INTRODUCTION

For the Second Plan of Assam, the Planning Commission had approved a total outlay of Rs.57.94 crores. Against this allocation a total expenditure of about Rs.54.50 crores was incurred. This is against the First Plan expenditure of Rs.20.50 crores. During 1958-59, in view of foreign exchange difficulties, the Planning Commission reduced the outlay on the National Plan from Rs.4,800 crores to Rs.4,500 crores. Ultimately, however, the expenditure on the National Second Plan was about Rs.4,600 crores. Judged by the expenditure against the original outlay, plan performance in the State, during the Second Plan, was quite in keeping with the revised outlay under the National Plan. But, as the State suffers from a number of chronic disadvantages, arising out of the isolated nature of the State and lack of communication facilities, etc., it was not possible to make adequate provision under all the sectors of development within the total allocation of Rs.57.94 crores. Allocations for power and industrial development were particularly inadequate. The result was that power development in the State remained rudimentary and the pace of industrial development was insignificant. Among the other sectors, expenditure on social services continued, as in the First Plan, to dominate plan expenditure. It was about 42 per cent of the total allocation. In the field of technical education, it was possible to develop, to some extent, the technical training institutions which were functioning at the beginning of the Second Plan and some new institutions for training of technical personnel were also started. Weather continued to be a determining factor in the field of agricultural production and production varied according to the fluctuating weather conditions. Due to the virtually isolated position and communication difficulties, the flow of essential commodities and scarce materials into the State was, by and large, irregular. These handicaps resulted in high price and shortage of scarce materials with consequent delay in the completion

This review is intended to present broadly the plan performance in the State during the period of the Second Plan and is presented in two chapters supplemented by 4 Statements. While the first chapter indicates the general background, the second chapter summarises the levels of development reached at the end of the Second Plan, under the different sectors of development.

Following are the statements:—

Statement I.—This annexure indicates, under each sector, progress of expenditure and physical targets achieved, scheme-wise.

Statement II.—This annexure indicates the programme of centrally sponsored schemes implemented in the State for which central assistance was received over and above the State Plan expenditure. This annexure, however, does not include expenditure on such programmes as local development works, metric system of weights and measures, etc., for which the departments concerned obtained allocations from the Government of India direct and all matters connected there-with were processed independently by them.

Statement III.—This annexure indicates the scheme of finance indicating contributions by the State Government and the Central Government.

Statement IV.—This annexure indicates important physical targets in certain sectors of development, in a consolidated form.

GENERAL REMARKS

1. Outlay.—The outlay on the Second Five Year Plan of Assam was Rs.57.94 crores. Against this outlay, actual expenditure during the period amounted to Rs.54.48 crores. The following summary statement shows the Second Plan provision and progress of yearly expenditure by major heads of development, for the period under review.

- 2. Financing of the Plan.—For financing the approved outlay of Rs.57.94 crores the Planning Commission had originally agreed to the State contribution of Rs.17.3 crores. Later, the State contribution was raised to Rs.21.3 crores. The balance of Rs.36.34 crores was expected from the Government of India, by way of Central assistance. On the actual expenditure of Rs.54.5 crores during the quinquennium, the receipts from the Government of India, by way of Central assistance, amounted to Rs.30.4 crores. The balance of Rs 24.1 crores was, therefore, met from State resources.
- 3. State National Income.—At the commencement of the Second Plan it was estimated that State National Income would rise by 15.8 per cent corresponding to the rise of 9.2 per cent in the per capita income. Against the target, the State National Income rose by about 33 per cent in terms of current prices and by about 11 per cent in terms of 1948-49 prices over the period of the Second Plan. The State National Income and per capita inco ne for the years 1950-51, 1955-56 and 1960-61 are given in the table below:—

According to the same estimate, the Second Plan ended with 117 thousand persons unemployed of which 107 thousand persons were in the rural area of the State.

5. Price Situation.—Throughout the period of the Second Plan, prices in Assam maintained a very high trend. Vagaries of weather and fast rate of population growth were the main attributable factors. Over the period of the Second Plan, the prices in Assam had risen by 26 per cent. Food prices rose sharply between 1955 and 1957 and thereafter there was a slight downward trend. The prices of non-food articles moved, by and large, on similar line, but they again recorded an abnormal rise in 1960. After 1957 food grain prices, particularly prices of rice, received State Government's special attention and this resulted in holding the price line to a considerable extent. The measures initiated by the State Government included State trading in paddy, creation of buffer stock of food grains and setting up of fair price shops, etc.

PROGRESS UNDER INDIVIDUAL SECTOR

6. Agriculture.—Against a target of 3.82 lakks tons of additional food production set under the Second Plan, the actual realisation was of the order of 2.02 lakh tons. The food production potential, from the different schemes, was as indicated below:—

Minor Irrigation.—Minor irrigation programme executed in the State included construction of bunds and dongs to irrigate high land areas, construction of channels to drain out excess water from low-lying areas, construction of embankments to check overflow of water from streams, installation of deep tube-wells and power pumps. About 8 thousand minor irrigation projects were constructed, besides boring 8 deep tube-wells and installing about one thousand power pumps. The power pumps have become popular for spring paddy cultivation. The table below sets out the estimated acreage benefited and additional production achieved from these projects.

Fertilisers and Manures.—The use of nitrogeneous, phosphatic and potash manure was popularised among the cultivators and its consumption which was 670 tons in 1956-57 increased to about 2 thousand tons during 1960-61. The area under fertilisers and manures increased from about 13,500 acres to 22,000 acres during the period. The use of different types of fertilisers has become popular with the cultivators, especially the mixed fertilisers and bonemeal in the K. & J. Hills for growing potato. The rural compost scheme has been steadily making headway. The production has increased from about 17,000 tons during 1957-58 to 3,03,000 tons during 1960-61. Similarly the area under rural compost increased by four fold from 15,000 acres to 60,000 acres during the quinquennium. Substantial progress was also made in respect of the town compost scheme. The production which was about 660 tons during 1956-57 gradually increased and reached a figure of 2,000 tons during 1960-61. At the end of the Second Plan period, 14 town compost centres were functioning in the Municipal areas of the State. An integrated scheme for production of green manure and compost from Wardha type latrines was also carried out in 24 C. D. Blocks from 1958-59. The area benefited under the scheme, aggregated 5,000 acres in 1959-60 and 10,000 acres in 1960-61. Corresponding figures of estimated additional production were 5,000 tons and 10,000 tons respectively.

Improved Seeds.—Out of the five year target of 110 seed farms, 144 seed farms were established. With 9 seed farms established under the First Plan, altogether 153 seed farms were functioning at the end of the Second Plan. Nucleus seeds were produced in 3 farms, while in the other farms foundation seeds were produced. An area of 4,38,000 acres was

under improved seeds.

Land reclamation and development.—Originally started to reclaim land in smaller areas covered with tall grass and thick-jungles the scheme was revised in 1958-59. According to the revised scheme reclamation work was taken up in compact areas and about 7,000 bighas of land had been reclaimed. 320 families affected by floods had been resettled on these reclaimed land.

Other agricultural programmes.—The schemes of Japanese method of cultivation, plant protection, vegetable production, cash crop production, production and distribution of improved agricultural implements, etc., were other supporting schemes executed under the Second Plan to increase food production.

Horticultural development.—This programme has been in operation since 1945-46 as an integral part of the Grow-More-Food Campaign. The scheme aims at improving the standard of production in the existing gardens, increasing the area under different varieties of fruits and economic utilisation of surplus fruits in the fruit preservation centres. During the Second Plan period about 8.50 lakks of graft plants were distributed.

Agricultural Education.—The intake capacity of the Assam Agricultural College at Jorhat was raised from 35 in the First Plan to 80 in the Second Plan. Four Integrated Extension Training Centres were also established with a total intake capacity of 200 students. These trainees are expected to meet substantially requirements of village level workers. Research work was pursued under the direction of the I.C.A.R., with special reference to local problems, on such subjects as paddy, sugar cane, pulses, vegetables, plant protection measures, soil chemistry and so on.

- 7. Animal Husbandry.—According to a live-stock census carried out in 1956, the State has a live-stock population of 72.97 lakhs. The cattle are generally ill-fed and consequently they have poor milk yeilding capacity and the draught power is comparatively low. A small start, towards planned development was made under the First Plan at an expenditure of Rs. 21.77 lakhs. During the Second Plan period, measures initiated under the First Plan were extended and a few new schemes were implemented. The development work was mainly concentrated in the key village areas. Better hospital and veterinary facilities were, in the main provided in the other areas of the State. The number of Veterinary hospitals and dispensaries increased from 127 in 1955-56 to 155 at the end of 1960-61. The number of rural key village blocks and key village centres increased from 11 and 29 to 17 and 71, respectively. The Assam Veterinary College was shifted to a new site and its admission capacity was increased from 68 to 93. A Field Assistants' Training Institute was also opened in the premises of the Veterinary College, with an intake capacity of 100. These institutions are now meeting the needs of veterinary personnel of the State and neighbouring administrations. 2 PGRs, and VGRs, covering an areas of 220 acres, were improved mainly for the purpose of fodder development. Survey was carried out for control and eradication of humpsore. More than 36 lakhs of cattle were vaccinated. 2 poultry farms, 2 poultry extension centres, one duck extension centre and 3 cattle farms were established. A live-stock research station was also established for research and study of animal diseases.
- 8. Fisheries.—The State has a considerable number of rivers and tributaries, beels and swamps, tanks and ponds and low-lying areas, offering great potentialities for development of pisciculture. During the First Plan period, some measures were initiated aiming at development of the fishery resources and an expenditure of Re. 10.54 lakhs was incurred during the period. 7 fish farms and 17 seed collecting centres were established. About 70 acres of water-area were developed. During the Second Plan period, an expenditure of Rs. 63.58 lakhs was incurred in carrying out the measures initiated under the First Plan. Some new schemes, relating to the organisation of fishery co-operatives, development hill fisheries and development of fishery in the Umtru Hydro Electric Project area and the improvement of natural fisheries were taken up. Conservation measures were taken up in seed collecting areas, beside starting a few additional fish farms and developing hill and natural fisheries. Breeding operation was taken up in collaboration with the Pond Culture Unit of the Government of India. 6 additional fish farms and 10 seed collecting centres were established which includes 6 induced breeding operation centres. 1,026 acres of additional water-area were developed. A production target of 6,710 maunds of fish was achieved during the period. An expenditure of Rs. 30.59 lakhs was incurred in carrying out these measures.
- 9. Forest and Soil Conservation.—Programme of forest development in the State during the Second Five Year Plan period were continuation and elaboration of programme which had been initiated during the First Plan period. These included schemes of afforestation, plantation, improvement of forests, provision of communication facilities

increasing areas under medicinal and economic plantations, survey of raw materials, provision of amenities like schooling facilities, medical facilities, drinking water, etc., for forest-dwellers. A botanical garden and zoo was also established, besides reclamation of examindary forests and establishment of a timber treatment and seasoning plant. Area under medicinal and economic plantations was extended from 141 acres at the end of the First. Plan to 272 acres, acreage under wattle cultivation rose from 650 acres to 750 acres, khoir plantations to 333 acres, and acreage under cane-cultivation to 560 acres, during the second plan period. 600 square miles of forest land, under private ownership, were brought under State control. A beginning was made for use of secondary species of timber by provision of an Ascustreatment plant and a seasoning plant. Facilities for tourists, visiting wild-life sanctuaries, were increased by construction and improvement of 226 miles of roads. Communication system in the forest areas was strengthened by the addition of 320 miles of new roads and improvements of 718 miles of existing roads. Regeneration operation was carried over an area of 9927 acres. Rs. 97·10 lakhs were spent during the second plan period.

A small beginning was made during the second plan period in the matter of introducing soil conservation measures like afforestation, construction of bench-terraces and contour bunding, etc.

- 10. Community Development.—At the end of the First Plan, there were 27 blocks. covering 5,633 villages and a population of 17.5 lakhs over an area of 7,859 square miles. During the second plan period, 57 additional blocks were started bringing the total number of community development blocks to 84, covering a total population of 42.92 lakhs in 14,735 villages, over an area of 26,341 square miles.
- 11. Panchayat.—Following the recommendation of the Balwant Rai Mehta Committee an Act entitled "The Assam Panchayat Act, 1959" was enacted and brought into force with effect from 1st October, 1959. Under the provisions of this Act, the State has a three-tier structure, namely Gaon Panchayats at the village level, Anchalik Panchayats at the block level and Mohkuma Parishad at the subdivisional level. 2574 Gaon Panchayats, 120 Anchalik Panchayats, and 16 Mohkuma Parishads have been established, covering the entire plain districts of the State. These institutions have not been at work for long enough and their impact as popular democratic organisations is expected to be felt from the Third Plan.
- passed through considerable stresses and strains, and before the First Plan the movement was in a moribund condition. The First Plan of Assam, therefore, aimed at revitalising the movement. The Second Plan was reoriented according to the decisions taken by the National Development Council in 1958. Notable achievement during the second plan period was the establishment of 3,361 service co-operatives. These service co-operatives were entrusted with the task not only of disbursing credit but also with such other responsibilities as distribution of fertilisers and establishment of effective links between credit and marketing. Over the period of the Second Five Year Plan, the number of primary agricultural credit societies (including service co-operatives) registered a rise from 1,973 in 1955-56 to 5,296 in 1960-61 with a corresponding rise in the membership from 43,087 to 2,66,805. The total amount of loan advanced had also risen from Rs. 42 lakhs during the first plan period to Rs.452 lakhs during the second plan period. Thirty-seven co-operative unions were formed in the hill districts besides one co-operative cotton ginning mill, one co-operative rice mill and 200 large sized co-operatives were also established. The number of co-operative farming societies increased from 105 to 157. A co-operative sugarmill was established which went into production during 1958-59. A State Ware-housing Corporation, 3 processing societies and 3 marketing societies (with an apex institution to serve as a federation of these marketing societies) were organised during the period.
- 13. Flood Control.—For the Second Plan, a provision of Rs. 529 lakhs was agreed to by the Government of India. Out of this allocation, an expenditure of Rs. 422.94 lakhs was incurred. The following works were executed during the period.

Embankments and Drainage.—Twenty-eight embankment projects (started from the first plan) were completed during the second plan period. These embankments are estimated to have benefitted about 1.98 lakh acres of land. 31 new embankments, estimated to benefit about 2.7 lakh acres of land, were also taken up along the Brahmaputra and Barak and their tributaries, covering a total length of about 2 thousand miles. Seven drainage schemes were also taken up, with a potential to benefit about 32 thousand acres of low land.

Town Protection.—Eighteen town protection works were taken up, out of which 12 town protection works were completed. Work was on progress on the remaining 6 projects.

14. Major and Medium Irrigation Projects.—Under this programme collection of hydrological and minimum data of rivers was continued and a river research and soil laboratory was set up at Burnihat. But due to the dearth of qualified personnel the station could not function fully.

Investigation and collection of hydrological data were carried through the River-Investigation Circle set up by the Government of India in the State The circle had completed detailed investigation in respect of Kopili, Subansiri, Noa-Dehing and Barak river basins.

- 15. Power Projects.—The Umtru Hydro Electric Project Stage I, with an installed capacity of 7,500 K. W. was commissioned in July 1957. Two new schemes (1) Umiam Hydro Electric Project Stage I (36,000 K. W.) and (2) Naharkatyia Gas Turbine Station (69,000 K. W.) were also approved by the Planning Commission. Work on the Umiam Hydro Electric Project was started in 1960 and work on the Naharkatiya Project was taken up there after. Preliminary works like jungle clearing, profiling and location of various poles and towers, etc., were done for the 132 K. V. transmission line between Shillong and Gauhati and 33 K. V. line connecting Barapani, Shillong and Cherrapunjee. Construction of a 900 feet long tunnel for diversion of the river was completed and construction of 2 coffer dams was taken up, 2,600 feet of tunnel boring and construction of 2 adits 100 feet and 500 feet long were completed. Construction of colony buildings was taken up. Under the small town and village electrification scheme, 38 towns and villages were electrified during the second plan period.
- 16. Large Industries.—Provision was made in the State Second Five Year Plan for the establishment of a jute mill with 300l ooms, a cotton spinning mill with 2,500 spindles, a sugar factory, a spun-silk mill, a fruit preservation factory and a cold storage plant, and a few other medium sized industrial units, such as ply-wood units, flour mill, light engineering and steel unit, etc. The sugar factory, and the spun silk mill went into production during the second plan period while progress in respect of other schemes, at the end of the Second Plan, was some what mixed. A techno economic survey of the State was carried out through the National Council of Applied Economic Research. A department of Mining and Geology was created with a view to supplement the survey work of the Geological Survey of India and exploring possibilities for exploitation and utilisation of the mineral wealth of the State.
- 17. Small Scale Industries.—The small scale and cottage industries programme undertaken in the Second Plan related mainly to provision of training, technical advice and assistance, supply of improved tools, creating marketing facilities, and loans and subsidies to individuals and organisations for encouragement of small scale and village industries. Among the important schemes undertaken during the second plan period were the setting up of a Small Scale Industries Development Corporation and a Marketing Corporation to ensure better marketing and management of productive units and establishment of 2 Industrial Estates at Gauhati and Dhekiajuli. A Central Workshop at Gauhati, 2 mobile vans fitted with modern tools and equipment, 32 emporium, 12 training-cum-production centres, a Cane and Bamboo mill and one store-cum-emporium were also established. At the end of the Second Plan there were 12 sericultural farms, 4 reeling units, 2 chowki-rearing centres, 13 concentration centres, 8 eri seed grainages, 3 muga farms, 1 community reeling centre, 1 tussar farm, and 3 cocoon marketing centres under the Sericulture and Weaving Department. The Sericultural Research Station which was established under the First Plan at Titabar was further strengthened. One hundred and forty Sericultural demonstration units rendered technical help to the sericulturists of the State. The Weaving Institute at Gauhati was upgraded to full-fledged Textile Institute

Under the Village Industries programme, one hand made paper unit was established at Gauhati and 15 khadi production centres and 12 khadi bhandars were set up in the different parts of the State. Schemes like village oil industry, cottage match industry, hand-pounding of rice, bee-keeping were also implemented. A Saranjam Karyalaya at Gauhati, one Ambar Vidyalaya at Roha, 7 Parishramalayas, 1 production-cum-training centre for encouragement of plam-gur industries and 9 centres for development of village leather industries were opened. Soap making, pottery, carpentry and blacksmithy, e.c., were encouraged. The programme under Handloom Co-operatives followed the pattern approved by the All-India Handloom Board and contained schemes for

formation of weavers' co-operatives and grant of share capital and working capital, supply of tools and accessories, propaganda and publicity, award of prizes, provision of sales depots rebates on sales of handloom cloth, subsidy for transport, etc.

18. Roads and Bridges.—According to the decision taken in the meeting of the second conference of Chief Engineers held at Nagpur, Assam should have, by the end of 1981, about 22,000 miles of motorable roads. Against this target the state is estimated to have 8,822 miles, including the national highways, at the end of the Second Five Year Plan as indicated below:—

During the second plan period, along with the construction of new roads about 600 miles of existing low standard roads were brought up to Public Works Department standards and black-topping was done over a length of about 184 miles. Adding about 1,000 miles of motorable roads under the local bodies, the total mileage of existing motorable roads at the end of the Second Plan would be about 9,822 miles leaving approximately 12,000 miles to be done during the next twenty years period.

- 19. Road Transport.—Under the Second Plan, a provision of Rs.104 lakhs was made. Due, however, to the decision of the State Government not to set up a road transport corporation, the programme was excluded from the State Plan by the Planning Commission with effect from 1959-60 and it was continued out of State revenues. 335 additional miles were nationalised out of plan funds and 104 miles from State resources, outside the State Plan, during the second plan period.
- 20. Inland Water Transport.—A Directorate of Inland Water Transport was setup in the State and the department carried out survey of some rivers during the period.
- 21. Other Transport.—A ropeway project from Shella to Shillong was included in the Second Plan. On this project, only survey could be completed during the second plan period. Preparation of the project report was also completed.
- 22. Elementary Education.—Keeping in view the ultimate objective of free and compulsory- education for all children of the age group 6-11 years, the schemes were originally drawn up to bring to schools 50 per cent (3,50.000) of the pupils of the said age group. At end of the First Five Year Plan, the number of elementary schools was around 13,500 with a total enrolment of about 7.62,000. At the end of the Second Five Year Plan, there were about 17,000 schools with an enrolment of about 11,50,000.

Since the basic system has been accepted as the national pattern of elementary education, the scheme for gradual conversion of elementary schools into basic pattern was taken up during the second plan period. To man these institutions with trained teachers, a training programme was taken up. As a result, there were about 10,000 trained teachers at the end of the Second Five Year Plan as against 1,148 at the end of the First Plan. The number of schools converted into basic pattern, at the end of the Second Plan, was about 1,500 as against 612 at the end of the First Plan.

In order to step-up the conversion programme more training centres were started and the annual out-turn was raised to 1,000 annually. To bridge the gap between the traditional elementary schools and the basic schools, an orientation programme was taken up with proper syllabus and reading materials for a short course of training. This programme will continue till all the schools are oriented to the basic pattern.

Improvement of the economic condition of the teachers was also attempted. During the second plan period, the pay scales of the L.P. School teachers were revised and raised from Rs.35—45 to Rs.50—65 in respect of trained teachers, and from Rs.30—40 to Rs.40—60 in respect of un-trained teachers.

Under the scheme for expansion of girls' education and training of women teachers, 600 school mothers were appointed on completion of a short training specially organised for the purpose. 250 residential quarters were constructed during the second plan period in rural areas for the school mothers.

Educational tours were also arranged for teachers and more than 200 teachers availed of the facilities offered for seeing educational and cultural centres outside the State. Arrangements were also made to train science teachers of elementary schools, seminars and short courses were organised by the science consultant for elementary schools. Schools were also given additional financial aid for purchasing science equipment. About 150 schools were benefited under the scheme, during the second plan period.

Under the scheme for employment of educated unemployed and expansion of primary education 1,620 matriculate teachers and 15 sub-inspectors of schools were appointed, and 145 residential quarters (for the women teachers) were constructed during the period of the Second Five Year Plan.

- 23. Secondary Education.—In the Second Plan, improvement rather than expansion was the guiding factor in the field of secondary education. The plan provided for re-organising secondary education on the lines of recommendations of the Secondary Education Commission. The most important schemes were—
- (i) Conversion of High Schools into Higher Secondary and Multipurpose Schools as a measure for the diversification of the secondary curriculum and making the High Schools education terminal.
- (ii) With the available resources for educational development in the State only 30 schools in addition to 15 developed in the First Plan, could be converted to the Higher Secondary pattern during the second plan period, leaving the bulk of the high schools (about 650 high schools) to be developed in subsequent plan periods.
- (iii) At the end of the Second Plan, the enrolment reached 2, 17, 276 and 2,44, 733 of the age group 1!-14 years and 14-18 years respectively, as against 1,34,279 and 1,47,002 under the First Plan.
- (iv) The number of teachers increased to 9,883 in the middle schools and 9,903 in High and Higher Secondary Schools, as against 6,141 and 5,921 respectively at the end of the First plan.
- (v) Training facilities for teachers in general were extended by establishing a Post-Graduate Training College, besides arranging for the higher training of science teachers for one year to make them competent to teach in the Higher Secondary schools. A scheme was taken up to depute the existing teachers for post-graduate studies. Annually, 175 teachers were deputed for training under the scheme.
- (vi) Improvement in teaching of science and introduction of crafts had been effected in 53 .High Schools during the second plan period.
 - (vii) The pay scales of the teachers of different categories were also raised.
- (viii) Various supplementary schemes were implemented in the field of social education, library service, publication in regional languages and development of sports.
- 24. University Education.—The construction of the University buildings, envisaged under the Second Five Year Plan was completed during the early part of the Second Plan. One hospital, one museum were also started during the Second Plan, Post Graduate teaching in some important subjects was started and the existing departments were expanded.

In the field of Collegiate Education, substantial improvement was effected in the conditions of services of the teachers. For the first time, the State Government had approved a regular scale of pay to the teachers of the non-government but aided colleges and ensured their implementation by offering financial help covering the deficits. Grants had also been sanctioned for improvement of college libraries, buildings and laboratories.

25. Technical Education—While the intake capacity of the Engineering College at Gauhati, which was established during the first plan period, was expanded to provide for 60 seats in Civil Engineering and 30 seats each in Mechanical and Electrical Engineering, the Jorhat Engineering College started functioning from 1960 with 60 seats in Civil Engineering

At the diploma level, in addition to 2 institutions namely, Assam Engineering Institute at Gauhati, Prince of Wales Institute at Jorhat, 2 new Polytechnics started functioning at Nowgong and Silchar.

At the certificate level there were 6 industrial training institutes with a total intake capacity of about 1,460. The turnouts from these institutions, during the second plan period were 64 engineering graduates, 257 engineering diploma holders, and about 1,700 certificate holders,

26. Health.—During the first five year plan period, health activities were, in the main, confined to urban areas in the State by extension and continuance of schemes initiated during the post-war period. During the second plan period, these facilities were extended to the rural areas as far as practicable. Progress of achievement during the second plan period was broadly as follows:

Water Supply and Sanitation.—Under the water supply sanitation schemes (urban), 2 water-works at Gauhati and Shillong were taken up at an expenditure of Rs.45 lakhs. Under the rural water supply scheme, works in 16 important centres were taken up entailing a total expenditure of Rs.90 lakhs. 14 of these projects were completed during the period.

Control of Communicable diseases.—The malaria control programme was switched over to an eradication programme since 1958. 14 malaria eradication units were functioning at the end of the Second Plan. Spraying, and surveillance operations were conducted in some of these units. The Malaria Institute at Shillong was developed by providing necessary research facilities on malariology and parasitology. The institution also imparted training to Malaria Inspectors. As regard filaria, one survey-cum-control unit was established which continued its activities in the Sibsagar district during the second plan period. For control of leprosy, a leprosy pilot project was started at Dotoma in the Goalpara district, providing for accommodation to 30 indoor patients including clinical facilities. Steps were also under way for establishing 6 more leprosy subsidiary centres in places where the incidence of the disease is marked. For control of goitre, two goitre control units were established. These two units conducted survey of goitre cases and made possible treatment facilities available to cases detected during the survey. To fight the menace of T. B. mass B. C. G. vaccination campaign was continued and the campaign covered almost the entire susceptible groups of the population and additional 100 beds were provided in one existing T. B. hospital. Grants-in-aid to one non-government tuberculosis institution were also advanced.

Indigenous system of medicine.—To encourage ayurvedic system of treatment, the Government Ayurvedic College at Gauhati was upgraded by providing for degree course. Five ayurvedic sections were attached to five district headquarter hospitals, and 30 ayurvedic subsidised dispensaries were established during the second plan period in the rural areas.

Education and Research.—The admission strength of the Assam Medical College at Dibrugarh was raised from 65 to 110 and the bed strength of the medical college hospital from 500 to 815 beds. A new department of social and preventive medicine were also established and attached to the college. A training centre was functioning at Chabua imparting training to sanitarians. Training facilities for nurses and auxiliary nurse-midwives were also considerably expanded. One health education unit was established in the State to impart training to the rural population about sanitation and environmental hygiene, etc Some medical graduates were sent abroad for specialised training in various branches of medical sciences like medicine, surgery, obstetrics, ophtalmology, gynaecology, etc.

Family Planning.—Sixty family planning clinics were established both in rural and urban areas of the State. One regional family planning training centre was also started during the second plan period.

Hospitals and dispensaries.—Eight subdivisional headquarter hospitals were improved. Total number of beds in different hospitals increased from 2,801 at the end of 1955-56 to 3,490 at the end of 1960-61. The number of dispensaries increased from 313 to 651 during the same period. The hospitals were provided with various up-to-date equipment and appliances. The public health laboratory at Shillong was also developed.

- 27. Housing.—Under the various housing schemes, it was possible, during the second plan period, to complete construction of 900 houses under the low income group housing scheme, 279 tenements under the industrial housing scheme, and 28 houses under the plantation labour housing scheme. Under the slum clearance scheme and the middle income group housing scheme, 362 tenements and 14 houses respectively were under various stages of construction. Under the rural housing scheme 42 villages were selected for implementation of the scheme. The progress under the plantation labour housing scheme was slow mainly due to difficulty of the planters to offer adequate security against loans admissible under the scheme.
- 28. Town and Country Planning.—The Assam Town and Country Planning Act, 1959 was enacted during the second plan period. Under the provisions of the Act, a development authority has been constituted for the development of Gauhati. Preliminary measures for the constitution of another development anthority for the Tinsukia town were underway. Side by side, work of preparation of master plans for the different towns was taken up.
- 29 Welfare of Backward Classes.—For the welfare of backward classes an expenditure of Rs.7:56 crores was incurred during the second plan period, against Rs.4:36 crores under the First Plan. The Second Five Year Plan broadly followed the lines adopted under the First Plan and the programme covered all the heads of development. It was in fact an additional programme intended to remove the disparity in the levels of the development of the backward classes population and the rest of the population. The table below indicates expenditure under the First Plan and Second Plan incurred for the different categories of the backward classes population—

30. Other Schemes.—Various development schemes were taken up under Social Welfare, Labour Welfare, Statistics, Publicity and Aid to Local Bodies. Under the Social Welfare programme, 3 State homes and 4 District Shelter Centres were opened for the benefit of ex-convicts. Construction was also under-way for the establishment of a Borstal Institute and a Vagrant Home. 22 Welfare Extension Projects were opened for the benefit of woman and children, of which 10 were converted into the co-ordinated pattern. These projects were opened through the State Social Welfare Board. Grants-in-aid to 420 voluntary organisations, engaged in social welfare work, were given. 10 candidates were sent for training in the Tata Institute of Social Sciences. Under Labour Welfare Schemes, one training centre for the training of female workers and another for training of male workers were functioning at Mezenga and Rowria respectively. 9 community centres for plantation workers and one centre for industrial workers also started functioning. Grants-in-aid were given to the Assam Seva Samity for running 10 welfare centres for craft-training and black-Under the employment service programme, there were 8 employment exchanges, 12 units for collection of employment market information, 1 unit for occupational research and analysis and 2 units for vocational guidance and councelling functioning at the end of the quinquennium. The Directorate of Statistics and the Directorate of Information and Publicity were strengthened and district offices were opened. Loan assistance was continued to the Local Bodies for improvement of water supply and improvement of hats and bazars.
