Viscount Wavell. Viceroy of Indian, went again to London, this time to talk with the new cabinet.

Elections were announced for the Central Legislative Assemble and for the eleven provinces of British India.

Lord Pethick-Lawrence, an extreme right-wing Laborite, was named Secretary of State for India.

Foreign Secretary Bevin's campaign promise to abolish the India Office and place India under the Dominion Secretary, seemed forgotten.

Permission to hold elections had to come from London, but it is not known whether this permission was, granted by Mr. Churchill's outgoing government or by the present one.

My colleagues and I feel that, with a new Government in office in this country house. We wish Mr. Pooran continued Tel. #### Doctor's Report Questioned

Just recently a child I I years old named Abdool Razack was employed at Pin. Ruse Hall on a 24 hours job, fell during the night of 4 9. 45. from an Irrigating Pump. His head and hands were severed from his body. What was surprising, was the doctor's report stated that the child died from drowning; this statement from a Government Medical officer should be investigated by the police Department and the circumstances under which a poor child-slave died, How this report was reached at, surprised even the common layman. Who it was that died? a labour's child not a manager's. Is Government sleeping over this? what is the labour Department and Police doing? will they act? What about the factory and its safe-guard for labourers? What is the attorney General doing about the safety of Factory people? Did he push the papers in the pigeon hole? If a man cannot do his job, why does he not get out and allow another to go on with it. Abdool Razick matter may engage the at-tention of the Labour Government in England if proper redress is not had in this colony,

-A move is reported to be under way in New Delhi to form a united front of all Moslem political organizations opposed to the Moslem Leagus in order to challenge Jinnah's claim that his League should be the only representative of Moslems in the forthcoming elections. Nationalist Moslem circles believe that such a united front could win over the Moslem League. The proposed new line-up would include: the All-India Jamiat-ul-Ulema, All-India Muslim Majlis, Momin Conference, Shia Political Confersence, and others.

Lahore, August 8—An editorial in The Tribune says: 'The experience of the Indian findustrialists, who are touring the United States, is that American businessmen are reluctant to enter into such contracts with Indian businessmen as may be annoying to British businessmen. When such a close tie of fellow-feeling exists between capitalists of America, it may be taken for granted that the Indian people can nover have genuine sympathy and real support from the American Government in their struggle for freedom from British Imperialism. American Government is controlled, by American capitalists and not by the American masses and its policy is dictated by Big Business and not the Yank in the street. American Big Business knows how to adjust rits rivalries and iron out its differences with British Big Business."

Hyderabad, August 26.—"Mrs. Sarojini Naidu, former president of the Indian National Congress, declared, "India is no longer in a mood to consider fresh versions of the stale and too familiar phrases selfgovernment' or 'dominion status'."

Mrs. Naidu added. "Lord Wavell's sudden summons to London , naturally presupposes a desire of the British Socialist Government to make a new offer, a new paraphrase of the old rejected offer to the people of India. India demands and can accept nothing less than full independence with all its far-reaching and intricate implications."

Bombay, August 28. - The Times of India, a British owned newspaper today protested at the omission of India from the list of countries to be represented at the formal surrender of Japan,

Even at the formal surrender of the Japanese forces to the Southeast Asia Command in Burma, it said, India did not appear to be formally represented, although France, the Netherlands, China and Australia were reported to have accredited observers.

How the efforts of a country like France could be considered to measure up in any respect to that of India in the war against Japan is a mystery," the paper said, one could deny France the right to be represented but it is little short of a scandal that India's name should be omitted."

The Transcontinental and Western Air line (TWA) has announced an elapsed flight time of 41 hours and 15 minutes between New York and India. This is one of the airline's newly certified routes. It will use a 57-passenger Lockheed Constellation.

New Delhi, August 27 .- The Government today extended amnesty to an estimated 30,000 to 50,000 "misguided" Indian soldiers of the so-called Indian National Army organized by the Japanese from Indian Army war prisoners captured in Burma and Malaya. Only leaders found guilty of particularly beinous crimes will be court martialed, it was announced. These include soldiers who killed their comrades or were responsible for the capture or torture of Allied soldiers and those who embraced the cause deliberately.

According to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Muhammad Abhas Ali, president of the London section of the All-India Moslem League, has stated in an article that the Moslems in India will back the Arabs in the Levant. "Why should Jews be removed from the European continent?" he asks. If this must be done on, account of anti-Semitism, then how can one expect the Arabs to be above this feeling?" The solution of the Jewish problem in Europe must be found by settling the Jows in underpopulated countries such as Canada and Australia, he added.
