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FOREWORD

MR. WILLIAM C. MULLENDORE was an important staff member of the United States Food Administration during the World War. After the Armistice he prepared the official history of the Food Administration, completing it in 1921. The introduction was written by Mr. Hoover in 1920. Both reports were based largely upon documents now in the Hoover Library on War, Revolution, and Peace. As the appearance of a world-wide food problem now renders these records of special significance, the Hoover Library has decided to publish them without any changes in the texts.

When President Wilson outlined May 19, 1917, the administration's food-control policy and announced that Herbert Hoover would accept the post of American Food Administrator there had already been a great deal of discussion in the press as to his coming to Washington from the Commission for Relief in Belgium and direct relations with food control departments in Europe to take the position of Food Dictator or Food Controller. These titles and their implications were far from Mr. Hoover's taste, or his approach to his new job. Such terms were necessary in Europe, but Mr. Hoover believed and proved that the American people and food industries could and would act voluntarily if they understood the need and were satisfied with the soundness of the methods proposed to accomplish the results. So it was as "United States Food Administrator" that he initiated this great undertaking, under five cardinal principles of food administration with delegation of authority, but proving for all time the efficiency of decentralized administration. There was no precedent to guide this type of vast organization. The details of means and measures were actually evolved from our own commercial institutions with the experience of the vast European laboratory of food control problems as a guard against repeating errors.

Since Mr. Hoover and Mr. Mullendore compiled these reports of the activities of the United States Food Administration, a number of books relating to special features of the Food Administration have been published. They have dealt with many branches of the service but none of them describes the Administration as a whole and the problems which it had to meet.

Of use only to a few students and accessible at the Hoover Library, and for the most part in the *Annual Report of the Food Administration for 1918*, published in Washington in 1919, they are not included here. Likewise certain of the price tables have been omitted as they represent more details than are now of importance.

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APPENDIX A

ORGANIZATION OF THE UNITED STATES FOOD ADMINISTRATION
