The Government of British Guiana invite applications for ised as !follows: A maternity and child wel-\$5,000,000 three and one half per cent Debentures to be issued at par on the 1st day of January 1946 under the provisions of the General Local Loan Ordinance No. 25 of 1941.

The loan is required to defray in part the cost of War Services and for such other public Purposes as the Secretary of State and the Legislative Council may from time to time approve, as well as for the but also to be of some real nursing and aredemption in par of outstanding 4% bonds of the 16th and 18th issue under Loan Ordinance No. 6 of 1916.

Child welfare Trainning Centre In Memory of Mrs. Gandhi

THE Kasturbai Memorial Medical Board at its first meeting, which was attended by Mahatma Gandhi, adopted a scheme, the principal features of which may be summarfare trainning centre should serve villages in an area of five miles radius or a population of 15,000 to 20,000. Those selected for training should as far as possible come from villages. The training given should fit a candidate not only for midwifery work medical assistance to village women and children when not engaged in maternity work The idea was, therefore, to create a new type of village medical worker.

PRISON FOR A EUROPEAN WHO WENT TO INDIA'S FREEDOM

SAD DEATH OF MR, KALLENBACH

THERE must be very few of the older the end of the war in 1919. He the senior partner of the well-known firm goined the band of European sympathisers of Messrs, Kallenbach Kennedy and Ferner in the cause of justice for the Indian comemunity and he went to the extreme length -of suffering the rigours of prison life for our cause. He dedicate not only his wealth but his whole life to the cause of justice. The spirit of service and sacrifice was within him. He needed a man to inspire him and that man was introduced to him by the late Mr. R.K. Khan a well-known figure in Natal who has left £400,000 for hospital purposes for the Indian community without distinction of class or creid. That man was Mahatma Gandhi, Both were attracted to each other like a magnet and wery soon they became one in body and soul. There was nothing that Mr. Kallenbach -could not do for Mahatma Gandhi, There was nothing that Mahatma Gandhi could not get Mr. Kallenbach to do. Those nearest to Mahatma Gandhi gave Mr. Kellenbach the name Hunumana the great disciple of Shri Rama the hero of the Ramayana. As whom we extend our heartfelt sympathy Hanumana was to Shri Rama so was Mr. in the great loss they have substained. May Kallenbach to Mahatma Gandhi. Mahtma his soul rest in peace. Gandhi had had the good fortune of having many European friends and co-workers wherever he went and in South Africa Mr. Kallenbach was among the best of his friends. Indeed he was more than a .friend. He was nearer to him even than the closest members of his family. It is Flot easy for anyone to keep pace with 'Mahatma Gandhi in living up to his ideals and Mr. Kallenbach was about the only one who kept pace with him cheerfully -and with the slightest signs of unwillingness or strain. Mahatma Gandhi was the severest task master to those who were -nearest and dearest to him. And he was severest with Mr. Kallenbach in living up .-to the ideals of Tolstoy and Ruskin which both cherished equally. One who was accustomed to all the comforts of life im--aginable and who spent money like water . to acquired all those comforts was transreformed by Mahatma Gandbi into a simple -man with an expence of two or three shillings a day. In the year 1914 when safter the end of the long drawn Passive «Resistance struggle Mahatma Gandhi left South Africa, Mr. Kallenbach accompanied him to Eogland and intended to go and -settle down with him in India. But it was otherwise destined and Mr. Kallenbach -was taken as war prisoner as they happened to reach England just when the great Great War was declared and Mr. Kallenbach was a German Jew by orgin. We did not see or hear of Mr. Kallenbach till after

as an architect and until the time of his architecte. He was also one of the Trustees of the Phoenix Settlement founded by, Mahatma Gandhi in 1904 and of the Parsee Rustomiee Trust. Immediately after his releasse he resumed his contact with Mahatma Gandhi and made a special trip to India a few years back to spend some time with him. In latter years he was keenly interested in Jewish affairs and was at one time a member of the executive of the South African Zionist Federation. The treatment of the Jews in Germany had shocked bim terrible and it will not be an exaggeration to say that was party responsible for shortening his life.
