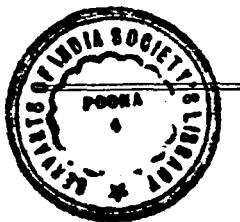

Diary and Consultation Book of Richard Bouchier Chief &c^a. Factors of the Hon^{ble} United East India [Companys] Affairs at Anjengo, Agreeble to the Establishment approved by the Hon^{ble} William Wake Esq^r. Pr[esident] and Governour of Bombay &c^a. Council.

The chief laid before the board the Chittys [Ola] of the 28 ult^o. which being taken into Consideration cometh [the] following resolutions.

ORDER'D Mr. Thomas Lane to gett himself rea[dy] to go to Cotata, and AGREED to send with him 5000 rupees and to give him Orders (if he finds the Hon^{ble} Company's Investment in that forwardness the Chitty represents) then to advance him accordingly hoping he will be able to gett 6½ fan^a. at least for the rupees for what he delivers the Chitty, & that he Exchange the rest of the rupees in fanams to be remitted here, And that he advises us as soon as he is well inform'd, what forwardness the Investment is in.

THO^S. PATTLE

RECED an Ola from Cumerasaumma Chitty, advising that he has now gott in [FRIDAY] four hundred pieces of the Hon^{ble} Company's Cloth, but that he shall have a thousand pieces before the Expiration of this month, that he is in great want of a further Supply of Money and that it is needless to Send Mr. Lane down yett. His objecting against Mr. Lanes coming makes us apprehensive that the Investment is not in the forwardness he represents for which reason, think it proper to hasten Mr. Lanes departure. 3^D.

[MON]DAY 6 THIS Morning Mr. Lane sett out for Cotata with five thous^d. Rupees as ᳚ order of Consultation of the 1st. Inst^t. & Orders are Accordingly [given].

VELTU coche Candy requesting to be advanced some money for pepper, and it appearing that he has brought in much more than he Contracted for, AGREED to Advance him three thousand Fanams.

[TUES]DAY 7 THIS Morning the Chief went to Eddova to try if he can gett the true reason from the Paru Merchants, why the Chattanore Pepper is detained, after the Kings so often repeated orders for it's being diliver'd. On discoursing with them they declared that they dare not tell why they cou'd not gett the Pepper from thence, but of their own Accord, desired that I wou'd complain of them to the King for not dilivering in their ballances. The True reason I find is that the King wants them to diliver him a large quantity at the same time they diliver the Honble Companys, by which they must be such Considerable Sufferers that the gain on what they gett to the Company will not be equivalent to the loss on what the King wants them to diliver him.

THURSDAY 9 RECED an Ola from the King with an Order to Ramana Annavy Paru, to lett our Merchants, have the Chattanore Pepper, forwarded the said order to Ramana Annavy desiring he will see it put immediately in Execution.

FRIDAY 10 RECED an answer from Ramana Annavy Acknowledging the recets of mine of yesterdays with the Kings orders, which he will comply with, when the Holydays are over.

TUESDAY 14 RECED a Lre from Mr. Lane at Cotata, advising that a Number of Northern Merchants were Arrived there before him, who h[ave] rais'd the price of Cloth, & lower'd the Exchange of rupees [...] Cumer Saumma Chitty had gott about Six hundred pieces [of the] Honble Companys Cloth in the House & wou'd have near [...] end of the month. That he is in want of Money to carry on [the investment] but will not take the rupees at $6\frac{7}{16}$ for which reason he thi[nks it] adviseable to send him some Fanams.

[DI]TTO DIE RECED an Ola from Cumer Saumma Chitty advising [that] the Honble Companys Investment is in great forwardness [and that] he is in great want of money to carry it on.

The Chief laid before the board Mr. Lane's [Lre] and the Chittys Ola reced last Night, By the former it app[ears] the exchange was fallen to $6\frac{6}{16}$ ᳚ Rupee before his Arrival [and] that the Chitty, wou'd not recieve the rupees at $6\frac{7}{16}$.

As the Honble Companys Cloth Investment [is of] a forwardness, & the Chitty being in want of money to carry it thought it most for our Honble Masters Interest to advance him the amount of another thousand pieces of Cloth in fan^s.

AGREED AND ORDER'D that the Sum of twenty thousand fanams be advanced the Chittys Servant taking his recet for the Same in his Masters Name which was accordingly done.

— AUGUST 1744 —

ORDER'D a Letter to be wrote to Mr. Thomas Lane advising, that we hope he will be able to gett $6\frac{7}{16}$ fanams [...] for the rupees, but shou'd the exchange continue under that rate, to advise before he parts with the rupees.

COSSIDS returned from Madrass which brings advice of the arrival there of our Hoñble Masters Ship Beaufort from the Maderas on the 9th. ult^o. and that the Winchester sailed for Bengall the 27th. of June, as did the Montagu the 30th. and the Durrington the 9th. ult^o. We likewise have an Account of the Nabob of Bengall (Alliverdy Chauns) having treacherously murder'd Bascall Pundit (the Maratta General) with twenty one Officers & two hundred & fifty Horse which attended him (under the Nabobs Oath for their safety) to treat about their settling of Affairs, and afterwards falling on the Morattas Army & distroying them, who had no Officers.

CRISNA Annavy Arrived. The Chief had a long Conference with him the Purport as follows, being ask'd if the King had fully empower'd him to settle the Hoñble Companys affairs, and how long he woud tarry in these parts. He reply'd that he was fully empower'd to settle the Hoñble Companys affairs, and that he wou'd not quit these parts till everything was settled to my satisfaction, It being demanded in what manner we were to Carry on the Honble Comp^{as}. trade in future, for by the Kings taking the Pepper into his own hands last year under pretence of knowing what quantity his Kingdom Produced, The Hoñble Companys trade was absolutely ruin'd. To which he desired to know in how I proposed the carrying on the Hoñble Companys trade in future. I desired that we might be permitted to carry it on as had been Customary time out of mind That we might Contract with whom we pleased, & that the Governm^t. do protect, and assist our Merchants in getting in the Pepper. He replied, that the Government were very ready to come into this on Certain Conditions, I then told him that the last years Contract was

of his own Making, & that the King was Security for the performance of it, That he forced Vena Chitty & Company on Mr. Whitehill as Merchants (tho he Vena Chitty then ow'd the Honble Company a Ballance) absolutely against Mr. Whitehills Inclination. If this Contract was not complied with, what hopes can we have of any future Contract being fulfill'd and all those Merchants have now ballances out standing. He acknowledg'd that he and the rest of the Government were greatly deceived in Peria Chitty, and that he wou'd not have him entrusted in future, but that he woud use his best Endeavours to recover the Honble Company's Money, And that the Crop of Pepper was less last Year then usual. He was lett known that recovering the Honble Companys Money was but a very poor satisfaction, after they had been out of it so many months, that it was Pepper the Honble Company wanted, and without they cou'd not maintain the Expense of this Factory. He replied that if Pepper was to be gott in the Country the Merchants should bring in their ballances in Pepper Then he made the following Proposals.

That the Honble Company shoud have all the Pepper that the Country Produced, & No body else shou'd be Permitted to purchase any, except the 500 telong $\frac{1}{2}$ Month for the Tocala, which the King was under Contract for, which all will Amount to about 170 Candys $\frac{1}{2}$ Annum on Condition the Honble Company woud Supply the King with one Musquet for every Candy of Pepper they bought, he paying for the Said Arms, and likewise to Supply him with Such Warlike Stores & Ammunition as he shall want on reasonable terms. He was informd, that he cou'd not have a Possitive Answer to this untill we had Orders from our Superiors at Bombay, but that we woud write to know their Pleasure and Make no doubt of their sending a supply of small Arms &c^a. Stores, but we must have his Majesty Obligation, that he wou'd take such stores when they Arrived as he indent-ed for, the Honble Company being Considerable Sufferers by the Gunpowder, which was brought here on his Acco^t. a great part of which was spoil'd in our Magazine, his Majesty not taking it. He than promised to give the Kings Obligation to take [such] Stores, when they Arrived which he intended for. I then Objected to the renters of the Tocala purchasing Pepper, under which pretence they might purchase & carry off what quantity of Pepper they pleased. To which he proposed that the Honble Comp^{as}. Merchants shoud Supply the Tocala with the 500 telong Monthly which I readily agreed to, but not to comence, till Jañry after the new Crop was gatherd, he then took his leave desiring we woud Consider of the Kings Proposals, and that he wou'd return on the 25th. Instant.

RECEED a Letter this Evening from Mr. Lane advising that the Price of Rupees at Cotata is now no more then $6\frac{5}{16}$ & that he saw no likelihood of their rising, And that the Cloth already gott in is in his Opinion as good as last years. THURSDAY

The Chief represented to the board the Conference he had with Crisna Annavy, and his Proposals, which is very satisfactory, if the Government Comply with their Part in letting the Honble Company have the whole Produce of the Country excepting the 170 Candy for the Tocala, & we do not apprehend any great danger from the supplying him with small Arms.

Mr. Thomas Lanes Letter being taken into Consideration it was thought highly Necessary to Exchange the rupees for what they will fetch, As we shall soon be obligd to pay the Chitty 29000 Fan^s. more on Acco^t. of the Cloth Contract And we know not how soon we may be in want of fanams to advance for Pepper, shou'd we be able to bring the Merchants to a Contract.

CRISNA Annavy return'd Agreeable to his Promise & had another very long Conference with the Chief, in which he pressed very much for an immediate supply of Small Arms And the Chief insisted as strenuously on his doing the Honble Company Justice in Obliging the last years merchants to diliver in their Ballances in Pepper which he promis'd to do. He and the Kings Carriacar (who came along with him) sign'd an Ola and gave it me, Ordering all the March, to bring in their Ballances in Pepper, & promised to Assist them in Collecting of it, on which we agreed to lett the King have 100 small arms Which is all we Conveniently can Spare. He then requested that the King might be supplied, with great Gunns, Mortars, Bomb-shells, & Cannon Shott, Engineers &c^a. & that the Honble Company wou'd permitt him to lade a hundred Can of Pepper Annually on some of their Ships to be sold for the Kings Account, & to be Accountable to him for the produce I lett him know that I was not qualified to give him any Answer fo[r] their proposals As for Small Arms and Amunition I made no doubt, that my Superiors at Bombay woud supply him, & that I woud use my Endeavours to gett them [back] as for Cannon, Mortars &c^a. they cou'd not well spare them, being in a Constant state of Warr at Bombay And as to the Granting him the liberty of lading Pepper on the Honble Companys Ship. I did not concieve that any Man in India cou'd make such an Agreement. On which he requested we wou'd represent this affair to Bbay and diliver'd me the King Proposals in Writting as follows.

Copy of Proposals sent by the King of Travencore reced the 25th. July.

I, Batta Matanda Vorma King of Travencore, write to you Richard Bouchier Esq^r. Chief at Anjengo, & send Crisna Annavy to make a new Contract of Pepper.

All the Produce of Pepper in the Kingdom of Travencore I grant to the Honble Company within the Limits of Niattingm to the Southward, to the Northward from the barr of Paru & from the Eastward, to the River Vellinelleur, & from the Hill to the Sea shore, thro' my Whole Dominions. The H^c. Company may Contract with what Merchants they Please and advance their Money, and buy all the Pepper, which must be weighd in the Banksalls of Brinjohn, Anjengo & Eddova, & that no one besides may buy Pepper & Carry it to the Southward. The Honble Companys Merchants shall be oblig'd monthly to diliver 500 telong of Pepper for the Expense of the Toccala at the Country Price, and all the Pepper shall be weigh'd in the presence of the Kings Officers, shou'd there happen any Obstructions in the Country, the Government Oblige themselves to see them cleard, For all the Pepper that's weighd at the three above mention Places, the Honble Company are Oblig'd not only to pay the Duty of four Rajahs Candy as usual paid by the Company but they shall also pay the Merchants in land Dutys at 36 new fanams Candy & be Accountable for both to the King.

As my Country is molested by Enemies both from the Northw^d. and Southward, I desire the Company, for every Candy of Pepper they purchase, will diliver a good Musquet at a reasonable Price. And that every year they diliver me 15000 flints, thirty Candy of Lead 50 can of Saltpetre, 15 Candy of Brimstone, 200 shells

for Mortars of Sundry siezes [sic] 200 Hand Granadoes, 500 Cannon Balls, these they are to supply me with Annually. This Year I desire they will supply me with small Arms 2000, And all these things which I request, I expect they lett me have them at the prime cost in Europe, and what may be due to the Hoñble Company after the Customs are ded^{td}. I promise to pay ready money.

For the Use of the Forts Cocolone & Pulliecurrichy, I want four Guns of the largest Size & desire they will send me these four Gunns, and also tenn Mortars.

I desire they will send on the Hoñble Companys Ships 100 Ca of Pepper on my Account, and be Accountable to me for the Principal & the Proffits on the Sale. That they shall send for some Iron, and Steel on my Acco^t. And Provide me with Six Gunners to serve me when I have Occasion for them. As the Dutch Company allow Passports to Several Princes for four hundred to five hundred Candys of Pepper, for this reason, I desire one hundred Candy of Pepper.

I desire this may be sent to Bombay for Confirmation by your Superiors.

Copy of an Ola reced the 27th. Inst^h. from the King of Travencore.

To preserve the Commerce between me, and the Hoñble Company, beyond the Antient Limits, I have now Proposed large Limits for you to Collect Pepper in.

Those Proposals I sent you shall be Letters Patent to you the Commodore of Anjengo, and all that I have inserted in those Proposals do you transmit to Bombay, likewise the Gunn Arms, and everything else that they may be here by the end of October next.

As my Enemys persecute me both from the Northw^d. & Southward, without Arms I cannot defend myself. As this shall be a Patent to you, I desire that you write to Tellicherry and Madrass for 2000 Arms, to be here before you can have an Answer from Bombay, I desire your Answer to all the above p^{ar}ticulars.

AN Answer to the above Proposals sent by the King of Travencore.

TUESDAY
28.

I reced your Ola with the Proposals your Majesty makes, And in regard to the Pepper Trade your Majestys Ancestors & the Honble Company have by consent of both Partys settled and Establish'd.

But of a New your Majesty desires for every Candy of Pepper a Musquet, As also to be provided with Saltpetre & Brimstone and when the latter are not to be gott, with Gunpowder. In this Case I shall use my Entercessions [sic] with my Superiors as also for some Gun flints, but as for the great Gunns & Mortars I apprehend your Majesty will not be supplied with, As Bbay has no more than what are immediately requisite for its Defence.

This Year your Majesty has taken upon yourself the Direction of the Pepper trade, whereby the Hoñble Company expected to have purchased double the quantity, but they have not had half what was usual, and very unjustly by the Hoñble Company has your Majesty order'd some Pepper repositied at Attinga, Beture & Chattanore to be Carried to the Northward though the said Pepper belongd to those Merchants who had Contracted with the Hoñble Company reced their Money, and for the performance of which your Majesty was engaged for, This I wrote to Crisna Annavy who deny'd it, though it is very apparent to every one, and I now desire your Majesty will be pleased to order the said Pepper to be diliver'd in on Acco^t. of the said Merchants that their Acco^{ts}. may be adjusted.

By the Proposals your Majesty makes now exclusive of the 500 telong monthly to be diliver'd to the Toccala; if there be a total prevention to all other way of Conveying Pepper into Pody, a large quantity may be Collected for the Hoñble Company, which when they find, they will assist your Majesty with small Arms &c^a. and this My Predecessors on like Occasions have not been wanting in.

I have informd Crisna Annavy that when we Contract with the Merchants for the new Crop they shall supply 500 telong Monthly for Toccala, and to Commence in Jañry next. When such measures are persued as evidently tend to the Interest of the Hoñble Company they will never fail of making a necessary, and Suitable return.

Crisna Annavy related to me that your Majesty was very much in want of Small Arms, I diliverd him 100 of what was actually for the use of this Garrison to be paid in Pepper, which Pepper we desire your Majesty will order to be diliver'd us.

I desire your Majesty will do the Hoñble Company the Justice to Oblige the Merchants to pay in their ballances in Pepper, when we may be able to engage in new Contract, your Majesty must send me an Ola therein Obliging to take immediately all such stores as Comes on your Acco^t. and pay for them.

In respet to the hundred Candy of Pepper which your Majesty writes on, we will represent to Bombay, but be assured that those Gentlemen cannot Acquiesce, that this, or any other Goods be put on board the Companys Shìps or others without immediate liberty from them in England.

SEPTEMBER 1744.
SUNDAY
2.

RECEED an Ola from the King of Travencore dated 1st. Instant.

Your Ola of the 28 of August I reced, and Observe therein that a Copy of the Proposals sent with Crisna Annavy for the Uniting both our Interest in one are remitted to Bbãý also that you Confirm the said Proposals by Consenting to every Article, and Expect that I shoud also, & when this be the Case the Interest of my Government will be greatly Augmented. On my part you may be assured nothing shall be wanting and that nothing may be remiss on the part of the Hoñble Company lett them be preserved in writing, and put in Execution the Particulars of these Proposals.

I have order'd Crisna Annavy to Oblige the Merchants to pay their ballance remaining in their hands on last Years Contract. I have Communicated to Crisna Annavy all that you write me, when he returns Your way, he will adjust every thing you desire, my affairs will require him to stay about ten days at Cotarracarra, than he will come to you.

The Arms Powder, and Saltpetre as soon as Landed send me advice immediately I will take charge of them. In relation to all other affairs as soon as Crisna Annavy Arrives, you will endeavour to prosecute the business intended by the Proposals made to you. The Merchants Acco^{ts}. either in Pepper, or Money shall be Settled without fail.

The Chief laid an Ola before the board which he reced Yesterday from the King of Travancore as ^{is} translate in the Diary, by which it plainly appears to us that the King has not the least regard to what he either says or Writes, for on

reading the Chiefs Ola to the King of the 28 Ult^o. it is apparent that he only promises to use his Endeavours to gett the Small Arms, Saltpetre and Brimstone (or in default in the two last Articles to Supply him with Gunpowder). But that it is his Opinion that he can't be Supplied with great Gunns, Mortars &c^a. the Government of Bombay being in a Constant state of Warr, & must have Occasion for all such Stores themselves, And as to the Loading of Pepper on any of the Hoñble Companys Ships he gives it as his Opinion, that it is not in the power of their Servants to make any such agreement without orders from Europe.

On taking this affair into Consideration came to the following resolutions. To Write to Madrass to desire that they will supply us with five or six hundred Arms, & to write to Tellicherry to desire they will supply us with what small Arms they can Spare. To Send Copys to Bombay of the preceding Olas and Proposals, requesting such directions as they shall think proper on this Occasion, referring the whole to their superior Judgment, advising that we have Wrote to Madrass and Tellicherry for some small Arms, and requesting that they will likewise send us, what they shall think proper, As we do not apprehend any Danger from supplying him with small Arms only which shou'd we not do, we apprehend, he wou'd not lett us have any Pepper at all, and we have resolved to use our best endeavours to purchase all the Pepper we can.



- [MONDAY 3^{d.}] WROTE an Ola to the King in Answer to his of the 1^{st.} Inst^{t.} advising his Majesty that there must be some mistakes by the Ola receiv'd from him last night, for that I had never given my Consent to or Confirm'd his Majestys Proposals any further than promising to use my endeavours to procure him some small Arms, and to send his proposals to Bombay, as I had before promised Crisna Annavy, and that it was always my opinion, that he cou'd not be supplied with Artillery, nor could the H^{o.} Companys Servants Consent to the loading of pepper or any other goods on the H^{o.} Companys Ships.
- TUESDAY 4. A Dutch Ship call'd the Knappenhaft from Amsterdam bound for Ceylone passed the Road, commanded by Capt^{n.} Hermanus Skerttie, He Sent advice that he sail'd from the Downs 27^{th.} Jañry, at which time England had no Warr with France.
- DISPATCH'D Cossids with the Bbay Packett to Madrass.
- WEDNESDAY 5. ANCHOR'D in the road a French Ship call'd St. Pierre mond De Bart from Mozembeque, and the Islands bound for Pondichy. being in great want of Provisions, spared them, 15 bags rice. They give an Acco^{t.} of a French Ship call'd the Jupiter being lost at Mozembeque with 700 Coffreys on board most of her People being Drowned.
- DITTO DIE. RECED an Ola from the King of Travencore acknowledging the recet of Mine of the 3^{d.} Inst^{t.}, advising that he had sent Copy of all the Olas to Crisna Annavy (who wou'd be here in a few days and order'd him to settle everything, having left this affair intir[ely] to him.
- WEDNESDAY 12. ANCHOR'D in the road a French Ship call'd the Cossimbuza from Moco, last from Surat bound for Bengall Mons^{r.} Heter [...] Commander being late in the Season and fearing a long Passage, requested tenn bags of rice which we spared them.
- THURSDAY 13. CRISNA Annavy came to the Fort, and being Ask'd he declared that the Chief did not Consent to the Kings Proposals but had only promised to remit them to Bombay. The Chief insisted on lowering the exorbitant inland duty on Pepper, which formerly used to be no more than four fan^{s.} ☞ Ca & is now raised to thirty six As all impositions they laid on Pepper was so much money immediately out of the Hoffble Companys [Pocket] He promised to represent this affair to the King, but gave little hopes of having this Evil redress'd. The Chief again insisted on not having

any Merchants imposed on us the Gover[nour] (the Annavy having recommended & strenuously a Chitty a Creature of his) And that our Merchants shou'd not be Obliged to supply the Tocala with Pepper till the New Crop came in, in [Jañy] both which he Consented to, and said that he only recommended that Chitty fellow as one whom he knew to be very Capable of Serving the Company.

WROTE to Crisna Annavy desiring that he woud send to Ittee Cherria Paru Merchants to come here & Contract for the new Pepper (for with his particular orders I well know they dare not Come) and to Oblige our last years Merchants to pay their ballances. FRIDAY
14.

RECD an Answer from Crisna Annavy to mine of the 14th. advising that Ittee Cherria, Ittee Naina, Ittee Thome & Jacko cou'd not Contract with us, as they were engag'd in the Dutch Contract and still had some of the Dutch Ballances in their hands but that I might send any of our Merchants there to buy or Contract for Pepper, and that he was using his endeavours, to recover the Merchants ballances, the Pepper deliver'd at Attinga and Eddova being on that Acco^t. TUESDAY
18.

WROTE Crisna Annavy another Ola requesting that in case Ittee Cherria, Ittee Naina & C^a. can't be permitted to Contract with us that he will allow Cunja Andy and Corada or some other of the Chattanore Merchants to Come and Contract with us agreable to his own & the King Proposals, it being very inconveni[ent] for our Merchants who reside at the Sea, to be Constantly going to Chattanore, to purchase small quantitys of Pepper, and in case he will not permitt the Chattanore Men to come to us. I shall conclude that the including Chattanore in our Pepper Limits, was done with an Intention to Amuse only, & what he never intended to perform. WEDNES-

SAW a Ship in the offing standing to the Southward, but she not Shortening sail, our boat cou'd not Speak with her.

SENT Domingo Rodriguez (the Linguester) to Eddova to enquire amongst the Paru and Chattanore Merchants if any Pepper is to be pick'd up, and to try if he can bring down any of the Chattanore Merchants to Contract for the new Crop.

FRIDAY
28. RECED the remainder of the Pepper from Eddova being Candys 8. 17. 21^{lbs}.

SATURDAY
29. RECED an Ola from Crisna Annavy desiring that I woud permitt the Currency in Anjengo of the New Budgerooks, which they had order'd to be Coind at Cer- ringa.

ANSWER'D his Ola that this was an innovation that could not be admitted, having Pice & Budgerooks of the Hoñble Companys Coin'd at Bombay, sufficient for the Currency here, should we admit this Innovation, it wou'd prove the Certain Ruin of most of our Poor Inhabitants, it being the Constant practice of the Government to cry them down soon after they have issued a large quantity.

SUNDAY
30. RECED a Letter from Domingo Rodriguez advising that there is some of the last years Crop of Pepper still in the Country about Paru, but that the Proprietors are afraid to bring it in, and desires I wou'd write Crisna Annavy for an Ola to Convince the Merchants that they have free liberty to bring in their Pepper.

WROTE to Crisna Annavy for such an Ola, and Sent the Kings ola to Domingo Rodriguez, to show the Merchants that we have an Ample power from his Majesty for purchasing what Pepper we can gett.

1. CRISNA Annavy being on his way to the Northward passed Attinga in the Night, and this Morning sent a Verbal message, that he was a going in haste to settle some disturbances to the Northward, and that he wou'd give orders that all Merchants shou'd have free liberty to bring in their Pepper.

2. RECED a Letter from Domingo Rodriguez, advising that one of the Merchants had promised to bring in tenn Candys of Pepper and desired that I woud send him 300 rupees which was accordingly do[ne.]

Ult^o. advising of the safe Arrival of our Hoñble Masters Ship King William directly from Great Brittain, with a Declaration of Warr against France. That she bro^t. the Maloncholly Acco^t. of the loss of the Ships Nottingham, & Grantham in the Chan[nel] & the Nottinghams Cargo being saved, Ship Northampton was taken up to bring it out, That the Fort St^t. George had mett with [severe tempests] which had detained her to refitt but [...] he left England with the first Convoy. The Wager having also met with an Accident was repair'd and wou'd be ready to Sail with the other two. Reced copys of the 2, 6, 8, 9, 15, 27, 28, 29, 45, 48, 54, 61 & 87 paragraphs of the Hoñble the Court of Directors General Ire by said Ship, with List of the Cloth Investment for this Factory, Reced a Letter from the Gentlemen of Tellicherry, with Six Chests small Arms Amounting to as ¹³ Accompanying Invoice Rupees 1215-2-30, which we had requested for the King of Travencore.

WEDNES-
DAY 3

ARRIV'D a Pattamar from Madrass, with advice of the Arrival of the Swift Snow at that Port from great Brittain the 5th. Ult^o. which brought the Declaration of Warr with France.

RECE'D a Letter from Domingo Rodriguez at Eddova acknowledging the recet of the 300 ruppes sent Yesterday and requesting, that he may have a supply of fanams also, as he expects more Pepper to Come in, sent him four thousand fan^s. to carry on the business.

THURS-
DAY 4

RECE'D a Letter from Domingo Rodriguez Acknowledging the recet of the 4000 fan^s. sent Yesterday, As yett no Pepper is Come Occasion'd as he beleives by the Chattanore Merchants not being return'd from Cotarracarra, that Ramana Annavy being returnd to Paru, he will write him, requesting he will use his Interest with the Merchants to bring their Pepper.

FRIDAY 5

WROTE to Crisna Annavy, that his two last Olas differ so much that I can't tell what to make of them, He has promis'd often that he woud send the Chattanore & Paru Merchants to make the Pepper Contract, by none appearing I am apprehensive that they will delay so long that they will make the same excuse as last year for non performance Viz^t. that the Contract was made too late to be Complied with, I now Insisted that he send a General Licence to all the Merchants in the Kingdom to come and Contract, That he had promised that he wou'd bring Peria Chitty to settle his Acco^{ts}. but as he passed without stoping I Insisted on his sending him to settle Acco^{ts}. and pay his ballance. That notwithstanding his agreement with us that we shou'd stop the Kings inland Dutys on the Pepper, the Merchants will not beleive it, as he had not advis'd them of it requested that he will send me an Ola to Convince them of this agreement. That his advices are so farr true that our Superiors are justly disgusted at the Small quantity of Pepper procured at this Settlement, as it will not support the Expence of it, That I have wrote as favourably to them of the Scituation of our affairs, as the Nature of the case wou'd bare but he can't Expect they will be satisfied, with bare words, so Hope he will Exert himself, that such a quantity of Pepper may be procured this Year, as will give satisfaction, that agreable to my promise I have applied to all quarters, for small Arms for his Majestys use & I expect the Government, will not be wanting on their part, that we may have the Pepper as they promis'd, That as yett I had no Answer about the lowering the inland Duty on the Pepper, tho' he had promis'd to gett it Effected.

SATURDAY
6

WROTE Domingo Rodriguez to know if any orders was yett come from Crisna Annavy to the Merchants to bring in the remains of last years Pepper, or for them to come & make the new Contract, and what Answer he had reced from Ramana Annavy, and empower'd him to promise him a small present if he wou'd enfluence [*sic*] the Merchants to bring in any quantity of Pepper, knowing how great difficiency there is of the last years Contract.

DOMINGO Rodriguez advises that some Pepper, was come into the Banksall at Eddova, & that more was Expected that he had weighd 2½ Candy, and shou'd weigh the rest today he desired Boats might be sent for it, and that he might be permitted to return having business at Anjengo, That Crisna Annavy had not sent any Orders to the Merchants as yett to bring in their Pepper, and that Ramana Annavy was gon[e] to the Northward, but had frieghten'd [*sic*] the Merchants before his departure, by threatening them for not bringing in the Pepper to him before, when he wanted it for the King.

SENT Boats to bring away the Pepper from Eddova.

MONDAY 8

DOMINGO Rodriguez advises that he had gott a little more Pepper, which he desires a Boat may be sent for it & that he may have permission to leave what ruppes and fanams he has, in the Sergaents Hands, in case any more Pepper shoud Come in after his return.

— OCTOBER 1744 —

SENT a Boat to Eddova for the Pepper, and ordered Domingo Rodriguez to diliver what mony he has left to Sergaent David Blackburn, Order'd David Blackburn to receive the rupees and fan^s. from the Linguester, & to pay for any Pepper That was brought, as he had done, deducting the Kings Customs. The Boats return'd with five Candy of Pepper from Eddova.

RECED an Ola from Crisna Annavy in Answer to mine of the 5 Inst^t. He says that when he was with the King it was one of the great feasts, & that he could not then talk of any business, & since that time he [*sic*] been greatly embarrass'd with the troubles to the Northw^d. but that every particular which he had promised shoud be Complied with. That he had now sent me an Order to all the Merchants, w^{ch}. they woud obey on my sending it to them. That he had order'd Nelly Narra Chitty to provide the 500 telong of Pepper monthly for the Toccala, which he orderd to be publish'd that no body else might carry off the Pepper under that pretence, That he had lower'd the inland duty from Six to five rupees ₹ Ca. which we must stop out of the Merchants Acco^t. & be Accountable to the King for with the export Duty That he hoped we shou'd be able to procure the King 1000 Small Arms in November, and that nothing shou'd be wanting on the part of the Government as to Peria Chittys Acco^t. he woud take care to see it made good.

WEDNES-
DAY 10

SENT the Annavys Ola to all the Pepper Merchants & desired they woud come, & make the Contract, that they might not pretend (as last year) that the Contract was made so late that they could not comply with it.

THURS-
DAY 11

ANSWER'D the Kings Ola reced Yesterday Congratulating him on the Success of his Negotiations to the Southward, and hope I should have the Honour of seeing him in his way to the N^o.w^d. that we were in hourly Expectations of the Merchants Arrival to make the Contract & that his Majesty might send for the Arms whenever he pleased to have them Examined and Carried away on giving a receipt for them.

RECED Answers from the Paru Merchants that this being the time of their great feast, they could not come till it was over which will not hold for several Days.

TUESDAY
16

THE King of Travencore sent an Officer to receive the 150 Arms which were Accordingly diliver'd him, and took his recet for the sa[me.]

THE Honible Companys Smack being fitted, and the Weather being fine put her in the Water, that she may be ready for Service.

THE Prince & Crisna Annavy calld here in their way to Cotarracarra They say the Dutch are making great Warlike Preparations at Cochin & Quilone, and wanted much to know if they were intended against them which I cou'd not satisfie themm [*sic*], but told them, it was my Opinion that if they Molested the King of Teckengore that the Dutch woud assist them, they having great quantitys of Pepper, Timber and Plank, and many other advantages by their friendship to them They Complain'd much of the Dutch having broke three of the most Material Articles of the last Peace concluded with them which were Viz.

SUNDAY
28

1st. The Dutch were to assist the King of Travencore in driving the French out shoud they attempt to settle in his Country which they now declare they will not.

2nd. They were to put the King of Travencore in possession of a Fort in Changanaiik Country, which is his right, This they will not now do.

3rd. That they should pay the King of Travencore in small Arms and Gunpowder for 200 Candys Pepper Annually which they say their Superiors at Batavia will not Consent to.

N.B. A very little time before he made this Peace with the Dutch he had invited the French into his Country, in hopes of driving the Dutch Out. The Annavy Assured me that he had sent orders to the Northern Merchants to come, and make the Pepper Contract which they would do in a few day [sic] the Moors fasts & feasts being over. He likewise gave fresh Assurances, that he would see Peria Chitty ballance made good to the Honble Company.

At Day break three large Ships appear'd to the Southward a working to the Northward, which conjectured to be French, [which] they proved afterwards to be, Put the Garrison under Arms, [the] Platform to the Sea not being finished, made one of Timber and Plank for the present Occasion, sett a large Number of Bricklay[er] &c^a. to work to carry on the Breast work, gott down four nine poun[d]ers from the inland Bastians & mounted them on the Platform to the sea which Compleats a line of Eleven Gunns The Sea W[as] proving scant, the three French Ships were Oblig'd to Anchor at three in the afternoon, right abreast of the Fort, but out of Gun Shott, at 12 at Night they weigh'd with the land Wind and stood to the

Northward, and by day break were out of sight. On making these to be French Ships dispatch'd an advice Boat to Tellicherry with an Acco^t. of them, and a Pattamar to Coletche, directing Mr. May Sclater to order the Master of the Neptune Smack to keep well in with the Land, and to keep a good look out for fear of falling into the hands of the Enemy, and sent another Letter of the same purport to Brinjon to be sent off to the Smack when She appears off that Port.

AT Noon imported the Smack with 945 pieces of Sallampores N^o. 4 on Acco^t. of the Hon^{ble} Company with which we reced a Letter from Mr. Sclater, advising that he had sent all the Cloth that was ready at Coletche and that he woud proceed the next day to Cotata & Press the Chitty to forward the rest of the Investm^t. THURSDAY 8

THE Chattanooga, Paru & Cheringa Merchants having been here these three Days, the Chief had many Conferences with them about the Pepper Contract but coud not bring them to any favourable terms. The Chattanooga Merchants at first insisting on dilivering no more than 150 Ca, but then they wanted either to have the Eddova weight lowerd or the Price raised at two rupees i^o Candy, which cou'd not be agreed to, so, the Chattanooga men went home, Notwithstanding all the remonstrances that cou'd be made to them of their folly, for if they wou'd not Come to a reasonable agreement they wou'd force us to apply to the Government, who wou'd Oblige them to Contract, on worse terms than was now Offer'd them which was the same as last year and is no bad offer as there is a tolerable Crop of Pepper on the Vines. RECEIVED advice of a French Ships being at Ruttera and of her having gott wood and Water, & was attempting to gett the Merchants together to trade, Ruttera being in the Hoñble Companys Limits sent a Serjeant, Corporal and 10 private Men in a Munchua, and a Boat both well mann'd with orders to seize any French Man they shoud find in the Hoñble Companys Limits, & bring them to Anjengo.

WROTE an Ola to the King of Traveneore, advising him of this Infringement of the Hoñble Companys Priviledges, and that I take the Ship for a Seekee and only Makes a Pretence of trade to delay time, in hopes that some of our Ships may fall into his hands, for which reason I had sent a force to seize any of their Men, & hoped he wou'd punish his Officers for permitting them to Land.

WROTE a[n] Ola to Juan Francisco a Christian fellow at Ruttera who has supplied them with Wood and Water, to lett him know that we are inform'd of what he is about, and advis'd him to desist, and not to Molest our People in seizing the French Men, who may be ashore.

WROTE an Ola to Perumal Annavy advising him of these intruders, & desired, that he wou'd assist our People in seizing them.

DITTO
DIE

Sent away our Brinjohn cruizing boat, with a Letter to any English Commander to advise them of this Ship That they may be on their Guard, she having search'd our Boat and found her former Letter and afterwards Employ'd her to bring some wood on board, but the Boat no sooner to shore and Landed a Moor-man they had put on board him, to fetch the Wood, but they put off the Boat and Made the best of their way to Anjengo. They say that they did not see above a dozen Frenchmen on board and about Sixty Lascars, by which she must be a Country Ship endeavouring to Trade.

WEDNES-
DAY 13

OUR Detachment return'd the Arriat (or Chief) of Ruttera having threaten'd to raise the Country, and to distroy every Man of them, if they Offer'd to meddle with the French, who were gott into the Church, so for fear of being embroil'd with the Government, our Men return'd, The Ship having fired two Shott at the Munchua, The Ship weigh'd and Stood close in shore, & is still in sight of the Fort.

DISPATCH'D another Pattamar to Perumal Annavy, advising him of the ill Consequence, that may Arise from his Conniving at this breach of the Hoñble Companys Priviledges, for which I expect he will be Answerable.

DISPATCH'D an Express to the King informing him of what had pass'd at Ruttera desiring he will lett me know whether, these people are trading by his Majestys permission, Contrary to all the promises, and Engagements to our Hoñble Masters, and his own assurance to me, that he wou'd not lett the French Land in his Territory's Whereas now the French who are our declared Enemys are protected by his Majestys Officers against our just resentment, in open breach of all the Priviledges granted to the Hoñble Company both by his Majesty and his Predecessors.

THURSDAY
14

THIS afternoon the French Ship kept a good Offing, and passd to the Northward. I have advice that they only gott wood, Water & sold tenn bags of Sugar & one bale of Piece Goods.

RECEIVED an Ola from the King in answer to mine of the 12th. Inst^d. in which he says that he has not had any advice from his Officers of any French Ships being on the Coast but if there is he supposes they are come to Demand the Money he owes them for Gunpowder and arms, which Monsieur La Bourdanoy supplied them with.

The Chief represented to the board that he had reced an Ola from Nelliapa Chitty advising that he and his Partners, had Maturely Consider'd on the proposals made them by this board the 25th. Ult^o. but thread being so Extravagantly Dear they found it impossible to engage on any terms, but what he had before offer'd without being great sufferers, and at those prizes they wou'd not gain anything, but, if we approve of it they were willing to Contract now, in hopes of more advantageous Contracts hereafter when Cotton and thread might be more Reasonable.

Having taken these Proposals into Serious Consideration, We having already wrote to our Superiors on Bbã for their orders in relation to the Extraordinary price demanded for the Coarse Cloth, resolved to deferr engaging for any but the tenn Call cloth, at the usual price, AGREED to write to Nelliapa Chitty that he or one of his Partners come to make the Contract for that specie only at present.

China, but naving had a tedious passage and had been eight Days on the Coast, had
many People down with the Scurvey, and desired he might have refreshments sent
him, & a Boat to Land some of his Soldiers on Shore, which otherwise must Perish.
- SATURDAY 30** THIS Morning Early dispatch'd an Express Boat to Tellicherry to advise of
this Ships arrival on the Coast, as it is impossible a Ship in such a condition can
proceed to Bombay and arrive in time to be dispatchd for China.
- SUNDAY 31** IN the Night Ship Northampton anchor'd short of the Road, & in the Morning
Landed two of the Hoñble Companys Soldiers very ill of the Scurvey, and in the
Evening said Ship sail'd having gott a Long Boat of Water, and what refreshment
cou'd be gott in so short a time.
- APRIL, MONDAY 1** RECED an Ola from Crisna Annavy in answer to Several has been sent him
(Complaining) of the Neglect or Connivance of the Government in letting the
Pepper be carried off to Pondy and of the Injustice in Suffering the Dollava to
hinder our Merch^{ts}. Purchasing Pepper at Vellinelleur Fair, For all which he makes
plausible Excuses, and pretends the Governments great Attachm^t. to the Hoñble
Companys Interest, by which they are great sufferers, as they shoud gott much more
by letting the Pepper go to Pondy than letting the Hoñble Company have it. Not-
withstandg. which they shoud religiously observe their Agreem^{ts}. with this Settlem^t.
that our Complaints were groundless, and that he shou'd be here on the 10th. of this
Month, & settle all differences.
- TUESDAY 2** SENT an Answer to the above Ola Demonstrating the inconveniencys we
labour under in many respects, first that Vellinelleur being in the Limits granted
this Year by his Majesty to the Hoñble Company for purchasing Pepper in, we had
advanced, the Chattanore, and Paru Merchants money for purchasing Pepper at
that Fair. Whereas that Dollava (by whose Authority I know not) had not only
hindred our Merchants from buying of Pepper there, but had carried it all to Pondy,
in absolute breach of his Majestys royall Promise to the Contrary, In the next Place
both the King and the Annavy had frequently promised and Order'd that Nelly
Nadin Chitty shou'd pay Peria Chittys Debt to the Hoñble Company, That I am well
Convinced that he has reced the Pepper for said Peria Chittys Debt from the
Natives, which Pepper with a very large quantity which he has purchas'd (farr
exceeding the 500 telong allow'd p month) he carried to Tocalla & Pondy, and
engross all the Pepper to the Southward for the same Purpose, by all which I am
sorry, we are too well Convinced of the little regard that is shewn to the promises,
and Engagements with the Governments, and we see the Hoñble Companys Money
(which the King and the Annavy were security for) made use of by a little dirty
fellow by their Connivance, which prevents the Merchants we Contracted with being
able to Comply with their Contracts, & by which means we are not only disappointed
of the Pepper, but the Hoñble Comp^a. may be sufferers by the Merchants who have
gott their Money in hand this Year to purchase it, if these are not Grievances, then
we Complaining without a Cause, that I shall be very glad to see the Annavy here
to settle these and all other Grievances.
- DITTO DIE** WROTE an Ola to the King on the same head, demanding Justice for the
Dollavas insult to our Merchants in taking away the Pepper at Vellinelleur, and not
permitting them to buy it.

WROTE the King of Travencore an Answer, which sent by Muito Chitty, who had kept at Vellinelleur the whole time of the fair & who had Protested by my Orders both in the Kings & the Honble Companys Name against the Dollavas illegal proceeding and lett his Majesty know that Muito Chitty had been present & seen the Pepper carried Off; that if he did not put a stop to such proceedings it was impossible the Merchants who now have the Honble Companys money in their hands can Comply with their Contracts, by which we are not only deprived of the Pepper but probably the Honble Company may Loose the money in the Merchants hands.

The Chief represented to him all the Grievances we labour'd under in Collecting the Pepper Contracted for, by the abuse of his Officers, of the insult we reciev'd from the Adagary of Ruttera, when we sent to Seize the Frenchmen, who landed there the 12 of March last, for which the Chief demanded Satisfaction, To all which his Majesty promis'd as soon as the Annavy return'd. He and the Dollova shou'd settle some method of Collecting the Pepper for the Hoñble Company, that there might be no further efficiencys and declared that he did not know of any Carried to Pondy and Coud it be proved that Nelly Nadin Chitty had abused his trust of Supplying the Toccala and carried any off to Pondy that he woud banish him, & further desired we woud send him a particular Account of what Peria Chitty diliver'd last Year, & what we had reced this Year from the Southern Parts and at Eddova. That as to the Ruttera affair he had not heard of it till the Chief wrote him about it, that it must be misrepresented to him and desired that I wou'd send him an Ample Acco^t. of all the proceedings there and that we shoul'd have satisfaction for the affront given at Ruttera by the Adaga[ry]. On the Chiefs requesting that we might pay his Majesty the Dutys on the Cloth purchas'd for the Hoñble Company. He promis'd that Crisna Annavy shou'd likewise have Orde[r'd] to settle this affair to our Satisfaction, and Said that he wou'd Comply in everything we shou'd desire provided the Hoñble Company wou'd but supply him, with a quantity of Small Arms.

RECED a Letter from Domingo Rodriguez, advising that the Chattanooga Merchants begin to bring in their Pepper, and that he makes no Doubt they will bring in their Pepper to the Amount they have reced, but that he Doubts Carta Coche Candy and Marcar Momply will fall Short, but shou'd they bring no more, Pepper than to the Amount of what reced we shall be Disappointed of a hundred Candy which they Contracted for That Veltu Coche Candy will Comply, with his Contract, and requested Permission to return & Sent him Orders not to return while he had any reasonable hopes of getting in any Pepper & that he Presse's the Chattanooga Merchants to Comply with their Contract, which is for 150 Candys Pepper of which they had been advanced no more then 1/3^d. of the money, and now talk of Dilivering Pepper only to the Amount of what they have reced.

23 RECED a Letter from Domingo Rodriguez, advising that he had a Conference, with Ramana Annavy, who lays the blame on Crisna Annavy for the Difficiency in the Northern Pepper from his Confederacy with the Dollava, and Conniving at his carrying it to the Northward, and using our Merchants ill, which has made, the Chattanooga Merchants, pretend that they have no Pepper, thô he is Certain they have, and that Ramana Annavy, has sett Nairs on their Houses, to bring it to the Factory and hopes to gett a good quantity in a few Days, and desired that the Chief wou'd promise Ramana Annavy a Small Present if he exerted himself in the Honble Companys favour. Orderd him to tell Ramana Annavy that we shall not be ungratefull to any body, that realy serves the Company—And sent Ramana Annavy an Ola to same Purpose.

SENT an Ola to Crisna Annavy, informing him, that we are not Ignorant of his Practices with the Dollava to the great Prejudice of the Honble Companys Affairs, which in him, is the utmost ingratitude, as he recieves their Wages Monthly, that by his Connivance (to give no worse name) of the Dollovas ill usage of the Merchants, our Honble Masters are like to fall short, full a hundred & fifty Candys of Pepper in the Chattanooga & Paru Merchants Contracts This we hope and Expect he will redress, and that he will permitt fifty Candys of Pepper to be brought to our Factory at Eddova which the Paru Merchants, woud bring in, cou'd they have Permission.

27 RECED By Moota Chitty a Particular Account of Seventy two thousand fanams advanced by Choco Nadim, Muper Chitty & Co. to the Weavers, On our Honble Masters Cloth Investment.

Peria Chittys Debt, Ballances of which Acco^t. Crisna Annavy had Promised shou'd be paid long Since, but they are Still outstandg. Also desir'd

that he will send us an Ola Confirming his promise that he woud recieve the Customs of Cloth from us, whereas we are advis'd that some of his People are troubling the Cloth Merchants for Money Acco^t. the Customs.

RECE^d an Ola from Crisna Annavy, pretending that he uses his utmost endeavours to promote the Hon^{ble} Companys Interest and that he has sent Orders to all the Northern Merchants to bring in their Pepper assuring them of his Protection, and threatening them in case of failure, were this true, & had the Governments Officers not been Concern'd (or Connived at) the Pepper over the Hills, our Chattanore and Paru Merchants wou'd not have fallen short of their Contracts, He requested we woud send him, thirty Barrels of Gunpowder, three Candys of Lead, and three thousand flints.

WEDNES-
DAY 3

MOOTA Chitty returnd with the Kings Answer to ours of the 1st. Inst^t. Viz^t. That he had given possitive orders, that our Northern Merchants, shou'd not Meet with any impediments in purchasing Pepper, and that he had now repeated his Orders to his Officers & sent two Nairs to see those Orders put in Execution, He sent 53 rup^s. on our Acco^t. our Draught at Madrass in his favour and Promised to send the remainder soon after his Arrival at Cocolone. That he Consented that we shou'd Pay the Dutys on the Cloth, but requested at the Same time that we will procure him a Supply of Arms he having lost four hundred in his late Warr to the Northw^d. and having received advice, that an Army of Moors are preparing to invade his Country to the Southward.

FRIDAY 5

ANSWER'D Crisna Annavys Ola, insisting in the strongest terms that he shou'd see that we had Justice done our Northern Merchants, & as the Dollova &c^a. had prevented their buying Pepper till they themselves had drain'd the Country to the Southw^d. of Vellinelleur River, we Expect they Permit them to Purchase Pepper to the Northward of Said River. That we are very ready to Assist his Majesty with Gunpowder Lead &c^a. as farr as in our power, provided our Honble Masters business goes on with the Currency it ought to do, but that it will not turn to Account for the Honble Company to keep this Settlement, only to provide the Government Amunition, if they are not supplied with Pepper.

ANSWER'D his Majestys Ola recieved Yesterday that we wou'd supply him with Small Arms, Were it in our Power Which it is not at Present, having none, but what are absolutely necessary for the use of the Garrison, and requested that he woud Acknowledge the rec^t of three thousand fanams his Officers had taken from our Merchants, at Cotata on Account the Cloth Customs, that we might give the Merchants Credit for that Sum.

SATURDAY
6

RECE^d an Ola from Choco Nadim Mupa Chitty & C^o. advising that they had one thousand two hundred pieces of Cloth, Coming in , part of which was diliver'd the Washerman, and that they hourly Expected, a hundred and fifty pieces more out of the Naiques Country, that they had a large Sum, in their Weavers hands, and were in want of forty thousand fanams more to diliver out before the Northern Merchants Arrival who woud Certainly be down, in a Months time, that the Exch^a. now runs high as 28½ for Venetians & 6¾ fanams for rupees but that the Exchange must fall on the Money's Coming from the Northward, & requested, that we wou'd send them both Venetians and Rupees to Exchange.

RECEIVED advice of Some Pepper being at Paru & Chattanore to be Purchased, Order'd Domingo Rodriguez to gett himself in a readiness to go to Eddova to Purchase the said Pepper.

RECEIVED an Ola from Cumer Saumma Chitty, Excusing himself for not Coming up to Settle his Acco^{ts}. for Some time, as they are apprehensive of an Invasion by the Moors.

THE Prince passed to the Northward, The Moors having attempted to Enter the Country by a Pass thro' the Hills, where Crisna Annavy and the Dollava have Collected an Army to prevent their Entrance and the Prince is gone to take the Command upon him.

RECEIVED an Ola from the King, advising that he had secured all the Passes to the Southward, being Certain that an Army of Moors were on their March to Envade his Kingdom, and requests, that we will send him a Supply of Small Arms, two thousand, Gun flints and some Bomb shells ready.

ANSWER'D His Majesty that we had not Small Arms at Present to supply him with, we sent him two thousand flints but desired to be excused the sending him any Armed Shells in the first Place not knowing the Size of his Mortars, and in the next Place we are apprehensive that his own Men may distroy themselves with them, not knowing how to use them.

RECEIVED an Ola from Crisna Annavy insisting on his having done (and still doing) all that is in his power to procure Pepper for the Hon^{ble} Company, and thinks it very hard to be refus'd a supply of Amunition, when the Government is in so great want of it, being threaten'd, with an Invasion both from the Northward and Southward, by the Moors, and hopes that we wo[ud] send him an immediate Supply of thirty barrels of Gunpowder three Candys of Lead, and five thousand Gun flints.

THE Chief being advised of the fall of the Price of Cotton thread to the Southward, wrote Mr. Thomas Lane to sound our Merchants, & try if they will now Contract for the Course sorts of Cloth, Orderd by our Hoñble Masters this Year.

DAY 31 Mr. Thomas Lane return'd from Cotata, and advises that in a few Days the Merchants will have Completed two thousand pieces of the Investment, that they are very diligent in their business, and wou'd have had a much larger quantity ready but the Apprehensions of the Moors Army had prevented their sending so much mony into the Naiques Country, as they woud have done. That he had talk'd with the Merchants about providing the 8 Call Cloth as the Price of thread is so much abated, but they told him, they cou'd give no answer till they were Certain the Moors Army was quite gone off, which it is reported they are and the King of Travencore has withdrawn some of his forces from the Frontiers.

WROTE an Ola to the Chittys, desiring to know their resolution about the 6 & 8 Call Cloth, everything Offering much in their favour at Present, the price of thread being fallen, and none of the Northern Merchants as yett arrived, and Supposing that they can't be Certain of providing the whole quantity, to know what part of it they can provide, that it may be put in hand immediately, time being very precious, and None so proper as the Present.

Call Cloth for the Honble Company, which differing from the Dutch Cloth in Length and breadth, that they could not afford the 8 Call Cloth for less than 19½ fanams ^{per} piece & the 6 Call at 18¼. 

THE Annavy return'd with the Dollava, and Insisted Peremptorily on our having no more than 800, Candys of Pepper but assured us of that quantity, without fail. They insist much on a large advance on the Northern Pepper, but at last come to the following agreement, to allow one Rupee as usual ^{per} Candy on the Eddova Pepper, and that six hundred Candy shoud be at 335 fan^s. ^{per} Candy and two hundred Candy (which they pretend is to come from the north end of his Majestys Dominions) they are to be paid for in rupees at 60 ^{per} Candy.

They insisted much on having a large supply of small arms, but that the Chief coud give no farther Answer to but that he had wrote & wou'd write again to the Presidency requesting they wou'd send such a supply as they thought Proper to Spare. They likewise desired to be supplied with 15 barr^{ls}. of Gunpowder, three Candy of Lead, and 2000 Gun flints, which the Chief Consented to, and they promised to send the Merch^{ts}. to Contract for the New Crop of Pepper.

REC^d advice that the Moors Army is advanced pretty near Towalla (or the Pass thro the Hills from the Morrawas Country into the Country of the King of Travencores) and that the King of Travencore has again assembled his Army ready to oppose them in case they attempt to enter his Dominions, and the Annavy and Dollava return'd to their Part to the Northward for fear the King of Calliquilone shou'd attempt to enter at the same time the Mogulls do the same to the Southward, and desired we woud write the King and inform him that they had been here and what they had done.

— AUGUST 1745 —

WROTE an Ola to the King of Travencore advising his Majesty that Crisna Annavy and the Dollava had been here, but instead of settling any affairs of last Years or giving any Hopes of Satisfaction for the difficiency of our last years Pepper Contracts, they only promised that there should be none on the Next, but the same time insisted on raising the Price of the Pepper, and instead of allowing us a thousand Candy the quantity his Majesty had given the Chief hopes we should have they would not allow us more than eight Hundred Candy for the ensuing year, which we hoped his Majesty would redress.

WEDNES-
DAY 14

RECEIVED an Ola from Choco Nadem Mupa Chitty and Co. in answer to ours of the 9th. they say they cannot Contract for the 8 Call Cloth under 19½ fan^s. ½ piece and the six call cloth under 18 fan^s. ½ piece at which prices they could Contract for the whole quantity Order'd. They advise that there is now ready wash'd at Coletche 1800 pieces of the 10 Call Cloth, and that they will send the Cloth there as fast as it comes in from the Washermans. That the Moors Army are advanced within three Leagues of Towalla, which has frightened most of the Merchants at Cotata so much that they are preparing to leave that Place money being gone already. And that the Honble Companys money not being Exchanged yett, they had sent it to Coletche for Security.

That on the 20th. inst^t. Commodore Barn[...] with four of his Majestys Ships, Viz^t. The Deptford, Medway Preston & Dolphin arrived at Fort St. Davids from their cruze off Ceylone, where they had left the lively & Medways Prize, That our Hoñble Masters Ships Benjamin & Sumatra where Arrived from Bencoolen, where the Orford had touch'd in her way to Banjar, and that the Portobello had proceeded from Batavia for Benjar. The Edge Baston from Bombay & the Wager last from Batavia Arrived Bengall June the 6th. from whence they had advice of the 10th. of the Same Month that a large Body of Morrattas had enter'd that Kingdom, and threatened distruction to the whole Country, if the Nabob did not pay them a large Sum of mony, from which they apprehended that our Hoñble Masters Investments will be greatly impeded. Helena or Bencoolen, wou'd be more than they are worth Order'd that we provide some large Cattamaran Wood agreeable to the Indent herewith sent.
- GAVE the Dimentions of the Cattamaran Wood (Order'd by the President & Council) to the Linguester, and Order'd him to send to the Northward, to procure it, if Possible.
- THURSDAY 19** IMPORTED Ship Poultney from Bombay bound for Bengall, which bro^t. us the agreeable News of the Arrival of our Honible Masters Ship Walpole at Bombay, none of the other Ships being Arrived the 4th. Inst^t. when she left Bombay.

FRIDAY 11

AT Day Break this Morning five Nairs enterd the House of a Poor Old Woman at Cottadally, beat her, and broke open every thing they cou'd find, and having plunderd the house, were going off, when the Poor Womans Cries raised the Neighbours, who seiz'd the Nairs, and sent advice to the Chief, a Guard being sent to bring the Nairs to the Fort, They declared they belong'd to Cunja Poola at Attinga, & that what they had done was by his Orders, On which the Chief order'd them to be detain'd on the Main Guard, and Sent an Ola to Cunja Poola, to inform him of the insult committed by these fellows and that they had made use of his Name (he supposed) for a Protection, The Chief sent for the Kings Scrivan who resides here, and desired that he wou'd take a particular acco^t. of this whole transaction, that it may not be misrepresented. He (the Kings Scrivan) gave it as his Opinion that the Nairs, must be drunk or they wou'd not have been guilty of such an Action. In the Evening reced an Answer from Cunja Poola, in which he owns that he sent the Nairs, having been inform'd, that this Poor Woman had found some Treasure, which he had order'd them to Seize for the Kings use. He likewise sent one of his Servants with Cauly Poola (a Servant of Grisna Annavys) to desire that the Nairs might be releas'd, and the Treasure which was found might be taken care of for the Kings use. The Nairs being brought before the Chief in the Presence of Cunja Poolas Man Cauly Poola, Domingo Rodriguez, & Batty Tepoy. The Nairs Declared, that they had not found any Money, and of course had not diliver'd any mony either to the Linguester, or any body, else, As Cunja Poolas Man insinuated. The five Nairs were released, and an Ola sent to Cunja Poola, to let him know that as Cottadally is a part of the Hoñble Companys Limits that no body has any Authority to make any Search, much less to Plunder, beat, and insult the Inhabitants, as his Nairs had done the Poor Old Chego Woman, of all which his Majesty shou'd be immediately inform'd, The Poola of Bacote having heard of this affair order'd the Passage Boat to be stop'd between Cottadally and Bacote. The Chief dispatchd express Olas to the King & Crisna Annavy, with an Exact Acco^t. of the whole affair, & of the Poolas of Bacotes having stoppd the passage Boat at Cottadally.

SATURDAY
12

THIS Morning the chief being inform'd, that a Prohibition, was laid on all Manner of Provisions, Labourers &c^a. from coming into the Hoñble Companys Limits by the Poola of Bacote, Olas were sent to him and Cunja Poola, to know the meaning of it the latter deny'd that he had given any such Orders, nor did he know any thing of the Matter, The former acknowledg'd that it was done by his order, because our Passage boat at Cottadally was hall'd up Yesterday morning when he wanted to come over (which was no longer than while the little bustle lasted in seizing of the five Nairs) but as I had now Wrote to him, he had taken off the Prohibition. Dispatch'd another Ola to his Majesty, complaining of this fresh insult, by the Poola of Bacote, and demanding Satisfaction, or it will be impossible to have the Hoñble Companys affairs conducted as they ought to be, if this Settlement is lyable to be insulted by every little dirty fellow. The Consequences of which I cant Answer for.

THIS Morning the Chief reced a Letter from Mr. Clement Searle Supercargo of Ship Expedition now at Cochin, advising that on the 24th. Inst^t. a Ship with English Colours was taken by Angrias Fleet Almost within Gun Shott of a Dutch Ship at an Anchor in the road, without recieving the least Assistance from the Dutch. We Conclude that this must be the Princess Augusto as we know of no other ship cou'd be there abouts at that time. The Natives say that she was Gallantly defended, & we know she had but five Europeans aboard, so that had the Dutch sent off but 100 Men in open boats, they might have rescued her. SUNDAY 29

A Moor Man being imprison'd, who had diliver'd some Pepper into our Factory at Eddova on Cunja Nainas Acco^t. and Crisna Annavy passing that way & having examined into the affair and still continued the fellow a Prisoner I sent an Ola to the Annavy to know what was the fellows crime, for by their imprisoning this man, all the Merchants were deter'd from bringing in the new Crop of Pepper a great deal of which was now gather'd. DITTO DIE

PASSED a Dutch Ship from Columbo bound for Cochin call'd the Deimer Meir Captⁿ. Christopher Boort. MONDAY 30

IMPORTED Ship Essex Captⁿ. John Thorp Commander & Mr. Peter Noke Supercargo from Bengall bound for Bombay having on board 2600 bags saltpetre on Acco^t. of the Honble company, and being too Sensible of the late misfortune of Ship Princess Augusta to run any risque of the Honble Companys Effects, when to be avoided we perswaded the Capt. to stay here till we can know from Tellicherry whether Angrias Fleet is return'd to the Northward, or whether they will send down the Convoy here to take care of the Honble Companys Estate on board this Ship. Sent an Express boat to Tellicherry on the above Account. TUESDAY 31

RECED an Ola from Crisna Annavy acknowledging the recet of mine of the 29th. Ult^o. pretending that the Moor Man was Imprison'd for disobeying some order of the Kings, & that he brought the Pepper in the Night. They having orderd the Merchants to gett a quantity of Pepper together before they brought it to the Factory, and not to bring it in by dribblise [*sic*]. That on Cunja Nainas passing his word for the Moorman he shou'd be releas'd, And that he had wrote to all the Merch^{ts}. to bring in their Pepper. Then he goes on in the following Manner Viz^t.

As I was talking with the King about the Pepper trade " He answer'd me that " the Commodore of Anjengo was always very pressing for Pepper but never gives " me a Satisfactory Answer, about what the Dutch have done and still may do. For " this reason the English Company ought to protect the Coast from Eddova to " Brinjohn If they can't do this lett them supply me with Gunpowder, Ammunition, " & fire Arms but if they can't do this neither, We will lett them have the Cust- " mary quantity of Pepper at Anjengo, And I will bring Pepper & Money to sell " purchase Arms & Warr like stores from any Ships that may bring them to sell " and don't lett them give me any Molestation To one of these three proposals " they ought to Consent, for without them I can't defend my country against " my Enemys, who may Come. On this Acco^t. his Majesty is much displeas'd with " me, because I don't settle this affair with the Company The Pepper which is " customary to be received at Anjengo shall be Diliver'd. But if the Company will " not Consent that Ships of other Nation shall come on this Coast but for Neces- " sarys only, it Convinces me they have no regard for this Country. I expect your " Answer whether you consent or no & with your Answer send the Linguester."

The above Ola not being sign'd the Chief wrote as follows to Crisna Annavy. I have this day receiv'd an Ola said to come from you, but not being sign'd I have not Answer'd it.

THE ANNAVY ANSWER—The Ola if not Sign'd was thro' Inadvertency, I confirm it mine, and it was wrote by the King of Travencores Order, and I expect your Answer to the three Proposals.

This Morning a Small Boat passing the Port from the Northward, on being Examined whence they came and where bound, said they came from Mahie, & were agoing in quest of a Munchua, which being thought to be only a pretence, she was order'd to be searched, and found a Letter in her Directed as follows. A Monsieur, Monsieur La Capetain du Vaissan De Guerre Francois, De L'iscardre de Monsieur De la Bourdunois But the Letter being wrote in Chyper, we could not learn the Contents, there has been another Boat at Coletche sometime w^{ch}. goes not in Quest of some Ship, and by this Letter we may be pretty certain they Expect either Mons^r. La Bourdonois or some other Vessell from the Islands, dispatch'd an Express immediately to inform M^r. Geekie at Tellicherry, and detain'd the Boat & Men till our advice boat be gott to Tellicherry, and to advise the Chief & Factors of the Arrival of Ship Essex from Bengall with 2600 bags of Saltpetre on Acco^t. of the Honble Company.

DISPATCH'D the Neptune Smack to Coletche with a Light Boat to send out with a Letter to the Commander of any English Ship, and another to Commodore Barnett to advise him (shou'd he come this way) of this Expected French Squadron.

WROTE an Ola to the King of Travencore to the following purport Viz^t. Being inform'd that the French have some intentions to harbour their Ships on your Majestys Coasts with design to Molest our Shipping. As your Majesty is at Amity with our Nation & both your Predecessors & yourself are under Contracts with the Honble English East India Company, I think it proper to advise your Majesty that shoud any French Ship Lurk about your Coast, and the squadron of English Men of Warr now in India hear of it, they will certainly attack them, & shou'd the French Land for a Protection, the Commander of his Brittish Majestys Ships will have no regard to their protectors, but will seize their Ships and Effects, whither afloat or on shore, of this I think myself oblig'd to advise your Majesty that you may not hereafter have any room for Complaint.

FRIDAY
3

THE King of Travencores Answer, I have reced the Comodore of Anjengos Ola, by which I understand there is a Warr between your Nation and the French, & that some of their ships may be Expected on my Coast. When the Dutch first made Warr on me I tried all Means with your predecessor, and I cou'd gett no manner of Assistance from Anjengo, which Oblig'd me to write to Pondicherry, and I made a Contract with them, but it was not possible for them to give me any assistance since which they have not wrote to me, nor I, to them. The Engagements I am under to the French are Exclusive of the English Priviledges as I made apparent to your Predecessor Send me an Answer to the Ola Crisna Annavy wrote you.

THIS Morning a Small Boat passing from the Southward which being stop'd by our out Guards, proves to be the other Boat which was a Cruizing to the Southward; we found in her a Letter from a Black fellow the French keeps at Coletche to the French Chief at Mahie, informing him that as yett he had not reced any advice of any Bengall French Ship which is the whole contents of the Letter.

SATURDAY
4

BEING inform'd that the King is gone to the Southward. and that the Annavy is coming this way, wrote to the Annavy to know whether he intends to come here, if he does, we can settle these affairs. Receiv'd his Answer that he will be here tomorrow.

— JANUARY 1745-46 —

THE Annavy came here and made many frivolous excuses for the Peppers not coming in, and confining the fellow who brought some, but assured us that the Merchants, woud bring in a quantity in two days. He insisted very much (with a very little or no reason) that the Chief shoud Consent to one of his three Proposals, and the Chief insisted as Peremptorily that he had no Authority to enter into any such Engagemt, & that the English must and woud insist on their Antient Priviledges granted by his Present Majestys Predecessors, & Confirm'd by himself. He was lett known that the Government had never wanted any Assistance that the English coud give them but that they never wou'd lay themselves under any Obligation to supply him with Arms & Amunition, On which the Annavy desired that the Chief wou'd write the King an answer to his Ola of Proposalls.

SUNDAY
5

WROTE an Answer to the King of Travencores Ola of the 3^d. Inst^t. informing him that we have no Authority to make any new Stipulations with his Majesty about our Honible Masters Priviledges, which were settled so many years ago by his Predecessors & Confirm'd, by his Majesty. That I am greatly surpriz'd to hear him say, that he had no Assistance from Anjengo, when his Country was invaded by the Dutch, when our Books can well prove the Contrary and it is apparent that the Assistance he had from hence Enabled him to overcome his Enemies, which hope he has not forgott.

Inst^t. some Guzzarat Vessels bound for Callicutt, and the Boatmen Declare that they went aboard a French Ship in Panany road, but give so imperfect an Acco^t. of her force that can only find out that she had many blackfellows on board as well as white men, from which Conclude that she is fitted out from Don Mascorine. Sent an Express boat after the Essex to inform them of their Danger and advise them to Stay under the Dutch Protection at Cochin till they have advice from Tellicherry that he may proceed up the Coast with safety.

THIS afternoon one of our Boats return'd from Tellicherry with a General Lre Confirming the Acco^t. we reced the 8th. of Angrias Fleet being still a Cruizing between Callicutt and Tellicherry they also acknowledged the recet of the Small Arms sent them the 27 Ult^o. and Express some Concern at our having Stop'd the French Boat with Letters to Mons^r. De la Bourdenois Squadron, which they say may be of ill Consequence, shou'd the Chief of Mahie resent it. THE Chief represented to the board that he had certain advice that a large quantity of Pepper (at least 100 Candy) was packed, and a packing in Robins at Paru by Romen Annavy and others of the Governments People ready to Ship off, and there was a Canareen fellow arrived there with a Clean well Mann'd Munchua ready to take it in to prove which he called in Veltu Coche Candys Son who is just Arrived from Paru, who declares he saw some of the Pepper ready packed, and the Munchua the[re] to receive it. Having taken this Affair into Consideration which is an absolute breach of the Honble Companys Priviledges, and well knowing that shoud we permit such practices to be once began there will be no end of them and that our Honble Masters will not only be deprived of their this Years Pepper but it will be the same the Next, and the Merchants who have already Contracted will not only be unable to comply with their Contracts, but will very Probably become Debtors to the Honble Company—On which came to the following resolutions. To send a strong Guard to Eddova, and to Give the Serjaent there orders to keep a boat Constantly Cruizing to prevent any Pepper being Ship'd off at Paru, and Shou'd they find any Pepper already ship'd to seize the Vessell and send her to Anjengo—To Write an Ola to Crisna Annavy to lett him know that we are acquainted with the illicite practices a carrying on at Paru, so very Prejudicial to our Honble Masters Interest and which is an absolute breach of the Governm^{ts}. Engagements with them which has Obliged us to send orders to our Factory at Eddova to keep a good look out, and to seiz [sic] any Pepper they shall find Shipped Off to the soutw^d. of the Dutch Companys Limits—To Write a Letter to the King of Travencore to inform his Majesty of his Affair which we make no doubt he is a stranger to and requesting that he will give orders to his Officers on shore to Prevent the Shipping off any Pepper, and to lett him know that we have taken the Necessary precautions by sea.

Veltu Coche Caudy requesting a further advance on his Pepper Contract agreed to advance him 10000 new fan^s.

THIS Evening the King of Travencore sent one Paco Mozo with a Message to the Chief to the following Purport—That his Majesty had been inform'd, that the Chief had reced some impressions to his Majesties prejudice, and desired to know from whence they proceeded, That his Majesty was engaging in a Warr with the King of Calliquilone, and desir'd a supply of Small Arms. To all which the Chief gave him a full detale [*sic*] of all Romen Annavys proceedings in the Pepper affair, by which the Honble Company will not only fall greatly short of their Quantity of Pepper but very probably the Merchants will in the end prove in debt to the Honble Company which proceeds intirely from his Ministers interferring in the Pepper business. He likewise gave him an Acco^t. of his Majestys Ministers long Correspondence carried on with the French, and the Several Meetings they had in the night, at Coletche & several other places to the Southward which his Majesty Cou'd not doubt must give us great uneasiness to see our Enemies harbour'd under our very noses, by our pretended friends, if his Majesty was not acquainted with these proceedings his ministers used him very ill and if he was, we have great Cause of Jealousy Poco Mozo desired he might be permitted to write this down for fear, he shou'd forgett any part, which was permitted.

PASSED two Ships in the Offing, sent a Boat aboard them, & they wrote that they were Hollanders from Bengall bound for Surat, but the Boat men say that they had not more then three or four White men aboard and those where French Men, Probably French with Dutch passes and Colours.

RECEIVED advice by a spy from Paru, that since the Neptune Smack has been off there, they are at a nonplus, and have not made any attempts to ship off any Pepper.

RECEIVED an Ola from the King of Travencore in Answer to ours of the 29th. Ult^o. in which he says that he has given Orders for all the Merchants to bring in their Pepper and that Perhaps, from the Want of rain this Year there may be a deficiency of ten Candy as some Years by an abundance of rain there may be tenn Candy over, and so it always has been, That at the settling this Factory it was not Customary to stop any of the Natives Vessells, for which reason he wou'd have us Proceed as our Predecessors had done.

ANSWER'D the Kings Ola reced the 10th. in which represented to his Majesty that since the Agreement between this Government, and the Honble Company for the Pepper of this Country, the Government had made many innovations to the Honble Companys prejudice they had Settled the Toccale Pitte, which Carried off a vast quantity of Pepper, That there is large inland Dutys laid on the Honble Companys Pepper, That large quantitys are carried through Arianada, that besides the 1200 Candy of Northern Pepper the Dutch have, His Majesty Ships off 400 Candy, and Romen Annavy has Shipp'd off a great deal and the large quantity he has ready pack'd for Ships. Off These are flagrant Injurys to the Honble Company, In the next Place as to the stoping of the Merchants Munchuas who are indebted to the Honble Company, it has always been Customary, when we have mett with impediments in our Pepper trade, and is our dernier resort, when we can't have redress, any other way, This has been frequently done as we can show in many Instances, and has had the good Effect of not only recovering the Honble Companys outstanding Debts, but the Interest likewise from the Natives from Porca to Travencore, and if we can't obtain Justice we must take the old methods.

We acknowledge that the Tocalle Pitte was not Settled in his Majestys Reign it being first founded by Doctor Annanja Perumal in the time of his Majestys Unkle, but for a very small quantity of Pepper but it is now grown

Company used to gett from 100 to 150 Candy Pepper from Trevenderong and as much at Brinjohn (which we can prove by our Books) all which now goes to the Toccale, and the Hoñble Company are deprived of that quantity of Pepper Your Majesty is pleas'd to say that we may use your Merchants as we please, and that you shall submit to it, being determined not to enter into any disputes with the Hoñble Company, We must take the liberty of representing to your Majesty that the English, have never mett with such treatment, either from the Governm^t. or Merchants before, for the Ministers have embraced every Oppertunity of fleecing our Merchants to the Great Prejudice of the Honble Company but we hope your Majesty will make them doe us Justice in future. Your Majesty is pleased to say that after the demand for the Expence of the Kingdom is supplied, the Hoñble Company shall have all the rest of the Pepper the Country produces, if your Majesty will please to order the Original Contract with the Hoñble Comp^a. to be look'd into, we believe you will find it Otherwise. Your Majesty seems to tax us with want of respect in our Ols. FRIDAY 8 RECEIV'D an Ola from the King of Travencore in Answer to ours of the 1st. Purport as follows, "The want of rain last year has render'd the Merchants "incapable of Complying with their Contracts, but that this is alliviated [sic] "to the Hoñble Company, by their having received some Pepper at Eddova, "which shou'd have gone to Quilone, that the Chief is always a writing to me "for more Pepper but does not Comply with my requests, of which Crisna. "Annavy will write my meaning in full, let me know in future, what you want, "and nothing shall be wanting on my part, I will order the Scrivans to go to "Anjengo to adjust the Acco^t. Customs.

PURPORT of Crisna Annavys Ola reced this Day.

I have received your Ola of the 1st. Instant, as you may perceive by his Majestys Ola, who sees all the Olas you send me. The Chief must know that the Pepper falling short proceeds from the want of rain last season, to aliviate [sic] which, part of the Pepper which shou'd have gone to Quilone, has been diliver'd at Eddova so that I believe there will be a very little difficiency which may be made up this year, you need be under no doubt of having Pepper, if you can but procure small arms, Observe, what I say to you on this head, and I can make every thing easy with his Majesty, in short you may have what you please, The Scrivans shall be sent to Settle the Acco^t. Customs, and I will appoint a time for making the Queen of Attingas present when I return after this Feast is over. If any of the Merchants Complain that they are hindred [sic] bringing in the Pepper, let me know, who they are, and I will Enquire into it.

DITTO DIE THE Chief acknowledged the receipt of his Majestys Ola this Day and told him that he was sorry to hear his Majesty say that we were always a pressing his Majesty for Pepper and were regardless of his demands for Small Arms, That there was an Antient Contract between the Hoñble Company and the Government of this Kingdom, on which they made this Settlement, which was purely for Pepper, and for which purpose, the Hoñble Company had sent me here, which his Majesty well knew, That the Hoñble Company do not trade in Arms, thô to Oblige his Majesty, former Chiefs had supplied him, and since my residence here, I had likewise Supplied him with arms &c^a. to the best of my power, But as our Nation is at present engaged in a Warr, Captains &c^a. belonging to the Ships, will not be permitted to bring any Arms aboard, which makes me doubt my being able to procure any, shoud any arrive I will immediately inform his Majesty, as I had before promised him. That the difficiency of our Pepper does not proceed from any real want of Pepper in the Country, for we cou'd now purchase Pepper would his Majesty grant a free Permission for any Body to bring it in, as we had often wrote him but could get no Answer to this Material affair nor is the two hundred Candy of Cotarracarra Pepper yett all diliver'd at Eddova.

ANSWER'D the Annavys Ola much to the same Purport as the Kings, only in a Clearer and stronger terms as that it was not the want of rain, but the large quantity of Pepper carried to Toccala, that made the Hoñble Company fall short

of their quantity, and that it is not only the Vellure Pepper but it is carried from these parts, and from Cotarracarra (which always used to Come here) it is carried the Attinga Road to Toccala, That notwithstanding, the repeated Olas sent him we cou'd gett no clear Answer about the Pepper, remaining in the Country which we desired the Natives may be permitted to bring in, or to grant us permission to send and buy it That I must request as we are under no Obligation to supply his Majesty with Arms that they may be not mentioned, as if on footing with our Pepper Contracts, That he well knows both my Predecessors and myself have supplied his Majesty as long as we were able, but as our Nation has not only a Foreign Warr but a Rebellion at home likewise; it will be impossible now to bring any abroad it being more than probable that we shall not have any ships out, till these troubles at home subside so must beg he will not write me daily for Arms when it is impossible for me to supply them, when they are to be gott I shall be mindfull of my promise That there is no Occasion to Mention any Particular Men who have Pepper it being in many hands they all Complain that they dare not bring it in.

RECEIV'D a General Letter from the President and Council of Fort St. George, SATURDAY
9 advising that on the 6th. and 7th. Ult^o. Imported nine sail of French Ships at Pondicherry, named the Achilles, Bourbon, St. Louis, Duke of Orleans, Neptune L'Heunux, Renomme, Parfait, and Insultair, that on the 25th. That on the 25 June off Calluneer had fallen in with Commodore Peyton with five sail of our Men of Warr, that a Sharp Engagement had ensued, which lasted from four in the afternoon till dark, that the French had Landed five hundred Wounded Men, and that Monsieur La Bourdounois Commander in Chief of the French Squadron was shott thro' the Arm, and some of the Captains killed but they had not yett received any Acco^t. from Commodore Peyton, who was seen with his Squadron (after the Engagem^t.) off of Negapatam, by a Danes Ship from Europe, they likewise had not reced the News of Europe by that Ship, which left Europe in December last, The French have Landed a Considerable quantity of Treasure, Broad Cloth & Coral at Pondicherry.

RECEV a very Extraordinary Ola from the King of Travencore which we MONDAY
18 thought Proper to have translated, and Enter'd, as we are apprehensive, that his Majesty has some ill designs in his head, and we are pretty sure that he carrys on a Correspondence with Pondicherry.

TRANSLATE OF THE KING OF TRAVENCORES OLA.

You seem uneasy at my continually writing to you for arms, and desire me to desist, That at the founding of the Factory of Anjengo there was no stipulation made for Arms, but take it ill that I still write for Arms. In the Original Contract there is no mention how many Candy of Pepper you were to have annualy The Company may buy all the Pepper in any Country of the Merchants without any Molestation. The frequent Warrs I have been engaged in has Obliged me to apply to them (the English) in my necessity, and the Chiefs have applied to me in their necessitys, but if you are inclined to forgett all that is passed I will do the same. You may Enquire where there is any Pepper, and inform me, and I will give orders, that you may have it, I will order my Scrivans to come and settle the Account Customs.

The Chief laid the Kings Ola before the board, which being taken into Consideration, as was his Ola received the 8th. and its answer, we find therein many Evasions and real falsitys, for the Pepper there said to be diliver'd at Eddova, which shou'd have gone to Quilone, under a supposition of being Northern Pepper, We well know was, what went out of this Country, and is what the Chief prevented being Exported from Paru in April and May, that the deficiency of Pepper proceeds Entirely from the Impositions of the Government, on the Merchants, who either hide it or run it over the Hills to avoid the Excessive Exactions of the Government, and we are certain that we cou'd now purchase a good quantity of Pepper, cou'd the Natives be permitted to bring it in, but were we to inform the King &c^a. who has the Pepper it would prove their Certain ruin for concealing it from them so long upon the whole RESOLVED to send the following answer.

Your Majestys Ola is come to hand this day and with concern we read the Contents Your Majesty well knows that the Original Contract between your royal Ancestors, and Confirm'd by your Majesty with the Honble Company, was that they shoud have the whole Quantity of Pepper produced in your Dominions they making the Annual presents, and paying such Customs as were then stipulated, on our part there has been no default. There was formerly no want of Pepper either for the Company the Expençe of the Country, or for Pondy, in your Ancestors Dominions, but we now fall short greatly.

Your Majesty is pleased to say, we may buy any Pepper that is in the Country, advising your Majesty of whom we purchase it, this we cant understand the reason of.

Your Majesty is pleased to acknowledge that my Predecessors have been of use to your Majesty, and that your Majesty has Granted the Honble Company many favours, on whose part we are always ready to make the most gratefull Acknowledgments, and you will not forgett, how usefull the Chiefs of this Place has been to your Majesty, as for my part I shall always be mindfull of any promise. What Arms I cou'd procure you have had, and when more are procurable you shall have them, I have not been difficient in writing to most parts of India to procure Arms for your Majesty and shall be proud of Executing your Commands. Being inform'd that your Majesty has received a particular Account from the French of the Engagement between nine ships of theirs, and five of our Men of Warr, and as I have not received the particulars as yett, I beg the favour you will Communicate them.

Arrived an Express boat from Tellicherry with a General Letter giving a short Acco^t. of the Engagement of the 25 June on the Cormondell Coast, but contains no more than what already received from the President and Council of Fort St^t. George. They also inform us, that it is reported that the French squadron are destined for this Coast, as soon as the Monsoon will permit with an Intention of Settling at Coletche, and likewise they intend to make an attempt upon Telli-cherry, but as these are only French reports, it is to be hoped that they will prove Gasconaders, and that M^r. Peyton has put it out of their powers to be troublesome They inform us also that on the 17th. Ult^o. a French Briggantine brought into

Mahie. Ship Lorrain Captⁿ. John Mackmuth Commander and Mr. Charles Douglas supercargo, belonging to Bengall, which ship they had taken at Mozembeque without the least resistance, that after landing a few Elephants Teeth at Mahie, the Lorain sailed the 20th. & had not been heard of since, but the Briggantine was refitting at Baypore. They have Concluded a peace with all the Mallabar Princes Except Ally Rajah and have a prospect of a large Crop of Pepper.

A Lascar which belong'd to the Lorain passed our Limits, who says, that she proceeded for Pondicherry, with the People aboard that were taken in her, and that he swam away from her and Landed out of the French Limits at Mahie.

THIS afternoon Arrived a Toney from Tellicherry with a General Letter from thence of the 30th. Ult^o. advising of the Arrival of three French Ships at Mahie on the 25th. Ult^o. One of which is a Man of Warr of 70 Gunns, the other two supposed to be Companys Ships, they beleive they come from France this season, and it is reported that they are a going to Pondicherry, they say that there are four sail more of them, which are Expected at Mahie in a short time. Reced also a General Letter from the President & Council of Bombay the 21st. Ult^o: and Duplicate of the 6th. of May, acknowledging the receipt of ours of the 16th. May, and ordering that the Neptune Smack be broke up, and her stores (Guns Excepted) be sold at Outcry if not worth repairing, and advise that they will build another vessell fitt for the use of this Settlement. They also direct that we keep the Goa Boat in repair, but not to spend any money on the Gamel, unless any pressing Occasion shou'd Oblige us to make use of her, That we shall have the stores indented for by the first Conveyance, and approve of our preventing the Pepper being ship'd off Paru last season, directing us to persuade his Majesty to prevent these practices, and not to permit the French to settle at Coletche We heartily wish that our remonstrances in our Hoñble Masters behalf wou'd have any effect where the King thinks it his Interest to Act to their prejudice, however we shall not cease our Endeavours both to Collect all the Pepper we can and to keep the French out of the Country. We have also received a List of twenty two thousand Pieces of Cloth order'd to be provided at this Settlement which by some mistake must have been mislaid at Bombay as this is the first we have heard of it, no such Papper having come down by the Fort St. George.

We also took into Consideration the state of our Garrison, and the settlement in General, and as we have great reason to believe that were we to come to any Action, most of the Cooleys wou'd desert the Place we think it absolutely necessary to have more men to work our great Guns upon Occasion for which Reason agreed to Entertain twenty to thirty good Topasses in our Military as we can pick them up and to discharge them when these troubles are over.

DISPATCH'D a Boat to Tellicherry with Letters to the Presid^t. & Council, to inform them of the Cloth Contract being made, with a Letter to the Chief & Factors there, desiring that they will forward our Letters to Bombay with all possible Expedition, and to lett them know that we shall want 50,000 rupees more than the 30000 wrote for the 4th. Inst^t. for the Currency of the Year that they may write to the Presidency in case they have not money sufficient to supply us, and desired that they will inform us what is become of the three French ships which arrived Mahie the 26th. Ult^o.

THE standard or Mast of the Flag staff at Eddova being rotten and having fallen down last rains, and there being a Mast at Brinjohn belonging to the Hoñble Company, which they were not permitted to sett up there, sent an order to Joseph Diaz, resident there to get it down to the Waterside, and to advise when it is ready that we may send a boat to bring it away.

RECEIV'D an Answer from Joseph Diaz, that the new Adagary of Brinjohn had lett him know that the Mast he must not offer to stir without permission from Cevedona Poola, who has the direction of those parts, but that he woud write to him for lease to take it away, wrote Olas to the King, and Annavy to know the meaning of this insult, and why we may not remove or do what coir [*sic*] we think proper with the Hoñble Companys property.

RECEIVED a Letter from Joseph Diaz, advising that the Adigary of Brinjohn had inform'd him that he had received the following Answer from Cevedona Poola Viz^t. that we might take away the Mast with our Anjengo Cooleys, but that he had orders that none of the Inhabitants of Brinjohn shou'd Assist us, Daily we receive various reports about the French squadron on the Cormondell Coast, most of which being in their favour, and being well assured that the King of Travencore carries on a Correspondence with Pondicherry gives us great reason to suspect that his Majesty is not so staunch in our Hoñble Masters Interest as he pretends to be. Dispatch'd Express pattamars to the King and Annavy with an Account of this fresh Insult at Brinjohn by Cevedona Poolas orders, desiring to know if his Majesty had given any such Orders, as that none of his Subjects shoud assist us.

RECEIVED Olas from Crisna Annavy and the Dollava that his Majesty was at Trevenderong, and desired that our Boats might be sent to Canyara to bring him to Attinga tomorrow and that orders were gone to Brinjohn to take of any Embargo or Molestations to the Hoñble Companys affairs.

SUNDAY
28

SENT our Boats to attend his Majesty & sent the Linguester with a Compliment to him, with orders to remonstrate to him the insolence of the Adagary of Brinjohn and demand satisfaction for the affront to our Hoñble Masters and also to sound him and try how he stands affected to the French, and to inform him, how short the Pepper Merchants fall in their Contracts this last season.

MONDAY
29

THE King coming late to Attinga last night The Linguister had not an opportunity of talking with him, but had order'd to attend him this Morning, which he did, and had some talk with his Majesty, in which the King absolutely denied having any Correspondence with the French, and assured the Linguester that he neither wou'd assist, nor Consent that they shoud attack Anjengo, but as they had a Maritime Force, he cou'd not prevent their attacking us by sea; if they were resolved on it, he said that the Crop of Pepper had fallen short in the Country last season was the reason that the Merchants cou'd not Comply with their Contracts, He Absolutely deny'd having given any Authority for stoping the Hoñble Companys flag staff at Brinjhon, and declared, that if we can make it appear, that the Adigary forbid the Natives assisting to gett it down to the Waterside, that he woud cut his head off, and at the same time said that he expected, that the Sepoy shou'd be punish'd if he did not prove the Adagarys having said so. but as his Majesty had a number of People in the Boat with him, the Linguester cou'd not talk to him about several material affairs which the King also declined, as he was in haste to go to Trevenderong, He told the Linguester that he had order'd Cevedona Poola to Come & settle the Acco^t. Customs, and when that was done he wou'd have him, attend him at Trevenderong, where he woud talk him about every thing.

THE Chief reced a Letter from Ezekiel Raby of Cochin, advising that the French at Mahie had sent a report to Callicut, that their Forces on the Cormondell Coast, had taken Fort St. George the 7/18 September which he took only to be a piece of French Vanity, as we do here.

CEVEDONA Poola Came, and ordered the scrivans to attend tomorrow to settle the Acco^t. Customs, and the Kings Acco^t. with the Hoñble Company from the last of July 1743, to the last July 1746—late in the Evening he sent the Chief word, that he had received an Acco^t. that the news was true of the French having taken Fort St. George.

This Morning the Chief reced an Ola from Crisna Annavy advising him that the Nabob of Arcott, had sent an Express to his General at Trichinopoly, with orders for him to repair to Arcott immediately on acco^t. the Melloncholly, Cattastrophe of Fort St. George, which he said was fallen into the hands of the French. This Melloncholly and alarming news made us determine to send a Boat express to Tellicherry in hopes of having it Contradicted, desiring the Chief &c^a. there to send us the best Acco^t. they have.

TUESDAY

7

ARRIVED a Boat from Tellicherry with a Letter from the President and Council Of Bombay of the 14th. Ultimo, and Duplicate of their last of the 21st. August General Letters of the 25th. and 29th. Ultimo from Tellicherry, and Invoice of two Candy of Iron by this Boat The President and Council inform us that they have sent by the Pelham, Mess^{rs}. Fowke and Hatton both Factors for the Assistance of this Factory (Mr. Thomas Lane being to return to Bombay) and that next in standing after Mr. Thomas Pattle is to take Charge of this Settlement in case of the Death of the Chief That they have sent what stores they can spare to Tellicherry by the Pelham, for the use of Anjengo, with orders to forward them. They also advise that the Severn imported from England at Moco the 27th. July, which place, she was to leave the 22^d. August, That as she can't arrive in time to be sent to Bengall, she will be dispatch'd home from this side, and fill up Either at Tellicherry or this Place. The Essex imported Bombay the 21st. Ultimo full Loaden with Coffee from Moco, and sail'd with the Pelham for Great Brittain. The Telli-cherry General Letter Confirms the Melloncholly account of the Capture of Fort St. George by Monsieur La Bourdounois in three Days having attacked it both by sea and Land, and they say that he had Surrounded Fort St. David, and Cudloor These Accounts came by the French Pattamars to Callicut, and Arrived Mahie the 23^d. Instant, They also advise that they received a Letter from Governour Morse the 5th. Ultimo importing that the French had Landed two thousand Men at St. Thome, who where raising a Battery of fifteen Mortars to Bombard the Town which Batary [*sic*] was out of the reach of their Gunns and that tenn sail of French Ships were in the road, ready to attack the place on the 6th. that the Pattamar came away on the 8th. and Confirm'd the above.

There is too much reason to fear the truth of the Loss of that important settlement, but it seems very Extraordinary, that the Pattamar dispatchd on the 6th. on so important an Occasion, shou'd stay till the 8th. As to Monsieur La Bourdounois having surrounded Fort St. David and Cudloor, that may also be true at present, but cou'd not be so at the time they mention, for as they did not Attack Fort St. George before the 6th. September, They could not be return'd and have surrounded Fort St. David for them to have any advice of it the 23^d. of the same Month, but in all these accounts, we have no manner of advice what is become of the Brittish squadron of Men of Warr under Mr. Peyton, which is greatly surprizing as Mr. Hinde wrote the Chief under the 1st. of August that Commodore Peyton had wrote him, that he woud be with him in a few days. They also advise from Telli-cherry that the Pelham imported there 26th. Ultimo to fill up for Great Brittain that Mess^{rs}. Fowke and Hatton, and some stores for Anjengo were Come on her & shoud be forwarded in a few day[s], They als[o] promise to send us a Supply of Treasure very soon.

HAVING settled the Account Customs and the King of Travencores Acco^t. with Cavedona Poola made him a small Present (as Customary on such Occasion) in hopes of Engaging him in our Honourable Masters Interest, but fear he is too much attach'd to the French already thô he assured the [chief] that he was certain that the King of Travencore woud [never] Consent to the French attacking Anjengo.

RECEIVED an Ola from Choco Nadim Mupa Chitty & Company advising that they had advanced the money received on the Cloth Contract amongst the Weavers, and that most of the Cloth to that amount, would be in the Warehouse in a few days and desired a further advance of fifty thousand Fanams (50,000) and that the price of Rupees is now six fanams fourteen Magganees $\frac{1}{2}$ Rupee.

The Linguester was order'd to rep[air] to his Majesty, and gave him Instructions to endeavour to persuade him, not only to prevent the Landing but [also] try to gett his promise to assist us in Case they attempt the taking of Anjengo, To gett a receipt for the Ballance Accounts now settled, being new fanams 8457 - 11 in our [Honble] Masters' favour and in case that he and his Ministers sh[ould] talk of the Pepper Contract, to try to Evade it till we are sh[ort] in Cash, and to try to gett the affair settled about the Qu[eens] Present which is three Years in Arrear to his Majesty.

It being the received Opinion of most of the better sort of People in the Place, that our [cooleys] would desert us shou'd the French attack the Place, and such a desertion would lay us under great difficultys both labourers, and boatmen, Agreed to Enter one hundred in the Honble Companys Service at fifteen fanams each $\frac{1}{2}$ mō[nth] which it is every bodys Opinion, will be a means of k[ee]ping them, and the money will be all thrown away, as they be now Employed in raising our Batterys to the sea, and other use we may want them for.

9 THE Marcar of our Boat from Tellicherry informing us that a Toney with Treasure from Tellicherry had over-taken him at Callicutt, and seperated from him in a squall off of Porca, said Boat not appearing, sent a boat with a Corporal and four soldiers to see what is become of her.
- SATURDAY** ARRIVED the Tellicherry Toney with two Chests of Treasure q^{ty}. twenty thousand rupees on Acco^t. of the Honble Company and the Chief &c^a. Factors of Tellicherry advise that they will send us a further supply as soon as they are in Cash, and desire that we will send them any advice we have of the Enemy.
- SUNDAY**
12 RETURNED the Tellicherry Toney, and acknowledged the receipt of the Treasure, and desired the Gentlemen, that they will punish the Marcar, for puting ashore with the money by which they runn a very great risque of loosing both the money and their own lives.
- TUESDAY**
14 RECEIVED a Letter from the Linguester (Domingo Rodriguez) advising that he had, had a Conference with the King, who seem'd very sincere in his promises, that he will not Consent to the French's Attacking Anjengo, and that he will give orders to all the Governments Officers to assist us in preventing their Landing shou'd they attempt it That the Cotarracarra Christian Merchants had represented to the King, Dollava and Annavy, that in case they had not mony immediately advanced them on Acco^t. Pepper it woud be impracticable for them to prevent its going into some other Channell.
- SENT an Answer to Domingo Rodriguez, advising him to return his Majesty many thanks for the assurance of his friendship, and assistance, against the French, and directed that he procure his Majestys order to all his Officers to repair to Anjengo with their Forces on a proper signal being made and that the Honble Company will not be ungratefull to those, who shall assist them on such an Emergency. Orderd him also to inform his Majesty &c^a. that we are ready to make the Pepper Contract, whenever he will Order the Merchants to come to Anjengo. Order'd him also to desire his Majesty to give a receipt for the Ballance of the acco^t. settled with Sevedona Poola, and to gett the affair settled about the Queen of Athingas Annual present.
- WEDNES-
DAY** 15 PASSED a Dutch Ship, which has been three months in her passage from Gombroon bound for Batavia, called the Oosterhaut Captⁿ. Vandenviël, but as they are in want of provision they are a going to Tootacorine, He gives an acco^t. that he mett Capt Barton in the Success Galey in the Gulf of Persia, with Mr. Whitwell on board a going to Bombay.
- FRIDAY**
17 PASSED a Dutch Briggantine called the Maria Laurentia Captⁿ. Dock Vander hoyden from Cochin for Columbo, but cou'd not gett any manner of news from her.
- SUNDAY**
19 THIS Morning arrived a Munchua from Tellicherry with part of our Stores sent from Bombay and a General Letter from the Chief &c^a. Factors there, advising that on the 9th. Inst^t. they dispatch'd our Honble Masters ship Pelham Captⁿ. George Lindsey for Great Brittain, which ship saild early the next morning. That on the 5th. imported ship Fuckero Moracob Captⁿ. Thomas Purnell from Batavia having a passage of twenty six days, that on the 13th. August in the streights of Sunda he mett with our Honble Masters Ships Dragon Captⁿ. Kent, and Somersett Captⁿ. Tolson bound for Banjar & Bencoolen, but were a going first to Batavia, They told Captⁿ. Purnell, that they left the Downs the 23^d. February, when five sail of men of Warr under Commodore Griffin, were a fiting out with all possible Expedition to relieve Commodore Barnett, and that it was said that the Coast and Bay Ships woud come under their Convoy They also Enclosed us a Letter from John Hinde Esq^r. Deputy Governour of Fort St^t. Davids to Mr. Bouchier & Copys of two other Letters one to Governour Wake & one to George Dudley Esq^r. Mr. Hindes signals for ships coming into Fort St^t. David and what other Intelligence

they had gott about the Melloncholly Catastrophe of Madrass which they seem to think may not be true as all the advice Mr. Hinde has had was from Deserters received also Invoice of stores sent us, amounting to rupees two thousand two hundred and five, and seventy nine raes (2205. —. 79) the Gun could not come in these Munchuas.

THIS afternoon arrived another Munchua, with the remainder of our stores, and Messouirs [*sic*] Francis Fowke and William Hatton, who are Order'd as Assistants to this Factory, these Gentlemen say that before they left Tellicherry a Pattamar Arrived at Mahie, on which the French gave out a Fresh report that Madrass had surrendered, but that Monsieur De la Bourdounois was killed, in attacking that place, which leaves some room to hope it may be false as their People don't Confirm their first accounts but bring fresh advice (as they say) of the surrender. They also Acknowledge the receipt of our Letter of the 6th. Inst^t. by Boat Express, and have sent us the [nine] pounder Gunn sent from Bombay and promise to supply us with some Gunns and Gun carriages if they can spare them.

DATED OCTOBER THE 5TH. 1746.

“ That he had waited thus long in hopes of some Certain advices of Madrass,
“ but as yett all he knows is by hear say, that is that Mons^r. De la Bourdounois
“ had appointed Mons^r. Velbogue (his Brother) Governour of Madrass and was
“ to sail on the 7th. with the unfortunate Madrass Gentlemen on board, That
“ they were determind to make a push at Fort St. David before they quit the
“ Coast though so late in the season, Others say that they are bound for this
“ Coast and have reship'd their Scaling Laders &c^a. and intend to begin with
“ Anjengo first which he does not beleive but thinks proper to advise us, their
“ Women being all at Negapatam, have wrote to their Husbands, that the
“ Governour of that place had sent to inform them that France had declared Warr
“ against Holland, on which they said a Council was immediately summonsd
“ [sic].

ANSWER'D the Tellicherry General Letter, and desired they wou'd advise us as soon as the Gunns arrived from Bombay and that they will spare us a few shells of Eight Inches, what we have being too small for the Mortars.

RECEIV'D an Ola from the King of Travencore advising that he was coming to Attinga to-morrow, desired that we wou'd send our Goa Boat to attend him which was accordingly done, and order'd the Linguester to wait on his Majesty, and request that he would call at Anjengo as he passed, that the Chief might have a Conference with him about the Present Posture of Affairs, but if he cou'd not persuade his Majesty to come to Anjengo then to sound him, how he stood inclined to the French, and whether his sincerity might be depended on in not permitting them to Land in case they attack this place, and that he woud grant us as house at Attinga to send the Women and Children to, in case of an Engage-ment, and to desire that the Merchants might be permitted to come, and make the Pepper Contract.

SUNDAY
2^d.

THE Linguester returned, not having been able to speak to his Majesty, he arrived, so late, but was orderd to attend him tomorrow Morning.

MONDAY
3^d.

THE Linguester return'd having had an Enterview with his Majesty, who assured him that he wou'd come to Anjengo in his return, but he had not time at Present, being a going to a Feast at one of his Pagodas to the Northward, but that he had given Orders to all his Officers to give us all the Assistance in their Power that it is his Opinion that the French will not attempt this place, but if they shou'd he will immediately come in Person to our Assistance, he orderd that

one of his Palaces at Cheringa should be cleared out for the reception of our Women and Children, if we had Occasion for to send them away, and gave orders to Crisna Annavy, and the Dollava to come to Anjengo, and see the Pepper Contract made as soon as the Queen of Attingas birth day was past (which will be in a few days) and at the same time desired that we would lend him tenn thousand Fanams, which should be accounted for out of his Customs, and also desired, that if we had any old unserviceable Gunns, that we would lett him have them to cast into shott and that he would pay away Reasonable price for them.

NOVEMBER 12TH. 1746.

“ I have received your Ola of this Day, you Observe that I remark your not
 “ sending Veltu Coche Candy and Cunja Naina with the Chattanore Merchants,
 “ whom you promise to send, but at the same time order that we shall Contract
 “ with these Men advance the price of Pepper both to the Northward and south-
 “ ward, and to advance the Money to these People or we shall find great difficulty
 “ in procuring any quantity of Pepper this Year, you also say we want to raise the
 “ Price of Arms, which is not the way to procure Pepper, to all which I must
 “ reply, That this is the first Order I ever received from the Government for mak-
 “ ing the Honble Companys Contract nor did they ever take upon them to Name
 “ the Merchants, the Honble Company are to deal with, nor can I submit to such
 “ an Order I expect that all the Merchants have liberty to come & make their
 “ Contracts. The Chattanore Merchants whom you now send, diliver'd but 1/3
 “ of the Pepper they Contracted for last year. The Dutch raising the Price of their
 “ Pepper (if true) can be of no Consequence to us, as the Pepper produced in their
 “ Limits cannot be brought into ours nor can the produce of our Limits, be carried
 “ to the Northward without the Connivance of the Government, and we well know
 “ that there is a plentiful Crop of Pepper to the Northward. The Honble English
 “ East India Company do not trade in Arms nor does anybody here, at the King
 “ of Travencores and his Ministers request, some arms have been purchased by

ARRIVED the Honble Companys Barge from Tellicherry with a General Letter from the Presidency a General Letter from the Chief &c^a. Factors at Tellicherry, and thirty Bomb shells for our Mortars, which we wrote to them for our being all too small, The President and Council Inform us that they have advices from several Parts of the Capture of Madrass and that it is reported, that the French intend next to Attack Bombay and the Pepper settlements, directing us to be upon our Guard, That they cannot spare us any more men nor amunition at present, and direct that we apply to the King of Travencore for succour if attackd agreeable to the former agreements on the settling of this Factory they also order, that we follow the Presidents orders to the Chief about securing our Treasure, reserving sufficient for Garrison Charges &c^a. Currency, The Chief &c^a. Factors at Tellicherry advise that they had sent us thirty shells for our Mortar amounting as Invoice to rupees forty four two quarters and twenty raes (44-2-20) and desire that we will send them what shells we have, which are unfit for our Mortars, they having Mortars of several seizes, [sic] which they have not shells for that they have given us credit for the eight rupees their Munchua that they had sent their Barge to Accommodate Mr. Thomas Lane and Family.

That their Orders shou'd be obey'd in selling our Pepper if an Oppertunity offer'd but submitted it to their superior Judgment whether it woud not be more proper to keep it, as some of our Hoñble Masters ships destined for Madrass might be sent to this Coast for homeward bound Cargoes, that place being fallen into the hands of the French, and as part of Monseieur De la Bourdounois swardron is lost, and the rest dismasted we think no great Danger is to be apprehended from them. That we shall not have an Overflowing Cash, when we have made the advance for the Pepper Contract, and the Chittys are makeing a Constant draught on us, on account of the Cloth Contract. Acknowledged the receipt of the Tellicherry Letter, and the Bomb shells, and sent them a supply of four hundred shells unfit for our Mortar.

IMPORTED Ship Wake Capt^a. Robert Norton from Bengall bound for Madrass, but having received advice at Pullecatt of the Loss of that Place he had return'd at Vizagapatam, and in his Passage had mett with Ship Vernon, which had runn out of the road of Madrass with only her standing masts having Ensign Morgan and seventy Soldiers on board, who had made their Escape, when the Place was surrender'd, and had only Eight bags of Paddy and a little Water on board, which they had purchased with some of their Arms at Pullecatt where the Dutch wou'd not supply them with any thing, all these Men he Carried to Vizagapatam, and deliver'd them there, except one called Daniel Hopkins, whom he diliver'd here. He not thinking it safe to proceed into Ballasore Road, as the French might be cruizing there, has proceeded to this Coast.

LATE last night received a General Letter from John Hinde Esq^r. Deputy Governour of Fort St. David, with a General Letter for the Presidency. The advise that Fort St. George surrendered the 10th. September, and that the French did intend to have attacked Fort St. David, had not a hard Gale arose on the 2^d. which Continued the 3^d. Ult^o. in which two of their Ships sunk and all the rest were disabled in Madrass road, that Monsieur De la Bourdounois, had agreed to ransom the Place, but they do not know the terms, but be they what they will they were not ratified by Monsieur Duplex (Governour of Pondicherry) who on Monsieur De la Bourdounois departure on the 12th. Ult^o. had appointed Monsieur Des-Preminal with a Council there, since which the Nabobs Eldest Son was gone down, with an Army to retake the Place in order to which they had Blockaded it, which had reduced the Europeans both French and English to very great Necessitys, Except a few English Gentlemen who were gott to the Mount. That the Achilles and three More (The remainder of the squadron) with Jury Masts, and the three ships which were on this Coast last August all saild from Pondicherry to the southward the 18th. Ult^o. they suppose some for this Coast, and the rest for the Islands and that on the 20th. they had dispatch'd the sumatra (taken from our Honble Masters) for France.

TUESDAY
18

THE Natives of Calliquilone having rose and burnt and plundered some part of the Country lately conquerd by the King of Travencore, and killed some of his men. His Majesty, sent away the Dollova, and Crisna Annavy immediately to the Northward, and sent an Ola to the Chief requesting a supply of tenn barrels of Gunpowder a Candy of Lead and one thousand Flints.

Chief at Tellicherry (to whom they had order'd us to apply, for what money we shou'd want) had wrote the Chief that he could not send us any more money untill he was supplied from Bombay, and that having our Cloth Merchants Constantly drawing upon, us, and our Pepper Contract being now a Coming upon the Carpett, we hoped that they wou'd send us a supply of money in time or we might be disappointed of part of the Cloth, also desired that they woud please to send us, the full Quantity of Gunpowder indented for, as we had now been Obliged to spare, the King of Travencore tenn Barrels to quell his revolted subjects in Changanants Country, notwithstanding, which we have a pretty good stock by us. AGREED to supply his Majesty with the Gunpowder &c^a. but to inform him at the same time that nothing but his urgent necessity could have induced us to part with any Gunpowder at this Juncture, when we know not how soon we may have Occasion for it, not in the least doubting, that that his Majesty will fulfill his promise of Assisting us if we are attack'd, by the French, and that he will not on any account or pretence, whatever permit them to Land, requesting (if his affairs woud permit) that he woud call at Anjengo that we might have an Oppertunity of Conferring with him on the Present Juncture both of his affairs and our Honble Masters.

HIS Majesty arrived here having sent a large Army to the Northward to Quell the Revolters, The Chief had a long Conference with him, in which he gave the strongest assurance, that he would not only, not permit the French to land, but that he would assist us in the defence of the Place, and that he himself would not go any distance from hence till the season was Elapsed for their Coming here, The Chief Complained of the Insolent Ola received from the Annavy and Dollava about making the Pepper Contract, and raising, the Price of Peper, giving many weighty reasons, why it was unpracticable, and in particular that the Honble Company would never submit to have the Pepper annually raised on them, as it would not Answer which his Majesty promis'd should be remedy'd, and that he would give orders to his Ministers accordingly. The Chief also Complained of the Ministers insisting on having a supply of small arms, at a time when they were not procurable, That the Chief had procured what was to be gott out of the ships, but this was only a matter of Curtecy, and still they were not satisfied, and sent very rude messages about them, To all which his Majesty very graciously replied that as he was in great want of Arms for the Defence of his Country, his Ministers probably might write very pressing for them, but we must not take any umbrage of that, he being thoroughly Convinced of the English Attachment to his Interest by the Confidence they had always put in him, for they had formerly assisted him not only with small Arms, but had also, lent him Artillery, He seemd in Top good Humour, and if his Royall word is to be rely'd on, we need not doubt his assistance, if we are attacked by the French, he seems still to be under apprehensions of the Dutch made his Majesty the Customary Present of fifteen venetians, and gave four rupees to Noranna Cutty Annavy who is one of his privy Councillors. THURSDAY
20

OUR Boat return'd from Tellicherry, which carried the advice of the Arrival of our Honble Masters Ship Ilchester which brought a General Letter of the 17th. Inst^t. from the Chief and Factors there, advising that two Grabs & five Gallivats supposed to belong to Tullejee Angria had appeared off that Port on the 12th. Inst^t. a standing to the Northward, and they have since heard that they had taken several Boats belonging to that Place, Mahie, Burgaree &c^a. which they had sent advice of to Captⁿ. Tedd. SATURDAY
22

RECEIVED an Ola from Choco Nadem Mupa Chitty & C [sic] advising that the Cloth came in a pace, and desired a further supply of money and that the price of Rupees is risen again to six fanams, fourteen Maggonees $\frac{1}{2}$ Rupee.

William Hatton to repair directly to Cotata and to Examine the Chittys Accounts, and if he finds the Investment in the forwardness they say it is, then to advance them six thousand rupees, which we agreed to send with him, To send us an Acco^t. what forwardness the investment is in, and to advise Constantly, what quantity of Cloth is ready at Coletche, that

PASSED a Dutch Ship to the Northward left, Europe in May, last from Columbo bound for Cochin, the Captⁿ. Told some of our Gentlemen, who went aboard him that France had declared Warr against Holland, but can't find where he gott this news, as we know that he left Europe before the Ilchester, however the Chief immediately wrote to the Commodore of Cochin to know if there be any truth in it.

RECEIV'D a General Letter from Mr. William Hatton at Cotata dated November, the 28th. advising that he had Examined the Chittys Acco^{ts}. and finds that they have four thousand five hundred pieces of Cloth already provided viz^t. 2200 pieces at Coletche, 300 pieces ready at Cotata, and 2000 in the Washermens hands, and that they assure him that they will have 5500 pieces more ready, by the end next month That as they were not in immediate want of money, he had not advanced them any more but should lett them have it when demanded.

THE Military being Musterd as usual Captⁿ. Thomas Mostyn, diliver'd the Chief an Insolent Petition from the Musters & Topasses of the Garrison, desiring redress as the price of pice was now greatly fallen, and complaining of the dearness of Rice, and Concluding with a demand that they should be paid 25 Gallian fanams, which they say is five rupees, and always paid by the Hon^{ble} Company. And he told the Chief at the same time that they refused to take their Rice as usual, on that they were gather'd together at the Fort Gate in a Tumultuous Manner On which the Chief Order'd Antonio Rodriguez (the fellow who had wrote the Petition his hand being known) to be brought to him, who in his own Justification produced another Copy of said Paper sign'd in a Round Robin by almost all the Topasses & Musters in the Garrison, This Fellow not making any Confession of his Accomplices, was order'd into Confinement and the rest being order'd by Captⁿ. Mostyn to dispense, one being insolent to him, was also Confined, but the rest still Continuing Mutinously at the Gate, The Chief went to them, and Order'd them to lett him know their Grievances, They Complain'd of the great fall of pice, and the dearness of Rice, They were lett known, that the price of Pice was already rectified, and had been done sooner, had the Chief been inform'd of it as to the Price of Rice it cou'd not be lower'd as they paid no more for it than it cost the Company, but if they did not take it, they might provide themselves where they could, and they having no other Complaint to make, where orderd by the Chief to depart, which they would not do till he was forced to order two file of Musquetters to draw out, on which they went away from the Fort Gate, but kept in partys about Town, wanting to have their Insolent Consorts releas'd. As things of this Nature ought never to go entirely unpunish'd, the Chief took some days to find out the ring leaders, and Employ'd Captⁿ. Mostyn, who told him that all

his Endeavours to that purpose had proved fruitless. One of the Chiefs servants told on the 5th. Inst^t. that the Prisoner on the Main Guard had threaten'd his Life, on which a Consultation was immediately called.

OUR Boats returned from Tellicherry, with a General Letter of the 28th. Ult^o. from George Dudley Esq^r. Chief &c^a. Factors, there Acknowledging receipt of our Letters of the 14th. & 18th. Ult^o. and of the receipt of the Bombs sent them, and advising of the Arrival of our Honble Masters Ship Ilchester at that Port on the 23^d. Angrias Fleet being saild to the Northward and no French Ship on the Coast, that they knew of, They likewise inform us that they had forwarded the Fort St. David Letter to the Presidency by the Ilchester, which saild thence the 26th. Ult^o.

TUESDAY
2

THE Chief received a Letter from John Hinde Esq^r. Deputy Governour of Fort St. David of the 12th. and 13th. Ult^o. advising that they had been under great Anxiety for some time from the Threats of the French having been in hourly Expectation of being Attack'd but that he had at last gott the Nabob to put Nizams Orders in Execution, who had March'd four thousand Horse down upon Pondicherry, That Monsieur Duplex, had made Proclamation by beat of Drum in Madrass, Annulling all treatys made with Monsieur De la Bourdounois and that the English (Governour and Council Excepted) must Rid the place either on their Parole or go Prisoners to Pondicherry or take an Oath of Alligance to his most Christain Majesty. The two former were Complied with, and some had made their Escapes, and were Arrived at Fort St. David, That Governour Morse being overwhelmed with Grief and his health being much impaired by the base shuffles and inhumane insults he had received, had gott Mr. Goodiorn to write to Mr. Hinde (he being scarce able to write himself) to tell him, that he lookd upon himself as entirely disqualified to Act, and that he was now invested with the Principal Authority to Manage our Hoible Masters affairs on that Coast, and desired that he wou'd Issue out such Orders to the Subordinate Factorys, as he thought most Conducive to the Honble Companys Interest, and to advise the other Presidencys of their Melloncholly scituation, However he gives the Pleasure of knowing that his prospect mends daily thō far from being out of danger, the Enemy being very inveterate, and it being a full Month before he can Expect any material succour, That on the 5th. November, one of our Europe Ships came in Madrass Road, The French hoisting English Colours, but she was no sooner at an Anchor, but they hoisted French Colours, and fired all the Gunns they cou'd bring to bear from the Fort and Princess Mary upon her, on which she cutt her Cable, and return'd tenn or dozen shott, and stood to sea but where gone to, he knows not. They had sent a note aboard her sign'd N, M, and received an Answer which they keep a secret."

The Europeans being all under Arms in the Fort, and the whole Garrison Called up Nazir Mahomet declared, that on some discourse he had the night before with Pasqual De soza (The fellow who was Confined for his Insolence to Captⁿ. Mostyn, about the Topasses. not taking their Rice) said Pasqual De soza had said to him that the Chief had best take care how he went out of the Fort of an Evening for he might be dispatch'd, and if it shou'd not be Effectuated out of the Fort, it might be done, as he passed thro the main Guard, This Villain having nothing to

say but denying the Fact, was order'd to be whip'd, Antonio Rodriguez being brought before the board at first, wou'd not Confess any thing, but that he had wrote the Paper at the request of all the Topasses, but on his being order'd to be whip'd he declared that as follows, That some days ago as he, Lazaro Swares, Manuell Peres, Alexander Miran, and Paul Fernands, were in the Portugueze Church, they were a Consulting how they might raise money to repair the said Church, on which they agreed to have a petition wrote the Chief &c^a. Factors to the purpose of the said Petition diliver'd, and they wou'd have him to write it, but he being fearfull of being brought into a scrape & afterwards deserted by the rest, Manuell Peres (the Rolier) told him that he need be under no apprehensions of that, for they woud all sign a round Robin by which none wou'd be more Cul-pable than another, Peres &c^a. being called before the board, absolutely denied all the other said, and it being late at night, Confined all the above named and adjourned till the Morning.

Antonio Rodriguez and Manuell Peres being brought before the Board face to face, Rodriguez insisted on his former declaration, which Peres denied, but Edward Evans (serjaent) being called in declared that on Sunday (the same day the round Robin was sign'd) being on his Guard at the North Trunkier, said Manuell Peres had said to him why dont you Petition to have your pay raised, as the other serjaents are ready to do, or words to that purpose, Manuell Peres still persisting in his denial, Antonio Rodriguez produced the Original Paper, which were wrote in another hand with Erazements, which Erazements he declared were made by Manuell Peres, The board insisting on knowing who wrote the said Original, Antonio Rodriguez said it was wrote by a Padre called Francisco Xavier Alverez, nephew to said Manuell Peres who was lately come into the Place, Lazaro Swares, being called before the board Confessed, Alexander Miran being call'd before the board wou'd not Confess, Paul Fernands being Called before the board woud not confess having taken this affair into serious Consideration, and find it, of so black a dye, that the Artfull Villain Manuel Peres, had been the Chief Incendiary, and had the Cunning to evade signing the Round Robin himself, because he was indulged with Europeans Pay as he was Rolier, AGREED and ORDER'D that he be whip'd at the markt place and at each Trunkier, and to have thirty nine Lashes at each place, to be Confined a Close Prisoner That Pasqual De soza (who threatened the Chiefs Life) be whipt three different times and Drummed out of the Honble Companys Limits, with orders never to return into them again That Lazaro swares, Alexander Miran, & Paul Fernandes receive each thirty nine Lashes at the Market Place, and that as Antonio Rodriguez, has made an ample Confession

his punishment be remitted, but that he be still Confined, after which all the Top-asses and Mustees, being call'd man by man, were askd whether they were content to serve the Honble Company for the pay they had received for some years past, and as now paid them, which they all chearfully agreed to, Except one silly fellow, who made answer, that he wou'd if the rest did, On which he was immediately strip'd and dismis'd the service for an Example They being also askd if they were satisfied to take the rice, on such Terms as it could be procured for them, which they also readily Consented to, being all very submissive, & ready to do their Duty, being Convinced of the heinousness of the crime in signing the round Robin to have their pay raised.

They acknowledge the receipt of our Letters of the 6 Nov^r. 22 Sep^r. Advise of the arrival of our Honble Masters ships Warwick & Severn the former on the 19th. and the latter the 27th. Ult^o. That they hope we have received the stores sent Pelham, and assur^d us we shall have the Guns we indented for by the first Conveyance, and that we shall have a supply of Treasure sufficient for carrying on our Investm^t. but do not think it prudent to risque a ship down the Coast at that time, nor do they think it a proper time to advance the Merchants any Considerable Sums, They approve of our enlisting the 25 Topasses in our Military & the President sends the Chief a Copy of a Letter received from Mr. Halliburton wrote from the Mount the 24th. Oct^r. by Order of Gov^r. Morse. They have received advice by an Armenian that the Men of Warr under the Command of Commodore Peyton Arrived Bengall the 18th. Sept^r. where they were refitting in order to come early to this Coast. Reced a General Letter from Tellicherry Accompanying the above General Letter from the Presidency, They advise that the Express boat which brought these Letters met two ships a little to the southward of Goa the 3^d. Inst^t. at 8 in the Morning which they judge to be the Ilchester & a Country ship which saild with her from Tellicherry the 26th. Ult^o. That on the 27th. Ult^o. Toolajee Angria, with a Fleet of Eight Grabs & forty or fifty Galevats, had Landed his Men at Mangalore, which Place they had plunder'd, and in about twenty six Hours reimbarqued.

SUNDAY
14 SENT five thousand rupees to Mr. William Hatton overland not thinking it prudent to risque it by sea at Present.

MONDAY
15 DISPATCH'D the Tellicherry Toney with a General Letter to the Presidency, and another to Tellicherry.

22 CRISNA Annavy came to Attinga the Linguester was sent to him to desire that he woud call at Anjengo, if his affairs would permit, which he promised to do tomorrow.

TUESDAY
23 CRISNA Annavy came to Anjengo and the Chief demanding the reason why the Merchants were hindred [sic] coming to make the Pepper Contract as usual, he pulled off the mask at once and proposed, the Governments making the Contract, to which the Chief made many weighty Objections, and one not of the least Consequence was that while the Merchants were permitted to make the Contract as usual, when any disputes arose, the Government adjusted Matters, but when the Government became partys, all disputes must be decided by the sword, which was such a method of trade, as the Honble Company, woud never submit to, and if the Pepper trade of this Factory could not be carried on in the usual manner,

we must apply to our superiors for their orders how we should Act, and as by the Original Contract the Company was to have all the Pepper the country produced, none should be carried out of the Kingdom by Sea, after the Annavys using many arguments to no purpose he promised to go to the King & to send the Merchants to make the Pepper contract.

THE Chief receiv'd a Letter from the Governour of Columbo, advising that our Honble Masters ship *Britannia* was arrived at Gallee in a miserable Condition, having been for fourteen days in the utmost distress from the Death, and sickness of her People but he assures him at the same time, that he shall have all necessary Assistance. WEDNES-
DAY 24

Not having any man here that is Capable of Carrying a vessell with assistance to the *Britannia* at Gallie, Dispatchd a Boat to advise the Chief & c^a. Factors at Tellicherry that they may send to her as we Cannot and the Chief wrote a Letter to Captⁿ. Somner via Columbo, to know what Condition his ships in, and whether he intends to come to this Coast, as he Cannot go to the Cormondell Coast at this Season. THURS-
DAY 25.

THE Chief received a Letter from M^r. Hinde at Fort St. David with a General Letter for the Presidency, which he desired might be forwarded with all possible Expedition, he gives an acco^t. that the French Garrison of Pondicherry, with a train of Artillery had attackd Fort St. Davids on the 9th. Inst^t. that they drove about sixteen hundred sepoys as farr as the Garden House but on making a Sallie with about a hundred Europeans. The French retreated, with the utmost Precipitation, having left their Tents, and all their Baggage, behind them, That the Moors who had an Army of five thousand Horse, wou'd not join our Men or they woud entirely destroy'd them. The French lost about two hundred private Men & four Officers and our Loss was not above six Men killed and twenty wounded, That Captⁿ. Worth in the Houghton, anchor'd in the Road the 5th. Inst^t. and received an Order from the Deputy Governour to send his Packet ashore, but being inform'd by the Cattamaran fellows of the loss of Madrass, wrote ashore, that he woud go either to Batavia or Columbo & so weigh'd & sail'd or run away. THIS day Came here Crisna Annavy and the Dollava with whom the Chief had a long Conference about our Honible Masters Pepper Contract, who at last agreed to let the Merchants come & make the Contract of Eight hundred Candys three hundred of which to come from the Northward, and five hundred from the Southward but the Chief insisted that the last years ballance shou'd be paid in Pepper, and not included in the new Contract, which they agreed to. They likewise said that the Warr, with Changanaut is like to be renew'd, and that the King of Travencore desired to be supplied with a hundred barrels of Gunpowder twenty five Candy of Lead and five thousand flints, and that in Case we could not supply him with the whole quantity, that we woud write to Bombay for it and that we woud lend him two large Gunns. The Chief inform'd them that we have little or no powder to spare at present, nor did he believe the Presidency wou'd send that Quantity, the Honble Company having suffered greatly by that formerly sent down for his Majestys use great part of which remaining on our hands, and being Damaged, was lost on the *Augusta* as it was returning to Bombay to be new made, but however he woud send this request to the Presidency, as to Cannon we absolutely cou'd not spare any. They then requested that we woud let the King have five barrels of Gunpowder, five Candy of Lead and some Flints at present, The Chief told them he woud send them the resolution of the Council in the Evening.

January, Named the Centaur Mars. Brilliant, and St. Louis, which are four of the ships, which left that Coast the 18 Oct^r. and that on the 20th. Ult^o. he had not received either succour or advice from the English at Bengall, But that he had heard by a French

ship which arrived Pondicherry the 16th. Ult^o. from Bengall, that Commodore Griffin with Eight sail of Men of Warr lay ready to sail at Hingilee with two of our Honble Masters ships.

DISPATCH'D a Light Boat to Tellicherry with the above Letters & advice that two sail, were passing us, that their Colours seem White, but are at such distance that we cannot be Certain whether French or No, and that our Pattamars and servant at Brinjohn inform us that there are seven sail more astern on this Coast, which must have stop'd some where on the Coast or they must have been in sight at present.

SENT a General Letter to Mr. William Hatton forbiding him to Load any of the Honble Companys Cloth, till further Orders.

PASSED two ships more to the Northward, one with Dutch Colours and the other with Armenian Colours. Late last night the Chief receiv'd a Letter from one John Vass a Pilot of an Armenian Ship, advising that he had been chased by four French Ships on this Coast, and that there were ten sail in all a stern of him, but that all the Others were Dutch, Moors and Armenians ships, which Original Letter Mr. Bouchier immediately dispatch'd Express to Commodore Griffin under Cover to Mr. Hinde at Fort St. David.

SEVEN sail of ships appear'd from the southward, which stood directly for the Road, and we have advice from some of the Natives that they intend to attack this Place, Got all our People under Arms, and put ourselves in the best posture to.

DISPATCHED another Boat to Tellicherry, with what advices, we have reced of these ships, and that seven of them were a standing in directly for the Road. In the Evening, when the above seven ships were abreast of the Fort, they Continued their Course up the Coast without shewing any Colours.

FRIDAY
13

THE French ships being entirely out of sight this Morning we apprehended no further danger from them at Present here, so sent Orders to Mr. William Hatton to Load what Cloth he has ready on board the Lively schooner; and to give the Master of her orders to keep a good look out for fear of a surprize. Dispatch'd a Light Boat to Tellicherry to inform, the Gentlemen there, that the seven sail of ships (supposed to be French) having a favourable Gale last night had passed us, that the Fishermen who have been aboard them say, that six of them are French, and one Moors ship, which they Oblige to keep them Company & that they did not hoist their Colours thō they were the whole day in sight of our Flag. We gave them as our Opinion that shoud Captⁿ. Tedd be arrived at Telli-cherry, that it is very practicable for him to put off from thence, and he may have indirectly for this Place to take in his Loading, we also requested that they will send us a supply of Treasure as soon as possible, or all our business must be entirely stop'd, we also inform'd them that it is reported by the Natives that the French intend to attack them, which we hope is as false as the report of their Intentions on this Place. At two in the afternoon, we were greatly surprized seeing four sail astanding down directly for the road from the northw^d. and in an hour after saw Eight sail more right out at sea also a standing in directly for the Port On which sent an immediate Counter Order to Coletche, and put every man to his Post. The four sail from the Northward, proved Portugueze, which were bringing down a Bishop to reside here, and the other Eight sail were the French squadron, which cou'd not gett in till late at night, who anchor'd round the Portugueze, but being inform'd who they were, the French weigh'd with the Land Wind in the Morning and made away to the Northward. The Government did send some Men down to the sea side both to the Northward and southward of us but they were too few to have made any Resistance had the French attempted to Land, which looks as if his Majesty was not so Sanguine in our Honble Masters Interest as he would us beleive.

— FEBRUARY 1746-47 —

ONE of the Portugueze Officers, came ashore informd us that he had been aboard the French Commodore the night before and says that he beleives the Commodores ship may be of the size they told him Viz^t. 74 Gunnship, and they gave the following Acco^t. of themselves That their squadron consisted of two 74 & four 50 gunn ships, and were come to this Coast to look out for the English squadron commanded by Commodore Griffin, and seeing the Portugueze anchor in the road, and salute the Fort, they Concluded them to be English ships. The Portugueze was not a little nettled at the Insult of surrounding his ships, and ask'd them if they did not see the King of Portugalls Flag at his Mizen topmast head, and if it was usual for ships to salute a Fort under any Colours but those of their own nation.

SATURDAY
14

THIS afternoon the Portugueze Landed the Bishop of Cochin who Generally resides either here or at Mompoly.

THE Portugueze ships sail'd to the Northward and the French squadron are not gott out of sight, which we think they might have been had they made the best of their way as the Wind has been favourable.

SUNDAY
15

SENT Orders to Coletche to send the Honble Companys Cloth up with all Expedition, that we may have it packed ready to ship off shoud the Ilchester arrive.

MONDAY
16

IMPORTED ship Dragon from Bengall bound for Surat she has been six Weeks on her Passage, and brings no fresher advices then the William did.

TUESDAY
17

IMPORTED Ship Lynn Captⁿ. Charles Gilbert Commander belonging to our Honble Masters, she left Great Brittain the 26 July 1746 in Company with the Exeter, Princess Amelia, and Princess of Wales, The Princess Amelia parted Company with them in Latitude 5 North on the 13th. Sept^r. the other three went into the Cape, where he left the Exeter, she not being able to tur[n] out against a north wester, as the Lynnard Princess of [Wales] did, which last ship he parted

with on the 9th. December in the Latitude of 36. 42 south.

PASSED one ship with Moors Colours, one with Dutch Colours and two more which were so farr to the Southward that coud not see their Colours at sun sett.

They also advise of the Arrival there of our Honble Masters Ships, Severn, Warwick & Ilchester, the latter having a Packett Treasure, and stores for this Factory, which she will diliver here if they judge it safe from our Expected advices, she being Order^d to fill up here, This seems very Extraordinary after we have given them, the fullest information, that the French squadron was on this Coast, and as those three ships, cou^d be no match for the French Squadron, we shoud have immagined, they woud have sent them away directly to some place of safety, indeed we took the liberty of giving them our opinion in our Letter of the [Lacuna] Inst^t. that as the French squadron was passed to the Northward, that the Ilchester might have put off the Coast and Hall^d in for this Place again, to take in her Cargo, without any great risque They acknowledged the receipt of the Fort St. David General Letters for the Presidency and themselves, the former of which they will forward in a few days.

HAVING advice that about 1500 Pieces of Cloth of the Honble Companys is ready at Coletche, Order^d a nimble Vessell to go, and bring it up with all Possible Expedition, that we may gett it sorted & packed ready, in case the Ilchester Comes to receive it and sent M^r. Inst^t. they had come to a resolution of dispatching our Honble Masters ships Severn, Warwick and Ilchester to some port of Safety, till they hear further concerning of the Enemys squadron that they had Landed the stores and Treasure out of those ships. which they shoud forward as opportunity Offers, that they woud have sent us a Chest of Treasure by this Boat but the fellows being strangers.

they did not chuse to trust them. The Boat fellows say that they mett the French squadron the 25th. off Panany, and that the Honble Comp^{as}. ships, were gott little or nothing to the Northward of Tellicherry when they come away, however they can be in no great Danger, if they make the best of their way to the Northward, for most of the French ships seem to go heavy, & the same wind which prevents ours getting to the Northward prevents the French from coming up with them, had the Gentlemen at Tellicherry taken our advice and let the Ilchester put some distance off shore, and have hall'd in again for this Port, she might have taken her Cargo in with great safety, and have saved her passage home, where as at present none of the three ships can save their Passages.

ANOTHER of our advice Boats returned from Tellicherry with a General Letter of the 25th. informing us that they have not sent us any of our Treasure, as they dont' think it safe trusting it on any of these small Boats, but shall send it, when we send such Boats as we think it may be risqued on, having five chests there for this Factory. By private Letters we hear that our Honble Masters three ships were out of sight of Tellicherry the 24th. in the Morning, and the French squadron was between Tellicherry, and Callicutt the 26th. in the Morning.

THE King of Travencore being Come to Cheringa, sent a message to the Chief to let him know, that he intended to call here to morrow to Consult him about the Present posture of affairs.

THE King of Travencore came here, and had a long Conference with the Chief, in which he gave him the strongest assurances of his Attachment to the Honble Companys Interest, and that he had not only absolutely refused the French his Consent to attack this Place, but that he had told them as he now assures us that shou'd they make any attempt upon this Place; he wou'd bring down the whole force of his Country to assist us against them, His Majesty being going to the Northward, against Changanaut, requested, that we woud lend him one of our Great Guns, thirty Double headed shott for it, and ten Barrels of Gun powder.

On the Chiefs informing his Majesty what the Council had agreed to he seem'd dissatisfied that we wou'd not lett him have more than five Barrels of Gunpowder, and made many pretences to gett tenn Barrels, but the Chief used all the arguments he cou'd think of to Convince him how dangerous it woud be for us to part with our Gunpowder when we dont know how soon we may be attacked ourselves.

Companys Servants on the Fort St. George Establishment he brings advice that **13**
Governour Morse & his Council (Mr. John Savage excepted) are released upon
their Parole, that Governour Morse & family are at Tranquibar, Mr. William
Monson gone for Europe on a Danes ship and Mr. John Stratton & family gone to
Bengall. The Chief received a Letter from John Hinde Esq^r. advising that the
Princess Amelia Captⁿ. Thomas Best had fallen indirectly with Madrass on the
16th. Febry & the Captⁿ. had carried his Packet ashore and had been prevaild on
to give an Acco^t. of the sicklyness and weakness of his ships Company, on which
they sent of a party of Men and took the ship, and that they boast much of the
quantity of Treasure and the secretts they have gott in our secret Comittees
Instructions. Mr. Hinde dispatchd these Pattamars in hopes they might overtake
some of our homeward bound ships that our Honble Masters may have timely notice
to Countermand any orders which may prove prejudicial by being known by the
Enemy. He Complains much of having received no succour either from the Kings
Ships or from Bengall.

Inst^t. from John Hinde Esq^r. advising that on the 1st. Inst^t. a Body of 1200 French **15**
Forces came to attack Fort St. David, but a party of one hundred of our
Europeans, and two hundred Topasses has prevented them passing Penny River the
whole Day, But it being thought proper to recall them into the Fort at night, The
French had got possession of the Garden House, and were making Preparation to
beseige them inform, when in the Morning Mr. Griffin appear'd with Eight sail
of Men of Warr, on sight of which the French retreated with the utmost Expedi-
tion, leaving their ammunition &c^a. behind the second time. That Commodore
Griffin had dispatchd Lord Northesk, and Captain Stevens to retake the Princess
Amelia He had also demanded Madrass of the Government in the same state as
the French Took it, and that he seemd fully determined to resent the Injuries
our Nation has lately suffer'd. He advises also that they had Come to a Resolu-
tion to dispatch the Brittainia for Europe in hopes of her saving her passage th^o
late in the same. He acknowledged the receipt of the Chiefs Letters of the 9th.
& 13th. ult^o. advising of the arrival of the French squadron on our Coast, He says

that he knows that our settlements are safe, and hopes that our Honble Masterships may Escape them, it woud be a great satisfaction to be Certain that our Settlements are safe, as we have so large a quantity of goods both here and at Tellicherry.

19 THE Adagary of Cherringa brought the Chief an Ola from Crisna Annavy in which he says, that his Majesty is highly displeasd that he was refused the tenn Barrels of Gunpowder he ask'd for, and now desires that we will send him eight barrels of Gunpowder one of our large 42 $\frac{1}{2}$ r. Guns, the shott &c^a. which was promised him.

ANSWER'D Crisna Annavys Ola, that cou'd we have spared any more Gunpowder, we shoud not have refused his Majesty, The six $\frac{1}{2}$ r. Gunn, Shott &c^a. which was promised the King to be Lent him shoud be diliver'd to his Majestys order, on giving an Obligation to Return the Gun, but as to the large Gunns on the Platform, it is not in our power to Lend them, so hoped his Majesty, wou'd not ask what was not in our power to Comply with.

January, They advise us that we shall recieve from Tellicherry, the twenty Candy of Lead—likewise the 5000 flints 25 Candy of Lead, and 50 barrels of Gunpowder, which we desired for the use of the King of Travencore, with which we may do as we proposed, The General Letter from Tellicherry informs us that as it was not thought proper to let the Bombay Grabbs come any lower than Mount Dilly, they had only received ten barrels of Gunpowder out of them for the use of this Factory, which shou'd be sent us with the other stores, The other forty Barrels being return'd to Bombay, that one of the French ships sail'd the night before, but as she sail'd in the Night, they know not which way she was gone, but the Chief has advice of her being at Callicutt a taking in masts, Timber, Plank, Cables & Coir Cordage, with the utmost Expedition. They also inform us, that Eight Men formerly belonging to the Princess Mary had made their Escape from the French and arrived Tellicherry.

30 THE Chief received a Letter from John Hinde Esq^r. at Fort St. David of the 14th. Inst^t. advising that they remain'd in the same state as when he last wrote on the 4th. Inst^t. but that he had received Letters from the Nabob, his sons, and all the Men of Consequence at Arcott, with Offers of their service against the

French. Our ships of Warr have not been able to retake the Princess Amelia she laying in so close under the Guns of Madrass, but that they had brought in a ship with Dutch Colours, mann'd with French Men and Loaded with Provisions for Pondicherry.

That the Enemy do not only throw Bombs & Granadoes, but other machines, which had sett some of their own Works on fire and done him no damage."

Our Gunner having been very long indisposed with sore Eyes, and it being the Opinion of the Doctors that there is no room left to Expect, that he can ever recover his sight, AGREED to dispatch a Pattamar to Tellicherry with a General Letter to the President & Council of Bombay desiring that they will send us a Capable man to supply his Place and also requested that they will send us a speedy supply of money or we shall be in the greatest distress, and not be able to Carry on our Investments.

— JULY 1747 —

Wrote also to the Gentlemen at Tellicherry requesting that they will spare us their Gunners mate till we are supplied with a man from Bombay, and sent them their account current with this Factory, desiring they will compare our account current with their Books, and return it adjusted as soon as they can Conveniently, that we may be able to close our Books for the year.
