the Stretham would be dispatch'd directly from that Place.

7. By private advices we hear the Oxford saild from Anjengo the 23 December but having sprung a Leak returnd there again the 1st. ultimo and was unloading and the Comm^r. was in hopes of getting away again by the 15th. The Dorrington was bound to Mocha and had taken in 300 Candys of Pepper as part of her Cargo for that place.

Cons 14 Sep^r. 8. As the Princess Augusta was in want of some Repair we came to a Resolution of sending her to Bengal for that purpose and she saild the 30th. September where we are since inform'd she is arrivd, and we are now in daily expectation of seeing her here with a supply of Rice & Wheat.

Cons 8 Nov^r. 9. Your honours Snow the Brilliant being much out of Repair we have sent her to Bombay, and as Capⁿ. Byers who had the Command of her died the 29th. October and none of her Officers had ever been on that side of India, we conferr'd the Command on M^r. Edward Burman First Lieutenant of the train of Artillery here who is an able Seaman and had been often that way and was willing to accept of the same provided it would no ways Prejudice his Rank in the Train, which we agreed it should not she saild for that place the 14 November, and by Letters Receiv'd from the President and Council we are inform'd of her arrival there the 2^d. ultimo. The Hawke Sloop built there for the Service of Bengal and only order'd to call here for any advices we might have to send by her, arriv'd here the 12 October and we Dispatch't her for that place the 23^d. But the Monsoon being set in very strong she was drove away to the Southward and having sprung her Mast put into Crankanella Bay which as soon as we were inform'd finding we should stand in need of the Pepper she had on board Consign'd to the President and Council of Bengall we took it out here and Dispatch'd her thither the 9th. Instant.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA
TO BE DISPOS'D OF AT ANOTHER

10. As the Tartar, came here without first proceeding to the Bay Capⁿ. Brett having heard at Atcheen that the Admiral was here and we knowing the Great advantage Your Honours would reap, by having the Treasure she brought out coined here, We therefore made application to the Admiral, to have the same landed which was accordingly done and we are now Coining it as also what was receiv'd by the Pelham into Rupees with all Expedition Possible, and as Conveyances offer shall forward great part of the same to the Bay, Upon receipt of this supply we sent a few days past 15 Chests of Rupees on the Hawke Sloop and thirty more by two Country Ships which will serve them a little while till we can get some more finishd.

of most of them, which we shall not fail to land as soon as they return here, as also the Madeira Wine which some of them have not yet deliver'd and which could not be sent for ashore before they sail'd from hence what has been receiv'd we have dispos'd of @ 50 Pag^s. Ɔ pipe, As yet we have rec'd no advice of the Fort St. George a Country Ship on board of whom we acquainted your Honours the Chief & Council of Vizagapatam put twenty pipes of the Oxfords Madeira wine, and who bore away to the Eastward on being chas'd off Madrass by one of his Majesty's Ships imagining her to be an Enemy therefore we fear she is either lost or taken.

12. Capⁿ. Samson of the Hardwick delivering one Bale of the Broad Cloth short of the Quantity mention'd in his Ships Invoice, His Reasons for the same were demanded to which he reply'd that he had return'd that Bale in England, upon its being Damaged and did not stay long enough after to have another in the room thereof upon which we have Debted Account Current London for the same.

13. Of the Broad Cloth rec'd by the Porto Bello several of the Bales appearing damaged on the outside we orderd a survey on it and some Peices thereof being found so As Capⁿ. The supply of seventy five Barel's of Gunpowder which Your Honours sent out on Ships Porto Bello, True Briton, & Prince William As there was a likelihood we shoul'd soon be in want thereof we landed it here but it proving excessively bad we were oblig'd to have it made over again, We demanded the Commanders reasons for its being so, to which they reply'd it was put on Board them in that condition and the Officers of our Train who survey'd it and tryed it being of the same Opinion we therefore must leave it to Your Honours to get satisfaction from the Persons who put it up as it appears it came so from them.

15. Upon Capⁿ. Fishers representation to us that he should be glad of the Pepper we took out of the Hawke Sloop to shoot amongst his Bales which would also be of great Service in stiffning his Ship who requir'd it as the season would be late for his going round the Cape we therefore accordingly let him have it, And having since requested of us to take out some of his Salt Petre as he has more on board than his Charter Party Tonnage finding the same to be twelve Tons we gave him Permission for so doing but that Quantity stowing where nothing else will, if we will give him leave to take out no more He desires that may continue on board which we have agreed to, and have acquainted him that the same is to be reckon'd at half Freight only.

By the Warwick your Honours were also acquainted of the Loss there was on the Cargoes of Rice sent us that year from Bengal and we are sorry to acquaint you there will a very great one Arise on what we have lately rec'd from the Gentlemen there as both the Rice and Wheat they have sent us are not only extreamly bad but very deficient in the Weight The reasons of which we have demanded of the several Commanders who all say they Rec'd it in the same condition they deliverd it to us, of which we shall as soon as we have dispatch'd this Ship acquaint the Gentlemen in Bengal that they may make proper enquiry into this Affair & prevent our being servd so in future.

19. Upon delivering 30 of the Chests of Silver recd by the Tarter to be coind into Rupees, We rec'd a report from Linga Chitty who now has the care of the Mint that the Dollars are of a new sort and a much lower touch than usual being four

Penny, w^t. worse than Standard, and what we have since receivd by the Pelham he tells us are the same, upon which we have taken 100 out of the ten Chests and now send your Honours twenty five in this Ships Packet to be assay'd in England as we shall the same number by the next Conveyance and understanding there is an Assay Master at Bombay shall forward theither 2[5] more and the remainder shall be kept here as Linga Chittee has offerd to take the same and will give us an obligation to abide by what finess they shall prove to be of in England we have agreed to deliver him the whole at the touch he reports them to be of as our present need of Cash will not permit us to keep them till we receive your answer Concerning their finess.

20. Our several Indents for Wares and stores come in this Ships Packet, and having sent home three Copys of what we are in want off for the Mint is the reason We send no Assay Masters indent now hoping your Honours have sent us supplies thereof by the Shipping expected here this Season.

THIRDLY TOUCHING THE INVESTMENT

By the George Snow your Honours were acquainted, that as soon as your Commands came to our hands for setting about an Investment and we receivd a supply of Treasure By the Porto Bello Prince William and True Briton that we immediately sent for the Merchants and contracted with them for the same, And by the several Conveyances since we have inform'd You of the Steps that we have taken therein. We are now therefore to Acquaint You that the Number of Bales we have provided here, including what sent on the Benjamin and Oxford Amounts to 2103. Which we could have greatly increas'd had the Demands upon us for money not been so great that we might have supply'd the Merchants plentifully therewith But that could not possibly be done when we had Fortifications carrying on and so many other calls to answer.

22. From the advices we had of Affairs to the Northward we were in great hopes that there would have been a flourishing Investment in those parts and as we have already said that by this time their Merchants would have brought in near Seven hundred Bales besides the 76 sent on the Exeter from Vizagapatam to Bengal as we took care to keep them well supply'd with Money but from the late disturbances there occasiond by the Nabob & Rajahs being at variance they have been able to gett no more than five hundred and fourteen, Two hundred of which as mentiond before were so much wetted that they were oblig'd to be return'd back again, But by the letters we have recd from thence By the Winchelsea we have hopes of doing something more considerable this Year to set about which We shall by the next Conveyance agreeable to the Desire of the Gentlemen there send them a supply of money and shoul'd we be plentifully furnis'd with that Article we doubt not of giving your honours an Account that we have met with good success therein, also at this place as we have now a pretty good prospect of getting a good Quantity of Cloth.

23. Of the Bales loaded on board on board Ship Porto Bello, Your Honours will find two hundred Brown Cloth, these were sent on board her at first as we had then hopes of sending to You the Winchelsea, but since that disappointment we have talk'd with Capⁿ. Fisher about taking them out and putting white Bales in the room of them which he reports cannot be done under many days, but as the Season now begins to grow late we do not think it proper to detain her on that Account which we hope will meet with y^r. 24. By the George Snow your Honours were acquainted with the Inconveniences we labourd under for curing y^e. Cloth, which with an unusual Quantity of Rain in the month of December as also Cloudy weather in the begining of January has been the reason why we have been able to cure so little of it, though hope to send you none but what is so in future as our utmost endeavours to gett more Washers shall not be wanting.

25. In obedience to Your Honours orders to send for the Madrass Merchants to come and settle their Accounts the President wrote to them accordingly & from several recd Answers that they were coming But as we have not yet seen them we

fear it will be some time first, though as there is now a prospect of a peace, when nothing will be apprehended from the French there is a likelihood of their coming as our neighbourhood to that Nation by whom they sufferd so much at Madrass, and are not yet reconcil'd to them has been the cause as we are inform'd of their staying so long in the Country.

26. The Ballance due from our old Merchants are now all paid, though it was but lately that they clear'd them, and had we not press'd them very often they would have evaded doing it now. But we told them your honours were resolv'd to have it and therefore we woul'd not be put of any longer. Upon which they discharg'd the same.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT

27. By the Benjamin your honours were advis'd of Our having made up the Account of the present to Nazir Jing and that the same amounted to 20518. 4. 77 ^{Cons} 23^d. May
The particulars of which are enterd on our Consultations.

28. Since when hearing of the Nabobs Arrival at Porto Novo we ordered another to be got ready to send him as usual upon his coming so near us to the Amount of about one Thousand Pagodas but as he made a very short stay there we sav'd your Honours that Expencc. ^{Cons} 28 Sep^r

29. At present the Country continues in great Tranquility and as we have lately stood in need of no Assistance from the Nabob or people belonging to it, we have had little Correspondence with them therefore have nothing more to offer to your Honours under this Head.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS, REPAIRS & REVENUES

30. In our letter of the 13 February 1747/8 We acquainted your Honours the State of our works then on Hand and were in hopes by this time to have had the satisfaction of acquainting You with the whole being compleated agreeable to our former plan, but as Admiral Boscawens arrival in July occasiond all our Labourers and Cooleys imploy'd on the Works to be taken off in order to assist the transporting the Amunition and other things necessary for the Seige of Pondicherry to which we may add the want of Materials though the long absence of these People and the Monsoon setting in at their Return (during which no work of the kind could possibly be undertaken) have been so many Impediments to the Business that it was impossible to have it in greater forwardness than it is, but we now beg leave to assure your Honours that we shall make all the Dispatch we possibly can and hope to be able to finish the Horn Work, the Lunettes to the Eastward & Westward together with the Glacees and what was began at Cuddalore by the Month of May or June provided materials are not wanting.

31. As the South side of the Fort next the River is thought to be very weake and Defenceless Capⁿ. Delavaux has deliverd us the Plan of an additional Work which he judges necessary in order to strengthen the same and as it has been approv'd of by the Governour and Major Lawrence we purpose to put it in execution, so soon as we have finish'd the Works we are now about and by the Plan of the Fort which we send Your Honours by this Ship You will be able to jud[g]e of the usefullness thereof.

32. As to what additions and alterations have been made in our Works since our last General address by the Warwick we take the Liberty to refer your Honours to the Presidents Letter to the Secret Committee for the Particulars thereof.

33. As the want of Godowns to keep the Cloth in whilst it is whitening has occasion'd considerable Quantitys to be eaten by Rats and white Ants we have thought proper to build one with Brick near Bandipollam washing place for that purpose and hope your Honours will approve thereof.

34. As the Horses for the Troop came in from the Country finding it absolutely necessary to build Stables for them we immediately set about a range thereof which are now near finish'd and will contain 110 Horses. ^{Cons} 19 April

35. Upon the Paymasters laying before us the account of the Ho[u]ses that were pull'd down in Tevenapatam and the Colloway agreeable to the resolution off a Council of War, and what it would cost rebuilding them again, The whole amounts to Pag^s. 13581. 25. 16 we deliverd to Mess^{rs}. Croke & Wynch whom we appointed a Committee for seeing the same paid.

36. Upon the Cowle for the Bounds Rent expiring the 1st. July the Renter deliverd us in a Petition requesting to have it renewed to him on the same terms but as the Income thereof is become more considerable from the number of Inhabitants that have resorted here lately, insomuch that we were offerd 4000 Pag^s. 4⁰ Ann^o: for it, as it has been so long rented by his family we chose to let him have the preference if he would give us as much, which he agreeing to we granted him a Cowle for five Years.

37. All the other Farms continue as when last addressd Your Honours except that for selling Arrack The Rent of which we have been oblig'd to take off for some time having prohibited the selling any Spiritous Liquors within the Bounds upon the Majors Representation, that the retailing of them was the occasion of so much disorder among the Military therefore we thought it proper to submit to so small a diminution of your Revenues than to keep them up when attended with such ill conveniences.

38. The inland Duty on Grain we also took off when the Army set out for Pondicherry to encourage People to bring in large Quantitys of it for the supplying the same. But since its return we have put it on again.

39. The Engineers Estimate of the projected Works to the Southward comes inclos'd.

40. Your Honours have already been advis'd of Mess^{rs}. Prince & Wascotts arrival here and taking their Seats at the Board as also how we had fill'd up their places to the Northward with them came M^r. Belsches in the Business of the Hospital which being greatly encreas'd of late was too much for one Person to go through with. And as there were always two of that Profession at Madrass and M^r. Turing having been many Years in your Service we have thought proper to appoint him Second Surgeon of this Place which we hope will meet with your Honours Concurrence as we cannot but Esteem him a Person highly deserving of your favours.

41. By the George Snow we acquainted Your Honours that agreeable to your permission we had entertaind Mess^{rs}. Richard Fairfield and John Starke who came out Writers in your service for Madrass but as that place was taken, continued at Bengall. Upon our being in want of assistants and desiring the Gentlemen there to order them thither they immediately came and are now both in the Secretarys Office.

42. M^r. Thomas Heath who came out with Capⁿ. Delavaux and orderd by your Honours to be brought up under him an Engineer. Upon that Gentlemans representing to us that he had no turn for that Employment we put him under the Accomptant in whose Office he assists at present.

43. Upon M^r. Foxalls Death as M^r. William Holt offerd his Service to Inspect the Mint we accordingly Entrusted him with the care thereof and appointed him half the Salary which Your Honours were pleasd to allow M^r. Foxall, But he has

since acquainted Us that he does not chuse to receive any thing under the whole Salary which we did not think him entitled to, as he understands nothing of the Assay Business, therefore he has at present no allowance for his employment as Assay Master.

44. Mr. Thomas Cooke upon Resigning his Employ of Storekeeper to Mr. Westcott in October and having requested our Permission to go to Bengall for a short time as his Affairs there were in such a Situation as to require his presence and promising to return again by the first Conveyance in December, having no Business of any great importance for him to do here, we accordingly comply'd with his Request upon which he proceeded thither and return'd here again a few days past.

Mr. Richard Rider who was appointed by your Honours one of your Chaplains at Madrass and as we advis'd You upon hearing of that place being taken stay'd at Fort Marlbrô when the Princess Augusta return'd hither he took his passage on that Ship but during her stay at Batavia died there, so that we have but one Chaplain here at present.

46. Two Widows, namely Phebe Graham & Elizabeth Smith having petition'd Us to grant them some allowance to subsist on, being in Necessitous circumstances, As their Husbands were both in your service and in pretty high Stations We have allow'd them 8 Pagodas ᱠ Month each, which we hope will not be displeasing to your Honours.

48. Upon the arrival here of Capⁿ. Delavaux The Charge of the Train as well as of the Fortifications were deliver'd over to him by Mr. George Jones who having no Employment here to detain him, went soon after to Tranquebar [w]here he is at present.

When the forces first set out for Pondicherry Upon the Majors representing to us that there was not a sufficient number of Officers to your Honours Troops and General Boscawen recommending for Ensigns two Persons that came out with him as Volunteers Namely Thomas Greenville and Allen Stewart Commissions were accordingly Given them which the latter has since laid down Agreeable to the Permission granted us by Your Honours to give Capⁿ. Commission to the Lieutenants, We accordingly promoted them to that Rank, and as thereby there was a Lieutenant wanted to the Majors Company and He recommending it to us to give a Commission for the same to Ensign Scrimsour as an Encouragement for his Behaviour when the Enemy attackt Cuddalore it was accordingly done & in his room Mr. Benjamin Pigou was made an Ensign, As the private Men that were in Cuddalore when it was attackt by the Enemy, all behaved very well and it was probable we should soon after have an occasion to try them again to encourage them to act in like manner we made them a present of a couple of Shirts each, and no fault having been found with the Seapoys that were there, to the Heads of them we presented a few Yards of Broad Cloth and to their people to the value of a Rupee each in a Turband or Sash.

50. We have already advis'd Your Honours of Capⁿ. Mr. James Cope a Lieutenant in his room as an Encouragement for his trouble in training the Military, whom we have also since promoted to be Capⁿ. Lieutenant upon the Major's Recommendation and telling us it was always usual to have one of that Rank to the first Company, Upon the setting out of the Forces for Pondicherry, as none of the Officers of his Majestys Train bore Commission[s] under Lieutenants, that ours might rank with them we gave them Commissions to act as such, and whilst the Forces were before Pondicherry the General having wrote the President that your Honours Battalion, had not Officers enough belonging to it to act the Duty requir'd there, and recommending some of his Voluntiers to be made such Commissions were granted to the following Persons viz^t. John Grant, William Boyde, Matthew Samson, Samuel Samson and John Innis to act as Ensigns and Samuel Worrall as Cornett of the Troope of Horse; Of which Mr. William Boyde & Matthew Samson have since desir'd leave to Resign and one Mr. William Gordon recommended by the General and Peter Nost who belong'd to His Majestys Train have supplyd their Places.

Of our having raised a Troop of Horse in your honours Service You have already been acquainted with And we must now assure you that we find it of Infinite service as it is to be relied on which cannot be said of any Peons that can be hir'd, and the number of them that were oblig'd to keep before (the Expences of which will fully Discharge that of the Troop) we shall shortly Dismiss as we have found them of very little Service on the Late Expedition, and had we been without the Troope we should have labour'd under great inconveniencys, which will in case of any Stoppages of Goods going or coming from the Country, soon remove the Cause and more expeditiously than any Peons. Therefore we hope Your Honours will think proper to continue the same. General Boscawen is of opinion also that the continuing the same will be more for your Interest than a Number of Peons. (which must be done if the Troop is abolish'd) having but a very mean opinion of those People from what he saw of them on the Expedition, He has also been so kind as to give us his advice concerning the Establishment there of which we have followed as Your Honours will Observe by our Consultations. The Military regulations rec'd from Your Honours by the Pelham, shall as soon as we have dispatchd this Ship be put in Execution as near as possible and we shall have Satisfaction to acquaint your Honours that by your having so capable a Gentleman as Major Lawrence at the head of your Military Affairs there are few of those Regulations but what he has already put in Execution.

SEVENTHLY OF ACCOUNTS

56. Upon Capⁿ. Peytons arrival here agreeable to what we wrote Your Honours we sent him a Letter and at the same time the Accounts in our possession depending with the Squadron when under Mr. Barnett and his Command and desir'd

the same might be settled and Certified by him to which he Return'd us for Answer that, as those accounts were all in M^r. Barnetts time He could not charge himself with them. And as to the Madrass Accounts, if M^r. Morse could produce either M^r. Barnetts or his Orders for purchasing Provisions of any kind for His Majestys Squadron and that they were actually in the Godowns when the Place was taken and wou'd send those Orders & Vouchers Home to the Victualling Board would allow them on his Account This was all the Satisfaction we could get from M^r. Peyton in regard to those Accounts, And as there is now no Method left for us to get them settled and certified here we have stated such of them as we have been able to get from M^r. Morse, (tho many are still at Tranquebar, not being yet Drawn out) in as clear a manner as we can, and have sent them in this Ships Packet with the Paper apart and the rest will follow by the Winchelsea. Amongst them is a Bill drawn by Lord Thomas Bertie on Commodore Barnett from Bombay for Rupees 5571.—62. He recd from the President and Council there, which we tendered to him here for Payment but as the whole was not on Acco^t. of his Ship He desird the same might be sent to your Honours and he would see that it was Discharg'd in England.

57. Capⁿ. George Cuming having applied to us for the Amount of the Silver He paid into your Cash in England, Agreeable to your Honours Directions we deliverd him the same.

58. The Account of your Honours Quick Stock at this Settlement we now transmitt you in this Packet by this Ship, but of what is at the Subordinates must defer till another opportunity for the Reasons mention'd in our Letter by the Lapwing.

59. In the month of August the President and Council of Bombay transmitted to us a Bond pass'd to them by Coja Shawmere (Son of Coja Sultan David late Inhabitant of Madrass but now residing at Pondicherry) for the Sum of Rupees 8580-1-36 which he gave them in part payment of Bills drawn by his Mother at Ispahaun on her Husband Sultan David which Bond they desird Us to receive the Amount of and then deliver up They also acquainted us that they had attach'd the Sum of 20,000 Rupees (belonging to the aforesaid Coja Sultan David lying in the hands of Gov^r. Wake) by way of security for the remainder of the said Bills, which attachment if he agreed to, then we were to deliver him a Release, Sign'd by the President & Council of Bombay and the Original Bills both which were transmitted us for that purpose. But in case he contested the said attachment then we were only directed to Endorse on the said Bills the Amount of the Bond given them by Shawmere. In Consequence of which on Shawmeres arrival here a few days after, the said Bond was tender'd to him for payment. But not having wherewithall to discharge it he requested permission to write to his Father for that purpose which was allow'd him, but he neither being furnish'd with ready Cash sufficient desir'd the Amount of the said Bond might be endors'd on the Bonds given him by the late President and Council of Fort S^t. George for Money he lent the Company there (as part payment thereof) which we consented thereto and as soon as the Bonds arrive from Pulliacat where they now are, shall see it done and have in the Interim taken Shawmeres Receipt for the said sum Shawmere having also acquainted us that his Father would allow the aforesaid 20,000 Rup^s. in Governour Wakes hands on the account of Ispahaun Bills, and M^r. Morse informing us that the Honourable Company are indebted to him more than that Amount of the said Bill exclusive of the aforesaid 20,000 Rupees. We thought it but reasonable to deliver him up the President and Council of Bombays Release which was accordingly done.

61. Our last Advices from thence being of so old a Date as the 10th. April we shall not presume at present to give your Honours an Account of the Situation of Affairs there as You must have had them much later by the Grantham & Benjamin.

As the Success Galley a Country Ship was bound to Batavia and design'd to touch at Fort Marlbrô was opened your Honours Letters of the 10 of May to the Deputy Governour and Council there, recd overland and sent a Cobby of it by here as we shall the Original by the next Conveyance, as also that recd from your Honours by the Tarter.

63. The usual Supplys of the Rice &c^a. for that place, which we are in da[i]ly expectation of receiving from Bengal we shall send by the first Conveyance after their arrival here that is bound thither.

NINTHLY TOUCHING THE CHARTER

64. We have nothing to advise Your Honours of under this Head but what we mentiond in our Letter by the Lapwing to which we beg leave to reffer you.

TENTHLY CONCERNING THE FRENCH AND OTHER EUROPEAN NATIONS IN INDIA

65. On the 23 ultimo arrivd at Madrass seven sail of French Ships who landed there a great number of sick people and from the Intelligence We have receiv'd we imagine they must be come from the Islands in their way they met with a Dutch Ship from Japan bound for this Coast whom they took and sent to the Islands and not knowing of the Cessation of Arms off Puliacat meeting with one of our Country Ships from this Place bound for Bengall, they carried her into Madrass, but soon after let her go, On the 29th. they came to Pondicherry and the 11 Ins^t. one of them saild from thence to Bengal, The 11 Instant two more from France it's said arriv'd there and have brought a large Quantity of Treasure as well as many men but of the truth of this we cannot be certain as our Intelligence is not all together to be depended upon. Five of them are now under sail to the Eastward and its said are bound to France.

66. The Declaration Your Honours have orderd us to Publish in Regard to the Dutch We have had drawn Out and the same is now translating into the several Languages, which when finishd According to your directions We shall fix at every Gate here and shall order the same to be done at all Subordinates.

ELEVENTHLY CONCERNING HIS BRITANNICK MAJESTYS FORCES BOTH BY LAND & SEA

67. Your Honours were advis'd by the Benjamin of a French Squadrons passing this Place in the Month of June which proceeded to Madrass, wither M^r. Griffin went in pursuit of them, but they were saild before he got there. On his return hither he wrote us a Letter congratulating Us on our Success against the Enemy when they attackt Cuddalore and desiring we would send him an Account of the State of our Garrison as also if we thou[gh]t overselves of sufficient Strength to defend the Fort & bounds against the Enemy that he might lay the same before a Council for their Oppinions wether it might not be proper to go in quest of the Enemys Squadron upon which Major Lawrence and Capⁿ. Delavaux being the properest Persons to Consult in regard of what M^r. Graffin requested of us were ask'd their opinions of the same, which they deliverd us in writing and which with an Account of the State of the Garrison & a Letter from us was transmitted him, Two days after we receive from him another Letter acquainting us that He had laid ours with the Papers we sent him at the same time before a Council who were unanimously of Opinion that the Companys Ships serving in the Squadron should be deliverd up to us as also such of our Men as were on board his Majestys Ships and dessiring we would give him our direct Answer Whither with our Military and the men we might take out of those of the Companys we could defend the Fort and its dependances against any attempt of the Enemy if so they were determind to go in Quest of the Enemys Squadron. Whereupon Major Lawrence & Capⁿ. Delavaux were again askd their Opinions of this Affair, which they gave us in a Letter and which with one from overselves we transmitted him. But he sent Us no Reply thereto and remaind here till the 16 August when he saild for Trincomoly and from thence for Europe the 16 ultimo, before he left this place the Preston being Condemn'd as unfitt to proceed to Europe He made us an Offer to let the Company have her Guns which we accepted being in great want thereof as most that we have upon

our Works are quite Honeycomb'd and he accordingly deliverd them to us, for which and their Appurtenances we gave him a Receipt where we made the Honble Company to be accountable to the Office of Ordnance for them The Medway having been survey'd at Trincomally and found in so bad a Condition to proceed to Europe was condemn'd also. And Admiral Boscawen has promis'd to let us have her Guns which are daily expected from thence, and what we are in much want of for our New Fortifications.

68. His Majestys Ship the Medways Prize having on a Cruize met with a Ship from Persia name'd S^{ra}. Catharina, on board of whom was a French Commander she was accordingly brought in here the 1st. May and examin'd and from many Circumstances it was pretty plainly provd she belong'd to the Enemy, whereupon she was accordingly Sold with her Cargoe soon after which Coja Petrus Uscaan an Eminent Armenian Merchant late of Madrass wrote us a Letter from Pulicat informing us that she was not a Lawfull Prize but belongd to several Armenian Portugueze and Moors Merchants the latter of which should they complain to the Country Powers would in all probabillity occasion the Honble Companys Investment to be stopp'd, which he thought it his Duty to impart to us, and hope we shoul'd take the same into consideration and not imagine, He did it on account of the concern he had in her. But the regard he had for the Honble Company, As we had sometime before resolv'd not to intermeddle with any Affairs relating to the Squadron, We wrote the same to Coja Petrus Uscaan for answer And in a short time after recd another Letter from him acquainting us that we had satisfied him the above affair was quite foreign to us Therefore as nothing could be done in Regard thereto in this part of the World desir'd we would represent it to your Honours which is the reason of our being so particular on this Subject.

69. Besides the S^{ra}. Catharina there was another Ship met with by the Benjamin when under the Admirals Direction loaded with Grain from Balasore which as she was going into Madrass and had a French Mustee for the Commander the said Cargoe was judg'd a proper Prize and was accordingly sold here. But the ship was releas'd upon whose return to Balasore the Owners of her made a Complaint to the Country Government of the treatment they had receiv'd and Who we hear have impeded Your Honours Affairs there till the amount of the said Cargoe is made good to the Owners. In Consequence of which the President & Council of Fort William have wrote to us desiring we would enquire into the affair and get Justice done to your Honours but as this happen'd when Capⁿ. Meard was in His Majestys Service who is since gone for Europe it is impossible for us now to get any Satisfaction here.

70. The Bombay Castle in her way to Negapatam after she was discharg'd from his Majestys Service having met with a Ship from Judda, Commanded by a Frenchman Capⁿ. Brown by virtue of his Letter of Mark brought her in here and having been examin'd by M^r. Brett Admiral Boscawens Secretary who has a proper power for that Purpose, she was judg'd to be a Prize and accordingly with her Cargoe Sold, But as she must be legaly condemn'd in England where she may appear to be no Prize (thô there is not much probabillity of it) Yet as in such case her Owners may Demand the Value of her Of some of your Ajents in India) as she was taken by one of your Ships and upon being denied payment Occasion the Country Government to obstruct your honours trade in land, The President thought proper to desire of M^r. Alexander Mackpherson Naval Storekeeper to Admiral Boscawens Fleet and Agent for the Captors that the Amount of her might be deposited in your Honours Cash here for to be deliver'd either to the owners or Captors as she should be judg'd a Prize or not. But he will not come to any such agreement. Therefore we must leave it to your Honours to take such security of Capⁿ. Brown and his Officers for refunding the same in case of need as you may think Necessary.

71. Last Year when his Majestys Ships Exeter and Winchester went round to the Malabar Coast Capⁿ. Pawlet on his arrival at Tellicherry being in want of Fresh Provisions for his People and other necessarys, applied to the chief, & Factors there for the same who accordingly supply'd him therewith, and for the Amount

thereof He gave them Bills of Exchange on the Agent Victualler and Naval Store-keeper of M^r. Griffins Squadron. Who as he had no Liberty from M^r. Griffin for Drawing the same Refus'd to accept them whereupon as soon as Capⁿ. Pawlet arriv'd he was acquainted therewith and desird to discharge them himself. But that not being altogether convenient for him to do, He gave us two setts of Bills of Exchange One on the Principal Officers and Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy, and the other on the Commissioner for victualling His Majestys Navy with Letters of advice to each. The first Bills of each sett with the Letters of advice are therefore now inclos'd in this Ships Packet.

72. The Remarks sent out by your Honours which were made on M^r. William Belsches Accounts. He has been acquainted with In answer to which he deliverd us in a Letter a Copy whereof goes in this Ships Packet.

As there is no proper Officer Here for Registering of Wills which us'd to be done at Madrass by the Register of the Mayors Court, In Compliance with the Requests of Sundry Persons to have the Wills of several that have Died here lately enter'd on our Consultations, We have accordingly granted the same.

74. A few days past we Receiv'd from M^r. Morse an Account of Two Bonds. He has for money lent the Honble Company at Madrass Viz^t.

One for Pagodas twenty thousand 20,000 Dated the 12 June 1746. The Money was lent to the Company some Years before and the Interest paid to that time.

One for Pagodas ten Thousand 10,000 Dated 30th. September 1746 and these are the only ones that we have Rec'd an Account of Since those mention'd in our Letters to your Honours of the 11th. October.

Several of the Commanders of Your Honours Ships being in want of Ballast, as nothing could be procur'd here for that purpose, but Sand they applyed to us for Double Gunny Baggs to put the same in, which was granted them, but upon the Warehousekeeper desiring them to pay for the same before their Departure from hence they return'd him for Answer Your Honours were to be at the Expence thereof which as we do not find any where specified in their Charter Partys we therefore must leave it to Your Honours to settle that Affair with their Owners.

76. We observe Your Honours directions in your Letter rec'd by the Pelham concerning the Church Stocks of Madrass, and as soon as we rec'd the Leidger which your Honours mention to have sent us in the Sommerset Packet and got a perfect Knowledge of what is owing to the said Stock we shall Endeavour to collect the same, And hope to inform Your Honours by the next conveyance, of all you desire in regard thereto, as well as of the Charity Stock which is entirely out of our Power to give you the least Knowledge of at present, as the Pelham did not arrive here till the 3 Instant since when our attention has been mostly taken up about the Present dispatch. As M^r. Samuel Harrison is indebted to the Church Stock the Sum of two Thousand 2000 Pagodas which was lent upon his House at Madrass. His Lady being here and designing to proceed for Europe on this Ship we wrote her a Letter, to desire she would Discharge the same or Impower a Person to do it after she was gone, to which she Return'd us for Answer that having remitted to England every thing belonging to M^r. Harrison, It was not in her power to pay the said sum, but if we could apply to M^r. Harrison about it she did not doubt but he would give proper Directions for discharging the same, Therefore as Your Honours will see M^r. Harrison we thought it necessary to Acquaint you with this that the same may be demanded of him.

HONOURABLE

It is with not a little Concern that we address Your Honours at present, as it is upon so melancholly a Subject as the Loss of above Forty sail of Vessels, upon this Coast by a Violent Gale of wind that came on the 13 ultimo and lasted all that and the next day. Among the number of those unfortunate Vessels were His Majesty's Ships Namure and Pembroke both which lay at Anchor in this Road till the Evening of the 13th. when they either Cut or Slipp'd their Cables and attempted

to get out to Sea, but the wind being far Easterly, they could neither of them Weather Caldron Point which lyes about ten Leagues to the Southward of this Place, Wherefore the Namure after having lost her Masts, came to an Anchor and in a short space of time, Foundered, and the Pembroke struck upon the Point with all the sail set that she coul'd carry in endeavouring to get round it and immediately split to Peices, On board of which two Ships near Nine hundred and fifty Men perish'd, and only thirty five were sav'd out of both. There being no news of the Appollo Man of War that was lying to the Southward, nor of the S^t. Frances Snow a Tender to the Fleet. It's greatly to be fear'd they have Shar'd the same fate on board of both which were three hundred and forty men Your Honours Ship Winchelsea, whom we dispatch'd for the Malabar Coast, not being able to gain her passage round Ceyloan, as it was so late in the Season, Returnd here again the 7 ultimo, and with the Lincoln was drove on shore a little to the Southward of the Fort, and not above two or three of their people were drown'd, The surff having thrown them pretty high on the Shore, Your Ship Princess Augusta that was also lying in the Road was wreck'd about half way between this Place and Porto Novo most part of whose people were sav'd Likewise, and some part of her Wreck which has been dispos'd of. The Tartar, Deal Castle and Swallow Men of War that were going to the Southward with your Honours Ship Edgebastion, carried away all their Masts and the latter was very much Shatterd and drove near Pondicherry from whence she was greatly assisted by Mons^r. Duplex, but the Westerly Monsoon being set in and the Current running strong to the Northward as she was in so bad a condition, The Chief Mate (who has taken upon him the Command of her Capⁿ. Hereford having died off Pondicherry) wrote a letter to the Admiral acquainting him that it was his and his Officers Opinion it was not practable to work up hither at this Season therefore should proceed to Bengal, which he has accordingly done as we are inform'd by Mons^r. Duplex. Your Ships Sommerset, Royal George and Rhoda, who arrivd here the 16 following from Bengal met with the Gale off Ceyloan, but none recd any considerable Damage from it except the Rhoda who had like to have overset, it having laid her upon the Beam ends when her Cargoe shifted in her Hold and she continued so, till her Topmasts was Cut away at which she righted th^o is much shatter'd by it, as are a Number of Country Ships that are now lying in this Road, many of which were also Lost. The Hand of Providence has been no more favourable to our Neighbours the French & Dutch, for the former had drove ashore. Three ships and two small Vessels between this and Pondicherry, One of which was a Sixty Gun Ship as we are informd, whose Crew were all sav'd, and one loaded with a Number of y^e. Cannon belonging to Madrass which they were bringing to Pondicherry foundered in the way. The Dutch have lost several Ships but we are not acquainted with the Exact Number. By advices from Tellicherry we are informd that the 14 they had a very Violent Gale on that Coast which drove ashore many Vessels, and particularly a Sloop of your Honours belonging to Anjengo that was loaded with Bales and bound thither But as yet we have no Account wether any other English Vessells have sufferd any Damage by it.

His Majesty's Ship the Syren who arrivd at Colombo some time in March by having most of her People sick from the Length of her Passage stayd at that place to recover them, whereby she escap'd this terrible disaster. She arrived here the 30 ultimo, by whom we Receivd Your Honours Commands of the 21 July and being informd by Capⁿ. King that he had on board fifty Chests of Treasure consignd to Bengall, As our Stock at that time was no more than four Chests, to enable Us to Dispatch the several Ships to China this Season agreeable to your directions. We desir'd the Admiral to order it to be landed here, which has been accordingly done, and we hope in a short time to send away the Pelham and Somerset, As also the Rhoda, when she is clear'd of what stores she has on board belonging to His Majesty and the Royal Duke whom we are in Expectation of seeing shortly from the Malabar Coast. The Royal George we shall dispatch in a few days for Batavia for a supply of Arrack & Timber & Plank for the use of the Garrison. The Lincoln was design'd for this Voyage and to have carried the usual Supplys for the West Coast which as the Success Galley is bound that way and Capⁿ. Barton has made us an Offer to carry anything for that Place freight free, we have accepted of because the Season is now

late and if the Royal George shoul'd call there might occasion her to be so long on her Voyage that she would in all probabillity, not be able to get back hither again before the Monsoon, as she is but a heavy Sailor. The Elizabeth that went round to the other Coast with Mr. Pawlets Squadron, we are inform'd from Tellicherry had been there, and was gone to Anjengo for some stores lying there belonging to His Majesty. The Brilliant Snow had been there Likewise. In her way hither and we are now in hourly Expectation of seeing her here. The Dorrington arriv'd at Cochine the 4 February with above seventy of her Men down with the Scurvy which oblig'd her to remain there some days to recover them after which she proceeded to Bombay where we are Inform'd she was arriv'd, and was to proceed in a short time after for China.

HONOURABLE

As we imagine an Address by the way of Bussorah may possibly reach your honours before any of the Shipping that will proceed for Europe next Month, we therefore now dispatch this to Bombay to be forwarded from thence by the first Opportunity, and have the great satisfaction to acquaint your Honours that General Boscawen took possession of Fort St. George on the 21 instant which occasions Universal Joy among the late Inhabitants of that place, who throng'd there in great numbers immediately on hoisting the English Flag: Tho' all the Art the French made use of could not induce them to return while they were in Possession, and the Attachment they now shew to the English gives them no little Mortification. The Condition we have receiv'd it in, is indeed very indifferent the French having Undermined the Fortifications, and Rifled it of all the usefull and valuable Stores the particulars of which we shall transmitt your Honours with Our next advices.

We have likewise the pleasure to advise Your Honours of the arrival here of the following outward bound Ships Viz^t.

besides which have been dispatchd by us for that Port of the last Years Shipping the Pelham 21st May the Somerset the 7 June, Rhoda 28th June in Company with the Griffin and the Royal Duke the 9th July the Walpole staid here but six days to land what she brought out for this Settlement and saild the 8th. July for the Bay with a supply of Rupees, a further Quantity of which Article we forwarded to the Gentlemen there by the Brittainia, whom we dispatch'd for that place the 20th following, and the Dragon will sail thither in a day or two with another supply thereof.

As yet we have no News of your Ship Augusta further than that the Walpole spoke with her the 23^d April in the Latt: of 31.21 South and East of the Cape 4.56 wherefore we imagine she had proceeded directly for Canton or Batavia. The Tavistock having met with hard Gales of Wind of Zeloan was blown off the Coast and put in at Vizagapatam the 8 July, from whence she proceeded for the Bay the 19 following. The Montfort in her way hither from Atcheen, (to which place the Commander went on finding himself to Leeward of Zeloan & his People much afflicted with the Scurvy) met with the Griffin & Rhoda, the 5 July of Atcheen Head.

We purpose dispatching some time next Month to your Hon^{rs}: two Ships, but as yet are not come to a Resolution which, but design them to be first that arrive here.

As we think this is all that is necessary to Advise your Honours by this Conveyance, We shall therefore add no more than that we are very Respectfully.

FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONBLE THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND
TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

Having compleated the Loading of your Ship Chesterfield, altho^{ugh} our Books & Papers are not in readiness, We have thought it proper rather than let her waite for them (as a days detention at this time may prove of the utmost ill Consequence should the Monsoon set in as expected) to dispatch her with only this short address, & shall by the Royal George who is now taking in her Cargoe & will follow in ten days at farthest, transmitt your Honours a particular account of our proceedings here since the departure of the Porto Bello which as there is a probabillity of their reaching You as soon as this & as we only at this Season transmitt single Copy thereof, We apprehend the not sending them by this opportunity will be of no material signification.

In the Letter We wrote Your Honours via Bombay bearing date the 30th. August to advise that General Boscawen had taken possession of the Town of Madrass (of which a Duplicate is inclosd in this Ships Packet) We acquainted Your Honours of such of Your Ships as had arriv'd with Us this year since when, on the 8th. ultimo Imported the Severn Capⁿ. Richard Dorrill, who staid here but four days to land the Treasure &c^a. she brought out for the use of this Presidency, after which

said for Madrass the Admiral being there to deliver the Stores belonging to His Majesty & We are inform'd has since proceeded for the Bay. By her We were favour'd with Your Honours Commands bearing date the 29th. March, as we have likewise been with those by the several other Ships that have arrived here this Season to all which We beg leave to assure Your Honours We shall pay the strictest regard.

We have no advise as yet of the arrival of the Augusta at any Port in India tho we are inform'd by Capⁿ. Field of the Royal George lately come from Batavia that Cap^t. Barton of the Success Galley in his passage thither met her the 23^d. June in the Latt^d of 2.17^m North & 11.31^m East Meridian distance from Tranquebar.

In this Ships Cargo Your Honours will find one hundred (100) Bales of brown Cloth which as it arriv'd so here from Vizagapatam a few days past we were streighten'd for Boats to land the same We order'd it to make quick Dispatch to be convey'd with the other Bales that accompanied it, on board the Chesterfield by the Boats belonging to that Ship, the which had we resolv'd to have landed would have been the occasion of a day or two's detention of her & which as we said before might at this Season (prove of the worst Consequence) therefore We were induc'd to act in this manner.

A few days past the Sheerness, Man of War & Basilisk Bomb Ketch both left this place for the Cape to prepare the necessary Refreshments for the Fleet when they arrive there which with the Admiral is at present at Madrass but we expect daily to see him here, Where we imagine his stay will be very short as the Season is now far advanc'd.

On this Ship takes Passage M^r. William Holt who having the misfortune to be disorder'd in his Senses which occasion'd his committing some extravagant actions We found ourselves under a necessity of suspending him from his Seat at the Board Likewise holding any Employment in Your Honours Service, of which a more particular Account is mention'd in our Consultations of the 17th. June the day of his suspension & as it is the opinion of the Doctors that his disorder has been occasion'd by the heat of the Climate, & from which there is no probability of his being reliev'd should he remain here but that a cold Country might be very conducive to the Effecting a cure is the reason We have resolv'd to send him Home: M^r. Hyde Parker late an Ensign in your Honours Service at his own request is likewise a passanger on this Ship on Charter party terms; Whose scandalous behaviour occasion'd the Officers here to refuse rolling with him & by the Decree of a Court of Enquiry that was held upon him, he was judg'd to be unworthy of holding a Commission therefore suspended on which Account he made his request to be sent home which We therefore comply'd with.

At the request of our President to pay into your Honours Cash the sum of nine thousand eight hundred and forty nine Pagodas twenty one fanams & twenty two Cash (9849.21.22) on Acco^t: of the Estate of Your late Governour John Hinde Esq^r: agreeable to your honours directions We have granted him Certificates for the same.

By this Ship We send Your Honours a Box Packet that we rec'd a few days past from the President & Council of Fort William which they desir'd We wou'd forward by the first Opportunity & in our Packet one from the President & Council of Bombay who requested the same of us.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY DATED OCTOBER 18, 1749. [*Public Despatches to England, Vol. 17, pp. 58-61*].

TO THE HO^NBLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HO^NBLE THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND
TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE.

By the Hoⁿble Rear Admiral Boscawen who purposes to leave us tomorrow You will receive this Address & it gives Us the greatest Concern to think that we should have Occasion to represent to you that notwithstanding the Peace concluded between His Majesty & the King of France Your Settlements on this Coast are far from feeling its good Effects; Nay, on the contrary are more embroiled then they were even during the War; all owing to the Wiles & artificies of Monsieur Dupleix the French Companys Governour of Pondicherry who has so bitter an Enmity to the English, as not to be able to refrain from showing it, by Committing Acts of Hostility in an underhand manner, though he will not venture to declare openly against Us as your Honours will see by the following Sketch of his late proceedings.

No sooner was M^r. Dupleix certain that the Preliminary Articles of the Peace were certified: & he freed from any Apprehension he might be under of an Attack, but one Sunda Soib (formerly a Moors General) who upon the Nabob his Master being defeated, had retir'd into the Mountains & there liv'd in Obscurity) & whose family had taken refuge in Pondicherry: & were in that place during the whole time of the Siege, began raising Men in the Country, to endeavour to disposses Anaverdy Cawn the then Nabob, & get the Government of the Province for himself.

M^r. Dupleix pretended to have no concern in the matter but sent out all the Seapoys in the French pay to join Sunda Soib, under the Colour of his discharging them to lessen their Expencies & the Men engaging them to serve him. But when Affairs were brought to a Crisis the March was thrown off & He publicly avowed the Cause of Sunda Soib & sent out 900 of the best Europeans in the Garrison of Pondicherry, with a Detachment of Artillery to join him at Auxilianir.

Soon after this Junction Sunda Soib forced the Nabob to a Battle, wherein by the assistance of the French who gave the turn of the scale, the Nabob himself was kill'd, & his whole Army defeated The Consequence of which has been Sunda Soib, taking upon him the Government of this Province, as Nabob by an illegal Firmaund procur'd from Mustapha Jung, without the knowledge or consent of Nazer Jung.

The first act he did after arriving at this Dignity was the recompensing his good Allies by granting them 42 Villages of the Villanour Country which lay all round this Settlement; and by way of reward to M. Dupleix in particular the following towns & their Revenues have been given to him and his Relations Viz^t.

Coibelong to M^r. Dupleix.

Porto Novo to Madame Dupleix.

Alempara to Mons^r. D'Antel his Brother-in-law.

St. Thome to Padrie D'lapurification a Relation of Madame Dupleixes.

So that we are surrounded in such a manner, as for the French to have it entirely in their power to stop our trade, or debar us from any supplies of Provisions from the Country; and we have great reason to believe from what has already happen'd they will not be wanting to make Use of this advantage; For the Padres Zeal being either warmer than the other or his Prudence less, could not help discovering himself, by forbidding on the severest Penalties, any sort of refreshments going to Madrass through or out of his Dependances: and by insulting us in other Respects, in so much that at last we were oblig'd to apply to General Boscowen for his assistance who immediately sent & took the Padre Prisoner: and is bringing him to England to be dispos'd of as his Majesty shall think proper.

By Letters that were found in the Padres house it appears he was to hasty in discovering himself; M^r. Dupleix having advis'd him to carry things with a fair Face till Sunda Soibs affairs were a little more settled who is & has been some time at Pondicherry; were they are preparing a Train of Artillery to go on some enterprise; which it is to be wish'd from M^r. Dupleix's Hint to the Padre may not be design'd against us.

As the Ships are to sail so soon We have not time to enlarge more on this Disagreeable Subject; & our present Situation which we think of great importance to Your Interest for You to be apriz'd off, that if it shall appear necessary to make any complaints of M. Dupleix Conduct towards Us & which we conceive to be directly contrary to what ought to be observed between Nations in Amity with each other Your Honours may be as early as possible in Your Representations: & M^r. Boscawen who is an entire Master of the whole: has been so kind as to promise to give You any further Information You may want in the matter; or to joyn with You in the complaints if You're pleas'd to ask him so to do.

Father René who for many Years past Resided at Madrass being suspected of having acted Traitorously by Us We have requested of the Admiral to take him likewise; as his being turn'd only out of the Bounds of Madrass woud be no impediment to furnishing the French (of which Nation he is) with the intelligence He might receive from the Emissarys He no doubt wou'd have about us, as there are many Churches contiguous thereto where he wou'd probably reside for that Purpose We had some suspicion that Father Severini the superior of the Church at Madrass was likewise greatly in the French' Interest, therefore had desired He might accompany Father René to England, but in the Papers taken with the Father Delapurification at S^t. Thome We discovered he is greatly detested by M^r. Dupleix on Acco^t. of his having much regard for us wherefore we have permitted him to reside at a little Church just without the Town.

Having great reasons to imagine that Mess^{rs}. Barnev[all] & Lametrie have acted very ungenerously by Us We made application to the Admiral for them Likewise to be added to the number of those he took with him in Consequence of which & our orders to Major Lawrence they were seized & on the brink of being shipp'd of, when they desird they might be admitted to bail for their appearance in January to proceed to Europe then being unprepared for so long a passage; which having procured in the Sum of twenty thousand pounds, We complied with their said Request.

As many Persons who resided formerly at Madrass under our protection We are of Opinion have forfeited the same by living under the French ever since the loss of that Place, We have therefore confiscated their Houses to Your Honours use likewise the Romish Churches within that Town & its Limitts.

Altho we have recd no directions from Your Honours for these Proceedings, Yet as Your Interest seem'd at stake We thought We cou'd do no less than to Act in this manner, & hope to have your Honours Concurrence therein.

Of the Independants We have got to inlist in Your Honours Service about five hundred Men, but to induce them to enter We have been oblig'd to raise four more Companys than Your Honours mention in the Regulation you lately sent Us & have given the same to four Gentlemen, before Lieutenants as without having their own Officers the Men cou'd not be persuaded to enter, & till we came to this Resolution We could get only two hundred of them. Wherefore as it was Hinted

that if We woud give Commissions to the aforesaid Persons, they wou'd bring with them each their Company's, We made no hessitations in doing so as there is at present so great a want of men at all your Settlements among which when We come to divide those We have got here will be not near a sufficiency to Garrison them all therefore hope your Honours will think of sending out more.

Of the Train we have got about thirty Men ; Who are allowed to be as capable Men as any in England.

The Plan of Devy Cotta, General Boscawen carrys with him from whom Your Honours will receive it as he has promised us to deliver it to you.

The 12 Instant sail'd from hence for England Your Ship Chesterfield. The Duplicate of our Letter by which ship comes enclos'd & We shall by the Royal George whom we shall dispatch in few days, send Your Honours the Duplicates of all the Papers she carried. We are.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY, DATED NOVEMBER 2, 1749.

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS
FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONOURABLE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND
TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

1. By this Season shipping we have receiv'd your Honours several Favours under the following Dates Viz^t. the 18 May, 17 June, 21 July, 2^d. & 21st. Dec^r. 4th. and 27 January 1748 and 29 March 1749 together with Mr. Secretary James's Letters dated the 30th. and 31 Dec^r :, 24 January, an[d] 1st. February 1748 And since the departure of the Porto Bello who carried our last General Advices to your Honours under Date the 22^d. February, We have address'd You under the 11 May and 30 August Overland, also by the Ship Chesterfield whom we had the pleasure to dispatch to You with a Loading on the 9 Ultimo And Conform[able] to our Intentions Specified by that Ship We have now the Satisfaction to dispatch to You the Royal George with a Cargo as Φ Invoice and Bill of Lading enclos'd as likewise to give You the Needfull Account of all Occurences in your Affairs for past Year under the Establish'd Heads and

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING

2. Your Honours have been already acquainted by us in the foregoing Advices of all such of this Season Shipping as have arriv'd here or have yet come to our Knowledge, as likewise of the Violent Storm that happned with us on the 14 of April last, and of the unhappy Circumstances that attend the same therefore we shall not here trouble You with anything further relating thereto.

3. We have this Year dispatch'd to China the Pelham, Somerset, Griffin, Rhoda, Royal Duke Sandwich and Montfort as before advis'd of, and have Consign'd them all to their Respective Supra Cargoes with a proportionable Quantity of Treasury on each Ship.

4. Upon the Chesterfields being Discharg'd from His Majesty's Service, as We had no better Employ for Her We Judg'd proper to send Her to Madagascar for to purchase Slaves in Consequence of the reasons given in Consultation as P Margent, and accordingly she saild hence in April, and returned the 9 September but brought no more than (34) thirty four slaves they being all that coul'd be procur'd within the time limited in the Commanders Instructions.

5. By the Directions of the President some time since a new sloop nam'd the Cuddalore of about Seventy (70) Tons burthen has been built at Bombay, and sent hither for your Service the Motive that led Him to direct the same being that he imagind she would have been greatly wanted in the Service of the Squadron had the War Continued which at that time there was no reason to suspect otherwise, but that Occasion being quite remov'd, and the Gentlemen at the West Coast having represented the Speedy want of such a Vessel to supply the Place of the Louisa whom they fear to have been lost in some bad Weather as she was going from Pooloo Pasang to Marlborough She has been accordingly sent thither for the Service of that Coast.

[6.] In [our] advices of the 11 May We likewise apprized your Honours of having dispatchd this Ship Royal George to Batavia from whence she return'd on the 21 September with a Cargo of Arrack, Timber and Plank after which the Commander having represented that she was a Weak Ship and unfit for Beating against the Monsoons at this time to Bengal as likewise that her going round the Cape in the Winter might be hazardous. For these reasons We Esteem'd it necessary to dispatch her home at this fair Season in preference to any other, having first caus'd a Survey to be made on her finding Her in a fit Condition to take on board her Cargo, And as our Reason leads to think that the best and Strongest Ships ought to be the longest detain'd as being the most capable of Enduring it. We therefore doubt not but your Honours will approve of our Proceeding herein.

7. The Ships Walpole Britannia Dragon, and Tryal Snow have all been dispatch'd by us to Bengal with supply's of Money for that Place & the Northern Factorys as your Honours will be more fully inform'd under the proper head, the Dragon we should have sent to the Malabar Coast or Bencoolen as your Honours Directed but Understanding from the Advices lately receiv'd from the Gentlemen at Tellicherry that the violent Rains which had fallen with them had Occasiond a great Destruction in their Pepper Plantations. In so much that they had little Reason to hope for a large Quantity of that Article this Season than sufficient for the Compleating of one Ships Tonnage; And being farther Inform'd from the Deputy Governour and Council of Fort Marlborough that the Contagious Distemper of the small Pox had rag'd so vehemently amo[ng] the Natives & Planters in those parts, that it was greatly to be apprehended from the Extraordinary Mortallity which had happen'd among them; there would be but a small Investment to be made with them this Year, which as they inform Us they Judge will scarcely Exceed the Tonnage of their own Store Ship; and for that Reason have been Constrain'd to send over to this Coast the Duke of New Castle as they were in no shape prepared for dispatching her Home as your Honours had directed. Upon these Circumstances we Judg'd it most Convenient to detain the Dragon with Us for the arrival of the Augusta when we intended to have Transported her Broad Cloth on board her and to dispatch her away with that and some Treasure to the Bay but after Waiting till the end of August and finding that the Augusta did not arrive, and Understanding from Vizagapatam that the Tryal Snow on whom we had sent a Supply of Money for the Northern Factory's had passd that Place and gone immediatly for the Bay by which accident they were become in great distress and entirely incapable of making the proper advances in their Investment. We thereupon judg'd proper to dispatch her away Instantly with the necessary Supplys for their Use, and what more Treasure we coul'd then spare was laden on her for the Bay, And as by the Gentlemen of Telli-cherrys Advices they were in hopes to be provided with the Tonnage of one Ship We resolv'd on sending the Duke of New Castle thither, and she saild accordingly the 9 ultimo.

8. Your Honours Snow Brilliant returning safe from Bombay, was dispatch'd to Bencoolen on the 21st. July with the proper supplys for that Settlement.

9. The Fort St. George was made over to Us by the Admiral Boscawen in August and has remaind Ever since going up and down the Coast And as we have no other Occasions for her at present We have judg'd it Convenient as She must proceed to some place or other out of the way of the approaching Season to send her to Madagascar In order to make another Attempt in the Purchase of a Cargo of Slaves, to which end We have sent on her One M^r. Henry Collins whom we take to be a capable Person of such Negotiation And we hope will meet with better Success than in our former Undertaking as we are perfectly assur'd that a number of those People will prove of great Service and be very convenient to Us.

10. The Elizabeth return'd here from Bengal and Madrass on the 5th. Oct^r: and is now taking in Ballast to proceed to Atcheen where we intend to Order her to lye the Monsoon and to return here in December when we design to dispatch her Home.

11. The Prince William having been sent from Bengal to Bombay and Surat, return'd thence to this Place on the 29 August and after delivering ashore a Quantity of Gunpowder Consign'd Us on her from the President and Council of Bombay She sail'd for Bengal on the 6 following.

12. On the request of several of the Europe Commanders we have made them Sundry Advances on Charter Party Terms, and Capn Fowler having apply'd to us for the Supply of one hundred (100) Pagodas for to provide Provisions for himself and Officers, and engaging to be accountable to your Honours for the same We have also Complied therewith and by the Chesterfield forwarded their first Receipts for the same, and in this Packet comes their Second.

13. From Bombay We are advis'd of the Boscawen's Arrival there on the 2^d. August which is the only one of this Season's Shipping We have yet heard to have arrived on that Coast.

14. We beg leave to assure you that we shall pay a strickt Regard to the several directions your Honours have been pleas'd to give Us as Specified in your several advices to Us this Season Regarding the speedy sending home your Ships, and the lightning as much as possible the heavy Charge of Demorage that must in Consequence arise from their long Stay in India and were it possible for Us to perform in this Respect agreeable to our Wishes Your Honours might depend on having your Instructions Complied with to your full satisfaction, but since it will doubtless too plainly appear to be quite a Contrary Case as you'l observe that large Disappointments have attended your Investment in all parts. We have only to hope that our Proceedings herein will appear to your Honours in the same advantagious Light It did to Us, when we persuade Ourselves you will readily grant Us that favourable Construction that We have upon the whole acted as to Us Seem'd most for your Interest, which we can very Sincerely assure You has been the only Principal we have had in View.

15. The Dolphin whom your Honours are pleas'd to place among the Number of those design'd for taking in Pepper at Tellicherry on the West Coast, We are concern'd to observe has never yet been heard off.

16. The Tavistock we have already advis'd your Honours to have fallen in at Vizagapatam from whence She proceeded to the Bay were she now remains.

17. We have heard nothing more of the Augusta since our advices to your Honours by the Chesterfield.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE DISPOS'D
OF AT ANOIH^r.

18. In Consequence of the repeated directions receiv'd from your Honours this Season for the sending to Bengal all the Treasure that We could possibly spare We have accordingly taken every Opportunity that offer'd of sending them a supply, And that your Honours may be more fully satisfied of the Justice We have done

them therein. We have in this Packet sent a List of all that has been receiv'd this Season from the Arrival of the Tarter in January which will exactly make appear the Quantity that has remain'd with Us; and we humb[ly] recommend the same to your Impartial Judgement wether they have the least reaso[n] to think they have not been Assisted to the best of our Abilitys, which by appearance from their Letters and Behaviour they seem Entirely to deny for not Contenting themselves with what we had from time to time sent them which was to the utmost Extent in our Power, They have thought proper to drain Us still further by Granting several Bills on Us which whilst they run only for small Sums We readily complied with; but being very lately tenderd with one for no less than Fifty Thousand (50,000) Rupees in favour of M^r. Charles Brett, His Majesty's Agent Victualler We could not but be much surpriz'd thereat, as such a considerable drain besides other small Bills was what we little expected, however We have taken care to Discharge them though as We apprehend great Inconveniences might attend our so doing as We had but just before made a Calculate of what was necessary for our own Occasions and kept with us accordingly. We judg'd it Necessary for our Security, lest We should not receive any further supplys from Europe a long time to give Bills on them for near about the like Sum which we have accordingly done, and flatter ourselves that your Honours will not disapprove thereof.

Upon the Receipt of your Honours directions for the providing such Goods as might be proper for the Canton Market to be laden on such Ships as might be dispatch'd thither from hence, We to that end requested the President and Council of Bombay to procure for Us (300) three hundred Candies of Sandall Wood, and to send it round to this Coast by such Opportunitys as might offer which they would have complied with but it was not procurable at that time as your Honours will see by their Letter to Us. And a Quantity of Tin offering for Sale at this Place We purchas'd about three hundred (300) Candies and Consign'd it to China on the Royal Duke and Rhoda.

20. The Redwood Indented for by the Gentlemen of Bengal a long time since and which we have for this Year past had ready provided at Dourassapatam is for the most part still remaining at that Place, having had no other opportunity of sending them any this Season but by the Ship Success who carried but a small Quantity We fully proposd to have sent them the whole by some of the Europe Shipping, but they arriv'd so late with Us that Year that knowing them to be in Extream want of Treasure We judg'd it Necessary to give them an Imediate Dispatch to the Bay, and design forwarding the Redwood by such Conveyance as are to be procur'd in January.

21. The Fort S^t. George returning from Trincomalay where she had been on the Admirals Service in April The Commander was then directed to land his Madeira Wine and to transport the Lead she brought out on board the Rhoda for China which was accordinly complied with and turn'd out right.

The President & Council of Bombay in order to Ease us as much as lay in their Power from the great Quantity of Tonnage remaining on our Hands thought proper to send us on the Royal Duke two hundred thirty one (231) Bales of Surat Peice Goods and two hundred (200) Bales of Cotton, which was all the Goods they had in their Warehouse Excepting three hundred fifty five (355) Maunds of Surat Putehuck which they had provided for the Dorrington's China Voyage, but it arriv- ing too late for her, they therefore Consign'd it to us by the Tryal Snow, to be sent thither by such Ships as might proceed from hence that way, which We accordingly loaded on the Royal Duke They have likewise been so good to Direct the Chief and Factors at Tellicherry and Anjengo to send Us on the Elizabeth all the Pepper Cardamums and Anjengo Cloth that they might have remaining in Warehouse, But we receiv'd only a Quantity of Pepper by her, and which is part of this Ships Loading. By the Elizabeth we likewise receiv'd part of the Timber and Plank that has been so long lying at Tellicherry and Calicut, and which we have long since stood in great need of. The Iron brought out by the Royal Duke and Elizabeth was landed at Bombay and We have Debted that Presidency accordingly, as We have done for a parcel of Lead they took out of the Brilliant Snow, the same proving Convenient to their present Occasions.

We have as yet receiv'd no more than Five hundred and ten (510) Bales from the Northern Factorys, but had not the Tryal Snow once whom we sent an Early Supply of Money for the forwarding their Investment, Unluckily pass'd Vizagapatam there would have been a great Probability of their making a far more conspicuous Figure, And we still hope they will retrieve that Misfortune by sending us an additional Number. In January as they have been since supplied by the Dragon whom we dispatch'd thither immediately on hearing of the Accident. In Obedience to the repeated orders receivd from your Honours, We made all possible Enquiry into the Accounts that remain'd outstanding with the Madrass Merchants, but the only information We have yet got regarding thereto is Contain'd in a Letter that We have receivd from M^r. Morse in Answer to one we wrote him on that Subject, a Copy whereof is Entered in our Consultations. The Persons indebted are now most of them resorted to Madrass So that we hope the Gentlemen whom we have appointed to mannage your Honours Affairs at that place will shortly have it in their Power to bring them to a just Payment of their Several Ballances. FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT

38. The Situation of Affairs in this Province has till very lately appeard to be quite Easy and undisturb'd, from which Circumstances together with the happy Peace that has been concluded in Europe We had just begun to flatter ourselves with the pleasing Ideas of very shortly reaping a most sensible Advantage, and it is an equal disappointment and Concern to Us to find that instead of being Enabled to Entertain You with an Account of that Wish'd for Effect, We are only furnishd with a Subject of a quite contrary Nature such as has rendered the whole Province in a State of Confusion The Cause whereof We attribute to have arose from the Death of the Prime Minister Nazam, who leaving behind him his Son Nazir Jung and a Grandson Nam'd Mustapha Jing the latter of whom immediately pretended to a right in the Succession, but the other not submitting to it, He presently seperated from Nazir Jings Army and taken his Force round the Province, and Collecting all the Forces he could get to joyn his Cause, He at length acquired a Body of about Thirty two thousand (32000) Men when He met with one Sunda Soib who had been for this 8 Years past a Prisoner with the Morattas but lately set at large and was coming into this Country with a small Force with a design to Rob and plunder where He could in order to discharge his Ransom, this Person Mustapha Jing conceivd to be quite suited to his Interests in the Undertaking he was upon and accordingly fell into a union with him, and soon after conducted Him into this Province, In order to subdue the several parts of it with which view they came near to the Capital of this Province Arcot where the then Nabob Aneverdy Cawn giving him Battle was (by the assistance of a Body of French Troops which Monsieur Dupleix

had sent from Pondicherry to join Mustapha Jing and Sunda Soib) unhappily defeated himself Slain and his Army Routed. Upon this Total Overthrow Sunda Soib was immediately proclaim'd Nabob And has accordingly taken on him the Government of the Province. This done they stay'd no longer in Arcot than was just Necessary to settle the Place in a quite Obedience, but they came to Pondicherry to make their Acknowledgements for the Evident Service they had received from their Good Allies, where M^r. Dupleix gave them a most grand Reception with all the tokens of Satisfaction that could be shewn them they remaind there for six Weeks in the most perfect Harmony, and scarce a day past in all the time but We heard of some New Grants and Indulgencies the French have acquired from them and from all Circumstances that have come to our Knowledge it is not to be doubted but they have been Mutually Assiduous in framing all possible Schemes that may be Contributory to the farther Enterprize, and as we have never yet shew'd the least Inclination to side with them, or even so much as to acknowledge the Authority they have assumd being thoroughly Assur'd that the same is Entirely Usurped and must of Consequence be ere long Exterpated and the Government Reestablishd in it's proper Course For these reasons together with the flagrant Invetterracy that still subsists with the French against Us We have sufficient reasons to be fully persuaded that Mons^r. Dupliex has been equally Industrious to Stir up their Resentment which We are the more Convinc'd of as Sunda Soib has already Pick'd out the means of making us acquainted with his Displeasure by demanding an immediate Restitution of S^t. Thom'e or he would shortly let us feel the Effects of his Anger, this Place We must acquaint your Honours We were under an Absolute Necessity to take Possession of, as the only means that could be us'd to prevent a growing and Everlasting Inconveniency that could otherwise have attended your Settlement of Fort S^t. George for We were Creditably informed the French had for long time been Endeavouring to prevail on the Moors for a grant of that Place with a full design to have erected a Fort and made a Settlement of it, which had they not been Obstructed in, as it lyes so near Madrass (being scarce two Miles a Sunder) it would by the many Artifices they had undoubtedly made use of. In the space of a very few Years have Encroach'd so much upon the Trade of that Place as We humbly conceive would have tended too greatly to Your Honours Prejudice as likewise that of the Merchants there inhabiting And besides this a far greater Evil must Unavoidably have accrued at that small distance and which we are dispos'd to think was the Chiefest Advantage they proposd to themselves from it that is There having a Constant Spy over all our Transactions the ill Consequences whereof it must be needless to set forth after what we have so lately experienc'd, We shall therefore only hope that when this our Proceeding has been Maturely Weighd and Considered, and You have been more Exactly acquainted with all its Circumstances from Admiral Boscawen, whose Advice and Concurrence We have not wanted therein your Honours will be fully Satisfied that nothing but our perfect Zeal to your Interest and the Duty We think Incumbent on Us to Maintain and preserve it on all Occasions, has been the sole Motives that has Induced Us to this Step, and We cant but flatter Ourselves with the Opinion that it will be entirely approv'd by You.

George as it appeard afterwards by the Papers that were seizd belonging to him wherein was discovered such a Correspondence to have been carried on between him and Mons^r. Dupleix as will Evidently make appear to your Honours that our Suspicions of Him was not without sufficient Grounds These Letters and Papers are all in the Admirals Possession and he promis'd Us to give your Honours a Sight of them.

40. How the Consequences of this Affair may end time must determine though as yet no sort of Hostilities has been Committed on Us and we are inclinable to think that if the French would be but Neuter We should have but little to dread on

the Occasion but as We are too plainly satisfied they are in the Opposite interest, We think it Necessary to keep our Guard, and to that purpose have plac'd a Party of Military at all our Redoubts which We hope will be sufficient to prevent any sudden Violences or Surprisals We hear Mustapha Jing and Sunda Soib took their leave from Pondicherry the 25 of September and have been ever since hovering between that and this Place, with their whole Army in which it's Reported they have fourteen hundred (1400) French Europeans besides some Artillery and their Assistance by which it may be concluded they have some grand Design, And We wish it may not prove on Us, not that we are under any great Apprehensions of it being inform'd by many hands they are Proceeding to Beseige the Town of Treechinopolly at which Place the Younger Son of the Old Nabob, Mahomud Ally Cawn has resorted and is preparing all the Strength he can Scrape together, In hopes if possible to redres himself of the Injury's done to his Family and Principality, It is thither We imagine Sunda Soib with his Army at present are destined as the speedy Subduing that Place, And the dispatching of Mahomud Ally Cawn and to become Master of his inestimable Treasure is the only means that can secure him in the Quiet Possession of his former Conquest, and which if he does not shortly Accomplish he is sensible that Nazir Jing will Ee'r long come to his Protection and Assistance, when it is greatly to be wish'd there will be an entire Period to all his Enterprize and He himself be oblig'd to retire, upon which Reflections as We are Creditably Inform'd that the same Nazir Jing is at this time Actually upon his March hither. We have a great dependance that We shall be soon reliev'd from the Yoke We seem at present under, Otherwise a Dismal Prospect presents itself to Us.

We have in the General been Extreemly Cauticus in shewing the least outward Attachment to either Party, but Notwithstanding upon calling to our minds the Service we receiv'd from the Nabobs Army when attacked by the French on the 9 Dec^r. 1746 and receiving very strenuous Solicitations from the Son Mahomu'd Ally Cawn after his Fathers Death, for to have some Succours and Assistance from Us, Upon these Considerations, as well as being Sensible of the Justice of his Cause, And that we might not be deem'd Ungratefull induc'd Us upon the Receipt of his repeated Entreatys to assist Him with some few Succours Just as a token of our Remembrance, and which we had just then an opportunity of doing in a very Convenient and private manner, for being resolv'd on Discharging all our Seapoys We directed them all to Devy Cotta being about seven hundred (700) in Number with a Lieutenant and thirty (30) Europeans to keep them together at which Place they were deliver'd into Charge of Mahomu'd Ally Cauns Officers and forwarded at his Expence to Him at Treechinoply, and caused it to be Publish'd at the same time that they were discharg'd our Service, He has likewise had from Us a few Peices of small Cannon and some Cohorns which is the whole Assistance We have given Him and is all We intend, Our entire Views herein being all design'd to Convince him of our goodwill that in Case he should hereafter regain his Right and be made Nabob of the Province as is most likely to beleive he will, We may then reap the Benefit of being entitled to his Favour, As We have already in some measure Experienc'd by his so readily granting Us a Phermaund for St. Thome by Virtue of which we hoisted our Colours there the 11 October.

41. Upon this Extraordinary Change of Government, and the turning of affairs into this Precarious Posture We judg'd it highly necessary to secure to ourselves the best and most Creditable Intelligence of all Proceedings among them that could possibly be Acquired. wherefore as We had remark'd a particular diligence and Assiduity in one Hodjee Addee (a Person of Reputation among them) for giving Us the most constant and true information of all Needfull Occurences that had happend in the Country from the Loss of Madrass, And for which he had never receiv'd any further reward from Us than fifteen hundred (1500) Rupees, We readily came to a Resolution of Engaging him in that Service and Esteeming it to be a Case of great Consequence We at once presented him with the Sum of five hundred (500) Pagodas with a Promise of a farther Gratuity of One hundred (100) Pagodas & Menssem during the time We might have Occasion for his Intelligence which we have good reasons to believe, will Subsist but for few Months and We sincerely hope it may.

42. The late Polligar of Madrass makeing application to Us upon the Re'establishment of that Place to be restor'd to his former Station as there was no Extraordinary Misbehaviour coul'd be prov'd against Him We were in a Perfect Mind to have Gratified Him in his Request with the only Proviso, that as Mulrauze who has been one of the Commanding Officers of our Peons during the whole War, and had behav'd with great Credit and Bravery at the Seige of Pondicherry, as well as on some other Occasions had formerly receiv'd the Eighth part of his Fees It was agreed that he shoul'd now have a right to a Quarter the Additional Eighth being allowed him in recompence of this Services but he the Polligar refusing to Comply with this our Pleasure, and declaring that He would have the whole or none Upon his giving Us so disrespectfull an Answer and perceiving that he had a very Indifferent Opinion of our Authority We thereupon came to a Resolution of dismissing him, and appointing Mulrauze to that Station, he being Judg'd a Capable Person, and have granted him Power to act Accordingly, the other pleaded that he had a Cowle for it from the President and Council of Fort St. George which Extended to him and his Heirs for ever; and we suppose the Dependance he placed thereon Occasion'd him to shew that Indifference towards Us, but as we imagine those Pretensions can now admit of no Argument since we presume all grants of that Nature are Expired, and are to be deem'd of no further Force from the Loss of that Settlement. it leads us to hope Your Honours will be satisfied with our proceeding herein and more especially as it has freed Us from the Insolencies that might probably attend the Entailment of it.

43. We must not hear omitt to acquaint your Honours that for Sundry Motives and Advantages, that presented to the Majority of the Board which your Honours will be fully acquainted with from the several Consultations Notified in the Margin, We have been induc'd to take by Force of Arms the Fort of Devycotta a Seaport in the Tanjour Dominions and is distant about 35 Miles to the Southward of this place. It has a fine River that runs close to it and the Soil alround it yeilds great plenty of Grain, In so much that we are persuaded that when the Extent of the Bounds is properly settled your Honours may be certain of its Producing a Revenue of Ten Thousand (10,000) Pagodas $\frac{2}{3}$ Annum since notwithstanding the unsettled State it is now in We have already let it to farm for four thousand Pagodas (4000) for six months only. The Expences of the Undertaking We have great hopes will be entirely repaid Us by the King of Tanjour, having already receiv'd from Him the sum of Fifty thousand (50000) Rupees and are in Expectation of getting as much more We doubt not but Your Honours will have a more particuar Account of this Affair from the President and Admiral Boscawen and as the Concurrence of the latter was had therein, We relye on the same being Approv'd, and wait Your Honours Directions regarding it.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS REPAIRS AND REVENUES

44. When we address'd your Honours on this Subject by the Porto Bello, We then entertaind great hopes of Compleating before this time the several Works therein Specified, And We are now sorry to observe that We have greatly faild in that Expectation which in great measure has been owing to the Scarsity of Materials and the Extream Difficulty in procuring of Workmen, but more particularly to the loseing our Engineer, having since his departure had no other Person to act in the direction of that Business but one Hugh Macklane that came out in the Military who was bred up a Bricklayer and was Esteem'd by Capⁿ. De Lavaux to have some little Knowledge thereof, which being Considered and he appearing to be a sober and dilligent Man We judg'd him the properest Person that offerd for an Overseer and have accordingly plac'd our dependance on him and the Lieutenant of the Train, as the best & only help that can at present be acquir'd in the forwarding and Inspection of all our Buildings.

45. We have compleated the Horn Work on the North side of the Fort, and about half finish'd the Lunetts to the East & West, the latter of which is now proceeding on in a gradual manner and We judge the Compleating of them and filling up the Covered way will be sufficient to employ our Workmen till we have the pleasure to receive your farther Commands on this Head And in the interim have only to

assure You that the Constant and sincere Regard we have always had for your Honours Interest, will Oblige us still to Continue our utmost care and Industry to prevent putting You to the least unnecessary Expence in all the Progress We may make herein.

46. Your Honours have been already Inform'd in an address we made you Overland the 30 August that your Settlement of Fort S^t. George was restor'd to us on the 21 : of that Month. We have therefore here only to acquaint you that the Condition in which it was deliver'd was so Extreemly Bad, that we apprehend it will require to be Entirely New Fortified, all the Walls and Bastions being Undermined in such a manner that they must in all probability fall down in the Ensuing Monsoon, and It is represented by His Majesty's Engineers and all the Bricklayers that they are no ways to be repair'd Neither are they in the least Capable of bearing any Cannon upon them on which last Circumstances We have been oblig'd so far to deviate from your directions as to Permitt a Platform that was began by the French to be finish'd, as we are inform'd it tends greatly to the present Security of the Place and We hope your Honours will not be displeas'd thereat, as we conceiv'd it to be absolutely necessary as our Engineer is gone We cannot at this time send you a Plan thereof, but will Endeavour to get one prepar'd with an Estimate of the expence in readiness to send You by the January Ship. Con 8 Sepr.

47. The foregoing Reason has likewise oblig'd Us to omit for the Present sending You a General Plan of that Place, but in case your Honours should have any imediate Occasion for it We take Liberty to request your Application to Admiral Boscawen who acquainted Us he had a very Exact one in his Possession and that he will readily Oblige You with a sight of it to whom we must also take leave to refer You for the Plan of Devy Cotta, neither of which have wee been able to prepare as yet from the want of a Capable Person for so doing.

48. The French having divested your Garrison of Fort S^t. George of all the Serviceable Cannon that where in it except about four, and being unable to supply them therewith from this Settlement We have been obligd to Admiral Boscawen for as many as he could spare us from the Ships in his Squadron the List whereof your Honours will receive in this Packet, as also an Account of the Quantity of Gunpowder and shot receivd from him ; For all which we have made your Honours Accountable And as we presume taking the Opportunity of this supply to be much more Convenient than to waite the sending off them out from Europe, as we are not only in Immediate Want, but likewise inform'd they are all Esteem'd to be perfectly Good, We doubt not but your Honours will approve of it.

49. We have taken due Notice of what your Honours have been pleas'd to direct in regard to such Grants of Ground as may be given by us in future, in order to prevent any farther Title of recompence to the Inhabitants for any Houses or Buildings that occasion may hereafter require to be levelled, and in Consequence of which all that has been given since the Receipt of your Commands have had the Desired Clause inserted in them, And we here take leave to observe that the Information your Honours have receiv'd of the Situation of M^r. Wynch's House has prov'd to be very unjust and Erroneous since upon causing the distance of it to be measured We find it to be in a very direct line 2170 Yards from the Foot of the Coverd Way, and full one thousand distant from the Pillar that were erected by Cap^t. De Lavaux as a sufficient length for an Esplanade, wherefore as it is evident that it does not in the least Incomode or Obstruct the Defence of the Fort, We have permitted it to remain, and M^r. Wynch flatters himself with a Relyance that upon this Remo[n]strance your Honours will have no objection thereto. Con 24 July.

50. As a means to Encourage the late Inhabitants and Merchants of Madrass to return thither, on the Restitution of that Place We thought it necessary for the first six months to suffer all trade to be Custom free Excepting such Goods as might be Imported from Europe & the Rents of [y^a.] Villages We have let to Farm as follows Trivitore &c^a. Villages that let before for twelve hundred and fifty (1250) Pagodas & Annun to Linga Chittee for Pagodas thirteen hundred (1300) Egmore Con 7 Aug^t.

&c Villages the let before for twelve hundred and fifty (1250) Pagodas ᱥ Annum to Gruah for Pagodas fourteen hundred (1400) and Peramboor &c^s. Villages that produced before Six hundred Fifty (650) Pagodas for Pagodas Seven hundred (700).

51. We have likewise let out to Farm all the Grounds of DevyCotta to our Bound Renter Sadashavarow for the half Year only, who is to pay four thousand (4000) Pagodas for the same.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS MILITARY OFFICEES, AND THEIR ACCOUNTS

52. The first thing that presents to our notice under this Head is the Suspension of M^r. William Holt, our Reasons for which your Honours have been already appriz'd of in our address by the Chesterfield (on which he took his Passage) and will more largely appear in the Consultations herewith Accompanying therefore we shall hear only acquaint you that the Vacancy which thereupon happened at our Board was immediately supplied by the Re-Accession of M^r. Thomas Cooke who being the next Person Entitled thereto according to your Honours Commands in the 19 paragraph of your letter dated the 27 January 1747 In Consequence thereof and the deserving Opinion We Conceiv'd of him from the Faithful Discharge he gave of his Duty when in Council before, We readily conferr'd it upon him, and persuade ourselves that he will behave In all Stations to your Honours satisfaction. Upon taken his Seat in Council he was appointed Import Warehousekeeper and Tevenepatam Customer and to continue the Post he before had of Military Paymaster in all which employs he at this time acts.

53. A few days after this Appointment arrived the Walpole who brought us your Honours favour of the 27 January wherein you were pleas'd to direct and Empower us to Entertain and Re'establish the Madrass Servants in their former Standing in your service under the present Council which we Instantly Signified to them an[d] in this Packet have sent your Honours a General List of Servants by which you'l perceive how many of them have accepted of it, Mess^{rs}. Goodwin, Fowke, Boddam, Powney, Greenhaugh, and Jones, have absolutely rejected it as by their several Answers Entered in Consultations, None of them having any other Reasons for it as we presume, they being all Sen^r. Servants, but a Nation of your Honours having done them Injustice in not giving them their due Rank among the Council, Esteeming themselves to be equally entitled with Us thereto, but this We humbly recommend to your Serious Consideration, and shall most willingly submitt Ourselves to your Impartial decision therein.

54. A complaint having been brought before Us by M^r. Francis Fordyce for an Assault that was made on him by M^r. Robert Clive A due Enquiry was made by Us into the same. In the course of which it appearing that M^r. Fordyce had given great Provocation for such Proceeding, by having frequently Scandiliz'd his Character in a most unsufferable manner, and being further acquainted that he had at several times taken great Liberty's in his Conversation in making use of many unbecoming Reflections on the President and all the Members of the Board, In Consequence of this his Aggression and Disrespect together with the many Instances We have had of his Insolent and Medling disposition We came to a Resolution of suspending him, your Honours Service, And besides the reasons already given for our so doing We might still add that He was in General remark'd to be extreemly Negligent and remiss in the several Duties of his Functions particularly in the Burial of the Soldiers and Seamen which part of his Office he scarce ever attended Notwithstanding he had been twice or thrice Rebuk'd by the President for not doing and which neglect had at length began to Create great Discontent in our Military, We therefore presume that upon a due Consideration of all these Circumstances your honours will Concur with Us in the Measures We have taken herein, In which dependance We shall only add as It is not to be doubted but M^r. Fordyce will set forth his own Story to your Honours and least the same should be to M^r. Clives Prejudice, We think it not improper to assure You that he is Generally Esteem'd a very quiet Person and no ways guilty of Disturbances.

55. After the Dismission of M^r. Fordyce as we were then without any Chaplain We thought proper to entertain the Reverend M^r. Robert Palk who has been many Years Chaplain to M^r. Boseawen and was strenuously Recommended by him. Con.

56. It having been represented the Want of an Assistant at Ingeram and seeing no farther Occasion for the Continuing of M^r. Alexander Baird at Pulliacat, We thought proper to remove him thither. Con.

57. And as there was no Person to take Charge of your Honours Effects at Ganjam in Case any accident happening the Resident M^r. John Andrews We thought necessary to send to his Assistance M^r. Thomas Heath, being first Inform'd from Cap^t. Delavaux that he had no Turn for Improvement in the Service your Honours had design'd him. Con.

58. In Consequence of your Honours directions for Establishing a Military Paymaster and Storekeeper Out of some of your Covenanted Servants M^r. Thomas Cooke was appointed to the former and M^r. Henry Cope to the latter, but M^r. Cope dying soon after (Even before he had taken Charge thereof) that Employ has been since Conferred on M^r. John Pybus who now Continues therein. Con

59. Being vastly distress'd for Writeing Assistants having far from a sufficient Number of Covenanted Servants, We have therefore been oblig'd to Entertain M^r. James Bourchier and M^r. Peter S^t. Paul as monthly Writers, whom We take the Liberty to recommend as deserving of being Entertain'd Covenanted Servants in your Service. Con. 24 May.

60. In Obedience to your Honours Commands for M^r. Morses Return to Europe, We communicated the same to Him, and he has deliver'd us his Answer wherein he proposes to proceed accordingly by the January Shipping, And as we judg'd him to be the most Capable Person of giving us any insight into your Honours Affairs at Madrass We at the same time requested Him to give Us the best Information he cou'd regarding the Moneys that was taken up after the Surrendry of that Place, likewise of the Uses it was applyed to with what Debts might have been outstanding at that time, but to all this he could give Us but a very Concise Reply as your Honours will be pleas'd to Observe from the Coppy of his Letters Entered in Consultations. 61. After the News of a General Peace was Confirm'd to Us, We immediately recalld our several Residents from the Dutch settlements, And upon receiving Application from M^r. Jones for a Gratification on having acted in the like Service at Tranquebar for the space of twelve Months and the President having Assertain'd that he had receiv'd the most Intelligible advices from him of any other, We thereupon directed him a Present in proportion to the Allowance made to our Resident at Negapatam. 62. M^r. John Pybus upon taking Charge of his Post of Military Storekeeper, having address'd the Board, Representing the Extraordinary Diligence and Fatigue that wou'd be required in the Faithfull Discharge of that Employ, and requesting some Additional Pay for the same as we were satisfied of the reasonableness of his Pretensions, And the Major having signified to Us that the Kings Allowance for it was ten Shillings p Day, We thought proper to direct him a Gratuity of twenty (20) Pagodas p Mensem. Con.

63. Your Honours having nominated M^r. Will^m. Holt one of the Commissaries for receiving Fort S^t. George, as he was suspended your Service we appointed M^r. Foss Westcott Commissary in his Stead, who together with Major Lawrence and M^r. Wynch were first Deputed to wait on Mons^r. Dupleix and Superiour Council of Pondicherry to request from them a speedy delivery of the Place, and fix upon a day for their Evacuating the same as likewise to Agree upon the Forms that shou'd be observ'd therein after which they return'd here, and Proceeded to Madrass where all Circumstances were perform'd accordingly, a Copy of their Proceedings both at Pondicherry and Fort S^t. George is Enclos'd in this Packet. Con. 24 July.
64. In Consequence of the Rules transmitted Us by your Honours for the Regulating of the Military : and Company of Artillery, we form'd in the Month of March Seven Companys of Military one whereof Granidiers And the Command of 29 Febr^y.

them were given as follows, The first Company to Major Lawrence, the 2 to Cap^t. Crompton the 3^d. to Cap^t. William Henry Southby, the 4 to Cap^t. John Scrimmour, the 5 to Cap^t. James Cope the 6 being the Granidier's to Cap^t. John Dalton and the 7 to Cap^t. John Clarke, And as it was the advice and Opinion of General Boscawen and Major Lawrence those Companies would be at least requir'd for the Garrison of this Place and Cuddalore and that too but a very Insufficient Complement Upon a mature Consideration thereof We could no ways propose to support the Garrison of Vizagapatam out of them without greatly distressing and rendering your Honours Affairs very Insecure at this Settlement It was therefore deem'd a Case of Necessity to Establish the Company that was there Extraordinary, and accordingly have Continued it under the Command of Cap^t. Peter Love.

65. The Company of Artillery remains as yet very Incompleat, having found it very difficult to procure persons Qualified for that Service We Endeavour'd all We coul'd to prevail on those in His Majesty's Train to Enter with Us and as a great Encouragement to Induce them thereto, We agreed as the Pay directed in your New Regulations was somewhat less than is allow'd in His Majesty's Service

to allow 4 ^d P diem more to each Gunner and to give one Shilling P Diem to all Matrosses but all would not tempt them And not above twenty Six came over to us.

66. Captain Lawrence Witherington and Serjeant Henry Learner whom your Honours had directed to be Entertain'd in our Company of Artillery Major Mosman has detain'd on the Bengall Establishment, Agreeable to the Permission he had for so doing.

67. Of the several Lieutenants that we had Entertained in this Company at the beginning of the War As they were all of them taken from the Seafaring Way under a Promise that they should have it in their Option to return thereto In Consequence thereof Mess^{rs}. Burman and Petch have at their Request since the Peace been permitted to return to that Service, To the former of whom we have given the Command of the Brilliant Snow and to the latter the Cuddalore Sloop, M^r. Hugh Flinn Dyed on the 9 March and M^r. Henry Collins We have lately appointed Supra Cargoe of the Fort St. George to Madagascar for to Purchase Slaves, which were induced to do as We could place no Dependance on the Present Commander of that Ship for any Negotiation of that sort, by which Dispersion We have at this time only left M^r. Tho^s. Savage and Monsuier Dumarchais who was Recommended by M^r. Boscawen being a Protestant, for the entire managing and Conducting of that Company.

68. We have now to acquaint You that Capⁿ. Delavaux on whom your Honours had repos'd a Dependance for the direction and Management of your Buildings and Artillery did for some Unknown Reasons Desert our service on the 24th May proceeding directly to PONDICHERY from whence We are inform'd he Embarked for Manilha. He had sometime before requested our Permission to retire a little from the Business of his Employ under a Plea of indisposition, which was readily granted him, and the Lieutenant of the Train Ordered to take Charge thereof, till he was sufficiently recover'd to Undertake it again And in all Respects he was particularly Indulged and well treated which makes Us Entirely Strangers to the Cause he had for leaving Us, And can only attribute it to the unhappy Accident that had happen'd to him In having been the Death of one of His Majesty's Subjects which may be suppos'd he could never reflect on without much Uneasiness.

69. Upon the Strenuous Advice and Recommendation of Major Lawrence for the still Continuing some of our Topasses in the Service In order to releive the Europeans from Duty in the violent heat of the Day We have therefore for that reason as likewise upon Consideration of the small strength of our Garrison been constraind for present, to deviate from your Honours directions therein, and have accordingly Entertain'd them @ 10 ^d P Diem which the Major judges to be a proportionable pay to the Europeans till you are pleas'd to direct the Country.

70. The New Establish'd pay which your Honours have directed to be allow'd to all your Officers and Soldiers was Introduced the 1 March and with which they seem much satisfied.

71. Since the last Information we gave your Hon^{rs}. of our Military Preferments A number have happen'd which we imagine woud be needless to relate here, therefore We take the Liberty to refer you to the Consultations and Book of Commissions herewith Accompanying for further Satisfaction in that Matter.

72. In Pursuance to your Hon^{rs}. Instructions for Reinforcing your Garrisons with Military out of His Majesty's Marines and the 12 Companies of Independants under the Command of General Boscawen We accordingly took an Opportunity before the Squadron departed hence for Madrass to Enlist all that coul'd be prevail'd on to Enter your Service giving them the Bounty your Honours directed But to our great concern and Surprize We could then prevail on no more than 56. And though a second attempt was afterwards made on them at Madrass Yet there was only Eighty more could be prevail'd on at that Place Finding therefore that We had got all that was possible, and knowing it would be the last Opportunity We should have as the General was then upon the Brink of Sailing with the Squadron for Europe and further judging them to be a very Insufficient Number for the supply of your several Settlements, And more particularly the Merchants and Inhabitants of Fort St. George having express'd such great uneasiness at the small Garrison they were like to have, as to Intimate an Unanimous Resolution to quit the Place and seek Protection in other parts for the several Motives together with the Sudeness of the Squadrons departure which would admit of no time for making Application to Us, The Gentlemen there acting being Major Lawrence and Mr. Westcott were tender'd under a great loss how to proceed, but at length after a due Weight of Circumstances they Conceiv'd it absolutely Necessary to think of some other Expedient to raise a greater Number, & it being intimated to them that in case they would grant Commissions to some of their Officers that a great part of the Men wou'd come with them. Upon which they promis'd Commissions for Captains to four first Lieutenants and to take a Lieutenant and Ensign with each Company, which so far took Effect as to procure Us four more Companys which together with those We had before raised In all amounted to five hundred Men (500) besides what have Entered in the Train, but out of such a small Number we cannot supply your other Presidencys, for if we did We should have but a very few of them left upon this Establishment, and humbly conceiving that the Garrison We have to defend will be greatly distress'd in Case of the Breaking out of War at home or even with the Country Powers here in India both which We presume to be very precarious We therefore think it our duty to repeat the Request made you in our last that a farther Reinforcement may be sent us by all opportunitys And as we doubt not but your Honours will be more particularly acquainted of the Necessity there is for it, From the private Advices you will undoubtedly receive from the President and Major Lawrence on this Subject, as also what you will hear from General Boscawen, We shall here avoid troubling you with a further enlargement thereon.

73. None of His Majesty's Marines could be prevail'd on to stay with Us as they had most of them large Off reckonings due to them in England far Exceeding the Bounty your Honours had directed for them which Inclined them all to proceed for Europe.

74. Upon Receipt of your Commands for Breaking the Troop, We had agreed to dispose of them all but Fifty which the General had requested might attend him to Fort St. George but the Country having since falling into Commotions. We have judg'd it absolutely necessary not to dismiss them till the Country is more settled which we hope will E'er long come to pass.

75. The Major having represented to the Board that as it was near the End of the Year the Stoppages which were to be made from the pay of such Recruits as might be rais'd from the Independants would not be near sufficient to pay for their Cloathing and having inform'd Us at the same time that it was always usual in the Kings Service when any new Troops were rais'd to give them their first Cloathing We therefore thought it Necessary as the Independants were greatly in want of it, to direct the Military Paymaster to prepare their Cloathing and to Collect in all the Off reckoning that because due from them for this Year on your account and for as much as it may prove deficient We have orderd to be at your Honours Expence.

Con 28 Aug^t. 76. Captain William Henry Southby upon the Confirmation of Peace and seeing no further probability of Service Requested our leave to resign his Commission in which he was immediately indulged and as the Major has remain'd Ever since at Madrass that Company continues still Vacant.

The Gratuity your Honours have been pleas'd to direct might be paid to Lieutenant Peter Eckman We have accordingly Complied with though if we might be permitted to speak our Opinion We think him very undeserving thereof, since from several Authors We are Creditably Informd he behav'd very ill during the Seige of Madrass which were the Entire Motives We had for taking no Notice of him since.

78. The Major having been long since absent It has not yet been demanded of the Gentlemen late Servants at Madrass, whom we Entertaind as Officers in the Military after the Loss of that place being at that time greatly Necessitated, wether they will Continue therein, or return to their former Service, but so soon as the Major Returns, We shall require their final Answer thereon, and by the next opportunity Inform your Honours how they are dispos'd

79. M^r. Edward Edwards and the Rev^d. M^r. Swinfen Arriv'd here last Month, upon the Severn whom together with Mess^{rs}. Walsh and Sloper We have Entertain'd as your Honours have directed.

Do. 23 Oct^r: 80. Your Honours Command regarding the several Servants on this Establish- ment having never yet Executed their Covenants are now strictly complied with by all such Servants as are with Us that have not executed them before as Your Honours will Observe from the several Covenants return'd in this Packet, And they with the several other Persons mention'd in the List to have never before given the proper Security, have Nam'd such of their Friends as they hope will stand for them, as mentiond in Consultation And have Accordingly wrote them to that Effect, the rest of the blank Covenants that are remaining with Us We shall take care of, for such other of your younger Servants to Execute as may from time to time Arrive of Age.

Con 14th. Aug^t. 81. By the Death of M^r. John Duncombe and the Relinquishment of M^r. Charles Hopkins from Entring your service, We are at Present left Destitute of a Capable Person for Sub Accomptant as there is none in your service that can be spared from their other employes who are fitt for it. We were willing to have station'd M^r. Sloper that Office but He being at this Juncter Engag'd in many Different Services He cannot immediately Extricate himself from them, so as to Undertake an Employ of so much attention Nevertheless he has promis'd to Con- tribute all he can by Inspecting into it at all Opportunity's, The Sub Accomptant- ship is at present repos'd on M^r. John William Speck, but We apprehend him to be of no further Use therein than to take care of the Papers &c^t. and to see that the other Assistants in that Office follow their Work.

Con 20 Oct^r. 82. Since our last address to your Honours under the 18 ultimo by Admiral Boscawen finding Ourselves in a quiet and Undisturb'd possession of Fort S^t. George, and Judging that it will be again a Place of great Trade & Business, and that an Investment may be shortly Commenc'd provided proper Encouragement is given to the Merchants and Inhabitants of that place, We have taken into Consideration the directions your Honours were pleas'd to give Us thereon in looking upon that place as a Subordinate Settlement till further orders, and to send such Persons there as are Necessary to invite and Encourage Trade and Accordingly in Consultation We appointed M^r. Richard Prince Deputy Governour M^r. Richard Starke second, M^r. John Smith third M^r. William Smyth King fourth, and M^r. John Walsh fifth of Council, who will proceed for Madrass soon after this Ship's Dispatch.

83. In regard to procuring a large quantity of Peice Goods thereabouts, as well as of the fine sorts, and some Bales of Every kind of Muslins, we shall ende-avour to Comply with your directions therein as near as possible but we judge it highly necessary to have all the Goods provided thereabouts Sorted & Cur'd there as We have scarce Washers & Beaters for the Cloth that is procured here, and it has always been much better done at that Place.

84. As Fort St. George is much better Situated for Dispatch of Business of all kinds than this Place, We take the Liberty of recommending it to your Honours to make that Place again the Presidency for the following Reasons.

85. The want of proper Warehouses at this Place to keep the Companys Effects in has Oblig'd Us to keep a great part of our Stores at Cuddalore Under tiled Roofs, by which they often receive Damage and for the same reason we are under a Necessity of sending our whole Stock of Grain to that Place which being a full Mile from the Fort is extremely inconvenient and may prove of bad Consequence in case of troubles with European or Country Powers.

86. That our Boats, by the River being greatly Choak'd up with sand, and the Communication with the Sea not being open above one third of the Year within our Bounds, they can but seldom make but one Trip daily to the Shipping and back again, besides many other smaller inconveniencies attend this Place by the Conicoplys and Merchants being oblig'd to live at a great distance from the Fort, whereas at Madrass Business may be done within a small Compass fine Commodious Warehouses being near the Sea Side, and the Boats in good Weather will make six or eight Trips to and from the Shipping daily we must further add the great affection the Black Merchants have to that place, who will not be prevaild upon on any Account whatever to leave it, and come and settle here.

87. We hope these reasons will induce your Honours to Establish that Place in it's former Condition and We take the Liberty of Advising that the same will be Recommended You by Admiral Boscawen.

88. At Present we have only taken off the Customs at that place for six months, but before that time expires, beleive shall be under a Necessity of prolonging the time for six Months more (as the greatest part of that already given is the Monsoon during which little or no Business can be done) as a farther Encouragement to the Inhabitants there, and for the same reason we shall not as yet let out the Farms excepting the Villages, but waite a proper Opportunity when it can be done with more advantage to the Company than offers to Us at present. Con

89. We have also thought proper to Publish an Order that none of the black Inhabitants shall be molested for the Term of one Year for any Debts Contracted by them before the Loss of Madrass for the reasons mentioned in Consultations. Con. 16 Oct^r.

90. Upon this Appointment of M^r. Prince and the Gentlemen for Madrass M^r. Wynch is again remov'd from being Customer of Cuddalore to take Charge of the Paymasters Employ as likewise that of Import Warehousekeeper and M^r. Thomas Cooke order'd to Cuddalore in his Stead M^r. Foss Westcot remains Storekeeper and will again take into his Charge the Tevenepatam Customs. Con 20 Oct^r.

91. In the Room of Mess^{rs}. Starke & King who acted as upper and under searcher at Cuddalore, We have appointed M^r. Robert Sloper to act therein. 1^{no}. Do.

92. M^r. Andrew Munro who was the former Surgeon of Madrass, We have reinstated at that Place.

93. Our Surgeons Mate that was station'd at Deve Cotta to attend on that Garrison being so ill as Oblig'd him to return here, And having no other of that Profession to supply his place we thereupon Entertaind M^r. James Wilson as Surgeon who came out by the Severn with your Honours Recommendation for the first vacancy, and sent Him thither. Con 2 Oct^r.

94. We shall not Neglect to Cause due Obedience to be Observ'd among your Younger Servants and to Oblige them to as strickt Compliance with their Duty in the respective Offices in which they may be stationd, And such of them as may shew a Disregard to our Orders We shall not fail to suspend your Service and send Home by the first Opportunity the great distress We are in for Writeing Assistants hav^g: greatly impeded that Business we think it Necessary to request that a farther Supply of Servants may be sent us the next Season.

We have taken due Notice of your Honours remark Regarding the Spirit of Gaming and shall make it our particular care to Check such a Pernicious Habit in any of your Servants that may appear inclinable thereto, though as we cannot learn of anything of that sort having been Practis'd for a long time past We apprehend

Your Honours Information hereon has been very ill Grounded, or otherwise the Persons Addicted must have long since Absented, since we can venture to assure You to the best of our Knowledge there is no such vice now in the Place.

Con 3^d Mar: At the request of Mess^{rs}. Mandevill and Goodere for an advance of two hundred (200) Pagodas, we supply'd them therewith they having agreed to be accountable to your Honours for the same.

SEVENTHLY OF ACCOUNTS

96. The Commands your Honours have been pleas'd to give Us for the sending Home such Madrass Books and Papers as were usually transmitted Annually from that Presidency, arriv'd with Us so lately that it has prov'd an Impossibility to prepare them in readiness for this Ship, neither have we been able to get any farther Information concerning the money Transactions of that Place than what We have already mention'd in the foregoing part of this address, as likewise in our former Advices on this Subject, but we hope by the January Dispatch to Execute your Orders more Exactly herein, and in the Interim beg leave to assure you that our utmost Endeavours shall not be wanting to Accomplish the same and for your Present Satisfaction We have thought Necessary to send you in this Packet the Copyes of such of the Madrass Consultations till the 31 June, and the Cash Accounts from that time to February 1746-7 M^r. Morse has transmitted and which we now likewise send your Honours.

Con 20 Oct^r. 97. For a farther Satisfaction in regard to the Accounts that were left Unadjusted by M^r. Rosewell, We must beg leave to refer You to a Letter that M^r. Morse has lately address'd to the Secretary on that Subject which is Entered in Consultation and is all the knowledge that can be had therein.

Con 15 Maroh. 98. Upon Receipt of the Madrass Church Leidger Mess^{rs}. Prince, Wynch and Westcott were appointed a Committee to Examine into that and the Charity School Stocks, as likewise to collect in all the Moneys that might appear due thereto, and in Consequence thereof they have delivered us in a Report as Entered in Consultation, by which your Honours will observe that the several Parties concern'd seem dispos'd to Evade any Payments till a Power of Chancery be acquired for the giving of due Acquittances for the same.

Con 10 July 99. In Consequence of your Honours Directions We have Discharg'd Coja Miquells Bond which is the only Payment we propose to make of any of the Madrass Demands, till We receive your particular Instructions thereon.

Con 24 April. 100. Upon the scarcity of Gold and Pagodas, and the daily Increase in the Exchange of Rupees, It reduc'd Us to great Inconveniencies to pay our Military and Garrison Charges, which led us to a Resolution of making the Rupees the Current Coin at (350) three hundred and Fifty $\frac{1}{4}$ (One hundred (100) Pagodas and to make all Payments and Receipts at that Rate which has been kept in Practice ever since that 1st. May last.

EIGHTHLY OF THE WEST COAST

Lres Rec'd N 54. 101. We have to acquaint your Honours under this Head that a very small Progress is to be feard will attend your Investment in those parts this Season for the reasons already given in the 7 paragraph of this Letter which affords Us much Concern, They have been sent the necessary Supplies for their Use by the Ship Success, Brileiant Snow and Cuddalore Sloop, All which We hope has arriv'd safe with them.

Lre Rec'd N 54. 102. By their Letter to Us as Notified in the Margin We are advis'd of great and Insufferable Indignities that have been offered to their Trade from the Dutch, which Occasiond us immediately to apply to General Boscawen to take the same into Consideration and to procure Us Redress, whereupon he was pleas'd to write to the General of Batavia thereon and We hope it has had the Dessir'd Effect.

103. In Consequence of your directions regarding the Dutch Pretensions to an Exclusive Trade in Ophium throughout the Streights of Mallaca and other Eastern Ports, We have thereupon caus'd it to be Inserted in the several Commanders Instructions that have sail'd that way this Season to repel Force by Force all

Violences that may be Committed of that sort on any Ships or Vessels that are under our Passages, And have Notified such our Intentions at the several Gates of this Place and Cuddalore as likewise directed it to be Publish'd at our several Subordinates.

NINTHLY TOUCHING THE CHARTER.

104. We observe what your Honours have signified to Us on this Subject and till we are properly Authoriz'd shall decline having any thing to do with the several Complaints and Causes that have been or may be brought before Us.

TENTHLY CONCERNING THE FRENCH AND OTHER EUROPEAN NATIONS IN INDIA

105. It was an Unspeakable satisfaction to Us to receive the News of a happy Peace being Concluded with all the Powers concern'd in the late War, And on the 25th Sep^r: His Majesty's Proclamation thereof was publicly read to all our Garrison, with all due form and Ceremony.

106. We have little further to prolong on under this Head, but what has been already mentiond only to inform You of the Ships that have Imported at Pondicherry this season from Europe which are as follows Viz^t. Le Raulier, Le Prince, Le Paix, and the Marshall de Saxe the three former We are inform'd left the Bulk of their Cargoes at Mauritius and the latter arriv'd about the end of September with fifty (50) Chests of Treasure and some Goods for the Coast & Bay.

107. In our address by the Admiral We acquainted your Honours with having Directed the sending to Europe the Fathers Severini & Re'ne also Mess^{rs}. La Metre and Barneville our Reasons for which will be fully made appear by our Consultations, and M^r. Boscawen to whom beg leave to Refer You.

ELEVENTHLY OF HIS BRITANNICK MAJESTYS SQUADRON

108. The 28 September saild His Majesty's Ship Sheerness for the Cape, and the Bomb Ketch on the 30th for England. The 19 Ult^o: likewise saild Admiral Boscawen for Europe In the Exeter taking with him the following Ships of His Squadron, The York, Deptford, Chester, Harwick Eltha[m] Deal Castle, And Young Eagle We have now left in India The Vigilant, Ruby, Tartar, Syren and Swallow Snow under the Command of Commodore Lisle who in the Vigilant saild to the Eastward the 21st. following, All the rest have been dispatchd to Bombay, but the Swallow who is gone for Bengall.

109. We have receiv'd from General Boscawen sundry supplys of Ordnance stores being much in want thereof, The several Lists of which together with all other Accounts relating to the Squadron are Enclosd in this Packet.

110. Captains Baron and Nanfan having made us a Tender of such part of the Stores as they had sav'd from the Winchelsea & Lincoln for the Companys Use We thereupon accepted of the Guns and their Appurtenances that were belonging to each Ship they being Esteem'd to be perfectly Good for which We have given Receipts to the Respective Captains, And have left it to Your Honours to decide and Account for their value.

111. Before Cap^t. Lindsay saild from hence, he delivered Us a Petition to be paid the Charges He was at when at the Cape for Maintaining the sick Military he brought out that were sent ashore for the Benefit of their Health at that Place, but as We had never before a Precedent of that kind We did not think proper to grant his Request.

Dupleix wherein it appearing that he had an Intention to Desert our Service as your Honours will be more fully acquainted by the Consultation that was held thereon, We have thought necessary to Cashire and send him to Europe on this Ship, And have Accordingly given the Commander Directions to take him on board on Charter Party Terms as We have likewise done for four of your Military who have served their Times and at their Request have been discharg'd your Service The latter We were oblig'd to direct to be taken on board on those Terms, this Ship having her full Complement of Men.

115. A large Deficiency of Arrack having arose in the Cargo receiv'd from Batavia on the Ship Royal George, which having been Entirely procured and Under Charge of Cap^t. Field We have thought proper to refer the same to your Honours Decision as P Consultation.

116. When the Recruits were Establish'd at Fort S^t. George Just before the Squadrons departure the three following Persons Mess^{rs}. Pero Hockett and Merryman, were Entertain'd Lieutenants In our Company of Artillery who were well Recommended to Us as being properly qualified for that Service, but as yet they have had no Opportunity of coming to Us.

HONOURABLE

1. By the Royal George We sent you our last General Advices under the 2^d. November, a Duplicate of which, as also Triplicate of that M^r. Boscawen carried with him, are enclos'd in this Ships Packet. Lres Sent

2^d. And We now have the satisfaction to acquaint you of the arrival here of your own Ship Lapwing the 6 Ultimo, by whom we receiv'd your Commands of the 30th. August, likewise the Packets for the President & Council of Bombay the one of which design'd to be transmitted overland, was dispatch'd thither immediately in Obedience to your Orders.

3. What has occur'd in your Honours Affairs since our last address, we shall now lay before You under the following Heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING

4 The Elizabeth whom We Dispatch'd to Atcheen to lay out the Monsoons, as We acquainted your Honours by the Royal George return'd here from thence the 25 December; where she left Commodore Lisle in the Vigilant and the Porto Bello Sloop, who were just arriv'd, having met with a Passage of five and forty days in Crossing the Bay.

5 The Augusta which We began to Entertain but little hopes of seeing here, imported with Us the 26 December from Malacca, wither she proceeded some time in June last upon being drove to Leeward of this Place. By her We had the Satisfaction to hear that all Your last Years Ship's bound for China had pass'd that Port in safety, As soon as the Season will permit, Whe shall dispatch her on her intended Voyage.

6 On the Lapwings Arrival in compliance with your Orders to give her a Quick Dispatch We landed only thirty Chests of her Bullion as we were then of Opinion her short stay would not allow of Replacing above that Quantity with Rupees. But upon Cap^t: Cheyne representing to Us the Weak and sickly Condition of his ships Company, and the Difficulty's he was likely to encounter by proceeding in those Circumstances, We thought it most prudent to detain him a few days for the recovery of his People, and made Use of that Interval to Coin the remainder of his Treasure; which being Effectuated she was dispatch'd the 29th. with orders to touch at Fort St. George for the delivery of her private Consignments but to remain there no longer than was absolutely necessary for that purpose. We have likewise wrote the Gentlemen at Bengal, that if they should be unable to comply with your Intentions in dispatching her from thence this season, (which We apprehend will be the case) to return her immediately to Us, as we expect to be furnish'd with a sufficient Quantity of Goods to send her away in May, without in the least Diminishing the Cargo of the September Ship and we flatter Ourselves that this Proceeding will meet with Your Honours Approbation.

7 By our last Advices You were acquainted that we had dispatch'd the Fort St. George to Madagascar to Purchase a Cargo of Slaves, therefore the Swallow's second Trip for that purpose (as design'd by Your Honours) We apprehend will be wholly unnecessary But shall pay the Strictest Obedience to the other part of your Orders regarding that Vessell, and send her immediately on her arrival with what slaves she may bring to the Deputy Governour & Council of Fort Marlborough, directing them to return her to be laden from thence with another ship in Janry, which make no doubt of being able to Accomplish.

8 Should the ships from Leghorn which your Honours advise Us of, appear on this Coast We shall agreeable to your Commands apply to the Comm^{rs}. of the Men of War for seizing such of his Majesty's subjects as may be found on board them, and should they attempt to make a settlement, Our utmost endeavours shall not be wanting to Frustrate their Intentions in that Respect.

9 That We might Contribute as much as possible towards Discharging the large Quantity of Tonnage on hand in Bengal, We requested the Gentlemen there in September last to send a ship to Vizagapatam to take in M^r. Saunders's Bales, and at the same time Orderd the Chief & Council there to advise them what number they should have ready by the end of December; and by our last Letters from the Bay we learn that the Prince William was intended for that Service, & to proceed immediately to Europe Whither also they had resolv'd to Dispatch the Edgebastion & Tavistock, That the Walpole was designd for Judda, & the Severn & Britannia for Surat, all on Freight and that Your Honours own Ship the Dragon, Sail'd from thence for Anjengo & Tellicherry the 1st. of December.

10. By Advices from Bombay we understand that the Salisbury is safe arriv'd there but as yet we have no Account of the Warren.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA
TO BE DISPOS'D OF AT ANOTHER

11. Upon Weighing of the Silver by the *Augusta*, a Deficiency of Forty seven Ounces was found in Chest N^o 133 which we call'd upon Captⁿ Parker to make good, who acquainted Us the same was owing to that Chests being broke open by one of his People, from whom he had recover'd the greatest part of it which he would deliver Us; and having the Delinquent in Confinement, desir'd We would send for him ashore in Order to take his Tryal for the Theft; but from Your Honours Opinion (in your Letter of the 29th. March 1749 with Respect to the Charter) being dubious of Our Authority for taking Cognizance of that Affair, We declin'd it, and only Orderd Captain Parker to make good the Deficiency which he accordingly did.

We should not have been Guilty of Deviating so much from Your Orders in sending so large a Quantity of Saltpetre on this ship, But as what she has aboard was put in at Bengal, and the *Royal George* and *Chesterfield* carrying you none of that Article, besides it's being an help towards Compleating this Ships Tonnage, We hope these Reasons will apologize to Your Honours for Our Conduct in this Particular.

14. Our want of Godowns, to lodge the Broad Cloth and other stores in, design'd for Bengal by the *Augusta*, have Induc'd Us to continue them on board that ship, till an Opportunity offers of sending them thither of which we are in daily expectation.

THIRDLY, INVESTMENT

16. We have made it Our Constant study to promote this so Valuable a Branch of Your Trade, and Esteem Ourselves extreamly fortunate in having procured such a Number of Bales, notwithstanding the many Difficultys that have happen'd to impede it proceeding from the late Revolution in the Country, which with Concern we are to acquaint you still subsists & is Fomented by the French, And We may venture to assure Your Honours that what You will receive by this ship is of a better Manufacture, and at as Reasonable Rates as has been sent Home for some time.

17. As the Arrival of the *Nazir Jing* in this Province who is daily expected at Arcot, will in all probability put an entire stop to Business during his stay which from the present Prospect, we have reason to apprehend will be of long Continuance, We have little hopes to succeed so well this Year; But as the Gentlemen at the Northern Settlements give Us Expectations of making a great Investment, We shall not be wanting to forward them large supplys of Money, to enable them to improve as much as lays in their Power so favourable a Circumstance for your Interest; which from their last Year's performance We have great Reason to imagine they will be successfull in.

18. The Madras Merchants who came hither to give in their Accounts, have Engaged with Us to deliver there, by the 20th. of this Month about two hundred & thirty Bales at an abatement in the Price usually allow'd them by the late President & Council of that Place.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT

22. We wrote Your Honours very fully on this Head by the Royal George and are now sorry to observe to you that the state of Affairs in this Province is rather worse than at that Ships Departure.

23. We acquainted Your Honours that Mustapha Jung and Sunda Soib took their leave from Pondicherry the 25th. September and were for some time hovering between that and this Place with their whole Army Assisted by the French with about 1400 Europeans a great Number of Seapoys and Peons and some Artillery They began their March inland the beginning of Novem^r. with their whole Army and directed their Course to Worriarpollam with expectations of recovering a large sum of money of the Worriar of that place, without making any stay and then to proceed towards Trichinoply, but the whole Army was detain'd there full one Month daily Skirmissing with the Worriars forces, who finding himself to be press'd hard Agreed to pay them three Lacks of Rupees In the mean time we receivd several Letters from Mahomud Ally Cawn requesting further Assistance which at length was agreed to send him Captn Cope was order'd to March from Deva Cotta with a Company of Military consisting of Europeans & Topasses also Lieutenant Nost with a few Private Men of the Train who all got safe into Trichinoply We have also spar'd him some Peices of Cannon (unserviceable to Us) and sundry sorts of Warlike Stores and this with little or no Expence to Your Honours Mahomud Ally Cawn having agreed to Pay for the whole Notwithstanding Mustapha Jung &c^t. intended to March from Worriarpollam directly for Trichinoply, upon their receiving advises of the Assistance we had thrown into that place, they thought proper to alter their design and bent their Course towards Tanjour which Country they have almost ruin'd about six weeks past they laid seige to the Capital of that Kingdom which was bravely defended by the Troops with[in] and they also made some successful sallies on the Beseigers, but after sometime the King of Tanjour finding them resolute in carrying on the Attack, thought proper to ma[ke] Peace with them for sixty Lacks of Rupees to be paid at Different Payments, we cannot learn that more than six or seven lacks of this Money has yet been paid and that slowly in small sums for which Reason the Moors have again renew'd the seige of that place and the French for that purpose have carry'd heavy Cannon and Mortars from Carrical and by frequent advices from the Southward we are advis'd they play briskly both by Night and day upon that Fort with three peices of Cannon and the sam[e] Number of Mortars and it is thought they will be soon Masters of it, if Nazir Jings Forces he is sending to their relief, do not quickly Arrive, if the Moors succeed, it is their Design to Defend themselves, by the Assistance of the French in that place against Nazer Jing, but in case they are oblig'd to raise the Seige it is thought Sunda Soib will retire with the French into Pondicherry and Mezepher Jing into the strong Fortress of Ginjee. Mahomud Ally Cawn Acknowledges the Assistance we have sent him to have been of the greatest Service and to have sav'd that place. and the President has receivd a Letter of thanks from Nazir Jing on that occasion.

24. We have daily advices that Nazir Jing is on his March this way with an Army of near one hundred thousand Horse and a large Train of Artillery, This Army is dividēd into several Bodys some of which are said to have enter'd the Province and Sumpetroy Devan to the late Nabob Anewerdee Cawn, is expected daily at Arcot.

25. Upon our first getting intelligence of Nazer Jings Marching this way we set about preparing a Present for him as also the making a handsome Tent which he requested when Motall our Vakeel was with him in Nov^r. 1748 the Present in sundry sorts of European goods & such Comodity's as we cou'd meet with, will Amount to about ten thousand Pagodas Major Lawrence, & M^r. Westcott are appointed Ambassadours with Captⁿ Dalton to attend upon him with it and immediately upon the Elizabeths dispatch the necessary Instructions will be drawn out for them Hodjee Haddy being a Man well vers'd in the Affairs of this Country & of reputation amongst them is Orderd to get himself in readiness to attend upon the Ambassadours we have reason to think this Expedition will prove of great advantage to Your Honours by obtaining grants of several Villages near Madrass and this place and particularly a Confirmation of the Phirmaund for S^t. Thome sent Us by Mahomud Ally Cawn as before advis'd of for such Favours Nazir Jing [and] his Head men about him will expect to be rewarded, it being [a] Constant Maxim with the Eastern Princes not to grant any thing without a Suitable Return and we beg leave to assure Your Honours that we shall be extreamly carefull of Your Interest and not part with more money than is absolutely Necessary and that must be in consequence of the several grants we may obtain from him.

26. S^t. Thomé remains in the same state as advisd Your Honours by the Royal George the Inhabitants of that Place esteem themselves happy in being under Our Government and we have not receiv'd the least Molestation from any one since we took Possession of that Place.

27. We are in the like situation at Deva Cota and the Country near that Place as far as our Bounds extends, is in Peace and quietness, but the King of Tanjour having been for sometime passd in troubles and now close beseig'd in his Capital by the Usurpers, is the reason we have not been able as yet to recover the remaining fifty thousand Rupees due to the Company by Agreement as also his Royal Phirmaund for the quiet Possession of that Fort and Boun[ds] but we shall not fail to renew our demands on him as soon as a fit opportunity offers.

28. Being apprehensive that the Deth[ow of] King of Tanjour who resides at Cuddalore might go off to Sunda Soib and thereby stir up fresh Commotions we thought proper to allow him 300 Rupees ꝓ Mensem to engage him to be contented with his situation but shall Continue [it] no longer than the present state of Affairs make it necessary & in the mean time shall keep a strict Eye upon him.

29. Maubrause who we advis'd Your Honours we had appointed Polligar at Fort S^t. George having by his unhuman behaviour of extorting Money from several of the Inhabitants by barbarous Methods renderd himself unworthy of that Post We have thought proper to dismiss him & have upon that Application & due Concession of the former Polligar reinstated him in that Office.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS AND REVENUES

30. We have little to add to our last advices by the Royal George of the Progress We have made in the Fortifications at this place, and have only to assure You of our utmost attention, to their being Carried on with the greatest Frugality.

31. The many Inconveniences that we found attended the want of Cranes to unload Our Boats of heavy Commodities, and the Delay it often Occasion'd in Our Business, Induc'd us to Erect one at the Back Gate of the Fort, and another at Cuddalore with small Wharfe's to each projecting into the River the former is finish'd and the other near compleated; and the Expence of them according to the Estimate deliver'd into Consultation will Amount to about Fourteen hundred & Ferty Pagodas.

The New Rampert at the North East end of Cuddalore, built by Captain Delavaux, had been executed in so slight a manner (notwithstanding the Consequence had been frequently Remonstrated to him) that by the heavy Rains we had in November last the greatest part of it fell down; upon which as the Rebuilding of it appeard to be absolutely Necessary, We immediately orderd it to be set about & it is now finish'd, in so substantial a manner, that we may reasonably expect it will last for many Years without requiring any Repairs.

Major Lawrence having represented to Us that the Parapet Wall on the Southern Curtain of Cuddalore was so high that it was hardly possible to Annoy an Enemy over it, unless they were at a Considerable Distance: Likewise that the sand which the Wind had gather'd in great heaps against the Walls, might be very prejudicial in Case of an attempt on that place, We have therefore Orderd the former to be lower'd & the latter to be Removed the Expence of which will amout to about, One hundred and forty (140) Pagodas.

34. Captain John Crompton having for these two Years past Lent us his House for the Accomodation of his Majesty's Captains, now applying for some Consideration on that Account We have presented him with three hundred Pagodas.

35. The Gun Carriages & other Military stores receivd from His Majesty's Squadron, having suffered greatly from being expos'd to the Injuries of the Weather we found it necessary to erect a shed for them, the Amount of which will be very Inconsiderable.

36. Since Our last advices to Your Honours We have let out the Paddy Fields & salt Pans at Fort S^t. George to Linga Chitty & Gruah at an advanc'd Price of Forty Pagodas upon what they usually produc'd. We have likewise granted a Cowle to the same Persons for [the] old Garden there at the same Rent it formerly yeilded, notwithstanding many of the Trees have been destroy'd by the French.

37. We are sorry to observe to Your Honours that the Horn Work and other Fortifications lately erected here will greatly exceed the Calculation we formerly transmitted You; which Chiefly proceeds from Captain Delavaux's pursuing a different Plan from that laid down by M^r. Jones who design'd that the Guns from the Fort should have play'd over the Horn Work, whereas Capt'n Delavaux has rais'd it to the same Elevation The Expence of the Glacis which has been very considerable, M^r. Jones did not at all conclude in his Calculate, imagining that the Earth taken out of the Ditch would have entirely answer'd that purpose but on the contrary we found it barely sufficient for Compleating the Covert Way, the former situation of which having been extreamly Low, we were oblig'd to raise it The Horn Work wants nothing now of being finish'd, but laying some of the Platforms & Compleating the Roman Ways.

38. We are now Building a Bridge over the Channel that was cut for Tevenapatam River to the Westward of the Fort; the want of which has hitherto been supply'd by one made of Coconut & Palmeira Trees but that being entirely decay'd, We judg'd it better to Erect a Durable one at once, than another of those Perishable Materials which stand in need of Continual Repairs, the Cost of this Work will Amount to about four Thousand (4000) Pag^s.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, OFFICERS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS

Your Orders in regard to the Troop of Horse have been Complied with as far as was Consistent with Prudence, but the Troubles in the Country still Continuing and having reason to fear from the Malicious Disposition of M^r. Duplex that he might Instigate Chunda Soib to an Attempt upon some of our Villages, which it would not be in Our Power to succour so expeditiously by a party of Infantry as by a Body of Horse, we have therefore Determined to keep up 30 for that end at Fort S^t. The Bills of Exchange drawn by Coja Marut Mercar on Coja Miguel de Gregoiro your Honours transmitted Us by the Lapwing has been tenderd for Acceptance and Refused Coja Gregoiro alledging that Marut is Indebted to him ; wherefore the Gentlemen at Fort S^t. George (where Gregoiro at present Resides) Protested the Bill, and we send You one of the said Protests enclos'd in this Ships Packet.

54. M^r. Morse having inform'd Us that he transmitted Your Honours by M^r. Boscawen a Cash Account wherein is specified the Disbursements of the Money taken upon Bonds by the late President & Council of Fort S^t. George, We therefore take the Liberty to refer you thereto, not having been able after the strictest search to meet with any paper that can give us the least sight into this Affair.

EIGHTHLY TOUCHING THE WEST COAST

60. Since our last Address We have recd no advice from the Gentlemen at Fort Marlborough therefore have nothing to acquaint You with under this Head but that we are in daily expectation of seeing your Snow Brilliant from thence.

NINTHLY TOUCHING THE CHARTER

61. Your Honours have already been acquainted of Our Diffidence in regard to the Charter by Our declining to take Cognizance of several Complaints that have been laid before Us as you will observe by Our Consultations, One of which between Mess^{rs}. Jones & Moses we should have been very glad to have Decided; as we are well Convinc'd how little Cause the former has for complaint, and that the Offers M^r. Moses made him for accommodating Matters before they came to this Length, were what every Man of Integrity would have accepted of and his Rejecting them induces Us to believe that he has no other vein in carrying the Cause into the Courts of England, than M^r. Moses's Ruin by obliging him to leave his Affairs in these parts (where his Character is so well Establish'd) to attend the Process. The several Papers delivered Us in by both Parties, being of too great a length to be Entered on Our Consultations, are Copied in a Book apart, which comes in this Packet.

TENTHLY OF THE FRENCH AND OTHER EUROPEAN NATIONS TRADING TO INDIA

63. As We inform'd Your Honours in Our address by General Boscawen and as our Consultations Transmitted You by the Royal George will acquaint You that We had seiz'd Messueirs La Mettrie & Barnewall & the Motives that induced Us thereto, We shall now lay before You some further Particulars regarding those Gentlemen.

64. Soon after the departure of the Royal George Mess^{rs}. La Mattrie and Barnewall address'd Us to be acquainted with the Reasons that Urged Us to Arrest them, that by their answer thereto they might be enabled to wipe off the Aspersion, which that Proceedure had thrown upon them, But as M^r. Boscawen (at whose solicitation We had taken this Step) had left Us entirely destitute of the Proofs, he inform'd Us he had against them, We thought it most prudent to return no Answer, And upon further Reflecting on this Affair We found there was Reason to apprehend that should We send those Gentlemen to Europe, and any Accident happen to M^r. Boscawen whereby those proofs might be lost Your Honours might be Involved in a great deal of Troubles We therefore came to a Resolution to deliver M^{rs}. Madeiras up her Bond given for their appearance, and only to expell them Your Limitts and include their Houses in the Number of those we had Determin'd to Confiscate. But we were prevented from executing the latter part of this Resolution by Learning that their Houses were Mortgaged however We orderd the Gentlemen at Fort S^t. George to acquaint them with the former, and in pursuance

thereof to Limitt their Departure with their Effects to a certain time, Although by this Proceudre We had entirely acquitted them of their Obligation to go to England, they still persisted in that Design, in order as they acquainted Us to throw themselves at the Feet of His Majesty, to Implore from his Clemency, & the Laws of our Country, Redress of their Grievances, & what they term our Illegal Proceedings, and to that end Embark'd on a French ship that saild from Pondicherry a few days since, Having first each of them Transmitted Us a Protest whereby they make Your Honours & us accountable for all Damages that may accrue to them and their Persons, Fortunes & Effects, from by & during the Term of their Voyage to & from Europe. In that delivered Us by M^r. La Mattrie We can't help observing that he has made Us accountable for 32000 Pagodas the amount of his Wifes Fortune, which it is well known he paid away a few Months after his Marriage to his Creditors in China It is also most absurd his making us accountable for several sums of Money he pretends to have outstanding in different parts of India since it is a Circumstance well known that he subsisted many Years before the Loss of Madras entirely on the Bounty of his Wifes Family; though it is not impossible the sums he mentions may have been accumulated since then by the Plunder of Madrass, of which we are well inform'd he sent a considerable Quantity to Bengal. We must further beg leave to Remark upon the Extraordinary Valuations he sett's upon his Credit, which has been at a very low Ebb ever since he appropriated to his own Use a larger Sum belonging to the French Company; part of which M^r. Dupleix & the Council of Pondicherry have now thought proper to make Your Honours accountable for M^r. Barnewall seems to exult greatly that We have nothing more to alledge against him! than his having acted as Quarter Master to Mons^r. La Bourdonnais Troops at Madras. But since he seems determined to push matters to extremity, We must now exhibit against him a Charge of much more Importance, no less than the carrying on a Correspondence with the Enemy during the time of Actual War, for the Proof of which we enclose Your Honours Copies of two Affidavits; as also attested Copies of two Notes from him for Quartering the French Officers at Fort S^t. George We were very desirous of Supressing this Article Relating to his Correspondence with the Enemy, because we were apprehensive it might touch his Life, nor shou'd have urged it now had not his Obstinate Behaviour oblig'd Us His withdrawing himself in Disguise from Madras the Night he was Orderd to quit it & an Escort granted for his protection thro' the Moguls Dominions to this place; whether he was coming at his own request to take Passage on the Elizabeth, Leads Us to believe that he entertains but a bad Opinion of his Cause, and would have dropt it long ago had not M^r. Dupleix from the Invetracy he bears Us Instigated him to Prosecute it. We have also reason to think M^r. Jones (who for his base Behaviour to M^r. Moses has been shunn'd by all the Inhabitants of Fort S^t. George, and only associated with these two Gentlemen) has Prompted them to carry this Affair to the length they have done and are well assur'd that many of the papers they deliver'd in were of his Dictating.

65. Your Honours have already been advised of the extraordinary Behaviour of the French which we are sorry to acquaint You has engaged us in a most Troublesome Correspondence with them, although we endeavour'd to avoid it as much as possible by giving them very concise answers to their first Letters wherein they Tax'd Us with breach of Treaties, & Protested against Us for the same They Likewise acquainted Us with having made Your Honours Accountable for M^r. La Mettrie's Debt to their Company of Pagodas 5720. 21. 48, with the Interest due thereon; as they pretended he was rendered incapable of Discharging it by Our Arresting him & insisting on his going to Europe In regard to their Accusation of the Breach of Treaties we Replied, That Our Superiours were the only proper Judges of Our Conduct in that Affair, & to them We should refer it; and as to their making You answerable for M^r. La Mattrie's Debt as we were certain they cou'd have no Precedent for so doing we should pay no regard thereto. This Produced another Letter from them dated the 11th. December, wherein they still persisted in making you accountable for the said Debt but We deferred answering it till we had executed Our Determination regarding Mess^{rs}. La Mettrie and Barnewall in acquitting them of their Obligation & expelling them our Limitts, which We imagin'd

would altogether Invalidate their Reasons for that procedure. In this Interval another Affair happend that occasion'd fresh misunderstandings. This they Complain'd of as an Insult Offered to their Flagg, because it happen'd in a Village about three Miles from Our Bounds where they had thought proper to hoist one, and from that Circumstance to Denominate, their own, But for a more Particular Account of this Matter, and Our proceedings therein We must beg leave to refer You to our Consultations, However in a Letter that pass'd on that occasion we took an Opportunity to acquaint them with what we had done in regard to M^r. La Mettrie and that their Reasons for making You accountable for his Debt, were consequently void, To this they Replied, that they had wrote to M^r. La Mettrie on that Subject and when his answer arriv'd, wou'd Communicate it to Us: after which they remain'd silent till the 24 Ultimo when they enclos'd Us, Copy of his Letter to them, with an Original Address'd to Us, and his protest as before taken Notice of: and gave Us to understand that they still continued in their former Resolution of making Your Honours accountable for the Money As We had so often Reiterated to them Our Determinations of not paying the least Regard to their Protest in that Respect we thought it unnecessary to repeat it again therefore only acknowledged the Receipt of their Letter and the Papers it Contain'd; But cannot help observing their Conduct in this Affair, appears to Us very extraordinary; as at the same time they presume to make You accountable for M^r. La Mettrie's Debt they permitt him to take Passage for Europe on one of their own ships which in our opinion does not carry with it the least Shadow of Equity.

66. We are too sensible as We advis'd Your Honours by M^r. Boscawen, That the French by their manner of acting, aim at nothing less than to exclude Us from the Trade of this Coast & by Degress from that of India: But hope by the Assistance of Nazir Jing (who is greatly Irritated with them, & whose Friendship we shall endeavour to Cultivate) to render their Schemes abortive; and turn the Ruin they meant for Us upon themselves. Though we cannot help wishing that Your Honours had put it more in Our Power to have Attempted it with greater Certainty.

67. Although M^r. Boscawen upon Our Application to him sent a Remonstrance to the Gentlemen at Batavia for the several Insults offerd by their Nation to His Majestys Colours and Your Pass We are sorry to Observe it has been to very little purpose having fresh Cause for Complaint by their Stopping in the Streights of Malacca a Country Ship call'd the Arcot bound from this Place to Manilha, & we have certain information that they had Orders from Batavia to stop her intended Voyage & would have done it, had not three of Your Hon^{rs}. China Ships then at Malacca been a means to prevent them their Motive for this procedure is as we learn their having a Ship of their Own destind to that Port and as a Resolution they have form'd to Engross the Manilha Trade to themselves, indeed their Encroachments are so notorious that We apprehend there is no Occasion to expatiate on the ill Consequences that must naturally flow from them; they are too obviuous to need a Comment We can only say that We shall Remonstrate this Fresh Indignity to the Gentlemen at Negapatam desiring them to forward the same to Batavia, & shall not fail to acquaint M^r. Lisle with it, by the first Opportunity.

The best advices We have been able to procure of the French Shipping inform Us that two have arrived from France lately, with a supply of Treasure thô We cannot learn the Quantity nor the names of those ships one of which saild sometime since but whither Bound we are unacquainted with The Prince, that arriv'd last Year at Pondicherry from Europe, and winter'd at Mergy was dispatch'd a few days past directly for France on which went Mess^{rs}. La Mettrie & Barnewall. The Favorite who was their Manilha Ship last Year, they have sent to Mahie for a Cargo of Pepper, and We are inform'd she is to Proceed on that Voyage again this Year. The Anson is gone on a Voyage to Mocha and the Tevenepatam from Bengall to the Mauritius.

69. The Investment they have made this Year amounts to about two Lacks of Rupees and we hear they have lately advanc'd their Merchants One Lack more.

ELEVENTHLY OF HIS BRITANNICK MAJESTY'S SQUADRON

70. Under the Head of Shipping Your Honours have already been acquainted that the Elizabeth left Commodore Lisle at Atcheen, of whom we can give no further Intelligence than that we don't expect to see him till May or June.

71. The Ruby, Tarter & Syren, who left this Place for Bombay in October, We have advice are all arrived there.

72. When the Brilliant Snow went to Atcheen in the Year 1747 M^r. Griffin and the President Directed the Chief Mate M^r. Thomas Webster to remain at that Place, in order to remit them any Intelligence he might get of the Enemy; and he being now Return'd from thence on the Elizabeth has deliver'd us in an Account of his Expences amounting to Rupees two thousand and eight (2008) which not being thought at all Extravagant, the same has been Discharg'd.

HONOURABLE

The last Address to your Honours from this Presidency was under date the 13th. February by the Elizabeth Capt Edward Wills, which Ship sail'd the next day, the Gentlemen in Bengal having Ordered the Lapwing to call here for any Advices We might have, gives Us an Opportunity of informing You of the arrival and departure of the following Ships, Viz^t.

By these Ships we were favoured with your several Commands of the 3^d. November, 8th. December, 12th. January and 22^d. March 1749.

Major Stringer Lawrence being the only one on the spot to whom your Packet by the Lynn was directed, transmitted Copy of the Letter of the 12th. January to the Gentlemen at Madras, who were pleased to commit the Care of this Settlement to his Charge, and Order the Brilliant Snow to Vizagapatam to bring up M^r. Saunders, who arrived here the 19th. Instant; Mess^{rs}. Goodwin and Greenhaugh declin'd your Service on account of their ill state of Health; the several Stations of the Council, will be fix'd before the Dispatch of the Fort S^t. George, and due regard had to Your Honour's Directions relating thereto.

We were sorry to hear by the Grantham of the Loss of the Duke of Cumberland, the particulars of that unfortunate Accident you will be acquainted with by the Dorrington Captain Crabb, on whom some of her People return'd.

On the several Ships dispatch'd to the Bay was sen[t] what Bullion could be Coined in time, and shall replace the whole amount of that by Norfolk, and hope to be able to dispatch her in a few days.

By the Elizabeth your Honours were advised of the Fort S^t. George being sent to Madagascar; She return'd the 7th. Instant with One hundred & fourteen Caffrey's, and the Swallow arrived here the 28th. August with Two hundred and forty five; For the reasons then mention'd, and Captain Bell setting forth in a Letter to Us the insufficiency of his Ship's Company for such a Voyage, we shall decline sending him again; and as he represents he is not able to carry more than 150 or 160, we shall reserve the remainder for your Service here. This Vessel is now going to Madras with some Stores and the private Silver & Coral which we Landed from the Kent and Benjamin; after the delivery of which she will proceed to the West Coast, and on her return here will be dispatch'd Home.

Commodore Lisle in the Vigilant arrived here [the] 23^d. Instant from a Cruize to the Eastward, where he left the Swallow Captain Speck; He spoke with the True Briton in the Streights of Banca, the 18th. Ultimo, and Sail'd this morning for Fort S^t. Geor[ge] to join the Ruby, and take in his Stores and Provisions; The Syr[en] and Tartar are on the Malabar Coast; But the Instructions for M^r. Lisle being lodged at Madras, we can't with any Certainty inform you where he will proceed.

Mr. Robins arrived on the Grantham and has Survey'd the Works here and at Madras; with this come his Plans and observations thereon, and We shall strictly observe what you have been pleased to Direct in regard to him.

We are sorry to acquaint You the French have been too Successfull in their Destructive Scheme on this Province But as this and the other Branches of your Business, are of a very extensive nature, and require a particular Account, and not chusing to detain the Lapwing, we must beg leave [to] defer enlarging thereon till the departure of the Fort S^t. Geo: which Ship is now taking in her Loading, and We hope will be ready to Sail by the 15th. of next Month.

The Register of Diamonds by this Ship amounts to One hundred ninety three thousand, four hundred thirty two Pagodas, thirteen fanams and four Cash 193432: 13: 4.

The first place you arrive at in England you are to send your Purser Overland with the Packet herewith delivered You, Directed to THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONOURABLE THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES, at their House in Leadenhall Street, LONDON takeing Care to write to them yourself and to give them an Account of any thing remarkable you may meet with in your Voyage.

If you touch at the Cape it will be acceptable to the Governour & Council of S^t. Helena, that you carry them a supply of Garden Seeds Plants, &c^s.

We wish you a good Voyage and date this in FORT S^t. DAVID, the 27th. day of September 1750.

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS

HONOURABLE

1. The Lapwing Sail'd the 28th. Ultimo, with Our Address of the 26th. Duplicate of which and the Letters from this Presidency of the 12th. February, come in this Packet.

2. This waits on Your Honours by the Fort St. George, We shall now reply to your severals this Season, wh^{ch}. we acknowledged the receipt of £ Lapwing, and acquaint you with the material relating to your Affairs under the Establish'd Heads.

FIRST, CONCERNING SHIPPING.

3. On the Fort St. George's return from Madagascar, we ordered her to be surveyed, and being Reported in a fit Condition to proceed to Europe, we now dispatch her to You.

4. The Augusta who we before advised arrived here the 26th. December from Malacca, sail'd for China the 27th. April.

5. The Walpole losing her Passage to Juddah went to Bombay, from whence after taking in a Cargo of Cotton she proceeded to Bengal.

6. The Britannia met with the same Accident and could not get round Ceylon, wherefore she came here the 2^d. May, and continued with Us till the 28th. June, when she proceeded for Bombay, where we have the Satisfaction to acquaint you, the Warren arrived the 9th. June, though in a very bad Condition, having met with a Gale of Wind the 19th. May which carried away all her Masts, and damaged her Cargo greatly.

7. The Severn though she succeeded in gaining her Passage to Bombay arrived there so late, that she was obliged to continue there the Rains. In her return from thence for the Bay, the President and Council Ordered her to call here to have Coined twenty five Chests of Bullion, they had put on board her and Consign'd to the President and Council of Fort William which we replaced with the Rupees, and she Sail'd the 6th. Septem^r after a Detention here of not quite three Days.

8. We are advised from Anjengo that the Duke of Newcastle was dispatch'd Home from thence the 25th. January as also the Dragon the 4th. March, and the Salisbury the 11th. following; and from Tellicherry that the Stafford left that Place for China the 6th. May.

9. The Lord Anson bound for Bombay was at Johanna when the Kent left that Place the 31st. July.

10. After Landing the One hundred and fifty Pipes of Madeira Wine and Treasure from the Norfolk, and replacing the latter with Rupees, We dispatch'd her to Bengal, where we hope she will arrive in such time that the same may conduce to the Tonnage designed home.

11. By the Lapwing we gave our reasons for not sending the Swallow to Madagascar; she Sail'd the 17th. Instant with 160 Slaves for the West Coast with Orders to the Deputy Governour & Council to return her to Us, with the utmost Expedition that We may be able to dispatch her Home in January.

12. By Your Vessel the Brillant We complied with the West Coast Indent, and directed the Gentlemen there after the delivery of the same to send her to Batavia for the purchasing some Arrack, which we are much in want of for Our Military; and Timber and Plank, which M^r. Robins represents to Us absolutely necessary for the Fortifications.

13. Our best endeavours shall not be wanting to contribute to the sending home as many of your Ships this Season as possible. Upon a Calculation of the Tonnage we might reasonably expect in January, We have wrote to the Gentlemen in Bengal to send up two Ships half Loaden, which we shall be able to fill up if not prevented by some very particular Accident.

14. We have been applied to by the President and Council of Bombay for Our Assistance to dispatch Home two Ships, which by their not having Tonnage for, will be obliged to Continue in India; but as those your Honour's have been pleased to Consign to this Coast and the Bay, this and the last year, are more than it will be in the Power of the President & Council of Fort William and Ourselves to find Cargoes for this Season, We could give them no Encouragement to send them Round to Us.

15. Captain Taylor has made Application to Us to be paid the same Wages and Allowances as he received when in Command of the Tryal, for the Months of January, February & March; being paid on the same Terms to that time by the Gentlemen in Bengal, but as your Directions were only to provide for him when Opportunity offered, we must refer him to your Honour's Agreeable to the [lacuna] Paragraph of your Letter to Benjamin, He is dismiss'd the Service, though We must beg leave to mention him to your Honours as a very capable, industrious Man.

16. The Supracargoes of the Portfield having Requested what Advices we could give them concerning Borneo, As we have no intercourse with that Port, we could only inform them that by a Letter from Captain Stevens of the Delewar to the late Secretary Mole, his Treatment from the Natives by the incitement of the Dutch, was such, that we very much doubted of their Success. It was not in Our power to supply them with a Linguist.

SECONDLY OF GOODS FROM EUROPE, OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE DISPOSED OF AT ANOTHER.

17. Of the Cargoes of the several Ships Imported here, We are to acquaint You

18. That in Landing the Broad Cloth from the Augusta, we found Ten pieces damaged, which was return'd to and paid for by Captain Parker, and replaced by Us when we forwarded to Bengal the whole Quantity, which was done by different Conveyances that offered.

19. By the Grantham, of her Broad Cloth eighteen pieces were also damaged and paid for by Captain Oliver, He attributed it to the Leakage of his Decks.

20. By the Prince Edward there was an Overplus in the Article of Pump Nails amounting to Pugodas, Seventeen twelve fanams and twenty Cash (17 : 12 : 20) and a deficiency in the small, of Pagodas, Six, thirteen fanams & sixty Cash (6 : 13 : 60) which were Landed at Fort St. George.

21. A Mast and two Coils of Cordage from the York, and five Shovels by the Prince Edward were made use of by the Commanders of those Ships and accordingly paid for by them.

22. In weighing the Copper and Lead to Prince Edward, there were wanting four plates poizing Six hundred Weight, one Quarter, and two pounds of the former, and one hundred Weight and Eight pounds of the latter, the amount of which was received of Captain Haldane.

23. The Madeira Wine to Norfolk was Surveyed as Usual; We received the whole Quantity, vizt. One hundred and fifty Pipes in good Condition; Captain Hancock and his Officers Landed here Twenty Pipes.

24. That design'd Us last year by the Tavistock we received from Bengal by Banetta and Grampus Sloops.

25. On the Resolution of the Swallows not proceeding to Madagascar, the remaining part of her Cargo was received into Our Storehouse, for the amount of which we shall Credit Account Current London.

26. Three Macao Ships having been upon this Coast, no Goods proper for the Market were procurable for your China Ships; should any offer we shall take Care to provide for the Expected Ones.

also, had we been left at liberty to do so, but Your Honour's Orders were so positive in regard to the Benjamins Stay being but ten days, that we were under a necessity of Complying therewith, and therefore divided the Rupees design'd for the Kent between her & that Ship.

28. We shall take Care to supply the Gentlemen in Bengal with what Redwood they may Indent for. We have wrote to them for five thousand Bags of Salt Petre; as We had none in store and M^r. Robins thinks it necessary we should have a large Stock for makeing Powder. Agreeable to your Directions, We have indented to the Gentlemen at Bombay for Seven thousand Barrels, as Major Lawrence is of Opinion we ought never to be without such a Supply for the Service of your Settlements on this Coast.

29. Nazar Jing's Army having been in this Province since the latter end of February, for the Payment of which being brought a large Quantity of Rupees, has occasion'd that Specie to be at four hundred & upwards, and consequently Silver at a low price. The Country has been a Scene of War and Plunder, on which Occasions the Natives generally Secreet their Valuables; This has Caused such a Scarcity of Gold that We have been put to great Streights in Negotiating the Mercantile part of your Affairs; nay even in Payment of your Military and Servants. But what with most Concern we must observe to Your Honours, is, that for want of proper Supplies of Madras Pagodas, the Northern Investments have suffered very considerably; No Efforts have been wanting in Us to surmount these Difficulties, a large Importation of Gold occurs to Us as the only Remedy. We therefore request you will please for this purpose to send Us out One hundred thousand pounds in Silver, with leave to send the same to China by your Ships for Gold. This will enable Us largely to Supply those Settlements, and Disappoint the Intrigues of Shroffs, by having the Ballance of Exchange greatly in Our Power.

30. We shall punctually obey your Orders in regard to the Sale of your Goods, and heartily wish it may answer the design'd end, though we must humbly offer to you that we are Apprehensive of Difficulties and Disappointments in the execution of it; should this be the Case we shall act as we judge most for your Advantage.

31. In this Ships Packet, we send you the Musters of Gold and Silver on Demanding of M^r. Edwards and Linga Chittee the Reasons for a Debasement in the Rupees, they assure Us they were agreeable to the usual fineness of 4 dwts better than Standard, and will abide by the Musters now Transmitted You.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS.

32. The Merchants, being call'd before the Board and pressed to exert themselves in the Investment, they represented the Grievances, the Weavers laboured under from the Encampment of Armies in the Country, who are continually oppressing & plundering wherever they go; it was Agreed to allow them the same Prices as last Year.

33. The Gentlemen at Fort St. George gives Us reason to expect an Encrease in theirs, We have directed that no encouragement be wanting to the Merchants and Inhabitants, which we look upon as the Strongest Foundation for the Success of your Affairs.

34. Notwithstanding the want of Madras Pagodas We have received from Vizagapatam Four hundred & sixty two Bales, and from Ingeram, Three hundred and ninety; and as we have supplied them by the London, and are now sending a further Sum ₹ Phoenix, we are in hopes of a Suitable return in January.

35. We have already acquainted your Honours that upon a reasonable Calculation, we expected to fill up two Ships from Bengal, and dispatch the Swallow to you in January, We cannot close this Head without telling you of the bad Situation of this Province, is such as may defeat the best Endeavours; at the same time assuring You, we shall always look upon this branch of your Affairs, as Our particular Care.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

36. Your Honour's were advised by the Elizabeth of the Capital of the Kingdom of Tanjour being Beseiged and drove to great Streights by the French in Conjunction with Mustapha Jing and Chunda Saib, and the little possibility there was if not succour'd by Nazar Jing (who was daily expected) of its being able to hold out much longer; Soon after that Ships dispatch, on the News of his having Entered the Province, and Detach'd part of his Army for the Releif of that Place, they broke up the Siege and return'd in so precipitate a manner that they left the Major part of their Battering Cannon and Mortars behind them, besides the Loss they Sustain'd in the Siege by Sickress &c. computed to be near Five hundred Europeans. In their Retreat they suffered little, though continually harrass'd by the Morattas detach'd for that purpose by Nazar Jing, and got into Pondicherry about the time he arriv'd at Arcott, Who after some stay there, bent his March to Tervedy twenty five Miles to the Westward of this place; from whence he sent a Vackeel to the late President demanding Assistance of such Force as could be spared to act in Conjunction with him against the Common Enemy, who by this time had again taken the Field and Encamp'd about Twenty Miles to the South West of Pondicherry, and by the Disposition they had made, seem'd Resolved to stand an Engagement; Their number was about One thousand Europeans, Two thousand Seapoys and Coffrees, with a large Train of Artillery; also Fifteen thousand Horse, belonging to Mustapha Jing & Chunda Saib. Accordingly Orders were given to Captain Cope to March from Trichenopoly with the Detachment under his Command, and Major Lawrence shortly join'd the Army with what Troops could be spared from this Garrison; soon after which the whole Army march'd towards the French, who after a days Cannonading at too great a Distance to do any Damage Retreated once more in so precipitate a manner, as to leave Ten pieces of Cannon and two Cohorns, being the Major part of their Train behind them, the People belonging to which were cut to pieces. The Morattas pursued them as soon as they had notice of their Flight, but with little effect, and they again got safe into Pondicherry. Mustapha Jing, who drew his Party from Churda Saib, and the next Day threw himself at Nazar Jings Feet was immediately Ordered under Confinement, and still remains so. After the Retreat of the French and Chunda Saib, Nazar Jing Encamp'd at a place call'd Waldoor, about seven Miles to the Westward of Pondicherry, but did not chuse to approach nearer, Major Lawrence and Mr. Westcott having inform'd him, Our Troops could not act in any shape against the French, where they were Principals, which must be the Case, were they to advance into their Bounds. In this Encampment he Continued a Month when decamping for Arcot, he requested Our Troops might accompany him, but the Gentlemen insisting on having the Grants of the Poonomalee Country given them before they Stirr'd he went away without Vouchsafing them an Answer. On which the Ambassadors, seeing the little dependance there was on him, and the great Expence the Company were at in keeping the Troops in the Field, they were Ordered to return hither, where they arrived the 22^d. April.

Not long after the return of Our Troops, and Nazar Jings being arrived at Arcot, the French in Conjunction with Chunda Saib March'd out again, Ravageing & Laying Waste the Country, which they put under Contribution wherever they came, and at length arrived at Tervedy, which after some Resistance they took, and from thence Detach'd a Party to Chellemburum, situated about Twenty five Miles to the South West of this Place, where after having Plundered the Suburbs, demanded a large Sum from the Hovildar, not to molest the Pagoda, Which they had almost received, when Mahomud Ally wrote to the late President acquainting him of the above Circumstances and moreover that the French were Entrenching themselves at Tervedy, which Place they were also Fortifying, assuring him of a Saneds being drawn out for Us for the Poonamalee Country which was Lodged in the hands of a Substantial Merchant at Arcot, and to be delivered Us on his Commencing his Nabobship, which would be in September; a Copy whereof he sent for the Governour & Council's Perusal, and at the same time a Bill of Exchange for Twenty thousand Rupees to defray the Expences of Our Troops for two Months in lieu of the Revenues

of Poonemalæ for that time ; The above Circumstances being duly weigh'd, & the French having declared that they were resolved to make Chunda Saib, Nabob, against all Opposition ; which if they had Accomplish'd, must certainly have been of the worst Consequence to your Affairs ; it was Determin'd that Our Troops should once more take the Field, and act in Conjunction with Mahomud Ally, who was coming from Arcot with a Body of Horse, and by that means put a Stop to the Rapid Progress of the French and Chunda Saib ; who were spreading Destruction wherever they came ; Accordingly Captain Cope March'd out with Six Hundred Men and a Field Train the 30th. June, and join'd the Nabob to the Westward of Tervedy, from which Place the French Retreated leaveing a Garrison within, as also from before Chellumbrum, without receiveing the stipulated Sum ; Our Troops continued Encamp'd till the middle of August, when finding there was little probability of Coming to Action, the French & Chunda Saib being again come out, and Encamped within a Mile of them to the Northward of Tervedy and considering a State of Inactivity could be of no manner of Advantage to the Nabob's Affairs, and only a heavy Charge to Your Honours, as his People could never be induced to make an Attack, and was out of Our Power to do ; and the Officers and Men daily falling Sick, Major Lawrence with the advice of Mess^{rs}. Starke and Powney, who were the only Acting Council on the Spot, Recall'd the Troops, who immediately came in. A few Days after the French embraced the Opportunity, fell upon the Nabob's Army, which they dispersed, Burnt his Camp, and He with such part of his Scattered Troops as could be gathered together, retreated to Gingey, whither he was pursued by the French ; but not chusing to trust himself in that Fortress, went further Inland, and the French Possess'd themselves of the Strong Holds of Gingey.

38. The Present designed for Nazar Jing and his Officers, being ready, which with the Sundry Camp Charges amounts to Pagodas 25715. 22. 44. M^r. Westcott set out to join Major Lawrence ; for the Particulars of which Embassy We beg leave to refer you to the Account delivered in by the Ambassadors at their return, and shall only observe that after repeated promises that their Affairs should be Settled to their Satisfaction, finding nothing Granted, and that it would be to little purpose to continue any longer at so fruitless an Expençe, they returned the 22^d. April.

39. Mañomud Ally has been appointed Nabob of Arcot, We have received from him a Grant of the Trevendaparum Country, for the Services rendered him.

40. The Foregoing is a detail of the Transactions with the Country Government to this time. They have again Applied to Us for Our Troops ; We have seriously weighed this Affair, The Expences attending these Expeditions are large, The Consequences, fatal to your Trade on this Coast, should the French prove Successful, urge a necessity for it ; But we conclude it reasonable that a Gratification adequate to the Charges we must be at, should be Confirm'd to Us. We have therefore sent Our Vackeel to Nazar Jing with assurances of Our Friendship, and readiness to Contribute to the preserving this Province from the Impending Ruin threatened by Chunda Saib, with whom the French are in Alliance, Upon the Confirmation of the Grants of such Country's as have been promised Us ; At the same time to tell him we cannot Embroil Our Affairs by acting against the French as Principals ; We think it would be highly Imprudent in an Affair of such Consequence to use any Deceit, or enter into Engagements, we should not be able with Honour to Execute. We shall wait the Success of this Negotiation, before any further Steps are taken ; Should Our Requests be Granted, we beg leave to observe, that the Revenues arising from these Places would Enable Us to Support a number of Men necessary for your Garrisons. We are inform'd that Nazar Jing if not Successful is resolved to give the Province up to be plundered by the Morattas. In this Gloomy, Hazardous, Situation, therefore humbly beg leave to lay before your Honours the Returns of your Garrisons on the Coast, wherein is Included the Bombay Detachment, which must be sent back ; a Force much too weak for the present Unsettled Times, hoping You will please to send us a large Reinforcement ; assuring you we shall be Carefull not to Enter into Schemes prejudicial to your Affairs, or put You to any Expençe more than necessary.

41. Mr. Andrews Resident of your Factory at Ganjam, has wrote he has again been Plundered by the Moors, We have Ordered Our Vackeel to represent this Affair at Court, & withdraw that Factory; We have directed Mr. Andrews to acquaint Us if not Redress'd are come to a Resolution to with the Sums that have been Extorted from him, and if any part has been Recovered; and after receiveing his Answer shall advise you accordingly.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS AND REVENUES.

42. Since the arrival of Mr. Robins, this branch of your Affairs, has been entirely committed to his Care; no Repairs are made, Buildings erected or purchased, without his Approbation. By the Lapwing went his Plans and Observations on this Place and Fort S^t. George, Duplicates of which go in the Packet. L^{tr}s rec^d
N^o. 104.

43. The only Expences in this head are the building a small Room for the Mint Master, and repairing some Gun Carriages, which we esteem'd absolutely necessary in the present precarious Situation. Consult

44. We cannot help mentioning to your Honours the great Inconveniencies we labour under for want of proper Warehouses, those that we are able to get are so Scattered that it makes the Transaction of Business tedious and expensive, the Sums paid for the hire of such, being very large; but the greatest difficulty we have to struggle with is the Loading and unloading of Vessells, which lay at a great Distance; the Boats few and ill work'd. In the fair Season, Dispatch is very slow and at this time of the year those designed for Bengal often endanger their Passage, and if it should blow hard, which is commonly the Case, all in general run a hazard of being driven on Shore.

45. The 9th. of April Deve Cotah was Farmed to Andeapah and Irshapah Chittee for Six thousand Pagodas ₹ Annum for Five years, and a Cowle has been given to One Cholagga Nynare as Polligar of that District, being a Person greatly Assisting in taking the Place. Consult

46. On the Resettling Fort S^t. George the Customs on Grain were taken of for six Months, and afterwards for a further Six as an Encouragement to a greater Importation, and an Inducement for its former Inhabitants to Resort there; This We are in hopes will have the desired Effect, and we have very particularly Recommended it to the Gentlemen there. When we find that Settlement has tolerably recovered its former Vigour, we shall enquire into the worth of the several Farms, and Let them, that you may not lose so profitable a Branch of your Revenues.

47. The Grants given by Mahomud Ally Cawn the Nabob of Arcot, are,

Trevendapuram and Dependancies
The Poonemalee Country promis'd, but the Phirmaund not yet received; none of these confirmed by Nazar Jing.

48. Till the present, the Rents of the S^t. Thome and Trevendaparum Country have been Collected. After informing Ourselves of their Value we purpose Farming them to Responsible People for a fixed Annual Rent.

Joseph Fowke Second of Fort St. George, but he having declined when you thought fit to Direct that the Madras Servants might be Reinstated, the Gentlemen did not think him Entitled to this Appointment. As we cannot perceive that M^r. Fowke lies any ways under your displeasure, we thought it unjust to refuse him his Station on Council according to your appointment & Lynn. M^r. Fowke imagined your Intention was that he should Continue Second at Fort St. George; as We have never had any precedent for this, and you make no mention of it; though in regard to M^r. Pigot, who is a Member of this Board, you are pleased to say he may be Stationed at Madras if any particular Service required it. We therefore could not gratify him in this; but in Consideration of the prejudice his Removal here might be to his Consignments, We have indulged him to Continue there till your Pleasure be known.

82. By the Elizabeth the necessary was advised You on this Head.

TENTHLY OF THE FRENCH AND OTHER EUROPEAN NATIONS IN INDIA.

83. The French that they might with more Facility execute their Schemes pretend they act as Principals and on Our Assisting Mahomud Ally the Legal Nabob against Chunda Saib with whom they are in Alliance, have at different times Protested which has introduced a Correspondence which we now transmit, and beg leave to refer you to for what has pass'd on this Occasion; assuring You that we

shall be very Cautious not to Embroil your Affairs by any unwarrantable Step, and at the same time as much as in Us lies endeavour to Frustrate their Schemes; which if Successfull must terminate in the Ruin of your Trade on this Coast.

84. We are inform'd their Factory at Yanam has been erased by the Moors, that, at Metchlipatam was also taken and their Servants made Prisoners; a Reinforcement has been sent there and we hear they have retaken their Factory at Metchlipatam, and excluded both Moors & Dutch from any Trade there.

85. When we reflect on the many affronts received by the Dutch, and more especially this last at Metchlipatam, we cannot but be greatly Surprized at their Inactivity, not finding they have yet shewn the least Resentment.

86. Six Ships have arrived this year at Pondicherry, 'tis Reported they have Landed to the amount of Ten Millions of Livres and some Military; They give out a very large Reinforcement is still expected. Two Ships have been dispatch'd for the Islands with about Two hundred Bales, Redwood, and some Artificers. 'Tis said they are to be fill'd up there with Coffee. Notwithstanding so large a Sum has arrived this Year we don't find their Investment is any ways Considerable.

87. In the Month of April we were addressed from Covelon by One Father Angelo De Gertrude, who Stiles himself a Resident there for his Imperial Majesty, acquainting Us that the French had taken Possession of that place by virtue of a Grant from Chunda Saib; wherefore he desired we would use Our Interest with Nazar Jing to procure him his Phirm^a. for it. As your Affairs at that time at Nazar Jing's Court required Our greatest Attention (and we were apprehensive of having much trouble in Complying with his Request) we therefore excused Ourselves to him on that Account.

90. Commodore Lisle on his departure from Fort S^t. George, requested that the remainder of the Kings Stores might be received by Our Storekeeper, desiring that such as the Company had not Occasion for might be Sold at Outery, and Accounted for to the Commissioners of the Navy; They were accordingly received by Our Commissary of Stores, and an Account of them comes herewith.

91. We shall pay due regard to what you are pleased to mention concerning Captures, if any such thing should happen in Future.

92. M^r. Belsches Surgeon of His Majesty's Hospital, has delivered in his Account and paid the Ballance and Deductions as Ordered, and has signed a Security bond for the Payment of any further Deductions that may be made by the Commissioners of the Sick and Wounded. His Bond and Account Current are now Enclosed.

93. What Original Papers we could find relating to the Squadron, we now send as ~~the~~ List.

SUPPLEMENT.

94. Upon demanding the usual Ten Pounds of each Passenger going home on this Ship, Mess^{rs}. Morse and Floyer acquainted the Secretary there was no precedent of any of your Governours abroad paying this Money. M^r. Belsches acquainted Us Doctor Douglas was excused it, and Major Lawrence and Lieutenants Cooke & Campbell, alledge Officers never paid it. Upon having recourse to Madras Records we find it so, therefore have not Insisted on it; but thought it necessary to acquaint you herewith, and request your positive Order on this head.

George, relating to a dispute between them; and not having leisure at y^e. time to Comply with his Request, we take the liberty to mention it to your Honours, as he may probably apply to you for them.

102. The weather appearing Dirty, we did not think it prudent to detain this Ship longer than was absolutely necessary, as she had near the number of Bales on board we intended to Load on her. The Invoice of her Cargo amounts to One hundred sixty three thousand seven hundred twenty four Pagodas, twenty five fanams twenty four Cash (163724. 25. 24).

103. The Register of Diamonds and Precious Stones by the Fort S^t. George amounts to Forty three thousand and ninety five Pagodas, thirty four fanams & Sixty six Cash (43095. 34. 66).

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS

OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

Beleiveing it will be acceptable to you to hear of the arrival of your Ships in India, we send this to Bombay to be forwarded Overland, and have the Satisfaction to acqu^t. you, that except the Duke of Cumberland, all those design'd for the Coast, have arrived here. Such as were destined for China proceeded in good time on their Voyage thither, as did those for the Bay with all the Rupees we could possibly Spare.

The Lynn was unfortunately Lost in going up Bengal River, But her Treasure and most of the Broad Cloth was Saved, though we hear great part of this last was Damaged.

Commodore Lisle acquaints Us he met with Your Honour's Ship the True Briton in the Streights of Banca the 18th. August.

The Lapwing was Loaded in Bengal, but being directed to call here, we wrote your Honour's a short Letter by her to advise you the needfull, and to accompany some Plans from M^r. Robins. She sail'd hence the 28th. September.

The Fort S^t. George was late in her arrival from Madagascar, which together with the great Inconvenience we Labour under in Loading Ships from hence, made it the 24th. Ultimo, before we could give Captain Burdett his dispatches; but the Weather has since been very moderate, and the Wind hanging to the Westward for some Days after her departure, we don't doubt but she soon got a fine Offing, and by this time is well out of the Bay. She is fully Laden, and we flatter Ourselves we shall be able to fill up two Ships in January, besides giving the Swallow a Loading of Fine Goods, if she returns in time from Marlborough, whither we dispatch'd her the 17th. October, with One hundred & sixty Slaves.

Mess^{rs}. Morse, Floyer and Major Lawrence went Home on the Fort St. George.

The Situation of Affairs in regard to the French and Country Government, is the same as when we address'd you @ Fort St. George; Our Vackeel has obtain'd an Audience of Nazar Jing and give Us hopes that his Negotiation will be attended with Success. We are

HONOURABLE

1. The Fort St. George Sail'd from hence the 25th. with Our Advices of the 24th. October, since which We have Address'd your Honours under the 3^d. November and 24th. Ultimo by way of Persia, Duplicates of which and Triplicate of that @ Lapwing come herewith.

2. The Severn Imported here the 21st. having touch'd at Madras for the Bales; by her We shall under the usual Heads acquaint You with what has Occurred in regard to your Affairs since Our last Dispatch.

FIRST, CONCERNING SHIPPING.

3. It will be needless to Repeat under this Head the Disposition of your several Ships in India, which is fully Related in Our Letter of the 24th. Ultimo, to the Duplicate of which We beg leave to Refer You. We have only to add,

4. That as the Norfolk is not yet in Sight, We are apprehensive she will be late.

5. In a Letter from Bombay the 13th. December which we received the 25th. Ultimo, The Gentlemen advise Us of their hopes of a large Investment at Telli-cherry, and desire that in Case the Warren should have Lost her Passage and be on the Coast that we would Dispatch her to Tellicherry. The Britannia now lying in Madras Road, and being too late to arrive at the Bay in time to be dispatch'd Home, or to proceed to the Malabar Coast from an Assurance that it will be highly acceptable to your Honour's to have as many Ships return'd Home as possible, We have Directed the Gentlemen at Madras if it can be done in Time that she be unloaded and sent to Tellicherry.

6. Agreeable to what we wrote you by the Fort St. George, we were proposing to put up your Broad Cloth at Publick Outcry, when we received a Petition from Linga Chittee requesting it might be delivered to him pleading his Faithfull Services, particularly that he had taken it for some Years at a Time when Refused by others, and no one Cared to Venture on it. That M^r. Floyer had promised it to him, and should it be bought in small Parcels at the Price Limited, from which

^Nine ₹ Cent being Deducted for prompt Payment, the purchaser would be able greatly to Under sell him, by which means he should be a very Considerable Sufferer, as he had a large Quantity on hand of last Years. Upon taking into Consideration his Petition, we could not but allow it to be just, and as We Concluded Your Honours were not acquainted with these Circumstances, We were induced to beleive it is not your design or desire we should Act with Injustice, But rather that Encouragement should be given to People that are Servicable to you, We therefore came to a Resolution that the Broad Cloth should be deliver'd to Linga Chitee, but that he should not have any pretensions to it in future; Your Honours will be more fully acquainted with Our Proceedings in this Affair in Our Consultations of the 25th. October, and 5th. November, to which we beg leave to Referr You.

8. We have been very unfortunate with Our Coffrees, on their first Arrival they Died daily, and with all Our Care were not able to prevent the Loss of Eighty Six, the Remaining are now well. The Men are Train'd to Arms, The Women will be sent to the West Coast by the first Opportunity.

9. The Lisle and Success, by whom we sent Forty Chests of Rupees to the Bay lost their Passage and fell in with Vizagapatam, But we are in hopes the Treasure will arrive in Time to be Servicable to the Investment.

10. Several Deficiency's have of late arose on Goods and Treasure sent to the Bay, which we are very much at a Loss to Account for, but to Remedy this in future We shall insist upon the Captain or Purser seeing such Goods weigh'd off, and then expect he pay for such Deficiency as may happen.

11. The Gentlemen at Bombay advising Us they had Six Hundred Barrells of Gun Powder ready, and could furnish Us with nine hundred Yearly, We Embraced the offer as it is much Superiour to what made on this Coast.

12. Rupees are Still at so low a price as Three Hundred Eighty two, and Silver in Proportion, We have not been backward in Endeavouring to Reduce them to a more equal Exchange, by Ordering all Receipts and Payments to be in Pagodas, this indeed has furnish'd Us with Sufficient for defraying Our Garrison Expences, and has been of some Service, as well as Satisfied Our Military, who were Continually Murmuring on this Occasion; But we are still in want of Pagodas for Our Investment, and must repeat Our Request made You on this Subject by the Fort St. George.

13. As by the large Sums Remitted to Bengal We have not Sufficient Remaining to Answer the Demands of Our Merchants, We have taken Twenty Chests Out of the Britannia, which we shall Replace as soon as Our Cash will allow of it.

14. In the Packet come Our several Indents for Wares and Stores, which we Request your Compliance with.

THIRDLY, TOUCHING INVESTMENTS.

15. We shall be able to fullfill what we promised on this Head; The Severn, Norfolk, and Swallow will have their full Tonnage, though we have met with unexpected Impediments.

16. The number of Bales from Madras is far less than the Gentlemen there gave Us Room to hope for; The Reasons they assign for it are the Unsettled State of the Country and the late Revolution; whereby Property is Rendered so precarious, that the Merchants cannot with the least Prudence make any Advances.

17. The London missing Vizagapatam was the Occasion of the Supply sent by her arriveing very late though the Gentlemen at the Bay forwarded it from thence by the Hawke Sloop. The Phoenix also lost her Passage, and did not reach that Port till the begining of last Month. These disappointments greatly affect^d. the Northern Investments, and occasion'd their falling short of what was Usual.

18. We are sorry we are under a necessity of sending you so much brown Cloth, The Violent Rains that have lasted from the begining of October, to the middle of Decem^r. is the Reason of it. We beg leave to assure you nothing but an Absolute necessity will ever be the Occasion of it; And as the Dispatch of the Ships, a matter of much more Consequence depended on it, it was unavoidable. In Our Directions to the several Subordinates, We shall always Recommend to get as much of their Cloth Cured as possible, and shall Exert Ourselves in what lies under Our own Management.

19. We have not lately made any advances to the Merchants, the very low Price of Rupees rendering it Imprudent, by which the Ballances will be lessen'd Considerably by the Time we shall make Our new Contracts; when we shall Strictly insist upon their keeping up to the Sortments, which of late they have greatly Deviated from.

20. The uncertainty of Affairs at present render it impossible for Us to promise anything Concerning Our Investment this Year, more than that no pains shall be wanting on Our part to promote it.

FOURTHLY OF THE TRADE OF INDIA IN GENERAL, AND THEREIN ANY TRANSACTIONS WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

21. We have wrote Your Honour's very fully in Regard to the Affairs of the Government in Our Letter of the 24th. Ultimo, that we have very little to add.

22. The Fort of Punoomallee which is not Included in Our Phirmaund, was delivered to Us by the Killedar, but is not your Property; M^r. Prince &c^a. Council have thought it necessary to send a Detachment there under the Command of Lieutenant Campbell, and make some Small Repairs, which was a Prudent Step. We must observe to your Honours that the Districts of Punoomallee reach Twenty Miles from Madras, As do part of those of Trevendaparum, near that Distance from S^t. David.

23. The Expences attending Our Several Detachments have been but small, We have got Twenty five thousand (25000) Rupees of the King of Tanjour since October, and Sixteen thousand (16000) Rupees of Mahomud Ally, which he was Indebted on Acco^t. of a former Expedition. The greatest Frugality and Caution shall be observed in all Our Transactions with the Government.

24. We must humbly beg leave to Repeat that greatly Essential part of Our Letter of the 24th. Ultimo. That it is Our Opinion, the Success of your Affairs on this Coast depends entirely on a Force to Curb the French. We must acknowledge that had not Europeans interfered in these Affairs, but left them to Decide their own Quarrells, it might have been better for Trade, But as the French struck at the Ruin of your Settlem^{ts}. possess'd themselves of Several large Districts, planted their Colours on the very Edge of your Bounds and were endeavouring to Surround your Settlements in such a manner as to prevent either Provisions or Merchandize being brought Us; It was judged necessary to Endeavour to Frustrate their Designs, Should they Succeed, Our Situation would be very Indifferent in peaceable Times, and much worse should there be a Warr.

25. The Troubles in the Province with the Death of Nazar Jing, will be Represented in Different Lights at Court according to the Different Interests that prevail, We shall therefore to prevent any Consequences that might happen from a Misrepresentation of Our Conduct dispatch Letters with an Impartial Account of what has happen'd since the coming of Mustapha Jung & Chunda Saib.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS AND REVENUES.

26. M^r. Robins your Engineer writes you a particular Account of the several Repairs and Additions, He has thought necessary to the Fortifications. The excessive Rains have Occasion'd the Works to go on very slowly, they chiefly are Erecting Pallisadoes on the Covered Way. Compleating the Glacis, & digging a dry Ditch to the Southward of the Fort.

27. Not being Room in the Fort for Quartering the Officers, who are now Scattered about at the several Out Guards, it was Agreed to build Lodgings for them, which according to M^r. Robins Estimate will amount to One thousand Nine hundred & Eighty one (1981) Pagodas.

28. Our Sick have Suffered inconceivable hardships from the want of proper Accommodations, having at present no better than an old Ruinous Building at Cuddalore, where they have been exposed to the Severity of the Season, their Recovery by this means Rendered very Tedious, & possibly many may have Lost their Lives, an Affair of such Consequence we thought deserved Our serious Consideration, and were Unanimously of Opinion that it was of the utmost Importance that the Sick should be taken Care of. The Estimate of the Cost of an Hospital Capable of receiveing Two hundred Men amounts to Pagodas, Eight thousand, four hundred & ninety two (8492) which when put in Competition with so Usefull a Building we think a very necessary Expencc and have Ordered it to be set about as soon as the Season permits.

29. The Fort of Deve Cotah has suffered greatly by the Rains, we shall Direct it to be Surveyed and the necessary Repairs made.

30. The Warehouse Keeper has Represented to the Board the great Expencc in the Single Article of Godown Rent for Rice, with the Damage and Extraordinary Cooley amounting to Pagodas Three thousand five hundred (3500) ꝯ Annum; To which adding that for the Rest of your Wares & Stores, it would go a great way in Erecting proper Buildings for that Use, and though we are quite Convinced of the necessity of it, yet as we impatiently wait your Honours Determination whether this Place or Madras be the Head Settlement, We for the present decline it.

31. We beg leave to assure you that in all your Repairs and Buildings, Care shall be taken that the Materials are good, and the Money fairly laid out.

32. In our Letter of the 24th. Ultimo, your Hon^{rs}. were acquainted with Our having Received the Phirmaunds for Deve Cotah and Punoomalee. Upon observing the Collecting the Rents of Trevendaparum was attended with great Inconveniencies, and that only Pagodas Eight hundred & thirty One had been received since the Month of March, it was thought much better to Farm it; Sambasheva Reddee &c^{ts}. Renters offering Eight thousand Pagodas ꝯ Annum, which being Esteemed very Advantageous, it was accordingly let to them.

33. The Gentlemen at Madras Advising Us that the produce of St. Thomé &c^a. Villages, amounted to no more than Pagodas Two thousand One hundred and Six, twenty two Fanams, and fifty three Cash: (2106. 22. 53) the last year which upon Enquiry being far less than could have been expected, it was Agreed it would be more Advantageous to let this also, Subramony Moodelee and Linga Chittee offering to Farm it at four thousand Pagodas ꝯ Annum exclusive of Sea and Land Customs, which would make it very near Double, Their offer was accepted as a very good one, and We are of Opinion that waveing the large Difference between the Sums Collected for these two Districts, and what they now Let for, but Considering them as when Farm'd by the Moors; Our Agreement will be found greatly for Our Interest.

34. We have not yet been able to get an Exact Account of the number of Villages in the Punoomalee District, and their Annual Revenue but shall inform Ourselves as soon as possible, and as we are Convinced that in Collecting the Money must go through so many hands and be liable to so much Rougery that probably we should not get One half of the Value. We shall when we are well acquainted with its produce Lett this also.

35. The Consignees of Coral representing to Us that by the Troubles in the Country, best part of their Goods are on hand, and Requesting a further time for the payment of the Customs, which being really true, we have shewed them this Mark of your Indulgence.

36. Your Honours will please to observe a Decrease in Our Land Customs of Pagodas Seven hundred fifty four, nine fanams, & Sixty two Cash (754. 9. 62) and that the Sea Customs this Year are less than the former Pagodas Five thousand three hundred Eighty nine, twenty six fanams, & Seventy two Cash (5389. 26. 72). The reasons for which Occurr immediately, The great hardship the Merchant suffers in tedious Dispatches, which often occasion Loss of Passages (Instance) the Lisle and Success to the Bay, the Excessive Charge in Cooley hire, the want of proper Warehouses from whence Great Embezzlements, are severe Discouragements to Trade, and not here to be Remedied. Madras is Re-settled, where Convenient Warehouses, Quick Dispatch, and Easy Charges are so many Invitations to the Merchant. Though Rice is here at Eighty five Pagodas & Garce, and at Madras Sixty five, yet from the Advantage of being Dispatchd in Time to save the March Passage, there are now Fifty Vessells in that Road, and not five in this, which we humbly offer as a Strong Circumstance of Fort St. David, not being Calculated for a General Trade.

37. That no part of yo^r. Revenues might be Lost We have wrote the Gentlemen at Madras to Let the Farms for one year only, We did not think it for your Interest to grant them for five as was the Custom formerly, because should it be your pleasure to make that your Head Settlement, all Branches of your Revenues there will be greatly Enhanced, and Consequently as it is now a Subordinate, no One will give near their Value for them at present; They have wrote Us that no offers have been made, But we can with Confidence assure you that they will be very soon Farmed, and don't in the least doubt that when it is the Presidency they will produce to yo^r. full as much as before. The Indulgence in favour of the Merchant and Inhabitant upon the Re-establishment is the Reason that the Sea, and Land Customs did not amount this year to so much as formerly.

42. M^r. John Palmer having for some Y^{rs}. wrote in your Secretarys and Accomptants Offices, and behaved himself well, We take the Liberty to Recommend him to your Honours favour to be Employed as a Writer in your Service on this Establishment.

43. M^r. William Perceval in a Letter to the Board Requested to be taken into Council at Fort St. George, but as there was no Vacancy it could not be Granted, In Consequence of which we received a Second Letter, setting forth his Desire to lay down the Service, which was Complied with. We beg leave to observe to Your Honours M^r. Perceval's Station was at St. David, but in regard to the Advantages of Trade he was Indulged in Staying at Madras, and took Care of the Sea and Land Customs. The appointment of Council there was long before M^r. Perceval came from Bengal, and after his arrival from January to this Time, he never once before made Application for it, nor could he be taken into Council without turning out M^r. John Walsh, which would have been an Act of Injustice, as We by having Recourse to Records, don't find, though many Servants at Madras were often Superiour to some of the Council at St. David, a Single Instance of any One's being Removed on their Accounts. And we cannot help taking notice the

very Reasons Mr. Perceval makes use of "Nor can I for many Reasons remove to Fort St. David" will make him Decline the Service should this be the Subordinate, and he be Ordered here. In short such are the Conveniencies and Advantages at Fort St. George that if private Interest took place, We should have very few here to transact your Affairs.

44. Mr. Charles Boddam arrived here the 17th. Ultimo, on his Coming to the Board, he took the Usual Oath of Fidelity, and named for his Security's Abraham Hume, & Charles Boddam Esq^r. Consult. 17th. Janry.

45. Mr. John Andrews your Resident at Ganjam having Represented to Us the Oppressions he has suffered from the Government, who have Extorted from him upwards of Sixteen thousand Rupees, The Miserable State the Country is in, and the little probability of its being better, as it is Evident that Settlement has not Answered the End proposed but been a Continual Expence with very Trifling Investmⁿ. and as by the Death of Nazar Jing we quite despair of getting any Redress for Injuries already Suffered or Protection against Insult that probably may be offered, We are come to a Resolution to withdraw that Factory for the present, and have Ordered him to Collect in the Ballances and proceed with the Effects to Vizagapatam. In the Packet comes an Account of the Sums Extorted from Mr. Andrews which we must do him the Justice to say are not in the least owing to any Mismanagement in him. Ltres Reced. No. 7 & 14. Consult. 25th. Janry.

46. The Bombay Detachment being detained so long from home Contrary to the Agreement made with them, were Discontented and Continually Murmuring. As they are a Considerable Expence to Us, we have return'd the better part of them with their Officer Captain Thomas Andrews who has behaved himself very well. Consult. 25th. Janry.

47. On the Apprehensions that upon the late Revolution we might meet with some trouble, your Servants Voluntarily lent their Horses, which we formed into a small Troop. Consult 17th. Decem^r.

48. The Military Preferments since Our last, are—

Serjeant Trussler a well behaved & Gallant Man to an Ensign's Commission. Consult. 21st. Decem^r.

Lieutenant James Hocket of the Train of Artillery to a Cap^t. Lieutenancy, on the Recommendation of Mr. Robins and being Eldest Lieutenant.

Lieutenant John Hood to a Captain Lieutenancy at Fort Marlbro, in Order to put your Military there on the same Footing as they are here agreeable to your Regulations. He will proceed by the first Conveyance. Consult 23th. Decem^r.

49. We have not Men to Form a Company of Artillery at Fort St. George which is judged absolutely necessary, nor any for Vizagapatam, We Request you will please to send Us a hundred able Men for that purpose.

50. Mess^{rs}. Fowke and Greenhaugh Church Wardens of the Parish of St. Mary's Stepney have Requested we would Represent to your Honours that Mr. Samuel Harrison formerly in your Service is Indebted to the Church Stock Principal and Interest due the 30th. September 1750 Pagodas Two thousand three hundred and Twenty four, twenty Six fanams and thirty nine Cash (2324. 26. 39) which they humbly beg your Honours will please to Demaud for them. SEVENTHLY, ACCOUNTS.

51. We have received into your Cash Pagodas Five hundred and fifty, thirty Fanams, and twenty one Cash (550. 30. 21) Account the Estate of Mr. William Petch deceased. Consult. 29th. October.

52. The Reverend Mr. George Swynfen dying Intestate, his Effects were disposed of at Publick Outcry, and the Ballance of his Estate Pagodas four hundred & thirty One Eighteen fanams, and Twenty Eight Cash (431. 18. 28) paid into Cash.

53. We promised your Honours to Transmit you the Madras Books for 1746 Closed, but when We came to make the proper Adjustments, could not find any Books of the Subordinate Factories for five Years past, which Rendered it impracticable. We have Directed them to be sent Us with the Greatest Expedition, when they shall be Completed. At present we can only send them open, and hope you will not think this owing to any Remissness in Us.

54. The Vizagapatam and Ingeram Books did not arrive here till the 29th December, the Ganjam the 24th. and the Fort St. George the 20th. Ultimo; all too late to be inserted in Ours, and this is generally the Case. After the Dispatch of the Ships we shall Order the Accomptant to make the proper Adjustments with all the Settlements, and will upon no Account, admit of any excuse.

55. Agreeable to what wrote you by the Fort St. George, We appointed Mess^{rs}. Starke, Boddom, Powney, Westcott and Wynch as a Committee for Inspecting Accounts and should have been glad to have transmitted you their Report by this Ship; But in a Letter to the Board as Entered after Consultation of the 4th. Instant, they Represent to Us the necessity of a much longer time as the Accounts are Various and of some years standing. When finish'd we shall have due Regard to what your Honours wrote Us on this Subject.

56. By Our Accomptants Annual Report, it appears the Expences are very Considerably Less than they were before. In the Month of November we turn'd Out Two hundred and fifty Peons, and One hundred and twenty Lascar[s] and were Resolved upon a General Reduction, when the sad Accident of the Death of Nazar Jing gave a quite different turn to Affairs, and has probably Involv'd the Province in lasting troubles. At such a Time the greatest Circumspection for the Security of your Effects is Required; and what at a proper Season might be call'd Frugality, would now certainly be Term'd, Imprudence. It is some pleasure to Us, and We hope will be Satisfactory to your Honours that we have not at this Juncture put you to any Additional Expence.

EIGHTHLY, CONCERNING THE WEST COAST.

57. The Last Letter we received from thence was dated the 19th. June. The Country was then in Peace, and a Prospect of a fine Investment, But the Suffolk not being arriv'd their Cash was so low as to oblige them to Reduce their Military to half Pay. 59. Having Directed the Swallow to be Returnd immediately, We are in hourly Expectation of Advices from thence.

61. We were in hopes not to have troubled You with any more French Correspondence, but a few days past Monsieur Dupliex &c^e. Council, Address'd Us enclosing Copys of two Letters, the one said to be wrote by M^r. Goodere than Resident at Ingeram, the other by M^r. Dalton a Captain in your Service here. As to the purport of the former it had been Replied to many Months past. We don't find M^r. Goodere has Interfered in regard to them and beleive the Letter very wrongly Translated. That of Captain Dalton was to One Kane a Deserter from hence, who had the assurance to request he would Use his Interest to get his Discharge. It is not of Consequence enough to dwell on, and could not have been taken notice of, but by such who were Determined to Wrangle.

62. Our Letter of the 24th. Ultimo will inform your Honours of the General Occurrences in Regard to them. They are Endeavouring to Establish themselves in the most Convenient Places on the Coast and laying a Foundation for a very advantageous Trade without the least Regard to their Neighbours. As far as may Concern or prejudice your Interest we shall Use Our utmost Endeavours to Obstruct.

63. A Ship is expected from Mahie with three hundred Europeans, and they give out two Thousand more will Embarque on their Expected Shipping.

GENERAL LETTER TO THE COMPANY, DATED FEBRUARY 24, 1751.

[*Public Despatches to England, vol. 18, pp. 84-88.*]

TO THE HONOURABLE THE COURT OF DIRECTORS
 FOR AFFAIRS OF THE HONOURABLE THE UNITED COMPANY
 OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES.

HONOURABLE

1. We now Dispatch the Norfolk to your Honours, with her full Tonnage, she arrived here from Bengal the 7th. Instant. By her you will receive Duplicate of Our Advices & Severn, who Sail'd the 8th.
2. The Swallow proceeded to the Bay the 10th. Instant, M^r. Robins took his Passage on her, he purposes Returning here in April, M^r. Charles Hopkins likewise Embark'd for Metchlipatam, and Diu Island.
3. In the Packet comes an Address, which by a Letter from Anjengo of the 22^d. Ultimo we were desired to forward you.
4. The London and True Briton Sail'd from Tellicherry the 9th. Ultimo, the Lord Anson and Bombay Grab are waiting there as a Convoy.
5. We must Request you will send us a larger Supply of Medicines, as the number of Our Sick in the Hospitals are many more than formerly.
6. The Warehouse Keeper representing to the Board that a small Quantity of Pepper remaining in the Warehouse was Damaged. As that Article was in great Demand it was Ordered to be put up at Outcry & produced Pagodas 722-19-9 or Pagodas 54-21-48 & Candy.
7. We have now remaining on hand about six hundred Bales, which will be Cured in time to Return the Swallow to you the Latter End of May.

8. By the returning Conveyances to Vizagapatam and Ingeram, we have Supplied those Factorys wth. Rupees Ninety six thousand and Pagodas Ten thousand, & shall shortly send a further Supply of Pagodas. This we hope will enable them to go on vigorously with their Investment and should Affairs take a favourable turn in this Province the Merchants promise largely.

9. We have acquainted your Honour's with the late Revolutions by the Death of Nazar Jing and the Steps we had taken, induced thereto from the best Judgment we could then make, by what we could Learn from the Camp before Pondicherry; Though this Treachery was agreeable to the Disaffected Party in Nazars Jings Camp who had been bribed by the French, yet when it was perceived a French Settlement was become the Metropolis of the Province, every thing was Governed by their Councils, The Treasure and Jewells mostly Possessed by them, and several large Districts were to be Granted, it occasion'd a great Discontent and Murmuring and it was whispered that as soon as Mustapha Jing should have pass'd the Bounds of this Province it would break out into a Flame, Sensible of this He Engaged a French Escort and had March'd as far as Rachooty a Country under the Government of the Cuddapah Nabob about five days distant from Arcot, when We Learn from Our Vackeel at Arcot that the Cuddapah & Cundanore Nabobs first shewed their Resentment, Mustapha Jing having contrary to his promise March'd through their Country, by which means it became Subject to the plunder of the Morattas. They Seiz'd some French Horse and stoped their Ammunition which brought on a General Engagement, wherein Mustapha Jing and part of the French were Kill'd on one Side, and on the other the Cundanore & Servanah Nabobs lost their Lives; Nizam Ally Cawn, Nazar Zings Brother was proclaim'd, He is by Slow Marches proceeding to Golcondah. 'Tis said the Friends of the Cudapah and Condanore Nabobs are raising Forces to oppose him. What Effect this may have on the Arcot Province We cannot say, Nizam Ally Cawn is a Youth of Eighteen Years, several of the French Party are near him and whether to Extirpate the whole Family of Nazam would not be acceptable at Court, is a matter of Speculation. Mahomud Ally Cawn is safe at Trechenopoly, who we have advised to push his Interest at Court, and Raise Troops to Oppose his Enemies.

10. It is a Satisfaction to Us to observe to Your Honours that the Measures we have pursued have at least prevented the Province from falling entirely under French Councils, and was it in the Power of the Country Government to Settle their own Affairs, we might now hope to see the Country once more in a flourishing Condition, but this is not to be Effected; 'tis with Concern that with the greatest Confidence we can assure you, the French Plan is to Seize what part of the Province they find necessary to their Interest without the least regard to the Laws of Nations. The late Action has no doubt given a Check to their Schemes, but they are still Resolved to Support Chunda Saib in his Pretensions to the Arcot Government, and will probably Insist on the Places Granted them by Mustapha Jing, which will be the Occasion of further Troubles We can only beg leave to Refer your Honours to Our Request on this Subject.

11. Our Officer on Command at Tanjore writes that One of Our Colours had been taken down, & that upon Demanding the Reason, the Reply of the French was that it was done by the Country People.

12. By the Master of a Vessell from Metchlipatam, We are inform'd the French have turn'd your Factory into an Hospital for their Sick.

13. We hear they have hoisted their Colours at Narsipore a Fort near Your Settlement at Madapollam and its Reported they pretend to an exclusive Right to the River, which must be of great prejudice to your Affairs there.

14. After the Death of Nazar Jing on the Strength of a Grant from Mustapha Jing they Planted their Colours just at the Limits of your Bounds.

15. As the above are at present and may be of greater inconvenience to your Affairs, we thought it Our Duty to take notice of them; We have therefore Protested against M^r. Dupliex and his Council and Demanded a Suitable Satisfaction.

16. Agreeable to what advised your Honours ¶ Severn, we wrote the Gentlemen at Madras to make enquiry of the worth of your Farms, that they might be Lett but receiveing no Satisfactory Answer, we have accordingly Lett the Under-mention'd for One Year.

17. By the Success Galley we Complied with the West Coast Indent, as far as was in Our Power, and by a future Conveyance shall Supply them for the Rice-Indented for.

18. On the 3^d Instant M^r. Thomas Eyre one of your late Council at Fort S^t. George died there.

19. Agreeable to your Orders now go in the Packett by this Ship, Translates of the Several Phirm^{ds}, at Fort S^t. George and this Place. Many that were at Fort S^t. George when the Town was taken being Missing, a List of them is Annex'd to the Translates of those remaining there.

20. In the Salt-Petre by the Norfolk from Bengal, there is a deficiency of Eight Candys, two Maunds fifteen Pounds and a half; Our Warehouse keeper demanding of Capt. Hancock to make good the same, He Requested it might be referred to you, as he apprehended the greater part was yet on board his Ship; The bags it was sent in from Bengal, being so bad that it was impossible to stow them away without their breaking.

21. We have not heard any thing further of his Majestys Ships since Our last Advices, The Danes Ship from Europe arrived at Tranquebar a few days ago.

22. On this Ship three of Our Military who have served Out their Contracted Time's and are Incapable of Duty, are sent home as Charterparty Passengers.

23. A French Ship Sail'd from Pondicherry for Europe a few Days ago. with three hundred & ten Bales of Calicoes Sixty Tonns of Pepper and twenty of Redwood.

24. The amount of this Ship's Invoice is Pagodas, Sixty nine thousand nine hundred & sixty, twenty six fanams & forty three Cash, (69960. 26. 43) and of the Register of Diamonds & Precious stones Licenced by her, Pagodas, One hundred & three thousand, eight hundred & forty eight, Ten fanams & Eight cash 103848. 10. 8).
