Diary and Consultation Book of Richard Bourcheir Esq. Chief &c. Factors for Affairs of the United English East India Company at Anjengo, Agreeable to the Establish mt. approved by the Honble William Wake Esqr. President & Gov. of Bombay &c. Council.

The Chief having recd advice the King is on the road to the Northward ordered the Garrison to be all under Arms & the Linguister to repair to Boccalay to wait his Majesty's Arrival with Instructions to request that his Majesty will Advice of inform us why the Honble Company's Pepper Trade is impeded & to represent passing Our several Grievances to him (of all which the Linguister is well apprized, & of to the which we have so often complain'd without any redress.

He (Mr. Peers) may refund this money again.

That he had met his Majesty at Boccalay & told him that he was ordered to ask him why the Honble Companys Pepper Trade was stoped to which he replied that the English had not Effection [sic] for him & his Gover[n]ment as formerly as they wou'd not supply him with Arms & Warlike Stores as they had formerly done, that he is now in great want of money & desired that we would advance him 8000 fanams on Account of the Annual Present. That the Conference was broke up by a hard shower of rain which obliged them to seperate after which he cou'd not see his Majesty.

The Chief laid an Ola before the board which he had reced this morning from the King in which he desired that we will send by the Bearers (who waited for an Answer) Ten yards of Scarlet broad Cloth a ps. of Crimson Velvet & Eight thousand (8000) fanams & to charge it to the Account of the annual Present. This Ola being taken into Consideration we think it proper to send his Majesty the following Answer.

That it is with great Concern that we find ourselves under a necessity of refusing any thing that his Majesty requests. The broad Cloth he wants we are ready & willing to supply him with as we wou'd with Velvet if we had any; But as to advancing any money on Account the Annual Present, We have before informed his Majesty that we dare not do it without the Permission of our Superiors those Presents being founded on priviledges formerly granted to the Honble Company by his Majestys Predecessors & confirmed by him and as the Honble Company have been debarred their Pepper Trade for above two years, we hope that his Majesty will Excuse our not paying any money on that Account till we are authorized from the Presidency for so doing, or that the Honble Companys Trade goes on with its usual Currency.

Letter from Tellicherry 15 Arrived a Pattamar from Tellicherry with a General Letter of the 2^d. Instant acknowledging receipt of Ours of the 18 May by the Serjeant who conducted the 30,000 Rupees down here.

They inform us that they have advised the Presidency about the deficiency in the Rice sent us to prevent Censure to either Factory, they being persuaded it happend from pillferage after it was Shipped off there, they seem to have a much better opinion of their black Servants than we have & we can't help thinking that Mangulore Rice must loose by every removal as the Package is so loose not that we had any design of Troubling the Presidency about it & we have too good an opinion of the Master of the Sloop to beleive that he permitted any to be stole[n] on board the Sloop.

They also sent us Mr. Douglass's Answer to their board about the 200 small Arms sents us P Ship Elizabeth 100, of which they insist were new ones & that they reced them as such from Bombay the other 100 were servicable Arms which many of them seemed not to be.

They say that they have not been able yet to procure any satisfaction for the Anjengo Sloop & her Cargoe the Sammorine, pretending a right to all wrecks in his Country notwithstanding this Vessell was lost intirely by the villany & Treachery of his Subjects. If they shou'd recover any thing they will bring it to the Credit of this Factory, but do not think themselves obliged to give this Factory Credit for any more of that Invoice than they receive.

Reced an Account Cost & Charges of the 1800 Bales of Rice for the use of this Garrison. reced also the Pay Mr. Account of Charges remitting the 30,000 Rupees.

The Chief reced an Ola from Gristna Annavy & the Dollova in which they An Ola say that they have talked with the King about the Honble Companys Affairs and Christna that he is willing to lett the Honble Company have some Pepper, but at a more Annay advanced Price than formerly & desire that the Linguister may be sent to them Dollova to Mavillaicare with our resolutions.

RETURNED an Answer to Gristna Annavy & Dollova's Ola desiring that they will let us know what Price they Expect for the Pepper that we may be able to form a resolution to send up by the Linguister who should be dispatched as soon as we had received their Answer. That the sending him sooner wou'd be of no use as he coud not make any Agreement on the Honble Companys Account without Permission from the board which we cou'd not give him till we knew their demand which we request may be sent as soon as Possible.

Reced an Ola from Gristna Annavy advising that he had shewn the Ola from Chiefs Ola to the King who said that he shoud return in a Short time to the South Annavy ward when he shoud stay a couple of days at Attinga when he wou'd settle the Pepper Affair, which cou'd well be done by writing backward & forward.

The Annavy says that they are now Encamped near the King of Teckengoor & that he will soon lett the Chief know the Event.

Reced advice that the King of Travencore has entered the King of Teckengoor's Country & taken two of the largest Towns in the Kingdom.

Being about the time that we may reasonably Expect some Pattamar Boat at Advices Tellicherry from the Presidency, We think it our Duty to inform the Honble the President & Council, what scituation the Honble Companys Affairs are in at forth the Council of the Council Present. present here. AGREED that a General Letter be wrote to the Governor & Council present State of setting forth the True State of Affairs here at Present not having received one of Affairs here. 1749-50-2

their Commands since a Letter dated the 15 April last. First that Our Cloth Investment goes on Tollerably well the King not having molested us in that Branch of the Honble Companys Trade.

Next as to the Honble Companys priviledges of a Pepper Trade that the King of Travencore has intirely abolished them, & that it is our humble Opinion that we must come to some new Treaty with this Prince for the Honble Companys Pepper Trade in future, but before any step of that nature is taken it is absolutely necessary that this Garrison be well reinforced with men & Officers not with any view of coming to a rupture with the King but we think it will be the most Effectual method of preventing one, as also any insults from either the King or his Ministers.

That We requeste we may have Explicit Orders what we are to insist on & what to weed from as his Majesty has lately demanded the Annual Present to the Queen of Attinga which thô She has consented to it's being paid him we cou'd not Acquiesce in as the Honble Company do not enjoy any of those valuable priviledges were founded on. His Majesty also demanding large annual Supplys of warlike Stores We request instructions on that head as the King is determined to be the Pepper Merchant having Engrossed all the Pepper, what Quantity we are to insist on annually & at what Price the Dutch giving him at Present Rupees 831—which will make Our Candy amount to [lacuna] Rupees besides the Customs which we shou'd be glad to know wither we must allow. Likewise whether we must insist on the Honble Company's Antient Priviledges of seizing all the Pepper we find afloat, as his Majesty's Dominions are near ten times [as big as] the Queens were when she made that Grant to the Honble Company. Also if we come to any Contract with the King whether we must advance him any money or insist on paying for the Pepper when it is delivered.

Letter to Tellichery. A Letter to the above Purport being Transcribed fair & Signed was dispatched to Tellicherry with a General Letter to the Chief & Factors there in Answer to theirs of the 2^d. Ultimo in which we inform them that we had no view in what we wrote them about the deficiency in the Rice but the hopes of some Satisfaction to the Honble Company from the providers of that Rice & as that was not procurable as they insist that it must be lost on the Cuddalore Sloop we shall not Trouble ourselves further about it. As to the small arms when they are returned (which shall be done by the first Opportunity) they will see whether they be servicable or no. Desire that they will send us by the first Conveyance Broad Cloth ordinary red [lacuna] Yards & Blue Perpets [lacuna] Yards.

Ola from Christna Annavy & the Dollova Reced an Ola from Gristna Annavy & the Dollova advising that they had talked with the King about the Subject of the Chiefs Ola of the 5 Instant & that his Majesty had ordered them to inform the Chief that the Price the Dutch gave him at present was rs. 83. 1. 50 Putch Candy & four Rajas which is (2rs.) Candy Customs & that no body cant [sic] Expect that he can part with it for less.

Answer thereto Sent an Ola to Gristna Annavy & the Dollova acknowledging receipt of theirs this day & Observe the Dutch have raised the Price of Pepper to a most Extravagant Price indeed which [s] ome particular necessity may have obliged them to. but this Price can never last nor can his Majesty suppose that they will take of all his Pepper at the same rate. Another Consideration why the Dutch have raised the price is on his Majestys giving up the privilidges of the Passports to carry Pepper to the Cormondell Coast which annually brought his Majesty 6000 Rajas. We have no such Consideration had they talked of four or even five Rupees advance at this juncture, We cou'd have given them some Answer but can say

nothing to this extravagant Demand so hope they will think more reasonably that We may advise Our Superiors in time as this is abolishing all the Honble Companys Antient Priviledges.

Some of the Pepper Merchants arrived having the Kings orders to settle their Accounts which most of them had done before.

Arrived a Pattamar from Fort St. David with a General Letter from ye. Governor & Council there advising that on the 21st. Ultimo the French evacuated Letter Fort St. George & General Boscawen had made his Entry & hoisted the English St. David. Flagg there they also advise that they had forward'd Our Packett for Bombay. That Our Honble Masters Ship Stafford had been putt by their Port by strong Westerly winds She had Touched at Vizagapatam & proceeded to Bengall.

Richard Bourcheir is appointed to succeed the Honble William Wake Esq^r. in the Chair of Bombay and that a Conveyance will be sent for him at the Proper season They are also pleased to order that what Pepper & Cloth we have ready in Wareh. be laden upon Ships NewCastle & Dragon & dispatched for Tellicherry without Loss of time consigned to the Chief & Factors there with a Calculate of their Tonnage.

We also reced his Majesty's Proclamation of Peace with France & Spain with orders to publish it.

Abstracts thereof. In respect to the Honble Companys Priviledges in the King of Travencores Dominions they do not think it prudent to sollicit a renueal of them for the reasons we gave the 22^d. December last but to insist in the most Strenuous terms on the Honble Companys Antient Priviledges being Complied with remonstrating to his Majesty the Injurious Part he Acts in depriving them of the Pepper Trade, and we may Acquaint him that we will spare him 200 small Arms if we judge it will be of any Service.

They recommend to use Our best Endeavours to gett in the Cloth Contract in Time and to encrease it if Possible & order that we inform the Chief & Fractors at Tellicherry what Cloth & Pepper we shall have in the Warehouse in all December that they may send a Ship to take it in, but if any of the Honble Companys Ships call here (bound to Tellicherry) to put what Goods we have ready on board them.

____ NOVEMBER 1749 ----

That as the Queen of Attinga consented to our making the King of Travencore her annual Present we may pay it him. But that it be our best Care to keep up the Honble Companys Pretentions to the old Agreement let what King or Queen prevail.

If any Contract is made with the King of Travencore for Pepper no money to be advanced but to agree to pay for the Pepper when reced paying him the Customs. And to take Care to seize any Pepper he may Endeavour to Export Permitted to Charge the money Mr. Peers was robbed of, to the Honble Companys Account, but this to be no precedent.

They have no Servant high enough in the service to releive M^r. Fowke & that there is no Limited time for servants to stay at the Settlements where stationed. That we ought to have returned an Answer to the President & Council of Fort S^t. David thô, we had no Pepper.

That as the Anjengo Sloop belonged to this Factory & the Goods consigned on her to Tellicherry where [sic] lost on her it will be irregular for them to give Credit for Goods they never received.

They send us two blank Covenants. One for the Chief to Execute as second of the Presidency & the other for Mr. Fowke as Junior Merchant who with Mr. Pattle are to give Security in England for the faithfull discharge of their Duty according to the Honble Companys Orders reced \$\mathbb{B}\$ Ship Boscawen as \$\mathbb{C}\$ Copy of said Orders Also Mr. George Bourcheir's Covenants to be Executed & all three to be returned

They have ordered the Chief & Factors to continue supplying this Factory with Treasure as we have occasion, for it.

On the 27th. September imported at Bombay our Honble Masters Ship Stafford from Great Britain as did the Salisbury the 17th. October.

Imported Ship Dragon from Persia & Bombay Captain John Jennicor bound for Bombay.

The General Letter from the President & Council being read resolved to Letter to send an immediate Answer to the following Purport That having made innumerable remonstrances to the King of Travencore on his abolishing the Honble Companys Antient priviledges in this Kingdom & all without Success but as it is their pleasure that we continue to remonstrate, their Orders shall be obeyed thô we see no room for any hopes of succeeding with an Arbitrary Prince who has overrun his Neighbours & Engrossed all the Pepper into his own hands.

That he has not mentioned either small Arms or warlike Stores for some time past but probably may shou'd we be near closing any Pepper Contract with him.

That our Utmost endeavours have been used to augment our Cloth Investm^t, but find it impracticable that we have upwards of 17000 Ps. of Cloth Collected but fear the whole Quantity ordered & Contracted for will hardly be ready in time as these People have never yet complied with the Quantity Contracted for.

What Cloth was ready Packed being 48 Bales was Shipped on the Honble Companys Ship Duke of New Castle which Ship arrived the 2^d. & sailed the 5th

Instant & their Honours Orders shall be punctually Obeyed in loading what Cloth is ready on any of the Honble Companys Ships which touch here sending the Invoice & Calculate of Tonnage to the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry & shall advise them what Quantity of Goods we may Expect to be ready in all December.

That when the King Makes any fresh demand for the Queen of Attinga's Annual Present it shall be delivered him.

That we will be sure not to advance any money to the King on any Pepper Contract but agree to pay for it as it is reced, & shall endeavour to seize any Pepper we find afloat, but as before advised, Expect it will cause an immediate rupture with the Government.

That on a Cooleness between the Dutch & the King we had embraced that Opportunity to try if we cou'd gett any Pepper of him on reasonable Terms on which he offered to let us have a Quantity at 75 Rupees # Eddova Candy which being seriously Considered & knowing the large Tonnage the Honble Company have abroad on heavy Demoorage [sic] & that both Bencoolen & Tellicherry all fall short we thought it wou'd be a meritorious Piece of service to Our Honble Masters to procure a Quantity if to be Efected on any reasonable Terms, which had induced us to venture to offer him the Price limited for Tellicherry vizt. 70 rs. # Tellicherry Candy which he wou'd not accept but had fallen to 721 # Eddova Candy & we beleive we can still have it at that Price from 1500 to 2000 Candys which is but 75 for the Tellicherry Candy, and if his Honour &ca. aprove of that Price they will please to advise in time for this dispatch.

Requested that the President & Council will please to send us some Qualified Person to take Charge of Mr. Fowks post, he disireing us to inform the Honble Board that he intends to lay down the Honble Companys service & to quit this place by the first Conveyance.

That as the board thinks proper that the Anjengo Sloop & Cargo shall be wrote off our Books.

Mr. Richard Bourcheirs Covenants being Executed & Mr. George Bourchier the same are returned & Mr. Pattle will write to his friends in England to give in the required Security.

That we shall apply to Tellicherry for what Treasure is wanted for the use of this Factory.

The above Letter being Transcribed fair was signed & the Secretary Ordered to make up the Packett. The two Tellicherry Letters of the 2d. & 10th. Instant being both Answered

& Transcribed fair the Secretary was ordered to make up the Packett and dispatch the Toney.

It being Currently reported that the French are coming to settle and build a Fort at Coletchee the Chief wrote an Ola to the King of Travencore representing to him how unjust it would be in him to suffer them to settle in this Kingdom where the Honble English East India Company had Exclusive priviledges settled for so long a series of Years.

The Chief reced an Answer from the King in which he absolutely denvs that he knows anything of the French coming to attempt making any Settlement in his Country.

Reced an ola from the Dollova full of Evasions to delay paying of the Pepper Ballances and as the King had given two possitive Orders for those Ballances being paid the Chief wrote an ola to His Majesty representing the Scandulous

usage the Honble Company met with from the Dollova in detaining those Ballances Chief at a time when the Honble Comp^y, are in want of the Pepper for the dispatch the King of their Ships.

Reced advice that a large French Munchua & some Toneys are arrived at A French Munchua Coletchee with some Military & stores.

This day the Chief received an Ola from the King informing him of the arrival of some French Vessells at Coletchee which he supposes must be come to demand a Debt which he had Contracted with Monsiur La Bourdanais for some arms &ca. that he knows not whether they came from the Northward or Southward, & if they are not come to demand the Debt to La Bourdanais he is ignorant of their Errand.

Imported his Majestys Ship Syren of 20 Gunns Captain William Mantell from Fort St. David for Bombay to clean & refitt.

He also says that being at his Devotion at one of his Pagodas, he has not yet had Leisure to receive the French Officer but as soon as he knows their Errand he will inform the Chief.

Instant requesting the favour to be informed in what manner he was to understand them & represent them to the Honble Company as the first desiring they says that his Majesty now repeated his order to the Dollova to deliver in the may b Pepper for those Ballances & the Second mentions settling Accounts when the Dollova & Gristna Annavy meet. These Contradictions are so unlike the Proceedings of a King that he desires that he may have a Possitive Answer that he may know how to act in regard to the Ship which is Expected to come for said Pepper & without which she must go home dead freighted.

La Bourdanais he was ready to pay it.

But this we know is not the Truth for the French demanded Liberty to build a Fort & had actually marked out the Ground with large Stones where they proposed building & insisted on the Kings promise of a Grant, but his Majesty was much disgusted at their marking out the Ground, without his Permission & told them that he never made any Promise but what was made to La Bourdounais which was Conditionally, that if they assisted him with their Ships against Quilone he being then at Warr with the Dutch that he wou'd give them a Peice of Ground at Coletchee to build a Fort on. But by their non Compliance with their Supply of Shipping his promise was also void.

He told the Linguister also that he beleived he cou'd influence the King to lett the Honble Company have Pepper at 72 Rupees \$\mathbb{P}\$ Eddova Candy if we wou'd agree to it but that He had no authority to make this offer & desired that the Chief wou'd send him an Answer.

The Chief sent him for answer that he had Exceeded any Authority he had in the offer we have already made of 70 Rupees for the Tellicherry Candy & till we receive Answers from the Presidency we cant say any thing further.

He then proceeds to say that his offer of letting the Honble Company have Pepper at 72 Rupees \$\mathbb{T}\$ Candy was only of his own head, & not by any Authority from the King as he then told the Linguister but to this offer the Chief did not Consent to.

Ordered that a Translate of his Ola be entered after this Consultation.

This Ola being duely Considered also the pressing Necessity we are under for Tonnage not having both at this Factory & Tellicherry by near fifty Tonns to fill up the Dragon & Duke of Newcastle & the General Letter of the 19th. Ultimo ordering us to Contract at 72 Rupees & Candy (the price the king had offered it at) for 2000 Candy or as large a part of it as we can possibly on the most reasonable Terms. We think it is our Duty to secure what is to be gott even on the Kings Terms & that no time may be lost in writing backward & forward nor the King have an opportunity of selling any more Pepper to the Dutch they having lately taken 500 Candy at Cape Commarine at 89 Rupees & Candy. Resolved to send the Linguister to the King empowering him to Contract on the following Terms

Linguist sent to the King.

With Instructions to make a pepper Contrat.

That he Contract for 2000 Candy of old Pepper Eddova weight on as reasona able Terms as he can, not Exceeding 75 Rupees & Candy, To be delivered in forty days, & in Case the Pepper is not delivered in time for the dispatch of the Europe Ships that we will not be obliged to take it. As to the Annual Present to the Queen of Attinga we Contract to deliver it to his Majesty.

As to small Arms we are willing to let his Majesty have what we can spare which is about 200 at Present he paying ready money for them but as this is not a Commodity the Honble Company Trade in we cannot oblige Our Selves to deliver his Majesty any Quantity hereafter. Shou'd they not be able to deliver the above Quantity of old Pepper, he may Consent to take some new, & he may tell his Majesty that whenever it suits his Conveyances [sic] the Chief is ready to receive him.

Translate of an Ola from Gristna Annavy reced January the 5th. 1749-50 in Answer to one sent him by the Chief dated December 29th. vizt.

I have reced Your Ola & Observe that by Your Bombay Letters you Expect Christna Your Ships to arrive in a few days to carry You away & that before Your departure Anavy his You desire to see the Honble Companys Business go on with it's usual Currency & desire to have an Interview with his Majesty & that you will give 72 Rupees Candy for Pepper the Price it was offered at.

I have informed his Majesty of the Purport of the above Ola to which he replys. That while I was selling Pepper to the Dutch at 85 Rupees P Candy I offered it to the Honble English East India Company at 75 Rupees P Candy to lett them have it ten Rupees less in a Candy than the Dutch which they did not then Consent to. which has occasioned this delay & now if the Commodore will give me the same Price of 75 Rupees I can lett him have Pepper on receiving the annual Present & letting me have some small Arms for which I will pay ready money & I will meet the Commodre & take leave of him. These are his Majestys Orders. The Price of 72 Rupees for the Pepper which I ordered the Linguister to offer the Chief was not by the King's Orders but of my own head & so I wrote the Chief & told the Linguister but this the Chief did not Consent to. If the Chief will not agree to what his Majesty offers above I will use my Endeavours to accommodate every thing in the best manner. The reason I did not send an Answer sooner was our being very buisy [sic].

Reced an Ola from Domingo Rodriguez the Linguister advising that he had Letter from had an Interview [sic] with Gristna Annavy & after a long Conference & several ye. Linguist,

Magnager [sic] from the King his Angelog was that they would tall the Harble relate to his Messuages [sic] from the King, his Answer was that they wou'd tell the Honble proces Company have 500 Candy of Pepper at 75 Rupees P Candy but insisted on the Limit of two months to deliver in that they demanded the annual present & a supply of small Arms.

The Chief immediately dispatched an Answer to the Linguister ordering him Further to remonstrate to the King & his Ministers the great injustice of this proceeding Instructions to him from when they had so often requested that we wou'd Purchase the Kings Pepper & the Chief that when we had Consented to take it at the Price they themselves had offered it, they now not only raised the Price but wanted to put us off with so inconsiderable a Quantity as 500 Candy that the writing backward & forward was only delaying of time so requested that the Annavy will come here where we coud come to some Conclusion & ordered him likewise if he found the Annavy was the acting man & cou'd be of any real use in making the Contract to offer him one or two thousand fanams if he cou'd bring it to a speedy Conclusion.

Wrote the Annavy an Ola at the same time shewing him the unreasonableness Ola to of their proceedings & how unfairly they had used the Honble Company & request-Annavy. ed that he wou'd come here & settle this affair if he wou'd not do it with the Linguister.

ARRIVED a Boat from Tellicherry with a General Letter from the President & Council; Ship Stafford which Ship with the Bombay Grabb arrived Tellicherry the 17 instant with Thomas Dorrill Esqr. Chief of that Place from whence they are to proceed to this Port with Thomas Byfeld Esqr. who is appointed to releive Richard Bourcheir Esqr. & it is Earnestly recommended to us to give those Ships as quick a Dispatch as Possible.

Mr. John Robinson is ordered for this Settlement & to take his Seat at the board according to his standing & Mr. Francis Fowke to return to the Presidency by these Ships. They say that hope we have Contracted with the King for the Quantity of Pepper we mentioned in Ours of the 16th. November agreeable to their Orders of the 19th. Ultimo.

They have sent us sundry Stores & Stafford amounting as & Invoice & Bill of Lading Enclosed to Rupees 6218. 3. 56. Captain Rodricke Forbes is ordered up to Bombay Lieutenant Wardman being Ordered from Tellicherry to command the Military here. The Gunner & his Assistants are ordered their Usual Pay here. We are Ordered to apply to Tellicherry for what Treasure we may want. Two hundred small Arms are sent which may be spared to the King if necessary he first Paying for them.

DITTO DIE Chief meets the King at Canniara,

This morning the Carricar & Dollova sent the Chief an Ola advising him that the King of Travencore wou'd be at Canniarra at two O'Clock & desired that the Chief wou'd meet him there on which he & Mr. Fowke immediately set out, but his Majesty did not arrive there till 9 at Night when we had a Conference of two hours with his Majesty, Gristna Annavy the Dollova & the Carricar.

---- JANUARY 1749-50 --

We represented to his Majesty the great injustice done the Honble Company His Confein being debarred their Pepper Trade for these two Years past & the many inhim, conveniencies we have laboured under. To which his Majesty replied that he wants nothing but to be supplied with Warlike Stores to defend his Country against his Enemies especially the Dutch who he is very apprehensive will join his Enemies & that if the Honble English Company wou'd but supply him with Warlike Stores he wou'd lett them have as much Pepper as he can Collect in his Dominions, Except what he is obliged to deliver to the Dutch. The King amongst other things demanded Cannon, the Chief told him that he cannot be supplied with them as it is Contrary to the Honble Companys possitive Orders but as we are at Present in great want of Tonnage to dispatch the Honble Companys Ships which had induced us to raise the Price of Pepper so Exorbitantly if his Majesty wou'd Exert himself in giving us a supply of 1500 or 2000 Candy of Pepper it wou'd enable the Chief to plead in his behalf for some Stores on which he gave his Royall word that we shall have all that he can Collect but he cannot assertain the Quantity till the Dollova has been to the Northward where he wou'd go in a few days. His Majesty also gave us all the Assurances imaginable of His Attatchment to the Honble Companys Interest but insisted greatly on a supply of old Iron Kintledge to cast into Shott.

On the Chiefs asking him about the French Pretentions to a Settlement at Coletchee he assured us that he was under no Obligations to them, but those formerly made with Monsr. La Bourdounoise & as they had not Complied on their part which was to have sent a Squadron of Ships to Attack the Dutch at Quilone the Contract was void. That they had demanded Liberty to build a Fort at Coletchee which he had absolutely refused unless they wou'd enter into an offensive alliance with him to assist him against the Dutch Enemies either Europeans or Indians which they wou'd not consent to but he was informed by his own French Captain that the French threatned to be revenged of him & that their Nation was not to be affronted.

When we parted he repeated his assurances of giving us all the Pepper that can be Collected & that he desired nothing more than to have a good Understanding with the Honble Company but hope & Expect that we will supply him with some Warlike Stores of which he wou'd send the Chief a List to be laid before the board at Bombay.

Begun to load Bales on board the Duke of New Castle as fast as they can stow them away. Some Pepper came in from Cheringa but none being yet come in at Eddova notwithstanding the Dollova gave a possitive Order for a hundred Candy being immediately brought from Paru & the Chief wrote to the Dollova to know the meaning of this delay.

SAILED Our Honble Masters Ship Duke of New Castle Captain Francis Fowler Commander.

from Tellicherry.

This Evening we return'd the Tellicherry Pinget with 318 Gunny Baggs reced from Captain Francis Fowler belonging to that Settlement writing a short Letter to the Chief & Factors advising thereof & requesting a supply of one ps. of fine Scarlet, & one Piece of ordinary red Broad Cloth, which we are in want of towards compleating the annual Present.

SATURDAY 27

By a Pattamar from Fort St. David reced a General Letter from the Honble the President & Council there dated the 8th. Instant acquainting us Our Honble Masters Ship Chesterfield was dispatched from thence for Europe the 12th. October near loaded And the Royal George about Eighty Tonns dead freighted, on the 2nd. November. That the Fort St. George sailed the day before on a slaving Voyage to Madagascar, & by advices from Bengall they were informed, the following disposition wou'd be made of Our Honble Masters Ships at that Presidency; Prince William, Edgbaston & Tavistock loaded for England, Walpole sent to Judda Severn & Brittania to Surat. The backwardness of the Merchants in not delivering in their old Balances for these Two years past Obliges me to desire your Majesty will order them to discharge the same immediately & that the new Contract may be completed without Delay a Ship being dailey expected to load for Europe.

It being usual to inform the adjacent Country Powers of any alterations that are made in the Government of this Place. THE Chief received an Ola from the King of Travencore in reply to that wrote him on the 3d. Instant. Congratulating him first on his Accession to the Travencore Chiefship, & says in Case the Honble Company will supply him with those Necessaries wanted (which his Predecessor had a List of) he shou'd not be wanting on his part to encrease their Commerce desiring the Two hundred small Arms promised by Mr. Bourcheir might not escape the Chiefs Notice; adding that proper Orders were dispatched for delivering the Pepper.

In Answer to the foregoing Ola the Chief wrote the King, That his diligence Chiefs shou'd be used in procuring him the necessaries required & as Mr. Bourcheir had promised the same upon his Arrival at Bombay he hoped part of his List wou'd soon be complied with. That a Ship being arrived here to load with Pepper, he was desired to give such Orders concerning the delivery of what was outstanding, that no delays or disappointment of Tonnage might be experienced, especially as the money lay ready to pay for the same when demanded.

THE King of Travencore in Answer to the Chiefs Ola under the 23^d. Inst^t. writes him that in former times Munchuas laden from Quilone & Choura never met with any Impediment or had their Mariners Imprisoned if belonging to him; but now he found it was Expected they shou'd Anchor off the Port, give Information of their Cargoes and carry such Signals as they might be known for his; which Orders & Signals cou'd not be Issued without much Trouble, however he had Directed on their being challenged by the Centrys to reply, "They belonged to the Government which other Vessells or Boats had not liberty of doing, but were to observe & conform to the Antient Custom; desiring the Munchua detained might be returned and all those employed by the Government suffered to pass without being stopped in future. That he had sent Directions for weighing off the Pepper without delay, & had been advised of the Discourse that passed between the Chief & Matanda Poolah, concerning which & all necessary Affairs he wou'd consult with him about in a few days, about which time he proposed coming to Travendrung & Cheringa.

In respect to the forgoing Ola the Chief wrote his Majesty that He was certain from the Contents thereof, some wrong information had been given him with regard to the Subject now in Dispute, it being Customary in times past for all Boats whether belonging to the Government [sic] or others to stop here & give the necessary Information where or to whom they belonged; an Instance of which he had Experienced upon his Arrival Mr. Bourchier his Predecessor having stoped one who endeavoured to Pass the Fort, & upon giving Notice thereof to Christna Annavy desiring him to acquaint his Majesty therewith he wrote for Answer. "That Orders given to the Carricar of Quilone for punishing the Mariners & to give Directions that all Boats call here before they pass the Fort in future. Therefore as several since then had only made an Appearance off this Port to obey such Orders by lowering their Sails & immediately hoisting it again without stopping occasioned Boats being sent after the Munchua now here, the People in her having acted in the same manner But wou'd not have his Majesty imagine it was done to give the least disgust, being on the Contrary very much inclined to preserve a good Understanding, & prevent Disputes of all kinds whatever, which cou'd not be done if Vessells were suffered to pass & repass without Notice as the same might occasion a Clandestine Trade to be carried on much to the Prejudice of the Honble Company), as many in such case might pass with Contraband Goods on board & without Passes, therefore it was hoped his Majesty would give proper Orders upon receipt of this Ola, for observing the Antient Customs.

THEY say That having no reason to doubt of the New Castle & Dragon's being Extract of dispatched home agreeable to their former Directions to Tellicherry & that there will be Pepper enough left upon the Coast to compleat the Salisbury's Charter Party Tonnage in due time or at least sufficient to send her Home in the manner prescribed by the Honble Company in their Commands of the 2^d. December 1748 in all the present fair Season so as to winter upon the other Coast or as the Commander may think proper she was consigned to Tellicherry accordingly after receiving on board all the Surat Piece Goods Cotton Yarn & Carmenia Wool in Warehouse, a Calculate of which & what might be laden there, we shou'd receive from the Chief & Factors, so that they had only to recommend the quickest Dispatch possible in the dispatch of this Ship to Great Britain. Enclosed Envoice of Broad Cloth &ca. reced \$\P\$ Ship Stafford omitted in the one then sent. Direct us to acquaint the Honble Company of all material transactions, sending at the same time all Necessary Papers & transmitting them Copys thereof. February 1747 \$\mathbb{B}\$ Ship Orford, informing us they have given Directions for a supply of Treasure to be sent from Tellicherry as Our Occasions may require; not doubting, but the Gentlemen there have had timely advice given them of the Quantity of Pepper we shall have in Warehouse for the Salisbury's Dispatch.

They acknowledge Receipt of what wrote them from hence the 16th. Jañry & make no doubt (notwithstanding there was likely to be a disappointm^t. in the Quantity expected from the King of Travencore) of the Salisbury's being dispatched agreeable to their directions already transmitted (Duplicate of which was enclosed) as five hundred Candies were Contracted for & hopes given of a further Quantity. Directing us in case there was sufficient to compleat the Charter Party of the Salisbury not to purchase any further Quantity but at the stipulated Price, having particular regard in case Pepper is purchased of the King not to make him any Advance as directed in their Letter of the 22d. October last altho' they approve of it on the present emergent Occasion. The Letters from Bombay & Tellicherry as Extracted in the preceding Diary under Yesterdays Date are again read & Perused by which it plainly appears Ship Salisbury is intended for this Place to compleat her Charter Party Tonnage; and as the Chittys have disappointed us in the quantity of Cloth they promised to deliver long since, Agreed imediately to write Captain Henry Kent a Letter directing him to acquaint us in writing what Quantity of Pepper he thinks will Compleat the Dragons loading. And as the Season is farr advanced, the detaining of him for any small quantity to answer this Purpose is deemed imprudent more specially as we find no reliance can be placed in the promises made by the Government [sic] for delivering the Quantity contracted for in due time & likewise fully persuaded that whatever may still be delivered into Warehouse will be required for the Salisbury. It is therefore resolved that in case what may yet be wanting to compleat the Dragons Tonnage comes within the quantity Our Honble Masters are pleased to Direct their Ships to be dispatched Home with dead freighted to send her away with what we may further receive by the 4th. Instant. In persuance [sic] of which the Warehouse keeper is Ordered to ship off the ten Candies of Pepper received this day & the Secretary to prepare all necessary Papers to be transmitted by her.

Bills granted.

The Reverend Mr. Stephen Lushington late Chaplain of Bombay who takes Passage on the Dragon for England requesting a Sett of Bills on the Honble Court of Directors for Thirty Pounds Sterling on his own Account, they are directed to be drawn out upon his paying the amount thereof into the Treasury & takeing the usual Oath prescribed on the Occasion.

Advice from the Dollova of Nazir Jungs Movements. This day the Chief received an Ola from the Dollava answering the request made by him the 25th. Ultimo as follows vizt.

THAT Nazar Jung had lately passed Catdapa & Detatched ten thousd. men under two Officers of Distinction against Sundy Soib at Arcott Who at that time with one of his Generals, was advanced to give the King of Tanjour Battle, but upon hearing of the intended Expedition against him immediately withdrew & then began to Treat with the Tanjour Rajah for concluding a Peace. That an Officer of Sundy Soib's was Ordered to destroy a Villiage called Sucaramdevy & a party of Troops belonging to Anaverda Caun (then there) with the assistance of the Inhabitants adjacent thereto.

A Fishing Boat being on Departure for Tellicherry & the Servants employed Private in the publick Office being busy in getting the necessary Papers in readiness for Advices to Ship Dragons Dispatch, The Chief wrote the Honble President a private Letter informing him of all needful occurrences.

THE Chief received an Ola from the King of Travencore acknowledging the SATURDAY receipt of those wrote him, & says Orders are given for his Munchuas wearing Colours for the future, which he desires may be the means of preventing them King of Travencore. if any Vessell shou'd pass in the mean time he hopes they will not be impeded. That he intends seeing the Chief shortly & has repeated his Orders to deliver the Pepper outstanding.

THE Chief wrote an Ola to the King advising him that the five hundred Candys of Pepper contracted for not having been yet Delivered, he was not only obliged to dispatch one of the Honble Companys Ships after a Detention of thirty three days (without a full loading) as he had been formerly advised but likewise another lately arrived; the Season not permitting of her longer Stay; which disappointments was little Expected after the many promises given to deliver the same in due time & that he hoped that the Balance of the New Contract with what due from the Merchants wou'd be shortly delivered in. and proper Persons sent to adjust the Accounts.

Advices are brought that Our Balloons sent to Coletchee for bringing away the Cloth have been stoped for many days by the Son of Areal Coxala Matanda Custom Master there, under a pretence that the Duty's thereon must first be paid Impediational by the Chittys, which being an unprecedented proceeding, especially for some laid on some years past. The Chief wrote an Ola to the King advising him, that the Honble Coletchee. Company having been disappointed in the quantity of Pepper expected, he had sent boats to fetch some Cloth from Coletchee which the Chagoes had brought to the Sea side, but the Son of Areal Coxala Matanda impeded them shipping it off, by which Piece of Insolence the Ship was dispatched likewise Dead Freighted, & King acquithe goods lay Damaging four or five Days. That to preserve a good understand-ainted thereing between the Government & the Honble Company such proceedings ought not of. to be suffered, therefore his Majesty was desired to inquire particularly about this Affair & hinder the like happening in future.

Another Letter being likewise prepared to the Gentlemen at Tellicherry it Advices to Tellicherry. was likewise Signed; in which we acknowledged the receipt of their Letters dated the 27th. Ultimo & 2d. Instant, acquainting them it was with impatience we waited for the Honble President & Councils Commands to us enclosed in the former in

Order to fix a resolution of Dispatching the Dragon whom we kept here till the 4th. Instant & then sent her Home Thirty Tonns & 2484 Decimals short of Tonnage on advising us that the Salisbury was intended to fill up here, & tho' at last we had not sufficient to fill up that Ship agreeable to her Charter Party being deficient thereof fifty three Tonns & 71854 Decimals still we sent her away the 11th. Instant as Captain Burrows declared to us he was determined to push for his Passage. Advised to have received by the Salisbury Rupees five thousand seven hundred & forty three & a quarter (5743 1.—) from Mr. Hornby at Cochien with his Letter of Advice for which sum their Factory had Credit. That the Goverment [sic] is still short of their Contract sixty Candys three Maunds & fifteen Pounds of Pepper that we have no prospect of making another Investment, so cannot say what Cash will be sufficient for us but shall be sure to advise them in due time. Adding that Our remains in Warehouse is Two thousand three hundred Pieces of Cloth & two thousand is Expected dailey from Cotata when the whole will be inspected what already reced being much inferior to Muster & therefore not accepted of as yet, the Contractors Agent not being willing to make proportionable Abatements. Desiring if they hear any thing of the French Movements at Myhie they wou'd advise us, it being reported they are preparing three Ships & proper forces for settling at Coletchee which will enable us to frustrate their Intentions as much as Our Circumstances will admit. Requesting a supply by the first Conveyance of twelve Rheams of Goa Paper, & their Care of the accompanying Pacquet for our Superiors.

This Evening a Boat sailed for Tellicherry with Our Pacquet to the Chief & Factors there enclosing one addressed to the Honble President & Council of Bombay.

RECEIVED from Eddova thirteen Candies & ten Maunds of Pepper on the Pepper reced Governments [sic] Contract & there being still a further Quantity remaining in Eddova. Warehouse there, the small Boat was dispatched to bring it hither.

The small Boat dispatched to Eddova arrives with five Candys & eight Maunds of Pepper.

We are informed the Kings Powder House at Cacalone blew up a few days past which killed several People altho' there was not above twenty five Barrills of Gunpowder therein, and that the French Engineer who has been for some time in his Service is Deserted from him to the Moors.

Complaint having been made to the Chief that false measures are used in the Bazar, he sent privately & seized the same, which upon Examination being, not only less than the Standard, but a hole at the bottom thereof stopped with Wax so dexteriously that in the small measures for Rice the Purchasers were deceived & cheated by the retailers who fixing it upon a great heap of that Article pushing up the wax with their finger just upon turning the measure apart returned to the heap again. He fined them each two hundred fanams. And likewise a Moorman twenty Rupees for attempting to sell a girl that was upon Examination found to be no Slave but Stolen from her parents with his knowledge & Consent.

One of Our Inhabitants being on departure for Tellicherry the Chief wrote Mr. Dorrill a Short Letter acquainting him that Our pepper Contract with the King is almost complied with and that we have hopes of making a Cloth Invest-Private Less ment very soon at which time he wou'd hear fully from us.

> The Dolova advised the Chief by an Ola that last Night he arrived at Cheringa in Company with the Prince both of whom intended to pay him a visit.

> In Answer to the forgoing Ola the Chief congratulated the Dolova, on his Arrival in these parts with the Prince offering to send the Companys boat to bring them hither.

FRIDAY 6тн. Boat sent off to a ship in the offing which proves the Prince Edward Co. Ship.

The Dollova arrives [&] Confers with the Chief.

A Ship passing by with English Colours bound to the Northward, a boat was sent off to gain intelligence of our Honble Masters, so long Expected from the Bay designed for Bombay Surat & Judda, but nothing was received relating to them upon her return; the Commander Captain Wedderburn only acquainted the Chief by Letter that his Ship was called the Prince Edward from Bengall bound into the Gulph of Persia.

THE Prince being obliged to sett out Early this morning to the Northward by the Kings Order upon some particular Business excused himself from coming hither but sent the Dollova; with whom the Chief held a long Conference, in which the necessary remonstrances were made concerning the present posture of Our Honble Masters affairs at this Settlement the Substance of which & the Dollovas replys thereto were as follows vizt.

THE DOLLOVAS REPLY.

1st

That the Honble Company were great sufferers by the Kings Contract for five hundred Candys of Pepper not being complyed with nor the Merchts. old Balances delivered in as yet two of their Ships having sailed for Europe Short of Tonnage after waiting so long here that even gaining a passage home this Season is dubious, which proceeds from the negligence of the Cheringa Carracar who has paid no manner of regard nor shewn a proper Obedience to his Majestys & the Dollovas Orders wrote him in respect thereto.

2d.

That by his Majestys Proceedings the Honble Company had been debarr'd making a Pepper Investment for two Years to get her which their friendly Services in past times did not deserve but on the contrary all manner of Assistance, as they beyond all Doubt enabled him to extirpate powerfull Enemies by the supplys affoard'd from hence & as it was Antient Custom for the Merchants not only to be permitted but Ordered to come hither by the Government & make a Pepper Contract without any restraint whatever it was therefore Expected that method wou'd be observed; the ensuing Season as we cou'd not act contrary thereto, neither have Orders from Our Superiors to make the least deviation whatever.

3d.

That as the Ho. Company had very Antient Grants from the Queens of Attinga for carrying on their Trade, if his Majesty interfered therein it wu'd be only deemed an infringem^t. on their prerogative therefore it appeared quite unnecessary for our entring into any others with him in respect to this Queendom, as Chief may send proposals to his Majesty, declaring what appears

That for this Insolence & Disobedience of Orders he wou'd reprimand the Carracar very severely & give such Orders in respect to the Delivery of what was outstanding of this Contract & due from the Merchants on their old Accounts as shoul prevent all future delays desiring when the former was compleated it might be immediately paid for.

2d.

That the Honble Companys going without an Investment for two years was occasioned by their not seeming inclinable to give the present Price of 75 Rs. P Candy for Pepper, but since that has been agreed to, he has done all in his power for the support of their Interest with his Majesty who is determined to keep this branch of Trade in his own hands having been at a very great Expence in the late Warrs, towards the maitaining [sic] of which the Merchants had made but every small Contributions & is very desirous that such Articles of Agreement shou'd be entered into betw[een] them, as wou'd oblige the King to give us the whole Pepper Trade of his Dominions in general have, many Enemies to deal with especially the French & Dutch, which he said might be done, by their engaging to defend such Agreemts. & priviledges as might be given therein against any Power what [ever] & affoarding the Government [sic] assistance in time of need.

3d

He says the Chiefs representation shall be made known to his Majesty & that Copies of the Agreements subsisting between him, the French & Dutch shall be sent hither, neither of which will (upon Inspection) be found of any validity or force, when the

the same were not forfited in any shape or manner whatever nor had he made a Conquest of the [Čo.] & Yt. all required of him was not to violate those priviledges obtained, but adhere to them strictly permitting a free & uninterrupted Trade to be carried on as usual, tho' if his Majesty thought proper to shew the Articles agreed upon between him & other European Nations so that Our Honble Masters might be satisfied how farr they clashed with their Interest, & wou'd then delir, any written proposals they shou'd be transmitted our Superiors.

That of late we have experienced several Insults from the Marineirs [sic] in Munchuas & Boats passing & repassing both by the Sea & River without giving an Account where or to whom they belong till fired upon. Cloth of Eight Caul seven thousand Pieces at nineteen fanams Piece & Cloth of six Caul seven thousand Pieces at Eighteen fanams Piece being in all thirty thousand Pieces which we oblige Ourselves to embark at Coletchee clear of all Charges for the same to be sorted in the Honble Companys Warehouse at Anjengo the second sorts of which Cloths as mentioned above, deduction is to be made thereon for bad manufacture as Customary in times past and the whole of this Contract for Thirty thousand Pieces is to be delivered into Warehouse in all the Month of December next ensuing agreeable to Muster, On which Account we hereby acknowledge to have received One hundred & thirty thousand fanams & on delivery of Cloth to the amount of fanams fifty thousand are to have a further advance of fanams Eighty thousand, & which is to be continued in the same till the Contract is completed. In Confirmation of which we the Underwritten have hereunto set Our Hands this 5th. day of May 1750.

NELLEAPEM CHITTY.

Passports denied the King of Porca his Subjects.

Maccao Ship Anchors to the Southward of Quilone. Some Merchants belonging to Porca intending to send their Vessells upon the other Coast applyed to the Chief for Passports who told them it was not in his Power to comply therewith from the Conduct of their Sovereign, who unwarrantably detained the Company's Property landed from One of their Sloops.

We are informed that the Macoao Ship having taken in about four hundred Candys of Pepper to the Northward, Anchored yesterday a little to the Southwd of Quilone but seeing Our Boats (as is imagined) Cruizing backward & forwards She continued there a very short Space of time, & in the Evening stood directly out to Sea. The Pepper we now hear cost them only Ninety five Rupees & Candys, [sic] but then it was not Sooped or Garbled, & what remains of this Contract, it's said, lays ready embaled at Paru & the Parts contiguous thereto, but the Quantity cannot be ascertained with any certainty.

LAST Night the King of Travencore passed inland & arrived at Attinga to be present at the Princes Wedding.

A Balloon attempts to pass the Trunkeer. Nair therein sent to the King. THERE being no reason to imagine any more attempts will be made this Season to Export Pepper out of the Country by Sea Our Cruizing boats are recalled from their Station.

The People in a small Balloon attempting to pass Our South Trankeer up the River they were challenged by the Centry who being grosley abused by a Nair that Steered acquainted his officer thereof & brought the boat to, which being fully proved upon examination before the Chief. He Ordered him to be carried immediately by a Gaurd to Attinga, writing his Majesty an Ola on the Occasion as follows "That the Prisoner being in a small Boat covered with Cajans & attempting to pass up the river without stopping (contrary to the usual Custom) at our South Trunkeer the Centry there challenged him, to whom he returned very opprobious [sic] Language which Muttoo Chitty the Bearer of this Ola wou'd inform his Majesty more fully of desiring the Offender might be punished in a suitable mann[er] as an Example to others & Orders given to prevent such insolences hereafter.

THE Chief likewise wrote an Ola to Christna Annavy much to the purport as Ola to the foregoing desiring he wou'd acquaint his Majesty of the Nairs impertinent Annavy. Behaviour which Muttoo Chitty wou'd inform him of, & see that he met with a proper punishment.

An Express Tellicherry Toney arrives with a Short Letter dated the 2^d. Instant Boat arrives from the Chief & Factors there acknowledging receipt of Ours by Mr. Robinson from Telliwith the Bill in his favour which had been discharged & that they now forward a Extract of Box of Stationary Ware & another of Hartall reced the Evening before Stafford with a Pagguet from Our Superiors at Bombay & which is detect the 24th by her. Stafford, with a Pacquet from Our Superiors at Bombay & which is dated the 24th. Ulto. in reply to what we wrote them the 4th. of February last; & wherein they Observe, due notice is taken of our having reced at that time two hund^d. & four Candy's Eleven Maunds & six Pounds of Pepper in part of the five hundred Contracted for with the King & hope we have not only reced the Balance remaining, but that his Majesty has shewn a Compliance with his Promise in respect to letting us have the like Quantity more at the same Price, expecting to hear Ship Dragon has been fully loaden & in time. That having been supplied with such Stores as cou'd be spared us before, a Box of Stationary Ware was only now sent to Tellicherry & wou'd be forwarded from thence amounts. to Rupees sixty two three quarters & sixteen reas as \$\mathbb{P}\$ Invoice enclosed. That as we have two hundred small Arms to spare the King when judged necessary they hoped he will be satisfied with a little Gunpowder & Flints, it being out of their Power to supply his wants for old Iron Kentleage having none at the Presidency, permitting us to take Pepper in Payment for what his Majesty may be supplyed with, but acting with such Caution as will prevent him getting much in debt to the Honble Company. Enclose an Account Current of the Persons detained here from the Stafford & Bombay Grabb agreeable to which they must be paid-directing us to advise them what money we recover on Account Captain Forbes his Cloathing that he may make good there any Deficiency, advising that Credit is given this Factory for the amount of Rice supplied his Majesty's Ship Ruby, & that they sent us Invoice of the Staffords Stores, \$\mathbb{F}\$ Ship Salisbury the 29th. January which they make no doubt we have received long ere now.

Translate of his Ola.

An advance being made Nelleapem Chitty this day of Fanams One hundred & thirty thousand on Account this years Cloth Investment agreeable to an Obligation entered under the 4th. Instant. And fanams forty thousand eight Hundred & forty three for compleating that of the last Season a Declaration is passed accordingly in the Mallabar Language the Translate of which is as follows-

Ordered that it be sent for his Partners to sign likewise at Cotata.

This is to Certify that We Choco Nadem Moopa, Nelleapem, Periatanua & China Tannua are justly indebted to the Honble English Company on Account Our Cloth Contract made with them Anno 1749 the sum of fanams thirty seven thousand nine hundred & seventy four & have now reced fanams forty thousand eight Hundred & forty three both which amounts to fanams seventy eight thousand Eight hundred & seventeen & for this Sum we Oblige Ourselves to deliver before the end of September next. Sallampores No. 5 & 6 agreeable to Muster two thousand One hundred & one Piece at nineteen fanams Piece amounting to fanams thirty nine thousand nine hundd. & nineteen & Long Cloth Brown No. 7 of the same goodness as the Muster Two thousand One hundred & sixty one ps. for Eighteen fanams Piece & which amounts to fanam thirty eight thousand eight hundred & ninety Eight.

In Witness whereof we have given this Declaration under Our hands this

7th. day of May 1750.

TUESDAY 8тн. Ola from Christna Annavy.

The Chief received an Ola from Christna Annavy by the return of Mutty Chitty in whose presence he says the Nayr was Chastized for his insolence, but the King having occasion for several things to pass the River both by Night & day desires the same may not be impeded. That the Carracar of Cheringa informing him most of the Pepper is now delivered, he has Ordered the Kings writer to make up the Account when what was outstanding shou'd be made good, desiring the money due on this Account might be paid to him.

WEDNES-DAY 9TH. \mathbf{Answer} thereto.

In Answer to the above Ola the Chief wrote Christna Annavy that immediately upon the Balance of Our Pepper Contract being weighed off, he wou'd give Orders for the remainder of the money due to be made good, Discounting the Price of fire Arms his Majesty had been supplied with, desiring Orders might be given the Merchants for making good the Balances due on their old Contracts & that if he passed to the Northward requested the favour of him to call here.

THURS-Ola from Christna Annavy requests. the loan of 2000 fans. to be paid out of the Customs.

CHRISTNA ANNAVY in reply to the foregoing Ola informed the Chief he wou'd DAY 10TH, call here in his way to the Northward & give particular Orders for the old Balances to be delivered in without delay-Adding that as the five hundred Candys was near delivered, the Carracar of Cheringa wou'd make up the remainder in Light Pepper therefore requested the Account might be adjusted, but that he coud not allow the Price of the Arms to be included therein as they were to be deducted Out of the Customs, desiring what Balance was due on this Contract might be made good immediately & fanams two thousand lent him, having occasion for the same to defray part of his Majesty's Charges at the Princess's Wedding & which shou'd be discounted when the Account Customs was settled.

FRIDAY lltH. Answer te the above complying with his request.

As the request made by Christna Annavy is but for a triffling Sum & our Honble Masters Customs due to the King amounting to much more which together with the expectations we are in of his being very Serviceable in recovering the old Balances due it was deemed prudent not to give a denial, as it might occasion disgust therefore Mutty Chitty was sent therewith & by whom the Chief wrote the Annavy acquainting him that he would deliver the Sum requested desiring a receipt for the same, to be made good out of the Customs. That when the Balance of Pepper was weighed into Warehouse, the money on that Account shoud be immediately made good, but that as the Arms was Agreed for to be paid for out of the Pepper Contract by Mr. Bourcheir the same was expected to be complied with.

This day died Mr. John Mackenzie Surgeon, whose Effects were sealed up SATUR-by Mr. John Peers Secretary & Lieutenant Nicholas Wardman Commandant in the DAY 12TH. Chiefs presence, neither his Heir or any relations being in the Settlement to take Mr. Macken care thereof.

The Chief received an Ola from Christna Annavy by the return of Mutty Ola from Chitty advising that he sent by him a receipt for the two thousand fanams to be Annavy. paid out of the Customs & desiring that he would meet the Price tomorrow at Cheringa, his Higness wanting to conferr with him on several Subjects.

An indisposition having prevented the Chiefs going abroad for some days he Chiefs was obliged to return for Answer that he was infinitely concern'd to say, his ill Answer. State of health wou'd not permit of his waiting upon the Prince at Cheringa begging he wou'd excuse the same, & honour him with a visit at the Garden House in his way to the Northward.

Mr. John Robinson returned from Tellicherry having proceeded to Cochein in a Boat by Sea & from thence came up the river to Quilone where he gott a Chair & came hither over land, who reports that the Natives were very Courteous Mr. Robinto him all through the Country but that the Commodore of Cochien absolutely from Telly. refuse him a passage by the way of that River for some time.

SUNDAY

As the King of Porca does not seem inclinable to comply with his frequent Promise's made concerning the restitution of the Honble Company's Stores detained by him the Chief wrote him as follows.

My Predecessoar [sic] wrote your Majesty several times & sent Mutty Chitty for Ola to the the recovery of what Stores remained at Porca belonging to the Honble Companys Porca. Sloop & to desire you wou'd likewise oblige Gooinda Shroff a Merchant under your Protection to adjust his Merchantile Concerns here in an equitable & just manner with those he has had dealings with, neither of which has been yet complied with. After my Arrival I wrote your Majesty two Letters on the occasion & gave Mutty Chitty the same necessary Orders to apply for redress, which likewise had been attended with no other Effect hitherto; then a promise from your Majesty that proper people shou'd be sent to adjust these Affairs after the Feast of TiruVlsavoan which time has been long since elapsed & as I hear nothing more of your Intentions, it does in my Opinion appear very clear & evident, that no justice is to be Expected, therefore in Point of Duty to those I have the Honour to serve a proper remedy must be sought for by me, & intending to write my Superiors at Bombay in four or five days what is necessary in respect thereto, I send you this Notice, that such disputes may be amicably concluded if you are so disposed, otherwise I shall be obliged to deny all Passports to Merchants trading under your Protection, & of which I not only now advise in a friendly manner but declare, such a proceeding will be much against my Inclination being very desirous of preserving the Antient Amity between your Majesty & the Honble Company.

RETURNED Our Balloons dispatched to Tellicherry the 27th. Ultimo bringing MONDAY from thence thirty thousand Rupees & a Letter from the Chief & Factors dated the 9th. Instant, advising of their sending that Sum agreeable to the request made by us giving Serjeant Riley directions to follow any we might have delivered him for proceeding back again. They Express a Concern at being so well acquainted by us of the French their Intentions of settling at Coletchee, being certain it will wrote for. prejudice Our Honble Masters, adding that what mentioned by them formerly to be only Mallabar reports, was in respect to three Ships being employed at that their letter. Season of the year which certainly proved to be without foundation, & cou'd only come from such People who generally upon the least appearance take things as already intended, assuring us no care was wanting to make the Strictest enquiry

possible into their neighbours proceedings, but even from the best of hands they cou'd get no particular or Material Information, which occasioned the Expressions to be made in those terms.

Serjeants of Cochien's Behaviour to him.

The Serjeant acquaints the Chief that he was forced by Stress of weather to report of the enter the Barr of Cochien where he applied to the Commodore for a Passage up Commodore that Piver who not only gave an absolute devial but headly permit him to get that River who not only gave an absolute denial but hardly permitt him to get a few refreshments, by which the money under his Charge has been in great danger of being lost as he generally met with hard Squalls of Wind in the Night & a very ruff Surff.

This day the Monsoon set it with pretty severe Squalls of wind & a heavy rain.

Ola from Christna Annavy.

THE Chief received an Ola from Christna Annavy advising him that the Two thousand fanams lent to defray the Charges of the Princes Wedding had been Expended by his Highness for the Funeral of Teriununbu Swammy which unexpected Accident obliged him to make application for a loan of the like Sum, desiring it might be sent by the Bearer.

Answer thereto.

In reply to the above the Chief in a suitable manner desired to be Excused complying with the request, as the Honble Company had sent no more money here this Season than was sufficient for the Expected Pepper Investment, on which Account if he wanted an Advance in Rupees the same shou'd be sent acquainting him that with impatience his Arrival here was expected, to discourse about some Affairs of importance.

A Prince related to the King of Cochien flies for protection to the King of Travencore.

It is reported from the Northward that a Prince related to the King of Cochien, having had some disputes depending with him for some time past he has flew to the King of Travencore for Protection which being granted there is reason to imagine an open breach between them will ensue tho' at present every thing remains pretty easy & quiet in the Country.

WEDNES-DAY 16TH. River & Grounds overflowed by excessive Rain.

The great quantity of rain that fell yesterday & to-day overflowed our River in such a manner, that there was near three feet water in the Carpenters & Ship's Shops, Hospital & Garden House & several others in Town which made it absolutely necessary to open another Barr immediately not only for self preservation, but likewise to preserve the lives of many whose habitations being under water on the other side had taken Shelter in Trees; & which was attended with the wished for Success the water abating in a few hours; tho' many we hear have perished, & others totally ruined by the losses sustained, this unexpected inundation (especially in the Night) hardly giving warning enough for the poor Creatures to preserve themselves & families, with a single Cloth to cover their nakedness. The damage Our Honble Masters have suffered is by the Smith & Carpenters Shops, Garden & Hospital walls, to the river Side being broke down, South Trunkeer damaged & Trees blown down at Cotadally which was likewise quite Covered with

Demag sustain'd therefrom by the Company.

THE Chief received a Letter from Eddova advising him that the late bad weather has broke down the Compound Wall of that Factory part of the House SATURDAY & Warehouses, more of which will certainly fall if it does not clear up shortly.

RECEIVED an Ola from the King of Porca in Answer to one wrote him by the Chief the 15th Instant wherein he express's a concern at what is therein mention'd concerning the refusal of Pass's to his Merchants & again promises to send the necessary People shortly for adjust^g. all Affairs in dispute concluding with King of his assurances of having a strong inclination to preserve a good Harmoney with Porca. the Honble Company.

THERE has been such severe Squalls of wind & rain to the Southward that it is confidently reported, upwards of twelve thousand Souls have perished, & the first Crop of Nelly totally destroyed by the waters overflowing at & about Cotata.

This morning Christna Annavy in his way to the Northward called here & Christna after the usual Compliments had passed at the meeting between him & the Chief, Annavy arrives & a proper representation was made of the many Impediments Our Honble Masters had met with in their Trade especially for two Years past in which time no Investment had or cou'd be made from the King of Travenco[re] illegal & Arbitrary proceedings, quite repugnant to the Antient Grants obtained from the Queens of Attinga, the circumstances of which, he must be so thoroughly well acquainted with (by being such a Number of years the principal Minister of this Country & hitherto a Vindicator of the Honble Companys Rights & priviledges) that he was their Confedesired as a faithfull friend to declare what in his Opinion occasioned such Extraordinary proceedings of late. In reply to which he seemed to lay the greatest Stress on disappointments his Majesty had met with in the necessary supply of Stores &ca. frequently required for extirpating his Enemies which wou'd not have been difficult had they been granted in time & our Limits of Trade defended from an invasion; whereas for the want thereof, the King had been obliged to accommodate all differences on terms quite disagreeable to him & which it was certain had & wou'd be destructive to the Honble Companys Affairs at this Settlement, so large a quantity of Pepper being annually assigned over to comply therewith so large a quantity of repper being annually assigned over to comply therewith let the Crop be never so small; giving it as his Opinion, that if the Articles lately proposed to Mr. Bourcheir for renewing & establishing a friendship between his Majesty & the Honble Company is listened to, there will be wanting nothing in the Governments [sic] Power to augment their Interest & Commerce. To all which the Chief answered in a suitable manner, defending the Conduct of his Predecessors not doubting but they acted in such a manner then as was consistant with their circumstances at that time; but finding all his Arguments were to little purpose, & the Annavys discourse much to the same Purport as what passed at the late meeting with the Dollova it seemed unnecessary to support the Argument any longer therefore he turned the discourse acquainting him of the Dollova's proceedings concerning the Investment & how prejudicial it wou'd be to the Company in having two of their Ships dispatched dead freighted; whose Answer thereto was not only quite evasive but the Excuses made for such delays & not delivering a further Quantity much of the same Nature; by his saying the Dollova had made no certain Agreement, neither was there above a hundred or a hundred & fifty Candys of Pepper in the whole Country, which the King wou'd not part with

under Eighty five Rupees P Candy. Such an Extravagent Price the Chief told him cou'd not be given by us nor a single Rupee more than seventy five Rupees Candy telling him upon the whole it woud be much better to avoid such prevarications & declare in direct terms the Honble Company was to have no more Pepper, which is what we want to be informed of in Order to write Our Superiors with some certainty in respect thereto, which at present there is no possibility of doing. However every thing was at last referred to a meeting his Majesty intends to have shortly with the Chief, at which the Annavy said he might possibly not be present, however his Interest shou'd be used before that time for accommodating all differences & settling Affairs upon a proper footing again.

Dr. Mackenzies Effects Examined. There being great reason to imagine the Hospital House reced much damage by the large quantity of water that entred [sic] therein upon commencement of the heavy rain, & Doctor Mackenzies Effects lying in different parts thereof Mess¹⁵. John Robinson John Peers, Lieutenant Nicholas Wardman were appointed to take an Inventory thereof & secure every thing in a dry room which having done they delivered the same this day as taken by them the 14th. Instant & it appearing by some Memorandums that the Honble President has got the Deceased his Will in his Possession the Effects are Ordered to be sealed up & remain so 'till he is pleased to send Orders about them.

THURS-DAY 24TH; Contract Olas reced from Cotata, King desires the Buchaneir Ps. may be Exchanged for Musquets.

RETURN'D Philip D'Soas from Cotata with the Contract Olas for this Years Cloth Investment & the Balance outstanding of that made last Season, Signed by Choco nadem Moopa, Peria Tanny Chitty & Chinna Tanny Chitty, Partners with Nelleapem Chitty.

The Carracar of Cheringa waited on the Chief with a message from his Majesty desiring the Buchaneir Ps. may be Exchanged as they were not fit for his Service, which if denied it is thought will occasion a Coolness at the intended meeting between him & the Chief, whereas a compliance may on the contrary terminate greatly to advantage & possibly be a means of contracting again for pepper, Therefore the Storekeeper is directed to deliver the fifty short Musquets in lieu thereof, eight of which the Carracar objects to being a little Scratched upon the Barrills so that he only received forty two there being no more of that sort in the Storeroom.

Nayrs stop from carrying several Persons Prisoners from Cotadally.

Ola to the King thereon.

SEVERAL Nayrs passing by the North Trunkeer with some Washermen Prisoners, they were stopped there, & the Chief being inform'd thereof, found upon enquiry those People were under an Arrest for denying to pay a Pole Tax demanded by Savadana Poolah & upon their craving Protection as Inhabitants of Cotadally they were Ordered within Our Limits upon which the following Ola was wrote by the Chief to his Majesty on the Occasion viz^t. "As your Majesty many Years past Agreed that Cotadally shou'd be the Honble Companys absolute Property, consequently the Inhabitants there are intirely under the Direction of the English Government [sic] notwithstanding which several violences have been lately Committed there by your Majesty's Subjects & this day in particular some Nayrs from Cheringa went thither & made several of the Washermen Prisoners intending to carry them as such by the Sea Side, which when I heard of, & finding upon Enquiry, this Extraordinary Proceeding was done by the Order of Savadana Poolah, to force an unjust Custom upon them & being fully assured your Majesty wou'd not allow of any such Arbitrary Actions to be committed, especially in the Honble Companys Jurisdiction, I detain'd those People under an Arrest in Consequence of it's meeting with your Majesty's approbation for whenever lawfull Customs are to be Collected I realy think your Ministers shoul first advise with me, & conclude on the proper methods to be taken for doing it, which having told the Nairs, & offered them this Ola, they very abrutely [sic] left me refusing to be the Bearer of it, which confirms my Opinion that this unwarrantable proceeding, is done without your Order & is the reason of my dispatching a Pattamar with this Complaint hoping you will Chastize the Nayrs & give such Orders that nothing of this kind will ever happen again in future.

THE Chief receiving a complimentory Message from the King of Travencore SATURDAY upon his Arrival at Bocola this day, desiring to have a meeting with him tomorrow at Cheringa. He returned for Answer, that having many Affairs to treat with his Majesty about therefore had your impetiontly woited for this friendly Injection by the King Majesty about therefore had very impatiently waited for this friendly Invitation to meet him which he shou'd sure to accept of, & accordingly waited upon him at the Place at Cheringa. appointed.

AGREEABLE to the King of Travencore's Invitation, the Chief attended with a SUNDAY proper Gaurd of Our Military proceeded to Cheringa, where he had an Audience for about four Hours, in which Time he represented in the Strongest terms possible, the great Losses Our Honble Masters had sustained in being debarred a free Liberty of Trade by him for two years together & having their Ships dispatched home dead ence with freighted by a failure in his Contract, altho' a faithfull Promise was made Mr. Him. Bourcheir that five hundred Candys of Pepper shou'd be delivered in due time & any further Quantity the Honble Company stood in need of; which his Ministers seem now to deny, declaring they knew of no such Agreement, & if the same has been concluded upon, no Price they are certain was fixed, neither can it be complied with, there being little if any Pepper at present remaining in the Country, which if true the Chief told him must be intirely owing to it's being sold to private Merchants who neither had or was able to be of any Service to him Observing that in general such proceedings were direct infringments & evidently contrary to the Honble Companys Rights & priviledges of Trade in the Queendom of Attinga, from which Palace they had very Antient Grants as he well knew being present at the Agreement made the 26th. April 1729 (when Prince of Neittingara) & which by positive & recent Promise he faithfully engaged shou'd not be violated and as nothing hitherto had been done to occasion a breach hereof, it was to be hoped his Majesty wou'd not be induced to deviate therefrom by any motive whatever, but on the contrary act upon the principals of uprightness & preserve what he never yet thought proper to disavow adding with all that the Trade of Pepper at Trevandarung & Brinjohn was likewise lost, by the encrease of what is annually required for the Tocally Pettee (founded by Doctor Ananga Perimal in the Reign of his present Majesty's Uncle) since it's first establishment & occasions a difference in Quantity near three hundred Candys annually those parts producing much thereabouts. In reply to which his Majesty Observed, the request made by him for a supply of Stores was not granted yet, & seeming greatly disgusted thereat; the Chief thought it not only necessary to promise him a hundred Musq^{ts}. in August or September next, but to give his word that the Honble President & Council shou'd be reminded thereof when we dispatched to Bombay, which soon brought him to a proper Humour, & after many arguments Pro & con, he seemed inclinable to give up the Point concerning the Honble Companys Pretentions to the Trade of Attinga but still wou'd not in direct terms declare the same but rather intended, that if it was possitively insisted upon, they must be contented with the Quantity of Pepper produced therein (which by the best Accounts that we can get does not Exceed Two hundred Candys annually) for it cou'd not be expected in such case that any wou'd be permitted to come hither from the Countrys he has Conquered & supporting at the same time his Ministers Alligations in respect to the late Pepper Contract. It being well known the greatest part of what is brought hither comes from those Parts which he excludes, seeming withall determined not to part with it but upon his own terms, & least such Demands shou'd be more Exorbitant, the Chief thought proper to drop the Subject in hopes of getting a much larger Quantity than cou'd otherwise be Expected & at the same time allmost Convinced, the Merchants of Attinga [durst] not sell us a Candy, notwithstanding his Majestys pretended Compliance; therefore began to Expostulate with him, about the large Share appropriated annually for the Dutch Company who never had shewn any disposition of friendship equal to what had been experienced from Our Honble Masters but on the Contrary invaded his Country destroying a great part thereof; & who after all, had broke three Articles of the last Agreement entered into upon concluding a Peace "First by declaring they wou'd not assist him in driving the French out of his Country if they

"attempted to settle therein. Secondly not putting him in possession of a Fort "in Changanauts Country. And Lastly by their Superiors absolutely refusing to supply him with Arms & Gunpowder annually for Two hundred Candys of Pepper, which being the real Case, consequently they had no Pretentions thereto at Present being the first violaters thereof. To which the King seemed not inclinable to give a direct Answer, evading the same by declaring it was true the Dutch-hitherto had not complied punctually with their engagements, but still he was certain a Quantity of Ammunition wou'd soon be delivered him at Cape Comorine expressing himself greatly surprised to find his Proposals slighted by Our Superiors at a time he was solicited to Support the Honble Companys Interest. Upon this the Chief assured him they had been reced & Considered of in a quite different manner to what his Majesty imagined, but as no Conquests had been made by him in this Queendom the Honble President & Council were of Opinion all Grants obtained from the Attinga Palace ought to be preserved; for which Consideration only, they esteemed it unnecessary to obtain others, therefore hoped his Majesty wou'd not entertain any such thoughts assuring him no disgust was intended to be given on the occasion desiring withall, that if he was determined to keep this Trade intirely in his own hands, a proper Quantity might be allotted for the Company, to whom he certainly lay under great Obligations for their friendly assistance in times past, which in effect was acknowledged by him, tho' he seemed to intimate, that more might have done been [sic] for his Service; however he declared to have their Wellfare at Heart in preference to that of any other European Nation, therefore shou'd be glad such Articles were entered into as might be of real Service, towards augmenting their Trade, for which purpose he wou'd readily give Permisson for erecting Banksalls in any Part of his Old or new Dominions provided they wou'd but protect them afterwards, & not suffer other Powers to invade his Country in those very Places; proposing at last to deliver us in all December next five hundred Candys of Pepper at Seventy five Rupees & Candy (which is Ten Rupees less than the Dutch give him for it) if money wou'd be advanced as last Season; which Quantity the Chief by all the Arguments Possible endeavoured to gett encreased but cou'd not Succeed therein, except in obtaining a Promise that if more was required to compleat the Tonnage of Our Expected Shipping & cou'd be got in these parts or those adjacent thereto--it should be delivered (therefore he was obliged to accept of those terms) as better cou'd not be obtained (And in respect to the making new Agreements it was Agreed between them, that as the former Proposals were not accepted of by Our Superiors, others shoud be delivered by his Majesty & all Original Grants whatever made between Europeans & his Palace produced that Copys might be taken thereof for their inspection likewise, so as to be the better judge how farr such effected the Honble Companys Trade and be enabled to take such a resolution as appeared to them necessary on the Occasion: which the King on his part promised shou'd be complied with upon meeting the Prince & such Ministers as were necessary to be consulted on so material an Affair. The Chief then took occasion to mention the frequent visits he observed lately made him by the French, which wou'd hardly be done he imagined without they had some hopes given them of a Settlement at Coletchee, tho' it was what his Majesty cou'd not well Consent to, nor they accept of as the Honble Company have a Grant now in their Possession of several Priviledges there signed by himself & confirmed by his Uncle so long since as the 30th. of July 1724. At the mention which he seemed greatly surprised & declared it had slipped his Memory adding withall, that as no part thereof had been put in Execution hitherto, it became necessary to renew what was Essential in the Articles he hoped wou'd soon be concluded between him & the Honble Company, declaring he had no thoughts of giving the French a footing there nor in any other part of his Country (if such an alliance was entered into) & that if any Efforts were made by them to Obtain the same in a Hostile manner they shou'd be opposed with the Utmost Vigour on his Part. However the Chief did not look upon such Rhetorick sufficient enough to make him allow the Grant of no Validity, therefore told him, if any additions cou'd be-

made thereto for Our Honble Masters Interest it wou'd (as he said) be necessary to communicate them in the manner proposed, but if otherwise what they had in Possession was full Sufficient to Answer their purposes, therefore a renewal thereof was quite unnecessary. He was afterwards reminded of the Promise made Mr. Bourcheir in respect to assisting us in recovering the Companys outstanding Debts (which to this time had not been Executed) & acquainted with the several Insolency's experienced of late from many of his Subjects especially from Savadana Poolah, who sent & Arrested People at Cotadally, & several Marcans of Boats, not making a report as usual (upon passing the Fort) to whom they belonged or whither Bound, quite inconsistent with the Antient Custom observed, Garrison Rules, & the Agreement made with Mr. Bourchier in which it's mentioned no Vessell belonging to a Subject of Attinga shall Navigate without an English Pass. All which grievances he assured the Chief shou'd be remedy'd in future, & then Ordered Matanda Poolah (Carracar of Cheringa) to assist us, immediately in recovering what was due to the Company from his Subjects, & in procuring any necessaries required for their Service, many Impediments having been Experienced lately & which was likewise Complained of to him. material Affairs being settled the Conference broke up with Expressions of a sincere friendship on both sides, & the Chief after giving his Majesty the Usual Present on such Occasions, had a small Gold Manilla & Chain of a triffling Value put upon his right wrist by him when the former set out directly for Travendarung, giving the Dollova Orders to Execute the Pepper Contract, & the latter return'd hither, leaving the Second Linguist behind to see the same drawn up in a proper

THE Dollova in his way to the Northward called on the Chief who reminded MONDAY him of the Kings Orders in respect to his executing an Ola for the Pepper Contract made Yesterday, which he absolutely declared cou'd not be complied with, unless what represented to the Second Linguist was Agreed to his Majesty having is talked to given him directions to draw out the same & possitively to incert that Declaration on the above Subject. therein; but upon being acquainted of what has since been wrote the King, he is prevailed at last proposed executing the same, if the Chief wou'd write an Ola to him upon to (as if at Cheringa) & signific therein the Substance thereof, in Order to vindicate contract for his Conduct, for proceeding contrary to Orders; which appearing to be of little 500 Candys or no Consequence & as it will Expedite Business, the Same is Complied with in substance as follows "That He had been informed of the Message sent by Our to the Second Linguist yesterday concerning the Contract for five hundred Candys of Pepper Promised by the King at Cheringa & had wrote his Majesty what blameless in sections. Fort) & considering of the same with him they both Agreed thereto; and the latter desired to write Mr. Pattle for his Sentiments on the Occasion, as the Conference with the Dollova wou'd not admit of a regular Council being Summoned, who in reply gave it as his Opinion, that He thought it was the Honble Governor & Councils Orders that no more Pepper be brought for above the limitted Price which was sixty Rupees & Candy & Presently afterwards sent us the following Letter.

I GRISTANNEN RAMAYEN Dollova & Minister to the King of Travencore Dohereby Declare that in Truth a Contract is adjusted & made by me with the Commodore of Anjengo Thomas Byfeld Esqr. for the Quantity of five hundred Candys of Pepper which I oblige myself to deliver the Honble English Company at the rate of seventy five Rupees P Candy either in their Warehouse at Eddova or Anjengo by the End of December next with any further Quantity that can be gott in these parts at the same Price. In testimony of which I pass this Agreement under my hand this 11th. day of June 1750 acknowledging to have received on Account thereof vizt.

Our Advices to Bombay being made up agreeable to an Order of Council Advices to this day the same is dispatched & a short Letter signed to the Honble President & Fort St. Council of Fort St. David requesting they will forward it upon receipt with the David Utmost Expedition, the Contents thereof relating to a late Contract made by us Dispatched. for Pepper. We likewise acknowledged therein the receipt of their favour dated the 23d. Ulto. with the List of Shipping enclosed.

The Chief received an Ola from Christna Annavy advising his Majesty had by the Bearer thereof (a Nayr) returned a Deserter from us who had he imagined flew from hence through fear of Punishment for breach of Orders desiring the man might be pardoned.

This man was a Topass Soldier in the Honble Companys Service & with another last Month, passed the North Trunkeer by the Sea Side disguised as Deserting. Cooleys in the Night & went to Momply of which the Gaurd having Notice watched for their return, & took his Comrade which he perceiving fled immediately over the River (tho' fired at by the Centinal) so that the Chief Answered Christna Annavys Letter by desiring him to give his Majesty thanks for returning the Annavy. Deserter who was Pardoned as it had been requested by him, tho' his fault deserved & required a most rigorous Punishment, giving assurances that if any of the Kings People took Sanctuary here on such like Occasions, he shoud Experience the like return of friendship.

It having been Observed that the Military are frequently disguised in Liquor Romarks on & not capable of doing their Duty, useing very blasphemous language & committing many Riots, occasioned by an Herb Distilled in the Arrack (& sold by numbers Drunkenof People belonging to the other side) which not only intoxicates the sooner but ness.

Ola to the King about routing several Vagabonds disorderly Persons from Momply. Several Vagabon'd People turned out of this Place formerly as disorderly loose Persons guilty of many Crimes, having by report settled at & about Momply committing several Thefts & irregularity's at Cotadally &ca. & by whom it was proved (upon Examination) that the Deserted returned to us Yesterday had been intered thither; it was thought necessary to advise the King thereof, & which the Chief did by an Ola wrote on the Occasion in Substance as follows. "That several People were turned out of the Trunkiers here for disorderly & loose behaviour who having taken Sanctuary at Momply, frequently committed disturbance to the Prejudice of Our Inhabitants at Cotadally & other inoffensive People; & being a Sett of Vagabonds who had no visible means of getting an Honest Livelyhood, desired his Majesty (in Order to prevent any further Mischief from them) to send some of his People hither, who in Conjunction with Ours wou'd seize & banish them the Country, Observing at the same time, that by the Articles with the Palace of Attinga the Christians living by the Sea Side, from Eddova to Brinjohn were subject to the Honble Company's Goverment [sic] (tributary only to the Country Goverment [sic]) but as the People themselves pay this Tax it has prevented them being used with that Vigour their Crimes deserved.

In Answer to the foregoing Letter the Chief wrote Serjeant Peacock that he Observed the quantity of Cloth delivered into Warehouse & what was in the Washermans hands, amounted to no more than 4010 Pieces which was farr short Serieant of what he Expected to be in readiness from the Solemn Promises made by Nelle- Peacock. apem Chitty in May last & so large a Sum as fanams One hundred & seventy thousand Eight hundred & forty three being then advanced him to carry on the Investment; directing him therefore upon Receipt hereof, to make private Enquiry what time the Chittys, gave money to the Weavers, & if any other Contracts have been made by them with the Dutch. If so, the Sortments Agreed for Prices And Quantity to this time delivered there being great reason to imagine the present backwardness of their Engagements proceeds from some of these causes. As for sending of money he was told, it cou'd not be thought of at present (being a very unreasonable request) from the small Progress made in securing the Cloth Agreed for which is thirty thousand Pieces (exclusive of four thousand two hundred & sixty two Pieces remaining of their old Contract to be Complied with on the following conditions vizt. "That the whole Contract for "thirty thousand Pieces is to be delivered into Warehouse by the end of December "next upon the Sum of One hundred & thirty thousand fanams being advanced " last May & on delivery of Cloth to the amount of fifty thousand fanams a further "Sum of Eighty thousand fanams, which sum when made good in Cloth, the like Sum must again be issued & so Continued till the whole is compleated."

present, which may be repaid when the Exchange rises, otherwise the Investment will be greatly retarded as he now wants an advance, & says if Rupees are sent it will be the 20th. or 25th. before they can be Exchanged, therefore being greatly distressed for money desires fanams may be procured. That the Vattaw of Madura fanams has raised from Ten to Twenty & Cent which occasions himself & Partners to loose One fanam & a half in each Piece of the Salampores No. 5 & 6 & Long Cloth Brown No. 7. Adding that He duely observes what the Chief writes him about the Price of Cotton & Thread being cheaper than formerly, which remark he says a little time past was just, but at present these Articles are dearer than formerly, & concludes with saying, that possibly some of his Adversary's (tho' they loose for one Year) may give the Honble Company some Cloth, but they have no such inclination, neither desire to be gainers making this years Contract purely to Oblige the Chief & to shew their ready inclination for serving the Honble Company.

Upon a Statement of the Cloth delivered in It appears after allowing the Salampores No. 5 & 6 & Long Cloth Brown No. 7 to be a part of the last Years Balance (tho' it cannot be Expected as that quantity by Agreement is only to be made good in all September next) that a thousand & fifty Pieces of Salampores No. 4 has actually been received into Warehouse, & seven hundred Eighty Pieces sent to the Washermans (which by this time may be delivered likewise) on Account the present Years Contract (which will in the whole amot to fifty three thousand & seventy fanams) the BOARD are therefore of Opinion that the request now made is consistent with the Engagements entered into, & as there can be but few (if any) purchasers of Cloth from the Northward at this Season of the Year, which may be of some Service in getting in Our Investment early IT IS AGREED to comply therewith, & that the Chief write a Letter to the King of Travencore, requesting him to lend the Honble Company what is sufficient for this Purpose & defraying other Charges of the Settlement the Exchange of Rupees being so low as Six fanams One Maggonney & a half (& even at that rate a very small Sum of fanams procurable) depositing Rupees for the amount thereof, 'till a proper Opportunity offers for Exchanging them advantageously on Account of Our Honble Masters; but in Case of failure an advance must be made in Rupees at the Cotata Price least Our endeavouring to save a triffling Sum thereby may occasion a Disappointment in the Investment.

The Chiefs Letter to Serjeant Peacock not being yet dispatched he made an Addition Addition thereto ordering him to acquaint the Chittys their Ola has been reced Serieunt & that the request made therein for money will be complyed with in a few days Letter. if fanams can be gott, assuring them of always being supplied in time directing him likewise constantly to advise the Price of Cotton & Thread when he writes, & not rely solely upon our Contractors for Information.

AGREEABLE to Yesterdays Resolution of Council an Ola was wrote by the Chief to the King, requesting the favour of him to lend the Honble Company One Hundred thousand fanams for about two or three Months, in lieu of which a Deposite of Rupees shou'd be made, acquainting him the reason for making this Application was owing to the Scarcity of fanams, which retarded the Honble Companys fanams. Cloth Investment going on so quick as was absolutely necessary. That He was in Expectation of seeing his Ministers shortly with the Agreements promised to be shewn him & desired they with the money might be sent without Loss of time.

SUNDAY Ola to the King for a

By the return of Nelleapem Chittys Pattamars, the Chief wrote him an Ola Ola to acknowledging the receipt of his, & in reply thereto cou'd not help complaining chitty. of his tardiness in delivering the Cloth, as he observed a much larger quantity was reced monthly, in the time of his Predecessor & which might be Expected rather to Encrease, from the large Sums of money they have been advanced for this Article, but still no greater diligence is observed on their parts & if the same delitoriness [sic] was Experienced in future, they must Expect to loose that Esteem the Honble Company have for them. That being well assured Cotton & Thread was Cheap, it was in vain for any one to alledge they wou'd be sufferers; but as Our inclination was not to employ other Merchants, therefore the more deligence out [sic] to be shewn on his part to comply with the present Contract, & give the Honble Company the Ordinary Salampores & Long Cloth, which he had been told was Expected. That in respect to money application was made to the King for fanams & when they arrived (which was soon Expected) his Servant shou'd be dispatched therewith, recommending the Collecting a large quantity of Cloth together in the Intrim.

The Chief received an Ola from Christna wrote by Order of his Majesty acknowledging the receipt of his, requesting a loan of one hundred thousand DAY 12TH. fanams, which the King cou'd not immediately comply with as the Governments Christma [sic] money was in Rupees but that he had sent a Pawn to Cotata for procuring a Annavy. quantity which (or at least) some part thereof shou'd be sent with all expedition. That His Majesty had delivered Savadana Poolah the two Agreements with directions to present them to the Chief, but his father departing this Life at the same time, prevented his coming hither till the Funeral Ceremony was over. That three different Propositions accompanyed his Ola, which his Majesty desired might be sent to Bombay & that the Chief after perusing thereof would Send his Opinion concerning them.

The Honble English Company may build a Fort at Cape Comorine, another at Mangalaaratupia, And in Cotteatu (which is in Tucumcurru's Country) one Banksall and in all other parts of my Country as many Banksalls & Factory's as they shall think proper.
 - That the English Company shall engage to preserve & defend my Country before mentioned against any persecutions of the French & Dutch giving Protection to all Vessells at Sea belonging to such Merchants as are my Vassalls.

- In the time of my being at warr, the Honble English Company shall 4th. assist me with proper Gunners & other necessary's, keeping a sufficient force to defend their own Fortifications.
- 5th. If the Honble English Company will Agree to the foregoing Proposals, I Oblige myself annually to give them five thousand Candys of Pepper, all the Cloth & Cassia with such other Goods as are the Produce of my Kingdom.

THE SECOND

- FROM Cape Comorine to Mangalaaratupia, & to the Eastward up to Cotteatu, are my Kingdom & Conquests. The Honble English Com-Article 1st. pany may therefore build a Fort at Cape Comorine, another at Mangalaaratupia, with as many Banksalls as they think proper, in Propositions. any other part of the Country that seems to them Convenient.
 - 2d. The Honble English Company must take care to preserve & defend this Country from being persecuted by any European Nation, & not permit of any Molestation to be given the Vessells belonging to such of my Subjects as are Merchants.
 - 3d. If I am at Warr with any Mallabar Kings, the Honble English Company jointly with the Dutch shall assist me with Artillery & Ammunition of Warr at the Price they cost in Europe.
 - THAT during the Warr both Company's shall likewise jointly send me 4th. some Gunners to point & fire my Cannon.
 - Shou'd these Propositions be Agreed to by the Honble English Com-5th. pany I engage to deliver them Two thousd five hundred Candys of Pepper annually & to the Dutch Company the like quantity dividing the Cloth & Cassia in equall parts to each.
 - IF these Propositions are Agreeable I will find means to have a meeting between the Commodores of Cochien, & Anjengo at a Place appointed for that purpose. And I now wait for an Answer in respect thereto.

 - 3d. WHEN I am at Warr the Honble English Company must assist & send me proper Gunners to fire my Cannon after they have reserved what are Sufficient to defend their own Fort.
 - Ir the Honble English Company Agree to these Articles I oblige myself to deliver them annually One thousand Candys of Pepper, & the like quantity of Cloth they gett at Present.

In reply to Christna Annavy's Ola reced Yesterday with the foregoing Proposals the Chief wrote the King of Travencore as follows.

- **J**ULY 1750 —

By the Hands of Matanda Poolah Carracar of Cheringa I receiv'd your Chiefs Majestys three Propositions the Circumstances of which I cannot now fully Answer, the Kings for want of seeing those Articles that have been Entered into between your Majesty Proposals. the French & Dutch But must Observe this Queendom is included in those now sent, whereas you very well know it appertains solely to the Queen of Attinga (no Conquest to this time having been made thereof by any Power whatever) and in which the Honble English Company have undoubted Priviledges of Trade from that Palace exclusive of all other European Nations, of which your Majesty seemed thoroughly convinced at Our late meeting & at the same time must well remember that the Honble Company have in their Possession a Grant from you (confirmed by the King of Travencore in the year 1724) of Several Priviledges at Coletchee; therefore it is highly necessary to Explain such Circumstances, with the greatest clearness in Your Majesty's present Proposals. I likewise observe the quantity of Pepper your Majesty has assigned for the Honble Company is mentioned, without any further Explanation, but as my Superiors will want to know in what manner it is to be got & the Price thereof I must therefore desire Your Majesty will write me fully about it when the other references now made are Answered, & that I may soon have a sight of the Articles which Christna Annavy informs me was intended to be sent by Savadana Poolah (who it seems at Present is busily employed about his fathers funeral) & if it then shou'd be inconvenient for Your Majesty to call here going to the Northward as was Agreed upon, please to appoint a proper place for our meeting, that no further delays may be Experienced in this material Affair.

Myself & Predecessor has frequently received Your Majesty's Promise that the old outstanding Balances of Pepper shou'd be made good without Delay, but to this time no part thereof has been received, for which reason I am now to renew my Solicitation's & desire your Majesty's absolute Orders to the Caracar for weighing it off, as some of them (Named Rama Annavy of Quilone) pleaded an Excuse some time past that the rain prevented him sending his part, since when he has taken no notice thereof, tho' the weather has since been fair & clear. I must likewise desire your Majesty will give the necessary directions for such Merchants as are the Honble Companys Debtors to adjust Accounts & pay whatever Balances are due from them not one (Except Chimilly) appearing before me since your Majesty gave Orders for that Purpose to the Carracar of Cheringa.

THE Chief reced an Ola from the King of Travencore advising him that every Ola from the thing would be settled agreeable to his inclination by the Carracar of Cheringa to King of Travencore whom he had sent peremptory Orders for that Purpose, enjoining him not to deviate therefrom. That in times past it has been usual upon the removal of Chiefs to make proposals agreeable to their necessity's, & which on his part has been observed tho' as yet never attended to; therefore that there may be no more disputes about Agreements, he desires the Chief will use his Endeavours to get the Proposals now made by him agreed to, when there will not only be a strict Union of friendship between the Honble Company & his Government but nothing wanting to preserve & maintain the same. That he shall shortly send People with the Copy's of those Articles entered into with the French & Dutch Company's, adding that what was necessary to mention to Bombay, Christna Annavy had wrote in his Ola sent with the Propositions. That having been advised of the old Linguist's Death, he hopes his Successor will be a Person of Credit, & one who will faithfully interpret what passes between the Chief & himself.

MATANDA POOLAH who was the Bearer of this Ola acquainted the Chief with A Detatchhis Maiestv's Orders to him & it being thereupon Agreed, to expell such Vagabonds in Co as were lurking about Momply, he sent ten of his Nayrs with a Serjeant & four of the Kings Topass's, who presently picking them up they were directed immediately to quit the Country & given to understand by him that their Lives wou'd be in danger Vagabonds upon returning hither again.

SATUR-DAY 14. Ola from Nelliapem Chitty. An Ola from Nellipa Chitty to the Chief came to hand this day wherein he acknowledges to have reced that wrote him the 7th. Instant & says the rainy weather which has continued thirty days together prevented so much Cloth being in readiness as might otherwise have been Expected. That to the 10th. of this Month they had gott in four hundred & thirty seven Pieces of Salampores No. 4 & two hundred & five Pieces of Salampores No. 5 & 6 & six hundred & ninety Pieces Long Cloth Brown No. 7. which with what reced in former Months makes the whole quantity five thousand three hundred & thirty Eighty Pieces therefore are now much in want of money, complaining they are great loosers in the Ordinary Cloth, by the low Vattaw at Madura & even will find much difficulty to Exchange Fanams into Rupees by the great Scarcity of that Coin tho' so low at present as six fanams two Maggonneys & a half however desire their Writer may be dispatched with a Supply immediately & conclude with being highly Sensible of the favour received in preferring them to other Merchants.

3,000 Rupees Advanced Nelleapem Chitty. As the Chitty's write so very pressingly for an advance & representing the great Scarcity of fanams withall, the Chief proposes to let their Writer have four hundred & forty eight Venetians & a third at twenty eight fanams & eight Maggoneys & five thousand five hundred & three fanams three quarters at six fanams One Maggoney & a half out of his Own private Cash in Order to prevent a Stop being put to the Investment which being readily accepted at that rate they are delivered him to be sent away immediately & the amount thereof being Rupees three thousand is this day paid out of the Treasury accordingly.

MONDAY 16TH. Letter from Serjt. Peacock. The Chief received a Letter from Serjeant James Peacock dated at Cotata the 13th. Instant acknowledging the receipt of his Commands and that conformable thereto he had acquainted Nelleapem Chitty of every thing necessary relating to the Investment, who gave his word that all the Cloth shou'd be in Warehouse by the End of December, as he designs delivering about five thousand Pieces & Month, & desired him to write very pressingly for money as there was a great want thereof. That within seven days past he has reced four hundred & thirty three Pieces of Salampores No. 4. Two Hundred & five Pices of Salampores No. 5 & 6 & Six hundred Ninety Pieces Long Cloth No. 7 adding that He does not hear the Chittys have made any Engagements with the Dutch, but that they send them annually bout [sic] forty or fifty Pieces of Long Cloth inferior in goodness to Ours & which is called Anna Catch. That Coarse Cotton is Twenty Two fanams & Telong fine Cotton twenty five fanams & Telong & thread of all sorts from Twelve Maggonneys to one fanam & Tollong. THURS-Ola to Neleapem Chitty.

The Chief in reply to Nelleapem Chitty's Ola reced the 14th. Instant advised DAY 19TH. him his writer had been kep't 'till now in Expectation of Our receiving some fanams which were still hourly expected, but to prevent any delitoriness [sic] he had sent (of his own) some Venetians & fanams to the amount of three thousand Rupees (the Exchange of which was settled with his writer, who wou'd inform him thereof) & had this day delivered Ten thousand Rupees more to be Exchanged at the Current Price of Cotata when they arrived, therefore he must be advised thereof. That it wou'd be much more Credit for him, to use his fervent Endeavours to comply with his present Contract before Our Shipping arrived & pay in the old Balance, than make such repeated Promises that were (he might be assured) of no Effect And as the Honble Company's Ships will be here much earlier this Season than Usual a double deligence must be shewn on his part; referring him for other particulars to the Bearer.

Letter to Serjt. Peacock

A Letter was likewise wrote by the Chief to Serjeant James Peacock acknowledging receipt of his Advices dated the 13th. Instant & acquainting him it was with pleasure Observed the solemn Promises made by the Chittys concerning the Investment, but still, as they are Mallabars he must watch them closely. the 11th. Instant Eighteen thousand two hundred eighty one & one quarter fanams was sent them which at the then rate of Exchange (Six fanams, one Maggonney & a half) amounts to Rupees three thousand & their Servant now carrys Ten thousand Rupees in hopes the Vattaw will be more in favour of the Company than when he wrote the last (Fans. 6. $2\frac{1}{2}$) so that proper Notice must [sic] taken thereof when he arrives therewith and information given hither accordingly, as the Sum is to be transferred to there Account in fanams let the Exchange be more or less-Directing him as this large advance is made, to acquaint the Chitty's that we Expect to hear of no delay's whatever & that he hasten them in the delivery of what they promised monthly.

Ola to the King of Porca.

As the King of Porca still delays sending his Ministers to adjust the depending Accounts, in relation to the Sloops Stores & those of Govinda Shroof with the private Merchants which the late Linguist's Brother in Law acquainting the Chief, some People now there (who are likewise concerned) & lately arrived from Jaffnapatam where [sic] desirous of bringing to a Conclusion He wrote his Majesty as follows "That finding him still evade the promise made of sending hither a proper Minister to settle which had so long been in dispute, he took another occasion to remind him thereof Our late Linguists Brother in Law having declared, that his Merchants were desirous of settling their Accounts, but cou'd not do it without his Majesty's Permission. He therefore was to repeat his request for a Compliance therewith, desiring his Minister might be sent likewise.

In reply to what wrote the King of Travencore under the 13th. Instant the Chief received the following Ola from him vizt. ٠.

I have reced your Letter & observe therein your Sentiments concerning my Propositions, but before I can Answer you I must first know which of the three Agreements can be consented to.

I Duely take notice likewise of what you mention concerning the Honble Companys Priviledges in the Queendom of Attinga which if so how comes it the Dutch Company were suffered to pay such little respect to your Colours? and in defiance thereof commit many Damages at Eddova? firing several Shott on Shore at Pudamadurra at which time I dont remember the English Company made any Opposition neither did they send out so much as four Soldiers to defend their Priviledges & which is the real Occasion of their being destroyed. However if you will now advise me with certainty from & to what Place the Company will defend these my Dominions on any Occasion I will then Agree about a Place for Our meeting to adjust the same.

You mention to have writings in Possession for many Priviledges at Coletchee, how then comes it to pass that the Dutch were permitted to destroy that Place likewise, & which thereby makes the same of no Effect.

Mutty Chitty to be sent to the King. SAVADANA POOLAH having always proved himself an Advocate for the French, it's presumed his coming here will only embarrass the depending Affairs, than be a means of bringing the same to a Conclusion, as business cannot be Entered upon with that Sincerity as is necessary on such occasions, & none of his Majesty's other Ministers being expected here from the Northward for some time The Chief dispatched Mutty Chitty (who has frequently been employ'd in affairs of Consequence & discharged the Trust reposed in him with great Zeal & Integrity) to Cocalone where the King still remains, giving him proper Instructions accordingly; the Substance of which is as follow's vizt.

The Chiefs instructions to him.

That with Concern he Observed his Majesty seemed inclinable to annul the Honble Company's Priviledges in the Queendom of Attinga after what passed between them at Cheringa; especially as it was then likewise Agreed to bury in Oblivion past Actions on all sides, & if possible to get such Articles of Agreement concluded upon, that wou'd preserve a strict Union of friendship between the Honble Company & this Goverment [sic]. And that agreeable thereto he had wrote his Superiors.

THAT his Majesty's declaring no assistance was affoarded from hence in the late Warrs, seems to be without any foundation, as it appears he has been charged upon the Honble Company's Books for a large Supply of Stores at that time, with which & his interfering as an Allie, the Enemys invasion was certainly stopped; But surely that does not entitle him to an Absolute Prerogative in this Country; & which if insisted upon will make him appear acting the part of an Enemy rather than that of a friend. Besides he must well remember an Ensign Command was sent from hence to the Pagoda of Chatomcoil to frustrate the Enemies Scheams [sic] about Eddova. And if the Gentlemen's Conduct at that time had not been Agreeable his Majesty woud hardly have promised Mr. Whitewell at Rutterah in October 1741 (which was after the Warr) that all Pepper shou'd be stopped going elsewhere but to Anjengo'& in November 1743 engaged to encrease the annual quantity from five hundd. to Seven hundred & fifty Candy's. That upon the whole as he hears the Ola was wrote & sent from the Northward (Copy of which is now transmitted for his Perusal) there is still reason to imagine it will be found not in the least Agreeable to his Majesty's Sentiments.

That having a jealousy of Savadana Poolah, he shou'd be glad other Ministers could be sent with the French & Dutch Agreements, as he might then conferr on other affairs of Consequence, tho he shou'd rather chuse to meet his Majesty at Travendrung in Person, if his Affairs will not permit of his coming further than that Place.

That what mentioned about including the Honble Company's former Priviledges of Trade in the proposals now sent by his Majesty is to prove we have Grants of a much later date than any other European Nation that shou'd pretend to make any Encroachments where their Liberty of Trade Extends to.

That no Objections were made to the Pepper Merchants Accounts when settled before the Dollova, as Mutty Chitty cou'd inform his Majesty being then present, therefore desire he will be pleased to give Orders for the Payment thereof without delay & such other Balances as are due to the Honble Company from private Merchants as # List of their Names delivered him.

That he request his Majesty will make up the Sum borrowed of him One hundred thousand fanams agreeable to promise being in great want thereof.

THAT He communicates the foregoing to his Majesty in private & not within the hearing of Savadana Poolah, who it seems is the only Minister now about his Person; reporting upon his Arrival at Cocalone that he is

going to Cotata, To which place he must proceed to inspect the Cloth Investment, enquiring into the Chittys proceedings & get good intelligence what Price has & is given for Cotton, Thread &ca. & the Exchange of Coins &ca.

By Mutty Chitty the Chief wrote his Majesty an Ola, acquainting him that as Mutty Chitty none of his Ministers were arrived, the Chitty was sent to communicate several to the King. Affairs agreeable to the Minutes delivered him desiring he might be heard with Patience & Attention.

THE Chief likewise wrote a Letter to Serjeant Peacock, directing him to let Letter to Mutty Chitty inspect the Investment, as he was sent with a proper Message to the James Records and the Control of t Contractors, on their shewing a Tardiness in delivering the Cloth promised; That they cou'd not expect the money last sent them, shou'd be passed in the Account at the Exchange mentioned in his Letter, as it was at Six fanams Two Maggonneys & a half when their Servant received it; And when they were advanced in Venetians no more than Twenty eight fanams & eight Maggonneys was charged by the Chief, tho' they rose before taken away (by their own Account received) to Twenty eight fanams & twelve Maggonneys therefore there can be no reason to make any Objections at receiving them upon the same Conditions.
