TERMS OF REFERENCE.

To report and make recommendations in regard to-

- (1) The adequacy of existing arrangements in India for facilitating the access of Indian students to the United Kingdom, including the constitution and working of the Advisory Committees and their future relations to the Provincial Governments;
- (2) The extent and directions in which the Secretary of State's control should be exercised as distinct from the actual work of administration which will be entrusted to the High Commissioner;
- (3) Details of the work to be undertaken in the United Kingdom and the relations that should be established with Universities and other institutions or bodies or with manufacturers or commercial firms in order to provide for the admission of Indian students and the provision of any special or technical training that may be required; and
- (4) Any other question affecting the education or well-being of Indian students in this or any other country upon which the Committee may desire to make recommendations.
