GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID DATED 30th. AUGUST 1749 PER THE LAPWING.
[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 53, pp. 31-38.*]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL AT FORT S^t. DAVID.

1. Since the Departure of the Severn with our Letter of the 29th. of March, We have received your Advices by the Lapwing dated the 16th. of January, as also the Presidents to the Secret Committee.

2. We have enclosed a List of Ships to be Employed this Season for the carrying on our Trade, also an Account of the Arrival and Departure of Shipping since the last was sent.

3. Our Committee of Secrecy for this Year consists of the following Gentlemen Vir^t. William Baker Esq^r. Richard Chauncy Esq^r. and William Mabbott Esq^r. whose Orders as [to] Signals and Places of Rendezvous of Ships are punctually to be Observed.

4. As the giving our Settlement at Bengal, an early Supply is of the greatest Consequence to Us, We now return to them the Lapwing Captain Francis Cheyne Commander, with a Consignment of Eighty Chests of Treasure and several other particulars according to an Abstract of her Invoice enclosed.

5. If Captain Cheyne should call at Fort S^t. David which he is directed to do if he can reach it in all the Month of January you are to Coin the Treasure with the utmost Expedition and Dispatch him away forthwith that he may get to Bengal in time to be sent home the same season with a Cargo of Fine Goods.

6. You are on no pretence whatsoever to detain any part of this supply without replacing it with the same value in Rupees, We the more particularly insist upon it because You have lately by diverting such large sums out of what We intended for Bengal most sensibly Distressed Us in that Important Branch of Our Trade.

7. And you are hereby positively directed to take all Opportunitys of forwarding as much Treasure to Bengal as can possibly be spared.

8. If you have any Rupees ready, let them be shipt in lieu of an equal Value of the Lapwings Bullion, and if you are apprehensive any Detention may hazard her early Arrival in Bengal, you must send her away immediately with her Silver uncoined.

9. We have returned to India in the Lapwing several Lascars which came to England in that Ship and the Swallow according to the enclosed List, the Surgeon for his care of them is to be paid Ten Shillings a Head for so many as are Landed at your Place, you must observe that this Allowance extends only to Lascars Navigating our own Ships.

10. As our Settlements on the West Coast are in great want of Slaves We have Ordered our Vessell the Swallow Snow Cap^t. John Bell Commander to Proceed to Madagascar for the Purchase of Two Hundred and fifty, or as many as can be conveniently stowed, and have appointed the said Captain Bell and his Chief Mate Mr. Thomas Routhead, or the Commander and Chief Mate for the time being our Agents for that purpose, We have enclosed a Copy of the Instructions given to them, wherein you will observe they are to Act under your Direction.

11. On her Arrival at your place time enough to proceed to the West Coast the same Season, as soon as the Slaves and Ships Company are Refreshed, and the necessary Repairs given to the Ship, you are to give the Commander Orders to proceed accordingly, otherways forward the Slaves by the first safe Conveyances, and in the meantime let the Vessell be usefully employed.

12. As soon as the Ships Company are Refreshed and the Vessell is refitted she is to return again to Madagascar for a Second Cargo of Slaves which are intended for the use of your Settlement to be employed in such a manner as you shall judge will be most usefull to us, in particular We would have those who are fitt for it Trained to the Military Exercise, as We are well assured that the same Slaves may be made usefull to Us both as Soldiers and Labourers.

13. If by the Death of Captain Bell or the Chief Mate in the first Voyage from Madagascar their Stations should be filled up by incapable Persons you are to set such aside and Appoint proper Ones in their room.

14. When the Swallows Slaving Voyage is finished, She is to have an early Dispatch from your place or Bengal with [a] Cargo of Fine Goods.

15. You are to Supply him with Men, Stores and such Assistance as the Commander shall apply for and you shall think necessary,

16. You are to pay to our said Agents Twenty Shillings a Head for so many Slaves as shall be Delivered to You alive to be divided between them in the following Proportions Viz. Two thirds to the Commander and One third to the Chief Mate.

17. And the Surgeon must likewise be paid Five Shillings a Head for so many of the Slaves as shall be Delivered alive.

18. The Shippers of Foreign Silver and Coral Consigned to your place on the Lapwing have agreed in case she proceeds directly to Bengal that it may be forwarded from thence to Fort S^t. David on the said Ship or any other of the

Company's European Ships at the risque of the said Shippers, but without any further Charge to them, and We shall give the necessary Directions for that purpose to the President and Council of Bengal.

19. The Orders We gave last Season with regard to Dispatching home the Ships at the high Freight & Demorage must be observed this if any still remain on your hands.

20. There being Three or more Ships now fitting out at Leghorn destined as We are well assured to the East Indies to Open and Carry on a Trade from that Place, and as there is great reason to believe many English Officers, Sailors and Others will engage in that Service; in Order to prevent the mischievous consequences that may attend the same We have Petitioned His Majesty to give Orders to his Commanders to Visit such Ships, and to Arrest and bring to Great Britain all such of His Majestys as shall be found on board them agreeable to the several Acts of Parliament for that purpose in the 5th. and 9th. Years of the Reign of George the 1st. and the 5th. 13th. and 20th. of His present Majesty. You are therefore to Apply to the Commanders of His Majestys Ships to put the said Acts in Execution, and as much as possible be Assisting therein yourselves.

21. Coja Marut Marcar an Armenian Merchant who has Resided under our Protection at Calcutta for several Years having Represented to Us that in the Course of his Voyage between Persia and Madrass his Ship and Cargo was Seized at Callicut in the Year 1747 by the Portuguese and Condemned at Goa, notwithstanding he produced to them a Fort S^t. George Pass, His Majesty upon his, and our humble Petition has been pleased to Order his Minister at the Court of Portugal to Assert the Rights of His Majestys Subjects and such Others as Reside under our Protection to a Free and uninterrupted Trade in the Indian Seas, and so far to [e-pouse] the Cause of the said Marut Marcar that his Ship and Cargo so unjustly Condemned may be restored, or a suitable satisfaction made him for the same.

22. And the better to enable him to prosecute the said Affair at the Court of Portugal, for which place he lately set out We have Lent him the Sum of Five hundred Pounds for which he has given us four Bills of Exchange of the same Tenour and Date on Michael Gregory Merchant at Fort S^t. David Payable at Sixty days Sight to Our President of that place for the time being or his Order Dated 12th. July 1749. We have sent by this Ship the First Bill with his Letter of Advice, you must take care to receive the same and carry it to our Credit.

23. As We find in the Proceedings at Goa some Objections were started against the Fort S^t. George Pass aforesaid, although We do not admit them to be Material, yet to obviate as much as in us lies all Difficultys in future, We have enclosed the proper Form of a Pass to be given to all such Persons as have a Right to our Protection.

24. From the Receipt of this Letter the rate of Exchange for Money paid into our Cash for Bills and Certificates is to be on the footing it was before Our Orders of the 10th. January 1745. [At] Seven Shillings and Eight pence a Pagoda to Covenant Servants and such Persons as are entitled to Bills at that Rate, and all Others Seven Shillings and four pence.

25. As We cannot send you by this Ship a List of the Investment to be made the Ensuing Season, We can only at present recommend it to you to use your utmost diligence procuring as large a Quantity of Goods as possible—particularly fine Muslins, as since the Prohibition of Camb[ric] there is a very great Demand for them, and for this purpose intend to Dispatch the China Ships very early that they may first call at Fort S. David with a plentiful Supply of Treasure, Goods and stores.

26. You must send Us a few Pales of Suocatums such as [we] used formerly to receive from Fort S. George.

27. Several Books from the Subordinates have been omitted to be sent home, particularly from Vizagapatam which must be forwarded by the next Conveyance, and more care must [be] taken that all Books, Accounts &c^a. are for the future regular[ly] brought up, and constantly sent Us every season.

28. As Captain Delavaux's Behaviour has been very unsatisfactory, We have thought proper to discharge him from Our Service, and you are hereby ordered to give him notice to proceed home on one of the first Ships.

29. A state of the Case with regard to several Bonds given by the late President and Council of Fort St. George together with the Opinion of Council thereon having been laid before a General Court on the 21th. of June last, they could come to no Resolution 'till further and more satisfactory Advices were received relating to them, You must therefore punctually obey the Orders We gave you last Season with regard to all the Money Transactions at Fort St. George, that We may be able to give the General Court the Satisfaction they expect.

30. You must Transmit us every Season separately in the Packet a Full and Exact Account of the Sales of all our Goods at your Settlement whether European or Indian, according to the method of our Sales in England, for which purpose We have enclosed a proper Form, Observing that Goods Invoiced separately must be separately Lotted.

31. It is with great difficulty and uncertainty We can collect from your Books the Appointments of our several Servants, you are therefore for our Information hereby directed to cause a List to be drawn out of our Covenant Servants, and from the Governour to the Writer distinguish their Yearly Salary, Allowances for Dyet, Pallankeen, Servants &c^a. of each, as well as all Allowances annexed by way of Gratuity or otherways to particular Posts.

32. The like must be done with regard to the Military from the Commander to the Private Centinell, not inserting however the name of each soldier.

33. As also of all other Persons Employed in the several branches of Our Business, who receive any Pay or Allowances from the Company, distinguishing their several Employments.

34. All which Accounts drawn out in a concise and methodical manner are to be sent Cs by the first Opportunity, and continued Annually.

35. In case the French Capuehins of the Province of Tourain should pretend to any Right of Presentation of Padres to the Romish Church at Madrass, you are to stop such pretence as Our Governours have always done, they having not the least shadow of a right to it, and upon any vacancy you are to Appoint the Persons who are to Officiate there.

36. Although We have so often represented to you the great Consequence of sending by every Conveyance a full and clear Account of the value of our Estate under your management as We are directed by the 29th. By Law Annually in the Month of June to cause a General State of the Companys Affairs to be drawn out, yet many Opportunitys have been omitted, and either through misapprehending Our Orders, Negligence or inattention, those which have been sent are very defective, and are far from Answering the purpose, in stating there[fore] an Account of the Quick Stock, you are to observe and punctually comply with the following Directions, as It will admit of no excuse to the contrary, viz^t.

37. The same Method is to be Observed in the Accounts of the several Subordinates, and under their respective Heads, to be inserted in the above Account.

38. The Ballance is the Nett Value of the Stock in Trade or as it is generally called Quick Stock at Fort St. David Presidency.

39. The Dead Stock, consisting of Forts, Buildings, Wor[ks] and their Appurtenances, is to have no place in this Account.

40. If it shall happen that at or near the Close of the Account, any Money or Goods are received from, or sent [to] any part of India a proper Remark must be made at the bottom of the name of the Ship, and the value of such [Money] or Goods, and whether included in this Account.

41. It must be forwarded to Us by every Conveyance, but that by the last Ship in particular must be as Correct as possible.

42. If our Servants at the Subordinates do not send you their Accounts in time, you must supply the same by way of Estimate in the best manner you can, but at the same time let them know we shall highly Resent their Negligence.

43. The enclosed Packets to our Governour and Council of Bombay being of great Consequence, you are to forward the same as soon as possible by the first good Conveyance, both by Land & Sea. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID, DATED 3^d. NOVEMBER 1749, PER THE PORTFIELD.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 53, pp. 29-36.*]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT ST. DAVID.

1. We writ to you by the Lapwing under date of the 30th. of August, and sent a Duplicate of the same Letter dated the 4th. of October by the Swallow, the first proceeded directly on her Voyage from the Downes the 6th. of September, and the other from Spithead the 26th. October.

2. To our very great Pleasure (and as it was so late in the Season almost unexpectedly) arrived about the middle of last Month the Godolphin from the West Coast, the Porto Bello from your Settlement, and the Bombay Castle from Bengal.

3. This goes by the Ship Portfield Capt^m. Carteret Le Gevt Commander who is under our Orders to proceed directly to Fort St. David to deliver the Treasure and Goods We have Consigned to you, according to the enclosed Invoice and Bill of Lading.

4. You will observe some Stores mentioned in the said Invoice, which the Swallow could not take in, being part of her Madagascar Cargo, you must therefore on the Swallows Arrival send them on board, and in the mean time, order the Chests of small Arms to be opened, and particular Care taken that they are kept free from Rust.

5. On the Arrival of the Portfield, you must with the utmost expedition, take out the Cargo Consigned to you, and at furthest within ten Days after her Arrival, give the Commander Orders to proceed directly to Benjar Massin on the Island of Borneo, and follow all such Orders as he shall receive from Mess^{rs}. Mordecai Walker, Francis Muriell and James Waller, whom We have appointed our Supra Cargos of the said Ship, for his future Procedure, under whose directions he is to be, immediately on his departure from Fort S^t. David.

6. Our View in sending the Portfield to Benjar, is not only to purchase a Cargo a Pepper for the China Market, but also to keep up and assert our Right to a Free and uninterrupted Trade to that Place, which has been lately obstructed by the Chicanery and Arbitrary Behaviour of the Dutch, you are therefore to communicate to our said Supra Cargos, all the Intelligence you are Masters of relating to that Place, particularly what Success the Delawar met with, and in general give them all possible assistance, as the Success of the Voyage greatly depends, upon their having a thorough information of the situation of Affairs there.

7. You are to provide and send aboard to our said Supra Cargos Assistance, a person well skilled in the Malley Language.

8. We repeat the Directions We have given by every Conveyance, because We positively insist upon a strict observation of them, That no more of the Treasure by this, or any other Ship, be detained, than what you absolutely want, the rest being to be Coined and forwarded to Bengal, by the first good Conveyances, as the giving that Settlement, a full and early Supply is the principal Object in our present View.

9. The four China Ships will very soon follow this, likewise with several Consignments of Treasure and Goods, you are therefore to hold yourselves in readiness to give them a quick dispatch, that no time may be lost in the prosecution of their Voyage.

10. If you can Load any Goods on them proper for the Canton Market, without hazarding their Passage, it will be an acceptable Piece of Service to Us, We give you this early Notice, that you may be making Provision accordingly, and We shall give Orders to the Supra Cargos, to pay the amount, out of the Bullion Consigned to them.

11. Though We have no Intention at present to give you our Thoughts, upon the Advices We have received from you this Season, yet We cannot help observing, upon your being so very short in most of them, your omitting to write by many Conveyances, and detaining your Books and Papers of Consequence for the last Ship, which, had she not most unexpectedly Arrived, must have kept Us almost in the dark for a whole Season, all which, to say no worse of it has a great appearance of Negligence.

12. As has likewise your sending the Delawar away to Borneo, without supplying the Command^r. with some Instructions for his Conduct, in a Voyage of such a Critical Nature deprived as he was of his Supra Cargos.

13. We have appointed Benjamin Robins Esq^r. Engineer General of all our Settlements in India, a Gentleman eminently skilled in his profession, who will, with several Assistants, take his Passage on one of the first Ships, after the departure of this, You are therefore hereby positively directed, entirely to put a stop to all further procedure in the Fortifications and Works at Fort S^t. David, untill his Arrival or untill you hear further from Us on that Subject.

14. Presuming that Madrass is restored to Us, We direct on sight hereof, that you appoint a Council to consist of Five Persons, for the Management of our Affairs at that Settlement, of which M^r. Richard Prince is to be Chief, M^r. Joseph Fowke

Second and the other Stations to be filled by our Covenant Servants, according to their standing, unless their Behaviour and Circumstances may render them unfit for the same.

15. We likewise direct that such a Number of Covenant Servants be sent to their Assistance, as may be necessary for carrying on the Business, as also half the Military Forces upon your Establishment, under the Command of a proper Officer.

16. And in order to recall the Trading People, and others the late Inhabitants of Madrass, and Encourage them to settle there again, you are hereby Authorized, to assure them and all others who may have an Inclination to reside there, that We will to the Utmost Protect and Defend them, and that they shall enjoy all their Rights and Privileges in as full a manner as the Inhabitants did, before the unfortunate Capture of the Place by the French, of which you are to give General Notice in the several Languages, and affix the same at all proper Publick Places.

17. No Building Publick or Private, either in the White or Black Town at Madrass, are to be Erected or restored untill the Arrival of M^r. Robins our Engineer, who will proceed on one of the first Ships, or untill you hear further from Us. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT S^t. DAVID DATED 8th, DECEMBER 1749, PER THE GRANTHAM
[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 53, pp. 57-53*].

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT S^t. DAVID.

1. Our last went by the Portfield bearing date the 3^d. of November a Copy of which comes in the Packet by the Ship Grantham.

2. We shall by this Conveyance under the usual heads give the necessary directions for the Transaction of Affairs under your Management, and at the same time reply to and make such Observations as occur to Us upon a Perusal of your Addresses of the 16th. January by the Lapwing and the 22^d. of February by the Porto Bello, and

FIRST OF SHIPPING.

3. On these Ships the Prince Edward Cap^t. Robert Haldane Commander the Duke of Cumberland Cap^t. Robert Osborne, the Grantham Cap^t. Walter Wilson, and the York Cap^t. Edward Ward, We have Consigned to you a large Quantity of Bullion, Merchandise and Stores for the particulars of which We refer to the Invoices and Bills of Lading in the respective Packets.

4. You are to use the utmost Dispatch in delivering them and immediately give the Commanders Orders to make the best of their way to Canton in China and follow all such Orders as they shall receive for their future Conduct from the Supra Cargoes We have appointed to take charge of the said Ships who are viz^t.

5. For the Prince Edward and Duke of Cumberland Mess^{rs}. John Misenor Richard Wood, Hillary Torriano, Robert Mackett and Thomas Smith, and for the Ships Grantham and York Mess^{rs}. Henry Palmer, Henry Revell, Stephen Devisme, John Hull and Mann Horner to whom you are to give all necessary Advice and Assistance.

6. If you can without loss of time load any Goods on the said Ships proper for the Canton Market agreeable to the Intimation in Our Advices by the Portfield it will be very acceptable to Us, and in such case the Supra Cargoes have Our Orders to pay the Amount of such Goods out of the Bullion Consigned to them, but you are on no pretence to detain them longer than the Supra Cargoes shall approve of.

7. We have given proper directions to Our Supra Cargoes to take charge of any Casual Ships that may arrive at Canton from Our several Settlements in India, and shall continue such Orders Annually of which We give you notice that in case of being overburthened with Tonnage you may Consign them to such Supra Cargoes as We have appointed to take Charge of them, with suitable Cargoes for the Canton Market.

8. As We propose to Dispatch the Ships London, Kent, Lynn and Norfolk Consigned to the Coast and Bay the beginning of next Month you may expect to see them soon after the aforesaid China Ships.

9. All Our Ships this Season carry out whole Kintlage in Iron therefore you will not be obliged by Charterparty to Load any Salt Petre unless you are under a necessity of doing it for want of other Goods, in which case you are to load no more than the Charterparty Tonnage.

10. You are to load home as many ships as you possibly can with their Charterparty Tonnage, observing that the Ships which have been longest in India are always to be the first dispatched; but if you have any surplus Tonnage it must be laden on the latter ships at half freight.

11. We have laden on the Swallow as Ships Stock an half Chest of Treasure, and the Commander has Directions to pay what remains of it into Our Cash at the last Settlement he shall be dispatched from or in failure thereof at S^t. Helena, and in case it is paid at Fort S^t. David duly advise Us of the same, and give him a receipt for what shall be so paid in.

12. It was recommended to Admiral Boscawen on his departure from England to dismiss as early as possible after his Arrival on the Coast of Choromandel such of the Companys ships as were not further absolutely necessary to him, and We are thoroughly persuaded had you done your duty by representing to him the excessive Expence We stood at by his detention of so many, after the Expedition against Pondicherry was at an end, he would have discharged at least Two more than he did which in some measure would have Alleviated that Heavy Article of Demorage and We been further Benefitted by a considerable Quantity of Pepper which lay ready for them on the Mallabar Coast.

13. It was with great difficulty the Porto Bello saved her Passage about the Cape owing only as We are very well assured to your detaining her near a Month for your Books and Papers which were not ready and which ought and might have been sent by the Lapwing this Piece of Negligence is very dear to Us, and We mention it that you may be more attentive to Our Interest for the future.

14. Our own Ship the Dolphin Captain George Newton Commander has never been heard off since her Departure from Spithead in March 1747/8 there is great reason therefore to apprehend she Perished at Sea.

15. The Captures made by his Majestys Ship the Medways Prize, as likewise by Captain Meard of the Benjamin and Cap^t. Brown of the Bombay Castle have greatly embarrassed Our Affairs in Bengal, the Government insisting upon Our making satisfaction to the Owners who they alledge are the Subjects of the great Mogul, with regard to Our own ships at least you should have more peremptorily insisted upon the Captors depositing the Produce of their Prizes in Our Cash to

abide the Issue of a Tryal in England as to the Legality of them, and this you the rather ought to have done as it appears you were apprehensive Our Trade would be obstructed on this Account.

16. You have not mentioned in your Letters the several sums of Money advanced the Commanders for the use of their Ships which must never be Omitted for the future.

17. Neither have you taken Notice in your Letters of the Money paid to several Commanders for the Maintenance of the Military aboard their ships, which upon a Perusal of your Consultations appears to be charged at extravagant Rates, viz^t. to Cap^t. Brown, after the Rate of Eighteen pence a day for each Man, and to Captains Weston and Baron Eight Fanams a day for Common Soldiers and Twelve for Officers, and which We observe was paid, to them upon their barely asserting the Detachments stood them in those Sums, if you could not bring them to more reasonable terms the adjustments of those Accounts should have been referred home; nor does it any where appear whether the Detachments on Board those Ships belonged to His Majesty or Us, if they were his Majestys it ought to have been Certified that We might have been Enabled to have made good Our Demand on the Government for Repayment.

18. You must be particularly careful and exact in adjusting all Accounts of Damage and Short Delivery of the Cargoes of Our several Ships, and oblige the Commanders to pay for the same according to Charterparty, you are to explain the Nature of such Damage and short Delivery, the Condition of the Package, and add such Observations thereto as will enable Us to Judge whether the Owners are Entitled to any equitable Relief, you are to endorse the same on the Bills of Lading and fully advise Us in your Letters of all Circumstances.

19. And as there generally appears a deficiency in the Weight of Lead, Iron, Copper and Elephants Teeth which may in part be occasioned by the different manner of Weighing the same in England and India, We have thought it proper to acquaint you with the Method used here, whereby you may be able to form a Judgment whether there is any real deficiency or not, viz^t. Lead about 15^{lb} at a draft, and no less Weights than 4^{lb} are used, but no draft allowed. Iron about 5^{lb} at a draft, weighing with no less Weights than 2^{lb}, and for draft 2^{lb} are allowed. Copper and Elephants Teeth about 5^{lb} at a draft, weighing very near and One Pound is allowed for a draft.

20. You should have insisted upon the Commanders paying for the Gunny Bags they were supplied with, to put their Ballast in, as there could be no reason for disputing whether it was a charge on Us or the Owners.

SECONDLY OF EUROPE GOODS, OR FROM ONE PART OF INDIA TO BE DISPOSED OF AT ANOTHER.

21. We have sent on these ships a large Quantity of Bullion intended solely for Bengal, it must be therefore Coined with the utmost Dispatch and forwarded with as much more as you can possibly spare by every safe and convenient opportunity, the earlier the better.

22. And here We cannot help observing how greatly you have distressed Our Affairs in Bengal by stopping such large Sums intended solely for the use of that Settlement contrary to Our repeated and express Orders.

23. By the Dollars which We have received from you in the Porto Bello's Packet, We find Linga Chitta's Assay to be right, and whereas Dollars are usually two penny weights and a half worse than the English Standard these are four penny weights worse, but We must observe in assaying the Rupees Coined in February 1748/9 likewise received by the said Conveyance there has been a debasement in that Coinage, for whereas Our Rupees ought to be four Penny Weights and a half better than English Standard, these are only two penny weight and a half better, as will appear by Our Accountants Remarks herewith

sent you, We therefore positively direct that for the future the strictest care be taken to keep the Coinage both of the Gold and Silver to the due fineness, that the Credit of Our Mint may be preserved.

24. As very good Gunpowder is made at Bombay, you must for the future be supplied from thence both for the use of the Settlements on your Coast and for Bencoolen whenever therefore you are in want of that article application must be made to the President and Council of Bombay accordingly.

25. From the Receipt of this Letter you are to make no Contracts for or Purchases of Tea notwithstanding any former Orders We may have given.

26. We observe that upon your Contracting for the Investment it was part of the Agreement with the Merchants that they should be indulged with Broad Cloth as was usual at Madras, but that afterwards upon their desiring to be excused from taking it at the Companys alledged fixed Price of Thirty ₹ Cent on Invoice it was disposed of to Linga Chittee on those terms, We find upon turning back to former directions to Fort St. George that the Method of Selling Goods by a fixed Price was so far from being approved of, that it was Connived at only from time to time to Enable the Merchants who were largely Indebted to the Company to discharge their Ballances and as We have experienced the great advantage of Publick Sales both in Bengal and at Bombay, We therefore positively direct that not only Woollen but all other Sorts of Goods and Stores whatsoever be put up to Auction the same Season they arrive, and you are to Lott them in such a manner as that each Species be distinct and not intermixed with any other, and in order to obtain the best price the Market will afford without subjecting any Species of Goods to be Engrossed, We further direct that no Lott exceed in Quantity Four Bales of Broad Cloth or Three Bales of Perpets, and that of all other Sorts of Goods no greater Quantity be put up in One Lott than to the Value of Two Hundred Pounds Sterling Invoice Cost. The Price you are to put them up at and under which they are not to be Sold must be by adding Fifteen ₹ Cent to the Invoice Price, and whoever bids most upon that Price is to be declared the Buyer. Notice in the several Languages must be given and fixed up in the most Publick Places at least a Month, but as much longer as you can conveniently before the day of Sale, and in the mean time the Goods are to be exposed to Publick View and the Buyers acquainted with the following terms viz^t.

First, The Goods shall be exposed to View from the time that Notice is given to the day of Sale Sorted in Lots as they are to be put up.

Secondly the Purchaser of any Goods shall be allowed Twelve Months time to clear them or any Parcel of them out of the Warehouse without paying any Rent or Allowance for Warehouse Room.

Thirdly the Buyer on paying the Amount of his Goods or any Parcel thereof shall have such Goods or Parcell delivered to him, and no Goods whatever to be delivered till the Money is actually paid.

Fourthly an Allowance or Discount shall be made to the Buyer of Nine Pagodas on every One hundred Pagodas paid in before the expiration of Six Months from the day of the Commencement of the Sale, and an Allowance in like manner shall be made of only Three Pagodas in every One hundred paid in after Six Months and before the expiration of Twelve Months from the Commencement of the Sale aforesaid.

Fifthly after the expiration of twelve Months if any Goods remain, not paid for and Cleared according to the Conditions aforesaid, such Goods shall be put up to Publick Auction, and Sold for ready Money and if any Loss is occasioned thereby the prior purchaser shall be obliged to make good the same.

Sixthly If any Person shall fail to make Payment within Twelve Months as aforesaid for any Goods bought by him he shall not be permitted to be a Buyer at any future Sale until he has made full Satisfaction for such his Nonpayment.

Sevently All Persons whatsoever without distinction shall be free to Purchase at the Companys Auction on the terms abovewritten.

27. The said Terms together with a particular Account of the Sale of every Lot must be Entered on Consultation and a Separate Account thereof forwarded in the Packets according to the Forms transmitted you this Season by the Lapwing, Swallow and Portfield.

28. These Regulations for the Sale of Our Goods We will by no means dispence with a Breach of.

29. We are surprized at the great deficiencies of Grain received by several Ships from Bengal, and although Our Servants there may have been to blame in sending it dusty and not have taken due care to prevent Pilferage on Shipping, yet We are apprehensive there has been a like want of care at your Settlement in Landing it, which for the future in such kind of Cargoes must be prevented by a more particular attention.

THIRDLY OF INVESTMENTS.

30. The small Returns made for the vast Sums of Money which have been sunk at Fort St. David has most sensibly affected Us, and the more so as it is has likewise so greatly influenced the Bengal Investment, your utmost Care and Application is therefore now absolutely necessary and must be exerted in this Important Branch of Our Business.

31. And for that purpose the greatest Attention must be had to the Orders and Directions in the enclosed List of Investment by procuring the several Goods therein mentioned at the most reasonable Rates.

32. By your Consultations it does not appear who were the Merchants you contracted with for the Long Cloths Sallampores and Romalls in 1748, nor does it appear that they were tyed down to the Delivery of any precise Quantity of those Goods, or to any fixed time, We suppose they are the same Persons who in your subsequent Consultations you call Brokers when you advanced Two Pagodas a Corge on the Investment more than at first was agreed upon, your coming so readily into it the very day they made their application appears too precipitate and makes Us apprehensive that you relyed more upon their Veracity, than upon necessary enquiries, and We are the rather induced to be of this Opinion as you gave them the Price they asked on agreeing for the Investment without hesitation.

33. For the future you must give Publick Notice of the day you intend to treat for the Investment, you are then to receive Proposals in Writing, from all Persons indifferently of the Terms, Quantitys and Times they will engage to deliver the several Species of Goods at ; all which are to be Enter'd distinctly on your Consultations together with the particular reasons why you reject or accept each particular persons proposals, such Persons with whom you agree are to Enter into Obligations under a Penalty and give Security for the Performance of their Agreement.

34. A French Ship is lately arrived from Pondicherry with a Rich Cargo of Coast Goods another is Expected ; this shows want of Care in getting proper Intelligence since it appears by M^r. Floyers Letter to the Secret Committee of the 20th. of February that he had not then heard that the French had sett about making any Investment.

35. It is with Pleasure We observe the Old Merchants have discharged their Ballances, and could Wish the same might be said of the Debts due from the Madras Merchants, the recovering of which must be sett about with the greatest Diligence.

36. We must acquiesce with the reasons that induced you to send Brown Cloth, but as We hope they will not again occur you must for the future take particular care to have all your Cloth Whiten'd before you Ship it.

FOURTHLY OF COUNTRY GOVERNMENT.

37. You have been too lavish of Our Money in making such extravagant Presents to Nazir Jung and the Great Men about him amounting to no less than Twenty thousand five hundred and eighteen Pagodas, four Fanams and Seventy Seven Cash, more than adequate to any Services We have received or may expect

from them, as experience has taught Us very little Confidence can be placed in any Indian Powers, you must Act with more Frugality and Caution in this respect for the future.

38. The present Tranquillity of the Country We hope will give you an opportunity of encreasing Our Investments and transacting the Various Branches of Our Mercantile Affairs with a greater Attention than We are sorry to say you have hitherto shewn.

39. It appears upon your Consultations of the 4th. of July 1748 that Mr. Andrews at Ganjam was in the Year 1746 ill used by the Nabob and Money forced from him, and he refers to Mr. Morse for setting that Affair in a clear Light, you have Omitted to take any Notice of this Transaction in your Advices, We therefore direct that you fully state this Fact in your next, what the Money so Extorted amounted to, and whether any of it is recovered.

40. As We make no doubt of your being in Possession of the Fort St. George Books and Papers, We direct that you Collect together all the Phirmaunds and Grants you can find from the several Moguls, Nabobs and their Ministers with regard to all Our Privileges in India and Our Rights and Titles to Our several Settlements on the Choromandell Coast, you are to get them Translated by able hands and fairly Copied in a Book which must be forwarded to Us as soon as it can possibly be completed.

FIFTHLY OF FORTIFICATIONS, BUILDINGS AND REVENUES.

41. We acquainted you by the Portfield that We had appointed Benjamin Robins Esq^r. Our Engineer General, he with his Assistants take their Passage on the Grantham, and by this Conveyance, We have Communicated to You Our Intentions and Directions in a separate Letter, dated this day, with regard to the Fortifications and Works at Our Settlements on the Choromandell Coast to which We particularly refer you.

42. The immense Sums of Money which appear by your Accounts to have been expended on the Fortifications and Works at Fort St. David and as We are well assured very injudiciously, together with the other excessive Expences of your Settlement have really surprized Us, We make all reasonable Allowances for the particularity of your Situation, but at the same time We are confident had you been as attentive to Our Interest as you ought to have been, they could not so much have exceeded all reasonable Bounds.

43. We observe you granted your Bound Renters Petition for a Renewal of his Lease, without receiving Proposals from any Competitor although Mr. Floyer acquainted you that he had several Offers made to him, from other Persons whose Proposals you ought to have had before the Board, We positively direct that for the future all Farms, Grants and Licences be disposed of to the highest Bidder before the President and Council, that Publick Notice be given thereof a convenient time before they are put up and Security taken for the Performance of every such Contract.

44. We observe by your Consultations of the 31th. October 1748 that you accepted and agreed to Proposals of Peter Denker for keeping a Butchers Stall at Cuddalore, by which it appears that he was to have the Sole supplying of the Troops in Garrison there with Beef and Pork at One and a half small Fanams a pound and that you advanced him Five hundred Pagodas to carry his Proposal into Execution, Upon this We observe that the confining the Soldiery or any others whatsoever to buy Provisions with their own Money of any One particular Person is very unjust and oppressive, and the more so as that Price is considerably higher than what the same Denker claims as due to him for supplying the Military at Fort St. George in 1746, and the making use of Our Money for this purpose is very injurious to the Company, We direct that you call in the said Loan of Five hundred Pagodas, if it is not already paid and that for the future you encourage a Free and Open Market for the Sale of all kinds of Provisions.

45. The Madagascar Slaves you will receive by the Swallow are to be employed on the Fortifications and Works as well as trained up in the Military.

SIXTHLY OF COVENANT SERVANTS, MILITARY AND THEIR ACCOUNTS.

46. We are highly displeas'd with Mr. Floyer for disobeying the Secret Committees express Orders with regard to Collecting and sending home the Proofs in support of what Our late and present Servants had wrote concerning the Conduct of Captain Peyton, by suffering them to remain in the hands of Mr. Morse and be by him transmitted to Mr. Monson, whereas Mr. Floyer should have demanded and Mr. Morse have delivered up those as well as all other Books and Papers in his Possession any way relative to the Company, and We observe by Mr. Floyers Letter to the Secret Committee that what Mr. Morse has so transmitted are only Copsys which can be of no use as Evidence instead of Originals which were ordered.

47. If Mr. Morse is not in consequence of Our Orders last Season come away, We direct that he be sent home on the first ship that Sails after the receipt of this.

48. We shall call Mr. Harrison to Account for the Two Thousand Pagodas owing by him to the Church Stock at Madras.

49. Notwithstanding We expressly required Mr. Lennox to return home, you have to Our great Surprize disregarded the same by permitting him to continue in India. We will have Our Orders Obedyed and therefore, We positively direct that he proceed to England on the first Ship.

50. We expect that you have Regulated the Military and Artillery exactly upon the Plan sent you by the Pelham and We direct that you make no Variation therefrom in point of Pay or by encrease of Officers without Our express leave, and that you will be particularly careful to prevent false Musters which We are well assured had been practiced very much to Our Prejudice before Major Lawrences Arrival.

51. We cannot admit of your reasons for keeping up the Troop of Hor[se] and therefore expect to hear Our Orders for Disbanding them have long ago been complied with, and that We have been in some degree reimbursed by the Sale of the Horse and Furniture, the extravagant Expences of raising and maintaining the said Troop.

52. For the future the Muster Rolls of each Company of the Military and the Artillery Company must be Annually returned by two Conveyances in separate Sheets, inserting therein a List Signed by the proper Officer of the Men, Dead Run and Discharged since the last was sent particularly writing against their Names when and where.

53. We shall consider of the Services of Captain James Cope for acting as Judge Advocate as he alledges in a Memorial now before Us when the same is properly Certified by you, in the mean time We direct if that Office is not already laid aside, that it be so immediately on receipt of this.

54. We particularly recommend it to Major Lawrence to give Us an Account of the Ability and Behaviour of the several Officers on your Establishment.

55. Your whole Transaction with Shawmere has been very irregular and highly displeasing to Us as you have in a collusive manner disobey'd Our express Orders not to discharge any of the Fort S^t. George Debts without Our leave, by agreeing to allow the Bond he gave for Eight thousand five hundred and eighty Rupees, one quarter, thirty six raees to the President and Council of Bombay as part of Payment of what was alledged to be owing from Us to his Father by Bonds under the hands of the late President and Council of Fort S^t. George and which Bonds it does not appear had ever been produced to you, or have you ever advised Us there were such Bonds in being.

56. The like Collusion appears to Us in some other Instances—particularly in advancing Twelve hundred Pagodas to John Gray and Five hundred Pagodas to Peter Dencker, under the Pretence of Assisting them in their several trades.

57. You seem to have given yourselves very little trouble in collecting an Account of the Madras Claims upon Us, contenting yourselves with noting them only on Consultation when demanded without making any Enquiry of such Persons, as it was reasonable to suppose, could give you a satisfactory Account of them, this

is the most favorable construction We can make for the lateness of M^r. Morses Claim of Thirty Thousand Pagodas the 18th. February last but just before the Porto Bello sailed whereas Publick Notice had been given for all Claims of this kind to be brought in so long before as the preceeding April.

58. We have been already so full in Our Directions with regard to your giving Us a full and clear Account of the Madras claims that We shall only refer you to them and let you know that We expect they will be punctually complied with.

59. We observe in your Consultations of the 30th. November that the Steward paid in the Ballance of his Account amounting to Twenty One thousand Nine hundred Sixty five Pagodas, fifteen Fanams and thirty three Cash, which shews great carelessness at least in advancing so large a sum more than he had occasion for.

60. We had not a Line from you by the True Briton although she was partly Loaded at your place, more care must be taken for the future to send Duplicates of your Advices at least by every conveyance that offers.

61. You have not mentioned in your Advices by the Porto Bello the dates of the several Bills drawn upon Us, which must never be omitted for the future.

62. A Bill of Exchange drawn by you under date of the 16th. Aug^r. 1748 for Four thousand two hundred fifty two pagodas, twenty five fanams and Sixty Cash at eight Shillings 9^d Pagoda payable to the order of Charles Floyer Esq^r. and M^r. John Haman was Tender'd to Us and paid according to the Tenour of it, but upon having recourse to your Advices by the Porto Bello it appears that no more was paid into Cash than Four thousand two hundred forty six Pagodas, twenty one fanams and Thirty Cash, and it further appearing that the Rate of the Exchange is carelessly or designedly omitted, We therefore direct that you recover of M^r. Floyer the difference between the said Two Sums, and as there was no Authority for drawing the said Bill for a higher Exchange than seven shillings and eight pence a pagoda, We likewise further direct and positively insist upon it that you recover of M^r. Floyer the fourpence a pagoda We have been obliged to pay in Our wrong.

63. The Account of Remains of Stores received by the Porto Bello is drawn out in a very confused and imperfect manner for Instance. The Number and Weight of the Iron and Brass Ordnance, Shott & Shells are only mentioned in the Gross without distinguishing the nature of each and entered in no order or under their proper heads; the different sorts of Cordage and Lines are not particularized; Most part of the Naval Stores are under the Head of Gunners Stores and defective with regard to distinguishing the particulars—And the Anchors not uniformly kept in the same Weights some being in the Indian and some in Dutch pounds.

64. We therefore direct for the future that in the Account of Remains the several Articles be ranged under distinct heads such as Guns,—Garrison Stores,—Anchors,—Grappnels,—Cordage—Ironmongers Ware &c^r. that the several Sorts, Sizes, Weights and Natures of each Article be particularly distinguished and the English Weights of all Europe Stores inserted.

65. We further direct that the said Account of Remains lay before you when you are drawing out your Indent which must be done in the same Method and framed to Correspond in all respects with the said Account of Remains.

66. And the better to explain Our Meaning We have transmitted you a proper Form which must be strictly observed in Framing all your future Accounts of Remains of Stores.

67. We forbid your giving Pentions to any Persons whatsoever but to such as We shall expressly direct, if you do We shall charge the same to your particular Accounts and with regard to the Widows Graham and Smith Captain Morgan and M^r. Baker, if their necessitys are such as you represent, send them home at the Companys expence and We will consider of their Meritts.

68. During the time M^r. Holt was attending the Mint he was not employed in other Branches of Our Affairs, We therefore do not think him entitled to any Allowance on that Account.

69. You did right in applying to Admiral Boscawen for his reimbursing the expences We had been at in the Maintenance of his Troops and other Charges incurred by the Expedition against Pondicherry, and by acquainting Us with what passed between you in Writing upon that occasion; but you should have carryed the matter further by endeavouring to have had the several Accounts Authenticated by him, which he could not have reasonably denyed and would have rendered Our Applications to the Government for Repayment less difficult.

70. We apprehend a great deal of difficulty in settling the unadjusted Accounts of the Squadron under the Command of the late M^r. Barnet and M^r. Peyton who is likewise dead, with the Government, you must therefore send Us all such further Papers and Informations you possibly can Collect relating thereto Authenticated in the best manner you can.

SEVENTHLY OF THE WEST COAST.

71. Take care to supply Our Settlements on the West Coast with all such Stores and Necessarys as they stand in need of, and be particularly attentive to their Conduct, by appointing a Committee as was the constant practice at Fort S^t. George to Inspect their Advices and examine into their Proceedings from time to time and Report the same together with their Observations thereon to the Board.

72. The Deputy Governour and Council having advised Us of the late Cruel and extraordinary Behaviour of the Dutch upon the West Coast, We have laid the same before His Majesty together with several other Papers relating to the Pretensions they have lately sett up to an exclusive Trade at Sumatra, Borneo and several other Places to which they have as little right, and as his Majesty has been pleased to take the same under his Royal Consideration, We are satisfied We shall have Our Right to a Free Trade effectually supported, as well as full Satisfaction made for past Injuries

SUPPLEMENT.

73. The Commissioners for Victualling the Navy having acquainted Us in case it should happen his Majestys Ships which compose Commodore Lisles Squadron should be Sailed for Europe before the Supply of Beef and Pork Shipped on the Duke of Cumberland, Grantham, York and Prince Edward arrives they have Consigned the same to the Governour of Fort S^t. David or the Chief of any of Our Settlements on the Choromandell Coast in order to be Sold to the best advantage for His Majesty, if therefore the said Squadron should be Sailed you are hereby directed to follow the Orders of the said Commissioners in the disposal of the said Provisions, and receive the Produce thereof into Our Cash, drawing Bills upon Us for the Amount at the Rate of Seven Shillings and eight pence a Pagoda payable to the Treasurer of His Majestys Navy.

74. We have had a great deal of trouble in Littigating M^r. Belsches's Accounts with the Commissioners of the Sick and Wounded Office who have at last deducted from the Amount thereof the Sum of Two hundred eighty five Pounds, five Shillings and ten pence farthing for the several reasons mentioned in their Remarks, Copys of which We have forwarded in these Ships Packets, you must therefore oblige M^r. Belsches to repay the said Sum into Our Cash at your Settlement, and also give Security to make good any Deductions which may be made out of his future Accounts.

75. And We cannot help observing that you have negligently omitted to forward to Us M^r. Belsches Accounts from the 31 July 1748 to the time of the Porto Bello Sailed in February following by which We shall suffer considerably in being kept so much longer out of Our Money as the Government make no Allowance for Interest.

76. We direct that for the future you send at the same time with your Annual Indent for Medicines and Drugs, a List of all the Surgeons Instruments and Utensils belonging to the Company then remaining. We are

SEPARATE LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID DATED 8TH, DECEMBER 1749.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 53, pp. 55-66.*]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT ST., DAVID.

I. Being Determined to have Our Possessions and Estate put in as perfect Security for the future, as We are able by making such Additions to, and Alterations in the Fortifications and Works at our several Settlements in the East Indies, and the Island of Saint Helena, as may render them Defenceable against the Attacks of any European or Indian Enemys, We have in order thereto, Appointed Benjamin Robins Esq^r. in whose Integrity and Capacity, We have an entire Confidence, Our Engineer General, as likewise Commander in Chief of the Artillery, And that you may be fully apprized of our Intentions in Employing him, We have here inserted his Instructions, and We direct that every Article in them, so far as they relate to Fort St. David and its Subordinate Settlements, be as fully complied with, as if they were particularly Addressed to you, and We further recommend and direct, that in any Matters which may have been omitted in these Instructions you give him all possible Assistance and furtherance, and We particularly direct, that if any doubts shall arise about the meaning or Import of any of the Articles contained in these his Instructions, he himself, as best Acquainted with Our Intentions, shall be Appealed to for the sense of them.

“To BENJAMIN ROBINS Esq^r.”

“We the Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants
“of England Trading to the East Indies, having by Commissions
“under the Companys Seal, Appointed You Engineer General of
“all our Settlements, in the East Indies, and our Island St.
“Helena; as likewise Commander in Chief of the Artillery
“during the time of your stay at any of Our Settlements or-

- “ Places, and of all Persons intended for its Service; You are therefore to Proceed on the Ship Grantham, now bound to Fort St. David on the Coast of Choromandell, and observe and follow the under mentioned Instructions, and all such others as We shall at any time hereafter think necessary to give you.
1. “ You are to Proceed first to Fort St. David, next to Fort St. George, next to Fort William in Bengal, next to Bombay, and are to call at Saint Helena in your return to Europe, and if, in your Passage from one of these places to another, you can, without too great a loss of time, call in at any other of Our Subordinate Settlements on the Coasts of Choromandell or Mallabar, you are permitted in that particular, to be guided by your own discretion, but We particularly recommend Vizagapatam to your Attention.
 2. “ In all these Places you are carefully to Examine the Fortifications, and to take an exact Plan of the present Works; after which you are to form a Scheme of such Additions or Reparations as shall on the consideration of all circumstances appear to you to be most Expedient. Two Copys of this Plan and Scheme you are to send to us by the two first Conveyances, together with the nearest Estimate you can form of the Expence, you are besides to Transmit to us at the same time such Descriptions and Explanations, as may the better enable us to Judge, both of the present Condition of the place, and of the Advantages of the Alterations proposed, and are to remark every Circumstance, that may occur to you for facilitating the Execution of your Plan And for the better Directing of your Judgement in all these Matters, you are to have free access to all Books and Papers in the Custody of our Governours and Council, where any Deliberations Resolutions, Projects, Estimates or Accounts relating to our Fortifications are Entered.
 3. “ By Our Orders of the 17th. June 1748 (Copys of which are herewith delivered to you) We have made a new Regulation of our Military Force, and have directed the Establishment of a Company of Artillery at Fort St. David, Fort William and Bombay, And We being desirous that our Artillery, on which the Security of Our Settlements so much depends, may be in the best Condition possible, do appoint you to Examine how far these new Regulations of the Artillery have been Executed, We therefore direct, that, without any Pay or Profit thence arising, you during the time of your Stay at any of Our places shall have the Chief Command of the Artillery therein, and of the Persons intended for its Service, whether they form a Company, a Gunroom Crew, or by whatever name they are Distinguished, These you are to see trained to the Use of Cannon and Mortars in the manner you shall Appoint, & you are to Allot what quantity of Ammunition you Judge necessary for that purpose, and you are also to form a Plan for this Exercise, which you are to Deliver to the Governour or Chief at your leaving each Place, and which is punctually to be followed by the Officers of Artillery, till other Directions shall be given by Us.
 4. “ You are besides to Examine the Small Arms, Cannon, Mortars, Carriages, Ammunition & Military Stores of every kind, which are in any of Our Magazines in the Places where you shall be, Of all these you are to make exact Inventories, noting what part is decayed, Unserviceable or Defective, and what Changes

“or Additions are necessary to be made, either at the Pieces or
 “Stores, for the better Defence of the Place, Two Copys of
 “these Inventories or Remarks, you are to transmit to us by the
 “Two first Conveyances, In taking these Inventories you are
 “particularly to observe if our Instructions of the 17th. June
 “1748, with regard to the Accounts to be kept by the Store-
 “keeper, be punctually Complied with, if they are not, you are
 “to deliver to the Storekeeper a Copy of your own Inventory,
 “and are to direct him in the manner of Entering his future
 “Receipts and Deliverys, And you are expresly Ordered to
 “Declare to him, that our Directions for the keeping these
 “Accounts, and the Transmitting Copys of them home, shall be
 “rigorously followed for the future in every Article.

5. “And We hereby Empower you to suspend or Dismiss any of our
 “Officers or Private Men in the Artillery, that you shall think
 “unfit for our Service, Transmitting to us the reasons of the
 “Suspension or Dismission of any Officer as aforesaid, and you
 “are to Appoint other Officers in their Stead, until our Pleasure
 “is known.
6. “If during your stay in India any of Our Places should be threat-
 “ned with an Attack either from an European Enemy, or from
 “the Troops of the Countrey, We in that Case leave it to your
 “discretion to repair to such of Our Settlements, where [e]ither
 “from the Neighbourhood of the Enemy, or from other Con-
 “siderations, you shall conceive your Advice and Assistance
 “may be of most Advantage to our Interests, and on all these
 “Emergenys, We shall direct our Governours and Council,
 “that they shall admit you to be present, and to Vote at all
 “Consultations, where any Military Proceedings are Consider-
 “ed.
7. “In all our Places that you shall visit (except Calcutta in
 “Bengal,) We chuse that you should avoid any great and Expens-
 “sive Work till you have Our further Directions, but where the
 “delay is apparently mi[s]chievous, and where you are fully satis-
 “fy’d in your own Judgment, We authorize you to direct
 “immediately what Reparations or Changes shall be made,
 “either in the Fortifications, the Warehouses, the Artillery or
 “in any other Article connected with the Defence of the Settle-
 “ment, having a particular regard, that the Warehouses if pos-
 “sible, may be situated in convenient and secure Places within
 “the Fortifications, and the Magazines Secure[d].
8. “And to avoid the unnecessary Expence which Confusion and mis-
 “management may occasion in the Works you may carry on in
 “consequence of these, or of our Subsequent Instructions, you
 “are Empowered in [all] Cases to Appoint Inspectors at each
 “Working Place, over each Branch of Work, these are to have
 “an Eye upon the Work, and are to take a daily account of the
 “number of Workmen employed under them, and no Payments
 “to Workmen shall be allowed to the Paymaster but Corre-
 “sponding to the Certificates of these Inspectors, Examined and
 “Countersigned by yourself; We further Direct that you
 “Appoint two joint Inspectors to be present at the Delivery of
 “all Materials, and the Paymaster shall not pay for these
 “Materials, but on the Joint Certificates of these Inspectors
 “examined & Countersign’d by you. Of all these Certificates
 “you are to keep Copys by which you are to Examine the
 “Paymasters Account[s] which he is to deliver to you every

“Month, and if upon this Examination, or for any other reasons
“you are dissatisfied with his Conduct, you are to require the
“Governour to remove him from his Office of Paymaster, which
“requisition of yours, the Governour Will be Directed to Com-
“ply with, and if any Person employ'd in the Works, whether
“our own Servant, or an Artificer of the Countrey does not be-
“have to your Satisfaction, You are Authorized to remove him
“from his Employ in the Works, and if he be Our Covenant
“Servant you are to Certifye to Us, the reasons for which you
“displaced him.

9. “As We are resolved to throw up some Works about the Town of
“Calcutta, for the better defence of its Inhabitants agreeable to
“our Letter of the 17th. June 1748. A Copy of which is here-
“with delivered to You, You are therefore on your Arrival at
“Fort William to consider of a Plan for that purpose, in forming
“this Plan you are to endeavour, that it may be of such a
“nature, that without any material Charge in the General dis-
“position, and without demolishing the Works that will first be
“raised, the whole may afterwards be wrought into a more
“compleat Fortress; when after maturely weighing all the
“Circumstances, necessary to be Considered you have formed
“your Plan for the Works about Calcutta, and have made an
“Estimate of the time, Expence, Materials & Workmen neces-
“sary to Compleat it, and have determined with what part to
“begin and in what Order to proceed, you are then to lay the
“Whole before Our Governour and Council, and to require
“them to prepare the Money, Materials and Workmen, and to
“Issue the proper Orders for carrying on the Work, which
“requisition of yours they will be Directed to comply with.
10. “That you may be the better enabled to Execute the various
“Articles contained in these Instructions, We have sent with
“you M^r. John Barker, Nathaniel Carrington, Charles O'Hara,
“Sampson Morrice, Charles Knapton, and Philip Glass to be
“your Assistants, all whom are to be therefore entirely under
“your Directions, to be employed as you shall order, and for their
“Diet We direct that Twenty Pounds Sterling p Month be
“allowed you over and above the Appointment in your Con-
“tract, but as the said Allowances is Calculated for Six Persons,
“therefore a proportionable Abatement is to be made in case of
“the Death or Dismission of any of them, and we farther allow
“M^r. Barker Forty Pounds Sterling p Year, and each of the
“others Twenty pounds Sterling p Year by way of Salary,
“till such time as you Quit them on your return to Europe,
“after which they are to be Entertained in our Service on
“the same foot as our other Servants in the like Rank that is
“to say M^r. Barker to take his Standing as a Factor, from the
“time of his first Landing in India, and the others to take their
“Standings as Writers from the same time, on your return to
“Europe you are to leave them in such of our Settlements,
“where you think they will be most Useful, We reserving to
“ourselves the Power of fixing them afterwards either in
“Bengal, or on the Coast of Choromandel or Mallabar, if besides
“these Persons you carry with you, you shall think it necessary
“in any of our Places to have the Assistance of any other of our
“Servants or Officers, you are Empowered to make use of them
“in the manner you shall find most Expedient; provided if
“they are above the degree of Writers it be with their own free
“Consent, And every one of our Covenant Servants thus

- “ Employed by you shall not thereby be deprived of any of the
 “ Advantages of Rank, Pay, Allowance or Advancement, which
 “ he would have been Entitled to otherwise.
11. “ If you are obliged to leave any of Our Places, before the
 “ Works you have begun are Completed, you are Authorized if
 “ you think it expedient to leave one or more of your Assistants
 “ behind you, whom you are fully to apprise of the nature of
 “ your Design, and of the manner in which you intend it to be
 “ Executed, Those whom you thus leave, are to keep a regular
 “ Journal, in which they are to enter daily, the Quantity of
 “ Materials received, the Number of Workmen Employed, the
 “ Payments made, and the Progress of the Work, for which
 “ purpose they are to have free Access to all parts of the Works,
 “ and to all Accounts and Papers relating thereto. And if at any
 “ time they observe that the Work is not Carried on conformable
 “ to your Plan, or that there are any Irregularitys in the Pay-
 “ ments, or misconduct in the Workmen, They are [to] make
 “ their Complaints in Writing to the Governour and Council,
 “ and are to pray that proper Orders may be given for the
 “ remedy of those Abuses, Copys of all these Complaints they
 “ are to enter regularly in their Journal, which Journal is after-
 “ wards to be delivered to you, and by you to be Transmitted to
 “ Us, reserving a Copy for your own Use, You are during your
 “ Absence to allow each of your Assistants for Diet Money
 “ Three Pounds six Shillings and eight pence Sterling a Month,
 “ over and above their Salary, and as an Encouragement to them
 “ to behave faithfully in this Employment, you may assure them
 “ that on your representing to Us their Fidelity and Dillii-
 “ gence, they may depend on being Considered by us in the
 “ manner their Services shall deserve, but if contrary to our
 “ Expectation, any of them should upon these or other occasions
 “ fail in the Integrity, or assiduity expected of them, you are
 “ Empowered to remove them from their Employ, and to send
 “ them to Europe by the first convenient Shipping, Certifying to
 “ us at the same time the reasons for their Dismission.
12. “ That the Works begun or Projected by you, may not be inter-
 “ rupted by any Casualty that may happen to you, We direct
 “ you to draw your Designs upon a large Scale, and to be very
 “ explicit in your Description of their different parts; and if,
 “ from the particularity of the Construction, there are any
 “ Works intended, where it may be supposed that Drawings are
 “ not alone sufficiently instructive, you are in that case to cause
 “ large and durable Models to be made of them, which Models
 “ together with Copys of your Plan, and all the Descriptions,
 “ Directions and Estimates relating thereto, you are to Deposit
 “ with our Governour and Council of the Place where the Works
 “ are to be Carried on.
13. “ You are carefully to Correspond with Us, and to Inform Us
 “ of the Progress you make, and of the manner in which your
 “ different Employments are Executed, and of the Behaviour of
 “ those We send out under your Direction, and as you are
 “ furnished with proper Instruments, you are to take all fitting
 “ Opportunitys to observe the Longitudes and Latitudes of such
 “ Places as you shall visit, and likewise the Variation of the
 “ Compass as often as you conveniently can, and when you are
 “ not immediately busied in our other Services, We expect that
 “ you should not omit pursuing any Enquirys which may occur to
 “ you, that may tend either to the Emprovement of Geography

“and Navigation, or to the Advancement of other Branches of
“Useful Knowledge, or to the Support and Enlargement of Our
“Commerce and Interests in the East.

14. “We have provided several Mathematical Instruments, and
“other Particulars for your Use, according to the enclosed List,
“which on your Departure from India are to be delivered to the
“Governour and Council at any of Our Settlements as may be
“most convenient to you.”

2. The same Civil and Military Honours are to be paid to M^r. Robins as to the Third in Council, and as you value our future favour, you and all our Servants in general are, as well in your Private as Publick Capacities, to behave in such a manner to him, as may facilitate the Execution of his Plan.

3. M^r. Robins is under Covenants with us to continue in India until the Dispatch of the last Ships, from the Places where he shall be Resident, between the Months of January and March 1753/4 and if he loses his Passage Outward bound he is to continue in India until the same time in 1754/5. During the time of his Stay at your Settlement you are to pay him for his own and his Menial Servants Subsistence, and instead of Diet Money, after the rate of Ten Pounds Sterling for every Calendar Month, to Commence from his first Arrival at any of the Companys Settlements.

4. Which as well as the several Allowances mention'd in the beforegoing Instructions, are to be Computed and paid at the rate We permit Bills of Exchange to be Drawn upon Us on Account of our Covenant Servants.

5. Upon removing from your Settlement to another, you are to Certifye to what time M^r. Robins and his Assistants have been respectively paid their said Allowances, and in failure of such Certificate the Governour and Council of the Place where they are Resident shall be governed in their Payments thereof, by a Certificate to that purpose under the hand of M^r. Robins.

6. Over and above the Allowances aforesaid you are to Discharge all the Expences he shall be at for himself Assistants and Servants in going from place to place by Sea or Land, as well as all extraordinary Expences incur'd by him in the Execution of the Trust We have reposed in him, which said Expences not having been otherways before paid him, are to be paid on his Certifying the particulars to you under his hand.

7. That We may have a full and distinct view of all the Charges and Expences that will attend the Carrying our Engineers Schemes into Execution, they are to be Carried to Account under a new head, to be Erected in your Books for that purpose.

8. You are to provide for M^r. Robins and his Assistants a Convenient Apartment or House in the Fort or elsewhere as may be most conducive to the Service, and agreeable to him.

9. Upon M^r. Robins's discharging his Assistants on his return to Europe, and their being thereupon in consequence of the 10th. Par^t. of his Instructions to be on the foot of Covenant Servants, they are then to enter into the usual Covenants, and Write to their Friends in England to give the customary Security.

10. We observe that Thomas Heath whom We sent out a Writer to be Trained up under M^r. Delavaux is represented as not having a Turn to the Profession of an Engineer, and is therefore Stationed under the Accountant at Fort S^t. David, We direct that M^r. Robins have a Tryal of him, and if he finds him Incapable or unwilling to Assist him that he be sent Home on One of the first Ships.

11. The several Mathematical Instruments, and other Articles provided for the Service of the Engineer, are to be left with the Governour and Council at any of Our Settlements as may be most convenient to him on his Departure from India.

12. We have appointed Robert Barrowcliffe a Smith, and Israel Selfe a Carpenter, to proceed with, and be under the Direction of our Engineer, they have

Contracted to Serve Five Years from the time of their Landing at any one of our Settlements from which time they are to be paid Sixty Pounds Sterling ₹ Annum, each in full for their respective Services, when M^r. Robins leaves India they are to serve the remainder of their Five Years where they may be most Useful to the Company, you are to be governed as to the rate of Exchange, and the manner of Paying them according to the Directions We have given with regard to M^r. Robins and his Assistants in the preceding part of this Letter. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT S^T. DAVID DATED 12TH. JANUARY 1749, PER THE NORFOLK.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 53, pp. 67-73*]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
AT FORT SAINT DAVID.

1. Our last Advices under Date of the 8th. of December went by the Ships Duke of Cumberland, Grantham, Prince Edward and York; the two first Sailed out of the Downes the 20th. of the same Month.

2. The Norfolk Captain Nathaniel Hancock is Consignd to you, under Orders however to receive aboard Three hundred Pipes of Wine at the Island of Madeira, One Moiety of which We have directed Our Agents to Consign to you, and the other Moiety to Bengal.

3. You are to Direct a Survey to be made of the Stowage, and the Condition of the Casks, that the Commander may Account with you, for what may be wanting, more than the Customary Leakage.

4. Captain Hancock and his Officers are allow'd Twenty Pipes of Madeira Wine on their Private Account, if any more should be Landed at your Settlement, it must be Seized and Sold on our Account as Unlicenced Goods, and you are to advise our President and Council in Bengal of the real Quantity Landed.

5. For the other Consignments to you by the Norfolk, We refer you to the Invoice and Bill of Lading in that Ships Packet.

6. Although the Ships Kent Cap^t. William Robson, the London Cap^t. William Sedgwick, and the Lynn Cap^t. William Egerton are Consigned to Fort William, the Commanders have our Directions to call at Fort S^t. David that the Bullion by the said Ships may be Coined, which must be done with the utmost Expedition.

7. Concluding that you have Coined the Bullion sent you by the Portfield and the China Ships, We direct that you send to Bengal on the Kent, London and Lynn the full Amount in Rupees of the value of the Bullion by the said last mentioned three Ships, and that you likewise send by the Norfolk an equal Value with either of those Ships, And we further Direct, that after the Dispatch of the said Ships, you continue to send by every Opportunity, whatever you can to the

Bay, our Intent being, that you should retain in your hands no more of our Effects, than will be absolutely necessary, for making your Investment and Defraying your Charges.

8. That you may be enabled to Dispatch home the more Ships, all of this Season as well as the last carry out whole Kintladge in Iron, which you must observe to reckon into the Tonnage, for so many Tons in Goods as the Charterparty mentions there are Tons of Iron Kintladge, to be Carried out and brought home.

9. As the Ships thus carry out Iron, you are not obliged by Charterparty to Load any Salt Petre, unless you are under a necessity of doing it, for want of other Goods, in which case you are to put aboard as much as will compleat the Charterparty Tonnage, and no more.

10. In this manner you are to send home as many Ships as you can procure Tonnage for, observing always, that those which have been longest in India are to be first Dispatched, and that the Surplus Tonnage, if you have any, must be laden on the latter Ships.

11. As it will be greatly for our Interest to have, as formerly, all our Ships Dispatched from our several Settlements the same Season they arrive, We recommend it to you to Act in concert with our Servants in Bengal and on the Mallabar Coast, the more effectually to answer our Intentions.

12. But if it shall happen, notwithstanding your utmost Efforts, any Ship should remain on your hands, She must be Employed in such a manner as will at least Ballance the Demorage that will be Incurred, by her Staying in India a Season extraordinary; and if there is a necessity of detaining any Ship it must be the London.

13. You must Early, and with as much exactness as you can, advise our Servants in the Bay what number of Bales you expect to have ready for the returning Shipping, and at the same time remind them of sending you a sufficient Quantity of Salt Petre.

14. As the Selling Coast Piece Goods at the beginning of the September Sale, will be greatly to the Companys Advantage, We earnestly recommend it to you, to use your utmost endeavours, to Dispatch One or Two Ships, with a large proportion of Fine Goods, so early as to Arrive in England some time in the Month of June.

15. As by this time the Books and Papers taken by the French at Fort S^t. George, we expect to hear are in your Possession, We direct (if it has not been already done) that an Exact List be made of them, and Transmitted to us by the first Conveyance, and that at the same time you remark whether any are missing, or not returned by the French, with the reasons thereof, This Order is not meant, to delay your immediately sending us such Books and Papers as were mentioned in our Letter of the 29th. of March last by the Severn.

16. We have appointed Joseph Cooper a Writer on your Establishment, who is to be Employed in such a Station, wherein he may be most useful to Us.

17. We have permitted the undermentioned Persons to Reside in India under the Companys Protection Viz^t.

18. Thomas Whitlatch, John Brohier and Jacob Dawson in the Seafaring way, John Page to Practice Surgory, wherever he may be wanted or Approved of, and Joseph Lowe (now in Bengal) as a Free Merchant.

19. The Intimations We received last Year that a Spirit of Gaming prevailed among our Serrants at Fort S^t. David have to our great Concern proved too true, and We have had undoubted Assurances that it has been connived at and practised by M^r. Floyer and many of our Superiour Servants to such a degree as almost to engross their whole time and attention, hence in a great measure the Extravagant Expences of your Settlement are to be accounted for, as well as the general neglect and want of Order in every branch of our Affairs, to remedy which a Change of hands is become absolutely necessary, We therefore Order and Direct that M^r. Floyer and M^r. Holt be immediately Dismissed from the Companys Service.

20. And We do hereby Constitute and Appoint the undermentioned Persons Our Council for the Management of all our Affairs on the Choromandel Coast Establishment Viz^t.

Thomas Saunders Esq. President and Governor for all our Affairs on the Choromandel, Orixa and Sumatra Coasts.

Mr. Richard Prince Second and to Succeed as President in case of the Death or Absence of Mr. Saunders.

Major Stringer Lawrence, Third and to remain as such.

Mr. Cornelius Goodwin	Fourth
Mr. Richard Starke ...	Fifth
Mr. Joseph Fowke ...	Sixth
Mr. Charles Boddam ...	Seventh
Mr. Henry Powney ...	Eight
Mr. Robert Goodere ...	Ninth
Mr. George Pigot ...	Tenth
Mr. Samuel Greenhaugh	Eleventh

21. The Principle we go upon in Settling the Council as above is to Rank every one according to their real Standing in our Service, and this is the method which in all Cases we intend to pursue, and you are to observe unless you have our Orders to the contrary.

22. Although We have left Mr. Croke out of the Council We do not thereby mean to leave him out of our Service, but in Consideration of his Age and former Services, We direct that he always continue to Rank as a Senior Merchant next under the Council, and that in lieu of all former and other Appointments whatsoever he be allowed Two hundred Pounds a Year.

23. Agreeable to the Principle abovementioned We direct that Mr. Wynch and Mr. Westcot (late of Council) be Ranked upon the List of Covenant Servants precisely according to the Situation they would have been in had Fort St. George not been taken.

24. And as Vacancys happen in the Council We direct that the next in Standing be taken in, unless their behaviour or Circumstances may render them unfit for that Station.

25. Mr. Pigot who was made a Prisoner at War upon the Surrender of Fort Saint George to the French, and thereupon come to England, now Returns to his Duty on one of the Ships of this Season, if you think he may be of particular Service to Us at Fort Saint George you may Station him there.

26. The whole Council are to take the usual Oath of Fidelity, and the President must write to his Friends in England to give the customary Security, as must such of the Council whose Friends have not already done so.

27. You are particularly to observe and follow the Directions we sent you by the Portfield under date of the 3^d. of November last.

28. We direct that you appoint one of the most able of the Council Chief of Vizagapatam.

29. And a very capable Person Chief of Ingeram on both of whom We shall very much depend for the Encrease of the Investment on your Coast.

30. If Mr. Munro or Mr. Lightfoot Apply to be taken into the Companys Service in their former Stations at Madrass as Surgeons, you are to Entertain them accordingly.

31. We have great reason to doubt whether the vast Sums of Money expended at Fort St. David since Mr. Floyers coming to the Chair have been justly and fairly Accounted for, We therefore positively direct that you do immediately make a strict enquiry into Mr. Floyers Accounts as likewise of all other of our Servants who have been Concerned in Transacting our Affairs, and wherever you find the Company have been fraudulently injured, that you do not suffer any of them to proceed to England until they have made Us full and ample Satisfaction.

82. As the pernicious Vice of Gaming has spread like a Contagion among all Banks and Degrees of our Servants both Civil and Military, We are determined to put a stop to it by making Examples of every Person infected therewith, You must therefore Agreeable to the Directions We gave you last year make a strict Enquiry into the Behaviour of our several Servants as well the Military as Civil, and send us a particular Account of such Enquirys, and in the meantime Reprimand, Suspend, or even Dismiss them from our Service according to the Degree of their Guilt, every Covenant Servant and each Military Officer are to be called before the President and Council and Acquainted with these Our Orders. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT ST. DAVID DATED 22nd. MARCH 1749

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 53, pp. 75-79*]

OUR PRESIDENT AND COUNCIL
 AT FORT ST. DAVID.

1. The Ships Kent, London, Norfolk and Lynn carry'd our last Advices under date of the 12th. of January.

2. The Norfolk and Lynn Sailed out of the Downes the 20th. of January last, but being Soon Separated, Contrary Winds and bad Weather drove the former to Dublin Bay, with the loss of her Foremast, Maintopmast, and some damage to her Rudder, which Captain Hancock writes he hopes will be repair'd by the 22th. Inst. and the latter was obliged to bear away for Falmouth from whence She Sailed in the prosecution of her Voyage the 1st. of March.

3. The Kent, and London after lying a Considerable time Wind bound, sailed out of the Downes the 1st. of March.

4. We have taken up Two more Ships this Season Viz^t. the Benjamin Captain George Meard Commander, Burthen 350 Tons, and the True Briton Captain Henry Broadley Commander Burthen 400 Tons, the first for the Coast and Bay, and the other for China.

5. Our Principal inducement for taking up the Benjamin is to Send a further Supply of Treasure and Goods to Bengal, in Order to put our Servants in a further condition to Discharge the heavy debt contracted at that Settlement, We have

therefore Consigned the said ship directly to Bengal, But at the same time We have Directed Captain Meard, in case he can reach Your Place by the 15th. of August, to put in and follow Such Orders as he shall receive from You.

6. If therefore the Benjamin should arrive at Fort St. David, You must forthwith put on board her all the Coined Treasure You have ready, as also what can be got ready in Ten Days after her arrival, taking out an equal value of her Bullion in lieu of it, and no more, as the Amount of her Consignment to Bengal must on no pretence whatsoever be Lessened.

7. You must within Ten days at furthest give the Commander Orders to make the best of his way to Fort William.

8. The Invoice and Bill of Lading is enclosed in the packet directed to You, which must be forwarded to the President and Council of Fort William by this Ship, Observing to make a proper Endorsement on the latter, for Such Bullion as You shall receive out of her, and to have a fresh Bill of Lading Signed for the Rupees laden in lieu thereof.

9. In case Our Supra Cargoes in China should in Consequence of any Orders from Us, Send any Ships from thence to be returned with Country Cargoes, You are to comply with all such Directions as you Shall receive from them relative to Such Voyages.

10. The Cargoes of the Ships Hardwick, Scarborough, Wager, and Duke of Dorset were Consigned directly to Fort St. David, with Directions that part Should be continued aboard for Canton, accordingly We find New Bills of Lading were Signed for Such part of their Cargoes as were Consigned to Canton, but the Warehouse Keeper in Endorseing the Bills of Lading from England, has taken no Notice of the Same, as he ought to have done, or of Fifty Tons of Iron deliver'd from the Hardwick, We likewise Observe that the Warehouse Keeper and Store Keeper have Endorsed on the Bill of Lading of the True Briton Consigned from England to Fort William, that they had received in part of the Contents of the said Bill of Lading as ~~the~~ List sent in the Packet, whereas by an unaccountable Omission no Packet was received by the Said Ship, and if there had such a reference was irregular, because the particulars should have been very expressly mentioned in the Endorsement.

11. We are tired with mentioning so many irregularitys and Omissions, But We cannot pass by another very Extraordinary One without taking notice of it Viz^t. the not sending Us any advices of the violent Storm which happened in April last, the want of a conveyance cannot be pleaded, as Admiral Boscawen advised the Admiralty of it by way of Bombay and Persia. and the Governour and Council of Bombay forwarded the Copy of a Short Letter you wrote to them upon that occasion.

12. Complaints have been made to us by the Buyers, that when they came to make Use of Several Parcels of Piece Goods received from Your Settlement, particularly the Brown Long Cloths they proved Rotten, although the Package appeared to be in good Condition, We have found many of the Pieces of white Long Cloth and Salampores full of holes, which must have been before they were folded up, We mention this, that the greatest care be taken by the Persons who Embale the Goods, to prevent any roome for such Complaints in future, as We are perswaded they must have been damaged before they were packed.

13. As it is of the greatest consequence to have the Books which contain the Accounts of the Transactions of Our Agents in the Execution of the Companys Business, rendered as Authentick as possible We therefore possitively Direct that it be a Standing Order for the future, that the Minutes of every Consultation be signed by all the Members present, on or before the next Consultation day, and that all Copys thereof which are to be transmitted to England, or lodged at Fort S. David, be Signed at the Same time, or on or before the next Consultation day, following at furthest, this is to be regarded as a General Order, as well at Fort St. David as the Subordinate Settlements.

14. You are likewise to observe it as a Standing Order for the future, that no Person be suffered to come to England until he has fully and satisfactorily adjusted all Accounts depending between him and the Company, however this is not to be construed to prevent the coming home of any Person, or Persons who have been or may be particularly named by Us.

15. The President and Council of Bombay having represented to us that the Tryal Snow on her arrival there wanting some Repairs, which could not be finished in time, to return her to Fort St. David or Bengal, they Judged she might during the time she must necessarily lay there be of some Assistance joined with the Triumph Phrawn, in Cruizing between Cannoree and Versovah for Securing the Import of the small Trade against the Euemys Gallivats, but Captain Taylor while in that Station lying at anchor instead of Cruizing, sufferd several of their Fishing Boats to be taken without firing upon the Enemy though within Gun Shot, and that they therefore judged it most for the Safety of the Vessell to call him into Port; Captain Taylor by his Behaviour having renderd himself unworthy of our Service, We empowred the President and Council to Dismiss him, and appoint another Person to Command the Tryal Snow, and if he should be gone to Fort St. David or Bengal, to forward a particular Account of his Behaviour with our Directions for his Dismission, In case therefore he should be at your Port you are to Discharge him from Our Service, and give the Command of the Tryal to a more deserving Man.

16. Upon reconsidering the Advices from our late President and Council under date of the 25th. April 1748 relating to the Sallary and allowances settled on Major Lawrence, We find them so Coutrary to Our express Orders and Intention, that Notwithstanding what We wrote you on the 28th. of January 1748 We direct that he be allowed only what We agreed with him for upon his engaging in the Companys Service which to prevent any doubts We now particularly mention Viz^t. as Standing 5^d. of Council at Fort St. David, Major of the Garrison and Commander of One of the Companys, his Sallary is to be Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds a Year with the same appointments for Diet Servants and Pallankeen as 3^d. of Council, he is likewise to have the Cloathing of his Company agreeable to the 22th. & 23th. paragraphs of the Military Regulation dated the 17th. June 1748 which Sallary and appointments are to be in lieu of all other allowances whatsoever, and you are to observe that he is not to have any additional Pay for any Service or Duty in regulating or Commanding the Artillery Company, or as One of the Council.

17. We observe upon looking over the Cash Accounts that the President has generally had large Balances remaining in his hands, contrary to Our Orders under date of the 24th. of December 1747. We therefore positively direct that for the future those Orders be punctually Comply'd with, We likewise direct that they extend to the Subordinate Settlements, with this difference that you must limite the Running Cash in the Chiefs hands to such a Sum as you judge suffioient.

18. You must Send to Us by the first Conveyances all Such Original Letters, Papers and Accounts as have passed between Admiral Buceawen and you, with regard to the Disbursements out of Our Cash for the use of the Fleet and Army under his Command, with whatever else may facilitate our applications to the Government for Repayment, Send Us also attested Copys by other Conveyances, and keep attested Copys of all the said Papers by you, the like must be done with regard to the Squadrons under the Command of the late M^r. Barnet and M^r. Peyton both deceased, and M^r. Griffin.

19. Besides the Persons mentioned in Our former Advices of this Season We have allowed Captain Samuel Hough and M^r. Peter Downes to reside in India under Our protection as Free Merchants.

20. M^r. Richard Grindal who has been regularly Educated under an Eminent hospital Surgeon, and has practiced in London for some years with great reputation, will proceed to Fort S. David On One of the first Ships of next Season, he is immediatly upon his arrival to be appointed an Assistant Surgeon at Fort St. Davids

or Fort St. George, and he is to succeed to the first Vacancy of Chief Surgeon at either Settlement after Mr. Andrew Munro and Mr. Stephen Lightfoot are provided for agreeable to our Orders of the 12th. of January last. We are

GENERAL LETTER TO FORT MARLBOROUGH DATED 8TH. DECEMBER 1749, PER THE SUFFOLK.

[*Public Despatches from England, Vol. 53, pp. 85—91.*]

[OUR] DEPUTY GOVERNOUR AND [COUNO]IL
 AT FORT MARLBOROUGH.

1. Since the Departure of the Swallow with our Advices of the 4th. of October, the Godolphin has brought Us yours under date the 19th. of January last, together with your separate Address relating to the Extraordinary and Cruel behaviour of the Dutch upon the West Coast.

2. The Ship Suffolk Captain Willam Wilson Commander, by which you will receive this Letter is Consigned first to St. Helena, from whence as soon as she has delivered her Cargo for that place, she will proceed directly to you, with a Consignment according to the enclosed Invoice and Bill of Lading.

3. The Governour and Council of St. Helena have our leave to detain One Chest of this Ship's Treasure if they want it, of which they are directed to give you Notice, as likewise to forward the Charterparty.

4. Send the Suffolk back to Us with as much Pepper as you can procure without incurring Demorage, as the present profits upon a pepper Cargo will not admit of any Extraordinary Charges.

5. We have laden on the Swallow an half Chest of Treasure as Ship's Stock, the Commander is directed to pay what remains of it into our Cash at the last

Settlement he shall be dispatched from, or in failure thereof at St. Helena, in case it is paid in at Fort Marlborough, give him a Receipt for it, and duly advise Us of the same.

6. We observe the Godolphin lay near a Month at Manna, and the greatest part of the time upon Demorage for about Seventy Eight Tons of Pepper, owing as Mr. Wadman alledged to the Qualloes being choaked up by the strong Northwesterly Winds, This We hope is a true representation, and We mention it chiefly to apprise you how dear that small Quantity comes out.

7. Mr. Wadman did right in not detaining her longer for about Thirty Eight Tons of Pepper expected from Peeno, but as that disappointment was owing to the disobedience of the Master of a Boat's not calling for it in his way from Croce, according to Order, We expect to hear you have called him to a strict Account for it.

8. Keep the Sloops as constantly employed as possible, particularly in bringing Pepper to Marlborough, to prevent our paying Demorage, as We are obliged to do in the case of the Godolphin abovementioned.

9. We approve of your Assisting the Dutch Ship in Distress, as well as the Crew of the other which was lost, although We are sorry to observe how little these Acts of Humanity operate upon their cruel Tempers.

10. We have as fully complied with your Indents by this Ship as We could, after allowing room for the Stores St. Helena stands in need of.

11. As very good Gunpowder is now made at Bombay, We have directed our President and Council at Fort St. David to furnish themselves and your Settlement with it for the future, you must make your application to them accordingly when you are in want of any, and give Us Notice how it proves

12. We observe you have had considerable Quantities of Rice, Arrack and other Stores from Batavia of late, We hope you are as frugal in the Use of them as possible, and that no more were bought than absolute necessity obliged you to.

13. By your Consultations of the 16th. April 1747 there appears a very large deficiency of Arrack and Rice brought in a Sloop from Batavia, the Arrack indeed We find Mr. Coombs procured satisfaction for, but not for the Rice, as it was represented the want could not be fixed upon any body, there likewise appears on your Consultations of the 24 August a great deficiency in the Salt Consigned to Moco Moco on the Louisa, some other deficiencies appear, though not so considerable as in the above Instances, We are persuaded they are occasioned by Pilferage, from want of proper Care in some of our Servants, you must therefore give such Directions upon the delivery or Shipping such kind of Goods as will prevent the same for the future.

14. The Storekeepers on the 14th. November Reported that the Salt by the Benjamin turned out Ninety six Bags short of Invoice, and that above half the remaining Baggs were in a very bad Condition, some of them but half full, upon reading the said Report without giving any Reasons you ordered the deficiency to be wrote off, this was very careless, a strict enquiry ought to have been made as to the occasion of so great a deficiency, and the Owners of the Ship made accountable for it by endorsing it off the Bill of Lading.

15. You have omitted to send this Year an Account of the Remains of Stores, which on no pretence must be neglected for the future, and We direct that in all future Accounts the several Articles be Methodically ranged under distinct Heads, such as Guns—Garrison Stores—Anchors—Grappnels—Cordage—Ironmongers Ware &c^a. And that your Indents be made at the same time and framed to Correspond in all respects with the said Accounts of Remains—And the better to explain our meaning, We have transmitted you a proper form which must be strictly observed in framing all your future Accounts of Remains of Stores.

16. We must submit to the disappointment of not receiving the Quantity of Pepper We had great reason to expect from the flourishing Condition the whole Country was represented to be in the former Season, as the raging of the small Pox

has in a great Measure been the occasion of it, but as it appears likewise there has been a considerable Decrease in several parts which you could not account for, you must make a strict enquiry into the Reasons thereof, and communicate them to Us in your next Advices, and We direct that upon all occasions you use your utmost Endeavours to encrease the Quantity of Pepper, by directing frequent Surveys, encouraging the Industrious, shewing your Resentment to the Negligent, and by using every other Method that may conduce thereto.

17. We approve of the Method taken to Encourage the Planters at Marang, in sending a Boat to bring their Pepper to Poolo Pesang, by the Resident's Agreeing the first Trip should be at the Companys Bisque, and the more so, as it appears by this Tryal the Navigation to that Place is not found so difficult as was imagined.

18. Your sending Us an Account of the late Cruel and Extraordinary Behaviour of the Dutch upon the West Coast of Sumatra in a seperate Address, meets with our approbation, We have laid the same before his Majesty, together with several other Papers relating to the Pretentions they have lately set up to an exclusive Trade upon that Island, Borneo, and several other Places to which they have as little Right, And as his Majesty has been pleased to take the same under his Royal Consideration, We are satisfied We shall have our Right to a free Trade effectually supported, and you may be assured We will Use our Utmost Endeavours to obtain satisfaction for past Injurys, We must observe to you that the Examination of the Mallay man who gave you the Information of the Massacre of the Crews of the two Praws, ought to have been taken in Council and Attested upon Oath.

19. And here it is but doing Justice to Mr. Coombs, to acquaint you that his Behaviour at Batavia on these unjust pretentions of the Dutch, has been very much to our satisfaction.

20. The Portfield Captain Carteret LeGeyt Commander, after delivering Treasure and Goods at Fort S^t. David, is directed to proceed directly to Benjar, not so much with a view of getting a Loading for Canton (though We hope that is not impracticable) as to assert our Right to a Free Trade at that Port, the Supra Cargos We have appointed for that Ship are Messieurs Mordecai Walker, Francis Mariell, and James Waller.

21. We observe your several Transactions with the Neighbouring Sultans, Pangarans and others, and recommend the keeping up a good Harmony with them all, as most Conducive to our General Interest, and if at any time you are obliged to come to Extremitys, to use your utmost Prudence therein.

22. We are very well assured that the Transaction of Churchey, and Jones, with regard to the Prince of Madura was a most Iniquitous one, and are convinced if you had been as strict in your enquiry as the Case required it would have so plainly appeared that you would have obliged them to make a Restitution of their illgotten Wealth.

23. We must submit to the Expence of the necessary Buildings, and Repairs mentioned in your Advices, recommending however the utmost Frugality therein, But We positively direct that you do not set about any expensive Works without expresse leave from Us.

24. We likewise recommend the greatest Frugality and Care to keep the several branches of your Expences within reasonable bounds, as they at present run too high for the returns from your Settlements, We observe the Expences for the Year 1748 exceed the preceeding Years Two Thousand five hundred and forty six Dollars, One Sooco and Ninety two Cash.

25. We approve of the Orders you gave on your being acquainted of a Deficiency in the Cash at Croce, upon the coming away of the late Chief M^r. Christie, by directing for the future that the next in standing should have a Key to it as well as the Chief, the like must be done at every other Subordinate Settlement.

26. It is with great Concern We observe the fatal Decrease of our Covenant Servants, Soldiery, and Slaves, in a great Measure occasioned by that raging Distemper the small Pox, in order therefore that you may have a sufficient Number of Covenant

Servants to carry on the Business, We have appointed M^r. John Goodwin a Factor on your Establishment, and as he has faithfully and diligently served Us many Years in several Stations at S^t. Helena, and was of Council until We thought proper to put it on a different footing, We therefore direct that he be stationed next below the Youngest in Council at the time of his Arrival, and that he do succeed to the Council upon the first Vacancy, and We take this occasion of assuring you that it is much against our Inclination, to break into the Regular Succession of our Servants, except in such an Extraordinary Instance as this; M^r. Goodwin must execute the enclosed Covenants and write to his Friends in England to give the usual Security.

27. We have likewise appointed the undermentioned Factors upon your Establishment, who are to take their standing as such upon their Arrival in the order We have Ranked them Viz^t. William Teshmaker, Alexander Forbes, John Garnsey, Robert Swinton, Thomas Paget and James Stephans.

28. M^r. Goodwin as well as the above persons take their Passage on the Suffolk.

29. Having thus supplied you with Covenant Servants, all Monthly Writers are to be discharged.

30. We approve your filling up the Vacancys in Council from time to time with the next in standing, unless their Circumstances and Behaviour are such as may render them unfit for that Station.

31. As M^r. Hampton did not Arrive at Fort Marlborough untill November 1747 and did not leave Bengal until he had our Express Orders for that purpose, We therefore direct that he be stationed next after M^r. Le Merchant, and We hereby positively forbid your giving any of our Servants any part of their Contracted time for the future.

32. We have lent John Garnsey whom We have appointed a Factor as before-mentioned the sum of Fifty pounds to be repaid out of his growing Salary, according to the Tenour of the enclosed Bond.

33. We have entertained Samuel Gardner who takes his passage on this Ship, to serve Five Years as a Mason and Bricklayer at the Pay of Ten Dollars a Month, to commence on his Arrival, let Us know whether he behaves to your Satisfaction.

34. And here We must observe that you have encreased the Pay of George Dobbinson a Bricklayer with you, from fifteen to Twenty Dollars a Month, We hope he is what you represent him, a very capable and Industrious Man, if so We acquiesce in what you have done, though We think it is a large Allowance.

35. We refer you to our Letter by the Swallow, a Copy of which is enclosed and which will probably come to your hands before the Original, for the care We have taken to recruit your Number of Slaves, upon the Arrival of which We direct that the best of them be trained to the Military Exercise, as We are well assured they will be very Usefull to Us both as Soldiers and Labourers.

36. For this Reason as well as that We expect to be acquainted that some of the Soldiery which Arrived at Fort S^t. David under the Command of Admiral Boscawen, have been forwarded to you by the President and Council, We have sent no Recruits this season.

37. We acquiesce in the writing off the large deficiency of Eleven Tons, One Quarter and Eighteen Pounds of Pepper in the Godown for the reasons you give, though We cannot help observing what is mentioned upon your Consultations, that no true Account of Remains had been taken for several Years, which is a Neglect that We hope and direct you will never suffer for the future.

38. Your Consultations Received by the Godolphin have no Marginal Notes or Index, they must never go out of your hands in so Negligent a manner for the future.

39. Nor the Books of Letters received and sent which are carelessly copied many of the Letters without Dates, and not Indext.

40. There is a Mistake in your General Books received by the Godolphin in the Article of Profit and Loss as will appear by our Auditors Remarks in this Packet, you are to direct the Accountant to rectify the same, and as it affects the Ballance of your Books you must by the next Conveyance let Us have a Copy of such rectified Account.

41. You have omitted in your Letter by the Godolphin to mention the Dates of the Certificates for Money paid into Cash, in which particular you must for the future be more carefull.

42. Upon transmitting your Yearly Muster Roll of the Military, you must for the future insert therein a List of the People Dead Run or Discharged since the last was sent, with the particular Time against each Name when they Dyed, Run or were Discharged, which is to be signed by the proper Officer.

43. Captain Stephens of the Godolphin has delivered to Us the Plank of Bencoolen Wood which he fastened to the Rudder, it appears quite free from the Worm, as does likewise a small piece which was upon his Pinnacle's Scagg six Weeks, during which time the bottom was eat in several Places, and We think it a very proper Wood to be used for Sheathing.

44. From the Receipt of this Letter you are to make no Contracts for, or purchases of Tea, notwithstanding any former Orders We may have given.

45. If M^r. Wadman died Intestate, as his Friends represent to Us they have great reason to believe, We direct that the produce of his Effects be paid into our Cash, and that Certificates be granted for the amount, payable to such person or persons as shall be legally Authorized to receive the same.

46. We direct that for the future you send at the same time with your Annual Indent for Medecines and Drugs, a List of all the Surgeons Instruments and Utensils belonging to the Company then remaining.

2. As We entirely depend upon your prudence and conduct in the execution of this Trust, We leave it to You to go to Such Port or Ports either on the West or East Side of the Island of Madagascar which have been usually Resorted to for the purchase of Slaves, or any others upon the Said Island where you have reason to hope for Success:

3. You must there purchase Two Hundred and Fifty Slaves, or as many as Your Vessell can conveniently Stow One third of which are to be Women and Girls between the Ages of Fourteen Years and Eighteen, not exceeding Twenty if you can possibly help it, the other two thirds able Bodyd Men under Twenty five Years of Age and well grown Boys.

4. We have Enclosed Some Extracts from the Books of the last Ships We sent to Madagascar, of the terms of Trade then Agreed on, which will be some Guide to You in Your purchases.

5. You must purchase at Madagascar a Sufficient Quantity of Rice and Provisions for their Use upon the most reasonable Terms you can get them.

6. Treat the Natives Civilly but be constantly on your Guard to prevent any Surprize.

7. You must likewise be constantly on your Guard during the whole time the Slaves are on Board to prevent their rising upon You, but We would have them used with humanity.

8. When Your Business is compleated and the necessary Provisions are on board, You are to make the best of your way to Fort St. David on the Coast of Choromandell and deliver all the Slaves to Our President and Council of that Settlement whose Orders You are to follow for your further proceedings.

9. But as our Principal view in this voyage is to supply Our Settlements on the West Coast of Sumatra, if you find you can proceed from Madagascar in a proper Season for making a Quick passage to Fort Marlborough and the Slaves continue in good health, you are in that case to deliver them to our Deputy Governour and Council there.

10. You must then refresh your People and get your Ship ready for returning to Madagascar as soon as possible to which Place You are hereby Directed to proceed again, and purchase another Cargo of Slaves agreeable to the foregoing Directions.

11. The Second Cargo must be deliver'd at Fort St. David, but however in this You are to be Govern'd by Such Orders as You may receive from Our Servants at either of these Settlements.

12. You are by Invoice to Consign each Cargo to Our President and Council of Fort St. David, or Deputy Governour and Council of Fort Marlborough, and the Commander for the time being is to Sign Bills of Lading for the Same.

13. You are to keep a regular and exact Diary of all Your Transactions at Madagascar and Enter therein all such Observations as may be of Service, for the future carrying on the Slaving Trade.

14. You are also to keep an exact Account of the Disposal of the Cargo consigned to You, the purchases of the Slaves, Rice and other necessaries together with all the Charges attending the Same.

15. Copys of which Diary and Accounts signed by you both are to be delivered to our Servants at the abovementiond Settlements, on the Delivery of each Cargo in Order to be forwarded to Us, the Originals You are to deliver to Us on Your Return to England.

16. Upon delivering Your Second Cargo of Slaves You are to follow all such Orders for your further proceedings as may be given you by Our President and Council of Fort St. David.

17. If contrary to our expectations you shall not be able to procure the Number of Slaves We have Directed in a proper Season for making a Quick passage to either of the said Settlements, You are in that Case to proceed with as many as you can get in time as a long Voyage may be very prejudicial to their health.

18. We shall give Directions to Our Servants at Fort St. David and Fort Marlborough to supply you with Europeans in case You shall want any to make up Your Compliment and give You all other necessary Assistance, You must therefore make Your application to them accordingly.

19. You must as often as is necessary Examine and keep free from Rust the Small Arms as some of them will remain on board a considerable time.

20. To excite you to discharge this Commission Faithfully and diligently We shall give Directions to our Servants at Fort St. David and Fort Marlborough to pay You Twenty Shillings a head for so many Slaves as shall be deliver'd alive to them, to be Divided between You in the following Proportions viz'. Two thirds to the Commander and One third to the Chief Mate.

21. And to Encourage the Surgeon to be careful of the Slaves health You may acquaint him We shall give Directions that he be paid Five Shillings a head for so many as shall be deliver'd at our Settlements in India. We are

TO ALL PEOPLE to whom these Presents shall [concern], The United Company of Merchants of England, Trading [to the] East-Indies, *Send greeting.* Whereas [in and] by an Act of Parliament made in the Fifth Year of [his late] Majesty's Reign, It is (amongst other Things) Enacted, [That if] any of his Majesty's Subjects should, from and [after the] twentieth Day of February, One Thousand Seven [Hundred] and Eighteen, sail, go, or repair to, or be in the East [Indies] in the Countries and Parts of Asia and Africa, or [in such] Places of Asia, Africa, and America, or any of them, [beyond] the Cape of *Bona Esperanza* to the Streights of *Magellan*, where any Trade or [Traffick] of Merchandize is or may be used or had, contrary to the Laws then in being, or the [Tenor of] the said Act; such Persons, so offending, should be liable to such Punishment as by any [Law in] being might be inflicted for such Offence; and that it should and might be lawful [to and] for the United Company of Merchants of England, Trading to the East-Indies, and their [Successors], to take, arrest and seize, or cause to be taken, arrested and seized such Person or [Persons] being a Subject or Subjects of his Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, at any Place or Places [where] he or they shall be found, within the Limits or Places aforesaid; and the Person and [Persons] so taken, arrested, and seized, to send and remit to England, there to answer for the [offence] aforesaid, according to due Course of Law. And it was in and by the said Act [provided and] enacted, that the said Act should continue in Force for five years, and from thence to the [end of] the then next Session of Parliament, and no longer. AND WHEREAS, in and by an [Act of] Parliament made in the ninth Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George, the [said act] of the fifth Year of his said late Majesty was further continued in Force for seven Years [from] the 25th Day of March, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Twenty three, and from thence [to the] End of the then next Session of Parliament. AND WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the fifth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty the said first mentioned Act is [revised] and further continued in Force for seven Years, from the first Day of May, One Thousand [seven] Hundred and Thirtytwo, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament. AND WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament made in the thirteenth Year of the [Reign of] his present Majesty, the last recited Act of the fifth Year of his present Majesty is [continued till] the first Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and forty-seven. And by another [Act] of Parliament, made in the twentieth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, the same [Act is] further continued from the Expiration thereof until the twenty-fifth Day of March, [One thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty; as in and by the said Acts, Relation being thereunto [had, may] more fully appear. Now KNOW YE, That we the said United Company [do by] Virtue of the Power granted to us by the above-mentioned Act, and Acts of Parliament [hereby] Authorise and Empower Captain John Bell Commander of the [ship] *Swallow* and the Commander for the time being pursuant to the Powers of the said Acts to take, arrest, and seize, all and every Person and [Persons] being a Subject or Subjects of his Majesty, his Heirs or Successors, offending against the [Laws] aforesaid, within the Places aforesaid; and the Person and Persons so taken, arrested and [seized] to send and remit to England to answer for his or their Offence, according to due Course of Law.
