I read with deep interest His Excellency's sincere broadcast in the issue of the Daily Chronicle of 25th. June last, on his recent visit to the Corentynewith its excellent sugar estates, very good rice lands and has got an airiness and bealthiness which is quite special;" but was shooked and surprised at the tail end of the broadcast—the Corentyne has its faults: far too much drinking; far too much going to rumshops and cinemas; far too much useless spending of their time and fer too much preadial larceny".

The scandalous and permanent large reservoir of landless and unemployed, retained mainly for the purpose of providing sheap labour to the sugar estates and the supplying quickly of any labouring section who refuses to work, leaving those who make any demands for improvement in any direction to starve.

The withholding of an election to the local legislature for over ten years.

The Maintainance of a constitution known as Grown Colony where the people are being governed from a distance of 4000 miles. The presentation of a Franchies which the Majority of the people would be kept out of the voting list. The preservation of system whereby Guianese are denied posts in the upper branches of the Civil Service.

# Gandhi's Tremendous Influence

Gandhi is in Bombay to preside over a session of the trustees of the Kasturba Gandhi National Memorial Fund. The trip highlights the tremendous hold the Indian leader has on the reople, occasional reports by superficial observers to the contrary notwithstanding. When the Manatma's wife, Kesturba, died in February, 1944, after long imprisonment by the British authorities, many who had loved her for her quiet, selliss work suggested raising a fund of 75 lakus of rupees to be used for social welfare on lines of her life-long interest. Though, the amount was deemed too ambitious in some quarters, an organisation to raise and administer it was set up. Appointed to head the Fund. Gaudhi succeeded in having its objectives limited to welfare work for women and children in the villages.

The dreaded darkness of slavery which threatened to engulf the liberty and aspiration of all free people the world over has disappeared Fears and aucsieties are away with it for all times. Shining once again is "the Sun of freedom unobscured from 'Lights overhead, and humanity "enlivened and alert all over the "British Empire. Indias plight is also reaching an end and soon beneath its glow our motherland will be free.

For all this goodness we swe something, and "it is to realize this fully that today is set

"A day of prayer and thanksgiving as an expression of our gratitude to the Royal" Navy for playing such a part in restoring this freedom and peace and to the Merchant Mavy for supplying us all our essential needs for life.

These are the words with which Priest-incharge Pandit Ramcharran Misir commenced his sermon on Navy sunday at a Central service held in New Ameterdam under the auspices of the Berbice Central Arya Samaj in accordance with instructions received from head quarters of the American Aryan League. ### Trividad Centenary GOVERNORS SPEECH

His Excellency said: 'As I stand here today as your guest in this impressive gathering my mind, prompted by the pageautry and ceremonial of the occasion, inevitably goes back in imagination to the day in the last century when the immigrants from India first arrived. This very site where we are assembled may, we are teld, have been the scene of some of their earliest labours. What I wonder would they say to us, if they could be here today? They came in seasons of depression from different provinces in India, as indentured labour which was required to sustain the agriculture of Trinidad. How simple it sounds, and yet what a human drama is enfolded in these few words,

"The world through which they travelled, one hundred years ago, was a world very different from that which we know now. Industry as we now know it had ecarcely touched the surface of our affairs. The scientific inventions, the engines and motors which in succeeding years were to exchange the face of human existence and to bring great wealth and then great destruction upon us were still unconceived or barely formulated in men's minds. Your ancestors, all our ancestors, of one hundred years ago, lived in a slow-moving, largely agricultural world. And they lived, too, in a world which, compared with ours, was a world of peace.

'If they were brought here today there is much in the surrounding scene which would surprise them—the machinery of the oi:fiélde, the pace of traffic, the motor care on the roads, the loudspeakers which enlarge but do not improve our voices, and the seroplanes overhead. But I doubt whether these phenomena would for long engage their attention which would be focussed first and foremost upon their descendants, upon
