It will be remembered that appalling conditions prevailing in these barracks were brough to light by Mr. C. F. Andrews some time back and they were subjected to strong criticism by one of the members of the Town Council itself in the person of Councillor Mrs. Knight. It is gratifying to note that the eyes of the Town Council

Charged with keeping insanitary native quarters a European, J. C. van Rensburg, Railway Street, Maritzburg, appeared before Mr. W. P. Maxied at the Maritzburg Magistrate's Court last week. Evidence went to show that the native living on the premises was housed in an iron shed with less than 100 square feet of floor area. The floor was not constructed with xood, tiles or other materials, and the roof was less than nine feet above the floor. There was no window in the room. In finding Van Rensburg guilty, Mr. Maxted said: "I realise that rome white people consider that anything will do for a native, but they are made of flesh and blood and suffer from just the same ailments as we do. They are entitled to housing that will not endanger their health. If you cannot supply sui able quarters you should not keep the servant." Van Rensburg was cautioned and discharged.

While we do not in any way wish to defend those Indians who do live in insanitary conditions we would venture to ask, if it is not true that the European employers are to blame for many instances of insanitation amongst Indians which is often made the subject of platform speeches by Anti-Asiatics? The tin shanties so often complained of belong generally to ex-indentured Indians who were never taught to live under any better conditions by their employers. The above is but one of the many instances that have often been brought to light. Let this rebuke by Mr. W. P. Maxted be brought home to more responsible employers who may be guilty of the same offence.

In connection with the recent motor accident opposite the Municipal Indian Market in Victoria Street, Durban, as a result of which five persons were removed to the Addington Hospital for treatment, the Indian Market Stall-holders and Squatters' Association at a special committee meeting has passed the following resolution copies to be forwarded to the Chief Constable, the Town Council, the Market Committee, and the two representatives of Ward, IV, in the Town Council:—

"That this meeting of the Indian Market Stall-holders and Squatters' Association deeply deplores the increasing number of motor and other accidents in Victoria Street (in the inter-section of Grey

and Brook Streets), and respectfully urges the Town Council and police authorities to take the necessary steps to divert vechicular traffic along some other well-defined routes, such as Queen Street, Bond Street, Brook Street, and Prince Edward Street, instead of Victoria Street, between the hours of 6 a.m. and 9 a.m. every day."

The position in regard to Indian emigration from Natal is stated to be as follows:—

In the period, April-June 634 emigrated the figures being made up as follows:—312 men, 12 women and 193 children. At present the Dapartment of Immigration has 400 applications from Indians wishing to leave the country. Each adult receives a bonus of £20 with an additional £10 for each child.

Mr. C. F. Andrews writes:

-mc. in Telse-<u>report</u> -

I made full enquiries from Dr. Malan and others regarding the limit of the Deposit fixed at £100. The answer was entirely satisfactory. The limit had to be named, and as the law is of general application it had to cover the cost of a full return passage to Europe of a prohibited immigrant, which could not be put down at less than £100.

This will make no defference at all to Indians who came under this clause, because Immigration Officers have been instructed to put down the nearest figure that will cover the return passage, and this in the case of Indians will remain at about £30, as it was before. The fixing of the amount by the Immigration Officer was necessary, because it was impossible within the time always to refer to the Minister, as he might be on tour. But I have been informed that the Immigration Officer has the general instructions from the Minister to charge the minimum deposit in each case and he cannot go beyond his instructions.

Therefore, this clause in the Agreement cannot really be said to be a restriction of previous rights.

A reuter's message from London states:— In the House of Commons Mr. Thurtle (Labour, Shoreditch) asked when Mr. Sastri would assume his duties in South Africa, whether Mr. Tyson had been definitely appointed Mr. Sastri's secretary, and whether Mr. Sastri was consulted and approved Mr. Tyson's appointment. Earl Winterton (Under Secretary for India) replied that Earl Birken-head (Secretary for India) had no information except reference in the Press with regard to Mr. Tyson's appointment, and the expectation that Mr. Sastri would sail early in June.

The Right Hon. Srinivasa Sastri who is expected to be here next week is accompanied, we are informed, by Mr. P. K. Kodanda Rao, M.A., Mr. L. W. Ricketts and Mr. J. D. Tyson., The Indian community will be sorry to learn that Mrs. Sastri is not accompanying Mr. Sastri.

Will not our brethren in Natal, Transvaal and the Cape take appeal to heart this least that is asked of them? Let us not give reason to Mr. Sastri to be ashamed of us for we must not forget that if Mr. Sastri has reason to be ashamed of us India too will have reason to be ashamed of us. The least assistance we could give Mr. Sastri in his heavy task would be to stand united and we have no doubt that our brethren throughout the Union will rise to the occassion and prove their worth.

In the name of the Indian Community of the Union we extend a very hearty welcome to the Rt. Hon, Srinivasa Sastri and pray that he may be blessed with long life, health and strength to see through successfully the task he has taken up at a considerable sacrifice.

#### The Rt. Hon. Srinivasa Sastri's Arrival

AY I make an appeal both in English and in Gujarati that all controversy may be witheld and the best possible welcome given to the Rt. Hon. Srinivasa Sastri, P.C., Agent-General from India to South Africa?

He comes at a very serious risk indeed to his own health which may at any time give way owing to heart trouble. At an advanced age, when most people would have retired from active service, he has undertaken this onerous duty solely owing to the persuasion of Mahatma Gandhi and to his own unbounded willingness to sacrifice himself for his country. With him comes his devoted personal secretary Sj. Kodanda Rao.

The very least we can do in return for a love so deep as this is to unite together in one body to welcome him and to leave all discords behind us.

I know that there are unfortunately differences of opinion with regard to the Agreement, but there can be no possible difference of opinion about the great nobility of the sacrifice that Mr. Sastri is prepared to make on behalf of Indians in South Africa.

Every organ of national public opinion in India, without exception, has wished Mr. Sastri God-Speed, realising the sacrifice he is making; let there be the same wish in all our hearts here! No one could possibly represent our cause so well, or obtain for us, as a Community, such a standing in South Africa, as the Rt. Hon. V. Srinivasa Sastri. May God grant him health and strength to fulfil his noble work ! May God bless him! May God preserve him!

This mission will be the crown of Mr. Sastri's life-work for his country. With all his great talents and learning, he might have aspired to great wealth and title. But he has remained a poor man, pledged to the service of the poor, unattracted by wealth and riches.

Here, in South Africa, he will be obliged, for the sake of the work itself,—as the First Ambassador to South Africa,-to maintain his status with all the necessary dignity of office. But he will ever remain, the friend of the poor, a lover of poverty, who is ready at a moment's notice to srcrifice all for the sake of the Motherland.

## Natal Under The Lash Bitter Attack By Ons Vaderland On The "Banana Colony"

A scathing attack on Natal is made in a leading article in One Vaderland. The following is an interesting translated summary: Discussing Colonel Molyneux's letter to the Natal Press, in which he proposed to render impossible a visit to Durban by Dr. Malan, the paper says that this kind of thing is beginning to pall on the rest of the community, and asks whether the time has not arrived for the Government to consider stopping all further capital expenditure in the Banana Colony, such as required for public buildings, railways, bridges and the rest of it. In the past Natal has been most lavishly "spoofed" by the Smuts' regime simply in order to keep them sweet, and public money has been squandered in that province far in excess of its significance in our economic fabric.

"Millions have been sunk in the electrification of its railways, and still there is no end in sight, while most of it will be quite unaccessary if Natalians have their own way. Further millions have been wasted on an inordinately large grain elevator which, after all, they will not require if their shrewd politicians and agitators succeed in cutting off the Transvaal and the Free State mealies. Large sums of money have been spent on straightening out railway lines that wont carry them very far beyond the provincial border if they go on as they are now doing.

"The present Government has also privileged Natal to a far greater extent than that province economically and properly merits, while it is reaping nothing but rank ingratitude from the men who are supposed to speak for Natal in the councils of the nation. Natal has bequeathed on the rest of our sub-continent the Asiatic question, while pigmy pump politicians thwart every attempt at its solution.

"For more than a year the province has been squealing like a pig about to be slaughtered over the Flag question. Their public men threaten now with this and anon with something else. They hold mass meetings of protest, and give vent to the most penrile and absurd language, thus becoming a distinctly disturbing factor to the rest of the Union. In all seriousness they have convened and subsequently postponed for the time being public meetings 'for the purpose of considering secession from the Union,' and Mr. Nicolson is now calling meetings to decide on not participating in an eventual referendam.

"Racial fanatics like Mr. Marwick never have a word of thanks or gratitude for what the Government does for the Province, and are for ever looking for an opportunity to vent racial spleen against 'the Dutch.' An old roldier Colonel Molyenux is actually inciting his fellow Natalians to acts of public violence because a Minister of the Union

proposes visiting Natal.

"This kind of thing is becoming a little more than sauseating, and though General Hertzog's Government is always inclined to wink at these foolish acts the conviction is fast gaining ground that Natal ought either to end or mend them on account of the unutterable twaddle of its so-called public men. The Province is gradually becoming a source of public nuisance to the rest of the Union. It is high time that Natal be taught to either drop this narrow insular bickering or take the consequences.

"There was a time when the politicians of Natal, a b coder-minded generation than the present tribe, wore out their shoe leather on President Kruger's stoop for part of our traffic, and subsequently again for a division of the traffic between Durban and Lourenco Marques.

"General Smuts years ago went in quest of a harbour on the Zululand coast for playing off against Delagoa Bay. The one he discovered and warmly recommended (but dropped on account of the wail that went up in D mban) might yet serve to make the interior independent of both Durban and Delagoa if the people of Natal cannot decide to behave themselves like rea onable men and citizens of the Union. Secession from the Union in the case of Natal is a very simple thing as far as we in the Transvaal and Free State are concerned, and if Natal

is really looking for it, all they have to do is to say so inplain language. If on the other hand they have no intention of seceding then this silly canteen talk about it should cease at once, and they ought to decide to drop idiotic threats like those of Columbi Molyneux. The rest of the Union is just about sick and tired of it, and the moment to us appears propitious to consider stopping all further capital expenditure in Natal.

#### For The Mothers' Sake Unite!

#### -Dr. Annie Besant's Appeal To India

The following is an appeal by Dr. Annie Besant to the People of India to unite in the cause of Home Rule published in the Indian Press.

Children of the Mother, worshipers of One God, "The one without a second," Why are you shaming Both before the world by your quarrels, religious and political? Is not the Country greater that your parties? Is no Religion greater than your religious?

You are playing into the hands of the enemies of your freedom. All the World is saying that if Britain did not hold the peace in India, Indians would be flying at each others throats. Of what use is it to sing, "Vande Mataram," while you plunge your parties as daggers into the Mother's heart? Of what use is it to demand liberty for Her, while you bind the fetters of your party hatreds round Her bruised and bleeding limbs? When I landed on your sacred soil in 1893, I cried in my first lecture: "India is not dead; She is only sleeping. Only her own children can kill Her." And now, in 1927, I who have worked since 1878 to deliver Her from a foreign yoke, who have sacrificed for Her dear sake all I have of life, of strength, of fixture I asked my own sad heart: "Will Her own children kill Her?" Were it not that I believe in India's Rishis, in the Inner Government of the world, in the Rishi Agastya, still the Regent of India, were it not for this belief I would abandon hope, and would lay a broken heart, my last offering, at her dear feet.

Who are these souls born into Indian bodies, who keep Her in subjection to a foreign yoke? These who betray the Mother, but know not the heart of India, that is sacrifice of selves to the Self.

O brothers! your past calls to you by all its glories; your present moans to you, out of its poverty, its ignorance its shortened lives. If you care not for your own servitule, for your children's sake, Unite. Britain is pledged to give you freedom. She will not deny it, if you ask it with a single voice. Let us make the Congress National once more. Let us forget the recent past and unite for the coming future. If the Bill now in the House of Commons does not please you, make another, and if that other gives you equal freedom with the Bill of 1925, I will be first to tear up the older one and to welcome the new. But no Bill will become an Act unless a united India demand it. Any Bill which makes Her mistress within her own house will be accepted by every true Indian heart whatever the colour of the skin.

The purpose of the Mission was particularly to get into touch with the more educated classes, and though today it has increasing work among the depressed classes, the great feature of its work is through St. Stephen's College, naw a part of the University of Delhi "The Mission has from the first had the closest

The Mission has from the first had the closest co-operation of Indian Christians of high culture and standing, and for many years the Principal of the College, was Prof. S. K. Rudra who died a year or two ago. The present Principal, Mr. S. N. Mukarji, is also an Indian. When therefore Mr. C. F. Andrews went out in 1904 from Walworth and Cambridge, he came into an atmosphero where there was the fullest unity between East and West. "There was no sense of a split when Mr. Andrews left us" Canon Western said: "His growing identification with the life of India had been most helpful to us at the Mission and it was only his increasing participation in work of a rather, more political character and his activities regarding Indians in South Africa, that made him feel obliged to separate from us."

There is a steady stream of men from the University of Cambridge to Delhi Mission, which to-day has taken over most of the work in that city of the S.P.G. An interesting feature is that many who for one reason or other, are not able to devote their whole life to the missionary vocation, are going out for short service, usually about two and a half years, to work in the College. Many come home to take parishes and others have passed on to Indian chaplaincies, fortified for their work with an intimate knowledge of Indian life. A Sisterhood has been formed which has served by a heroic succession of medical women and nurses.

The jubilee celebrations next Friday will begin with a Communion Service at St. Mary's, Primose Hill. The Bishop of Salisbury, chairman of the Missionary Council of the National Assembly will be chairman of the meeting at the Fishmongers Company's Hall, L ndon Bridge in the afternoon at which Canon Western and Dr. R. Parry, Vice-Master of Trinity College, chairman of the Cambridge Committee will speak. There will then be a picturesque proc ssion of Cambridge men and women across London Bridges at the busy time when city workers are flocking homeward, to attend a Thanksgiving service at Southwark Cathedral at 6 p.m.
