GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. GEORGE, DATED OCTOBER 5, 1737.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 42, pages 1-10.*]

OUR PRESIDENT AND

COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. Our Last was dated the 9<sup>th</sup>. February 1736, and being sent but by Two Conveyances, Copy thereof comes enclosed in the Godolphin's Packet, the Devonshire and Nottingham saild out of the Downes the 27<sup>th</sup>. February in Company with the Lyell and Winchester; the Heathcote saild the 20<sup>th</sup>. March.

2. This Season it hath pleased God to return Us the following Ships Viz<sup>t</sup>. the Britannia on the 19<sup>th</sup>. April, the Prince William from your Place the 9<sup>th</sup>. May, the Lynn the 23<sup>th</sup>. June, the Walpole and Princess of Wales the 28<sup>th</sup>. June, the Normanton, Richmond and Ha'slingfield the 26<sup>th</sup>. July, the Duke of Lorrain and Grantham the 6<sup>th</sup>., the Wyndham the 10<sup>th</sup>. and Defence the 22<sup>th</sup>. August, Harrington and Shaftsbury the 11<sup>th</sup>. September.

3. By the Prince William, Grantham and Shaftsbury We received your Advices of the 1<sup>st</sup>. and 5<sup>th</sup>. October, 29<sup>th</sup>. January and 16<sup>th</sup>. February, which as usual shall be taken Notice of at Large by Our Latter Ships, and We shall now proceed to acquaint you with such Particulars as are more immediately necessary.

4. And First We have thought proper to take up the following Ships for the carrying on Our Trade this Ensuing Season Viz<sup>t</sup>.

5. Our Supra Cargos to Mocha, are Messieurs Francis D'abbadie, James Sanders and William Frederick Boscawen.

6. We send this by Our Ships Godolphin and Princess Mary, and We have Loaden on board them One hundred Chests Treasure, Some Broad Cloth, Lead, Iron and other Merchandize according to their Respective Invoices and Bills of Loading enclos'd in the Packet.

7. Our List of Investment for the Choromandel Coast comes herewith, We are sorry to acquaint you that the Prices of Callicoes are very considerably fallen in Europe, which We severely felt in the Sale of the Prince William's Cargo, so that We earnestly recommend it to you to procure Our Goods on the best Terms possible agreeable to the said List.

8. After reserving a Sufficient Stock for the carrying on Our Investment, and other Needfull Occasions, you must consign to the Bay, on Our Several Ships sent thither, all the Surplus Treasure in such Proportions of Bullion and Rupees, as Our President and Council at Fort William may require.

9. We have consign'd you the Godolphin thus early, that she may reach Madrass in time to be sent to China, and accordingly We hereby direct that you put on board her, in Treasure, Lead, Long-Ells and other Articles which you may have reason to apprehend will turn to a Good Account there, to such an Amount as you shall think proper to be invested in Gold, Teutenague, Sugar, Sugar-Candy, Allom, China Ware and other Commoditys proper for the Madrass Market, wherein We give you a Liberty to be concern'd, such a Proportion as you shall think fit, making the whole a Joynt Stock, in the same manner as We directed in all respects, as to the Royal Guardian last Year.

10. We again leave the Choice of the Supra Cargos to you, and the ordering such a Quantity of the several Species of Goods as you shall judge best.

11. To avoid many mistakes We must add What we wrote upon that occasion, the Voyage must be debted a reasonable Sum for the Hire of the Ship, wherein regard must be had to the Demorage incurred, and the Charge of sending a Country Ship.

12. The Success of the Voyage so much depends upon an early Dispatch from your Place and China, that the ship must be hastned thither as soon as possible, and the Needfull Orders must be given the Supra Cargos, to Dispatch her back to you in good time, that so she may be returned to Us the same Season, as otherwise you cannot but be Sensible, the Demorage that will be incurr'd must fall very heavy upon Us.

13. We hereby repeat Our Orders as to Surplus Tonnage, directing that no more Goods be put on board Our Ships Homeward bound, that We are obliged by Charterparty to Load, Unless the Comanders agree in writing on behalf of the Owners to accept of Half Freight for all Surplus Goods, and their Original Agreement must be sent Us in the Respective Packets.

14. And as to Salt Petre, you must put on board each Ship such a Quantity over and above the Charterparty Kintlage, as the Captains shall request for, at Twelve Pounds Sixteen Shillings and Eight Pence a Ton, and the same is not to be reckoned any part of the Charterparty Tonnage.

15. Our Comanders are allowd the same Indulgence as last Year, and We hereby enjoyn a Compliance with the Orders then given respecting them in the 22<sup>th</sup>. 23<sup>th</sup>. and 24<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of Our first Letter of that Year.

16. The Ship Marlborough in her last Voyage, was consign'd directly to you, notwithstanding which, the Comander alledges, That you acquainted him he might proceed to the Bay when he pleased, for that you should not take him under your Directions, and after he had layn Thirteen days, sail'd to Bengal without any Orders in writing for so doing.

17. Your mistaking the Ships Consignment was a very great Neglect, and you were still further to blame, in not taking notice in the Consultation Book, when Cap<sup>t</sup>. Hunt was acquainted he might proceed to the Bay, the consequence of which is, the Owners are allow'd Demorage for all the time this Ship lay at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, as she must have had, even to the Expiration of her Charterparty, had she layn so long.

18. On Perusal of Your Consultations, We Perceive that the Ballance of Our Cash is duly examin'd by the Council every Month, pursuant to Our Orders, this is well, and the same must in all times be continu[e]d. and We hereby enjoyn all the Subordinate Factorys the like Practice, We have suffered so very severely at Dacca, and in other Parts of India from the Chiefs Embezzling Our Cash, that it calls aloud for the most Vigorous and Prudent Measures, to be taken by those who are at the Head of Our Affairs, to prevent Effectually all such Notorious Breaches of Trust.

19. Two of Our Ships the Ockham and Compton were destroy'd by Fire and We cannot help observing, that the Commanders of them were both ashore, when the Ships were consumed, it is but too Evident that Mankind in General, are far from being so circumspect, Carefull and Vigilant as they ought, when the Masters Eye is not over them, We have fatally experienced it, and therefore all Our Commanders must be positively directed to keep on board as much as possible during their Stay in India.

20. Supply Our Island S<sup>t</sup>. Helena with Two hundred Pieces Long Cloth, they having again indented for that Quantity.

21. We have order'd the Ship Resolution to call at Madagascar and given Directions to the Com<sup>m</sup>ander and Chief Mate to purchase Three Hundred Slaves or more, and they are to proceed thence to Bombay, We have given Directions to Our President and Council there, to send you by the Nassau & Anglesey, or the best Conveyance that offers, one Third of the Men, Women and Children brought thither; upon their Arrival you must forward them to Bencoolen by the first Opportunity.

22. Several of the Commanders having borrow'd mony of Us at Respondentia, in case they should offer to pay any Sum into Our Cash in part of their Bonds, you must receive the same, being very Explicit in Your Receipts, that the mony so paid in, is upon that Account.

23. Our List of Investment as before mentioned comes enclos'd not doubting your best Endeavours will be exerted to comply therewith, We observe the Many Difficultys you Labour under in meeting with bad Seasons, and thereby want of Grain so frequently, and the few Merchants who are willing or able to undertake the Investment, the former is a Temporary Evil, and We hope the times will mend, the many Grain Vessells employd on your Coast may in some measure alleviate it, and by due Encouragement being given to Merchants to reside at your Place, Our Business may be forwarded.

24. We have desired Harry Gough Esq<sup>r</sup>. Josias Wordsworth Esq<sup>r</sup>. S<sup>r</sup>. William Billers And Matthew Martin Esq<sup>r</sup>. to be Our Secret Committee for the Current Year, to appoint Signals for Our Ships, The Orders you may receive from those Gentlemen, or any Three of them relating thereto, must be duely complied with.

25. The Resolution Captain Bagwell is ordered to relieve the Wilmington, in Guarding the Mallabar Coast against Angria's Piracys, and We have invested the Commander with the like Powers, as were given to Captain Massey last year, and directed that after the Easterly Monsoon is over, the Resolution shall be sent to your Place and Bengal, with Pepper to be shott loose at half Freight on Our Homeward bound Ships, and then to be return'd back to Bombay, with Sixty Tons of Red Wood & One hundred & fifty Tons of Salt Petre, with such Freight as may offer, and so to be dispatch'd home from Bombay.



26. We shall order the Duke of Cumberland Our Bombay Ship, first to proceed Bengal for Salt Petre and Red Wood, to Kintlage and Dunnidge Our Ships from that side of India, and the Nassau and Anglesey two of Our Coast and Bay Ships, to be first consign'd to Bombay with Ammunition and Stores, and thence to be sent, with Pepper and Cotton to your Place and Bengal, the former Article to be shott Loose on Our Returning Ships at Half Freight, and the Latter must be forwarded to the Bay.

27. The Scarborough (One of Our West Coast Ships, will be directed first to proceed to Bengal, there to take in Salt Petre for Kintlageing Our Ships from thence.

28. And the Royal George is order'd to be Laid in for a Freight to Surat or Elsewhere, as Our President and Council in Bengal shall esteem most for Our Interest; and for preserving the English Navigation, and to vie with the French, We have come to a Resolution that a Ship shall annually be laid in for a Freight in the Bay.

29. The Beaufort will be directed to call at the Madeiras, to bring you and the Bay a Supply of Wine from thence.

30. In case M<sup>r</sup>. Weston your Late Assay Masters Attorney should offer to pay into Our Cash, the Produce of his Effects, you must receive the same, and grant him Bills of Exchange upon Us for the Amount, at Eight Shillings the Madrass Pagoda, on your being satisfy'd that the same is M<sup>r</sup>. Weston's real Estate.

31. We have sent you by the Godolphin One hundred Tons of Iron, which We judge sufficient for the Use of your settlement this year, and for the Consumption of your Coast, We apprehend sending you more, must interfere with Our Market at Surat, as to the Danes We do not pretend to regulate Ourselves by them, knowing they can send but a Certain Quantity Yearly.

32. In Case the King William's Supra Cargos cannot procure more than Two Thousand Bales of Coffee, within Our Limited Price, of One hundred Spanish Dollars ꝯ Beetlefuckee Bahar, they are order'd to consign the Ship and Cargo to you with the Remaining Part of the Outward bound Stock Uninvested, as ꝯ Copy of their Instructions enclos'd, and in that case you must give them a Receipt for the same, and fill up the Ship with Callicos, dispatching her to Us without Loss of time.

33. Having Plentifully supply'd you with Covenant Servants for Two Years past, We shall not send any Factors or Writers this Season.

34. We shall give Orders to the Supra Cargos of Our Canton Ships, to put on board the Godolphin upon Our Account, One or Two Thousand Pecul of Tea, as part of her Cargo for Europe, consigning the same to you, and therefore your Supra Cargos must have the needfull Directions, to acquaint Our's in time, what Quantity of Tea they shall have room to receive on board, and the same Care must be taken of the Stowage, as was directed last year, and in case you are concern'd with Us in the other Part of the Cargo, We hereby agree to allow the Voyage, a Tale and a half ꝯ Pecul for the Freight of the said Tea, or if that is not a sufficient Consideration, We agree to allow you the Profits that would have arisen on the like Quantity of Sugar.

35. We have reason to believe, that by Several Ships a Large Quantity of Pepper hath been sent to your Place and Bengal; more than perhaps Our ships can take in at half Freight, in which case, We are willing further to assist and encourage your Trade to China, and do allow you to Load on board the Godolphin, and engraft on the Joynt Stock as much Pepper, as you think We shall have over and above Three Hundred and Fifty or Four Hundred Tons, which We esteem necessary to be reserv'd, as what We judge Our Ships may shoot, and allowing some reasonable Quantity left to make up any Head Freight that may happen in the Bay, and to favour the Voyage all We can, We will allow the said Pepper at Two Pagodas ꝯ Candy; under the market price at Your Sea Gate.

36. In Case you shall stand in need of a Number of Bales and Salt Petre to Load home the Godolphin, you will do well to write in time to the Bay for a Supply, We having given Directions to Our President and Council, duly to comply with what you shall require upon that account.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. GEORGE, DATED 30<sup>TH</sup>. DECEMBER, 1737.  
[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 42, pages 11-30.*]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT S<sup>T</sup>. GEORGE.

1. Our Last Letter was dated the 5<sup>th</sup>. October, and on the 12<sup>th</sup>. of that Month the Ships Godolphin, Princess Mary, Royal George, Resolution and King William sailed out of the Downes with a Fair Wind at North, the Prince of Wales on the 20<sup>th</sup>. and the Queen Caroline on the 4<sup>th</sup>. November last.

2. We shall now proceed to take notice of your Advices and Transactions to the Ship Shaftbury's Departure, giving Our Sentiments thereupon, and the needfull directions under the Establish'd Heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

3. The Commanders of Ships Halifax and Grantham are said to be acquainted you should give them no Dispatches for the Bay, We sett you right as to that matter in Our Last Letter, the former had Goods on board consign'd to you, and they both took in Redwood, Sailing Orders are so necessary, that We are surpriz'd at your Unwillingness to give them, however as the avoiding Demorage might be your Inducement, We are willing to think you intended it for the best, although the End proposed cannot possibly be attain'd under such Circumstances.

4. We observe that Cap<sup>T</sup>. Manley alledg'd he could take in no more than Thirty Ton of Red Wood, alledging he was a full Ship for the Bay, Cap<sup>T</sup>. Montgomery for the same reason refused to take in any, and you inform Us the Early Ships were so full of Goods for the Bay, that it was with great Difficulty they took in their Charter-party quantity of Red Wood; In reply thereto, if any of Our Commanders should refuse to take what you think fit to order them, deliver them a Formal Protest to be judg'd of by Us, on their Return.

5. You acted very commendably in sending a Price Current of China Goods to Macao for the Normanton's Supra Cargo's.

6. As the Ship George brought you Sixty Ton of Pepper from the West Coast, which shew'd that Our Servants there did not expect Two Ships, We approve of your desiring some Bales to be Loaden on the Compton in the Bay, notwithstanding the Fatal Loss of that ship deprived Us of the Benefit which had otherwise arisen from your Prudent Measures.

7. The Dutch this Last Year had several Ships cast away at the Cape, and Our Ship Defence was in very Eminent Danger during the same Storm, and the Shaftsbury met with Exceeding[ly] Bad Weather in getting round, so that We are pleas'd to find you are duly sensible of the Risque Our Ships run, when they go about the Cape late in the Season, and depend upon your Assurances to send them away as early as you are able.

8. Our Ships George and Madrass Galley were not suffered to lye Idle, but by the many Trips made for Salt Petre from the Bay, and Callico's from the Subordinates, with other Services were employ'd in the Best manner, and by the Earnings convince Us that all Opportunitys were embraced to make them of Use to Us, and as you had no further occasion for the Galley, you did well in offering her to the Bay, where through the Loss of several of Our Sloops, she will be the more acceptable, and may be of Service to Us.

9. We approve of your filling up the Shaftsbury's Tonnage with Six Hundred Bags Salt Petre, as the Sixty Bales remaining arrived from S<sup>t</sup>. Davids, but the Day before that Ships Dispatches were sign'd.

10. On Perusal of Our Letter to the West Coast, Copy whereof comes enclos'd in the Packet, you will observe their Silence as to the Bengal Goods consign'd them by the Compton is blamed, however in case you have reason to apprehend, that a Fresh Recruit of those, or any other Sortments will be of any Service there, don't fail of duly advising Our President and Council in the Bay, to send them on the Scarborough, that so Our Trade may be carryed on to the most Advantage, Gue, Oyl, Ophium with some Proper Callicoe's, cannot fail of being acceptable and turning to a Good Account.

11. We dispatch'd Our Ship Godolphin so early and she had such a Fine Outsett, that We may reasonably expect her Arrival at your Place in April, according to your desire in the 10<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph by the Shaftsbury. We are pleased to find that one of Our Europe Ships proceeding from Your Port to Canton, is so agreeable to you, and the Emperor of China having abolish'd the Imposition of Ten  $\text{¢}$  Cent, and put Trade on it's Old Footing, the most material Objection you make to that Voyage is thereby removed, and We doubt not but a considerable Benefit will annually accrue to Us, and your Inhabitants from thence, on the Supra Cargos discharging the Trust reposed in them with Integrity, and with respect to the discretional Liberty you desire of sending the Ship on to China or not, We have not thought fitt to comply therewith, as you are left entirely to Your Option whether you will be joyntly concern'd in the Voyage, and We are willing to run the whole risque, however that be, We persuade Ourselves a Faithfull Part will be acted in promoting the Success of it by all Proper Means, We on Our Parts having given all the Due Encouragement to you that can be desired.

12. We have the same reason this year to complain of your want of Care in Endorsing the Bills of Lading as last, for on adjusting the Prince William's and Haeslingfields accounts, We find a Bale of Duroys not endors'd as receiv'd by you on the Back of the former's Bill of Lading, and four Chests of Stationary Ware on the Latter's, though from several Circumstances and the Captain's positive Assurances, We are convince'd they were deliver'd; likewise when you referr'd the Deficiency's in the Weight of the Double Headed Iron Shott and Cordage, by the Prince William, to be adjusted by Us, you should have acquainted Us at the same time, how many of each Species of Shott you received, as also whether the Sizes of the Cordage answer'd to the Invoice, whether the Bandages were whole, and whether the Tallys were upon them; from such Notices We should have been assisted in forming a Judgment, whether there had been any Embezzlement or Exchange. We therefore direct that for the future, whenever you refer any Deficiency's to be adjusted in England, you make such Observations thereon according to the Nature of the Goods, as may enable Us to determine whether the Owners of the Ship, or the Persons of whom such Goods are bought, are to make Us Satisfaction for the same.

13. The Large Quantities of Damag'd Goods yearly receiv'd from your Place, more than from any other of Our Settlements, the Captains pretend arises from the Bales being damag'd in your Boats going on board, so that We are oblig'd again to recommend such Methods to be taken in sending off the Bales, as were order'd in Our General Letter  $\text{¶}$  Marlborô dated the 2<sup>d</sup>. February 1724 and that notice be given to the Commanders to receive the Bales as soon as possible, and not suffer the Boats to lye along side or astern their Ships with Bales in them, whereby they are lyable to receive Damage by the Spray of the Sea.

SECONDLY CONCERNING GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA  
TO BE DISPOSED OF IN ANOTHER.

14. Enclos'd in the Packet of each respective Ship, is Invoice and Bill of Lading for the Treasure Goods and Merchand[ise] consign'd you, the Abstracts of the Bay Cargo's enclos'd in the Packets will serve to show what Bullion is sent to the Bay, according to your Desire in the 23<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your first Letter, the General Direction therein mentioned, of coining half the Bullion design'd for them, will not hold Good at all times, nor indeed must not, for some times Futtichund and the Shroffs pretend to stop the Currency of Madrass Rupees at the Usual Batta, so that Explicit Directions must be requir'd annually for your Guidance, if once they are depreiated below the Price, which uncoin'd Silver will yield, they are orderd to give you the needfull advices, that more or less may be minted as shall be most for Our Interest.

15. You acted right in reserving Forty Chests of Treasure for the Normanton, and as that Ship did not come your way, having met with no manner of Success at Limpo and you had a flowing Cash sufficient to carry on Our Investment, We take it, for granted the said Treasure was sent early in the Season to Bengal, towards forwarding Our Important Investment there.

16. For some years past We have supply'd the Bay with a Double Stock, in order to command the market, and at present they are in such a Pleasing Situation, in case Our Ships arrivd safe, and therefore you must desire to be inform'd from them, what Particular Assistance they stand in need of, from time to time from you, besides the Cargos consignd directly to them, and in case you have a Surplus Stock in Pagodas or Bullion, more than adequate to all the Demands upon your Coast, you may thereby sell or buy Silver, as shall be most advantageous to Us; We know full well the Price thereof varys, the Rate of late Years affords a very considerable Profit and We rely upon your Assurances to make the best bargain you can the same as for yourselves.

17. We have orderd Our Correspondents at the Madeiras, to consign you on the Beaufort Sixty Pipes of the best, strongest bodyed Wine that Island produces, We observe the encouraging Price of Forty two Pagodas  $\text{¶}$  Pipe, which the Pelham's sold at, and hope for a Continuance of the same.

18. Copper not having a Vend at your Place, it was all sent to the Bay, this method must be continu'd agreeable to Our former Orders in case any is sent you, and the Madrass Market stands no better affected, and Teutenague being greatly wanted there to mix with it in Brass Works, you will do well to supply Bengal with a part of what may be receiv'd from China, invoicing the same upon Our Account, at the Current Madrass Price, and thus the Consumption of Our Product will be promoted in those Parts.

19. You were informed last year, what Care and Pains were taken as to Our Woollen Goods, We are fully assured they are bought, dyed and finish'd in the best manner possible, your Merchants extolling the Swedish Cloth in Substance and Colours, are not much to be regarded, they might have selfish Bye Ends in so doing, by inducing you to sett a Less value upon Our's, We wish the Patterns and Prices annex'd had been sent Us for our Notice, thereby a True Judgment might have been form'd, on comparing them, and We direct that you do it by the next Ships.

20. We took notice last Year of your Reasons for selling Our Broad Cloth to your Contract Merchants, preferable to a Sale at Outcry, and shall add nothing thereto, till We have your Reply, We are pleas'd however, that all the Six hundred Bales

were sold the 18<sup>th</sup>. October which you receiv'd last year, that Tomby Chitty hath at Length paid off his Bond on account of Old Remains, and the Merchants had paid into Cash Seventeen Thousand Pagodas on account of their Last Purchases, these things afford an agreeable Prospect, that your Godowns will be cleared before a Fresh Supply arrives, and the Consumption of Our Woollen Manufacture, Encrease upon the Coast of Choromandell, this on a Review of Our Sentiments from time to time, is what you will instantly perceive, We have always much at heart as a National Benefit, and your Promotion thereof will be esteemed a very acceptable Piece of Service.

21. Having consider'd the 10<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your Letter dated the 29<sup>th</sup>. January urging in Strong Terms the Hardship of Tomby Chitty and his Partner's being obliged to pay Interest on their Bond, which in your opinion will fall exceeding heavy upon and go near to ruin them, as also the said Merchants Allegations in their Petition entered upon Consultation, to shew you Our willingness to encourage the vent of Our Woollen Goods in particular, We leave it to you to relieve them in such manner as you shall think fit.

22. Your Indents for Wares and Stores are in all Respects complied with, We are very Sensible that a Quantity of Naval Stores, ought always to lye at your Place, for the Supply of Countrey Shipping, and would have you make such Demands, as may be fully sufficient for that End other Purposes, continuing to pay a True Regard to the 27<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Comands dated the 23<sup>th</sup>. January 1735.

#### THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS OF GOODS PROPER FOR EUROPE.

23. By the Early Ships We sent Our List, and such Alterations and Additions, as We have been induc'd to make from Our Sales since their Departure, will be enclosed in the Packets, which you must endeavour to conform to, as near as you are able.

24. We are much concern'd that year after year a Succession of Difficultys should rise up, and be conflicted with, in the carrying on Our Investments upon your Coast, the marching of Armys, Scarcity of Grain and the like, are attended with such Bad Consequences, in all Countreys and Trade is so sensibly affected thereby, that We must acquiesce and submit to Providence in those respects, and shall only recommend it to you to grapple with them, in the most Prudent and Politick manner.

25. And considering the Circumstances set forth in the Letters before Us, and the small Assistance you had from the Subordinate Settlements We do esteem the Three Thousand four hundred Sixty Seven Bales by the Prince William, Grantham and Shaftsbury a Good Performance.

26. And whereas for some time Tomby Chitty and his Partners were the only Persons contracted with at your Place, who always failed in their Performances, We are glad to find other Merchants employ'd, that Molinga Kistna and his Partners have been of Good Service, and complied with their Promises, this may serve to confirm Our Remark in the 30<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter dated the 9<sup>th</sup>. February 1736, and we the rather make this Observation, because Callico's have fallen in Europe more than Ten  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent this last Year, such a Difference in the Gross Sale at Our Candle, you must be sensible, causes a very severe diminution of Our Profits, and calls for a more than ordinary Care, that the Prime Cost does not rise upon Us.

27. In your First Letter One Ponnapa Chitty is said to have been advanc'd some money, and deliver'd some Cloth. but there is nothing particular concerning him in either of your Subsequent Ones, We are apt to think the more Merchants you employ in carrying on our Investments the better, in Bengal, Our Dadney is advanced to a Great number, who have each a Share of the many different Sortments of Goods produc'd at the several Aurungs, and were you to disperse Our money among more hands, the Weavers up and down the Countrey, might by that means be secur'd to work for Us, and drawn off by degrees from Our Competitors, but of this you are best able to judge, and we only offer it to your consideration, being somewhat induc'd thereto, from your saying, it must be larger Advances that will enable the Merchants to carry on their Business with more Spirit, this implys in Our Apprehension a want

---

of money to command the Market, and set the Looms a going, when We say this, We must add a Caution, Beware of Bad Debts which run away with Profit and Principal too, and therefore must constantly be guarded against, by entrusting Our Cash with responsible honest Men, and such as by Observation you perceive take pains to live, and are not given to Extravagancys; Merchants who deserve these Characters, are generally to be found in Places, where an Extensive Commerce is carried on, and a Discerning Eye will soon Distinguish them from the Unworthy.

28. The turn'd out Midling Cloth which you tell Us in the 39<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your first Letter, were taken in at a Proportionable Abatement and mark'd with a Cross, sold from two Shillings and Six pence to Three Shillings less than the other Respective Numbers. whence you will be able to judge what Deductions ought to be made in the like Cases.

29. We are concern'd that Andiapa has declined providing Goods for Us any longer, his Porto Novo Cloth having generally sold well, however, as the Troubles might be his inducement, when they are over We recommend it to you, to try what can be done in order to engage him in Our Service again upon reasonable Terms, the accomplishing hereof you give Us some Hopes of, and you must heartily sett about it, as his Circumstances are undoubtedly Good and therefore according to your own representation to be trusted with Large Sums, so that could he be brought to exert himself vigorously, it could not fail of Promoting and encreasing Our Investments, to a considerable Degree.

30. In your Advices to the Bay what Tonnage you may fill up We cannot expect the Calculate to be exact, and therefore upon making the best Computation you are able, that Good Method must be continu'd, of requiring a Sufficient Quantity of Salt Petre, to make good any Deficiency which must be made use of, on the Merchants and Subordinate Factorys failing in the Promis'd Number of Bales, unless you have Pepper to fill up Our Ships with their Charterparty Tonnage.

31. We wonder how it came to pass that Our Covenant Servants should generally show a Backwardness to be remov'd from your Place to Subordinate Settlements, and look upon it as a Sort of Banishment, such a prevailing Opinion may be very prejudicial to Us, in the carrying on Our Investment on the Coast of Choromandel, and We must animadvert upon it; All Our servants by virtue of the Covenants entred into with Us, are to obey your Orders, and whenever you see it for Our Interest to fix upon such as are capable to do Our Business, on the Several Parts of the Coast, they ought chearfully to acquiesce and promote their Employers Welfare to the Utmost of their Skill and Power, in whatever Station is allotted them, and you may assure them from Us, that We shall always take due Notice of their Performances, and Promote them according to their Merit and Standing, Our nominating Mr. Sanderson to be One of Our Council at your Place, may surely convince them, We are not unmindfull of Our Servants at Subordinates, but if after all such a Groundless Notion should still continue, you ought to pay no Regard to it, but by acting without Favour or Affection, make Our Interest the Rule of your Proceeding.

32. When Cotton and Grain are dear the Merchants may experience it in the Country, otherwise the Prices gradually encreasing upon Us, were highly unreasonable and whenever times shall mend and Plenty reign, Our being sharers in the common Benefits, by Goods lowering accordingly may justly be expected.

33. Contracting at a Certain Price for each Number is preferable upon Several Accounts to the Method practiced some years ago, of charging them one with another, this We observ'd heretofore, and are glad that you were duely sensible of, so as to overcome the Merchants Attempts to pervert you, Our Buyers make a Difference of Two Shillings or thereabouts between each Number, and We always had too great a Proportion of the lowest Sorts when all were bought at the same Price.

34 By Our having constantly a Flowing Cash, you certainly have had an Apparent Advantage over Our Competitors the French, who by your own account are oblig'd to borrow all the money they can at Arcot, and to make Use of art to obtain Credit, Enclos'd in the Packet We send Observations on the French Cloth compar'd with

yours, made by one of Our Greatest Foreign Buyers, who also was at the French Sale, by which you may see the French get more Fine Cloth than you do, wherein We should be glad to have a share with them in every Sort.

35. We are highly pleas'd that none of your Private Trade interferes with Our's, this is all We aim at, and are far from having such a thought as a Total Prohibition, diverting of Goods proper for the Europe Market, to carry on the Trade to Mocha and elsewhere, was what We complain'd of, and whatever the French may do, whose hands are not to be ty'd by Us, We cannot suffer Our own Servants to become Our Competitors.

36. Levying those Great Penaltys on Sunca Ramah and the Chittys, so long ago as M<sup>r</sup>. Macrae's time, are represented as still having a bad Influence on Our affairs, tho' Mild Governments do generally in a course of years, obliterate past Severitys, your Place is well situated for Trade, and a Number of Substantial Merchants, usually take up their Residence in such a City, on Experiencing, that Property is Secure, and We flatter'd Ourselves the Presidents return would have been an Inducement thereto, and a Means of restoring that Flourishing State, Madrass was formerly in, and We still hope it will yet be accomplish'd.

37. Some of the Ingeram Cloth by the Prince William, would not sell in Our March Sale, and We have been oblig'd to lower it Two Shillings this Sale, and yet it will not go off, nor any of that Settlements Cloth by the Grantham mark'd with an O, so that it was high time to show M<sup>r</sup>. Graham the Faults in his Cloth, when he was up at your Place, and We expect that he will take all Due Care to amend them in future, and by improving Our Investments in those Parts recommend himself to Our Favour.

38. We are very much concern'd that Our Servants at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. Davids, fell so vastly short this last year, of the usual Provision of Callico's at that Settlement, having received no more than Six hundred and Ninety Bales, of the One Thousand which their Merchants contracted for, the Reasons assign'd appear to have some weight, the Moor's Army continuing so long near Salem, doubtless terrify'd the Merchants from Dispersing Money among the Weavers in those Parts, and the many Buyers raising the Prices with the rise of Fannams, adding to their Difficultys, have disappointed for the present Our Expectations sett forth in the 33<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of last years Letter, but no Stone must be left unturn'd to revive Our Affairs there.

39. Returning any Bettellees on Molinga Kistna, had certainly been a Great Hardship upon him, and therefore it was a Right Method, in agreeing to take in all, and to prize them according to their Goodness, those few that We receivd were an acceptable Commodity and sold well, in case any Particulars Remarks, are necessary, to be made on this or any other Species, they will be imparted in Our accompany<sup>g</sup>. List of Investment.

40. In answer to the 18<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your Last Letter, the buyers gave about one Shilling more, in the Several Numbers for your Ordinary Long Cloth than the S<sup>t</sup>. David's, and a few Bales of the D. 2 would not sell, however their Salem Cloth sold better than yours.

FOURTHLY TOUCHING THE TRADE OF INDIA AND THEREIN ANY TRANSACTIONS  
WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

41. We observe the Account given Us of the Nabob's Son's Progress with their Army, and how much the Countrey sufferd thereby, which require no reply from Us, however communicate to Us Annually the Situation of Affairs for Our Notice.

42. Our 44<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph last Year We refer to, for Our Sentiments as to the Badness of Trade all over India, which you complain of in several Parts of your Letters, being firmly of opinion, that Madrass will reap a Considerable Benefit, from the Measures We conserted on the Bombay Side, and Our Expedition at Mocha.

43. The President and Council in Bengal, in answer to the Lord Kinnoul's Letter, desired S<sup>r</sup>. Everard Fawkeners Good Offices in General Terms only, which We have approv'd of, on a like occasion avoid if possible all particular Discussions, the Less that is said the better.

44. We cannot but approve your Proceedings with respect to Mual Chund and the Pollygar, for the reasons enterd upon Consultation the 19<sup>th</sup>. April, on a Supposition those two affairs are therein represented in a Genuine Fair Light, without Glosses or Prejudice, Disputes with the Countrey Government ought by all means to be avoided by your immediate Intervention whenever it can be done without infringing the Common Rights and Priviledges of your Inhabitants.

45. The most Particular Intelligence procurable, concerning those Powerfull Competitors the French, and their Commerce, must annually be communicated to Us, inserting the Number of Ships, Tonnage, Imports and Exports, with the Situation of their Affairs, and Our other Rivals in Trade on the Coast of Choromandel.

46. Your Freindly Assistance afforded to Tellicherry, We acquiesce in, as Our President and Council at Bombay desir'd all the Force you could spare, under the apprehensions that Settlement would be attack'd by the Carnatick Rajah, the Charge attending that Expedition, they advise Us amounted to Seven Thousand Seven hundred and Sixty Six Rupees, which they add is more than they could have beleivd it would come to, and appears to Us a Great Sum for transport<sup>s</sup>. and victualling Sixty Nine Men.

47. It affords Us a Pleasing Reflection to read, that pursuant to Our Orders, the Grain laid in with Our money has had so Salutary an Effect, as is laid before Us in the 40<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your Second Letter, wherein you add nothing is omitted, which may encourage an Importation, this is well, and Pursuant to Our Directions last Year, the Fatal Consequences of Engrossing must always be watch'd against, and duly prevented, more especially in times of General Calamity, your Entire Silence upon this Head, We are willing to attribute to the Effectual Care you had taken, to remove that Pernicious Practice.

48. We are far from expecting a Pagoda for Nine Mercal of Paddy in a Scarcity, We only desire the Welfare of Our Settlement to be promoted, the Wants and Indigencys of the Military and others, to be supply'd by the Stores laid in upon Our Account, and to be reimburs'd Our money with Interest for so doing, happy would it be for Madrass, were all Importers of Grain satisfy'd with a reasonable Profit.

49. We have wrote in Strong and Pressing Terms, to Our President and Council at Bombay, to remedy the Hardship you complain of at Gombroon, and enclose a Copy thereof for your Perusal, don't fail to inform Us what Effect it has, and on your Parts see to it, that the Supra Cargos and Captains of your Country Ships, act conformably to Our Establishd Rules, and regularly pay all accustomary Dutys wherever they go, that so We may not be troubled from any Quarter, with Complaints of a Neglect in that material Respect.

50. The French have no Right to beat the Bush, and start Game within Our Bounds, We are surpriz'd their Agents were suffer'd such a Practice, as ferretting among your Merchts. to engage them in their Stocks and Loans at Respondentia, and that it should be urg'd as a reason, you had not any Power to prevent it in reply thereto, you may refuse the French or any other European Nation a Liberty of Trade, without a Violation of the Law of Nations, as the Dutch at Batavia, and the French in their Colonys, do constantly practice, whenever they think it for their Interest, and therefore it was high time to put in execution Our Orders in the 49<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Commands dated 23<sup>th</sup>. Jañry 1735, by affixing those Regulations at the Sea Gate, which are enterd upon Consultation the 21<sup>th</sup>. July, on Perusal of them they seem well adapted, to answer the end propos'd, but in case upon Experience they are found ineffectual, you must find out ways and means to put it out of the Power of all those, who reside under Our Protection affording, directly or indirectly, any Assistance to Our Rivals in carrying on their Commerce.

#### FIFTHLY TOUCHING FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

51. Several of the Paragraphs under this head being in answer to Our Letters then before you, you assure Us all Accounts are narrowly inspected and the Utmost Frugality us'd in all Disbursements, We shall only reply in general, that the same Care must always be continu'd, We observe the Expences of your Place and the



Subordinates, are near the same as usual, and you tell Us the Great Reduction made in 1723, has left no room for you to lessen the Expence of the Military Gunroom and Peons, this being the Case, We acquiesce; needfull Charges must be defray'd all that We aim at is, to have Our money disburs'd in the carefulest manner, Superfluous Articles avoided, and in short Good Husbandry to be exercis'd in the management of every Branch of Our Affairs committed to your Care, whereby savings may be made, when repairs and other such like things are necessary.

52. We highly approve the Method you are fallen into of having each Settlements Expences monthly reported in Consultation, this with duly observing all Exceedings, is the best way of answering Our Directions in the 60<sup>th</sup>. Para of Our Letter dated 23<sup>th</sup>. January 1735.

53. The Minters having been reducd already one half  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent in the Charge of Coinage, We are Satisfy'd therewith, and do not insist on a farther Reduction, in case you have just Grounds to conclude, they cannot afford to coin Our Silver for one  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent, you must always have a Watchfull Eye over them, and see that they keep up to Standard in Fineness and Weight, both in Pagodas and Rupees.

54. You will do well to continue all Proper Encouragement to Weavers, and other Manufacturers and Handicrafts, to reside within Our Bounds, those were Our Sentiments two years ago, and We are still of Opinion, that the Priviledges granted to them, should be agreeable to Our Establish'd Rules, otherwise it may create an uneasiness in the ancient Inhabitants, to see New Comers invested with Special and Peculiar Rights.

55. On Perusal of Our Letter to the West Coast you will perceive, that We are not for removing the Factory from Moco Moco to Bental, We have several Reasons inducing Us to be of that Opinion, however, notwithstanding Our Sentiments in this Respect differ from yours, this must not lessen your Care and Concern for Our Welfare, in supravising their Transactions, and giving the needfull Directions to Our Deputy Governour and Council thereupon, that Our Affairs upon that Coast, may be continu'd in a Thriving, Flourishing Situation.

56. You did well in ordering the Storekeeper and others, to lay before you the Particulars under their Care, which were any way decayd, and disposing of them for the most they would yield, this is a good Method and must annually be continu'd that We may suffer as little as possible, by Our Wares and Stores being depretiated.

57. We have taken into Serious Consideration what you will write concerning Current Pagodas, and the Bad Consequences which may accrue to Us, from receiving into Our Cash, a Coin so much debased, and having thoroughly weigh'd, what the Coral Merchants offer'd to Us in their Favour upon this Occasion, We have come to several Resolutions which are as follows Viz<sup>t</sup>.

58. That by the Accounts laid before Us for Five years past, it appears to Us, that the Amount of Revenues and the Produce of Europe Goods sold, raise more than Sufficient for the Southern and Western Investments, where Current Pagodas only pass, and all Bills given for Current Pagodas at Eight Shillings, is in favour of those to whom the Bills are given, and prejudicial to the Company.

59. That we cannot ascertain the Batta from hence.

60. That the Coral Merchants have Liberty to import the Produce of Coral into England in Pagodas in Specie, or Uncoin'd Gold, and for their Encouragement, to be allowed a Bounty of Five  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent thereon, upon the same footing that a Bounty is allowd on Diamonds, Oath having been made at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, that it is the Produce of Coral.

61. That the Coral Merchants have Liberty to coin the Produce of Coral into Pagodas, in the Company's Mint, and that the Company will remit thereupon, the Half  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent Revenue hitherto collected.

62. That the Coral Merchants have Liberty to pay the Produce of Coral in Madrass Pagodas into the Company's Cash, and have Bills of Exchange drawn upon Us at Eight Shillings a Pagoda, in consideration of which Rate no Batta shall be allow'd.

63. That the Coral Merchants have Liberty to pay into the Company's Cash, the Produce of Coral in Current Pagodas, and have Bills of Exchange drawn upon Us at Seven Shillings and Eight Pence a Pagoda, provided they are not further debased.

64. That the Customs, Dutys and Consulage shall be paid in the same Specie that the Coral is valu'd in.

65. These are the Resolutions We have come to upon this Affair, and accordingly We direct, that immediately upon the Receipt of these Our Orders you act conformable to these Regulations, Sending Us a Particular and Distinct Account in the Packet by each Ship, how and in what manner the Produce of each Parcel of Coral is remitted home, whether in Diamonds, by Bill of Exchange or in Pagodas or Gold, and you must keep Our Cash in the most exact manner, that We may see in one View what part consists of Madrass Pagodas, and what part of Current Pagodas specifying which Sort is paid or receiv'd in every Entry.

66. You must also be extremely carefull in keeping up the Madrass Pagodas and Rupees to full Standard, both in Fineness and Weight, this being of the Utmost Importance to Us, and inform Us in a Particular Manner of Your Real Sentiments concerning these Regulations, but you must not deviate from them without Our Previous Leave first had, and We direct that you send Us annually five Current Pagodas coin'd in the same year that We may have them assay'd and so compare them with the Madrass Pagodas.

SIXTHLY TOUCHING FACTORS, WRITERS, OFFICERS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

67. Having also taken into consideration the Exchange from all Parts of India, We have come to the following Resolutions relating to your Place & the Subordinate Settlements to you, including therein the West Coast Viz<sup>t</sup>.

68. That the Company's Servants at Madrass & the Subordinate Factorys be put upon the same footing with the Coral Merchants in their Remittances in all Respects (according to the beforementioned Regulations) provided their Estates are remitted so, as not to be return'd back to India, or the money paid in, is for purchasing Stores allow'd them from hence, they making Oath the money is their own Property.

69. And that all others Living under their Protection there, shall be allowed Seven Shillings & four Pence  $\text{p}$  Current Pagoda, unless the Pagoda should be further debased.

70. That as these Exchanges are in favour of those who remit their money by Bill on the Company, compar'd with what the Company would get by sending out Silver, therefore all Bills for the future be drawn payable ninety days after sight, not only for the Comp<sup>rs</sup>. Servants, but also for the Coral Merchants and others.

71. And accordingly We direct, that from and after the Receipt of this Letter, you grant no Bills of Exchange, but such as are conformable to these Resolutions.

72. We have appointed Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Edward Page, William Colebrooke, William Lane, Thomas Shore & Mark Heggard Supra Carges of Our Ships Prince of Orange & Princess Royal, and Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Henry Plant, Thomas Liell, Richard Martyn, John Hodgson & Foster Jakua Pearkes Supra Cargos of the Ships Prince of Wales & London, & have given them the Needfull Directions, with relation to the Tea that may be loden on the Godolphin, agreeable to what We wrote you by that Ship.

73. In Our Orders to the Bay We have recommended the Wager Cap<sup>t</sup>. Raymond to be sent a Countrey Voyage, in case they are obliged to keep another Ship besides the Royal George in the Countrey, thro' a want of Goods so that upon the Wagers Arrival with you she must be sent down to the Bay.

74. Major Roach having sett forth that his house and Furniture have been sold for about Four Thousand Pagodas, & M<sup>r</sup>. Day that M<sup>r</sup>. Sanders has Effects of her's in his hands to the amount of Two Thousand Pagodas & M<sup>r</sup>. James Colebrooke that Our President has the Produce of the Silver he consign'd to his Brother M<sup>r</sup>. William Colebrooke, by the Princess Royal & Prince William under his Care, and all of them desiring Bills of Exchange for the same, We direct that you grant Bills accordingly

upon the same Terms as to Our Servants, and also to M<sup>r</sup>. Westons Attorney on the like Terms for what mony may be paid into Our Cash on their Respective Accounts, Oath being made thereto.

75. And whenever any of Our Servants for the future quit the Service, whatever they pay into Our Cash that Season, & what is collected in of their Effects the next Season (and no longer) We hereby grant them a Liberty of their having the Amount paid into Our Cash for Bills upon Us on the same Terms, as We allow them while actually in Our Service, upon Oath being made as aforesaid.

76. When any of Our Covenant Servants, are admitted into Council pursuant to Our Orders, or enter upon any new Employ in Our Service, you must make it a Constant Rule to administer an Oath to them, that they will be true and faithfull to the Company according to the Form transmitted in the Packet. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE, DATED 8<sup>th</sup>. FEBRUARY, 1737.  
[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 42, pp. 31-33.*]

OUR PRESIDENT & COUNCIL OF  
FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE.

1. We wrote to You at large under the 30<sup>th</sup>. Decem<sup>r</sup>. by our Ship Beaufort and Copy of our said Letter comes Enclosed in the Packet, We shall now add what further occurs to Us.

2. Notwithstanding M<sup>r</sup>. Lowther's Assurances that he had no other Intention but to appear before Us, as mention'd in the 55<sup>th</sup>. Parā. of your first Letter, he left the Ship at Plymouth and is fled from Justice, had a Private Order been given to Captain Langworth, to deliver him up to Us, he might have been effectually secured.

3. You acted quite right, in settling the Freight of the Lead and Iron put on board the Prince William at Seven Pounds ꝑ Ton, those Articles together with the Silver seized at Porto Novo, have been Legally Condemned in His Majestys Court of Exchequer, as forfeited by virtue of the Acts of Parliament made in that behalf.

4. Since our last, We have thought proper to take up the Ship Onslow Captain John Balchen Commander Burthen 480 Tons and We shall Consign her to Bombay in March.

5. Our Ships Beaufort, Scarborough, Duke of Cumberland, Anglesey, London, Prince of Orange and Princess Royal are not yet sail'd out of the Channell, the Nassau in a storm run on the Galloper, lost her Rudder, and was thereby so much Damaged, that she was obliged to put back and refit at Sheerness.

6. Upon this Occasion, the Soldiers and Seamen that were in the Nassau are put on board the Wager to recruit your Garrison in the Place of those sent to Tellicherry, or in case you do not stand in need of them, Send them to Bombay by the first Conveyance that offers, because they are much wanted there.

7. In case any Money is offer'd to be paid into our Cash for the maintenance of M<sup>r</sup>. Symonds's Daughter Theophila, You may grant Bills for the same, at the Rate We allow to Our Servants by our last Regulations.

8. We have permitted M<sup>r</sup>. William Douglas to return to your Place, and also to his former Station of Surgeon's Mate in case you have not Entertained another in his Room.

9. By this Ship We have consign'd you, Sundry Goods and Merchandize, as  $\text{ᄁ}$  Invoice & Bill of Loading Enclos'd in the Packet.

10. We have sent you on the Wager a Black named John (who came from St. Helena) by the first Conveyance You must send him to Bencoolen, to be Employ'd in our Service there, and give Directions to our Deputy Governour and Council to send another able bodied Black to M<sup>r</sup>. Wrangham at S<sup>t</sup>. Helena in lieu of him, our Reason for sending him is, because the Man is afraid of falling into the Hands of a Cruel Master.

11. It has been represented to Us that Hodjee Addy has been of Service to you, in Negotiating with the Countrey Government, and is very desirous of being Excused Duties, that are not paid by Christians, this seems to us an Unprecedented thing, but in case it is a matter of no great Importance, We leave it to you to shew him this Mark of our favour, if you think proper.

12. The Enclosed Packet Directed to our President and Council in Bengal was sent Express to the Downes, but the Scarborough sailed with our other ships there on the 2<sup>d</sup>. Instant before the Express got down, We therefore Enclose it to you, and direct that it be forwarded to the Bay by the first Ship Consigned thither, but not on the Wager, as she carries the like Orders, In case all our Ships are sailed, send it by the first Ship or vessel bound thither.

13. We shall Order Our President and Council of Bombay to send you a further Number of Slaves, and We direct that you send six or Eight of them well Clothed to S<sup>t</sup>. Helena on every one of the Homeward bound Ships, but as we satisfy the Owners for their Passage you need not put any Provisions aboard for them, except a little Tobacco & Arrack. We are

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL  
AT FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE.

Our last was dated the 8<sup>th</sup>. February by the Wager, and that Ship Sailed out of the Downs the 11th of the same Month, Copy of Our said Letter is enclosed.

We have only to add that We have taken up the Ship Marlborough Burthen 495 Tons, Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Smith Commander, and shall Consign her in April to the West Coast, with Orders to our Deputy Governour and Council to send her for a Cargo of Pepper to Benjar, with proper Persons to Transact our Business there, in case the Advices from our Supra Cargos of the ship Prince of Wales, give reasonable Encouragement to expect Success, in a Trade with those Parts, and otherwise they are to Dispatch the Marlborough, immediately to Our Chief and Council at Anjengo or Tellicherry, with the Treasure Wee shall put on board, at which places she will meet with proper Orders, from Our Governour and Council of Bombay for Loading her for Europe.

The Danish Ship bound for Tranquebar, was cast away on the North of Shetland about a Month ago, all the Men Perished, and very little of her Treasure was saved, hereby an opportunity may present itself, to secure for Us the Callicoos that otherwise would have been Loaden on the said Annual Ship, the accomplishing whereof We shall esteem a most acceptable piece of Service. GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH, DATED 14<sup>TH</sup>. OCTOBER 1737.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 42, pp. 37-54.*]

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND COUNCIL AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. We wrote you at large last Season by our Ships George and Lyell, the former saild from St. Helela the 4<sup>th</sup>. of April, so that We doubt not of her early arrival at your Place, and the Lyell saild out of the Downes the 27<sup>th</sup>. of February.

2. Our Ship Duke of Lorain arrived the 6<sup>th</sup>. August and brought us your Advices under the 9<sup>th</sup>. and 18<sup>th</sup>. of January, and We shall now proceed to give the proper Directions under the Establish'd heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

3. Herewith We consign you the Ship Queen Caroline Burthen Four Hundred and ninety Tons Captain Charles Birkhead Commander who has Orders to call first at St. Helena to deliver the Stores put on board for that Island, and a Copy of the Ships Charterparty will be forwarded to you in the Governour and Councils Packet from thence.

4. We shall Order the Ship Scarborough Four Hundred and Seventy Tons Captain George Westcott Commander to proceed first to Bengal, and give Directions to our President and Council of Fort William to put on board Three Hundred Tons of Salt petre, and Thirty Tons of Redwood, and to consign the same to You.

5. In Case Captain Birkhead requests for any Salt petre at the low Freight of Twelve Pounds Sixteen Shillings and Eight pence a Ton, You must Ship on board the Queen Caroline, what he shall so request for, if you have it to spare, and the same is not to be reckond any part of the Charterparty Tonnage.

6. You give Us assurances that you Shall be able to load home two Ships, and therefore We direct if the Crops of Pepper are Sufficient, that you fill these Ships therewith as full as they can hold, puting [*sic*] on board the Scarborough no more than her Charterparty Kintlage in Salt petre, and what the [Comma]nder may request for, at the abovementioned [Low freight] remembering that such requested Petre [may be] reckoned any part of the Charterparty Tonnage, but you must see that the Captains are very Explicit in asking for the Petre upon those terms to prevent all disputes with the Owners, and the Original requests must be sent us in their respective Packets.

7. The Ship Compton to our very great concern was burnt in your Road, this Second heavy loss by Fire has obliged us to enjoyn all our Settlements to require the Commanders to keep on board as much as possible, the Common Sailors are so careless that the most Watchfull Eye must be kept over them, You tell us the Officers of the Compton gave a Report Signed by them of what they knew relating to her Loss, and allege that the Said Report came under Cover, but We must tell you there was a very great Omission somewhere, for the Said Report was not Sent us, nor is it So much as mentioned in the List of the Packet, or entered upon Consultation as it ought to have been.

8. You did well in Setting a Guard about the Place, where the remains of the Compton lay, to watch if any thing came ashore, a Covenant Servant or two Should have been Stationed there to prevent the Soldiers and Sailors plundering or pilfering, which they are too apt to be guilty of upon Such occasions unless they are well look'd after.

9. As the People Saved out of the Compton were destitute of all manner of necessaries, We cannot but approve of your allowing each of them two Dollars and a half  $\text{₹}$  Month for Diet, not doubting but that during their Stay you Employed them in some needful work at the Fort, Plantation or elsewhere as occasion required, and that you Sent then[*sic*] to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George by the first Conveyance.

10. We are pleased that your Sloop of Fifteen Tons which has been so long about is at length finished, and One of Ten Tons was Ordered to be built at Pegu for your Use, which together with [the George] will be able to fetch all the Pepper from the [several] parts of the Coast, whereby you assure Us [the charges of] Boathire will be lessend, and We expect that those Sloops are Constantly Employ'd on Our Account, and be Sure to comply with your promise in throughly Examining the Indents for Stores, and other necessaries put on board those Sloops, and the vessels from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, and as to the former fix on a method for the Masters regularly accounting every three Months or oftner for the Provisions and Stores committed to their care, and in all other respects pay a due regard to the 12<sup>th</sup>. and 13<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of Our Commands upon this head dated the 5<sup>th</sup>. of December 1735.

11. On having recourse to the 10<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of our Said Letter, and what passed between you and the Commanders of the Duke of Lorrain and Compton with relation to Salt Petre We find that you did not comply litterally and Strictly with our Said Orders, You tell Us those Captains were acquainted therewith, but there was some thing obligatory on their parts, which We required namely requesting Expressly at the low Freight which was omitted We expect the carefulest observance of our Directions in future.

12. Captain Jenkins of the Harrington could not procure the full number of Slaves We ordered, and Our President and Council at Bombay Standing in need of those he carry'd thither to Man our Gallies and for other necessary purposes, the Supply intended you could not be sent, however the Ship Resolution Captain George Bagwell Commander has Orders to proceed to Madagascarr this year for the purchase of Three Hundred Slaves or more, and One third will be sent to Madrass to be forwarded from thence to you by the first Conveyance.

SECONDLY CONCERNING GOODS FROM EUROPE, FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE & BENGAL

13. By this Ship We have consigned You Treasure, Goods and Merchandize as ~~the~~ Invoice and Bill of loading enclosed in the Packet, We perceive that you had remaining in Cash the last of October Fourscore Thousand Dollars, which together with the Forty Thousand brought you by the [ . . . ] was more than sufficient for your Investment [of pe]pper and to defray the necessary Charge of the Coast so that we are highly pleased you proposed to send Six Chests to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, which pursuant to Our frequently repeated Orders must be your constant Practice reserving sufficient in Cash to pay for all the Pepper which may probably be brought in the Ensuing Year, in case of a disappointment from hence by our Ships miscarrying which God forbid.

14. Your Indent is Complied with for so far as We judged necessary, and for our better guidance in this affair you must annually Send Us in the Packet an Account of Remains in Stores a month or thereabouts before our Ships Departure, and the Said Account, with the last years Indent, together with the Consumption of the Coast must be duely weighed, and considered before the New Indent is framed, We mention these previous things thô obviously necessary, because there is no Notice taken of them upon Consultation, We have further to add upon this head that whenever Goods lye by and are not in demand for Sale or Use you must send them to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George by the first safe conveyance, and not suffer them to Wast or Spoyl.

15. Our Cash must be monthly Examined by the Council, and it most [*sic*] be noted upon Consultation whether the Cash in Specie agrees with the Cash Account.

16. The George brought you from Madrass Twenty Bales of Cloth, and our President and Council Ordered Our Deputy Governour to land it at Moco Mocho before he came to Marlborô, however We find that it was brought up in that Vessell to Your Place, the reason alleged for so doing in your Letter to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George is that there was Sufficient remaining for the Year, but herein he was mistaken, for We find the said Twenty Bales being sent thither afterwards on the Duke of Lorraine Sarcely held out to pay the People for their Pepper according to agreement, half in Cloth and half in money, and Pepper in great Quantitys came in before it arrived, which might be a Discouragement to the Planters, who are [very] uneasy if Long Cloth is not duly delivered to them [and when] ever you are fully supplied You must not [be put off] with promisory Notes, which has been the practice, weigh and pay is the best way of Trading upon Several Accounts, and is more Especially so in carrying on a Commerce with the Mallays.

17. You are entirely Silent as to the Eleven Bales of Piece Goods and other Articles consigned you from Bengal by the Compton, whether they were agreeable to you or Suited to the Consumption of the Place, this was a great Omission We ought to have been acquainted in a particular manner how far they were of Service, which of them would turn to Account and fully apprized in case of our sending a Ship the Same Tract as to the Several Species of Goods procureable there proper for Your Coast.

18. When a Change was made of your Storekeeper the 6<sup>th</sup>. of August We don't find an Account of Remains was signed by M<sup>r</sup>. Rigg, on his Entering that Employ, M<sup>r</sup>. Jordan is Order'd indeed to proceed to Sillebar So Soon as he had Transferr'd the Remains of Stores to M<sup>r</sup>. Rigg, yet there is no notice taken in any subsequent Entry that it was actually done, But We lay this down as a Rule that upon all Charges in Employs Receipts be given for every particular by those who take Charge of Our Property, and that all Deficiencies whatsoever be made good into Our Cash, Unless they arise from unavoidable decay in perishable Commodities, and it behoves you to see that these our Orders are Constantly comply'd with.

19. We approve of the method taken in Selling our Wares and Stores as mentioned in the 19<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph, by fixing a certain advance of Fifty ~~the~~ Cent to the Malays, and Twenty five ~~the~~ Cent to the Companys Servants on a Supposition that the latter make Use of everything so Sold themselves, and do not resell them to the Natives whereby our Profits would apparently be diminished, and We cannot help Observing that the profits on Stores in your last Books amounts to no more than Two

Hundred and Eighty One Dollars, which is a Trifling Sum, You must See to it that We have Justice done Us [in the mon]thly Accounts.

20. We are glad to find [that you] are So amply supply'd with Salt as to ha[ve stock] for three Years Consumption, It is an Article in great Demand among the Natives, and therefore Encourage the Importation of it from Java, and duely distribute it at our Several Residencys to the Satisfaction of all Partys.

21. When our Small Arms have been proved We are apprehensive that thro' unskillfulness they were overcharged, however We shall take care to send the best for the future.

22. We sent you a Sufficient Quantity of Sacking by the George for Pepper Bags, which with care will last and be serviceable for many Years by a due Observance of what was then wrote You.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS AND FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

23. Pepper being our Sole inducement to maintain Settlements on the West Coast, We are pleased that by your good management the produce has yearly encreas'd, and the Advices before Us give a very agreeable prospect, that they will still improve, To continue this flourishing Scituation must be your dayly Study the accomplishing whereof will Effectually Recommend you to our future favour.

24. In Order thereto it is absolutely necessary in the first place to take the most prudent measures and wisest Steps to keep the Country in Peace, and to Quell the first Commotions in any part before they get ahead, by exerting your Authority in not suffering the Leading Men to destroy the Pepper Plantations of any of their Neighbours without due Cognizance, this the Mallays are too prone to be guilty of, upon the least differences amongst them, and was really the Case this last year in the Country near to Manna, by Summoning the Contending Partys to appear before you at Marlborough, We have the Satisfaction to find by the Consultation of the 25<sup>th</sup>. of August those Disturbances were accommodated.

25. From this and other Instances of your good conduct We persuade Our Selves that our true Interest will be promoted upon all Such like Occasions.

26. The Sultan of Anacksoongey by the large [supply] of Pepper in his Country this last Year Amounting [to ... hu]ndred and Seventy Ton has thoroughly established himself in our good Esteem, and whereas We Ordered some years ago, that whenever Five Hundred Bahar were received from the Northward, an annual present of Fifty Dollars should be made him in our Name, We hereby Direct that it be doubled every Year, when the Crops are upwards of One Thousand Bahar, and Assure the Prince that We have a great Affection for his welfare and the happiness of his People.

27. As you pay two Dollars a Hundred weight for Pepper at Bencoolen and Sillebar We cannot but approve of allowing the Same Rate at Laye and Bentoonen, the Inhabitants having so considerably encreased the Quantity of Late Years, but you must take this caution along with you, not to Suffer the price to rise higher under any pretence whatsoever, as there is no end of advances among the People you have dealings withall.

28. Raja Lelle being released from his confinement the 7<sup>th</sup>. January 1735 at the Request of the Laye Proateens and People, the head men being bound for his good behaviour, We should have been informed what Effect his enlargement had upon him.

29. In the 34<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph you mention three Places at such a Distance from Manna that the People often complained of carrying their Pepper on their Backs so far as Manna, this is represented as an Extraordinary discouragement, and you Orderd Carts thither for their relief, this may be of use, but We are in doubt whether it may be effectual; In our last years Letters We recommended it to your consideration the sending Our Covenant Servants to reside at proper Distances on the Coast for the reception of Pepper in Order to give satisfaction to the Planters, as you have been so plentifully supplied with hands the two last seasons, We are apt to think a real benefit may accrue to Us from thence.

30. Whenever a Survey of the Country is agreed upon You must fix on a discreet Person for that purpose One well versed in the [Art of] agreeable Deportment towards the Nat[ives and] the necessary Instructions must be drawn [for]



Guidance, Captain Cuney who went the last Survey has transmitted Us an Account of his Expences in that Expedition amounting to Four Hundred seventy three Dollars, and On perusal of your Consultation the 11<sup>th</sup>. of January We find that he refused to lay the particulars before you, which is therein termed a contempt of your Authority, We are concerned that the Captains conduct has in this Instance been so disagreeable, All the Civil and Military are entirely under your Command, and We will not Suffer in any the least Invasion or Slight thereof and are surprized that Captain Coney should take such a Step, he ought to know better, and to behave in a becoming Manner towards you his Superiors, However as you intimate in the said Consultation that the pains he had taken on the survey well deserved a Reward We enclose in the Packet his Petition and Papers annexed, And Direct that you take the affair into consideration, and allow him what is reasonable, in case his behaviour since has been agreeable to you.

31. On perusal of your Book of Accounts it appears that Two Hundred Dollars was advanced to One Bendaharra One Hundred Dollars to Monko Boomy and Two Hundred and Eighteen Dollars to Four Other Persons in Order to provide Pepper, but they have not brought in any, nor discharged any part of their Debt on the last Books, for which no reasons are Assigned when the List of Debts were laid before You by the Accountant the 20<sup>th</sup>. of July, on Balancing the Books there being no other Order made thereupon than that the said List should be Entered after that days Consultation, but must See that the money is recovered and not part from any sums before the Delivery of Pepper.

32. In your next inform Us in a particular manner upon what part of the Coast the several Places are Scituated wherever We have Residencys, describing their Distances from the Fort, and from one [another] for our Satisfaction.

33. Gaming is a vice which the Malays are [much] addicted to and is such an Inveterate Enemy to Industry in all Countreys, that you did well in procureing strict prohibitions against it in Several Districts, and be sure not to suffer any English to Encourage its practice, by setting the Natives a bad Example.

#### FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

34. Our President and Council at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George in this years Letter have intimated to Us that a house built at Moco Moco will not be so well scituated as at Bental, which being high, more healthy and the Barr much safer are the reasons of this preference, They have the appearance of Some weight with Us, but We are informed the People of Bental, are upon such ill terms; and so unacceptable to the Sultan of Moco Moco, that such a Removal may be of the utmost ill consequence, and therefore We cannot approve of it but rather choose that a house be built at Moco Moco, and that the Factory continue there.

35. We are entirely of Opinion with them that Mudd Walls, and Paggar Sticks are a very poor Defence, they only buiry our money to no manner of purpose, and therefore Bricks and Chinam must be made Use of when the building is set about, which must be substantially performed, and the utmost Frugality used contriving it in the best manner for use and Defence against any Surprize, according to the Plan, which may be sent from Your Superiours at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George.

36. Your new Hospital has Stood us in Four Thousand three Hundred and Fifty five Dollars already. In our Letter by the Nassau We found fault with Erecting such a Costly building for that use, on an Estimate of One Thousand Pounds, and We are Still of Opinion, that less than half that Sum had been fully sufficient at a Settlement where the Garrisons so small, and We expect that the 26<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of our said Letter be constantly comply'd with.

37. The Repairs and Materials for building amount to Two Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars in the Paymasters Accounts [from Nov]ember 1735 to October 1736. And then is [ . . . ] Consultation but something or other wants [ . . . ] Occasioned Chiefly as We apprehend from the use of Altops unsound Timbers and such like materials, but surely some better method might be fixed on, were it heartily set about to keep every thing from running into such a frequent

decay, And in Order thereto We hereby Enjoyn You that before any work whatsoever is sett about some of the Council make it their Business thoroughly to Examine and See that all the materials proposed be made use of, are sound, good and lasting, and the properest that can be procured for the purposes intended according to this our Directions, Reporting the same to the Board.

38. We observe that the whole Charges of Fort Marlborough, Moco Moco, Sillebar and Lays on your last Books wrote off to the Debt of Profit & Loss Amounts to Forty One Thousand Dollars, which is near the Same as the two preceeding years, wherever any Savings can prudently be made pursuant to the Directions in the 36<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter by the George and Lyell, We shall esteem it an acceptable piece of service, the Husbanding Our Estate in the most frugal manner is a Duty incumbent on You.

39. When the Arrack and Ophium Licences are annually put up to Sale a free Liberty must be given to all Bidders, in Order to encrease our Revenues which are so small upon Your Coast.

40. Notwithstanding you have Two establish'd Surgeons Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Haag and Pugh at Fort Marlborough, yet ten Dollars a month are constantly charged in the Pay Masters Accounts for One Adams as Surgeons Assistant this appears to us as unnecessary, in such a Garrison, and where so few English reside, and therefore We see no reason to allow this additional Charge.

41. The Account of Our Cash must be Sent in Each Ships Packet to the time of their Departure.

42. We have desired Harry Gough Esq<sup>r</sup>. Josias Wordsworth Esq<sup>r</sup>. S<sup>r</sup>. William Billers and Mathew [Martin] Esq<sup>r</sup>. to be our Secret Committee for the Current [year to] appoint Signals for Our Ships, and the Orders [you may] receive from those Gentlemen or any three of [them relati]ng thereto must be duly complied with.

#### SIXTHLY TOUCHING COVENANT SERVANTS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

43. We perceive that Our President and Council at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George sent you a Commission Constituting and appointing Robert Lennax Esq<sup>r</sup>. Deputy Governour, M<sup>r</sup>. John Savage Second, M<sup>r</sup>. Samuel Greenslate Third, M<sup>r</sup>. William Rigg Fourth, M<sup>r</sup>. Benjamin Hawkes Fifth, M<sup>r</sup>. Richard Jordan Sixth, and M<sup>r</sup>. Charles Barbut Seventh of Council, which We hereby Confirm, expecting a Faithful discharge of the Trust reposed in you by promoting our Interest to the utmost in your several Stations, and Our Deputy Governour having never Entered into Covenants with Us, We send them enclosed in the Ship Queen Carolines Packet, which he must Execute being regularly dated and Witnessed, returning them to Us by the first Ship, and he must write to his Freinds in England to propose two responsible Persons to be Security in the Sum of Two Thousand Pounds for his Faithful performance, and he must take the usual Oath of Fidelity on the arrival of this Letter, noteing the Same upon Consultation.

44. We perceive M<sup>r</sup>. Savage has discharged his Bond for the Two Hundred Pounds advanced him in England, but M<sup>r</sup>. Perry before his untimely end had paid off no part of his Bond, however as his Executors obliged themselves to pay off his Debt in twelve Months We hepe to be no losers.

45. We are greatly concerned at M<sup>r</sup>. Daniel Coles Murther, on perusal of the Consultation relating thereto it appears that a Black Wench was suspected to be accessory, but she could not be found, on your Offering a Reward for apprehending the Accomplices, the unhappy and fatal Consequence of the Course which he took should warn all our Servants to refrain from Mallay Women, and We expect that you will set them a Sober and virtuous Example in this and all other respects.

46. In answer to the 55<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph, We have Sent a recruit of Soldiers in [the . . .] as ~~the~~ List enclosed, You tell us that about Ten were [discharged] who had served out their contracted time and Petitioned to go home, We should be pleased if by some Small Encouragement you can induce such who are Serviceable to continue longer.

47. The Judge of the Admiralty has Committed White and Weir, whom you sent over on the Duke of Lorraine on a Suspicion of Murthering Thomas Heath, but their Tryal is not yet come on.

48. You do not mention in either of your Letters or upon Consultation any thing about the Silver. We sent out as a present to M<sup>r</sup>. Everest which was a great Omission We suppose it was delivered to his Attorneys, but as he was not on the spott it should have been deposited in Our Cash till further Orders. The Bill of Exchange drawn in his favour has been accepted and paid.

49. We observe that M<sup>r</sup>. Jeddere has at length paid off the Fifty Pounds We advanced him in England, and as M<sup>r</sup>. Daniel Coles Effects produced very near the Sum he was Indebted to Us, We expect that his Debt will be discharged according to Your promise in the 49<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph, and you must see to it, by regularly adjusting all accounts every Month that none of our Servants ran behind hand but on the contrary that such of them are entrusted with our money or Goods do fairly and honestly account for them by produceing authentick vouchers for each Article, and acting in the most frugal manner in all Disbursements.

50. We have thought it very necessary and proper to send a Chaplain to your Place, and have Elected the Reverend M<sup>r</sup>. Francis Barlow in that Station at the Salary of Fifty pounds  $\text{p}^{\text{annum}}$  and Fifty Pounds  $\text{p}^{\text{annum}}$  Gratuity on his behaving suitably to his Character and profession, and thirty five Dollars a month Diet money, to commence from his arrival at your Place, and We hope that by his regular Life and conversation as well as good Doctrine he will [be of ser]vice to the Place, and so deserve our future [favour] We expect that you will give him all due Encouragement and attend constantly on Divine Worship.

51. Captain Crompton informed Us that you had several conferences and Bechars with the Borneo People relating to our Traffick thither, We are surprized that you gave Us no clearer Light into the affair than what is communicated to Us in the Consultation of the 11<sup>th</sup>. of January, You ought to have been very particular whether the Sultan was privy to the Invitation how it came about, whether the Messengers appear'd to be sincere, what Price Pepper bore in those parts, and imparted also your sentiments of the matter, However We have taken the hint, and notwithstanding Your Account is so defective, We have Ordered the Prince of Wales One of Our China Ships to make an Essay Cap<sup>t</sup>. Pelly the Commander, M<sup>r</sup>. Thomas Liell and M<sup>r</sup>. John Hodgson are our Supra Cargo's, the two first having been at Benjar and We hope they will meet with such success as fully to load the ship for the China Market, and thereby make it worth our while to continue a commerce in those parts, We send you a Copy of some Paragraphs of their Instructions inclosed in the Packet for Your Information that in case you receive any further messages from Benjar you may act thereupon as shall be most for our Interest.

52. To supply the Vacancys occasioned by Death or otherwise, We have sent to your Assistance Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Peter Cary, Robert Fitzhugh, and Henry Stirling Factors, and Charles Smith a Writer, You must Employ these and all our Servants in such Stations as are most suited to their Capacity, and see that they behave with sobriety and Diligence not suffering any of them to guilty of Excess, and be Sure to encourage the most deserving among them.

53. In Case Our Commanders Should Offer to pay into our Cash all or any part of the produce of their outward bound Adventure, you must receive the same and grant them Certificates for the Amount, on their making Oath that the money is rea[lly the] produce of what they are Licenced by Us to carry Out [and that] they neither have taken up nor will take up [other money] in India to Trade withal in the Room of it.

54. We have advanced M<sup>r</sup>. Barlow Fifty Pounds to be deducted out of his growing Salary and his Bond for the same comes enclosed in the Packet.

55. Since writing the above We have received *Via* Holland the Officers of ship Comptons Account of her Loss, it came enclosed in a Letter from your Secretary with an Apology for its being omitted in the Packet, which for the reason he mentions We are willing to overlook, but more care must be taken in future.

56. We have sent you Ten Bolts Russia, and Ten of English Canvass, let us know which best Answers the Uses you want them for, making allowance for the Deficiency in the Breadth of the English Canvass.

57. By this Ship you will receive a number of Bibles and Common Prayer Books for the regular performance of Divine worship, The largest Bibles and Prayer Books are for the Chaplains Desk and the Clerks, the others in Folio for the Deputy Governour and Council, the Octavos for the rest of our Covenant Servants, and for the use of the Military. We are

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND  
COUNCIL OF FORT MARLBOROUGH

We wrote to you at large under the 14<sup>th</sup>. Octo<sup>r</sup>. by the ship Queen Caroline, and she sail'd out of the Downes the 4<sup>th</sup>. November Copy of our said Letter is Enclosed, this [comes] by the Scarborough *via* Bengal, and on her we have Consigned five Chests Treasure as Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed.

Captain George Westcott has borrowed of Us Three thousand Pounds at Respondentia, and in case of his Death, you must see that his Effects are not Embezzled, or if he offers to pay any part of the Produce of them into our Cash, you must receive the same, and Grant him Certificates for the Amount, and we will adjust the same with him on his return to England.

In Consultation the 8<sup>th</sup>. January a report is Enter'd from the Paymaster & Gunner, wherein it is alledg'd that the Duke of Lorrain had her full Complement of men agreeable to Charterparty, but by the List, it appears there were no more than ninety men on board, which falls short of the Charterparty Number, so that more care must be taken in future in this Important affair, We are

You must Enjoyn Our Agent and Council at Gombroon to grant Free Liberty to the [Supra] Cargoes of all Countrey Ships to Sell their Goods to the highest Bidders We having received Complaints that they must Sell to the Chief and at his prices or not at all, this is a very unwarrantable way of proceeding, a great discouragem<sup>t</sup>. to the ffair Trader, extreamly prejudicial to our Revenues and you must See to it, that no just cause of Complaint is given in future in this Respect at that Settlement, Your place or any Subordinate ffactory and all Ships must be allowed to Dispose of their Cargoes at Gombroon, or proceed to Bussero as shall be thought fit by those who have the Charge of them, there being no further occasion for the prohibition which took place on the Turks obliging two of them to Attack the Persians And You ought by all proper means to Encourage and Cherish the Trade of your ffellow Servants and others who reside under our Protection in Madrass & Bengall carried on Conformable to our Established Rules & paying our accustomed Dutys, this is the more necessary nor the French Vye with Us to such a Degree in the Trade all over India, who should not be suffered to meet with any accidental Advantages arising from your Neglect.

We have Order'd Our Servants in the Bay, to Supply you with, Five hundred Pieces Midling Sannoos, & Five hundred Pieces Jugdea Baftaes, which must be Printed with a variety of beautiful Pattern's, but not in the expensive manner of the Madrass Chints, those sent by the Ship Prince William were not full enough of Work, you must continue to make them all white Ground and the Colours more lively with as much variety as You can.

They will likewise send You [Two hundred] fine Brown Sannoos, to be Bleached and Whitned [upon your] Coast, those You have hitherto sent home, have [been conjeed] and Glazed, but We would have You for the future [send them] without.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. GEORGE, DATED 25<sup>TH</sup>. OCTOBER 1738.  
PER DUKE OF LORRAIN.

OUR PRESIDENT AND  
COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. Our Letters last Season were dated the 5<sup>th</sup>. October, 30<sup>th</sup>. December, 8<sup>th</sup>. February 1737 and 7<sup>th</sup>. April 1738, the last was sent by way of Bombay & Ship Onslow and Copy's come enclosed of such of Our said Letters as have not been sent by three Conveyances, the Onslow saild out of the Downes the 9<sup>th</sup>. April, the Marlboro the 27<sup>th</sup>. of the same month, and the Harrington saild from thence the 29<sup>th</sup>. July last for Bombay and Canton.

2. It hath pleased God to return Us this Year the following Ships Viz<sup>t</sup>.

3. The Nottingham by touching at the Cape and having a long Passage from St. Helena of three months did not arrive early enough for Our March Sale which was a Great Loss to Us, as the news of so many Ships being drove on Shore in Bengal would have caus'd her Cargo to sell well at that Particular Juncture, and therefore you must if possible dispatch Our Ships in September and enjoyn the Comanders to make the best of their way without touching at the Cape.

4. By that Ship and the Royal Guardian We reced your Advices of the 5<sup>th</sup>. October, 28<sup>th</sup>. January and 6<sup>th</sup>. February, whereof due Notice shall be taken in the Sequel of this Letter, or by Our Latter Ships ; proceeding first to acquaint you with such Particulars as are Needfull, concerning Shipping.

5. We have taken up the following Ships for the carrying on Our Trade this Season viz<sup>t</sup>.

6. Besides which We have resolved to send out three Ships to the Coast and Bay, Two for China, one to Bengal and Bencoolen, One to Bombay with a Comodore, One to Bengal and Bombay and one directly to Bombay.

7. This comes by Our Ship Duke of Lorrain, We have loaden on board Fifty Chests Treasure, some Broad Cloth, Lead with other Goods and Merchandize, as & Invoice and Bill of Lading enclos'd, which Ship is consignd you thus early, that she may arrive in good time to be sent to Canton in China, and accordingly We direct that such a Cargo be loaden on board this Ship, as you shall judge proper, for the

purchasing such a Cargo as is proper for the Madrass Market, wherein We give you and the Inhabitants, a liberty to be concern'd such a Proportion as you shall think fit, making the whole a Joint Stock, in the same manner as We directed in all respects as to the Godolphin last year.

8. We again leave the Choice of Supra Cargos to you, and the ordering such a Quantity of the several Species of Goods, as you shall esteem the most proper.

9. The Voyage must be debted an Equitable Sum for the Hire of the Ship, wherein Regard must be had to the Demorage incurr'd, and the Charge of sending a Country Ship.

10. We shall give Orders to the Supra Cargos of Our Canton Ships, to put on board the Duke of Lorrain upon Our Account, Two Thousand Peculs of Tea, as part of her Cargo for Europe, consigning the same to you, and therefore your Supra Cargos must have the needfull Directions, to receive on board the Duke of Lorrain what Tea Ours may think proper to load, within the said Quantity of two Thousand Pecul, stowing the same in the Dryest Part of the Ship, and taking the Greatest Care that it is not tainted with Camphire or any other Strong Smelling Druggs, by prohibiting them to be put on board, and the Captain, Officers, and Ships Company must not be allow'd to exceed their Priviledge in Tonnage.

11. In case you are concern'd with Us in the other part of her Cargo, We agree to allow the Voyage for the Tonnage which the said Tea will take up, a Tale and a half  $\text{q}^{\text{r}}$  Pecul to be paid in China, provided you pay the Hire of the Ship, before her Departure from Madrass, or if not the Difference of the Freight to be adjusted on the Ships Return.

12. As a Larger Quantity of Pepper may have been sent to your Place, more than Our Ships can take in at Half Freight, in which Case, We are willing that the Surplus may be engrafted on the Duke of Lorrain's Stock, at Two Pagodas a Candy under the Market Price at your Sea Gate.

13. In case Our Supra Cargos to Mocha, are not able to procure more than half a Loading for the Ship Defence within Our Limited Price, they will be order'd to consign the Ship and Cargo to you, with the remaining part of the Outward bound Stock uninvested, in that Case you must give them a Receipt for the same and fill up the Ship with Callico's, dispatching her to Us without Loss of time, but you must not send any Pepper in her.

14. By the Endorsments on Our several Ships Charterpartys, a full provision is made by ascertaining the Freight, that shall be paid for all Surplus Goods, loaden on board over and above the Charterparty Tonnage, so that you will do well to fill them as full as they can hold, in case you have Goods sufficient upon hand for that purpose, observing that whatever Salt Petre is loaden more than the Charterparty Kintlage, the Captain must first request for it expressly, at Twelve Pounds Sixteen Shillings and Eight Pence a Ton, and the same is not to be reckoned any part of the Charterparty Tonnage.

15. The Allowances to Our Commanders, are as  $\text{q}^{\text{r}}$  Printed Indulgence, enclos'd in the Packet, and We hereby enjoyn a Compliance with the Orders contain'd in the 22<sup>th</sup>. 23<sup>th</sup>. and 24<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of Our Letter dated the 3<sup>d</sup>. November 1736.

16. Cap<sup>t</sup>. Crompton has borrow'd of Us Three Thousand Pounds at Respondentia, and as it is probable Our other Commanders, may also take up mony in like manner, We direct in case they should offer to pay any Sum into Our Cash, in part of their Bonds, that you receive the same, being very explicit in your Receipts, that the mony so paid in is upon that account.

17. We have desired Josias Wordsworth Esq<sup>r</sup>. Sr. William Rous, Harry Gough and Matthew Martin Esq<sup>r</sup>. or any Three of them to appoint Proper Signals for Our Ships, what Orders may be receiv'd from these Gentlemen relating thereto must be duly comply'd with.

18. Your Letter of the 28<sup>th</sup>. January last, sent *via* France never came to hand, although the Letters from Bengal by that Conveyance were duly receiv'd.

19. You did well in hastning away the Royal Guardian to China, and on her return from thence in dispatching her to Us in Good time, whereby the Captain had a Good Passage, from this Instance, We persuade Ourselves the like Prudent Measures will annually be taken, that the Round about Ship, may be return'd to Us the same Season, as otherwise it must prove a Loosing Voyage to Us, Our dispatching them so early as October, may enable you to send them from Your Place in May, and thus the Compleating Affairs at Canton, may be accomplish'd in October, or the beginning of November, which We earnestly recommend to you, and the Commander must have it in Charge, not to Go to Malacca or elsewhere, but by your Express Orders, and be directed to make the best of his way to your Place, that so you may be able to dispatch him for Europe in January, and the Great Risque which always attends Our Ships coming late about the Cape may be thereby avoided.

20. We entirely approve of your discharging the Bond which Mr. Waters entred into at Mocha.

21. You tell Us the Charges of building the Two Sloops at Pegu, exceeded what you expected, adding the Governments Impositions there, occasions building to be much dearer than formerly, In reply thereto We must observe, first, that on Perusal of your Orders to the Resident upon this occasion, Frugality or Good Management is not so much as mention'd, a Watchfull Eye ought to have been enjoyn'd, that the Workmen kept close to their business, and in the next Place, Impositions are not pleaded for, their Dearness by the Resident, but other Causes are assign'd by Our Advices from the Bay, that the Rigging and other Stores sent from Madrass, were unsizeable and very bad, the Twine rotten and Master Carpenter continually drunk, by the Needfull Instructions and Proper Care these things will for the future be prevented by you.

22. The Sloop built at Bombay for Our Service in Bengal was by all Accounts well perform'd, and a Prime Sailer, her Cost, (Stores included) was Eleven Thousand Six hundred Rupees, We observe in Consultation the 16<sup>th</sup>. January, you agreed to write to Our President and Council at Bombay, to build a Ship of Two hundred Tons for the West Coast Service, which for the Reasons therein mentioned We acquiesce in, and from the above Instance hope will prove both better and cheaper than if built at Pegu, you must not fail of Informing Us whether she answers Our Expectations, and be sure to fix upon Capable Sober and Trustworthy Men for Master and Mates, constantly employing the Ship either to that Coast, in fetching Callicos from the Subordinates, Salt Petre or Rice from Bengal as the Circumstances of things shall require, and so as We may reap considerable Profits, to which End a Due Regard must be paid to the 7<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter by the Nottingham, whereto no reply is made in the Advices before us, although you should have told us, whether We had Real Cause for Our Apprehensions or not, which by your Silence, We have too much Reason to think were well founded.

23. Your Good Intentions as to the Ship Lyell, We are afraid were frustrated, by Our Servants in the Bay sending a Loading of Rice upon her to Bombay, however you judg'd well, and acted commendably, in Imparting your design to them so immediately, as set forth in Consultation the 20<sup>th</sup>. January, which might induce them to alter their Measures.

24. The Explicit Advices concerning Our Ships in the several Parts of India and China, interspers'd in both your Letters, afford Us an agreeable Satisfaction and the like must be continued.

25. Our Ship George made but One Trip this last year which was to the West Coast, from whence she arriv'd the 23<sup>th</sup>. July, and wanting to be new sheath'd and

Naild was sent to Vizagapatam, We observe by the Accounts transmitted Us, the Repairs took up four Months time, and amounted to Three Thousand Three hundred and Fifty Rupees, including the last Article, which is thus oddly worded, Cash Gave Captain Taylor One Thousand Rupees, without any manner of Explanation, but as he arriv'd at Madrass the 20<sup>th</sup>. January We expect that Sum was accounted for before he sailed to Bencoolen.

26. You did well to secure from the Bay a Sufficient Stock of Salt Petre, to comply with Our Commanders Requests, that We may reap the Benefit of having it at the Low Freight, and in order thereto, We should be well pleased, were four or five thousand Bags always lying in your Godowns, which would answer very valuable purposes in several other Respects, and you must write to Our Servants in Bengal accordingly, such a Situation We are the more desirous of, because for years past the Quantity on hand, has been so Scanty, that you have Seldom been able to load more than the Kintlage, however We think proper to add, that Our Ships must always be fill'd with Bale Goods, preferable to Salt Petre whenever it is in your Power.

27. We are entirely in the Dark, what Cargo the Royal Guardian Carried to, or brought from China, although We were not concern'd in the Voyage, We would be glad to have accounts transmitted Us for Our Notice, which you must not Fail of in future, and send Us also the Commanders Registers of their own, and the Ships Company's Private Trade, to and from Canton, informing Us whether they as well as Our other Commanders exceed their Priviledge or no.

28. The Sloop of Twenty Ton bought for the West Coast, will be of great Service in fetching Pepper from Manna and elsewhere, don't fail urging the due Employment of Our Vessels there, that the Charge of hiring may be avoided.

29. We have agreed with the Owners of Shipping here, with respect to all such Officers and Seamen, whose Ships are taken or lost in this Company's Service, and who desire to return directly to England without going into other Service that We will pay or allow the Owners of such Ships as bring them home, Two Thirds of what is agreed in Charterparty to be allow'd or paid for Passengers out or home, and so in proportion, for such as are taken on board, in any part of the Voyage, and that the Owners will stand to the other Third Part agreeable to the Stated Rules on other Extraordinary Cases.

30. And therefore on any such Melancholy Occasions, We direct, that you give Orders to Our Commanders, to receive all such on board their Ships as apply to you for that purpose, dividing them in Equal Proportions on Our Several returning Ships, and in case no Salvage is made, the Men must be taken Care of, by employing them in the Gunroom till they can be shipp'd.

SECONDLY CONCERNING GOODS FROM EUROPE, OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA,  
TO BE DISPOS'D OF IN ANOTHER.

31. We received no Price Currant of Europe Goods by either of the Ships from your Place, this was a very Great Omission, a Correct one of all Sorts of Merchandize, must for the future be sent Us by the October and January Shipping, drawn out in Alphabetical Order and attested by the Board.

32. Effectual Care We think is taken to prevent all Complaints of Short Weight in Our Treasure, however don't fail of weighing it off in the Captains Presence and inform Us constantly how it turns out.

33. We always buy Steel by the Long Weight, of One hundred and Twenty Pounds to the Hundred, which not being specify'd in the Bedford's Invoice, We observe on Captain Wells demanding the Overplus as his own, it was deliverd him, without obliging him to produce any Authentick Voucher, which was a Wrong Method, you must see whether due Credit has been given Us in times past, according to the said Long Weight, and inform Us of the Result, We shall take Care to do Ourselves Justice, by charging Captain Wells for Our Proportion.

34. As the Dorsett's Madeira Wine sold for upwards of Fifty Two Pagodas a Pipe, We have order'd a Fresh Supply to be sent you, inform us how it proves and observe Our Directions upon this Head by the Nottingham.

35. We observe with Pleasure that a thorough Scrutiny was made into the State of Our Stores, the Judicious Explicit Report and Regulations made thereupon, as entered upon Consultation in the Month of April, are very Commendable and Praiseworthy, you did well in ordering all y<sup>e</sup>. decay'd & Worn out to be sold at Outcry, and will still do better to dispose of them before they are so, We are very sensible a Sufficient Quantity should always be on hand, to supply the Shipping that resort to Madrass, and would have you by all means, Indent accordingly, and not think of Lessening them upon any other account, than as Articles are unvendable or unprofitable, and We hereby recommend it to the Storekeeper for the time being, to make himself thorough Master of the Demand, and to frame an Indent annually agreeable thereto, for your Perusal and Consideration, sometime before the ships Departure, and also to take Effectual Care by a thorough Inspection every Quarter or oftner, that no Article whatsoever is suffer'd to be the Worse for Keeping, We have only to add upon this Head, that the Masts and Yards indented for are not sent, by reason they lumber Our Ships so very much, and you may easily be supplied with them from Pegu.

36. We shall supply you with Two Thousand Candy of Lead as desired; Thirteen Pagodas and upwards a Candy is a very encouraging Price, and by continuing the Method of putting up at Outcry a Proper Quantity, as the Market shall stand best affected, at due distances of time, the like may be secur'd.

37. The full Quantity of Sail Cloth Indented for, will be sent on Our Several Ships, of Our Own British Manufacture, acquaint Us how it answers, and in case Ours is every way as serviceable as the Hollands Duck, introduce the Use of it as much as possible, for a National Benefit, the Parliament having thought fit lately, to take this Particular Manufacture under their Patronage, and don't fail of annually complying with the 27<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter by the Nottingham, agreeable to your Promise.

#### THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS PROPER FOR EUROPE.

38. A very Affecting Account is presented to Our View, of the Famine which reign'd on the Coast, in reply thereto, We can only refer to the 24<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter by the Beaufort last year.

39. Although you are at a Loss to account for the French making such Large Contracts, and add, that such a Quantity of Cloth could not be procured, yet by the Printed Cargos of their Ships, their Importations are equal to your Information concerning them.

40. You have form'd a True Judgment of Our Small Profits in the 19<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph, and We have the Mortification of telling you, the Prices now are still lower here than in 1736, and yet in answer to the latter part of the said Paragraph, We must submit to the times, and not suffer the French or any other Rivals to run away with our Commerce, Markets are variable and We trust the Coromandel Coast will be favour'd with Plentiful Seasons, and as to the Discretional Power desired, We say, as Faithfull Capable Servants the Best Endeavours and most Prudent Measures must be taken to comply with Our List of Investment, by procuring the Goods therein Mention'd, on the Cheapest and best Terms you are able in so doing We persuade Ourselves, that you will not suffer Our Competitors, to carry on their Trade more advantageously than We, but by encouraging a Greater Number of Merchants to reside in Madrass, and to engage in Contracts for Callicos; dispersing Our Servants and Money up and down the Coast, either to the Northward or Southward as occasion may require, and so as to keep the Weavers constantly employd for Us in a Mercantile manner, for Our Greater Benefit do your Utmost to comply with Our demands.

41. We are concern'd that Andiapa at Porto Novo is no longer engag'd in Our Service, especially as Porto Novo lyes to the Southward, and in your last Letter We are told, that almost the whole Investment of Ordinary Cloth is now made South of Madrass, this being the Case, We are apt to think the sending some of Our Servants

to reside in those parts may answer very valuable Ends, and offer the same to your Serious Consideration. We observe with Pleasure that though M<sup>r</sup>. Goddard did not arrive at Maddepollam till May yet he sent up Two hundred Bales from that New Residency ; from this Instance as well as from the Nature of things, We are persuaded that Our having Servants on the Spot, wherever Large Number of Weavers take up their Abode, must necessarily be attended with very Good Effects.

42. We are not informd what European Nation is now supply'd with Cloth from Porto Novo, We are apprehensive the Portugueze Ship which touchd there secur'd it this last year, unless by some Politick Measures the Supra Cargo's Attempts were frustrated, Mr. Milner the Chief being his Majesty's Subject, and Trading contrary to the Laws of his Country, you are sufficiently warranted to secure all such Persons, if you can by any Stratagem.

43. Besides the Remarks made in Our List of Investment Enclos'd, We must observe here in answer to several Parts of the Letters before Us, that the Long Cloth in general by the Nottingham and Royal Guardian, sold about one Shilling a Peice higher than last year, your Long Cloth Ordinary though cheaper, sold something better than the S<sup>t</sup>. Davids, their Salem and the Cloth with that Long Hard Name Chema-naickpollam, went off at much the same Prices, We perceive they are both invoic'd at lower Rates than your Salem Cloth, and yet they sold from Eighteen Pence to Two Shillings higher in the several Numbers, and We are surprizd to find that the Salem Cloth both from your Place and S<sup>t</sup>. Davids is charg'd at more than Midling as the Buyers at Our Sale give Eight and Nine Shillings a Piece more, for this last sort than the others, this being the Case We read with pleasure in the 31<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your last Letter, that you aim'd at an Increase of Midling to the Northward, which for the reason just mentiond, We hope will be crown'd with Success, by Our Servants who reside in those Parts, exerting their best Endeavours for that purpose.

44. We receiv'd but Six hundred and Eighty Pieces of Fine Long Cloths this year, although Ten Thousand were indented for, the procuring of which you tell Us you had exceedingly at heart, but We must take notice that Our List of Investment arriv'd so Early as April, you alledge that the Merchants positively told you in October they could not bring them in at the Old Prices, We are sorry to find that you put such a Confidence in them S<sup>t</sup>. David's and the Northern Settlements should have been wrote to early in the Season for a Proportion of Fine Goods and Midling, which might as formerly have facilitated a Compliance with the other Branches of Our Investment, whereas your Letters to the Subordinates during the whole Season, are entirely silent upon those Articles, by the Tenour of your 21<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of the last Letter, you seem to be sensible of your Error, and therefore We shall not doubt of better Success in future.

45. Notwithstanding Our Observation in the 35<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph ¶ Nottingham, that the Ordinary Cloth sold much in proportion to its Cost, than that of Salem, We receiv'd this year but Two hundred and Sixty five Bales of the former, and Eight hundred Forty two of the latter, at a higher Price than was then mention'd, We are told the Merchants were press'd to bring in a Larger Quantity of Ordinary, but without Effect, and that most of the Ordinary sent Us of late years, was turn'd out from the Salem, if this is the Case We would have a New Sortiment made, of all the turn'd out Cloth, and what will come up at N<sup>o</sup>. 1. 2. 3 or 4 Ordinary, be secur'd for Us, both at your Place and at S<sup>t</sup>. David's, at a price according to it's Goodness, We think this is the more necessary to enjoyn you, because of the Small quantity of Ordinary sent Us, and more especially from the Contents of Our Deputy Governour and Council's Letter from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David dated the 8<sup>th</sup>. September, wherein whole Parcels are said to be turn'd out of late, and the French it is added hardly refuse any, and Thirty Ox Loads were sent away to Pondicherry, the Directions you gave in reply to the said Letter, founded on Our Sentiments in the 32<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph by the Nottingham were in all Respects well adapted for the Promotion of Our Interest, but there seems by the manner of wording what pass'd, to be some misunderstanding between you, and We observe the like on the Letters to and fro in the beginning of the Season which We are concern'd at, We hope that all Our Servants at Subordinates are Obedient to your Express Orders for promoting Our Interest.



46. On agreeing last year with the Merchants for Our Investment, the Prices only were fixed for the Callicos they should bring in, so that by these General Terms a Full Liberty was granted them to provide more or less of any particular specie, as they should think fitt, whereas from the foregoing Parts of this head, you may gather it would be much more advantageous to Us, were a certain Proportion to each other of Fine, Midling and Ordinary, or the Quantity of each Sort specify'd, and this is so reasonable a method, that surely the Merchants cannot but all readily agree thereto, especially as We observe with Pleasure, in Consultation the 20<sup>th</sup>. January last, that you had broke the Ice, and made a Contract with one sett of them, for Six hundred Bales in this manner, and We recommend the Continuance of this Practice, as a very agreeable and necessary Piece of Service.

47. We are concernd that Sallampôres have stood Us in such High Rates at Vizagapatam, that according to the Account laid before Us, in the 26<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of your last Letter, We get nothing by them selling for no more than Eighteen Shillings and two Pence to Nineteen Shillings and Eight Pence, and allowing for the Interest of Our mony, your computation of the Charges is right, We don't find that any of the European Nations are Our Competitors in those Parts so that We are surprizd, Our Servants were not able to perform better for Us, the Price of Cotton is said indeed to have been from One hundred and Twenty, to one hundred and Forty Rupees the Candy all the Season, but this is Twenty five  $\text{₹}$  Cent dearer than it was in the Bay of Bengal, and it is not usual to be cheaper there than upon your Coast, however as that is the only Reason assign'd for their coming out so dear, We shall expect to have Our Goods procured upon a Profitable footing when Cotton falls.

48. We direct that all the Madrass Piece Goods be pack'd in a Wax Wrapper and Cotton over and above all other Package in the same manner as the Fine and Midling Cloths are now pack'd.

49. We hereby caution you, not divulge Our Orders of Investment, but the same must be kept Secret, that so Our Competitors and the Merchants, may not gain an Advantage over Us by the Knowledge them.

FOURTHLY TOUCHING THE TRADE OF INDIA AND THEREIN ANY TRANSACTIONS  
WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

50. As Ships are annually sent from your Place to Manilha, Mocha and Bussorah, with Loadings chiefly consisting of Piece Goods, We depend on a faithfull discharge of the Trust repos'd you, by not suffering the Private Traders to interfere with Us in Our Investments, and for Our Satisfaction in this Respect an account of their Usual Cargos must be sent Us yearly in the Packet.

51. In case you are satisfy'd that Real Benefits will accrue to Us, in the Prices of Goods provided in the New Pettah, from the Undertakers laying out Two hundred Pagodas for Liberty to bring in Cotton Yarn for a very Small duty, We give you leave to make good that Sum to them, setting forth the Benefits in a Clear Light.

52. We entirely approve of your laying in a Stock of Rice by making a Large Purchase with Twenty One Thousand Pagodas of Our mony, and are highly pleased, that it was such an Emminent Relief to the Inhabitants as is set forth in both your Letters, you may be assur'd that Our being no Gainers thereby in such a Calamitous Time, is by no means displeasing to Us, a Watchfull Eye was necessary that those who deliverd it out, did not charge more than the Prime Cost, We hope a due Care was taken in this Important Respect, although We don't find, after the first Purchase was made in September, the Rate fix'd by any Order of Consultation which We must say had been the Regular method, to prevent any of Our Servants or Black People in the Warehouse, being Knaves in Grain, as it is wittily express'd in your Letter.

53. Our Servants in the Bay acted very unbecomingly in ordering their Ships and Vessells, to unload at Pullicat and Covelong their Rice Cargos, without coming to your Place, you did well in expostulating with them on this occasion, but then We observe, on perusing what pass'd between you, that your Letter is dated so late as the 9<sup>th</sup>. September, and the President and Council in Bengal alledge that, in excuse for not supplying you, We hope that all Private Interests are laid aside, and that both of you, will do all that's possible to relieve your Fellow Creatures, when they labour under so General a Calamity.

## FIFTHLY TOUCHING FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS, REPAIRS &amp; REVENUES.

54. As the Sea Gate and the Passage thereto, stood in need of a Repair you acted right, in causing a Survey and Estimate of the Charge to be laid before you, Our Buildings must not be suffered to run to decay but whenever it is needfull to lay out any mony upon them, We expect a due Compliance with Our Directions upon this Head by the Nottingham, your acknowledging that We have suffer'd by the Black Workmens Unskillfullness, makes this Injunction highly requisit, more especially as Our Observation on the Grainery is not clear'd up, appointing an Italian Overseer at Ten Pagodas a Month, and placing too great a Confidence in him, may serve only to encrease Our Charge.

55. We ought to have had your Opinion as to a New Powder Magazine at S<sup>t</sup>. David's, in the Letters from thence it is said, the Old Powder House at Cuddalore is not a very Safe Place, and that there is no convenience in the Fort, to keep a Store of Powder, and the Charge is estimated at Four hundred and Forty Eight Pagodas, in case you are of Opinion, that such a Building is necessary, We give you leave to sett about one according to the Plan sent Us, or any other you may think proper to fix upon, Our Deputy Governour and Council erecting it on a spot of Ground, the best situated for that purpose, and not exceeding the Estimate.

55. We are told the Sale of Farms at Outery is a Method that will not answer, if that is the Case We rely upon your Integrity, to make the Best Bargain you can for Us, which Confidence We can place with the Greater Satisfaction, as We perceive with Pleasure y<sup>e</sup>. flourishing state of Our Revenues at your Place Our Sea and Land Customs being considerably encreased this last year, and the Expencc decreased at the same time, convince Us that you have Our True Interest at Heart, and gives Us an agreeable Prospect of a Like Watchfull Care, for the Promotion of Our Welfare in future.

57. Pursuant to the Original Regulation made in 1715, We direct that the Seer and a half  $\text{₹}$  Maund, collected for Us in Bengal, on all Rice exported from thence, be in future deducted out of the Five  $\text{₹}$  Cent Duty payable at your Place, on the Importers producing a Certificate from the Jemindar there, that they have paid Us the said Duty, and We hereby approve of your Method as to your own Ships, in deducting what is paid in Bengal for the said Duty, out of the Customs at Your Place, with this Proviso, that they also Produce the beforemention'd Certificate.

58. Notwithstanding the Committee appointed to survey the Bounds had not made a Report, and for that Reason a Reply to Our Commands upon that head was deferr'd till next Season, We ought to have been acquainted whether our Cautions and Injunctions had their due weight, in an Affair of such vast Importance to the Welfare of Our Settlement, your entire Silence is by no means pleasing to Us. We are

We shall order you some fine brown Sannoos to be Bleached and Whitened upon your Coast, those you have hitherto sent home have been Congeed, and Glazed, but We would have you for the future send them without.

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL  
AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. OUR Ship Duke of Lorraine Sailed out of the Downs the 5<sup>th</sup>. November, and carried our Commands of the 25<sup>th</sup>. October, Duplicate whereof comes enclosed, the Walpole Sailed the 3<sup>d</sup>. and Defence the 8<sup>th</sup>. November.
2. THIS comes by the Shaftesbury, Captain Matthew Bookey Commander, We have loaden on board sundry Goods and Merchandize, as  $\text{P}$  Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed.
3. OUR Supra Cargos to Mocha Mess<sup>rs</sup>. John Wallis, Thomas Thomson, and Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Coates, are ordered to Dispatch the Ship Defence to you, in case they are not able to procure more than Three thousand Bales of Coffee, within our limited Prices.
4. WE have sent Ten Bales of Cloth, of French Yellows for a tryal, they cost Dying double the price of a common Yellow, we hope you will be able to Sell them accordingly, and advise Us how they are approved, and in future, send us Patterns of Woollen Goods along with the Indent.
5. ONE Bale of Emerald Green Imbost Cloth is sent instead of Ten Indented for, the other Nine Bales are Popinjay, inform Us how they are liked.
6. SUCH of our Ships as are Consigned to your Place which you are not able to Load home in September, must be sent down to the Bay, without loss of time, so soon as the Bullion is Coined, Loading on them such a Quantity of Rupees, and Bullion as they may write for, in case you can spare the same.
7. HAVING Dispatched the Ship Britannia, Captain John Somner Commander, We send enclosed, Copy of our Letter to the West Coast for your notice.
8. OUR Ship Lynn is to be in the Downs the 10<sup>th</sup>. December Cap<sup>t</sup>. Charles Gilbert will be ordered to call at the Madeiras to take in Wine for your place and the Bay, We shall dispatch him, and Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Langworth of the Prince William for Bombay, before Christmas.
9. WE have taken up the Ships Houghton Burthen 495 Tons, Captain Philip Worth; and the Augusta 495 Tons Augustus Townshend for China.
10. IN case any Money should be offered to be paid in to our Cash, on account of Grantham Bird late Soldier at your Place, We direct that you receive the same, and grant Bills of Exchange upon Us for the amount, on the Terms granted to our Servants by the last Regulation.
11. WE order for the future that you Erect a Treasury Office as We have here, and that all our Bullion, Pagodoes, Rupees and other Treasure, be kept therein under three Locks by our President, and the two next in standing upon the Place, except a Running Cash of about Forty thousand Pagodoes which must be in the Presidents Possession, and the Ballance of the same must be Monthly produced before the

Council, and the like Rule must be observed at each Subordinate Settlement, proportionable Running Cash being placed in the Chiefs hands, as you shall think fit to regulate. WE ARE.

1. WE Wrote to you last by our Ship Shaftsbury, under the 6<sup>th</sup>. Instant, Copy of our said Letter with that of the 25<sup>th</sup>. October are enclosed.
2. This comes by the Ship Lynn, Captain Charles Gilbert Commander, who is ordered to call at the Madeiras our Correspondents there having Directions to load on board her, upon our Account, Sixty Pipes of the Choicest, strongest bodied Wines that Island produces, and to consign the same to You, as also One hundred Pipes for Bengal, and We have permitted the Captain and Officers to take in Twenty Pipes on their own Account, and no more, so that you must inform Us, and our Servants in the Bay, how many Pipes are landed at your place, on the Ships Proceeding thither.
3. WE have Consigned You Twenty five Chests of Treasure, with other Goods and Merchandize as ☿ invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed.
4. Captain Charles Gilbert has Borrowed of Us Three thousand Pounds at Respondentia, in case of his Death, You must see that his Effects are not Embezzled.
5. The Ship Prince William, Captain Thomas Langworth, is ordered to relieve the Ship Resolution, in Guarding the Mallabar Coast against Angrias Piracys, We having possitively enjoined, that the said Ship be detained for that purpose, in case a Peace with Angria is not Concluded, and after the Easterly Monsoon is over, the Prince William will be sent to your Place and Bengal with Pepper, if the President and Council have it to spare, that so the same may be Shott loose on our several Returning Ships at half Freight, and otherwise She is to be sent with a Loading of

Cotton directly to the Bay, and in both cases to be returned from thence to Bombay with Salt Petre and Redwood to Kintlage, and Dunnidge Our Ships Dispatched home from that side of India.

6. The Bullion, Pagodoes, Rupees, and other Treasure remaining in the Treasury Office, together with the Ballance of our Cash, must be Monthly produced to the whole Council. We are

TO THE PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL  
 AT FORT S<sup>r</sup>. GEORGE.

1. Our Letters to You this Season were dated the 25<sup>th</sup>. October 6<sup>th</sup>. and 20<sup>th</sup> December, the first under the Established Heads has been sent by three Conveyances and Copys of the others come enclosed.

2. The Shaftesbury Sailed out of the Downs the 12<sup>th</sup>. and the Britannia the 14<sup>th</sup>. December with a fair Wind, but the Richmond being somewhat Leaky, put back to Plimouth in order to Refit, She was Repaired in a few days, but is not yet Sailed from thence: the Prince William and Lynn are also Wind bound in the Downs, with the Houghton and Augusta Dispatched for Canton the 24<sup>th</sup>. January.

3. Since our last We have taken up the following Ships VI<sup>r</sup>.

4. This comes by our Ships Normanton and Grantham and We have loaden on board each of them Thirty Chests Treasure, and Sundry Goods and Merchandize, as  $\text{P}$  the Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed in their respective Packets,

5. Our Ships Warwick and Somerset, will be Dispatched directly for Bengal in a few days, the Captains are permitted to call in at your place, if they think fit on their so doing You must put them in mind not to make any needless Stay, and a sufficient Quantity of Redwood must be sent to the Bay for Dunninging them and our other Ships, We have Orderd the Warwick to be sent from thence to Bombay and the Somerset to Bencoolen; In case our Servants on the West Coast stand in need of any Stores, or you have reason to apprehend that a few Piece Goods, some Ophium or the like will turn to a good Account there, dont fail of acquainting Our President and Council at Fort William, that so they may be sent accordingly, We having given them Directions to Comply therewith.

6. We have ordered Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Frederick Pigou, Richard Oliver and Henry Hadley, Our Supra Cargos of the Ship Augusta, to Load on board the Duke of Lorraine upon our Account Two thousand Pecul of Tea and to Consign the same to You, they are Ordered to Pay One Tale and a half  $\text{P}$  Pecul for the Freight thereof, in case your Supra Cargos demand the same, agreeable to what We wrote in our first Letter.

7. Our Supra Cargos of the Ships Houghton and Walpole, Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Miles Barne, John Misenor, William Henry Draper, Lascoe Hide, and Jonathan Scarth, are Ordered to Provide a Returning Cargo for the Ship Harrington to Bombay.

8. Security has not been given for some of our Servants whose Names are mentioned in the List of the Packet, and they must write to their Friends in England upon that head.

9. We observe on Major Wilsons Death, Lieutenant Holland was appointed to the Command of the Company at your Place, vacant by the Major's Death, and Lieutenant Amyand had Captain Hollands Company at S<sup>t</sup>. David, but as Captain Amyand is the Senior Officer, We would not have him prejudiced in his Standing thereby.

10. Captain Roger Hale has Borrowed of Us Three thousand Pounds at Respondentia, in case of his Death, You must see that his Effects are not Embezled, they being Assigned over to Us as a Security for the same.

11. As to the Reasons Urged in the Advices before Us for the usual method of Selling our Woollen Goods to the Contract Merchants, and for preferring the Same to a Sale at Outcry, We shall only say, that you on the Spot are certainly proper Judges whether the Consumption thereof, and our Investments are promoted and encreased by that practice, and therefore We leave it to you to Act therein as may be most for our Interest, in accomplishing those desireable Ends always remembering what has been so often mentioned, that We have the Consumption of our English Product and Manufacture very much at heart.

12. We are very glad to find that a Negotiation was on foot, in order to procure Salt Petre from Pegue, and in case it is to be had there on as cheap terms as at Patna, or in proportion to the difference in goodness, and you find upon Tryal, the Quality to be fit for our purpose, We would by all means have you take the proper measures to Secure for Us Annually a large Quantity from thence.

13. Having thought fitt to refer the Difficulties mentioned in the 53<sup>th</sup>. and 54<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of your last Letter, relating to the Charter unto John Brown Esq<sup>r</sup>. our Standing Council, We send enclosed in the Normantons Packet his sentiments thereupon, in a Letter Directed to You and Copy thereof is forwarded in the Granthams Packet.

14. We have sent You for a Tryal a Bale of Twelve Pieces Dyed Flannels, and a Bale of Twelve Pieces Culjeed Flannels, You must inform Us how they are liked, and what Encouragement there is to send more.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH DATED 26<sup>TH</sup>. APRIL 1738, PER  
MARLBOROUGH.

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND  
COUNCIL AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. We have wrote you this Season under the 14<sup>th</sup>. of October and 6<sup>th</sup>. of January last, the former went by the Queen Caroline She Sailed out of the Downs the 4<sup>th</sup>. of November, and the latter by the Scarborough, which Sailed the 2<sup>d</sup>. of February, Copies of our Said Letters come Enclosed in the Packet.

2. We now consign you the Ship Marlborough Burthen Four Hundred ninety five Tons Captain Thomas Smith Commander, and We shall proceed to acquaint you of our design in so doing.

3. In our Instructions to the Supra Cargoes of Ship Prince of Wales bound to Benjar, they were Ordered to acquaint the Natives that We should send another Ship thither before We heard what Success they mett with, and agreable to the Several Paragraphs of their Instructions which were communicated to you We doubt not, but upon this Ships arrival you will be so fully informed of the State of Affairs at Benjar as to be well able to Judge what Success We may hope for in a Trade with those People.

4. If you should not have reasonable encouragement to send this Ship to Benjar We Direct that you dispatch her immediately to our Chief and Council at Anjengo or Tellicherry on the Mallabar Coast, with the Treasure We have put on board at which Place She will meet with proper Orders from our Governour and Council of Bombay for Loading her for Europe.

5. But in case you Shall have good ground to hope that We may Establish a Trade at Benjar you are then to Order this Ship Directly thither for the procuring her Loading of Pepper and Settling a Commerce with those People, which as it would be a very valuable piece of Service, and of great consequence to Us more especially in enlarging and improving our China Trade; You are therefore to send upon her some of the best and ablest of our Servants, who are well acquainted with the humour and Temper of the Mallays, and the manner of Transacting business with them by appointing Some of our Covenant Servants to transact our business there,

---

of whose ability and Integrity you are thoroughly satisfyd, to whom the Ship and Cargo must be consigned, and the Commander must have Directions in his Sailing Orders to obey all such Orders as shall be given him by the Persons so appointed.

6. The most ample and Explicit Instructions in writing must be given to them, according to the Advices and Intelligence, you may have received, in order to promote our Interest and welfare, by the procurement of a Cheap and Clean Well Garbled Cargo of Pepper.

7. If they meet with that good Usage and Success which We promise Ourselves from their Invitation, you may Assure them of our sending two Ships or more yearly One from your Port about the time this Ship will arrive, and the other in April in her way to China, as We did the Prince of Wales Captain Pelly, and therefore upon the Dispatch of this Ship for Europe, the Persons you Send upon her may remain at Benjar if they Invite them thereto, untill another Ship shall arrive, but if you or they think it not Safe or convenient so to do, they must then hire a vessell to return to Bencoolen, and leave Instructions in some trusty hands for the next Ship, whom they may expect in the Month of April following.

8. If the Banjareens act kindly and fairly you are to cultivate the Strictest Friendship with them and engage them to maintain and keep up an Intercourse with you at Bencoolen, since they know the way thither and if any of them shall at any time come to your Place, You must use them with distinguishing Friendship and regard, as any of their Vessells or People coming to you, would be a kind of hostage or Security for our being well treated by them at Benjar, and if any of their People of Note Should come by your Invitation, or otherwise you are to entertain them at our Expence.

9. For if We could obtain a Well Established Trade with them upon a well grounded mutual confidence betwixt them and Us We might besides the immediate benefit thereof, have a continual account of all Transactions in those Eastern parts, and thereby further enlarge Our commerce with the Mallays of all Sorts as occasion may offer.

10. And if some Accounts and Reports We have here of the scituation of affairs in those parts be true the opportunity that now Offers Seems very favourable and We think therè must be some such uncommon circumstances of affairs that Should Engage the Banjareens to send and Invite Us to come among them, whereof you will do well to get Information.

11. As our Endeavouring to Trade there again may give great umbrage to the Dutch, We must therefore expect they will underhand Obstruct it, so that if you are of that Opinion You must expresly Order the Commander not to go into Batavia, but to take in Water and Provisions at Princess Island, Angur or other places in the Streights of Sunda, where so good Provisions are to be got that the French Ships call no where else in their way to China.

12. And if this Ship gets her loading at Benjar the Captain must be ordered to proceed on his way home through the Streights of Bally, where at the Port of Ballambanq on the East end of Java he may have good Water and Provisions of all Sorts sending some little present in our Name to the Rajah or Kay there, that our Ships may be always wellcome and the English acceptable to him.

13. You are carefully to avoid giving the Banjareens any suspicion or Jealousy of our settling amongst them by Force, or in a Fortified way as We have no such Intention, having Pepper enough for our Europe market so that it is not worth our while to seek for more unless it can be had in a Fair and Mercantile manner, upon which foot alone We shall continue to Trade with them, and if they will not maintain it with Us in the same manner, you may assure them We will come no more there, as We had so determined had not it been for their Invitation.

14. Such presents are to be made in our Name to the Sultan and Pangrans or other People of note as may assure them of Our Friendship, and you must let Us know from time to time what may be acceptable to them, in return for any good Usage We may receive from them.

15. But above all things We Strenuously recommend fair and punctual dealing with them, and good payment in money Only, as most of the Evils in our Traffick with the Mallays having Sprung, from joining Goods in payment.

16. If it can be procured, as much Pepper must be put on board this Ship as She can take in, But if after all they Should fall Short of her Charterparty Tonnage, in Such Case you must order her back to your Port to make it up, and if you should have any Salt Petre lost You may make up her Tonnage therewith or Load the Same on board, upon the Captains requesting for it, at the Low freight of Twelve pounds Sixteen Shillings and Eight pence a Ton.

17. The Mexico Dollars in Chests N<sup>o</sup>. 381. 382. and 383. are all Pick't and full weight, this may prevent the Banjareens objections to any being Light for sometimes they will not take such at any rate they always insisted to have each piece weigh Seventeen penny Weights Eight to ten Grains, and if under and they were prevailed on to take them, would have Eight  $\frac{1}{2}$  Cent allowance, when the true difference was not one and a half, If any are found heavier than the rest they must be kept to the last, for if they have them at first they will make it a handle to insist on all the rest being as heavy, or to have at least more than treble the allowance for the difference, as before mentioned.

18. Care must be taken to give no offence to the Natives, they being Proud and Revengeful, Yet by a little good Usage and a few small presents are easily made Friends, thô they must not trust them or put themselves too much in their power, they being a treacherous People, and especially if they should have it in their power to Master the Ship otherwise they have nothing to fear from them.

19. On no Account Trust them with our money upon any pretence whatsoever, for they are always needy and never repay but by Force, the consequence thereof thô never so Just is a Quarrel as We know full well by former Experience.

20. If the Sultan or any of their great Men come on board Ship, on pretence of Visits or otherwise, very few of their Attendants must be Suffer'd to Enter the Ship with them, nor the Lascars or Boatmen be never permitted, and the Captain must be acquainted that it is our positive Order, that his Men have their Arms in their hands at such times, by which means as the Banjareens will See they are watchfull against Surprizes they will be less liable to attempt it, the like Watch must be kept at all times during our Servants being up the Countrey and aboard the Lantings, and while passing up and down the River.

21. A strict Watch must also be kept over the Pepper when in the Lantings, it having often been privately Stole from thence, and therefore it must be hasten'd away as fast as a Sufficient Quantity comes to send down to the Ship, with a like Watch till safe aboard letting the Captains know it is our Order that he keep his Men as much as may be in the Ship without suffering them to Ramble needlessly on Shore least they be Secretly Mischieved or Murdered.

22. You must put on board proper Materials for Garbling Sifting and Cleaning the Pepper, and Contracts must be made to have it all delivered fully Garbled, before weighing off if possible, and the Dust and refuse must be destroyed, for if the Banjareens get it they will mingle it with the Next Parcells they bring, the best way is to throw it privately, and in small Quantities into the Water to Sink the Sooner.

23. Special Care must be taken to get the Pepper weighed by the English true weight, or at least to have their Dotchin truly adjusted that We may have full one Hundred thirty two pounds English Averdupoize weight to every Pecule, and great care must be taken that all the Pepper be very dry, because the Natives have often wetted it, to encrease its weight, and then dry the Outside in the Sun to hide the Fraud, and make it look fairer and Larger.

24. We have sent James Freeman as a Linguist on the Ship Prince of Wales, should he come to your Place with Letters from the Supra Cargoes agreeable to our recommendations, you must send him in the Same Capacity on this Ship, Complying with the Agreement our Said Supra Cargoes have made with him as to his Trouble.

25. A Diary and Regular Account must be kept of all Transactions and Mercantile Affairs Entering therein every days buying, Selling, and all Disbursements wherein the Utmost Frugality must be used, and in case the Charterparty Tonnage or more is procured at Benjar, a correct Invoice must be drawn out of the Cost, and Charges of the Cargo, and Bills of Lading be signed by the Captain or Purser consigning the same to the United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies, and Sailing Orders must be given the Captain to make the best of his way for the Port of London, Stopping no where in his way thither Excepting at our Island of S<sup>t</sup>. Helena.

26. We hope that the Persons sent upon this occasion will recommend themselves to our Future Favour and regard by transacting our affairs with the greatest prudence, Sagacity, and Integrity, Studiously Endeavour by an affable, courteous, Civil deportment, and by all other proper means to obtain the confidence and good Esteem of the Natives, Ingratiate themselves to the Sultan and Pangrans and lay a solid foundation for a Lasting Advantagious Commerce with those parts to that end it will be also necessary to urge upon all proper occasions that Pepper being procureable at a Moderate reasonable Price, and a Quick dispatch of our Ships, are of the greatest Importance to Us, Intimating the vast Charge We are at whenever our Ships are detained, sometimes a Present of One Hundred Dollars to the Sultan, and Fifty to the Chief Pangran rightly timed has gained a Dispatch before all other Ships in the Port, for all Delays which they are so prone to, must be avoided as much as possible, Remembering that our Business may be agreed on and finished in a Small time.

27. Those whom you Send must write Us at large of all Transactions and Occurrences, giving Us their free Sentiments as to the Trade in General, what Ships and Junks annually resort thither, particularly from what Ports in China and what Lead or other Europe Goods may be acceptable to them, what Steps may tend to promote or obstruct the Traffick and be particular as to the manner of their reception and Treatment, Informing Us in the best manner they are able what Pepper is generally produced One year with another in the Adjacent Countrey, the lowest price which they apprehend the Merchants and Planters can really afford to sell at, if any other Merchandize proper for Europe is procureable, How the Sultan and Leading Men stand affected towards Us and the Dutch, what Dependence there is upon assurances from them, and in all other respects be so explicit, that We may form a Judgement whether and in what manner it may be prudent and beneficial, to cary on a Trade to Borneo, And they may be assured from Us whatever good Servicee they do Us in procuring this Loading, and Establishing a Trade thither upon good Terms We shall consider and reward them for such Important Services.

28. Enclosed are Copys of the Ships Charterparty and the Captains Instructions, which must be well considered are duly comply'd with by the Captain and Ships Company, for so far as concerns Us, and themselves as our Representatives, seeing that no more Tonnage be taken up by them than is allowed in Folio 8, that all Goods received into or delivered out of the Ship be entered in a Book as in Folio 6 the Captain Registering with them his own and Ships Companys Private Trade, before his Departure from Borneo least he incur the Penalty in Folio 6. We also Enclose our Printed Indulgence, the Companys Tenth By Law, and Order of Encouragement for their Notice, all which must be transmitted to Anjengo or Tellicherry in case the Ship is sent to the Mallabar Coast.

29. The Benjareens by the Experience of all times have been found to be very Tricking, Crafty, deceitful and Treacherous, and if they think themselves ill Used, vindictive, hiding their resentment till an opportunity Offers to Wreke their Revenge, nevertheless both in Language and behaviour they appear Fawning submissive and Complaisant, for which reasons they must carry it towards them with respect and as if they believed them to be civilized and good humoured, Nevertheless to be constantly on their Guard to prevent Treachery.



30. Our Treasure must not be sent up from the Ship to the Factory till the Natives begin to weigh off their Pepper and then but a Chest at a time or so much as will be sufficient to pay off the Merchants for the Pepper delivered, always remembering to have it sent up under a Strong Guard and well buoyed.

31. As the old Mexico Dollars will very probable be soon all gone, and not to be procured, they must therefore exactly Inform themselves, what specie will be most acceptable at Benjar and in particular Enquire what sort of Coin the Dutch and Chinese Transact with them in, and advise Us accordingly, and you must also Inform Us what Specie will be most agreable on the West Coast, when old Mexico Dollars are no longer to be had.

32. We have consigned you some Lead, and other particulars as ~~an~~ Invoice and Bill of Loading for Sale or Presents, which you are to send to Benjar in whole or in part as you think fit, We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH DATED 6<sup>TH</sup>. OCTOBER 1738.

PER BRITANNIA.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 44, pages 271-282*].

DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND  
COUNCIL AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. By our Ship Queen Caroline We last year wrote to you at large under the 14<sup>th</sup>. of October, and She sailed for S<sup>t</sup>. Helena the 12<sup>th</sup>. of March, by the Scarborough. We sent a Short Letter dated the 6<sup>th</sup>. of January which Sailed out of the Downes the 2<sup>d</sup>. of February, by the Ship Marlborough We again wrote the 26<sup>th</sup>. April last, and that Ship sailed out of the Downes the next day.

2. Our Ship George arrived the 9<sup>th</sup>. of August and brought your Advices of the 15<sup>th</sup>. and 24<sup>th</sup>. of December last whereof due notice shall be taken in the course of this Letter as We proceed in giving the needful Directions under the Established heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

3. We herewith consign you the Ship Britannia Burthen 495 Tons Captain John Somner Commander who has Orders first to proceed to our Island of S<sup>t</sup>. Helena, and the Copy of her Charterparty will be forwarded to you by the Governour and Council of that Place.

4. Your Conduct with respect to the Comptons Wreck and People as set forth in the Letter before Us was in all respects commendable.

5. Sloops ought by all means to be hired to fetch the Pepper from Manna and else where, in case our Own are not proper for that purpose, and are duely Employed as occasion offers, paying due regard to our Commands upon this head for three years past.

6. We observe that you Spared Cap<sup>t</sup>. Mylne some Rice in August to carry in his Ship the Jane to Madrass and wish you had been able to fill the George Captain Taylor on his return thither in June pursuant to the Governour and Council's directions, there having been a great Scarcity on the Choromandell Coast, however for the future you must make it a Rule to Supply them with a Quantity upon our Account on the return of the Ships annually sent from thence whenever it can conveniently be Spared.

7. In case the Commander of the Britannia requests for any Saltpetre at the low Freight of Twelve Pounds Sixteen Shillings and Eight Pence a Ton you must Ship aboard the Britannia, what he shall So request for, if you have it to Spare, and the same is not to be reckoned any part of the Charterparty Tonnage.

8. Considering the circumstance you were in dayly expecting the Lyell, and not having Pepper enough for her, We cannot help approving your conduct on Captain Whites requesting Sixty Ton.

9. For the future you must send Us an attested Account of all Goods Landed from our Ships, by the Captains, Officers, and Ships Company Specifying to whom each particular belongs, and before their Departure require the Commanders to deliver in to you an Exact Account of all Private Trade Ships on board entering the same upon Consultation, and Transmitting to us the Original in each Ships Packet, together with an account of all Parcells sent home by our Servants, or others.

10. We have desired Josias Wordsworth Esq<sup>r</sup>. S<sup>r</sup>. William Rous, Harry Gough and Mathew Martin Esq<sup>r</sup>. to Impart Signals for our Shipping, what Orders may be sent from those Gentlemen, or any three of them relating thereto must be duly comply'd with.

11. We trust in God that more success will attend the measures taken to supply you with Kintlage than hitherto, and that the Lyell or Scarborough brought Petre Sufficient for that purpose, We shall Order a Ship to Bengal, and Direct our President and Council at Fort William to put on board Three Hundred Tons of Salt Petre, and Thirty Tons of Redwood, and Consigne the same to you.

12. Although the Crops of Pepper fell Short this last year, amounting to Six hundred Ton only, you encourage Us with the prospect of a plentiful Crop the ensuing Season, and therefore if you have a Sufficient Quantity, We direct that you fill these Ships as full as they can hold, leaving on board the Ship from Bengal no more than her Charterparty Kintlage in Salt Petre and what the Commanders requests for, at the before mentioned low Freight of Twelve Pounds Sixteen Shillings and Eight pence a Ton, remembering that all such requested Petre is not to be reckoned any part of the Charterparty Tonnage both the Captains original requests upon this head are to be sent Us in their respective Packets.

13. It does not appear by the advices before Us in what manner our Sloops Morton and George were Employed, after the General Books were closed in April, Our President and Council of Fort St. George had purchased a Sloop of Twenty two-Ton for your Service, and designed to Send her over in February, you must see to it that their Expences are kept within due bounds, not allowing any waste or Embezlements on board, and that We may form a Judgement of their Earnings send Us annually in the Packet an Account of their Several Trips, Loadings to and fro, and the Charge of Each for the whole Year.

14. We observe there is no reply to the 12<sup>th</sup>. and 13<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of our Letter by the George, but We expect you will duely regard them.

15. When our Commanders offer to pay Dollars into Cash, as the produce of any part of their outward bound Adventure, or in part of their respondentia Bonds, you must receive the same, taking care that they are good Weighty and Current Money.

SECONDLY CONCERNING GOODS FROM EUROPE FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE, & BENGAL.

16. We have consigned you by this Ship Fifteen Chests of Treasure, and Sundry Goods and Merchandize as ~~an~~ Invoice and Bill of Loading Enclosed.

17. Your sending Forty Eight Thousand Dollars to Madrass affords us great Satisfaction, as seventy Eight Thousand remained when the George came away, and We sent a fresh plentiful Supply by the Several Ships last Season, whereby you were enabled to continue the Same good practice, always remembering the Caution in the 13<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph by the Caroline.

18. The Planters must not be put off with Notes as is mentioned to have been the Practice in the 23<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph, which method was duly animadverted upon last year, and therefore We shall only refer you thereto especially as We find a Surplus remained both of Cash and Cloth, at Moco Moco When the George came from thence, expecting that the Orders We then laid down are constantly complied with.

19. Your indent is complied with and you must in future distinguish what is wanted for your Own Use and what for Sale, and indent for no more Stores than you think will be annually necessary to prevent their perishing by long lying, and a Copy of your Indent must be annually sent to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George that they may know what Stores you require from hence and regulate themselves accordingly, We cannot help repeating our Surprize that as We sent the Ship Lyell to Bengal, and from thence you might reasonably conclude the same method would be continued, Yet you say nothing of a proper Supply from thence which was a great omission, Oyl, Gee, opium, piece Goods, and other Articles procurable there, are suited to and in Demand upon the West Coast, and it is a duty incumbent upon you to inform Us of all ways and means to extend our Commerce in the most profitable manner.

20. We are not able to send old Mexicos any longer and hope that all the Natives will soon be reconciled to the new money as the Mallays around you, do not refuse them, continue to weigh off our Treasure in the Captains presence and advise Us how it turns out.

21. When Old worn out Arms are sent Us, the Captains agreement to bring them Freight free must be sent Us in the Packet, they must not be returned but on those terms.

22<sup>th</sup>. Our 16<sup>th</sup>. and three following Paragraphs must be duely comply'd with, altho not replyd to.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS AND FOURTHLY COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

23. As the failure of Pepper arose from a poor barren Season, We are pleased to hear there is a prospect of a plentiful Crop, the ensuing season, so that We doubt not you were thoroughly enabled to load home two Ships as Two Hundred Ton and upwards remained when the George came away.

24. There was no Order of Consultation for confining the Offender to the Fort, who is mentioned in the 38<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph on making an Escape to be drove out of the Country Upon this occasion, We cannot help recollecting that Sidee Ibrahim himself Some Years ago, was imprisoned and represented to Us as a notorious Offender, also whose influence it is now acknowledged in the 44<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph makes him very powerful over the Natives, therefore We hope that you have in this case, and that you will act in all matters of this Importance with the Utmost care and Caution.

25. Whenever it shall so happen that you think yourselves in prudence obliged to Imprison any One, the matter must first be debated in Council, and the reasons be set forth at large upon Consultation for Our Notice and every thing relating to the Country Government must be transacted in Council.

26. As you mention in the 36 Paragraph uneasinesses often arise on distributing the Usual Gratuity upon Pepper, We shall be glad if all Partys are satisfy'd in the Division agreed upon, and were gaming Effectually Banished, We should esteem it an Eminent piece of Service.

27. You must not fail of Supplying constantly the Residents at Laye, and Manna, with money sufficient to pay for Pepper, as it may be brought in, and it might not be amiss to send our Sloops a Cruizing up and down the Rivers, with a Covenant Servant on board in order to take off the Planters hands, all the Pepper they may have ready in such Places where no Residencys are Settled; this would doubtless have a good Effect, for you acknowledge in the 39<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph it would be a great help to them, to receive mony to supply their necessitys, whenever they have a Quantity of dry Pepper on hand; We expect that you will continue to make it your business to remove all manner of discouragements; and not only so, but also contrive and make it your dayly Study to Excite and Spur them up to an annual encrease of their Crops and Plantations, as being our main and principal concern.

28. The 25<sup>th</sup>. 26<sup>th</sup>. 28 and 29<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of Our Letter by the George ought to have been particularly reply'd to; and altho no notice is taken of them We must enjoyn a due regard to our Sentiments as therein Contained.

29. We are told in the 48<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph that the whole Charge of the Arrack Plantation is a real loss and that you can be provided with Arrack at a cheap Rate from Batavia; if that is the case, it is high time to have done with it, by laying it aside, especialy as what is distilled there is disliked by the People, and you did well in lessening the Charge.

#### FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

30. We perceive the Sultan at Moco Moco was very much alarmed at the Building of a Factory house at Bental, and therefore you acted quite right in putting a Stop thereto, We entirely approve of your Sentiments upon this head in the 49<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph and as our President and Council at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George were convinced of their mistake, and sent proper Orders in February last for Erecting it at Moco Moco and then transmitted a Plan thereof, We doubt not but that the foundation is laid; and some progress is made in the Superstructure; as the Doors and window Frames were forwarded from thence; hereby the Sultans concern would be removed, who having the welfare of his Countrey at heart; You most [*sic*] not fail in giving him all due Encouragement, this We mention as being naturally led thereto upon this occasion, but We have further to add, that our Servants Resident on the Spott must see to it, that the 35<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of our Letter by the Caroline is thoroughly observed; and by a narrow inspection of their monthly Accounts at Marlborough, and giving the needfull Directions thereupon, We hope that all of you will recommend Yourselves to our future favour, by not suffering our money to be Lavished away, but acting a frugal and faithfull part in every Item whatsoever And in order to lessen the Expence our Slaves must be duly employed in carrying it on, and not Sufferd to Loyter away their time in any branch, either the making of Chunam Bricks or the like, and our Residents must every day make it their business to have an Eye over the Workmen, that so it may be well finished out of hand; in case it is not covered in and compleated before you answer this Letter, inform Us what the whole Charge will amount to.

31. There is no good coms [*sic*] of advancing money to the Mallays beforehand, the Instance laid before Us in the 50<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph is a convincing proof of it you say that a strict Eye should be kept over the Rajah but there is near a year after he had got the money and in all that time had made little progress in discharging his Debt, and We find upon Consultation that Munko Rajah was twice advanced money on account Pepper Customs before due; this is a practice that may make the Pangarans indifferent, there is nothing like keeping them Strictly to the touch, the contrary Serves only to encourage unreasonable demands and Indolence.

32. Tyles are preferable to Attops, upon all Accounts for coverings, and therefore We shall be pleased if the making of them is brought to perfection and We are apt to think there can be no great difficulty in it, as Bricks have been made by the Natives time out of mind, the frequent repairs mentioned in the 52<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph will thereby be no longer necessary and great Savings of Course be made in that Article.

33. We Ordered by the George that the Muster Rolls of the Garrison should be monthly laid before the Council, before they are paid, In reply thereto they are said to be publickly called over in the presence of the Governour and some of the Council, If this method prevents all Frauds and Impositions it is well Your adding that none but effective Men receive any allowance, does not come up to our requirement, of receiving a real Benefit from all such ; and is by no means a Satisfactory answer ; for on perusing the List of Covenant Servants Mr. William Coles appears to have been our Resident at Laye for years past, and yet by the Paymasters Accounts Eight Dollars a month are constantly Charged as paid him for being Reader, and Ten Dollars as Linguist, this must be Cleard up ; You add when the Accounts are past due care is taken to compare them with the former months so that if Once any abuses are Crept in, a Sanction is given to their continuance by this means, but surely this was not intended as a proper Reply to the latter part of our 36<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph, We cannot deem it such but expect that our said Order are constantly and Literally complied with.

#### SIXTHLY TOUCHING FACTORS, WRITERS OFFICERS, AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

34. We are concerned that you had such a sickly season the last year, as to lose so many Europeans We have annually sent a recruit of Military for the Garrison, and a Number of Soldiers comes on this Ship as ~~is~~ List Enclosed.

35. When the Effects of our deceased Servants are put up at Outcry, Publick Notice thereof should be given a convenient time beforehand ; both in the Mallays and English Language, and a free Liberty be given to the Natives, and all others to view and bidd for the same ; this method is very necessary for the benefit of their Estates ; on perusal of the Accounts of Sales entered upon Consultation it appears that Europeans were the only Bidders ; all badd Debts must be avoided by not delivering the Goods till they are paid for.

36. We observe that Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Perry, and Daniel Coles Debts are discharged.

37. As the Lyell was not arrived, the Calculate of Quick Stock should have been sent by the George.

38. In answer to our 49<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph We are told in a few words, the Brick layer Directs the works and Instructs the Slaves how to perform them ; We observe by the List you had One hundred and Ninety two, and thirty three only are therein mentioned to be Superannuated ; thô most that are left are alleged to be so in the 75<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph, We last year Ordered a Number to be forwarded from Bombay *via* Madrass to your Place, We hope they are arrived, and Expect that you duly Employ them.

39. To supply the vacanecs by Deaths or otherwise, We have Entertained Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Henry Campion, William Culliford, and John Merchant in our Service as Factors but observing in the List of Covenant Servants Sent Us by the George, Five Writers who arrived at your Place Anno 1736. We hereby permit you to advance such of them to be Factors from the receipt hereof, who have behaved deligently and well, and to station them in the List before those now sent out.

40. We also send to your Assistance Charles Gibson, John Delamotte, John Greene, and Alexander Christie Writers ; For the future a true Account of each of our Servants Age must be inserted in the List for our Notice.

41. In the 46<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of our Letter by the George You had our Opinion that Covenant Servants residing at Manna would answer very valuable purposes adding our reason for the same, but there is no manner of Notice taken thereof in the Advices before Us ; nor was any One sent, such a Slight of Our Sentiments is very displeasing to Us, and as We are still of the same mind, and having plentifully

supplied you with hands, We direct that two of our Covenant Servants be sent to reside there on Receipt of this Letter fixing on the most proper and capable Persons for that purpose, and drawing up such Instructions for their guidance as are mentioned in the 47<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of our aforesaid Letter, and you must fall into the same practice, by sending two of our Servants, if you can spare them to every other part of the Coast, that produces yearly Two Hundred Bahar of Pepper or thereabouts, taking care for their Expences within due bounds, and to Examine narrowly their monthly Accounts and by a due correspondence with them convince Us that you have our true Interest at heart, by exhorting them to a prudent and Just behaviour towards the Natives, and to do all thats possible for keeping the Country in peace, and promoting the encrease of Pepper Plantations in the Several districts, not Spareing to admonish, and set our said Servants right whenever you perceive them Err and in case their conduct Should nevertheless give you cause to be dissatisfied, call them to the Fort and place others in their stead to manage better for Us.

42. Our Ship Walpole Sailed the 3<sup>d</sup>. November for Benjar and Canton; the Supra Cargoes Captain Charles Boddam, John Misenor, and Lascoe Hide were directed to act in concert with our Servants, in case any were found resident at Benjar and to give them their best Advice and Assistance for promoting the common good, and on their having procured a stock of Pepper before hand, the Supra Cargoes were directed to demand the same for our Use, on paying the prime Cost and Charges thereof.

43. Pursuant to the Directions sent out last Year We persuade our Selves that the Ships Prince of Wales and Marlborough mett with Success at Benjar and that by the prudent measures taken, a lasting foundation is laid for carrying On a beneficial commerce in those parts, it must be your Study and endeavour to cultivate a Friendship and good understanding with the leading Men; and to give Our Servants who either reside or are sent there, the properest Instructions to that End, and pursuant to what We wrote under the 26<sup>th</sup>. of April last You may depend on sending you a Ship about the same time next year, in order to be consigned thither, unless We should by any means receive such advices, as may deterr us from it.

44. A Correct Index to your Consultations must always be drawn out and sent Us therewith.

45. We direct that the produce of M<sup>r</sup>. John Imes's Effects be received into our Cash, and so soon as all Legal demands on the Estate are Satisfy'd and paid the Surmount must be wrote off to Account Currant Fort St. George without delay; that We may pay the same to the Lawful Claimers here, who have represented that the value of Six Hundred and forty Pounds thirteen Shillings and Seven pence was Sent him by Our permission in foreign Silver and necessaries; which he did not live to receive, the produce thereof must also be received and brought to the Credit of the Estate in like manner; and the same method must be taken with respect to all other deceased Persons.

46. We entirely approve of what you have done relating to M<sup>r</sup>. John Savage whom We Order to be dismissed from Our Service, and whenever any of our Servants act so unfaithfully as to Embezle Our Cash, you must immediatly not suspend only, but dismiss them from Our Service, and our Cash at Your Place must be kept under three Locks and the Keys be kept by our Deputy Governour, and the Two next Standing; and at the Subordinates by our two Chief Servants at each Place.

47. It does not appear any Examination was made how far any One employed under M<sup>r</sup>. Savage was to blame in Embezzling our Stores as alleged by him which We are surprized at; and a strict enquiry must be made into that affair.

48. We have agreed with the Owners of Shipping here with respect to all such Officers and Seamen whose Ships are taken or Lost in the Companys Service; and who desire to return directly to England, without going into other Service; that We will pay or allow the Owners of such Ships as bring them home, two thirds of what is agreed in Charterparty to be allowed and paid for Passengers out or home, and So

in proportion for such as are taken on board in any Part of the voyage, and that the Owners will stand to the other third part, agreeable to the Stated Rules on other extraordinary cases.

49. And therefore on any Such Melancholly occasions We direct, that you give Orders to our Commanders to receive all such on board their Ships, as apply to you for that purpose, Dividing them in equal proportion in our several returning Ships; And in case no Salvage is made, the Men must be taken care of by employing them in the Gunroom till they can be Shipped.

50. We acquiesce in Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Fordyce and Barlows making an Exchange as it was done with their joint consent.

51. We have advanced Captain John Somner Eighteen Hundred Pounds at Respondentia: You must take the needful care in case of his death, that his Effects are not Embezled they being assigned Over to Us as a Security for the same.

52. M<sup>r</sup>. Easton Chief Mate of the Compton has sent the Owners no manner of Account what Salvage was made We observe you have made him Gunner, We should be glad to know what recommended him to you, so as to fix him in that Post especially as he has behaved in such a manner towards his Owners; We cannot confirm him in the said Station, till both you and him give satisfaction. We are

This comes by Our Ship Somerset Cap<sup>t</sup>. Robert Holmes Commander by the way of Bengall, We have consigned you on her Five Chests Treasure as  $\text{£}$  Invoice and Bill of Lading which come in the Packet.

The President and Council of Fort William will doubtless forward to you an Account of the Salt Petre Redwood and other Goods loaden on board and We gave the needful Directions concerning the same in Our aforesaid Letter to which We Refer.

We have advanced Cap<sup>t</sup>. Robert Holmes Fifteen Hundred Pounds at Respondentia, you must in case of his Death see that his Effects are not Embezled they being Assigned over to Us as a Security for the same. WE ARE

THE 21<sup>TH</sup>. JULY 1738 SENT BY HARRINGTON.

Our Ship Winchester arrived from China the 2<sup>d</sup>. Instant and brought Us an Account that the Captain Officers and most of the Men belonging to the Ship Sussex left her apprehending she would sink by reason that on the 9<sup>th</sup>. March in the Latitude of 28<sup>d</sup> 1<sup>m</sup> South and 52<sup>d</sup> 25<sup>m</sup> West from Java head in a Storm she sprang a Leak and cut away her Main and Mizzen Masts notwithstanding which sixteen Men remained on board and when she left the Winchester which was on the 11<sup>th</sup>. March they had set the Foresail and Foretopsail and Sailed before the Wind being then about One Hundred Leagues off Madagascar and altho Cap<sup>t</sup>. Gostlin and the Officers seem to be of Opinion the Ship would go to the bottom that night We are not without Hopes that as the Men chose to Venture their Lives in Her they might be able to proceed to Madagascar and that then Cap<sup>t</sup>. Bagwell in the Resolution met with her or that as the Wind was favourable they would make for your Place, and in either case We depend due care has been taken to Refitt, Man and send her home to Us and if the Ship has arrived with You, We hope you have given the Men all the Encouragement and Good Usage that so much Bravery and Resolution deserves for which they may be assured We shall amply reward them. You must advise Our other Head Settlements of this Unhappy Affair.

### Orders and Instructions.

GIVEN BY

THE COURT OF DIRECTORS OF THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND,  
TRADING TO THE EAST-INDIES. TO CAPTAIN WILLIAM CROMPTON COMMANDER  
OF THE SHIP *DUKE OF LORRAIN* AND THE COMMANDER FOR THE TIME BEING.

1. We the said COURT OF DIRECTORS having freighted the Ship *DUKE OF LORRAIN* whereof you are COMMANDER, to serve us in Peace and Warfare, and to proceed to such Ports and Places in the EAST-INDIES whereunto you shall be directed; We do therefore hereby order you to make all Possible Expedition, (So soon as you have received your Dispatches) according to CHARTER-PARTY, and ply your Voyage with the first opportunity of Wind and Weather, and sail directly for *FORT ST. GEORGE* in the EAST-INDIES, whereto you are consigned. On your arrival you must deliver to our PRESIDENT and Council there, our Packets to them, and all the Bullion, Goods and Merchandizes, and also put on shore all the Passengers on board your Ship consigned to them; and in all things, agreeable to your CHARTER-PARTY, to follow from time to time the Orders of our said PRESIDENT and COUNCIL for your further proceedings.

2. We strictly require you to keep up the worship of God on board your Ship, and good Orders among your Men, taking care of their Healths during the whole Voyage; take care of all the Passengers and Soldiers that we have or shall send on board; be very tender of our Soldiers Healths, give them daily fitting Provisions, keep them stirring and in motion to prevent the Scurvy and other Distempers but we will not have them made the Drudges of the Ship.

3. You must carry along with you a MEDITERRANEAN Pass, there being many ALGERINE ROVERS abroad, which you are very likely to meet withal in your Outward or Homeward-bound Voyage. You must also carry with you the full number of ENGLISH Mariners, according to the direction of the ACT OF NAVIGATION, and your Covenants in CHARTER-PARTY.

4. Whatever STATIONARY-WARE is or shall be sent by us abroad your Ship, be sure to put it in the Bread-room, or other dry place in the Hold abaft the Main-Mast, but not in any moist Place lest it be thereby spoiled, as our Advices from INDIA have often complained. Keep all our Packets in the Round-house, free from damp.

5. We positively require and order, That you do not directly, or indirectly, either for yourself or any other Person, carry out any Bullion, Goods or Merchandizes, or any Letters, but what you shall be licenced by us or some COMMITTEE appointed by us for that purpose shall licence you to carry; and that you use your utmost endeavours to prevent all your Officers and Seamen from carrying out any Bullion, Goods, Merchandizes, or Letters, without the like licence.

6. Take immediate care on receipt hereof, To have and keep your Arms fixed; To station your Men at their several quarters; to put your Ship in a good posture of defence; To have a sufficient number of Cartridges filled with Powder, and a proportionable quantity of Shot; to be always in readiness during this Voyage in case of a sudden Assault. Trust no Colours. Be very watchful at all Times against Surprizes; and cautious of Speaking with any Ship; and, if you can avoid it, speak with None during every part of the Voyage; Be very Industrious to find out the Trim of your Ship for her better sailing.

7. We having great reason to believe Some of the CAPTAINS of the Ship's in our service have while they were in INDIA, disposed of part of their Ship's Ordnance, Fire-arms, Powder and Shot, and thereby rendered themselves less defensible in case of an Enemy's attacking them; we do hereby positively forbid you, and the CAPTAIN for the time being, to sell, or otherwise part with any, except in case of absolute necessity, to our PRESIDENTS, AGENTS, or CHIEFS, and COUNCIL, and that only for the use of our Settlements, under penalty of an utter Incapacity of being continued in our Service.

8. Use all possible endeavours to expedite your Outward-bound Voyage, and when by judgment you are within forty or fifty Leagues of the WESTERN ISLANDS; shape the Course, Wind and Weather will permit, so as to keep at least thirty Leagues to the Westward of the CANARY ISLANDS and thence proceed directly for St. GEORGE aforesaid without stopping; and to this end take in a sufficient quantity of Water and fresh Provisions here. But if, by reason of Sickness, or want of necessary Refreshments, you should be forced to touch any where by the way, Choose with the Advice and Consent of your Officers in Writing, any Port not prohibited in CHARTERPARTY, which you judge least liable to the danger of Pirates, or other Enemies, remember the Pirates and SALLEE MEN used to visit St. JAGO, and the ISLE OF MAY; therefore put into none of the CAPE DE VERDE ISLANDS, for Pirates have been there, and probably will again; be sure keep far enough out of sight of them. Wherever you touch, carry it civilly to the GOVERNOR and INHABITANTS to prevent Complaints. While you are at an anchor in any place outward or homeward-bound, or in the EAST-INDIES, keep a good look out at topmast-head; and keep the same look during the whole Voyage when at Sea.

9. The Pirates which some years ago lay off the CAPE OF GOOD HOPE, took two Ships there, and attack'd a third, therefore be very cautious in putting in and out, if you shall be necessitated to Touch there; if you are not, keep out of sight of it, or of any Ships that may lie near it in hopes of prey.

10. We forbid you touching at the BRAZILS outward-bound, on penalty of an utter incapacity of continuance in our Service, unless you can give us very satisfactory reasons of the Absolute Necessity of proceeding thither.

11. We likewise forbid your making any Deviation outward or homeward, or breaking Bulk; for if you do, we shall put in Suit the Bonds you have entered into on those Accounts and require the CHARTER-PARTY Penalties.

12. We Direct that you do advise us by all Opportunities in your outward and homeward-bound Voyage, and during your stay in the EAST-INDIES, of all Occurrences worthy our Notice, directing your Letters to us in London; if you meet with any DUTCH Ship, send by her, putting your Letters under cover, TO MESSIEURS ANDREW PELLIS AND SONS, MERCHANTS AT AMSTERDAM.

13. Take care to clean and tallow your Ship as often as you have Opportunity, while you remain in any Port during your present Voyage.

14. If any ALOES, OLIBANUM, LACKS, or such like sort of Goods, shall be laden on board, take care they be so stowed as to prevent Lamage by running together.

15. We Direct and Order you, particularly to regard, and strictly to observe all the Covenants and Agreements contained in your CHARTER-PARTY, of which you have a Copy with Marginal Notes, for your easier perusal and notice; and among other things, To put up and continue the order of Encouragement, as directed in FOLIO 3. To touch at no Places prohibited, as in FOLIO 4 & 5 To take care that the Journals and BOATSWAINS and other Books be kept, and Entries made therein, of all Goods, Bullion, and Effects taken into, or delivered out of the Ship, and for whose account; and all those Books produced and delivered, as Covenanted in FOLIO 5 & 6 To take care no Goods or Bullion be laden on board during this Voyage, except such as shall be licenced and indulged; for if there be, we shall exact the Penalties mentioned in said FOLIO 6. of which we give you this Warning, that you may not incur them; remember in these last Clauses, the Covenants are made stronger than in the late CHARTER-PARTIES, to prevent the Exorbitant Excesses of Private and Unlicenced Trade, out or home, and the encroachment of COMMANDERS on the Ships Tonnage from Port to Port abroad.

16. We hereby direct, that neither yourself, nor the COMMANDER for the time being, do lade for your own Private Account, or suffer any others to load on board your Ship, in the EAST-INDIES, or elsewhere, within the limits of the COMPANY'S CHARTER, to be brought from thence unto or towards EUROPE, any Goods or Merchandizes, but what shall be duly Registered with the COMPANY'S PRESIDENT, or CHIEF, and COUNCIL, at the Factory where the said Goods shall be taken on board; or if the COMPANY have no Factory there, then at first Factory of the COMPANY'S where the said Ship shall touch at; or if they touch at none, then with the SUPRA CARGOES, if any belong to the said Ship; or else with the CAPTAIN. In which Registers, the several Sorts, Quantities, and Values of each species of Goods, shall be express'd, and all the numbers in Words at length as well as Figures. And that Copies thereof be delivered the COURT OF DIRECTORS for the time being, within ten days after the Ships unlading in ENGLAND. Of this give due notice to all your OFFICERS, MARINERS, and other Persons on board; and acquaint them, That the Goods if Unregistered, will be Forfeited when discovered. We further direct, That neither they, or you, do bring from the EAST-INDIES, or elsewhere, any Packet or Letter, but what shall be sent up to the EAST-INDIA-HOUSE in LONDON, and delivered to the COURT OF DIRECTORS for the time being, or their Order.

17. You, or your Purser, must sign Bills of Lading for the Goods shipped on board you for our Account; and when dispatched homewards, use the like Diligence and Watchfulness in your return, as is before directed in your passage outward.



18. *Be very careful, that neither yourself, nor any of your Mariners, or other Persons, do sell or deliver out of the Ship, until her return to ENGLAND, any Goods laden on board your said Ship, lest thereby you bring your Owners and Us into trouble, by causing the Bond given at the CUSTOM-HOUSE to prevent breaking Bulk which is in TWELVE THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY FIVE POUNDS Penalty to be put in Suit, and by bringing on yourself and the Ship's Company divers other ill Consequences. We must likewise tell you, that by an Act of Parliament all such Goods so run from on board are forfeited; tho' the Goods should escape, yet the Value will be sued for, and recovered by Information afterwards, even by any of your Seamen, from the Persons who can be proved guilty; and we require you to give Publick Notice hereof to all the Ship's Company, that none may pretend Ignorance of the Laws and that several Prosecutions have been commenced on this Account. We understand, some of our CAPTAINS have pretended this Clause as a Justification to them, not to deliver out any Necessaries to our GOVERNOR and COUNCIL at St. HELENA, tho' they were shewn our Orders to the GOVERNOR and COUNCIL to demand them of our returning COMMANDERS out of our Cargoes. We mention this, that you do supply them according to those Orders, if you can come at the Goods, taking Receipts for what you deliver, which you must give into the COURT at your return.*

19. *When you receive your last Dispatches for EUROPE, if you are not otherwise particularly directed, you must make the best of your way for our Island St. HELENA, using all possible Diligence in getting early about the CAPE OF GOOD HOPE; when you are come near the Island, be cautious how you make it, and keep a strict Watch and a constant Look out, to prevent falling into any Pirates or other Enemies hands, who may lie thereabouts to surprize you. On your entrance into St. HELENA Road bring your Ship to an Anchor before you come open with CHAPPLE-VALLEY near to MUNDEN'S-POINT, if you don't meet with good Anchor-hold sooner, and then send your Boat ashore, to give the GOVERNOR an account who you are, because he hath our Orders to fire upon any unknown Ship that shall attempt to pass that Point, and come into the Road, for fear she should prove an Enemy, and attempt to surprize our Ships there, as the FRENCH did the QUEEN and DOVER. While you are in the Road, keep a good Look out, and a strict Guard. Stay no longer there, than to refresh your Men, and to get in the necessary Supplies, but hasten away to the River of THAMES.*

20. *We have, by a smarting late Experience, found how hazardous it is for our returning Shipping to go into the CAPE; especially, if their Arrival there is late in the Season; and yet tho' the COMMANDERS are not insensible of it, they will make one Pretence or other for putting in, when the true reason is for the benefit of PRIVATE TRADE: Wherefore we positively direct and order, That you do not, on any pretence whatsoever, except in case of being disabled by Storms, or other such like real and inevitable Necessity, venture to put into the CAPE, homeward-bound, as you value being continued in our Service, and would avoid putting in suit your CHARTER-PARTY Covenants, for Breach of Orders. Several of our Captains, notwithstanding these Directions, have presumed to touch at the CAPE, to the great detriment of our Island St. HELENA; for which BREACH OF ORDERS, we are determined to call them to a strict Account, and so we shall do all such as Offend in the same manner hereafter.*

21. *You will see by the Covenants in CHARTER-PARTY, FOLIO 5 you are not, in your homeward Voyage, to put into any of the Western Islands, or Plymouth, or any Port of ENGLAND or IRELAND, or any other Port of EUROPE, except in case of unavoidable Danger, or by particular Directions; which, we expect you Comply with, and that you make the best of your way into the Downs, if Wind permits. Into whatever place you put, send us, by double Conveyances, Advice of your Arrival, with Copy of your Bill of Lading, and a short Account of your Voyage; if you do not, we shall reckon you unworthy our future Service. If you can, reach the DOWNS, Or if, by contrary Winds, you should be obliged to put into some other Port in ENGLAND you must from thence send up your PURSER with such Packets as contain our Letters and Advices,*

and with all other Letters aboard your Ship, together with Copy of your Bill of Lading and the Account of all Private Trade, Parcels of Goods, and Tokens on board; And if we shall afterwards understand, that yourself, or any of your Officers or Mariners, do conceal any such Letters, Goods or Tokens, we shall make them feel our Resentments; of which give them all Notice, that they may not plead Ignorance.

22. If you happen to be Supplied, during this Voyage, by any of his Majesty's Officers, with Provisions, or Naval or Ordnance Stores, send us by the first opportunity, an exact Account thereof, advising also when and where the same were delivered, and by whom, and a Duplicate, thereof by the next, to prevent the Disputes which may otherwise arise (as they formerly have) between the Commissioners of the NAVY, VICTUALLING, and ORDNANCE, and Us, on the like Account.

23. We hereby direct, That when you send ashore the Treasure on board you, Consigned so our PRESIDENT and COUNCIL, (which must every Chest be buoyed) yourself, or the Purser, or other Person you shall appoint, do accompany it, and be present at the Delivery, Opening, and Examining to see if it comes out according to Invoice; if by any Accident it cannot be immediately opened, it is to be lodged in a proper Place, and you, or the Person so appointed, is to have a Look upon it till it can be so Examined. Our PRESIDENT and COUNCIL have Notice of, and will conform themselves unto this our Direction.

24. Finding that some of our COMMANDERS have brought home several Quantities of PEPPER under pretence of encreasing the Freight to the Owners, by shooting it between the Bales, hoping to get some benefit to themselves, but instead thereof they found it would not pay BOTTOMRENT and Charges, and therefore have solicited us to abate our Duties; we hereby declare, That if you bring home any on Private Account, we will not remit our Duties for the future; of this we give you previous Notice, that you may avoid the Evil.

25. We hereby peremptorily order, that you do not suffer any RATTANS to be put on board your Ship to be brought for ENGLAND, above the Quantity of two hundred Bundles for every hundred Tons the Ship is let for, which shall be computed at two hundred weight and a quarter for every thousand RATTANS, and is fully sufficient for answering the end of DUNNIDGE. If you bring more than the said Quantity, we hereby tell you, That for every Bundle, so far as one hundred Bundle, you shall pay the COMPANY after the rate of Ten Shillings each Bundle; and in case of a yet further exceeding, the Overplus shall be forfeited to the use of the said COMPANY.

28. It being represented to us, That several of the CAPTAINS of the COMPANY's returning Ships have imported exorbitant quantities of ARRACK, to the imminent danger of the Ships, by the stowing it between Decks, or elsewhere out of the Hold, whereby they became Crank, not capable of carrying Sail, or of taking in sufficient Quantities of Water, and the Mariners have not had sufficient Room to lie in; to prevent the further Spreading of this Mischief, we do hereby Order, That the CAPTAIN OFFICERS and SEAMEN do not presume to bring home more than four Leaguers of ARRACK for every hundred Tons this Ship is let for, and so PRO RATA; and do declare, That the PROPRIETORS shall pay as a Damage adjusted, Eighteen-pence PER Gallon for every Gallon that shall exceed the said quantity of four Leaguers PER hundred Tons as aforesaid, over and above the present Charge of Six-pence PER Gallon, to be applied the benefit of POPLAR-Hospital. And that no COMMANDER, OFFICER, or any other belonging to this Ship, shall be allowed to take on board, to be brought for ENGLAND, for any one Person, as a present or otherwise, above Thirty Gallons of ARRACK, and that only in case the same be laden for Account of the COMPANY's Servants abroad, or of their Friends in ENGLAND, which said Quantity shall pay only the Six-pence PER Gallon: But if the said CAPTAIN, OFFICERS, or SEAMEN, shall take on board any ARRACK for

account of such as are not in the COMPANY'S Service abroad or at home, the same shall be subjected to such Duty over and above the said Sixpence PER Gallon as the COURT OF DIRECTORS shall think fit to require.

27. To prevent the great Danger, and frequent Loss of Ships, by opening of Casks of ARRACK, RUM, and other Spirituous Liquors at Sea ; *we hereby strictly direct and require, That during the whole Voyage, you do not at any time Open, or on any pretence whatsoever suffer to be Opened, any Cask of ARRACK, or other Strong Liquor, in the Lazaretto, or elsewhere under any of the Decks ; but that whenever any Cask, great or Small, is to be Opened, you do first bring it upon the upper Deck, and there draw it off as you want it : And if we shall hear you do otherwise we shall deeply Resent and Punish it.*

28. We do peremptorily forbid you, and the CAPTAIN for the time being, and all your OFFICERS, and MARINERS, to do or offer any Injury to the Natives in any part of the EAST-INDIES, on any Account whatsoever ; *and you are to take the necessary care for that purpose.*

29. *The Owners of our outward-bound Shipping Complain of the great and needless Expence of Powder on pretence of Salutes ; for remedy thereof we direct, That all our Europe Ships, upon their first arrival in any Port of India, or at St. HELENA, do salute the FORT with no more than Nine Guns, and that the FORT return the like Number, which is esteemed here a ROYAL SALUTE. That at the CAPTAIN'S first coming on Shore from EUROPE, or dispatch thither, they shall fire but Nine Guns ; and at all other times of saluting, to give the CAPTAIN only Seven ; that all Country Ships be answered with no more than five Guns (Foreigners excepted) that the GOVERNOR, or any of the COUNCIL, or other Persons belonging to the COMPANY, going on board, be not saluted with more than Nine Guns, at their coming on board, or going off, and that no other Guns be fired during their stay on board.*

30. *We do likewise direct and order, That you do not on any Account whatsoever, take or admit on board your Ship, to be carried into or towards the EAST-INDIES, any Person or Persons who shall not have the COMPANY'S Licence, under the hand of the proper Officer, for such their proceeding ; for if you do, we hereby Declare, That you shall be liable to the Penalty of One hundred Pounds, over and above all other Penalties mentioned in your CHARTER—PARTY, and also be Incapable of continuing in the COMPANY'S Service any longer.*

31. *And whereas we are well assured, It has been a Practice in times past, for Such Persons as have not been able to procure our leave for going to INDIA, to ship themselves as MIDSHIPMEN, or asore the Mast, and by Agreement with the CAPTAINS have been dropt on purpose in INDIA, in Contempt of our former Orders to the contrary ; we have therefore Resolved, That if any COMMANDER in our Service, shall in future discharge any Person in India without an order from the PRESIDENT and COUNCIL (of whatever Factory the Ship Shall be at) in Writing, the Said COMMANDER shall forfeit to the COMPANY, Fifty Pounds, and greatly incur the COMPANY'S displeasure. That whoever shall inform of any Person carried out and left abroad contrary to this Order, shall have one moiety of all Such Money as shall be recovered on Such Forfeitures.*

32. *Considering the great Danger our Ships were in some time since by Storms in the DOWNS, and that the CAPTAINS, to our great surprize, were on Shore during the whole time ; we find it necessary, and do hereby order and strictly Enjoin you, not to lie out of your Ship one night in the DOWNS ; on any pretence whatsoever, nor in any other place of Danger ; and if we find this Order is not complied with, we shall severely Resent it.*

33. We have for divers good Reasons at this time Us thereunto moving, resolved to restrain all Our CAPTAINS from bringing in Private Trade any RAW SILK whatsoever for EUROPE for the future, or any TEA, excepting only TEA for their Private Use

in the Voyage, and therefore We hereby Order, That you take care neither Yourself, nor any others do lade in PRIVATE TRADE, any RAW SILK whatsoever on board your Ship, nor do load any TEA on board, except so much only as you may reasonably expect to expend in the Voyage, for if you do, We hereby declare, SUCH RAW SILK and TEA shall be forfeited as Unlicensed Goods, and that you will thereby render Yourself incapable of longer serving the COMPANY.

34. We strictly forbid Yourself, your Officers or any others belonging to your Ship, to bring Home any JAVA COFFEE on any Pretence whatsoever, on penalty of incurring Our highest Displeasure, it being of an inferiour Goodness to that of MOCHA, may bring that Commodity into Disrepute here, and therefore, We are resolved to hinder the Importation of it.

35. Among other Hardships which Our Free Inhabitants and Planters labour under at Our Island St. HELENA, We find one very great one, which We would be glad to remedy, and that is (if We are rightly informed) some of the COUNCIL, and others immediately employed in Our Service, do find Ways and Means to Engross the sale of BEEF, and all other sorts of Provisions that are wanted for the Shipping to themselves, by which means the poor Planters are reduced to great Want and Necessity, and as We have the Welfare of this Island greatly at Heart, as well for your Benefit as the COMPANY'S We most earnestly recommend to You, as We shall do to all the rest of Our CAPTAINS and SUPRA CARGOES, to Purchase what you want of the Free Inhabitants and Planters preferable to any others, provided they will furnish You at as cheap Rates as any body else, and your compliance herewith will be highly acceptable to Us.

36. TERRA JAPANICA or COTCH, being applied to a very pernicious Purpose here in ENGLAND, We hereby positively forbid it to be brought home in your Ship, by You or any of Your Officers or Ship's Company (of which We require You to give them Notice) on the Penalty of forfeiting the Goods, and your Employments in the COMPANY'S Service.

37. Having lost two of Our Ships by Fire, the OCKHAM and COMPTON, when the COMMANDERS of them were on Shore, We hereby Enjoin you to keep on board your Ship as much as possible, and for Our mutual Security to have the watchfullest Eye in order to prevent so fatal a Calamity, and whenever You are obliged to be ashore, be sure to give the strictest Charge with your Mates, to be constantly careful in this Respect, as to the Lights, in drawing off ARRACK, as mentioned in a foregoing Paragraph, and in stowing, that So We may not suffer through the Sailors careless Behaviour.

38. Josias Wordsworth Esq. St. William Rous, Harry Gough Esq. and Mathew Martin Esq. or any three of those Gentlemen are appointed to be Our Secret Committee for the Current year, and in case you should receive any Orders from them relating to Signals, you are hereby Ordered to comply therewith, as likewise all such Directions relating to Signals, which you may receive from our Servants abroad pursuant to the Powers vested in them by the said Gentlemen.

39. You are forbid in the foregoing part of these Instructions to touch at St. Jago, the Cape de Verde Islands, or at the Cape of Good Hope, except in case of necessity, but considering there is no danger of Pyrates, We think it most adviseable to leave it to your prudence, either to Water at St. Jago or the Cape, or to go quite thorough without touching any where, not doubting but you will always have in view the great danger of being caught at anchor in the Bay of the Cape, after the month of April is expired.

40. His Majestys Royal Proclamation is enclosed in your Packet, which must be fixt up in the most proper and convenient part of the Ship for the Officers and Sailors perusal.

41. We have taken into consideration the Extravagant Quantities of China Ware imported by several of the Commanders, and have thought fit to restrain the same, and there-

fore We hereby Direct, That neither you, your officers or Seamen, do bring home China Ware on any pretence whatsoever, exceeding the value of Two Thousand Five Hundred Pounds Gross sale at the Candle.

42. Enclosed in your Packet is our Printed Indulgence to the Commanders, and Officers of our Ships which must not be exceeded upon any pretence whatsoever and We hereby permit you to pay into our cash at Fort St. George all or any part of the produce of your outward bound adventure on your making Oath before the President and Council that the money so paid in is part of your Privilege, and the profits thereon, and that you neither have taken up nor will take up other money in India to Trade withal in the room of it.

43. Upon your so doing, a Certificate will be granted you for the amount, which on your return to England We will adjust at the same Rates as We allow to our Covenant Servants, In case of your decease (which God forbid) they are directed to take care that your Effects are not embezzled.

44. By the said Indulgence you will perceive what our allowances are in Tea and China Ware to our China Commanders, and We hereby permit you as you are designed to proceed from Madrass to China, to bring home the same Quantities of those Commodities as our China Captains are Licenced upon your duly registering of all your Private Trade at Fort St. George.

45. Besides the money allowed you in the said Indulgence We have thought fit as a further Encouragement to permit you to carry out the sum of Three Thousand Pounds to be laid out in Gold, as We do the rest of Our China Commanders.

46. We have agreed with the Owners of Shipping herewith respect to all such Officers and Seamen, whose Ships are taken or lost in this Companys service and who desire to return directly to England without going into other service that We will pay or allow to the Owners of such Ships as bring them home two thirds of what is agreed in Charterparty to be allowed or paid for Passengers out or home, and so in proportion for such as are taken on board in any part of the Voyage, and that the Owners will stand to the other third part agreeable to the Stated Rules in other Extraordinary Cases.

47. And therefore on any such Melancholy occasion We direct that all Persons in those destitute circumstances who apply to you for a passage home in the Ship under your Command, or whom our Servants abroad to whom you are consigned shall order aboard you be received accordingly and kindly Used during the voyage.

TO ALL PEOPLE to whom these Presents shall come, The United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East-Indies, Send GREETING. And it was in and by the said Act provided and enacted, that the said Act should continue in Force for five Years, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, and no longer. AND WHEREAS in and by an Act of Parliament made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George, the said Act of the Fifth Year of His said late Majesty, was further continued in Force for seven Years, from the 25<sup>th</sup> Day of March, 1723, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. LETTER FROM JOHN BROWNE, DATED FEBRUARY 3, 1738, TO THE PRESIDENT & COUNCIL, FORT S<sup>t</sup>. GEORGE.

GENTLEMEN,

The Court of Directors having referred the Inclosed Paragraphs of your Letter of the 6<sup>th</sup>. of February 1737 to my Consideration, it gives me an opportunity of presenting my Respects and Service together with my Opinion.

In Answer to the 54 paragraph I must Observe that as Your Commission to Administer Justice is Derived frpm His Majesties Charter so the Laws of England must Guide you in the Execution of it in all Cases where the Charter has not Expressly deviated from this General rule, and Consequently in Disputes betwixt the Indian Natives if you assume the power of Judicature and act as a Court of Justice Erected by the Charter Your Decision must be Governed by the Laws of Your own Country. The Difficulty arising from this Necessity is very Obvious and Yet I cannot think of an Expedient to Solve it, ffor althô contending parties by reference to private Arbitration and by Mutual Consent may Submitt to have the Question in Controversy decided by a different Law, Yet in Adversary and Compulsive Suits the Judges of the Courts acting in that Capacity under the Charter must Conform their Judgment to the Laws of England.

In Answer to the 55 paragraph You will Give me leave to remember that the Charter Impowers the Court to proceed in the Examination of the matter of Complaint upon the Oath of the Witness taken in the most Solemn manner, the Charter is indeed Silent as to the nature and form of the Oath but I think it must necessarily be Understood to mean Such an Oath as in Similar Cases is Administred in our Judicial proceedings; the Great doubt that arises in my Mind is whether the Court is warranted in Administring any Pagan Ceremony in the Nature of an Oath as an Obligation upon the Witness to Speak Truth, for altho it is Usual with us to Swear a Jew upon the Old as we do a Christian upon the New Testament, and altho there are hints in some Authors that a Mahometan may Depose upon the Alcoran, yet in Experience I do not know of any Instance of a Mahometan being received as a Witness, Save only in a Matter of Complaint before the Lords of the Council against [the] Governour and Even in that Case no Oath was Ten[dered] from whence I conclude that the Charter does [n]ot authorize you to Impose Either of the Oaths m[entioned] in th 55 Paragraph upon a Witness, and that if the Witness voluntary takes the Oath of his Country from the hands of a Braminy or in the Pagoda (as you describe in Your Letter) in Order to Give a Sanction to his Testimony before he comes to attest a fact, All that You can do is to Afford a Greater or less Share of Credit to his Evidence According to the Solemnity and the Nature of the Oath taken and the Degree of Reverence in which it is held by the Indians and from this Measure and the probability of the fact Testify'd the Court must form a Judgment upon the whole Case According to their real Beleif of the Witness.

Affairs in Europe at present have a Warlike Aspect, by Spain's non-compliance with the enclosed Convention; A General Embargo has been laid on all Ships and there has been a hot Press some Months past, for Manning Three Strong Squadrons which His Majesty has Fitted out to Cruize in the Mediterranean, West Indies, and the English Channell. Letters of Marque and Reprizal have also been Granted against Spain, as <sup>is</sup> the enclosed London Gazette.

Whether France may Intermeddle in the present Quarrell is as yet not known but greatly to be apprehended.

So that you must be on your Guard, and take all proper previous Measures for the Security of Our Settlement, Estate, and Shipping, in case a War should break out Between Us and France, and our Ships must be Ordered to keep Company home-ward bound. We are

1. By last Year's Shipping We wrote You Several Letters which went by three Conveyances, that dated 14<sup>th</sup>. February 1738 in Duplicate only, and therefore Copy is enclosed, as also of Our Letter *via* Anjengo dated 3<sup>d</sup>. August last by the Ship Royal Guardian who sailed out of the Downes the 8<sup>th</sup>. of the same month, bound for Bombay and Canton, The Ship Duke sailed for Bencoolen and Borneo the 25<sup>th</sup>. May last.



2 Since last Season, It hath pleased God to return Us the Eighteen Ships as ☞ List enclosed.

3. By the Wilmington, Beaufort and Godolphin We received Your Advices dated the 29<sup>th</sup>. and 30<sup>th</sup>. August, 26<sup>th</sup>. September, 1<sup>st</sup>. 24<sup>th</sup>. and 27<sup>th</sup>. January 1738, with the Consultations and Books of Accounts, whereof due notice shall be taken in the course of our Letters this Season.

4. We shall now acquaint you with the Needfull.

5. We have taken up the following Ships to carry on Our Trade this Season VIZ<sup>r</sup>.

6. This comes by the Ship Wilmington, Copy of her Charterparty is enclosed.

7. In answer to Our Complaints of receiving more damaged Goods from you, than any other Settlement You say it has been a Constant Quarrel with the Officers, that the Boats are kept a Stern or along side of Our Ships most part of the day As a Reply thereto, You ought to consult the Commanders, when the Goods are sent off, how many Bales can be conveniently stowed away every day, and in case the Officers on board are dilatory, and neglect their Duty, acquaint the Commander thereof in writing and require his Answer in the same manner to be judg'd of by Us on the Ships Return, and if you still have just reason to conclude they are faulty protest against them, for all damages that may ensue. We are thus particular in Our Directions, because, in the first place, notwithstanding it is a matter of so much Importance to Us, and a Constant Quarrel is alleged, yet no Letters have ever pass'd between you, nor has anything been entered upon Consultation relative thereto, by calling the Commanders before you, or otherwise, and in the next place We must acquaint you, that this Affair has given Us a great deal of Trouble this Year, The Owners of Shipping in a Body have made Heavy Complaints of Damaged Madrass Piece Goods returned upon them, and We found ourselves in Equity obliged to allow the Owners of the Nottingham Five hundred Pounds towards alleviating the Loss they sustained, a great many Goods by her being damaged, thô little or no Damage appeared on the Gunnys or other Package.

8. And in order to avoid all Differences with them in future, We have come to a Resolution, that in case neither the Gunnys nor the Inside Wrappers appear to be damaged or stained, It is not reasonable that the Goods should be returned upon the Owners as Ship Damage, unless it appears that the Package hath been altered.

9. Having thus imparted the whole, it behoves you to take all Proper Previous Methods, that the Bales are not wetted in the Boats, by the Surf or Sprøy of the Sea, according to your Promise, and not only so, but by inspecting the Subordinate Factory's Goods, as well as your own, to see to it, that no Goods are in the least

---

manner damaged before they are packed, for if the Gunnys are not damaged, nor the Wrappers Stained and the Goods are damaged they must be so when packed, & therefore you must be answerable to Us for the same.

10. The Godolphin by a Quick Dispatch from Canton arrived in Good time with you, which would have been more pleasing to Us had the Supra Cargos promoted Our Interest to the Utmost in that Voyage, for Mr. Neville told Our Supra Cargos the Godolphin could not take above Fifteen hundred Pecul of Tea though no more than Three Thousand Six hundred Pecul of Teutenague were shipped upon Our Account, so that she had only Three hundred and ninety Eight Tons aboard for Us, notwithstanding the Godolphin was lett at Four hundred and Eighty Tons, it does not appear what they and the Captain filled her up with for themselves. As Gold was so very dear, more Teutenague should and might have been bought with Our Stock, it being procurable at a Moderate Rate, besides all this the Supra Cargos were either imposed on, or a Fraud was committed somewhere, in the Touch of the Gold, by the Assays at your Place, and here it comes out no more than Eighty nine instead of Ninety three, which [is] above Four and a Quarter  $\frac{1}{4}$  Cent you tell Us however, there will be no Loss by it, which is all that can be said. But We shall say something further, and that is, the Supra Cargos must make good the Difference to Us, as in Justice they ought, having received for transacting our Business above Two Thousand Tales for Commission, and doubtless they reaped a further Benefit by a Large share of the Ships Tonnage, yet We defrayed all Expences and Charges in China, which by their Account Currant amounted to Four Thousand nine hundred and forty five Tales more, whereby Our Profits on the Voyage are reduced to a Trifling Sum. If the Merchants in China abused them, they know where to seek a Remedy.

11. As Captain Acton lost his Passage to Bombay, and put in at your Place, permitting him to land the Ship Lyell's Cargo, and the several Subsequent Steps, that were taken relating to her, seem to Us, considering the Circumstances that Ship was in, to have been acting the most for Our Interest.

12. We observe with Pleasure that you were supplied with a Sufficient Quantity of Salt Petre from Bengal and agreeable to Our Sentiments last year, We have reason to expect a Continuance of the same Circumstances.

13. When the Masters of the Vessells sent to the West Coast return, their Journals should be delivered in for inspection, We have frequently complained of Long Passages, the Jane and Galatea, your own Country Ships, made much shorter Trips than Ours which ought not to pass by unobserved.

14. The Explicit Entrys upon Consultation of the Short deliveries from our Ships, is a Satisfactory method, and by endorsing the Bills of Loading accordingly, We shall be thoroughly enabled to adjust accounts with the Owners.

15. We take notice of the Early Intelligence communicated to Us, from the Several Parts of India, in your several Letters, more particularly in the first, and desire the same may be annually continued.

16. His Majestys Declaration of War against Spain comes enclosed, the Present Situation of Affairs in Europe is such and it has raised Seamen's Wages and encreased the charge of fitting out Our Ships so considerably, for which We have been obliged to make the Owners suitable allowances that We at present [do] not judge it proper that One of Our Ships should proceed from Madrass to Canton, especially as the Godolphin's Voyage turned out so indifferently, and therefore you must not send any of them thither.

17. We have desired Sir William Rous, Samuel Feake Esq<sup>r</sup>. Mathew Martin Esq<sup>r</sup>. and Josias Wordsworth Esq<sup>r</sup>. to be the Secret Committee for the Currant Year, what Orders those Gent<sup>l</sup>. or any three of them, may Judge proper to give for the security of our Shipping, must be as punctually observed & regarded as if signed by the whole Court.

18. A Mistake was made in the List of the Packet by the Wilmington, N<sup>o</sup>. 21 was said to be a Packet from the Supra Cargos of the King William received  $\text{P}$  Jane, instead of the Prince of Wales, for We had none from the King Williams.

19. You acted quite right in putting Twenty Tons of Salt Pe[tre] on board the Godolphin, and We are entirely of your Sentiments that a Ship should not be kept so late as to hazard her passage for the sake of a few Bales.

20. The Allowances to Our Commanders and Officers are as  $\text{P}$  Printed Indulgence enclosed, which you must see that they [do] not exceed, & Our Orders last year upon this head must be constantly complied with.

21. The same Clause is inserted as was last year in each Ship Charterparty, as to Surplus Tonnage, We direct that you fill them for so far, that they may not be pester'd, but be clear sh[ip] in case of an Attack.

22. We propose that the Wilmington, Princess of Wales, Bedford, Winchester and Montagu shall sail together if possible, Our other Eleven Ships are to be in the Downs the 23<sup>th</sup>. of January, and We hope to be able to get them away by the beginning of February.

23. Our Servants in the Bay, will want about Two Hundred Tons of Red Wood, to send on Our Ships from thence designed for the West Coast and Bombay, so that you will do well to supply them accordingly.

24. We have consigned to you on this Ship, Fifty Chests of Treasure some Broad Cloth, and other Merchandize, as  $\text{P}$  Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed.

25. Our List of Investment comes herewith, We expect a Continuance of your best Endeavours to comply therewith on the most Reasonable Terms, that the Circumstances of things will admit.

26. We observe that a Larger Quantity of Iron is indented for than usual, and for the Substantial Reasons given, you will be supplied accordingly, but you must take Effectual Care, that the same does not interfere with the Demands from Bombay by confining the Consumption within your own proper Sphere.

27. We are concerned at the Death of M<sup>r</sup>. Francis Rous, in the Circumstances mentioned in your Letter, Sir William Rous Knight and Alderman, Our Present Worthy Chairman, having intimated to Us, that although he is a very Great Sufferer by his Brother, yet he is unwilling the Company should be at any Charge in maintaining his Children, towards which he designs with Leave of the Court to send out something for the Children's Subsistence, Your Allowance to them must therefore cease on the Arrival of this Letter.

28. M<sup>r</sup>. Von Franken who has been an Ensign at Bombay takes Passage on this Ship, you may employ him in the said Station if you think fitt, Supply of Soldiers comes on her and We shall endeavour to send Fresh Recruits by every Ship to strengthen our Garrison.

29. Captain Maddox has borrowed of Us Two Thous<sup>d</sup>. five hundred Pounds at Respondentia, and he having assigned over to Us his Effects on board the Wilmington as a Security for the same, you must take Care in case of his Death, that they are not embezzled.

30. We hereby permit the Rev<sup>d</sup>. M<sup>r</sup>. Wynch One of Our Chaplains at your Place to remove to Bengal, and to succeed as Our Chaplain there on the first Vacancy, and his Present Salary and other Allowances are to be paid him during his Stay with you, till such Vacancy shall happen.

31. The Ship Beaufort by calling at the Cape, and a Long Passage did not arrive in time for the March Sale to Our Great loss.

32. We rely that you have exerted a Proper Care of Our Privileges and Estate, on the Surprizing Revolution brought about by Shaw Nadir's March, from Persia into India, and his conquest of the Mogul Empire, by your securing a Quiet Possession and continuance of the Phirmaund Grants, in Our favour, and a free Currency of Our Trade without Molestation, from the New Governours Vice Roys and Nabobs,

that may be appointed on so Great a Change, in case of any Difficultys or Obstructions, We persuade Our selves that you struggled with and removed them in the best manner, embracing every favourable Opportunity that offered, to promote Our Interest and Welfare conformable to the Trust reposed in you. 1. We sent our Last which was dated the 2<sup>d</sup>. January by our Ship Wilmington, Copy whereof is enclosed, She sailed from Cowes the 24<sup>th</sup>. of that Month, in Company with the Princess Wales, Winchester and Montagu, the Bedford Sailed from Portsmouth the 14<sup>th</sup>. February.

2. This comes by our Ships Heathcote, Durrington Cæsar and Colchester, Copy of their Charterparty comes enclosed in the respective Packets, which must be forwarded to the Bay, on the Ships Sailing thither.

3. Having already taken notice of your Advices and Transactions relating to Shipping, We now proceed to give the proper Directions.

SECOND CONCERNING GOODS FROM EUROPE OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA  
TO BE DISPOSED OF IN ANOTHER.

4. We have Consigned to you on each of these Ships Chests Treasure, some Broad Cloth, Lead, Iron, with other Goods and Merchandize, as specified in the Invoice and Bill of Lading enclosed in each Ships Packet.

5. As our Servants in Bengal have generally desired the first Ship to bring the Silver Uncoined, and the Princess Mary arriving with you so early as the 7<sup>th</sup>. April, and near a Month before any other Ship, it had been the more prudent method to have coined a Moiety only of her Treasure, but to avoid all Mistakes in future, you must require explicit and early Advices from them agreeable to our Directions at Beaufort.

6. The New Mill'd Mexico Dollars by Assays here, are Three Penny Weights worse than Standard, so that the Brahminys of the Mint agreeing to take them at that rate, is what We can have no objection to.

7. Woollen Goods and Lead are provided by our Committee of Buying, and all other Articles by our Committee of Shipping the List of Two hundred Bales was inserted with different Wares, which the Clerk of the latter Committee taking for their Use, and the Duplicate being over looked by the other, was the true cause why the said Two hundred Bales were not sent however it could be no great Disappointment as very near all the Cloth Imported for two Years, remained in your Warehouse when the Beaufort came away, which being the case, you did well in confining the Demand to a Years Consumption, and agreeable to our Sentiments heretofore, that ought always to be the method.

8. As the Merchants had made an Agreement in March, to take the Broad Cloth Imported Anno 1737, at Thirty three  $\text{p}$  Cent Advance on Invoice, it was highly unreasonable [o]n them to expect an Abatement six Months after, especially as it appears by the Consultation of the 18<sup>th</sup>. September and their own Petition that they might have Examined the Invoices and doubtless had the Inspection of the Patterns before the Contract was made, this being the Case it seems very strange to Us that a Pretence should be trump up above a Year after the Goods Arrived, that they were Invoiced at higher Rates than usual and although the Merchants Instance the Auroras only, Three  $\text{p}$  Cent was abated on the Whole; they allege also the Buyers in the Country, will give no more for the fine Auroras than the common Sorts, which should have been proved in a stronger manner than by the near Allegation of the Partys so nearly Concerned, by making a Tryal yourselves in the Countrey.

9. The above Convinces Us, that a Sale by Outcry is the best Method on several Accounts, and as such ought to be practised to prevent all Impositions.

10. In Consultation the 27<sup>th</sup>. March, You agreed that the Merchants should have the value of Five thousand Pagodoes of Broad Cloth out of the Warehouse, without paying ready Money for the same, and this though a new thing, was made a constant Rule, but We can by no means approve thereof, it is a sufficient accommodation that it lies till they want a Parcell, and then they must make good into our Cash the full amount, We have suffered so much by bad Debts at our other Settlements, that We have made this a Standing Order.

11. Agreeable to your desire One hundred Pipes of Madeira Wine will be Consigned You on the Durrington by Our Agents at that Island, Inform Us how it proves; Cap<sup>t</sup>. Crabb and his Officers are allowed to bring Twenty Pipes, acquaint Us how many are Landed at your Place.

12. Very substantial Reasons are given for making so large an Indent for Iron as Four Hundred Tons and Ten Pagodoes a Candy being a good profit, We shall supply you accordingly.

13. We think that there was no manner of occasion to keep Thirty Chests of Treasure as a Supply for our Cash, as is mentioned  $\text{p}$  Wilmington, because from that time at the lowest which was the 30<sup>th</sup>. November you had never less than Eighty five thousand Pagodoes and by the large Draughts upon Us which amount to Two hundred and fifty thousand Pagodas being near as much as your Consignments, the Ballance of Our Cash at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George when the Godolphin came away was no less than Two hundred twenty six thousand four hundred seventy two Pagodas, the Merchants then owed One hundred and twenty seven thousand Pagodoes for Money Advanced them on Account the Investment and Europe Goods on hand are valued in the Calculate of Quick Stock at One hundred twenty five thousand Pagodoes, one Moiety whereof was sold, and our Cash at Subordinates was Thirty seven thousand five hundred sixty seven Pagodoes, so that altogether a Ballance remained of Five hundred and sixteen thousand Pagodoes for carrying on the next Years Investment, and the Cargoes We received  $\text{p}$  Beaufort Godolphin and Princess Mary amount to no more than Two hundred sixty one thousand one hundred and one Pagodoes exclusive of Salt Petre.

14. The Chief occasion of so large a Ballance of Cash was occasioned by receiving great Sums on account of M<sup>r</sup>. Pitt for which you had no Authority from Us, and not only so, but You knew that We had denyed him the Favour, that We might not be Over burthened therewith, although M<sup>r</sup>. Drake a Free Merchant was refused Bills for Forty thousand Pagodoes when he Requested for them, and the Exchange on that Sum had been Six hundred sixty six Pounds thirteen shillings and four pence more in our Favour than M<sup>r</sup>. Pitts Bills so that instead of Gaining a Profit by the Sale of Our Silver, which is always very considerable, You talk by the last Ships of Purchasing Silver when the Manilla Ship arrived, but such a disadvantageous way of carrying on Our Commerce for the sake of accommodating Private Persons cannot be agreeable to Us.

15. As the Bills were Drawn, We thought proper to accept them, but notwithstanding We deem you Answerable for the Loss We sustained thereby, and therefore We expect that it be made good into our Cash on Receipt of these our Orders.

16. Copper Selling better in the Bay, than on the Coast, You Acted right in sending it all thither agreeable to our Orders, the Price is very much fallen there of late, so that We have no manner of encouragement to Provide any this Year, however as the Godolphins Teutenague was sent thither, We are not without hopes that it helped to raise the Price.

17. We shall comply with your several Indents of Wares and Stores and in all respects supply You with the Arms and Warlike Stores mentioned in the last Separate Address.

18. Lead We observe continues to sell well, by its fetching Twelve Pagodas a Candy in January, which is an encouraging Price, Our Buyers here would reckon themselves extreamly obliged to Us were We to put off our September, or March Sale for the sake of their stock on hand, which We mention because you Inform Us of a like Complaisance to the Lead Buyers.

19. Such a Commodity as Tin to loose Five  $\text{q}$  Cent in Weight appears strange, though the Royal Guardians Freighters lost so much, both they and all others ought to have Justice done them, there seems to be no other way to account for it but by an Embezzlement, however We shall consider the Deficiency in the Godolphin on Adjusting with the Owners.

20. We do not find any Steps taken upon Consultation as to Relieving Tomby Chitty, which was referr'd to you in Our Letter  $\text{q}$  Beaufort, nor is there any Reply thereto in the Letters before Us, though We should have been Informed what was done therein.

21. The Woollen Goods sent out this Year will be within the Prices mentioned in the Indent, and all the Auroras have White Lists as desired.

22. So soon as the Silver that you can spare for the Bay is Coined, that our President and Council there may have desired to be sent them in Rupees, the said Rupees, and the Bullion you can spare must be consigned thither without loss of time, on such of Our Ships as you are not able to Dispatch home directly to Us.

#### THIRDLY, CONCERNING INVESTMENTS,

23. The Beaufort and Godolphin's Cargoes were lately put up to Sale, and in general sold at a small matter Advance on last Years Prices, with some Exceptions, whereof due notice shall be taken in the Course of this Letter.

24. As to the Difficultys mentioned in the first Letter, arising from those powerful Competitors the French, and by other different Nations, with the badness of the Countrey Government, We can only refer you to the 40<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Commands last Year by the Duke of Lorraine, wherein explicit Directions are given, hereby recommending a due compliance therewith. We are not Informed that the French give more than usual, and by our small Profits, We are led to conclude that they will see their Error, in giving so much as they have done and when that is once the case, the Dutch and Danes make such small Investments that We may reasonably expect the times will mend as the latter are said to have had no Goods ready for their Ships and for two Years together had no Ship from Europe, all such like favourable opportunitys must be improved for our Advantage.

25. We are pleased that a new Sett of Merchants made a Contract, the more Persons are Employed in the Investment the most likely it is to flourish, but Contracting is not the only thing necessary, the Merchants should be well looked after that they comply with their Engagements, and for our satisfaction Entrys must be made upon Consultation, at the close of the Year in proper Columns, how the matter stands with respect to each of them, by inserting the number of Pieces Contracted for in each sort, the Value, what Money has been Advanced, how many Pieces are brought in with their Value this is the more necessary because of Fourteen

Thousand Pieces Fine and Superfine Long Cloth and Sallampores Engaged for, We received only Four thousand two hundred and sixty Pieces, and the Merchants Owed a great Sum as before observed, when the Godolphin came away no less than One hundred twenty seven thousand Pagodas for money Advanced to Five Setts only, for carrying on their Contracts by this means either bad Debts may be Incurred, or our own Money may be diverted to the worst of Purposes, namely that of Procuring Goods for our Competitors, We mention these as possible Cases, when such large Sums remain in their hands and as such should be duly guarded against, a like Account as the above must be entered on Consultation for each Subordinate Settlement, so as to be transmitted to Us the same Season.

26. Of Fifteen thousand three hundred Pieces Midling Cloth Contracted for, We received only Eight thousand four hundred Pieces, Our loss by these Deficiencies is the greater, because the Fine and Midling turn to a much better Account than the lower Sortments, by reason of the great Prices given for the Ordinary, Salem and Chemnaickpollam Sorts we get very little by them, these things must be duly considered. You ought to be Guided by our List of Investment as far as you are able, and in case it cannot be altogether complied with, the several different Sorts Provided, should bear a proportion to the Quantity of each Specified therein, whereas We do not find that upon the Receipt of it, although the Princess Mary arrived so early as the 7<sup>th</sup>. April, or at any time afterward, any Measures were taken with the Merchants at Madraas for that purpose.

27. You did well however, in taking the One hundred thirty six Bales Midling Cloth for the Godolphin, which did not come up to Muster, as an Abatement was made in the Price, and it sold in a near proportion thereto, and the like Method should be taken as to other Sorts, provided the Merchants will admit of reasonable Deductions, for what the Goods really fall short in Goodness, by Introducing a N<sup>o</sup>. 4 in each Denomination, We are led to this from its being practised at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David with success, in the Salem and C Cloth, which doubtless must be more satisfactory to the Merchants, than to have the Goods turned out upon their hands, and as they sold in proportion to the higher Numbers it is more agreeable to Us that no cause of Complaint should be given them, besides this may be a means of causing Our Investment to flourish.

28. Your Salem Cloth though dearer, did not sell so well as the Fort S<sup>t</sup>. Davids in any of the Numbers; their C Cloth We observe costs the same as Salem, but Sells lower about Two Shillings a Piece in each Number, and therefore endeavours should be used to get it cheaper by what past between you and that Settlement, it appears that both were sensible of its Inferiority, so that the Prices being alike surprizes Us.

29. The Maddapollam Cloth sold much better than the Ingeram, though Charged at the same Prices, and those two Places are very near one another.

30. As to Vizagapatam, their whole Investment of Thirty Bales Sallampores, will not defray a Factors Charge, much less the Expence of a Settlement, Affairs must either take a new turn there, or you must think of withdrawing, Our servants should be ashamed of Eating Our Bread unless they work in the Vineyard; We observe that M<sup>r</sup>. Sanderson the Chief by coming to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, was absent from the 1<sup>st</sup>. January to the 4<sup>th</sup>. April during which interval all your Contracts were made, and no other Covenant Servant was left at Vizagapatam than a Young Writer which was doubtless the true cause of such a slender Performance; We can by no means approve of Our Servants thus running from one place to another, and Quitting the Post allotted them, Our Business must not be suffered to stand still, nor Golden seasons be lost for the sake of their private Affairs; In a Letter from thence Dated the 14<sup>th</sup>. August, Cloth is said to come in so slowly, that care shall be taken to get in the Outstanding Ballances by the latter end of the Year, from that time forward, there is not a word said of our Investment, or the Ballances during his Stay, and he came from thence the 23<sup>d</sup>. December, leaving only M<sup>r</sup>. Prince, who came there but in April to look after our Affairs, We expect that no Bad Debts are Incurred, but

as Permission was given him in October to come up, M<sup>r</sup>. Simpson or the Person appointed to Succeed, should have been on the Spot before his Departure, to take the Charge of Our Affairs, and that Things might not stand still, whereas he was not gone when the Godolphin came away, and thus Our Investment as We apprehend would again greatly suffer the ensuing Season, no Instructions being sent thither, nor any Advices received upon that head, after M<sup>r</sup>. Sandersons Departure.

31. We observe with Concern, that our Servants at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David complain of a want of Merchants having but Two only engaged in our Investment, it would be a great pleasure to Us could some means be found out to Engage a Number of Substantial Men to reside within Our Bounds, and We are apt to think that it might be brought about by granting them some particular Privileges with respect to their several Casts, which they are generally so fond of and at the same time are not detrimental to Us, We recommend this Affair to your particular and serious consideration. We are told that Indico may be cultivated at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. David, you will do well to make a tryal.

32. As there is some prospect of Andiapas returning to Porto Novo, when he comes to do Business, you will do well to engage him in our Service, that Interlopers and Clandestine Traders may not be Supply'd with Cargoes at that Port, as Millner was in the Portugueze Ship.

33. All the Dimities that We received, are Reserved for our March Sale, so that We cannot say whether the Beauforts are better than the Royal Guardian, but Musters should have been kept for your Guidance.

34. There is an absolute necessity for strictness in Sorting which you say was practised, otherwise the worst of Consequences will ensue, as the Buyers here are sure to make a Difference in the Prices, according to their real Goodness, and the Merchants have no reason to complain thereof, as you seem in general to have Acted, in an equitable manner between them and Us.

35. There is no Notice taken of several Paragraphs in Our Letter under this Head in the Advices before Us, but We expect they are duly regarded.

FOURTHLY, CONCERNING THE TRADE OF INDIA AND THEREIN ANY TRANSACTIONS  
WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

36. We observe the Advices under this head, relating to the Nabobs Son<sup>s</sup> Plundering the Countrey, The Persians Progress, and the like, which require no particular Answer, however continue to Inform Us, fully of all Occurrences from time to time.

37. The Morattas took Salsett, a Year before the Date of Emaum Sahibs Advices of their designs against Bombay, and from the first Our President and Council were prepared against their expected Attempts, so that Sahibs Intelligence could be of no Service, his Letter being dated the 14<sup>th</sup>. May 1738 although this was the Case, Our Presidents Answer was altogether right in thanking him for the same, as a good Correspondence ought always to be kept up with the Great Men, not doubting that real solid Services will be duly distinguished from meer Pretentions only.

38. The French's Aim at great things upon the Coast, as mentioned in the first Letter, soon came to nothing, without so much as making any Attempt, it gives Us a pleasure that whatever Designs were formed, they proved abortive, as Affairs are now situated, you cannot be too watchful of their Measures and Actions, We take it well at your hands that upon a Report of a War being broke out In Europe, Our Strength was considered in the manner represented by your separate Letter, what is therein desired We have complied with by this Years Shipping as far as We were able.

39. Your Opinion of their favourite Scheme makes them altogether regardless of their Employers Interest, who doubtless are governed by the same Maxim in Trade as all other Merchants and accordingly would never suffer such a loosing Commerce as you represent, to be carried on long by their Servants, the particular Intelligence



We desired in the 45<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph respected an Account of their several Ships Cargoes Inward and Outward, as far as you could learn, together with their Trade carried on from Port to Port in India, and by the same being collected together in one of the Papers in the Packet, it may be more explicit, than your General Advices will admit.

40. We perceive that the Raw silk by the Lyell although in Demand, was sold to some Merchants at a Price certain in Consultation the 15<sup>th</sup>. June, without putting it up to Outcry, which ought to be the method and besides you made a wrong Calculate of the Profits by your own Account.

41. We are pleased that a great number of Ships resorted to Madrass the last Year, which must doubtless be a great benefit to the Place, they are said to be most of them, Grain Vessells, however We find by the List, Ships Imported from all parts of India a great Commerce must be carried on, where One hundred and twenty Sail of Ships arrive in a Year, and notwithstanding it is said, only One Ship was designed to the Westward, We find them sent to Surat, Bussero, and Mocho, We heartily wish you Success in all your Trade that does not interfere with Ours, in case the latter part of the 49<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter by the Beaufort to which there is no Reply, is duly complied with.

42. The Ship Lyells Rice was of great Service and the unexpected Supply in September, caused the Price to fall, the Great Rains We are told by the Godolphin were of singular Service to the Countrey which doubtless put new Life into the People after so severe a Famine, and We persuade Ourselves that notwithstanding the Countrey Government is said to be very bad, some good Effects ensued from so many concurring favourable Circumstances and that We shall be Sharers therein,

#### FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

43. We have no objection to your ordering so necessary a Building as a new Powder House to be Erected on the old ones falling, and for the reasons mentioned by the Godolphin, We approve of fixing on a spot of Ground for that purpose, separate from the Magazine.

44. As the heavy Rains caused a general Survey of Our Buildings to be necessary, We expect that a due regard was paid to the 54<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of our Letter dated the 25<sup>th</sup>. October 1738, in carrying on the Repairs to be requisite upon that occasion, You must see to it that the Work is substantial, strong and Lasting, that a Rainy Season may not affect Our Godowns, and sett them, with our other Bulidings a complaining so frequently as hath been the case.

45. By the Accounts entered upon Consultation We observe with great satisfaction that our Revenues continue Flourishing, and the Expences are kept within due bounds, being near the same in their several articles as usual, so that We have reason to depend upon the same care, and vigilance in future.

46. We send enclosed an Account of the *Assays* at the Tower, of the Pagodoes and Rupees transmitted to Us on the Godolphin, with our Accountants Remarks you will perceive they fall short somewhat in the Weight and Fineness, and that Our Silver does not produce quite so much in our Madrass Mint, as at Bombay, though We ought to reap the same benefit, You must take this Affair into serious Consideration, see that Justice is done Us, and that both the Pagodoes and Rupees are kept up to full Goodness.

#### SIXTHLY TOUCHING FACTORS, WRITERS, OFFICERS, AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

47. The vacancy in the Council, occasioned by M<sup>r</sup>. Rous's Death, We observe was filled by calling M<sup>r</sup>. Charles Simpson to the Board in Consultation the 6<sup>th</sup>. April as being next in Standing, We Confirm the same expecting he will revive our Affairs at Vizagapatam whither you design'd him, Our 76<sup>th</sup>. Par<sup>a</sup>. ¶ Beaufort must be Complied with on all such like occasions.

48. The Legal Claimers here, have received the Money paid into our Cash on Account of Messieurs Everest and Denny what Sums are paid in on Deceased Persons Accounts, must be carried to their Credit on the Books, and when there are no Demands in India, the Account must be Wrote off to Account Currant London.

49. As M<sup>r</sup>. Hurlock arrived at Madrass the 18<sup>th</sup>. August, Copy of his Diary at Borneo should have been forwarded to Us On the Wilmington. and not postponed to the Beaufort's Departure, We Dispatched the Ship Duke for that place, between those two Ships Arrivals in England.

50. M<sup>r</sup>. Goodere loosing his all in Sloop Formosa, We cannot but approve of the Fifty Pagodoes given to new Rigg him upon that occasion.

51. We have granted leave to M<sup>r</sup>. Smarts Wife and two Daughters to go over to him agreeable to your Recommendations.

52. As We keep no Farthings in our Accounts, they must not be Inserted in the Bills of Exchange for the future.

53. William Belsches late Surgeon of Our Ship Winchester, having lost his Legg by a fall at Canton and is thereby rendered incapable of Acting in that Station on board Ship, We have taken his unhappy Case into consideration, and being satisfied of his Capacity, he now takes Passage for your Place, and We direct, that he succeed either M<sup>r</sup>. Barlow or M<sup>r</sup>. Douglass on the first vacancy after M<sup>r</sup>. Munro, and in case of no vacancy he is permitted to proceed to Bengal, that he may be appointed Surgeon there upon the first Vacaney after M<sup>r</sup>. Lindsey.

54. We have taken into consideration the small number of Covenant Servants upon the Choromandell Coast with what you write concerning the same, and that Our Business may be carried on in the most regular manner, We have Entertained Mess<sup>rs</sup>. William Holt, and Samuel Greenhaugh Factors, and John Legg, William Mackett, Grantham Mead, Arthur Rider, Borlace Stacey, Foss Westcott, Alexander Wynch, Thomas Cooke, John Smith and John Churchey Writers upon your Establishment who must be Stationed on the List of our Covenant Servants in the same order that they are placed in this Letter, Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Greenhaugh, Wynch, and Cooke are at your place, and therefore Covenants come enclosed for them to Execute; You must keep them all close to our Business, and Encourage the most Deserving among them.

55. Having thus plentifully Supplied you, all Monthly Writers must be immediately Discharged, and every Person who has not our leave to come abroad must be sent home, unless they betake themselves to the Seafaring way for a Livelyhood.

56. The Commanders of Our Ships bound your way have Borrowed of Us at Respondentia the Sums mentioned in the List of the Packet, In case they offer to pay any Money into our Cash in part of their outward bound Adventure, or their Respondentia Bonds, You must receive the same, granting Certificates for the Amount, on their making Oath that they neither have taken up, nor will take up any Money in India to Trade with in the room thereof, in case of their Death, you must see that their Effects are not Embezzled, they being assign'd over to Us as a Security for the same.

57. Lieutenant William Henry Southby, takes Passage on one of these Ships, he has served two Campaigns in that Capacity under Count Munich, We direct that he enter upon Lieutenants Pay, Allowance and Accommodations at his Arrival with you and that the Command of the first vacant Company in our Garrison be conferr'd upon him. We have Supplied you by these Ships with as many Soldiers as We were able to procure, and shall continue to send fresh Recruits next Season.

58. Silver when Purchased at your Place from the Manilla Ships or otherwise at Fourteen Dollars ꝓ Ten Pagodoes stands Us in Five Shillings and Eight pence one Eighth an Ounce and whenever you are overburthened with too large a Cash for the carrying on our Investment, We hereby direct that you Buy Silver upon our Account when Procurable at or under the said Price, but not otherwise.

59. Before the Erection of Our Mayors Courts by the last Charter it was the method when any of our Servants or others Dyed Intestate and left Estates behind them after all Just Demands thereon were satisfied, the Nett produce was paid into our Cash and the Amount was Transferr'd to Account Currant London, that We might pay the Legal Claimers here whereas since that time a new method has been Introduced by the Partys Concerned paying the same when they pleased into our Cash, and Bills of Exchange have been drawn upon Us in several Instances for large Sums, when We have not been in want of Cash and without our Directions.

60. For the future Certificates only must be Granted for the Money received on Account of all Deceased Persons Estates in the same manner as We have Directed with respect to our Commanders.

61. And We recommend it to all Executors or Trustees, and the Mayors Court, to take effectual Measures that the Estates of all Deceased Persons be Collected, and paid into our Cash with the utmost Expedition, not suffering any needless Delays, but oblige all Concerned to make up the Accounts, and Pay the Ballance into our Cash as soon as possible, that We may pay the Amount to the legal Claimers here, who are continually making Application to Us.

62. We direct that Upon Dispatching of every Ship for Europe, You cause to be delivered a Copy of the Bill of Lading to the Comander without any Charge or Expence to the said Comander.

63. As you give a good Character of Mr. Jonathan Smart at Pegue We hereby permit him to reside in India as a Free Merchant and Covenants come enclosed for him to Execute accordingly, which must be returned to Us by the first Ship.

64. Just as We were Signing these Dispatches, We received a Letter from Mr. Pitt relating to his Bills of Exchange, and therefore We shall explain ourselves further upon that head by the Cæsar. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. GEORGE, DATED APRIL 2, 1740.

PER CÆSAR.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 44, Pages 27—42*].

[*Paragraphs 1—64 are a copy of letter, dated 21-3-1739 printed above*].

65. In case any of these Ships should not be able to reach your Place by the last of August, the Commanders are ordered to make the best of their way for Fort William in Bengal, and to follow our President and Council's Directions there Resident, for their further Proceedure, you will do well to write thither for such Part of their Cargos, as you may stand in need of, and for as much Tonnage as you may be able to fill up for Europe.

66. Having referred the State of Our Military to the Proper Committee, We send enclosed in the Packet, the Regulations they have judged it necessary to make, and as a great deal of Pains was taken therein, We enjoyn a Strict Compliance with the same, and We recommend the Establishment of the same Regulations at the Subordinate Factories.

67. You must enquire in Consultation of Our Servants and other Passengers on board of Our Ships, whether the Commanders have used them well in the Voyage, and complied in all Respects with their Agreement, minuting their Reply for Our Notice.

68. Mr. Pitt having made Us Satisfaction for the Bills of Exchange drawn in his Favour, We have no demand upon You on that Account.

69. As We apprehend Our Island of Saint Helena will stand in need of a Larger Quantity of Rice than Usual, We direct that you write to Bengal, to supply them with three Ton a Ship Extraordinary, on the Captains agreeing to take the Usual Freight for the same, although the Tonnage consign'd to the said Island should exceed the Charterparty Quantity. GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH DATED 2<sup>ND</sup>. JANUARY 1739.  
PER BEDFORD.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 44, pages 43-57*].

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND COUNCIL  
AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. Our last was dated the 23<sup>th</sup>. May 1739 by the Ship Duke Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Hindman Commander who sailed out of the Downs the 25<sup>th</sup>. of that Month, We therein took some Notice of Your Advices by the Ship Queen Caroline, and therefore Copy of Our said Letter comes Enclosed.

2. The Scarborough Arrived the 27<sup>th</sup>. August and brought Us Your further Advices of the 9<sup>th</sup>. February We shall now give the necessary Directions.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

3. This comes to You by the Ship Bedford Burthen 490 Tons Cap<sup>t</sup>. William Wells Commander who is ordered to proceed first to Our Island of S<sup>t</sup>. Helena with the needfull Stores, the Copy of her Charterparty will be forwarded to You from thence.

4. By the Enclosed List of Ships taken up for carrying on Our Trade, You may perceive that We shall Order the Hardwick Cap. John Hallet to bring You Salt Petre

from Bengal and in case the Commander of the Bedford requests for any Salt Petre at the Low Freight specified in the Charterparty We would have You put on Board what can be spared upon those Terms.

5. The Ship Queen Caroline We observe with pleasure was Dispatched before any Demorage was Incurred and no time lost in sending away the Scarborough which We mention that the same care may be taken in future.

6. In the Advices before Us We are informed that a Ship arriving in August will meet with the same Dispatch as if she came sooner, altho this may be the Case yet as the Ship consigned to You is always Our Store Ship for S<sup>t</sup>. Helena, her early Arrival at which place is of great Importance to Us that thereby Our Homeward bound Ships may have the needful Intelligence of the Situation of Affairs in Europe which is the more Requisite this Year as Differences have arisen between Us and Spain which We doubt not Your being apprized of from Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George pursuant to Our Advices thither as  $\text{¶}$  Copy Enclosed to which We now add that War is since declared against Spain as  $\text{¶}$  His Majesty's Proclamation Enclosed and Hostilities have actually been Committed by Captures on both sides and therefore what Orders Our Secret Committee shall give for the Security of Our Returning Ships must be strictly regarded and Complied with in the same manner as if signed by the whole Court.

7. You did well in writing to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George for a Sloop of about Forty Tons to bring Pepper from the Out Settlements and We expect a due Compliance with the 10<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter dated the 14<sup>th</sup>. October 1737 tho no particular Reply is made thereto.

8. We had Entertained hopes of having the Marlborough returned to Us this last Season, but notwithstanding We ordered her to be Dispatched Home directly from Borneo, on a full Loading of Pepper, being procured and altho by the Scarboroughs timely arrival with Salt Petre and Cap<sup>t</sup>. Smith Petitioned for One Hundred Ton, You thought fit to Order the Marlborough back to Your Place, alledging it would be about the height of the South East Monsoon before she could be Dispatched from Borneo, and by that means We shall have a clean Garbled Cargo, these do not appear to Us sufficient Reasons for such a Deviation from Our Orders because in the first Place it was altogether uncertain how long her stay there might be, it requires but a little time to Load a Ship with Pepper in case a Contract is immediately made, in the next place by this Means We shall be saddled with a heavy Demorage which a Cargo of Pepper will by no means bear and further Our Servants at Borneo might surely have Garbled the same with the Mill and Utensils sent for that purpose as mentioned upon Consultation and in the Letter  $\text{¶}$  Scarborough.

9. You acquaint Us that after waiting Six Weeks in hopes of her being in a Condition to prosecute her Voyage, You thought it Requisite to deliver the Captain Sailing Orders, but this was acting quite Wrong, You ought not to have waited in this manner but immediately upon her Arrival gone to Work in preparing the proper Instructions which when ready and every thing was aboard by Dispatching him, all further stay had Indubitably been flung upon the Owners and by that means Your Protest against him had bore Date a Month at least sooner than it did.

10. We observe that Our Ship George did not arrive at your Place from Madrass till the 14<sup>th</sup>. June tho she sailed thence the 20<sup>th</sup>. February We complained in the 11<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of Our Letter dated the 4<sup>th</sup>. December 1734 of Our Vessels Long Passages to and from Madrass the Jane and Galatea with other Countrey Ships make much more Expedition and in order to prevent Our Suffering by the Captains calling at Acheen or other parts of the Coast for the sake of their Own Private Gain, which there is too much reason to apprehend has often been the case You must positively forbid such a Practice and examine strictly whether they presume to make any needless Delays by calling the Officers before You and minuting their Allegations upon Consultation for Our Notice.

11. You did well in writing to Fort St. George that Captain Westcott should call at Moco Moco as it was in his way and thereby it had hastened his Dispatch although this prudent Conduct did not meet with the Desired Success by the Advices

not reaching him however it may serve to Regulate Your Conduct in future by sending more Early Intelligence that so the Commander may be Ordered to act accordingly before his Departure from Bengal, but least that should fail We shall direct Our President and Council at Fort William in their Sailing Instructions to Order the Commander to call at Moco Moco and to follow the Residents Directions.

12. We have taken up the Ship Edgbaston Captain Stephen Cobham Commander for a Voyage to Madagascar, Bencoolen and Benjar, a Number of Slaves which You are in want of will be Ordered by her.

13. Upon her arrival she must be sent to Borneo for a Loading of Pepper in case there is any probability of meeting with Success, You will doubtless be able to Judge of the same on the Bedford's Arrival and therefore if contrary to Our Expectation an entire Stop is put to Our Trade with Borneo and You have no reason to think that it can be revived and You are not able to load home the Bedford, Edgbaston and Hardwicke with the Salt Petre on hand and what may be expected by the Hardwicke.

14. In that case the first Ship of the Two that arrives with You must be sent without Loss of Time to Bengal in order to be Consigned home from thence, We having given the needfull Directions thither accordingly and the other must be loaden Home directly from Your Place.

SECONDLY CONCERNING GOODS FROM EUROPE, FORT S<sup>r</sup>. GEORGE AND BENGAL.

15. We have Consigned to You on this Ship Fifteen Chests Treasure as  $\text{£}$  Invoice and Bill of Loading Enclosed, the good old Practice must be continued of Opening and Weighing them in the Captains Presence.

16. We observe with pleasure that Ten Chests of Treasure were sent on the George to Madrass and Eleven on the Marlborough to Borneo notwithstanding which Eighty Five thousand Dollars remained in Cash when the Scarborough came away, this would be sufficient to answer all Demands the next Season untill the Britannia's Arrival.

17. A thousand strong New Europe Canvas Bags brought from Batavia are said to be Bought at Two shillings Each and commended as strong and cheap, but We should have been Informed why the Canvas by the Queen Caroline would not Answer the same purpose as We find the purchase of those Bags was made the 10<sup>th</sup>. September and in your Letter by the Scarborough that Canvass is said to be most of it remaining, for the future Indent for every thing needfull that so We may not pay Advanced Prices for any thing.

18. Agreeable to Our Orders We are told an Account remains of Stores to 31<sup>th</sup>. July is sent but We ordered it to be brought down to a Month or thereabouts before the Ships Departure and You take no manner of Notice of Our Injunction in the latter part of the same Paragraph, but We expect a Correspondent Practice.

19. By the many Changes in the Storekeepers Employ Deficiencies and Surplusses are still continued by giving wrong names to the particulars but We rely upon Your Assurances to prevent them in future, be very carefull that no Embezlements are Covered under such a specious Pretence.

20. Although there was no Demand for the Piece Goods received from Bengal, Yet some Articles of its Product or Manufacture are doubtless agreeable to the Mallays or Serviceable for Our Use and pursuant to what We Wrote upon that head they should have been mentioned that so Our President and Council might have been Directed to supply You accordingly, don't fail of Writing Us the needful in Relation hereto perhaps Supplys from thence may in some measure Interfere with Your own Trade but that ought to be laid aside and not to Influence You in an Affair wherein Our Commerce and Welfare are Concerned.

21. Notwithstanding We wrote so strenuously in the 15<sup>th</sup>. and 16<sup>th</sup>. Paragraphs of Our Letter by the George that a sufficient Quantity of Long Cloth should always

be ready at Moco Moco to Deliver the Planters in Payment for their Pepper We again find the Resident Writing the 14<sup>th</sup>. January for what Long Cloth could be spared, in Answer thereto You replied there was none in the Warehouse, And this continued to be the case till the George arrived in June which shews how much We suffered by her Long Passage but why are You ever without so necessary a Commodity? for the future Indent to Fort St. George for so many Bales, that Two Years Consumption may always be on hand and Our Investment may not suffer in case of a Miscarriage.

22. You inform Us the Arms lately received frequently split as the People are exercising this gives Us Concern but as We exprest Our Apprehensions that it might arise from unskilfulness in over charging, in Our Letter to Queen Caroline You should have replied thereto, The Makers Name and the Year are always put upon each Barril, Transmit the same to Us and thereby We may do Ourselves Justice in case You have fresh Reason to Complain.

23. We observe with pleasure a good Order made in Consultation the 22<sup>th</sup>. April to keep up always a Stock of Rice sufficient for Six Months Provisions and Direct that it be a Standing Rule, In order to supply the same at the Cheapest Rate don't fail of procuring Salt enough from the Java Prows to Exchange for it whereby a further good end will be Answered by Delivering Salt to the Natives as it is so agreeable to them and it must be Your care to Distribute it among them at Our several Residencies according to the Demand that no Murmurings or Uneasiness may arise thro' the Want of it. We again mention this thro' Urged to Queen Caroline because several pressing Letters were wrote from Moco Moco and Manna for Supplies.

24. Near a fifth part of the Rice brought You by the Sloop from Moco Moco in June was deficient where upon a New Tub was order'd to be sent thither for a fixed measure, it was high time to take such a step and You did well in calling the Master before You upon that occasion, In the Residents Letter of the 29<sup>th</sup>. June, he suspects it was Stole by the Boats People and Promises to Watch them more narrowly which We mention to Remind him to be as good as his Word.

25. As the Scarborough came away several Months after the Queen Caroline You did well in sending a fresh Indent for some necessary Stores and We have Supplied You accordingly.

THIRDLY TOUCHING INVESTMENTS FOURTHLY CONCERNING THE TRADE OF INDIA  
AND THEREIN ANY TRANSACTION WITH THE COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

26. We choose to begin these Heads with Expressing Our entire Satisfaction and Approbation of Your Conduct in the Management of Our Affairs by spiriting up the Mallays in such a manner that the Encrease of their Pepper Plantations is Evident by the large Quantity sent Us this Year and we are not without hopes that by a continuance of the same care and Vigilance the West Coast may be rendered more advantageous to Us.

27. In order hereto it is well worth Your serious Consideration whether Our Commerce may not be Extended Northward and Southward by fixing Residencies at proper Distances still further up in the Country, We are Induced to Offer this, because by the Account before Us it appears that Our Trade is confined but to a narrow Compass.

28. Our favourable Notice of the Sultan, We perceive has the desired Effect and in Order to Excite him with Alacrity to go on Improving his Country, We direct that you make him an additional Present in Our Name of Fifty Dollars every Year whenever it produces Fifteen Hundred Bahars of Pepper and assure the Prince that in case he is desirous of any particular from Europe, We shall be very ready to Oblige him therewith.

29. The Mallays when they Dye seldom leave much behind them and therefore it is Dangerous trusting them, In Consultation the 15<sup>th</sup>. June it is acknowledged that

when they are Dunn'd some plausible Excuse is always Alleged and from the Instance mentioned in the 26<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph We are led to Enjoyn You not to lend them Our Money upon any pretence whatsoever, by advances beforehand they are apt to become Indifferent and Indolent with Respect to their Plantations and everything that has such a bad Tendency ought and must be removed out of the way.

30. Inform Us whether We reap the Good Effects expected from the allowance of Ten Dollars a Month settled on Sydee Ibrahim for if no real Benefit accrues to Us such a Pension must not be continued, guard against them as much as possible, least other Leading Men should form the like Pretensions.

31. You did well in bringing about an Accommodation between the Two Pangorans who had differed about Dividing the Gratuity on Laye Pepper, and We cannot help observing the prudent Declaration made to them on the Barrenness of the Soyl being pleaded for the small Crops in one part of the Countrey that it was rather to be Imputed to the Indolence of the Inhabitants dont fail of acquainting Us whether any Improvements are made in consequence thereof.

32. We shall be glad to hear that Bangsaradan the Harbourer of M<sup>r</sup>. Coles Murtherers is apprehended that his Lurking up and down the Countrey may not cause Comotions which are generally attended with the Destruction of thriving and flourishing Plantations, to avoid which We have annually enjoyn'd Your most studious care and shall only add, that the needfull Previous Measures to prevent Evils are highly acceptable to Us.

33. The Manna Pepper is said to have been Gathered last Season too Green and thereby lost in Weight more than usual, but this is not all for You found it necessary to Caution the Planters not to Gather it before it was full Grown, You ought never to suffer the Natives falling into such a Practice as it may bring a Discredit on the Pepper from Your Place at Our Sales where it has been usual to fetch something more than other sorts from the Mallabar Coast.

34. Richard Bagleys Report when he returned from Surveying the Countrey, should have been Enter'd upon Consultation for Our Notice. In the 43 Paragraph it is said that he made one, but whether Verbally or in writing is Uncertain to Us, the Persons who are sent upon that Business must be Discreet in their Behaviour and not suffered to give the Mallays any just cause of Offence and it would not be Improper to Employ Two Persons in the Affair whereby the Accounts would be the more to be Depended upon and Correct by their being a Check upon one another.

35. We entirely approve of Your Prohibiting Countrey Ships Contracting for Pepper at Borneo till Our Ships are Loaded as otherwise a Competition would tend very much to Enhance the Price and also Retard the Dispatch of Our Ships.

36. Under this Head We Enjoyn that an Extensive Freedom of Trade must be constantly allowed to all Our Servants, Captains and Officers of Our Ships without any Restriction whatever on their Paying Our Established Dutys and Conforming to Our Stated Rules You must not restrain them from Buying or selling of and to whom they please under any pretence whatsoever, the Reason for Our giving this Injunction is that some Complaints have been made to Us of hardships that some have labour'd under by being debarr'd the Liberty of selling their Goods at Fort Marlborough in a free manner particularly from the Comander of the Scarborough as a Copy of his Representation Enclosed to which We require a clear and Distinct Answer from You, for at present it seems to Us a very great hardship on the Captain and His Officers.

#### FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

37. We Observe that no further Progress is made in Erecting Moco Moco Factory House than in providing Bricks and Chunam Informing Us of the want of Hands to carry on the Work. In Reply thereto a Supply of Slaves will be forwarded on this Ship from S<sup>t</sup>. Helena in case they can be spared as We have reason to think they may by the Advices before Us and a further Number may have reached You from Bombay before now pursuant to Orders thither besides all which Cap<sup>t</sup>. Cobham will be Ordered to bring You Slaves from Madagascar as beforementioned.



38. In Consultation the 11<sup>th</sup>. August Fifty Two Thousand Five hundred Tyles were bought of Captain Birkhead at Sixteen Dollars a thousand which is very near a Penny a piece, We are apt to think that such of Our Slaves as are growing in Years might be employed in making them.

39. As the Arabs lost their all in the late Fire and Exerted themselves to Extinguish it We cannot but approve of the One hundred Dollars distributed among them upon such a melancholy Occasion.

40. The Account of Charges for two Years was not sent in the Packet as We desired ~~of~~ Lyell nor any Pay Masters Accounts later than July the Scarborough should have brought them to the last of December, the Whole Charge of the Coast by the last Books appears to be near the same as usual. In our Letter by the Queen Caroline, We recommended Savings wherever it could prudently be done, no answer or Notice is taken thereof in the Advices before Us.

#### SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, OFFICERS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

41. We Observe two Monthly Writers, William Burton and Thomas Joy are constantly Charged as having each an allowance of Ten Dollars a Month, notwithstanding the plentiful Supply of Covenant Servants, We can see no reason for putting Us to that Expence and therefore send them home by the first Conveyance as they had not Our leave for coming out.

42. It is very extraordinary that those Monthly Writers should be employed as you inform Us of having servants enough to carry on Our Business upon granting M<sup>r</sup>. Fitzhugh leave to come home.

43. We are at Eight Pounds Charge for every Factor or Writer sent out that Sum being paid to the Owners on Account of their Passage so that in case any of them should take it in their Heads to return to England before their Covenanted time is expired as M<sup>r</sup>. Fitzhugh did all such must repay into our Cash to that Amount before their Departure and deliver up the Counterpart of their Covenants under Our Seal which must be returned to Us.

44. Last Year an Enquiry was Ordered to be made into the Deficiency of the Stores in M<sup>r</sup>. John Savages Custody and We don't think proper to give any Directions upon that head till We have an Answer it appearing by the Account Current Transmitted to Us that His Debt exclusive of the said Stores is not yet fully Discharged into Our Cash.

45. The frequent Murthers of Englishmen by Coffrees give Us great Concern, We are apprehensive that Provocations are too often the cause by Invading their Property in some Shape or other or by undue severitys which You must take due Cognizance of and not suffer Our Servants or others to do them any Injustice whatever.

46. It should have been Entered upon Consultation when the Writers become of Age were sworn and You must make it a Rule in future.

47. We have sent fresh Recruits for Our Garrison by every Ship and shall endeavour to procure a Number if possible to come by this conveyance.

48. Your appointing M<sup>r</sup>. Stirling Factor to be Lieutenant on a Vacancy by Lieutenants Hornes Death We cannot but suppose must be done more out of Favour than from his real Merit, he was but a very Young Man and as to his being Brought up in the Military here We very much doubt whether he was ever an Officer besides it is a Discouragement to the Ensigns who if deserving and have served well for a Course of Years ought to succeed as a Reward in order to Encourage others to a like good Behaviour.

49. M<sup>r</sup>. Stirlings Commission must be taken from him and the Oldest Ensign if deserving be appointed Lieutenant in his Room and as to M<sup>r</sup>. Stirling, You may appoint him Youngest Ensign or he may return into his former Station of Factor.

50. As the Deputy Governour Exchanged an able Coffree for Black John We acquiesce therein.

51. Our Chaplain must send in the Packet by each Ship an Attested List of all Marriages, Births Christenings, Deaths and Burials in a Correct manner taking care that the Names are right spelt.

52. By Writing Your Books in Sections there is a needless Wast of One Sheet of Paper to each Section that method is peculiar to Your Settlement and therefore must not be continued.

53. The List of Books must be sent separate from the List of Papers in the Packet.

54. Our Servants should not be suffered to run in debt M<sup>r</sup>. Edmund Edlyne acknowledged himself indebted to M<sup>r</sup>. Hodgkins Three hundred and Fifty five Dollars in Consultation 15<sup>th</sup>. June, he must see and Discharge it and when all Accounts are adjusted His Credit must be wrote off without delay to Account Current Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George together with M<sup>r</sup>. Jordens and all other Deceased Persons that so the Legal Claimers may be paid who are always very pressing to Us for the Money.

55. Inform Us which of the Young Men make any Progress in Learning the Mallay Language pursuant to Our Recommendations  $\wp$  George, by a Consultation Entry the 30<sup>th</sup>. June We observe, M<sup>r</sup>. Walter Churchey in Two Years had made himself Master of it so that by Application We are persuaded it might become more General and thereby many Benefits would Accrue both to Us and themselves.

56. It was omitted to Number the Paragraphs in the Letter  $\wp$  Scarborough th $\hat{o}$  several obvious Reasons make it Requisit.

57. We have put on Board this Ship about Fifty Soldiers, but Our Governor and Council of S<sup>t</sup>. Helena are permitted to take on shore such a Number of them as they shall Judge proper for Strengthening Our Garrison at that Island, an Exact List of such as remain on Board will be forwarded from thence.

58. Mess<sup>rs</sup>. Hurlock and Wheeler sent to Borneo for Transacting Our Affairs there We perceive both took Passage on the Galatea before the Marlborough's Departure whereby in case the former miscarried not One of Our Servants would be ou the Spot to manage Our Business, You seem to have been sensible of the liableness to such an Inconvenience by Empowering Captain Smith to Act for Us but the right Method was to have sent an able, capable Covenant Servant after them on Board the Marlborough, the setting out wrong at first may be attended with bad Consequences, the Captain knew little of the Mallays or their Customs, You had no hint from Us that he shoul'd be Employed besides his absence from the Ship would thereby be Requisit alth $\hat{o}$  Our Commanders Presence on Board is more especially Requisit at such a place as Benjar, On the whole One of the Senior Council might on so Important an Occasion and should have been Pitched upon to Conduct Our Affairs in the best manner.

59. You must always mention in the List of Covenant Servants the Business that each is Employed about if any of them doe nothing say so, that We may give the proper Orders respecting such Cumberers, three of them stand as so many Cyphers in the List before Us, let this matter be cleared up in Your next by Informing Us whether the same was an Omission only or the case is really such as it is Represented.

60. The Mother of Isaac Lovett a Soldier at Your Place having Requested his Discharge, and upon Examination finding that his Contracted Time is Expired, on His applying for the same, You must Grant him a Discharge accordingly, but Effectual care must be taken that none of the Military Desert on Board Our Ships as hath been the case more than once before they have served out their Time, causing a strict Examination on Board just before the Ships Departure by One of the Council and a Military Officer going on Board for that purpose.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH, DATED 2<sup>ND</sup>. APRIL 1740. PER EDGBASTON.  
[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 44, pages 58-62.*]

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOR AND  
COUNCIL AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. We wrote to You at large under the Established Heads the 2<sup>d</sup>. of January last, by Our Ship Bedford and she sailed from Portsmouth the 14<sup>th</sup>. February. Copy of Our said Letter is Enclosed.

2. This Comes *via* Bengal by Our Ship Hardwicke Burthen 495 Tons Captain John Hallett Commander the Charterparty will be forwarded to You in the President and Council's Packet from thence, who will also give You the needfull Information as to the Cargo put on Board upon Our Account which We have Ordered shall Consist of Three hundred Tons Salt Petre and Sixty Tons of Redwood with such Stores, Patna, Ophium and other articles as Our Governour and Council at Fort St. George or You may have Informed them will be of Service or Turn to Account on the West Coast.

3. They are also Directed to put on Board the Hardwicke Two or Three hundred Bales of Course Piece Goods for Europe if they can spare them as was done upon the Compton, on their so doing the said Bales must be Continued on Board and Consigned to Us as part of her homeward Cargo.

4. We have Consigned to You on the Hardwicke Five Chests of Treasure as  $\text{f}$  Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed in her Packet.

5. This comes also by Our Ship Edgbaston Burthen 495 Tons Captain Stephen Cobham Commander who has Orders to call at Madagascar and there to purchase One hundred and Fifty Slaves or more We having put on Board a proper Cargo for that purpose.

6. Upon the said Ships Arrival at Fort Marlborough the Slaves are to be Delivered to You with such part of the said Cargo as is not Disposed of at Madagascar together with the Provisions laid in there for the Slaves Use in the Passage that are not Expended as  $\text{f}$  Copy of the Instructions upon those Heads enclosed.

7. The said Slaves must be constantly Employed about Our necessary Business in carrying on the Building of Moco Factory House, Garbling Our Pepper and the like. We positively forbid any of them being Diverted therefrom as Menial Servants to You or others, they must be Used well, suffer no One to be cruell over them, see that a due Allowance in Rice and other Provisions is Weekly or Daily Distributed for their Comfortable subsistence Proper Habitations to dwell in must be Allowed and such Raiment as is needfull Provided for them.

8. Agreeable to what We wrote in Our last the Edgbaston must be sent from Your Place without loss of time to Benjar in case You have reason to conclude that a Loading of Pepper is procurable there Acting therein Conformable to Our Instructions at large by the Ships Marlborough and Duke.
9. But if a Stop is put to Our Trade at Borneo and there is no Prospect of Renewing the same Our Directions by the Bedford must be duly Complied with by Dispatching the First of the Two Ships that arrives with You the Bedford or Edgbaston to Bengal and the other Home to Us, forwarding Copy of the Ships Charterparty that is sent to Bengal in Your Packet thither.
10. On sending the Edgbaston to Benjar or Dispatching her to Us You must put on Board what Salt Petre You can spare upon the Terms Stipulated in Charterparty and You must do the same as to the Bedford and Hardwicke.
11. The Commanders of Our Ships bound Your Way have Borrowed of Us at Respondentia the sums mentioned in the List of the Packet. In case they offer to Pay any Money into Our Cash in part of their Outward bound Adventure or their Respondentia Bonds You must receive the same granting Certificates for the Amount on their making Oath that they neither have taken up nor will take up any Money in India to Trade with in the Room thereof, In case of their Death You must see that their Effects are not Embezled they being Assigned over to Us as a Security for the same.
12. Captain Cobham is Ordered as  $\text{¶}$  Copy of his Instructions Enclosed to make Enquiry at Madagascar for Our Ship Sussex and the Sixteen Brave Men that Remained in her on his Meeting with Success and Bringing the Ship or Men to Bencoolen the latter must be most kindly Used and You must do the best You can for Us as to the Ship in sending her home if possible.
13. By Your putting on Board the Ship Queen Caroline no more than the Exact Charterparty Tonnage, the Pepper brought home fell short thereof near Thirteen Ton, which We have Judged reasonable to allow the Owners for as so much Dead Freight the Wastage being no more than Usual.
14. We Direct therefore that for the future both at your Place and Borneo there be Loaden on every Ship so much more Pepper if possible than the Charterparty Tonnage as will make up the usual Deficiency which is Four  $\text{¶}$  Cent on the Quantity Laden at least, and on having sufficient Pepper on hand Our Ships must be filled as full as they can hold.
15. Enclosed is a Letter under Our Seal to Tamjeed Alha Sultan of Benjar in Answer to One received from him by Cap<sup>t</sup>. Pelly as  $\text{¶}$  Copy of the Translate Enclos'd.
16. Upon the Edgbastons Proceeding thither We direct that Our said Letter with a Translate accompanying the same be delivered to him or to the Sultan for the time being, by Our Servants to whom the care of Our Affairs there are committed together with the Two Large Guns, Gunpowder and Shott therein mentioned which We have sent as a Present to the Said Sultan and for Our Satisfaction Our said Satisfaction Our said Servants must obtain an Acknowledgment from the Sultan that he hath received them with an attested Translate of the same.
17. You must Transmit to Us by the first Opportunity a Copy of the Diary and Account Current kept by the Captain and Chief Mate for the Slaving at Madagascar and Inform Us in a particular manner whether every thing has been regularly and justly Accounted for by them.
18. We have Entertained Mess<sup>rs</sup>. John Massey and John Rowles Factors and Richard Gripton and Robert Wadman Writers upon Your Establishment, You must keep them and all Our other Servants close to Our Business and Encourage the most Deserving among them.
19. M<sup>r</sup>. James Welsh is Entertained as Surgeons Assistant at Your Place at Twenty Pounds  $\text{¶}$  Annum and Fifteen Dollars a Month to commence on his Arrival he has Contracted to Serve Us Five Years upon those Terms,

20. In Case John Brown a Soldier at Your Place has served his contracted Time and is desirous of a discharge you must Grant him one accordingly.

21. You must enquire in Consultation of Our Servants and other Passengers on board of Our Ships whether the Commanders have Used them well in the Voyage and Complied in all Respects with their Agreement Minuting their Reply for Our Notice.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HIGHNESS.

We the United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies send Greeting and embrace this first Opportunity to acknowledge the Receipt of Your Letter by Captain Pelly M<sup>r</sup>. Lyell and M<sup>r</sup>. Hodgson who have fully acquainted Us of Your Highness's Kind and Courteous Treatment for which We return You Our most Hearty Thanks, and from thence We persuade Ourselves that Our Three-Ships Marlborough, Walpole and Duke met with the like Favourable Reception.

We are most earnestly desirous of continuing a commerce with Your Dominions, and cultivating a strict Lasting Friendship with Your Highness and We have ordered Our Governour and Council of Fort Marlborough to send Our Ship Edgbaston Captain Stephen Cobham Commander to Benjar for a Loading of Pepper, We desire Your Highness will cause the Great Men and Merchants to Trade with Us upon the same terms as the Hollanders, and that Quick Dispatch may be given to Our Ships.

By this Conveyance We send You according to Your Highness desire Two of the Largest Guns procurable being Two and Thirty Pounders, with some Gun Powder and Shott, which We Present to Your Highness as a Free Gift, and beg You will please to accept of them as a Token of Our Affection, assuring You that so long as Pepper is procurable at Benjar upon Moderate Reasonable Terms We shall carry on a Trade with Your Territorys.

Our Sincere and Hearty Prayer is that God Almighty will always bless you with Health and Happiness as also Establish a Lasting Friendship between us.

In Witness whereof We affix Our Great Seal this Twenty Seventh day of the Month of March in the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Seven hundred & forty.

HON<sup>RS</sup>. SIRS

When an Evil is felt, it naturally produces an uneasiness which breaks out into a Complaint such being my situation at this time, I humbly presume to lay the foundation thereof before your Honours hoping for a favourable Construction since it proceeds from no manner of Pique or disaffection to the Person of M<sup>r</sup>. Lennox Your Deputy Governour of Bencoolen, but really from the hardships I received from him during my stay there, when I was disappointed from reaping the fruits of my Labour and Industry.

This being premised Your Honours will please to forgive me if I acquaint you that on my Arrival at Fort Marlborough my son and I offered our Goods (which We had bought at Madrass and Bengal for the Bencoolen Market) to the Black Merchants for Sale, which M<sup>r</sup>. Lennox coming to the knowledge of, he exemplified his ungenerous Actions by forbidding Us selling our Private Trade and even found out Methods to Intimidate, and hinder the Men of Worth from coming to purchase them, this procedure laid me under an indispensible necessity of bringing them to England and must in all appearance Involve Us both in many Difficultys and Inconveniencys, and as a stop cannot be put to such a Conduct which in him appeared inflexible but from Your Honours immediate Interposition, is the true and only motive of my laying this Representation before you, to pass such a Judgement thereon, as to Your Honours great Wisdom shall seem most meet being at all times and Seasons with the profoundest Respect

EXTRACT OF THE COMPANY'S GENERAL LETTER TO BOMBAY DATED THE 2<sup>d</sup>. AUGUST 1739  
BY THE ROYAL GUARDIAN WHEREIN AN ACCOUNT IS GIVEN OF  
SHIPS ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE.

The Haeslingfield saild out of the Downes on the 11<sup>th</sup>. of March, the Prince William Warwick, Lynn, Houghton, Normanton, Grantham and Somerset did not sail from Portsmouth 'till the same day the Augusta saild from the Downes the first of March.

Captain Cooke has advis'd Us that the Haeslingfield got to S<sup>t</sup>. Jago the 6<sup>th</sup>. April and he designd to sail thence the 10<sup>th</sup>. of that Month.

The Warwick and Somersett were in Latitude of 6. 30 North on the 11<sup>th</sup>. April, they parted from the other Ships in the Latitude 44.

Since Our last it hath pleased God to return the Ship Hallifax on the 6<sup>th</sup>. and the Wilmington the 8<sup>th</sup>. April by the latter We receivd the Advices from your Place dated the 22<sup>th</sup>. and 25<sup>th</sup>. Febr<sup>y</sup>. 1737. Our Ship Queen Caroline arriv'd the 14<sup>th</sup>. May the Lyell and Royal George on the 2<sup>d</sup>. June, Beaufort and King William on the 9<sup>th</sup>. June, by which last Ship We receiv'd the Advice from Our late President and Council of the 8<sup>th</sup>. September 1738 and the Onslow brought us the 18<sup>th</sup>. June their Letters of the 30<sup>th</sup>. November 2<sup>d</sup>. and 6<sup>th</sup>. December last. The Prince of Wales, London, Prince of Orange Princess Royal and Godolphin arrived the 12<sup>th</sup>. July having left S<sup>t</sup>. Helena the 16<sup>th</sup>. May, at which time none of Our other Ships were at that Island.

We dispatchd the Duke Cap<sup>t</sup>. Thomas Hindman Commander to Bencoolen the 23<sup>th</sup>. May last and she saild the 25<sup>th</sup>. of that month with Orders to be sent from thence to Benjar for a Loading of Pepper and We have Great Reason to expect Success Our Supra Cargo's of Ship Prince of Wales having open'd a Trade there.

However We have thought it necessary in case by any Turn of Affairs a Cargo is not procurable at Borneo to direct Our Deputy Governour and Council of Fort Marlborough to consign the Ship Duke to Our Chief and Council of Tellicherry in order to be dispatchd home from thence, We having given the needfull Orders to Tellicherry for that purpose as  $\text{\textcircled{P}}$  Copy of Our Letter enclosed.

PARAGRAPHS IN THE COMPANYS GENERAL LETTER TO BENGAL  $\text{\textcircled{P}}$  PRINCESS LOUISA, HARDWICKE, AND DURRINGTON RELATING TO THE COAST AND BAY TONNAGE NOW SENT.

52. On considering that Three Thousand Two Hundred Ton of Goods, besides Surplus Tonnage, were returned to Us from Madrass and Bengal last Season, and you wished for another Ship to take off the Goods in Warehouse, and the Salt Petre that We have Order'd to be put aboard of each Ship, over and above their Kintlage, as also the Tonnage now consigned to the Coast and Bay, to be loaden home from thence, being no more than Two Thousand nine Hundred and Seventy Tons, We judge it proper to Direct that after you have filled up our Ships directly home with Goods at half Freight as ordered in the 12<sup>th</sup>. Paragraph of our last Letter, in case you have not Tonnage sufficient upon hand for the Goods provided, in compliance with our Orders of Investment, that a number of Bales of piece Goods, be put on board each of our Ships, Prince William, and Princess Louisa in part of their Cargoes for Europe, in the same manner as We have Ordered with respect to the Hardwicke.

53. In case it should so happen (which God forbid) that either of the Six Coast and Bay Ships should Miscary, the Prince William must be dispatched home directly to Us from Your Place, And thus Provision is made as far as in Us lies, that Goods may not lye in Warehouse a whole Season. We have imparted these our Orders to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George and Bombay, for our Servants Notice and Guidance at those Presidencys.

COPY OF TWO PARAGRAPHS IN THE GENERAL LETTER TO BENGAL SENT  $\text{\textcircled{P}}$  PRINCESS WALES AND WILMINGTON.

Par<sup>a</sup>. 20. We have sent Directions to Bencoolen that in case an entire Stop is put to our Trade with Borneo, and they have no reason to think that it can be revived, and are not able to Load home the Bedford Edgbaston and Hardwick with the Salt Petre on hand and what they may expect by the Hardwick; In that case the first Ship of the Two (Bedford and Edgbaston) that arrives at Bencoolen is to be sent without loss of time to Bengal, and on their so doing you must load home the said Ship to Us from your place.

24. We have appointed the Hallifax for Bombay, Captain Blake is to relieve Cap<sup>t</sup>. Langworth as Commodore, and after the Easterly Monsoon is over the Hallifax will be sent to Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George, and your place with Pepper if it can be spread in order to be Shot loose on our several returning Ships at half Freight and otherwise she is to be sent with a Loading of Cotton directly to you, You must return her Early to Bombay with Two hundred Tons of Salt Petre, and Sixty Tons of Redwood, with such Freight as may offer for Surat or proper Goods for that Market, taking care that she is not Loaden too deep and directing the Commander to call in at Tellicherry to Convey the Countrey Ships up the Coast to Bombay staying at Tellicherry only five or six days for that purpose, and on his Arrival there, and at Bombay to Obey all Orders that may be given him by Our President and Council.

We shall also order you some Fine Brown Sannoos to be bleach'd and whitened on your Coast, those you have sent home this year without Conjee, not answering Our Expectation, you must order some to be put in them, but not to be glazed.

But notwithstanding the above Reservation, the *Court of Directors* do hereby, as a further Encouragement, allow each Commander to lay out and invest, in *India*, to the amount of Two Thousand Pounds (Part of the above-mentioned Three Thousand Pounds) reckoning the *Pagoda* at Eight Shillings, and the *Rupee* at Two Shillings and Six Pence, in any of the Commodities so reserved, excepting only such as may be limited or prohibited in their Instructions, and provided each Commander bring no more than Five Hundred Pieces of any Particular Species of Piece Goods, nor the *China Captains* more than half their Three *per Cent.* Privilege, in *Tea*, upon paying the Five *per Cent* Duty, Fifteen *per Cent.* Indulgence, and the usual Warehouse-room, upon the gross Sale thereof at the Candle.

And upon all Exceedings of the beforementioned Allowances, an additional Duty of Thirty *per Cent.* on the gross Sale, shall be paid for the Use of the said Company, except on *Arrack* and *Rattans*, which are to remain on the Terms above stated.

HIS MAJESTY'S  
DECLARATION  
OF WAR AGAINST THE KING OF SPAIN.

GEORGE R

Whereas many unjust Seizures have been made and Depredations carried on for several Years in the *West Indies*, by *Spanish Guarda Costas*, and other Ships acting under the Commission of the King of *Spain*, or his Governors, contrary to the Treaties subsisting between Us and the Crown of *Spain*, and to the Law of Nations, to the great Prejudice of the lawful Trade and Commerce of Our Subjects; and great Cruelties and Barbarities have been exercised on the Persons of divers of Our Subjects, whose Vessels have been so seized, and the *British* Council have been insulted in the most ignominious Manner: And whereas We have caused frequent Complaints to be made to the King of *Spain*, of these violent and unjust Proceedings, but no Satisfaction or Redress has been given for the same, notwithstanding the many Promises made, and Cedula's issued, signed by the said King, or by his Order, for that Purpose. And whereas the Evils abovementioned have been principally occasioned by an unwarrantable Claim and Pretension set up on the Part of *Spain*, that the *Guarda Costas*, and other Ships authorized by the King of *Spain*, may stop, detain, and search Ships and Vessels of Our Subjects navigating in the *American* Seas, contrary to the Liberty of Navigation, to which Our Subjects have not only an equal Right with those of the King of *Spain*, by the Law of Nations, but which is moreover expressly acknowledged and declared to belong to them by the most solemn Treaties and particularly by that concluded in the Year One thousand six hundred and seventy. And whereas the said groundless Claim and Pretention and the unjust Practice of stopping, detaining, and searching Ships and Vessels navigating in the Seas of *America* is not only of the most dangerous and destructive Consequence to the lawful Commerce of Our Subjects, but also tends to interrupt and obstruct the free Intercourse and Correspondence between Our Dominions in *Europe*, and Our Colonies and Plantations in *America*, and by Means thereof to deprive Us and Our Subjects of the Benefit of those Colonies and Plantations; a Consideration of the highest Importance to Us and Our Kingdoms, and a Practice which must affect, in its Consequence, all other Princes and States of *Europe*, possessed of Settlements in the *West Indies*, or whose Subjects carry on any Trade thither; And whereas, besides the notorious Grounds of Complaint abovementioned, many other Infractions have been made on the Part of *Spain*, of the several Treaties and Conventions subsisting between Us and that Crown and particularly of that concluded in Year One thousand six hundred and sixty seven as well by the exorbitant Duties, and Impositions laid upon the Trade and Commerce of Our Subjects, as by the Breach of ancient and established Privileges stipulated for them by the said Treaties; for the Redress of which Grievances the strongest Instances have been, from time to time, made by our several Ministers residing in *Spain*, without any Effect: And whereas a Convention for making Reparation to Our Subjects for the Losses sustained by them, on Account of the unjust Seizures and Depredations committed by the *Spaniards* in *America*, and in order to prevent for the future all the Grievances and Causes of Complaint therein taken Notice of, and to remove absolutely, and for ever, everything which might give Occasion thereto was concluded between Us, and the King of *Spain*, on the Fourteenth Day of *January* last, *N.S.* by which Convention it was stipulated, that a certain Sum of Money should be paid at *London*, within a Term therein specified, as a Balance admitted to be due on the Part of *Spain*, to the Crown and Subjects of *Great Britain*; which Term expired on the Twenty fifth Day of *May* last, and the Payment of the said Sum was not made according to the Stipulation for that Purpose by which Means the Convention abovementioned was manifestly violated and broken by the King of *Spain*, and Our Subjects remained without any Satisfaction or Reparation for the many grievous Losses sustained by them; and the Methods agreed upon by the said Convention in order to the obtaining future Security for the Trade and Navigation of Our Subjects, are, contrary to good Faith frustrated and defeated; in Consequence of which, We found Ourselves obliged

for vindicating the Honour of Our Crown, and for procuring Reparation, and Satisfaction of Our injured Subjects, to order, that general Reprisals should be granted against the King of *Spain*, his Vassals, and Subjects, and their Ships, Goods, and Effects: And whereas the Court of *Spain* has been induced to colour the open Violation of the Convention aforesaid, by Reasons and Pretences, which are void of all Foundation; and, at the same Time, has not only published an Order, signed by the King, for seizing the Ships, Goods, and Effects belonging to Us, and Our Subjects, wherever they shall be met with, but has caused Seizures to be actually made of the Goods and Effects of Our Subjects, residing in his Dominions, and has also ordered Our said Subjects to depart out of the *Spanish* Dominions, within a short limited Time, contrary to the express Stipulations of the Treaties between the Two Crowns, even in case of a War actually declared; We have taken into our Royal and most serious Consideration these Injuries, which have been offered to Us, and Our Subjects, and the manifest Violation of the several Treaties subsisting between the Two Crowns, all which have been in many Particulars eluded, or evaded, by the unwarrantable Behaviour of the Court of *Spain* and their Officers, notwithstanding the repeated Instances, We have given of Our Desire to cultivate a good Understanding with the King of *Spain*, and the essential Proofs of Our Friendship and Regard for him and his Family; which We have demonstrated to all the World; and being fully satisfied, that the Honour of Our Crown, the Interest of Our Subjects, and that Regard which ought to be had to the most solemn Treaties, call upon Us to make use of the Power which God has given Us, for vindicating Our undoubted Rights, and securing to Our loving Subjects the Privileges of Navigation and Commerce to which they are justly intitled; We therefore, relying on the Help of Almighty God, who knows the Uprightness of Our Intentions, have thought fit to declare, and do hereby declare War against the said King of Spain; and We will, in pursuance of such Declaration, vigorously prosecute the said War, being assured of the ready Concurrence and Assistance of all Our loving Subjects in so just a Cause, wherein the Honour of Our Crown, the Maintenance of Our Solemn Treaties and the Trade and Navigation of our Subjects (which are so essential to the Welfare and Prosperity of this Nation, and which We are determined, at all Times, with Our utmost Power to preserve and support) are so greatly concerned; And we do hereby will and require Our Generals and Commanders of Our Forces, Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of *Great Britain*, Our Lieutenants of Our several Counties, Governors of Our Forts and Garisons, and all other officers and soldiers under them, by Sea and Land, to do, and execute all Acts of Hostility in the Prosecution of this War against the said King of *Spain*, his Vassals, and Subjects, and to oppose their Attempts; and We do hereby command, as Well Our own subjects, as advertise all other Persons, of what Nation soever, not to transport, or carry any Soldiers, Arms, Powder, Ammunition, or other contraband Goods, to any of the Territories, Lands, Plantations, or Countries of the said King of Spain; declaring, that whatsoever Ship or Vessel shall be met withal, transporting or carrying any Soldiers, Arms, Powder, Ammunition, or other contraband Goods to any of the Territories, Lands, Plantations, or Countries of the said King of *Spain*, the same being taken, shall be condemned as good and lawful Prize.

Given at Our Court at *Kensington* the Nineteenth Day of *October* 1739, in the Thirteenth Year of Our Reign.

Convention between the Crowns of *Great Britain and Spain*, concluded at the *Pardo* on the 14th of *January 1739, N.S.*

Comme il s'est élevé depuis quelques Années des Differends entre les deux Couronnes de la *Grande Bretagne* et d'*Espagne*, par raport à la Visite, Recherche, et Prises de Vaisseaux, Saisies d'Effets, Reglement des Limites, et autres Grieffs allegués de part et d'autre, tant aux *Indes Occidentales* qu'ailleurs, lesquels Differends sont si graves et de telle Nature, que si on ne prenoit pas soin de les etouffer pour le present entrièrément, et de les prevenir pour l'avenir, ils pourroient faire naitre une Rupture ouverte entre les dites Couronnes; C'est pourquoy sa Majeste le Roy de la *Grande Bretagne*, et sa Majesté le Roy d'*Espagne*, n'ayant rien tant a Cœur que de continuer et affermir la bonne Correspondance qui a si heureusement subsisté, ont trouvé convenable de munir de leurs Pleinpouvoirs, favoir, *S.M.B.* le Sieur *Benjamin Keene*, son Ministre Plenipotenciaire auprès de *S.M.C.*; & *S.M.C.* le Sieur *Sebastien de la Quadra*, Chevalier de l'Ordre de *St. Jacques*, Conseiller d'Etat, et premier Secretaire d'Etat et des Depeches; Lesquels après l'Exhibition prealable de leurs Pleinpouvoirs, ayant conferé ensemble, sont convenus des Articles suivants.

Como las Diferencias movidas de algunos Años à esta parte entre las dos Coronas de la *Gran Bretaña* y de *España*, a causa de la Visita, Fondeo, y Presas de Vageles, Embargos de Efectos, Descripcion de Limites, y otros Perjuizios alegados por una y otra parte, asi en las *Indias Occidentales*, como en otras Partes, son tan graves y de tal naturaliza, que sinó se procurase atajarlas enteramente aora, y precaucionar el que no se repitan en lo futuro, podrian originar un entero Rompimiento entre las enunciadas Coronas; su Magestad el Rey de la *Gran Bretaña*, y su Magestad el Rey de *España* no deseando tanto otra alguna cosa, como continuar y fortalecer la buena Corespondencia que tan felizmente ha subsistido, han considerado por conveniente el autorizar con sus plenos Poderes, es à saber, *S.M.B.* à *Don Benjamin Keene*, su Ministro Plenipotenciario cerca de *S.M.C.*; y *S.M.C.* à *Don Sebastian de la Quadra*, Cavallero del Orden de *Santiago*, Consejero de Estado, y primer Secretario de Estado y del Despacho; losquales despues de haver exhibiso ante todas cosas sus Plenos Poderes, y conferenciado juntos convinieron en los Articulos siguientes.

*Whereas Differences have arisen, of late Year, between the two Crowns of Great Britain and Spain, on account of the Visiting Searching, and Taking of Vessels, the Seizing of Effects the Regulating of Limits, and other Grievances alledged on each side, as well in the West Indies, as elsewhere; which Differences are so serious, and of such a Nature, that if Care be not taken to put an entire Stop to them for the present, and to prevent them for the future, they might occasion an open Rupture between the said Crowns: For this Reason His Majesty the King of Great Britain, and His Majesty the King of Spain, having nothing so much at Heart as to preserve and corroborate the good Correspondence which has so happily subsisted, have thought proper to grant their Full Powers, Viz., his Britannick Majesty to Benjamin Keene, Esq; his Minister Plenipotentiary to his Catholick Majesty, and his Catholick Majesty to Don Sebastian de la Quadra Knight of the Order of St. James, Councillor of State, and First Secretary of State and of the Dispatches; who after previously producing their Full Powers, having conferred together, have agreed upon the following Articles.*

*Article I.*

Comme cette ancienne Amitié si desirable et si necessaire pour l'Interest reciproque des deux Nations, et particulièrement par raport à leur Commerce, ne peut être établie sur un Fondement durable, à moins qu'on ne prenne non seulement soin d'ajuster et regler les Pretensions pour la Reparation reciproque des Dommages déjà soufferts, mais sur tout de trouver moyen de prevenir pareils Sujets de Plainte pour l'avenir, et décarter absolument; et pour toujours, tout ce qui pourroit y donner Occasion; on est convenu de travailler incessamment, avec toute l'Application et la Diligence imaginable, pour parvenir à un but si desirable; Et pour cet effet, il sera nommé de la part de leurs Majestés *Britannique* et *Catholique* respectivement, d'abord après la Signature de la presente Convention, deux Ministres Plenipotentiaires, qui s'assembleront à *Madrid*, dans l'espace de six Semaines, à compter du Jour de l'Echange des Ratifications, pour y conferer et regler sinalemment les Pretensions respectives des deux Couronnes, tant par raport au Commerce, et à la Navigation en *Amerique* et en *Europe* et aux Limites de la *Floride*, et de la *Caroline*, que touchant d'autres Points, quirestant aussi à terminer, le tout suivant les Traités des Années 1667, 1670, 1713, 1715, 1721, 1728, et 1729; y compris celui de l'Assiento des Negres, et la Convention de l'An 1716, et on est convenu aussi, que les Plenipotentiaires, ainsi nommés, commenceront leurs Conférences six Semaines après l'Echange des Ratifications, et les finiront dans le Terme de huit Mois.

*Artículo I.*

Como esta antiga Amistad tan apeteçible y necesaria para el Interes reciproco de las dos Naciones, y particularmente para su Comercio, no puede establecerse con un fundamento durable, à menos que no se procure no solo ajustar y regler las Pretensiones para la Reparacion reciproca de los Danos ya padecidos, sino hallar principalmente un Medio de obviar semejantes Motivos de Queixa para en adelante, y apartar absolutamente, y para siempre todo lo que puede darle; se ha convenido en trabajar incesantemente, contoda la aplicacion y diligencia imaginable, para llegar à un sin tan apeteçible, y à este, efecto se nombrarán respectivamente por parte de sus Magestades *Britanica* y *Catholica*, inmediatamente despues de haver firmado la presente Convencion, dos Ministros Plenipotenciarios que se juntarán en *Madrid* dentro del termino de seis semanas, quehan de contarse desde el Dia de el Cange de las Ratificaciones, para conferir y regler enteramente las Pretensiones respectivas de las dos Coronas, asipor lo que mira al Comercio y Navegacion en *America* y *Europa* y à los Limites de la *Florida* y *Carolina*, como por lo tocante à otros Puntos que piden tambien Determinacion, todo segun los Tratados de los Anos de 1667, 1670, 1713, 1715, 1721, 1728, y 1729, incluso el de el Assiento de Negros, y la Convencion de el Año de 1716, y se ha convenido assimismo en que los Plenipotenciarios asinombados, comenzarán sus Conferencias seis semanas despues del Cange de las Ratificaciones, y las finalizarán en el termino de ocho mezes.

*Article I.*

Whereas the ancient Friendship, so desirable and so necessary for the reciprocal Interest of both Nations, and particularly with regard to their Commerce, cannot be established upon a lasting Foundation, unless Care be taken, not only to adjust and regulate the Pretensions for reciprocal Reparation of the Damages already sustained, but above all to find out Means to prevent the like causes of Complaint for the future, and to remove absolutely, and for ever, everything which might give Occasion thereto; It is agreed to labour immediately, with all imaginable Application and Diligence, to attain so desirable an End; and for that Purpose there shall be named on the Part of their Britannick and Catholick Majesties respectively, immediately after the signing of the present Convention, two Ministers Plenipotentiaries, who shall meet at Madrid within the Space of six Weeks, to be reckoned from the Day of the Exchange of the Ratifications, there to confer, and finally regulate the respective Pretensions of the two Crowns, as well with relation to the Trade and Navigation in America and Europe, and to the Limits of Florida and of Carolina, as concerning other Points, which remain likewise to be adjusted; the whole according to the Treaties of the Years 1667, 1670, 1713, 1715, 1721, 1728, and 1729, including That of the Assiento of the Negroes, and the Convention of 1716; and it is also agreed, that the Plenipotentiaries, so named, shall begin their Conferences six Weeks after the Exchange of the Ratifications, and shall finish them within the Space of eight Months.

*Article II.*

*Artículo II.*

*Article II.*

*The Regulation of the Limits of Florida and of Carolina, which according to what has been lately agreed, was to be decided by Commissaries on each side, shall likewise be committed to the said Plenipotentiaries, to procure a more solid and effectual Agreement; and during the Time that the Discussion of that Affair shall last. Things shall remain in the aforesaid Territories of Florida and of Carolina in the Situation they are in at present, without increasing the Fortifications there, or taking any new Posts; And for this Purpose, his Britannick Majesty and his Catholick Majesty shall cause the necessary Orders to be dispatched immediately after the signing of this Convention.*

*Article III.*

*After having duly considered the Demands and Pretensions of the two Crowns, and of their respective Subjects, for Reparation of the Damages sustained on each Side, and all Circumstances which relate to this important Affair; It is agreed, that his Catholick Majesty shall cause to be paid to his Britannick Majesty the Sum of Ninety five thousand Pounds Sterling for a Balance, which has been admitted as due to the Crown and the Subjects of Great Britain, after Deduction made of the Demands of the Crown and Subjects of Spain; to the End that the abovementioned Sum together with the Amount of what has been acknowledged on the Part of Great Britain to be due to Spain on her Demands, may be employed by his Britannick Majesty for the Satisfaction, Discharge, and Payment of the Demands of His Subjects upon the Crown of Spain; It being understood nevertheless, That it shall not be pretended, that this reciprocal Discharge extends, or relates to the Accounts and Differences, which subsist, or are to be settled between the Crown of Spain and the Company of the Assiento of Negros, nor to any particular or private Contracts that may subsist between either of the two Crowns, or*

And whereas we have nothing so much at Heart, as to take Care, by settling the Rights, on each Side, according to the Tenour of the Treaties, and by removing, as much as can be done, all Cause of Complaint for the future, to establish and reserve, for ever, the Friendship that has subsisted between Us and the King of Spain; and whereas the aforesaid King of Spain has declared, That he will willingly concert with us the proper Measures for attaining so desirable an End: Know ye therefore that we reposing special Trust, in the Fidelity, Prudence, Integrity and Diligence of our Trusty and Well beloved Benjamin Keene, Esq., our Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of the aforesaid Catholick King, have nominated, made, and appointed the said Benjamin Keene, as We do, by these Presents, nominate, make and appoint him our true, certain and undoubted Commissioner, Procurator and Plenipotentiary, giving and granting to him, all, and all manner of Faculty, Power and Authority, together with general as well as special Order, (so as the general do not derogate from the special, and so on the contrary) to meet, treat, confer and conclude for Us, and in Our Name, with the Minister or Ministers furnish with sufficient Power on the Part of Our Good Brother the Catholick King, of and upon such Treaty, or Treaties, Conventiõ, or Conventions, as may most conduce to the above-mentioned Purposes, as also upon Articles, whether secret or separate; and lastly, upon all things which shall seem most proper for promoting and perfecting the said Work; And in our Name to sign, and mutually to deliver, and receive, what shall be so concluded and agreed, and to do and perform all other things necessary to be done, in as ample Manner and Form, as We Ourselves, were We present, would do and perform engaging and promising on Our Royal Word, that Whatever shall be concluded by our said Commissioner, Procurator, and Plenipotentiary, We will ratify, approve, and accept it all in the best Manner, and that We will never suffer any Person to violate the same in the Whole, or in Part, or to act contrary thereto. Whereas many and repeated Depredations have been committed, and many unjust Seizures have been made in the West-Indies and elsewhere, by Spanish Guarda Costas and Ships acting under the Commissions of the King of Spain or his Governors, contrary to the Law of Nations, and in Violation of the Treaties subsisting between the Crown of Great Britain and Spain, whereby his Majesty's trading Subjects have not only sustained great Losses but have also suffered in their Persons by the Cruelties and Barbarities which have been exercised by the said Spanish Guarda Costas: And whereas his Majesty has caused repeated Instances and Representations to be made from Time to Time at the Court of Spain, in order to obtain Redress and Satisfaction for such injurious Treatment and unjust Practices, and to prevent the like Violences for the future: And whereas a Convention for making Reparation to his Majesty's Subjects for their Losses by the said Depredations and Seizures, was concluded between his Majesty and the King of Spain on the Fourteenth Day of January last N.<sup>o</sup>. by which Convention it was stipulated, that a certain Sum of Money should be paid at London within a Term in the said Convention specified, as a Ballance admitted to be due on the Part of Spain to the Crown and Subjects of Great Britain, which Term did expire on the Twenty Fifth Day of May last; and the Payment of the said stipulated Sum, as agreed by the above mentioned Convention, has not been made, by which means the said Convention has been violated and broke on the Part of the Crown of Spain, and his Majesty's Subjects remain without any Reparation or Satisfaction for their many, great, and grievous Losses; His Majesty hath therefore taken this injurious Proceeding of the Crown of Spain into his serious Consideration, and his Majesty having determin'd to take such Measures as are necessary for vindicating the Honour of his Crown, and for procuring Reparation and Satisfaction to his injured Subjects, is pleased by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is

hereby order'd, that general Reprizals be granted against the Ships' Goods, and Subjects of the King of Spain, so that as well his Majesty's Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned by Letters of Marque or general Reprizals, or otherwise by his Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to the King of Spain or his Subjects, or others inhabiting within any the Territories of the King of Spain, and bring the same to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within his Majesty's Dominions; and to that end his Majesty's Advocate General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to his Majesty at this Board, authorizing the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprizal to any of his Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that behalf, for the apprehending seizing and taking the Ships, Vessels and Goods belonging to Spain, and the Vassals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or any Inhabiting within his Countries, Territories or Dominions; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual and are according to former Precedents: And his Majesty's said Advocate General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and present the same to his Majesty at this Board, authorizing the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to Will and Require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within his Majesty's Dominions, to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes and Reprizals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be taken, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty, and the

Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels and Goods as shall belong to Spain, or the Vassals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or to any others inhabiting within any of his Countries, Territories, and Dominions, and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents: Any they are likewise to prepare and lay before his Majesty at this Board, a Draught of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the Courts of Admiralty in his Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Draught of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes of aforementioned. PROVIDED also and it is hereby Agreed that if at the Request or with the Consent of the Commander of this Ship, any Pepper, cowries or Turmerick shall be shott loose in the Hold, it shall be accounted and paid for at half Freight and no more in which case the said shott Goods shall not be reckoned at any part of this Ships Charterparty Tonnage. PROVIDED further and it is hereby Covenanted and Agreed, by and between the Partys to these Presents, That for all Goods laden on Board this Ship in the East Indies or China over and above the Charterparty Tonnage, the said Company shall pay to the said Part-Owners after the Rate of £14 a Ton for such exceeding so far as the Ship carrys Iron or Stones for Kintlage by Order of the said Company their Agents and Servants and for all further exceedings of Tonnage to pay only half Freight. REGULATIONS MADE BY THE COURT OF DIRECTORS OF THE UNITED COMPANY OF MERCHANTS OF ENGLAND TRADING TO THE EAST INDIES FOR THE MILITARY AT FORT ST. GEORGE, DATED 2<sup>ND</sup>. APRIL 1740, RECEIV'D BY CÆSAR.

1. THAT the Governour make his constant Residence at the Fort, or the Garden House, that he may have the Military more immediately under his Eye, and that he may be the better able to Judge of Conduct, and Capacity of the Officers and Soldiers, is not being intended by this, to restrain him from being intended by this, to restrain him from being absent on the Customary Visits or Tours into the Country for Health or Diversion.
2. THAT the Chief Officer of each Company be Named Appointed and Receive his Commission signed by the Governour and Council, but that all Officers of what Ranks soever under him, be named and appointed by the Governour only.
3. THAT no Officer of what Rank soever below the Chief Officer of each Company, be broke or degraded, but by the Governour only, and that no Chief Officer be broke or degraded but by the Governour and Council.
4. THAT no other Man shall be discharged from the Military before his time is out, but by Order of the Governour and Council and that those who have served their full time be discharged unless they Contract for a further time.
5. THAT the Captains or other Officers of the Companys, or any other Person for them shall not on pain of being dismissed the Service, Receive or Demand any Present, Fee or Reward from any person whatsoever on the Promotion of any Man in his or their Company.
6. THAT the Captains or other Officers shall not Excuse one another from doing their Duty or Excuse the Private Men from doing theirs without first acquainting the Governour, or in his absence the next in Council therewith, and having his Consent thereto in which case another Man of equall Rank who is not otherwise to be on Duty at that time shall with his own Consent be appointed in his Room, and be paid for such Service according to his Rank by the Person excused, but if any Present be made on that Occasion to any one else the Person receiving it to be dismissed the Service.
7. THAT no Man among the Military be allowed to keep a Publick House for the retailing strong Liquors or to retail them or be concerned in the retailing them in any manner whatsoever. But if the Governour and Council think fitt to permit any Military Man on his Request to keep a Publick House or to get his Living by his Trade or Profession, they shall discharge such Person from the Military on Condition that he Remain on the Place till his time is expired and that he be ready to take up Arms when Ordered by the Governour to assist in the Defence of the Place, or to go on any Expedition during which Time he shall be Allowed Pay, but not otherwise.
8. THAT no Military Man put under an Arrest or Confined and Continued so above Six Hours shall be discharged but by the Governours Order, and any Officer detaining a Person under an Arrest or Confinement more than six hours without making a Report of it in Writing to the Governour or his absence to the next in Council present shall be broke unless such Person be taken into Arrest or Confined in the Night time in which case Report thereof shall be made as above early in the Morning.
9. THE Governour at relieving the Guard shall have a Report made him immediately in Writing by the Officer of the Guard relieved of all Occurances the passed during his Guard.
10. THE Governour shall appoint from among the Officers an Experienced and capable Person to Act as his Adjutant whose Business it shall be to take Notice of all Irregularitys and Accidents that may happen among the Military, whether at the Barracks or other Quarters or in and about the Town,



or other Places. He shall visit the Hospital once a Day or oftner and shall be Watchfull that no Abuses happen there or among the Companys he shall from time to time when Ordered by the Governour visit the Out-Posts and shall receive all Complaints the Soldiers may have to make against their Officers, or that the Officers may have against the Soldiers or against one another of all which he shall every Morning make a Report in Writing to the Governour, as also of all Detachments sent abroad or returned, specifying the Names of the Officers and Soldiers likewise the Names of the Sick Men in the Hospital, Barracks or other Quarters and the Governour shall give what Commands he has for the Military by himself or the Adjutant who shall receive Fifteen Pagodas  $\text{₹}$  Month, and have no other Employment during the time of his being Adjutant.

11. THAT the Governour or Second shall make a general Review and Muster of the Military and see them Exercised once a Month or oftner.
12. THE Muster Rolls of each Company shall be signed by the Captains and Certified by the Governour or Second (which ever of them shall have made the Review according to the forgeoing Article) and then they shall be laid before the Council for their Approbation before Payment.
13. THE Governour shall appoint One of the Company's Servants to be Military Paymaster, who shall pay to every Man his own pay in Person without suffering any Money to be Stopt at the Pay table, on any Pretence whatsoever without an Order of Council, except for Dyet Money, Mountings and Apparell bought at Outery and for these no more than what may become due from Pay day to Pay day, and that Publick Notice be given thereof.
14. THE Pay Master shall take care on the Death of any of the Military to secure his Effects, in order to pay the Funeral Charges and his Debts there and if there be any Overplus he shall pay it into the Company's Cash except in Cases where the Deceased hath an Heir at Law on the Place, or hath by Will apppointor.
15. THE Adjutant shall give immediate Notice to the Pay Master of the Inlisting or Discharging any Soldier, and of their Promoting or Degrading any one in the Military as also of their Death or Desertion, that their Actount of Pay may be Settled accordingly and the Pay Master shall send home in the Companys Packet Yearly Duplicates of his Monthly Accounts.
16. THAT a Separate List be sent home Yearly in the Companys Packet of the Military sent from hence who have been landed at Fort S<sup>t</sup>. George and of all others that are Inlisted there specifying the times of their Arrival or Entering into the Service and when Discharged, Died, or Deserted.
17. THE Governour shall take Care that the Captains do Justice to the Soldiers in their Cloathing that they be new Clothed once in Two Years with English Cloth bought out of the Companys Warehouse, and that they nor the Subaltern Officers do not oppress them and that the Soldiers be kept to a strict Discipline and Subordination. But that upon inflicting Punishment on any European Soldier it be done by Europeans only.
