LETTER FROM THE ASSISTANT COLLECTOR, NORTHERN DIVISION, TO THE SUPERINTENDENT, DATED THE 1ST NOVEMBER 1796.—Forwards a report of his personal investigation of the outstanding balances of his division in fasli 1205; requests that the sanction of the Board may be obtained for the total remission of these balances; expresses great satisfaction that the claims of the real and the pretended have been thoroughly discriminated; states the causes of the failure noted against each defalcation. LETTER FROM THE ASSISTANT COLLECTOR, CENTRAL DIVISION, TO THE SUPERINTENDENT, DATED THE 24TH JULY 1797.—Presumes that the share of Government was not more than one-third of the crop of the farmers; does not believe that so many ryots as one-fourth in ordinary years and one-half in bad years borrow money to pay their rents so long as they find lenders; cannot admit that the balances of the one-fourth or half of the ryots who fail are collected by an extra assessment from those who have money; that although the minute investigation alluded to may increase the number of applications for remissions, yet it will diminish in a tenfold degree the number of those who pay for it without reason; does not believe that every one that borrows will be a defaulter; compares the number of defaulters in the Northern Division with that in the Central and gives reasons why the failures were so less in his division last year; states that his Tahsildars were never obliged to press the ryots for rents to the utmost extremity so as to endanger the collections of the next year but to stop short whenever a ryot tries to make good the payment by selling any part of his farm or stock, that in consequence they pushed their demand to the utmost so as to bring in a much greater accounts of remissions than is actually necessary; the plan of joint responsibility is known in his division and tends greatly to restrain the demand for remission; solicits the Board's sanction for the remission of the outstanding balances in his division of the land-rent amounting to pagodas 877-20-48; gives reasons for the failure of crops in the two northern districts of the Central Division. XLIV. LETTER FROM THE ASSISTANT COLLECTOR, CENTRAL DIVISION, TO THE SUPERINTENDENT, DATED THE 24TH SEPTEMBER 1797.—Reports that, if the farmers are permitted to take or reject whatever lands they please, the failures will be very trifling; contends that losses do not always occasion failures and points out the only case where a remission becomes absolutely necessary; proposes a new plan as to how to make all failures good; requests the Superintendent's opinion as to the mode to be followed regarding defaulters; condemns the practice of seizing cattle and ploughs, but suggests that the farmers' all other properties be confiscated for the payment of the outstanding balance, as this would be less prejudicial to agriculture; the Sārkār will have no further claim on the farmer if the latter pays all that is due; proposes a new plan for regulating takāvi sureties	46—47
