I have the honour by direction of the Chief of Jamkhandi to submit the Annual Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State for the Fasli year 1319 (1909—10) ending 5th June 1910.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2 The area of the State is 524 square miles and the total population is 105,357 according to the census of 1901. For administrative purposes the State is divided into three Talukas, Jamkhandi, Bidri and Kundgol, and three Thanas, Wathar, Patkhal and Dhavalpuri. The first two Talukas situated on the banks of the river Krishna are within the limits of the Belgaum and Bijapur Districts, and the third is in Dharwar. The three Thanas are within the Satara, Sholapur and Abamednagar Collectories. The gross revenue of the State inclusive of Inam alienations is estimated at Rs. 817,387. A tribute of Rs. 20,515 is annually paid by the State to the British Government.

3 The Chief Shrimant Parasharamrao Ramachandra alias Bhausab Patwardhan, a Koknastha Brahman by caste and aged 27 is a First Class Sardar of the Deccan and a Treaty Chief. His wife Ramabai Saheb and minor son Shankarrao Appasaheb, are doing well.

4 Having visited Italy, Switzerland, France, England and Scotland the Chief returned to India in September 1909. On his return to Jamkhandi he saw you at Kolhapur during the same month and later on he paid a visit to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay in Poona. He had been to Bombay, Belgaum

and Mahableshwar during the year and was present at the Sangli installation Darbar. He paid short visits to a few villages in Bidri and Jamkhandi Talukas.

5 The Assistant Political Agent visited Jamkhandi in January 1910 and Kundgol in April 1909.

6 The Chief of Sangli and Captain Burke had come to Jamkhandi (in November 1909.) on a short visit.

7 The names of the principal Officials of the State are given in Appendix I.

CHAPTER II.

ADMINISTRATION OF LAND.

8 With the exception of a few alienated villages in Bidri and Kundgol Talukas the Survey Settlement has been introduced into all the villages of the State and the terms of the Settlement extend to 1911 and 1913. There were, therefore, no new survey operations this year.

9 The area of waste land available for cultivation was 5,066 acres and 26 gunthas; 522 acres and 19 gunthas were taken up for cultivation during the year, and 178 acres and 32 gunthas were thrown out. There is a large decrease in the area taken up this year as compared with the last year's figure, and the reason assigned for the decrease is that almost all the useful lands have been already taken up and there are very few lands left now, which will pay the cost of cultivation.

10 There were only two applications for Tagai advances from Wathar Thana, one for improving well water and the other for purchasing building materials. Both were granted.

11 There was no occasion for large remissions this year. Arrears, however, of water rate in the Wathar Thana and other irrecoverable outstandings to the amount of Rs. 6,121 were ordered to be written off.

12 The total area of land under cultivation during the year was 256,357 acres against 253,617 acres of the past year. The land revenue demand (Jamabandi) inclusive of fixed assessment and fluctuating miscellaneous items amounted to Rs. 472,133—2—0 this year against Rs. 470,136—5—6 of the previous year, while the actual realizations were Rs. 454,556 against Rs. 414,964 of the last year. No difficulty was experienced in the revenue collection in the Kundgol and Jamkhandi Talukas but the crops in some villages of the Bidri Taluka being indifferent owing to scanty rainfall, the work of collection had to be very cautiously done and every facility was given to the ryot to pay his dues. 1866 notices of demand had to be issued, while in 11 cases moveable property had to be attached, in two of which alone the final step of sale had to be taken. Thus resort to coercive measures was limited to as few cases as possible.

CHAPTER III.

PROTECTION

LEGISLATION.

13 Acts and Regulations in force in this State are given in Appendix II. Only one Act viz: Press and Registration of Books Act of 1867 was introduced into the State during the year.

MILITARY FORCE.

14 There is no military force in the State.

POLICE.

15 Appendix IV shows the strength, discipline and education of the Police Force in the State. There is an increase of 60 in the strength of the Force, due to the inclusion of the men in the Chief's Body Guard, in this Statement.

16 There is a slight improvement in the discipline of the Force as there were fewer dismissals this year. There is an increase in the number of men able to read and write.

17 Of the whole Police Force 243 carry fire arms (193 Muzzle loading Sniders and 50 Breach loading Martini Henry muskets) and the rest are provided with swords and batons.

18 There is slight variation in the ratio of the whole Police Force to area and population. There is one Police man for 1.4 Square miles and 299.3 people.

19 The duties of the regular Police are the prevention of crime, investigation of offences, preservation of peace and order and the supplying of guards and escorts. The Sowars or the Mounted Police assist the regular Police in their work and are also employed on other miscellaneous duties.

20 Appendix V and VI show the results of the work done by the Police during the year. There is a slight increase in the number of offences reported to the Police, 87 against 85 of the past year; a similar increase is noticed in the number of accused persons arrested and sent up for trial. Of the 69 accused persons sent up for trial 39 were convicted and the rest were discharged. The Police did not seem to be as successful this year in arresting proper persons and in recovering stolen property as they were last year. Still it may be remarked that the figures of percentage of convictions and recoveries are over or about 50 percent.

21 The total number of crimes (193) of all kinds (both cognizable and noncognizable) committed and disposed of during the year under report shows an increase which is chiefly noticeable under hurts and offences under local and special laws. Of the 3 murders one was really a case of murder, while the other two were doubtful cases. In the first case which resulted in

conviction an old Kazi was brutally murdered by a Mulla in a serious riot in connection with the rights of worship of a Darga. Of the remaining two cases, one related to abandoning a newly born child by a widow and the other was the finding of dead body of a woman in a well. The accused in the first case was discharged for want of evidence; and in the second, nobody having come forward to complain that the woman was really murdered nor even to identify the dead body, there is little hope of getting any evidence in the matter. There was no dacoity this year. Seven robberies are shown as committed but three of them were doubtful cases which have been struck off, and others were not serious offenses, but only thefts of sheep, goats and other petty things. Some of these are under investigation and the remaining have resulted in discharge or acquittal of the persons apprehended. Most cases of thefts have been detected and the accused persons therein convicted. Other offences there were, but they do not call for any special mention or comment.

22 The number of Village Police (Police Patils and Sihat Sanadis) was 333. The Village Police are chiefly entrusted with the Police duties described in the village Police Act in their villages. They are remunerated partly by Inam lands and partly by cash payments.

23 There were 40 cases of accidental deaths and 22 of fires. The value of property burnt is estimated at Rs. 1,742.

24 The total cost on the Police was Rs. 40,819 this year against Rs. 49,751 of the past year.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

25 The number and description of the various criminal courts of original jurisdiction at work during the year in the State are given in Appendix VIII. There has been no alteration in the constitution of courts

26 There were 189 cases for disposal this year, against 143 of the previous year, and corresponding to the rise in the number of cases the number of accused persons increased (421 against 277). Of the 421 accused persons 134 were convicted, 145 were acquitted, 130 were discharged and 7 committed for trial to the Sessions Court. Only 5 persons remained under trial at the end of the year. The average duration of cases in all Magisterial Courts was 10.7 days

27 There are two Criminal Appellate Courts, the Huzur or the Chief's Court exercising High Court and Sessions Court powers and the Karbhari's Court exercising District Magistrate's powers. The results of the work done by the Appellate Courts are shown in Appendix IX. There was only one appeal to the Huzur Court and 10 to the District Magistrate's Court. Of the 11 appeals, the convictions in 3 were confirmed, sentences reversed in 4, and modified in 2, further inquiry ordered in 1 and one was pending at the end of March 1910 but has been since disposed of.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

23 The number and description of the several courts of original civil jurisdiction at work in the State and the results of the work done by them in connection with suits instituted, are given in Appendix X. There is one court that exercises First class Sub-judge's powers and the rest exercise Second Class Sub-judge's powers. 755 new suits were filed during the year against 710 of the last year. Out of 886 cases for disposal, 753 were disposed of and 133 remained pending at the end of the year. There were 181 suits for lands and houses, 531 for money transactions and 43 for other rights. The entire value of the subject matter of suits is estimated at Rs. 114,044 against Rs. 109,341 of the past year. There were 16 suits above Rs. 1000; 21 above Rs. 500; 179 above Rs. 100, and 539 below Rs. 100. The average duration of suits in all courts was 2 months and 27 days.

29 Appendix XI shows the details of work done in connection with the execution of decrees. There were 760 applications for execution this year against 852 of the past year. Of the 925 applications for disposal, 822 were disposed of and 103 remained pending. There were 20 applications above one year and the rest below 12 or 6 months.

30 The number and description of the Civil Appellate Courts and the results of the work done by them are given in Appendix XII. The Huzur or the Chief's Court is the highest court of appeal, while the Karbhari's Court is the regular or the first appellate court. There were 56 new appeals this year for disposal besides the 2 pending. Of these 54 were disposed of and 2 remained pending. In 30 cases the decrees were confirmed and in 10 reversed, 3 cases were compromised and 11 have been remanded. The average duration of appeals was 2 months and 2 days.

EXTRADITION.

31 This year 12 accused persons were received for trial from the British Authorities and 6 were handed over by the Jamkhandi state to the British, Sangli and Kolhapur Courts. No want of reciprocity was felt.

PRISON

32 The Principal Jail of the State is situated within the town of Jamkhandi. It is an old fashioned quadrangular building sufficiently strong and well ventilated. There is ample accommodation in the building for all sorts of prisoners civil and criminal, male and female, and convicted and under trial. The Chief Medical Officer of the State is the Superintendent of the Jail. Besides the principal or central Jail at Jamkhandi there are sub-jails for short time prisoners at Kundgol and Savalg in charge of the Taluka Mamlatdars, and lock-ups at Wathar and Mudhavi in charge of Wahivatdars of Wathar and Patkhal.

33 There were 95 new admissions in all the Jails against 59 of the last year. Out of the total (121) 85 were released and 36 remained in the Jamkhandi Jail at the end of the year. The daily average in the Central Jail was 30.31.

The total expenditure on all jails was Rs. 2917-3-6 against Rs. 2883-15-5 of the last year.

34 The annual dietary cost per head in Jamkhandi Jail was Rs. 41. The earnings of the convict labour were estimated at Rs. 637.

35 There was no death in the jail and the health of the prisoners was good throughout the year.

36 There was no breach of jail discipline this year. Remission of sentences was given to 20 prisoners according to the Mark system, which is in force in the State.

37 Convicts were mostly employed in the State Gardens, the State Printing Press and the Faraskhana. Some prisoners were put on weaving coarse cotton and woolen cloths required for the use of the convicts.

38 There were 3 civil prisoners and 2 lunatics in the Jamkhandi Jail during the year.

REGISTRATION.

39 Appendices XIV and XV give information about the Registration Department. The first shows the work done, while the second gives the financial results. There is a slight decrease this year in the number of documents presented for registration. (1902 against 2065, of the last year). Inversely to the decrease in the total number of documents, the number of mortgage deeds has increased (721 against 688), while sale deeds have fallen from 682 to 589. This state of things is as it should be. 6 documents were refused registration and one is pending inquiry.

40 All the registry offices were inspected.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATION.

41 There are six municipalities in the State, two at the head quarter towns of Jamkhandi and Kundgol Talukas, and four in other large villages. Jamkhandi town being the head quarter of the State and an important place, the working of the municipality there, is carried on according to the provisions of the Bombay District Municipal Act. It consists of 7 elected and 11 nominated councillors. Other municipalities being unfit for the elective franchise, the councillors there-of are all nominated and their working is regulated by certain special rules based on the general principles laid down in the District Municipal Act. The State Karbhari is the President of all the municipalities and as such controls their general working. The Chairmen of the Managing Committees of most of the municipalities are non-officials.

42 The financial condition of all the bodies is sound (vide Appendix XVI). Receipts in most municipalities have increased, and it is to be observed that notwithstanding enhanced expenditure, they were able to show good closing balances. House Tax and Octroi duties are the principal heads of income, while general conservancy, lighting, road repairs, water supply, education &c, are the chief items of expenditure.

43 Owing to deficient rainfall there was little water in the Katekeri Tank and the Jamkkandi Municipality had to spend a large sum on pumping water from a temporary well dug in the tank. Further progress was made in the construction of the Vegetable Market building, which is approaching completion. Surface drainage or the construction of open U shaped gutters was undertaken in Jamkhandi and Banhatti. Improvement of water supply in tanks and wells was the principal item of expenditure in Sawashi, Kundgol and Kandoli Municipalities. Road repairs were attended to every where. Sanitation was well looked after in all the municipal towns.

CHAPTER IV.

PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

RAINFALL AND CROPS.

44 Appendix XVII will show the amount of rainfall in the State during the year under report. In Jamkhandi and Bidri the rainfall was not only less than that of the last year, but was much below the average of past five years. In Kundgol, however, it was much more than last year's fall and also a little above the average. The rainfall naturally determined the condition of crops both Khariff and Rabi in all places. In Bidri Taluka where the rain was the lowest, the crops were poor, in Jamkhandi they were middling, while in Kundgol they were excellent. The outturn of cotton in Kundgol was estimated at 14 annas and that of wheat above 12 annas. In the other two Talukas the outturn of Jwari and cotton was estimated at 4 to 6 annas.

45 Although the yield of crops was indifferent in some places, fodder supply was sufficient, and water supply fair every where and so the condition of the agricultural stock was on the whole good (vide Appendix XX). There is an improvement under several heads, while bullocks and cows show notable increase.

46 There were no regular crop experiments but some attempts were made to grow Broach, Khandeshi, and American cotton in a field at Jamkhandi proposed to be made the State Experimental Farm. It appeared that the land was suitable for these varieties of cotton, but owing to meagre rainfall the out-turn was poor. American ground-nut was also sown but it failed.

PRICES AND WAGES.

47 Appendix XVIII will show the prevailing prices of food grains as compared with those of the last year. There is very little improvement and it seems that the prices might continue high and the chances of a fall are distant.

48 The rates of wages are getting high as a natural consequence of the rise in prices, and moreover labour is becoming scarce and dear day by day. The rates for unskilled labour were 4 to 6 annas, and those for skilled ranged from 8 to 12 annas.

FOREST

49 The area under Forest continued unaltered. The revenue increased from Rs. 3,551 to Rs. 3,827, while the expenditure was Rs. 1,764 against Rs. 1,647 of the past year. Attempts were, as usual, made at plantation but owing to insufficient rain--fall they proved fruitless.

50 Thirteen persons were punished for forest offences. There were no forest fires.

TRADE AND MANUFACTURE

51 There is little trade worth mention in the state. Rice, Sugar, Colours, Karosine oil, Timber and other articles of foreign manufacture are the principal heads of import, while food grains and cotton are chiefly exported. Imports and exports were estimated at Rs. 1,859,447 and Rs. 905,070 respectively during the year.

52 Dyeing and weaving business is carried on to a large extent in the town of Banhatti. Cotton and silk sarees are manufactured and sent out. Coarse cotton and woolen cloths are also manufactured in Jamkhandi and other villages. There were 3,921 hand looms at work during the year. Kardi oil-pressing business is also done in some places. There were 76 oil presses working.

53 The State ginning factory was working for nearly 3 months. Cotton weighing about 607 khandis was ginned. The profit made in the bargain is estimated at Rs. 1,680.

54 There were three private ginning factories in Kundgol Taluka, two at Savashi and one at Kundgol.

FAIRS AND SHOWS

55 The annual cattle fair was held at Jamkhandi in April last. There was, as usual, a very large gathering of men at the fair both for business and sight seeing. Nearly 5,634 heads of cattle were brought to the fair of which about 4753 were bullocks. Prizes were awarded for fine animals by the Chief in a formal Darbar specially held for the purpose. Speeches were made at the Darbar on the theory of rainfall and the importance of putting *Tals* or embankments round fields so as not to allow the rain water that fell from the skies to run waste. Prizes were given to some cultivators who had put such *tals* as a sort of encouragement. Small fairs were held as usual at Kadpatti and Kundgol.

POST OFFICES AND MINT.

56 There are eight Post offices in the State. The office at Jamkhandi is combined Telegraph office also. There is no mint in the State.

PUBLIC WORKS.

57. Appendix XIX shows the details of expenditure on public works from the State as well as Local funds. The total expenditure this year was Rs. 72,271 against Rs. 69,084 of the last year. The following are some of the works which require a passing notice.

58 Under State buildings may be mentioned the following works:—the out-houses attached to the new Guest House, stables for horses and elephants, the Shikarkhana Compound, and additions and alterations to State buildings at Ramtirth. Under the head of Public offices comes the outlay on the Sawalgi Mamlatdar's office. Further progress was made in the construction of this building. Annual repairs were made to all Kacheris and offices. A new building for Faraskhana has been commenced at Jamkhandi. A small building for Municipal Office at Kundgoi has been erected. The Dharmashala building at Gote was completed. Yaliwal is still under construction and a new Dharmashala has been undertaken at Gadyal. A new Chawadi was built at Asgi.

59 Among school-houses, the "Ferris School" at Jamkhandi deserves special mention. The building has been completed and was formally and ceremoniously opened by Major Harrison, when he was at Jamkhandi. It is a spacious and well ventilated building. The school-house at Savshi is still under construction, and a new school building for girls has been undertaken at Banhatti. Additions to and alterations in old school-buildings were necessitated by increased attendance and were, therefore, undertaken and carried out at Banhatti, Navalgi, Hosur, Tadalbagi, Sawalgi, Hulugbali, Kamdoli, Devnur and Wathar.

60 Under water supply may be mentioned the construction of wells at Kalhali, Nelgud, Sawalgi, Gote, Chikalgi, and Walmasar. Tanks at Vasali and Shirur were cleared. The Shiddapur Channel was further improved.

61 There was no new road but all the existing roads were repaired as usual. New trees were planted. Cattle pounds were constructed at Kadkol and Algur.

62 All the Dharmashalas and School-houses were repaired.

CHAPTER V.

REVENUE AND FINANCE.

63 The Financial condition of the State will be seen from the details given in Appendix XXII.

64 The income of the year has slightly increased, while the expenditure has greatly decreased leaving a larger closing balance as compared with that of

the last year. There is a large increase under Land revenue due to better collection. Most of the other sources of revenue show more or less decrease. The payment of the emoluments to the village officers which was to be paid in May, has been deferred to July, and hence the decrease under revenue establishment. Increase and decrease under other departments have been noticed in dealing with those departments.

65 There was not much demand for loans from the State Bank. Only Rs. 4800 were advanced during the year on the security of Inam lands. Rs. 22,336 (15,486 principal and 6,849 interest) were recovered during the year leaving Rs. 113,128 out-standing to be recovered in future. The profit made by the Bank is estimated at Rs. 5.5 percent.

66 The interest on Government Securities and other investments amounting to Rs. 461,300, received during the year was Rs. 22,996.

CHAPTER VI.

MEDICAL RELIEF AND VITAL STATISTICS.

67 The number of Medical Institutions in the State remained unaltered, *viz.* 4. The Hospital at Jamkhandi, called the Prince of Wales Hospital is in charge of the Chief Medical Officer, and the three Dispensaries at Kundgol, Banhatti and Savalgi are in charge of Medical Assistants. All the institutions are charitable.

68 The results of the work done by the Medical Department are given in Appendix XXIII. The total attendance during the year was 37,591 of whom 30 were indoor patients. The prevailing diseases were fevers, worms, bowel complaints, lung affections, ear, eye and skin diseases. There were 15 major and 1,154 minor operations.

VITAL STATISTICS.

69 Births and deaths registered during the year under report were 3,476 and 2,702 respectively against 3,512 and 1,924 of the last year. The ratio per mille of births was 32.9, while that of deaths was 25.6. Births have slightly decreased, while deaths show a large increase due probably to the prevalence of cholera in nearly 25 villages during the early months of the year. There were 840 attacks and 445 deaths. There were 6 cases of small pox. The most fortunate circumstance regarding public health was the entire absence of plague in the state during the year under report.

70 The following tabular statement gives the results of the work done by the Vaccination Department.

There were 43 cases of re-vaccination.

71 The State Vaccination Inspector visited all the Talukas and Thanas for inspection.

SANITATION.

72 There is no special establishment for sanitation. Municipalities do the work in Municipal towns and in villages it is looked after by the Village and Taluka Officers.

73 The total expenditure on the Medical and Vaccination Departments during the year was Rs. 12,376 against Rs. 12,062 of the last year.

CHAPTER VII.

EDUCATION.

74 Appendix XXV gives information about the number of schools in the Jamkhandi State and the attendance of pupils therein. Five new schools (of primary education) in villages were opened this year. The total number of schools now is 72 and that of pupils 5,471, an increase of 5 in the former and of 672 in the latter. The daily attendance has increased in all schools. There is a large increase this year in the amount of expenditure on education viz: Rs. 29,324 against Rs. 27,316 of the last year.

75 The number of schools and scholars in villages has been remarkably increasing since primary education was made free in the State, and it seems that the increase will continue for a year or two. Almost all the large villages in the State have now got schools and it is only two or three villages with a population of 500 and upwards that are without schools; in the rest (about 10 villages) the population being below 400, it may not perhaps be conveniently possible to open schools for some time to come.

76 The Parasharam Bhau High School at Jamkhandi sent up 14 candidates this year for the Matriculation Examination, of whom 12 came out successful. 10 students from this school presented themselves for the 1st and 2nd Grade Art examinations and 9 passed. Not only intellectual education is given in the school at a nominal fee of one anna per mensem, but provision is made for imparting moral and physical training to all the boys, and deserving poor students have got the special advantage of getting free food. The average number of such free boarders was 42 this year. The High School thus continues to be a very useful, popular and efficient institution. The Educational Inspector S. D. inspected the school this year and remarked that the staff deserves praise for the efficient management of the school.

77 There is a second grade Anglo-Vernacular school in the town of Kundgol where instruction is given upto the 3rd standard.

78 Education in Vernacular up to the 7th standard is imparted in three large towns of the State while in small villages instruction is given up to the 4th standard, 20 boys from the three large schools appeared for the Vernacular Public Service Examination, and 18 came out successful.

79 There is a Hindusthani school for Mahomedan boys in Jamkhandi, and separate Hindusthani classes in the schools at Kundgol and Kamdoli. The number of Mahomedan boys getting instruction this year was 187 against 153 of the past year. Jamkhandi town possesses an independent school for the children of depressed classes, and in other places boys of these classes are admitted in village schools. Books and slates are given free of cost to the boys, and other inducements and encouragements are given with a view to make education popular among these classes. The number of children under instruction of such classes was 175 against 92 of the past year.

80 There are independent Girls' schools in 3 places, Jamkhandi, Banhatti and Kundgol and in other places, girls are admitted in boys' schools. The number of girls in all schools, was 519 this year.

81 A special teacher was engaged this year to teach drawing in all the schools in the town of Jamkhandi.

82 Almost all the schools were inspected by the State Educational Inspector who reported that the results (being above 71 percent) were satisfactory.

83 There were 4 indigenous schools in the State during the year besides the State schools. One of them receives State grant. There were 183 children in these schools.

84 If the total expenditure on the Educational Department is taken into consideration, it appears that the State spends about 4.8 percent of its real income on education, while the expenditure per head of the population is about 5 annas per annum, and the cost per student under instruction is about 5.3 rupees. Of the entire population in the state 5.2 percent are under instruction in schools.

85 Besides the maintenance of schools for vernacular instruction and a High School for English education within the State limits, scholarships (to the amount of Rs. 90 per mensem) are awarded by the State with a view to encourage higher education to deserving students studying in Poona and Bombay; three of these students are in the Arts colleges, one in the Medical College and one in the Victoria Jubilee Technical Institute.

CHAPTER VIII

MISCELLANEOUS.

86 There are two Printing Presses in the State, one maintained by the State for printing forms, circulars &c. and the other by a private person for job work.

87 There are 7 reading rooms in the State. All of them receive grants from the Municipal and Local Funds.

88 I visited all the Talukas and Thanas and several villages in the State. While on my inspection tour, I examined accounts and records in Taluka Kacheris and Village Chawadis, visited schools and dispensaries, inspected public works, such as buildings, wells, roads and tanks in progress or completed and lastly attended to the wants of the people and heard their complaints.

CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

89. The prevailing prices of food grains and the unusually high prices of cotton during the season greatly mitigated the ill effects of insufficient rain-fall in some parts of the State. For a poor out-turn of cotton (which is the principal crop in the State) in the field the cultivator could get a rich return in the market this year, and he was thus able without much difficulty to make provision for the public as well as private demands. His agricultural stock increased and the occasions to part with his landed property by sale decreased. So the year on the whole was a fair one to the agriculturist. The rise in the rates of wages and the scarcity of labour indicate that the labouring classes fared better than last year. The marriage season mended the condition of the weaving and trading classes. Cholera disturbed the public health in some places for some time but the entire absence of the more dangerous epidemic (plague) from the State through-out the year was a great relief to the people in general.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

90 Though the year 1909—10 was a normal one, so far as the administration of the State was concerned, the above record will show that the several departments earnestly attempted, as usual, to make the results of their working conducive to the moral and material progress of the people of the State. Administration of justice both Civil and Criminal was prompt and efficient. The working of the Police was on the whole fair. Revenue collections were made almost without pressure and every facility was given, where needed, to the ryot to pay his assessment. The financial equilibrium of the State Treasury was maintained. With increased income the Municipalities spent larger sums for the convenience

and comforts of the people in their charge. The working of the Medical and Vaccination Departments was efficient. There was an enhanced outlay on the Public Works Department which undertook and executed several works of public utility. An all round progress was made by the Educational Department. And lastly it is a matter for satisfaction that there was no unrest and its attendant evil results in the State and the people continued to be loyal.

91 In conclusion, I am desired by the Chief to convey his hearty and sincere thanks to you and to the Assistant Political Agent for the valuable advice given and the kind treatment received from time to time.

SIR,

I have the honour, by direction of the Chief of Jamkhandi, to submit the Annual Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State, for the Fasli year 1320 (1910—11) ending 5th June 1911.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2 The area of the State is 524 square miles and the total population is 105,357 according to the census of 1901. For administrative purposes the State is divided into three Talukas, Jamkhandi, Bidri and Kundgol and three Thanas, Wathar, Patkhal and Dinvalpuri. The first two Talukas situated on the banks of the river Krishna, are in the Belgauni and Bijapur Districts, and the third is in Dharwar. The three Thanas are within the Satara Sholapur and Ahmednagar Collectorates respectively. The gross revenue of the State including Inam alienations is estimated at Rs. 929,133. The State pays an annual tribute of Rs. 20,515 to the British Government.

3 The Chief Shrimant Parashuramrao Ramchandra alias Bhausahab Patwardhan is a Koknastha Brahman by caste and his age is 28. He is a First Class Sardar of the Deccan and a Treaty Chief. He has one son, Shankarrao Appasaheb, aged 5 years. One event requiring special mention here is that the Chief's wife Shrimati Saubhagyawati Ramabaisahab successfully passed this year the First Grade Drawing Examination of the School of Arts, Bombay.

4 The Chief paid visits to His Excellency the Governor of Bombay in Poona and Mahaleshwar. He saw you at Kolhapur in December last.

He had been to Belgaum and Bombay. He inspected some villages of the Jamkhandi and Bidri Talukas.

5 You visited the State in November last and the Assistant Political Agent was in the State on his inspection tour in January.

6 The Chief of Jath had come to Jamkhandi on a short visit.

7 The names of the principal officials of the State are given in Appendix I.

CHAPTER II.

ADMINISTRATION OF LAND.

8 With the exception of a few Inam villages, the whole State has been brought under the Survey Settlement. The terms of the Settlements extend to 1911 and 1913. No new surveys were made during the year under report.

9 Out of about 4722 acres of waste land available for cultivation, 1150 acres were taken up during the year, against 522 acres last year, and only 28 acres were relinquished. The large increase in the area taken up seems to be due to improved condition of the people on account of fair season and good crops.

10 As there were no applications for Tagai advances no grant was made this year.

11 There was no occasion for remissions this year. Irrecoverable out-standings of land and other revenues were written off to the amount of Rs. 1429.

12 The total area of land under cultivation during the year was 262,322 acres against 256,357 of the previous year. The land revenue demand (Jamabandi) amounted to Rs. 415,941, against Rs. 409,743 of the past year, while the total land revenue collections of the current year's demand, as well as of past years arrears amounted to Rs. 457,479 against Rs. 454,556 of the past year. Owing to better crops and prices this year, the agriculturists paid their dues with much ease. Only 1111 notices of demand had to be issued for the current year's demand, while the recovery of past years arrears necessitated 37 cases of distraint of property but in none of which the extreme measure of sale was resorted to.

CHAPTER III.

PROTECTION

LEGISLATION.

13 The Acts and Regulations in force in the State are given in Appendix II.

Only one new Act, viz. Bombay Boiler Inspection Act was introduced during the year.

MILITARY FORCE.

14 There is no military force in the State.

POLICE.

15 The details regarding the strength, discipline and education of the State Police Force, both foot and mounted, are given in Appendix IV. There has been no change in the Police Force this year, the total strength being 352. The total expenditure incurred on the Police Department was Rs. 44314 against Rs. 40819 of the last year. The increase is due to dress.

16 Three men from the mounted Police were dismissed, three foot Police judicially punished, and 33 fined departmentally. Three swars were rewarded by promotion.

17 Of the entire force 142 are able to read and write. While 185 are under instruction.

18 As regards arms, 243 carry fire arms (193 muzzle loading Sniders and 50 Breech loading Martini Henry muskets) and the rest are provided with swords and batons.

19 There has been no variation in the ratio of the Police to area and population. There is one Police man for 1.4 square miles and 299.3 people.

20 Prevention and investigation of crime, preservation of peace and order, and supplying of guards and escorts are the principal duties of the regular or foot Police, while the swars besides doing miscellaneous work assist the regular Police in their duties.

21 The results of the work done by the Police are given in Appendices V and VI. The number of crimes with which the Police had to deal, decreased from 87 to 70 this year. 70 persons were arrested, and 66 sent up for trial, 31 of them were convicted, 31 either discharged or acquitted and 4 remained under trial at the close of the year. Property worth about Rs. 5610 was stolen of which nearly Rs. 3265 worth was recovered. The percentages of convictions and recoveries are about 50.

22 The total number of offences committed and cases disposed of during the year was 185 against 193 of the past year. (vide Appendix VII.) The decrease is slight. There were three cases of murder and culpable homicide. In one of them the accused being found insane has been confined to prison. In the second, death of a woman was due to simple hurt by her husband. The case being found to be a spleen case has resulted in conviction for hurt. The third proved to be a case of culpable homicide in which three persons were convicted for having caused the death of a Mahomedan in a dispute for land. There was no case of dacoity. Of the five cases of robbery, only two deserve to be so

called and are under active investigation, while the rest were disputes about the possession of land, bullocks &c. and have been already disposed of. Most of the theft and housebreaking cases have resulted in convictions and a few have been struck off. Other offences do not call for any special mention or comment.

23 The number of village Police (Police Patils and Shet Sanadies) was 338. They have to do Police work in their villages and they are remunerated partly by Inam lands and partly by cash payments.

24 There were 43 cases of accidental deaths and 21 of fire. The value of property destroyed is estimated at Rs. 1303.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

25 Appendix VIII shows the number and description of the various original criminal courts at work in the State during the year. There was no change in the constitution of courts.

26 The number of offences for disposal was 145 this year, against 189 of the past year. Corresponding to the decrease in the number of offences, the number of accused persons has fallen from 421 to 291. Of these 93 were convicted, 97 acquitted, 93 discharged, one was confined to jail as insane and 7 remained under trial at the end of the year. The average duration of cases in all courts was 11.9 days.

27 There are two appellate courts, the Huzur or Chief's Court, as High Court and Sessions Court, and the Karbhari's Court as that of the District Magistrate. Appendix IX gives the results of the work done by the appeal courts. There were 5 appeals to the Huzur Court and 5 to the Karbhari's Court. In 5 appeals, orders passed by the lower courts were confirmed, in 2 they were modified, in 2 they were reversed and in one further inquiry was ordered.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

28 Appendix X gives the details of the number and description of the original civil courts working during the year, as also the results of the work done in the disposal of suits. There is only one court that exercises first class sub-judge's powers, while the others are second class sub-judge courts.

29 The year opened with a balance of 133 suits and 622 new suits were filed during the year against 755 of the past year. The total number of cases disposed of amounted to 615, and 140 remained pending at the end of the year. There were 158 suits for lands and houses, 437 for money transactions and 27 for other rights. The entire value of all suits is estimated at Rs. 98805. The average duration of suits was 4 months and 16 days.

30 The results of the work done in connection with the execution of decrees are given in Appendix XI. The number of applications filed during the year was 766 against 760 of the past year. Of the 869 applications for disposal, 762 were disposed of during the year and 107 remained undisposed of. Of these 15 were above one year and the rest within 12 months.

31. Appendix XII gives the number and description of the Civil Appellate Courts at work in the State, as also the results of the work done by them. The Huzur or Chief's Court is the Highest Court of appeal, while the Karbhari's Court is the first Appellate Court. The number of appeals filed during the year was 73 against 56 of the past year. Out of 77 appeals for disposal, 74 were disposed of during the year and three remained undisposed of. In 42 cases the original decrees or orders were confirmed, in 6 they were reversed, in 3 amended, and 19 cases were remanded for further inquiry and 4 cases were compromised or otherwise disposed of. The average duration of appeals was 2 months and 3 days.

EXTRADITION.

32 Three accused persons were received this year for trial from other Native States, and only one was handed over to the British Authorities and 2 were handed over to the Sangli State.

PRISON.

33 The Principal Jail of the State is situated within the heart of the town of Jamkhandi. It is an old fashioned, quadrangular building, well ventilated and sufficiently strong. There is ample accommodation in the building for all sorts of prisoners, criminal and civil, male and female, and convicted and under trial. The Chief Medical Officer of the State looks after the Jail management as Superintendent. There are sub-jails for short time prisoners at Kundgol and Savalgi in charge of Taluka Mamlatdars and lock-ups at Wathar and Mudhavi in charge of Wahivatdars.

34 The number of prisoners admitted during the year was 71 against 95 of the previous year; 77 prisoners were released during the year out of the total number of 107 and 30 remained at the close of the year. The daily average in the Jamkhandi Jail was 26.9. The total expenditure during the year was Rs. 2628 against Rs. 2917 of the past year.

35 The annual dietary cost per head in the Jamkhandi Jail was Rs. 41. The earnings of the convict labour were estimated at Rs. 543. There was no death in the Jail and the health of the prisoners was good during the year.

36 There was no breach of Jail rules and the conduct of the prisoners was good. Remission of sentences were given to 19 prisoners according to the Mark System.

37 Convicts were mostly employed in the State Garden, the State Printing Press and the Faraskhana.

38 There were 7 civil prisoners and 2 lunatics in the Jamkhandi Jail.

REGISTRATION.

39. Appendices XIV and XV give details about the working of the Registration Department. The number of documents presented for registration during the year was 1910 against 1902 of the past year. Mortgage deeds

and Sale deeds show a slight decrease while wills and miscellaneous documents show some increase as compared with past year's figures. Registration was refused in 4 cases and three are pending inquiry.

40 Although there is a slight increase in the number of documents presented for registration, the amount of fees realised shows a slight decrease, Rs. 4616 against Rs. 4665 of the past year.

41 There were 4 registration appeals during the year to the Karbhari as District Registrar. All of them have been disposed of.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATION.

42 There are six municipalities in the State, one at Jamkhandi the principal head quarter town of the State, and five in large towns and villages of the Jamkhandi and Kundgol Talukas. The constitution and working of the Jamkhandi Municipality are regulated by the provisions of the Bombay District Municipal Act. Out of 18 Councillors of the Jamkhandi municipality 7 are elected and 11 nominated. In the other municipalities the members are all nominated and the work is carried on according to certain rules based on the District Municipal Act. The State Karbhari is the President of all the municipalities and, as such, controls their general working. The Chairmen of the Managing Committees of some of the municipalities are non-officials.

43 Appendix XVI shows the financial condition of the several municipalities. Two municipalities Banhatti and Kamdoli show a slight increase in their receipts, but the incomes of the remaining four have decreased. Most of the municipalities show a curtailed expenditure and there is thus an increased closing balance in most of them. House tax and octroi duties are the principal heads of income, while sanitation and general conservancy, lighting, road repairs, water supply and education are the chief items of expenditure.

44 The vegetable market building of the Jamkhandi municipality is almost complete. Construction of pucca U shaped gutters was attended to in Jamkhandi and Banhatti. The work of road repairs did not receive as much attention as it deserved and this fact has been brought to the notice of the municipalities concerned.

CHAPTER IV.

PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION

RAINFALL AND CROPS.

45 There was good rain this year throughout the State (vide Appendix XVII). The fall was every where above the average rainfall of the past five years. It was expected that plentiful rainfall would produce bumper crops but the weather condition prevailing in the cold season caused some damage to the Jwari and cotton crops and the yield of these crops (about 10 annas in the rupee) fell much short of expectations. Cold breezes that were harmful to cotton,

were beneficial to wheat and gram and these crops gave a good outturn which is estimated at 14 annas in the rupee. Khariff crops were not much below the average.

46 As there was good rain, fodder supply and water supply were sufficient every-where and the condition of the agricultural stock was satisfactory. Appendix XX shows slight decrease under some heads but it is more apparent than real and is alleged to be due to sale of cattle on a large scale.

47 A plot of land measuring 14 acres and 6 gunthas has been acquired near the town of Jamkhandi and set apart as an experimental farm. Experiments on wheat, jwari and cotton were this year formally made. Those of the cereals failed but that of cotton was successful. Seed of Broach variety was obtained and sown in 4 acres of land in the month of August. The plants appeared more vigorous than the local cotton plants and gave a good outturn which fetched 203 Rs, which is nearly three times the amount (nearly 80 rupees) that could have been got from local cotton sown in the same area. Several cultivators from the neighbouring villages were taken to the farm and they were shown the plants of the broach seed. Advantages of using Broach seed were explained at the time of the cattle fair. Two iron ploughs and other agricultural instruments have been brought for use at the farm and also for giving them to such land-holders as show a desire to use them.

PRICES AND WAGES.

48 There is a slight improvement in the prices of food grains, especially under Bajri, (vide Appendix XVIII). Good season and crops have not much improved the prices and it seems, as remarked last year, that high prices may continue perhaps for a long time.

49 The rates of wages continued as high as they were last year. Labour is becoming dear every year. The rates for unskilled labour were 4 to 6 annas and those for skilled ranged from 8 to 12 annas.

FOREST

50 The area under forest continued unchanged. There is a slight decrease (especially in grazing proceeds) in the revenues Rs. 3032 this year against Rs. 3827 of the past year. The expenditure this year was Rs. 1576 against Rs. 1764 of the past year. Endeavours were as usual made to plant nimb and other trees, and owing to good rain some seedlings are still to be found in the hills.

51 There were 7 forest offences viz. stealing dry wood from the reserved forest. There were a few fires but they did not do much damage.

TRADE AND MANUFACTURE.

52 There is not much trade in the state. Rice, sugar, salt, colours, spices, cocoanuts, kerosine, timber, stationery and other articles of foreign manufacture are the principal heads of import, while food grains and cotton are chiefly

exported. Imports and exports of the year are estimated at Rs. 24,31,800 and 10,55,130 respectively.

53 Dyeing and weaving business is carried on to a large extent in the town of Banhatti. Cotton sarees of the inferior sort and useful for the lower classes are woven and sent out. Coarse cotton and woolen clothes are manufactured in the town of Jamkhandi and in some villages. There were 3861 hand-looms at work during the year while there were 78 country oil presses for extracting kardi oil.

54 The State Ginning Factory was working nearly four months. About one thousand Khandis of cotton were ginned and the profits made in the bargain are estimated at Rs. 5555.

55 There were five private ginning factories working in the Kundgol Taluka. About 800 khandis of cotton were ginned.

FAIRS AND SHOWS.

56 The annual cattle fair was held at Jamkhandi in April 1911. The fair is getting more popular and is attracting larger numbers of men and cattle. Nearly 6852 heads of cattle were brought to the fair, out of which 5709 were bullocks. Prizes for fine animals were awarded, as usual, by the Chief in a Darbar specially held for the purpose. With a view to encourage embankments of fields, prizes were also given to land holders who had put *Tals* round their lands. Speeches were made at the Darbar explaining the advantages of Dry Farming system practised in America. Small fairs were held as usual at Kadpatti and Kundgol.

POST OFFICES AND MINTS

57. There are eight Post Offices in the State and one Telegraph Office at Jamkhandi. There is no mint in the State.

PUBLIC WORKS.

58 Information as to the expenditure incurred on Public works from the State as well as Local Funds is given in Appendix XIX. There is a large increase in the total expenditure this year, being Rs. 91268 against Rs. 72271 of the past year. The increase is due to the erection of a new bungalow for the Chief at Ramtirth. P. 11

59 Among other buildings requiring mention the Sawalgi Mamlatdar's Office comes first. The building made further progress and the greater portion of the building has been roofed. Another work of importance done this year was the stone pavement and other additions and alterations in the Prince of Wales Hospital, Jamkhandi.

60 A new Dharamshala was built at Gadyal and another began at Tungal. The Yaliwal Dharamshala is almost complete. Large repairs were made to Rameshwar Temple at Gote and Baswana. Temple of Vithapur. A new

Chawadi was built at Par and another commenced at Kadpatti in Kundgol, and the Chawadi at Kalhalli was repaired. Special repairs were made to Algur Dharamshala and Wada at Hulugbali.

61 The Savashi boys school building was completed and formally opened. Banhatti girls school building was also completed. A school house has been taken in hand at Shegunshi and extensions and additions were made to the school house at Kamdoli and Devnur. Special repairs were made to school buildings at Hosur, Kunchanur and Chipalkatte.

62 Under water supply may be mentioned the construction of well at Shiddapur for Mahars and another for Mangs at Jamkhandi. The Mahar well at Kalbilgi was repaired. The Chikalgi well in Bidri was completed and so was the well at Patkhal. A new well was sunk at Bidri. Two tanks in Kundgol were cleared.

63 No new roads were undertaken but all the existing roads were thoroughly repaired. A cattle pound was erected at Navalgi and two new ferry boats were constructed.

64 All the public offices, Dharamshalas and school-houses were repaired as usual.

CHAPTER V.

REVENUE AND FINANCE.

65 Appendix XXII will show the general condition of the State finances during the year under report as compared with that of the past year.

66 Some of the revenue heads on the credit side show slight increase, while the interest head only shows marked decrease which is due to the fact that interest on Government Securities was not received before the end of the year. The large increase shown against advances on the income side is due to adjustments having been made during the year in connection with the final accounts of the expenses of the Chief's tour to Europe and also of refund of money to the Khasgi Department from which it had been brought to the State Treasury during the Chief's minority. This explanation also accounts for the large increase under "refunds" and also under "Others" of the Miscellaneous on the debit side. The increase under revenue establishment is due to the payment of the arrears of cash allowances to village officers. The very large increase under loans and investments on the expenditure side is due to the surplus cash balance lying idle in the State Treasury, having been deposited in three banks in Bombay with a view to make provision for the construction of the Jamkhandi Railway, regarding which the State has already forwarded its proposals and views. If the amounts of the adjustments and investment were excluded the real expenditure being between five and six lakhs would not exceed the amount of income. The investments will also account for decrease in the closing balance

which is only apparent and not real. Causes of increase and decrease under other departments have been noticed in dealing with those departments.

67 The State Bank advanced Rs. 18300 this year, of which more than seventeen thousand were on the security of gold. Rs. 3470 (Rs. 27448 principal and Rs. 6722 interest) were recovered during the year leaving Rs. 103980 yet to be recovered. The average rate of interest received was Rs. 5.15 percent.

68 The interest on Government Securities and profits from other investments (amounting to Rs. 473900) during the year amounted to Rs. 15348 against Rs. 22996 of the past year.

CHAPTER VI

MEDICAL RELIEF AND VITAL STATISTICS.

VITAL STATISTICS.

69 There was no change during the year in the number of medical institutions in the State. There are four such institutions and all of them are charitable. The Prince of Wales Hospital at Jamkhandi is in charge of the Chief Medical Officer and the three dispensaries at Kundgol, Sawalgi and Banhatti are in charge of Medical Assistants.

70 Appendix XXIII shows the results of the work done by the four medical institutions. The total number of patients treated was 39188, of whom 39164 were outdoor and 24 indoor. The prevailing diseases were malarial fevers, worms, bowel complaints, respiratory affections, eye and ear diseases and skin affections. There were 25 major and 1261 minor operations. The maximum daily average attendance in Jamkhandi was 210 while the minimum in Sawalgi was 37. The Chief Medical Officer inspected the Sawalgi and Banhatti dispensaries.

VITAL STATISTICS.

71 The total numbers of births and deaths registered during the year were 3468 and 2617 respectively (vide Appendix XXIV) against 3476 and 2702 of the past year. There is some decrease under both but not such as to call for any remarks. The ratio per mille of births this year was 32.9, while of deaths 24.8.

72 There was no cholera this year in the State, but there was plague in two places of the Kundgol Taluka. There were 139 attacks and 80 deaths. There were no cases of small pox during the year.

VACCINATION.

73 The following statement gives the results of the vaccination operations in the State.

There were 127 cases of re-vaccination.

74 The State Vaccination Inspector visited all the Talukas and Thanas for inspection.

SANITATION.

75 There is no special establishment for sanitation. In large towns the work of sanitation is done by the Municipal Committees, and in other places it is looked after by the Village and Taluka Officers.

76 Overgrown prickly pear in several places was removed this year. Purity of drinking water was specially attended to every where.

77 The total expenditure on the Medical and Vaccination Departments was Rs. 13165 against Rs. 12376 of the past year.

CHAPTER VII.

EDUCATION.

78 Information as to the number of schools maintained by the state and the attendance of boys and girls therein, is given in Appendix XXV. There is one High School, one Anglo Vernacular school and 72 primary vernacular schools where the instruction is free. The total number of State schools was 74 this year against 72 of the previous year, while the total number of pupils in all schools was 5365 against 5471 of the past year. There is thus an increase of 2 in the number of schools and of 394 in that of pupils. The daily average attendance has increased in most of the schools.

79 It is a matter for satisfaction that education is getting popular here and is making steady progress. Having regard to the fact that in a population of over a lakh, the total number of school going children is nearly six thousand or about 6 percent (in large towns it is 10 percent and in villages it is 4 percent) there is yet ample room for further progress taking 15 percent as the number of school going children. Almost every village in the State has got a school where primary education is freely given without distinction of caste or creed.

80 The Parashurambhatu High School with its large attendance for a small town like Jamkhandi is a very popular and useful institution. The fee here is nominal, one anna per month, and there is the exceptional advantage of free board to deserving poor boys. The average number of such free boarders was 46 against 42 of the previous year. Provision has also been made for giving physical as well as moral instruction. This year 15 candidates were sent up for the Matriculation examination from this school of whom three came out successful.

81 Drawing is taught in the High School as well as in the vernacular schools at Jamkhandi. Out of 27 students who presented themselves for 1st and 2nd Grade Art Examinations held at the Jamkhandi centre, 13 came out successful, of whom one was a girl.

82 The Anglo Vernacular School is in the town of Kundgol. Instruction is given here up-to the third standard.

83 In large towns vernacular education is given upto the 7th standard, while in villages instruction is imparted upto the fourth standard. 26 candidates appeared for the Vernacular Public Service examination, 8 of whom were successful and one of them was a girl.

84 There is a special Hindusthani school for Mahomedan boys in Jamkhandi, and separate Hindusthani classes in the schools at Kundgol and Kamdoli. The total number of Mahomedan boys under instruction this year was 170 against 187 of the past year.

85 There is an independent school for Mahar, Mang and other low castes in Jamkhandi, while in villages the children of these castes are admitted in the village schools. Books and slates are given free of cost to these boys and in some cases special inducements are given to make education popular among these castes. The number of low caste students this year in all schools was 287 (of whom 48 were girls) against 175 of the previous year.

86 There are three girls' schools in three large towns, Jamkhandi, Banhatti, and Kundgol, and separate girls' classes in two schools at Savashi and Gote. In other places girls are taught along with boys. The total number of girls in all schools was 676 against 519 of the past year.

87 As recommended by the Educational Inspector, S. D; a thoroughly trained master has been brought from the Ratnagiri District on a monthly salary of Rs. 60 and he is giving lectures to the teachers of the State schools in

Kinder Garten system and Object lessons, and generally in the art of teaching.

88 The State Educational Inspector examined 72 schools. The results of the examination were on the whole satisfactory.

89 There is only one indigenous school in the State with 73 pupils.

90 In addition to the expenditure on schools mentioned above, the State has granted scholarships to deserving students studying in the higher educational institutions in Bombay, Poona, and Dharwar. Four such scholars are in an Arts College, one in the College of Science, one in the Grant Medical College and two in the Training Colleges.

91 The total expenditure on education this year was Rs. 31506, which is nearly one twentieth part (or 5.2 percent) of the total actual or real income of the State.

CHAPTER VIII

MISCELLANEOUS.

92 There are two printing presses in the State; one maintained by the State for printing the State Gazette, departmental orders &c.; and the other by a private person for job work. There is no news-paper in the State.

93 There are seven reading rooms in the State. All of them receive money grants from the State, Municipal and Local Funds.

94 The work of the Imperial census was done in the State on the 10th March 1911 under the general control of the Provincial superintendent of census, Bombay. The provisional figure of the total population of the Jamkhandi State was 100327 of whom 50505 were males and 49822 females.

95 Usually there are no wild beasts in the State; but this year two leopards had come into the hills near Jamkhandi and were doing some harm to the sheep and cattle. Both of them have been killed.

96 I made my tour of inspection for Jambandi and other purposes in all the Talukas and Thanas and went to several villages; attended to the wants of the people and heard their complaints; also visited schools and dispensaries and inspected public works such as buildings, wells, roads, &c. either in progress or completed.

CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

97 This year the rainfall was above the average, the crops were fairly good, and the prices of food grains and cotton ranged high. All these circumstances tended to improve the material condition of the agriculturists who form the bulk of the State population. The continued rise in the rates of wages and the scarcity of unskilled labourers are sufficient to indicate that the labouring population is doing very well. The figures of exports and imports as well as the registration records show that the condition of the trading classes is normal. Excepting two places affected by a mild attack of plague the people of the State enjoyed fairly good health, throughout the year.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

98 Such is the record of the administration of the State during the year 1910-11. The several events, facts and figures recorded above will show that earnest endeavours were made, as usual, to maintain the efficiency of the several Departments as well as to carry on the work of administration in a way that would conduce to the moral and material prosperity of the people. The Police attempted to discharge their duties fairly and the courts administered justice promptly. The State finances were well husbanded. The working of the Municipal institutions was on the whole good. The Medical Department continued to do its charitable work vigorously. The Public Works Department attended to the wants of the people as usual. And lastly the increased expenditure on education and the steady progress made by it will show that the sacred work of public instruction is receiving special attention.

99 In conclusion, I am desired by the Chief to convey his most cordial and sincere thanks to you and to the Assistant Political Agent for the valuable advice given and the kind treatment received from time to time.

I have the honour, by direction of the Chief, to submit the Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State, for the Fasli year 1323 ending 5th June 1914.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2 The area of the State is 524 square miles and its population 1,00,304 by the census of 1911. It has three Talukas, Jamkhandi, Bidri, and Kundgol, and three Thanas, Patkhal in Sholapur, Dhawalpuri in Ahmadnagar, and Wathar in Satara Districts. The gross Revenue inclusive of Inams is Rs 12,36,456. The State pays an annual tribute, to Government, of Rs. 20,515.

3 The Chief, Meherban Shrimant Sir Parasaramrao Ramchandrarao alias Khausaheb Patwardhan K. C. I. E. is a Koknastha Brahman. His age is 31. He is a treaty Chief and a First class Deccan Sardar. He has a son and a daughter. The former, Shrimant Shankarrao Appasaheb is now 8 years of age. He is being carefully educated under an experienced graduate. He is now learning the Marathi 3rd standard. He takes a good interest in his studies and is an exceptionally intelligent child. He is being given lessons in riding and has already made a fair progress. He is also being given religious instruction under a spiritual Guruji. The name of the daughter is Shrimant Keral Tarabai Sahib.

alias Shakuntala Taisaheb. She is now in her 2nd year. They all reside at Ramtirth and are in good health. It may be noted here, with satisfaction that this year Lady Ramabaisaheb passed her examination in drawing in the 3rd Grade and stood high in the list of successful female candidates. She is learning the A. V. Standard V and has made a fair progress in her studies. She can ride and drive skilfully.

4 During the year under report, His Excellency the Right Honorable Lord Hardinge of Penshurst P. C., G. C. B., G. C. M. G., G. C. V. O., G. M. S. I., G. M. I. E., I. S. O., Viceroy and Governor General of India, travelled through the limits of the Kundgol Taluka of this State on 3rd November 1913, on his way to see the Girsappa Falls. Full arrangements were promptly made on the occasion for the protection of the Viceregal train on either side of the Railway line. In making the arrangements loyal assistance was given by the ryots, the village and Taluka Officers and the Police. Assistance was also given by the Railway Police and the Criminal Investigation Department to me, for which the Chief is thankful. You very kindly expressed your satisfaction at the arrangements,

5 His Excellency the Right Honorable Lord Willingdon of Ratton G. C. I. E., Governor of Bombay, also passed by the same route, a few days after, to open the Industrial and Agricultural Exhibition held at Ranibinnur of the Dharwar District.

6 The Political relations of the State with the Paramount Power and with the neighbouring Native States remained cordially satisfactory.

7 The mutual extradition of criminals received prompt attention during the year.

8 As regards co-operation in Police matters there is yet room for improvement in arrangements now existing. Government very kindly issued orders on the last year's report for a complete reciprocity in the matter. At your instance, proposals were submitted by me with the approval of the Chief, suggesting rules to ensure prompt exchange of information as to the movements of criminal suspects. Orders on these proposals are awaited. In this connection, I have to observe that the Chief regrets to find that his proposals for exchange of certain State villages for Government villages situated within the State limits, of similar importance were negatived by Government. The Chief does not know what difficulties came in the way of Government in according their sanction to the proposals. The Chief has desired me to ascertain the difficulties in the matter with a view to meet them satisfactorily. This will be done in a separate reference. It will be sufficient to note here that a very serious evil affecting the peace of the country would be allowed to continue with impunity, if matters remain as they are.

RELATIONS OF THE STATE WITH GOVERNMENT OFFICERS.

9 The Postal and Telegraph Department:— The Chief intends to have

a telephone service between Banhatti and Jamkhandi, and Sidapur and Jamkhandi I have already submitted to you his request for permission to put the wire on the existing Government Telegraph posts on that line. Your orders on the subject are awaited. This Department is receiving all assistance whenever required.

10 The Excise Department:— The State has been doing its best to help the British officers of this department in the excise administration of the State. Smuggling and other illegal practices brought to light have been promptly punished. The need for deterrent punishments in such cases has been impressed on the local Magistracy.

11 Control of education by the Educational Department:— The annual School-report was submitted to the Educational Inspector, Southern Division, of the progress of education in the Primary and Secondary Schools in the State. His suggestions for introducing reforms in the system of education were promptly carried out. All possible care is being taken to prevent students getting any ideas of extremism

12 All the libraries in the State have been registered on condition that the library buildings are not to be used for any discussion of Political matters; and no proscribed book or paper is allowed to be read in the library. I have personally overhauled the list of books and periodicals and newspapers kept in them and have taken steps to see that no objectionable book or paper is allowed to be introduced in them.

13 A very careful vigil is kept to see that doubtful characters with Political fads do not enter in the State limits. If any do, they are promptly dealt with.

14 During the year the Chief of this State and the Nabob of Savanur entered into an agreement of reciprocity with regard to surrender of criminals and Muddemal and transit and maintenance charges of criminals, cattle etc, under your advice. Negotiations were also in progress with a view to secure mutual reciprocity in the matter of service of processes and summonses of the State Civil Courts and those of British Civil Courts. No final orders have yet been received in the matter.

15 Sir Bhausahab paid visits at Bombay to His Excellency the Viceroy at the time of the departure of Her Excellency Lady Hardinge for England. He also paid visits to His Excellency the Governor and the Honorable Councilors in Poona and Bombay. He attended the Darbar held by the Agent to the Sirdars in the Deccan on the birth-day of His Majesty the King Emperor in Poona. He paid visits to you in Kolhapur and made a tour in Kundgol, Savalgi and Jamkhandi Talukas. In Patkhal Thana he visited the villages with a view to see for himself, the state of the ryots, as there was famine in those parts and made personal inquiries into the state of the indebtedness of the ryots and granted prompt relief to them. He also visited Belgatm during the hot weather.

16 The principal citizens and merchants and officials in Jamkhandi held a meeting presided by the Chief. In it a message of hearty and sympathetic congratulations was sent to His Excellency the Viceroy on his complete recovery from the brutal outrage, committed on him at Delhi on the coronation-day. Grateful prayers and thanks-givings were offered to the Almighty for restoring to the country the life of such a generous, and noble Viceroy. His Excellency was touched by the sentiments of sincerity contained in the message, and at your request I communicated to organizers of the meeting the sincere thanks of His Excellency for the troubles taken by them.

17 Recruiting for the Military Department was given all practicable help; and deserters from the Mahratta Infantry in Belgaum were arrested and handed back promptly.

18 You and Major E. O'Brien Assistant Political Agent S. M. Country paid visits to Jamkhandi during the year.

CHAPTER II.

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION.

19 The Revenue Survey and Settlement has been introduced throughout the State except in some of the Inam villages. The term of lease of all the Talukas and Thanas having expired, the work of revision of the Settlement of the Kundgol Taluka has been taken up. Application was made through you for a trained Survey and classing party from the Survey Department. But no such party was available. The original Settlement was made more than 40 years ago. Any delay in making a revision meant a needless loss of legitimate revenue. The Chief therefore decided to have the work taken up and carried out by the State Agency. The State surveyors assisted by retired measurers of the Mysore survey were therefore deputed for duty and placed under the direct supervision of a thoroughly competent officer Mr. G. K. Hulyalkar M. A. LL. B. specially appointed for the purpose. He assumed the charge of his duties on 18th February last. The field work is not yet complete. The partial measurement and classification system is being followed. The work is progressing satisfactorily as shown below:-

Thus the original measurement work was found practically correct, the difference in area being too small to be noticed. The whole field-work will be completed by the end of June 1915.

20 The area under cultivation, the revenue due from it, its collection and out-standings are shown in the following table:-

21 The season being generally satisfactory, land revenue demand was easily and timely paid up, except in the Patkhal Thana, where there was famine. Here the Chief was pleased to suspend the collections of the revenue. This small tract has been exceptionally unfortunate as it had two successive indifferent seasons to face,

22 The increase in the collections is due to the recovery of the previous year's arrears. Fewer notices had to be issued. There was only one case of distraint in Bidri Taluka. In this case moveable property was attached but the arrears were paid up before the property could be sold. No other coercive measures had to be resorted to. This is a satisfactory feature of the prosperity of the ryots and proves that the assessment on the land is light.

23 Out of A. 2620 & G. 11 of land lying waste at the close of last year, Acres 1669 & G. 32 of land were taken up for cultivation. This is satisfactory. Cultivable land is on increasing demand. It has considerably risen in value. The rental value too has risen. Land-transfers on all accounts have increased.

CHAPTER III.

PROTECTION.

LEGISLATION.

24 Appendix II shows the Laws already in force and also those introduced during the year under report. They have been administered with good care and moderation.

25 *The Criminal Tribes Act, III of 1911*:—It was introduced under your advice. This was an absolute necessity. The complicated situation of the territory, belonging to this State interspersed by Government villages has made

it difficult to keep under control the Criminal tribes which move to & fro between the different jurisdictions. Some of these are too clever to catch. Preventing them from committing crime, and keeping an effectual control on their movements and doings, was therefore an immediate need.

26 *The Court of Wards Act (Bombay) I of 1905*:—It has come to the notice of the Chief that there are some estates of considerable importance which are mismanaged and abused, owing to the ignorance of their owners, their wasteful habits and improper influences on them of persons of doubtful character. To prevent further mischief and waste, the Chief had to introduce the Act. Preliminary inquiries are being made and some of the estates would be taken up during the current year.

27 *The Irrigation Act VII of 1879 with subsequent amendments*:—The State has spent large sums in the construction of Irrigating Tanks and has in contemplation other schemes of such improvements. Several Lands are benefitting by the improved water supply. The regulation of supply of water, and taxing the benefits arising therefrom made it necessary to introduce the Act.

28 *The Revenue Jurisdiction Act X of 1876*:—There was evidently a necessity of this measure to prevent matters which were exclusively a State concern and policy, being a subject of litigation in the Civil Court.

29 *The Summary Settlement Act and the Inam Commissions Act*:—have been introduced for settling all the Inams in the State once for all; and on a uniform basis. There has been no such legal settlement made so far.

30 *The Transfer of Property Act*:—The principles of the Act were being actually followed in practice by the Law Courts but remained a matter entirely with the will of the Courts. This was found to be unsatisfactory and therefore the Law was introduced.

31 *The Bombay Sanitation Act*:—was introduced in the interests of sanitation in the more important rural parts of the State.

32 *The Amending Act of the Bombay Land Revenue Code and the Abkari Act*:—were a necessary corollary to the Administration of the principal Acts; and, were introduced with a view to bring the administration of those Acts up to their level in the British territory.

33 To prevent improper proceedings in the matter of enlisting indentured labor, *the Indian Immigration Act of 1883* was introduced.

34 It was noticed that gambling was carried on in certain places in the Kundgol Taluka, *Act of IV 1887 (Bombay)* was therefore introduced to prevent gambling.

MILITARY FORCE

35 There is no military force in the State.

POLICE

36. The strength of Police is the same as last year viz: 363. The cost of its maintenance was 57,055-7-6 as against Rs. 45,558-2-10. Prevention and investigation of crimes, preservation of peace and order, and supplying guards and escorts, are the principal duties of the force. A satisfactory discipline was maintained. The conduct of the Police on the whole was fairly satisfactory. The pay of the Chief Constables and Head Constables was increased this year. One Head Constable and a constable were given rewards of Rs 5 each for good service, and one Chief Constable and one Head Constable were given certificates of merit. Only one man was judicially punished under section 409 I. P. C. and dismissed from service. 54 persons were departmentally fined for neglect of duty. A teacher has been specially appointed to teach the police, reading and writing. The percentage of men able to read and write rose from 65.8 to 72.8 and of those under instruction fell from 34.1 to 27.3.

37. There are 247 men armed with Muzzle-loading Sniders and Breech-loading Martiny Henry Muskets; the others carry swords and battons. The former of the two kinds of fire arms in question are of the old type and have for the most part lost their efficiency. They are practically unserviceable. A proposal for a supply to the Police of new 50 S. B. B. L. Martiny Henry Muskets in exchange for the old ones, has been again submitted to Government. You were pleased to personally inspect the old arms and found them to be unserviceable. The Chief earnestly hopes that the application will be granted by Government, as soon as possible. The ratio of Police to total area is 1 man per 1.5 square mile and to population 1 man to 276.32 people.

38. Appendix V. VI. and VII. give the working of the Police and the Magistracy in cognizable crimes. There were 110 against 123 cases last year for disposal, of these 83 were inquired into during the year. 27 remained pending investigation, being received near the close of the year. Of the 83 investigated 16 were found to be false and 46 ended in conviction and in 21 the Police were unable to find a clue. There were two murder cases in the year, in both, the accused were placed before the court of trial. In one the accused were acquitted as the evidence was insufficient for conviction. In the second the accused were convicted after the end of the year. Of the four accused in the murder case alluded to in the last year's report, one was discharged, one turned an approver and the remaining two were convicted under Secs 323 and 352 I. P. C. respectively.

39. The percentage of convictions to persons sent for trial fell from 69.4 to 57.9 and the percentage of convictions to accused arrested also fell from 65.4 to 54.6. In Justice to the Police department, I must note here that the 27 cases which were received at the fag-end of the year and therefore the investigation could not be completed, ought not in fairness, to come in the calculation of the percentage of success in investigation. If this is conceded and we exclude them, as well as the false 16 cases, the percentage of 46 convictions in 67 cases, rises up to 61.2 which would go to show that the Police

have practically maintained their last year's level of efficiency. In the matter of the recovery of stolen property, the Police have an unfortunate front to show. In one case alone, the property lost amounted to Rs. 3,345. Of this, since the end of the year property of the value of Rs. 2,000 has been traced. The bulk of the stolen property yet remained to be recovered. If this unfortunate case is excluded, the percentage of recovery to loss rises up to 41.7 p. c. Though this would still be smaller than that of the last year, the recent recovery of about Rs. 2,000 worth property would more than make up the deficiency.

40. There were 4 direct complaints of cognizable cases to Magistrates. Of 14 accused of these brought to trial 4 were convicted, 8 discharged and 2 awaited trial at the close of the year. There were 91 non-cognizable cases for disposal. Out of 22% accused, 62 only were convicted. This shows a gross want of care in issuing processes against the accused, on the part of the Magistrates. General orders have been issued to the Magistrates regarding the absolute need for such careful preliminary inquiry in each case as would minimise the evil. There is a general tendency on their part to issue process as soon as a complaint is made. A systematic attempt will be made during this year to check this tendency. The efficiency of the Police is steadily improving under the supervision of the able Police Inspector Mr. R. A. Chabbi retired Police Inspector of the Bombay Criminal Investigation Branch. Every facility is given to him to improve the work of the Police. Complete lists have been kept of bad characters and the Inspector is organizing an effective control on their movements. Hajaris are kept of the fifteen classes of habitual criminals. They are overhauled from time to time. The Shetsanadis who are more in touch with these, are being kept on the alert. Several gangs have been already brought to book under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code. But one gang escaped. This was a large gang of Madras Kalkoryis who entered the State limits from Mahalingpur side and infested the south-west parts of the state. A strong party of Swars and a small Police was sent at once under the Police Inspector and one Chief Constable. There-on the gang dispersed in different directions. Not one of them could be caught. Evidently they got information of this party coming on. Draft rules for reciprocity in prompt exchange of information of the movements of Criminal gangs between the Police of this State and the British Police have been already submitted for approval as desired by Government in their remarks on the Administration Report of this State for the last year. It is hoped that the rules, if approved, will assist the Police a great deal to check the movements of the gangs. Similar rules might be adopted with advantage by this State with the neighbouring Native States for purposes of prompt exchange of information.

41. The village Police is made up of the Police-Patil and his Shetsanadis. For 84 villages there are 340 men mostly paid in land and in a few cases in cash. There are on the average 4 men for each village.

42. There were 26 accidental deaths and 17 suicides. There were 38 accidental fires and the value of property destroyed by fire was reported to be Rs. 3,221. There were 2 cases of incendiarism. Both have been carefully and

promptly detected by the Police. The accused in one case was sentenced and the accused in the other case are awaiting trial in the Sessions Court.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

43. Appendix VIII shows the various Courts and the work disposed of by them. There was a slight decrease in this work. 321 persons were tried, out of which 114 were convicted. This gives a percentage of 35.5. But excluding the noncognizable cases, the percentage in cognizable cases alone comes to 52.5. The average duration of trial was 17 days against 8.5 days. The rise in this percentage is due mainly to the delay in two cases. In one case in the Court of the First Class Magistrate and Sub-Judge Jamkhandi, it was 134 days; and in the other before the Kundgol Sub-Judge and Magistrate F. C., it was 13 days. In the former the complainant himself and his witnesses did not appear though repeatedly summoned.

44. Appendix IX shows the result of appeals heard and disposed of by the Appellate Courts. These were 5 against 11 last year. In 4, conviction were confirmed and in 1, the orders were modified.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

45. Appendix X shows the Civil Courts of original jurisdiction and the work done by them. There was an increase of 76 suits for disposal as compared with the last year. Of the 779 cases for disposal 613 were disposed of during the year. Of these 182 were for immovable property and 426 of money transactions. The majority of these were for a value less than Rs. 500. The average duration for disposal is 4 months and 24 days which is satisfactory.

46. Appendix XI shows the work of execution ~~to~~ decrees and orders passed by the Civil Courts. The amount of work disposed of is satisfactory. The closing balance of applications for execution of decrees in the Court of the Jamkhandi Nyayalish shows a slight increase. This is mostly due to the pendency of regular suits relating to the subject matter of the applications.

47. Appendix XII shows the work turned but by the Civil Appellate Courts. This year also the total number of appeals fell from 72 to 59. The Chief's Court disposed of 15 out of 16. The District Judge 32 out of 42. One appeal was transferred to the First Class Sub-Judge with [appellate powers and it was disposed of. The average duration of disposal is 6 months & 7 days. The delay is longest only in the Court of the Daftaradar. In the other two Courts, it was three months only. It will be seen that on the whole justice was given promptly as far as it was practicable. I am happy to note that the work of the Sub-Judges has been very satisfactory.

EXTRADITION

48. Four persons were received for trial under Sec. 504 in the State from the British Authorities. Out of these 1 was discharged, one was made

an approver and the remaining two were convicted under Sec. 323 & 352 I. P. C. respectively. One accused was handed over under Sec 380 I. P. C. to the British Police and one to the Kolhapur Darbar under Sec. 380 & 457 Indian Penal Code.

PRISON

49. The Central Jail is at Jamkhandi. Else-where there are sub-jails or lock-ups. The Jamkhandi Jail is a strong and convenient building for all sorts of prisoners. The Chief Medical officer is its Superintendent. A jailor and a sufficient number of warders look after it. The sub-jails are in charge of the Taluka Magistrates and Wahivatdars. The Jail maintained an efficient discipline. The number of prisoners admitted in Jail during the year was 89 against 75 admissions in the preceding year. The average daily number is almost the same as last year viz: 18.01. There are non-official visitors appointed to inspect the Jail periodically. These gentlemen have inspected it according to rules. There is no industry attached to the Jail. The prisoners are employed in State gardens, Faraskhana and odd work. Their health was reported to be good throughout the year. One old man, a life convict, died of fever and lungs disease and one lunatic died of Plague.

50. The total expenditure of the Jail was Rs. 2,728-3-8 as against Rs. 2,796-10-4. The annual dietary cost per head was Rs. 45 as against Rs. 39 6-0. The increase is due to a rise in price of fuel and mutton; and to special diet for sick prisoners. The earnings of the convict labour amounted to Rs. 322-12-6. The rations and clothing were given on the scale obtaining in the Yerod Central Prison. The conduct of the prisoners was satisfactory. Remissions were awarded to them according to the mark-system. 10 prisoners have earned remission.

51. The average period of custody of under-trial prisoners was 11 days

REGISTRATION.

52. Appendix XIV and XV show the results of the working of the Indian Registration Act in the State. There was a considerable rise in the number of total documents presented for registration, which is mostly due to the opening of State Bank for the subjects of the State and the introduction of the Transfer of Property Act. The income from registration was Rs. 5,919-1-0 against Rs. 3,662-12-6. In one case registration was refused and an appeal made. The case was remanded for further inquiry.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATION.

53. There are 6 Municipalities (vide appendix XVI).

54. The constitution of each body is shown below:-

55. It would appear that in Jamkhandi members are elected and nowhere else. A sort of quasi-election is permitted in the other Municipalities. The village ryots through their Panch nominate members, with the help of the Mamlatdar. A list of such members is submitted to the Chief, who has the power of approval with or without modification, with a view to adjust inequalities in representation and to eliminate undesirable elements.

56. The income and expenditure of these institutions fairly balance each other except in Jamkhandi Municipality. The fall in the receipts of the above Municipalities is mainly due to suspension of house-tax owing to the prevalence of plague in the town and the decrease in the expenditure was due to want of labour for starting miscellaneous works such as the repairs of roads etc. The chief sources of income are house-tax and octroi except in Hunnur, which is a small place. The Jamkhandi Municipality has besides these a toll and a water-tax. The chief items of expenditure are sanitation, general conservancy, lighting, road repairs, and water supply. Towards education a small contribution is paid to the State which bears the major portion of charges under that head. There were twenty-eight meetings of the Managing Committee and seven of the General Committee. A fairly keen interest was taken by the non-official members in the Municipal Administration.

CHAPTER IV.

PROTECTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

RAINFALL AND CROPS.

57. Appendix XVII shows the rainfall of the year. Although in Jamkhandi and Kundgol and Thana of Watnur, the rainfall was less than last year, and not uniformly distributed, it was found sufficient for the crops on the whole. In Bidri the

rainfall was nearly double last year's; but it was not seasonable. Crops in all the Talukas and Thana Wathar came up fairly to the average level; though cotton in Jamkhandi and Bidri Talukas was somewhat below the average. Fodder was sufficient, Agricultural and other cattle were in good condition. The supply of drinking water was plentiful except in Kundgol.

58. The two Patkhal villages had practically no rain. Almost all lands except garden lands, remained uncultivated. Famine condition set in. Relief measures were adopted in time. Suspensions of revenue were given. Loans were advanced to relieve indebtedness, to the amount of Rs. 20,460 and Tagai to the amount of Rs. 670 was given. Doles were given to the poor to the extent of Rs. 322. This would appear to be small; but the bulk of the ryots went out for work else-where; and for the relief of such as remained in the villages, the construction of a road from Patkhal to Mangalwedha was opened and completed.

EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

59. Experiments of Broach cotton, Khrip Jowari and Bajri were made; but owing to the deficiency of rain the crops withered away. The yield of groundnuts, chilli, Japanese wheat sown in garden lands was fairly good. Broach and Combodia cotton crops in garden lands came up fairly well. Iron ploughs were used in this farm and its advantages were shown and explained to ryots.

PRICES AND WAGES.

60. The prices of staple food grains have fallen everywhere in ^{the} three Talukas. This is satisfactory. The yeild of cotton was somewhat less than the average owing to the unseasonable rain, but what was lost in yeild was gained in price. The out-turn of wheat was satisfactory and fetched a good price.

61. Prices of labour remained unchanged. Unskilled labour ranged from 3 to 6 annas and skilled from 8 to 12 annas a day.

F O R E S T.

62. The area under forest cousevration increased from 27,206 acres to 27,263 acres and 22 gunthas; of which 1,510 acres and 29 gunthas are under reserve forest. The forest growth is poor. Grass is allowed for grazing on permits, and fees are charged for head-loads of fuel. The revenue amounted to Rs. 5,419-2-7 and the charges to Rs. 1,822-3-5. The forest area is worked under rules framed on the lines of Forest Act of 1878 There is no forest settlement made. Grazing fees were charged at rates lower than those prevailing in the next British Districts. They form the principle source of forest revenue. There were 17 cases of breach of rules against 12 of fuel thefts from the forest. No perceptible damage was dome to the forest tree-growth from fire.

EXCISE REVENUE.

63. Appendix XXI will show the number of excise shops and excise revenue of the State. The excise revenue of the State is from country-spirit, toddy and hemp-drugs. This is managed by the British Excise Administration. Government pay Rs. 50,312 each year, to the State in compensation. From opium sales the State obtained a revenue of Rs. 1125 only. The lease for management of the country-spirit and toddy revenue expires by the end of July 1914; and is being renewed, that for the hemp-drugs expires by the end of March 1916.

TRADE AND MANUFACTURE

64. There is not much trade in the State. Rice, sugar, salt, colors, spices, cocoanuts, kerosine, timber, stationery, cotton-yarn, cloth, metals and other articles, required for home consumption are the principal heads of imports, while food-grains, cotton and oil-seeds and oil-cakes are the chief articles of export. Imports amounted to the value of Rs. 14,24,939 and exports to Rs. 9,78,485. Thus the imports are smaller than the exports.

65. Dyeing yarn and silk and weaving is carried on, on a considerable scale in Banhatti. The clothing for males and females of the working classes is manufactured and sent out. Coarser cotton goods and kambli are also made there and in other villages.

66. The number of hand-loom at work were 3,601. They are found in almost all villages. It is a remarkable fact that notwithstanding the strong competition of machine made cloth, this hand-made clothing has yet maintained its position in the rural parts. The work turned out though rough, is strong and cheap. There is a cotton press and gins maintained by the State for demonstrative purposes. About 170 tons of cotton was ginned and pressed. The earnings amounted to Rs. 11,231; and after deducting the working expenses, the net profit made in the bargain was reported to be Rs. 5,636, inclusive of interest or capital invested. There are small 9 private ginning factories, 8 in Kundgol Taluka and 1 in Jamkhandi.

67. There were 62 oil presses for extracting kardi oil. One oil machine mill is being erected in Jamkhandi and more cotton gins are being set up in Jamkhandi. Almost every village in Kundgol Taluka has hand-gins worked in private houses. These number 77.

FAIRS AND SHOWS

68. The annual cattle fair was held at Jamkhandi in April 1914. The fair is getting more popular and the number of cattle brought for exhibition is steadily increasing; nearly 8,047 heads of cattle were brought to the fair; of which 6,377 were bullocks alone. Prizes for well-bred animals were awarded to the aggregate value of Rs. 198 by the Chief in a Darbar specially held for the purpose. Small fairs were also held as usual in Kadpatti, Kalhalli and Kundgol.

POST OFFICES AND MINTS.

69. There are 8 Post Offices in the state and one telegraph office at Jamkhandi. There is no mint in the state.

PUBLIC WORKS.

70. Information as to the expenditure incurred on Public Works from the state as well as local funds is given in Appendix XIX. There is a considerable increase in the total expenditure on works this year, being Rs. 206,211 against Rs. 145,667 of the past year.

71. At ramtirh the construction of office buildings, a guest house, the store house, the Palace cook rooms, temples and other buildings and roads and the compound wall were completed.

72. The school houses at Chamkeri and Mudhavi have been completed. The Edward Memorial School for depressed classes and extension of the Ferris School at Jamkhandi are in progress. Two new chayadis one at Gote and the other at Betdur were built. Four new roads viz:- (1) Hosur-Chimad (2) Kundgol-Yaliwal (3) Betdur-Kuibial (4) Saunshi-Gudgeri were undertaken and although the work is not complete, it is hoped that it will be soon finished. Patkhal-Mangalwedha road has just been completed.

73. Under water-supply may be mentioned the construction of wells at Kumbharhal, Albal and Kuibial. The construction of these wells is in progress

74. The Shidapur water-works for the supply of water for the Jamkhandi town have made a steady progress in the year and is fast approaching its completion.

75. Additional buildings for setting up of the cotton gins and its auxiliary buildings were built.

76. During the year under report, new water-works at Savalgi have lately been undertaken. The estimated cost of this work is Rs. 16,000.

CHAPTER V

REVENUE AND FINANCE.

77. Appendix XXII explains the general condition of the State revenue and finances. Some of the Revenue heads on the credit side show a slight decrease, which requires no explanation. The principal increases on the debit side are due to:-

- I The several new public works constructed.
- II Increase in the pay of the Police.
- III Purchase of special furniture and Science apparatus for the High School and instruments for the Dispensaries.

IV The Revision Settlement work of the Kundgol Taluka.

V Enlargement of the State Bank by branches in 2 Talukas.

The Bank advanced money to the amount of Rs. 134,492-13-10 in all; Rs. 87,335-13-10 on land security, and Rs. 47,157 on security of gold. The average rate of interest is 5 P. C. The total interest earned in the year was Rs. 11,124-7-3. The effect of this small rate of interest was beneficial to the borrowing ryot. The Bank has distinctly gained in popularity and has proved a useful investment.

Investments in Government paper, Banks and Shares amounted to Rs. 37,013-0-6, the interest earned being Rs. 41,734-14-3.

The failures of Banks in Bombay and other places had no practical effect on the finances of this State. Only a lakh of Rs. has, to be recovered from the Indian Specie Bank, now in liquidation.

The financial position of the State is thus quite sound and the State will be able to meet the required expenses on account of the proposed Railway and Canal Schemes, without any difficulty.

CHAPTER. VI.

MEDICAL RELIEF AND VITAL STATISTICS.

MEDICAL RELIEF.

78. There are four Medical institutions, all of them charitable including the Prince of Wales Hospital at Jamkhandi. The Chief Medical Officer looks after the Hospital and the dispensaries at Kundgol, Savalgi and Banhatti are in charge of Medical Assistants.

79. Appendix XXIII shows the work of all the institutions. The total number of patients treated was 33,777, including 17 in-door. The prevailing diseases were Malarial fevers, worms, bowel complaints, respiratory systems, rheumatic affections, eye, ear and skin diseases. There were 9 major and 1,260 minor operations. The maximum daily average attendance in Jamkhandi was 184, while the minimum in Savalgi was 38.24.

80. Quarters for the Hospital Assistants were built during the year. A fresh supply of new instruments was given and a thermometer shed of the latest pattern was erected.

81. It will be seen that these institutions have maintained their popularity and usefulness.

VITAL STATISTICS.

82. The total births and deaths registered were 3,674 and 3,349 against 2,818 and 3,505 of the past year, respectively. (vide appendix XXIV)

83. Plague prevailed for a long time in Jamkhandi town and in 16 neighbouring villages and in 8 villages of Bidri with 1,040 deaths out of 1,382 attacks. Cholera broke out in 2 villages of Jamkhandi. Four cases proved fatal out of 16 and small-pox in Jamkhandi and Bidri Talukas with a very small mortality. Notwithstanding plague which carried off 1,040 souls the total mortality was much smaller than in last year, which is satisfactory. The larger number of recorded births shows more careful registration.

84. Inoculation was popularized to a certain extent in Jamkhandi, Banhatti, Savalgi and in rural parts where plague prevailed. The number inoculated was 2,164. Only 4 died out of these. Evacuation was the chief remedy adopted.

85. Disinfection of wells and tanks was carried out and cholera was checked within a short time.

There were 178 cases of revaccination. The results are satisfactory. The number of unsuccessful vaccinations being so small.

86. The State Vaccination Inspector examined all the vaccinations. The Chief is very thankful for the aid given by the Deputy Sanitary Commissioner S. D. R. D. He very kindly suggested improvements which were promptly attended to. He was good enough to give a special training to the State Inspector of Vaccinations.

SANITATION

87. There is no special establishment to look after sanitation. In large towns the work of sanitation is done by municipal Committees and in other places it is looked after by village and Taluka Officers. The Bombay village Sanitation Act was introduced into Savalgi where it is working well.

88. Overgrown prickly pear has been removed in almost all villages on a large scale. This was a growing evil and the Mamlatdars are to be congratulated on their success in eradicating it.

89. The total expenditure on Medical and Vaccination Departments was Rs. 13,144-5-1 against Rs. 12621-3-0 of the past year.

CHAPTER VII.

EDUCATION

90. The number of schools maintained and the attendance in them is given in Appendix XXV. There is one High School, one Anglo-Vernacular School and 75 Primary Schools as last year. The total number of pupils on the rolls

fell from 5,927 to 5,632 and the daily average attendance from 4,390 to 3,749, 32 schools had to be temporarily closed for plague. Almost every village in the state has a school. Primary education is given free to all.

91. In larger villages education is given upto the 7th standard while in smaller ones boys are taught upto the 4th standard, 19 candidates appeared for the Vernacular School Final Examination this year, of whom 10 were successful,

92. There are 50 Marathi Schools, 23 Kanarese, one Urdu and one Dhead school. There are 180 Mahomedan and 201 low caste boys. Cooked food is given gratis to poor deserving low caste pupils to whom special inducements are given to make education popular among them,

93. There are three girl schools, in Jamkhandi, Banhatti and Kundgol, and special girls classes in Saunshi, Kamdoli, Gote and Savalgi. The total number of girls in all schools in the state is 703 against 784 of the previous year..

94. Schools are located in special buildings and temples. As funds permit, proper school-houses will be built for the latter. 2708 pupils were presented for the examination of whom 1967 passed; of these 196 were girls out of 230 presented. This gives a percentage of 72.6 as against 72 of the last year.

95. The teaching staff has very few trained men, so the State has kept each year two students who have passed mulki examination from this State in the Training College for men, in Poona and Dharwar. Besides these, one female student is in the Training College for women, Poona in the 4th year's course,

96. The A. V. School, Kundgol was raised from 3rd standard to the 4th.

97. The Parashurambhau High-School sent up for the Matriculation examination 21 candidates; of these 19 passed; and for Arts examination 8 candidates appeared and all of them passed. The High-School staff has worked very satisfactorily.

98. Physcial, religious and moral education is receiving special attention.

99. The State has also kept scholarships for deserving Jamkhandi state pupils, for studies in the Arts, Science, Medical and Agriculture Colleges, as also in the Victoria Technical School at Bombay.

100. The total expenditure on education amounted to Rs. 35,156-8-8 against 34,309-15-9 of the last year.

CHAPTER VIII

MISCELLANEOUS.

101. A Printing Press was maintained by the State for State purposes. One more press was maintained by a private person till January 1914 which was closed on account of the death of the proprietor.

102. There is no newspaper or periodical in the State.

103. There are 7 libraries as last year. All except Hunnur library receive grants from the State.

104. One leopard was shot in Chipalkatti hills for which a reward of Rs. 8 was given.

105. I visited the famine-affected villages of Patkal Thana to look into the condition of the people and personally inquired into the applications for relief and granted Tagai on the spot. Dole was given to the needy. I also visited some villages of Jamkhandi, Bidri and Kundgol during my usual inspection tour. The Jamabandi of all the Talukas was completed by the prescribed date. I have as far as possible done my best to supervise the administration in all its details. Owing to my ill health, I was not able to do sufficient inspection. The Taluka officers have worked satisfactorily. Steps have been taken for the prompt disposal of work in all offices, Petitions are being promptly dealt with. The revenue collection work was satisfactory. All arrears of revenue inquiries and correspondence have been considerably cleared. The revenue settlement work is being watched carefully. The state banks are being popularised. The Inam Settlement work and the Setsanadi re-organization will be shortly taken in hand.

106. The proposed scheme of a cord line of Railway from Chinchli to Bagalkot via Jamkhandi is still before Government. Government asked the Chief to state what financial aid he was willing to offer to the construction of the line. The M. S. M. Railway company asked for an advance of 20 lakhs of Rupees to the Company, on debenture terms. The Chief expressed his unwillingness to do this and in turn submitted to Government the three following alternative proposals.

(A) The state would pay Rs. 20 lakhs or the estimated cost of the whole line from Chinchli to the Jamkhandi-Mudhol frontier; the money to be a permanent investment with profits at a minimum of 5 P. C. This portion may be named "The Jamkhandi State Branch."

(B) The state would pay the cost of the line running within the Jamkhandi state limits only, without Government guarantee of a minimum profit; the portion of the line remaining as state property; in which case the state would take the risk of loss or profit.

(C) The state would pay the cost of the Jamkhandi portion as a permanent investment with a Government minimum guarantee of 5 P. C. profit by way of interest or rebate.

107. These proposals were submitted some time ago. Orders of the Government of India there-on are awaited. A railway to Jamkhandi is a long-felt want, very keenly felt by the people in these parts and repeatedly recommended by the British Officers as an urgently needed protective measure in famine times.

The Chief is anxious to have a Railway of the state, built at its cost and named "the Jamkhandi state Railway" from Chinchli to the Jamkhandi limits. He is prepared to pay the entire cost of the undertaking.

CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

108. The condition of the people was on the whole satisfactory. The bulk of the population are agriculturists. The season was generally favourable. The out-turn of crops was good. Prices were not unfavourable, especially of cotton and wheat. The ryots paid up the land revenue demand without any difficulty. Fodder was plentiful. That enabled the cattle to keep well. Drinking water-supply was good, except in Kundgol where it has failed recently.

109. Government fallow-land was eagerly taken up, as land has considerably risen in value. The rental value too has considerably increased. The registration records show that a larger number of transfers of land took place in the year. This is explained by the fact that the introduction of the Transfer of Property Act compels registration of deeds even of less value than Rs. 100. The value of the immovable property transferred, rose from six lakhs to eight lakhs about. There were practically no money bonds registered.

110. The State Bank is being largely resorted to by the ryots chiefly with the object of redeeming mortgages and improving lands. Money is now available for the cultivator's need at a cheap rate of interest; and so he is not slow to take advantage of it. Local crime on the whole has decreased. There is a higher scale of living seen among the people. They have taken interest in education. Land is being improved on a large scale. The fall in prices of staple food-grains, though apparently adverse to the interests of the ryots is on the whole beneficial to the people in general. The larger attendance at the fairs is another sign of the ryots' prosperity. The general health of the people was satisfactory. The increase in births and decrease in the mortality prove this. The exports were smaller than the imports. The weavers and other artisans had sufficient work to earn a living. Their condition is satisfactory. The laboring classes are fully engaged. The agricultural labourer gets enough work during the cultivating and harvest season and in other days on general work. The supply of labour is insufficient to meet the demand.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

111. Such is the record of the events connected with the administration of the State, as well as the condition of the people. The administration was carried out on the line of least resistance; the revenue was collected with ease; all needs and comforts of the people were attended to as far as possible; their education was a special care of the state; justice was administered with moderation, efficiency and promptitude as far as possible. Financial help was given to the needy to assist improvement of land, domestic difficulties and higher education; water-supply was improved as far as could be. Education to life and

property was ensured as far as possible. The Municipalities managed their finances well; and useful work was done. Steps to enable the ryots to get their business done in the state offices in time were adopted. The records were rearranged.

112. The High-School has maintained its high reputation for efficiency and usefulness. In the same way all departments of the administration worked satisfactorily and loyally with a view to secure the economic prosperity in the condition of the people.

113. The Chief Saheb has been taking a lively interest in the administration personally; and has done his best to supervise carefully every branch of it.

114. I am extremely happy to note here that the people of this state have continued to remain as loyal as before.

115. In conclusion, I am directed by the Chief Saheb to offer his heart-felt thanks to you and to Major O'Brien for the valuable and sound advice so kindly given to him from time to time in important matters of administration.

I have the honour, by direction of the Chief, to submit the Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State, for the Fasli year 1324 ending 5th June 1915.

CHAPTER I

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2. The State is divided into three Talukas—Jamkhandi, Bidri, and Kundgol, and three Thanas, Vathar, Patkhal and Dhawalpuri. It has an area of 524 square miles and a population of 1,00,304 according to the census of 1911. The gross revenue of the State, exclusive of Inams, is Rs. 6,10,333 based on the average of the past 5 years. The State pays to Government an annual tribute of Rs. 20,515.

3. The Chief, Meherban Shrimant Sir Parashuramrao Ramchandrarao alias Bhausahab Patwardhan K. C. I. E., is a Kokanastha Brahmin. His age is 32. He is a Treaty Chief and a First Class Deccan Sardar. He has a son and a daughter. The former, Shrimant Shankarrao Appasaheb, is now in his 9th year. This Prince is being carefully educated under an experienced graduate. He is studying the 4th Marathi Standard. The daughter, Shrimati Keral Tarabaisahab alias Shakuntala Taisahab is now in her third year. The Chief, with his family, resides at Ramtirth. They are all in excellent health.

4. The Chief paid a visit to His Excellency the Governor in Bombay. He paid a friendly visit to Jath, where he stayed for a few days in the month of December 1914. He went to Ramdurg and attended the ceremony of the Chief's installation in January last. He also spent a fortnight in Kolhapur during

the summer. He made a tour in the state, visiting the Taluka stations of Savalgi and Kundgol and two Thanas and a few villages in each Taluka. He visited the Taluka Kacheris to see how things went on. At Kundgol he discussed with the people the feasibility of a water-supply scheme, and the cotton trade possibilities of the town. At Savalgi, he visited the water-supply works under construction and developed the idea of connecting that outlying station with Jamkhandi by a telegraphic line. In the Patkhal Thana he visited both the villages to see the state of the ryots for himself.

5. The all engrossing event of the year was the Great War, which the British Government found it painfully necessary to declare, against Germany in July last. The news was received both by the Chief and his people with much sympathy anxiety and regret. The Chief Saheb called up a meeting of the people at once; and explained the situation to them, who unanimously passed a resolution of their unswerving loyalty to His Majesty's Throne, and to the British Empire; a message was sent at once of complete sympathy and steadfast adherence to the cause of justice and liberty of mankind, for the protection of which the British Government had drawn their sword. When, later on, Turkey threw in her lot with Germany notwithstanding the best efforts at persuasion to the contrary by His Majesty's Government, some anxiety was felt, as regards a possible change in the feelings and attitude of the Indian Mohamaden population. A public meeting of that community was immediately called at Jamkhandi, and the situation was fully explained to them, as also the efforts made by Great Britain to induce Turkey to take better counsel, and stand neutral. It was also explained that when all advice failed, with great reluctance and regret Great Britain had to declare War against Turkey. The situation was fully appreciated by the people present, who unanimously passed a Resolution of absolute loyalty to the British Crown and a complete alienation of all sympathy with and respect for Turkey, who, they found, had abandoned the righteous cause of justice and liberty of mankind against the teachings of their sacred faith.

6. Appeals from high quarters, for funds needed for the help of the wounded on the field and their families, were responded to by the subjects of the State and by the Chief Saheb and the Rani Saheb with promptness and liberality. The sub-joined table shows the donations to the different funds by the Chief and his subjects.

7 The Chief expressed to Government his keen desire several times to be permitted to go to the War front for service on field, and he is extremely sorry to find that his request could not be granted.

8. He has since desired to go in charge of a Motor Ambulance which he has offered to Government in aid of the War service at a considerable cost; Orders on the offer are awaited.

9. The Ordinances passed by Government on account of the War, were introduced in the State as far as may be, as shown in Appendix II.

10. Shrimant Ramrao Venktrao alias Raosaheb Bhawe, Chief of Ramdurg remained at Jamkhandi under your advice, with the Chief Saheb, to learn administrative and judicial work. He spent about 5 months in that connection here. He attended the Civil and Criminal Courts to hear cases, and also, my office and that of the Chief Saheb to see how revenue work was being disposed of. He did his law study first with the Huzur Chitnis Raosaheb Gokhale and then with his tutor and guardian, Raosaheb Datar. On the whole he spent his time here usefully.

11. You and Major E. O'Brien Assistant Political Agent S. M. Country paid official visits to Jamkhandi during the year. During the sojourn, you were kind enough to give your advice and suggestions in matters of administrative difficulty and the Chief is sincerely grateful to you for it. Major O'Brien too discussed with me important matters of administration, and went over the Administration Report of the State for the last year very carefully, especially touching the Police, the Financial and Educational Departments; and his kind suggestions and advice have been usefully followed. He went into the question of the State Bank, the method of its working and the general investment of State balances.

12. The Chief Saheb attended a special meeting convened by you at Kolhapur, to consider the question of obtaining Military Recruits, at which the Chief Recruiting Officer, Major W. J. H. Hunter was also present. The proposed measures were discussed for what might and could be done to induce eligible men to enroll themselves for field service. I have however to record my regret at the complete failure of all attempts made by the State to induce men to join as recruits. News of heavy casualties on the field was filtering through the papers: and this was enough to create a widespread terror in the minds of the ryots. It is true, the real fighting material of the Deccani Mohamadan and Mahratha is absent in these parts of the State. The majority of the ryots is Lingayat and inferior Jain Kunbi, in whose families no one has ever seen field service. The few families of Mahrathas in Savalgi Taluka had already, before the War broke out, sent their sons to the Army Service.

13. A meeting of the State Karbharis was held by you at Kolhapur, at the instance of Mr. Starte I. C. S. on special duty for adopting reciprocal measures for bringing under a central control, bad characters and criminal tribes in Native States, and adjoining British Districts. Mr. Starte's proposals were submitted by me to the Chief Saheb whose approval has been already communicated to you. Orders on the subject from Government are awaited.

14. The opening ceremony of "The Shrimant Ramchandranw Appasaheb club" at Jamkhandi was performed at the hands of Major E. O'Brien during his stay here. The club house, is a nice building with the Badminton and

Tennis-Court appendages, and has been presented by the Chief to the townspeople of Jamkhandi in a spirit of liberality and with a sincere desire that the citizens of Jamkhandi might really profit by it. Major O'Brien, in an impressive speech, urged the gentlemen present to make use of the institution in the spirit in which it was offered by the Chief Saheb. The Chiefs of Sangli, Mudhol, Jath and Ramdurg graced the occasion. These Chiefs met at Jamkhandi then for the periodical sports, which took place on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd January 1915 under the umpireship of Major O'Brien. The sports were a remarkable success. This meeting of the Chiefs at a central place, once a year, has so far been an efficient means for exchange of thought and discussion of administrative questions between them.

15. The river Krishna was in highest floods known during the last 40 years. Some villages on the banks of the river were in danger of being washed away. The Chief, however, adopted as usual, very prompt and efficient measures and saved the situation. His paternal care and solicitude for the welfare of his subjects were of great help. Not a single life was lost.

16. All possible care was taken to prevent suspicious characters entering the State limits. The year under report was a specially anxious time for the Police. The disturbing elements in the War crisis likely to work on the minds of the people were supposed to be many. But a people, who by nature and grain have been steadfastly loyal to Government from the bottom of their heart, it is impossible for any one to change; and the Chief has the satisfaction to find that there was not the slightest sign of disturbance] during the year.

17. The Political relations of the State with the Paramount Power and with the neighbouring Native States remained as cordial as ever.

RELATIONS OF THE STATE WITH THE ADJOINING BRITISH AUTHORITIES.

18. Co-operation in Police matters still requires to be regulated by satisfactory rules. This matter has been under consideration of Government for a long time. Their orders are still awaited. This matter was referred to in para 8 of my last year's report. This is a matter at once urgent and important. Criminal tribes live in the Athni Taluka villages lying in the State limits. Their position has been impregnable. The Katbus have been a pest both to the Bijapur District as well as to the Jamkhandi State. The only officer who has been tactfully trying to tackle them with some success is Mr. M. V. Kamat the Police Inspector, Bijapur. He has rendered valuable help to the local State Police during the year. The Athni Taluka Police have not been able to control the Katbus in their limits.

19. The extradition of criminals from State limits received prompt attention from the State authorities. The period of reciprocity for the exchange of criminals and Mudemal between the Kolhapur Darbar and this State was extended for a further period of five years.

20. Reciprocity for service of processes between the British and State Courts in civil matters was authorized by Government Resolution (Political) No. 1787 dated the 24th March 1915.

21. The Excise Department:—The Abkari rights of the State have been

farmed out to Government. The lease which ended on 31st July 1914, was renewed for a further term of 10 years. The State has been doing its best to help the Government excise officers in protecting the revenue. Smuggling and other illegal practices brought to light have been promptly punished. The need for deterrent punishments in such cases has been impressed on the local Magistracy.

22. Educational Department:—All possible care is being taken to see that no boy in any school gets ideas of extremism. A strict discipline and obedience to orders is enforced, both among the teachers and the pupils.

23. A very careful vigil is kept to see that doubtful characters with Political fads do not enter into the State limits. If any do, they are promptly dealt with.

24. All the libraries in the State have been registered on condition that the library buildings are not to be used for any discussion of Political matters and no proscribed book or paper is allowed to be read in the library. I have personally over-hauled the list of books and periodicals and newspapers kept in them and have taken steps to see that no objectionable book or paper is allowed to be introduced in them.

25. Appendix I will show the names of heads of offices in the State.

CHAPTER II.

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION.

26. The lands in the State have been settled on the Bombay Revenue system except in Inam villages. The existing lease 40 years old, has been continued pending completion of the Revision Settlement. This revision is nearing completion in the Kundgol Taluka; as reported last year, it is progressing under the special officer Rao Saheb G. K. Hulyalkar. 15 surveyors with the head surveyor are employed under him. The progress of the work till the end of May last is shown below:—

27. By the end of June 1915, the work of re measurement and re-classification will have been completed in 10 villages leaving only 3 villages for the next fair season. The staff was drawn up from the old measurers and classers of the State, from a few pensioners of the Mysore Survey, and men specially trained. The difficulty in obtaining the staff with the required training for doing accurately the maximum quantity of work was great. Ill health of the surveyors by an epidemic delayed operations. An extremely careful and yet hard supervision was necessary. The driving power of the Superintendent was severely taxed. The results obtained are extremely satisfactory. The cost so far does not exceed 2 annas the acre. Nearly 5/6 of the work will have been done by the end of June leaving about 9,000 acres to be completed. The necessity of separating the unregistered

sub-divisions of holdings has increased the work. 1904 old Survey numbers have been divided into 2630 new numbers.

28 After completion of the work in Kundgol Taluka, Revision Settlement will commence in other Talukas and Thanas.

29 The following table will compare the area under cultivation, the revenue due and the collections and outstandings.

30 The season was favourable on the whole. Land Revenue demands were easily paid up, though more notices were required to be issued. The suspensions granted to ryots in Pathkal Thana last year, on account of famine, were also easily recovered. There the season was exceptionally favourable. No coercive measures were required to be resorted to. The increase in collections over demands is due to the recovery of the previous years' out-standings. 15 A. and 12 G. of unoccupied assessed land was taken up. 11 A. 12 G. were thrown out of cultivation; thus leaving 779 A. 26 G. waste for the next year.

31 Tagai of Rs. 620 for the improvement of lands in Jamkanhdi Taluka was given.

CHAPTER. III

PROTECTION.

LEGISLATION

32 The Acts and Regulations in force and those introduced in the year are given in Appendix II. The amendments of the enactments hitherto in force were also introduced to bring the law in force in British territory upto date in the State.

33 The need for the introduction of the Whipping Act was keenly felt to check habitual crime. Act IV of 1909 was, therefore, introduced. Great care will, however, be taken to invest officers with the power of whipping.

34 The new code of Civil Procedure was introduced, as being more compact and methodical than the earlier code. The introduction is much appreciated by the people. The same remarks apply to the introduction of the Limitation Act IX of 1908.

35 With a view to secure a legal value to the wills executed in the State, the Probate and Administration Act V of 1881 was introduced.

36 The need for a proper treatment of lunatics who were found by the Police to require looking after, made it necessary to introduce Act IV of 1912.

MILITARY FORCE.

37 There is no military force in the State.

POLICE.

38 The total strength was the same as that in the last year i. e. 317 foot and 46 mounted Police. The total cost of the force amounted to Rs. 55,470-1-7 against Rs. 57,055-7-6

39 The details of the Police Force are given in Appendix IV. Of the Foot Police 217 are armed and the rest unarmed. There are 46 mounted Police, all armed. More than two thirds are able to read and write: the rest are under instruction, a fairly satisfactory discipline was maintained, as will be seen from the very few punishments that had to be given. In seven cases the good services were rewarded by promotion and in 4 by money. One sowar and a constable were dismissed for gross disobedience to orders and absence from duty. Only 10 men were fined for neglect of duty.

40 Of the 247 armed men 197 carry Muzzle Loading Sniders; and 50 Breech Loading Martiny Henry Muskets; and the rest carry swords and battons. The Muzzle Loading Sniders are all of the old type and have for the most part lost their efficiency. They are practically unserviceable. A proposal for a supply of new 50 S. B. B. L. Martiny Henry Muskets in exchange for the old ones, was again submitted last year to Government. You were pleased to personally inspect the old arms and found them to be unserviceable. The Chief earnestly hopes that the application will be granted by Government, as soon as possible. The ratio of Police to area is 1 man per 1.5 square miles and to population 1 man to 276.32 people.

41 The pay of one Head-Constable was raised from Rs. 20 to 25. An important reform was introduced in the pay of the Police constabulary. During the year a time-scale of services was introduced. This has graduated the promotion of men automatically provided the service is satisfactory. The graduated scale laid down is:—

This has removed a long standing complaint of a stop-gap in promotion of men of long standing.

42 The results of the working of the Police are given in Appendices V, VI and VII. There were 91 cases for disposal against 110 last year. Of these 53 were disposed of and 38 remained pending investigation. Of these 38, not less than 20 are mere house-breakings, without loss of property-cases which it is difficult usually even for the shrewdest Policeman to trace.

43 If therefore, the cases of simple house-breakings without any loss of property are excluded, the bulk of the crime would seem to fall from 73 cases last year to 53 in the current year. This would seem to be very satisfactory.

Excluding such house-breakings, the number of *true cases* undetected was only 7; but these 7 include one case of murder and one of robbery and one of theft. Besides this "undetected" serious crime, there is one more case of murder and three dacoities still under investigation at the end of the year.

44. Of the total serious crime, there were 4 murders. Of these two were brought to trial. In one, accused were convicted and in the 2nd the accused had to be acquitted for want of direct evidence. The 3rd was classed as undetected; and in the 4th the investigation was completed and accused brought to trial and convicted since the close of the year.

45. Of the 94 persons arrested, 87 were sent up to take trial. Of these 68 were convicted and 15 were acquitted or discharged; while 4 remained awaiting trial at the close of the year.

46. The percentage of convictions to arrests rose from 54.6 to 72.3 and that of convictions to accused sent for trial also rose from 57.9 to 78.1. This rise is satisfactory. But in dealing with serious crime, the Police have unfortunately failed to reach a high standard. One of the two Foujdars, who proved inefficient was retired, and the other was transferred recently to another department and their places have been filled up by better men. In the interests of efficiency and protection of the public from serious crime such drastic steps were deemed absolutely necessary. The efficiency of the Police Inspector Mr. R. A. Chhabbi, who came from the Government Criminal Investigation Department broke down by his unfortunate continued ill-health.

47. In the recovery of stolen property too, the police were not sufficiently successful. Out of the total property stolen worth Rs. 12168, they were able to recover property worth Rs. 2436 only and consequently the percentage fell from 25.4 to 20. This would seem to be disappointing. It must be noted however that the large figure of the stolen property is made up by only three cases out of 28 offences affecting property. These offences were committed by dacoits from other parts beyond state limits and it would be extremely unfair to take the local police to task for it; so long as they remain quite powerless to deal with offenders, who get a safe refuge by shifting in another jurisdiction, where State Police are powerless; nay, they run the risk of being thrashed instead, without help from local authorities. The Katbu dacoits have found a home and a safe protection in the Athni Taluka, the Police of which place, have done absolutely nothing to bring them to book. This terrible evil cannot be nipped in the bud *a day too soon*. The matter has been already brought to your notice; and, the Chief is of opinion that, unless his proposals for (1) the exchange of British villages for certain state villages and also (2) for more efficient reciprocity between the Government Police and the State Police on definitely regulated lines submitted last year, are sanctioned, there seems little hope of improvement in this important matter. There was only one case of a nominal robbery. Thefts fell from 32 to 14.

48. A very important feature of the Police activity during the year has been the dealing with bad characters under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code. No less than 39 cases were brought for trial and not less than 36 convictions were secured. Doubtless this effective measure was to a large extent responsible for the decrease of crime against property in the year.

49. The Village Police is made up of the Police Patils and Sanadis. These numbered 340. Most of the Sanadis work on service lands and a few on cash pay. The Village Police is an excellent auxiliary to the District Police, if well treated and kept in hand. They are useful in the prevention and detection of crime and in keeping a sharp look out on the bad characters and criminal tribes in the rural parts. In this connection, I have to note that the Hajiri of criminal tribes introduced in the State, under your advice is working satisfactorily. I have not received a copy of the rules under the Government Tribes Act, which I have already asked you to furnish me with. The bulk of the Hajiri has been considerably reduced and attempts are now being made to take proceedings against known bad characters under Chapter VIII Criminal Procedure Code and then treat them under the Regulation XII of 1827 for the purposes of the Hazari. This step would, it is expected, result in a very efficient check on the movements of the local bad characters and must prove a real preventive of crime to a considerable extent.

50. There were 24 accidental deaths or suicides against 43 of the last year, 39 cases of accidental fires and property worth Rs. 2828 was destroyed.

51. 10 cognizable cases were taken up by Magistrates direct. 19 persons were tried, 6 were convicted and 8 discharged, the rest are being tried. The small percentage of convictions in these cases is due to the failure on the part of the Magistracy in using the needful care before issuing processes against the accused. Their attention has been again drawn to the matter.

52. Noncognizable cases fell from 91 to 79. Most of these are compoundable offences of no importance. The percentage of convictions in the offences under the special Acts is satisfactory.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

53. There were 12 Criminal Courts. The details of their work are given in Appendix VIII. The average duration of trial was 15.5 days. 120 cases with 285 accused persons were tried. The work of the Courts was on the whole light. The Civil Sub-Judges are also First Class Magistrates. The Mamlatdars are only 2nd Class Magistrates and the Head Karkuns and Wahivatdars are 3rd Class Magistrates.

COURT OF SESSIONS.

54. In 4 cases 15 persons were tried; only 3 were convicted. Of the 12 acquittals, 5 were in a forgery case and the rest were in two murder cases.

APPELLATE WORK.

55. There were three Appellate Criminal Courts. Their work is described in Appendix IX.

56. The Chief's Court or the High Court heard one appeal. In it the conviction and sentence was confirmed. The Court of Sessions heard two appeals by 5 appellants. In one case the conviction and sentence was reversed; and in the other, confirmed.

57. The District Magistrate's Court had before it 6 appeals made by 8 appellants. In 5 cases, the conviction and sentence appealed against was confirmed and in one it was reversed.

CIVIL WORK.

58. One original suit was transferred to the District Court by special orders of the Chief Saheb. The work done by the different Courts is given in Appendix X. Suits filed rose from 652 to 889, showing a rise of 36.35 p. c. over last year's figures. The total for disposal was 1053 against 779 last year. Of these 866 (more than 82 p. c.) were disposed of during the year, and the rest were pending at the end of the year. Over 63 p. c. related to money transactions 31 p. c. related to immovable property. Over 58 p. c. were for values less than Rs. 100 and 33 p. c. were for claims below Rs. 500. These figures show that litigation was not important though the number of suits increased. Further 72 p. c. were heard *ex-parte*, compromised or struck off, reducing the contested litigation to about 28 p. c. of the whole.

59. The average duration of the hearing of a suit in regular Civil Courts was about 1 month and 3 weeks. In the Court of the 1st Class Sub-Judge it was 4 months and a half, as the Daftardar had other duties to do as well. Appendix XI shows the number of applications for execution filed, and disposed of during the year. There were 777 applications for execution: of these 603, not less than 75.1 p. c., were disposed of, during the year. The work of execution of decrees involving lands was transferred from the Civil Court to the Collector as an experimental measure. The success or otherwise would be watched with interest. The darkhasts pending for more than a year are largest in Jamkhandi, where the work is exceptionally heavy.

60. Appendix XII shows the results of appeals in Civil cases. The rise in appeals was consistent with the rise in number of suits. Out of 85 appeals, 74 were disposed of; 11 appeals remained outstanding in the District Court. Except 3 appeals, most of these 11 were late admissions.

61. Looking to the number of suits (866) disposed of by the Courts, the number of appeals (85) were indeed small; and that of decisions reversed (11) is extremely small. This speaks very well for the efficiency of the Civil Courts on the whole.

WARDS' ESTATES.

62. Particulars of the wards' estates are given in Appendix A. The estates are under the management of Mamlatdars of Talukas, who exercise careful supervision over minors and their estates, under my orders.

63. There are in all 14 wards under the care of the State. The total value of their property is Rs. 77,250 of which immovable property is worth Rs. 48715. Nos: 5, 7 and 9 in the schedule have reached their majority. No. 5's estate has been kept back as the ward still requires to be looked after. No. 7's estate will be returned shortly and No. 9's estate requires to be divided between him and his step-brother, who is still a minor. There are disputes about it. Such of the movable property which can be converted into cash is being so treated and the proceeds will be invested in the State Bank for the benefit of the wards.

64. Inquiry was made into the condition of the estate of the Kundgol Nadgir, which was reported to be mismanaged. But as soon as the Court of Wards Act was introduced in the state, the Nadgir set matters right and appointed a manager of his estate. He was allowed time to regulate his affairs

properly and warned that unless there is a satisfactory improvement in the management, it would be necessary for the State to take up the management. This has produced the desired effect. There is one more estate of sufficient magnitude, that of Shrimant Bapusaheb Raste. I have already informed him *via voce* that unless the management of his estate improves, it would have to be taken up by the Court of Wards, for his own good. The estate is over-burdened with debt.

MAMLATDARS COURTS ACT.

65. During the year under report the Mamlatdar's Courts disposed of 14 cases as against 20 in the last year. In two cases the decisions were appealed against; in one the decision of the Mamlatdar was up-held and in the other, the case, which was dismissed for want of limitation, was ordered to be taken on file again. This civil work of a summary nature entrusted to the Mamlatdars was performed by them satisfactorily.

EXTRADITION

66. There was no case of extradition into this state. 12 persons were handed over for trial from this state to British Authorities and 2 to the Kolhapur Darbar. The result of their trial was not communicated to the State.

PRISONS

67. At Jamkhandi there is a Central Jail. It is an old building but fairly efficient for present requirements. It is strong and well ventilated. There is ample accommodation for all kinds of prisoners. The Chief Medical officer is the Superintendent of the jail.

68. There are besides, two sub-jails, one at Kundgol, the other at Savalgi in charge of the Mamlatdars; and lock-ups at Wathar and Mudhavi in charge of the Wahivatdars for short time prisoners.

69. The number of prisoners newly admitted in jails rose to 134 against 89 last year. The total number of prisoners in the Central Jail were 126, of these 102 were released, in the course of the year. The daily average was 32.8 as against 18.01 as compared with the last year.

70. The official and non-official visitors inspected the Jail periodically as required by the rules.

71. There is no industry attached to the Jail. The prisoners are employed in State gardens, Faras Khana and odd works. The five female prisoners were employed on grinding work. One of these is a life convict.

72. The conduct of the prisoners was generally good. 13 prisoners got remissions according to the mark-system.

73. The average period of accused under trial is 11.6 days as against 11 days last year.

74. There was one civil prisoner and three lunatics confined in the Jail building during the year.

75. Rations and clothing were given on the scale obtaining in the Yeroli Central Prison. The dietary cost per head was Rs. 43-12-0 per annum as against Rs. 45 last year. The increase is due to high prices of corn in the first half of the year. The total expenditure of the jail was Rs. 3445-15-7 against Rs. 2728-3-8. The earnings of the convict labour amounted to Rs. 1,046.

REGISTRATION

76. The details of the work done by the Registration Department are shown in Appendix XIV and XV. The number of documents presented for registration was 2883 showing a rise of more than 45 p. c; of these 2379, were registered; one was refused registration and 3 remained unregistered at the close of the year. The total value of the documents registered during the year was Rs. 10,75,344. The only deed of which registration was refused, was ordered to be registered, on appeal, after the close of the year. The receipts and expenditure on account of the Registration Department amounted respectively to Rs. 7203 and Rs. 1545.

77. The rise in the number of deeds presented for registration is observed under all heads mentioned in column 1 of Appendix XV; those under "miscellaneous" having nearly doubled. Transfers by mortgages and sales of immovable property have increased 33 p. c. The receipts of the Department have therefore necessarily increased.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATION

78. Information regarding the receipts and expenditure of the 6 Municipalities in the State is given in Appendix XVI. The incomes of Jamkhandi and Banhatti Municipalities alone show an appreciable increase; Kundgol, Hunnur and Saunshi show a decrease. The increase in Jamkhandi is due to recoveries of arrears for past year. The House-tax settled in Saunshi has been revised and next year the income would be 50 p. c. The large increase in expenditure in Jamkhandi is due to heavy out-lay on Kategeri Tank work; of which the bund required immediate repairs. Further the town roads were put in proper repairs; and an approach road to the tank was constructed. The water-supply of the town of Jamkhandi would certainly be ensured on completion of Shiddapur storage tanks. These sister tanks would, it is hoped, be completed by the end of the monsoon. These works being beyond the means of the Municipality had to be undertaken at the cost of the State. In other Municipalities too, except in Kamdoli, the expenditure has exceeded the income. The closing balance of all Municipalities amounted on 31st March 1915 to Rs. 11,063-2-8. The Jamkhandi Municipality has deposited Rs. 5,000 out of its balance in the State Bank, on interest at $3\frac{1}{2}$ percent.

79. The principal source of income of the various Municipalities is house-tax. Octroi is levied by all Municipalities except Hunnur. The Jamkhandi Municipality has besides these, a toll and a water-tax and a wheel-tax. The chief items of expenditure are sanitation, general conservancy, lighting, road repairs and water-supply. Towards education and dispensaries small contributions are allotted.

80. The constitution of each body

87. In order to demonstrate the practical use of improved implements and different kinds of manures for different crops, the State has opened an Experimental Farm, close to Jamkhandi town. It is kept under the direct management of the Forest Officer of the State. He takes a keen interest in giving useful information to agriculturists.

88. On the Experimental Farm, experiments of Broach, Cambodia and Kumtha Cotton and Jowari, Bajari, Japanese wheat, Chillis, Onions, and Ground-nuts were tried. The experiments on Broach Cotton and Japanese wheat, Chillis, Onions and Ground-nuts proved successful. The different kinds of manures were experimented upon, on the Farm. But the unusually heavy rain-fall having damaged the Farm-beds owing to a breach in the embankment of the next field, the demonstrations failed. It was found, however, outside this area, that the manures of Nitrate of Soda and super-Phosphate are most profitable in case of Chillis, Ground-nuts and Onions.

89. On the whole the Farm is doing a satisfactory work. The receipt on account of the Farm produce amounted to Rs. 403 while the net charges amounted to Rs. 480. Besides this, Rs. 338 were spent on the repairs to the well and Rs. 96 for buying a pair of ploughs and a hand-hoe.

FOREST.

90. The area of the State Forest was reduced from 27,263 A. 22 G. to 27,198 A. 22 G. including the area 1510 A. 29 G. under Reserve Forest, the reason being that 65 Acres were given out for cultivation as that area was found unsuitable for growing forest. Seeds of Nimb, Karanji, Mashwal and Temburi were sown at the beginning of the rainy season; the seedlings of Tugali, Mashwal and Nimb are flourishing. Owing to the scanty rainfall on the tract, and the nature of the soil, forest-growth is generally poor. But as an experimental measure an area of 3 miles round about Ramtirth, has been absolutely closed against any kind of exploitation. The total receipts of the Department fell from Rs. 5,419-2-7 last year to Rs. 5118-13-3 and the charges amounted to Rs. 2,240-1-7 against Rs. 1,812-3-5.

91. The forests of Jamkhandi do not grow good timber trees. They produce a fair growth of Nimb and other inferior wood. A poor fuel supply is obtained from them. The grazing on the hills is not sold by auction. Grazing fees are levied, on permits issued for grazing, and head loads of fuel pay fees. The Forest area is worked under rules framed on the lines of the Indian Forest Act. All the forests are State property. No private rights exist in them. The rates of fees for grazing are the same now, as in the next British Districts. Grazing fees are the chief income of the forests. There were 14 cases of petty forest thefts against 17 last year. There was not a single case of forest fire.

92. The question of the improvement of the fuel supply in the State is engaging the attention of the Chief. Fuel is already scarce, and therefore insufficient and dear. The consumption of a large quantity of it for factories has affected the supply available for the public.

EXCISE REVENUE.

93. Appendix XXI shows the number of excise shops and excise revenue of the State from country liquor, toddy and hemp. The Abkari rights of this State have been farmed to Government for a period of ten years from 1st August 1914 to 31st July 1924 for an yearly amount of Rs. 43,600 payable to the State, subject to revision after the 3rd, 6th and 10th year. Of this Rs. 2733-1-1 are payable

to Inamdars. This amount is a good deal larger than that settled by the previous lease. The amount is based on the actual revenue collections of the tract. Government have kindly decided not to charge the State with the cost of the excise establishment employed to control and collect the revenue. The hemp-drugs lease too, has been farmed to Government for five years ending 31st March 1916, the yearly amount payable to the State being fixed at Rs. 5,346.

94. From opium sales the State obtained an income of Rs. 1,297, as against Rs. 951 last year. This revenue represents the difference between the actual cost of opium charged to the State by the Government Depots, and the fixed rate per lb. of sale to the licensee.

TRADE AND MANUFACTURE

95. The town of Jamkhandi is gradually rising in importance as a cotton trade centre. Besides the State cotton press and gins, two new gin-factories worked by steam engines have been started by private persons. These, together with the old 3, make a total of 5. In all 46 gins were at work in Jamkhandi town alone. The 28 state gins and the press have been started as a demonstrative experiment, for inducing local men of capital and enterprise to start industries on a suitable scale. The demonstration has begun to operate successfully. The benefits from the enterprise are being appreciated, though slowly.

96. The State press and gins have turned out a larger quantity of work during the year, than last year. They worked for 70 days in the season. 1218 khandis of cotton against 952 of last year was ginned out and 5497 bales pressed. The earnings amounted to Rs. 32000. These would have increased still larger but for the difficulties created by the War, in getting the needful material for pressing and baling, and scarcity of fuel. The charges therefore increased to Rs. 17,000 leaving a net profit of Rs. 15,000 on a capital of Rs. 1,15,000.

97. In the three private gins nearly 1800 khandis of cotton was ginned.

98. The daily average number of labourers employed during the season on the gins and Press came to 200 men, and if new industries were opened with the help of the available motive power it will provide for labour for many more.

99. Cotton sales during the season at Jamkhandi alone amounted to about six lakhs of rupees, and cotton seed was sold to the value of over a lakh notwithstanding the fall in prices. The absence of foreign demand for cotton and its seed, pulled down the prices. Rally Brothers bought cotton and sold it locally. All cotton sold was exported to Bombay and Sholapur.

100. The fact remains that the boilers attached to the Press and gins remain idle during the greater part of the year: and the capital locked in the machinery remains unproductive during that time. The question is engaging the attention of the Chief, as certain proposals have been made by the Mechanical Engineer in that connection, with a view to utilize the motive power for a set of new industries for demonstrative purposes.

101. On his visit to Kundgol, which is within a short distance from the large cotton mart of Hubli, the Chief has found that that town has a fair chance of developing its cotton trade. Kundgol is however badly off for

LIBRARIES.

144. The number of libraries remained the same as last year. *viz:* 7 All of them are registered and 5 of them get State or Municipal donations. Since the out-break of the Great War, reading of newspapers has increased. A keen interest is taken by the reading public in the progress of events.

DESTRUCTION OF WILD ANIMALS.

145. One leopard was shot in the Kalhalli hills and a reward of Rs. 8 was granted to the man who shot it. There were 4 deaths from snake bites.

RAILWAY.

146. The proposed scheme of the cord Line of Railway from Chinchli to Bagalkot via Jamkhandi referred to in the last year's report and submitted more than a year ago has not yet received the sanction of Government. Government asked the Chief to state what financial aid he was willing to offer to the construction of the line. The M. S. M. Railway company asked for an advance of 20 lakhs of rupees to the company, on debenture terms. The Chief expressed his unwillingness to do this and in turn submitted to Government the three following alternative proposals.

- (A) The State would pay Rs. 20 lakhs or the estimated cost of the whole line from Chinchli to the Jamkhandi-Mudhol frontier; the money to be a permanent investment with profits at a minimum of 5 p. c. This portion to be named "The Jamkhandi State Branch."
- (B) The State would pay the cost of the line running within the Jamkhandi state limits only, *without Government guarantee* of a minimum profit; *the portion of the line remaining as State property*; in which case the State would take the risk of loss or profit.
- (C) The State would pay the cost of the Jamkhandi portion only as a *permanent investment with a Government minimum guarantee of 5 p. c. profit* by way of interest or rebate.

* It is hoped that the scheme will be sanctioned at an early date. The Chief has not been able to hear what has come in the way of its being sanctioned. It requires no special pleading to say that the Railway is an urgent want of the State in order to connect these parts with more important towns and trade centres. Its absence is daily felt. The Chief Sahab trusts that Government would see their way to accord their sanction *at least to a part of the scheme as far as Jamkhandi* as in his opinion there should be no difficulty in doing so, and he is willing to provide funds for that portion.

THE GOKAK CANAL

JAMKHANDI BRANCH

147. The Gokak Canal scheme has, it is believed, been sanctioned by the Government. The question awaits, it appears, the allotment of funds. The execution of the Jamkhandi Branch depends on the construction of the head work.

INAM SETTLEMENTS

148. There are a considerable number of Kadim and a few Jadid Inams, which have not been settled under the Settlement Acts. Such Inams have been settled in other Native States in the S. M. Country *e. g.* Sangli State. The Chief Saheb proposes to settle them on the same system as obtains in the British districts and the Sangli State. With this view, the Chief had applied through you, to the Commissioner C. D. for copies of the standing orders on the subject. But the Chief Saheb regrets to observe that his application for copies of the orders has been negatived by Government. The Inams, both of the service tenure and a personal or religious character require to be settled on some uniform and a definite system. It is hoped, therefore, that Government will see their way to aid the Chief Saheb by their advice, as to the best way of effecting a settlement once for all of this vexed question.

STATE KARBHARI'S TOUR

149. As usual I visited all the Talukas and Thanas and a few villages therein, Taluka and village accounts were carefully examined and tested. Schools and Dispensaries were inspected. The condition of the people and their immediate wants were carefully inquired and attended to as far as possible.

CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

150. The general economic condition of the people was satisfactory on the whole. The season was not unfavourable. The out turn of crops was practically normal, except of cotton in Kundgol, where it was slightly below normal. Prices, except of cotton, were practically steady. Those of cotton fluctuated off and on in a varying scale. In Jamkhandi cotton flourished extremely well. Here there was a brisk business in it. The Rally Brothers did an amount of business. The industrial activities were satisfactory in Jamkhandi. In Patkhal Thana, the ryot was unusually prosperous. He was able to pay off the current and suspended demands of Land Revenue without the least difficulty. He has also paid away the loan instalments due. In Savalgi too, the condition of the ryot is satisfactory. The Land Revenue demands, as well as the repayment calls of the Bank were promptly paid up. There is not a single bad debt so far. The leases for the next season of lands in the possession of the State, having been sold, it is noticed that land is in as good a demand as ever. In Kundgol, however, matters are different. The price of cotton having gone down a bit, certain busy bodies in the Taluka have taken an advantage of it, and have induced a combination to reduce the lease-hold price considerably. The object of this movement is to induce the State authorities to give up the idea of increasing the land assessment in Revision Settlement of the Taluka now in progress.

151. The Great war having broken out there was less foreign demand for exportable goods. Imports were retarded. The incoming and outgoing trade suffered somewhat. That relaxed prices of cotton, wheat and oil. Though the producer's profit as well as the middleman's commission were lost to them, the local custom profited. Land changed hands on a larger scale. The registration records show that transfers of immovable property were large. Litigation was unfortunately heavier than in last year. The public health was good. Capital and labour were profitably engaged. The State Bank played an important part in affording relief to the indebted ryot from the heavy rate of interest of the Sowcar, and in reducing the prevailing rate of interest in the money market. Still money lending went on apace.

152. The artizan classes get a full wage. As a rule they are prosperous. There was a good demand for labour both skilled and unskilled. In the cotton season in Jamkhandi and Savalgi labour was difficult to get. Every living woman went out for cotton picking and earned an exceptionally good wage. They had no time to grind their own corn, which they got ground at a mill and paid for it. The excise revenue has increased. That shows that the labourer is quite well off.

153. The condition of the agricultural cattle was also satisfactory. Fodder supply was ample.

154. The above will show that so far as the material condition of the ryot is concerned, there was nothing wanting to make man and beast happy. But this happiness has been marred by the anxiety caused by the unhappy War catastrophe. The appalling loss of life that is being reported in papers daily, not to speak of the enormous waste of money and stoppage of business, is heard by the people with much regret, and all hearts and eyes are directed to Heaven praying for a satisfactory end of it as soon as possible.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

155. The above record would show that all was well, with the agricultural classes, the craftsmen and the labourers, less so with the trading classes. Nature's bounty came in with unsparing liberality for the producer as well as for the consumer. Life was peaceful but through-out anxious, on account of the direful War. The situation has been gravely trying and has put to test the real value of the loyalty of the people to the Crown. In this respect there was sincere co-operation on the part of the people with the Chief, in rendering the help required for supplementing the War Relief Funds. The relations of the people with the Chief remained cordial. A feeling of love exists between them. They fully appreciate his anxiety for their welfare. On the other hand, he keenly watches their interests in matters of their health, education and safety of their person and property. This is as it should be. The financial position of the State is quite sound. The administration of the State was, on the whole, smooth and efficient.

156. In Conclusion I am directed by the Chief Saheb to offer his sincere and grateful thanks to you and to Major E. O'Brien for the ever kind and sound advice given to him from time to time in important matters.

I have the honour, by direction of the Chief, to submit the Annual Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State, for the Fasil year 1325 ending 5th June 1916.

CHAPTER I GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2. The State is divided into three Talukas—Jamkhandi, Bidri, and Kundgol and three Thanas, Vathar, Patkhal and Dhawalpuri. *These Thanas lying as they do in different collectorates unconnected with each other make Administration somewhat costly and inconvenient. The State has an area of 52½ square miles and a population of 1,00,304 according to the Census of 1911. The gross revenue of the State, exclusive of Inams, is Rs. 6,16,274 based on the average of the last 5 years. The State pays to Government an annual tribute of Rs. 20,515.*

3. The Chief Meherban Shrimant Sir Parashuramrao Ramchandrarao alias Bhausaheb Patwardhan K. C. I. E. is a Chitpawan Brahman. His age is 33. He is a treaty Chief and a 1st Class Deccan Sardar. He has a son and a daughter. The former Shrimant Shankarrao Appasaheb is now in his 10th year. An experienced graduate looks after the education of this Kumur. He is studying the 1st English Standard. The daughter, Shrimati Keral Tarabaisaheb alias Shukuntala Tai Saheb is now in her 4th year. The Chief with his family resides at Kuntarhi. Except Shrimati Soubhagyawati Rani Saheb they are all in good health.

4. In my last year's report I observed that the Chief expressed his keen desire to Government several times to be permitted to go to the War Front for Service; but that, his request could not be granted. During the year however, Government were graciously pleased to accept his offer of a Motor

Ambulance and of his personal services as an officer in charge of it. The Chief left the Indian shores after paying a visit to his Excellency the Governor and his councillors on the 14th of September 1915. He was to remain there for six months. He remained off the French War Front, however, for a short period as the Indian Force was withdrawn from it at the time. Nevertheless, Sir Bhausaheb Patwardhan feels ever so grateful to Government for being allowed this opportunity. He then went to England, where he took an opportunity to visit some of the leading statesmen. The Chief has desired me to take this opportunity to express his most grateful thanks for the kind treatment he received at the hands of his immediate superiors General Kerry, Colonel Greyfoot and Colonel Sloan, the Military officers of the corps, to which he was attached, and the other High Officers with whom he came in contact, both while he was on duty at the War Front, and during his short sojourn in London. After a stay of about 20 days in England, he returned to India with his attendants and arrived in Bombay safely on 27th December 1915.

5. During the Chief's absence the administration of this State was entrusted with the approval of Government to a Council of three members of which the State Karbahi was the President.

6. He made a tour in the State, visiting the Taluka Stations of Savalgi and Kundgol and some of the villages in these Talukas; in order to see the condition of the crops and the people and to get first hand information about the wants of his ryots. While at Kundgol, he visited the site of a proposed ~~storage~~ reservoir and discussed with the State Engineer the scheme for the supply of water to Kundgol. He has directed the scheme to be taken in hand; and has appointed a special Assistant Engineer for that purpose. That officer has nearly completed the survey and taking levels. Besides this he selected a site for building a house for the A. V. School at Kundgol, for which plans and estimates have been sanctioned. He twice inspected the water works at Savalgi and developed the idea of constructing new police lines just in front of the present Mamlatdar's office. He also visited the Wathar Thana and his estate in Tasgaon. At Wathar he selected a site for the Wahiwatdar's office and police lines. The Chief takes a keen interest in public works; these he visited with the Executive Engineer of the State.

7. With a view to help Government to obtain recruits for the War service the Chief has hitherto tried all means in his power to induce people to enlist, from the Deccani Mahrattas and Mahomedans within the State limits. The notices received from the Resident Kolhapur and Political Agent S. M. C. were published and explained in each village. The State Police and Revenue Officials visited each village for that purpose; but the few families of Mahrattas who had in them the traditional martial spirit, have already sent out their sons to join the ranks. Certain accidents having unfortunately occurred among them, the work of enrolment has suffered a good deal. Although the prospects in this direction have so far, been gloomy, it is proposed to renew the efforts once more. The intention of Government to enroll Brahmin recruits has been notified. Since then, attempts are being made to induce Brahmans to come forward for recruitment.

8. I am glad to note that the Chief and his people have been doing their best to help the different War Funds. The subjoined table shows the donations to the different Funds so long made by the Chief and his subjects:-

9. The Ordinances passed by Government on account of the War were introduced in the State as far as may be, as shown in Appendix II.

10. You and Major E. O'Brien the Assistant Political Agent paid official visits to Jamkhanli during the year. You were both kind enough to give your advice and suggestions now and then in matters of Administrative difficulty and the Chief is very thankful to you for it. Major E. O'Brien visited Savalgi Taluka this year and made his camp there for about 4 days. During his sojourn he visited the adjoining villages and inspected the Schools and Dispensary.

11. The Police have been keeping a close watch every where to prevent suspicious characters finding an entry within the State limits. The Railway Line and works within the State limits are also being carefully protected as far as possible. The people are generally peace loving and loyal to the core, and the Chief has the satisfaction to find that all is well in the State.

12. The Political relations of the State with the Paramount Power and with the neighbouring Native States remained cordially satisfactory.

RELATIONS OF THE STATE WITH THE ADJOINING BRITISH AUTHORITIES.

13. It is satisfactory to note that during this year, the British Police in the adjoining Districts of Bijapur, Belgaum, Dharwar and Kanara rendered valuable help to the State Police. This enabled the latter to adopt preventive measures under Chapter VIII of the Criminal Procedure Code and to send gangs of Ghantichors and Kachns to take their trial in Criminal Courts.

14. A Band of dacoits of Ghantichors from the Bellary District, which was troubling the Kundgol Taluka of this State, the south of the Dharwar District and the Talukas of Laxneshwar, Gudgeri and Shirlatti of the Patwardan

States, as also the Mundgod Petha in Kanara was brought to book; and was sentenced to long terms of imprisonment. In dealing with them, valuable help was given to the State Police by the Police of Kanara and the Bellary District. The Chief takes this opportunity to acknowledge it very gratefully.

15. Again very lately the Belgaum Police and the Jamkhandi Police have joined in all good spirit to apprehend certain Katbu dacoits in the Athni Taluka. A large amount of Stolen property has been traced. The Savalgi Police of this State have rendered good aid to the Police of the Bijapur District in two important cases, which the District Superintendent of Police has highly praised and has sent a special certificate to the Foujadar Mr. Limaye in appreciation of his services.

16. On the subject of the special steps suggested last year by Mr. Startz I. C. S. on special duty, for adopting reciprocal measures for bringing under a central control, bad characters and Criminal tribes visiting Native States and the adjoining British Districts, the Chief Saheb has expressed his willingness to lend over the criminals visiting the State and to pay the cost of their settlement for a period of five years (my letter No. 57 dated 6th February 1916).

17. Mutual extradition of criminals received prompt attention during the year.

THE EXCISE DEPARTMENT.

18. Although the Abkari rights of the State have been farmed out to Government the State authorities have always helped the Government Excise officers in excise administration to promptly punish smuggling and other illegal practices when they were brought to light. The need for deterrent punishments in such cases has been impressed on the Local Magistracy.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

19. The annual school report was submitted to the Educational Inspector Southern Division. His suggestions to introduce reforms in this department were carried out as far as possible. All possible care is being taken to prevent students getting any idea of extremism. Strict discipline and obedience to orders is enforced both among the teachers and the pupils.

20. A very careful vigil is kept to see that suspicious characters with Political fads do not enter into the State limits. If any do, they are promptly dealt with.

21. Appendix I will show the names of heads of offices in the State.

CHAPTER II.

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION.

22. The Revenue Survey and Settlement has been introduced throughout the State except in some of the Inam villages. The existing lease, 40 years old, has been continued pending completion of the Revision Settlement. The Revision Settlement operations in Kundgol Taluka were completed by the end of March.

23. The following table shows the details of Survey work in the Kundgol Taluka to the end of Fash year 1325.

25. The net expenditure is Rs. 12,197-0-2 and the area resurveyed and reclassified is 60,150 A. 23 G. The average expense per acre is Rs. 0-3-3. This is certainly moderate and fair.

26. New maps for all the re-measured villages have been drawn up. The spare copies have been pricked from the Sarnip. After checking the copies, they will be supplied to the Villages officers and the Taluka office.

27. The Revision Settlement report for the Kundgol villages is ready and the proposals for revised rates will be shortly placed before the Chief Sahib. The main feature of the revision is that the operations have been conducted on the partial measurement and classification system. Full opportunity was taken for recording and measuring subdivisions and re-assessing them. This measure has been very popular; and bids fair to remove the complications of title that must exist in the absence of such an arrangement. It will reduce litigation and opportunities for setting up false claims. All disputes of boundaries, vacancies and encroachments were set back, wherever found.

28. The basis of the new proposed rates will be that adopted for the neighbouring British territory in Hathi and Barakar Talukas.

were also introduced to bring the law in force in British territory upto date in the State.

MILITARY FORCE.

37. There is no military force in the State.

Police.

38. The total strength was the same as that in the last year *i. e.* 317 foot and 46 mounted police. The total cost of the force amounted to Rs. 56 566-14 s against Rs. 55,470-1-7 of the last year.

39. Appendix IV gives the details of the Police force. Of the foot police 217 are armed and the rest unarmed. There are 46 mounted police, all of whom are armed. Of the total force numbering 363, 259 can read and write and the rest are under instruction. A fairly satisfactory discipline was maintained. In 8 cases, rewards by promotion, were given for good services and in three cases, money rewards were given. One constable was dismissed and 17 fined for neglect of duty. One was judicially punished.

40. Of the 247 armed men, 197 carry Muzzle Loading Sniders; and 50 Breech Loading Martiny Henry Muskets: the rest carry swords and buttons. The ratio of Police to area is 1 man per 1.5 square miles and to population 1 man to 276.32 people.

41. Appenlices V, VI and VII give the results of the working of the Police in investigation and detection of crime. There were 130 cases for disposal against 91 of the last year; of these 82 were disposed of and 48 remained finally undisposed of. Final reports, in 24 of these, were received and are awaiting the orders of the Magistrates, and the other 24 are under investigation, the majority of them having been filed near the close of the year.

42. The more serious dacoities were committed by professional dacoits. These were committed in the Kundgol Taluka which is exposed to the Korchars of the Madras Presidency. One gang of these has been brought to book; others having escaped. The difficulties caused by the several jurisdictions adjoining the State are the chief cause of the failure of the Police to control the doings of these gangs.

43. Out of the total stolen property worth Rs. 10,933 the Police were able to recover property worth only Rs. 3,338. Of the total property lost, more than half (Rs. 6,324) related to the dacoities in Kundgol Taluka, committed by the Madras Korchars referred to above. The percentage of property stolen to property recovered rose to 30.3 from 20 of the last year. This shows an improvement in the Police work but the figures are not yet satisfactory.

44. The Police Patils and sanadis form the village Police force. These number 328. Most of the sanadis have got lands for their remuneration, while a few are paid in cash. They have assisted the District Police in the detection and prevention of crime. They would certainly form a very useful institution if their head, the Police Patil, were a man more competent and skilled in his work than what he now generally is.

45. There were 50 accidental deaths or suicides against 24 of the last

year. 31 cases of accidental fires took place during the year under report as against 39 of the last year. Property worth Rs. 3,015 was destroyed by fire.

46. 7 cognizable cases were taken up by Magistrates direct 16 persons were tried, 3 were convicted, 9 discharged, while 4 are being still tried.

47. I regret to note that the Magisterial work has not improved under this class of cases. Last year's circular pointing out to them the absolute need of thoroughly examining complainants before issue of process has not had the desired effect. More efficient steps will be taken this year.

48. Non-cognizable cases rose from 79 to 107. Most of these were compoundable offences of no importance.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

49. There were 12 Criminal Courts. Appendix VIII gives the details of their work. The average duration of trial was 30.7 days. The rise in the average duration was due to the unavoidable delay in the trial of one case of grievous hurt before the 1st Class Magistrate, Jamkhandi. The chief cause of the long delay in this case was the absence of the complainant and witnesses who studiously avoided the Court's process repeatedly issued, by moving from place to place. Further, certain blood stained clothes sent to Bombay for being examined by the Chemical Analyser were not received back in good time.

50. In all 167 cases with 491 accused persons were tried. The work of the Courts was on the whole light. All the Sub-Judges in the State have been invested with powers of 1st Class Magistrate with a view to try the experiment of separation of the Judicial power from the Executive in more important criminal cases. Only one Mamlatdar had to be invested with 1st class powers in the Bidri Taluka, where there is no Sub-Judge.

COURT OF SESSIONS.

51. Only one case of murder came up for trial before that Court. In that case, 3 persons were tried and two of them were convicted.

APPELLATE WORK.

52. There were 3 Appellate Criminal Courts. Appendix IX gives the details of their work.

53. The Chief's Court or the High Court heard 4 appeals made by 6 appellants. In all of them the conviction and sentence were confirmed.

CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

157. The bulk of the population are agriculturists. What they therefore want most for their material prosperity is a good season. The Kharif rainfall was everywhere seasonable and sufficient. The Rabi rainfall was not so, but was fairly sufficient for crops which yielded a fair out-turn. These, except cotton, were on the whole good. Prices of food grains too were normal. The out turn of cotton this year was not satisfactory. But cotton fetched a high price in the market during the year under report. What the agriculturists therefore lost in quantity this year, they gained in price. Fodder supply was plentiful. There was sufficient supply of drinking water in all the Talukas and Thanas except Kundgol. The Chief Sahib specially visited Kundgol to see what could be done in the matter of water-supply to that Taluka. He has lately sanctioned the survey of a Nala and its water shed near Kundgol with a view to construct a reservoir. If this is taken up it promises to supply water to the two important towns of Kundgol and Saunshi, and two more villages of Kamdoli and Kuibyal. The water-works for the town of Savdgi are complete, and that has now been a lasting boon to the people of that town. The Jamkhandi Town water-works are now complete. The ryot has obtained all the advantages of good communication to send the produce of his field to the market. The only want is a good Railway, which it is hoped Government will soon sanction.

158. The State has done its best for the ryots for giving them primary as well as secondary education which is free in both cases. Higher education is being encouraged by grant of scholarships in Colleges to deserving students. The local industry of weaving is progressing. The manufacture of oil is steadily increasing. The great War now in progress has however disorganised business. Cotton trade was indifferent. The relations between the capitalists and the debtors are satisfactory. The State Bank has reduced the rate of interest to a fair level. The ryot is taking full advantage of the State Bank. He is being gradually free from the clutches of the greedy Sawkar. Prices and wages go hand in hand. The rise in wages leaves a fair margin for the labourer. His condition is satisfactory. The artizan class specially is in a flourishing condition. The general health of the population was on the whole good.

159. It will thus be observed that the economical condition of the people during the year was satisfactory. The great War, which has so much destroyed the material happiness and prosperity of man-kind in Europe has not much affected the well-being of the people here. This is due to the kind protection afforded by the powerful arm of the British Government, though the indirect effects of the War are being felt. Along with the whole Empire the people of this State are looking to the Almighty to bring the terrible War to a successful and speedy end.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

160. The above is the record of the year's Administration of the State. It will be seen that it is satisfactory on the whole. By the grace of God the season was satisfactory. Land yielded a sufficient out-turn of crops. The condition of the ryots, craftsmen and labourers remained satisfactory. The relations of the people with the Chief continue cordial. This was best observed in the grand welcome given by them to the Chief on his return from the War Front. His efforts and anxiety for their welfare and progress are fully appreciated by

them. Their health, education of their children and their general wellbeing are his special care. The financial condition of the State continues quite sound. The Chief is gratefully aware that the results so far attained in his administration of the State are due to the wise counsel he has from time to time received from you and Major E. O'Brien in important matters; for which he is extremely thankful.

I have the honour, as directed by the Chief, to submit to you the Annual Administration Report of the State, for 1326 Fasli.

CHAPTER I

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2. The State has three Talukas and three Thanas. The latter being in distant British Districts, their Administration is both costly and inconvenient.

The area of the State is 524 square miles, and population 1,00,304. and its gross average revenue excluding loans is Rs. 6,36,731. An annual tribute of Rs. 20,515 is paid to Government.

3. The health of the Chief and of his family has been good. His age is 34; and that of his son is 11, and of his daughter 4. The former is bearing the 2nd A. V. Standard.

4. The noteworthy event of the year was the visit of His Excellency the Governor to Jamkhandi in the middle of April, in connection with the Annual Cattle Show and the Agricultural exhibition. His Excellency sojourned at Jamkhandi for a couple of days only. He visited these institutions on 14th and there His Excellency was given an address by the Agricultural Association. Another was given by the Municipality of Jamkhandi. The usual official visits and return visits were paid with all due ceremonies.

5. The Chief attended the Darbar of the Sarkars, held by His Excellency the Governor of Bombay, in the month of July 1916. at Poona.

6. He was appointed His Excellency's Honourary Aikad Camp during the year.

7. He made an official tour of inspection in Savalgi, Jamkhandi and Kundgol Talukas, and visited also Shirvade and Wathar, and saw for himself the condition of the crops and of people. The more important work he performed in his tour was in connection with the recruitment of men for the Army, and the raising of the War Loan. The water works at Savalgi, the irrigation tank at Gadyal, the survey for the water works scheme in Kundgol, the developement of cotton industry in Jamkhandi and Kundgol, and construction of new roads to facilitate traffic, are some of the matters which engaged his attention during his tour.

8. The donations so far made by the Chief and his subjects for different War Relief Funds are tabulated below:-

9. The question of enlisting recruits in the State has engaged the special attention of the Chief. What the revenue and Police officers failed to do, so far, the Chief has been able to do personally by inducing some men at least, to enlist. Certain events have struck terror into the minds of the people. Not being educated, and not in touch with the sentimental part of duty, and being altogether ignorant of patriotic or martial life, the ignorant masses are naturally disinclined to enlist. There are inherent difficulties in overcoming these draw-backs. A sense of patriotism has to be infused. That is uphill work. Here, however, the personal weight of the Chief has been of great use. So far, he has been able to send up 33 men of whom only 13 have so far passed the required test of approval. A further batch of 25 men are ready.

10. The Chief presided at a large special public meeting at Jamkhandi in February last; where, he advised the people very impressively to invest their savings whatever they be in the War Loan. The desired effect was produced; and every one consented. The work of collection is going on apace. It is hoped that the collections will come to a fitting contribution from this State, which is expected, to be about a lakh.

11. The War Ordinances issued by Government have been extended to this State, so far, as they could be made applicable.

12. Your visit to Jamkhandi and those of your Assistant have been very

helpful indeed, in matters of Administration and specially in connection with His Excellency's visit to this Town. The Chief feels extremely grateful to you and to Lt-Col. Condon for the advice and suggestions so sincerely given to him from time to time.

13. Suspicious characters trying to enter State limits were being constantly watched. A protective watch has been kept on the Railway line and bridges in State limits. There are no Political Clubs or Societies in the State. Students in schools are protected from ideas of extremism. Strict obedience and discipline are enforced. People are loyal. Their relations with the Chief are satisfactory. The political relations of the Chief with the Paramount Power and with the adjoining Native States have been cordial.

14. The British Police of adjoining Districts and the State Police have exchanged cordial help in suppressing crime. Mr. Limaye, the Foujdar mentioned in last year's report was given a special reward by the Inspector General of Police for such help. Mutual extradition of criminals was prompt. The excise officers of Government who manage the State revenues in Abkari, were helped by the State Police in suppressing smuggling and other illegal practices.

CHAPTER II.

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION.

15. All lands have been settled. The revision of rates has been completed in Kundgol. That of Jamkhandi Taluka is nearing completion. The details of work so far completed are given below :-

Maps for areas completed in Kundgol have been supplied to the villages. All other papers are ready.

16. The system of operations described in para 27 of my last year's report, has been extended to the Jamkhandi Taluka. The partial measurement and classification, and the recording of sub-divisions and their re-classification are its main features. The basis of the new rates will be the recognised principles of assessment adopted in the adjoining Government villages. For administrative purposes Inam villages will also come under the operations.

17. Details of the arable land and its revenues are shown below :-

There was no need of coercive process. The net increase in area taken up was 36 A. 39 G. Nearly all outstandings will be collected. About 25 p. c. of the gross assessment is inam as shown below :-

18. For improvement of land, for purchase of agricultural implements and purchase of cattle Takavi was given to the amount of Rs. 1853-12. Loans for similar and other purposes were given to people from the State Bank to the amount of Rs. 2461. The average rate of interest was $5\frac{1}{2}$ p. c. The security taken is land or gold. This low rate of interest has done an amount of good to the ryot.

CHAPTER III.

PROTECTION.

19. Appendix H shows the Acts and Regulations in force.

20. There is no military force in the State.

The details are given in Appendix IV. The discipline of the force was good, on the whole. 293 men including the Sowars are armed. 247 carry fire-arms; of which only 50 are breech loaders; the rest are muzzle loaders; and others carry swords. The ratio of police to population is 1 man to 276.32; and to area 1 man to 1.5 square mile.

22. Appendices V to VII show the working of the police in dealing with crime

Serious crime decreased. No murder or culpable homicide was committed.

The one pending case of previous year, still undetected, relates to Kundgol, where criminals have best opportunities to escape either in the Kanara jungles or in Mysore territory. The percentage of recovery of stolen property has risen well.

In cases dealt with by Magistrates, direct convictions have improved.

23. The village police strength is 328, and is managed by patils. And it is the chief help to the District police.

24. Accidental deaths and suicides fell from 50 to 27. There were 31 cases of accidental fires, destroying property worth Rs. 1518 only.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN COURTS.

The average duration of trial fell from 30.7 to 14.4 days. This is satisfactory. The work was light. Three Sub-judges are First Class Magistrates also; all law graduates of experience. The work was satisfactory on the whole.

26. The appellate work was very light. The very few appeals and the smallest number of reversals show that the work of the courts was satisfactory.

CIVIL WORK.

27. The bulk of the work increased. The increase was marked in the Jamkhandi Court. A good proportion was disposed of. Of the closing balance a large number was filed at the end of the year. The average duration of trial was smallest in Jamkhandi Nyayadhis Court (Appendix x.)

28. The Collector was entrusted with execution of decrees involving lands, with benefit to the parties. 78.3 per cent of the applications for execution of decrees were disposed of. (Appendix XI)

29. About 10 per cent of the decrees were appealed against of which 24.4 p c. only were either reversed or amended. This shows that the quality of the work of the Courts was satisfactory.

WARDS' ESTATES

30. Details of these are given in Appendix A. Six more estates have come under the State management. All the estates have profited by being taken up. The income and balances have mostly increased. Of the 13 estates, 9 belong to minors having no capable elders to manage them, and the rest belong to persons, who were found to ruin them owing to wasteful habits, family disputes etc. The cash balances of the larger estates are invested either in the State Bank, or in the Savings Bank and in Promissory Notes, after deducting sums required for current expenses.

MAMLAIDAR'S COURTS ACT.

31. Only 20 cases were filed, all of which were disposed of. There was no appeal. The 28 appeals filed at the end of last year have all been disposed of.

32. There were only two extraditions from British Districts and two from other Native States. All accused were convicted.

PRISONS.

33. Appendix XIII gives details of their working. There was a fall in the number of prisoners in the sub-jails. But the daily average in the Central Jail increased. The discipline was good. So was the health of the prisoners. There were only 3 jail offences against rules. One prisoner escaped while employed on work. He is yet away.

The Jail accommodation is sufficient. It was periodically visited by visitors appointed for the purpose.

There were 7 civil prisoners, and a lunatic. The Chief Medical officer looked after the Central Jail.

REGISTRATION.

34. The work of the Registration Offices increased 25 p. c during the year, as shown in Appendices XIV and XV. which give very full details of the work done. The reason of this increase may be ascribed to the prosperity of business on account of high prices of cotton and other crops. The income of the department has proportionately increased. The previous year's figures pointed to a fall from normal state of things. This has been nearly restored.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATION.

35. Appendix XVI gives its details. The incomes have slightly increased. The taxation schedules have been revised in Kundgol and Saunshi and Kamdoli. The extra balance of Jamkhandi is invested in the State Bank. Banhatti shows a fall in income owing to War conditions. Dyes being scarce and overcostly, the dying industry has suffered; and imports have fallen.

Jamkhandi alone elects its members. There is no change in the last years constitution. The managing committees met more often, except in Hunnur, where the Municipality is not working satisfactorily. The General bodies have met once a quarter. The working of all Municipalities except Hunnur was satisfactory.

CHAPTER IV.

PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

36. RAIN FALL. The hot weather storms were useful for preparation of lands. The monsoons were very favourable. Kharip crops seemed to be at their best. But when unusual weather set in in November and sweeping storms and abnormal weather prevailed for a week continuously, Kharip was practically destroyed. Rabbi was belated owing to excess of moisture. Very favourable winds, however, subsequently prevailed and saved the situation. (Appendix XVII)

37. THE SEASON. The Kharip area being small, the damage, which was complete, was limited to that area only. The Rabbi tract maintained its position. Prices of cotton and wheat got high. This benefitted the ryot very well indeed. Thus the season was satisfactory on the whole; the out-turn of crops being cotton 12 annas, wheat and gram 8 annas each, Rabbi Jowari 6 annas.

PRICES AND WAGES.

38. Prices of staple food grains rose enormously. This was natural, Kharip having been damaged. The rise was 45 p. c. in Kundgol, 40 p. c. in Savelgi and 30 p. c. in Jamkhandi. In their anxiety to secure the largest profit, the ryots have sown larger area with cotton 92,183 acres as against 50,776 acres last year, and neglected the staple crops. Old stores of Jowari and Bajari had to come for help.

Prices of cotton have increased considerably. That has brought more money to the ryot.

39. Wages have been showing a continuous rise for skilled as well as unskilled labour. The former was one rupee and the latter 8 annas. The demand for labour has increased. The supply is small, and the workman is now in a position to dictate his own terms. Prices of staple grain having increased the rise in wages is natural. The capitalist does not mind the increase in his industrial enterprises. The reflex effect on others however is unfortunately serious, as incomes do not increase in every quarter.

The special feature of this labour question is that the quality and quantity of work turned out compare badly with the cost. The labourer does not care to improve his work. The worst effects of this are felt in the cost of the articles produced, by the general buyer. The matter is serious and shall require a solution as soon as may be.

THE STATE EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

40. The methods of agriculture in the State require improvement. They are in their retrograde condition. The tenacity of the old cultivator in doing his best for his land is on the wane. The habits of industry and rigid economy and hard and persistent work on their "mother earth" are flagging. The reason is that the ryot possesses land more than he can manage. His style of living is changing. Habits of a town life are attracting the peasant's younger generation, as cotton is bringing them more money. Fortunately these evils have not spread much as yet.

With a view to improve the methods of cultivation the State Farm is introduced. Here, ploughing up and clearing land at proper times with improved implements, selection of good seed, using remedies to disinfect it with chemicals and using proper manures are demonstrated. These demonstrations are attracting notice, and are producing beneficial results. Experiments on different kinds of cotton, white Jowari and Bajari, Chillis, Japan and irrigated wheat, and on Onions and Cabbage were made.

41. The Annual Cattle fair and Agricultural Exhibitions held in April last brought many instructive and valuable exhibits for the benefit of agriculturists. Improved implements of agriculture were shown. A new drilling machine designed by Mr. Joshi of Jamkhandi was found very useful and was approved with praise by His Excellency the Governor and the high Officers of the Agricultural Department, who visited the Shows. Demonstrations of Gal manufacture, threshing corn, drilling, ploughing, butter making were shown by professional experts. Manures of all sorts and their uses were explained. A series of lectures by experts in the different branches of agriculture were given to the assembly.

ryots. Various points were raised and were explained. Both the ryots and the State were gratified at the results. The State owes a deep debt of gratitude for the very sincere and hard work undertaken and most sincerely performed by the officers of the Agricultural Department, and for the very keen interest taken by His Excellency the Governor. His visit to these Shows, it is hoped, will inaugurate a new era of agricultural regeneration of the State, if systematic and sustained attempts are made to keep up the interest created.

42 Owing to the change in the date of the Cattle Show, the number of cattle exhibited was only 3685 as compared with 5118 last year. Some 214 prizes were awarded, and 7 medals were won. The total value of the awards was Rs. 2000 from the State. To this was added a special prize of Rs. 50 by His Excellency Lord Willingdon for the best bred cow and its calf which was approved by him. To the address presented by the Agricultural Association His Excellency made a suitable reply, and promised that the Irrigation project of the Ghatprabha river, which will supply water for the Jamkhandi branch canal, will be taken up by Government as soon as the present War conditions cease.

FORESTS.

43. The area covered by them is 27198 acres; of this the reserved forest is 1510 acres. Conservancy and afforestation continue to be attempted. The forests supply fuel and grazing. There is no timber in them. An experienced Forest officer is in charge of the Department. A superficial survey of minerals in the Forest was made in the year. A more satisfactory verification of the results will be undertaken next year. The year's receipts amounted to Rs 5551 and charges to Rs 1735.

EXCISE REVENUE.

44: Appendix XXI shows details. The country spirit and toddy farm has been leased to Government. That of Hemp-Drugs is going to be renewed. Government are considering the question. The existing lease terminated on 1st April 1916. The sales have increased.

TRADE AND MANUFACTURE.

45. Jamkhandi has improved its cotton trade. The State Press and gins opened for demonstration have induced four other factories to open. In all 62 gins worked in the town. Kundgol Taluka have three centres with 52 gins. In all 10623 Khandis of cotton was ginned in Jamkhandi alone; and about 8000 bales will have been pressed by the end of the season, which still continues. There was brisker business in cotton than in last year. Prices having risen old stores are being brought out. The factories were worked under the Act under proper supervision. The State Press worked at a cost of Rs. 35712, and produced a net income of Rs. 24,010. The satisfactory nature of the season, explains the increase notwithstanding the business done by other factories. The average daily number of workers in the factories varies from 177 to 232. The Chief Mechanical Engineer inspects all the factories.

46. Cotton sales on the spot, besides exports for sale elsewhere, amounted to 15 lakhs in Jamkhandi alone. In Savalgi Taluka they amounted to Rs. 2 lakhs and in Kundgol to Rs. 1,95,000.

47. Hand loom industry suffered slightly for want of dyes and dyed yarn. 113 out of 3644 looms weave blankets. All others weave Sadis, Dhoria etc. German dyes are being replaced by country colors. There is considerable dyeing industry in Banhatti and round about.

Oil presses have increased. Oil is pressed in old country presses. The business is paying. Prices have increased; and the oilmen are making money. There is ample supply of Kandi; it can supply a good field for a machine Presser.

The Chief had to postpone the fraction of his idea of attaching an oil press and looms to the Bolders at the State factory. That means machinery, which is difficult to get in the war times.

48. The articles of imports were the same as were mentioned in the last year's report. The exports are oils, oilseeds, oil-cakes, wheat and cotton chiefly. The total imports are estimated at the value of Rs. 27,09,820 and the export at Rs. 23,07,850.

49. Including the cattle fair at Jankhendi, there were 4 fairs, at Kudhatti, Kundgol and Kalhalli.

50. The number of post offices remained unchanged.

51. There is no mine in the State.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

(Appendix XIX)

52. The total expenditure on public works was Rs. 1,66,120-14-6. The more important works executed were :- Original works - (1) Completing the Summer-house Rs. 7922; (2) mechanical lines (Rs. 5089); (3) a Gymnasium at Ramirth (Rs. 1200); (4) the Guest house (Rs. 5611); (5) Hospital addition (Rs. 2269); (6) Bhateshwar Temple, Kundgol (Rs. 1387); (7) Jankhendi Bidri road (Rs. 2393); (8) School at Shiddapur (Rs. 1359); (9) Shiddapur Water works (Rs. 2319); (10) Savalgi Water works (Rs. 3002); (11) contribution for a causeway over the Hurs-hall Nalla (Rs. 5000), and (12) Race Course (Rs. 3344). For repairs to buildings (Rs. 14657) and to roads (Rs. 10281).

The Summer-house was completed for putting up His Excellency the Governor and other Guests in last April. The Water works at Shiddapur and at Savalgi were completed. The road to Bidri is an important one and when complete would join the State with Bijapur District via Mandapur. The total length of roads maintained is 135 miles.

CHAPTER V.

REVENUE AND FINANCE.

53. Appendix XXII shows full details of income and expenditure.

54. The years revenue was Rs. 6,93,271-3 0, with a fall of Rs. 10,629-14-0, which is a nominal figure, as may be gathered from the explanations of increases and decreases given in the Appendix.

55. The income from the revenues remained practically normal. All outstanding arrears were collected. The debt accounts do not affect the permanent revenues of the state.

56. There is no special feature on the debit side worth noting, the increases and decreases having been explained in the Appendix.

57. The State balances are in a sound condition. In addition to the cash closing balance, there are investments in Banks Rs. 4,67,779, in the State Bank Rs. 3,54,189, in Government Promissory Notes and Loans Rs. 5,56,300, in shares of Companies Rs. 60,740, and in advances to be adjusted Rs. 1,10,098. These with deposits to be repaid Rs. 99,487 leave the total figure of the State balance at Rs. 15,36,631. The investments brought interest, so far paid up to Rs. 46,113 for the year.

58. The State Bank is working satisfactorily. Loans are given at an average rate of interest at $5\frac{1}{4}$ p. c.

CHAPTER VI.

MEDICAL RELIEF.

59. Appendix XXIII explains the work done at the different institutions. The attendance of patients increased. The cost of the maintenance too has increased owing to scarcity of medicines, due to war conditions. The working of the Hospital and Dispensaries was satisfactory.

60. The vital statistics are shown in Appendix XXIV. The birth rate and death rate per mile have improved. There was less plague than last year. Inoculation was done in Jamkhandi and Kundgol to 3378 persons, of whom 4 got an attack, but none died.

61. Vaccination was successful in 3343 cases out of 3489 in the year. There were 54 revaccinations. The work was done by four vaccinators, supervised by one Inspector. The Deputy Sanitary Commissioner S. D. checks the work.

CHAPTER VII.

EDUCATION.

62. Appendix XXV gives all details. Primary education is free. Both, the number on rolls and the average attendance, increased in all schools. The progress was satisfactory. Though the language of the masses is Kanarese, the number of Marathi schools is larger than that of Kanarese. Steps have been taken to ensure that education is given in the language of the pupils. Already in some Marathi schools the last three standards are teaching Kanarese. 19 boys appeared for the Vernacular Final, and 8 passed. Female education is receiving attention. At Jamkhandi a Trained Head Mistress is in charge. Female teachers are difficult to get.

63. The education of the backward classes is making a slow progress. The attendance was 150 in all. All practicable encouragement is being given to the pupils, in free boarding and scholarships.

64. The Inspector of Schools visited them. Out of 2645 presented, 1811 passed. It will be noticed that the number presented was small, on account of plague in some villages.

65. The English Schools made a good progress. The Kundgol school attendance fell. The P. B. High school sent 20 students for the matriculation of whom 10 passed. The staff is sufficient and efficient. The teaching follows the Government Departmental methods and standards. Five students sent up from Kundgol for examination in Drawing have all passed.

66. Higher education was encouraged by the State by grant of special scholarships to 11 students, in the different Colleges. The cost was Rs. 2880. Six studied in Arts College, three in Medical College, one in the Technical Institute and one studied Law. Rs. 2363 were given as rewards to writers of books.

67. The Mechanical Institute Jamkhandi is teaching 15 students. Out of these 9 passed the examination in Motor driving.

68. The total expenditure incurred on education was Rs. 43,858-13-3.

CHAPTER VIII.

MISCELLANEOUS.

PRINTING PRESSES.

69. The State maintains one Press for doing State work. In Jamkhandi Town, there is a private Press for job works. No Newspaper or Periodical is published in the State.

RAILWAY AND CANAL.

70. The proposals of the Chief as regards the Chindli Bagalkot Railway have been approved by Government. Owing to the difficulties of the War times, the commencement of the work will take time. The same remarks apply to the work of Jamkhandi Branch of the Gokak Canal Scheme. The State has been assured that the two works will be taken up soon after peace conditions are restored.

TOURS OF INSPECTION.

71. The Jamkhandi was completed in good time. The Taluka and village accounts and records were examined. Kulruvat and field inspection was made. The Maulakhars and the State Karbhari made the usual tours. Schools and Dispensaries were visited. Petitions were attended to and disposed as soon as may be. A successful attempt has been made to reduce correspondence, and enforce prompt disposal of work.

THE CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.

72. The economic condition of the people is on the whole satisfactory. It is true the Kharip crops badly suffered. But the cultivators of that tract have been able to pull through. The labouring classes have earned well. The weavers had a dull season. Traders in cotton and grains did a good business, prices having ruled high. There was sufficient fodder and water; that kept up agricultural

cattle in a satisfactory condition. Agriculture is slowly improving. Land is fetching good Prices. The lease-hold rents are satisfactorily high. Crime has decreased. Civil litigation has increased. Transfer of property has followed the increase in business. Revenue collections were smooth. There is a perfect state of a quiet contentment among the subjects. Yet all eyes are directed to the issues of the Great War with anxiety: as the daily loss of life, energy and money, is appalling, and as general business depending on the European market is at a stand still. People have been loyal throughout. They have not hesitated to do their mite in helping the War Services.

KOLHAPUR.

SIR,

I have the honour, under the directions of the Chief, to submit the Annual Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State, for the Fasli year 1327 ending 5th June 1918.

CHAPTER I

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2. The State is divided into three Talukas, Jamkhandi, Bidri and Kundgol and three Thanas, Vathar, Patkhal and Dhavalpuri. It has an area of 524 square miles and a population of 1,00,304 souls according to the census of 1911. The gross revenue of the State exclusive of Inams is Rs. 6,83,786 based on the average of the past five years. The State pays to Government an annual tribute of Rs. 20 515.

3. The Chief Captain Meherban Shrimant Sir Parashuramrao alias Bhausaheb Patwardhan K. C. I. E. is a Kokanastha Brahmin 35 years of age. He is a Treaty Chief and First Class Deccan Sardar. He has one son and one daughter. The former, Shrimant Shankarrao Appasaheb, is now in his 12th year. He is being carefully educated under an experienced graduate. He is learning the 3rd English Standard. The daughter, Shrimati Keral Tarabaisaheb alias Shakuntala Taisaheb, is now in her 5th year. The Chief with his family resides at Ramtirth. They are all in excellent health.

4. During the year under report His Imperial Majesty the King-Emperor of India has been graciously pleased, for services in connection with the War, to grant the Honorary rank of Captain in the Army and a personal salute of 9 guns to the Chief.

5. The Chief was selected by the Imperial Government to inspect and report in Company with Major Maddin on the working of the Red Cross Society in Mesopotamia. Accordingly he left Bombay on the 25th January 1918 and returned back on the 2nd March 1918. During his absence the State was administered by a Council of three officials, namely, Rao Bahadur Dattatraya Sadashiv Sapre B. A., LL. B., State Karbhari, Mr. R. D. Sathe B. A., LL. B., Sub-Judge Kundgol and Mr. M. C. Gokhale, Huzur Chitnis (who has passed the High-Court, pleaders' examination).

6. The Chief made an official tour of inspection in Savalgi, Jamkhandi and Kundgol Talukas and visited also Shirvade and saw for himself the condition of the crops and of the people.

7. During the year under review His Highness the Maharaja of Kolhapur visited Jamkhandi to invite the Chief for the marriage Ceremony of his son.

8. Lieutenant Colonel Condon, Assistant Political Agent S. M. C. paid his official visit to Jamkhandi. During his stay at the place he visited the Schools, the Hospital and the Jail at Jamkhandi and expressed his satisfaction with all that he saw of these institutions.

9. The War in Europe has not yet ended and the State has done and is doing its best right loyally to help the Paramount Government in waging it to its victorious end. The donations so far made by the Chief and his subjects to-wards different war relief Funds are tabulated below:—

War bonds of Rs. 14,300 were purchased by the State and Postal cash certificates of Rs. 87,589 were purchased by the subjects of the State.

10. The interest on Government Securities carrying interest at 3½ per cent, of the face value of Rs. 10,000 was offered to the Lady Willingdon Memorial Fund started by Her Highness the Rani Saheb of Bhavnagar and the offer has been accepted with thanks. During the continuance of the War the interest accruing on these securities is to be made over for the relief of the Indian disabled soldiers.

11. The State sent up 124 men for enlisting as recruits out of which 97 were approved and enlisted—80 combatants and 17 non-combatants. To carry on the work of recruitment more vigorously and efficiently a District Assistant Recruiting Officer for this State has been recently appointed and it is hoped that recruiting business will flourish now.

12. The Political relations of the State with the Paramount Power and with the adjoining Native States have been as cordial as ever.

13. Rao Babadur K. B. Moghe having resigned the office of the State Karbhari, I took charge there of on the 12th September 1917.

14. Appendix I will show the names of high officials in the State.

CHAPTER II.

ADMINISTRATION OF LAND.

15. The Revenue Survey and Settlement had been introduced through out the State except in 4 Inam villages. The term of the settlement having expired, the work of Revision Survey in the State was started in 1913-14. The work of Kundgol Taluka having been complete the revised rates were declared there during the year under report. The following table will show the increase in area and assessment over the last year.

16. The revision work in the Jamkhandi and Bidri Talukas and in the Thanas of Wathar and Patkhal is nearing completion.

17. The work of Record of Rights in all the Talukas and Thanas is in progress.

18. The area under cultivation, the revenue due from it, its collections etc. are shown in the following table.

19. No coercive measures were taken in collecting revenue.

CHAPTER III PROTECTION

LEGISLATION.

20. The Acts and Regulations in force in the State are given in Appendix II.

MILITARY FORCE.

21. There is no military Force in the State.

22. 326 foot Police and 46 Sowars constitute the total Police Force. The details are given in Appendix IV.

23. Of the foot Police 305 are armed of which 198 are Muzzle loaders and 50 Brecch Loaders; 57 carry swords and battons and the rest are unarmed. All the mounted Police are armed.

24. A fairly satisfactory discipline was maintained in the force as will be seen from only a few punishments that had to be inflicted.

25. The ratio of Police to area is one man per 1.4 square mile and to population one man to 269.1 people.

26. The pay of constables and head constables and sowars was increased during the year.

27. The village Police is made up of the Police Patels and Sanadis. These numbered 328.

28. Appendix V to VII will show the working of the Police in dealing with crime. The results of the recoveries of stolen property during the year under report compare a little unfavourably with those of the preceding year.

29. There was a fall in the number of accidental deaths and suicides, which numbered 38 against 50. The number of accidental fires was 24, destroying property worth Rs. 900.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

30. The details of the work of 14 Criminal Courts are given in Appendix VIII. The average duration of trial was 13 days. The work was satisfactory on the whole.

APPELLATE WORK.

31. The work of the appellate Courts is described in Appendix IX. The appellate work was light and it was very satisfactorily done in all the Courts.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

32. Though the total number of suits for disposal has increased, the disposal has been prompt. The details of the original civil work are shown in Appendix X.

33. Results of applications for execution of decrees are fully described in Appendix XI.

34. Appendix XII shows the work turned out by the Civil Appellate Courts. Of the appeals filed nearly 77 p. c. were disposed of, which is satisfactory.

35. On the 24th December 1917 a Judicial Conference of the Judges and Pleaders was held at Jamkhandi on the lines on which similar Conferences are held in British India. The Conference was presided over by the Chief.

WARDS' ESTATES.

36. At the beginning of the year under review there were only 13 estates under the superintendence of the State. During the year under review four more were added to the number. Details of all these are given in Appendix A. Of the 17 estates 12 belong to minors and the rest belong to persons who were found incapable of managing their estates. These estates were so long managed by the Mamlatdars and the Wahiwatdars in their respective Talukas and Thanas. But the number there of having increased and the work in connection there-with having assumed larger dimensions a special Manager for all these estates has recently been appointed. The health and the financial position of the wards are satisfactory.

MAMLATDARS' COURTS ACT.

37. During the year under report, the Mamlatdars' Courts including those of the Wahiwatdars disposed of 15 cases out of 16 filed. There was no appeal in any of these cases.

EXTRADITION.

38. 16 persons from British Government and one from Sangli State were obtained for trial by extradition and none was surrendered either to the British Government or to any Native State.

PRISONS.

39. There are one Central Jail and two Sub-Jails and two lock-ups in the State. Appendix XIII shows details of their working. There was a rise in the number of prisoners during the year. The discipline was good. The jail accomodation,

is sufficient. The whole building is well-lighted, well ventilated and well kept up. 3 prisoners were attacked by plague but all of them recovered. The general health of the prisoners was good.

40. The remission system is working well. 27 of the prisoners got the benefit of the system during the year.

41. The number of civil prisoners was 7 and that of lunatics two. The central Jail has been under the superintendence of the Chief Medical Officer of the State.

REGISTRATION.

42. The details of the work done by the Registration Department are given in Appendices XIV and XV. There is a decrease in the number of documents presented for registration. The reason for this decrease may be ascribed to the prosperity of the Ryots on account of the abnormally high prices of cotton and other agricultural products.

MUNICIPAL ADMINISTRATION.

43. Appendix XVI shows the financial condition of the six Municipalities in the state. The principal sources of income of all the Municipalities is house-tax and octroi. The principal items of expenditure are street lighting, road repairs etc.

44. Till now the Jamkhandi Municipality alone was electing 7 out of 21 members, the president being the State Karbhari. But recently the privilege of electing 11 out of 21 members and non-official president was conferred on it. Till recently the other Municipalities in the State did not enjoy the privilege of electing any members but they have now been granted the right of electing one-half of their councillors.

CHAPTER IV.

PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

RAINFALL AND CROPS.

45. Appendix XVII gives figures showing the rainfall in all the Talukas of the State. Although the rainfall was less than that of the preceding year, still it being timely and uniformly distributed, was found sufficient for the crops on the whole. The out-turn of crops being cotton 8 annas, gram and wheat 10 annas each and Jowari 6 annas. The season was satisfactory on the whole as cotton and other agricultural products fetched abnormally high prices.

PRICES AND WAGES.

46. Appendix XVIII compares the prices of food grains in the year under report with those prevailing in the preceding year. The prices of cereals have gone up as elsewhere. The wages of skilled and unskilled labourers have been continuously rising. The former varied between 12 annas to one rupee and the latter was 8 annas. It will be seen that the rates have gone up very high but even at this high rates sufficient supply of labour is not available.

AGRICULTURE.

47. Agriculture being the main stay of the people here, efforts are being made to introduce improved methods of agriculture and to induce people to take to them. For this purpose the State has maintained an Agricultural Farm where several experiments were tried to demonstrate the use of improved implements and methods of agriculture and the uses of various sorts of manures. The total cost of the Department amounted to Rs. 2,308 against Rs. 2,628. The income of the Farm was Rs. 535 against Rs. 151.

FORESTS.

48. The area of the State forests has been increased by A. 146 G. 16 during this year. The total area is 27,344 acres and 38 Gunthas of which 1510 acres and 29 Gunthas form the Reserved Forests. The forests of this place supply fuel and serve as pasture lands. They contain no timber. An experienced Forest Officer is in charge of the Department.

49. The number of offences against forest rules during the year under report was 8, in 6 cases the accused were convicted.

50. The income and the expenditure of the Forest Department amounted to Rs. 7,658 and Rs. 2,308 respectively.

EXCISE REVENUE.

51. Appendix XXI shows the details of excise shops and revenue. The country spirit and Tolly farm has been leased to British Government for a period of ten years ending 31st March, 1924 for an annual compensation of Rs. 43,600. The last lease of Hemp Drugs that terminated on 1st April 1916, has been renewed and farmed to the British Government for 5 years ending 31st March 1921, subject to revision after the 3rd and 5th year, 10% compensation of Rs. 10,821.

TRADE AND MANUFACTURE.

52. There is no important centre of trade in the state. Rice, sugar, salt, colours, spices, coconut, kerosine, timber, stationery, cotton yarn, cloth, and metals required for home consumption are the principal heads of imports, while food grains, cotton, oil-seeds and oil cakes are the chief articles of export. No special arrangements have been made for keeping the statistics of imports and exports. However, the figures taken from the Municipal records show that imports and exports amounted to Rs. 41,70,693 and Rs. 33,47,715 respectively.

53. Dyeing yarn and silk and weaving are carried on, on a considerable scale at Banhatti and the adjoining villages of this State. Coarse cotton goods and Kambalis are also made in some villages of this State.

54. The number of Hand-loom at work was 3,595. They are found in almost all villages. The work turned out on these looms though rough is strong and cheap. The cotton trade of Jamkhandi has increased to a great extent. The State Press and gins opened by the State for demonstration have induced other people to open 5 ginning factories. In all at Jamkhandi 72 gins worked.

and 11,900 khandis of cotton were ginned out during the year under report. 6,500 bales have been pressed out by the State Press. The daily average number of workers in the factories was 290. The income and expenditure of the State gins and Press amounted to Rs. 80,826 and Rs. 59,155 respectively leaving a net profit of Rs. 21,671.

55. At Kundgol a new State Cotton Press was opened during the year under review at a cost of Rs. 1,08,000 and was worked for some time. Next year it can be worked through out the season and the Kundgol Taluka people will enjoy its advantages.

56. There are 8 ginning private factories, the daily outturn of which is 80 khandis of cotton. The Mechanical Engineer inspects all these factories.

57. The number of crude country oil presses was 86, the principal among oil-seeds being Kardi.

FAIRS AND SHOWS.

58. The annual cattle fair at Jamkhandi was held in the month of April. The fair is getting more and more popular. The number of cattle brought for exhibition and sale was 6,418. Prizes for 34 well bred animals, of the aggregate value of Rs. 217, were awarded by the Chief. Small fairs at Kadpatti, Kundgol and Kalhalli were also held as usual.

POST OFFICES AND MINTS.

59. There are in all 8 Post offices in the State of which one is a combined Post and Telegraph office at Jamkhandi.

60. There is no Mint in the State.

PUBLIC WORKS.

61. (1) Completion of school houses at Shiddapur and Shagunshi. (2) Erection of State Press at Kundgol. (3) Completion of Bhuteshver temple at Kundgol. (4) Completion of Shiddapur water works for Jamkhandi town and (5) the completion of Savalgi water works for Savalgi are the important works undertaken during the year. Appendix XIX will show the details of expenditure on original works and repairs.

62. Owing to want of skilled and unskilled labour several other works under contemplation had to be post-poned.

CHAPTER V.

REVENUE AND FINANCE.

63. Appendix XXII will show the general condition of the State finances as compared with the previous year.

64. The amount advanced during the year from the State Bank was Rs. 1,01,968. Rs. 83,565 were advanced on the security of gold and the remainder Rs. 18,403 on that of Watan or Inam lands. The amount of interest received during the year was Rs. 20,637. The average rate of interest was 5 p. c. per annum.

CHAPTER VI.

MEDICAL RELIEF & VITAL STATISTICS.

MEDICAL RELIEF.

65. Appendix XXIII describes fully the work done by the Hospital Jamkhandi and by the other Dispensaries in the State and the total expenditure incurred thereon. It may be noted that they are all doing their work well. The total expenditure of this Department amounted to Rs. 19,799-14-10. In these institutions medicine is given gratis.

VITAL STATISTICS.

number of births and deaths and their rate per thousand of population in Appendix XXIV. The increase in death rate is due to the plague in 26 villages of the State. It carried off 1420 souls out of whom 1000 were cured. The efficacious preventive remedies of inoculation and evacuation were resorted to. 7,374 persons were inoculated out of whom only 47 were attacked and only 10 died. It is very satisfactory to note that inoculation is getting more and more popular in the State.

67. Cholera broke out in 7 villages of the State during the year. In all persons were attacked of whom 82 died.

68. No epidemic of small pox prevailed in the State during the year.

VACCINATION.

69. The work done by the Vaccination Department is as shown below:—

70. The number of unsuccessful vaccination is only one. The results are satisfactory. Revaccination was done in 501 cases. The work is done by four

vaccinators and is supervised by one Inspector. The Chief Medical officer is the Superintendent of Vaccination. The Deputy Sanitary Commissioner S. D. R. D. checks the work.

CHAPTER VII.

EDUCATION.

71. Appendix XXV gives the classification of different schools with particulars regarding attendance &c. The number of boys on rolls and the average attendance in all schools during the year under report. This was due to the prevalence of for some months at Jamkhandi and some of the villages of the State. education is free. The female education was well attended to. Stipendments are given to the boys of backward classes with a view to making education popular among them. Cooked food is also given gratis to the pupils of the depressed class. The total number of pupils present for the examinations was 2,376 of which 1671 passed. This gives a percentage of 70.3. 37 students were sent up for the Vernacular Final Examination. 11 passed. As the teaching staff includes only a small number of teachers the State has been sending every year students to the Pooné and Dharwar Training Colleges at its expense for being trained there. During the year under report the pay of the School Masters in the last two grades was increased.

72. The attendance in the A. V. School at Kundgol increased and the progress of the school was satisfactory.

73. There is a slight decrease in the daily average attendance at P. B. High School, Jamkhandi. This is due to the prevalence of plague in an epidemic form at Jamkhandi for about four months. The number of poor and deserving boys from this High School fed by the State was 37. The P. B. High School sent up 23 students for the Matriculation Examination of whom 15 passed. The inconvenience caused by the abolition of the Drawing Examination Centre here has been removed by Jamkhandi being again recognized as a centre for the elementary and intermediate Art Grade Examinations. The High School presented 25 students for the former and one for the latter of whom 17 and one passed respectively.

74. These results would appear to be quite satisfactory.

75. The Educational Inspector S. D. visited all the Schools at Jamkhandi and expressed his satisfaction with all that he saw there.

76. The State has also kept scholarships for deserving Jamkhandi State pupils studying in the Arts Colleges, Veterinary College etc. There are altogether 14 scholars and the total cost in this connection is Rs. 3,000 per year.

77. In order to improve the Educational system of the State still more the Chief has appointed a Committee consisting of graduates and non-graduates, officials and non officials for inquiring into and reporting on educational questions.

I have the honour, under instructions from the Chief, to submit the Annual Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State for the Fasli year 1328 ending 5th June 1919.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

2. The State is divided into three Talukas, Jamkhandi, Bidri and Kundgol and three Thanas, Wathar, Patkhal and Dhavalpuri. It has an area of 524 square miles and its population according to the census of 1911 is 100,304. The total gross revenue of the State based on the average of the past five years amounts to Rs. 700,596. The State pays to Government an annual tribute of Rs. 20,515.

3. The Chief Captain Meherban Shrimant Sir Parashuram Rao alias Bhansaheb Patwardhan, K. C. I. E. is a Konkanastha Brahmin. He is 36 years of age. He is a Treaty Chief and First Class Deccan Sardar. He has only one son by name Shrimant Shankarrao Appasaheb who is now in his 13th year and a daughter by name Shrimati Keral Tarabai Saheb alias Shakuntala Taisaheb who is in her 6th year. Both of them have been making satisfactory progress under the supervision and care of an experienced graduate. The former is learning the 4th English standard and the latter the 1st Marathi standard. They are all in excellent health.

4. The Chief was appointed His Excellency's Honourary Aide-de-Camp during the year.

5. The Chief made an official tour of inspection in all Taluk and Thanas and saw for himself the condition of the crops and the people.

6. During the year under report Chiefs of Sangli, Jath and Mudhol attended the anniversary of "the Shrimant Ramchandra Rao Appasaheb Club" on the New year day.

7. Colonel Wodehouse, Resident Kolhapur and Political Agent, S. M. C. States and you paid official visits to Jamkhandi, and visited the schools, the Hospital and the Jail there.

8. The great war that had been raging for the last five years ended with complete success to the British Arms and the Treaty was signed by the Germans on the 28th June last. The news was received with great joy and enthusiasm by the Chief and the subjects of this State. Rejoicings were expressed in various ways.

9. The State has done its best to render its humble aid to the Paramount Power in carrying the war to its successful end.

10. The contributions so far made towards it by the Chief and his subjects are enumerated below:-

11. War Bonds of Rs. 14,300 were purchased by the State and Postal Cash Certificates of Rs. 8,589 were purchased by the subjects of the State.

12. Rupees 26,648-12-0 have been invested in the Second Indian War Loan.

13. The interest on Government securities carrying interest at $3\frac{1}{2}$ p. c. of the face value of Rs. 10,000 was offered to the Lady Willingdon Memorial Fund started by Her Highness the Ranisabeb of Bhavanagar and the offer was accepted with thanks. During the continuance of the War the interest accruing on these securities was made over for the relief of the Indian disabled Soldiers.

14. With regard to the supply of man-power the State sent up 202 men for being enlisted as recruits of whom-163 were approved and enlisted- 129 combatants and 34 non-combatants.

15. The Political relations of the State with the Paramount Power and with the adjoining Native States have been as cordial as ever.

16. Appendix I shows the names of High Officials in the State.

CHAPTER II.

ADMINISTRATION OF LAND.

17. The term of the old Settlement having expired, the work of Revision Survey was started in all the villages, except the four Inam villages, of the State in 1913-14. The work in the Kundgol Taluka was quite complete last year and that in the remaining Talukas and Thanas was in progress. The measurement and classification work in Jamkhandi Taluka and Patkhal Thana is all complete this year. What remains to be completed is the measurement in two villages of Bidri Taluka and the classification work for Bidri Taluka and Wathar Thana. That too is nearing completion.

18. The work of Record of Rights in all Talukas and Thanas is in progress.

19. The following table will show the area under cultivation, and taken up for the first time for, and thrown out of, cultivation, by Talukas, in the State during the year.

21. Owing to insufficient rainfall crops in some villages were much below the average. Suspensions have been granted to the ryots of those places where crops have utterly or almost failed.

22. Rs. 6665 were advanced in the form of Takvi to the ryots of Bidri Taluka and Patkhal Thana for the improvement of their lands.

CHAPTER III.

PROTECTION.

Legislation.

23. The Acts and Regulations in force and those introduced during the year are given in Appendix II.

Military Force.

24. There is no regular Military Force in the State.

Police.

25. Appendix IV shows the strength, discipline and education of the Police in the State.

26. Of the foot-police 305 are armed, of whom 198 carry Muzzle loaders, 50 Breach-loaders and 57 swords and the rest are unarmed. All the mounted police are armed. A satisfactory discipline was maintained in the force.

27. The total strength of the Police gives an average of one constable for every 280 souls and for every 1.4 square mile.

28. The village Police is made up of the Police Patils and Sanadis. These numbered 328. They assist the District Police in the detection and prevention of crime.

29. Appendices V to VII show the result of the working of the Police which, when summarised, would appear to be fair.

30. The question of increase in the pay of the police has recently been considered and they will now get promotion according to a time-scale system. The question will again be considered, if necessary.

31. The number of accidental deaths and suicides was 30 against 38 of the last year and that of accidental fires was 40 against 24. The property destroyed by incendiarism during the year was Rs. 10,224.

Criminal Justice.

32. Appendix VIII shows the work done by all the Criminal Courts in the state during the year.

Appellate Work.

33. Particulars of the work of the Criminal Appellate in the State during the year under review are given in Appen

Civil Justice.

34. Appendix X shows the details of the origi

and Appendix XI fully describes the results of applications for execution of decrees. It may be remarked here that the work of Civil Courts continued to be satisfactory.

35. Appendix XII shows the disposal of the Appeals in the year under report compared with that of the previous year.

36. On the 26th December 1918 a Judicial Conference of the Judges and pleaders presided over by the Chief was held at Jamkhandi just as in the last year.

Wards' Estates.

37. The health, the financial position and other details of the Wards are described in Appendix A.

Mamlatdars' Courts Act.

38. During the year under report Mamlatdars' Courts including those of the Wahivatdars had on their file 23 cases all of which were disposed of. There was a revision application in one case only.

Extradition.

39. Only two persons were extradited to this State by British Government and none was surrendered by this State either to British Government or to any Native State during the year.

Prisons.

40. Appendix XIII shows the number of Jails and lock-ups in the State and the number of prisoners confined there-in and the cost incurred there-on.

41. The general health of the prisoners was good.

42. Remissions were awarded to prisoners, in conformity with the mark-system, 19 of them having got the benefit there-of this year.

43. The number of Civil prisoners was 3 and that of lunatics was 1 during the year.

44. The total cost per head per day was 0-4-6. The rations and clothing were given according to the scale obtaining in the Yeroda Central Jail.

Registration.

Appendix XIV shows the work done by the Registration at and Appendix XV shows the receipts from, and expenditure on account of, it.

Municipal Administration.

46. Appendix XVI shows the number of Municipalities in the State and their financial conditions. The principal sources of income of all of them is house-tax and octroi.

CHAPTER IV.

PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

Rainfall and crops.

47. Appendix XVII shows the distribution of rainfall by Talukas. The rainfall being much less than that of the last year and that too being not timely all crops suffered much. The annual valuation of the crops was—Jowari 5 annas, Cotton 7 annas, Wheat 4 annas and Gram 2 annas. The season was unsatisfactory on the whole.

Prices and Wages.

48. Prices of food grains as will be seen in Appendix XVIII were abnormally high during the year. In order to check the prices going up high, control over imported staple-food grains was exercised and exports of Jowari and fodder were restricted.

Wages.

49. The wages for skilled labourers were Re. 1 and those for un-skilled labourers were 8 to 10 annas per day.

Forests.

50. The total area of the State Forests remained the same as in last year. *i. e.* 27,344 Acres and 33 Gunthas including 1,510 Acres 29 Gunthas under Reserved Forest. The Forest growth here is poor. There is no timber in the forests here. They supply only fuel and serve as pasture lands.

51. The number of offences against forest-rules was only 3.

Excise Revenue.

52. Appendix XXI shows the number of excise shops in the State and the Revenue realised from them.

Trade and Manufacture.

53. Jamkhandi is not an important trade centre. Rice, Sugar, Kerosine, Salt, Colours, Spices, Coconut, Timber, Stationery, Cotton yarn, Cloth, Metals and other articles required for home consumption are the principal imports, while food-grains, Cotton, Cotton-seeds Kardi, Kardi-oil and Oil-jakes are the chief articles of export. There are no special arrangements made for keeping the statistics of imports and exports.

54. Dyeing yarn and silk and weaving are carried on on a considerable scale at Bahatti. Coarse cotton goods such as Dhotis and Saris are manufactured there and sent out. The number of hand-looms manufacturing these goods is 3,459. Besides these there are 138 hand-looms on which rough blankets or Kamblis are woven in some villages of this State.

55. There is one State ginning factory at Jamkhandi and two State presses, one at Jamkhandi and the other at Kundgol.

56. Jamkhandi ginning Factory and press had very little work this year, only 87 Khandis of cotton having been ginned out and 1,376 bales pressed out.

57. The State press at Kundgol could not be worked at all this year owing to the scarcity of water there.

58. Besides the State Ginning Factories there are 6 ginning factories at Jamkhandi and 8 in Kundgol Taluka, belonging to the local merchants. All of them had practically no work on account of the scarcity of cotton at Jamkhandi and of water at Kundgol.

59. Kardi oil is exported to a certain extent from Jamkhandi. This oil is pressed out in crude country oilpresses. The number of these presses was 82 this year.

Fairs and Shows.

60. Four fairs are annually held in this State.

- (1) The Cattle fair at Jamkhandi in the month of Chaitra (April).
- (2) Bramhadeva fair at Kundgol in the month of Jestha (June).
- (3) Basvanna fair at Kadpatti in the month of Shravan (August).
- (4) Venkoba fair at Kalhalli in the month of Ashvin (October).

61. In the Cattle fair at Jamkhandi 6,311 head of cattle were brought for Exhibition. In all 61 prizes were awarded 9 in gold, 15 in silver and 37 in cash.

Post Offices and Mints.

Post and Telegraph Offices.

62. There were in all 8 Post-offices in the State last year. A new combined Post and Telegraph office was opened at Ramtirth during the year which raises the number of Post-offices in the State to 9.

63. There is no Mint in the State.

I have the honour, under instructions from the Chief, to submit the Annual Administration Report of the Jamkhandi State for the Fasli year 1331, ending 5th June 1922.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL AND POLITICAL.

The State comprises an area of 524 sq. miles. It is administered for administrative purposes into two Talukas, Jamkhandi and Jamkhandi and three Thanas, Wathar, Patkhal, and Dhavalpuri. The population of the State according to the Census of 1921 is 1,00,000. The gross revenue of the State exclusive of Inams for the average of past five years is estimated at Rs. 7,32,104. The State pays a tribute of Rs. 20,516 annually to British

Chief, Captain Meherban Shrimant Sir Parashuramrao Patwardhan, K. C. I. E., is a Konkanastha Brahmin. He is a Class Sardar of the Deccan and a Treaty Chief. He has a son named Shrimant Shankarrao Appasaheb, who is 16th year, and a daughter named Shrimati alias Shakuntala Taisaheb, who is in her 10th year. Appasaheb completed his English VI Standard and Shrimati Shakuntala Taisaheb completed her English VI Standard in the Saradars High School, Belgaum. She has made good progress there under the supervision of a Shrimati Shakuntala Taisaheb is learning the English under the supervision of an under graduate and is enjoying good health.

He has continued to be his Excellency's Honorary Sardar for the year.

5. The Chief had the honour of being present at Bombay and Poona for the reception of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales. He had also the honour of being a guest of His Excellency the Governor of Bombay at Poona.

6. During the month of February 1922 the Chief had a severe attack of Pneumonia and consequently he was much reduced in health. He, therefore, visited OOTACAMAND during the hot season to recoup his health. During his stay there he had the honour of paying a visit to his Excellency Lord Willingdon, the Governor of Madras.

7. E. G. L. MacGregor Esquire, B. A., I. C. S., Collector of Belgaum and Mrs. MacGregor visited Jamkhandi as guests during the year under review.

8. The Chief made an official tour in all the Talukas and Thanas of the State in order to see for himself the condition of the crops and of the people. In his usual solicitude for the welfare of his subjects the Chief gave audience wherever he went, to local pates, Inamdars and others so as to enable them to explain freely their needs and complaints to him.

9. Colonel H. Harrison, Assistant Political Agent, S. M. C. States and you paid official visits to Jamkhandi and visited the Schools, the Hospital and the Jail.

10. Appendix I shows the names of high Officials in this State.

CHAPTER II.

ADMINISTRATION OF LAND.

11. All the villages in the State, except two Inam villages viz. Benkanhalli and Kop in Kundgol Taluka, are surveyed and settled.

26. Appendix VIII shows the work of the Criminal Courts in the State. It will be seen that the work was satisfactory.

Appellate Work.

27. Particulars of the work of the Criminal Courts in the State during the year under review are given in Appendix IX. The small number of appeals filed and the very few reversals go to show that the work of the Original Courts is satisfactory.

Civil Justice.

Original.

28. Appendix XI fully describes the results of the work for execution of Decrees and Appendix X gives the results of the Original Civil work in the State. It may be seen that the work of all the Civil Courts continued to be satisfactory.

Appellate Courts.

29. The results of the work done by the Civil Courts in the State, are given in Appendix XII. The work will be seen to be more prompt although the number of cases was much increased.

Extradition.

30. Six accused persons were made over for extradition by the British authorities during the year. One of these was... and 2...

Wards' Estates.

31. There were 19 estates under State management at the end of the last year. The estate of the ward No. 18 in last year's report was released from management and superintendence of three new estates was assumed during the year. Appendix A will show the details of all the estates. The health, education and general interest of the wards were very keenly watched by the Manager of the Wards' Estates.

Mamlatdars' Courts.

32. The number of Suits filed in all the Courts of Mamlatdars and Vahivatdars was 21 during the year under review and all of them were disposed of before the close of the year. There were no revision applications.

Prisons.

33. Appendix XIII gives the number of Jails and Lock-ups in the State. There was no change in the number of Jails and Lock-ups. The Central Jail is located at Jamkhandi and the Medical Officer at Jamkhandi is its superintendent. Accommodation is sufficient there. It was periodically visited by the visitors appointed for the purpose. There were 9 Jail offences. The discipline of the prisoners was properly maintained and so was their health. There were two deaths in Jamkhandi Central Jail—one from Pneumonia and the other by drowning.

34. Remission of sentence was given to 37 prisoners during the year according to the system laid down in the Jail Manual.

35. The number of Civil prisoners was 5 and that of lunatics 1.

36. During the year the total expenditure of the Jail and Lock-ups was Rs. 7,862 against Rs. 7,225 in the preceding year, the increase being chiefly due to the increased number of prisoners.

37. The dietary costs per head per day in Jamkhandi Central Jail were 4 Annas.

38. The rations and clothing were given according to the scale obtaining in the Yeravada Central Jail.

Registration.

39. Appendix XIV shows the work done by the Registration Department and Appendix XV shows the receipts from, and expenditure on the Department. The total number of Documents presented for registration was 3,002 as against 2,940. The gross receipts and expenditure amounted to Rs. 8,634 and 2,306 against 7,934 and 1,833 of the last year.

Municipal Administration.

40. Appendix XVI shows the number of Municipalities in the State and their financial condition. House-tax and Octroi are the principal heads of income. General conservancy, lighting, road-repairs, water supply and education are the chief items of expenditure.

Sanitation was well looked after by all the Municipalities. All the 6 Municipalities have the right of election. The State Karbhari is the President and the Mamlatdar is the Vice President of all the Municipalities except Jamkhandi which has been given the right of electing its own President and Vice President.

CHAPTER IV.

PRODUCTION AND DISTRIBUTION.

Rain-fall and Crops.

41. Appendix XVII shows the distribution of Rain-fall by Talukas. At first the Kharif Crops seemed to be at their best but the long draught in the months of August and September made them wither away. Sowings of cotton were delayed for want of rain and the area under cotton cultivation, therefore, diminished to a great extent. The later rains in October and November in all the Talukas, however, made the Rabi Crops a success. The out-turn of Jowari, Cotton, Wheat and Gram was estimated at Annas 12,6,6 and 4 respectively. Fodder supply was sufficient everywhere, and so was the water supply. The condition of the agricultural stock was on the whole fair and its details are given in Appendix XX.

Prices and Wages.

42. Prices of food-grains, as will be seen from Appendix XVIII have fallen to a great extent owing to good Rabi harvest.

Wages.

43. Rates of wages have shown a downward tendency. The wages for skilled labourers were 12 to 14 Annas and those for unskilled were 6 to 8 Annas per diem.

Forests.

44. The total area of the State Forests was 27,504 Acres 6 Gunthas last year. Out of which, land measuring 2 Acres and 19 Gunthas, was disforested and given out for cultivation. The remaining area, therefore, left under Forest for the year under review was 27,501 Acres 27 Gunthas, including 1,510 Acres 29 Gunthas under Reserved Forest. The Forest growth here is poor. No timber is available. The Forests supply only fuel and serve at places as pasture land.

45. There were only 11 offences against Forest Rules during the year under Report.

Excise Revenue.

46. Appendix XXI shows the number of Excise shops and the revenue realised therefrom.

Trade and Manufacture.

47. Jamkhandi is not an important trade centre and in the absence of a Railway Line connecting the State with the outside World, there

no prospects of trade increasing in the near future. Rice, Sugar, Kerosine oil, Salt, Colours, Spices, Coconut, Timber, Stationery, Yarn, Cloth, Metals and other articles required for consumption are the principal imports. While food-grains, Cotton, Cotton-seed, manufactured Cotton, Sarees, Karadi, Karadi-oil, and Oil-cakes are the chief articles of export. There are no special arrangements made for keeping the statistics of the imports and exports.

48. Dyeing of yarn and of silk and weaving of sarees and coarse cloth is carried on, on a considerable scale at Banhatti, Hosur, Ramapur and Asangi. The number of Hand Looms working is about 3,747 of which 3,603 are used for manufacture of cotton goods and 144 for blankets (Kamblis) of wool.

49. There is one ginning factory and one cotton press at Jamkhandi owned by the State. The two factories had very little work this year for want of cotton. Only about 1,285 bales were pressed.

50. Besides the above mentioned state factories there are 6 private Ginning factories at Jamkhandi and 8 in Kundgol Taluka. All of them had no sufficient work for want of cotton.

51. Karadi-oil is exported in large quantities from Jamkhandi. This oil is pressed out from karadi in crude country oil presses. The number of such presses is 105.

✓ Fairs and Shows.

52. The following 4 Fairs were held this year, in the State as usual:—

- (1) The Cattle Fair at Jamkhandi was held in the month of April. The number of Cattle brought for Exhibition and sale was 6,218. The increase over last year was naturally due to good season. In all 36 prizes for well-bred animals were awarded by the Chief in a Darbar specially held for the purpose.
- (2) Bramhadeva Fair at Kundgol was held in the month of June.
- (3) Basavana Fair at Kadpatti was held in the month of August.
- (4) Venkoba Fair at Kalhali was held in the month of October.

Post Offices and Mints.

Post Offices.

53. There are in all 9 Post offices in the State, of which 2 are combined Post and Telegraph Offices—one at Jamkhandi and the other at Ramtirth. Saunshi and Kundgol being Railway Stations have also Telegraph Offices.

54. A Telephone Service is maintained at Jamkhandi. It is very useful in facilitating communications between several offices and institutions connected with the central Office.

55. There is no mint in the State.

Public works.

56. Appendix XIX gives the details of expenditure on Public Works from the Local and State Funds.

57. All Schools, Dharmashalas, Temples, Chawdis, Roads &c. were repaired as usual.

CHAPTER V.

REVENUE AND FINANCE.

58. Appendix XXII shows full details of income and expenditure of the State as compared with the previous year.

59. The gross income of the State in the year under review amounted to Rs. 8,83,801 as against Rs. 7,50,309 of the last year. The increase was due to collections of out-standings suspended last year.

60. There is no special feature on the debit side worth noting, the increases and decreases having been explained in the Appendix.

61. State Bank is working satisfactorily, The Bank advanced this year Rs, 76,655 on the security of gold and Rs. 79,202 on that of land. The average rate of interest being 6 p. c.

CHAPTER VI.

MEDICAL RELIEF AND VITAL STATISTICS.

Medical Relief.

62. The State maintains 4 Medical Institutions. Appendix XXIII explains the work done and the total expenditure incurred in connection therewith. The attendance of patients in all these charitable Institutions decreased from 27,658 to 24,951. The working of the Hospital and Dispensaries was satisfactory.

63. At these Institutions 49 major and 1399 minor operations were performed during the year.

64. All the Medical Officers are qualified men; two being University Graduates and 4 Sub-assistant Surgeons. One qualified Lady Dr. is also employed in the Prince of Wales Hospital Jamkhandi. With her staff of Nurses she is very useful to the female patients.

65. The Jamkhandi Municipality has newly opened an Ayurvedic Dispensary.

Vital Statistics.

66. Vital Statistics are given in Appendix XXIV, from which it will be seen that the death rate has this year fallen more than 30 p. c. Last year the number of deaths had risen owing to

the prevalence of Plague in epidemic form in Kundgol Taluka. But fortunately there being no epidemic of that sort during the year, death rate has come to its normal level.

67. Cholera broke out in a very mild form in only one village of the Patkhal Thana and carried off 6 souls only out of 23 attacked.

68. There was not a single death from small-pox in the State during the year under Report.

69. There were only a few stray cases of Influenza in the State during the year.

Sanitation.

70. There is no special establishment for doing Sanitation work in the State. The Municipalities look after the work in Municipal areas. In Villages it is looked after by the village and Taluka Officers. For the purpose of improving sanitary condition of some of the villages in the State, Sanitary Committees have been organised under the Village Sanitation Act.

Vaccination.

71. The following Statement shows the work done by the Vaccination Department, as compared with that of the previous year:—

72. Revaccination was done in 69 cases. There were 19 cases of unsuccessful Revaccination.

73. The State Vaccination Inspector inspected all the Talukas and Thanas.

CHAPTER VII.

PUBLIC INSTRUCTION.

74. Appendix XXV gives the details about the number of Schools in the State, the attendance of pupils therein and expenditure in connection with these Institutions.

75. Steps are gradually being taken to increase the number of Kanerese Schools as the language of masses is Kanerese. The number of boys on rolls has again increased from 4229 to 4326. The daily average attendance will also be seen to be more satisfactory. About 3377 boys presented themselves for various examinations and about 2651 came out successful. The percentage of passes is 78.5 as against 72 last year. This increase is primarily due to the adoption of one's own mother tongue as via media of instruction. The good results are also due to the improvement in the method of teaching and the conduct of the staff as a whole. Three out of six passed in the Vernacular-Final Examination this year.

76. Primary Education has been free in the State. The percentage of pupils receiving instruction to entire population was 5.9.

77. All the Schools were regularly inspected by the Deputy Vidyadhikari and the Inspector of Schools. There is again an increase in the number of Trained teachers.

78. Female education too is receiving due attention. There are 4 separate Girls' Schools in the State. In other cases girls are taught along with boys. The number of girls has decreased by 35. It is 640 as against 675 of the last year. Notwithstanding the fall in the total number of girls, the daily average attendance has greatly improved during the year. It is 295 as against 232 of the last year. The number of ladies in the Home Classes at Jamkhandi, a private institute aided by the State, has decreased to an appreciable extent. It is 25 as against 48 of the last year. The absence of the Head Mistress on leave, it appears, is the cause of the decrease.

79. The education of backward Classes is duly attended to. All practical encouragement is being given to the pupils of the said Classes, in free boarding, Scholarships, free supply of books and slates &c., but no marked progress is observed. The teachers of the village Schools have been asked to encourage the depressed Classes to send their boys to schools.

80. The Jamkhandi Municipality has maintained one night School at its own cost at Jamkhandi for the use of labouring Classes.

81. The F. G. A. V. School at Kundgol is doing its useful work. The annual results are satisfactory. The two S. G. A. V. Schools, one at Savalgi and the other at Banhatti, are also doing their useful work.

82. The number of boys on rolls and the daily average attendance in the P. B High School Jamkhandi have risen from

409 and 344 to 414 and 357 respectively. 23 students were sent up for S. L. C. Examination of whom 16 passed. 20 students appeared for the Drawing Elementary Grade Examination and 10 for the Drawing Intermediate Examination of whom 16 and 6 respectively came out successful. The working of the High School was on the whole satisfactory.

83. 15 Scholarships have been awarded to deserving students to prosecute their studies in various Institutions as against 14 of the last year. Of these 4 are for the B. A., 2 for the M. B. B. S., 1 for the L. C. P. S., 1 for a widowed girl in the women's High School Poona, 4 for the training College For Men, 2 for Vedic Course and 1 for a widowed girl to learn Nursing and Midwifery. The yearly expenditure came to Rs. 4,344.

CHAPTER VIII.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Printing Presses.

84. The State maintains one Press for printing forms and Circulars &c. In Jamkhandi Town there is a private printing Press named "Hanuman Printing Press" owned by Mr. Mahadeo Anant Ponshe and is used for printing Job-work. No Newspaper or periodical is published in the State.

Libraries.

85. The number of Libraries and Reading Rooms remained the same as in the last year, i. e. 11. Seven of them are registered. The use of proscribed books is strictly prohibited in them.

Destruction of Wild Animals.

86. Two leopards were caught alive and one was shot.

87. There were seven deaths from snake-bite during the year under Report.

Railways.

88. The construction of a Railway Line connecting Raibag with Bagalkot was sanctioned; but the Railway Board has recently informed the Darbar that the work could not be taken up in the near future for want of programme funds. The Darbar is very keen on the construction of the Line or at least the Western portion of it. It is hoped the funds would soon be available and the line constructed.

State Karbhari's Tour.

89. I made an annual tour of inspection in all Talukas and Thanas. Taluka and Village accounts were carefully examined. Schools and Dispensaries were visited and wants and complaints of Rayots were inquired into and were promptly dealt with as far as possible.

The condition of the People.

90. Though the Kharif Crops failed for want of early rains the later rains proved more favourable and the Rabi Crops were successfully raised. Owing to high prices of Jowari and other farm produce the Rayots could pull on satisfactorily. The rates of wages were also high and the condition of skilled and unskilled labourers was satisfactory. The weavers and dyers thrived well as they could get sufficient quantities of dyes required and as there was a good market for their productions. There was sufficient fodder and water-supply that kept the Agricultural Cattle in a satisfactory condition. There was no epidemic of any kind in almost all the villages. In short the people of all Classes were in a more satisfactory condition than that of the last year.

Concluding Remarks.

91. Such is briefly the record of the events connected with the Administration of the State and the condition of the people during the year. The needs and comforts of the people were attended to, justice was well administered and protection of life and property was ensured as far as possible. People have been loyal throughout.

92. The Chief has been taking a personal and lively interest in the administration of the State and is doing his best to supervise carefully every branch of it.

93. In conclusion I am directed by the Chief to express his sincere and cordial thanks to yourself and to the Assistant Political Agent, S. M. Country States, for the sound advice given to him from time to time in important matters of Administration of the State.
