PREFATORY NOTE

This volume contains the letters received from England during the period 1743-1744 as contained in the 48th volume of the series "Despatches from England."

- 2. The years expressed are in the old civil style and their conversion into corresponding historical years can be effected by the adoption of the following formula enunciated by Mr. Arthur T. Pringle in his notes on page 198 of the Diary and Consultation Book for 1685, viz.—
- "(1) When any day from 1st January to 24th March (inclusive) is followed by figures denoting a single year, add one to them.

Example, 25th February 1690=25th February 1691.

(2) When any day from 25th March to 31st December (inclusive) is followed by figures denoting a single year, make no alteration.

Example, 25th June 1690=25th June 1690.

(3) When any day in the year is followed by figures denoting two years, adopt the second of these two.

Examples, 25th February 1690-91=25th February 1691, 25th June 1690-91=25th June 1691."

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT St. GEORGE, DATED JUNE 8, 1743 PER HARDWICKE [Public Despatches from England, Vol. 48 page 5.]

OUR PRESIDENT AND

COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

- 1. The Ships Heathcote, Saint George, Colchester and Princess of Wales Sailed the 15th. April last.
- 2. This comes Via Anjengo by Our Ship Hardwicke Captain John Hallett Commander, bound to Bombay, and thence to China.
- 3. In case M^r. John Stratton Conducts Our Affairs well at Vizagapatam, We would have him continue Chief of that Settlement, and We shall in due time take his Services into Consideration, if he is not Incumbered in Debt, as he is reported here to be.
- 4. If it should so happen that this Ship puts in at your place, and the Supra Cargoes Messieurs Hide, Hadley and Pinnell should judge proper to lodge with you any of the Cargo designed for Bombay, You must take Charge of, and give Receipts for the same, forwarding the Goods by all proper Conveyances to Bombay, as they are Designed for that Market, unless you have reason to think, any Article will turn to a better Account with you.
- 5. On the Ships coming to Madrass, you are to open Our Packet for Bombay in the Supra Cargoes presence, and have recourse to the Invoice, Bill of Loading, and other Papers for your mutual Guidance, but our said Packet must afterwards be forwarded to Bombay by the first proper opportunity.

- 6. If you have any Goods on hand that you, and the Supra Cargos think are proper for the Canton Market, We would have you load them on the Hardwicke upon our Account, Consigning the same to the Supra Cargoes.
 - 7. Forward the enclosed Packet to Bengal by the first opportunity.

General Leiter to Fort St. George, Dated October 14, 1743 per Lapwing. Received April 25, 1744 [Public Despatches from England, volume 48, pages 7 & 8.]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL

AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

- 1. We wrote to you a short Letter the 8th. June last by the Hardwicke She Sailed the 22th. of that Month, Copy of our said Letter is Enclosed.
- 2. Since then It hath pleased God to return to us in Safety the several Ships mentioned in the Enclosed list.
- 3. We have duly received your Advices of the 11th. 14th. and 15th. Septem^r. 9th. October, 24th. and 27th. January and 2^d. February 1742.
- 4. To our very great Concern the Ship Princess Louisa was Lost near the Isle of May, and the Ship Winchester run ashore on the Coast of Brazil at Pernambuco, however her Cargo was lodged in the King of Portugals Warehouses, till it was known whether the Winchester could be refitted, so as to take it in and proceed on her Voyage.
- 5. This comes by our own Ship Lapwing Burthen 260 Tons Captain Henry Watts Commander, who is ordered to call at Pernambuco and to take in our Treasure, with the Licensed Silver, Bugles & Coral landed there from the Winchester in case She is not repaired, and Captain Watts will thence proceed for your place and Deliver the same to You as \$\Phi\$ Copy of his Instructions Enclosed for your Perusal.
- 6. On Our said Treasures Arrival, it must be Coined with all Speed and sent on the Lapwing or the best Conveyance to Bengal, at least so much as you can spare.
- 7. We direct that you dispatch the Lapwing to Bengal, whether We have given directions to send her away to Bencoolen, in order to be loaden home from thence, of which acquaint the Commander, and advise the President and Council to put on board such Wares & Stores as they may stand in need of on the West Coast.

8. For the further Carrying on our Trade this Season, We have taken up the following Ships Vizt.

- 9. Our Secret Committee for the Current Year are Harry Gough Esq. Samuel Feake Esq. Dodding Braddyll Esq. and Captain William Mabbott, what Orders may be received from them or any Three of those Gentlemen for the Security of Our Shipping must be strictly Complied with & obeyed.
- 10. The two past Seasons We have receiv'd such Vast Quantitys of Salt Petre, that Our Servants in Bengal are Ordered to lessen the Purchases and lower the Price, so that you must put on board the Charterparty Kintlage only in Salt Petre on our respective Ships, except You are under an absolute Necessity to make up the Charterparty Tonnage.
- 11. The Goods Imported this Season are not yet Sold, so that We are unable to send a List of Investment, however do you go on providing conformable to our last Orders on the best and cheapest Terms.
- 12. Considering the great Consequence of having an able Gunner at your Place, and the thorough Ability of M^r. John Waters for that Post, We hereby direct on Receipt hereof, You appoint the said M^r. Waters head Gunner, and We will consider in due time what Provision to make for M^r. Percival. We are

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

1. His Majestys Envoy at the Court of Portugal being of Opinion that no Licence can be obtained for the Lapwings Proceedure to Pernambuco, Captain Watts is Ordered to make the best of his way to your Place, after Executing Our Secret Committees Orders.

- 2. Hereupon We have Judged proper to send Thirty Chests of Treasure on Board the Lapwing, which come Consigned to you as # Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed.
- 3. The said Treasure must be Coined, and what can be spared is to be sent with all Expedition to Bengal, on the Lapwing, for carrying on Our Investment there.
- 4. By the last Advices from Lisbon, We have some reason to hope, that the Winchester has been Refitted and Proceeded on her Voyage. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. GEORGE, PER PRINCE OF WALES, DATED NOVEMBER 23, 1743. [Public Despatches from England, Vol. 48, pages 11 & 12].

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL

AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

- 1. We wrote last by Our Own Ship Lapwing the 4th. Instant, she carryed also a letter dated the 14th. Ultimo, Copys of both are enclosed, that Ship and the Edgbaston sailed in Company the 13th. Instant:
- 2. This comes by Our Ships Prince of Wales and Prince William We have put on board each of them Fifty Chests of Treasure with Sundry Goods and Merchandize consigned to you as # Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed in their respective Packets.
- 3. Such a proportion of the Silver is to be coined as Our Servants in the Bay have desired, which together with so much of the Bullion as you can spare, must be forwarded thither with all expedition, on such of Our Ships as you are unable to load home in September.
- 4. Our Coast Goods have been put up to Sale, and in general went off at Encouraging Prices, so that in case a List of Investment is not transmitted you by these Ships, you will do well to secure for Us all the Longcloth and Sallampores you can.
- 5. We have permitted M^r. George Jones of your Place, to reside under Our Protection as a Free Merchant, and Covenants for him are enclosed in the Prince of Wales's Packet accordingly.
- 6. We have resolved that the Ship York after landing her Cargo at your place, shall be dispatch'd immediately to China, with Orders to be loaden home with Tea, if procurable at a Limited Price, but in case of losing her Passage to China, she must be order'd to make the best of her way to Bengal, to be loaden home directly from thence, or come down to your place to fill up, as they shall judge most proper. We shall write you more at large on this head by the said Ship.
- 7. Hereupon We have resolved also to take up two more Ships for the Coast and Bay, likewise One Ship more for Bombay.

- 8. Our Supra Cargos of the Ship Edgbaston for Mocha, Messieurs Thomson, Wood and Cobham are directed to purchase Two Thousand Bales of Coffee at the Market Price and no more, unless it is procurable at or under One Hundred Spanish Dollars & Bettlefukee Bahar, in which case a full Ships Loading is to be bought.
- 9. The Coffee be it more or less is to be Consigned to Bombay, Our Directions thither are, if the Edgbaston brings Two Thousand Bales only, and they have not Bale Goods or Petre sufficient by them to compleat a Ships Cargo, then to put the said Coffee on board another Ship, and send her away therewith to your Place, on their so doing do you fill up and dispatch her to Us with all Speed.

- 2. This comes by the Ship Duke of Dorset We have put on Board Fifty Chests of Treasure with Sundry Goods and Merchandize Consigned to you as P Invoice and Bill of Loading Enclosed.
- 3. Such a Part of the Treasure as can be Spared must be forwarded to Bengal, Coined or in Bullion according to the Advices from thence.

OUR PRESIDENT AND

COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

- 1. We wrote last the 16th. Instant by the Ship Duke of Dorset, Copy of Our said Letter is enclosed.
- 2. This comes by Our Ship Beaufort, the Goods and Treasure on board consign'd to you will appear by the Invoice and Bill of Loading in the Packet.
- 3. Our Correspondents at the Madeiras are directed to supply you with One Hundred and Fifty Pipes of the Best and Strongest Wine produced on that Island, and to ship the same on board the Beaufort, Two Hundred Pipes will be consigned to the Bay on the Durrington.
- 4. The Commander and Officers are allowed to bring Twenty Pipes, acquaint Us how many are landed at your Place.
- 5. All the Treasure on this Ship being consign'd to you, so much thereof as can be spared, must be sent to Bengal in Rupees or Bullion, according to your Advices from thence.
- 6. In case Our List of Investment can be prepared before this Ships Departure, it will come enclosed, We rely on your Utmost Care to procure Our Goods on the Best Terms possible.

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT St. GEORGE, PER YORK, DATED JANUARY 11, 1744

[Public Despatches from England, Vol. 48, pages 17 & 18.]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL

AT FORT S. GEORGE.

- 1. The Ship Beaufort carried Our last dated the 23th. Decem. Copy thereof is enclosed.
- 2. The Ships Duke of Dorset and Cæsar Sailed the 26th, and the Durrington the 30 Ultimo.
- 3. This comes by the Ship York We have put on Board Fifty Chests of Treasure with sundry Goods and Merchandize which are Consigned unto you as P the Enclosed Invoice and Bill of Loading.
- 4. The Copper is to be forwarded on One of Our Ships to Bengal in case you have reason to think that it bears a better Price there than at your Place.
- 5. The Lead being designed for the China Market is to remain in the Ship, and if Redwood by the last Advices from thence yeilded a Profit, fill up the Ship therewith and put on Board Twenty Chests of Bullion, valuing each Article at the Prime Cost and Dispatch the Ship with all the Expedition possible that so she may not loose her Passage Consigning the Cargo to Messieurs John Misenor, William Henry Draper, Richard Oliver, Jonathan Scarth and John Forbes, give the Commander Orders to make the best of his way to Canton in China, and on Arrival there to Obey the said Supra Cargoes Orders, or in the Absence of any such of them as shall be Resident on the Spot.
- 6. But in case it should happen that the Ship looses her Passage from your Place to China you must Order the Commander on such an Emergency to make the best of his Way to Bengal and deliver the Cargo to Our President and Council at Fort William and to Obey their Orders for his further Proceedure.
- 7. Mr. John Scott who hath been a Surgeon of Our Ships several Years takes Passage on One of Our Ships, and We direct that in case he is Acceptable to you he be employed as One of Our Surgeons at your Place on the first Vacancy after Mr. Belsches and that in the mean time he Act in that Station at One of Our Subordinates in case of a Vacancy.
- 8. If you send no Ship of your Own to China and can Procure in the Market Three or Four Thousand Pounds Worth of Goods proper for that Place We would have you put them on Board the York for Our Account Consigning the same to Our Supra Cargoes aforesaid.
- 9. The enclosed Packet for Bengal contains Our List of Investment therefore it must be forwarded thither by the first Conveyance that Offers except the Durrington and Beaufort they having the like on Board. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. GEORGE, PER GODOLPHIN DATED MARCH 21, 1743

[Public Despatches from England, Vol. 48, pages 19 to 33.]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT ST. GEORGE.

- 1. We wrote last the 11th. January 1743 by the Ship York that sailed in Company with the Beaufort the 23th. of that Month, Copy of Our said Letter is enclosed.
- 2. By this conveyance We shall proceed to give the Needful Directions and to take notice of your Advices and Transactions under the Usual Established Heads.

FIRST CONCERNING SHIPPING.

- 3. As Our Coast and Bay Ships last Season were with difficulty all loaden home, We entirely approve of giving the Early Ones their Tonnage only in Bales.
- 4. We have this year judged proper to alter the tenour of the Ships Charter-partys, as to their coming out of the Bay of Bengal, whereby they may now be dispatch'd from thence on the Tenth of November, which We mention here for your notice and that Provision before hand may be made, to send them home earlyer than formerly. Demorage that heavy expence will thus be avoided and many good consequences ensue.
- 5. This war time more especially the Commanders should be protested against on dispatching them, if their full complement of Men are not on board, the Wilmington's coming away from Fort S^t. David with Twelve Men short leads Us to this Injunction.
- 6. You are under no manner of Obligation to furnish them with Men from Our Garrisons, and should discourage Applications of that Nature, Captain Lowe We observe was allowed some Soldiers, whose contracted time was not wholly expired, though you should not spare any such, but supply them with Lascars if you are able.
- 7. Our Servants in Bengal do not represent any difficulty as to the hire of Lascars, We took the Hardships they laboured under into consideration anno 1741, and in concert with the Owners, Directions were then sent to Bengal, that in all such Cases the Commander must enter into a Contract, obliging himself on the Part of the Owners to pay those Lascars the stipulated Wages until the Ship is unlivered and that then a Weekly allowance shall be made to them of Five Shillings each by the Owners for Subsistance till a Passage is procured for them back by the said Owners, free of all Charge to the Company.
- 8. The same method must be practised at your place. See that this Order is complyed with before the Ship is dispatched, or otherwise protest against the Commander, The Contract must be transmitted to Us in the Packet:
- 9. An Account comes in each Packet of the money that the Several Commanders have borrowed of us at Respondentia, on their offerring to pay any money into Our Cash you are to receive the same, granting Certificates for the amount.
- 10. Their Effects on board are made over to us by way of security for the same, as \$\sigma\$ Copy of the Assignment also enclosed, therefore in case of the Death of any of the Captains, you are hereby required and empowered to take effectual care that their Effects are not embezzled.
- 11. As all Surplus Goods over and above the Charterparty Tonnage are to pay only half freight, We would have you put on board as many upon those terms as can well be spared after Ample Provision is made for all the Tonnage on hand.
- 12. Our Ship George being worn out by Twenty Six years Service, We perceive another built at Pegu was bought to supply her room and sent to the Bay, you will do well constantly to employ that and our other Vessells in fetching Bales from the Subordinates, Salt Petre from Bengal, or to the West Coast, as shall be most for Our Interest, looking well after the Captains, that they discharge their trust in a becoming manner.

- 13. The President and Council of Bombay not sending one of Our Ships or Vessells to take in the Tygris Woollen Goods and carry them to Persia, you acted right in sending them on Freight upon a Country Ship.
- 14. Captain Raymond justly deliver'd the Bale of Gurrahs here which should have been put ashore at your place.
- 15. Having yearly instances of Goods being clandestinely loaden on Our Ships Outward bound, you must take all the Proper means you are able to discover such Illicit Trade, and put Our former Orders in execution upon this head.
- 16. When the Package such as the Bags for Turmerick, Cowries and the like shott loose, or any other Goods are returned from the Ships, the Proper Officers must give receipts for the same if demanded.
- 17. Having considered the Great Damage the Company suffers, and the danger that may befal Our Settlements in India by the desertion of Our Soldiers and Seamen, We have come to a Resolution that the Commanders of any of Our Ships seducing away or conniving at any of the Companys Soldiers or Seamen coming on board their Ships, or not delivering them to the Settlement they belong to, or such other of the Companys Settlements as lye in their way after their dispatch from any place, such Commander shall be dismiss'd from Our Service.
- 18. A Clause is inserted accordingly in each of the Captain's Instructions, to deter them from such a practice, but in case it has not the desired effect, be sure to acquaint Us that We may shew a Proper Resentment.
- 19. On the arrival of any Europe Ship from Our other Settlements, require of the Captain to inform you if he has any of Our deserted Soldiers or Seamen on board, and if he has, let him know that his refusing to deliver them up to you, must be at his Peril.
- 20. Upon examining the Bills of Loading produced by the Commanders of Our Ships arrived this last Season from your Place, they are found to be endorsed in so careless and irregular a manner, that it does not appear by the said Endorsments, whether a great many of the Articles were delivered or not, as \$\Psi\$ Account enclosed.
- 21. Whereas pursuant to Our former Orders, it should be done so Explicitly, that at One view We might discern what Goods were duly received, and what Deficiencys there are in any sort.
- 22. Our Warehouse and Storekeepers must see to it that in future We have no cause of Complaint in this Material Affair.
- 23. On the Captains who are consigned directly to the Bay, touching first at Madrass, do you acquaint Us whether their People wanted to be refreshed, or any other Circumstances render'd such a Step proper or not, and continue the usual Method of requiring their reasons for so doing.
- 24. The Two Boats built at Bombay for the service of the West Coast We doubt not will be of Signal Use in fetching Pepper through the Little Rivers in those Parts.
- 25. We have taken up the following Ships Viz.

- 26. You must send the Ship Wager to Bengal We having appointed her to be one of the Ships that are to be returned to fill up at your place.
- 27. By the Ship Stafford We have given Directions that in case Our Supra-Cargos are not able to procure Bohea and Green Teas at a Limited Price by the 10th, of February, they are to fill up the Ship York with Teutenague, Sugar, Sugar Candy &ct. and to consign the same to you, on their so doing those articles must be sold at Outcry for the most they will yeild, or if after all the Ships are gone Gold

should be at One Hundred and Ten Tales or under and Teutenague dear, We have given them leave to invest what part of their stock they think fitt in Gold, consigning the same to you which must be coined into Pagodas in Our Mint.

- 28. The other parts of the Yorks Cargo will consist of Tea, Silks and China Ware designed for the Europe Market, which must be continued on board the Ship York and consigned to Us filling her up with Bale Goods and Salt Petre, dispatching the ship to Us without Loss of time.
- 29. You must pay the Supra Cargos five \$\P\$ Cent on the Amount of the Sales of the Teutenague, Sugar, SugarCandy and other Articles and the Produce of the Gold dividing the said five \$\P\$ Cent in the following Proportions Vizt. One and a half \$\P\$ Cent to M^r\$. John Misenor, One and a Quarter to M^r\$. William Henry Draper One \$\P\$ Cent to M^r\$. Richard Oliver, Three Quarters \$\P\$ Cent to M^r\$. Jonathan Searth, and the remaining Half \$\P\$ Cent to M^r\$. John Forbes, or in case of the absence of any, you must carry their proportion to their Kespective Credits on Our Books, and We will make good the same here, the money so paid them they have liberty to bring home in Diamonds, Gold or Bills of Exchange at Seven Shillings and Eight Pence a Pagoda.
- 30. In case it should so happen by unavoidable Circumstances that any of Our Ships are finally dispatched after the Twentyeth day of February, We have come to a Resolution, in order to excite and encourage the Commanders, to use their Best Endeavours to get about the Cape of Good Hope, and gain a Passage home the same Season, that with respect to the Owners, We will take only the Cost of the Damaged Goods according to Invoice, remitting the Thirty P Cent agreed to be charged on all such Damage, P Charterparty, and as to each Commander, in case of a French War, We will give him a Gratuity of Two Hundred Guineas on getting about the Cape as aforesaid and at all other times a Gratuity of One Hundred Guineas.
- 31. Whenever you have reason to apprehend that any Ship will be dispatched so late, We direct that Our Fine Goods be secured with Double Wax Cloth and Double Cotton the better to preserve them from Damage.

SECONDLY OF EUROPE GOODS.

- 32, In compliance with the Indents before Us, We have supply'd you with Sundry Goods and Merchandize by Our several Coast and Bay Ships, as \$\to\$ Abstract of their Cargos enclos'd, a further Quantity now comes on the Wager as \$\to\$ Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed.
- 33. As Our Servants in Bengal could not dispose of Bullion for some time this last season, We have judged it proper to consign great part of the Silver designed for them directly to you, that so much may be coined, as they shall desire, which must be done with all Expedition, forwarding all you can spare, that so the Heavy Bengal Interest may be avoided.
- 34. We are very glad to find by your last Advices, that Our Warehouses were likely to be clear of Woollen Goods, so that now you will do well to come into the method of Outcrys, agreeable to Our Sentiments last year, which practice continues to be attended with very good Success at Our other Head Settlements, We are thoroughly persuaded the Consumption will thereby be encreased, as the few Merchants among whom they are now divided are doubtless more intent upon a Great Profit than a Large Vend.
- 35. On melting down One Hundred and Twenty Candy of Lead, We perceive the Loss amounted to Seven Candy, you judged quite right that We should not be for having it back again, and entirely approve of your not suffering this Adulterated Stuff to go out of your Hands until it was thus refined, We shall endeavour to procure satisfaction from the Sellers, and take the Utmost Care to prevent any such like gross Imposition in future.
- 36. As to your Complaint of the Paper, by the Samples thereof kept with Us it was good, so that there must have been some Fraud here, We will for the time to

come take all the Care possible, and in case of any proving bad send Us some Quires, or even a Rheam for Our Inspection, letting Us know the Mark and Number of the Chest.

- 37. As you advise us most of the Guns on the Walls and Bastions are Old and Honeycombed, We have furnished you with as many as We were able this year.
- 38. Our Correspondents at the Madeiras are acquainted agreeable to your Advices, that the Shaftesbury's Wine proved Poor, Thin and Eager, We hope the Beaufort's will be of a good Quality agreeable to Our Directions, do you aquaint Us how it proves, and what Quantity is suitable to the Consumption and Demand at your place.
- 39. Captain Taylor of the Ship Sumatra having deposited in Our Cash, the value of Five Maund Twenty Six Seer of Copper short delivered in the Bay, whence they write he was no way to blame, as it arose from your weighing it on an even Beam, and they have a Small Turn of the Scale in each Draught, and you say it is hard he should pay the Money, therefore repay him his Deposit.
- 40. We observe by the Consultations that although the Thirty Seven Casks of Copper by the Ship Admiral Vernon were in good Order and tight, Forty Two hundred weight was deficient in the weight, which shall be narrowly scrutinized into, the other short deliverys from Our Several Ships, being by the Entrys upon Consultation but small, will be adjusted in an equitable manner with the Owners, for Our guidance be very particular in your Advices, as to the condition of the Package in all such Articles.

THIRDLY OF INVESTMENTS.

- 41. Our Coast Goods being sold We sent P Beaufort and York a List of Investment, another List of the same Tenour comes enclosed, which it must be your Care to comply with as near as the circumstances of things will admit on the Best Terms possible.
- 42. Having received but very few Gurrahs this Season, a Larger Quantity of Callicos from your Coast, would have been the more acceptable, We are concerned that the Effects of the Moratta's Ravages were still felt, but hope Trade would revive and flourish on the Countrey's being settled.
- 43. The Lower Numbers generally answer as well at Our Sales as the Higher Ones, provided they are justly sorted to each respective Number, and often times better, which We mention for your guidance
- 44. As We fall short in Gurrahs, and Callicos being in good demand, We shall approve if you send Us some of a Still lower quality than usual, provided you have a proper abatement in the price, and that they are not overbad, but such as you judge are fitt for the Europe Market, distinguishing them by No. 5, but be sure to keep up the other Numbers to their usual Goodness.
- 45. The Six Bales of Superfine Longcloth you mention are reserved for Our Spring Sale, as they go off then to a Greater Advantage for Summer Wear.
- 46. As the Merchants have considerable Sums of Ours in their Hands, see to it that the Difficultys they alledge are not mere pretences only, which too often proves to be the Case if they are not well look'd after, by the Accounts transmitted in the packets, it appears their Ballances are less than last year with which We are pleased, as We then indulged them with the Broad Cloth, the better to secure their Debts, We expect they are cleared off, Old Running Open Accounts are by no means satisfactory, every thing should be settled and closed annually, that so Fresh Contracts may be made with the Best Performers at such Prices, as upon considering all Circumstances, you judge reasonable between them and Us.
- 47. It is of the highest importance that Upright Capable Men should conduct Our Affairs at the Subordinate Factorys, by placing a bad one at Fort S⁵. David's We sufferred greatly in Our Investment, fewer Goods being provided than usual, and at higher prices, the Ballances in the Merchants hands are larger too than in the preceding year, We expect that every thing was sett to rights, and as that part of

the Countrey was represented last Season, as the best situated for enlarging Our Investment, We hope Our Servants now there will improve such, and every other Opportunity to Our greatest Advantage.

- 48. As you represent the making use of Callico's torn at the wash for Wrappers, is a saving to us, We would as occasion offers have that method continued, they answering the purpose as well as Gurrahs.
- 49. The French being in great want of money, is a Circumstance very much in Our favour, you are continually furnished with a Flowing Cash to command the Market on the several Parts of the Coast, which We doubt not by your watchful Care of Our Interest will be attended with those Solid Benefits that may reasonably be expected.
- 50. We refer you to Our List of Investment for Our Sentiments of the Northern Cloth, Sadrass Chints and other Species.
- 51. Always be mindful of your promise to prevent as far as you are able Our suffering by Fire, We never allow of Smoaking or any Candles or Fire to be carryed into Our Warehouses, and take it for granted that in your climate the like necessary precautions are practised.
- 52. The Pilferage of several Pieces that We complain of, you say must have been committed by the Boat fellows, without mentioning what method you proposed to take in order to prevent the like, We are apt to think by placing a Serjeant and Soldier or Two in each Boat such Roguerys may be prevented.
- 53. Notwithstanding the Difficultys you complain of, you must continue to print the Baftaes, as they turn to a much better Account here than the Ordinary Moorees, and We would have some of the Chints Moorees painted at Sadrass.
- 54. We observe with satisfaction, that Our Servants at the several Northern Settlements duly exerted themselves, furnishing about Seven Hundred and Fifty Bales, wherein you assure Us there had been no want of Care, and that the Chay Goods exceed any hitherto, sent, as the Troubles that affected your Province did not reach those parts, We hope that Our Investments will go on flourishing and improving more and more. Vizagapatam and Maddapollam should have sent up a State of their several Merchants Ballances, both for yours and Our Notice.
- 55. Notwithstanding what is mentioned in the List of Investment We direct that all the Sannoes you receive from Bengal be whitened only, and that none of them be printed, We having ordered Five hundred additional Baftaes in their room, which must be printed as they turn to a better account than the Sannoes.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTREY GOVERNMENT.

- 56. We take notice of the Particular Account of the late Nabob's Murder, and of his young Son succeeding to the Government, hoping he will be confirmed from Court, that so the Charge We have been at in entertaining the Family at your place may not be lost, but some Amends may be made to Us by the Grants standing firm for the coining of Arcott Rupees in Our Mint, the Five Villages, lessening and taking off sundry Dutys, whereby We may be reimbursed, and not only so, but We persuade Ourselves many Solid Advantages will accrue to Us, to which end We doubt not your best Endeavours will he exerted.
- 57. As these Grants were obtained by Kisnajee a Braminy's Good Offices, incase they prove really Beneficial and have the desired Effect, We would have you gratifye him with some Mark of Our Favour.
- 58. Madrass becoming by the Nabob's presence the Capital of the Province is highly pleasing to Us, hence the Trade will encrease, and the Currency of Our Pagodas all over the Countrey, doubtless adds greatly to it's Fame, We cannot help upon this occasion expressing Our Entire Satisfaction with Governour Benyon's Management, to whose Prudent Conduct such an Agreeable Situation is in a Great Measure to be attributed, in case he is come away, We must recomend it to you to tread in his Steps, and to conduct Our Affairs with respect to the Countrey Government in like manner.

- 59. We had it in Our thoughts, on the breaking out of the present War with Spain, to apply for Powers to Our Three Presidencys to judge of Prizes taken by virtue of Letters of Marque, but several Substantial, reasons deterred Us therefrom, you did well in examining Captain Petre on his bringing a Manilha Ship in, that belonged to the French, and as he delivered up both Ship and Cargo on it's appearing they were not Legal Prizes, no bad Consequences ensued, on any the like case happening, the same method must be taken.
- 60. The Heads of the Casts agreeing to pay Three Thousand Five Hundred Pagodas to excuse the late Shroff from going to Bencoolen, on its being applyed to put the Streets in the Black Town in order, and repairing of Bridges, We acquiesce in the same, but the Inhabitants having suffered greatly by his Villany, he should be banished out of Our Bounds never to return, as was done with respect to a Couple of his Comrades in Iniquity.
- 61. We shall give Directions to Our Agent and Council at Gombroon, in order to do justice unto Our Servants and others Trading under Our Protection, and to prevent their continual Complaints, that they be not compelled to sell their Goods as hitherto in the Factory of Gombroon, but be at Liberty to live and dispose of them out of it, if they think fitt, they paying the usual Consulage and conforming to Our Rules that so We may not be entangled with the Persian Government by their means, of which you will do well to give all Persons concerned in the Trade to those Parts due notice, this We hope will prevent their going to Bouchier, and induce them to trade under Our Protection.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

- 62. We are pleased to find by the Advices before Us, that the Black Town is entirely secured, although the Expence amounts to Thirty One Thousand Pagodas, relying on the Assurances you give Us, that the Works are Substantial and well performed.
- 63. As to your Proposal of Enlarging and Making the White square with the Black Town, and turning the Course of the River by digging a Trench North and South and damming across from Queen's point to the Island, instead of complying with Our directions anno 1741 by strength'ning the West Side of the Town, We have considered the same, and as you are sincerely of opinion there will be but little difference in the cost of fortifying either way, and Major Knipe is of opinion that the River may be turned at a very small Expence, and the Ground cross the Island is Clay, capable of sustaining any Weight, We say that in case the Situation of Affairs on the Coast should give you good reason to think that carrying on any further Works will be for Our Service, We leave it to you on the Spot to execute them in such manner, as upon consulting the Major, shall be judged best for the Security of the Place.
- 64. Some Soldiers come on this Ship to Strengthen Our Garrisons and Wesent a number of Recruits on each of Our former Ships this Season, Europeans are certainly to be preferr'd before Topasses, but this war time Men that are good for any thing are scarce, you should encourage such to re-enter whose times expire, as One Old Soldier is worth Two or Three New Raw Raised Men.
- 65. Our Resident at Injeram having only a Mud and Thatched House to dwell in, We approve of the Liberty given him to lay out a Thousand Pagodas in building a New One.
- 66. In making satisfaction to the Owners of the Houses pulled down and the Gardens destroyed by your Order near the Walls on the Morattas Invasion, Wedoubt not of your having acted in an Equitable mannar between them and Us.
- 67. Upon this occasion We observe a Good Order made in Consultation, that Six Stone Pillars be set up Six Hundred Feet from the Walls to prevent any Encroachment which must not be sufferred upon any pretence whatsoever in future.

- 68. When the Arrack or any other Farms Expire, Publick Notice must be given they will be let to the Highest Bidder on a Certain Day.
- 69. We acquiesce in your freeing some of the Great Moors and Kisnajee from paying Quit Rent, and Scavengers Duty, as they look upon it as a Tribute.
- 70. The Current Charges We take notice are lessened Seven Thousand Pagodas the last year, at the same time We have the Pleasure of observing the Revenues are encreased near as much, which are sure Tokens of your Good Services, and never fail meeting with Our Favourable Regard.

SIXTHLY OF FACTORS, WRITERS, OFFICERS AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

- 71. Our dismissing M^r. Burton last year from Our Service, renders it unnecessary for Us to say any thing more of his Suspension, than that We entirely approve thereof, and as M^r. Edward Croke gave information of M^r. Burtons male practices, in consideration of which and his Long Faithful Services We direct that a Present be paid to M^r. Croke of Five Hundred Pagodas out of Our Cash on receipt of this Letter, and that he likewise have a Gratuity of Fifty Pounds Annum over and above his Salary and other Allowances to be continued 'till We order the contrary.
- 72. For the future care must be taken in drawing out the Calculate of Quick Stock, that Our Cash and Good Debts at the Subordinate Settlements are duly therein brought to account, in the last Calculate the Merchants Debts at Fort St. David though considerable are omitted, whereas every thing remaining in Cash, Goods, Stores, Good Debts at your place and the other Factorys must be brought to the Credit of the said Account, drawing out the same in a most Accurate Correct manner, it being of great importance for Us to have a Clear and Certain View of the State of Our Affairs, distinguishing any Debts that you deem doubtful and Bad, transmitting the same annually by the Two last Ships.
- 73. We have resolved to send Medicines annually to a Certain Value for the use of Our Settlements be the Indents more or less, and not to supply the Surgeons with any for their own Separate Account, as was formerly proposed.
- 74. If any can be spared, and the Countrey Ships are supplyed with them, or any are made use of by the Surgeons in their Private Practice, they must give an account of the same, and pay the value of all such as are so disposed or made use of, with an advance of Twenty P Cent upon Invoice into Our Cash, the Store Keeper seeing to it that this Order is duly complyed with.
- 75. Besides Major Knipe's Pay, We direct that you make him an Allowance of Twenty five Pagodas & Annum for Servants.
- 76. We direct that Mr. William Percival the late Gunner, be entertained a Factor in Our Service on your Establishment on receipt of this Letter, Covenants come enclosed for him accordingly, he must write to his Freinds in England to give Security for him in One Thousand Pounds.
- 77. We direct that Mr. Arthur Rider commence a Factor on receipt of this Letter, Covenants are also enclosed for him, who is to act in a like manner.
- 78. We have entertained the following Persons Writers upon your Establishment Viz. James Mansell, William Orme, Thomas Gage, Hugh Norris, Alexander Baird, James Hugonin, James Morford and John Trenwith, keep them all close to Our Business and Encourage the most deserving.
- 79. Captain Francis Steward representing that he has about Five Hundred Pounds lying in his Attorneys hands at your place, on it's being offered to be paid into Our Cash, We direct that you receive the same and grant Bills of Exchange for the Amount at Seven Shillings and Eight pence a Pagoda, Oath being made by his Attorneys that the Money so paid in, is on Capt. Francis Steward's own account.
- 80. We direct that the Ages of Our Several Covenant Servants be inserted in every List sent Us for the future.

81. Our Ships Severn and Neptune from Benjar with the Swift Snow from Madagascar arrived safe lately in England, and the Duke of Lorrain at Kinsale in Ireland, but the Grantham with all her Cargo was lost off Folkstone the 29th. Ultimo.

82. It being a matter of Great Importance to the Honour of the Mayor's Court, and the Security of the Suitors, that the Moneys and Effects which are ordered to be brought into Court should be kept in a Secure manner, and the Legislature here having thought fitt by Act of Parliament to establish a Method for keeping the Money and Effects of the Suitors of the Court of Chancery under the name of the Accountant-General of that Court, and as the same has from Experience been found to be useful, We therefore offer it to your consideration, whether it may not be proper to put the Money and Effects of the Suitors of the Mayors Court under a like Regulation, by appointing One of Our Covenant Servants to be Accountant General, and ordering the Money and Effects to be paid into Our Cash, and in that case We agree to be answerable to the Suitors for such Money and Effects as shall be so paid into Our Cash, except in case of Fire, Foreign Invasions, or other unavoidable Accidents, whereby the said Moneys and Effects or Securitys may be lost, and We likewise agree to be at the Charge of such an Officer, so that the Suitors may not be burthened with any additional Fees, this We think should be done under an Order to be made by the Mayors Court, the Form whereof We send you herewith, and therein you will find it explained in what manner the Moneys and Effects are to be paid in and taken out, and how and by whom the Accounts thereof are to be kept, which We think are so plain as not to admit of any mistake, and for your further Satisfaction therein We send you the Forms in what manner the Accounts of the Court of Chancery are kept with the Bank and of the Certificates used upon paying in or taking out any Moneys or Effects, if you should not think proper to fall into the Method We propose, then We desire you will inform Us, in what manner and under what Cheeks the Money and Effects of the Suitors are at present, and We likewise order you annually to send Us an Account what Moneys and Securitys remain in the Mayors Court for Our Notice and Observation.

- 1. Since Our last dated the 21th. March, His Majesty has declared War against France.
- 2. This Important Event requires You and all Our Servants to exert all possible Sagacity for the preservation of Our Property, Trade and Estate.
- 3. Hereupon Our Secret Committee for the Current Year are Samuel Feake, Dodding Braddyll, Alexander Hume and William Mabbott Esqrs. or any Three of them, what Orders and Directions may be given by those Gentlemen for the Security of Our Shipping and Settlements must be strictly complyed with and obeyed as if signed by the Whole Court of Directors.
- 4. Our Ships Wager and Fort S^t. George, having sustained damage by Accidents We are apprehensive they must be docked at Portsmouth, the Godolphin and King William are not yet sailed, the York, Durrington and Beaufort went from the Madeiras in good order on different days in February. We have no Tidings as yet whether the Ship Winchester was gott off or not.
- 5. The Ship Duke of Lorrain, We thank God, arrived safe in the Downes the 4th. Instant.

LETTER FROM THE SECRET COMMITTEE TO FORT ST. GEORGE, DATED APRIL 18, 1744 [Public Despatches from England, Vol. 48, pages 39-40.]

GENTLEMEN

His Majesty having Declared War against France hath been graciously pleased to appoint several of his Ships of War to proceed for the East Indies to protect our Trade.

And it being highly necessary for them to be Supplied with Stores and Provisions abroad, We The Secret Committee therefore pursuant to our agreement with The Right Honourable The Lords of the Admiralty Direct that You Furnish The Commodore or any other of His Majestys Captains by the Commodores Direction with such Sums of Money as they shall Require of You for those Purposes, The Commodore or the other Commanders of said Ships giving You Bills of Exchange or attesting such as may be drawn by the proper officers for the Amount of the Sums so Advanced at the Rate of Six Shillings and Six pence per Weighty Dollar drawn for the stores on The Commissioners of the Navy and for the Provisions on the Commissioners for Victualling the Same, Payable in Money at Thirty days Sight to The Court of Directors of the East India Company in London taking Four Bills of the same Tenour and Sending them to The Company by different Conveyances on their Ships.

You are also to give them what help and Assistance they may Want to acquire, Shewing them all due Civility and respect. We are

OUR DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND

COUNCIL AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

- 1. We have the Misfortune to have no Advices from you this Season, not One-of Our Ships from the West Coast or Borneo being Arrived, We Learn however by Letters which came by a Dutch Ship from Cap Hancock and M^r. Coles that the Duke of Lorrain was refitting at Batavia in April last, having been dispatcht by you the beginning of March for Europe, and that the Grantham was Arrived at your Place from Bengal.
- 2. Our Letters to you last Season were dated the 7th. January 1742 and 2d. April 1743, the former went by the Ship Royal Guardian and she Sailed from the Island St. Helena the 12 May last, the other was sent Via Benjar by the Ship Colchester that Sailed the 15th. April from Spithead, Copys of Our said Letters are enclosed.
- 3. This year We have Built for Our own Account the Ship Lapwing of 260 Tons Burthen Captain Henry Watts is at present the Commander, We dispatched him the 14 October to Execute first some Secret Orders, and then the Ship is to proceed to Fort S^t. George and thence to Bengal, where Cap^t. Watts is to Resign the Command to his Chief Mate M^r. Stephen Kirwin or the Chief Mate for the timebeing. She Sailed from Plimouth the 16 November.

- 4. Our President and Council at Fort William in Bengal are directed to put on Board the Lapwing besides her 20 Tons of Iron Kintlage about Fifty Tons of Salt Petre more or less as the Commander may require, some Redwood for Dunnidge with such Wares and Stores as the President and Council at Fort S^t. George advise to be proper, and then to dispatch her away with all convenient Speed to you.
- 5. On the Lapwings Arrival at your Place Supply the Ship with every thing the Captain informs you she will want.
- 6. The Salt Petre and Redwood are to remain in her and you must put on Board a full Loading of Pepper, dispatching her to us with the utmost Expedition.
- 7. Give the Commander Sailing Orders to make the best of his way according to Our Secret Committees Directions.
- 8. This comes by the Ship Cæsar Burthen 498 Tons Capt. Matthew Court Commander who is Ordered to call first at St. Helena to land Our Governour Colonel David Dunbar, and Lieutenant Governour Capt. Charles Hutchinson there, with the needful Stores for that Island, Copy of the Ships Charterparty comes enclosed.
- 9. We have put on Board the Cæsar Fifteen Chests of Treasure with Sundry Goods and Merchandize which are Consigned to you as # Invoice and Bill of Loading enclosed.
- 10. Having no Indent before Us We have Judged proper to send only such Articles as are deemed absolutely necessary.
- 11. You will do well to put a Loading of Pepper on Board the Cæsar within Four Months after the Ships Arrival, that so Demorage may not be Incurred and Dispatch her home to Us so early in the Season as to get round the Cape without endangering her passage.
- 12. Our Secret Committee for the Current Year are Harry Gough Esq^r. Samuel Feake Esq^r. Dodding Braddyll Esq^r. and William Mabbott Esq^r. what Orders may be received from them, or any Three of those Gentlemen for the security of Our Shipping, must be strictly complied with and Obeyed.
- 13. When Package such as Bags for any Article shott loose or the like are Returned from the Ships or any other Goods the proper Officers must give Receipts for the same if demanded.
- 14. Having Considered the great Damage the Company suffers and the danger that may befall Our Settlements in India by the Desertion of Our Soldiers and Seamen, We have come to a resolution that the Commanders of any of Our Ships Seducing away or Conniving, at any of the Companys Soldiers or Seamen coming on Board their Ships, or not delivering them to the Settlement they belong to, or to such other of the Company's Settlements as lye in their way after their Dispatch from any Place, such Commander shall be dismissed from Our Service.
- 15. A clause is Inserted accordingly in each of the Captains Instructions to Deter them from such a Practice, but in case it has not the desired Effect, be sure to Acquaint Us that so We may shew a proper Resentment.

- 17. John Smallman having Served the Empress of Russia in a Millitary Capacity We have Entertained him as a Serjeant for your Place, and Direct that he Succeed as an Ensign on the first Vacancy, provided his Behaviour in the Military is to your Satisfaction.
- 18. In case M^r. Robert Wright should come from S^t. Helena to your Place, We direct that he be Entertained a Factor in Our Service upon his Arrival, and do you Acquaint Us how he behaves.

- 19. If there is no Demand on the Money paid into Our Cash on Account of Mr. Zechariah Hodgkin deceased, you must Acquaint Us thereof, and Write off his Credit on the Books to Account Current Fort St. George without Delay, that so We may pay the Amount to the Legal Claimer here, acting in the same manner with respect to the Estates of all deceased Persons whatsoever.
- 20. We have put on Board the Cæsar Twenty five Tons of Lead, which you are to forward by such Conveyances as offer to Fort St. George apon Our Account.
- 21. Richard Wyatt is Entertained by Us a Writer upon your Establishment. We are

WHITEHALL, MARCH 21, 1743/44.

LATE LAST NIGHT A COURIER ARRIVED HERE WITH AN ACCOUNT FROM ADMIRAL Matthews (DATED THE 29TH OF February, O.S. IN Mahon Harbour) OF WHAT PASS'D IN THE ENGAGEMENT NEAR TOULON, BETWEEN HIS MAJESTY'S SQUADRON UNDER HIS COMMAND, AND THE COMBIN'D FLEETS OF France and Spain, and OF HIS PROCEEDINGS SUBSEQUENT THERETO, WHICH IS IN SUBSTANCE AS FOLLOWS.

That the Somerest, Dragon and Warwick joined the Admiral the 3d Instant: That on the 8th he received Advice, that three Expresses came to Toulon the Day before, in a very short Distance of Time, one after the other: That he was likewise informed, that the Conjunct Fleet would put to Sea the next Morning: That between Three and Four that Afternoon, Capt. Marsh, of the Winchilsea, one of the

Ships appointed to watch the Conjunct Fleet's Motions, made the Signal for some of the said Fleet being under Sail; upon which he made the Signal for Unmooring, and putting the Ships in a Condition for Action, which was done with the utmost Alacrity and Expedition: That in less than Half an Hour, they could see several of them from their Ships: That the Signal was made by Capt. Marsh, before it was dark, for seeing nineteen Sail, and about Two in the Morning he sent the Admiral Word, that they had anchored again under Cape Sepet: That as soon as it was Day, they saw those, that came out the Night before, under Sail, and in a very little Time the rest coming out, their Number in all being 34: That the Admiral then. got under Sail, the Wind blowing very fresh Westerly, expecting they would have come down to him; but soon found they had no such Intention, at least for that Day, for they kept plying to Windward, though there was all the Appearance of dirty Weather, and some of the Weathermost Ships were, at Night, Hullto: That he therefore stood to and fro in the Bay till Night, and then anchored having left Cruizers out to watch their Motions; during which the Warwick touched the Ground, but by starting 30 Tuns of Water, was got off about Nine that Night, without any other Damage.

That by Break of Day the next Morning, our People seeing from the Masthead 15 Sail (the rest being hid by the Island of Porquerole) the Admiral immediately got under Way, having but little Wind, and that at North, and made all the Sail he could to get to them, they standing at the same Time towards the English Fleet with a small Breeze Westerly: That after an Hour or two's Calm, there sprung up a small Breeze Easterly, by which Means they neared each other. That at the same Time the Boyne and Chichester appeared in Sight from under Levant. Island, and the Easterly Wind prevailing, they, and a Tender with Provisions from Mahon, soon joined the Admiral, having had the good Fortune to fall in with the Land to the Eastward, without which they must have fallen into the Enemies Hands... That the Enemy brought-to in a Line of Battle, but for Want of Wind, and having a very ugly Sea. it was Night before the Admiral could get near them, having had the Signal out all Day for the Line of Battle, and kept it out for some Time after it was Night. At Dusk he brought-to, within a little more than three Gun's Shot of them, and ordered the Essex to lie a Mile to Leeward of him, and the Winchilsea a good Musket's Shot to Leeward of the Essex, to watch their Motions, and to make the proper Signals, and stand after them, in Case they should make Sail: That they were so near, that he could count the Enemies Ships after the Moon was down, but could not at the same Time see Vice-Admiral Lestock and his Squadron, he having brought-to so far to Windward, that, when it was dawning, and the Admiral had made Sail, and the Signal for the Line of Battle a-breast, the Vice-Admiral was full five Miles a-stern of him: That the Enemy also made Sail, and went with their Topsails and sometimes set their Foresails.

That about Eleven, the Royal Oak and Two Tenders with Provisions from Mahon join'd the Fleet, having luckily fallen in to the Eastward.

That Rear-Admiral Rowley led the Van, but could never come near the French Squadron, as M. de Court would sometimes lie-to, as if he designed staying for them, but when they drew near him, he made Sail again, till at last he had left most of the Spanish Ships a good Way a-stern of him: That the Admiral was then fully convinced he never would come to a general Engagement, but judged his Design was by his way of acting, to draw him down the Streights: That about half an Hour after Eleven, the Admiral made the Signal for Engaging, and soon after bore down upon the Spanish Admiral, and ordered the Marlborough to do the same: That the Action began about One: That the Norfolk engaged M. Navarro (the Spanish Admiral's) Second, who soon bore away, and never shortened Sail, whilst they could see her. The rest of the Admiral's Division a-head engaged those a-head. The Marlborough driving a little too near the Admiral, obliged him to fill his Sails, to prevent her coming on board him. That the little Time Mr. Matthews was engaged, they greatly disabled his Masts and Rigging; and that having but little Wind, and an ugly Swell, his Mizen Topsail handed, to prevent the Masts and Rigging tumbling about their Ears, hindred their working the Ship,

though he reeved new Braces three several Times, so that he could not give the Marlborough the Assistance Captain Cornwall wanted, whose Behaviour is mentioned by Mr. Matthews to merit all imaginable Praise, and whose unfortunate Fate he greatly laments. That the Enemy were extremely well served with Gunners, the French training up a great Number of them, and having been exercising them at a Mark for upwards of three Months before the Engagement: That the Marlborough's Main-mast was brought to by the Board, as if it had been but a Twig, and that the Admiral's Main-mast and his Bowsprit were shot through and through, and the former had only two Shrouds to support it, and all his Top-masts were wounded. That the Enemy fired chiefly at our Masts and Rigging, for though the Admiral engaged within Pistol-shot, he had but nine Men killed outright, and 40 wounded. That his Captain's Arm was shot off the first Broadside. That the Spanish Admiral's Ship the Real was totally disabled, and when Mr. Matthews attacked her Second, she soon bore away, and made all the Sail, she had in her Power so set. That he then made the Signal for the Ann Galley Fireship to burn the Real, but that her Commander was so tedious in priming her, and in coming down; that the four Ships a-stern got so near her, as to prevent her Success; when by some of their Shot, or some other unlucky Accident, she blue up (being then within Pistol-Shot or less of the Real) with her Captain and several of her Men, and also the Spanish Admiral's great Launch full of Men, which had been sent to prevent the Fire-ship from Boarding him. That the Admiral was himself at the same Time within Musket-Shot of the Real, and was afterwards engaged within less than Musket-shot by the same four Ships, which had passed by Mr. Lestock, which Ships the Rear of the Admiral's Division engaged, but at too great a Distance.

That the Somerset, Princessa, Dragon, Bedford, Kingston and Berwick, engaged the Rest of the Spaniards a-head: That one Ship of Sixty Guns of the Enemies fell into our Hands, and that during this Time M. de Court let Rear Admiral Rowley come a-long-side of him, when they had warm Work for near three Glasses, as had the Princess-Caroline: That after that Time, M. de Court, set his Foresail, and left Mr. Rowley, who was then engaged by the French Admiral's two Seconds, but not for above twenty Minutes, before they went off: That there were but three of the French Ships engaged, the rest kept their Wind in order to tack and weather us, but that our Van keeping the Wind of them, prevented their Design taking Place: That the Night coming on with little Wind and a very great Swell, hindered our improving the Advantage we had got; and that the Barfleur had Eighteen Men killed, and Thirty eight wounded.

That notwithstanding the French tack'd upon Rear Admiral Rowley, they did not think proper to engage him; They however retook the Spanish Ship, it being impossible to do any Thing with her, as she had not a Mast standing, and as it was near dark, and the whole French Squadron had tack'd upon them; that there-upon Capt. Hawke of the Berwick left her, but could not get his Lieutenant and Twenty three Men out of her, his first Lieutenant having done all he could to persuade the Men to quit her, but in vain.

That about Eight at Night, the Admiral shifted his Ship, and hoisted his Flag on Board the Russel, Capt. Long, not caring (should there be an Engagement the next Morning) to risk the falling of all his Masts. That at Break of Day they saw the Enemy's Fleet again to Leeward of them, and found they had towed all the crippled Ships before the Wind all Night. The Admiral chaced them again, the French lying in a Line of Battle to Windward of the Spaniards, most of them Hullto, but as he drew near them, they made Sail, and left the disabled Sixty Gun Ship. The Admiral then sent the Essex a-head, and ordered Capt. Norris to burn the said Spanish Ship, (not being able to spare any of his Squadron to carry her to Minorca) which Capt. Norris did, and she blew up about half an Hour after Nine at Night. That there was great Reason to believe, that if there had been any Wind, the French would have left the Spanish crippled Ships, as most of them had suffered greatly.

That in the Afternoon Captain Watkins of the Burford join'd the Fleet; he had been in Hieres Bay the Day before, and hearing the Reports of Guns, and seeing the Smoak, he made directly for it.

That at Night the Admiral brought to, that the Sternmost Ships might get up with him. That he saw the Enemy again the next Morning, but at a great Distance.

That after the Admiral had lost Sight of the Enemy's Fleet, and found all his Endeavours to rejoin them, or to procure Intelligence of them, ineffectual (they being gone, as he supposed, down the *Streights*) he laboured for several Days, against contrary Winds and Storms, to get back to the Bay of *Hieres*, which however he found impracticable, and was obliged to put into *Port Mahon*, where he was at an Anchor on the 29th past, and proposed to get again out to Sea the first moment that the necessary Reparations could be made of the Damages sustained by several of his Ships, as well in the Engagement with the *French* and *Spanish* Fleets, as in the constant Storms and foul Weather he had since met with.

As the Admiral had not then had his Returns from the several Captains, who were engaged, of the Loss they might sustain in the Action, he was not able to send the Particulars thereof by this Courier.

All that he mentions upon that Head, besides what is above, is, that the *Marlborough* lost in the Action 43 Men, her Captain and Master included, had 90 wounded, who had been sent to the Hospital in *Minorca*, and 30 slightly wounded, who remained on board, and would soon be able to do their Duty.

Hrs Majesty's Ships the Gibralter, Phœnix, and Fly Sloop, are sail'd to the Westward. The following remain, the Sufflok, Sir John Norris; the Northumberland, Captain Monmouth, Augusta, Dreadnought, Princess Mary, Jersey, Success, Ætna and Scipio Fire-Ships Came down Yesterday, and is now under Sail, the Whittane, Dancy, for Virginia. Wind N. E.

Yesterday arriv'd Mail from France and two from Flanders.

Paris A-la-main, March 27. 'It's reported here, that near thirty Officers have desired to throw up their Commissions, and that the King will go to the Army in Flanders, upon his Keturn from Fontainbleau.

- 'All the General Officers who have been at *Dunkirk*, are arrived here. The Son of the Pretender, who is also arriv'd incognito, supp'd last Sunday with that Prince, at the Hotel de Conde.
- 'The Court has given Notice to all the Merchants of the Kingdom, that the 'Men of War which Admiral Mathews has upon the Coasts of Villa Franca, seizes 'upon all the French Ships he can meet with, and carries them into that Port, 'where there are already twenty Ships.
 - A Regiment of Hussars is forming at Sedan, for the Service of France.
- 'The Marquis de St. Sevrin, a Sovoyard, who bore a Commission in the Army of the Infant Don *Philip*, has been carried to the Prison of *Mont-mellian*, being accused of holding Correspondence with the Court of *Turin*.
- 'They write from *Provence*, that all Vessels fit for being made Transports of, continue to be stopt in order to carry Troops into *Italy*. Actions 1945.'

Peterburg, Feb. 29. The Empress has published Letters Patent throughout all the Empire whereby she grants her Protection to all Foreigners without Distinction, who will come and settle in her Empire, and promises Rewards to all those who

shall promote Arts and Sciences; and further grants them the free Exercise of their Religion, with Power to build Churches, &c. the Jews are only excepted out of this Toleration.

The Merchants, as well English as National, who trade with Persia, have found Means of facilitating the Transportation of Provision and Merchandize coming from Ispahan, by causing them to be landed directly at Archangel, where pursuant to the Orders of the Empress, all necessary Assistance will be given, whereas heretofore being obliged to carry them by Astracan and Derbent, upon the River Volga, which is frozen up during several Months in the Year, and the Mountains scarcely passable, they were, to the great Detriment of the Merchants and People, an infinite Time before they arrived. It's reported that her Imperial Majesty has at length have been moved by the repeated Instances made to her, to grant to the Person of Duke Ulrick of Brunswick only, Liberty to go into Germany.

Vienna, March 7. Count Donha, the Prussian Minister at this Court, is going to Brestaw, from whence he intimates he shall soon return hither.

Boisteduc, March 19, Yesterday we had here a violent Tempest of Thunder and Lightning, which set Fire to the Hotel of the Government, and entirely reduced it to Ashes.

Brussels, March 26. Yesterday about Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, arrived here their Serene Highnesses the Archdutchess Mary-Anne and Prince Charles of Lorrain, to whom great Honours have every where in their Journey hither been paid; and the Joy that every Body demonstrates upon their Arrival here is inexpressible.

LONDON.

The Dispatches brought by the Messengers from Admiral Mathews and Admiral Rowley import, that just before the Engagement, Admiral Rowley [had] Command of the Van, Admiral Mathews the Center, and Lestock lay by for a Reserve; but upon the Wind changing Mathews had the Van, and Rowley the Center. The former, with sixteen English Ships, engaged fifteen Spaniards; the latter (Rowley) with eight engaged fifteen French and two Spanish, which after two hours and a half sheered off. Mathews sunk the Spanish Admiral, and destroyed two others, and it's computed that 3000 of them were killed. Both the Admirals sent to Lestock for Assistance, but receiv'd none. All the English are safe. Admiral Mathew's Empress came from Port-Mahon Rowley's from Antibes, where he lies to prevent any Embarkation for Italy.

Yesterday the Duke of New Castle sent for the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, and Representatives of this City, and acquainted them that an Express was arriv'd from Mr. Thompson, our Ambassador at Paris, with an Account that he the said Ambassador was sent for by M. Amelot to Versailles, who acquainted him in the Name of the King his Master, that Things were come to such a pass that a Declaration of War must soon ensue on their part; upon which Mr. Thompson replied, that his Nation was thoroughly prepared to take the proper Measures. And last Night Sir William Calvert and Sir Robert Ladbrooke, by Order of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, acquainted the Merchants and Traders therewith, that they may act accordingly.

This Day his Majesty will go to the House of Peers to give the Royal Assent to several Bills.

On Tuesday Night last the Right Hon. the Lord Carteret was married to Miss Sophia Fermor, Daughter to the Right Hon. the Earl of Pomfret.

The King has been pleas'd to appoint William Lindsay, Montagu Blomer, and John Whitwell, Esqrs. to be Captains in His Majesty's Third Regiment of Foot-Guards, commanded by the Right Hon. John Earl of Dunmore, in the room of Col. Buchan, Capt. Lovell, and Capt. Paulet.

They write from Brest, that M. Roquefeulle Commander of the Brest Squadron, died on board his Ship soon after his Arrival there.

They write from Monkton-Farley in the County of Wilts, that a Church under Ground has lately been discover'd in a Coney-Warren belonging to Webb Seymour, Esq., by some Labourers employ'd to level a Piece of Land there. It appears to have been a Church by the several Stone Pillars, Altars, Sepulchres, Skeletons, Bones, and Inscriptions, which have been found about it. The Labourers have also dug up a Cup, Spoon, and Thimble, all of Silver; and 'tislikely, that as the Rubbish is clear'd away, many other valuable Curiosities may be discover'd.

His Majesty has been pleas'd to confer the Honour of Knighthood on Thomas Rider, Esq., of Boughton-Monchensey in the County of Kent, Son of the late Sir Barnham Rider, whose Family has long held an Estate in that County under the particular Tenure of presenting three Cups to our Sovereigns at their Coronations.

The following Persons will preach the Spital-Sermons next Week at St. Bride's before the Right Hon. the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and the Governors of the several Hospitals: On Monday, the Right Rev. Dr. Hutton, Bishop of Bangor; on Tuesday, the Rev. Dr. Brook, Dean of Chester; and on Wednesday, the Rev. Dr. Bayne.

On Thursday last came on the Election for a Thursday Lecturer at St. Lawrence Jewry, in the room of the Rev. Dr. Middleton, deceas'd. The Candidates were reduced to the Rev. Mr. Agate and the Rev. Mr. Rayn. A Poll being demanded in Favour of the latter, at the close of the Poll there appear'd for Mr. Agate 86, and for Mr. Rayn 61, when the former was declar'd duly elected.

Yesterday the Dean and Chapter of St. Paul's presented the Rev. Mr. Pinckney, Minor Canon of the said Church, to the Living of Mucking in Essex, void by the Death of the Rev. Mr. Abbot, the late Incumbent.

We are credibly inform'd that Mr. Currer jun. of Furnival's Inn, (who lately married Miss Freeman, sole Daughter of George Freeman, late of Knightsbridge, Esq., deceas'd, a Lady of fine Accomplishments) has had, and will have with his said Lady, a Fortune exceeding 6000l. Fortes Fortuna juvat.

Last Night the Serenata call'd Love and Friendship, compos'd by Mr. De-Fesch, was perform'd at the Crown and Anchor Tavern in the Strand, with universal Applause, to a very numerous and polite Audience.

Yesterday one Jones, some time since convicted at Guildhall for demanding a Sum of Money from Mr. Wilmer, an eminent Apothecary within Bishopsgate, or upon refusing to comply that he would swear Sodomy against him, stood on the Pillory in the said Street, and met with severe Treatment from the Populace.

CAPTAIN THOMAS STEVENS'S COMMISSION TO SEIZE PERSONS IN INDIA.

TO ALL PEOPLE [to whom these Presents shall come], [The] United Company of Merchants of England Trading to [the] East-Indies, Send GREETING.

WHEREAS, in and by an Act of Parliament made in the Fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign, it is (amongst) other Things Enacted, That any of his Majesty's Subjects should, from and after the twentieth Day of February, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighteen, sail, go or repair to, or be in the East-Indies in the Countries and Parts of Asia and Africa, or in such Places of Asia, Africa, and America, or any of them, beyond the Cape of Bona Esparanza to the Streights of Magellan, where any Trade or [Troffick] of Merchandize is or may be used or had, contrary to the Laws then in being, or the [Tenor of] the said Act; such Persons, so offending, should be liable to such Punishment as by any [Law in] being might

be inflicted for such offence; and that it should and might be lawful [to and] for the United Company of Merchants of England Trading to the East Indies and their Successors, to take, arrest and seize, or cause to be taken, arrested and seized, such Person or Persons being a Subject or Subjects of his Majesty, his Heirs or Successors at any Place or Places where he or they shall be found, within the Limits or Places aforesaid; and the Person and Persons so taken, arrested and seized, to send and remit to England, there to answer for the Offence aforesaid, according to due Course of Law. And it was in and by the said Act provided enacted, that the said Act should continue in Force for five Years and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, and no longer. AND WHEREAS in and by an Act of Parliament made in the ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the said Act of the Fifth Year of His said late Majesty was further continued in Force for Seven years, from the 25th Day of March 1723, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. And whereas by an Act of Parliament made in the Fifth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty the said first mentioned Act is revived, and further continued in Force for several Years, from the First Day of May, 1732, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. AND WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the thirteenth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, the last recited Act of the fifth Year of his present Majesty [is] continued till the first Day of June 1747, as in and by the Said Acts, Relation being thereunto had, may more fully appear.
