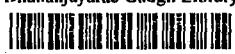

[1st August 1747 to 31st

— AUGUST 1747

Diary & Consultation Book of Richard Bouchier Esqr. Chief &ca. Factors for affairs of the Hon^{ble}. United East India Company at Anjengo agreeable to the Establishment approved by the Hon^{ble} William Wake Esqr. President and Governour of Bombay &ca. Council.

PASSED a Ship farr out in the Offing and not knowing of what Nation she was, sent off a Boat to try if we could gett any News from her, she proved to be a Dutch Ship called the Crabendyke from Trankonomally bound for Columbo, and cou'd not give us any news at all our Boat did not return till the 2^d. in the Morning. SATURDAY 1st.

RECEIVED an Ola from Crisna Annavy, and the Dollava in the Kings name, desiring another supply of twenty Barrels of Gunpowder, and fifty large shott for the 42 p^r. Gun lent his Majesty. FRIDAY 7.

SATURDAY 15. OUR Pattamar despatched the 20th. May returned from Fort St^t. David with a Packet for Tellicherry, but not a single Line for this Settlement, which is something Extraordinary, after detain^g. them near three Months Despatchd a fresh pair of Pattamars with the Tellicherry Letters, and desired the Gentlemen there to send us what intelligence, they have received, as we are not favour'd with any from Fort St^t. David.

UESDAY 18. Received an Acco^t. from Xavier Poola Perez and Phillip de Soza who were sent to Cotata to Examine the Chittys Accounts. That they have now ready and in the Washermens hands the follow^g. cloth viz^t.

— AUGUST 1747 —

THE Chief received a Letter from Callicutt, enclosing the Honble the Secret Committees Commands p swift Snow which imported Fort St. David the 17th. June, but no advices from the Cormondell Coast Except that two French Privateers (named the Angelsea & Apollo) ha[ve] been Cruizing off the Cape of good Hope, but have left that station. On the 16th. Ult^o. a French Sloop imported Mahie from the Islands and on the 22^d. a French Ship directly from Europe having stay'd only four days at the Mauritius, they give out that a Spanish squadron, had fallen in with Eleven of our ships bound for India and had taken and distroyd they [sic] all which God Avert, and send them speedily to Support our distress'd Settlements in India. There is a report come from Goa of an English Europe Ship being lost somewhere between Garia and Goa, and that Sixty Men are saved, but as it is come in such doubtful terms, it is to be hoped it is false.

PASSED a Dutch Ship in the Offing which saild from Batavia the 27th. July N.S; she gave us no News, but that the Dutch were still Neuter.

ARRIVED a Toney from Tellicherry with Mr. Josiah Farrin their Gunners second Mate; who had Orders to Examine all the Gunners Stores. and to see that they are in proper order for use.

RETURNED one of our Pattamars from [Fort] St. David, with a General Letter of the 10th. Inst., acknowledging the text of ours of the 29th. June, and 9th. July. They advise that our Honble Master's Ship Bombay Castle, was arrived there, that she had been detain'd near three Months in the Cape, by the Apollo and Angle[sea] which were Cruizing off that Port, she Came last from Bencoolen where the Norfolk had been, & was saild for China, upon Intelligen[ce] that Banjarr her consign'd Port, was blocked up by the Dutch who wou'd not permit any English Ship to go there. That the Severn would be ready to sail in Eight Days for Great Britain and that they had forwarded our Packett to Bombay. We have also advice by private Letters of the safe Arrival of the Hought[on] and Exeter in Bengall, the former having been twice at Bencoolen. We are also inform'd that Governour Morse and Mr. William Percival are Exchanged for Mons^r. Leyrit Director of Bengall and Mons^r. Le Riche Chief of Carracall, who were seized by our People, as they were passing over Land to Pondicherry, and that Commodore Griffin is still at Fort St. David a Collecting all his Force and had taken three of our Honble Masters Ships under his direction Viz^t. & the Warwick, Ilchester, and Bombay Castle, having received Intelligence that the French expect a force of fourteen sail of Ships to Come to the relief of Pondicherry.

RETURNED the Tellicherry Toney which brought down Josiah Farrin with a General Letter to the Chief & Factors there, desiring they will supply us with twenty thousand rupees, but if they can't spare us so much, to send us ten thousand, only, as we are in great want of Money to Carry on the Honble Companys Investments.

THE Weather being fair and the surff moderate and the Bank[sall] being full of Pepper at Eddova sent for part of it away, and this Evening received Pepper

RECEIVED a very Pressing Ola from the Chittys for more money that being greatly in advance for the Honble Company, they say that they have upwards of two thousand Pieces of the new Contract ready, and that they cannot keep the Weavers, nor comply with their Contract, if they are not supplied with money.

Passed a Dutch Ship called the Sparingrijk from Batavia to Columbo Captⁿ. **MONDAY**
 Hennannus Schutte who advised the Chief, that when he left Batavia July the 20th. **7.**
 NS, that two of our Honble Masters Ships were saild for China, and that he left
 four in Batavia road; and that he met the Norfolk in the Straights of Sunda.

Arrived a Toney from Tellicherry, with a General Letter [f]rom thence of the **THURSDAY**
 4th. Inst, advising that the Bonetta Sloop was arrived there from Bombay, bound **10.**
 for Bengall, which was to land some Stores for this Factory, which shou'd be for-
 warded in a few days, under the Care of Captⁿ. Forbes, who is order'd to take
 the Command of Captⁿ. Thomas Mostyns Company here, the latter being Order'd
 to take Capt. Fishers post at Tellicherry. Received a General Letter from the Presi-
 dency of the 21st. Ult^o. & Duplicate of the 9th. June, [the Original not being come
 to hand]. The Duplicate of the General Letter of the 9th. of June, advises that P
 Ship Dragon was sent for the use of this Factory, Gunpowder Lead, and Flints but
 that Ship having passed this Port, she must have carried them to Bengall, where
 we hear she is arrived, They also Acknowled[ge] the receipt of our several Letters
 of the 23^d. Febry, 26th. March, and 7th. April. They approve of our sending all
 the Intelligence we received of the Enemy to Fort St. David and Tellicherry, and
 direct us to Continue the same. They approve of our taking the two Ches[ts] of
 Duccatoons out of the Lynn. The General Letter from th[e] Presidency of the
 21st. ult^o. Acknowledges the receipt of our dispatch of the 20th. May. The large
 Anchors we sent for, and what Gunns they Coud spare were sent P Ilchester, and
 are at Tellicherry to be sent after the Rains. By the Bonetta Sloop they have
 sent us such Part of the Stores, we indented for, as said sloop cou'd ta[ke] to be
 sent us from Tellicherry, But Observe that by our not sending them, such a Cal-
 culate as they order'd, of what money we shou'd want, for the Currency of our
 business they are at [a L]oss to know how much we realy stand in need of. which is
 a little surprizing as we have not had a rupee remitted for Purchasing the 22000
 Pieces of Cloth, Order'd this Season, nor on the Acco^t. of the new Contract for
 Pepper But the Gentlemen at Tellicherry have orders to send us such a supply as
 they can spare. They also Order'd that we write a Letter to the Commodore & Coun-
 cil of Cochin Conformable to a Copy of a Notification Issued at Surrat on the same
 Purport as the Letter we received in May from the Commodore & Council of Cochin.
 Receivd the Presidents Commission for Cap^t. Thomas Mostyn to Comand Captⁿ.
 Thomas Fishers Company at Tellicherry, Capt. Rodrick Forbes being appointed to
 Command the [Military] at this Factory Order'd us to aply to Tellicherry for what
 [...] we are in want of. Advise us of a French Ship [supposed to be the Princess
 Mary] being lost at Gogo as she was laying ashore to Clean, but that her Crew which
 Consisted of 150 Europeans, and 50 Blacks were saved, which with what Effects
 they had wou'd be transported to Surrat in boats hired for that purpose.

— SEPTEMBER 1747 —

WEDNESDAY 16. THE Chief received a Letter from one Captⁿ. Lawrence Price Comm^r. of a Country Ship, sent ashore at Quilone, in which he informs him that he left Surrat the 2^d. Inst^t. for Bengall & that he had received advice from Governour Wake, that the two French Privateers were a Cruizing off the Port of Bombay, that they were under the Greatest Anxiety for our Hoſible Masters Ships Portfield & Anson, which were hourly Expected from Moco and Persia, a Country Ship being Arrived Bombay which brings advice that the Anson, was to sail in thirty hours after him from Gombroon, and it is reported that they have taken one Country Ship from Bombay bound for Surrat, and Bengall. He also gives an Acco^t. that a severe Famine rages at Surat.

FRIDAY 18. ARRIVED Captⁿ. Roderick Forbes, who is appointed to Command the Military here in the room of Captⁿ. Thomas Mostyn, he brought with him a short General Letter from the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry advising that they had sent us Two Chests of Treasure of Rupees twenty thousand, and our Stores received from the Presidency, but as three Sail of French Ships appear'd in sight, they thought proper to dispatch the Vessells without any Acc^t. particulars, and that they woud send the Invoice afterwards by a Toney.

SATURDAY 19. LANDED all the Stores, and Orderd the Vessells to gett in a readiness to carry up Captⁿ. Thomas Mostyn and his Family but the Weather proving dirty they were Obliged to harbour in the River.

THURSDAY 24. EARLY in the Morning Saw a sail standing right in for the Land, but it blowing hard, and the Cu[rr^t.] seting strong to the Southw^d.; she soon drove out of sight.

SATURDAY 26. RECEIV'D advice from Brinjohn that on the 24th. they saw two sail farr [sic] out in the Offing a standing to the Southward.

MONDAY 28. HAVING had dirty Weather ever since the Arrival of the Tellicherry Vessells, which being now pretty well over they halted out of the river, and Captⁿ. Thomas Mostyn with his Family embarqued for Tellicherry.

This Evening Arrived a Toney from Tellicherry with a General Letter of the 17th. Inst^t. Enclosing Invoice of Treasure, & Stores sent us by Captⁿ. Forbes, which had been sent sooner but they were entercepted by some of Cota Marcars people scizing a Munchua belonging to Tellicherry, which had Obliged them to send out & retake her which was efected [sic] but as it happen'd in sight of the three French Ships, they sent out four of their Boats Man'd & Arm'd, but might prevented [sic] any Mischief, and they have the boat & six fellows Prisoners, and three were killed in attempting to make their Escape. They desire that we will dispatch their Boats (which were dispatch'd before the arrival of their Letter) and promise to return our Acco^t. Current with that Factory as soon as they have adjusted it.

— SEPTEMBER 1747 —

This Morning arrived a Tony from Tellicherry with a General Letter directed to the Governour of Fort St. David, and the Chief has advice that the three French Ships left Mahie the 20th. Inst^t. and stood to the Southward, which probably were the Ships seen here & at Brinjohn the 24th. Dispatch'd a Pattamar to Fort St. David with the Tellicherry Letter to Governour Floyer, & the Chief advised Commodore Griffin of the departure of these, three ships. As Noon Arrived another Toney from Tellicherry with advice that on the 27th. Ult^o. The Two French Privateers had seizd a Dutch Ship which Came out of Bombay bound for Surat, upon which the President, sent a Number of Boats to the Westward to inform any of our Ships of the Enemies Station. On the 1st. Inst. the Portfield belonging to our Honble Masters had Certainly fallen in to their hands had it not fallen Calm which gave the Boats an oppertunity of towing her into Basseen, But Capt^a. Foulis in the Anson was not so fortunate Capt^a. Debadie having detain'd the Boats so long that they had only time to inform Capt^a. Foulis of his danger and to receive his Treasure & Packets before the Apollo of fifty Guners Engaged here, The Engagement lasted two hours when the Ansons riging & sails being shott all to pieces she surrender'd having lost but three Men, & the French Confess they lost six and had twenty wounded, and both her Mainmast and Bowsprit being wounded, obliged them to quit their Cruiz and proceed to Goa, where they strip'd Capt^a. Foulis and his People and turned them ashore to the Number of one hundred & twenty Men, one of the Privateers remains at Goa with the St^t. Louis which is not yett fitted. The other Privateer with the Anson and the Dutch Ship she seized Arrived Mahie the 26th. Inst^t. it is said that the Anson parted with the Heathcote in the Latitude of 27^o South in the Middle of April last, but as yet we have no Acco^t. of her.

Received advice that the King of Travencore had taken Changanauts Quilone by storm, which he has beseiged near Eight Months, and that the young Prince had retreated into the Dutch Fort at Quilone.

John Carmichael Gunner of this Place, who has been incapable of his Duty almost six Months past by being Blind, sent an impertinent Letter to the Chief this day demanding a servant to be allowed him, to which the Chief gave no Answer he being very busy dispatching the Pattamars to Fort St. David and Boats to Tellicherry.

Being Muster Day John Carmichael Gunner sent his Muster Role to the Chief with a servant for himself enroled, which the Chief orderd to be struck out, on which the Gunner sent the Chief an insolent Message that he wou'd not sign the Muster role as he was not permitted to add a servant.

The Chief laid before the board the Gunners Letter of the 30th. past, and informed the board of his Insolence yesterday, and likewise, that what has caused all this impertinence, which was that last Month the best Topasses in the Gunroom desired to quit, and to be entertaind in the Military the Cause of which being enquired into by the Chief, and why no Cooleys will enter on the Gunroom, he found that the Gunner kept them so hard at work a distilling of Arrack and about other his own business, that they had no time to themselves, upon which the Chief order'd that they shou'd do the Honble Companys Duty & no other and being inform'd by the Storekeeper that the Gunner (who has been blind near six Months) had notwithstanding kept a great quantity of the Gunners stores at his own house, where they were lyable to much embezelment, and is breach of Duty. he was order'd by the Chief (as he would not obey the Storekeepers orders) to return them to their proper place in the Gunroom. This affair being taken into Consideration & finding that

there are great diffiencys in the Gunners Stores thro his Negligence, in particular in the Gunpowder, we think it proper to suspend him, & have appointed Mr. Josiah Farrin provisional Gunner till a person shall be appointed from the Presidency, and orderd the Gunner[s] Letter to be enterd, as he desires, after this Consultation.

I wrote Yesterday to the Chief according to the following Copy [to] desire a servant which my Honble Masters allow me as Gunner of Anjengo.

Worshipfull Sir.

My Honble Masters allow a servant to the Gunner of this Place, since I have been here I have had a Cooley from Each Guard, and paid them for the time they were to be off Duty, which were but equal to one Man, these you have been pleased to take from me, which is very hard at this Juncture there is now too wanting on our Role I desire you will allow me to enter one for my servant. Yesterday I had no Answer to the above, but this Morning he told Mr. Farrin that the Fellow meaning me thought to Bully him out of a servant, but there was no Occasion for that Expression there being no need for Bullying for what my Hoñble Masters Allow me which is a European servant, and a Topass Cook As an Addition to my Lieutenants pay I therefore now apply to this Board for redress, and must further beg Leave to take notice to you of some things very Determental [*sic*] to the service of my Hoñble Employers in whose Interest I have Concern Viz^t. I was sent down here Gunner by the Hoñble the President and Council of Bombay, and thought to have had the Command of the People belonging to the Artillery as was due to my Station but Contrary to my Expectation and all form of Garrison Rules the right of Command was never admitted me but the Direction of the Artillery people was given unto the Military Lieutenant and Ensign as I can by many Instances ma[ke it] appear and further the Gunners Mates and People, who ought to have been employed in Learning their Duty at Exercise, and fiting up Stores for the defence of the Place, were employed about Caulking, Rigging and [...]ling the Chiefs vessels, and them that were left on shore were at Picking Oakem making spun yarn, making and mending sail and Cleaning the Fort &c^a. Drudges I mention Cleaning the Fort because no Gunners People was ever heard of being employd in the like service before, and it is well known the Hoñble Company pay monthly a scavenger and six Pallanqueen Cooleys for that Purpose, I was orderd to Exerci[se] the Military People to fire the Gun, but as I thought it foreign from my Duty I took not much care about them but leave that to their own Officers to perform, I could say much more to this import but let this suffice to shew my Honble Masters, what they Expect from such Management in time of Warr as for myself thò I have had great reason of uneasiness given me since I have been here, yet if any thing hapens by Attack on this Place, I will do all I can to defend it, but if they

want Experienced Men to Manage the Guns, which I judge to be our Chief Dependance I shall be blameless, as I have many times spoke to the Chief for more men but had none thô their was a good Number entered in the Military, nay when there was two Topasses, wanting in the Gunroom they supplied them from the Military, but such Worthless Fellows, that there is not such to be found in the Garrison besides yet were good enough for the Gun [room]. I desire this may be taken notice of, & Enter'd [in our] Consultations as I shall write Copys to send myself. I am with great respect.

Anno 1743, the Gunners pay stands, 51.2. John Carmichael has had [the] same pay ever since he has been at this Place, also [never] demanded any more till now, what he means by his Lieutenants pay and an allowance for a Cook, he must explain, what Command this Man wanted I know not, he had always, the Command of the Gunroom [Crew] as is plain from the bad Use he made of it as P Consultation, Indeed he once had an impertinent dispute with the Military Officer, about who shou'd Command (under the Chief) in the Fort in time of Action which he carried so farr that the Chief was Obliged to silence him As to the Dirt thrown at the Chief in saying, that the Gunroom [crew] were Employed about his Vessells when they shou'd have been learning their Duty is absolutely false as Every Man in the Place can testifie when any Vessel has been sent to bring the Companys Cloth, or as Guard Vessells, where it has been necessary to have an European, on [sic] of the Gunners mates, has been order'd on that service, and not one of the Gunners Mate or Crew ever struck a stroke, with a Caulking Mallet, but in this last Rains, when the Gunner was blind, which proves his Assertion to be downright Malice, nor did they Ever neglect one hours Duty on that or any other business of the Chief. As to [Sweeping] the Fort the Gunroom Cooleys always did it, and do it now, [and] is Ended before [...] a Clock in the Morning, and they do no other Durdgery that I know of. The Gunner was often Order'd by the Chief to Excercise both the Gunners Crew, and off Guard Military with a Field Piece and I had a Butt built for that Purpose, which he is weak enough to declare he neglected, though he says at the same time, that our great Gunns are our Chief security, But his abominable Pride wou'd not permit him to do his Duty, without having the Chief Command of the Place, Upon a strickt scrutiny it is now found that two of the Gun room Crew, are the Gunners own servants one being his slave, which with the Drudgery he has Obliged the Others to do, is the sole reason that we can gett no good Men to enter in the Gunroom, and those who are there wanted to quit the service, and to gett into the Military. To Conclude this [wa]s a very troublesome fellow, while he had his Eyes and is much worse now he is become useless.

and as our Honble Maste[rs] are Authorized to carry on their trade by his Present

Marucob, that on the 2^{d.} they saw several Vessells in the Offing, but Cou'd not
distinguish, what they were, and on the 3^{d.} they heard many Gunns Fired off Mount-
dilly they judged they must have Attacked the French, but cannot guess who they
can be, as it is Earlier then usual for Angrias Fleet to be out. The 5^{th.} Mate and
Gunner of the Anson arrived the 3^{d.} Inst^{t.}, at Tellicherry from Mahie, where the
French brought them to Condemn the ship, but the Gentlemen at Mahie wou'd not
have any hand in Condemning the Dutch Ship. It is said that Shaw Nadir is at last
cutt off by his own subjects which has put that Kingdom in such Confusion that

THIS Morning came ashore tenn of the George Snows People and the Commander Cap^t. Thomas Wadham sent a Verbal message to the Chief to inform him that, he had been assaulted & wounded the night before by some of his seamen, it being dark he cou'd not tell who it was that wounded him, but that he knew three of those who Attacked him, whose names are viz^t. Joseph Featon, Samuell Tucker, and John Shaw, which he desired might be Confined The Chief Confined the three ring leaders close prisoners, and Confined the Others upon Guard till the Cap^t. can Come ashore. THURSDAY
12.

CAPT^N. Thomas Wadham sent his Doctor Samuell Harmston to the Chief, with a message requesting that five of his Men viz Samuell Gerard, John Smith, Joseph Crassy, Edward Palmer and John Malloy, might be Examined, for what reason they had left the ship, and if they appeared innocent, as he beleived them to be of the assault on his Person, that they might be sent aboard to their Duty. as he beleived they had only been drawn in to leave the Ship by the Instigation of the others. But as Peter Cunningham Gunner of the Vessell had join'd them, he did not think proper to receive him aboard. The following five Seamen viz^t. Samuell Gerard, John Smith, Joseph Crassy, Edward Palmer and John Malloy belonging to the George Snow being Examined before the Chief, Samuell Harmston Surgeon and Richard Damon Maté of said snow being present, first, as to their leaving the vessell they could give no reason but very trifling ones such as not having their Victuals in due time, when the Vessell was a Cleaning, but they all Confessed that they had never been shorten'd in their Allowance the whole Voyage. They declared their Innocence in assaulting and Wounding the Capt^a. but Smith, Crassy and Malloy Confess'd that they saw Joseph Featon Samuell Tucker, and John Shaw, Assault (or as they called it Hustle) the Captⁿ., but they did not see any body stab him, that they did not assault the Boatswain, nor woud they Confess who did. but Edward Palmer, seem'd to prevaricate very much. June & 27 July & 12 Sep^r. We are order'd to give the Ilchester (when she Arrives) her Loading in Cloth and Pepper, agreeable to her Charter party and as much more Pepper as the Captⁿ. will Engage to take at half frieght, and to dispatch her for Great Brittain, the Chief giving her the Private Instructions he has reced from the President. On this Boat Arrived Mr. William Holland who is appointed Gunner of this Fort in the room of John Carmichael. The Amount of the two Chests of Duccatoons taken out of the Lynn Captⁿ. Charles Gilbert is rupees fifteen thousand three hundred, and forty six, two quarters and twenty seven ræs. An Ensign will be sent when a proper Conveyance offers, to supply the place of Mr. Joseph Cheesbrough.

- THURSDAY 14.** RECEIV'D a Letter from Brinjohn advising that a Ship appearing to the Southward last Night, our Cruizing Vessell went off to Enquire what Ship it is.
- FRIDAY 15.** RECED advice from Brinjohn that a Moors Boat from Porvear had been a board the above mentioned Ship and gives the following Account of her, that She is a large French Ship carrying Seventy Guns & a great Number of Men on board, that she had seized our Boat and Continued [*sic*] our People.
- RECEIV'D another Letter from Brinjohn advising that the above Ship kept Cruizing off Brinjohn, and that she was joind by another Ship.
- SATURDAY 16.** PASSED the Road a Large Ship with Dutch Colours, she seems deep Loaden, and to have July Topmasts—The Chief employ'd a Moorman to go on board the French Ship to gett a particular Acco^t. of their force, and Number of Men.
- BY Private Letters from Cochin, received advice of Commodore Pallets Arrival at Batavia with three sail of the Kings Ships and five of the Honble Companys.
- THE Chief dispatch'd advices to Fort St. David and Tellicherry of the French Ships Cruizing off Brinjohn.
- SUNDAY 17.** OUR Boat returned which had been on board the French Ship gives the following Account. That taking to be an English Ship he carried his Letter on board, which they took from him & confined the Marcar by himself, and the Cooleys apart, that there is but one Ship, the other mention'd from Brinjohn being a Dutch Ship from Bengall, bound for Cochin, which they had Examined, and let her go, That the French Ship Keeps Cruizing off Brinjohn, is a Ship of two Fire of Gunns, has about one hundr[ed] fifty Europeans aboard, & a great Number of [Sepoy], that their Bread &c^a. Provisions is very bad, of which the People Complain'd while they, were on board, that they did not Maltreat them, and only enquired, if there were any Ships at Anjengo, or if they knew of any Expect, and that they had released them at 4 P.M. the 16th.
- MONDAY 18.** THIS Morning the Boat returned, which the Chief employed to bring an Account of the force of the French Ship and says that she has quitted her Cruiz, but this is not to be rely'd on, so the Chief sent down to the Southward for better Intelligence.
- WEDNESDAY 20.** Reced advice of a Ship seen off Brinjohn, but they can't give any Acco^t. of her.

And as no Bengall Ship or Vessell has yet appear'd on the Coast and our stock of Rice being also Low Desired that they will send us a thousand Robins of Rice.

DISPATCH'D a humble Vessell with a General Letter to the Chief &c^a. Factors at Tellicherry to the above Purport.

RECEIVED advice that the Ship seen yesterday off Brinjohn is supposed to be a Maccao Man, some of the Natives having been on board and not only reported her to be a Portugueze from Maccao, but they brought ashore some Empty Jarrs, they had gott in truck for their trempery, which they carried a board. This afternoon receiv'd a further Confirmation that she is a Maccao Man, but that she is fallen down to the Southward, and I suppose invited by the King of Travencores Ministers to buy Pepper immediately dispatch'd, a light schooner, with a Detachment of Military, and Boats to Attend her to prevent the Pepper being carried off.

THURSDAY 21.

RECEIVED advice from Brinjohn that the Maccao Ship is at Anchor at Vallovella a Port about three or four Leagues to the Southward of Brinjohn.

FRIDAY 22.

IMPORTED the St. Louis from Maccao, which brings an Account that there were at Canton this Season twenty three Ships of which Eight belong'd to the Hoñble English East India Company, the Rest were Dutch, Sweeds, and Danes, but no French Ships, he gave an Acco^t. of a large Ship he saw yesterday in the Offing off Brinjohn but he out sail'd her Considerably.

SATURDAY 23.

THIS Morning a Large Ship appear'd off the Port a working into the road under English Colours. The Chief sent off a Boat with a Letter to the Commander, to know what ship it was, which Boat they detain'd till the Ship Anchor'd in the road, but out of Gunn shott and a good mile to Leeward of the Portugueze Ship, and then sent our Boat with one of his Officers, and three Armed Men on board the Portugueze Ship, of which the Chief receiving advice (from some of our own People who were on board the Portugueze Ship) that they were French Men and Enquiring of the Portugueze about the Place, the Chief immediately sent off a Boat with a Detachm^t. of Military to entercept them in their return and to bring the Boat & People ashore, and after her sent another larger Boat with a stronger Detachment to sustain her in case the ship should attempt to rescue them, but they did not, and our People brought our Boat with one of the French Lieutenants, & three other men ashore without Bloodshed. The French Captain sent a Bullying Letter to the Portugueze Captain telling him that in Case his Officer and People were not return'd in two hours, that he wou'd sink the Portugueze, but he thought better of it, Weigh'd and stood to the Southward.

SUNDAY 24.

THIS Day return'd a pair of our Pattamars from Fort St. David with a Packet for Tellicherry, which was immediately dispatch'd by Boat, and in the Evening arrived another pair with a General Letter for this Factory, from Fort St. David, advising as follows By a Dutch Ship from Mallacca they had advice that Commo-do[re] Poulet with three Ships of his Majestys and five belonging to the Hoñble

Company, passed Malacca the 12 Nov^r. and by a [Ketch] which Arrived the 4th. Inst^t. from Bengall, they were informed that she saw nine Ships off Point Palmiras the 20th. Ult^o. that on the 6th. Inst^t. Monsieur Duplex (Governour of Pondicherry) having collected all the Force he could, encamp'd about three Miles from their Bounds, and that they Expected to be Attacked that night, but as they were a preparing for an Attack in the Morning Commodore Griffin coming in sight, with four of his Majestys Ships they retreated to Pondicherry. They suppose that the French had about one thousand Europeans, besides a great Number of Topasses, Sepoys and Coffreys. That the George Snow imported there the 30th. December.

1st.

THIS Evening the Chief Reced advice from Callicutt that on the 28th. Ult^o. The Bombay & Restoration Grabs arrived at Tellicherry with the Anjengo Sloop intended for this place, He also Reced advice from the S^o.ward that Yesterday a large French Ship Anchored near the Shoar in Coletche road and another small Ship anchored farr out, and that the large Ship fired 9 Guns when she anchored.

THE Chief immediately dispatch'd a man to Coletche to gett an Acco^t. of all the French transactions there, with orders to send a Fishing boat aboard the small Ship to get an acco^t. whether she is a French Ship or a Prize taken by the other.

TUESDAY
2^d.

RECED Advice, that upon one of y^e. French Tonys going aboard, the Captⁿ. landed and desired that they wou'd procure him Wood, Water and Provisions, which they immediately set about, that Pocathosa a Moorman & y^e. Arriall waited on the Captⁿ. & that they had wrote for Chevadona Pula to come there, who was to set out from Coccalany as on this Morning.

THE Chitty sent an Ola to y^e. King of Travencore setting forth the unreasonable-ness of this proceeding of his to furnish our Enemys with Water and Provisions to enable them to Continue their Cruize upon our Trade, without which they must have quitted their Stations that he might be sure that it would be highly resented both by the Government of Bombay and the Hoñble Company at home. This being but a very Ill Return for all the favours y^e. Hoñble Company had done His Majesty, in assisting him with Stores &c^a. not only to enable him to subdue his Enemys, but also to make Conquests, hoping and requesting that his Majesty wou'd forbid his Ministers giving any further Assistance to our Enemys, which wou'd be the surest method to preserve y^e. friendship which had so long Existed between him & the Hoñble Company.

WEDNES-
DAY 3^d.

RECEIVED advice from Coletche that the St^t. Louis continues here a purchasing of Provisions, but that the other ship which they had supposed to be a French Ship was a small Dutch Ship which was bound to Columbo.

THURS-
DAY 4th.

RECED Advice from Coletche that St^t. Louis continues there and that Chevadona Pula has been on board with a Present of a Dear and some fruit, and that they saluted him with 9 Gun[n] when he came on board & the same N^o. when he went ashore.

FRIDAY
5th.

Received an Ola from Gristna Anavy & y^e. Dullova by the Kings Order as they say to the following purport. That a French Ship Anchored in Coletche y^e. 5th. of y^e. Mallabar present Month. sent Four Officers ashore; who by the hands of the Adeyary had sent a Lre to his Majesty to y^e. following purport. We arrived of the Port of Anjengo where there was riding a Portugueez Ship we sent a boat aboard said Ship with 4 Men for Enquiry who she was, which were seized by the English in their Return and Carried Prisoners to the Fort. We now Request that thro' your Majestys means we may have these men Returned. But if this cannot be accomplished, We will land and Attack that Fort [w^h.] your Majesty must not take amiss, and we expect an Answer to one of these before sunsett y^e. 6th. Inst. To which his Majesty wrote them that he woud let them know what answer he reced from Anjengo. His Majesty has ordered us to write y^e. Commodore that the Hoñble C^o. has no Advantage from these 4 Prisoners, which can only cause Contention, so if

y^{er}] will send the King y^e. 4 Prisoners he can return them, and then his Majesty can be of Service shou'd they come with a Force to Land, which his Majesty suspects may happen, as this occurs to our thoughts. We thought it proper to advice y^e. Commodore, This is our Opinion as well a[s] his Majestys.

As this is a trifle, it is not necessary to make it a thing of Consequen[ce] and if you want People y^e. King can send some Europeans as he has done before. The Commodore may send y^e. 4 Prisoners by the Bearer of this and then his Majesty can return them, which will enable us to Obtain any favour from his Majesty.

Copy of an Ola in Answer to the King of Travencores Ola of y^e. 5th. Febr^y SATURDAY
1747/[8]. 6TH.

I sent your Majesty an Ola y^e. 2^d. Inst. complaining of the kind reception I heard that a French Ship had mett with at Coletche and of the Quantity of Provisions they had been supplied with besid[es] Wood and Water, to enable them to Continue their Cruiz upon our Trade and Remonstrated to your Majesty how ill this wou'd be taken by [my] Hoñble Employers, who had Espoused your Majestys Int^t. upon [all] Occasions.

As to the French Letter y^r. Majesty is pleased to say y[ou] have Reced and desire my answer. I now give it you as follows. The [French] Cap^t. tells you he sent a boat with 4 Men aboard y^e Portugueez Ship and that I seized her in her return, but does not tell your Majesty that he came into this road under false Colours, and stole my boat wh^h. went aboard him as a friend and that I only took my own boat in which were 4 of his men armed. These 4 men I cannot deliver to your Majesty it not being the Custom of us Europeans. but they have had my promise for some days. that they shall be sent to Mahie, upon the terms we Europeans release our prisoners. I shoud be greatly suprised at their Insolence, in talking of Landing their Men in your Majestys Dominions and attacking this Place did I not know they were French men. I am under no concern about this place were their Force much superior to what it is. But as I have so many assurances under your Majestys own hand that you wou'd neither assist them nor permit them to land, I am greatly surprised that y^r. Majesty did not tell them peremptorily that an Attempt on any part of y^r. Dominions was an Affront to your Majesty, and as such you wou'd resent it. I had the more reason to have expected that your Majesty wou'd have given them this answer from what you have often told me, of the Ill treatment your Majesty has had from that Nation by flattering you with many fair promises of assisting you against your Enemys and never complying with any of them but it is the General Character of that Nation, to promise any thing for their own Advantage, but never to fulfill those promises. I never doubted y^r. Majestys capacity of supply^g. me with Men if Anjengo was Attacked nor can I doubt your Inclination of fulfilling the many promises you have given me to that purpose, but I am convinced [sic] that this Poultry Ship can never put me under a necessity of claming [sic] those promises &c^a.

By Private Letters y^e. Chief has advice that the Grabs and Rose Galley were to Return for Bombay the 4th. Inst^t. but as yet we have reced no publicq Acc^t. of their being at Tellicherry nor do we know what stores y^e. Vessell for this place may have brought down. 6TH.

ARRIVED three Toneyes from Tellicherry with Gen^l. Lres One from the Presidency and one from the Chief and Factors at Tellicherry, with Five Chests of Treasure q^{te}. Rupees Fifty thousand (R^s. 50000) sent down by y^e. Grabs for the use of this factory, they advise us that they had returned y^e. Grabs and Rose Galley for Bombay the 4th. Inst^t. and that they had detained the Anjengo Sloop, till we advise them that they may send her down with safety, they wou'd load on her such stores as they had there for this Factory and fill her up with rice and the remainder of Rice we wrote for shou'd be sent on Munchues. WEDNES-
DAY 10TH.

The General Letter from the Presidency informs us that none of our Dispatches since the 12th. Sept^r. have Reached Bombay but very justly impute it to y^e. Gentle- men at Tellicherry their neglect who had returned our Letters, as they had word from Callicut that we had dispatched the Ilchester abo^t. y^e. 12th. Dec^r.

They also inform us that they had sent down the Anjengo Sloop which was built for y^e. use of this Factory and Cost rupees seven thousand six hundred fifty eight. One quarter & forty six reas (Rs. 7658. 1. [46]) and that they had sent us Fifty thousand r^s. and what Stores cou'd be spared. That Mess^{rs}. W^m. Hornby & Rob^t. Fremoult were sent down to Assist in this Factory who were both Factors and that Mr. W^m. Hornby was to have a seat at this Board. That they had duly observed the Calculate of Cash sent them and that they had sen[t] us as much as they thought prudent to Risque at this juncture not doubting y^t. we have supplied ourselves out of any Europe Ship which may have arrived. They strenuously recomend to us to have our Cloth Invest^t. well compleated and likewise to provide as much [more] Cloth as is procurable, on the best terms we can thô no list of Invest[ment] is yet arrived, being well assured that it will be esteemed an acceptable service by our Hoñble Masters They also order that we send y[ou] as soon as possible an estimate of what money will be proper for the Current [S]eason, forwarding at the same time our Books, Diary & Consultations, Ordered that we return any Gunpowder or Stores that are grown unserviceable.

THURSDAY 11TH. THIS Morning at Day light saw two sail of Ships at Anchor hull bearing about S^o. in which Position they remained the whole day, at noon appear'd another sail standing to the Northward, which passed farr out in the Offing with a Tack on her Ensign Staff, with a jury Maintopma[st] but she was so farr out that we cou'd not distinguish what Colours she had, and in the Evening appear'd a Ship to the Southward with Dutch Colours.

FRIDAY 12TH. THIS morning the Dutch Ship passed to the Northward and proves to be a Ship bound from this Coast to Battavia but mett with so great a S[ea] and strong Easterly winds of the Cape that she was obliged to bear up for a Supply of Water and Provisions. This Evening passed a small Armenian Ship from Bengall all the advices we could get from them was that they came from Bengall five sail in C^o: viz. 2 Armenian Ships, 2 Moors and One Jew with Dutch Colours, and y^t. there were 5 English Ships bound for Surat, but he was in such a hurry that we cou'd get no particulars from him.

Returned the 3 Tellicherry Toneyes with the Detachment which Accompanied y^e. Treasure.

SATURDAY 13TH. THIS morning passed a Dutch Snow farr out in y^e. Offing.

SUNDAY 14TH. THIS morning arrived a Boat from Quilone with one Mr. Mackackreen who is a Passenger on the Dutch Ship Bound to Battavia & was 1st. Mate of the Dutch Ship which the Apollo and Anglesea Privateers made a Prize off the 27th. Augst. as she came out of Bbay Harbour, he says that y^e. Ship which passed to the Northward y^e. 12 Inst^t. is the St. Louis which has brought them too twice, and is now Cruizing off Quilone, and can't tell what y^e. other two Ships were which lay at an Anchor.

The Chief Received a very impertinent Ola from Cristna Anavy and the Dollova which he did not think proper to send an Answer to, but wrote to his Majesty informing him the Chief had reced a very Extraordinary Ola from his Ministers and desired to know whether it was wrote by his Majestys Order. WEDNES-
DAY 17TH.

Two of our Advice Boats returned, one from Coletchee y^e. other from Brinjohn, with advice that a Ship had passed Coletchee from the Southward and that when she was abrest of Brinjohn she stood to the Southward again, that one of the Boats was near her but seeing that she had white Vanes y^e. Boat returned fearing she might be a French Ship. A Monchua from the Southward gave also the same Acco^t. of her coming from the S^o.ward and hulling off to sea when abrest of Brinjohn. THURS-
DAY 25TH.

A Large Ship passed well in the Offing with Dutch Colours and seems to be a Dutch Ship, a Ketch Grab also passed with a White Ensign, but as the Moors on this Coast Carry white Colours, suppose her to belong to Callicut and come from Bengall. FRIDAY
26TH.

Arrived a Parr from the Cormandell Coast, which gave an Acco^t. of seeing many English Ships on the Coast, and that there were 26 sail of Ships and a snow in Fort S^t. David road the last of January.

Passed a Portuguees Ship from Bengall Called the Nossa Sen[r] D.Rosaria, she gives an Acco^t. of Three Europe Ships at Gallee but does not say whether they are part of Admiral Griffins Squadron, or three Ships directly from Europe. SATURDAY
27TH.

This Morning saw a Ship at Anchor a little to the Southward of the Fort, which weighed about 8 oClock and hoisted Portuguees Colours sent a boat after her, but the sea Breeze setting in fresh y^e. boat cou'd not come up with her. SUNDAY
28TH.

RECEIVED an Ola from the King of Travencore, in which he declar[ed] the Ola wrote to the Chief by his Ministers are all by his direction without which they dare not write, and then goes on as follows. "Such things as I have had Occasion for, "I have ordered my Minister to write for, But I can only have them when the "Commodore please for such things as I was formerly favoured with, y^e. Company "were no looser, and I was generally supplied with. But at presen[t] what ever "I want You write me that you have them not, which I don't know the reason of."

RECEIVED an Ola from Gristna Annavy and the Dolloa in Answer to one sent them a few days ago in which the Chief complained that the Merchants who had Balances outstanding said that the Government must make them good as they had reced the money and that the Merch[ants] might be permitted to come & make new [contract] To which they make a vile Excuse and pretend that the Merchants not being able to procure Pepper, they had Delivered them the money and requested they would supply the Pepper which they had done to the Northward. That they wou'd come to Anjengo on the 5th. of their Month and settle these Acco^{ts}.

THAT as to the new Contract our Price of Pepper was very low, that for the N^o. con Pepper it is but 61 rupees and as rupees are now low makes it very difficult to gett Pepper. Then they go on and say that Being in great want of Powder, Ball Small Armes and other warlike Stores, which we cannot be supplied with from Anjengo, make it necessary to apply to some other Europe Nation, and having Enemy on both sides of us, makes absolutely necessary to provide ourselves in the best manner we can at this juncture, and without Pepper we Cannot be supplied with these Stores, which done we shall use our utmost dilligence to supply the Honble East India Company.

And in the following Paragraph they contradict themselves. They first say that all the olas they write the chief are by the King's order, without which they dare not write them, and then they go on and say that for all Europe Commoditys w^h. the King has occasion for, we have no dependance on any body but the H^o. East India Co. which his Majesty has often declared to the Commodore.

Translate of an Ola Reced from Gristna Annovy and the Dollava dated the 17th. Febr'y.

TUESDAY
1ST. Arrived a Monchua from Tellicherry with 1500 Bales of Rice for the use of this Garrison and y^e. Gentlemen there have adviced us that they do not think it Prudent to dispatch y^e. Anjengo Sloop while y^e. St. Louis lays in Mihie road, where she has been ever since the 18th. Ult^o. and this is the first advice we have reced of her being there from them.

The Chief reced two Letters from Captⁿ. Benjamin Fisher Commander of the Porto Bella Capt^a. W^m. Webber of the Prince William and Capt. Henry Broadley of the True Britton of the 31st. Jañry from Gallee advising that they had Reced his several Lres informing of the Enimie and that they arrived at that Port the 29th. of Janry and waited there for Orders from Fort St. David's for their proceeding y^e. former for Fort St. David the two latter for Bengall were qtd.. they advise that Admiral Boscowan had hoisted his Flag before they left Portsmouth y^e. 5th. August /and they belive he wou'd sail in a month with what Ships of the Companys were ready but they make no manner of mention of our two expected Ships the Darrington & Strettham, the Chief reced also a Lre from the Gov^r. of Columbo, informing him that Commodore Griffin was at Fort St. Davids with 18 sail of Ships, The Chief immediately dispatch'd Letters to the Gov^r. of Columbo to be forwarded to the Captⁿ. at Galle[e] to get advice of those two Ships.

Partners that they cou'd not come to any Contract for the Honble Companys Cloth at pres[ent] as there had been a very Dry season, and a great part of the Crop of Cotton Lost, nor should they be able to give any answer in less th[an] Six Weeks, when they should be Certain what Quantity wou'd be prod[uced].

Resolved immediately to dispatch a boat to Tellicherry with this Advice to the Presidency and agreeable to their orders to send up our Books Dyary & Consultations for last Year and an Estimate of what money will be necessary for y^e. Currency of this Factory.

THURSDAY
3^D. The General Lre for Bombay being wrote fair, was signed with Books usual Papers and Dispatched with a General Lre to y^e. Chief & Factors at Tellicherry informing them that it was the Governour and Councils orders that they shou'd, on Recet of those dispatches send them up by a Pattamar Boat without delay.

FRIDAY
4TH. DISPATCHED the Tellicherry Monchua which brought down the Rice, with a General Lre to y^e. Chief and Factors their desiring that they will please to Charge us no more for the Rice than it Cost the Honble Company as the Price they Charge the 450 Bales at with the extravagant Freight to their Monchuaes makes it come out so excessive dear to our Garrison, that they cannot aford [sic] to pay for it.

MONDAY
7. IMPORTED Ship Faza Salam from Bengall, bound for Surat she touched at Fort St. Davids and brings advice that the Exeter and Winchester Men of Warr had sailed for this Coast either late in Janry or early in Febry. Admiral Griffin writes the Chief under the 15 Febry that he then hoped they were arrived here, and yet we have no manner of advice of them, which makes me fear they are drove away to the W^t.ward by not keeping Ceylone close aboard.

TUESDAY
8TH. This Evening sailed Ship Phezasalam for Bombay and Surat.

WEDNESDAY
9TH. ARRIVED two small Monchuaes and a Pinget with Rice from Tellicherry, they bring advice that the St. Louis remains in Mihie Road, and that they have a small Grab which Cruizes off that Port. Also that the Portuguees have sent down a Frigat,

four Galleys & a Number of small Vessels of Warr which had Attempted to make a landing at Tannore but were drove of Scandalously [*sic*] by the Moors and were returned to Callicutt.

The Chief wrote an Ola to the King desiring that the Merchants might be permitted to come and make y^e. Pepper Contract and that the Ministers who are said to have recd part of the Merchants money last year may be ordered to pay in Pepper, for those Balances. THURSDAY 10TH.

Arrived a Boat from Coletchee with [*lacuna*] P^s. of the H^o. Companys Cloth, and the Chittys wrote the Chief desiring that they may have a further supply of Money, and that they shall have another Boat load Ready in 8 or 10 Days time.

Inst^t. in which they inform us that they do not think proper to risque the Honible Companys Sloop down yet as the S^t. Louis was in Mihie road still, That they have advice from Fort S^t. David of y^e. 20th. Ult^o: when all the Men of Warr were there except the Midway, Preston, & Lively, which were daily expected. SUNDAY 19TH.

Private Letters bring an Account that the Portuguees Armado were at Telli-cherry in their Return to Goa after their scandulouse behaviour at Tannore, that they had borrowed Tonys of the French and made some preparations for a second Attempt, but the Padre Vicar of Callicut seeing the little union there was amongst the Officers wrote a Lre to the Commandant, perswading him to desist from any further Attempts, which advice they followed, it [*is*] supposed that the Padre found that nothing was to be expected from them, and that they wou'd only bring more disgrace upon Europeans in General which made him give his advice.

ARRIVED a Pattamar from Fort S^t. Davids with only a Duplicate of y^e. last General Lre of y^e. 15th. Ult^o. and Private Lres of the 6th. Inst^t. inform us that the Harwich was gone to Convoy the Prince William Porto Bello & True Briton from Gallee to Fort S^t. David & that the Exeter & Winchester had been sailed sometime for this Coast to look out for the S^t. Louis, and as they have not been heard of We are very Apprehensive they must have been drove off to the S.W^t. We are also informed that the Honible Companys Forces were Encam[p^d.] to the N^o.ward of Fort S^t. David and that Two of our Men of Warr Blocked up Pondicherry by Sea. TUESDAY 21ST.

Cape &c^a. Ports to the Southward on the Dutch Contract this being an absolute breach of y^e. Hoñble Companys Priviledges Resolved to send out two good Detachments of a Serjeant Corporal and Eight Private Men each one to Cruize to the N^o.ward & the other to the S^o.ward with orders to seiz any Vessels they shou'd find with Pepper on board and to bring them to Anjengo.

RESOLVED that the Chief send another Remonstrance to his Majesty, representing the unreasonableness of this proceeding and at the same time requesting that his Majesty will give orders that the last Years Pepper Ballances be paid, and that the Merchants be permitted to come and make a pepper Contract, and that his Majesty will not permitt his subjects to carry any Pepper off shore which we can't avoid seizing if we find it afloat agreeable to the ancient Contra^{ts}. Existing between this Government & the Hoñble Company. Resolved to send an Express to Telli-cherry with a General Lre to the President and Council of Bombay. Representing the difficultys we are like to be involved in, and the probability of a rupture with the Government shoud any of this Pepper fall into our hands for which reason, requested that they wou'd send us down a few Englishmen and a small Gallivat if she Can be spared.

DISPATCHED a Boat Express to Tellicherry with a General Lre to the Presidency, and a General Lre to the Factory giving them an Acco^t. of our Fort St. David Advices, and desired that they will dispatch the Bombay Packet with all possible expedition, as it may be of the utmost consequence to this Factory shou'd it miscarry.

SATURDAY
25TH.

ARRIVED a small schooner [sic] from Tellicherry with 290 Ba^s. of Rice for the use of this Factory.

Reced a Gen^l. Lre of the 20th. Inst^t. from the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry they say they cannot yet send us an Acco^t. Cost of the new Rice sent us, till they have settled the Acco^t. of the whole Quant[ity] contracted for this Year. That the old rice stands the Company in R^s. 2.—10 $\frac{1}{2}$ Bale and that they Issue it out at 2-60 to make good defeciency. They advise us that they had sent out y^e. Express Boat to discover 2 Ships which had apeard [sic] off their Port at times from the 14th. Inst^t. which done she had orders to Cruize to y^e. Northward of Mount Dilly to inform the Grabbs which they Expected from Bombay and that on her Return she shou'd be dispatched with our Books & to the Presidency.

That a Moors Ship from Bengall bound for Bussora had Import[ed] there the 19th. Inst^t. one Richard Finley Master. This Richard Finley has sailed many Years in the French Service from Bengall, and is married to the late French Directores sister, so that it is more then Proba[ble] that she is a French Ship under Fictitious Colours.

Febr̄y when the Hoñble Companys Ships Princess of Wales, Houghton and Ceasar were atakeing in their Cargoes for great Britain and the East Coast Captⁿ. Benson was come up before the Town to lay Guard Ship, the Country being greatly infested with Morattas.

PASSED a Ketch under Dutch Colours and a Penant she fired a Gunn (we suppose for a boat) but sent no other advice ashore, but that the Vessel was Called y^e. Bombardeer Hooker come from Batavia had been at Columbo and Tutecourine and was bound to Cochim, We suppose her a Packet Boat with the Declaration of War against France.

SUNDAY
2^D.

THE Chief having reced Advice of his Majestys being at Attinga sent an Ola, Congratulating his Arrival and requesting a Conference with him if it suited his conveniency.

TUESDAY
4TH.

RECEDE an Ola from Gristna Annavy in Answer to the L̄re sent by the Chief and Council the 25th. Ult^o. and to the Ola sent Yesterday by the Chief the Purport viz^t.

WEDNES-
DAY 5TH.

That he had Reced the L̄re and Ola the “ Purport of both he had Communi-
“ cated to his Majesty, As to the L̄re from the Council, we conclude that there will
“ be an Alteration for the Resolutions therein. We here have also Consulted
about the Price of Pepper, that now is, It would be a very hard Case for us to advance
our Money and to loose by the Pepper without being supplied with the Necessarys
for Warr, to defend us against our Enemies, were these procurable a loss wou'd
be supportable but it is hard to be loosers, without any advantage at all and this is
the Result of our Consultation. It is impossible for the King and the Chief to meet
at Present, As the Chief cannot come here, and it is inconvenient for his Majesty
to go there at present as he is going to the N^o.ward, and I am obliged to accompany
him.

The Linguister also reced an Ola from Gristna Annavy in Answer to one he had wrote him in his own name and by the Chiefs order to try if he wou'd perswade them to desist from their present scheme by assuring him that the carrying the Pepper by sea is a Point which the English cannot give up, and that the Attempting it might prove of very ill Consequence, as the English wou'd have a very great Power in India in a very short time. To which he reply'd. That they made no doubt of y^e. Power and Strength of the English, thô they did of their Affection for the Government. Seeing that all other Europeans who had Fortificatio[n] on the Mallabar Coast, suffered not any Europeans to insult the Governments where

settled, should they now bring all their Powers here, we must bear what ever they please, for we shall do nothing against them. If we can't carry the Pepper by Sea we must carry it by Land for we are obliged to deliver it.

Ult^o. took on board 300 Topasses and immed[iately] attacked the St. Louis in Mihie Road, which Ship fired pretty briskly at first, but in a short time cut her Cable and Run in Shore under the Guns of the Fort. That the Men of Warr reared in Shore as near as the depth of Water wou'd permit and continued firing at her till Sunsett.

**FRIDAY
7TH.** ARRIVED the Hoñble Companys Sloop Bonetta (intended for the use of this Place) with Mess^{rs}. W^m. Hornby & Robert Freemouth having some Stores and some Rice on Board. By her reced a Gen^l. Lre. from the Chief and Factors at Tellicherry advising that the Exeter & Winchester returned into Tellicherry Road y^e. 31st. Ult^o: having reced very little damage, in their Ships, and had lost only one European and one Topass. But that the Enemy had lost upwards of 40 Men and the Ship so much damaged that they think she cannot go to sea this Season if ever.

The Weather growing squally and looking doubtfull (tho' the Monsoon does not seem set in as the Winds hang S^o. and S. E-erly) Agreed to Recall our Vessels which are Cruizing to the S^o.w[ard] to prevent y^e. Pepper being Shipt off at Porviar : being informed that all the Munchuas which were there are loaded with other good [sic] and gone to theSw[^d.].

Upon Inspecting the Treasury, and Treasury Acco^{ts}. we find that they agree exactly, and that the Ball^a. Rupees is Eighty three thousand One hundred seventy four, three quarters, & seventy one reas and Balance of Cash, Fan^s: Thirty eight thousand One hundred forty eight & fourteen Magonie.

A Princess of this Royal Family being to be married in a few days the Government demanded the usual present on such occasions, for which we can find but one precedent, which was July the 2^d. 1736. when the Present was much less than now demanded, but as they insist this is a Princess of greater dignity, and the difference in value does not seem of Consequence sufficient to Engage in any New disputes with the Government. ORDERED the Paymaster to prepare y^e. Present and that Mess^{rs}. Francis Fowke & W^m. Hornby get themselves ready to accompany it to Attinga tomorrow.

Richard Bourchier Esq^r. having demanded of this board the sum of Rupees Three thousand seven hundred seventy eight & seventy three reas which sum he had paid Captⁿ. Thomas Waddam for the Lead & Iron deliverd to the Government and for which the Government had given an Obligation to pay the Hoñble Company in Pepper being Candies 61. 18. 20 $\frac{1}{2}$ this affair [sic] being thoroughly examind and the Governments Obligation for said Pepper laid before the Board, AGREED that he be paid the sum out of the Hoñble Companys Treasury.

Finding that Mr. Robert Freemoult is incapa[ble] of doing the Secretarys business. We think it absolutely necessary that W^m. Hornby do take Charge of that Office, and we appoint him to be payM^r. and Store K^r. and as we have not a Companys Servant who can be spared to go and see the Cloth collected at Cotata RESOLVED that we pick out a sober Man out of the Military to be sent with Xavier Poola (one of the Assist^t. in the Warehouse) to take an Acco^t. of the Hoñble Companys Cloth as it is brought into Cotata, as we cannot send for it away at this season.

Tho' the Gentlemen at Tellicherry have not yet sent us an Invoice of the Rice sent here on the Honble Companys Acco^t. for the use of this Garrison, yet by some hints we have reced it appears to us that it will stand the Honble Company in more than we deliver it out at, to y^e. garrison, which being taken into Consideration and being convinced that the Garrison from their Poverty, cannot aford [*si*] to pay any more than the usual price of 13 Fan^s. ^{per} Bale, y^e. price they have paid for some years. Resolved that it be Issued to them at y^e. same price and that every boddy [*si*] else pay 16 fan^s. ^{per} Bale for what Rice they have out of y^e. Warehouse.

At Noon reced a Lre from the Master of the lively schooner advising that at 8 last night that Vessel was wrecked about two Miles to the Southward of Quilone, y^e. Sea Running so high that they cou'd not weather Quilone Point tho they had the wind at [S.E.] but a monstrous westerly Sea, but that all the People were saved, that they have lost their Cloths Arms and 4 Wall Pieces which were on board her, the Monch[ua] also drove on Shore a little to the Southward of them, she had run by her cland[est]inly in the night, and when the Lively brought her too, she dropt her Anchor and all her People jumpt overboard and Swam ashore, she had nothing but some Cassia on board, which had y^e. Dutch seized they wou'd not only have conf[is]cated her Cargoe, but wou'd have made Slaves of all her people, which pro[ba]bly might be the reason that they jumped overboard, not knowing but our Vessel might be Dutch.

SATURDAY
6.

It continues blowing hard in squals with a teri[ble] Sea but the Wind shifts a little to y^e. Westward being at S.W. reced hourly [news] of monchua being lost to the Southward.

Reced advices by some travellers along shore that they had seen y^e. Hoñble SUNDAY 7.
Comp^s. Sloop Bonnetta on this side of Callie Quilone without her Mast, which
probably she may have cutt away that she may be able to ride at an Anchor, the
Weather modderate with some Squals.

Received an Account from some travellers that the Hoñble Comp[anys] Sloop MONDAY
Bonnetta is ashore a little to the Northward of Porca. 8TH.

Reced a Lre from Isack Hope advising that the Weather continuing he had
cut out of this Road and put for Mudd Bay: but fearing to overshoot the place he
had anchored at 7 at night when both sea and weather were Moderate, but the
weather came on again so hard in the Night, that they were forced to run the Sloop
ashore to save their lives, not withstanding which they had lost two Europeans and
3 Black fellows, two of the latter being Lascars and y^e. other and the 2 Europeans
were Soldiers, that the Natives had halled the Sloop up (she having reced little or
no damage) and that they had seized all the Arms and every thing that was in the
Vessel and turned our people adrift, who were kindly used by the Dutch Factor at
Porca.

Reced a Dutch Lre from the Commodore and Council of Cochin with its
translate in English, informing us that they had reced orders from the General and
Council of Battavia, to seiz all Ships belonging to the French which came into
their Ports, and to do them all the prejudice in their power and to aid and assist y^e.
English and that they were ready to Co-operate with us against the Common Enemy,
and offered to come to an agreement to return all dis[er]ters.

March from Great Briton last from Gallee, in Company with wh. c[ome] out the Tryall and Swallow Snow's, y^e. former bound for Bengall arrived at Vizagapatam the 12th. of Febry and the latter proceeded for Batavia, with Dispatches from the Prince of Orange to the General of that Place.

They bring farther advices that they left of the [Cape] Our Honible Masters Ship the Kent which Ship with y^e. Malbrô & Salisbury had lost their Passages round the Cape and had wintered at Delege that the Lapwing in her return home arrived the Cape y^e. 18 August, and [sailed] for great Britain the 22^d. of said Month.

They also Advice us that our Honble Masters have [ap]ointed Fort St. David to be the Presidency on that Coast and have appointed the Honble John Hinde Esqr. Presid^t. & Gov^r. Maj^r. Stringer Lawrence third of Council and confemred the rest of the Gentlemen of Council.

TUESDAY
16. Reced Advice that a Large Boddy of Moors Horse have aproached the Towallee or Pass thrô the Hills into this Kingdom and that the Kings forces were gathering together and have put that pass in a good Posture of defence.

THURSDAY
18. The King passed to y^e. Southward by water in the night and in the Morning Grisna Annovy wrote the Chief that his Majesty was gone in a hurry to Celebrate a Feast at Chevandrang Pagoda and coud not possibly stop at present but that he shoud return the third of their next month to Travandrang, when the Chief might write him, this we know to be all a pretence and that his Majestys buisness [sic] to the Southward is to see that his Forces are in a proper Posture of defence in Case the Moors shou'd attempt y^e. Towalla.

MONDAY
22^d. Returned a Boat from Tellicherry with a General Lre dated the 12th. Instant they acknowledge the receipt of our Letters of the 20th. and 29th. Ultimo and that they had forwarded our Packet for the Presidency on a Pattamar Boat y^e. 27th. Ult^o.

Their Fort St. David Lre give them the same Acco^{ts}. as we last reced from thence. viz^t. of the Arrival of the Porto Bello & C^o.] Ships and of that Place being made the Presidency on that Coast.

They have also reced a Letter from the Commodore and Council of Cochim of the same purport as they wrote us.

That the Sloop expected there from Bombay had not appeared, which makes them aprehend that she had passed their Port, as they had very violent squalls and a great swell from the S.W^t. from the 5th. Inst^t. in the Morning to the 7th. at night.

WEDNESDAY
24. Reced a General Lre from the President and Council at Fort St. David dated the 6th. Inst^t. informing that they had Reced a General Lre from the Dutch Gov^r. and Council at Negapatam of those we have reced from their Factories on this Coast. that the Swallow Snow imported there the 11th. Ultimo from Batavia, where she had delivered the Prince of Oranges Orders to the General of that Place, and that on the 26th. Ult^o. the George Snow was dispatched for Great Britain and the 3^d. Inst^t. the Exeter man of Warr arrived there from this Coast.

Chief of that place which sloop filed [*sic*] with Pepper and sailed y^e. 23^d. for Bengall. That they have orders to supply us with an Ensign and R^s. 50000, that the Season will not admitt of an Officers coming down at Present, and desire to know in what manner we wou'd have the Treasure remitted, in case what we have already reced is not sufficient to serve till the Rains are over.

The General Lre from the Presidency acknowledges the Recet. our [*sic*] several Lres of the 3^d. 8th. & 24th. March with our Diary and General Books for last Year.

They approve of our Reasons for releasing the 4 French Prisoners. Direct that we take care not to deferr making the Cloth Contract, too long, least it shou'd not be compleated in time. They observe that we shoud want about 150,000 Rupees to the end of October which they will supply and direct that we apply (agreeable to their former orders) to Tellicherry for what we may want in the interim.

They also order that we Manifest to the King of Travencore the injurious part he acts in letting the Dutch [have] the Pepper out of his Country, contrary to the Hoñble Companys Antient Priviledges and if that proves inefectual to take all suitable Measures in our Power to prevent it.

They shall have a regard to our Request for some Englishmen in the room of the Dutchmen sent up on the Phazasallam, and have ordered Tellicherry to send us an Ensign the season will not admitt of sending us a Gallivat; If we have any important Dispatches for the Presidency they order that we send them via Fort St. David, requesting they will dispatch them, with all possible expedition, if we want any more Gunpowder we may apply to Tellicherry for it.

The Chief reced a Lre from the Commodore of Cochin informing that agreeable to his request that he had let Ezekiel have two Anchors for the use of the Honble Companys Sloop and that Ezekiel had paid for them, Ezekiel also adviced that he had sent the Anchors to Porca as directed, and Charged the Chief with their amount.

Mr. Baldwin arrived from Porca, who says that the Sloop lays very well having got several Coconut Trees under her Bottom, that she has reced very little damage in her hull, and her sails are in pritty good order, but her rigging Masts Yards and Booms are all destroyed, that he reced an Anchor and a large Grapnail from Ezekiel Raby which he had left with the Sloop under the Care of the Tindall.

The Chief reced a Lre from Ezekiel in which he informs him of a report of a French Brigantine being arrived at Mahie from the Islands with a Packet for Pondicherry and they give out that six Ships are arrived there from Europe, which are coming to India, probably those which arrived on the Cormandell Coast the begining of last Month.

DAY 19TH.

The Chief Reced a Letter from the Commodore of Cochim informing him that he has advice from Ceylone that one of our Honble Masters Ships called the Duke of Sommerset arrived Gallee last Month, which left England the 25th. Jañry, but

suppose it must be the Duke of Dorsett. He has also advice from Cannannore that the French Sloop which arrived Mahie last Month brought a Packet for Pondicherry, and another to the Chief of Mihie and that the King of France has declared Warr against the state General and that 9 Ships were arrived at Mascarine from Europe and sailed for Pondicherry. THURS-
DAY 20TH.

Arrived Ensign John Edgerton from Tellicherry for to serve in this Garrison By him reced a General Lre dated the 4th. Instant from the Chief and Factors there. Advising that they had sent us Ensign John Edgerton agreeable to our request, with orders to proceed overland, that they had supplied him with some stores &c^a. amo^t[g]. to Rs. 15. 2^{qr}. 5^{rea}. /which they shoud Charge this Factory and had ordered Mr. Alexander Douglas to supply him with guides and what else he might want. Mr. Douglas informs us he has laid out Eighty six & eleven reas for Guards Guides &c^a. as ^p Acco^t. They also send us the same advices we last reced from Fort St. Davids. They say they cannot send us the Invoice of the Rice sent us till they have brought up the Books and Accounts of that Factory which were greatly behind hand.

Private Letters of the 6th. from Tellicherry advise that they had just Reced a General Lre from Fort St. David advising of the safe arrival on the 19th. Ultimo of our Hoñble Masters Ship Scarbrough from Great Britain, and that the French Squadron had made the best of their way to the Northward and arrived Madrass the 11th. at 4 P.M. that it is said they landed some Military and a hundred Chests & 50 Casks of Treasure and having reced some water [&] Refreshment 7 sail departed that night, and left only one Ship and the Sloop in Madrass Road, the Sloop they took in their Passage being a Dutch Sloop bound for Columbo, where the seven sail are gone they know not, but they have reported that they expect 14 Sail more Com-manded by Monsieur LaBourdounay, which must be a right French Lye, as we know that he is a Prisoner in England.

Diary and Consultation Book of Richard Bourcheir Esqr. Chief &ca. Factors for Affairs of the Honble United English East India Company at Anjengo Agreeable to the Establishment approved by the Honble William Wake Esqr. President & Governor. of Bombay &ca. Council.

An Army of Moors having been for some time past in the Naiques Country and having made some large Demands on the King of Travencore it has been reported that they were decamped and gone off and the Government [sic] have industriously spread the same but it is now as confidently reported that they are returned to Trinnivelly. AUGUST
1st.

The Chief received Advices from Callicutt that two Topass's who came on the French Sloop from Maritius to Maihie gave an Account of two squadrons sailing from thence in April, one consisting of twelve Ships under one Monsieur Bovett the other of Nine sail commanded by Monsieur Masse and that another of 14 sail arrived the day before they left the Island directly from France but this seems to be a French Gasconade to amuse. 11

The Chief received an Ola from Gristna Annavy. The purport of which is the Chief has been often informed of the Kings resolutions which he may send to Bombay and that now he demands to be supplied Annually with what warlike Stores he may want at the Europe Price and then the Honble Company shall have all the Pepper in the Country at the Price it Costs & that if we will now send him a supply of warlike Stores he will pay for them in Pepper. 12

The Chief returned the Annavy an Answer in which he tells him he must be mistaken as he has never received one Clear Answer whither his Majesty is determined to be the Pepper Merchant and to breake thro' all the Honble Companys long established priviledges in this Country and confirmed by his Majesty or whither he will permitt the Merchants to come & Contract as usua[1] his Majesty having impeded the Honble Companys Pepper Trade this last Year. That his Majesty has demanded to be supplied with the same Quantity of warlike Stores annually as we indent for, for the use of Anjengo which he has been desired to Explain as our Indents were larger or smaller as our Necessitys required but to this no Answer has been obtained. The Chief had often informed the Annavy and all the Kings Ministers that the Honble Company do not deal in warlike Stores any farther than is necessary for the defence of their Trade and priviledges and that his proposal both to the Stores & Price of the Pepper were too loos [sic] to be represented to our superiors and was absolutely giving up of the Honble Companys rights & priviledges in this Country. That we dare not sell our warlike Stores for pepper, And then he concludes with requesting that his Majesty will send a List of his Demands and next that he will give an Explicit Answer whether he will permitt the Merchants to come & Contract for pepper as usual with his Royal protection or whether he is determined to turn Pepper Merchant himself and lastly that the Merchants may be permitted to come and settle their Amounts and pay in their Ballances and that his Majesty will order the Pepper to be paid which he owes for the George snows Kentledge.

The Chief laid before the board the Annavys Ola & his Answer to it which being taken into serious Consideration it seems to us very apparent that the King is determined to abolish all the Honble Com[pany's] antient priviledges. He having this year sold a large Quantity of Peppe[r to] the Dutch and has not permitted any of the Merchants to contract with the Honble Company as usual by which they have been deprived of their Annual Quantity of Pepper. And by the Annavys Ola it seems very plain that the King is determin'd to oblige the Honble Company to supply him with what Warlik[e] Stores he pleases or debarr them of the Pepper Trade this being our opinion RESOLVED to write to the Honble the President & Council for their orders how we shall act in in so Critical a Juncture letting them know it is our opinion that the Kings resolution are no warlike Stores no Pepper and that he insists on having all the Stores at the price they cost in Europe and to make what price he pleases for his Pepper and that our Engaging in any such affair will be giving up all the Honble Companys established priviledges granted by this Kings predecessors & Confirm'd by himself.

The Chief received a Letter from the Commodore of Cochin advising him that on the 20/31 Ultimo Admiral Boscawen with three Ships only passed Gallee and had advised them that he had dispatched the rest of his Fleet before him from Mauritius.

Arrived a pattamar with a General Letter from the Governor & Council at Fort S^{t.} David advising that in June arrived there our Honble Masters Ships Scarborough, Wazer, Duke of Dorsett & Hardwick which four ships were all dispatched for China and that on the 26 Ultimo arrived there Admiral Boscawen in the Namure with the Deptford & Bomb Tender and in a Postscript say the rest of the Fleet were in sight to the Northward. That the Honble the Court of Directors had appointed the Honble Charles Floyer Esq^{r.} Governor of that Place.

— AUGUST 1748 —

They also inform us that the French Ships they mentioned in their last had made the best of their way to Madrass where they had landed some Treasure & Military taken in fresh provisions & water and sailed in a few hours leaving behind them a small Ship & a Sloop and had not been heard of since And that on the 17th at 9 at Night Cuddalore was attacked by a party of French who were so warmly received that they retired in less than an Hours time having lost about 30 Europeans and 50 Seapoys besides many wounded and many deserters but not one of our People got any hurt. That they had forwarded our Packett of the 26 May to Bombay as they shou'd that of the 21st. June in a few days.

16 The aforesaid advices arriving Yesterday retarded the dispatch of Our Pattamars till this day with a General Letter to the President & Council of Bombay and another to Fort St. David.

17 Reced advice from Callicutt that on the 17th. Ultimo arrived the Hercules of 28 Gunns at Maihie. She came from France but last from Madagascar where she was procuring Cattle for her Consorts at Mauritius when a small Vessell from the Islands informed her that 25 Sail of English ships was standing directly for the Port of Mauritius upon which she immediately weighed and came away for Maihie. She left France about the beginning of June in Company with five other Ships which She left at Mauritius. She has Exchanged about 30 Soldiers for the same Number of Sailors at Maihie. On the 28 the French sent a Detachment of 90 Europeans 100 Coffrees & 80 Seapoys under two Lieutenants for Pondicherry who passed Callicutt the 3^d. & 4th. Instant none having fire Arms but the Officers and a few swords in the Hands of the Seapoys and they talk of sending another Detachment to Pondicherry in a Short time.

21 Reced advice of three Ships being seen on the Coast passing to the Southward one passed in sight of us but the weather was too squally & dirty to venture a Boat of to her Suppose them to be Dutch.

Arrived a Toney with a General Letter of the 24th. Ultimo from the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry acknowledging receipt of Ours of the 23^d. July. They promise to send us an Account Current with this Factory as soon as possible, they also send us the same advices as we received the 15th. Ult. from Fort S^t. David.

Dispatched Mr. William Holland (Our Gunner) with Boats People & necessaries to gett the Sloop into the water and the Chief wrote an Ola to the King of Porca desiring his Majestys Order to his Subjects to assist in getting her off and to order all her stores to be delivered. 3

Arrived a Toney from Tellicherry with a General Letter from the Chief & Factors there and another from the Honble the President & Council of Bombay of the 19th. Ultimo & duplicate of the 4th. May last. 5

They [*sic*] Gentlemen at Tellicherry inform us that they shall detain the Bombay Express Boat for the return of this Toney with our Dispatches for the presidency and that they shall send us us [*sic*] fifty thousand Rupees agreeable to the President & Councils Orders as soon as they shall think the weather settled enough to venture it. The Honble the President & Council advises us that they have not received any Letters from us since their dispatch of the 4th. May and of which they now send a Duplicate but that they were inform'd by the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry that they had forwarded three of our Packetts on an Express Boat the latter End of April which boat was drove on shore by stress of weather to the Eastward of Diu where she and her Packetts were lost but all the People saved that the Gentlemen at Tellicherry had informed the President & Council of their supplying us with fifty thousand Rupees in the Month of April & that they had now ordered them to send us a farther supply of the same sum which they hope will be sufficient till they can supply them further. They also sent us Copy of the 6th. Paragraph of the Honble Companys Commands of the 24 July 1747 with the resolution of the General Court concerning their Settlements in India. They are pleased to order that we keep our Gunroom Crew & Military in Good order & Discipline the Honble Company having approved of their preparations after the misfortune of Madrass, they are pleased to permitt us if we think it necessary for the defence of our Fort in Case of being Attacked to enlist a suitable Number of Mercenaries.

That we advise his Honour &c^a. that we have not been able to procure any Pepper We are in no immediate want of money and that we have wrote the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry that the sum of thirty thousand Rupees wou'd be sufficient for us till we cou'd both be farther supplied from the Presidency And that having received advice from private hands that our dispatches of the 25 May arrived after the close of the Gen^l. Letter those dispatches wou'd fully inform them of all the Honble Companys affairs under our Care to that time.

That due obedience shou'd be paid to the resolution of the General Coast but hope we shall not be putt to the Tryals.

That we shall also pay due obedience to the Presidents &c^a. Orders for entring more men when we can find any fit for Service but that is very difficult here and that those people called Callicuilones being Enemies to the King of Travencore the entring them might cause a misunderstanding with his Majesty.

That a few days ago we had dispatched Mr. William Holland (our Gunner) with men and necessaries to gett the Bonetta into the water and as it does not seem probable the King of Porca can return her Gunns small Arms & Ammunition as he has given them the King of Travencore we can oblige him to pay for them if it meets with the approbation of the Board.

Arrived a Pattamar from Fort St. David with a General Letter from Admiral Boscawen to the Chief. 9^{PM}.

Private Letters of the 16 Ultimo mention there being above twenty sail of English Ships before Pondicherry and that as our Troops were marching overland, on the 13th. Ultimo they Attacked a small Fort about three miles to the Southward of Pondicherry called Ariocopong where they were repulsed having killed wounded & missing between thirty & forty men, upon which they had immediately sent them twelve hundred Seamen with twelve 12 Pounders to batter the Fort and that the people were all in high spirits. That our Honble Masters ship Oxford was then coming into the road from the West Coast & Batavia and that Admiral Griffin was under sail for Crancanella Bay to refitt his ships for Europe with the Princess Mary, Medway & Pearl and the Preston being Condemned was also gone to be made a Hulk of.

Imported Ship Phasazalam from Surat bound for Bengall Captain Joseph Gunning & Mr. George Williamson Supercargoe brought no news & sailed the same Evening. 13

This morning reced a Letter from Mr. William Holland advising that on the 15 He had got the Bonetta sloop into the water & hoped to gett her down in a few days. 17

- 17 Having reced advice of several Ships passing to the Southward which we suppose to be Dutch Ships bound for Ceylone & probably some of the English Bengall Ships which have been forced to lay the rains at Bombay.
- 18 Imported Ship Prince Edward bound for Bengall Captain Henry Wedderburn Commander, He & Mr. Charles Douglass Supercargoes she left Bombay the 9th. Ins^t. at which time neither the Essex from Mocho or any of our Honble Masters Ships were arrived.
- 19 Sailed ship Prince Edward for Bengall.
- 23 Reced a Letter from Mr. William Holland advising that He had gott the Honble Companys Sloop into the water the 13th. and had gott her in readiness to come down but the Winds hanging Southerly and a strong Northerly Current had prevented his Arrival and the Pattamar says that before he came away he saw the Sloop under sail for MudBay where several Manchuas were gone the weather looking very doubtfull with abundance of Rain.
- 24 Arrived a Pattamar from Fort St. David with a general Letter of the 7th. Instant from the President & Council of that place acknowledging receipt of Ours of the 16th. Ultimo with Our dispatches for Bombay which they wou'd forward with all possible Expedition. They advise that our Forces had made their Approaches within 450 Yards of the Walls of Pondicherry and that the [*sic*] Expected to hear that Our Batteries ashoar and our Ships in the road woud begin to play upon the Town in a day or two.
- 26 Return'd a Boat from Tellicherry with a General Letter from the President & Council of Bombay of the 30 Ultimo acknowledging receipt of our General Letter of the 26th. May & Duplicate of the 20 April last the Original we suppose was lost on the Pattamar Boat.
- They are pleased to direct that we do not follow the Dutch Example in raising the price of pepper as they suppose Tellicherry will be able to supply the Honble Companys Demands this season and that may prove a bad precedent in future and be of prejudice to the Honble Companys affairs.
- They hope the King of Porca will deliver the Honble Company Sloop Bonetta with her Stores on which they will write more fully when they have reced our farther advices about her.
- 28 This Evening arrived the Honble Companys Sloop Bonetta but the King of Porca or his Officers have detained one of her sails all her artillery, small Arms, Amunition & all her small Stores.
- 29 Got the Bonetta sloop into the river to repair and refitt her she having lost her false Keel and one plank in her Bottom being bulged.
- 30 Arrived a small Vessell with twenty Bales of the Honble Companys Cloth from Coletchee.
- OCTOBER
5TH. A Toney arrived from Tellicherry with three private Letters containing Extracts of Europe News to the 15th. March last wherein it was said that a Congress was to meet at Aix La Chappelle but that all parties engaged in the Warr were making vigorous preperations for carrying it on.

The Custom Master having informed the Chief that all new impositions are taken off at Coletchee sent Boats to bring away the Cloth as fast as possible.

Arrived a Pattamar from Fort S^t. David by which Governor Floyer advises the Chief under the 26 Ultimo that he intended in a few days to dispatch the Ship Oxford belonging to our Honble Masters with a few Bales to fill up h[e]re for Europe. That the seige of Pondicherry went on very well that all our seven Batteries being opened on the 25th. and on the 26th. a very smart fire continued all day both from the Ships and Batteries and that they did not Expect the place wou'd hold out Ten days at most.

14

Bengall advices of the 20th. August say that all was well there.

The Chief dispatched a Boat To Tellicherry with a Letter to the Chief desiring that he woud forward his Letters to the President with all possible Expedition it being to advise his Honour of the Irregular proceedings of Governor Floyer in sendg. Ship Oxford here for a Loading without previously advising the presidency of it and requesting Orders for Our farther proceeding in this Affair. The Chief also dispatched a Letter to Gallee in hopes it may find Captain Thomas Stevens there and prevent his proceeding for this Port till we can receive orders for loading of his ship, informing him that we cannot load any goods on his Ship till we receive orders from our Presidency.

15

— OCTOBER 1748 —

- 18 One of Our Boats returned from Tellicherry with a General Letter of the 12th. Instant from thence acknowledging receipt of Ours of the 26 Ultimo and advising that they now forward us a General Letter and a Box of Medicines reced the 11th. Instant from the Presidency.

The General Letter from the Presidency acknowledges receipt of our several General Letters of the 21st. June 16 August & 7 September to which they reply That we upon the spott must be the best judges as to advancing the Honble Comp^y[^s.] money for the Cloth and leave it to Our Discretion. They approve of the Chiefs answer to the King of Travencores demand for warlike Stores and they are pleased to Observe that his Majesty cannot be in Earnest when he made such a proposal as letting the Honble Company have his pepper at prime Cost on Condition of being supplied with Stores as they cost in Europe. As to what we say of Contract^s. for pepper they apprehend that if we Contract with the Merchants the King has it equally in his power to disappoint us by distressing them as if the Contract was made with himself that by his present Majestys & his ancestors Grants we have Liberty of hindering the Exportation of Pepper that the Greatest Evil must be to the King if he oppresses the Merchants beyond Measure as it may prevent the Cultivation of the Commodity. That to seize pepper going out of the Country Clandestinely is undoubtedly conformable to the original Grants and has not been Contested. And as we have a Sloop and a sufficient number of Military to Arm our Boats for that Purpose, they do not comply with Our request of a Gallivat. They confirm their orders of the 30th. August as to not raising the price of Pepper. They direct that we at all times send to Tellicherry for what money we may want advising the Presidency what sum we may want for the whole Season and order that we peremptorily Demand the Sloops Gunns & all her other Stores of the King of Porca and in case of a refusal, to acquaint them with all Circumstances and they will give us farther orders. As to the five Barrils of Dust which was receivd instead of Gunpowder they suppose it must be a mistake there in barril^s. and order it to be returned. Resolved to send a Detachment to Tellicherry and desire the Chief & Factors there to send us the fifty thousand Rupees ordered for the Use of this Factory Resolved to send a Demand to the King of Porca for the Sloops Gunns Arms &c^a. Stores which his people have detained. Resolved that the Chief send an Ola to the King of Travencore informing what Answer we have received from the Presidency to his Ola sent to them.

- 19 Agreeable to resolution of Council yesterday sent a Letter to the King of Porca signed by the Chief & Factors demanding the Anjengo Sloops stores leting him know that we were ordered so to do by the Honble the President & Council.

The Chief wrote an Ola to the King of Travencore/agreeable to resolution of Council of yesterday/ informing his Majesty that we have received an Answer from the Presidency in which they acknowledge receipt of Copy of his Majestys Ola sent them & they say he can't be in Earnest in his proposals about pepper & Warlike Stores so that we hope He will order the pepper Ballance from his Majesty to be paid in and permitt the Merchants to pay in their Ballances and to Contract as Usual.

- 20 Passed a Dutch Ship from Gallee bound for Cochin they say that they have not had any Ships arrived at Ceylone either from Europe or Batavia this Season.

- 21 Passed a Brigantine to the Northward with Dutch Colours but it was too late to send a Boat on board her.

- 22 Dispatched a Detachment to Tellicherry agreeable to resolution of Council of the 18 to bring down the Treasure for the use of this Factory, but as their Toneyes are Nimble Boats requested that it might be sent on Toneyes.

- 23 This morning Chevedana and Matanda Poolas arrived and informed the Chief that the King had received the Chiefs Ola and that they were authorized to Treat about the Honble Companys Affairs but they were ordered to settle the Account Customs &c^a. Accounts first & that they woud return tomorrow for that purpose.

— OCTOBER 1748 —

The Two Poolas returned but not having the Kings Serivan with them who belongs to this place they could only begin with the Receipts for what his Majesty has had of the Honble Company. 24

A Prince of Teekingoor passing to the Northward called and made a Vissit saluted him with 9 Gunns & made him a present of two pieces of striped Taffaty & two flasks of rose water. 25

The King of Porcas brother in law called here as he was passing to the Northward who promises to gett all the Sloops Stores Guns &c^a. returned as soon as he arrives at Porca. Presented him with a piece of China Damask & two flasks of rose Water. Reced an Ola from Gristna Annavy & the Dollowa as follows. We have read the Commodores Ola to the King and observe that you remitted his Majesty's Ola to Bombay and have received for answer That the Honble Company cannot supply him with stores at the price they cost in Europe at their own risque. You also desire that the Merchants may be permitted to come & Contract for Pepper as formerly. To which his Majesty replys That he shall not be displeas'd with the Merchants Contracting nor has he hindered them and that he shall not be wanting on his part to preserve the amity subsisting between him & the Honble Company. That he had sent the adigary of Charinga & Savadana poolah to settle the Account Customs [&c^a.] and to see on what side the Ballance falls, and if we want any thing to write to his Majesty. 26

The Two Poolahs Chevedana & Matanda having informed the Linguister that they had Orders from the King to bring the Queen of Attinga's Annual present to the King of Travencores Credit. The Chief ordered him to tell them that there were several things to be settled before the annual present cou'd be brought to [acc^t.] and immediately the Chief wrote an Ola to her Majesty to inform her of this Demand, in hopes that she will Consent to it otherwise shou'd she ever recover [her] Power she may demand it again of the Honble Company. He also sent an Ola to Gristna Annavy desiring that we may be justified in bringing this money to the Kings Account not that we intend to pay it till we have some Security for the Honble Companys priviledges of Trade. 27

The Two Poolas desired that we wou'd lend the King of Travencore two hundred & twenty six Rupees & a half we thought it better to lend him this small sum than to putt him out of Humour at this Juncture. 30

Reced an Ola from the King of Travencore desiring that we will settle all Accounts as soon as possible with the Poolahs, and that we will bring the Queen of Attinga's Annual Present /for the Time it has not been paid/ to his Credit. That his great Expences and the Scarcity of money Obliges him to write that the Present may be brought to his Account. 31

This day adjusted the Account Customs & all the Accounts with the Government with the Poolas the Ballance in the Honble Companys favour being fanams 13139 which done the Poolas desired that the Queens Annual present might be brought to the Kings Credit which they were lett know [sic] cou'd not be done till the Honble Company were first put into possession of those priviledges on which that Present was first Agreed to be made. After much disputing they desired the Chief wou'd putt his proposals in writing which they wou'd send to his Majesty /Notwithstanding that they pretended when they arrived they had full power to settle every thing/ and they wou'd stay at Cheringa for the Kings Answer. The Proposals were as follows vizt. NOVEMBER 1ST.

“ FIRST, That the Merchants be permitted to pay in their Pepper Ballances.

“ SECOND, That the Government pay the Pepper due to the Honble Company for the George snows Kentledge which was delivered to his Majesty.

“ THIRD That the Merchants be permitted to Contract for the Pepper as formerly.

“ FOURTH, That we are ready & willing to buy any Pepper the Government have upon their Hands.

— NOVEMBER 1748 —

“ FIFTH, That his Majesty will give such Orders as will Effectually putt a stop to the Insolence of the Neirs as they pass through our Limitts.

“ SIXTH, That his Majesty will return all deserters as was always Customary.

2^d. ARRIVED a Boat from Tellicherry with a General Letter from the Honble Court of Directors of the 10 May last to this settlement & one from the Presidency of the 15 Ultimo & one from the Chief & Factors of the 26th. Ultimo. Enclosed in the Honble Companys General Letter received his Majestys Proclamation for a Cessation of Arms as well by Sea as Land, Agreed upon between his Majesty the Most Christian King & the States General of the United Province Enjoining the Observance thereof. They are pleased to order as all Hostilities are Ceased their Ships must be dispatched directly home to them after the 19th. of October next in the usual manner as before the Commencement of the Warr by directing the Commanders to proceed to St. Helena and after refreshing there for a few days to make the best of their way to the Downs. We are also ordered to pay due Obedience to all Orders we may receive from the Secret Committee relating to their Ships. Notwithstanding the above in Case any of the men of warr are bound [Home] & any of their Ships can conveniently join them they wou'd have their Ships come in Company with them for their greater Security.

The Honble the President & Council are pleased to advise that they received the above Packett from the Honble Company by the Honble Companys Ship Orford the 13th. Ultimo from Gombroon they now send us also sundry Paragraphs of their Commands of the 15th. Febry last ☞ said Ship to which we are to pay due regard.

They advise that they have ordered the Gentlemen, at Tellicherry to send one Ship to be filled up here and order that we immediate[ly] advise them what Quantity of Tonnage we shall have for her that they may act accordingly.

The Honble Company are pleased to approve of the Surplus Tonnage sent on Ship Fort St. George &c^a. and order that we Comply with the Captains request when we have Goods on hand. The 43 paragh of said Letter must relate to Tellicherry and not to this Factory as 70 Rupees ☞ Candy is a higher Price than ever was given at this Settlement for Pepper. The 63 Paragraph orders that this and all the Honble Companys Settlements be putt in the best Posture of Defence and that their Engineer when he can be spared from Fort St. David will come this way. They are pleased to say that they perceive with satisfaction that we were preparing to give the Enemy a warm reception.

3^d. The two Poolas returned and desired to know if we wou'd bring the Queens Annual Present to the Kings Credit. They were told that as that Present was founded on Certain priviledges to the Honble Company we were very ready to make the Present or pay the value of it provided the Honble Company were putt in possession of those priviledges but to make the present without them was want [sic] we could not answer to our Honble Employers. They then made a proposal that we should permitt them to lay a Pole Tax on the Inhabitants of Anjengo who were the King of Travencores Subjects but they were informed that this woud never be submitted to and that this proposal looked as if they intended to embroil instead of settling Affairs. They having desired the Linguister to Ask the Chief if we wou'd permitt them to go on board of all Ships to try if they cou'd purchase Warlike Stores, but as they did not make this proposal to the Chief themselves he took no Notice of it thô, we well know that this is only a Pretence for selling of Pepper to the Shipping & then the Honble Company wou'd never gett an Ounce.

4 Return'd an Answer to the Chief &c^a. Factors at Tellicherry with a Calculate of what Tonnage we have now in Warehouse.

Received the Kings answer to the Proposal sent the 1st. Instant by the Chief which are very trifling & insufficient and not signed by any body as first if we will send him the particulars of the Merchants Ballances that he will order them to be paid. That if we will settle the Account of what Pepper has been received on Account the George snows Kentledge he will order Umamen to pay the Ballance.

That if we will Name the Merchants we want to Contract with he Will send them. That he has Issued orders to prevent the Insolency of the Neirs in future. That we are to blame for the breach of returning Deserters and if he has any Pepper remaining we may have it on settling the Terms.

The Chief sent an Ola to Christna Annavy and the Dollava who are now with the King to the following purport. That Chevedona Poola having settled his Majestys Accounts & Account Customs said that he woud return to his Majesty and that he wou'd send the Merchants to settle their Accounts and pay their Ballances and that he woud soon return with his Majestys Answer about permitting the Merchants to Contract for Pepper. That I have reced an Ola but know not from whom it came as it was not signed / in Answer to some proposals given to Chevedana Poolah about settling of Our Affairs. But this is very insufficient in every respect and most in relation to the Honble Companys priviledges. Chevadana Poola made a proposal of laying a Pole Tax on the Inhabitants of Anjengo & he also told the Linguister that the Government Expected that we woud permitt them to Trade with the Ships that came here. These are absolute Breaches of the Honble Companys priviledges established with this Government and cannot be allowed of and it wou'd have been much better had his Majesty sent these with his other proposals which he desired might be sent to Bombay and then he would have had the Opinion of the President & Council about them.

By these proposals & from the purport of many Olas reced it does not appear that this Government is enclined to lett the Honble Company Enjoy their Antient Priviledges & to carry on their Trade as formerly. If the King is determined to continue the impeding the Honble Companys Trading in Pepper, I request that he will tell me so that I may inform my superiors. I desire your Explicit Answer as soon as possible.

The Annavy & Dollawa met the Chiefs Ola on the road they being on their way to the Northward & sent the following Answer. " We have reced the Commodores Ola and have heard since our Arrival at Attinga from the Adigary of Cheringa and Chevedana Poola all that has passed between them & the Commodore. The Merchants shall come by the 12th of the Month & settle their Accounts. We are ordered to MavillaCarree by his Majesty about some Business of a Pagoda and must make the best of our way.

If the Commodore will name the Merchants he wants to Contract with they shall be ordered to Attend him and nobody will be displeased at the Honble Company's Trading in Pepper as formerly. The Quantity of warlike Stores formerly supplied his Majesty will not be sufficient at present as the Commodore well knows this Government has many Enemies to Contend with. It is his Majesty's misfortune that the Commodore does not Consider the Inconvenience this Government labours under from its Enemies. Let us know what the Honble Company Demands & there shall be nothing wanting. Those Vassalls of the Government which are in your Limitts as they formerly paid Taxes and you may now order them to do the same. The poolas say that they did not mention Trading with shipping to the Commodore. They only [sic] if the Commodore could not supply them with warlike stores they [sic] he wou'd Consent to the purchasing of them out of any Ship, but did not desire any other Trade And if the Commodore will not supply us or Consent to our supplying ourselves out of any one shipping that comes here, it is Apparent that he has no Esteem for this Government. If you will not deliver the Annual Present now we can receive it when you please to deliver it, if there is any thing that you want You may write to us for it.

This day the Chief received a Letter from Captain William Stevens Commander **DITTO DIE** of the Honble Companys ship Delawarr dated the 4th. Instant off, of Kattera vizt. That he left Fort S^t. David the 15th. Ultimo bound for Tellicherry, Benjarr & China that he left the Honble Companys ship Oxford at Gallie the 30 Ultimo waiting for

orders from hence. That before he left Fort St. David Admiral Boscawen was returned with all his Squadron having made an unsuccessfull Attempt against Pondicherry having lost many brave men but no farther particulars.

This day the Delawarr passed in the Offing, the Landwind blowing very fresh and She being farr out could not fetch the road.

The Chief wrote another Ola to the King of Travencore to the following purport. That the Account Customs had been settled with Chevadana Poolah conformable to his Majestys Order but that none of the Merchants had come to settle their Accounts nor paid in any of their Ballances. That it is now a Year that an Intire Stop has been putt to the Honble Companys Pepper Trade on which & several other particulars the Chief had wrote a Letter to his Majesty to which he had received a very insufficient Answer but not signed by his Majesty or any of his Ministers, having applyed to Chevidana Poolah to open the Honble Compys. Pepper Trade which he said he could not untill he had returned from his Majesty. If your Majesty is determined not to permitt the Honble Company to carry on their Pepper Trade as formerly, I beg the favour that you will tell us so that we may inform our superiors. That the annual Present was stipulated on Consideration of Trade & priviledges to the Honble Company which if his Majesty wou'd putt them in possession of and allow their Trade it's former Currency there shou'd be no delay on our parts in making the Present for as long as they had been in Arrears. Your Majesty makes Constant Complaint that the Chief will not assist You with what you are in want of but Your Majesty has not mention'd any particulars. We are always ready to supply you with any thing in our power.

By private Letters from Fort St. David we are informed that we were obliged to raise the seige of Pondicherry from the lateness of the Season, a sickness among the People & the unskillfullness of the Engineers. The former might very reasonably have been Expected when they sat down before that place.

Reced the King of Travencores Answer to the Chiefs Ola of the 7th. Instant which is full as insufficient & Triffling as the former. As that the Account Customs might have been settled before, had we have had Leisure to have settled them and as to the Ballance for which he has sent an Ola it may be deducted out of the next Years Customs. That he has not hindered the Honble Company from Trading in Pepper nor of Making their Contracts as formerly without any molestation from him that we shou'd not be well pleased to have him Engrose the Pepper and to lett the Honble Company have it. And for some things which this Government is in want of, he finds that the Commodore is not willing to supply them. If we will send him the money for the Annual Present it will be of great use to supply his present Necessities but I perceive you will not lett me have it now, but I shall have it when you please. At least you may pay the amount of the Present to the year 1746. 7 which will be better, as for every thing else Savadana Poolah will inform you when he arrives. The above is a palpable Falsity for the King has not only prevented the Merchants Contracting with us for any Pepper, but he actually forbid them paying in their Ballances. Indeed Chevedana Poolah did come here and offered to settle the Account Customs when the Ilchester was loading for Great Britain when we had not Leisure but he wou'd never come again till now and this has been made a pretence for not paying of the Pepper Ballances thô the Ballance was so much in the Honble Companys Favour. And what he says about the Annual Present is downright Triffling, for he cannot want so small a sum of money, nor can he or any man Expect it shoud be paid but upon the Honble Companys being put in full possession of their Antient priviledges on which that Present was founded.

Our Detachment returned from Tellicherry with three Chests of Treasure containing 30,000/ Rupees being all the money they can conveniently spare at present, they advise under the 1st. & 5th. /the boat's being detained by bad weather/ that Robert Rawdon, Esq^r. Chief of that Place died the 30 Ultimo and that Charges is devolved at present on M^r. Thomas Byfeld.

They inform us that they received a General Letter of the 11th. Ultimo from Fort St. David informing them of the Intended dispatch of the Honble Companys Ship Oxford to this place to be filled up for Europe and the Delawarr for Tellicherry bound for Benjar & China.

Reced a packett from the President & Council of Fort St. David dated October 10th. via Columba in which they tell us that they have putt 300 Bales & 30 Tonns of Red wood on board Our Honblè masters ship Oxford which is all the Tonnage they can possibly give at present and have dispatched her to be filled up here but if we can't fill her they desire she may be sent to Tellicherry and that they have wrrote the President & Council of Bombay and hope we shall have orders before she arrives here. That for the security of the Ship they have ordered the Captain to stay at Gallée untill he shou'd receive our Orders for his proceeding to this post but to forward his Packett via Columba.

I therefore beg your W^o. &c^a. Gentlemen will Excuse the Error Committed through Ignorance by Gentlemen.

The Chief wrote an Ola to the King desiring that his Majesty wou'd please to remember that he had promised to send Chevedana poolah (to settle as he called it) all Affairs with this Factory but said Poolah had passed to the Northward & returned to the Southward without so much as stoping here on which he desired that his Majesty woud please' to inform him whether he intended to send any of his Ministers or that the Honble Companys Affairs was to remain Embargo'd in this Manner.

30 The Chief received a Letter from Captain Philip Todrell advising that he had met with an Accident off Cape Commarine and requested that Boats and a Magazine might be ready to take in part of her Cargoe.

31st. The Chief received another Letter from Captain Philip Todrell with a Copy of his protest against the weather for his having sprung a Leake the 26 December off Cape Commorine Copy of which is this day Entered.

WHEREAS on Monday the 26 day of December 1748. at one O'Clock in the morning the Ship Orford being then off Cape Commoring a fresh Gale of wind sprung up when she began to make water having when first sounded 14 Inches in her hold and notwithstanding both Hand Pumps were sett to work they were so soon Choaked with Pepper that the water gained upon her to three feet before five O'Clock nor cou'd the Chain pump be sett to work being so Choaked with pepper also that several of the Links were broke in endeavouring to work it which Obliged us to take it up & scuttle it in Order to take the Chain out. And as the Salt Petre began to receive damage by the water encreasing in the Ships Hold having above three feet water there. We agreed in order to save the Ship & the remaining part of her Cargoe to through [*sic*] over board part of the Lee Booms and to slave all the water Casks that were upon Deck also a Quantity of Pepper which were kept in Bags to be started when the rest was settled in the Hold by which means & bailing a great deal of water We at last freed her to two foot and unanimously Agreed to putt back to Anjengo to Examine the Cargoe & stop the Leakes.

As this Accident has entirely proceeded from the stress of weather as more particularly Expressed in the Ships publicke Log Book. We the Commander & Officers of said Ship do hereby protest against the wind & weather for all Losses & Damages that may have on this Account occurred to the owners of said Ship & Cargoe

He talked much of the Dearness of Thread and insisted on having the price of the Sallampores A & B No. 5 & 6 being raised & as the Quantity of Cloth was large it wou'd not only require Time but that we must also advance the whole amount at four Payments the first to be immediately advanced that they may be able to Engage a sufficient Number of Weavers to compleat the Investment and he alledged the only reason why they had not complied with their former Contracts was from our not having supplied them with money sufficient to carry on the Business.

Nellipa Chitty being withdrawn took his proposals into Consideration & resolved that we will not raise the price of any of the Cloth and as this seems the best Season for Engaging the Weavers the Dutch not having yet made their Contracts and the Northern Merchants being returned home AGREED (knowing this Family of the Chittys to be rich and no apparent danger of the Honble Company's being any sufferers by them) to make him the following proposalls. First that the Cloth shall be as good as the last years Musters, Secondly that they shall deliver in the whole Investment of 30,000 p^s. of Cloth by the last day of December 1749 on which conditions we will advance them fanams 15,000 and upon their delivering Cloth to the amount of 80,000 we will advance them 80,000 fanams more & so continue till the last advance shall be made and the Contract Compleated. That 4 of Our Honble Masters Ships were at Kingelie raddy [sic] to sail for Europe and the Cormondell Coast when this Ship left Bengall the last of February.

14 The Honble Companys Sloop Cuddalore returned into the road it blowing very fresh Northerly & a great Sea, the Master William Holland wrote to the Chief by a Cattamaran (Our boat not being able to go over the Surff) that having had nothing but strong Northerly winds & Southerly Currents he had gott no farther then Calliquilone the 13^{th.} of the Month when he had a very hard Gale of Wind in which he split all his Sales and sprung his Mast dangerously the Surff runs so high & the Weather so bad that it is impossible to give her any Assistance at Present.

The Linguister says he cannot gett a clear & possitive Answer from these Ministers about the Honble Companys Affairs on his telling them that the Chief had promised to proure for the King 100 small Arms before the rains. The Dollova replied They must have 200 Arms now & before next May as many more as can be procured without which they could not write to the King about the Honble Comp^{ys.} Affairs.

The Annavy & Dollova say that 200 Arms will not be sufficient [sic] for his Majesty's use and that they Expect that the Chief will Engage to deliver them at least 500 more the next Season and then they will write to the King about the Honble Companys Affairs for which & all other Stores they can pay ready money or Pepper immediately.

THIS morning arrived two Munchuas with 800 Bales of Rice and a General port that he had given his word for no more than 100 Arms but had promised to endeavour to gett a 100 more after the rains that the Dollova had demanded no more than 200 Arms in his List and that their now making of an additional Demand of 500 more Arms looks as if they only intended to Triffle without coming to any Conclusion which if that were their real Intention there had been no occasion of sending the Linguister up. As to the number of 500 small arms I could not Engage to deliver any such Quantity not beleiving they can be procured. And as to the several Stores demanded by the Government there is no body doubts but they can pay for them but that is not a sufficient security for me to send for them. I Expect an Obligation from under his Majestys hand both to receive them & pay for them immediately on the delivery thereof. 22^p.

The making of any new demand at present is very ill timed As We can make no Engagements without the Permission of our Superiors at Bombay & the Monsoon being now upon setting in we can have no Answer till the Month of September next.

THIS morning arrived two Munchuas with 800 Bales of Rice and a General Letter from Tellicherry informing us that they have received our General Letter of the 19th March but the strong Northerly winds had prevented the Anjengo Sloops arrival at Tellicherry. That they had had a very violent storm which had done much Damage on the Coast and which had prevented their coming to any resolution about complying with the Master of the Sloops request of sending him 800 Bales of Rice to Callicutt & to take out the Honble Companys Bales there. And that they had an Account of her putting into a Port called Cuilandy before the storm & left it the 17th. 23

They cannot supply us with any broad Cloth or Perpets but will Indent for them at Bombay. They have reced Our Box of Books & Consultations which they them at Bombay. They have reced Our Box of Books & Consultations which they proposed sending away the 25th. if the weather will permitt.

OUR Honble Masters Ship Winchelsea has not been able to gett round Ceylone and is put into Negapatam, They hourly Expect the Doddington to receive her Dispatches to China from their Port.

RECED an Ola from Muttoo Chitty from Porca advising that one European & 4 of the Anjengo Sloops Lascars are arrived there who give an Account that the Sloop is lost in Pannany River.

THE River being landed returned the two Tellicherry Munchuas with a General Letter acknowledging the Receipt of the Rice and desiring an Account of the Cost of it as soon as they can conveniently send it, also advised them of the account we have reced of the loss of the Anjengo Sloop.

RECED a General Letter from Robert Baldwin Master of the Anjengo Sloop dated the 16th. Instant in which he informs us that on the 14 Inst. in sight of Sacrifice rocks he met with a very hard Gale of wind which split all the Sloops sails Except her foresail with which he worked till one O'Clock the 15 when being within two miles of the shore of Panany when the wind blowing hard at W.S.W. he was obliged to come to an Anchor but the sky looking very doubtfull & the Sea running so high that the Vessell Shipped a great deal of water which they cou'd not free the Pumps being Choaked & having the river of Panany open they made several signalls for a Pilot but to know [sic] purpose they at lenght [sic] agreed to slip their Cable & put for the rivers mouth as they cou'd not have rid it out till morning they gott very well over the Barr & Anchord when a number of the Natives came on board and under a pretence of assisting them to gett into the river they 24

run the Sloop on a sand as he beleives on purpose for oncoming in of the Flood Tide the sea broke over her & quite filled her then they took possession of the Sloop & plundered her of the Honble Companys Bales & every thing She had on board the Bales are in the hands of the Sammorines Rajadore and the Sloop lies sunk at the rivers mouth.

He informs us that he has sent Copy of this Letter to the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry.

Instant advising that he has sent a proper Person to Panany to see what can be saved of the Anjengo Sloops Cargoe and to gett what farther advices he can about that Affair and that he had advanced Mr. Baldwin thirty Rupees for his & the Sloops Crew's subsistance.

Having also reced a General Letter from the Chief & Factors at Tellicherry of the 27 Ultimo in which they inform us that it is so late that they cannot send down any Pepper for the Cuddalore Sloop and we having no Goods to put on board her, Wrote a Letter to the Governor & Council at Fort St. David advising them thereof.

Dispatched the Sloop.

They write us an unaccountable story (on our Complaint of the Loss in the Mangalore Rice) that on a scrutiny by a Committee of their Council, that, 100 Bales of Rice taken promiscuously out of their Warehouse, they found them to turn out 2^{lb}. more by weight & measure than they ought to do which is something very Extraordinary [&] they suppose it must be stolen out of the Sloop, but it unluckily happens that their [*sic*] is a greater deficiency in the Rice by the Munchuas than there was in that by the Sloop. They advise they [*sic*] Brillant Snow imported there the 24 & sailed the 25th. which day Ship Elizabeth imported there, by which Ship they intend sending us the 200 small Arms we wrote for but that 100 of them had been used.

IMPORTED the Brillant Snow belonging to the Honble Company from Bombay bound to Fort St. David. 3

SAILED the Brillant snow & imported the Royal Duke at present in his Majestys Service. The Chief loaded some Cables on board her for the use of the Squadron under Admiral Boscawen. 4

Sailed the Royal Duke for Fort St. David. 5

Imported Our Honble Master's Ship Elizabeth Captain Edward Wills, Captⁿ. Ambrose Laurence having died a few days ago. 7RECED a Letter from the Linguister advising that the Dutch Linguister was arrived at Mavillacurre from Cochien and that he had struck with the King of Travencores Ministers for what Pepper they will deliver at Quilone &^a. Triffling to lead us on with storys only to amuse us till the Monsoon is set in when it will require 4 or 5 Months to gett an Answer from our Superiors at Bombay and that their present Demand for small Arms was so Exorbitant that it cannot be complied with and that now they have demanded to raise the Price of the Pepper. Desired to know if this is done by his Majestys Order.

14 ARRIVED a Pattamar from Fort St. David with a General Letter dated the 21st. Ultimo giving an Account of a Terrible Storm they had on that Coast the 13th. & 14th. Ultimo in which were 45 Sail lost which were all lying at Anchor amongst which were his Majestys Ship the Namure of 74 Gunns & Pembroke of 60 & the Appollo it was supposed shared the same. As did also our Honble Masters Ships Winchelsea & Lincoln & the Augusta the Honble Companys own Ship. That not a Ship that was near the Coast but what had lost her Masts. That the Calamity was General the French, Dutch, Moors, Armenians & Jentues had all Shared the same fate. That his Majesty's Ship Pembroke had brought advice of the arrival of his Majestys Ship Syren at Columba, where she stayed to recruit her sick men. That she left England the 28th. March when the Peace was not concluded but hourly Expected. They had not reced any Letters from the Court of Directors but Expected one when the Ship arrived she having brought out Treasure on Account the Honble Company.

17TH. ARRIVED a Serjeant & 9 men with 30,000 R^s. from Tellicherry. The Chief & [c^a.] advise that they were very busy in Collecting Sandall to dispatch our Honble Masters Ship Doddington for China.

18 RETURN'D the Tellicherry Detachment with a General Letter acknowledging
21 the recet of the Treasure.

Reced the Kings Answer to the Chiefs Ola of the 12th. Instant which consists of nothing but Evasions, he acknowledges having reced an Account from his Ministers of what passed at Mavillacurree & says that all former Chiefs of Anjengo used to supply this Government with what they wanted in times of necessity & when the present does the same it will be then time to talk. That he has no Inclinations to impede the Honble Companys Trade but wishes it were Augmented. When it is plain to a demonstration that it is he & he only that has putt an intire stop to the Pepper Trade & while the Dutch will give this Exorbitant Price for it is not probable that any thing but force can oblige him to lett us have any.

The Chagoes who always sort the Honble Companys Cloth representing to the Board the great hardships they laboured under in the loss of their time by constantly attending the sorting of the Honble Companys Cloth for which they formerly had an allowance annually of 25 fanams & $\frac{1}{4}$ of p^s. of Taffaty each man which they have not reced for some Years past and that as the annually [*sic*] Investments are now larger they are obliged to give greater attendance for which they hope to be considered for their Trouble as formerly and that they may be paid for their Arrears.

The Chagoes request seeming so very reasonable to us, AGREED that they be paid for the two last Years only and that they be paid in future as formerly provided the Investments be as large.

That they never had any Inclination to impede the Honble Companys Trade and as to this Years Pepper Contract they had not reced a satisfactory Answer to their Demand by the Linguister so that it is not their Fault if the Business does not go forward. As the Honble Company will not supply the King with such warlike Stores they can spare, His Majesty suspects their Diligence in Endeavouring to persuade us to spare them, & We suspect their Affection to the Honble Company so that they are suspected on both sides.

7 The Chief wrote an Ola to Cristna Annavy & the Dollova in Answer to theirs of the 6th. Instant to the following Purport. That I had wrote them as clear as possible as to every thing they demanded by the Linguister. That I never said that they did the Honble Companys Affairs any prejudice but that I am too though ugly [sic] convinced that some body does by the Honble Company being debarred of their Pepper Trade for these two Years past. As to the Honble Companys Pepper Ballances Chevedana Poolah knows nothing of them he having only settled the Kings Account & his Account Customs, And as all the Merchants declare that they were obliged to pay the money advanced to the Dollova it is he who must be best acquainted with this Affair, and we desire that he will order the Pepper to be delivered in for those Ballances which has now been outstand^g for this two Years to the Honble Companys great Detriment. As to your Complaint that We will not supply his Majesty with what stores are procurable it is groundless for you were assured that you shou'd be supplied as farr as were in Our Power & further we cou'd not Engage, you say that you have no desire to prejudice the Honble Company but the Pepper is carrying out of the Country & the Honble Companys Pepper Ballances unpaid.

19 Christna Annavy wrote the Chief an Ola advising that the Prince & He were arrived at Attinga in their return from the Southward & that a wedding wou'd detain them there till tomorrow.

The Chief wrote each of them a Compliment on their Arrival & wrote the Annavy that he is surprised that He & the Dollova had not sent an Answer to his Ola of the 9th. Instant that he must know that Chevedana Poolah cou'd know nothing of the Pepper Ballances as he never had any thing to do with those Accounts And as to their raising their Demands for small Arms they well knew that they were not to be gott here what was procurable I had gott for them on which they immediately doubled their Demands. That if he pleased I woud send the Linguister to wait on him about the Honble Companys Affairs.

20 The Annavy sent to desire that the Linguister might attend him at Attinga which he accordingly did & had a long Conference with him but to very little purpose further than to promise to use his Interest with his Majesty to gett an Order for the Pepper Ballances to be paid. He had not to say with regard to the Obstruction of the Honble Companys pepper Trade, but that those Affairs were Conducted intirely by the Kings particular Order & that as his Majestys small Arms were very much decayed & continued daily & decaying he was in great want of a Supply.

That He was ready & willing to do every thing in his Power to serve the Honble Company but he cou'd do nothing at Present, & advised that the Chief shoud write again to the King.

THE Chief wrote an Ola to the King desiring to know the reason the Honble. Companys Trade is impeded & the Merchants not permitted to come & settle their Accounts & pay their Ballances.

- 21 ARRIVED a Pattamar from Fort St. David with a General Letter from the President & Council acknowledging the receipt of Ours of the 2^d. & 23^d. May with the Pay Masters Account sundries supplied the Cuddalore Sloop & our Pacquett from for [sic] Bombay Presidency which they have forwarded.
- They also advise that on the 14th. Ultimo imported Our Honble Masters Ship Griffin from Europe for China as did the Sandwich the 28th. for the same place. They left England the 26th. January in Company with the Montford, Augusta & Tavistock but seperated in a hard gale in the Channell. The Dragon sailed 3 Weeks before them but not yet heard of.
- The Honble Company have appointed Commissioners out of Fort St. David Council to receive Madrass from the French & Mr. Dawson is appointed President of Bengall. The Rhoda & Griffin sailed the 28th. Ultimo for China & the Sandwich & Royal Duke follow in a few days.
- RECED a Triffling Evasive Answer from the King of Travencore in which he pretends that he is not so well supplied with warlike stores as formerly but nothing to the Purpose about the Honble Companys Trade.
- 22 RECED advice that the King is going to the Northward on which the Chief wrote him an Ola requesting that his Majesty will call as he passes that the Chief may have a Conference with him about this Obstruction of the Honble Companys Pepper Trade at present.
- 27 RECED his Majestys Answer that his Affairs will not permit him to call as he Passes to the Northward but if the Languister meets him at Boccalay he will give him an Audience.
