#### WELFARE OF LABOUR

We have been bearing quite a lot recently on the part of Government and Capital that labour is becoming more and more difficult to handle everyday; but we have heard very little about the utter negligence, disregard and contempt with which Government and capital has been treating labour on to the present time.

. We feel that as long as things are allowed to continue as at present, the future of British Guiana will remain completely clouded and its outlook dark. This colony can only progress when and if there is complere harmony between labour, Government ! and capital. But it is impossible for any harmony to come about as long as the inhabitants are continued to be ruled as a crown colony from a distance of four thousto furnish the luxury of men four thousands miles away. It is practically impossible for any government and Capital 4000 miles away to fully appreciate the needs, requirements and natural aspiration of a people who are merely regarded as cattle from whom face to be drawn the wherewithall of susi tenance.

The present war was fought for the liberation of men but it is becoming apparent daily to us colonists that this liberation is meant for Europeans and not the other races. We are sure that a new stage is being set for a war of distruction and liberation. It is time the British Government begin to set things right and make new moulds if it is going to survive at all.

It is time labour begin to place its just demands on the table for discussion. The time is now quite ripe;

### WORKERS MEETING HELD. AT PLN. SCHOON ORD

Messrs. E. S. S. Burrowes, Deputy Commissioner Of Labour: And Tahar Ally, Inspector Of: Labour (Acting) Adviced Workers To Join Trade Unions

At a meeting held at Pln Schoonord on Monday 16th July, Mr Burrowes deputy Commissioner of labour told hundreds of workers, that if they wanted to improvethemselves so as to become better men and women of their country and futher that if they wanted to better the lot of their children and become the proud parents of the worthy citizens of tomorrow, then they cannot in the least ignore their Trade Unions. He advised that every worker should be a member of a Trade Union and always see that he or she is financial. He futher added that in Trade Unions lies the failure or success of the Workers.

Mr Tshar ally, inspector of labour (acting), spoke exhaustively on the Estate Joint Committee and explained how it would help in bringing about a better understanding and harmony between the Workers and the Management, He also stressed the importance of Trade Unions and urged every worker to become a member of a Trade Union.

After the speeches, Mr. Burrowes and Tahar Ally left for the city and Miss Plta. Pita Piarce entertained the gathering with her songs and dancing.

### One Convicted, One Acquitted, In Port Mourant Murder Trial

BAIJOON, ex labourer of Pln. Port Mourant, Courentyne, Berbice, was found guilty on Monday afternoon by a jury, of the murder of Mr. George Wilkie, Deputy Manager of the estate. Jaisupersaud, also an ex-la-bourer at Port Mourant, who was also charged with the murder was found not guilty.

After the jury had announced their verdict, Mr. S. I. Cyrus, Counsel for Baijoon asked the trial Judge, Chief Justice, Sir John Verity, to reserve certain points which he would raise for consideration by the West Indian Court of Appeal. Mr. Cyrus intimated that one of the principal points the would raise was that in the course of the trial certain statements were admitted in evidence which were inadmissible and dangerous and highly prejudicial to his client. These statements it was explained were given in the evidence of David Rowana, a witness for the Crown.-

The Chief Justice announced that he would hear Counsel's arguments [Tuesday, morning July 17, 1945], and then promounce sentence on Baijoon.

Sir John began his summing up to the jury Monday morning, after which the jury, retired at 2.20 o'clock in the afternoon and -deliberated until 4.55 p, m. returning to the -court room without arriving at a decision. In answer to the Chief Justice the foreman of the Jury, Mr. J. Dow, said there was nothing on the law which they desired to be explained to them. The jury retired again at 5 p. m. and after further deliberation returned at 6 o'clock with the verdict.

On Tuesday however, the Chief Justice dismissed the Counsel's application to grate a case for the Appeal Court. In the cirturned by the Jury on Monday last against Government in Britian, cumstances therefore the guilty verdict re-Bajjoon stands unchallenged.

### TRINIDAD CENTENARY

#### GOVERNOR'S SPEECH

(Continued From Last Week.)

#### VITAL CONTRIBUTION

"When they came here they must have forseen full well the difficulties that lay shead, and have felt the doubt to which all mankind is subject, whether the fruits of their labour would be assured, whether the venture upon which they had embarked would for them and for their children prove worth while. We could tell them, as we have already been told this morning, of the vital contribution which their labour and that of their successors have made to the agricultural life of this colony and of the part their descendants have played in increasing measure in the professional and commercial life of the community, as independent farmers and in the service of the State. And they would see you assembled in this vast company and judge your stature in the community against their own. What then would they say to you'

"They would not ign bre, but they would not, I think, dwell upon the hardships and difficulties that have been encountered on the way. Children of time they would know full well, as we all learn to know as we grow older, that what matters more than the bardships or difficulties is the manner in which they are overcome. It is, I feel sure, on your achievements and your propects that their minds would rest and, as they summed up the record of these hundred years from your appearance be fore them they would say with pride that they, that you had done well. They would say, Well done, go on and prosper; and that tribute, those good wishes would be acclaimed by all sections of community in Trinidad.

#### TAKING STOCK

"On occasions such as this, one is led to ask why it is that we celebrate centenaries. Time must of course be divided and subdivided into convenient periods such as the round number of a bundred years affords. But a centenary is something more than a division of time. It well exceeds the span of normal human existence and is about twice the length of a working life. Yet it does not exceed the greatest age to which men can live, and it is not too long to contain within itself living memories and associations before they pass into history.

"The observance of a centenary provides the occasion for acknowledging our debt to those who preceded us before they are forgetten. Let us then acknowledge the doubts and difficulties which must have faced and exercised your ancestors in taking and fulfilling the decision that brought them here.

"You have more than justified their early expectations. Let us look back unon them with the respect which is due. Your place here and your opportunities are fully assured, and you stand, with all your fellow Trinidadians, on the threshold of the fuller opportunities which we rightly expect from the post-war world. Though they will be open for all to se ze, do not imagine that it will require any less effort or ingenuity to find or make good use of them. The road that leads to opportunity will still go uphill and for many years is likely to be steeper than before.
