IMPRIMIS.—That such set of Merchants shall engage to pay the old Merchants [for] the term of five years.

SECONDLY.—That they shall not require any mony to be advanc'd them [upon any pre] tence whatsoever only a true & ready payment made for what [brought] into the Companys Warehouse.

THIRDLY.—That said Merchants shall strictly keep to such contract as they shall [or may] at times make with the Cheif and Councill and not shift of one sort of [goods in the] room of another such as suits best with their conveniency.

FOURTHLY.—That said Merchants shall be oblig'd to take every tenth pagoda in Europe other such goods as the Comp^a. send down proper for this place.

FIFTHLY.—That said Merchants Shall oblige themselves to invest within the ye[ar y°.] mony the Gov^r. & Councill of Fort S^t. George shall send down the usual [charges] Garrison deducted and in case of failure to pay the customary interest [of that place] for such part as shall lie dead provided that such failure be made a[ppear] from the dearness of cotton or their own choice but in case of any stop [to the] trade by the Country Government and not any visible fault on their [part y°. Merch] ants to remain free from any such contribution.

In consideration of which to be duly and truly performed the Govern. & [Councill] of ffort S^t. George shall grant upon their part to the above set of Merchants.

IMPRIMIS.—A Charter for fifteen years by which they & their assigns shall [be vested] with the sole priviledge of providing goods for the Company to the [exclusion of] all others from interfering with them in that particular.

SECONDLY.—They shall by deed under their seal convey to said Merchants all [y°. just] claims from and upon the abovesaid Cunsum Lingana &c. and [deliver the] persons of the said Debtors with their familys into their hands [and also] to

give them all their assistance in making inspection, into [all the] accord and circumstances of the Debtors and if occasion be at their [request to punish the] said Debtors according to the custom of the country in order to ma[ke them reveal] where and in whose hands their effects are conceal'd.

THIRDLY.—In case it shall afterwards appear (as there is but too just cause to suspect) that the above said Debtors have lodg'd their mony among their Freinds and acquaintance up in the country that then the Company shall use all power and authority to retreive it and bring said Persons on accot. whatsoever charge they are at in so doing to be truly repaid them [by] said set of new Merchants.

FFOURTHLY.—That the Governe, and Councill of Fort St. George shall annually send down Forty thousand pags. till such time as the old Merchants debt be clear'd provided that said Merchants upon tryall make it appear they can invest that or a ·larger sum.

FIFTHLY.—That the said Merchants shall be permitted to bring in one fifth Pags. in fine goods, and four fifths in course till [said] debt be clear'd, afterwards to be oblig'd to provide such goods as the Gov. and Councill shall direct.

Our last to your Hon. &c. was the 21st. Ultimo We were in hopes much sooner than this to have repeated the good news but the strange dilitoriness that attends all manner of business here, has kept us also at a snails space, so that We fear the present Cossids will not be able to reach your last Europe dispatches, however the three Phirmaunds for Bengall, Madrass and Surat being drawn up in the Secretarys office and approv'd of by the Mier Moonchy by whom they were sent into his Majesty for his approbation likewise we have taken Coppys thereof, and now send them for your Hon. &c. perusal it being already finish'd by all the under Mutsuddys. We are under no apprehensions of any alterations to Our disadvantage. As soon as it pleases God that it comes out sign'd by his Majesty We shall take care to dispatch the good news with the greatest expedition. But not expecting to reach the Bengall shipping we do not (sic) at this time dispatch the same good news with Coppys of the Phirmaunds to the Hon. President and Councill of Bombay in hopes that a Conveyance may be mett with from that quarter so soon as the papers come out approv'd by his Majesty they will be wrote over fair; then carry'd to the Vizier for his Seal and lastly to the Office where it will receive his Majestys great Seal.

The Duanny Sunnods are all wrote over fair but as yet not sign'd by the Duan Colsa so we do not remitt their Coppys besides they are not of so great Consequence.

The Kings Tents are gone out of the City, to morrow is the day appointed for his Majesty to follow them the report is that he is going to hunt where he went the last Season, This will add something to the natural delays of this Coast, but the seeming good posture of our affairs at present gives us courage to pursue a glorious Conclusion with Our accustomary patience.

Letter advises that Leanqua & Anqua had undertaken the management of that affair, in order to make it up amicably with the Tytuck & Mandareens of Amov. That they had sent to the Tytuck for his Chop, & were in expectation of his answer, web. they will communicate to us by the first opportunity, the Several Letters being read. The President added He had discours'd wth. Mr. Bongri who went from hence to China expressly on that affair, who gave him the following Account of the matter. That the Mandarins concern'd in abusing the English had represented to the Emperour, that the Junk was carried away by a Pyrat, but the Merchants whose goods were taken on the Junk, gave a different relation that she was taken by the English in Satisfaction for injury's done them at Amoy, on which the King order'd an enquiry to be made & finding the Merchants who had abus'd the English, were protected by the Mandarins & Tytuck, He order'd them to make good all the damage sustain'd by the Freighters of the Junk, & turn'd the two Mandarins out of Post continuing the Tytuck, so that now the affair must be negotiated with him. The President further added that He is inform'd that the Bercalong of Siam is a relation of the said Tytucks from whom He must have receiv'd the particular Invoice of the Junks Cargo, & He is of opinion that He has been employ'd by him to procure Satisfaction that way, not knowing that any steps were taking on our side towards an Accommodation, It appears both by the acknowledgments of the Chinese at Amoy, & by the claim of the Bercalong of Siam, that the Junk belongs to the Bercalong & that the Amoy Merchants were only freighters. He therefore proposed that there being a ship now bound from this Port to Siam Commanded by Capt.

The following relation of the loss of the Ship Catherine, is what gave in to the Depty. Gov. and Coun". of Marlbrô Fort, web. I now humbly present to your hon. &ct. Coun", and is as follows.

The 14th of Septembr. Ultimo made the Eastward part of Java, the 18th got into the Streights of Sunda, and the 20th about noon struck upon a Sunkeen Rock, off the 4th point of Java not mention'd in any of Ours, or the Dutch Mapps, the said Rock lying about two miles from Shoar, and at low water has 12 foot upon it, Mr. West my Gunner was then at the Lead, We shoal'd Our Water from 15 fathoms to 10 fathoms, when hauled off, the next Cast was 6 fathoms, and before could heave the Lead again struck. In a Little time after lost Our Rudder, We made all possible hast to carry one anchor out to get the ship off which about five got off in 7 fathom Water. We kept continually abaleing at each Hatch Way likewise pumping with both Caine and hand pumps, notwithstanding all endeavours the Water gain'd on Us very fast, I endeavour'd to wear the ship to get her into a small bay to the Eastward but being sunk so deep and no rudder could not, it being then the Opinion of Officers and men that We should use Our utmost Diligence, to Wharpe ashoar, otherwise in a very little time should founder in the aforemention'd depth, and unavoidably lose

several lives upon which sent M. Skerwin my Second Mate to sound the best ground. Betwixt the Hours of seven and eight at night got fast ashore laying Our best Bower of y. Sea fast, and two Hawsers ashoar the ship lay very easy that night but the Water making a free passage in and out according to the washing of the Tide.

The 21st. sent my Pinnace with my Purser to Batavia to get assistance which immediately was granted now seeing but little hopes of recovering the ship went about saving what stores and Effects We could (the Hono. Company first as thought myself in Duty bound). The reasons for my going into the Streights, referr your Hon. &ct to yo. Lett. and Consultation I deliver with this I humbly request the Officers of the ship Catherine, may be examin'd to yo. truth of the same, and doubt not with your Hon. &ct. Impartial Character to the Hono. Company shall be able to Vindicate my hon. & Conduct against any attempts that may be made to the contrary, by any Evil designing Men I am

That your petitioner is an Inhabitant of Ganjam but has for these 40 years past come to Madrass to trade by w^{ch}. y^e. Company gets annually about two hundred pagodas.

One time M^r. Symonds came to Ganjam and brought with him some Cowries, Copper &c^t. to dispose of, in M^r. Holcombs time, and before, t'was a Custom to acquaint the Moors Gov^r. of any Goods brought there for Sale, but M^r. Symonds sold his without their knowledge.

Before Mr. Symonds sold his Goods Your petitioners Father and some of his Officers belonging to the Government came to him, and told him that it was usual for Merch. to let y. Gov. know of what Goods they brought before they dispos'd of them, t'was their advice he sho. do the same, which w. be no prejudice to him as all Englishmen were by the Kings order excus'd paying Custom at that port adding that as he was very well acquainted with the Country manners, they did not doubt but he wo. act according to Sallabad, and pay according to the writing gave y. Moors. This is all they said to him.

Some time after M^r. Symonds wrote to M^r. Hastings, upon w^{ch}. he sent a sloop with twenty soldiers that anchor'd in Borua road, your petitioner thought they only came for provisions, but as soon as they landed the soldiers plundered the place and broke open your petitioners House taking out what they pleas'd and then return'd upon the same sloop to Vizagapatam but first took three ships in Borua Road fully laden in which belonging to your Petitioner and two Ships out of Ganjam Road likewise fully laden and belong'd to your petitioner, but the soldiers beating the Lascars of one of the ships, they ran away and left y^c. ship w^{ch}. soon after founded the other four they carried to Vizagapatam and from thence to Madrass where they sold the Cargo for ready mony.

When your Petitioners Father saw this, he consider'd, that as he had done M^r. Symonds no injury in any respect whatever, 'twou'd be best to acquaint the Gov^r. of Madrass thereof in order to procure justice, accordingly he wrote him an acco^t. of y^c. whole affair, an answer was return'd that if he, or any person wo^d. come to Madrass, what was taken away sho^d. be return'd so your petitioner came and Gov^r. Harrison promisd to do him justice and M^r. Benyon told your petitioner that he had spoke to y^c. Gov^r. in his behalf and advised your petitioner to receive 4000 pagodas which was what the Cargoe sold for and return to Ganjam, One day in Consultation the Gov^r. order'd your petitioner to bring an acco^t. of y^c. first cost of y^c. said Cargoes but delay'd examining y^c. matter till M^r. Hastings came from Vizagapatam who talk'd something about it to Gov^r. Harrison, in the interim M^r. Benyon died.

One day the Gov^r. bid your petitioner give a writing to stand to whatever he shou^d. determine, your petitioner told him he wo^d. in case he wo^d. act wth. equity and justice and accordingly gave a writing, but two or three days after the Gov^r. order'd

your petitioner to take 2,000 Rupees which he refus'd desiring justice might be done him, as he had done no injustice to any body, so your petitioner waited in hopes of receiving his mony. When your Hon. arriv'd your petitioner had a mind to have spoke to you but Talliars were sett to watch that he came not out of his House.

Your petitioner wholly relys upon your Hon. to do him justice, and desires this affair may be examin'd into, 'tis now four years since he first arriv'd, and not receiving this mony, has hindred him from trading. 18000 Rupees are justly due to him which he desires your hon. &ct. to consider of and order the mony to be paid him, for which favour as in Duty bound.

Court of Directors, we represented to them the small consideration of advantage they had appointed to be paid us here for so long a Voyage and for the Services they were to expect from us the commission at that time being directed drawn in ythe manner it is now made up by Mr. Frederick and also representing to them that in such manner our proffits would be much short of what they had allow'd the Supra Cargoes of their out and home ships, they were pleas'd to take it into consideration and order'd us to withdraw, and in a short time we were called into court again, when we were told by Sr. Robert Child Chairman that the Court had consider'd our request, & as a further Encouragement to us, had granted us a larger allowance, the particulars of which he directed the Secretary to read to us and was as follows.

That the Severall proportions allowed us to be concern'd in the stock, also our commission shou'd be paid us with such proffit as Gold shou'd produce in this Mint without deduction of Freight or any proportion of charges upon our Stock in China that such mony was to be invested in Diamonds and carried freight free to England where at our arrivall y°. Hon. Court of Directors also promis'd to make us an allowance for y°. 5 \$\Psi\$ C°. Directed by act of Parliment to be paid them upon all private Trade, if they approved of our management, we assure your Hon. &c. that this is matter of Fact, but we coming out of Towne immediately before the sitting of another court, cou'd not get a coppy of this minnett from Secretary Woolly, and we also assure your Hon. &ca. that this was the reason the Hon. Court of Directors made an addition to our Stock of near £5000 sterling after our being in the Downs, they considering that we receiving our severall proportions here without any part of charges in China upon them the said charges wou'd Lye very heavy upon their remaining stock as appears by some Letters enter'd in our Diary now we humbly request your Honr. &ca. wou'd direct our commission to be made up in this manner but if you cannot doe it, then, that youle' be pleas'd to mention what we have desir'd in your Generall Letter to our Hon. Masters, who we are assured will pay it us there.

Our last to your Hon. &c. was Febry. y. 23d, which carried the good news of the Broad Seal being clapt on the Phirmaunds weh. [We] hope is duely arriv'd from that Office they were carried to have the Rossalaw Vizt. the Grand Viziers Seal on ye. back the obtaining of weh. took up ye. whole month of March considering the Kings being in his Camp so near ye. City, the Muttsuddys miss'd no opportunity of regaling themselves at their own houses, the Kings going daily a hunting and some times the Viziers not sitting out may have been the cause of so great delay, besides this We cannot answer but the Visier may have some small stickling whither he sho^a. on this occasion require a bribe or not, for y°. Phirmaunds were severall times carried and return'd without receiving y°. full approval but in y°. end this great Minister answer'd the opinion We always had of him the fortune of Our Hon°. Masters carrying ye. day, he sign'd a paper for ye. seal ye. 27th. which was affix'd ye. day following without any alterations although it was reported that Rey Reyon and Rajah Ruttunchud, at that instant did make some offers to the contrary, but which however prov'd ineffectuall We shod. at that time have given your Hon. &c. the good news but being so near the finishing We were willing to detain Our dispatches a few days longer till the Phirmaunds were deliver'd, but first there was another petition to be wrote to y. King, that they were ready, and his Orders expected thereon, weh. was sent in to his Majesty ye. 2d. and came out sign'd ye. 7th. and this day ye. Phirmaunds were brought home intirely finish'd by Cojee Seerhaud and deliver'd to Mr. John Surman pursuant to your Hon. &ct. Orders We do not detain this Cossid any longer for the sake of transmitting Copies under the Cozzees seal which may take up a few days, your Hon. &c. may be sure you utmost precaution shall be taken therein and for the security of those precious papers which have been obtain'd [at] so much expence of Our Hon. Masters, and trouble to Us, we shall contribute all that lies in Our power.

We herewith enclose Copies under the Cozzee's Seal of 25 perwanna's being the same We formerly sent down, the Originals are finish'd, except one Writ[ten for] signing them, which Seerhaud says will be done either to day or to morrow when they will be deliver'd as the Phirmaunds the remaining Seven Perwanna's as yet are not done Attesham Caun while He remain'd Duan Colsa refusing to sign them without some alterations which were not fully compleated till y°. late revolution in y°. Duanny Seerhaud tells Us they will be done in a few days, but a small matter must be first expended.

The most active part of the Ministry here, has of late recd. a very great turn by your displacing of Attesham Cawn Duan Colsa and Rey Reyon Duan Tun His Majesty giving those post to Enotoola Cawn who is lately come from Mecca as a Master fit to retrieve you troubled state of this Kingdome. He was possessed of these posts for many years in time of Allumgeer and the same all the Reign of Behauder Shaw, noted for his knowledge in you affairs of this Kingdome, his great severity and utter refusall of any sort of bribery whatever at the beginning of this Kings Reign, His son Edatoola Cawn was Consomma but falling under the suspicion of your Reigning Favourites they sacrificed him to their own Security, and so sent your Father to Mecca. His Majesty finding young Complaints made from all parts, the great want of Treasure and in finding the strange Confusion every thing was in, made him look out to find out, if possible a fit man to retrieve it, this man, they say, was first propos'd by Ameencodyn Cawn and afterwards so well fix'd in his Majesty's thoughts, that all the instances us'd by the reigning Ministers cod. not avert him from it Enoitoola Cawn himself was very hardly brought to, considering [the risk he would] run by disobliging the reigning Favourites, and to act [.........] were perfectly inconsistant, so that before he wod. accept yo. post, he made a great many objections Vizt. The protection of Cootbulmooluck, to have a considerable sum of

mony paid down out of y. Kings private Treasury as He shod. require it and that no man shod offer to interferr in his business all which his Majesty readily granted and purely in Obedience to the Kings Command was [consented] to by the Vizier for the present, Our patron is not to Fathom'd, but it is supposed [that] this alteration has Clipt his Wingns in a great measure y. 3d. inst. He recd. Seerpau as Duan Colsa Duan Tun and Subah of Cashmeer we have very good reason to be extraordinary glad to find Our Hon. Masters affairs wants none of his assistance, and We believe we dare venture to say He is to well acquainted to have pass'd such papers of which his predicessor knew less y. Consequence and We hope it is to late for him to make any enquiry after them.

We have not as yet been able to make any great progress in Our Dispatches, Our strange dilatory patron is ye. occasion of it, He puts us off from ye. Camp to ye. City promising with the many asseverations He wod. do it on Our Arrival there His Majesty came in ye. 3d. inst. but as yet We have seen nothing but fair promises We shall leave no stone unturned to get away with the utmost Expedition but at present must have patience.

Your Hon. &ct. dated Feb., y. 12th. came to hand march y. 18th. We humbly propose the foregoing as a sufficient answer thereto, every one being to y. utmost of their Endeavours willing to obey all orders your Hon. &ct. shall impose on them.

A Translate of y. Phirmaund Granted y. English Company by King Farruckseer, and attested to be a true Copy of y. Originall by y. Codgee Dated the 5th, of January 1716.

To the present Subah, and all the Jaggeirdawr's, Corrodees, Phow[s]dars, Rahaudaurs, Gusurabands, Zammedars, and their Successors at Golcondah.

Be it known unto you that Mr. John Surman and Cojee Seerhaud the English Company's Gomastah's have sollicited ye. King in their behalf Vizt.

That the Company have the liberty of trading Custom free in all the port Towns under the Subah of Golcondah, That they annually pay twelve Hundred pagodas into the King's Treasury for y°. rent of Chinnapatam, as appears by y°. Books and that they hope to obtain His Majesty's Phirmaund for y°. continuance thereof according to Sallabad.

Wherefore the King has been pleas'd to Order that their petition be granted if conformable to Custome, that whatever Goods the Company's Gomastahs Import, or Export to, or from all parts of India, shall be excus'd paying any Dutys, where the Subahs power extends, and His Majesty strictly Charges You all to see that none attempt to molest or interrupt the English Company in their mercantile affairs, Giving you permission to receive from them 1200 pags. annually as usuall and forbids your presuming to demand any more.

His Majesty likewise Commands that if any persons Embezled the Effects of the English Company &c. you shall do your utmost endeavour to detect the Robbers, inflict a severe punishment upon them and make them restore y. Goods to y. respective Owners.

That if y°. Company have a mind to settle a Factory in any part you shall give them all reasonable assistance in Buying and Selling of Goods also where they have already setled.

That if any Merchants, or others are lawfully indebted to y. Company you shall oblige them to do justice and satisfie all reasonable demands without any trouble.

That you take care that none of your people insult yo. English, and (as much as in you lies) prevent all disturbances.

THE ENGLISH COMPANY'S GOMASTAHS HAVE FURTHER PETITION'D AS FOLLOWS.

That in the time of the Chingee War they Supplied the Kings Camp, with Guns, Powder, Balls &c. ammunition and provision. That in consideration of such Services his Majesty gave them (as a free Gift Trivatore &c. (5 Villages) which they a long time enjoy'd but that they were taken from them by the Kings Officers three years ago.

THAT also during the War at Hughly they were very assisting to Zeoudy Cawn in the same manner, in Obedience to his Majesty's Comm^d. that therefore they humbly hop'd the five Villages aforemention'd might be restor'd to them, and the Grant Confirm'd.

Wherefore the King has commanded that their petition be granted that y°, five villages be redeliver'd to their possession with all the privileges which they enjoy'd by y°. Munificence of Aurenzeb.

The Companys Gomastahs have further petitiond the King as follows.

That adjacent to the Companys Factory at Vizagapatam there are four Villages, for which (including Vizagapatam) they pay yearly into the Treasury at Checacolo 4862 Rupees that two of ye. said Villages namely Berwana and Woodabundah (rated at 900 Rupees & Annum) are situated too great a distance from the Factory and that therefore they desire to return them to ye. King, and request a Confirmation of ye. grant for ye. other three.

Wherefore his Majesty hereby orders you to take possession of those two Villages according to their desire, and Confirms the other three to them.

The Companys Gomastahs further petition as follows:-

That the Nabob Duan and Subah frequently upon any dispute demand a sight of the Originall Grant refusing to be satisfied with the Copy; that in sending it from place to place they are in danger of losing that which is of so much Consequence to them and that the Managers under the Subah are not contented if they produce any other authority than a Perwanna under y. Subah seal. That they humbly desire his Majesty to publish his Royall Edict that no one should dispute their priviledges upon producing attested Copys of y. Originall Grants.

That at Bombay the Currant Coin is at present stamp'd with a Portugueze Character which they desire may be eras'd and the Kings Impress'd in it's stead, in y's, same manner as it is at Chinnapatam.

FORT ST. GEORGE, JULY 1717-

That Company Servants and others, who are indebted to them and fly for protection to the Kings Subjects may be immediately secur'd and sent back to the nearest Factory without any extorting demand for such service.

Wherefore the King considering the reasonableness of these request has granted as follows—

That a copy of this Phirmaund attested by y°. Codjee or an attested Copy of any other grant or perwanna shall be suffitient to convince you of y°. Authority by which the English Company Act.

That the Coin of Bombay shall be impress'd with the same Character with which is Currant in the Kings Dominions.

That when any persons indebted to ye. Company Desert their bounds and fly to you for refuge, you shall not presume to afford them protection but secure them till they can be sent back from whence they came to ye. nearest Factory belonging to the English Company and you are hereby order'd not to exact from them for such services, that Duty which is call'd Mumnoon.

The Companys Gomastahs further request as follows.

That the Subahs refuse to take their pagodas and Rupees without Discompt, and they are great sufferers thereby, their Gold and Silver being of the same fineness with that of Surat, and other ports according to the Currency of whose coin they desire the King would be pleas'd to order Madras Pagodas to be valu'd.

That as they have Factories at Bengall, Baharr, Vizagapatam, Woodesha, Madrass &c. they would presume to build (as they had occasion) elsewhere in His Majestys Dominions, for which purpose they humbly request forty Bages of Ground might be granted them at any such place.

That if by violence of Weather their ships should be drove ashoar and stranded at any of y°. Kings ports, the Managers thereof may not be permitted to seize the Effects and forcibly detain them (as they frequen[tly] do) nor suffer'd to extort a quarter part thereof before they restore them to y°. Proprietors.

Wherefore his Majesty has order'd that what ever Rupees the English have coin'd at Madrass, ever since the 5th, year of his Reign, shall go Currant thrô all his Dominions, if they are of y°, same fineness with those of Surat.

That y°. Company have setled Several Factorys in the Kings Dominion and drive a very extensive trade even as farr as His Majestys Camp for which they have rec^d. a Phirmaund, and if they are willing to settle any more Factorys, let the Subahs do therein as is accustomary at other ports.

That when any of the Companys Ships are drove ashoar and stranded in your ports you Give them all reasonable assistance, pray see that you punctually observe all the severall injunctions in this Phirmaund and dont demand a sunnod every year, but let this be sufficient and perpetuall.

This day being appointed for Proclaiming the Royall Phirmaund or Charter Granted by the Great Mogul King Furruckseer to the Hon. English East India Company for enjoyment of severall priviledges in his Dominions (rec. from Bengall y. 21st. inst.) the following Orders for y. Ceremony are to be observed.

All ye. Soldiers of ye. Garrison are to be upon Duty and one Company to be drawn up under arms before ye. Fort Gate.

THE MAYOR with all the Aldermen and City Officers to attend on Horse back at the Fort Gate, Where y°. Phirmaund will be in y°. Govr. State Pallenkeen till y°. Govr. comes down and Orders the Secretary to read in y°. English Language, and y°. Cheif Dubash in y°. Moors and Jentu Languages in presence of all y°. Inhabitants of y°. City after w°. y°. Pallenk[een] with y°. Phirmaund attended by y°. Mayor, Aldermen, City Officers on Horseback, a Company of foot Soldiers all y°. English musick are to move forward down Charles Street to S°. Tho. Gate there y° Register is to proclaim His Majesties Phirmaund, to proceed from thence to y°. Sea.

Gate proclaiming it there and so on to the middle Gate repeating the proclamation over again [from] which Gate the Mayor, Aldermen and City Officers are to return to y°. Gate in the Fort, and y°. Phirmaund to be carried forward from y°. middle Gate through the Black Town to Attapollum Gate in [the] manner following Viz°. First y°. Pedda Naigue or Watchman of the City to be on Horse back with all His Taliars and y°. Country Musick, then one Company of y°. English Gaurds, next two Trumpets after which y°. Cheif Dubash on horse back, the Pallankeen with the Phirmaund Gaurded by Six Serjeants after him and then all the Moors and Jentu Merchts. on horseback close after the Pallankeen to y°. foremention'd Attapollam Gate where y°. Cheif Dubash on Horseback is to hold up y°. Royal Phirmaund and proclaim it by expressing himself in the following words.

This is His Majesty King Furruckseers Royal Phirmaund, wherein he confirms to y^e. Hon^e. English East India Company all former Grants and Priviledges, enjoy'd by them, heretofore, and further grants many new priviledges with the possession of several Lands in many parts of India with such fav. as has never before been granted to any European Nation.

Then He is with the retinue to go out at the said Attapollam Gate and enter the Town at Tom Clarks Gate Proclaiming the Royall Phirmaund a 2^d time there, and thence to proceed within y. Town to Bridge foot Gate in Order to proclaim it a 3^d time, and from the said Gate to return to y. Choultry Gate, where y. Taliars and Black Musick are to stay without and the Gaurds with the Dubash and pallankeen to return to the Fort and deliver up the Phirmaund to y. Gov. the Black Merch. being permitted on foot to [attend] it back from the Choultry Gate, and for the more regular management of this solemnation the following Orders were deliver'd the Gunner of y. Garrison for the discharging his part of the Ceremony.

To Mr. Fras. Hugonin Gunner.

As soon as y°. Phirmaund is read before the Gov^{*}. at the Fort Gate you shall begin to fire from S^t. Thoma's Bastion and proceed from thence to y°. Westward and on the Northward till you come round to the said S^t. Thoma's Bastion, and then to continue firing round y°. Walls of y°. Black Town to y°. Number of 151 Guns, as soon as y°. fire is gone round y°. White Town Cap^t. Matth. Martin Commander of the Marlbrough must take up y°. fire and when he has done, all the Europe Ships in the road must fire one after another, and the Country ships upon the Europe ships finish^s. to fire altogether as fast as they can, the ships being handsomely dress'd out with their Coulors and Streamers.

When the Gov^{*}. and Company come to the Garden at Tiping, the Gov^{*}. will begin y^o. Mogulls Health when you must begin to fire from y^o. Garden point and Continue y^o. fire round the Town to y^o. Number of 101 Guns after w^{oh}. you are to prepare against Dinner to fire 101 Guns at King Georges Health, 31 Guns at y^o. Prince and Princess and Royal Families Health, and after Dinner 31 Guns for y^o. Hon^o. Companys health, the ships in y^o. Road to fire at drink^o. y^o. Moguls and King Georges healths in y^o. same manner as they did upon proclaiming the Royal Phirmaund.

After y°. Ceremony of proclaiming the Phirmaund in y°. English and Black Town was over the Hon°. Presid°. with y°. Gentlemen of Councill proceeded to the Garden House through the black Town, attended upon by all the Gentleman of the City on Horse back with handsome accountrements where all they English, Portuguse, Armenian, and Moors Inhabitants were splendidly entertain'd at Dinner, and the Day Concluded, with feasting of y°. Soldiers with Tubs of Punch, and a Bonefire at night and the Black Merchants. to show their Joy at the Hon. Company's receiving so much fav. from the Mogul made abundance of fire Works upon y°. Island.

We were in hopes by this Letter to have given your Hon. &ct. an accot. that We had recd. Our Dispatches from his Majesty, but as there is very little to be depended on here, so We find Our Selves on this accot under no small disappointment having never suspected this trifling matter cod. have taken up so much time, Our Experience on this occasion has taught us, that the least affair cannot be transacted here, without the solemnity of a long and tedious attendance, thereby enhanching the favours they grant, as to make them hardly worth receiving, Our Diary for the month of Aprill, may be more a proper Index than what can be contained in this Letter. We hop'd all had been concluded with the month, not being much concern'd with the Kings determination for our Dispatches, althô not with the same hon. that was granted the Dutch by Morruddeen. Wherefore we desir'd Sallabut Cawn not to request an addition, being satisfied such pursuit must be attended wth. loss of time and consequently become expensive to Our Hono. Masters, he promis'd very fairly, but bes. netled at the disappointment, that a woman (such as Bibbee Juliana) shod. be able to do that for the Dutch wth. a quarter of the present, we was not in his power to effect for us wth. such advantageous pleas made him storm in private and resent it to Caundora in very pathetick terms neither wod. he desist on web. Caundora made him speak to the King himself his Majesty disputed making the addition of Cunger and Horse for Mr. Surman as an ill precedt. for futurity but in the end he granted it with this salve that it shod. he given some Duan before the time of Our Dispatches, that it might remain upon the Records as a mark of his fav. and not to be challenged by other nations, We have exerted Our selves to the utmost on this occasion in hopes of a speedy dispatch, so the disappointment cannot be laid at Our Doors, and hope Our precedent Behaviour is evident proof that no outside Vanity or expectations cod. make us swerve from our Hono. Masters Interest.

Villages lately granted by the Royal Phirmaund, the Nabobs Letter is wrote in general terms with a great many compliments but referrs to Sunca Ramah and the spy Braminy for an answer to the business in hand, they both advise that in conversation the Nabob told them, He could not deliver up possession of the Vilages whout seeing the Original Phirmaund, but that He was desirous to maintain a good understanding with the English.

The matter debated and agreed the Presidt, write a Letter to ye. Nabob.

On a full consideration of the matter it was AGREED that the President should write to the Nabob rendering him thanks for the assurances of his freindship & favour & acquainting him, that twenty one days after the date He designs to take possession of the said Vilages & together with his Letter to send the Present, usually made upon a new Presidents accession to the Government of this place, which has been suspended so long, that We might be assur'd of the Nabobs keeping his post, which has been very unlikely, & if a New Nabob had been establish'd, We should have been oblig'd to have given it over again, the Sum Agreed on is five hundred pag". & one peice of Superfine Scarlet cloth to the Nabob, and two hundred pagodas with some cordial waters to Ducknaroy the Nabobs Secretary and son in law, who has the cheif managemt of his affairs, to whom also it was Agreed the President should write a short compliment. It's further AGREED that the President do write to Sunca Ramah to make the several Presents and at the same time to acquaint the Nabob that it is an express grant in the Royal Phirmaund, that neither He or any of the Kings Officers shall demand to see any of the Original Papers, but

that copies duely attested by the Cozee shall be a suffitient claim on our parts for the several priviledges and grants bestow'd upon us, & that himself and all other Officers are oblig'd to yeild obedience to such attested Copies.

Inhabitants near Divy Island & Metchlepatam to make speedy dispatch in taking possession of that Island, the reasons urg'd for it are that the Nabob Mubaurize that was Cawn (in whose district that country lies) is at present near that place, but the Inhabitant of in a few months will be going for Golcondah and that it will be much more easy ants near to treat with him at so small a distance than when he is further remov'd, besides that & Metchlepm. He has a considerable influence on the Renter of Divy Island, & is the only person to make from whom We can expect assistance, to which is added the impatience of the Inhabitants for our coming, who apprehend themselves in danger of being pillag'd by taking possession of our delay another Reason is the hopes of bringing Upparow Renter to submit by a that Island. treaty, if We do not give him time to strengthen himself too much, especially if We permit him to live under our protection, and employ him in the Compas. Service. These are things appear to us of so great weight, that it is unanimously AGREED to take the following steps in order to obtain a peaceable possession of Divy Island with all possible expedition, & in the mean time to be preparing the necessary forces in case of opposition.

FIRST, That Mr. Richard Horden fourth of Councill be constituted Deputy Govern. of Divy Island at the same time reserving his rank & station at this

SECONDLY, That three of the Honble. Companies Servants be appointed of Councill for his assistance together with two Writers.

THIRDLY, That the Monsoon being very near changing a Vessell be imediately provided to transport the said Companies Servants with a few Soldiers of Metchlepatam, with orders to reside there in the Compas. ffactory till the arrival of Mr. Horden who is to go by land as soon as the rains are over, which may be expected about the middle of next month, and that during their stay there they be instructed to make all the discovery they can of the disposition of the Inhabitants, the condition of the place, the depths of the Barrs, with other Circumstances needfull.

FOURTHLY, That the President send by them a Letter to the Nabob acquainting him that in a short time a person will come with full Commission and Authority from the Company to take possession of Divy Island in their name and to establish a freindship with himself.

FIFTHLY, It's AGREED that the President singly shall have the particular direction of entertaining necessary persons in the service and providing of all stores &c.

Calcutta Town's Present & to come, for Do. one on Echram Cawn Patua house on Esgar Cawn Companys Debtors one, as also a sett of Copy's of the Phirmaund under the Cazees Seal, by that Conveyance we likewise sent our accounts Cash, Warehouse & Charges Gen¹¹. with Copys of Consultations for the months of March & Aprill which we hope will arrive in a good time having already sent two Setts of the Phirmds. we shall not repeat them till we hear they are arriv'd or farther orders we now send four more of the abovemention'd perwannaes.

The 23d. ulto. Jno. Surman recd. from his Majesty an horse & Cunger as was preappointed, & the 30th. Do. we were sent for by Caundora to receive our Dispatches which we had accordingly; a seerpaw & Culgee being Giv'n to Jn°. Surman Seerpaw's to Seerhaud & Edwd. Stephenson, as likewise to the rest of our Companions. We are order'd to pass one by one to our Obeisance then to move from the Duan. We did so, but when it came to Mr. Hamilton's turn he was told the King had granted him a Vest as a mark of his favour but not for his Dispatch, so was Order'd up to his standing again whilst he was performing this the King Got up we

were highly surpriz'd at this unexpected motion, not having the least notice of it till that Minute either from one Patron or any of authority, it being near a twelve month since Mr. Hamilton had been in private with his Majesty and in all this time not the least notice taken. We were very much concern'd at his Delainment, and the more because we were assur'd of his firm aversion to accepting the service, even with all it's Charm's of Vast Pay honour &ct. that if the King did detain him by force, if he outliv'd the Trouble of his esteem'd Imprisonment, he might be endeavouring at an Escape which every way had its ill Consequences To free our Hon. Masters from any Damages that might accrue to them from the passionate Temper of the King, Our patron Caundora was apply'd to for leave, twice or thrice he positively denied to speak, or even have a hand in this business till our Friend Syud Sallabad Cawn had opportunity to lay the Case open to him; when he Order'd us to speak to the Vizier, and if by any means we could gain him to interceed that he would back it, nay if the Vizier refus'd he would make one Effort for the Doctor himself. Nay Sallabad Cawn promis'd to convince the King himself in case of any Delay pursuant to our Patron's directing we made a Visit to the Vizier the 4° instant and laid the case open to him in a petition from Mr. Hamilton of how little service he could be without any Physick language or Experience in the Country medicines or their Names, besides which headbreaking Distractions of being parted for ever from his wife and Children would be insupportable, and entirely take away his Qualificat. for the Kings Service, that under the favour of his Maj. clemency with the utmost submission he Desir'd that he might have leave to Depart with us. From ourselves we inform'd the Vizier that we should have esteem'd this a very great honour but finding the Doctor under these troubles not to be persuaded we were oblig'd to lay the case before his Majesty, & that in this case none so proper as himself, with all that we humbly Desir'd he would use his intercessions to the King that his Majesty might be prevaild upon to dispatch him. The good Vizier readily offer'd to use his utmost Endeavours, & since the Case was so, the business was to Gain the Doctor's dispatch without Displeasing the King and order'd a Petition to be drawn up to his Majesty in ye. same form as that given to himself directed to the King and sent him which he would forward with one from himself. It was sent him and the Vizier was as good as his word writing a very pathetick address to his Majesty, enforcing Mr. Hamilton's reasons and backing them with his own opinion, That it was better to let him go. The King return'd an answr. which came out the 6°. as follows. Since he is privy to my Nakedness, and perfectly understands his business, I would very fain have kept him, and Giv'n him whatsoever he should have ask'd but seeing he can't be brought on any terms to be Content I agreed to it; and on Condition that after he has Gone to Europe procur'd such medicines as are not to be Got here, & seen his wife and Children he return to Visit the Court once more let him Go. We hope in God, the Troublesome business is now blown over.

The Phirmaund for the Hon. Rob. Hedges Esq. is wrote fair and gone to the Sudder Suddool for the broad seal, it is open & will have the Vizier's seal on it, and is more like a Gen. Phirmaund than an answ. to a Letter, so without Doubt will be of Great service.

The Present order'd for the Hon. Robt. Hedges Esq. the Consomme has Giv'n his Dustuck's for the Delivery of the Goods on y. severall Offices. We are getting them in as soon as possible.

The Rains are setting in here, but however we intend to leave this place with all the Expedition we can preparing carriage & taking in several's, although it may be impossible to march when the waters are up, but it is absolutely necessary to leave the place the our Journey may be stop'd at Agra.

The King notwithstanding His many Oaths made to the Contrary has lately Impos'd the Gieja or Polltax, we have had some apprehension they were going to rip up old stories but as yet it has extended no farther than a surmise We have Esteem'd it for our Hon. Master's Interest not to make any addresses to the King for fear of bringing our late Grants in Question. The only place where the Tax was paid by the

English was Surat, and there in lieu of it was an additional Custom, which being entirely taken away and a piscash plac'd in it's stead, we hope the Phirmaund now obtain'd will be Esteem'd sufficient to fend off the Imposition, altho it is not improbable there may be Some Trouble about it, should it be laid on other European Nations. We design to write Your Hon. &ct. again as soon as we shall leave this City in the Int'rim we remain.

First, That Diaram has no pretence to make any demands on us on account of the said Town's, that we are not Directed by the Phirmaund or Husbulhookum to demand possession of them from him, but from the Nabob, his business being only to Collect the Rent's for Sied Hussenally Cawn, and that to Give him mony upon this Occasion would be a Precedent for him to make Demands on any other, or perhaps without any pretence whenever he should think Fitt.

Roach that he had enter'd the Town exactly at the time appointed, and found the enemy in possession, but that after about an hours Dispute he had oblig'd them to Quit the Town, and take to the Plains, that after this they made some attacks, but were constantly drove back, & Lieutenant Roach pursuing some of them to the Plain saw a fresh Body of horse coming from the Northward, which he then guess'd by view to be about five hundred in number. On these advices the President order'd Lieutent. Fullerton to draw out one hundred men more of the Garrison, and with a sufficient Quantity of Provisions and Ammunition & two field pieces to march immediately in order to Join Lieu*. Roach; By twelve a Clock at noon all things were in a readyness & Lieutent. Fullerton began his march; in the meantime the President order'd the Militia of the Town to be rais'd who took Possession of the white Town, while the Outguards were Strengthen'd by the Remainder of the Garrison and Gunner Hugonin with the Govern's. horse Guard's (being six in y. whole) were order'd to Patroll about y. washer Town and Tondore to Prevent the enemy from burning or Plundering on that At three of the Clock in yo. afternoon the President recd. farther advices from Lieutenant Roach dated half an hour after twelve advising that the enemy had kept skirmishing with them till near that time, but then were all Drawn off, and march'd towards Satan Go[du] after he had recover'd the Flag Staff and Flag which he again hoisted in the middle of the Town. Soon after arriv'd farther advices that Lieutent. Fullerton had Join'd Lieutenant Roach with his Body, and that the Enemy were march'd off to some miles Distance, on which the President sent orders to Lieut's. Roach & Fullerton to march back in ye. evening or early the next morning, it being Difficult to Supply them with necessary's at that Distance they return'd the same Evening, and arriv'd at Fort St. George about 8 of the Clock.

It appear'd that on Lieutenant Roache's entring the Town the Moor's were not prepar'd to receive him, presuming we Durst not march out of the Reach of our own Caunon. As soon as he Gain'd the middle of the Town he saluted them with three Vollies, which did some Execution; As fast as they Got into order they Possess'd themselves of the Avenues which are Numerous, and endeavour'd to regain the middle of ye. Town, it being a very large square containing a Tank and a Pagoda, but in

about an hours time were oblig'd to Quit the Town, and take to the Plains, though they afterwards made severall attempts to Reenter yo. Town, but were oblig'd to retire about noon.

In the whole action which lasted about Six hour's, there was not one man of our Garrison kill'd or wounded by ye. Enemy, one only of our Europeans, was shott in ye. arm by his Comrades error in Firing; three of our Peons were slightly wounded but none kill'd. The Enemy left in the place one Camel & six horses kill'd, six horses were taken alive by our men; Five men only of the slain were left, the rest being carried away, so that we do not know the certain Number, but Suppose there might be about ten or twelve kill'd in ye. action.

The President adds that he rec^d. advices Yesterday from Pullamully that when the enemy had march'd about three miles from Trivadore towards Pullamully, they encamp'd and Continued there till nine of the Clock at night, and then march'd one hour (contrary to their Custom) without lights, fearing as it appear'd to be attack'd in ye. night, for when they thought themselves out of reach of Pursuit, they light their Dutys and proceeded on their march towards Pullamully. Advices from thence further add that Diaram's Son who commanded the Party [one line lost] That the Commander next to him had severall Ball's in his Thigh that thirteen more of their men were wounded and eleven horses, besides one Camel & two horses which dropp'd on the Road.

The President Concluded that this Great Success without any Loss must next to The Presidt. the Blessing of God on the Justice of our Cause, be ascrib'd to the good Conduct of that some Lieutenant Roach, who had posted his men in such a manner that the enemy was not honorary able to make any attack without certain loss to themselves, as at the same time they were unable to do us the least Injury. He therefore proposes to the Board to consider of some honorary Reward to be Given Lieutent. Roach who to his former merit at Fort St. David has added this new and eminent service.

AGREED that in consideration of Lieut. John Roaches former services at Fort Agreed that St. David, for which the Hono. Company have in their Letters order'd him a Gratuity which has never yet been Giv'n, and also in Consideration of his eminent services at Trivadore on the 19° instant, in defeating the enemy with so much loss on their side, and without the loss of one man on ours, That the President by this Commission constitute Lieutenant John Roach Major of all the Hon. Comps. Forces on the Coast of Choromandell & Island of Sumatra, and that a Gold medall with the Hon. Companys arms set round with Diamond sparks, with an Inscription on the Reverse suitable to the occasion (the value about three hundred Pagodas) be Given him.

AGREED that his pay as Major be twenty pag. P mensem.

M^r. William Jennings petition of appeal from the Mayors Court on a judgment given there in a case depending between M^r. Jennings as Attorney for M^r. John Afflack in England and M^r. FIRST that M^r. Afflack when he went for England left M^r. Addison his Attorney here, and either left with him or sent to him particular orders to demand Commission on that part of Consul[1] Pitts estate, which had gone through his hands.

SECONDLY that the Trustees of Mr. Addison had in pursuance of that order made a demand on Consull Pitts estate of that Commission amounting to Seven hundred forty two pagodas fourteen fanams and five great cash.

Thirdly that some differences arising between Mr. Addisons Trustees and Mr. George Morton Pitt in closing the Account [of] Consull Pitts estate they were referr'd by bonds of Arbitration to Messr. ffrederick, Curgenven, Legg, & Theobalds who jointly sign'd an award for the determination of all differences between the said

partys in which award the said Commission of Seven hundred fourty two pagodas, fourteen fanams and five great cash demanded on the behalf of John Afflack by the Trustees of Mr. Addison is fully accounted for and discharg'd.

From the foregoing reasons it is the Judgment & determination of this Board that the Judgment in the Mayors Court be confirm'd and the appeal dismiss'd.

Brabourne and Addison which he ought not to have done it being expressly order'd in the Will of the deceased John Pitt to collect the estate in these parts and give a true account of the same to the Executors in England that by his paying the mony to Sarah Pitt &ca. a considerable loss has accrewd to the estate by the mismanagement in Trade of those with whom he entrusted the said Monys, that in the year 1715 George Morton Pitt demanded the estate of John Pitt deceasd and an inspection into the accounts of Gulston Addison deceased from his Attorneys who jointly with the consent of George Morton Pitt to avoid all litigious suits did agree each party to chuse Arbitrators to inspect and determine the controversie then in hand, who upon examining the accounts of the late Gulston Addison did find that he contrary to an order in Chancery, employ'd and traded with the said estate by which it suffer'd a loss of One thousand one hundred and forty five pagodas four fanams and one great Cash for which reparation was demanded by George Morton Pitt but in consideration of the Commission amounting to Seven hundred fourty two pagodas, fourteen fanams and five cash due to Gulston Addison from the estate of John Pitt deceas'd the same was relinquish'd by George Morton Pitt as may more plainly appear by the award of the Arbitrators.
