RESOLUTIONS OF THE COURT OF DIRECTORS OF THE EAST INDIA COMPANY;

Being the WARRANTS OF INSTRUMENTS, granting any Salary, Pension, or
Gratuity;—submitted to the Honourable The House of Commons, in pursuance
of the Act of the 53^d Geo. III, c. 155, s. 88.

ARNOT:—£. 1,500:—14th September 1825; approved by the board of Commissioners for the affairs of India, 13th September 1826.—*Resolved*, That under a compassionate view of the case of Mr. Sandford Arnot, with reference to the destruction of the ship “Fame,” on board of which he was proceeding as a passenger to England, *via* Bencoolen, under the orders of the Bengal government, he be granted the sum of (£. 1,500,) fifteen hundred pounds, subject to the approbation of the general court of Proprietors, and the confirmation of the board of Commissioners for the affairs of India.

MICHAEL:—£. 1,050 per annum:—3d. May. 1826; approved by the board of Commissioners for the affairs of India, 14th October 1826.—*Resolved*, That having had under consideration the correspondence which has passed between the Tanjore Commissioners and the Court, respecting the employment of Captain Michael, of the Madras establishment, in the capacity of Mahratta translator; in the course of which the Commissioners have suggested, in view to the continuance of the services of that officer, that the Court should obtain the authority of Parliament to detain in England any officer on the public service, beyond the term of 5 years, prescribed by the 33d Geo. 3, c. 52, s. 70;—the Court decline to sanction the arrangement proposed by the Commissioners, which could hardly fail to operate prejudicially on the interests of the Company's army at large; but it appearing that Captain Michael will have been absent from Madras 5 years on the 28th January next; that there is no other gentleman in England competent and willing to undertake the office of translator; and that Captain Michael has signified his readiness, in the event of his appointment to that office, to render his services at the East India College without further salary than that now proposed for him; that, provided he relinquish all claim to return to the service, and continue in England as Mahratta translator to the Tanjore Commissioners, his present salary of £. 682. 10 s. per annum, of which £. 127. 15 s. is to be considered as half-pay upon retirement, be continued to him for life, whether or not the Tanjore Commission shall still exist; and that whenever the period shall arrive, at which, if Captain Michael had continued in the military service, he would have succeeded to the command of a regiment, and a share of off-reckonings, the said salary of £. 682. 10 s. per annum be increased from that date to £. 1,050 per annum, for it being, however, distinctly understood, that the condition of this arrangement shall be, that Captain Michael discharge all the duties of Mahratta translator to the Tanjore Commissioners, and any other service in England, that he may be required to perform, whether before or after he may have succeeded to the allowance of £. 1,050

per annum, be required of him by the court of Directors, in any department connected with the Oriental languages.

That the foregoing arrangement be submitted for the approbation of the court of Proprietors, and of the board of Commissioners for the affairs of India.

BARTY:—1 s. per diem:—3d May 1826.—*Resolved*, That in conformity with the Court's resolution of the 14th April 1819, John Barty, who has served upwards of 21 years, and has held the rank of serjeant during the last 14 years, be granted a pension of 1 s. per diem from the Company's cash, in addition to his pension from the military fund.

BORDWINE:—£. 100 per annum:—3d May 1826.—*Resolved*, That having adverted to the period when additions have been made to the salary of Mr. Joseph Bordwine, the professor of fortification at the military seminary, who has held that situation for nearly 16 years, and to the circumstance of his being a non-resident professor, an allowance of (£. 100,) one hundred pounds per annum, be granted to Mr. Bordwine for house rent, in addition to his present salary of £. 500 per annum.

That the application of Colonel Sir Alexander Dixon in favour of Mr. Bordwine having only been withheld from the Court's notice until it was ascertained whether Mr. Bordwine would recover from a very dangerous indisposition, under which he was labouring at the close of last year, the allowance for house rent take effect from the 22d August 1825, the date of the said application.

MASTER and CREW of STEAM PACKET "SIR JOSEPH YORKE":—£. 52. 10 s.:—3d May 1826.—*Resolved*, That Mr. Joseph Wallis, master of the "Sir Joseph Yorke" steam packet, and his crew, be rewarded with the sum of fifty guineas, for the services they rendered to the freighted ship "William Fairlie," when she was on shore on the Chapman Head Sand, on the 30th April 1825; the same to be distributed in the proportion of £. 26. 5 s. to the master, £. 13. 2 s. 6 d. to the mate, and £. 13. 2 s. 6 d. to be divided in equal proportions between the remainder of the crew; and that a warrant for £. 52. 10 s. be made out, payable to Mr. Joseph Wallis accordingly.

EXTRACT of a Letter in the Public Department, from the Court of Directors, to the Governor in Council of Fort St. George; dated the 11th February 1801.

27. Mr. Gilbert Ricketts has our permission to return to your Presidency, to practise in his profession as Prothonotary and Register of the Recorder's Court there.

30. In pursuance of an Act passed in the session of the 39th and 40th year of His Majesty's reign, c. 79, His Majesty has seen fit by His royal charter to establish a new Court of Judicature for the Settlement of Fort St. George, and the Territories subject to that government; it is styled, "The Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras," and is to consist of a Chief Justice and two Puisne Justices. The charter will accompany this Dispatch. Sir Thomas Strange, now Recorder of Madras, is appointed Chief Justice by His Majesty, who has named Henry Gwillim, Esq. and Benjamin Sullivan, Esq. the Puisne Justices; Mr. Sullivan is already at Madras, Mr. Gwillim has taken his passage to go out on board the Hindostan. On the arrival of the charter, you must do what is necessary on the part of the Government, in concert with the Judges, or such of them as shall be at Madras, for the open publication of it, and for establishing the new Court in its functions; upon that event, the Recorder's Court in all its jurisdictions will be at an end, and all its powers and authorities will cease, and from that time will be to be exercised by the Supreme Court, which is invested with the whole Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction of the Recorder's Court, and late belonging to the Mayor's Court, and Court of Oyer and Terminer. The Supreme Court will be the depository of the records of all the former courts above-mentioned. The appointment of the ministerial officers of the court is to be made by the Court itself, and we feel confident that in making such appointment the Court will pay every attention to an economical arrangement; and we trust that the establishment of the Recorder's Court will be found at least sufficient for the new court, and if it will admit of any retrenchments they will be adopted. We direct, as well for this purpose as upon every other occasion, that all our servants give such information and assistance as may be in their power and shall be requisite.

31. The Corporation of the Mayor of Aldermen, erected by the charter of the 8th of January 1753, will still remain entire, and be continued as directed in that instrument.

32. The Act of Parliament, section 6, provides that the Chief Justice is to be paid the yearly salary of £.6,000. at an exchange of 8s. for the pagoda; and that each of the Puisne Justices is to be paid the yearly salary of £.5000. at the same exchange; we direct that their salaries shall be paid accordingly.

33. The 7th section of the Act points out from what times they commence.

34. His Majesty has seen fit to declare by the charter, that the Chief Justice for the time being shall be entitled to rank next after the Governor of Fort St. George, and that the Puisne Justices shall take rank next after the Members of the Council. We, therefore, direct that they shall enjoy such rank; and that Sir Thomas Strange, Mr. Gwillim, and Mr. Sullivan, shall have every attention shewn to them, which is due to their high station and their own merits.

35. We direct, that by the earliest conveyance after the establishment of the Court shall be formed, you send us an account of it, as well as copies of the rules and regulations which may be framed, and also in future of all alterations which may be made thereon from time to time.

EXTRACT of a Letter in the Public Department, from the Court of Directors to the Governor in Council of Fort St. George; dated 12th February 1802.

Para. 3.- WE are greatly surprized that you have not yet sent us any of the Wills and Administrations registered at Madras, since the end of the year 1793, though

though we have several times directed you to transmit them regularly. We were informed by your letter of the 15th October 1798, that you waited the arrival of the Recorder, to apply to him on the subject, having repeatedly applied to the Mayor's court without success; he arrived some time in the same month; but we have heard nothing more respecting it. In the meantime persons who are interested in the wills and administrations registered since 1793, continue to experience the greatest inconvenience from the inability of our Secretary to furnish them with copies thereof; we, therefore, positively direct that you transmit the same to us to the latest period possible, by the first ships despatched to England after the receipt of this letter, or that you acquaint us with the circumstance which prevents your so doing.

Para. 12.—Conformably to the Orders of your honourable Court conveyed in this paragraph, we applied to the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature to give the necessary instructions for our being furnished with copies of all Wills, letters of administration, inventories and accounts current, which had been registered since the year 1793, and we have accordingly received those which were proved during the existence of the Recorder's Court, with a promise that we should be furnished in time for the January Dispatch, with those registered before and since that period of time.

Cons 30th July.

13. These vols. we have now the honour of forwarding to your honourable Court in our book packet.

76. We have in a preceding paragraph of this letter informed your honourable Court, that we had made an application to the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature for copies of the Wills, &c. which had been registered at this Presidency from the year 1793, and that we had obtained copies of those registered from the constitution of the Recorder's to that of the new Court, with a promise of the rest for transmission by the January Dispatch.

Para. 12.

77. We now beg leave to refer your honourable Court to our proceedings noted in the margin, for the letter which we received from the honourable the Chief Justice, in reply to our above-mentioned application to the Court.

In cons. 6th August.

78. In this letter, after pointing out the reasons why these documents had never been furnished to your honourable Court during the existence of the Recorder's Court, Sir Thomas Strange observed, that as the Register receives no salary, he must be paid for this as for other specific services by an appropriate fee, which fee might in time to come be made chargeable upon the respective estates, as probates, &c. were applied for, or inventories, &c. delivered in, but that for the arrears in this branch of business, as the Register could not reasonably be held answerable for them, and no charge could now be made on that account on the respective estates, but trusted that Government would be pleased to grant him a compensation similar to that which he will in time to come receive from the estates of the persons concerned.

79. We, in reply, informed the Judges of the Supreme Court, that we entirely approve the mode which they had suggested of furnishing your honourable Court, in future, with these indispensable documents, and that we shall give the necessary instructions for paying to the Register the usual fees on preparing them, from the year 1793 to the present time, so soon as the work should be completed; and we have since paid to Mr. Ricketts, for those delivered in, the sum of rupees 2884. 9. or star pagodas 824. 9.

In cons. 6th August.

80. We have subsequently received from the honourable the Chief Justice the Rules and Table of Fees which had been prepared for the Supreme Court; and we have now the honour of forwarding them numbers in the packet for your more immediate reference, together with lists of the officers and gentlemen practising in the Court.

Cons. 24th Sept.

81. On submitting these papers for our approval, Sir Thomas Strange took occasion to bring to our notice the case of the Deputy Sheriff of Madraspatnam, and to recommend that he should, for the future, receive a consolidated salary of 60 pagodas per month, including his present allowances.

82. Sir Thomas Strange also pointed out to us the necessity of making some arrangement for securing the peaceable execution of lawful process at distances from Madras, and he suggested the propriety of directing the local authorities, civil and military, to assist the officers of the Court in the execution of their duty.

83. In reply to this address, we informed the Judges, that we entirely approved the rules and table of fees submitted to our consideration, and that we acquiesced in their recommendation in favour of the Deputy Sheriff, to whom we should accordingly grant the salary that they requested.

84. That in regard to their suggestion on the subject of securing the peaceable execution of legal process at distances from Madras, we conceived that the employment of military officers in cases of civil process would not be proper, but that we proposed directing Zillah Judges, collectors of revenue, and commercial residents to assist the sheriff whenever the person entrusted by him with the execution of the duty should produce a passport, countersigned by the Secretary in the Judicial department, and in cases in which, in the opinion of the Supreme Court, the end of justice may be better and more conveniently obtained by the employment of persons under the immediate authority of the civil officers of the Company in the execution of process. The Secretary in the Judicial department will be instructed, when duly informed of the wishes of the Supreme Court, to issue the necessary instructions to Zillah Judges, &c. &c.

Read, the following letter from the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature :

To the Right honourable Lord Clive, Governor in Council, &c.

My Lord,

THE Judges lately appointed by His Majesty for this Residency, wishing to proceed to an early publication of the Charter brought out by Mr. Gwillim, beg leave previously to communicate to your Lordship their proposed arrangement for the Supreme Court, so far as the assistance of Government will be requisite towards carrying it into effect.

Of the officers existing in the Court of the Recorder, it is their intention to continue those of the Master and Clerk of the Crown, together with the Interpreter for the Malabar and Gentoo, as also for the French and Dutch languages, on the Crown and Civil sides of the Court, for all whom their former salaries are requested, with such addition to that of Shunmogoroy, the Interpreter on the Crown side, as your Lordship may think reasonable, upon the representation lately made in his favour by the Recorder, to which your Lordship is hereby referred.

It is proposed to discontinue the offices of the persons employed in interpreting the Persian, Portuguese, Moors, and Guzerat, for which several languages the Judges think it will be sufficient to appoint special Interpreters from time to time, to be paid by fees as occasion may require.

In addition to the establishment already stated, it is hoped that Government will have no difficulty in providing the Judges with chubadars; and a suitable allowance is also requested for clerks, tipstuffs, and a private Interpreter; the persons serving the office of serjeants in the Court of the Recorder may be converted into tipstuffs, so as to leave only one new office of that kind to be created.

The enclosed list will exhibit to your Lordship, in one view, the establishment proposed, including such salaries as the Judges respectfully hope will be allowed; and so soon as they shall be honoured with a communication of your Lordship's sentiments thereupon, an immediate day will be fixed for the publication of the Charter.

The President lays before the Board the following draft of a Letter, which he proposes shall be dispatched to the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature :

Gentlemen,

WE have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated the 15th instant, and to express our desire of affording you every practicable degree of assistance in carrying the intention of His Majesty's Charter into effect.

2. We are convinced that the arrangement which the Judges have proposed for the offices of the Supreme Court has been regulated by every degree of attention to economy, consistent with the dignity of the court. We have accordingly issued orders to the proper officers for the payment of the several Establishments included in the separate statement recommended by you.

3. We have in conformity to your recommendation, increased the salary of the interpreter on the Crown side of the Court to the sum of 75 pagodas per month ; and we shall authorize the payment of 8 chobdars for the establishment of the Judges of the Supreme Court.

4. The civil Engineer has been ordered to conform to any instructions he may receive from the Judges, respecting the repairs or alterations requisite to the House allotted to the Supreme Court.

5. In describing the limits of the Court of Recorder according to the Minute of Council transmitted with our letter of the 2d of November 1798 to the Recorder, no particular exception was made with respect to the Palace and grounds of Chepank, the permanent place of residence of his Highness the Nabob of Arcot, and of his Highness's family ; because it was considered that those Princes would be sufficiently respected and secured in their rights under the general operation of the public law of nations.

6. On the present occasion we judge it to be expedient to inform you, that the treaty recently concluded with his present Highness the Nabob of Arcot, has created no change in the political relation of his Highness, or of his Highness's government,

government, to the British Empire in India. He is considered by the British Government in India to be an independent Prince, permitted to reside and to administer his executive government within the British Territories. It is our desire, therefore, that the palace and walled gardens of Chepank should be excepted from the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court, and we have no doubt that the Judges will concur in the expediency of that exception, on the principles of national faith and generosity.

7. In our letter of the 2d November 1798, to the Recorder, to which we have now the honour of referring the Judges, the nature of the Company's property in the land situated within the jurisdiction of the Court, is particularly stated; and a regulation was introduced into the rules of practice established for the Recorder's Court, for the purpose of restraining the abusive exercise of the sheriff's power in cases of execution.

8. That rule we have reason to believe is insufficient to prevent an improper interference of the inferior officers of the Court in the lands paying revenue to the Company. No doubt can exist of the intention of the legislature with respect to questions founded on the Company's revenue, and we believe that if the Judges of the Supreme Court should qualify that regulation by excepting all lands not actually held under a grant of the Company from the jurisdiction of the Court, the agitation of much litigious matter would be anticipated; but we fear that under the ordinary operation of the English law, the agitation of such questions cannot fail of producing great inconvenience and distress to the native inhabitants of an inferior description, who are ignorant and incapable of comprehending the forms and proofs of the Court; we therefore recommend this subject in the most earnest manner to the consideration of the Judges.

9. The honourable Court of Directors being desirous of receiving copies of the rules and regulations which may be framed by the Supreme Court, we have the honour of furnishing you with an extract from the Court's letter; and we request that you will enable us to comply with its wishes, by transmitting copies of the documents described in the extract.

10. The honourable Court of Directors has appointed Mr. Randle Jackson to be the Company's Advocate General, and we have appointed Mr. Robert Williams to be the Company's Second Counsel, and Mr. Robert Orme to be the Company's Attorney, in the Supreme Court.

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS His most gracious Majesty, by His letters patent bearing date at Westminster the 26th day of Decem^{ber} in the 41st year of his reign, hath of his especial grace thought fit to direct and ordain, and hath accordingly thereby directed and ordained, That there should be within the Settlement of Fort St. George a Court of Record, which should be called the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, and hath therein and thereby declared, that from and immediately after the publishing and proclaiming of the said Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, so much of the charter granted by him in the 38th year of his reign, as confers any jurisdiction whatever upon the Court of the Recorder of Madras, should cease and determine and be absolutely void to all intents and purposes, and all powers and authorities by any Act or Acts of Parliament granted to or vested in the said Court of the Recorder of Madras at the said Settlement should cease and determine and be no longer exercised by the said Court, but that the same should and might be exercised by the said Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, in the manner by the said letters patent directed:

And whereas His most gracious Majesty hath further willed and ordained, That the said Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras should consist of and be holden by and before one principal Judge, who should be and be called the Chief Justice, and two other Judges, who should be and be called the Puisne Justices of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras; and hath by his said letters patent constituted and appointed Sir Thomas Andrew Strange, Knight, to be the first Chief Justice, and Henry Gwillim and Benjamin Sullivan, Esquires, to be the first Puisne Justices thereof:

And whereas the said Sir Thomas Andrew Strange, Knight, and Henry Gwillim and Benjamin Sullivan, Esquires, so constituted and appointed, have, pursuant to the directions contained in the said letters patent, assembled and duly qualified themselves to proceed to the execution of the several authorities vested in the said Court:

All manner of persons are therefore directed to take notice, that the said Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras being so constituted, and the said several Justices hereinbefore named having so assembled and qualified themselves as aforesaid, the said Court is now hereby proclaimed and published; and that the said Court of the Recorder of Madras at this Settlement hath ceased and determined.

And His Majesty, by his said letters patent constituting the said Supreme Court, strictly charges and commands all his faithful and liege subjects whatsoever, in and throughout the British territories and possessions in the East Indies, and the countries, districts, and places which now are or shall be hereafter dependent thereon, or subject or subordinate to the British Government there, that in the execution of the several powers jurisdictions and authorities by the said letters patent granted, they be aiding, assisting, and obedient in all things, as they will answer the contrary at their peril.

The opportunity now presents itself, and the enclosed list exhibiting the expenses alluded to;—I would recommend, that the 5 pagodas per sessions allowed for cryers, should be added to the salaries proposed by the Judges for tipstiffs, who will perform that service; and that the sums of 21 and 18 fanams allowed the priest and mullah, being the same persons employed in those capacities on the Civil side of the Court, be transferred to their general pay, as drawn for by the Register; that the 2 pagodas 21 fanams allowed the gaoler, be also added to his general salary as drawn for by the sheriff; and that the allowance for a Portuguese interpreter be discontinued, Government permitting the Court from time to time to draw for such sums on' this account as may be proper when the occasion for him arises, or to discharge them out of such fines as shall happen to be in the hands of the sheriff, for which he is, by his Majesty's charter, accountable to the Honourable Company as the King's grantees.

EXTRACT, Fort Saint George Public Consultations, 6th August 1802.

Read the following Letter from the honourable T. A Strange, Kt. Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Judicature, to the Right honourable Lord Clive, Governor and President in Council.

My Lord,

5th August 1802.

I HAVE had the honour of receiving, and have communicated to the other Judges, your Lordship's letter dated 31st July, enclosing extract of a general letter from the Honourable the Court of Directors, desiring to be furnished with copies of all Wills, Letters of Administration, Inventories and Accounts current, that may have been registered at this Presidency since the year 1793.

The practice of making such transmissions appearing to have been in disuse ever since that period, may account for its not having been adverted to by me on my arrival when I assumed the office of Recorder in the latter end of 1798. Had my attention been led to it during the existence of the late charter, it is so reasonable and expedient a one, that so far as had depended upon me, it would certainly have been revived, and the present complaint of the Directors thereby prevented. It is now some time since it was under the consideration of the Judges of the Supreme Court, who, feeling the propriety of it, directions on the subject had actually been given to the Register previous to the receipt of your Lordship's letter.

As the Register has no salary, he must be paid for this as for other specific services, by an appropriate fee; this, in time to come, will be the ordinary fee for copies, chargeable upon the respective estates, as probates and administrations are applied for, or inventories and accounts delivered in. By this means his future compensation for this extraordinary trouble not unnecessarily incident to his office, is easily provided for; but the Court has not the same hold upon estates, with regard to which every thing hitherto depending upon him has actually been transacted; and as he cannot reasonably be made responsible for arrears in a branch of business discontinued in the Mayor's Court long before he became Register, and as no neglect in this matter is justly imputable to him during the remaining interval to this period, it is hoped that your Lordship will think it but equitable on the part of Government to provide for the extra trouble he will have in executing the wishes of the Honourable Court of Directors, according to the same measure of compensation to be received by him for the like service in time to come, out of the estates of the persons concerned.

EXTRACT, Fort St. George Public Consultations, 24th September 1802.

Read the following Letter:—

To the Right honourable Lord Clive, Governor and President in Council,
Fort St. George.

My Lord,

I HAVE the honour of forwarding to your Lordship copies of the Rules, and Tables of Fees which have been prepared by the Judges for the Supreme Court of Judicature. The latter, by the provision of the charter, requires your Lordship's allowance in Council before it can be established.

On reviewing, at the end of a year from the publication of the charter, the state of the office of Deputy Sheriff, its emoluments have appeared to the Judges to be inadequate, and it is hoped that your Lordship will not think it unreasonable to request for him a consolidated salary, including his present allowance of 60 pagodas per month. I beg leave to refer your Lordship on this occasion to the accompanying copy of a letter (with its enclosure) from the Sheriff.

The subject of providing for the peaceable execution of lawful process at distances from Madras lately engaged the attention of the Court: Its import is obvious, as experience has formerly shewn in the instance of the British subject, and as may be still more apprehended in that of the native. It has occurred to the Judges, that it would be convenient could the Court possess the sanction of Government for addressing the Sheriff to some officer of Government nearest to the place where the person may be supposed to be, against whom process in such cases shall have issued, the latter having by a circular and standing order been previously directed to assist the former in the discharge of his duty. Perhaps wherever the Honourable Company's Judicature shall extend, the Zillah and other provincial Judges would be the fittest persons to be resorted to on the occasion; in other parts, collectors and officers commanding districts and stations. By some arrangements of this kind, the security in view would be co-extensive with the object.

The state of the profession requiring a provisional augmentation, the Judges request your Lordship will be pleased to convey to the Honourable Court of Directors their recommendation, that Mr. Henry Timple and Mr. Daniel Neale, both at present here, and otherwise qualified to be admitted Attornies in the Supreme Court, may, pursuant to the exigency of the charter, receive the license of the Honourable Company for that purpose.

I enclose for the information of the Honourable Court of Directors, pursuant to their request formerly communicated to the late Court of Recorder, lists of the officers and gentlemen practising in the Supreme Court at this date.

GENERAL RULES.

I.—That all process, whether in term or vacation, being tested the day on which it issues, be immediately delivered to the Sheriff or his deputy, who is to indorse thereon the time when it was received, and to execute the same without delay, making return thereupon to the office from which it issued, with the manner in which it shall have been executed.

II.—That the Sheriff be not compellable to execute process by himself or his officers out of the Honourable Company's jaghire, but that in all places beyond the limits thereof, being within the jurisdiction of this Court, the same be executed by such person and in such manner, and subject to such terms and security as the Court or any Judge thereof shall order under a warrant or deputation to be for that purpose specially granted by the Sheriff.

III.—That for all purposes relative to the jurisdiction of this Court, the limits of Madras be, pursuant to an Order in Council of 2d November 1798, as follows: That the southern limits shall be the southern bank of the St. Thome River, as far as the road leading to the long tank; that the limits shall then be continued in a northern direction to the villages of Kilpankun and Paramboor, and that from the latter village it do take an eastern direction to the sea, so as to include the whole village of Tandeesputta; also that no lands situated to the south of the St. Thome River, or to the westward of the bank of the long tank or of the Nangapaukam tank, shall be considered within the limits of the said town of Madras, but that all the lands included in the said villages of Chittaput, Kelpankam, Paramboor, and Tandear, shall be considered within the said limits.

IV.—That in all cases where any act is allowed or required to be done by any process, rules or order of this Court, or by notice to be given in the course of any suit or proceeding, and a certain number of days is expressed therein, the same shall be taken inclusive, both of the day of the test, and of that on which the act is to be done; and where the actual day according to this rule happens to be Sunday, the next day shall be added.

V.—That on the first day of every term there be given into the Court by the proper officer, a report, in writing, of all judgments and decrees of the preceding term, as likewise of all causes wherein one year hath elapsed without either party having proceeded therein; of all petitions for administrations, wills, inventories, securities, bonds and accounts current, filed from the first day of the preceding terms to the date of the report; such report to be afterwards filed and preserved in his office.

VI.—That the Sheriff, on the first day of every term, personally deliver in open court a statement in writing, signed by himself, specifying what has been done in the execution of all writs since the date of his last Return.

VII.—That the Office of the Prothonotary and Register be open from ten till three o'clock in term, and till two in vacation; and that the Sealer attend the same every day during the last hour of its being open, for the purpose of sealing all process writs and commissions.

VIII.—That the attornies, solicitors and proctors be responsible to the several officers for their fees, and that they do not in any instance receive or demand the amount of any bill or part thereof till taxed by the Master, and finally allowed by one of the Judges; and that no person be at liberty to change his attorney, solicitor or proctor, nor any attorney, solicitor or proctor to decline acting for his client, without the leave of the Court.

IX.—That no remuneration whatever, other than what is allowed by the table of fees, or shall be inserted in the attorney's, solicitor's or proctor's bills, be received upon any consideration or pretence whatever, from or on account of any native client, either pending previously or subsequently to any suit or matter to be instituted, prosecuted or transacted for him or her in this Court; for official or professional services rendered or to be rendered him or her in such suit, or in any matter or thing relating thereto, or in anywise respecting the same; and that the Master do in all cases tax a reasonable fee to counsel, proportioned to the nature of the suit or business; and that counsel's fees, including fees for opinions when required, be paid by the attorney, solicitor, proctor, or his

European clerk, only, and in no case by the intervention of any native, upon any account whatever.

X.—That upon taxation and allowances of any bill for business done in this Court, and delivery of the same to the client or party chargeable therewith, if not paid within two weeks after such delivery, an attachment issue upon an order *nisi*, founded on a sufficient affidavit, and made absolute for want of a satisfactory answer to such affidavit.

XI.—That any person who shall be clerk to a Judge, or shall be in future articulated for three years to an attorney of this court, with its privity and consent, shall be deemed qualified to apply to be admitted an attorney thereof, subject to the proviso in that behalf contained in his Majesty's late charter, dated the 26th of December in the forty-first year of his reign.

PLEA SIDE.

I.—THAT where any defendant, having been arrested, shall have entered into a bail bond with the Sheriff, such defendant shall, within four days after execution of the process, put in special bail before a Judge of this court, by entering in a book to be kept by his clerk for that purpose, the names, additions, and places of abode of such bail, together with the names of the defendant and his attorney; of all which he shall on the same day give notice to the plaintiff, who, if he be not satisfied therewith, shall, within two days after it has been put in, enter an exception on the said book, and give immediate notice thereof to the defendant, in which case the defendant may forthwith put in other bail, giving like notice to the plaintiff as before, and if the plaintiff does not thereupon make an entry in the said book that he is satisfied, the bail (whether excepted to or added) shall within three days after such exception, and one day's notice of justification, proceed to justify on oath before the Court or any Judge thereof.

II.—That when any defendant having been arrested, and not having entered into a bail bond with the Sheriff, shall be in custody upon such arrest, the plaintiff shall have four days for excepting to any bail put in by such defendant, from the day of notice thereof, subject in all other respects to the like rule and orders as to proceeding in relation to such bail as is before directed in case where a bail bond has been given to the Sheriff.

III.—That the defendant shall at the time of putting in bail, deposit with the Judge's clerk the fee due to the Prothonotary for filing the bail piece, and the plaintiff not having excepted in time, an affidavit of notice of bail being made, or the plaintiff having entered that he is satisfied therewith, or the bail having justified, the said clerk shall, together with the said fee, deliver the said bail piece to the Prothonotary, who shall forthwith sign and file the same; and thereupon the bail bond to the Sheriff shall be discharged, or the defendant, if in custody, released.

IV.—That in all cases where the bail piece shall have been filed, the plaintiff may enter and serve a rule for the defendant to plead within four days, or may enter such rule *de bene esse* before the bail piece be filed; and the defendant, if served therewith four days before the day of such filing, shall plead on the day on which the same shall be filed, or within four days after the service of such last mentioned rule.

V.—That when the defendant shall be in custody at the time of filing the plaint, and, having been served with a copy, shall not have filed an appearance within four days of the service thereof, and the plaintiff shall previously make affidavit of such service to be filed with the Prothonotary; or where, having been arrested and committed for want of bail, he shall not have filed an appearance within four days after such commitment, the plaintiff may in either case file one for him, and proceed to serve him with such rules for pleading, and all other rules orders and notices, and with like effect, as if the defendant himself had filed such appearance; and such rules orders or notices shall be deemed well served by delivering them to the gaoler, who shall immediately, upon receipt thereof, deliver the same to the defendant.

VI.—That when the plaintiff shall have proceeded by summons, the defendant shall, within four days after service thereof, enter an appearance in the office of the Prothonotary, and plead within four days after the demand of a plea by the plaintiff; and in all other cases shall enter such pleadings as the state of the cause shall

shall require, within four days after service of a rule by the plaintiff for that purpose.

VII.—That the pleadings in this Court be in as few words as the nature of the subject will admit, the plaintiff in every case containing a special averment how the defendant is subject to the jurisdiction, and if brought upon any matter of contract or dealing not specially disclosed therein, that there be annexed thereto a bill of particulars, specifying exactly the items and extent of the plaintiff's demand, against which, if the defendant intends to set off any thing, that he annex in like manner to his plea, or notice, a particular account of the same, to which in either case the parties shall be afterwards restricted in the evidence to be given at the trial.

VIII.—That in every case where the defendant, having appeared, neglects to plead in such manner as the state of the cause may require, the cause may be heard *ex parte* upon an order of the Court, or of any Judge thereof in vacation, for that purpose, grounded on an affidavit that a rule to plead has been duly served, and a certificate from the Prothonotary that no plea has been entered, or, where no rule to plead is necessary, upon an affidavit of a demand of a plea, with a certificate of the Prothonotary alone that an appearance has been duly entered and no plea filed, whereupon the Prothonotary shall proceed to make up the record; and no plea or pleading whatsoever shall be received from such defendant, or any evidence be admitted for him on the trial, unless such order shall have been discharged for good and sufficient cause, and upon terms consistent with justice.

IX.—That when issue is joined, the Prothonotary, if required, proceed to make up the record, the plaintiff having entered the cause for that purpose be entitled to have it tried, giving the defendant six days notice in writing if resident within the limits of Madras, and if beyond the same, then such notice as the Court, upon application, shall specially direct; and if such notice be not countermanded within four days of trial in the one case, or in the other within such time as the Court shall think reasonable, and the plaintiff neglect to proceed to trial pursuant to it, that he be subject to pay such costs as the opposite party shall have been necessarily put to thereby, and do not proceed to trial on any future day without giving such notice as is by this rule required.

X.—That the Prothonotary having set down all causes for trial, immediately on the application of the parties, in the order in which they shall be entered, do make out lists of the same, to be fixed up before the day of trial in some conspicuous part of his office and of the Court; and that no cause be entitled to be tried at the sittings after any terms, which shall not have been entered for that purpose within and before the last day of term.

XI.—That on every trial the Prothonotary read and sign the exhibits, and also mark on them the day of the month and year, with the name of the party for whom they shall have been adduced; and where the cause may be appealed, reduce into writing the depositions of the witnesses, who shall severally subscribe the same, to be afterwards attested by the Prothonotary, and if the judgment be for a sum exceeding 1000 pagodas, that copies of such exhibits and depositions remain with the pleadings in his office till the time for appealing is out, or in the event of an appeal till its determination, in either of which cases the whole, together with the final judgment, shall be filed on record.

XII.—That before the entering of any judgment, the costs shall be taxed by the Master, who shall give a certificate as well thereof as of the amount recovered by the verdict, according to which the Prothonotary shall enter up judgment.

XIII.—That if the defendant, being subject to the jurisdiction, is not to be found therein, and a return to that effect shall have been made by the Sheriff, a sequestration against his property shall upon order for that purpose issue, of which the Sheriff, if the defendant be other than one of his Majesty's British subjects, shall cause to be stuck up at the time in some conspicuous place, at or as near where the property is as may be, a true translation into the language of such defendant; and if no appearance is thereupon entered, proclamation shall upon a motion by the plaintiff be made in open Court from time to time for the defendant to appear, and if he continue to make default the cause shall be liable to be set down for hearing *ex parte*, and upon due proof of the debt or demand judgment be recoverable against him, to be levied, by virtue of a writ for that purpose,

purpose, out of his property sequestered in the hands of the Sheriff, subject to such order, as to the surplus, as shall be made therein.

XIV.—That no judgment upon any warrant of attorney to confess judgment, be entered after a year and a day from the granting of the same, without leave given upon affidavit shewing the due execution thereof, that the debt or part of it is still due, and the time when the defendant was alive; and that no warrant of attorney to confess judgment be taken from any British or European subject, being in custody under an arrest, or from any native subject to the jurisdiction, whether so in custody or otherwise, but in the presence of an attorney for such person, who shall subscribe his name thereto; and that such warrant be produced at the time of acknowledging the judgment, and be filed by the Prothonotary.

XV.—That when a Hindoo or Mahomedan woman is defendant, the first process be a summons; and that no original *capias* or *capias ad satisfaciendum* issue against such defendant, without order for that purpose grounded upon affidavit, by which it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Court, or one of the Judges thereof, that such native woman is not of a rank or cast which would, according to the manners and usages of the natives, exempt her from similar process, and that such writ is necessary to the due execution of the law and attainment of justice.

XVI.—That the Prothonotary enter in a book, to be kept by him for that purpose, all rules (rules for pleading excepted) that shall be made in causes; and that he enter in another book to be kept for that purpose, minutes of every motion and every judgment pronounced in the same.

XVII.—That the Prothonotary keep a book, in which he shall enter, immediately after the filing of any bail piece, the names of the parties to the cause, and of the bail, and the name of the defendant's attorney, and the day of the month and year in which the said bail was taken.

XVIII.—That the Prothonotary keep a separate book, for the purpose of entering therein all surrenders in discharge of bail, and the commitments of defendants so surrendered, and of all persons committed on the Plea side of this Court, with a memorandum of the cause of such commitment, and the name of the suit, if such commitment be on account of any matter arising in a cause, and also an alphabetical list of the names of the persons so committed, referring to such memorandum.

XIX.—That the Prothonotary, after entering the judgment, immediately docket the same in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, by setting down the name of the plaintiff and defendant and their attorneys, and the debt or damages recovered, or costs if the judgment be against the plaintiff, with the term and number of the roll wherein the judgment is entered; and likewise keep an alphabetical list, referring to such docket, of the names of the parties against whom judgment shall be given.

XX.—That the record be entered on a roll of that term in which the plaint was filed, and bear a caption setting forth the year of our Sovereign Lord the King, his heirs or successors, and his or their style or title, as also the style of the Court, and naming the term and year of our Lord in which the plea was holden, and that each roll be marked at the bottom with the number thereof, and that there be marked in the margin the day of the month and year on which any judgment shall be entered on the roll, together with the name of the attorney, and of the party in whose behalf the same is entered.

XXI.—That all records and minutes delivered to the Prothonotary be safely kept by him and classed in a regular order; that there be constantly in his office a book containing dockets of the names of the parties, their attorneys, and number of the roll, and that there be also an alphabetical list of the names of the parties to such proceeding, in order that recourse may be speedily had thereto.

EQUITY SIDE.

I.—THAT when defendant lives within the limits of Madras, process be returnable immediately, and an appearance entered for such defendant within four days from the day of the service thereof, and in case defendant's residence be beyond the said limits, such time shall be allowed for the return of all process issued against

against him, and for any act to be done by him conformably thereto, as the Court, if the same be sitting, or one of the Justices thereof in vacation, in their discretion shall direct.

II.—That the whole time for answering, pleading or demurring, when defendant resides in Madras or within the limits of the Jaghire, do not exceed six weeks from the return day named in the subpoena, and that no further time be granted for that purpose, unless, on motion or petition grounded upon very special cause verified by affidavit, the Court if sitting, or one of the Justices thereof in time of vacation, shall order or allow the same; of which motion or petition three days notice at least shall be given to the plaintiff's solicitor previous to the expiration of the ordinary time granted by this rule; and in case the Court, or any Justice thereof, shall think proper to grant further time, then such defendant shall undertake to enter an appearance in four days, should he not have done so previously, and consent to put himself in the same situation and submit to the same process as if the commission of rebellion were returned *non est inventus*, in case he do not file his answer on or before the expiration of the time so granted; and that when an answer is filed, notice thereof be given to the plaintiff or his solicitor by the solicitor of the defendant.

III.—That all further or amended answers be filed in eight days after exceptions to the original have been allowed, or order to amend has been obtained, unless further time shall be given to put in the same upon application to the Court, if sitting, or to a Judge thereof in vacation.

IV.—That in case any defendant against whom a bill shall be filed in this Court, and process shall issue, do not cause his appearance to be entered with the Register within such time and in such manner as the same ought to have been entered, and an affidavit be made to the satisfaction of the Court, or any of the Justices of the same, that such defendant is gone beyond sea, or that on enquiry at his usual place of abode he could not be found so as to be served with process, and that there is reason to believe that he has departed the jurisdiction of the Court, or otherwise absconded to avoid its process, the fact or information on which such belief is grounded being specially stated in such affidavit, then and in such case the plaintiff may have an order directing the appearance of the defendant at a certain day, a copy whereof shall be stuck up in the court-house and on the outside of the door thereof, and likewise at the sea gate and some public places in the Black Town, and the said defendant shall be three times publicly proclaimed in Court during the sitting of the same, on three several days, distant from each other at least three days, and in case he shall not appear within the time limited, or within such further time as this Court shall think proper to grant on proof made of such publication and proclamations as aforesaid, the plaintiff's bill shall as against such defendant be taken *pro confesso*; provided if such defendant be resident in Great Britain or Ireland, that such suit shall have been commenced within two years after its cause arose, and the sum to be recovered be not of greater value than 7,500 pagodas. And where any defendant shall have regularly appeared and shall not have put in his answer within the time directed, and shall have been in consequence thereof committed for contempt, and having been brought into court and heard the plaintiff's bill read to him; shall have refused to answer the same, or in case any defendant shall have appeared, but shall not have put in a full answer within the time granted by the Court, and process shall have been awarded against him to the extent of the writ of sequestration, the bill shall be taken *pro confesso* as against such defendant.

V.—That no person who shall be in contempt shall be heard by petition, motion or otherwise, until cleared of the same, and until he shall have paid the costs allowed by the Master consequent to such contempt; and that after a contempt duly prosecuted to a writ in the nature of a commission of rebellion, and return thereof, no commission to take an answer shall be granted, nor any plea or demurrer allowed but on motion and affidavit satisfactory touching the delay, and likewise on payment of such costs as the Court or any Justice thereof shall direct.

VI.—That where the plaintiff shall except to the answer of the defendant, he do file his exceptions in writing, with the Register, and deliver a copy of the same to the solicitor of the defendant within 14 days after receiving a copy of the answer from the Register, and if such defendant do, within four days after such delivery,

either submit to amend his answer in the particulars excepted to, and pay the plaintiff's solicitor his taxed costs, or satisfy him of the invalidity of his exceptions, the plaintiff do then proceed to file his replication; but if the defendant shall fail so to do, or put in a second insufficient answer, then that the plaintiff be at liberty to set down the exceptions with the Register, to be argued in four days after the same are set down in open court, if the said four days shall expire in term time, and if in vacation then before one of the Judges thereof, and if such answer shall be held insufficient, then that the defendant pay such costs as the Court, or a Judge thereof, shall award; but if, on the contrary, it shall be held sufficient, then that the plaintiff be subject to such costs as shall be awarded against him; and if a second answer be put in (after the first has been ruled insufficient) and the same be afterwards reported insufficient as to any of the points previously ruled insufficient, double costs shall be awarded against the defendant; and on a third insufficient answer, the defendant shall pay treble costs, and be thereupon examined on interrogatories to the points holden to be insufficient, and be further committed until he shall have put in a perfect answer and discharged all costs.

VII.—That within eight days after receiving a copy of the answer from the Register (unless there be more than one defendant, and then within eight days from receiving a copy of the last answer) the plaintiff (in case he doth not except to such answer) do file his general replication (no special one being to be allowed under any pretence whatsoever,) and that on failure thereof, the defendant may move for a rule to shew cause why the plaintiff's bill should not be dismissed, and, unless cause be shewn satisfactory to the Court, that the same be dismissed accordingly.

VIII.—That after replication filed, the plaintiff be entitled to a subpœna to rejoin, returnable within two days; and if the defendant do not rejoin before the return thereof, that the plaintiff do file a rejoinder for him, and proceed to the examination of witnesses.

IX.—That the complainant in every cause be at liberty, at any time after issue has been joined, to serve an order on the defendant to file his interrogatories within three weeks from the service of the same, and should the defendant not file his interrogatories within the time above specified, or having done so not proceed to examine his witnesses (or to take out his commission, where a commission may be necessary) on or before the last of eight days, the first to be computed from the end of three weeks allowed him for filing his interrogatories, the complainant be at liberty to enter with the Register an order for publication to pass in four days, to be made absolute at the expiration of the same, unless the defendant comes in and pays the costs thereof, undertaking at the same time to file his interrogatories and commence the examination of his witnesses, or take out his commission (as the case may be) and proceed therein on or before the day on which the complainant would have been entitled to have had an order for publication to pass, until further time shall have been granted by the Court or a Judge thereof.

X.—That the complainant, where he intends to examine witnesses, do file his interrogatories in three weeks after replication, and if the complainant do not set down the cause for hearing or file his interrogatories within the time above specified, the defendant may dismiss the bill with costs, for want of prosecution, unless the complainant, on being served with an order *nisi* for so dismissing his bill, comes in and pays the costs of the said order, and undertakes to set down his cause or file interrogatories within one week from the day on which the defendant was entitled to make his order for dismissing the bill absolute, subject to the Court, or a Judge thereof in vacation, seeing reason to allow further time; and unless the cause be so set down, or the interrogatory filed within the time so granted, the bill shall stand absolutely dismissed.

XI.—That if the complainant after filing his interrogatories do not proceed to examine witnesses or take out a commission for that purpose within twelve days (subject to leave being obtained for further time,) the defendant be at liberty to move to dismiss the bill with costs for want of prosecution; and that in order to give the adverse party an opportunity of preparing and filing cross interrogatories in time, six days notice of the intended examination of a party in chief be served on the opposite solicitor.

XII.—That

XII.—That proof be in general made before publication; but should the Master upon reference find the same deficient in any particular point or circumstance which could not properly be examined to before the hearing of the cause, he shall be at liberty to examine thereto, or if necessary, shall settle interrogatories for a commission to examine in the place where the witnesses happen to be, the party applying for each commission producing a certificate under the hand of the Master, certifying that such examination is necessary, and that the particular point and circumstances to which the said witnesses are to be examined were not fully proved, nor could properly be examined to, before the hearing of the cause, which commission and the depositions thereby taken shall be returned to the Master so certifying unopened, and publication passed by him in like manner as is usual on other commissions for the examination of witnesses beyond the limits of Madras.

XIII.—That the depositions being copied and delivered out, the plaintiff may set down his cause for hearing with the Register, and take out a subpoena to hear judgment, returnable in four days; but that no subpoena be taken out, nor the cause set down for hearing, until fifteen days from the time of passing publication; and if the defendant do not appear to hear judgment at the time mentioned in the subpoena, and affidavit be made to the due service thereof, the Court will proceed to hear the cause *ex parte*, and make a decree thereon; but such decree shall not be considered as final; but the same shall be served on the defendant, with a rule to shew cause why such decree should not be made absolute, and if satisfactory cause be not shewn within the time limited by the rule, that the decree become absolute, and be entered by the Register as of course; and that such decree, and all other decrees, be entered in the Register's books before the first day of the term subsequent to such decree having been pronounced.

XIV.—That where it shall be manifest to the Court that a bill in equity has been filed merely for the purpose of delay, and in order to obstruct any proceedings at law, such bill be dismissed with double costs, which costs are to be full, and taxed as between attorney and client.

ECCLESIASTICAL AND ADMIRALTY SIDE.

I.—That upon every application for letters of administration, two notices be given by advertisement in one of the Madras newspapers, and that such letters be not granted to the party applying for the same until fourteen days from publication of the first notice in one of the said newspapers, and the necessary citations issued and returned.

II.—That in all citations and process to be issued on the Ecclesiastical side of this Court, directing an appearance or any matter or thing to be done, there be the same time between the test and return thereof, and for the entering an appearance thereto, and for the performance of the matter or thing directed with relation to the circumstances of the party on whom the same be served, as allowed in like cases on the Equity side of this Court; and that the due service of such citations and process be verified by the oath of the party serving the same.

III.—That in every case where a caveat may be filed, the same be accompanied by affidavits, stating the right and interest of the caveator in the estate of the deceased, or the grounds of objection to the party applying for letters of administration, or for probate of a will or testament.

IV.—That either party be at liberty to support his case with further affidavit (giving timely notice and copies of the same,) and to set it down for argument; the administration to be finally granted either upon such summary hearing, or upon a suit to be instituted by libel, at the discretion of the Court.

V.—That fourteen days be allowed for filing answer to the matters in the several articles in the libel, and after filing the same (if it be not accompanied with a cross libel) either the proponent or opponent may on the next court day move that a term probatory, to consist of twenty-one days, be assigned, or such longer term as the Court, from the nature of the case, shall appoint; and after the expiration of such term, publication pass, and the cause be set down by either party for hearing, the Proctor who so set it down giving four days notice thereof to the Judges and opposite Proctor.

VI.—That all special cases not provided for by the above Rules, be regulated and governed as near as may be, subject to the directions of this Court, to the practice of the Prerogative Court of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

VII. That the proceedings on the Admiralty side be governed and regulated by the rules established on the Ecclesiastical side, wherever the same will apply; and where otherwise, subject to the like directions, as near as may be, to the course established in the High Court of Admiralty.

CROWN SIDE.

I.—That the Clerk of the Crown enter in proper and separate books to be kept by him for that purpose, an account of all writs, precepts, orders, or other mandatory process and warrants issued on the Crown side of this Court, of all bail allowed and taken, and of what shall have been done thereupon, of all fines and recognizances set and forfeited at each sessions, and the minutes of the proceedings of the sessions; and that he make up and safely keep all records and muniments, classing them in a regular order, with the references thereto, so that recourse may easily be had to them.

II.—That the Clerk of the Crown deliver into court upon oath, in every term next after holding of a sessions of oyer and terminer and jail delivery, an extract roll of all fines, amerciements, forfeitures, penalties and sums of money which shall have been set, imposed, lost, or forfeited by any person or persons whomsoever at such sessions.

Honourable Sirs,

IT would be unnecessary for me to point out to you the public importance of the office of Deputy Sheriff in this country, and the difficulty of finding a proper person for the discharge of it; the person who acts at present as Deputy Sheriff would seem every way calculated to perform all the duties attached to the situation which he fills, and from all that has come within my observation I can bear ample testimony to his zeal, fidelity, and integrity. It is under this impression, and for the considerations above expressed, that I take the liberty to request your attention to the smallness of the salary now allotted to the office, and to solicit such an increase as, with the fees arising out of his business, will together constitute a comfortable subsistence. In order that you may form an estimate of the product of the office in fees and salary, I beg leave to trouble you with the inclosed Statement.

I trust you will excuse the liberty I have taken in suggesting the matter, but I could scarcely refuse the best word in my power on behalf of a meritorious Officer immediately under my own cognizance.

In the course of the Shrievalty, it has often been represented to me that the Bailiffs fees are not adequate to the business done by them: If I might be excused in offering my opinion on the subject, I should be inclined to think that an additional fee of three rupees six fanams, in the instance of a capias on effectuating the object of such writ, could be no burthen to the suitor, while it would at once essentially serve a useful description of men, and be a stimulus to their diligence in an important part of their duty.

Extract of a Letter from Lord Clive, dated 24th September 1802.

Para. 1.—WE have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of the letter of the 2d instant, from the Honourable the Chief Justice, with its several enclosures.

2. We approve and confirm the Rules and Table of Fees which the Honourable the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature have been pleased to submit to our inspection.

3. We acquiesce in the recommendation of the Judges of the Supreme Court, in establishing for the deputy Sheriff a consolidated salary, including his present allowances of 60 pagodas per month, for the reasons given by the Supreme Court.

4. With regard to the means of securing the peaceable execution of lawful process at distances from Madras, we beg leave to assure you that the subject has engaged very much our attention; and that we are of opinion the object may be effected in the following manner:

5. We conceive that it would not be proper to employ military officers in cases of civil process; but we purpose directing Zillah Judges, collectors of revenue, or commercial residents, to assist the sheriff whenever the person entrusted by the sheriff with the execution of the duty shall produce a passport, countersigned by the secretary in the judicial department; and in cases in which, in the opinion of the Supreme Court, the ends of justice may be better and more conveniently obtained, by the employment of persons under the immediate authority of the civil officers of the Company in the execution of process, the secretary in the judicial department will be instructed, when duly informed of the wishes of the Supreme Court, to issue the necessary directions to Zillah Judges, &c.

Extract of a Letter from the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, to the Right Honourable Lord William Bentinck, &c. &c. dated 7th November 1803.

WITH regard to the subject of the 42d para. of the same Extract, it has been often under our consideration at the repeated instance of the gentleman named in it, Mr. Cecil Smith. The office held by him in the Court, is created not by the Court, but by the express provision of the charter, and the appointment is with the Court of Directors. The salary referred to was not applied for by the Judges, but settled between Government and him, without their interference or privity. It has always appeared to us, that we have not power to remunerate the Accountant General by fees; a power of settling fees is given to the Court, but it has reference to officers named, as described in an interior part of the Charter, not including the Accountant General, who occurs only towards its conclusion; and from a reference to former Charters in the parts respecting the same office, it appears to have been the express intention of both His Majesty and the Company, that the suitor should not be in any degree burthened by the appointment.

In fact the duties of the office, which are very trifling, might easily be consolidated with those of some other existing one, and its expense altogether saved. But the reduction of it must be the act of Government, or of the Court of Directors themselves, it does not rest with the Judges.

It is calculated among other things to simplify as much as possible the duties of the office of Accountant General to the Court, by reducing them to the keeping the account and making out from time to time, as may be required, a certificate to the Sub-Treasurer for the payment of any particular sum demandable from the Treasury. As conducted hitherto, the office has been burthened with a good deal of unnecessary correspondence between the Accountant and the Register,

That all money so paid in shall bear an interest of eight per cent, to be paid by the Honourable Company, of which a running account be kept.

That when and so often as the Court may direct the whole or part of the money or securities for money in the Company's treasury, belonging to any suitor, to be paid or delivered out, the Accountant General, on production by the Register of the order of Court for that purpose, shall certify to the Sub-Treasurer accordingly, specifying the amount of the money, or the numbers, dates and sums of the securities so to be paid or delivered, and, having annexed such certificate with the Sub-Treasurer's receipt in his possession applicable thereto to such order, shall deliver the whole to the Register, who shall accompany the party named in the order to the Treasurer, to receive the amount or contents thereof, upon payment or delivery of which the receipt of the Sub-Treasurer filed in the Register's office shall also be returned; and a report made by the Register to the Court or a Judge at chambers, and the order of the Court, with the Accountant General's certificate as above required, being left with the Sub-Treasurer, shall be a sufficient discharge for the said Company and Officer of any sum or sums, bond or bonds, or other securities for money so paid or delivered to the party named in such order and certificate.

That every such order for payment or delivery by the Sub-Treasurer, of money belonging to any suitor, so as to be a discharge to the Company and its officer, shall be under the signature of one of the Judges, and countersigned by the Register as under the Seal of the Court.

THE Register and Prothonotary of the Supreme Court of Judicature having delivered for transmission to your Honourable Court duplicates of the volumes which were received from his office in the year 1804, and are supposed to have been lost on the ship Prince of Wales, we authorized payment of the charges incurred in their preparation amounting to pagodas 318. 14.

179. These volumes, as also those containing copies of the Probates of the Wills, &c. which were granted in the last year, are now forwarded to your Honourable Court, in the book packet from this Presidency.

180. Extract of a Letter from the Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court of Judicature, to the Right honourable Lord William Bentinck, Governor in Council, &c.

My Lord,

I HAVE the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that the Registrar's report for last year, from the Ecclesiastical side of the Supreme Court, was a few days ago sent to Mr. Keble's office, in order that it might be forwarded to England by one of the ships now under despatch. This report, like that of the preceding year, exhibits correct accounts voluntarily delivered in, by the representatives of deceased persons; and where balances appear in favour of the estates, I would take the liberty of submitting to the consideration of the Honourable Court of Directors, whether it might not very much further their good design, in requiring these reports to be annually transmitted to them, if they were occasionally to give notice of such balances in some of the public prints. Accounts of this sort, voluntarily rendered by persons in India, have not, I believe, been very frequent, so that it cannot be expected that parties interested will of course inquire for them. A short notice would suffice, the names and descriptions of the persons deceased, and that there is a surplusage of their estates in the hands of their representatives in India, should seem to be all that is requisite; the amount of the surplusage, and other particulars, would be more properly given on inquiry at the India House. I see a further advantage in such notice, in that it would facilitate the operation of that important clause in the late Statute, which enables the King's Courts in India to grant administration in certain cases to their Registrar. I beg leave to assure the Honourable Court, that I submit this to their consideration with the greatest deference and respect.

THE President submits the following draft of a Letter, which his Lordship recommends may be dispatched to the Honourable the Puisne Judge of the Supreme Court, in reply to the foregoing address.—Approved, and ordered accordingly.

Para 12.—WE beg leave to request the particular attention of your Honourable Court to a letter from the Judges of the Supreme Court, which will be found recorded on our proceedings, noted in the margin, bringing to our notice, that the late Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, formerly Register of the Supreme Court, died insolvent to a large amount, and that there existed no fund out of which the demands of those whose money was lodged with him in his official capacity, could be satisfied. The Judges represented it as being very important to the ends of justice, that such a fund should be provided, and they solicited our help for that purpose, either by means of a reference to the authorities in England, or by any other means we might deem proper.

13.—In reply, we signified our intention to forward the various papers received by us from the Judges, to your Honourable Court, who will have it in your power to procure the best advice on the important subject to which these papers relate, and without whose sanction it would not be competent to us to afford that pecuniary assistance which it was the object of the Judges to obtain; it does not occur to us that we have any means of aiding your Honourable Court in the judgment to be formed on the subject.

14.—We transmit as N^o in the packet, Schedules, shewing the Money which passed through Mr. Ricketts' hands as Register of the Supreme Court; together with a copy of a Rule of Court, passed for the purpose of regulating the duties of that officer, with respect to such monies in future; all of which papers have been forwarded to us by the present Register.

WE have the honour to acquaint you, that in consequence of the death of Mr Gilbert Ricketts, the late Registrar of the Supreme Court, in December 1817, and his reputed insolvency, we thought it expedient and proper to appoint a committee, consisting of Mr. John Shaw, the then Registrar of the Court, Mr. George Garrow, the Accountant General, Sir Samuel Toller, Knight, Advocate General, Mr. Henry Byrne, Barrister at Law, and Mr. Robert Orme, Company's Solicitor, to inquire into and report upon the accounts of the then late Registrar, Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, relative to the Suitors Money, and to the estates of deceased persons which came to his hands; and we have the honour now to transmit to you a copy of the Report of the said Committee, upon the matters so referred to them, with the Schedules hereunto annexed.

You will perceive by the 8th paragraph of the said Report, that an unaccounted Balance appears against the late Mr. Ricketts, of star pagodas 123, 105, 37, of the estates of deceased persons, received by the late Mr. Ricketts as Registrar of the Court, in his capacity of administrator to those estates under the statute of 39th and 40th Geo. III. c. 79, together with certain smaller sums of the suitors money, appearing in the 5th, 6th and 7th paragraphs of the said Report, amounting in the whole to pagodas 1,500 or thereabouts.

As it appears that the late Mr. Ricketts died insolvent, and that there is no fund in Court, or in the Honourable Company's Treasury, applicable to the discharge of those balances, and of such claims as have been already made on account thereof, (which appear at the date of the Registrar's late Report to amount to the sum of pagodas forty-six thousand or thereabouts) or of such claims as may hereafter be made on account of the balances aforesaid in which the late Mr. Ricketts was deficient; and as we conceive that it is highly important to public justice, that some fund should be provided for the discharge of such claims; we have the honour to submit the said Report to the consideration of Government; and to request that they will be pleased to take such measures as appear expedient to obtain the desired object, either by transmitting the said Report and Schedules, and our representation thereon, to the Honourable the Court of Directors and Board of Control, or by taking such other measures as may appear to you proper and effectual for the purpose.

We beg leave to add, that much as we regret the occasion of this application, arising from the insolvency of Mr. Ricketts the late Registrar, such arrangements have been made as, we trust, will for ever hereafter prevent the recurrence of a similar misfortune, as all the suitors money, as well as the proceeds of the estates of deceased persons to which the Registrar administers, are now paid into the Honourable Company's Treasury for the benefit of the parties interested, pursuant to the Order of Court of the 25th November 1817, a copy of which we have the honour to enclose you, and the other rules and provisions made upon those subjects; and we have also the honour to inform you, that the present Registrar, Mr. Cleghorn, has, in consequence of the new arrangements made by the Court, entered into a bond with three sureties, in the sum of one lac of pagodas, conditioned faithfully to discharge his trust as administrator to such estates of deceased persons to which he may administer, and truly to account for all such sums as may pass through his hands in that capacity, in their progress to the Honourable Company's Treasury.

That with regard to the Suitors Money, they called upon Mr. John Shaw to prepare an abstract of all Orders of the said Court, whereby monies or securities for money had been ordered to be paid into or deposited in the same, from its establishment to the day of the death of Mr. Ricketts, and of the applications and disposal of all such sums of money and securities for money : Whereupon Mr. Shaw stated, that a clerk, named John Sykes, had been the principal person employed by Mr. Ricketts, as Registrar, in keeping the accounts of the office ; that he (Mr. Shaw) had been Deputy Registrar of the Court at the time Mr. Ricketts was the Principal Registrar, but that, according to the course thereof, he was engaged solely in the law proceedings of the Court, and had no control over, or inspection into, or interference with the pecuniary concerns of the Registrar's office, being a distinct department of the same.

2. That on this intimation the said John Sykes was called before the Commissioners, and, being examined on oath by them, stated, That he had been employed by the late Registrar, Gilbert Ricketts, from the 8th December 1806 to the period of his decease ; that it was his duty to make entries in the Registrar's books, kept for the purpose, of all sums paid into the office on account of the suitors in equity ; that the books had always been, and were then in his custody. He further stated, that he was unable to say whether any monies had ever been paid into the Court, that were not entered in the books so kept by Mr. Ricketts as Registrar ; but he said, in answer to inquiries on this point, that the books of which he spoke were the only books for the exhibition of such transactions and for making such entries.

3. That the Commissioners having inspected the books, found that they were in a confused state, and contained various private transactions of Mr. Ricketts, blended with such as were official.

4. That it thus appearing to the Commissioners, from the statement of the said John Sykes, that monies might have been paid into the hands of Mr. Ricketts, in pursuance of orders of Court, and not entered in the books kept by him, he the said John Sykes having made entries of such monies only as he was directed to make by Mr. Ricketts, and the accounts having been so irregularly kept, the Commissioners find it to be essentially necessary that a comparison should be instituted between the said orders pronounced by the said Court and the entries in the said books of the late Registrar. That the Commissioners accordingly directed that an Index should be prepared of all such Orders of Court, and also an Index of all receipts signed by Mr. Ricketts as Registrar, for all monies paid or deposits made in pursuance of such orders ; and also an Index of all entries made of such payments and deposits in the said accounts, and of all issues on such accounts.

5. That the Indexes having been accordingly made, the Commissioners have been enabled to make a statement of the suitors' money paid to, and deposits made by, Mr. Ricketts the late Registrar, on the Equity side of the Court, since its establishment, being the Schedule (A.) annexed, which exhibits the amount from time to time ordered to be paid in ; the payments actually made in pursuance of such orders ; the deductions on account of commission to the Registrar ; the amount issued to the parties ; the amount paid into the general treasury of the Company ;
and

and what remained to be accounted for by the late Registrar ; which Schedule shows, That during the period aforesaid, sums of money to the extent of pagodas 5,37,593 have actually been paid into Court. That of that sum pagodas 1,96,017. 18. had been re-issued to the parties ; that pagodas 334. 71. 32. have been drawn by the late Registrar, for commission, fees, and law charges. That the sum of pagodas 3,06,627. 34. has been paid into the general treasury ; and that the sum of pagodas 1,476. 4. only remains to be accounted for by Mr. Ricketts the late Registrar. The Commissioners further report, That the Accountant General of the Court has examined this Schedule, and has certified, that the accounts, as far as they exhibit the transactions between the Registrar and the General Treasury and his books, is correct ; that the sums stated to have been paid do appear so to have been paid by his books.

6. That the Commissioners have also caused a Schedule, marked (B.) to be prepared and annexed to this their Report, of the said late Registrar's Accounts on the Plea side of the Court, on which there appears an unaccounted balance of pagodas 99. 37. 55.

7. A similar Schedule has also been prepared of the monies paid into Court on the Admiralty side, marked (C.) which also exhibits a balance of pagodas 87. 14. 31.

8. That the Commissioners have also caused a Schedule, marked (D.) to be prepared and annexed to this their Report, of Mr. Ricketts' Accounts on the Ecclesiastical side of the Court. By this Schedule it appears, that there has passed through the hands of Mr. Ricketts as Registrar, from the 4th September 1801 to the 4th December 1817, the date of the late Registrar's death, the sum of pagodas 17,34,642 in cash and public securities.

That there have been paid on account of commission, law, incidental charges and claims, pagodas 5,79,289 ; to legatees, heirs and constituted attorneys, pagodas 7,91,929 ; into the Company's treasury, pagodas 2,41,159 ; and that there is an unaccounted balance of pagodas 1,23,105. 37. That of the sums stated in this Schedule to be paid into the general treasury of the Government, the Accountant General of the Court has ascertained and certified the accuracy thereof, and that the same will be found in the books of the Supreme Court, kept by that officer.

9. Having found such to be the result of the several Accounts above mentioned, the Commissioners deemed it expedient to call upon Mr. Patrick Cleghorn, the present Registrar of the Court, to state to them what demands had been made in reference to the claims appearing due by Mr. Ricketts as administrator, and as shown by the said Schedule (D.) (being the only claims of any serious amount appearing on the face of those accounts ;) and the Commissioners have learnt from Mr. Cleghorn, that claims of that description, from the death of Mr. Ricketts in December 1817, up to the present time, have not in the aggregate exceeded the sum of pagodas forty-six thousand, or thereabouts.

This Report would have been completed earlier, had it not been for the long illness and death of the late Registrar, Mr. Shaw.

A LETTER from Mr. M. O'Reilly, dated the 4th instant, requesting to be informed what measures it is necessary for him to adopt to procure the remittance to this country, of the property of the late Colonel Edward O'Reilly of the Madras Establishment,—was read ;

Ordered, That the said Letter be referred to the consideration of the Committee of Correspondence.

Sir,

HAVING requested my friend Colonel Massey to make enquiries at the India House, respecting the affairs of my late brother Colonel Edward O'Reilly, who commanded the First Battalion 4th Regiment Native Infantry on the Madras Establishment, and who died intestate at Samnelcottah, on the 22d of March 1816 ; I have learned by his letter under date of the 10th ultimo, that only about

from 140 *l.* to 150 *l.* of the assets have been lodged in the Treasury at Madras; this the more surprises me, as I, by information which I have lately obtained from Captain Dalziel of the regiment my brother commanded, who was with him at the time of his death, and who is very lately returned home, that my brother informed him, just before his death, that notwithstanding severe losses which he had sustained by the failure of his former agents, that he had 10,000 star pagodas (value about 4,000 *l.* sterling) principally in the Company's paper; and he also informed me, that the sale of his effects would produce 1,000 *l.* more. The whole of this appears very small for an officer of his rank and who had served so long in India. I am therefore at a loss to account for so small a sum only being in the treasury; the only way I suppose it can be accounted for, is, that the sum in the treasury is the balance of pay due to the Colonel at his death, and that the rest of his property had not been paid in by those in whose hands it was at the time of his death, or who, since that period, have got it into their hands. But being wholly unacquainted with the proceedings necessary to be taken in order to get those effects remitted here, I have taken the liberty of addressing myself to you on the subject, who, I understand from my friend Colonel Massey, can give me the best information and instructions upon the affair, the necessary and proper steps to be taken for collecting the assets of my brother and having the value remitted home with as little delay as possible; and in case it should be necessary to send out a power of attorney to India, perhaps you would have the kindness to name a proper person who would take the trouble of acting with promptitude under it. Mr. George Knox, of the firm of Knox and Gordon, at Madras, was Colonel O'Reilly's agent at the time of his death. If I had any particular friend in India, I would not thus intrude upon you.

I HAVE laid before the Court of Directors your letter of the 4th ultimo, respecting the affairs of your late brother Colonel Edward O'Reilly, who died intestate at Madras in 1816; and I am directed to inform you, that your brother having died intestate, his estate was administered to by the late Mr. G. Ricketts, the Registrar to the Supreme Court, according to Act of Parliament: It appears he received on the 25th August last the sum of 3,800 pagodas, which had been previously deposited in the Company's Treasury.

The usual mode of establishing the claims of the legal representatives to intestates who die in India, is by sending out proofs of their being so, and a power of attorney to some person on the spot, to receive any balance belonging to the estate which may remain in the Registrar's hands.

THE MEMORIAL of Myles O'Reilly, of the City of Dublin, Esquire, Administrator and personal Representative of Edward O'Reilly, Esquire, deceased, late Lieutenant Colonel in the Honourable the East India Company's service, in the Presidency of Madras, who died there in March 1816 intestate;

Sheweth,—That previous to the Act of Parliament of the 39th and 40th of George the Third, hereinafter mentioned, the East India Company having represented that in consequence of the losses sustained by the next of kin to persons dying intestate in India, and to relieve them from the same, and from the impositions practised upon them by fraudulent administrations obtained by strangers in India to deceased persons, it would be conducive to the interests of the Company and the representatives of intestates residing in Europe, that the Registrar of the Company's Supreme Court at the several Presidencies in India should be entitled to take out administration to intestates; and upon those grounds the Company procured an Act of Parliament to be passed in the 39th and 40th of George the Third, c. 79, intituled, "An Act for establishing further regulations for the government of the British Territories in India, and the better administration of justice within the same." It was amongst other things enacted by the 21st section of the said Act, "That from and after the 1st day of March 1801, when any British subject should die intestate within either of the Presidencies of Fort William, Fort St. George, or Bombay, or the territories subordinate or become subordinate thereto, and, upon the return of the citation to be issued from the proper Ecclesiastical Court, no next of kin or creditor should appear and make out their claim to the administration of the effects of the intestate deceased, to the satisfaction of the Court, it should and might be lawful for the Registrar of such Court respectively, and he is thereby required, to apply for, and such Court is thereby required and directed to grant Letters *ad Colligenda*, or of an administration, as to such Court shall seem meet, by virtue whereof such Registrar shall collect the assets of the deceased, and shall bring them for safe custody into such Court, and account for them regularly in like manner as is now by law provided in cases where assets are vested in the hands of any officer of the Court under or by virtue of the equitable jurisdiction of any such Court."

And by the 22d section of the said Act it is provided, "That when any next of kin, or creditor, who at the time of the return of the above citation shall have been absent in Europe or elsewhere, shall make and establish their claim to the administration of the assets of such intestate, the Letters *ad Colligenda* or of administration granted in virtue of this Act to the Registrar, shall be recalled, and administration in due form granted to such next of kin or creditor respectively."

Sheweth, That previous to the passing of this Act, administrations were granted in India, as in Europe, to the next of kin or creditors applying for the same in the due and ordinary course of administration; but inasmuch as it generally happened that the next of kin (and particularly of officers dying in India) were resident in Europe, in order to preserve the property more effectually for their use, the East India Company, upon the grounds hereinbefore mentioned, and without notice to those most interested, procured the Act of Parliament of the 39th and 40th of George the Third (herein referred to) to be enacted, by which the whole property of intestates was to be transferred to the possession of their officer; and this must have been done upon the understanding, that the East India Company or the Court of Directors of that Company would take care that none but a solvent person, or such as should give ample security, would be by them appointed to a situation by which he was to get into his possession the property of the next of kin of all persons dying intestate in India, and over whom the next of kin residing in Europe could have no control for a long period of time; and if the Company or the Court of Directors have appointed any person since they procured said Act of Parliament, who has, in virtue of his office as Registrar and official administrator, got the property of the next of kin into his possession, without obtaining ample security

security from such their officer for the honest and faithful discharge of his duty in this respect, then and in that case Memorialist relies upon it that the East India Company, virtually and according to the obvious intention of the said Act, became the security of their officer to the public, and are in justice and equity, and true meaning of the said Act of Parliament of the 39th and 40th of George the Third, bound to make good the defalcation of the officer so appointed by them without sufficient security to those lawfully entitled to the assets collected by him and wasted or misapplied, for it never could be intended by the Legislature that this office was to be filled by an insolvent, or by any person not giving ample security; for if that could be supposed, what was intended as a benefit and for the preservation of the property of those persons resident at so great a distance as this country is from India, would prove the very reverse of security and protection, and the next of kin would be much better secured as the law stood before than after the enactment of the 39th and 40th of George the Third.

No doubt, before the enactment of the statute of the 39th and 40th of George the Third, the next of kin in Europe had great difficulties to contend with in respect of the property of persons dying intestate in India, but still it would bear no comparison with the ruin that would be effected in case the India Company or the Court of Directors could be considered as authorized to appoint a person to an office without security, who was, without the approbation of the persons, entitled to collect, in virtue of the office he held under the Company, the property of all intestates, and make such use of it as he pleased; and therefore, and upon the grounds of public policy and justice, and the true and obvious meaning of the 39th and 40th of George the Third, Memorialist humbly submits, that in any case when the Company or the Court of Directors, or any others acting by their authority, have appointed any such officer without taking ample security, that they have thereby made themselves the security of their officer to the public, and are bound to make good such property as came to the hands of such officer in virtue of his appointment as their officer, which alone entitled him to get possession of the property; and Memorialist has not a doubt upon his mind, but that the East India Company, and the Court of Directors of that Company, who upon all occasions act upon such just and liberal principles, will at once agree in the view Memorialist has taken of the case, and make good not only the loss of the principal sustained through their officer, but the interest thereof, inasmuch as if the principal was, as it ought to be, in their treasury, it would be bearing interest.

It appears that after the passing of the Act of the 39th and 40th of George the Third, that some doubts had arisen in India, whether, after passing that Act, administration could be by the Courts in India granted to the attornies of the next of kin resident in Europe; and to set that doubt at rest, it was by an Act of Parliament of the 55th George the Third, c. 84, enacted by the 2d section of that Act, "That persons empowered as the attornies of the parties entitled to administration, that administration should be granted to them." And by the third section of the said Act, it makes the administration granted to the Registrar void, "upon the application of the attorney of the party entitled to administration." And by the 5th section of the last-mentioned Act, it is enacted, after reciting the 39th and 40th of George the Third, "That in all cases in which the Registrar of any of the said Courts shall be appointed administrator under the aforesaid Act (meaning the 39th and 40th of George the Third) besides filing an inventory and account current according to the tenor of the administration bond and the usual course of the ecclesiastical court, he shall enter in a book to be kept by him for that purpose separate and distinct accounts of each estate, and of all such sums of money, bonds and other securities for money, goods, effects and things as shall come to his hands, or to the hands of any person employed by him or in trust for him, by virtue of any letter *ad colligenda* or of administration granted to him under the authority of the said Act, and likewise of all payments made by him for or on account of the said estate, and of all debts due by or to the same, specifying the dates of said receipts and payments respectively; which said book shall be kept in the Registrar's office, and shall be open for the inspection of all persons having occasion to inspect the same, at office hours; and the said Register shall twice in every year, on the 1st day of March and 22d day of October, or on the first day after on which their respective Courts shall be sitting, exhibit and deliver in open court a true and perfect Schedule of all sums of money, bonds or other securities received on account of each

It is clear from the enactments of the Statute of the 55th George the 3d, that the administration to the Registrar under the 39th and 40th of George the 3d, as it then stood, did not give satisfaction to the parties interested; and therefore the Statute of the 55th of George the 3d was enacted, to define the official duties of the Registrars as official administrators to intestates dying in India, and to preserve the property to those entitled to it, and settle the doubt respecting the right of persons applying under powers of attorney from the next of kin for administration. But this Act of Parliament in no way exonerates the Registrar, or the East India Company who appoints him, from the responsibility due to the public by their official officer, who is authorized, in virtue of his office as Registrar and the Act of Parliament before referred to, to get into his possession, without the consent or concurrence of the next of kin, the property of intestates. And it is humbly relied upon that if the East India Company, the Court of Directors, or others acting in their name, appoint a Registrar to a situation of so high a trust without having full security for his faithfully accounting for and paying over to the next of kin all such property, money, securities for money and goods as shall come to his hands as official administrator, and that such Registrar shall waste or embezzle such property, that the East India Company who appointed him, or by whose authority he was appointed, and thereby put him into a situation to get possession of the property of third persons, is bound to make good the losses sustained by their officer, over whom the parties could have no control at the time he possessed himself of their property.

Sheweth,—Your Memorialist's brother Edward O'Reilly, Esquire, was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Honourable the East India Company's service, and died in their service intestate at Samnelcottah, in the Presidency of Madras, in the month of March 1816, leaving Memorialist his next of kin, of which event Memorialist did not receive certain information until the year 1818, in answer to letters he wrote to India upon the subject; and early in 1819 he obtained administration to his brother in Doctors Commons, which he forwarded with a power of attorney to Messrs. George Arbuthnot, John D'Monte, William M'Tegart and Robert John Hunter, residing at Madras, authorizing them to call in and collect from the Registrar of the Supreme Court, and all others indebted to the estate of the said Colonel Edward O'Reilly, the monies and assets of said estate. In consequence of which authority, Memorialist hath lately received from his said attorneys the accounts furnished officially by Patrick Cleghorn, Esquire, the present Registrar of the Court, as well his own account as that of Mr. Shaw his predecessor in office; but he has not furnished the official account of Mr. Shaw's predecessor in office, Mr. Gilbert Ricketts. But Messrs. Arbuthnot and Company, by their last letter bearing date at Madras the 13th October 1820, state, that they have ascertained that there was in the hands of Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, at the time of his death, assets belonging to the estate of Colonel Edward O'Reilly, and of course then the property of Memorialist, a principal sum amounting to pagodas 7048. 44. 37. making in British currency £.2,819. 11 s. 11 d. exclusive of interest. But they add, that Mr. Gilbert Ricketts died in office insolvent.

Sheweth,—That your Memorialist has been informed, that the late Chief Justice of Madras, Sir John Newbolt; and his brother Judge Sir Edmund Stanley, feeling the injustice it would be that individuals should suffer from the dishonesty of a public functionary appointed under the authority of the East India Company, and in opposition to the sentiments and inclination of Sir Thomas Strange, then Chief Justice of Madras, in that true spirit of justice and integrity which marks their characters, and feeling, no doubt, that the Company who appointed Mr. Ricketts (and perhaps incautiously appointed him without security) ought in

justice make good the claims of individuals for their property which he got into his hands in virtue of his office as Registrar, made a strong representation to the local Government at Madras, giving it as their opinion that the Government ought and were in justice bound to come forward and make good to the individuals the property so embezzled by their officer Mr. Ricketts; and your Memorialist understands that the representation so made by the beforenamed Judges, has been referred by the local Government of Madras to the Court of Directors in London; and your Memorialist doubts not that the Honourable the Court of Directors will see the matter in the same just point of view in which it appeared to the upright Judges who made their representation as aforesaid on the case, and the injustice it would be that individuals should suffer by the default of a public officer appointed by the Company; otherwise, instead of an advantage and security to the next of kin of intestates, as the law of the 39th and 40th of George the Third was intended to be, it would have quite a contrary effect, and in that case it would have been much better for the next of kin that the law had never passed.

Sheweth, That a sum of 3,800 pagodas was, previous to the 25th of August 1817, lodged in the Company's treasury on account of the estate of the said Colonel Edward O'Reilly (which deposit Memorialist supposes was made by Major Moore, upon whom the command of Colonel O'Reilly's regiment devolved upon the Colonel's death) as the proceeds of his effects where he died, and which sum was drawn out of the treasury on the said 25th August 1817 by the said Gilbert Ricketts; and Memorialist is advised that the Treasurer had no right to pay over the same to the said Gilbert Ricketts without the special order of the Court, and that the Court could not grant any such order but to pay debts ascertained by affidavit to be due by the intestates; and those forms not having been complied with, that the Company is answerable for the sum so paid over by their Treasurer to the said Ricketts. And Memorialist submits, that under the circumstances of his case, and the great hardship and injustice it would be that innocent third persons should suffer by the dishonesty of a public officer of the Company over whom they could have no control, that this Honourable Court will accordingly direct the claim of Memorialist to be satisfied.

May it therefore please your Honourable Board to take the case of your Memorialist into consideration, and direct that your Memorialist be paid the said sum of £.2,819. 11s. 11d. already ascertained to have been received by the said Gilbert Ricketts, with interest thereon from the time the same came into his hands until paid. And your Memorialist will pray.

A LETTER from Mr. Myles O'Reilly, dated the 10th instant, urging various grounds upon which he trusts the Court will re-consider the claim of the estate of his brother, the late Lieutenant Colonel O'Reilly of the Madras Establishment, to be indemnified from the loss occasioned by the insolvency of the late Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, who was Registrar to the Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort St. George; was read.

Sir,

I HAD the honour a few days since, on my return to town, to receive the letter you addressed to me, under date of the 8th ultimo, by command of the Court of Directors of the East India Company, in answer to the Memorial I presented to that Court in the latter end of March or beginning of April last. I am much mortified and disappointed at the answer it has pleased the Court of Directors to return to what I must consider a very just claim. I looked for a quite different result to my application; but I am not without hope that upon further consideration my case may be viewed in a different light from that in which it at present seems to strike the Court of Directors, and with this expectation I have to request that you will lay this letter as soon as possible before the Court. I have a high respect for the East India Company, and I cannot persuade myself that even if the Company was protected upon the grounds stated in your letter, that they would avail themselves of it in a case of such peculiar hardship as mine is. The payment of my demand can be no great matter to them, but is of serious consequence to me; I therefore trust that the Court of Directors, upon reconsidering my case, and the facts and circumstances connected with it, and the reasons I shall here adduce, will find grounds for changing their present determination, and do justice to me by ordering my just demand to be paid, with interest. It appears from your letter, that the Court of Directors came to their present resolution upon the following grounds, "That the Officers of His Majesty's Courts of Judicature in India are not appointed by the authority of the East India Company, that the Company are in no way responsible for the acts of those officers; and that my application, to be paid the amount of the assets of the estate of the late Lieutenant Colonel O'Reilly, said to have been received by the late Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, as Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, cannot be complied with." To this I beg leave to reply, that amongst other proofs, it appears by the return published by the East India Company in the London Gazette, at page 1162 of the bound volume of Gazettes for the year 1821, that Mr. Ricketts received the money I claim; and this I suppose will be admitted as conclusive evidence of the fact by the Court of Directors. In answer to the objection, that the Company do not appoint the Officers of the Courts of Judicature in India, and is not responsible for their acts, I beg leave to state, that even if the Registrar was appointed by the Judges of the Court, that yet I submit that the Company would be responsible. Before the passing of the 39th and 40th of the late King, the Registrar had no right to administration to intestates, that right by law was vested in the next of kin; the Company thought fit to procure an Act of Parliament interfering with that right in the first instance, and transferring it to the Registrar of the Supreme Court; thus the Company procured an Act of Parliament by which the property of the next of kin was without their consent put into the possession of the Registrar of the Court; and does it not follow, that in justice the Company was bound to guard the property thus transferred to the Registrar, from all hazard and loss, and not to permit an insolvent, improper or dishonest man, to be appointed Registrar? for it can never be supposed that the Judges had a power to appoint a person of such description to such an office, in opposition to the Company; and surely it was the bounden duty of the Company, after procuring such an Act of Parliament, by which the property of third persons was to be affected, to see that no person should be appointed but upon giving ample security for the property to be entrusted to him; and if the Company has neglected to do this, to whom are the persons aggrieved

to look to for redress, but to the party that procured the Act of Parliament, and that are entitled to the whole revenue of India? If the Company had not procured the Act of Parliament in question, then the Registrar could not have got the possession of the property of the next of kin; and is it just and fair now for the Company to say to the public, We procured an Act of Parliament that entitles the Registrar to get possession of your property, but you shall have no security or any party responsible for it. How does it appear that the Judges have in any instance the appointment of the Registrar? The Act of the 39th and 40th of the King, by the authority of which a Court of Supreme Judicature at Madras was established, gives no such power; and certainly in the case of Mr. Ricketts, no such power was exercised by them; that gentleman was appointed by the Mayor and Aldermen of Madras, in direct opposition to Sir Thomas Strange; and it therefore follows, that if the appointment was really vested in the Judge, that the interference of the Company, or that of other persons acting under their authority in the appointment of Mr. Ricketts, makes the Company beyond all doubt responsible for his conduct to the public; and I have no doubt that I shall be able to shew that Mr. Ricketts was so appointed. I had it not in my power to protect my rights against Mr. Ricketts, when he got possession of my property under the Act of Parliament procured by the East India Company; would it not be cruel and unjust in the Company now to say, True it is we procured the Act of Parliament that gave Mr. Ricketts the power to get possession of your property, and in framing that law we took care that we should not be made responsible for his misconduct or embezzlement, and therefore we resist your claim. I will not believe that the East India Company can act in this way; on the contrary, I persuade myself that upon reconsideration it will be seen that I ask nothing that is not justly my due, and that the Court of Directors will accordingly order my demand to be discharged. How is it possible for the next of kin in Europe to intestates in India, to protect themselves from the injustice or dishonesty of Registrars, if there is no responsibility; and where is this responsibility to be looked for but in the Company, to whom the territorial possessions in India belong? or is the public to understand, that their property in India, under the authority of an Act of Parliament obtained by the Company, is to be destroyed and embezzled by the Registrar at his pleasure, and that the persons aggrieved are to have no redress? and will this be a likely way to increase public confidence in the East India Company? Sure I am that it will not; but I am equally sure, that if the Company should now step forward, and have justice done in respect to the embezzlement of Mr. Ricketts, that such an Act would raise the confidence of the public in the justice of the Company very high indeed. There is a part of my claim that certainly does not fall within the grounds laid by the Court of Directors for declining to comply with my Memorial: The Crown has nothing to do with appointing the Company's Treasurer at Madras, and for all his acts the Company is clearly and legally liable. There was in or about 3,800 pagodas, part of the assets of Colonel O'Reilly, lodged in the Company's Treasury; this has been paid out by the Treasurer to Mr. Ricketts. Now the Treasurer could not legally pay it over to him without an express order of the Court for that purpose, and the Court could not make any such order, except for the purpose of paying the ascertained debts of the intestate, verified by affidavit; and as no such debts were due or paid, it is quite clear that there could not be any order on the Treasury to pay over the money to Mr. Ricketts; and if paid without such an order, it follows, of course, that the East India Company is bound to make good the money so improperly paid. It does therefore appear to me, that look at this case fairly in any point of view, that I have a just claim upon the East India Company. But what renders the Company particularly responsible for Mr. Ricketts is, that by their interference or that of their officers, he was appointed in direct opposition to Sir Thomas Strange, and thereby it must be taken that the Company virtually became his sureties to the public for the due and honest discharge of his duty. The East India Company ought also to consider, that was it not for the Act of Parliament procured by them, the Registrar could not have the power of injuring the public. I understand, that by calling in the balances due by individual administrators to Government, or by means of a lottery or two, the East India Company could raise the necessary funds to discharge to the public the amount of Mr. Ricketts' embezzlements, without trenching on their own revenues; and would not this be far more just and equitable than to leave innocent third persons to suffer

suffer by the dishonesty of a public officer? I am aware that if the Court of Directors persist in refusing to do me the justice I consider myself so justly entitled to, that there is another course open to me to apply for redress; but I trust that the East India Company will render such a course unnecessary, by doing me that justice themselves.

AN application from the under-mentioned person, upon the subject of the credits and effects of the individual hereinafter named; viz.

Mr. Myles O'Reilly, on behalf of the estate of the late Lieut. Colonel Edward O'Reilly, of the Madras Establishment, was read;

Ordered, That the said application be referred to the consideration of the Committee of Correspondence.

Gentlemen,

It was my intention, in consequence of the answer I received from you through your Secretary, Mr. Dart, to the last representation I made to you on the foot of my claim on the assets of my late brother Col. Edward O'Reilly (acknowledged by your official return to have been received, and at one time in your treasury,) to have applied to Parliament, where I doubt not the justice of my case would command speedy redress; but being unwilling to resort to this strong measure without making another effort to obtain from your spontaneous justice that redress to which I feel I am so fairly entitled, that I have declined, notwithstanding the advice of my Parliamentary friends, to bring my case before Parliament this Session, being well aware that if I once brought it forward in the House of Commons, that my example would be followed by many others, circumstanced as I am with respect to the Company whose affairs you manage, and perhaps to its no small annoyance. It therefore now remains for your consideration, whether you will discharge my just and fair demand, or leave me to bring it before Parliament and the public, which I am fully determined to do in the ensuing Session in case you continue to refuse to do me that justice to which I am justly entitled. I do not by any means now address you with the view of holding out a threat of applying

to Parliament ; that would be unworthy both of you and me ; but I think that it would ill become me to proceed with such an application without first candidly communicating my intentions to you, and leaving it to your determination, whether it would not be more for the interest as well as the honour of the East India Company to settle my claim, rather than it should be brought before Parliament, and thereby set the example that no doubt would be followed by many others, and thereby cause you much trouble.

It is unnecessary for me here to go into a statement of my claim ; that is fully set out in the Memorial I presented to you in the year 1822, and to that I beg leave to refer you. Permit me, however, to observe, that the property received by an officer of your Government without the consent of the party to whom it belonged, and which must have been lodged in your Treasury, under an Act of Parliament procured by you, and under colour of which he could at all interfere with it, ought in justice be made good by the Company, the more especially as the money should not have been paid out of your Treasury to the Registrar without the express orders of the Court, and that only for the purpose of paying ascertained debts of the intestate ; and in justice, as between you who procured the Act of Parliament, and the Public, who were to be affected in their private property by it, you must be considered as the surety of your officer to the Public, into whose power you put their private property without their consent, and therefore ought to have taken especial care that the property was effectually secured for the right owners.

The objection made by you to my claim resolves itself into this, that the Registrar who got possession of my property was appointed by the Judge of the Supreme Court, and that the Judge was appointed by the Government, and that therefore the Registrar was not your officer, but was the officer of the Crown. Supposing this to have been the case, yet I do not see with what justice the East India Company can say that such an appointment exonerates it from making good the defalcation of an officer acting in the Territory and under the control of the Company upon the property of individuals under colour of an Act of Parliament obtained by the Company, without the consent of the parties to be affected by it ; as well might it be said, that because the Crown approves of or appoints the Judges in India or the officers of the army serving there, that the Company is not liable to the salary of the Judge or the pay of the officers, in case the Treasurer shall have handed over the amount, even without due authority, to some other person. But if this was not only a legal but a just and conscientious objection, the East India Company cannot shelter itself under it in respect to Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, for I am prepared to shew that he was not appointed by the Judge, but elected by certain officers of the Company ; and further I am prepared to shew that Colonel O'Reilly's assets were in the Treasury of the Company, and if the Treasurer paid them out to Mr. Ricketts or any other person, without the orders of the Court, and for the payment of ascertained debts, or those entitled as next of kin, the Company is clearly liable to make good the money so parted with by their Treasurer without legal authority. I therefore submit to you once more, that looking at this case in a fair point of view, that in honour, in justice and fair dealing, the Company is bound to make good my claim for principal and interest, and it may be, that doing me justice may be prudential with respect to the Company.

I understand from my Correspondent at Madras (a gentleman of the first respectability,) that the Company might, without any loss, make good the embezzlements of Mr. Ricketts by a Lottery, and applying the profits of it to the payment of the sums wasted by him.

The MEMORIAL of Myles O'Reilly, of the City of Dublin in Ireland, Esquire, the Brother and personal Representative of Edward O'Reilly, Esquire, deceased, late Lieutenant Colonel in the Honourable the East India Company's service;

Sheweth,—THAT Memorialist, in March 1822, presented a Memorial to the Court of Directors, as personal representative of Colonel O'Reilly, praying to be repaid a sum of 2,819*l*, 11*s*. 11*d*. with interest, which their servant, the late Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, as Register of the Supreme Court at Madras, got possession

of as official administrator to Colonel O'Reilly, who died intestate on service in the Presidency of Madras, and which he fraudulently converted to his own use, to the great injury of Memorialist.

To the Memorial so presented in March 1822, and to which your Memorialist now begs leave to refer, the Court of Directors was pleased, through Mr. Dart, the Secretary of the Court, to signify on the 8th of May 1822 to Memorialist, "that the Officers of His Majesty's Courts of Judicature in India were not appointed by the East India Company; that the Company was no way responsible for the acts of those officers; and that Memorialist's application to be paid the amount of the assets of the estate of the late Lieutenant Colonel O'Reilly, said to have been received by the late Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, as Register of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, could not be complied with."

That Memorialist little expected such a refusal to be given to a just and fair demand, by the Directors of the East India Company; and in consequence of the answer so given to his Memorial, Memorialist, on 10th June 1822, addressed a letter to the Court of Directors through the Secretary, Mr. Dart, demonstrating that Mr. Ricketts was not appointed by the King's Government, nor by the Chief Justice or Judges of the Supreme Court at Madras, as insinuated in Mr. Dart's letter, but that he was elected to the office by civil servants of the Company, in direct opposition to Sir Thomas Strange, then Chief Justice, who supported another gentleman, and this fact Memorialist is ready to prove, either before the Court of Directors, or at the bar of the House of Commons, if he shall be compelled to appeal to that House for redress; and thus the point made in the letter of the 8th of May 1822, written by Mr. Dart, by the command of the Court of Directors; to Memorialist, as an answer to his Memorial, fails entirely; and this appears to Memorialist as the only ground taken by the Court of Directors for so unlooked for a refusal to his just and equitable demand.

That supposing (but by no means admitting) the fact to be, that the King's Government appointed the Judges, and that the Chief Justice or Judges of the Court appointed the Register and other officers of the Court (though that certainly was not the way in which Mr. Ricketts was appointed) yet, as the East India Company have the entire control of the territory, revenue, and officers both civil and military serving in India, it is more reasonable that the Company rather than the King's Government should be responsible for the conduct of those officers to the public; the more so as the Act of the 39th and 40th of the late King was not a general law, but merely local, and confined to India, and passed without notice to those persons, either in India or Europe, that were, as it turns out to be, most grievously affected by it, and whose property was to be entrusted to the possession of an utter stranger without their consent or approbation; and therefore it became the bounden duty of the Directors to see that proper persons were appointed Registers, and gave adequate security for the trust reposed in them; and, neglecting these essential duties, the Company virtually became the security of the persons so appointed, and is in honour, justice and conscience, bound to make good the losses sustained by individuals by the dishonesty of a public officer acting under the control of the Company.

That independent of all other responsibility, the East India Company is liable to Memorialist for the amount of the money embezzled by Mr. Ricketts, for, Memorialist is ready to prove, from unerring documents, that the sums in question were lodged in the Company's Treasury *in usum jus habentio*, and that the Company's Treasurer paid over the money to Mr. Ricketts without any legal authority for doing so; for in all cases of the kind, the Treasurer has no right to pay a shilling to any person (much less to an administrator in trust) without the sanction of the order of the Court for that purpose, and the Court could not make such an order but upon proof that the money applied for was necessary to pay debts of the intestate previously ascertained and proved, and no such order having been obtained by Mr. Ricketts, the Treasurer of the Company had no right to give him the money in question; and, therefore, Memorialist relies upon it that the East India Company is bound to make good to Memorialist the money so improperly paid out of the Treasury, with interest for the same from the time it was lodged in the Company's Treasury to the present day.

That setting aside for the present whether the appointment of Mr. Ricketts was by the King's Government, or those acting under the authority of the East India Company, and the consequences attendant upon the manner of his appointment,

ment, it is clear that the East India Company is answerable for all money paid into the Treasury, and paid out again without legal and proper authority.

Memorialist would not willingly apply to any other tribunal than the Court of Directors; he seeks nothing but what he is in justice entitled to; but, if compelled, he must seek redress elsewhere; and he is certain that he will be able to find many others, circumstanced as he is, to join him, but hopes that the Court of Directors may render such a proceeding on his part unnecessary, by ordering him payment of his just demand.

The MEMORIAL of Myles O'Reilly, of the City of Dublin, in Ireland, Esquire, the Brother and personal Representative of Edward O'Reilly, Esquire, deceased, late a Lieutenant Colonel in the Honourable the East India Company's Service;

Sheweth,—THAT Memorialist's brother, the said Colonel O'Reilly, died intestate at Samnelcottah, in the Presidency of Madras, on service, in March 1816, leaving considerable personal property perfectly safe, if permitted to have remained as it stood at the time of his death, until Memorialist could legally demand it as his personal representative.

That upon the death of Colonel O'Reilly, Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, in virtue of an Act of Parliament of the 39th and 40th of the late King, became, as Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, official administrator of Colonel O'Reilly,

O'Reilly, and possessed himself of his assets, as after stated, without the consent of Memorialist, whose property those assets were, and converted to his own use Two thousand eight hundred and nineteen pounds eleven shillings and eleven pence sterling of said assets, and afterwards died in office insolvent.

That Mr. Ricketts having been placed by the Mayor and Aldermen of Madras, who were themselves appointed by the Government of India, in an office of great trust, in virtue of which he was empowered to get possession of the property of third persons without their knowledge or consent, the Government of India ought to have taken care that he gave ample security for the trust reposed in him, before he was permitted to enter upon the duties of the office; and Memorialist respectfully submits, that the Government of India is responsible for the conduct of a public officer appointed as Mr. Ricketts has been, to an office of public trust in a country under its government, and respectfully submits, that in this point of view (if there was nothing else in Memorialist's case) the Government of India is in conscience and justice bound to make good to Memorialist the said sum of £.2,819. 11s. 11d. and the interest for the same, so as aforesaid embezzled by a public functionary under the Government of India.

That your Memorialist respectfully submits as a strong fact in his case (and perhaps differing from all others that have suffered through the dishonesty of Mr. Ricketts) that the money so embezzled by him was lodged in the Company's treasury at Madras to the credit of the estate of Colonel O'Reilly *in usum jus habentio*, and that in all cases where money is so lodged it cannot be legally paid out without an order of the Court for that purpose obtained; and that Memorialist's money having been so lodged, and afterwards paid out of the treasury to Mr. Ricketts without any legal warrant or order of the Court for such payment, and the Treasurer who so paid out the same without warrant or legal authority, being an officer of the East India Company, Memorialist submits (if there was nothing else in his case) that the Government of India is bound to make good to Memorialist the money, together with the interest thereof, so lodged in and afterwards paid out of the treasury to Mr. Ricketts without any legal warrant of law for such payment.

That Memorialist in March 1822, and again in March 1825, memorialized this Court (to which Memorials he begs leave to refer,) requesting payment of the said sum of £. 2,819. 11s. 11d. and the interest thereof from the time the same was lodged in the treasury; and this Court having refused to comply with the prayers of said Memorial, your Memorialist can only attribute such refusal of his just and fair demands, to this Court not having been well informed of the facts and circumstances attending his claim; and therefore, and being willing, if possible, to avoid the necessity of appealing to any other tribunal for redress, he again solicits this Court, notwithstanding the former refusals given to his applications, to re-consider and inquire into his case, when he doubts not that this Court will find good reason to alter its former opinion; but, in case this Court shall, contrary to the expectations of Memorialist, continue of its former opinion, he respectfully requests this Court will state if its determination is founded on a denial of all, or any, and which of the facts here stated, or upon what other ground this Court refuses to yield to Memorialist's just and fair demand.

Memorialist respectfully prays the Court of Directors to re-consider his just and fair claim, and direct payment to be made to him of the said sum of £.2,819. 11s. 11d. sterling with interest thereon from the year 1816, when the principal was lodged in the Treasury and paid out without any warrant or legal authority, to Mr. Ricketts, by the Treasurer of the East India Company.

THE Petition of Mr. Robert Sinclair, representing that Mr. Ricketts, the late Register of the Supreme Court at Madras, administered to the estate of his brother the late Captain Charles Sinclair, and that in consequence of Mr. Ricketts having died insolvent, the whole of the property has been lost ; and soliciting the Court to make good such loss,—being read ;

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to the consideration of the Committee of Correspondence.

To the Honourable the Directors of the East India Company,

The humble Petition of Robert Sinclair of Hersham, near Esher, Gentleman,

Humbly Sheweth,—THAT your Petitioner's brother, Charles Sinclair, was sometime Master Attendant at Ganjam, in the Presidency of Madras, where he died intestate, leaving your Petitioner his sole next of kin, and as such entitled to whatever personal property belonged to him. That your Petitioner not having had early or regular information of his death, took the liberty of applying to your Honourable

Honourable Board, on the 24th of April 1823, and received an answer from your Secretary, Mr. Dart, dated the 8th of next month, saying, that your Petitioner's brother dying intestate, letters of administration to his estate were granted in 1816 to the late Mr. Ricketts, as Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, and that officer having omitted to file an account current of the estate of Captain Sinclair, the Court of Directors were unable to give your Petitioner any information of the amount of property. In consequence of this answer, it was thought right for your Petitioner to use all the means in his power to seek after the property; he therefore sent a Power of Attorney to the respectable house of Messrs. Burny and Co. at Madras, whose answer was dated the 24th of April 1824, viz. We now inclose copy of the Estate Account taken from the late Registrar's books by the succeeding Registrar, P. Cleghorn, showing a balance at credit of Captain Sinclair, of Eight thousand nine hundred and eighty-nine pagodas and a fraction, but which we fear is totally irrecoverable, unless Government, or the Company, come forward and relieve the parties involved by the late Register's insolvency. In consequence of this, your Petitioner was further advised to apply to the Honourable Board of Control, which was done on the 25th of January 1825, and an answer received, dated 7th January 1827, saying, That they were induced under all the circumstances of the case, which was a case of injury suffered through the proceedings of an officer of the Court of Judicature, to recommend a Petition to the King in Council, for such relief as His Majesty might be advised to afford. This was done by your Petitioner, with a copy of the account, on the 13th of February 1827, and an answer received, at the Council Office on the 27th of that month, referring him to the Right Honourable the Lords of the Treasury, to whom he applied on the 7th of March, and 17th of October, and received an answer from them, dated the 31st of October, That while they lamented the hardship of the case, they were unable to grant any relief. Under these circumstances, your Petitioner, with deep concern, is under the necessity of informing your Honourable Board, that the disappointment by not receiving this money has been most unfortunate, having led him into embarrassments which he has no means of getting clear of, unless your Honourable Board will generously make good the loss brought down upon him by the insolvency of the Company's servant, which he humbly hopes you will do at an early opportunity, to save him from utter ruin, at a very old age; and, as in duty bound, he will ever pray, &c.

EXTRACT, Madras Government Gazette, Thursday, 18th December 1817.

In the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, 15th December 1817.

IN the matter of suitors money and of the estates of deceased persons which have come to the hands of the late Gilbert Ricketts, Esquire, either as Registrar of this Court, or as Administrator under the statute;—

IT is ordered, That John Shaw, Esquire, the present Registrar of this Court, George Garrow, Esquire, the present Accountant General of this Court, Sir Samuel Toller, Knight, Advocate General to the Company, Henry Byrne, Esquire, Barrister at Law, and Robert Orme, Esquire, Solicitor to the Company, be appointed, and they are hereby appointed Commissioners for the purpose of inquiring into and investigating all accounts of the late Registrar relative to suitors money, and to the estates of deceased persons which have come into his hands; and that they do investigate the same accordingly; and that they do examine all necessary books, papers and documents, and also the records of this Court relative thereto, and that they be at liberty to call before them all such persons as they may think necessary, and examine them on oath touching the matters aforesaid, should they think it requisite; and that they make their report to the Court thereon with all convenient expedition. And it is further ordered, That the said Commissioners shall be at liberty to apply to the Court for further directions as they may deem expedient, and that all persons who are interested be at liberty to attend before the said Commissioners, who will commence their sitting at the Registrar's office at the Court House on Monday next the 22d instant. And it is further ordered, That this Order be published in the Government Gazette.

Ordo Curiae, the 25th November 1817.

WHEREAS it is of the utmost concern and importance to the suitors of the Court that their money, securities and effects should be preserved and secured for their benefit, in the most careful and effectual manner: And whereas the same will be most safely deposited and kept in the hands of the Governor or President and Council of Fort St. George in the Public Treasury, with the cash and effects belonging to the said Company, subject to such orders as the Court shall make from time to time for the benefit of the suitors:

And whereas the good and salutary rules heretofore made, with a view to attain these desirable objects, may in some respects have been misunderstood, and may require further explanation:

It is therefore ordered by the Court, That whenever any order or decree shall be made by the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, for the payment or delivering into Court, or to the Governor or President and Council at Fort St. George, or into the Honourable Company's Treasury, of any money, effects or securities of any suitors of the Court or parties interested therein, the order of the Court with the seal of the Court affixed thereto, signed by the Register, and countersigned by one of the Judges of the Court, shall be taken out of the proper office by the suitor or suitors or party or parties who shall be ordered to make such payments or deposits, or his or their attornies or agents lawfully authorized, and shall be brought by him or them to the Accountant General of the Court; and that the said Accountant General shall make an entry thereof in his book to be by him kept causewise of all suitors' money, securities and deposits in each cause, which book is to be kept in his office, and at all times, within office hours, to be open to the suitors of the Court or other parties interested, for their inspection; and he shall mark *intratur*; or entered at the foot of the said order, and subscribe his name thereto; and

and the Accountant General shall certify in his proper hand writing, and with his name thereto subscribed at the foot of the said order to the Sub-Treasurer or other officer acting for the Treasurer, that he is to receive from the party mentioned in the said order the sum of money, effects or securities mentioned in the said order, specifying the amount and particulars thereof, and to place the same to the account of the cause in which the same is ordered to be deposited in the book of suitors money and deposits kept by the Sub-Treasurer or other officer acting for the Treasurer in the Honourable Company's Treasury and that the Accountant General shall deliver the said sealed order, with the certificate thereon, to the party who is to make the payment or deposit into the Honourable Company's Treasury, who shall deliver the same, together with the sum of money, effects or securities mentioned in the said order and certificate, to be by him paid into the Honourable Company's Treasury to the Sub-Treasurer or other officer acting for the Treasurer in the Honourable Company's Treasury, who shall receive the same, and enter the said order and certificate in his book, and the said Sub-Treasurer or other officer acting for the Treasurer, shall thereupon give the party a receipt or certificate for the said money, effects or securities so deposited in the Honourable Company's Treasury on account of the Governor or President and Council of Fort St. George, or of the Honourable Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies; and the party who shall make such deposit, or his agent or attorney lawfully authorized, shall, within two days after payment of the said money, effects or securities into the Honourable Company's Treasury, bring the said receipt or certificate to the Accountant General of the Court, who shall enter the same in his book and file the same in his office of record; and the said Accountant General shall thereupon give the party a certificate or make a report in writing, that pursuant to the order in that particular cause, specifying the date thereof, the party had paid into the Honourable Company's Treasury the sum of money, effects or securities mentioned therein, and shall annex thereto an examined copy of the receipt of the Sub-Treasurer or other officer acting for the Treasurer, which certificate or report, and a copy of such receipt, the party or his agent or attorney lawfully authorized, shall, within three days after payment or deposit into the Treasury, file in the Register's office, and the Register shall make an entry thereof in his book to be by him kept causewise of all suitors money, effects and securities which shall be ordered to be paid into or out of the Honourable Company's Treasury; and the Register shall file the said certificate or report of the Accountant General of record to which all suitors or parties interested may have recourse, and inspect the same at office hours; and that all sums of money that shall be so paid into the Honourable Company's Treasury, shall bear interest for the benefit of the suitors and other parties interested, from the time of the respective payments into the Treasury and from the date of the Sub-Treasurer's receipt for the same.

And it is further ordered, That when any money, effects or securities of the suitors of the Court, or parties interested, shall be ordered to be paid or delivered out of the Honourable Company's Treasury, the sealed order, signed by the Register and countersigned by one of the Judges of the Court, shall be brought by the suitors or party interested, or his agent or attorney lawfully authorized, to the Accountant General of the Court, who shall enter the same in his book and mark the same *intratur*, or entered on the said order; and the Accountant General shall give a certificate at the foot of the said order directed to the Sub-Treasurer or other officer acting for the Treasurer, stating that pursuant to the said order the Sub-Treasurer, or other officer acting for the Treasurer, is to pay or deliver out of the Honourable Company's Treasury, to the party interested or entitled thereto, or to his agent or attorney lawfully authorized, the money, effects or securities mentioned in the said order, specifying the particulars, of which he shall make an entry in his book, and the Accountant General shall deliver the said order and certificate to the party entitled, who shall give a receipt for the said order and certificate to the Accountant General; and the party, or his agent or attorney lawfully authorized, shall bring the said sealed order and certificate to the Honourable Company's Treasury, and the Sub-Treasurer shall, pursuant to the said order and certificate of the Accountant General of the Court, pay out or deliver to the said party, or his agent or attorney lawfully authorized, the money, effects or securities mentioned in such order and certificate; and the party, or his agent or attorney lawfully authorized, shall thereupon give a receipt for the same to the Sub-Treasurer, or other officer acting for the Treasurer, which order, certificate and receipt

he shall file of record, and that the said order, certificate and receipt shall be a sufficient voucher for and acquittance to the said Company or their officers for any sum of money, effects or securities so paid over to the party entitled, or to his attorney lawfully authorized to receive the same, under such order and certificate; and that the Register, upon the issuing of any order of the Court for the payment or delivering into or out of the Honourable Company's Treasury of any money, effects or securities of the suitors, shall make an entry of such order in his book to be by him kept of suitors money and deposits, and shall enter *in-tratur* at the foot of such order, subscribed with his name and proper hand writing thereto, before the delivery of the same to the party, his agent or attorney.

And it is further ordered, That the Accountant General of the Court and Register shall each keep a book causewise of all money, effects and securities of the suitors of the Court or parties interested, which shall be ordered to be paid or delivered into or out of the Honourable Company's Treasury, under the orders of the Court, to which all parties interested may have recourse and inspect the same at office hours; and they shall once in every month diligently compare the same with each other, and also compare the same with the book to be kept by the Sub-Treasurer, or other officer acting for the Treasurer at the Honourable Company's Treasury, of suitors money, effects or securities, ordered to be deposited in the said Treasury; and that the said Accountant General of the Court shall duly keep and settle his accounts of all suitors money, effects and securities ordered to be deposited in the Honourable Company's Treasury, and of all receipts and payments on account thereof, with the several persons, and in the manner specified and directed by the clause relating thereto in the Charters of Justice of Madras; and that a duplicate of such account, duly signed and authenticated, shall be delivered in open Court and filed on record in the Register's office on the first day of the second and fourth terms in each year, to which all persons interested may have recourse, and inspect the same at office hours. And it is further ordered by the Court, That the Accountant General of the Court shall not meddle with the actual receipt of any of the money or effects of any of the suitors, but shall only do all things necessary to carry into execution the orders of the said Supreme Court relative to the payment or delivery of the suitors money, effects and securities to the Governor or President and Council of the said United Company of Fort St. George, and taking the same out again, and keeping the accounts thereof with the said Governor or President and Council and the Register of the Court, and other matters relating thereto, pursuant to the directions for that purpose in the said Charters of Justice; and that neither the Register of the Court or any officer of the Court shall in any way intermeddle with the actual receipt of any money, effects or securities which shall be ordered by any order or decree of the Court to be deposited into or paid or delivered out of the Honourable Company's Treasury by or to the suitors or other persons.

And it is further ordered, That the above rules be henceforward observed and kept, subject to such future rules, methods and directions as shall from time to time hereafter be made and given relative thereto, and as circumstances may require or render necessary.

By the existing regulations in Bengal, the produce of the effects of deceased officers and soldiers (which is first taken charge of by the commanding officer of the regiment or corps to which the deceased belonged) is deposited in our Treasury, to await the claims of the representatives of the deceased; and we direct that the same rule be established at your Presidency, and that annual statements of such deposits be transmitted to us.

2. Previously to the amount of the estate of a deceased officer being paid into the Treasury, it is to be ascertained by the officer in charge of the property, whether the Honourable Company has any demand against the deceased; for which purpose he will communicate to the Military Paymaster General the amount in his hands, and retain that amount till the receipt of a reply from the Military Paymaster General, who, if any claim exists, will specify the sum to be retained on account of the Company; and the remainder shall be paid by the officer having charge into the Treasury.

3. The Sub-Treasurer at the Presidency shall receive all such sums as may be tendered to him in consequence of the foregoing order.

4. For the convenience of those officers who may have to remit unclaimed dividends of estates from the out-stations, all Paymasters are hereby directed to receive such sums as may be tendered to them on that account, and to grant bills on the Military Paymaster General at the Presidency, at five days' sight, drawn in favour of the Sub-Treasurer, specifying in the body of the bill, the officer from whom the money is received, as also the estate on account of which it is paid.

5. The bill so granted will be forwarded by the officer paying in the money to the Sub-Treasurer at the Presidency, who has directions to grant receipts for the same, and to return them by tappall to the officer forwarding the bill.

I HAVE laid before the Court of Directors of the East India Company, your Letter of the 30th ultimo, on the subject of the losses which have been sustained in consequence of the insolvency of the late Mr. G. Ricketts, the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras; and in accordance with the desire expressed by the Board to be furnished with any information which the records of this House may afford, whether Mr. Ricketts left any property and how it was disposed of, I am directed to transmit you the enclosed extract from the Schedules of the estates of deceased persons, committed to the charge of the Registrar of the Supreme Court, by which it appears that letters of administration of the effects of Mr. Ricketts were granted by that Court, on 26th January 1818, and 22d August 1818, to Mr. John Shaw, the then Registrar, by which it appears that the balance realized by him from Mr. Rickett's estate, was about 51,000 M^o rupees.

With reference to the opinion expressed by the Board, that the advice of the Company's Standing Counsel should be taken as to the legal liability arising out of the transactions in question; I am directed to forward to you the accompanying copy of a Case, which was laid before Mr. Serjeant Bosanquet, in the year 1820, together with his Opinion thereon.

THE Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, was established under the authority of an Act of 39 & 40 George III, c. 79, which contains the following clause:

“ And whereas great inconveniences have arisen from the practice of granting Letters of Administration by the said Court of Judicature at Fort William aforesaid, in cases where the next of kin, or any of the creditors of the deceased do not apply for the same, to persons calling themselves friends of the deceased; Be it therefore further Enacted, That from and after the first day of March, which will be in the year of our Lord 1801, whenever any British subject shall die intestate within either of the Presidencies of Fort William, Fort St. George or Bombay, or the territories subordinate to either of the said Presidencies or to become subordinate thereto, and on return of the citation to be issued from the proper Ecclesiastical Court, no next of kin or creditor shall appear and make out their claim to the administration of the effects of the intestate deceased to the satisfaction of the said Court; it shall and may be lawful for the Registrar of such Court respectively, and he is hereby required, to apply for, and such Court is hereby required and directed to grant such letters *ad colligenda* or of administration, as to such Court shall seem meet, by virtue whereof such Registrar shall collect the assets of the deceased, and shall bring them for safe custody into such Court, and account for them regularly in like manner as is now by law provided, in cases where assets are vested in the hands of any officer of the Court, under or by virtue of the equitable jurisdiction of any such Court: Provided always, and be it further Enacted, That when any next of kin or creditor who at the time of the above citation, shall have been absent in Europe or elsewhere, shall make and establish their claim to the administration of the assets of such intestate, the letters *ad colligenda* or of administration, granted by virtue of this Act to the said Registrar, shall be recalled, and administration in due form granted to such next of kin or creditor respectively.”

The Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, was erected in pursuance of the provisions of the Act above referred to; by letters patent dated 26 December 1800, by which the appointment of clerks, registrars and other ministerial offices is vested in the Supreme Court, who were to settle the fees they were to receive, subject to the approbation of the Governors of Fort St. George in Council. The Court was invested with an Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, with powers to grant letters of administration of the effects of persons dying intestate; and it is directed that every person to whom such letters of administration shall be committed, other than the said Registrar of the said Court, taking administration under the authority of the said Act above referred to, give security by bond, with two sureties.

The following is the provision, made in the letters patent for safe custody of the suitors money or effects: “And we further order and ordain, that all the monies, securities and effects of the suitors of the said Court, which shall be ordered into Court, or to be paid delivered or deposited for safe custody, shall be paid or delivered into or deposited with the Governor or President and Council at Fort St. George, to be by them kept and deposited with the cash and effects of the said Company, subject to such orders and directions as the said Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, shall from time to time think fit to make concerning the same for the benefit of the suitors. The said United Company being responsible for the said monies, securities and effects, in such manner and subject to the same exceptions as is mentioned in the said in part recited Charter of our said Royal Grandfather, with respect to the monies, securities or effects to be deposited with the said Governor or President and Council, under the authority of the Mayor's Court thereby erected.” And we do for us, our heirs and successors, give and grant unto the Court of Directors of the said Company or the major part of them, full power and authority from time to time to nominate and appoint an officer, under the name of the Accountant General of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, and the same at their pleasure to remove and another to appoint, who shall act, perform and do all matters necessary to carry into execution the orders of the said Court, relating to the payment or delivery of the suitors money, effects and securities, unto the Governor or President and Council of the said United Company of Fort St. George, and taking the same out again, and keeping the accounts with the

said Governor and Council, and Registrar of the said Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, and other matters relating thereto, under such rules, methods and directions as shall from time to time be made and given, under the hands of thirteen or more of the Courts of Directors of the said Company, which rules, methods and directions, we will and direct shall be according to such rules, methods and directions, as are observed by the Accountant General of our High Court of Chancery in Great Britain, or as near thereto as may be, and as the situation and circumstances of affairs will permit." "And whereas by An Act passed in the 39th and 40th year of the reign of his present Majesty, intituled, an Act for establishing further regulations of the Government of the British territories in India, and for the better administration of Justice within the same: It was enacted among other things, That whenever any British subject should die intestate, within either of the Presidencies of Fort William, Fort St. George or Bombay, or the territories subordinate or to become subordinate thereto, and on return of the citation to be issued from the proper Ecclesiastical Court, no next of kin or creditor should appear and make out their claim to the administration of the effects of the intestate, to the satisfaction of the said Court, it should and might be lawful for the Registrar of such Court, and he was hereby required to apply for, and such Court was hereby directed to grant letters *ad colligenda* or of administration to such Registrar, in manner as in the said Act set forth; and whereas the said Act doth not expressly provide for the cases of executors or administrators or persons entitled to administration, as hereinafter mentioned, not resident within the jurisdiction of such Courts, who may have appointed attornies resident or being resident therein; and it hath been doubted whether the said Courts were not required, under the said Act to grant letters *ad colligenda* or of administration to their Registrars, in preference to attornies so appointed, and it is fit that such doubts should be removed; Be it therefore Enacted and Declared, That when the executor or administrator lawfully appointed, or the person entitled to administration as next of kin or residuary legatee, with the will annexed, of any person deceased, whose effects shall be subject to the jurisdiction of any of the said Courts, in respect to the granting of administration, not being resident within the jurisdiction of such Court, shall have appointed, or shall hereafter appoint, either by Power of Attorney, under seal, or by any other sufficient authority, to be shown to the satisfaction of the said Court, any person or persons resident or being within such jurisdiction, to act for such executor or administrator or person entitled to administration as aforesaid, in collecting or administering in any manner the effects of the deceased; the person or persons so appointed shall be entitled to obtain letters *ad colligenda* or of administration, either general or special, as the of such authority and the nature of the case may require preferably to the Registrar of such Court, and all other persons to whom such executors or administrators or persons entitled as aforesaid, would have had a preferable claim, if personally resident within the jurisdiction of the said Court.

"And be it further Enacted, That where any such letters *ad colligenda* or of administration shall have been granted to the Registrar of such Court, and application shall be afterwards made by any person or persons so appointed as aforesaid for the revocation thereof, in order to grant other letters to such person or persons, the letters so granted to such Registrar shall be revoked, unless it shall appear to the said Court that there has been unreasonable delay, either in the transmission of the authority under which such application is made, or in making such application: Provided always, that when any letters *ad colligenda* or of administration shall have been actually granted to the Registrar of any such Court, by virtue of the Act hereinbefore recited, and shall be revoked on the application of any such attorney or attornies as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for such Court, if they shall think fit, to direct that the whole or a part of any commission in respect to administration of assets, which may arise or become due by virtue of any reasonable custom obtaining within the jurisdiction of such Court, shall be allowed to such Registrar out of any assets which may have come to his hands, regard being had to the trouble and responsibility actually incurred, and to the service rendered by the said Registrar in the collection of such assets: Provided also, that nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to render necessary the taking out of letters *ad colligenda* or of administration from any of the Courts aforesaid, by any such attorney or attornies otherwise than it would have been if this Act had not been made; and that no claim or right to any such commission

in respect of administration of effects as aforesaid, shall be deemed to accrue to any such attorney or attorneys by reason of letters *ad colligenda* or of administration, taken out by him or them by virtue of such authority as aforesaid, nor any other or than by virtue of such authority as aforesaid, nor any other or further commission than would have been payable to him or them as agents, either according to the usual and reasonable rates of such an agency or by special agreement: Provided also, and be it further Enacted, That the Act shall not or any thing herein contained in anywise prejudice or affect the rights, claims, actions suits or appeals of any person or persons being entitled or claiming to be entitled, either as principal or principals, attorney or attorneys, to the probate or probates of any will or wills, codicil or codicils or letters *ad colligenda*, or of administration of the goods, chattels and effects of any person or persons who shall have died before the passing of this Act, nor the rights, claims, suits or appeals of any person or persons claiming or suing, or to claim or sue for the recall or repeal of any letters *ad colligenda* or administration granted of the goods, chattels or effects of any person or persons who shall have died before the passing of this Act, which may have been or shall be granted to any such Registrar as hereinbefore mentioned, nor to the rights, claims and actions, suits or appeals of any person or persons claiming or to claim as executors, legatees or next of kin of any person or persons who shall have died before the passing of this Act, in any way relating to the goods, chattels, property, estate or effects of such deceased person or persons, or to the transactions, acts, deeds, neglects, defaults, intermeddlings or accounts of any such Registrars, relating to any such goods, chattels, and property, estate or effects, or under or by virtue of any letters of administration *colligenda*, or of administration which may have been granted to him; nor in any way to entitle any such Registrar to any commission, compensation or allowance in respect of any thing done or to be done by him in relation to the goods, chattels, effects, debts or credits of any person or persons who shall have died before the passing of the Act, which he would not have been entitled to if this Act had not been passed; but every person being entitled to or claiming any such probate or probates, letters *ad colligenda* or of administration, or to have any such letters *ad colligenda* or of administration recalled or repealed, or having or being entitled to, or claiming or to claim any such cause or causes of action, suit or appeal, shall be entitled thereto, and all benefit and advantage thereof, and to prosecute and carry on the same in the same manner as he or she or they would have been entitled to if this Act had not been passed.

“ And be it further Enacted, That in all cases in which the Registrar of any of the said Courts shall be appointed Administrator under the aforesaid Act, besides filing an Inventory and Account Current according to the tenor of the Administration Bond and the usual course of the Ecclesiastical Court, he shall enter into a book to be kept by him for that purpose, separate and distinct accounts of such estate, and of all such sums of money, bonds and other securities for money, goods, effects and things as shall come to his hands, or to the hands of any person employed by him or in trust for him, by virtue of any letters *ad colligenda* or of administration, granted to him under the authority of the said Act; and likewise all payments made by him, or in trust for him by virtue of any letters *ad colligenda* or of administration granted to him under the authority of the said Act; and likewise all payments made by him for or on account of the estates, and of all debts due by or to the same, specifying the dates of such receipts and payments respectively, which said book shall be kept in the Registrar's Office, and shall be open for the inspection of all persons practitioners in the said Courts, or others as may have occasion to inspect the same at office hours, paying such reasonable fee as may be fixed therefore by the said Courts, and no more; and the said Registrar shall twice in every year, that is on the 14th day of March and the 22d day of October, or on the day after those days, on which their respective Courts shall be sitting, exhibit and deliver in open Court a true and perfect Schedule of all sums of money, bonds or other securities received on account of each estate remaining under their charge, together with the payment thereon, and the balances, and also of all administrations whereof the balances shall have been paid over to the persons entitled to the same since the period of exhibiting the last Schedule, specifying the amount of such balances, and the persons to whom paid, which Schedule shall be filed of record in the said Courts, and shall within fourteen days afterwards be published in the Gazettes of the Presidencies within which such Courts are respectively situated, by the said Registrar, who shall likewise cause

copies thereof in triplicate to be delivered to the Chief Secretary at such Presidency, and the same shall be transmitted by the respective Governments at such Presidencies to the Court of Directors of the East India Company, who upon the receipt thereof shall cause the same to be published in The London Gazette."

Gilbert Ricketts, Esq. now deceased, was appointed by the Supreme Court at Madras, the Registrar thereof; and under the authority of the Acts of 39 and 40 Geo. 3, and 55 Geo. 3, letters of administration of the effects of many persons were granted to him as Registrar; and at the time of his death, he had in his hands very large sums of money belonging to the estates under his charge as administrator; the monies were not deposited in the Company's Treasury, or placed under the care of the Accountant General. He died insolvent, and a very great loss must arise to the parties beneficially entitled to the money and effects in his hands as Administrator and Registrar. Your Opinion is requested, whether the East India Company is liable to make good to the parties interested, any Deficiency of Mr. Rickett's Assets to satisfy the monies and effects of deceased persons which were in his hands as Administrator and Registrar.

I AM of Opinion that the East India Company is not liable to make good to the parties interested, any Deficiency of Mr. Ricketts' Assets, to satisfy the monies and effects of deceased persons which were in his hands as Administrator and Registrar; Mr. Ricketts not having been an Officer appointed by the East India Company, and the monies which came to his hands not having been deposited in the Company's Treasury, or placed under the care of the Accountant General, who is their officer, I think that no liability has been incurred on their part.

Sir, 27th April 1825.

WITH reference to your Letter of the 7th instant, transmitting two documents connected with the claims against the estate of the late Mr. Ricketts, Registrar of the Supreme Court at Madras; I am directed by the Commissioners for the Affairs of India to acquaint you, that they are desirous of obtaining some further information on the subject.

They wish to know the date of Mr. Ricketts' appointment to the Registrarship to the Supreme Court at Madras.

They are desirous of an explanation concerning two statements contained in the Extract from Schedules transmitted in your letter; first, with respect to the sum of Madras rupees 51,267. 1. 9., stated as balance in cash appertaining to the estate of Mr. Ricketts; they wish to know how that property has been disposed of; and, secondly, with regard to the sum of Madras rupees 47,482. 12. 6., stated as amount of payments made out of the estate of Mr. Ricketts, they are desirous of learning the nature of those payments and to whom those payments were made, whether to the private or the public creditors of Mr. Ricketts.

I am desired to add, that as the Case and Opinion transmitted in your letter is confined to the liability of the Company, the Board think it desirable that the case be submitted to the Company's standing Counsel in a more general form; and that Mr. Bosanquet be asked, Whether any and what party is liable to be called upon to indemnify the public creditors of the late Mr. Ricketts; and also (as suggested in my former letter) what steps it may be proper to take in consequence of the applications which appear to have been made to the Court as well as to the Board.

IN reply to the inquiries contained in your Letter of the 27th ultimo, I am ordered by the Court of Directors of the East India Company to inform you, that the Company's records contain no information as to the date or manner of Mr. Ricketts' appointment to the Registrarship to the Supreme Court at Madras.

It appears, however, by the lists of passengers to Madras in April 1801, that Mr. G. M. Ricketts left England in that month by the ship "Asia," and arrived at Madras on the 29th July in that year; and it appears by the accompanying extract from the Madras Gazette of the 5th September 1801, that on the preceding day His Majesty's Charter, constituting the Supreme Court, was publicly read and proclaimed; and that the Judges having taken the usual oaths of office, the Court then proceeded to the nomination of its officers, amongst whom Mr. G. Ricketts is named as Prothonotary and Registrar.

This Extract will be found in the second Case laid before Mr. Serjeant Bosanquet.

The Court of Directors are unable to furnish the Board with any explanation of the Statements contained in the Extract from the Schedules transmitted in my letter of the 7th ultimo. The Indian Governments are in the habit of transmitting to the Court of Directors for public information, Copies of the inventories and accounts filed in His Majesty's Courts in India by executors or administrators, to whom probates or letters of administration are granted by those Courts; but of the mode in which the parties so appointed apply the property committed to their administration the Court of Directors are wholly uninformed.

In conformity with the Board's suggestion, the Court have directed that a Case shall be laid before the Company's standing Counsel, for his opinion upon the general question proposed in your letter.

Copy of a CASE submitted for the Opinion of Mr. Serjeant Bosanquet, together with his Opinion thereon, dated June 7th, 1825; received from the East India House, October 22d, 1825.

THE Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras was established under the authority of an Act 39 &c. 40 Geo. 3d, cap. 79, which contains the following Clause, &c. [as in the case of March 11th, 1820. to] "who upon the receipt thereof shall cause the same to be published in the London Gazette."

On the 4th of September 1801, the Charter was publicly read and proclaimed at Madras; the Company's records contain no information as to the appointment of any of its officers, but by the following Extract from the Madras Gazette of the 5th September 1801, it appears that Gilbert Ricketts, Esquire, (who it appears had arrived at Madras from England on the 29th July preceding) was then appointed by the Supreme Court the Registrar thereof.

EXTRACT from the Madras Gazette of the 5th Sept. 1801.

"Yesterday His Majesty's Charter constituting a new Court of Judicature under the title of the "Supreme Court at Madras, was publicly read and proclaimed.

"After the publication of His Majesty's Letters Patent, the Honourable Sir T. A Strange took the usual oaths of office as the First Chief Justice, and the Honourable Mr. Justice Gwillim and the Honourable Mr. Justice Sullivan as the two first puisne Judges of the Supreme Court.

"The Court then proceeded to the nomination of its officers, when S. D. Totton, was appointed Clerk of the Crown and Registrar of the Court of Admiralty, G. Ricketts, Esq. Prothonotary and Registrar, &c. &c."

Under the authority of the Acts of 39 & 40 Geo. 3d., and 55 Geo. 3d., Letters of Administration of the effects of many persons were granted to Mr. Ricketts, as Registrar, and at the time of his death he had in his hands very large sums of money belonging to the estates under his charge as Administrator; the monies were not deposited in the Company's Treasury, nor placed under the care of the Accountant General; he died insolvent, and very great loss must thereby arise to the parties beneficially entitled to the money and effects in his hands as Administrator and Registrar; several of whom have made applications upon the subject, both to the Court of Directors of the East India Company and to the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India.

Your Opinion is requested,—Whether any or what party is liable to be called upon to indemnify the public creditors of the late Mr. Ricketts, and what steps it will be proper to take in consequence of the applications which have been made on the part of the creditors?

It does not appear to me, after fully considering this case, that any one is liable to be called upon to indemnify the persons who may have sustained the loss in consequence of the deficiency in Mr. Rickett's accounts as Registrar of the Supreme Court at Madras, but the personal representatives of Mr. Ricketts, in respect of assets which may have come to their hands.

Mr. Ricketts was not an officer of the East India Company, and as the money was not paid by him into the Treasury, as directed by the Charter of Justice, the Company cannot be responsible for the deficiency; Mr. Ricketts was appointed by the Supreme Court pursuant to the power given by charter for that purpose; but the Members of the Court by whom he was appointed, or under whom he continued to act, are not responsible for his personal misconduct as an officer of such Court. It is not suggested in the Case, that the appointment of Mr. Ricketts was attended with any arrangement by which profit accrued to those who appointed him, or that his conduct has been in any way connived at by those who had authority over him.

The omission to take security cannot, I think, be imputed to the Court as matter of blame, since the Charter which requires that security should be given by administrators in general, excepts the Registrar from the necessity of giving such security. Whether Mr. Ricketts ever complied with the directions of the 55th Geo. 3d, c. 84, s. 5, is not stated; but as he died in 1817 the Act had not been very long in operation at the time of his death; and unless the attention of the Court was called to his omission, they cannot justly be charged with the consequences of his neglect.

In the case of the deficiencies which occurred in the accounts of the masters in Chancery in 1725, it was not suggested that any person but the masters themselves were civilly answerable to the suitors for those deficiencies. In the impeachment against Lord Macclesfield, his neglect to cause proper schedules of the transfer and delivery of the suitors' money to be taken, or to appoint proper persons to inspect or supervise the transfers and deliveries, was charged against him criminally in the 12th article, but that charge was mixed up with the imputation of a corrupt intention to increase the value of the offices with a view to his own profit in selling the same. Having been found guilty upon the whole impeachment generally, he was fined £.30,000, which sum, pursuant to an Address of the House of Commons, was applied by his Majesty towards the relief of the suitors. In addition to this sum a fund was provided by Parliament by the imposition of new Stamp duties for 16 years, with power to the Court of Chancery to borrow money upon it to the extent of £.60,000, to be paid into the Bank for the benefit of the suitors; power was also given to the Lord Chancellor to determine the claims upon the two deceased and three surviving masters whose accounts were deficient, in the most compendious and summary way, and to cause to be done therein what was equitable and just, and the three surviving masters were made debtors to the Crown for the amount of the balances due from them, so as to subject their lands as well as goods and chattels to the process of the Crown for the benefit of the suitors.

It appears from the papers that have been furnished in addition to the above case, that Mr. Ricketts died on the 4th December 1817; that administration *ad colligenda* was committed on the 26th January 1818 to Mr. Shaw the Registrar who succeeded him; that the administration to Mr. Shaw *ad colligenda* was revoked and administration of the assets of Mr. Ricketts was committed to the Registrar for the time being on the 22d August 1818.

By the Schedule of the administration it also appears, that on the 17th July 1820, a sum in Madras rupees of 98,749. 14*a*. 3*p*. had been received by the administration on account of the estate, out of which payments had been made to the amount of Madras rupees 47,482. 12*a*. 6*p*., that there remained of claims unsatisfied, Madras rupees 461,164. 9*a*. 5*p*. due to private creditors, and Madras rupees 791. 0*a*. 3*p*. due to the administration; and that the amount in the Company's Treasury was Madras rupees 52,058. 2*a*. It further appears by a Report of Commissioners appointed by the Supreme Court, for the investigation of Mr. Ricketts' affairs, that besides the claims of the private creditors above mentioned, there were some deficiencies in Mr. Ricketts' accounts on the Equity, Plea, and Admiralty sides of the Court; and that on the Ecclesiastical side there was a deficiency in the accounts, as Registrar, to the amount in star pagodas 123,105. 37., on account of which claims had then been preferred to the amount of about 46,000 pagodas.

How the balance in the Treasury has been applied, or whether Mr. Ricketts left any assets beyond what were received by the succeeding Registrar, does not appear; considering the nature and hardship of the case it may probably be thought proper, that every facility should be given to the Registrar in administering the affairs, and in recovering, for the benefit of the sufferers, any further property which there may be a prospect of obtaining; and that the law officers of the Company should be directed to render their assistance to the administrator in any legal proceedings which it may be necessary to institute for those purposes. It will also be right that enquiry should be made whether there are any assets of Mr. Ricketts recoverable in England. Beyond this, however, I am not aware of any legal steps which can be taken for the benefit of the parties who have suffered by Mr. Ricketts' insolvency. Any grant of pecuniary assistance in aid of the deficient fund, pursuant to the suggestion contained in the law letter from Fort St. George, of the 13th October 1820, would be a gratuity, and could not be resorted to without the concurrence of the Court of Proprietors and Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India.

It appears that regulations have been made by the Supreme Court in India to prevent a recurrence of the evil, and that security to a large amount has been taken from the present Registrar.

The Board are advised, that neither the East India Company nor any other party is responsible to the parties for the amount of these losses; nevertheless they are induced under all the circumstances of this case, which is a case of injury suffered through the proceedings of an officer of His Majesty's Court of Judicature, to recommend to the parties a Petition to the King in Council, for such relief as His Majesty may be advised to afford.

To the Right honourable the Lords of the Treasury.

The humble Petition of Robert Sinclair, of Walton-upon-Thames, in the County of Surrey, Gentleman;

Sheweth,—That in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, Charles Sinclair, your Petitioner's brother died in the Presidency of Madras, in the East Indies; intestate, leaving Personal Property there, and your Petitioner sole next of kin, and as such entitled to receive the same; that at the time of the decease of your Petitioner's said brother, Gilbert Ricketts, Esq. was Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, and, as such, administered to the Personal Estate, of the deceased, and (as will appear by the Account Current hereto annexed, drawn out by P. Cleghorn, Esq. the present Registrar of the said Court, and successor of the said Gilbert Ricketts) received, after the payment of the debts of the deceased, a balance of 8,989 pag. 23f. 9c. amounting in British money, when the exchange is at par, to Two thousand eight hundred and eighty-four pounds, which ought to have been remitted to your Petitioner by the said Gilbert Ricketts.

That the said Gilbert Ricketts, soon after the above mentioned sum came into his possession as such Registrar, died by his own hands (as is supposed) wholly insolvent, in consequence whereof the above balance is entirely lost to your Petitioner, as he has been informed by his agents in India, to whom he transmitted

That by the British law of India, the only person who is permitted to administer to the effects of British subjects dying intestate there, is the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature of the Presidency within which the effects are situate, and no other person is allowed to interfere in the collection, receipt or administration thereof; and it is the duty of such Registrar, after the payment thereof of the debts of the deceased, to distribute the surplus of such effects amongst the next of kin of the deceased, agreeable to the order prescribed by the statute of distributions in this country.

Your Petitioner therefore (who is far advanced in years, and in declining circumstances) most dutifully submits to your Lordships, that the loss which he has sustained, having been occasioned by the Insolvency of an Officer receiving his appointment from His Majesty's Government here, he is equitably entitled to remuneration for such loss from His Majesty's Government; and he humbly prays, that his very distressing case may receive the favourable consideration of your Lordships, and that he may receive such effectual and early relief as your Lordships may be pleased to afford.

Sir,

I HAVE laid before the Commissioners for the Affairs of India your Letter of the 19th instant, enclosing a Memorial from Mr. Robert Sinclair.

The Case of the representatives of intestate persons, who have suffered loss from the insolvency of Mr. Gilbert Ricketts, the Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, has been brought before the Board, by applications from several of the parties, and has occupied their serious attention.

The Board think it necessary to observe, that the appointment of Registrar is not made, as is supposed by the Memorialist, by any department of His Majesty's Government in England, but by the Judges of His Majesty's Court in India; with this exception the case is correctly stated.

In the year 1825, the Court of Directors of the East India Company, at the desire of the Board, laid a case before Mr. Serjeant Bosanquet, their standing Counsel, who gave it as his Opinion, That no person was liable to make good the losses sustained by the insolvency of Mr. Ricketts.

I am directed to transmit a copy of this Case and Opinion for their Lordships information.

The Board, deeply impressed with a sense of the hardness of the case, recently suggested to some of the sufferers the propriety of applying by Petition to His Majesty in Council; but they have been informed that the Lords of the Council are not of opinion that the case is properly within their cognizance.

Under these circumstances the Board recommend to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury that, with a view to their decision on this subject, the Opinion of the law officers of the Crown should be taken on the liability of the East India Company or any other party to make good the loss sustained.

Sir,

I AM commanded by the Lords to transmit to you for the information of the Board of Commissioners, the copy of the Opinion of the Attorney and Solicitor General upon the case of the deficiencies occasioned by the insolvency of Mr. Ricketts, late Registrar of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras; and to request that you will move them to make such further communication to the East India Company as they may deem expedient, with a view to their reconsideration of this particular case; and suggest that some measures may be taken for the regulation of this and similar offices in India, by assigning to the parties holding them, adequate salaries for the duties they may be required to perform, by taking proper and sufficient securities from the parties who may be appointed to these offices, and by providing that the balance of the effects of all intestate persons, as well as of any other monies which may come into the hands of the officer of the Courts, as stakeholders for the parties, may be regularly deposited in the Company's Treasury, and paid by drafts from thence whenever the same may become regularly payable.

WE are of opinion, that neither the East India Company nor any other persons are liable to make good the losses occasioned by the insolvency of Mr. Ricketts. The case is certainly one of considerable hardship, where an individual suffers from the misconduct of a public officer, who has not been required to give security for

for the due execution of his office; and although the party injured can establish no legal claim for redress, he may perhaps be considered a fit object for humane consideration of the East India Company, under the peculiar circumstances stated in the Petition.

A Copy of the REGULATIONS that have been adopted by the Supreme Court of
Judicature at Bombay as to Natives sitting on Juries, under 7 Geo. IV. c. 37.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the seventh year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to regulate the appointment of Juries in the East Indies," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that "the respective Courts of Judicature at Calcutta, Madras and Bombay shall have power from time to time to make and establish such rules with respect to the qualification, appointment, form of summoning, challenging, and service of jurors, and such other regulations relating thereto as they may respectively deem expedient and proper:" The following rules are made and established by the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, this 5th day of February, in the year of our Lord 1828.

I.—QUALIFICATION OF JURORS.

Every man, except as hereinafter excepted, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, who is a resident householder within the town and island of Bombay, and occupies any house or tenement of the monthly value of rupees thirty, or of the annual value of rupees three hundred, or whose property or interest in lands, tenements or goods is worth the sum of rupees three thousand, after the payment of his just debts, is qualified and liable to serve on juries.

II.—EXEMPTIONS.

The Governor, the members in council, the secretaries, the accountant-general, and sub-treasurer of the Government, clergymen in holy orders, priests and dissenting ministers following no secular employment, except that of a schoolmaster; barristers at law, attornies, solicitors and proctors actually practising; officers of the supreme court, police magistrates, and officers of the quarter sessions, petty sessions and police, coroners and jailors, and keepers of houses of correction; physicians, surgeons and apothecaries actually practising; officers in His Majesty's army and navy on full pay; officers of the Company's army, officers of the Company's marine, holding the command of or employed in any ship or vessel; persons employed in the pilot service of the Company; sheriffs officers, constables and church clerks; persons not subjects of the King, or attainted of any treason or felony, or convicted of any crime that is infamous, unless a free pardon shall have been obtained; persons under outlawry or excommunication; persons disabled from serving by lunacy or imbecility of mind, or by deafness, blindness, or other permanent infirmity; persons who do not understand the English language, shall not serve on juries, nor be inserted in the list hereinafter mentioned.

III.—LIST OF JURYMEN TO BE PREPARED.

The clerk of the Crown shall within the first week of February in every year issue his precept to the sheriff, requiring him to prepare and make out before the 1st day of April then next a true list of all men qualified and liable to serve on juries as aforesaid; and

and the sheriff shall forthwith, after the receipt of the said precept, proceed to prepare and make out such list in alphabetical order, containing in separate columns opposite to each person's name his proper style, addition or calling, his place of residence, the country of his birth, his religious profession, and his qualification to serve on juries, and the ground of his privilege, if any, to serve on grand juries only; provided always that in stating the religious profession of any person it shall be sufficient to say Christian, Mahometan, Hindoo, or the like, without specifying the particular church or sect of the party, and the sheriff shall deliver the said list signed by him or his deputy to the clerk of the Crown on or before the said first day of April.

IV.—LIST TO BE ADVERTISED.

The clerk of the crown shall within the first ten days of the month of April cause the said list to be published once in a Bombay newspaper in the English and native characters, and copies of the said list to be affixed to some conspicuous parts of the court-house, with a notice stating that all objections to the list will be heard before the supreme court, or one of the judges at chambers, during the months of April and May, and the clerk of the crown shall also keep the original list, or a true copy thereof, to be perused by any person at any reasonable time without any fee or reward.

V.—LIST TO BE CORRECTED AND ALLOWED.

If any man not qualified and liable to serve on juries as aforesaid is inserted in the said list, the court or judge, upon satisfaction from the oath of the party complaining, or other proof that he is not qualified, and liable to serve, will, during the said months of April and May, order his name to be struck out. The court or judge will likewise order to be inserted in such list the name of any man omitted, and will likewise order any errors or omissions in such list to be reformed; provided always, that no man's name, if omitted, shall be inserted in such list, nor shall any error or omission in the description of any man be reformed unless upon the application of such man, or unless such man shall have had notice that an application for such purpose would be made to the court or judge, or unless the court or judge shall cause notice to be given to such man requiring him to show cause why his name should not be inserted in such list, or why any error or omission in the description of such man in the list should not be reformed, and the clerk of the Crown shall forthwith, after the expiration of the said month of May, attest such list, with such correction (if any) re-copied, if necessary, as the list allowed by the court.

VI.—ASSESSMENT BOOKS, &c. TO BE INSPECTED.

The sheriff or under-sheriff shall for his assistance in completing the list (upon request made by him at any reasonable time to any collector or assessor, or to any person having the custody of any assessment or book of assessment, or registry) have free liberty to inspect any such book or assessment, or registry, and to make such extract therefrom as may appear to him necessary; and upon order made by the court or judge to any such collector or assessor, or person having the custody of any assessment, book of assessment, or registry, the same book, assessment or registry shall be produced before them or him at the time and place specified in such order; and the supreme court doth require and enjoin all justices of the peace, and constables, and other officers employed in the conservation of the peace, and all persons having in their keeping or possession any public books of assessment or registry, that for the purpose of enabling the sheriff and clerk of the Crown to form and perfect the aforementioned lists, they be aiding and assisting unto them.

VII.—JURORS BOOK.

The clerk of the crown shall keep the list so allowed among the records of the court, and shall cause the same to be fairly and truly copied in a book, and before the end of the month of June shall deliver the said book to the sheriff, who, on quitting his office, shall deliver it to the succeeding sheriff, and, excepting such alterations as at any time upon motion in open court may be directed by the court to be made, the said book, so prepared in each year as aforesaid, shall, from the 1st of July in the same year for twelve months next ensuing, be deemed and taken to be a true list of all persons qualified and liable to serve on juries.

VIII.—PRECEPT TO SHERIFF TO SUMMON JURY.

The clerk of the crown shall, fourteen days at least before each sessions of oyer and terminer, issue his precept to the sheriff, commanding him to summon thirty of the principal inhabitants resident in the town and island of Bombay, being subjects of the King, to attend as a grand jury, and forty-eight good and sufficient men, being subjects of the King, resident within the island of Bombay, or the factories subordinate thereto, to serve on the petty jury.

IX.—SUMMONING JURORS.

The sheriff, on receipt of the said precept, shall summon, out of the names contained in the said book, thirty of those who are qualified and liable to serve on grand juries, and forty-eight

eight of those who are liable to serve on petty juries, provided that one half at least of those summoned to serve on grand juries, and one half of those summoned to serve on petty juries shall be British subjects, and all those summoned to serve on grand juries, Christians; and the summons shall be made six days at the least before the sessions, by showing to the man to be summoned, or in case he shall be absent from the usual place of his abode by leaving with some person there inhabiting a note in writing under the hand of the sheriff or under-sheriff, containing the substance of such summons.

X.—PANEL OF JURORS.

The sheriff shall at each sessions, on the sitting of the court, deliver to the court a panel of the persons so summoned to serve on the grand jury as aforesaid, and also a panel of the persons so summoned to serve on the petty jury as aforesaid; and nothing in these rules contained shall be construed to take away from the court such control as it may legally exercise over any panel returned by the sheriff.

XI.—BALLOTING GRAND JURY.

The name of each man who shall be summoned for the grand jury, with the place of his abode and addition, shall be written on a distinct piece of paper or card, such pieces of paper or card being all, as nearly as may be, of equal size, and shall be delivered by the under-sheriff unto the clerk of the Crown, and shall by him be put together in a box; and he shall from the said box, in open court, draw the said pieces of paper or card indiscriminately one after the other, and the names of the first twenty-three that shall be drawn and appear, except such as shall be excused by the court for good and sufficient reason, shall act and be the grand jury for that sessions.

XII.—BALLOTING PETTY JURY.

The name of each man who shall be summoned for the petty jury, with his place of abode and addition, shall be written and delivered to the clerk of the Crown as aforesaid, and placed in a box; and the said names shall be drawn as aforesaid, and the twelve persons whose names shall be first drawn, of whom six shall be British subjects, that shall appear, and shall not be challenged or set aside or excused, shall form the petty jury on each trial; provided also, that on the trial of any person who professes the Christian religion the twelve persons professing that religion whose names shall be first drawn that shall appear, and shall not be challenged or set aside or excused, shall form the petty jury on such trial.

XIII.—CHALLENGE.

If any man shall be returned as a juror who shall not be qualified, the want of such qualification shall be good cause of challenge, and he shall be discharged upon such challenge if the court shall be satisfied of the fact; and if they that sue for the King will challenge any of the said jurors, they shall assign of their challenge a cause certain, and the truth of the same challenge shall be inquired of, according to the custom of the court.

XIV.—LIST OF SERVICE.

The clerk of the Crown shall make out a list of such men as shall serve on the grand or petty jury at each sessions, and shall, within twenty days after the close of such sessions, transmit such list to the sheriff, who is hereby required forthwith to register the names included in such list in the proper columns of the jurors book for that purpose, together with the date of their services; and every man having duly served shall, upon application to the clerk of the Crown, receive a certificate of such service on payment of one rupee.

XV.—JURORS NOT TO BE SUMMONED AGAIN WITHIN CERTAIN PERIOD.

No man shall be returned as a juror who has served as a juror at the preceding sessions, unless for want of jurors who shall not have so served.

THIS Balance is subject to reduction, by the Amount of the Advances made in India from the Territorial Branch to the Commercial Branch, in the Indian Official Years 1827/28 and 1828/29; the Documents whereby the Amount of these Advances is to be ascertained, have not as yet been received from India, but which, it is estimated, may amount to £. 5,908,942;— which will leave a Balance due to the Commerce, of £. 4,731,230, including Interest.

In the period from 1st May 1814 to 1st May 1829, there has also been advanced or set apart from the Surplus Commercial Profits in England, the sum of £. 4,923,020 towards the liquidation of Indian Territorial Debt, which being a payment under the 4th head of Appropriation of the 57th Section of the 53d Geo. 3, is not held to constitute a Claim upon the Territorial Department for repayment, upon the principle observed in respect to other Territorial Advances.

SUPREME COURT.

RULES relating to Juries in the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras.

WHEREAS an Act has been passed in this seventh year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, “An Act to regulate the appointment of Juries in the East Indies;” wherein, amongst other things, it is enacted, that “the respective Courts of Judicature at Calcutta, Madras and Bombay, shall have power from time to time to make and establish such rules with respect to the qualification, appointment, form of summoning, challenging and service of Jurors, and such other regulations relating thereto as they may respectively deem expedient and proper:” The following Rules and Regulations, in pursuance and in explanation of the said Act, are laid down and established by the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras, this 12th day of February, in the year of our Lord 1827.

I.—All men who on any former occasion have served on juries in the Supreme Court, and all who are resident householders within the limits of Madras, and occupy any house or tenement of the monthly value of thirty rupees, or the annual value of three hundred rupees, or whose property or interests in lands, tenements or goods would be worth the sum of three thousand rupees, after the payment of their just debts, are qualified and liable to serve on juries in the Supreme Court, except such persons as are hereinafter excepted.

II.—Those persons are incapable of serving on juries in the Supreme Court who hold any office in or under the said Court, or receive any pay or emolument for any employment in or under any office thereof, or for executing any duties of police within the limits of Madras, or who are the subjects of any foreign state, or who are under the age of twenty-one years, or who are attainted of treason or felony, or who have been convicted of any fraudulent or infamous offence, without having obtained a free pardon, or who are under outlawry or excommunication, or who are lunatics or idiots, or who are unable to understand the English language; and inasmuch as there are parts of the proceedings upon trials in the Supreme Court, which have not usually been translated by the interpreters, and which could not be translated without great difficulty and inconvenience, the sheriff and clerk of the crown are forbidden to insert in the list hereinafter mentioned the names of any natives of whose competency to understand the English language they have not experience or sure knowledge.

III.—No person who does not profess the Christian religion is qualified to serve on any grand jury, or on any jury for the trial of a person who does profess that religion.

IV.—These persons are exempted from the liability to serve on juries; namely, the governor and all peers; the members of council, the chief secretary and other secretaries to government; the judges of the court of Sudder Adawlut; the accountant-general and the sub-treasurer for the time being; all officers of the army, navy or marine of His Majesty or the Honourable Company; all persons employed in the pilot service of the Honourable Company; all clergymen, and all such dissenting ministers as are actually attached to or employed in any public place of religious worship, and who follow no other secular employment but that of teaching; all bramins, moolahs and other Hindus and Mahometans actually officiating as priests in their respective religions; all barristers at law, physicians,

surgeons and apothecaries actually practising as such; all domestic servants, and all persons above sixty years of age, or who are afflicted with any great infirmity of body or mind.

V.—All covenanted servants of the Honourable Company's civil service; all persons who according to the usage of England, or of this Presidency, are entitled to the style and addition of esquire, or of any higher degree; all persons whose claims to the title of rajah, or to have about them any insignia of equivalent rank, have been acknowledged by the government, or whose rank or superiority of caste, according to the usage of their tribe or religion, would prevent them from sitting on common juries, shall be exempted from serving on any other than special or grand juries.

VI.—The sheriff shall by all lawful means make inquiry throughout the limits of Madras, and shall prepare to the best of his ability, knowledge, information and belief, a full and accurate list, in alphabetical order, of all persons who are qualified and liable as aforesaid to serve on juries; and such list, according to the form of the schedule annexed to these rules, shall contain in separate columns opposite to each person's name, his proper style, addition or calling, his place of residence, the country of his birth, his religious profession and his qualification to serve on juries, and the ground of his privilege, if any, to serve on grand or special juries only; provided always, that in stating the religious profession of any person it shall be sufficient to say Christian, Mahomedan, Hindu or the like, without specifying the particular church or sect of the party.

VII.—The sheriff shall, on or before the 1st day of April in each year, deliver to the clerk of the Crown such list so made as aforesaid, signed by himself; and the clerk of the Crown shall thereupon, if need be, make further inquiry, and make any necessary additions, corrections or alterations thereto which he shall think fit; and shall, on or before the 15th day of the same month of April, together with the sheriff, attend the sitting judge in chambers with such list, and after inspection, and any necessary alteration of the said list by such judge, shall make out one fresh list in alphabetical order, signed and attested by his hand and seal as a true and perfect list of all persons qualified to serve as jurors in the Supreme Court, and shall cause the same to be published once in the Government gazette before the 1st day of May then next, and copies thereof to be affixed to some conspicuous part of the court-house, and in such other place or places as he shall think best adapted for the purposes of notoriety.

VIII.—The clerk of the Crown, on every day in the month of May on which any Judge shall sit in chambers, shall attend at the court-house with the last-mentioned list; and every person whose name is improperly inserted, or omitted, or who is wrongly or defectively described, may apply to the sitting judge, who either on the oath of the party himself, or on examination of witnesses, may order the list to be corrected by the clerk of the Crown; and if any Hindu or Mahomedan, included in the said list, shall be desirous of being excused from serving upon juries, he may in like manner appear in the said month of May at the court-house, and state to the sitting judge such his objection, and his name shall thereupon be struck out of such list; and in case of any alteration being made in the said list, the same shall be re-copied, and finally perfected and attested by the clerk of the Crown, and once more published in the Government gazette before the 10th day of June then next.

IX.—The clerk of the Crown shall place the said last-mentioned list among the records of the Supreme Court, and shall cause the same to be fairly and truly copied in the form in a book, and on or before the 10th day of June shall deliver the said book to the sheriff, who on quitting his office shall deliver it to the succeeding sheriff, and excepting such alterations as at any time, upon motion in open court, may be directed by the court to be made in it, the said books so prepared in each year as aforesaid, shall from the said 10th day of June, for twelve months next ensuing, be deemed and taken to be a true list of all persons qualified and liable to serve on juries in the Supreme Court, and the same persons shall be summoned to serve as jurors and on other; and the Supreme Court by virtue of its authority hereby requires of all justices of the peace, and constables, and other officers employed in the conservation of the peace, and of all persons having in their keeping or possession any public books of assessment or registry, that for the purpose of enabling the sheriff and clerk of the Crown to form and perfect the aforementioned lists, they be aiding and assisting unto them.

X.—The sheriff, out of the names contained in the book aforementioned, shall summon for each sessions, twenty-four of those who are qualified and liable to serve on grand juries, and thirty-six of those who are qualified and liable to serve on petit juries, and every summons shall be served one week at least before the first day of the sessions at which the party summoned is to attend; and of each of the panels returned by the sheriff, one half at least must be of that class of persons who have hitherto been designated in the statutes relating to India, by the term "British subjects," and in like manner one half at least of every jury shall consist of such British subjects.

XI.—Upon motion made on behalf of the King, or of any prosecutor or defendant, after issue has been joined upon any indictment or information for any misdemeanor, the Court, if the case shall appear to require it, will order a special jury to be struck before the clerk of the Crown, and for this purpose the sheriff or under-sheriff shall within ten days after the delivery of the jurors' book for the current year to either of them, take from such book
the

the names of all men who shall be described therein as liable to serve on grand or special juries only, and shall cause the names of all such persons to be fairly and truly copied out in alphabetical order, together with their respective places of abode and additions, in a separate list to be subjoined to the jurors book, which list shall be called the "Special Jurors List," and shall prefix to every name in such list its proper number, beginning the numbers from the first name, and continuing them in arithmetical series down to the last name, and shall cause the said several numbers to be written upon distinct pieces of parchment or card, being all, as nearly as may be, of equal size; and after all the said numbers shall have been so written, shall put the same together in a separate drawer or box, and shall there safely keep the same; and whenever the Court shall order a special jury to be struck, the clerk of the Crown shall appoint a time and place for the nomination of such special jury, and a copy of the Rule of Court shall be served on the under-sheriff and also on all the parties on whom it has been usual to serve the same in England; and the clerk of the Crown at the time and place appointed, being attended by the under-sheriff or his agent, who are hereby respectively required to bring with them the jurors book and such special jurors list, and all the numbers so written on distinct pieces of parchment or card as aforesaid, in the presence of all the parties and of their attorneys (if they respectively choose to attend, or if the said parties or their attorneys, all or any of them, do not attend, then in their absence) put all the said numbers into a box to be by him provided for that purpose, and after having shaken them together shall draw out of the said box forty-eight of the said numbers, one after another, and shall, as each number is drawn, refer to the corresponding number in the special jurors list, and read aloud the name designated by such number, and if at the time of so reading any name either party or his attorney shall object that the man whose name shall have been so referred to is in any manner incapacitated from serving on the said jury, and shall also then and there prove the same to the satisfaction of the clerk of the Crown, such name shall be set aside, and the said officer shall instead thereof draw out of the said box another number, and shall in like manner refer to the corresponding number in the said list, and read aloud the name designated thereby, which name may be in like manner set aside, and other numbers and names shall in every such case be resorted to, according to the mode of proceedings hereinbefore described for the purpose of supplying names in the places of those set aside, until the whole number, forty-eight names, not liable to be set aside, shall be completed; and if in any case it shall so happen that the whole number of forty-eight names cannot be obtained from the special jurors list, in such case the clerk of the Crown shall fairly and indifferently take, according to the mode of the nomination heretofore pursued in England in nominating special juries, such a number of names from the general jurors book, in addition to those already taken from the special jurors list, as shall be required to make up the full number of forty-eight names, all and every of which forty-eight names shall in such case be equally deemed and taken to be those of special jurors; and the clerk of the Crown shall afterwards make out each party a list of the forty-eight names, together with their respective places of abode and additions, and after having made out such list shall return all the numbers so drawn out, together with all the numbers remaining undrawn, to the under-sheriff or his agent, to be by such under-sheriff safely and securely kept for future use, and all the subsequent proceedings for reducing the said list, and all other matters whatsoever relating to special juries, shall be conducted in the same manner as in England; and the person or party who shall apply for a special jury shall pay such fees for striking such jury as shall be prescribed by the Court.

XII.—When it shall appear to the court, or to any judge thereof in vacation, that it will be proper and necessary that some of the jurors who are to try the issue in any case, shall have a view of the place in question, in order to their better understanding the evidence that may be given upon the trial of such issues, in every such case the court, or any judge thereof in vacation, may order a rule to be drawn up, containing the terms usual in England, and also requiring, if such court or judge shall so think fit, the party applying for the view, to deposit in the hands of the under-sheriff a sum of money, to be named in the rule, for payment of the expenses of the view, and commanding special writs of *venire facias*, *distringas* or *habeas corpora*, to issue, by which the sheriff, to whom the said writs shall be directed, shall be commanded to have six or more of the jurors named in such writs, or in the panels thereto annexed (who shall be mutually consented to by the parties, or if they cannot agree, shall be nominated by the sheriff) at the place in question, some convenient time before the trial, who then and there shall have the place in question shown to them by two persons in the said writs named, to be appointed by the court or judge, and the sheriff, by a special return upon the same, certify that the view hath been had according to the command of the same, and shall specify the names of the viewers and those men who shall have had the view, or such of them as shall appear upon the jury to try the issue shall be first sworn, and so many only shall be added to the viewers, who shall appear, as shall, after all defaulters and challengers allowed, make up the full jury of twelve.

XIII.—That in all cases wherein the King is a party, notwithstanding it be alleged by them that sue for the King, that the jurors or some of them be not indifferent for the King, yet the inquests shall not remain untaken for that cause; but if they that sue for the King will challenge any of those jurors, they shall assign to their challenge a cause certain, and the truth of the same challenge shall be inquired of according to the usage in England,

and it shall be proceeded to the taking of the same inquisitions as it shall be found if the challenges be true or not, after the discretion of the court; and no person arraigned for murder or felony shall be admitted to any peremptory challenge above the number of twenty.

XIV.—There shall be no award that any of the bystanders be sworn upon the jury in any case, except it be by consent of all the parties in the case.

XV.—No verdict shall be set aside or in any way affected for any cause which might have been cause of challenge at the trial, nor shall any writ of attainr be prosecuted against any jury or jurors for their verdict, nor against any party who shall have judgment on such verdict; but any person who shall be guilty of the offence of embracery, and every juror who shall corruptly or wilfully consent thereto, shall be punishable as heretofore.

XVI.—At each sessions the clerk of the crown shall make a minute of the name of those who shall serve at such sessions, and immediately after shall give a copy of the same to the under-sheriff, and no juror who has served, shall be summoned again within twelve months, unless for want of other jurors.

XVII.—All those who shall be lawfully summoned to serve on juries as shall wilfully neglect to attend, shall be punished as for a contempt, unless upon motion made it shall be shown to the satisfaction of the court that the name of the person ought to be erased from the sheriff's book, or that such a material alteration shall be made in the entry thereof in the said book as would have excused the party from attending in obedience to the summons.

XVIII.—The sheriff and clerk of the Crown shall not be answerable for any casual errors; but for wilful omission, false insertion or description, or vexatious summoning, they shall be punishable as for a contempt.

Sir,

IN obedience to the Earl of Aberdeen's direction, conveyed to me in your letter of October 2d 1828, I have now the honour to transmit for his Lordship's information, a list of the number of vessels, belonging to the United States, which have cleared from their ports for ports beyond the Cape of Good Hope in each year since 1813.

It was only yesterday that I received the necessary information from the ports of Salem and Boston, in the state of Massachussetts, to enable me to complete the inclosed document; a circumstance which will account for the delay that has attended its transmission to the Foreign Office.

It was found impracticable to obtain any return of the East India trade of New York previously to 1820, or of that of Philadelphia beyond the year 1821; I have therefore, as you will discover, substituted in red ink hypothetical returns for the absent periods, founded upon an average declared from the trade of the subsequent years: 1814 being the last year of the war, I have left the line appropriated to it blank.

I propose forwarding a duplicate of the inclosed list by the packet for Liverpool, to sail from New York on the 1st of April.

Copy of a LETTER from Sir *Daniel Bayley*, Consul General at *St. Petersburg* to
John Backhouse, Esq. dated 6/18th December 1828.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your circular dispatch, dated 18th November, communicating to me the directions of the Earl of Aberdeen to use my best endeavours to collect and transmit to you the most correct information as to the consumption of Tea in Russia, together with statements of the prices of different qualities, and the rates of duties levied upon them in English money, at the existing rate of exchange.

In compliance with his Lordship's orders, I have taken every means to obtain the information required, and now proceed to communicate the results.

Nearly the whole of the Tea destined for the consumption of this empire, is brought from *Kiachta*, where it is obtained from the Chinese by barter; of course it is not possible to ascertain the cost at its first purchase. From thence it is mainly conveyed by caravans, with other valuable articles, to the great annual fair held at *Negënei Novogorod*, and even there it is chiefly disposed of by barter. From thence it is distributed to the various parts of this vast empire, and then only it becomes an article of monied trade, and that prices can be fixed.

The exportation of Tea from Russia is of small extent, and is only permitted to merchants in the possession of special licenses granted by the Minister of Finance, in pursuance of an *Oukaze*, dated 16th August 1826, up to the 31st December of the same year, which licenses are to continue in force for four years from the last-mentioned date, when other arrangements will be made.

Even these licenses confine exportation to *Berlin*, *Francfort on the Maine*, *Hamburgh*, *Vienna*, *Paris*, *Ansterdam*, *Leipsig*, *Constantinople*, *Trieste*, *Naples*, *Leghorn*, *Genoa*, *Marseilles*, *Cadiz* and *Lisbon*, and to other places out of Russia, but not nearer than the fore-mentioned, and provided Russian Consuls are established there.

By these regulations it is required that the boxes of Tea destined for exportation, should be sealed at *St. Petersburg*, *Moscow* or *Odessa*, accompanied by a permit; and on presentation of a certificate, signed by the consul resident at the place to which the Tea is destined, of its true delivery, the full duty is restored to the exporter, by the proper authorities

authorities of the place from whence the Tea was dispatched, with exception of green Tea of the finer description, for the exportation of which the duty upon common green Tea only is returned; but for coarse brick Tea no drawback whatever is allowed.

On an average P^d 144,097 6 lbs. of the value of R° 5,671,726 ½, or 5,187,496 lbs English, value £. 248,346. 7. 4. sterling, taking the exchange at 10½ d. per ruble, which may therefore be fairly considered as the annual average of the quantity of Tea consumed within the empire. I have reason to believe, however, that the value above stated is estimated exclusive of the duty.

I have not been able to obtain any information of the extent of the importation of Tea during the present year; but from the reduction in the retail prices of common descriptions of Tea usually consumed in families, I am led to believe that the importation has exceeded the usual average.

On the other hand, however, I subjoin an extract of an article, which appeared very lately in the Russian newspapers upon this subject, showing the result of the trade in Tea brought for disposal to the annual fair at Negënei Novogorod, held last summer.

The black Tea was almost entirely purchased by Armenians and Tartars from Astrachn, and a small portion by Russian merchants carrying on trade with Asia.

In all, 29,000 seroons were sold at the fair, to the amount of about eleven millions of rubles, and the whole of what remained over was dispatched for disposal to Moscow and to this place.

Enclosed I have added a Price Current received from one of the principal retail dealers in Tea in this city, which I have reduced into sterling money per English lb.; and from all the information I have been enabled to collect, the prices are nearly the same at all the principal cities in the empire.

It may not be useless to add, that though the importation of Tea by sea is prohibited at all the Russian ports in Europe, excepting Odessa, yet that it is admitted at all the Russian ports in Asia at the same duties as by custom-houses on the frontier.

I have thus endeavoured to execute Lord Aberdeen's commands, and I have used my best exertions to do so fully and correctly. It will give me great pleasure to be informed that I have performed the service in a manner satisfactory to his Lordship.

Sir,

IN reference to your letter of the 13th of November, conveying to me the Earl of Aberdeen's desire to use my best endeavours to collect and transmit to you the most correct information as to the price and consumption of Tea in the Hanse Towns, together with the statements of the prices of the different qualities, and the rates of duty levied on them on importation, and of drawback allowed on exportation; I beg leave to send you the enclosed table, which contains the required information as regards the prices of Tea, and the duties and drawbacks.

As regards the consumption, there is a difficulty in stating it with accuracy; the public records at the Custom-House here do not afford it, and private information may not always be correct.

I inclose the copy of a letter which I have received upon this subject from ————, who, you will find, states the importation of Tea into Hamburgh at between 10,000 and 20,000 quarter boxes annually; but I collect from the lists of general importations which are published here annually by private persons, that the quantity of Tea imported in the last five years has been as follows; namely,—

Making an average importation in five years of 23,590 chests, or at 70 lbs net per chest, of 1,650,300 pounds per annum.

Neither of these quantities can, however, be fixed upon as quite correct. The quantity actually consumed in Hamburgh is only a small part of the whole importation, as the greater part goes to the interior of Germany.

At Bremen and Lubeck, the same difficulty in stating the importation of tea with accuracy prevails as here, but in neither is the quantity important; and I beg leave to refer to the enclosed copies of what the British Vice-Consuls in those towns have reported on the subject.

Copy of a LETTER from _____ to Mr. *Henry Canning*, dated
Hamburgh, 13th January 1829.

" I MUST ask your pardon for the procrastination of an answer to your letter of the 16th December, concerning the Tea trade of Hamburgh. I am very sorry the registers of the customs, which have no other object but to secure the small duty of 1/5 per cent on part of the importation, and of 1 per mille on part of the exportation, without providing for a drawback, will scarcely offer sufficient information for giving an official answer to most of your questions.

" The importation of Tea in the port of Hamburgh, variable and accidental, may be rated at between 10,000 and 20,000 quarter boxes annually. The extraordinary importation of 35,700 quarter boxes in 1827, must purely be attributed to their smaller size. The market of Hamburgh, as well as that of Holland, appears overstocked: prices since 1816 are reduced to one-third. At the end of December 1827, 28 to 30,000 quarter boxes remained unsold. The exportation, owing to the impossibility of controlling quantities below a certain weight and value, can still less be stated with any degree of certainty.

" The safest method would be, to deduct the probable average consumption of 200,000 to 250,000 boxes from the importation, which, by an alteration of duties in Holland, has been reduced to 12,500 quarter boxes in 1828. The late failures in the United States, the balance of two or three millions of dollars due to the American customs, the loss of the Dutch Trading Company, computed at 2,000,000 of florins during the last four years, sufficiently prove the trade has of late been carried on without benefit. The consumption in the interior of Germany, though slowly increasing, is very moderate. Smuggling to any extent must be out of the question; fine Black Tea, the staple consumption of Great Britain, scarcely appearing in the Hamburgh market.

" Insignificant as these details, for which I was obliged to address myself to the persons better acquainted with commercial business, must appear to you, I hope you will consider them as a proof of my sincere wish to substitute private information for official ignorance."

Extract of a LETTER from the British Vice-Consul at *Bremen*, addressed to

—" IN reply to your letter of the 13th instant, I have the honour to state, that the consumption of Tea in this city cannot be exactly ascertained; it is however not considerable. Its importation is chiefly from the United States, and never in whole cargoes, but occupying a small portion of ship-room. Its exportation from hence is chiefly East Friesland, and to the countries on the Upper Weser.

" In 1826 were imported 84,122 lbs. amounting to R^r 46,735.

" In 1827, 346,888 lbs. amounting to R^r 231,259: and the quantity on hand at this moment may be estimated at circa 4,000 chests, averaging 240,000 lbs."

Extract of a LETTER from the British Vice-Consul, at *Lubeck*, dated 22d December 1828,
addressed to Mr. *Henry Canning*.

—" I WAS duly favoured with your letter of the 15th instant, and lost no time in attending to its contents.

" There is no wholesale trade in Tea here, and but a very irregular one in the retail line. The retail dealers in this article draw their supplies mostly from Hamburgh, but sometimes from Copenhagen and Bremen; it is however impossible to ascertain the quantity consumed here, since almost all the principal families have their Tea sent them by the post-coach from Hamburgh, in quantities of 5 lbs. 10 lbs. or 25 lbs., of which no account whatever is required here; and even what the dealers receive is but very partially entered at the Custom-house, the parcels being given in at whatever quantities the receivers choose to state.

" There is no inquisitorial establishment here for examining the goods received; and the Custom-house has so little control over them, that the head of that department has himself declared, that it is impossible to ascertain either the quantity imported or that consumed."

IN reply to the official circular of the 13th ult. I have the honour to state, that the consumption of Tea in the island of Sicily is very trifling, about twenty chests per annum. The Sicilians seldom make use of it, except in illness as a medicine, and that of very inferior quality. It is chiefly imported from the United States of America. The duty, without regard to quality, is one shilling and three-pence sterling per pound, English weight, at the current rate of exchange of 58 taris per pound sterling: the retail price for bohea four shillings per pound, and for green six shillings per pound, English weight. There is no drawback allowed on re-exportation of tea.

Sir,

ON receipt of your letter of the 13th of November last, by which you communicated to me the desire of the Earl of Aberdeen, that I should collect and transmit to you the most correct information as to the consumption of Tea in the Austrian States in Adriatic; I immediately requested His Majesty's Consuls at Trieste, Fiume and Ragusa to furnish me with such particulars as might relate to their several districts.

I have delayed my reply in consequence of not hearing from Mr. Turner at Ragusa; but as I am credibly informed that the consumption of Tea there is very insignificant, I now transmit a return, which I hope will be found sufficient.

The article in question is so little in use in the southern parts of the Austrian States, that it does not appear that the total consumption amounts to half a ton annually.

Tea may enter the free ports of Trieste, Fiume and Ragusa without payment of duty; but on leaving those places for the interior, the duty levied is at the rate of $1/5\frac{1}{2}$ sterling per lb. avordupois for the gross weight; on all quantities indiscriminately which corresponds with the importation duty at Venice.

No drawback is allowed on re-exportation; but, on the contrary, Tea is liable to a small export duty of about one farthing per pound avordupois.

Except at Trieste, no other Tea is known than a very inferior Hyson. The prices are inserted in the return herewith transmitted.

Sir,

WITH reference to my communication under date of the 29th November, I have herewith the honour to state the information I have been able to collect respecting the prices, duties, consumption and qualities of Tea in this part of Germany.

The list below comprises the Confederate States, which levy a consumption duty on that article, on which none of them allows drawback. The printed tariffs of them are too bulky to admit being sent by post, and shall be transmitted by the first messenger passing through Frankfort.

In other parts of the Confederation, with the exception of Austria, the duties levied on Tea deserve more the denomination of toll or turnpikes than duty, such as in this free city, where the cwt. pays ten-peace on entry. The present prices of tea in this town are as follows:—

The quantity of Tea consumed in this city cannot be exactly ascertained, as it forms an article of trade on which no consumption duty is levied, 10 *d.* not deserving that denomination, and consequently no drawback allowed on it that might lead to regular registers. The modicity of the duty on entry on all articles in general is the cause that the entry books are not so explicit as to admit of a separation of the quantity of Tea consumed and exports into the interior of the country; but I have ascertained that the importation amounted in the year 1817 to 380 cwt., and in 1826 to 112 cwt. on which the duty of 10*d.* per lb. was paid. I have reason to believe that not more than 100 cwt. of it were consumed in the town and territory of Frankfort, forming a population of 70,000 inhabitants, and thus about one-eighth of a pound for each per annum; but this valuation cannot serve as a general basis for Germany, as in some parts of it no Tea is drunk, and in others very little, the people being in the habit of drinking coffee for breakfast, and beer or wine at their other meals.

Notwithstanding the great activity and the extended mercantile connections of this free city, the Tea branch cannot be of great consequence, as Hamburg and Bremen supply the north of Germany and part of the Baltic coast, and Holland the country along the Rhine, as well as other German provinces near her frontiers; whilst the south, Bavaria, Wurtemberg, Baden, Darmstadt and Nassau chiefly consume coffee, as more congenial to beer and wine countries; and thus the *debouché* into them becomes retail business to no considerable extent. Prussia receives supplies from Hamburg and her Baltic ports, and Austria chiefly by Trieste; but both countries import also tea from Russia, which goes by the name of Caravan Tea, and of which the first qualities find likewise their way into this part of Germany, although in small quantities, and sell at high prices, as stated in the list.

Very seldom purchases for this town have hitherto been made at the East India sales in London. On the outset, this may have been caused by the length of the journey, aversion against sea voyages, want of knowledge of the language, and the considerable travelling expenses. Most of these impediments having been lessened by steam navigation and improved land conveyance, I think it likely that the Tea sales at the India House may in future be as well attended as the indigo sales, to which Frankfort houses regularly send their agents.

In former times, Tea for this place was purchased of the East India Company at Copenhagen and the Swedish Company at Gottenburg, but chiefly then, and now in Holland.

The

The two former companies have ceased to exist, and Holland meets latterly with great competition in the French port of Havre de Grace, visited so much by American vessels, that the orders upon Tea may be considered now as divided between Dutch and French ports.

The French Government has, sub-hand, been so extremely active in facilitating inland water communication, that by means of the Canal de Monsieur and the Canal de Besançon, the North Sea will shortly be united with the Rhine at Strasbourg, and thus Havre, with its kown activity, will easily meet Dutch competition in Tea and all colonial produce. In the prospectus and plan of the undertaking, the union of the North Sea with the Mediterranean has been promised through this caual, which, by contract, is to be finished at latest in 1830.

The great difference in the importation of Tea into Frankfort, in 1817 380 cwt., in 1826 112 cwt., I attribute chiefly to supplies from France, although the very low prices of grain may likewise have caused a diminution in the consumption of Tea in Germany, which there belongs more to the luxuries than to the necessaries of life, whilst coffee ranks more amongst the latter. Under the aforesaid circumstances, it is my opinion that the most correct calculation of the quantity of tea consumed in Germany can only be made by collecting information of the imports in the following sea ports, viz. Amsterdam, Rotterdam, Antwerp, Hamburgh, Bremen, Havre, Bordeaux, Trieste and Copenhagen. Neither Prussia nor Italian ports supply inner Germany with Tea at present.

COPY of Mr. Consul Fenwick's REPORT on the Consumption and Price of TEA in Denmark, dated Elsinore, December 13th 1828.

THE China trade has, ever since the year 1732, been a monopoly to the present Asiatic Company, and, with the exception of two private expeditions made by royal authority in 1816 and 1817, against a recognizance to the Company, and with their sanction, in consequence of the dilapidated state of their finances, no importation of Tea has been made to Denmark from any place beyond the Cape of Good Hope, as being in opposition with the privileges of the Company.

The duty paid by the Company is two per cent *ad valorem*, whereas the duty on importations from ports on this side the Cape of Good Hope is about 14 *d.* on Green Teas, and 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ *d.* on Crown Teas, which amounts to a prohibition; and it can thus be admitted that the consumption of the country is wholly supplied by the Company.

On the other hand, the activity of the Company has, ever since the peace in 1814, been exclusively limited to the wants of the country, both in consequence of their want of capital and of the prices at which they are enabled to dispose of their teas for consumption; and the extent of their sales accordingly affords a sale and correct criterion respecting the consumption of the country.

Teas from any port this side of the Cape of Good Hope may be landed, in bond, at Copenhagen, and when re-exported pay a transit duty of about 18 *d.* per 100 lbs. for Crown Teas, and 54 *d.* for Green Teas; but this trade is not carried to any extent, as they cannot be entered for consumption, unless at a high duty, as stated above.

No drawback is allowed on the re-exportation of Tea from Denmark.

Sir,

IN reply to your circular of the 13th instant, I have the honour to transmit, for the information of the Earl of Aberdeen, a Statement of the Law and Tariff respecting the importation of Tea into the Netherlands, as it existed formerly. By this, it appears that all exportation or transit of Tea was prohibited.

The Teas which were imported into this kingdom were consequently for consumption alone; and, according to the best information I can obtain, it appears that the quantity of Tea consumed yearly in the Southern provinces is not more than 2,000 chests, of 75 lbs. each; whilst in the Northern provinces the consumption yearly may be rated as high as from 25,000 to 27,000. Thus the whole consumption of Tea of all kinds in this kingdom cannot be estimated at more than 30,000 chests, of 75 lbs. each, or about 2,000,000 lbs. per annum.

This is the most accurate information I have been able to procure upon this subject.

I have likewise the honour to enclose N^o 2, being a Statement of the present Law and Tariff upon the importation and exportation of Teas, showing likewise the prices of the various sorts in sterling and English cwt, likewise the precise quantity said to be consumed in the Southern provinces from the best source, which appears rather less than 2,000 chests.

But as there is now a general entrepôt established in this city, as well as in other ports, it is supposed that a much larger quantity of Tea will be imported in future direct from China, in Netherland vessels, the greater part for exportation.

But this law has not been long enough in operation to enable me to form any opinion as to the probable quantity of Tea that will be imported in future.

I have likewise to observe, that since the 1st of January last I do not find a single chest of Tea set down as imported into Antwerp.

Sir,

IN addition to the information contained in my letter of the 27th ult. N° 17, respecting the duties upon Tea, I have the honour to acquaint you, that, in pursuance of the law of 31st March 1828, a copy of which is herewith transmitted, relating to the "free exportation and importation of merchandize from and into the kingdom of the Netherlands;"

His Majesty, by a Special Decree, dated 10th September 1828, has been pleased, as an act of grace and favour, to allow the extension of that law to the port of Antwerp; although the terms of the said law have not yet been complied with, by the erection of a suitable building for a general Entrepôt.

It is therefore established, under the authority of this Special Decree, that all sorts of Tea may be imported into Antwerp from any country whatsoever by sea, and re-exported by sea to any other country, without paying any duties whatsoever, not even those of transit.

The necessary measures are however in operation for the erection of an Entrepôt.

IN compliance with the directions of the Earl of Aberdeen, communicated to me in your circular of the 13th inst. I beg leave to transmit you the following information relative to the price of consumption of Tea, and the duties payable on that article in the kingdom of the Netherlands.

The annual importation of Tea into the whole kingdom of the Netherlands, taken on an average of the last ten years, is 42,000 quarter chests, and the consumption is estimated to be 40,000 per annum, about two and a half million pounds.

Sir,

I HAVE the honour to acknowledge the receipt of the circular letter of the 13th instant, received on the 24th, in answer to which I have to acquaint you, for the Earl of Aberdeen's information, that the annual consumption of Tea in the Sardinian States (on the continent), is about 2,500 kilogrammes, equal to 5,625 pounds English weight. The duty of entry is 2 francs 50 cents per kilogramme, which, at the exchange of 25 francs per pound sterling, is 2 shillings per 2 pounds 4 ounces English weight.

The re-exportation of Tea by sea is 2,000 kilogrammes, equal to 4,500 pounds English weight, which pay 1 franc 20 cents per decimal quintal, or 1 shilling per 225 pounds English weight.

The actual price of Pearl Tea is from 3 livres 10 sous to 4 livres, or from 2 shillings and 4 pence to 2 shillings and 8 pence sterling per Genoa pound.

The price of Hyson Tea is from 2 livres 16 sous to 3 livres 5 sous, or from 1 shilling and 10 pence to 2 shillings and 2 pence per Genoa pound.

The price of Green Tea is from 1 livre 10 sous to 2 livres, or from 1 shilling to 1 shilling and 4 pence per Genoa pound.

The price of Black Tea is from 1 livre 5 sous to 1 livre 10 sous, or from 10 pence to 1 shilling per Genoa pound.

The deposit in Port France of the different qualities of Tea does not exceed 150 cases; containing each 90 Genoese pounds, or 64 ½ pounds English weight.

No drawback is allowed in this port, all goods being admitted in the Port France free of duty; and when withdrawn from thence they pay the duty of entry, if such goods are for the consumption in the Sardinian states; the transit duty, if they are re-exported by land, and the duty of ostellaggio, if they are re-exported by sea.

Sir,

WHEN using my best endeavours to obey the directions contained in the circular of the 13th ult. it is necessary for me to remark, that, from the manner in which the custom-house books are kept here, it is impossible to ascertain the quantity of Tea imported; but from the best information I have been enabled to procure from other sources, the imports for the last seven years, in large and small chests (for they have not been distinguished from each other) have been nearly as follows; viz. in 1821, 1822, 1823, 1824, 1825, 1826, 1827—chests 182, 407, 103, 555, 354, 548, 326; thereby averaging about 353 chests annually, which have almost entirely been brought from America.

The consumption of Tea in Tuscany is chiefly confined to the foreigners who reside in Florence and Leghorn, the natives only using it medicinally.

A great part of it is exported to the Roman and Sicilian states, and to the Levant; but as the custom-house takes no cognizance of this, the quantity consumed in Tuscany cannot be ascertained, although it may be computed at from 3,000 to 4,000 lbs. annually.

The duty on importation of Tea into the port and city of Leghorn is as follows; viz.

When sent into the interior of the country it pays

Sir,

IN answer to the circular letter, dated Foreign Office, 13th ult. I have the honour to state, for the information of the Right Honourable the Secretary of State, the Earl of Aberdeen, the following particulars respecting the importation, price and consumption of Tea in this district, and also the duties to which it is subject.

The government, of which this place is the seat, comprises the city, port and liberties of Trieste, the county of Gorizia, and the peninsula of Istria, which being maritime provinces, the whole is styled "Governo del Litorale," and contains about 300 m. inhabitants. The county of Gorizia (containing about 115 m. inhabitants) is alone subject to duties of customs; the other districts are exempt from them, and enjoy the advantages of a free port.

The consumption of Tea in this government is so insignificant as to warrant the assertion that it is scarcely to be considered as an object of trade. It is used more as a medicine than as a necessary article of subsistence, or an agreeable beverage, except by the English families here resident, and a few others in the higher circles.

Only four qualities of Tea are known here, as stated, with their respective prices, in the schedule here annexed. The importation in British vessels is limited to small parcels brought by masters of ships, and I am credibly informed has not amounted to 1,000 lbs. during the last nine years, the period I have been in office. A more considerable quantity (about 3,000 lbs.) was imported some years ago in an American ship, and left in commission

with an English house here; but the greater part, notwithstanding the extreme lowness of the prices, still remains unsold, and I am assured that it is very doubtful whether wholesale buyers could be found for it even at a reduction of 30 per cent.

In the city and liberties of Trieste, which is a free port, and also in Istria, as being beyond the line of custom-houses, there are no duties on this or any other articles of merchandize. There was, indeed, till lately, a duty of one-half per cent *ad valorem*, which has now ceased, the object for which it was levied, viz. to pay the debts contracted by the municipality during the war, being accomplished. The Tea sent into the interior of the Austrian States, on passing the boundaries of the territory of Trieste, is subject to a duty of 54 kreutzers per lb. of Vienna, or one shilling and sixpence sterling per lb. English avoirdupois weight. No drawback is allowed; but Tea may be bonded in large towns, or may be sent through the country for exportation to foreign parts, on paying a transit duty of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ florins per 100 lbs. of Vienna, or five shillings and two-pence sterling for 112 lbs. English avoirdupois weight.

I understand that the consumption of Tea in Vienna and the Northern provinces of the empire is much more considerable than in these parts; but as very little is sent from hence the supplies must be received from Hamburgh and other ports in the North.

* No letters of administration, with one exception, have been granted to the Registrar since I have been Recorder. His average profits, during the seven years previous to my taking office, viz. 9 August 1827, were about forty dollars.

IN explanation of the several TABLES of FEES and the LIST of SALARIES now forwarded, in compliance with the orders of the Honourable House of Commons, bearing date the 22d day of May 1828, and received by me on the 13th January 1829, I beg to submit the following statement:—

The United Settlement of Prince of Wales Island, Singapore and Malacca, is composed of,

- 1st. Prince of Wales Island, and a narrow tract of country on the Malayan Peninsula opposite the said Island.
- 2d. The Island of Singapore.
- 3d. The Town and Fort of Malacca, with its dependencies, embracing a considerable tract of country on the Malayan Peninsula.

By His Majesty's most gracious letters patent, bearing date the 27th day of November 1826, it is ordained that the court of judicature of Prince of Wales Island, Singapore and Malacca, shall consist of and be holden before the governor or president, and the resident councillor for the time being, of the station where the said court shall be held, as two of the judges of the said court, and before one other judge, who shall be called "the Recorder of Prince of Wales Island, Singapore and Malacca;" and which recorder shall be a barrister in England or Ireland, of not less than five years standing, to be named and appointed from time to time by His said Majesty, His heirs and successors, by letters patent under His and their great seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland: And that the said governor or president, and the resident councillor of the station where the said court shall from time to time be held, shall at all times be judges of the said court, and shall hold their said offices of judges severally during all such time as they shall severally hold and exercise the offices of governor or president and councillor respectively of the said settlement: Provided always, that in case at any time there shall be more than one councillor present at either of the said stations, besides the governor or president, then that the governor or president and the resident councillor only, if he shall be there, shall be judges of the said court; and if the resident councillor shall not be present, then that the governor or president and the senior councillor present, according to his rank in the said council, shall be judges of the said court: And that the said recorder of Prince of Wales Island, Singapore and Malacca, shall hold his office during the pleasure of His said Majesty, His heirs and successors.

By the same letters patent, the court is authorized and empowered to settle a table of fees to be allowed to the registrar, sheriff and coroner, for all and every part of the business to be done by them respectively; which fees the said registrar, sheriff and coroner shall and may lawfully demand, and receive; and the said court is authorized from time to time to vary the said table of fees as there shall be occasion; and to settle and adjust what salary or salaries, or what proportion of the fees to be allowed to the registrar, sheriff and coroner respectively, shall be paid and allowed by them respectively to any clerk or clerks, under sheriff or officers, to be employed by or under them respectively.

In the same letters patent (see printed copies, p. 81) it is recited, that the United Company had lately preferred their humble petition to His Majesty, stating to the effect thereinbefore recited; and also, that they were willing, so long as they should maintain the said united settlement and places aforesaid, to defray all the expenses necessarily incidental to such courts and judicatures as His said Majesty might see fit to establish or authorize to be established there, on the application of the said United Company.

The fees collected by the court of judicature have never been sufficient to defray the expenses of the establishment; it has therefore been considered advisable to remunerate the different officers by annual salaries, payable in monthly portions, as will appear by reference to the list. The amount of the salaries collectively being known, the amount of fees is ascertained at the end of each month, and application made to Government to supply the deficiency, by virtue of a guarantee given to the court in the month of November 1827; subject, however, to a reference to the East India Directors. The guarantee in question is to a certain amount, the whole of which has never yet been drawn. The judges of the court of judicature have not been informed of what has been written to the East India Directors by the governor in council on the subject of the salaries of the different officers; but from

authentic documents in my possession, I am warranted in believing that in the opinion of the Governor in Council, the officers of the court are overpaid in proportion to the work performed by them respectively, and the time expended by them respectively in the public service, and that such opinion has been officially communicated to the Directors, and that in consequence the guarantee will not be continued. If my anticipation turns out correct, some inquiries on the subject ought to take place, because such conduct on the part of the Directors must materially affect the independence of the judges, and is a breach of the contract between His Majesty and the East India Company.

The above-mentioned list of salaries bears for date the 1st of November 1827. The salaries of the interpreters and native officers at Malacca and Singapore were not fixed until May 1828. And since 1st November 1827 the following appointments and changes in the amount of salaries at Penang have taken place, viz.: R. Allan, the chief clerk, having died in January 1828, the salaries of the junior clerks, A. and B. Rodyk, were increased from 200 to 300 rupees each, and that of R. Carty to 200 rupees; no chief clerk having been appointed in the room of R. Allan, deceased. Mr. Caunter, the clerk to the recorder, having accepted the office of principal law-officer to the East India Company within the united settlement, Mr. James Glass was appointed clerk to the recorder, with a salary of 150 rupees per mensem, since raised to 200 rupees; and John Gifford Symons has been appointed chief interpreter throughout the settlement.

There is no doubt but that the court of judicature would fully pay the expense of the establishment by fees, if a steam vessel were supplied by the East India Company, to enable the recorder, the sole professional judge, to visit each station four times a year, and be present at all the civil and criminal sessions of the settlement.

The governor of the settlement, and the resident councillors of Penang, Singapore and Malacca, receive no salary or emolument as judges of the court, over and above such salaries as are allowed to them respectively for their services as governor or president and council of the settlement.

The recorder receives a salary of 18,000 dollars per annum.

The coroners are paid by salaries from Government, and receive no fees.

The charter (page 13 of the printed copies) expressly provides and directs that no court shall be holden and no act done by the said court without the presence of the recorder, if he shall be resident within the settlement; and (page 33) that, "except in the case of the vacancy of the office of recorder of Prince of Wales Island, Singapore and Malacca, or in case of the absence of the said recorder from the said settlement, or in case, by reason of sickness or other misfortune, the said recorder shall be incapable of attending to business, that none other of the judges of the said court shall be competent to make an order, or do any act out of court, in any civil matter, suit or concern, unless the recorder shall be previously summoned to meet the judges about to make such order, or do such act, in order to assist him with his opinion thereon."

In consequence of the refusal of the East India Company to provide a steam vessel for the conveyance of the court establishment from Penang to Singapore and Malacca, the judicial business of both places must be conducted wholly during eight months in each year by the resident councillors, who are civil servants of the East India Company, and not removable by His Majesty, and the resident councillors and magistrates of Singapore and Malacca must try prisoners for felony at quarter sessions without the presence of the professional judge. If such practice is within the letter of the charter, it is decidedly contrary to its spirit, but there is no remedy.

Of fees on the criminal side in proceedings before the court of Oyer and Terminer, or quarter sessions, I entirely disapprove. If paid by individuals, the course of justice will probably be impeded by discouraging prosecutions. If paid by government, an uncertain and indefinite expense will be incurred; nearly all criminal cases coming before the court, and sent by the sitting justices, being virtually public suits; if necessary, we may recommend government to allow a clerk of the crown to conduct them.

STATEMENT of the TABLE OF FEES in the Supreme Court at Calcutta, and of the SALARIES and EMOLUMENTS of the several Officers.

LETTER to the Secretary of the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India,
 Sir, Calcutta, March 1829.

TWO or three days before the beginning of the fourth term of the last year, we received the letter of the Earl of Melville, dated 26th of May 1828, inclosing a copy of certain orders of the House of Commons, bearing date the 22d of the same month.

On the 22d of October, that being the first day of the fourth term, we announced the orders in open court, and directed that copies should be affixed in a conspicuous place in the Court-house, with a notice that the information called for was to be supplied to the Judges, if possible, before the last day of the term. Before the end of the year we received the reports or returns of the several officers of the court; and the delay since that time has been owing to the pressure of business in the court, and to the necessity of making some references to correspondence which at different times has taken place between the court and the Government. Having added to the reports of the other officers our own statements of our salaries, we directed the registrar to transmit the whole to you in duplicate by the H. C. ships Rose and James Sibbald, which we are informed has been done. We intend that another copy of the Papers shall be sent to the Governor General in Council, and that another shall be placed amongst the records in the Registrar's Office.

We feel some doubt whether the House of Commons may not have meant to inquire into the emoluments of the barristers and attorneys of the court, as well as those of persons holding offices; and we have not taken upon ourselves to give any less extended construction to the orders; but at the same time we have not thought the intention of the House so clear, as to authorize us to resort to any compulsory proceeding against the barristers or attorneys; none of whom have made any returns. If the intentions of the House have not been fulfilled, it will be necessary that we should have further instructions.

By these returns we learn that there are fees charged in some of the offices of the court which have not been set forth in any of the tables of fees, nor established by any rules of court. This appears to have arisen, in most instances if not in all, from an omission on the part of the court to make specific provisions for those branches of the business of the court for which the fees are charged; such as the copies of probates, administrations and registrar's accounts, supplied quarterly to the Government and to the India House; the Judges' certificates authenticating papers sent to England, which usually are voluminous and of considerable importance; and those cases in which the registrar is obliged to correspond with persons on the subject of marriage-licenses, or of assets for which they are accountable. We are informed that these fees have all been brought to the notice of former Judges of the court, and have been allowed by them; but we think it desirable, as far as it is possible, consistently with the multifarious and varying business of the court, that no fees should be taken except such as are included in some published table; and having previously had the intention to make some new rules respecting other parts of the practice of the court, we have taken this opportunity of forming several, which will be submitted without delay to the Governor General in Council, whose sanction is required by the charter for any alteration of the established fees; and as soon as these new rules shall have been approved by the Council, they will be transmitted to you for the information of the Board of Commissioners.

The emoluments of the registrar considerably exceed what the Judges had previously supposed them to be; but it appears that this is owing to a great increase of business of late years. The duties of receiver of estates, which are very peculiar, were cast upon the registrar only for a time, and whilst an alteration was taking place in the Accountant-general's office; and they are now transferred to another officer. The Judges are

desirous that the Board of Commissioners may observe that the duties of the registrar are extremely extensive, and include two distinct offices, which are perhaps the most important in the whole court; that of registrar in the Court of Equity, and that of registrar in the Ecclesiastical Court. The present registrar is a person of much ability and experience, and is able to carry on the business of both these offices in a satisfactory manner; but in the event of his leaving the court we should, in all probability, find it necessary to place the two offices in separate hands, and we doubt whether the emoluments of either would be more than sufficient to induce barristers in this country of adequate ability and experience to undertake it.

The return of the sheriff of the last year will not be found amongst the rest, the undersheriff having stated to us at the time the other returns were made, that it was impossible to make up the accounts.

RULES and ORDERS of the Court relating to Fees; and regulating the Master in Taxation of Costs.

BESIDES the foregoing Table of Fees, the following RULES and ORDERS relating to and regulating Fees are in force: some of them were passed anterior to the date of the Table of Fees, and the rest were framed as occasion required, either as alterations in, or additions to the Table of Fees. They are here placed according to their Dates, without reference to the Side of the Court to which they relate.

THAT no attorney of this court do demand or receive the amount of any bill, or any part thereof, for business done in this court, till such time as the same have been taxed by the proper officer, who shall subscribe his name thereto, nor shall demand or receive any sum of money whatsoever for any business done or to be done in this court, without delivering in his bill of costs to the person from whom such money shall be due, except small advances in the progress of the cause; and that any attorney or attorneys receiving such advances shall within four days after the judgment or other final conclusion of the cause account before the master of this court for the money so advanced.

76th Plea Rule.
3d Term, 1776.

It is ordered, that the sheriff and all the officers of this court do make out separate general accounts of all the business done in their several offices within the hereinafter mentioned periods, by each attorney or proctor respectively, and of the fees which the said sheriff and officers take or charge thereon, and lay the same before the master at the four several times in every year hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, an account of business done from the twentieth day of December unto the twenty-fourth day of February next ensuing, both days inclusive, on or before the last day of the month of February; of business done from the twenty-fifth day of February unto the thirtieth day of April next ensuing, both days inclusive, on or before the tenth day of June next ensuing; of business done from the first day of May unto the fifteenth day of September next ensuing, both days inclusive, on or before the first day of October next ensuing; and of business done from the sixteenth day of September unto the nineteenth day of December next ensuing, both days inclusive, on or before the second day of January next ensuing; and that besides the before-mentioned general accounts, the said sheriff and officers do within two days after judgment given in any cause, in the first twenty-four days of every term (if required by the party or his attorney so to do,) make out and deliver to him, without taxation, a particular account of all such business (as has not already been included in any of the before-

mentioned general accounts,) that remains to be done to complete the judgment in their respective offices, in the said cause for the party that has obtained the said judgment. And it is ordered, that the Master do upon the delivery of the said general accounts appoint a convenient time or times for the said sheriff and officers, and the attornies or proctors respectively, to attend before him for the taxing of their several accounts; and that the master, at the time and times so appointed for each account respectively, do examine the said account and correct the same, and do certify in writing upon the account the amount he thereupon allows, and affix his signature thereto, without taking any fee; and that the sheriff and officers do, after the taxing aforesaid, deliver the said accounts to the several attornies or proctors for whom the business has been done respectively, and repay or account for to the said attorney or proctor whatever he may have received, more than the master shall in such manner have allowed; and after the first day of each term next ensuing the before-mentioned periods for delivering in accounts, the said sheriff and officers shall not take any fee or fees from any attorney or proctor for any business done or to be done in their respective offices, nor be at liberty to avail themselves of the sixth rule of this court for the recovery of any fees that may be due to them from any attorney or proctor, by stopping his practice, unless they shall have delivered to the said attorney or proctor the before-mentioned taxed accounts of business done for him, and shall have complied with the requisitions of this rule, according to the true intent and meaning thereof.

92d Plea Rule.
4th Term 1798.

The Court thinking it necessary that the fees in future to be given by attornies should be as certain and uniform as possible; do order, that in taxing the bills of the attornies of this court, as between attorney and client, the master do in future allow no other or larger general retaining fee than five gold mohurs, nor allow the same to be repeated in the same bill oftener than once in the same year, if the party giving desire its effects to continue; and that no other or larger fee than two gold mohurs be allowed as a special retaining fee, although such fees may have been given by the special orders or directions of the client himself. And whereas, notwithstanding the directions contained in the 76th rule of this court on the plea side, which orders that no attorney do in future demand or receive the amount of any bill, or any part thereof, for business done in this court, till such time as the same shall have been taxed by the proper officer, who shall subscribe his name therefo, it has hitherto not been the practice to bring bills for retainers before the master of this court for taxation, it is ordered, that no attorney of this court do present any bill, demanding payment for business done in his office, whether the same be for retainers or for any other business of whatsoever nature done by him as an attorney of this court, until the same shall have been taxed by the proper officer. It is likewise ordered, that the attornies of this court do henceforth by themselves or their clerks, pay all such fees as they may have occasion to disburse, and that they take special care that no retainer or other fees be paid through the intervention of any native inhabitant of this country, or other person not in the service of such attorney, and charged in their bill; and the master is directed not to allow, upon taxation, fees being paid without the intervention of an attorney, and also to report the same to the court. The master is hereby further directed not to allow any fee, unless the amount of the same, together with the date at which it was given, be written on the brief or other papers produced as vouchers of the same, and signed by the counsel receiving the same; and the master is not in any case to allow refreshing fees, whether the same be claimed between party and party, or between attorney and client, except such refreshing fees as may be given where the cause is adjourned or postponed from one term or sittings to another. The clerk of the papers is ordered not to set down any cause for hearing until the attorney applying for having the same set down, has filed a certificate with him, stating the cause or causes, relating to which his application is made, will be ready for trial on the day marked in his instructions for entering it for hearing, and also that it is *bonâ fide*, his intention to try the same; all such certificates to be handed over by the clerk of the papers at the end of each term or sittings to the master of this court, and the said certificate to be deemed and taken to be a part of the attorney's instructions to the officer for setting down the cause. The master is directed not to allow any charge for dismissing witnesses during the time the cause stands on the paper for trial, during the time of the trial of the same; and the daily attendance of the attornies while their causes are on trial shall be reckoned at four attendances, and the master shall allow the same accordingly. The master also is directed not to allow any charge for the receipt of letters, rules or copies of rules, or notices or other papers, except in cases where it was necessary to serve the same on the attorney. It is ordered, that no officer of this court do make any charge for his attendance with papers, records, grounds of rules, bills, answers or other pleadings, or other matters or things from his office, except for the day or days on which he has received notice to attend, such attendance to be charged as a single attendance only, if the cause or motion be not heard, and when the cause or motion is heard, not be charged as more than four hours. It is ordered, that no officer of this court do charge more than one search in each term or sitting for the papers or records he has had notice to produce at the trial of any cause set down for hearing or on motion. It is ordered, that one search only be allowed for making office-copies of papers in any one cause, unless such office-copies be required from the officer granting the same upon different days; the cause of such additional searches, if they should be made, to be strictly inquired into by the master. It is ordered, that all names of the witnesses required by any one party to attend at the trial of a cause, be inserted in one subpoena, and that copies of such subpoena (showing at the same time the original to the party required to attend) be served by the attorney and not by the sheriff as heretofore; and that

that where more than one subpoena is taken out and charged for, the attorney must satisfy the master taxing his bill upon oath, if required, of the necessity for taking out such subpoena, and of his not having known, at the time he took out the first subpoena, that the persons whose names are inserted in the other subpoena or subpoenas were necessary witnesses in the cause. It is ordered, that the attorneys of this court be allowed to make no other charges for their attendances in taking out and serving subpoenas than such as are directed to be allowed in a table of the charges for suing out subpoenas, left in the master's office, with the approbation of the judges, and of which he will furnish the attorneys with copies if required. It is also ordered, that the costs of entering up judgment by confession on a new warrant of attorney, do not exceed three gold mohurs, and upon an old warrant of attorney, that the same do not exceed four gold mohurs and one half. The attendances and other charges allowed to be made by the attorneys, and the fees allowed to be charged by the officers of the court, will be found in a schedule left in the master's office, with the approbation of the judges, and of which he will furnish copies if required. The judges have also directed certain charges hitherto made for suing out execution to be disallowed; a table of such charges as are allowed to be made in future, will also be found in the master's office.

Whereas certain charges for keeping possession under writs of sequestration or other process of this court, and for drawing bonds of indemnity in certain cases, have been demanded and received by the sheriff or his deputy, or other person acting under them, it is ordered, That in future neither the sheriff or his deputy, or any person under him for them, or acting by their authority or in their names, do take, demand or receive, either directly or indirectly, by themselves, or by any person for their use and benefit, any money, gift, gratuity or reward for keeping possession, of goods, or lands in Calcutta, taken under execution or sequestration issuing from this court, or for drawing bonds of indemnity as aforesaid, nor is any other or greater fee to be demanded or received or taken, upon any account, or pretence whatsoever, for drawing bills of sale, than that already allowed by the table of fees; and that no charge of any sort for any thing herein above specified be allowed to be made as against any plaintiff or defendant, or against the estate or goods of any such defendant, or as against any attorney employed by such plaintiff or defendant, upon any pretence whatsoever; and every sheriff or under-sheriff, or other person, making any such charge, or asking, receiving or demanding any such fees or rewards as aforesaid, shall meet with the severest animadversion of the court; and every attorney or officer of this court, against whom such charge shall be made, or from whom such sum or sums shall be demanded, shall report the same to the court as soon as possible. And whereas the advertising for sale property seized by the sheriff has been attended with great and unnecessary expense to the suitors, as well from the notices having been printed three or four times, as from the sums charged for printing, it is ordered, that from and after the last day of this present term, all notices of the sale of houses, lands or ships in Calcutta by the sheriff be in future inserted only once, and in the Calcutta Gazette, and that on the day week subsequent to the publication of such notice, the property be publicly sold at the sheriff's office in the court-house, four written copies of the printed notice of sale in the English and Native languages to be put up at the following places; one set on the door or some other conspicuous part of the house or other premises to be sold, one set on the east gate of the old fort, one set at the Bankshall, and one on the chief entrance to the court-house. It is further ordered, that no greater sum be allowed for printing than four annas per line, the vouchers for the payment of which, signed by the proprietor of the Calcutta Gazette, and specifying the number of lines in each advertisement, and in each cause separately, are to be produced to the master on taxation. And it is further ordered, that the sheriff do use means to render this regulation as public as possible before the last day of this term. It is further ordered, that no fee whatsoever be charged or received by the sheriff for a crier or auctioneer's attendance at the sale of property sold at his office: and finally it is ordered, that the sheriff, on the fourth day of every term and after the motions have been heard, do personally deliver in open court a statement in writing, signed by himself, specifying what has been done in the execution of all writs, since the date of his last return, and that the present sheriff do make such report for the first time, on the day before the last day of this present term, of all that has been done on the writs which have come into his hands since the 20th day of December last past.

73d Equity Order.
 17th January 1803.

It is hereby ordered, that from and after this day, the office of one of the sworn clerks and clerks of the depositions do cease and determine, and that in future the business of the offices shall be done by one officer. It is further ordered, that all notices which were heretofore served by or upon the sworn clerks, shall from henceforth be served by or upon the attorney in the cause, who shall be entitled to charge for the same the fee which the sworn clerks heretofore charged for receiving such notices.

It is ordered, that when the sheriff seizes or extends any debts, and has occasion to seize the same debts on behalf of another party, the following shall be deemed a sufficient description of such debts in the notices to the debtors; viz.

"The same debt due from you to A. B. which has been already seized at the suit of C. D. is now further seized at the suit of E. F."

And

And it is further ordered, That the sheriff shall not charge any fees for notices which are not served, nor any more than 2 rupees each for such notices of a second or subsequent seizure as are above directed.

In the second term 1827 the office of accountant-general of the court was put upon a new footing, and the funds were deposited with the accountant-general and sub-treasurer of the Company; the former rules relating to the office were revoked, and new rules were framed, and among others, the following, which relates to fees:

The accountant-general and sub-treasurer of the Company shall charge the like percentage on all agency for the suitors of the court as they would charge, and are accustomed to charge, upon similar agency for any creditors of the Government; and the accountant-general of the court, in lieu of all fees, poundage, commission or percentage which he may have hitherto received, and of all other fees and emoluments whatever, except such as are mentioned in the list annexed to these rules, shall receive 2 1/2 per cent, and no more, upon all monies which in any suit shall be ordered by the court to be paid to the accountant-general of the Company, and upon all interest accruing thereon.

86th Equity Order. 2d Term, 1827.

All the books of the accountant-general of the court, as well those in which orders and certificates are entered as those in which the accounts are kept, shall be at all times open during office-hours to the inspection of the suitors or their attornies, upon paying the established fees, and the following list of fees is prescribed and established for the office of the accountant-general of the court, and he is strictly prohibited and forbidden from taking any larger or other fees whatsoever, save and except his commission of 2 1/2 per cent, as is afore-mentioned in these rules.

The accountant-general of the court shall not demand or receive any fee whatever for or in respect of any thing which by the foregoing rules is directed to be done; and the accountant-general of the court shall be responsible for any loss which may be incurred by his delivering any such order or cheque as is aforesaid to any person not entitled to receive the same, and for any other thing which by him may be done or ordered contrary to the true intent and meaning of any order of the court of which he shall have had notice; and in case the said accountant-general of the court shall entertain doubts as to the true intent and meaning of any order, under which he shall be called upon to act, in pursuance to these rules, it shall be lawful for him, instead of giving a cheque or order as aforesaid, to require the party or parties to make an application to the court, or to some judge, thereof, for the purpose of receiving directions respecting the same.

95th Equity Order 3d Term, 1828.

In the 4th term 1828, the following rule was formed by the court, and the schedule of fees therein referred to was also approved by the Governor General in Council.

Whereas by the eleventh rule of the rules relating to juries in this Honourable Court, it is amongst other things ordered, that "the person or party who shall apply for a special jury shall pay such fees for striking such jury as shall be prescribed by the court." And whereas the clerk of the crown has laid before the court a statement of the business done in his office, upon the applications that have been made for special juries under the said eleventh rule, and the court having taken the same into consideration, do order, that the annexed table of fees demandable by the clerk of the crown for the business done in his office upon such applications, as aforesaid, and no other, be in future allowed by the master for the matters and things therein specified. Dated this twenty-seventh day of October 1828.

RULES and FEES established by Order of the Judges, the 15th of June 1829.

IN the Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal.

THE following Rules and Fees are established by order of the Judges, this 15th day of June, in the year of our Lord 1829, the concurrence of the Governor General in Council, according to the 12th clause of the Letters patent of 1774, having been previously ascertained and signified.

1.—Except by special order of the court, no warrant of attorney shall be filed, unless it be signed by each person by whom it purports to be given; nor if there be any mark instead of signature, unless, together with the warrant, there be filed an affidavit of the due execution thereof; nor if there be any signature by procuracy, unless there either be some sufficient written authority or duly attested copy thereof filed at the same time as the warrant, together with an affidavit of the due execution of the original, or at least of the handwriting of the party who hath signed the same; or in case the warrant be signed by a native gomastah or mooktear acting for his principal without any written authority, unless there be an affidavit filed by the party who signs the warrant, explaining the nature of the authority under which he acts: provided always, that nothing herein contained shall prevent any one partner of any mercantile firm or partnership in trade from signing any warrant of attorney on behalf of himself and partners, when he would otherwise have been lawfully entitled so to do.

2.—All decrees and orders for the payment of money shall be drawn for the payment of the money to the party or parties who shall be entitled to receive the same, and not to the parties or their attornies.

3.—The time for pleading, answering or demurring to a bill in equity shall be six weeks, if the defendant be resident in Calcutta; and if he be resident in any other part of India, two months.

4.—The time for replying or setting down exceptions to an answer shall be one month, if the complainant be resident in Calcutta; and if he be resident in any other part of India, six weeks: and there shall be no order, in any case, for delivering or setting down exceptions *nunc pro tunc*.

5.—Upon all applications for further time, the court, if it shall think fit, for reasons specially stated upon affidavit, will make the order absolute, in the first instance, upon such terms and conditions as may be reasonable.

6.—No

6.—No bill in equity shall be filed on behalf of any infant without leave previously obtained from the Court, or a judge in chambers, upon special affidavit, stating the circumstances and reasons which make it for the benefit of the infant that the suit should be instituted.

7.—In all cases in which parties are at liberty, in the High Court of Chancery in England, to show cause against decrees which have been obtained against them, they shall have the like liberty in this court; and the fifty-third equity rule shall in future be observed, as well where any bill is taken pro confesso for want of an answer, after the defendant shall have appeared, as where any defendant, having answered, shall neglect to attend upon any subpoena to hear judgment.

8.—When any *capias ad respondendum* shall issue against any person resident beyond the limits of Calcutta, if upon the trial of the cause it shall appear that the debt might have been sued for in any court of the district in which the party resided at the time of suing out the process, no costs shall be awarded or allowed to the plaintiff, unless he shall recover damages to the amount of more than four hundred rupees.

9.—On every attachment for want of an answer to a bill in equity, the words "for want of an answer," shall be indorsed by the registrar; and if the attachment is to be executed beyond the limits of Calcutta, the party suing out the same shall be at liberty to file an affidavit that the answer of the party against whom the same is sued out is necessary to enable him to proceed in the suit; and, upon such affidavit being filed, the registrar shall further indorse on the writ the words "affidavit filed;" but without such last-mentioned indorsement the sheriff shall not be required to arrest any person beyond the limits of Calcutta, upon any attachment for want of an answer; and if the party is not to be found within the limits of Calcutta the sheriff shall make his return to that effect; and such further process shall thereupon be issued as if the sheriff had returned that the party was not to be found within his bailiwick.

10.—In all cases in which any attachment or other process is sued out against any person for nonpayment of any sum of money, the sum, for the nonpayment of which the process is to issue, shall be indorsed thereon by the officer out of whose office the process shall issue.

11.—In all cases in which any *capias ad respondendum* or other mesne process or attachment, or other process of contempt, is to be sued out for the arrest of any person who is resident beyond the limits of Calcutta, it shall be lawful for the party at whose suit the process is to issue, to make application, supported by affidavit or solemn affirmation, that the sum which will be required to cover the necessary and unavoidable expenses of making the arrest, may be by him advanced to the sheriff, and indorsed on the writ; and if the court or judge to whom such application shall be made shall be satisfied of the reasonableness and necessity thereof, there shall be inserted, in the order for the issuing of the writ, a specific direction that the party may advance a sum certain for the costs of the execution of such process; and that the sheriff, upon receiving the same, shall certify on the back of the process that it hath been advanced to him, by permission of the court or of a judge, as the case may be.

12.—In all cases in which the sheriff shall arrest any person upon mesne process beyond the limits of Calcutta, it shall be lawful for him to discharge the party upon receiving from him the sum for which he shall have been directed by the writ to take bail, and also any sum which may have been indorsed upon the writ, according to the preceding rule; or if the party shall refuse to deposit such sums, and is unable to give bail, then instead of bringing the party forthwith to Calcutta, it shall be lawful for the sheriff, upon the request of the party, to detain him in custody at the place where he shall have been arrested, or at some convenient place in the neighbourhood, for such time as may be necessary or reasonable to enable the party to obtain bail, or to communicate with Calcutta; and the sheriff in all cases in which he shall receive any such sums in deposit, shall forthwith pay them to the proper officer, to abide the order of the court.

13.—In all cases in which the sheriff shall arrest any person beyond the limits of Calcutta, upon any attachment or other process for nonpayment of money, he may in like manner discharge the party from arrest, upon receiving the sum or sums of money which shall have been indorsed upon the writ, according to the foregoing rules.

14.—When the sheriff shall arrest any person beyond the limits of Calcutta, upon any attachment, *capias* of contempt, or other process for want of an appearance, it shall be lawful for him to discharge the party, upon receiving from him any sum of money indorsed upon the writ, according to the preceding rules, and also a warrant duly signed by the party, and directed to any attorney of the court, and attested by one credible witness, authorizing such attorney to enter an appearance for him; and every appearance entered under the authority of any such warrant so given as aforesaid, shall be valid and effectual to all intents and purposes, provided it be entered within one month after the warrant shall have been given, but not otherwise.

15.—That from and after the day of December in the present year, the sheriff shall defray, out of the emoluments of his office, the whole salaries of his banian, cashier, sircars and writers; and shall not charge the Government with any part thereof.

16.—Whereas, it hath hitherto been usual for the master, upon sales of estates in his office, and upon other occasions, to receive and pay monies without such monies being placed to the credit of the cause in the books of the accountant-general, and to charge a commission or poundage on the same, it is ordered, that in future no monies whatever shall be received and paid by the master, but shall be received and paid by the accountant-general and sub-treasurer of the Company, with the privity of the accountant-general of the court; and no other commission or poundage shall be charged thereon, but that which is allowed to the accountant-general of the court.

17.—The master shall not, in any case in which he issues a warrant or summons, require any proof of any other notice having been given to the party on whom the warrant or summons shall have been served; nor shall the master in such cases, upon the taxation of any bill of costs, allow any charge to be made for any notice.

18.—Upon all searches and examinations of books or papers in the master's office, the parties or their attornies upon each attendance shall be at liberty to search and examine during the whole of the time that the office is usually open on any one day, without being charged by the master for more than one attendance upon him.

19.—The master shall enter in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, the name or title of every cause or matter referred to him, and the time when the decree or order is brought into his office, and the date and description of every subsequent step taken before him in the same cause or matter, and the attendance or non-attendance of the several parties in each of such steps, so that such book may exhibit at one view the whole course of proceeding which is had before him in each particular cause and matter.

20.—Upon the bringing in of every decree or order, the solicitor bringing in the same shall take out a warrant, appointing a time, which is to be settled by the master, for the purpose of the master taking into consideration the matter of the said decree or order, and shall serve the same upon the other parties or their solicitors.

21.—At the time so appointed for considering the matter of the said decree or order, the master shall proceed to regulate, as far as may be, the manner of its execution; as, for example, to state what parties are entitled to attend future proceedings, to direct the necessary advertisements, and to point out which of the several proceedings may be properly going on *pari passu*, and as to what particular matters interrogatories for the examination of the parties appear to be necessary, and whether the matters requiring evidence shall be proved by affidavit or by examination of witnesses; and in the latter case, if necessary, to issue his certificate for a commission; and if the master shall think it expedient so to do, he shall then fix a certain time or certain times within which the parties are to take any certain proceeding or proceedings before him.

22.—Where the party actually prosecuting a decree or order does not proceed before the master with due diligence, there the master shall be at liberty, upon the application of any other party interested, either as a party to the suit or as one who has come in and established his claim before the master under the decree or order, to commit to him the prosecution of the said decree or order; and from thenceforth neither the party making default, nor his solicitor, shall be at liberty to attend the master as the prosecutor of the said decree or order.

23.—Upon any application made by any person to the court, the master, if required by the person making the application, shall, in as short a manner as he conveniently can, certify to the court the several proceedings which shall have been had in his office in the same cause or matter, and the dates thereof.

24.—Where by any decree or order of the court, books, papers or writings directed to be produced before the master for the purposes of such decree or order, it shall be in the discretion of the master to determine what books, papers or writings are to be produced, and when and for how long they are to be left in his office; or in case he shall not deem it necessary that such books, papers or writings should be left or deposited in his office, then he may give directions for the inspection thereof by the parties requiring the same, at such time, and in such manner as he shall deem expedient.

25.—All parties accounting before the master shall bring in their accounts in the form of debtor and creditor; and any of the other parties who shall not be satisfied with the accounts so brought in, shall be at liberty to examine the accounting party upon interrogatories, as the master shall direct.

26.—In all matters referred to him, the master shall be at liberty, upon the application of any party interested, to make a separate report or reports from time to time, as to him shall seem expedient; the costs of such separate reports to be in the discretion of the court.

27.—Where a master shall make a separate report of debts or legacies, there, the master shall be at liberty to make such certificate as he thinks fit, with respect to the state of the assets; and every person interested shall thereupon be at liberty to apply to the court, as he shall be advised.

28.—Whenever, in any proceeding before a master, the same solicitor is employed for two or more parties, such master may, at his discretion, require that any of the said parties shall be represented before him by a distinct solicitor, and may refuse to proceed until such party is so represented.

29.—The names of any number of the witnesses required by any one party to attend upon a reference before the master, shall be inserted in one summons, at the request of the party.

30.—No attendance in any case shall be charged by the master for swearing any witness, except where a party is to be sworn to an answer to a bill in equity; but the proper oaths in all other cases shall be administered by him without any other fee or charge than that which is provided by the table of fees for every oath administered; and for swearing parties to answers, there shall be the further charge for attendances as upon ordinary occasions, and nothing more.

31.—Whereas, by the table hereunto annexed, the fees of the master and of the attorneys for attending upon references are much increased, it is declared, that such fees are to be charged only on attendances which, according to the rules of the court, are effectual for the purposes of the reference; but where any attendance is rendered ineffectual by the default of any party, the master may charge the party in default with the same fees which would have been charged to him if he had been present, and there had been an effectual attendance: and in order to secure regularity in this respect, the master is required to state at the foot of every report the number of effectual attendances on the matter of the reference which have been necessary, and for which he has allowed the parties to be charged.

32.—In cases respecting marriage licences, or the filing of inventories or accounts of assets, but in no other cases, if the registrar in the Ecclesiastical court shall be called upon by any party residing at the time beyond the limits of Calcutta to do any act or transact any business for which no fee shall have been allowed to him as registrar by any table of fees or rule of court, it shall be lawful for the registrar to charge such fees as would be given to a proctor for the same business, according to the table of fees and rules of court; provided always, that the registrar shall not transact any business whatever as a proctor for any person who is at the time an inhabitant of Calcutta; and in all cases in which executors or administrators shall neglect to file their inventories or accounts for two months beyond the time allowed to them by law, the registrar is ordered to issue the necessary citations and other process to compel the filing of the same, and to charge the parties making default with the costs thereof.

33.—In all cases in which it shall be referred to the master to inquire and report who is a fit and proper person to be the receiver of any estate or property, or guardian of the property of any infant, or manager of any estate or property, for the purpose of giving effect to any charitable bequest; the master shall also inquire and report what will be a proper commission, poundage or salary to be allowed; and whenever, for want of any proper person who is willing to undertake any such duty, it shall become necessary to name the officer of the court who shall have been appointed by the court to be receiver of estates and guardian of infants and lunatics, the said officer shall pass his accounts half-yearly before the master, in such manner as any other receiver, manager or guardian ought to do; once in the year, and in like manner as other receivers are required to do upon passing their accounts, he shall pay all monies into the hands of the accountant-general, and sub-treasurer of the Company, with the privity of the accountant-general of the court; and the master in equity is required to report any default of the officer in these respects, in like manner as by the seventy-first equity rule he is required to report the default of other receivers.

34.—Attendances with papers shall not be charged by the officers or attorneys according to the number of the papers with which they attend, but single attendances only shall be charged, whatever the number of the papers may be with which a person attends at any one time in any one case. And the registrar, sworn clerk, clerk of the papers, and prothonotary, shall not charge any more than one attendance on any one day, whether the cause be tried or heard on that day or not, for attending with the papers in any cause set down for hearing or trial; and no charges shall be allowed by the master for any attendances in court in any cause standing in the paper, on those days which are appropriated to the hearing of contested motions, which at present are Mondays and Thursdays in term time.

35.—For the purpose of enabling all persons to obtain precise information as to the state of any suit or proceeding in equity, and to take the means of preventing improper delay in the progress thereof, the sworn clerk shall, at the request of any person, whether a party or not in the suit or matter inquired after, furnish a certificate of the state of the cause,

specifying therein the dates and general description of the several proceedings which have been taken.

36.—If any party shall neglect to give the proper notice to the prothonotary, according to the forty-second plea rule, to make up the record, and the prothonotary shall bring the default to the notice of the court at the time the cause is called for trial, the cause shall stand over, and the party making default shall pay the costs consequent thereon as between attorney and client.

37.—The accountant-general of the court shall not charge any commission or poundage upon monies paid into the hands of the accountant-general and sub-treasurer of the Company by any officer of the court, as receiver of any estate or property or guardian of the property of any infant or lunatic.

38.—The fee of the accountant-general for any certificate of the state of the funds in any cause is reduced to five rupees.

39.—The fee of the sealer for affixing the seal to proceedings to be sent to England is reduced to sixteen rupees; and it shall be lawful for him to demand and receive the like fee for affixing the seal to any papers to be sent beyond the limits of the presidency of Fort William and the provinces subordinate thereto.

40.—In all cases in which any certificate of any judge is required, it shall be drawn and engrossed by the registrar, prothonotary, clerk of the papers, or other officer whose papers are to be certified; and no judge's clerk shall demand or take any fee for drawing or engrossing the same.

41.—On or before the last day of the fourth term in every year the registrar and the prothonotary shall each present to the court a table of the established fees; and in case it shall be necessary to make any addition thereto, or alteration therein, proper measures shall be taken to obtain the concurrence of the Governor General in Council for such additions or alterations; and as soon as the table shall be finally settled and approved, the seal of the court shall be affixed thereto, and it shall be published in the first week in January, or as soon after as may be, in the Government Gazette, and such other public newspaper as the court shall direct; and a copy of the Gazette or paper containing such table shall be sent to the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India.

42.—No officer of the court or attorney shall, upon any pretence, nor for any reason whatsoever, demand or receive any other fee than such as shall have been established by the subsisting table of fees, or allowed by some written and subsisting order of the Court, with the express concurrence of the Governor General in Council; and whenever any thing shall be required to be done by any officer or attorney, for which no fee shall have been before provided and established, such officer or attorney shall bring the same to the notice of the court by petition, in such manner that a written rule or order may be made respecting the same.

43.—In like manner, and at the same times as the other officers make out their accounts for taxation by the master, the master shall also make out separate and general accounts of the business done in his office; and at the times at which the other officers are directed by the 88th plea rule, to lay their accounts before the master, the master shall lay his before the junior judge of the court, who will thereupon proceed to tax the master's accounts in the same manner as the accounts of the other officers are taxed by the master; and the master shall thereupon deliver his accounts to attorneys or parties in like manner, and subject to the same conditions as are prescribed for the other officers by the rule aforesaid.

44.—If any officer shall neglect for one term to compel the payment of his fees, according to the provisions of the 6th plea rule, his remedy for them shall be absolutely gone; and it shall not be lawful for him afterwards to demand or receive the same, or any part thereof, except by leave of the court.

45.—Whenever any party shall think himself aggrieved by any allowance by the master of any bill of costs, and shall leave a copy of the bill, together with his name and place of abode, and a statement of his objections, with one of the judges clerks, the clerk shall forthwith bring the same to the notice of the judge, who will take such steps for inquiring into the matter as to him shall seem expedient.

46.—The following fees are allowed and established.
