FOREWORD

1. All the Imperial tables contained in this volume are in accord with the prescribed form and cover the whole population of 14,436,148 persons enumerated in the Dominions of His Exalted Highness the Nizam on the night of 26th of February, 1931. There was no non-synchronous area this time and, therefore, there is no estimated population of any tract included in the above figure.

2. In all tables, in which statistics are given by districts, the Dominions have been divided into two natural divisions, Marathwara and Telangana. Districts being the unit of administration, subahs have been left out of consideration. Telangana includes the city of Hyderabad, which embraces the metropolis, the British Administered Areas and the British cantonments of Secunderabad and Bolarum. Aurangabad (cantonment included), Gulbarga, and Warangal towns have been treated as cities. The last is comprised of Fort Warangal, Matwada, Hanamkonda, and Urus Karimabad and the figures of the previous censuses have been grouped together to admit of comparison.

3. The samastan of Amarchinta has this time been assigned its proper place, in Mahbubnagar district. For the purpose of comparison, therefore, its population figures at the preceding censuses have been deducted from the Raichur district total and added to that of Mahbubnagar.

4. In the age tables the individual ages have been reckoned from the nearest births and not from the number of completed years as in 1921.

5. For the first time separate figures for Urdu literates have been shown along with English figures in the Imperial table.

6. Imperial table XX is an additional feature presenting in a nutshell the area, population, density and religions of each district. The table of literate unemployed was not compiled as the schedules returned were too inadequate and entries too unreliable to be of any use.

7. Among the State tables, an innovation has been made in II by showing literacy by religions and English literacy by taluks. The other useful additions are III in three parts regarding Infirmities, IV on cottage industries and V population of wards of the Hyderabad city.
