LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT, PART I, FOR THE PRESIDENCY PROPER.

The following are the reports for the year 1905-1906 of the three Divisions of the Presidency Proper. The usual Appendices are attached. Jamabandi returns Nos. 6 and 7 have not been appended to this report, as they are now prepared decennially.

2. Season.

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The rainfall during the year under report was capricious. The total fall was in defect of the average in all the Districts north of Surat. The fall in June no doubt offered a good start for sowing early Kharif crops, but the abnormal fall in July damaged and washed away seeds and seedlings, necessitating resowing in some parts, especially in Kaira and Ahmedabad. The second sowings might have done well, but the entire absence of rain in August almost destroyed the new seedlings and completed the failure of the rice crop. The fall in the middle of September, though in small quantity, was most opportune and beneficial to the standing crops and was specially useful for sowing rabi Jowari in Broach, but that in October and subsequent months was not sufficient to push on rabi sowings. Thus the outturn of rabi crops was more or less below normal except in a few places supplied with irrigational facilities. The cotton crop was on the whole a very fair one, and as the demand for it ran high, the crop was most remunerative and compensated largely for loss in other crops.

In Surat and Thána rain was insufficient at the time of transplantation and the rice crops failed, especially in the coast villages. The inland villages were better off generally and the late rice crop was fairly good.

Water Supply.—Owing to heavy rain in July, the water-supply in the Northern Districts proved sufficient, but the scanty fall in Surat and Thána caused a deficiency in the drinking supply.

Plague.—With the exception of the Panch Maháls, plague did not attain to serious proportions in any of the Districts. In the Panch Maháls it prevailed in a more or less severe form, but the people, as usual, readily took to evacuation.

Cholera.—Cholera spread over the greater part of the Thána District, as also parts of Surat, where it caused 1,948 and 200 deaths respectively. It appeared also in the Broach District, but did not assume epidemic form or linger for any length of time.

Cattle Diseases.—Cattle diseases were prevalent in some Tálukas, but the mortality was not great owing to their short duration.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was a total failure of crops in Ahmednagar, most of Poona, a large part of Sholápur and Sátára and a small part of Násik, and a partial failure in the remaining portion of these districts. Khándesh with fair crops and high prices did well.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The season as a whole was very deficient and it was marked by an almost complete absence of rain in September which generally determined its character. In the three above-ghát Districts, the kharif crops were severely damaged as a consequence and rabi crops, the sowing of which depends mostly on the September rains, were almost entirely lost. The parts that were badly hit were the whole of Bijápur and the tracts in Belgaum usually liable to famine. In these parts, the previous year's monsoon had also proved a bad one and the people could not tide over the difficulties of a second year of famine. Famine had therefore to be declared and relief works and other measures of relief undertaken. The crops were also bad in other parts of Belgaum and some parts of

Dhárwár, but the difficulty was met by the grant of large suspensions of revenue and liberal distribution of tagái. The coast Districts escaped with little or no injury, as the rainfall there, though much under the average, was sufficient for the crops to mature and the yield consequently was above half the normal, except in parts of Kánara bordering on the Dhárwár District.

Fodder-supply was scanty and large sales of pressed forest grass took place in Belgaum, Bijápur and Dhárwár Districts, besides large private imports of kadbi and rice straw from Mogláí and other Districts into the latter two Districts. The condition of agricultural cattle was, however, good on the whole, except in the Bijápur District, where large sales took place owing to want of means to support them and a large demand for them in Mogláí. Cattle disease did not appear, except a slight attack of rinderpest in Bijápur and Hubli Tálukas and mild forms of ordinary diseases elsewhere.

The public health was good, though plague, cholera and small-pox prevailed more or less in almost all the Districts.

Locust hoppers had appeared in three Tálukas of the Ratnágiri District, but timely measures for their destruction prevented them from doing any damage to crops. The complaint regarding wild elephants that entered Kánara villages from the Mysore jungles last year exists still. It appears that it is not possible to undertake the khedda operations for driving them out owing to the estimate of the cost having risen from Rs. 5,000 to Rs. 20,000 and trained elephants being not available.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was an increase of Rs. 96,123, due chiefly to revision settlement in the Sátára and Sholápur Districts. The increase in the Ahmednagar District is due to the increase of revenue in alienated villages.

The large variations in Belgaum and Bijápur Districts are accounted for by the transfer of the village of Kanmade from Athni Táluka of the former to Bijápur Táluka of the latter district. The decrease against Kánara is mainly due to reduction of assessment of lands taken up for forest and the increase in Ratnágiri to the introduction of Revision Settlement into the Vengorla Táluka.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was a net increase of Rs. 42,328, principally due to the fact that fluctuating kadim cash allowances which were wrongly treated as judi recoverable from Inámdárs were again transferred to Ináms. The decrease in the Poona District is due to the Saranjám village of Rahatni in the Haveli Táluka having been temporarily attached owing to the death of the Saranjámdár.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was a net increase of Rs. 58,627 under this head. The increase is shared by all the Districts, except Sátára and Ahmednagar. It is mainly due to the revision settlement in the Sholápur District. The decrease in the Ahmednagar District for the most part corresponds with the increase under the head "Alienation" and is so far only nominal.

The same cause that is mentioned under head 3 above explains the somewhat large fluctuations in Belgaum and Bijápur. Besides this, there is a decrease in Belgaum, Dhárwár and Kánara owing to relinquishments by occupants or forfeiture and entry of lands as Government waste for non-payment of revenue. The Collector of Kánara remarks that malarious climate has gradually scared away tenants, with the inevitable result that cultivation proves a losing concern and holders elect to throw up lands. The large increase in Ratnágiri is explained as follows :—

The increase in Belgaum is mainly due to larger receipts than in 1904-05 from sales of land in the Belgaum, Chikodi and Khánápur Tálukas and from grass and grazing in the Belgaum Táluka. There is a decrease in this District of Rs. 3,700 under occasional items of fixed revenue, occurring mostly in the Parasgad Táluka.

The increase in Kolába is ascribable to increased receipts under rent, occasional items and revenue from trees in the Panvel and Karjat Tálukas. In this District, there was a decrease under notice fees of Rs. 980 and increase under penalties of Rs. 548, which took place chiefly in the Mahád Táluka.

The decrease in Bijápur is small, but it is made up by large variation under occasional items and sales of lands on the side of decrease in the Bijápur, Bágalkot and Bádámi Tálukas and under grass and grazing on that of increase in the Bádámi Táluka.

A falling off of nearly Rs. 3,000 under grazing and of over Rs. 3,200 under sales of land occurred in Dhárwár. The former is prominent in the Ránobennur and Hangal Tálukas and is said to be due to there being very deficient rainfall and the grass crop being scanty. Apparently, the same cause did not prevent such revenue from actually rising in Belgaum and Bijápur Districts. The latter decrease is explained by the Collector as being due to people not keenly desiring to take up lands, the seasons proving precarious year by year. Notice fee receipts decreased in Dhárwár by Rs. 443, while the penalties rose from Rs. 38 to Rs. 887 and were recovered almost wholly in the Kod Táluka.

The decrease in Kánara is wholly due to the fact that grazing fees are now treated as being wholly forest revenue under the arrangement alluded to in the last year's report.

In Ratnágiri, the swell on account of sales of unoccupied land that occurred last year in the Málwan and Rájápur Tálukas did not take place this year. Hence the decrease.

In 1904-05 remissions were granted in Bijápur to the extent of Rs. 46,000; but collections having been made before the orders regarding remissions could reach the village officers, only Rs. 7,044 could be actually brought to account as remissions. Rs. 38,956 were consequently ordered to be treated as advance payments for the next year by the rayats to whom they were due. Out of this

sum only Rs. 17,000, however, could be so treated in 1905-06, because the land revenue for 1905-06 of the rayats to whom the remissions were due was also remitted. Rs 21,956, therefore, still remain to be similarly accounted for as remissions in 1906-07.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There were no suspensions in the Khándesh District. For the remaining five districts, the total in column 27 shows that more than 89 per cent. of the balance for the current year 1905-06 has been suspended with sanction. There are still for the year under report over four lákhs and a half of uncollected and unsuspended revenue, the largest amounts being in Poona and Sátára; these very districts were similarly responsible under this head in the previous year. There were also large balances from former years in all the five districts. The balance of revenue due which has not been suspended amounts to about eighteen and a half lákhs; of this nearly $7\frac{1}{2}$ lákhs relate to years previous to 1904-05; some of this would have been suspended had the rules, now in force, been in force in the years for which it was due. The balance, therefore, of unauthorized arrears is less than eighteen and half lákhs. The total demand for an ordinary year for the division is about 124 lákhs. For the two years 1904-05 and 1905-06, suspensions amounted to nearly 60 lákhs and remissions to about 9 lákhs. That is to say for 2 years with a demand gross of some 248 lákhs,

60 lákhs have been suspended;

9 lákhs remitted; and 2 lákhs written off;

$18\frac{1}{2}$ lákhs uncollected.

The Commissioner does not consider these figures discouraging from a revenue point of view, but the most noticeable point is the large proportion of unauthorized arrears in Poona and Sátára. The matter is receiving the attention of the Collectors.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The amount of demand suspended during the year owing to failure of crops was Rs. 28,93,614 or a little over 34 per cent. of the total realizable revenue shown in column 19 of Appendix I. By districts, the amounts suspended bear the following percentages to the demands :—

Belgaum 36, Bijápúr 76, Dhárwár 52, Kánara and Ratnágiri 6 each.

In Kolíba no suspensions were granted on account of failure of crop; but a small sum of Rs. 279 was suspended on account of loss by flood and fire.

9. Revenue for Collection.

(Columns 19, 22 and 23 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The amount of revenue for collection on account of the year under report was Rs. 93,36,136 (column 19) as compared with Rs. 84,88,950 in the preceding year. The increase is due to less remissions given in the year under report than in the preceding year, on account of the rainfall on an average being fairly sufficient.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

The amount for collection (after granting remissions but without taking suspensions into account) for the year under report (column 19) decreased by Rs. 60,460 and that on account of the years previous to 1905-06 (column 22) increased by Rs. 22,66,899. The result (column 23) was a net increase of about twenty-two lakhs; out of this more than twenty lakhs were authorizedly suspended arrears of 1904-05 which were mostly again suspended.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The current year's revenue for collection shows a falling off of Rs. 2,65,734 (column 19), which is due mainly to so much more amounts being remitted during the year under report than in the previous year. Kolába District alone shows an increase (Rs. 11,640) owing to the rise in its miscellaneous revenue explained under head 6 above. The past arrears, after deducting irrecoverable amounts written off (column 21), increased from Rs. 2,51,448 to Rs. 10,53,582 owing to large suspensions granted in 1904-05. The result was a net increase of Rs. 5,36,400. Excluding suspensions (Rs. 28,93,893) of the year, however, the revenue for actual collection for 1905-06 was only Rs. 55,21,792 against Rs. 72,54,882 (columns 19 to 27) for 1904-05. The authorised arrears of 1904-05 were Rs. 7,26,537. As some portion of this amount must again have been suspended during the current year, but as the amount so suspended does not appear anywhere in the Jamabandi Return, it cannot be known exactly how much of the sum entered in column 22 was actually due for recovery in 1905-06. As under the rules of December 1905 the collection of the amounts suspended has now to be spread over a series of years, there would always, in future, occur some authorised and some unauthorised arrears on account of former years under column 29 and therefore it would seem necessary to have double columns for these, as in the case of arrears on account of current year, in order to get a clear idea of what the actual arrears are.

The past arrears remitted as being irrecoverable amounted to Rs. 63,714 (column 21) against Rs. 48,019 in 1904-05. Nearly half of this sum represents the expenses of management of Khoti villages in Ratnágiri which have lapsed to Government and is, therefore, nominal. The largest share out of the rent has been appropriated by the Gokak Taluka in Belgaum (Rs. 9,433) and Indi in Bijápur (Rs. 12,033).

10. Collections.

(Columns 24, 25 and 26 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The total amount realized out of the current year's demand, *viz.*, Rs. 89,97,638 (Rs. 93,36,136 *minus* Rs. 3,38,498 suspensions = Rs. 89,97,638) was Rs. 87,33,259 or 97.06 as compared with 96.02 per cent. in the preceding year.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Out of the total revenue for collection a sum of Rs. 80,30,117 was collected. The percentage of collection over the amounts for collection (including amounts suspended) for the year under report is detailed below :—

In Khándesh nearly the whole of the amount in column 19 was collected. The percentage fairly represents the extent to which the several districts had to suffer on account of the failure of rains.

Out of Rs. 55,21,792 for collection for the year under report and Rs. 10,53,582 for former years, as stated under head 9, Rs. 53,68,513 and Rs. 1,51,476 or 97·2 and 14·4 per cent. respectively were collected against 97·3 and 28·9 per cent. respectively in 1904-05. The decrease in collections in the above-ghát districts was due to the badness of the season, and the very low percentage on account of former years appears obviously to be owing to the non-separation of the previous year's suspended amounts ordered to be collected from those, the collection of which was again suspended, as noticed under head 9 above. The cause for Ratnágiri is the inclusion in the demand of the arrears of khoti villages under attachment that are liable to lapse to Government after 12 years, as mentioned in the last year's report.

11. Balance.

(Columns 27-30 of Appendix I and Appendix II.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The balance of Rs. 29,13,275 was outstanding at the close of the year of which Rs. 6,02,877 (inclusive of Rs. 3,38,498 suspensions) were on account of the year under report and Rs. 23,10,398 on account of previous years. The prospects of recovery of this amount are exhibited in Appendix II in which Rs. 22,46,990 are shown as recoverable, Rs. 3,57,043 as irrecoverable, and Rs. 3,09,242 as an amount the recovery of which is uncertain.

Of the amounts shown as irrecoverable, Kaira is responsible for Rs. 2,39,742 and Ahmedabad and Surat for Rs. 56,044 and Rs. 47,866 respectively. This is

due to failure of rice crops. The Collectors have been directed to take steps to write off the arrears in accordance with rules.

Out of the outstanding of Rs. 6,02,877 belonging to the year under report, Rs. 3,38,498 were authorized suspensions. Thus, out of the amount set down for collection during the year, Rs. 2,64,379 remained uncollected and constituted unauthorized arrears, but it is reported that after the close of the year, Rs. 97,530 have been actually recovered and steps are in progress to recover the rest.

Out of the previous year's balance also, Rs. 2,45,009 have been recovered since the end of the year.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Appendix No. II shows the amount of balances that remained outstanding on the 1st August 1906. Of the balances for collection, *viz.*, Rs. 71,44,644, less than 14 per cent. are estimated as irrecoverable; column 6 includes amounts suspended with sanction.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The outstanding balances of land revenue of current and former years amounted to Rs. 30,47,172 and Rs. 9,02,106 respectively. Out of the former sum Rs. 28,93,893 represent authorised suspensions and Rs. 1,53,279 unauthorized arrears. The latter amount to 7, 4 and 4 per cent. respectively of the demands for actual recovery in Belgaum, Bijápúr and Dhárwár and were, no doubt, due to the unfavourableness of the season. The arrears of former years are the largest in the same three districts and owing for the most part to suspended arrears of previous years being presumably re-suspended during the year under report, though the fact has not been separately mentioned by the Collectors except the Collector of Dhárwár.

In Kanára the unsuspected arrears (columns 28 and 29) are said to be due to occupancy price in the Siddápúr Táluka. The Collector explains that at the time of original survey many occupied numbers in Siddápúr Táluka were dealt with as waste lands in the Survey Department, but that the fact having been noticed afterwards, the assessment of the lands is being collected every year as per Takarári Patraks and the owners of those lands have been asked to pay the occupancy price of the said lands before they are entered in their Khátás. This occupancy price has not yet been fully recovered and hence the amount is shown as unsuspected arrears. It is expected that the amount will be fully recovered in the year 1906-07.

The bulk of the arrears shown against Kolába represents the amount on account of kadim cash allowances recoverable from the Inámdars of alienated villages in the Panvel Táluka.

As for Ratnágiri, the arrears shown in columns 27, 28 and 29 are explained to be due to the following causes:—

The rest Rs. 9,066 are the actual arrears.

Even after allowing for the causes mentioned above, the balance of realizable revenue that remained uncollected, both past and present, is somewhat large and cannot but be the result of the contumacy of the people, especially the well-to-do, engendered by the hope of eventually getting remissions and suspensions along with the really deserving. A more extended use of the provision regarding notice of intended declaration of forfeiture under section 153 of the Land Revenue Code than is visible in the figures given in Appendix VI would have the effect of teaching promptness to such persons, and, at the same time, enable the Collector to find out more easily than otherwise cases in which forfeiture and re-grant of occupancies would be a suitable method of clearing off these arrears from the accounts.

The amount shown as irrecoverable in column 7 of Appendix II is Rs. 1,31,649 and that the recovery of which is doubtful is Rs. 2,09,006. These figures are approximate only and Bijápur and Dharwár are mainly responsible for them, the amount shown against Ratnágiri being nominal and requiring only to be adjusted in the accounts. Urgent measures must be taken by the Bijápur and Dhárwár Collectors to see that these amounts appearing against their districts, if really irrecoverable, are not allowed to remain unnecessarily long on the books.

12. Taka'vi Advances, Recoveries and Balances.

(Appendix III.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

Details of advances under Acts XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884 are given in Appendix III. The total advances made under the two Acts amounted to Rs. 56,037 and Rs. 2,45,832 against Rs. 1,05,870 and Rs. 7,71,417 respectively in the preceding year, showing a total decrease of Rs. 5,75,418. This is due to the better condition of the rayats. The advances under the Land Improvement Loans Act were all made for the construction of wells and improvements of land. Those under the Agriculturists Loans Act were given for the purchase of seed and cattle and for assisting cultivators in rebuilding their houses destroyed by flood or fire.

Including the unrecovered balances of advances made in past years, the total amount outstanding under both the Acts was Rs. 44,40,433.

Out of this, Rs. 13,30,123 were due in the year under report and Rs. 12,75,941 were arrears of past years. Of the former amount Rs. 6,40,011 were collected and Rs. 487 were written off as irrecoverable; of the latter, Rs. 5,18,972 were collected and Rs. 1,353 were written off. The percentage of collection on demands in the year under report was as given below :—

Rs. 11,260 in the Poona District and Rs. 6,005 in the Sholápur District are reported to have been misapplied.

Of the balances in columns 22 and 23 of Appendix III, Rs. 4,14,579 are reported to have been suspended by the Collector of Sholápur. The other Collectors have not furnished similar figures of suspension.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The famine conditions of the year rendered it necessary to make advances under both the Acts on a large and liberal scale and the total amounts granted came to Rs. 5,21,052 under Act XIX of 1883 and to Rs. 5,56,580 under Act XII of 1884 against Rs. 2,09,230 and Rs. 93,064 of the previous year. All the districts, except Kolába, share the increase, but the largest amount (over 91 per cent. of the whole) was distributed in the famine-affected area. A comparison of column 3 of Appendix III with column 3 of Appendix I shows that this help was extended to almost each and every Government village in the Bijápur District, while out of 1,289 Government villages in Dhárwár no less than 1,120 received it. The vast expansion of the year's business naturally swelled the outstanding arrears at the end of the year, which ran up from Rs. 36,90,335 to Rs. 44,55,471. The recoveries were also affected owing to large suspensions and the collections fell from Rs. 5,55,605 to Rs. 3,03,374. The latter amount was collected out of a total of Rs. 21,48,096 (including past arrears) that fell due during the year, and, excluding Rs. 11,953 on account

In Bijápur, the percentage collections were respectively 17 and 11 per cent. against 23 and 23 of last year. Looking to the unfavourable character of the season, these may be regarded as satisfactory on the whole. The worst results appear in the Muddebihal Táluka under Act XIX of 1883 (8 per cent.), though the amount due for collection there was much less than elsewhere, while under the Act of 1884, both that táluka and Sindgi and Bijápur come out very low with 6, 5 and 9 per cent. respectively.

Apart from the immunity from famine of these districts, the large percentage collections here compared to the above-ghát districts are, no doubt, due to the fact that the transactions being comparatively few are much more efficiently looked after by responsible heads than in the latter districts.

The best way of dealing with the accumulated arrears in the three above-ghát districts is under consideration and a separate report will be submitted about it as called for in Government Resolution No. 11363, dated 30th November 1906, paragraph 8.

Jamābandi Return No. 5 shows the distribution of lands according to use in each of the six districts. A comparison of the cultivable occupied area (column 12) in 1905-06 with the corresponding area for the previous year shows an increase of 24,624 acres. Khándesh largely and Násik to a small extent show an increase due to land taken up for cultivation. As regards the remaining four districts, there is a decrease due to transfer of land to public purposes in Ahmednagar, under forfeiture in Sholápur and to other minor causes in Poona and Sátára.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

There is a net decrease of 1,647 in the area of occupied assessed land (column 12). The chief causes contributing to this are relinquishments (2,583 acres) and forfeitures for arrears (5,134 acres). Waste lands, both assessed and unassessed, were taken up for cultivation to the extent of 6,321 acres. It is satisfactory to note that even in a famine year 2,415 acres were taken up in Bijápur and 1,706 in Dhárwár. There is a decrease of 20,927 acres in Belgaum and a corresponding increase in Bijápur owing to the transfer of the village of Kanmadi from the former to the latter. Under "uncultivable land" (column 5) there is an increase of 883 acres in Ratnágiri, which fact seems rather curious and ought to have been explained by the Collector. In column 7 (public purposes) there is a large decrease against Kánara which is counter-balanced by an equally large increase under column 6 'Forests'. This is explained to be due to the fact that an area of 3,283 acres on account of 'free grazing lands' in Kumta Táluka continued hitherto to appear under the head 'public purposes' by mistake, as it was not transferred to the head 'Forests' when the grazing fees system was introduced. The transfer was made during the year under report in accordance with the amended Forest Register.

14. Average Incidence of Land Revenue.

NORTHERN DIVISION.

Appendix V gives the average incidence of land revenue and assessment per head of population and per acre respectively. The figures representing incidence of land revenue per head of population in the surveyed Government rayatwari villages are given below :—

The incidence has increased in all the districts of the division and is due chiefly to more land having been taken up and less remissions given in the year under report than in the preceding year.

In surveyed alienated villages the incidence per head of population varied from Rs. 0-1-7 in Kaira to Rs. 3-6-7 in Surat.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Jamábandi Return No. 8 shows the average incidence of land revenue per head of population (column 15) and per acre of fully assessed area (column 19). There is a decrease of 2 pies in both the averages.

There is a decrease in all the Districts, except Kolába and Ratnágiri owing to remissions granted on account of famine. The incidence in surveyed alienated villages varies from Rs. 0-3-4 in Ratnágiri to Rs. 1-2-1 in Dhárwár. The incidence on fully assessed area (column 19) shows little variation, while the net cropped area having diminished owing to deficient rainfall, an increase is observable in Belgaum, Dhárwár and Kánara in the incidence shown in column 20. In Bijapur, the result is, however, the reverse owing to the land-revenue itself having greatly diminished on account of liberal remissions.

The number of towns having 10,000 or more inhabitants shows a decrease of one in Belgaum. This is due to correction of a mistake in the last year's return.

15. Coercive Processes.

(Appendix VI.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

Appendix VI shows in detail the extent of coercion employed in each district of the Division for the recovery of arrears of land revenue.

The number of notices issued and the amount of arrears for which they were issued were 59,033 and Rs. 7,67,957 against 28,701 and Rs. 531,248 respectively in 1904-1905. The number has considerably increased, being 14.29 per cent. of the holdings compared with 6.95 in the preceding year. The increase is noticeable in the Districts of Ahmedabad, Kaira, Panch Mahals and Broach.

Contumacy of the cultivators well able to pay the demands, the disputes among the registered occupants and the purchasers of land as to who should pay and the hopes entertained by the cultivators that they would get remissions as in the preceding year appear to be the causes of this increase.

Penalty under section 148 of the Land Revenue Code was levied in 201 cases, of which Surat alone contributed 102, but the Collector reports that it was due to contumacy on the part of cultivators able to pay Government dues. As compared with the preceding year, this form of coercion was less resorted to in Ahmedabad, Broach, Surat and Thána during the year under report. The increase in Kaira and the Panch Maháls is also due to the same reason as in Surat.

The number of cases of distraint of moveable property has considerably decreased in all the Districts except Ahmedabad and Kaira. The increase in both these districts is but slight and calls for no remark.

There were only three cases (two in Broach and one in the Panch Maháls) of distraint of immoveable property other than the land for which land revenue was due. Forfeitures of occupancies decreased on the whole from 1,016 to 709. In Kaira there was, however, an increase from 75 to 133, and the reason for the increase is assigned to the contumacy of the people.

Arrests under section 157 of the Land Revenue Code were made in Kaira, Broach and Thána. In each of the two former Districts, 4 persons were arrested, all of whom were released on payment of arrears due, after a detention of from one to seven days. In Thána three arrests were made. Two paid up the arrears after a detention of six days and one after a detention of three days.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Jamábandi Return No. 9 shows the extent of coercive processes adopted for the realization of land revenue. The number of notices under section 152 (column 3) decreased in all the Districts. The number of notices in Khándesh is less than 25 per cent. of what were issued in the year previous to the one under report, and shows the comparative ease with which revenue was collected in that District. The fall in the other Districts seems to be due to the exercise of the principle that notices need not be issued in cases where it is not proposed to employ compulsory process.

In the number of notices issued under section 153, the decrease is most marked in Ahmednagar and Khándesh, but the increase in Násik District from 896 to 2,124 (column 16) is remarkable.

Arrests under section 157 were made in Niphád and Sinnar Tálukas of the Násik District, but in all the cases the defaulters were released immediately after arrest on payment of arrears.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

In a year of famine, the large decrease of 1,117 in the number of notices served under section 152 was perhaps to be expected, as owing to large suspensions of land revenue, the occasion for issue of notices was less frequent than in ordinary times. This, however, did not prevent the rayats and sawkárs in some place from contumaciously withholding payment, and this tendency was most marked in the Indi and Badámi Tálukas of the Bijápur District and Haliyal and Honáwar in Kánara, where the number of notices thus rendered necessary was unusually large.

There is a net decrease of 165 in the number of penalties inflicted under section 148 of the Land Revenue Code. Kánara heads the list under this head with 265 cases, which number though much smaller than in previous years is still a very high figure compared to the other Districts, being 89 per cent. of the total number. It is also noteworthy that in the very tálukas in Bijápur where the contumacy of the rayats is said to have necessitated the issue of a large number of notices, both under section 152 and section 153, this form of compulsion was not as freely resorted to as at least in the previous year, Indi táluka having fallen from 5 cases to 0 and Bagewádi from 18 to 2 cases.

Processes by distraint of moveables seem to find much favour in Ratnágiri where the number of them during the

year was 359 against 259 of the year before, though there were only 3 cases under section 148. These distraints were made on account of arrears amounting to Rs. 12,514, but sale was resorted to only in the case of arrears amounting to Rs. 1,316. The táluka figures given in the margin would seem to show that this form of process is rather too readily availed of. The Collector should consider whether some more cases than 3 under section 148 would not prove

much more beneficial than so many seizures of property made only to be subsequently released.

While 1,380 notices were issued under section 153 against 1,454 in the previous year, actual forfeiture was made in 315 cases only against 740. It appears that in Bijápur and Kolába the issue of these notices had the quick and telling effect of making contumacious rayats pay up at once, while in the others it had no such effect. In the Belgaum District, the arrears for which this form of process was resorted to were due from insolvent, poor or deceased khátedárs and had consequently to be written off. In Kánara, most of the lands forfeited are near or surrounded by thick forests, or are such as cannot be cultivated owing to malarious climate and sparseness of tenants. The Collector of Kánara calls these forfeitures voluntary relinquishments, as the lands would not be taken up on restricted tenure even if the arrears were remitted. Only these lands were not relinquished before the arrears accrued as required by section 74 of the Land Revenue Code and therefore had to be forfeited. The amount of arrears for which forfeitures took place shows a large decrease from Rs. 24,522 to Rs. 7,281. The decrease is almost wholly made up in the Dhárwár District and in two tálukas, Dhárwár and Kalghatgi of it.

It has been long in evidence that the issue of a notice under section 153 leads to the prompt payment of the dues, and its effect is much quicker than that of a notice under section 152 where there is contumacy. If so, it would seem that a notice under section 152 followed by another under section 153 is a waste of time and retarding of payment, and a remedy would lie in abolishing section 152 altogether and making the fee leviable thereunder leviable on every notice issued under section 153.

Ratnágiri is the only District where no use is made of the provisions of section 153 of the Code.

Rs. 84,270 were received on account of interest. Of this Rs. 741 were on account of interest on revenue from lands held under leases and the remainder

on account of interest on takávi advances. The increase of Rs. 53,727 in takávi interest as compared with the previous year is due to a corresponding increase in the collection of takávi instalments during the year.

The extraordinary increase in Khándesh is due to adjustments under Railway Department Resolutions Nos. 762, 763, 932 and 1,612 of 1906.

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT, PART I, SIND.

The following is the report for the year 1905-06 of Sind. The usual appendices are attached. Jamabandi returns Nos. 6 and 7 have not been appended to this report, as they are now prepared decennially.

2.—Season.

The season was decidedly favourable. The river rose in good time and although it fell suddenly in the end of August, it soon recovered itself and maintained a high level almost upto the end of the season. The rainfall, specially that of the cold weather, was both copious and seasonable except in the Kohistán Mahál of the Karáchi District and in the submontane tracts elsewhere. In the Desert the rainfall was fair, but the crops suffered heavily from the ravages of locusts. Except for these drawbacks the results were on the whole very gratifying. The area under cultivation increased by 484,000 acres or 14 per cent. and the land revenue demand by $14\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs or 16 per cent. The remissions amounted to $3\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs against $6\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs last year.

But for the plague which ran its usual course in the town of Karáchi, the public health was generally good. A few cases of plague were reported from the town of Hyderabad, but the disease did not take an epidemic form there.

Fodder was plentiful almost throughout the province, including the Kohistán and Desert tracts, and the general condition of the cattle was satisfactory. Foot and mouth disease was reported from the Karáchi and the Thar and Párkar Districts, but the mortality due to it was very small, only two cases having proved fatal out of 197 cases in the former district and about 1,000 in Thar and Párkar.

3.—Gross Revenue.

(Column 6 of Appendix I.)

The Provincial totals show a net decrease of a little over Rs. 76,000, but the fluctuations in some of the districts are large. The most important of these are (a) a decrease of nearly $1\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs in the Karáchi District, the result chiefly of reduction in the rates of assessment introduced in the Tatta, Ghorabari and Mirpur Sakro Tálukas, (b) a decrease of over $2\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs representing the assessment of an area of 125,000 acres of uncultivable land in the Nasrat Táluka, hitherto classed as cultivable, but this year shown under its proper head, and (c) an increase of nearly $3\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs in the Thar and Párkar District, which is due almost entirely to the introduction, with effect from 1905-06, of enhanced rates of assessment in the Jamrao portion of the district.

4.—Alienations.

(Column 9 of Appendix I.)

There is a net increase under this head of Rs. 782, in spite of the lapse of certain life grants and seris. This is due principally to a substantial increase in the average rate at which the value of alienations is calculated, caused in the Thar and Párkar District by the enhancement of rates of assessment in Jamrao tálukas.

5.—Net Government Revenue.

(Column 13 of Appendix I.)

As a natural result of the excellent inundation of the year there is a large increase under this head, amounting to more than 14 lakhs as compared with the figures of 1904-05 and over $7\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs as compared with the previous record year, 1903-04. The increase is noticeable in all districts, though not so marked in the Karáchi District as elsewhere. The figures in column 13 include

sums of Rs. 90,000 on account of hakabo (water-rate) on alienated lands and Rs. 3,000 on account of water-cess charged on certain lands in the Digri Mahál, which previously belonged to the Tando Bago Táluka, and in which, owing to the old guarantee being still in operation, the new Jamrao rates have not yet been introduced, (*vide* Government Resolution No. 3562, dated the 2nd May 1905). Both of these items are credited to the Public Works Department. The increase under the former head is the result of increased cultivation in Jagir areas owing to the favourable inundation.

6.—Miscellaneous Government Revenue as in Taleband.

(*Column 16 of Appendix I.*)

This head of revenue shows an increase of Rs. 43,338, which is the result partly of an increase in the proceeds from unauthorised cultivation, but principally of enhanced receipts on account of occupancy fees in the Hyderabad and Lárkána Districts. Under the latter head, a decrease of Rs. 78,843 is observable in the Thar and Párkar District, in spite of a large area having been given out. It is due to the fact that the payment of occupancy fee is in many cases distributed over a series of years, and the amount recoverable in the year under report was smaller than in the previous year.

7.—Remissions.

(*Column 20 of Appendix I.*)

There is a substantial decrease in the amount of remissions granted. A sum of Rs. 14,500 only was remitted on account of insufficiency of water, against 2½ lakhs in the previous year, and, although the inundation was high, the amount of revenue remitted on account of floods did not exceed Rs. 15,480. Remissions due to damage caused by locusts and other insects amounted to Rs. 35,000 against Rs. 43,000 in the previous year, and in the Hyderabad District Rs. 8,000 were remitted on account of injury caused by wind storms. The figure appearing in column 20 against the Upper Sind Frontier District includes a sum of Rs. 10,514 remitted under section 104 of the Land Revenue Code on the introduction of revised rates of assessment in tálukas Thul, Kandkot and Kashmor. Sums aggregating Rs. 71,000 were remitted in the Jamrao tract under the conditions applicable to grants of land in that tract. Remissions on time-expired fallow numbers amounted to Rs. 1,76,000 against Rs. 1,10,000 last year. The bulk of the remissions under this head belong to the Hyderabad District.

8.—Suspensions.

(*Column 33 of Appendix I.*)

As remarked in previous reports, suspensions of revenue are seldom granted in Sind with reference to whole tracts, each case being considered on its merits. The amount suspended this year is Rs. 1,37,785, against Rs. 1,20,351 in the previous year. As the amounts under postponements form part of the outstanding balances at the close of the year, they will be discussed in their proper place.

9.—Revenue for collection.

(*Column 21 of Appendix I.*)

Deducting from the total demand the amount remitted, the revenue for collection amounted to over Rs. 104 lakhs against Rs. 86 lakhs last year. To this must be added the previous year's balances (exclusive of the amounts written off during the year), which bring up the total amount for collection to Rs. 113½ lakhs against Rs. 95½ lakhs, the corresponding figure for 1904-05.

10.—Collections.

(*Column 32 of Appendix I.*)

A marked improvement is visible in the recoveries of the current year's demand, the collections amounting to 96.50 per cent. of the total sum recover-

able, against 90·5 per cent. last year. The collections of previous years' balances show an equally satisfactory improvement, the percentage having risen from 40 to 49·49.

Under Government Resolution No. 5420, dated 2nd August 1890, collections of land revenue, including miscellaneous items not brought to account in the Jamábandi, are to be compared with the collections shown in the Accountant General's books. The difference amounts to Rs. 31,760, and is explained in Statement A. A difference of Rs. 14,141-13-8 is due to over-collections in the Karáchi, Hyderabad, Lárkána and Upper Sind Frontier Districts. The remaining differences are mostly due (1) to errors requiring adjustment in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts, owing to the collections on account of boundary marks recovered from occupants in the Jámráo tract having been excluded from the Jamábandi Return No. I, and (2) to collections on account of village cess in the Sukkur District for April and May 1906 not having been credited to provincial revenues, an error which was rectified by subsequent adjustment in the accounts.

11.—Balances.

(Columns 33—36 of Appendix I and Appendix II.)

The total outstanding balance at the close of the year (including previous years' balances) amounted to Rs. 8,03,957 against Rs. 13,91,825 at the end of 1904-05. Deducting, however, the amounts which were remitted or written off after the close of each year, and which are included in the above figures, the balances are reduced to Rs. 8,54,575 for 1904-05 and Rs. 7,41,351 for the year under report, the former representing 8·93 per cent. of the year's amount for recovery, and the latter only 6·55 per cent. Of the sum of Rs. 7,41,351 just referred to, Rs. 39,555 have since been collected, reducing the unrecovered balance to Rs. 7,01,796, of which Rs. 2,85,267 belong to the current year and Rs. 4,16,529 to previous years. The current year's balance is nearly a lakh less than the uncollected balance of 1904-05 and is only 3·50 per cent. of the amount for collection. This is a matter for congratulation, seeing that the latter amount exceeded that for the past year by nearly 18 lakhs.

Of the unrecovered balance of Rs. 7,01,796, (a) a sum of Rs. 1,83,041 is under postponement granted by competent authority, (b) Rs. 22,725 are under correspondence for postponement, (c) Rs. 1,58,371 are due from the Manager, Incumbered Estates in Sind, (d) Rs. 2,77,185 are in process of recovery, and (e) Rs. 60,474 are mostly due on account of occupancy fees recoverable under agreement in future years. All these heads except (d) and (e) show an appreciable decrease as compared with last year's figures. The bulk of the balance, after deducting the amount due by the Manager, Incumbered Estates in Sind, and that shown under head (e), is again due in the Karáchi (Rs. 79,062), Upper Sind Frontier (Rs. 1,41,884), Thar and Párkar (Rs. 1,40,988), and Hyderabad (Rs. 65,264) Districts. Except in the Thar and Párkar District, the amounts are smaller than those of last year. In the Karáchi District the Collector says the zamindars have not yet recovered from the effect of bad seasons, and it is still considered expedient to deal leniently with landholders in deserving cases. In the Upper Sind Frontier the amount is stated to represent mostly dues on unauthorized cultivation, of which there is a great deal in the district, owing to the existence of a restriction on extension of cultivation (pending the remodeling of the canals), while there is a plentiful supply of water available; the non-recovery of the amounts being, according to the Deputy Commissioner, due to the difficulty that exists in discovering whether the neighbouring zamindar or his hari is to blame for the unauthorized cultivation. One or two other causes of a general nature are also mentioned by the Deputy Commissioner, but the Commissioner is not satisfied as to their sufficiency, and the whole question will be further investigated. The amount appearing against the Thar and Párkar District is mainly due in the Desert Tálukas, where, owing to the damage done to the crops by locusts, it was considered impolitic to press for the immediate recovery of the assessment.

As required by Government Resolution No. 5140, dated the 22nd July 1890, previous years' balances, which were shown as recoverable in Appendix II, and which were not recovered in the year under report, have to be separately accounted for. Such balances amounted to Rs. 4,24,799, as stated above. Of this amount Rs. 8,270 were recovered after the close of the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 4,16,529, as accounted for in a separate statement (B).

12.—Takavi advances.

(Appendix III.)

Appendix III shows the details of takavi advances. The total amount advanced during the year under report is Rs. 3,44,595 under the Land Improvement Loans Act and Rs. 2,42,952 under the Agriculturists' Loans Act, against Rs. 4,16,894 and Rs. 2,38,998 in 1904-05. The loans under the Land Improvement Loans Act were mostly utilised for the construction of wells, and those under the Agriculturists' Loans Act for the purchase of seed and cattle. Greater attention was paid during the year to the inspection of works, with the result that several cases of misapplication of loans came to light in the Hyderabad, Sukkur and Upper Sind Frontier Districts.

Out of the total amount advanced, including the balances of advances made in past years, *viz.* Rs. 23,81,197, a sum of Rs. 6,13,767 was collected, and Rs. 1,15,089 were remitted during the year in the Karáchi District. Reference was made to this remission in last year's report, and the amount of remission was stated to be Rs. 1,36,986. But subsequently several landholders preferred to repay the advances due from them rather than accept the condition of non-transferability which was to be attached to their holdings on regrant after forfeiture, and the amount finally remitted was as shown above, *viz.* Rs. 1,15,089. The balance (Rs. 16,52,142) includes a sum of Rs. 12,68,090 which does not fall due till 1906-07 and future years. The remainder, Rs. 3,84,052, is composed of Rs. 2,47,428 on account of arrears from previous years and Rs. 1,36,624 falling due during the year under report. It includes a sum of Rs. 1,200, which is under correspondence for remission in the Karáchi District and Rs. 20,446 since recovered. Statement C shows how the remaining arrears are accounted for. The total amount is Rs. 3,22,405 against Rs. 4,05,583 at the end of last year. The heaviest arrears are still due in the Upper Sind Frontier District, but an appreciable reduction is observable in the figures as compared with those of 1904-05. The subject will receive further consideration along with the question of land revenue arrears in this district.

The information required by paragraph 5 of the Government of India's letter No. 2155-321-7, dated the 3rd October 1901, regarding the amount of agricultural loan business, is embodied in Statement D.

13.—Area.

(Appendix IV.)

The increase in the total area (column 3) is slight and needs no comment. There is a decrease of nearly 350,000 acres in the area of unassessed cultivable land (column 4) which is contributed by all the districts except Karáchi. It is most marked in Hyderabad and Upper Sind Frontier, where large areas of unsurveyed land were broken up into survey numbers and are now shown as cultivable assessed land. Such of these lands as are awaiting occupation are included in column 10, while those given out are shown in column 13. The increase in column 5 occurs mostly in the Nasrat Taluka, where over 125,000 acres, hitherto treated as unassessed cultivable, have now been classed as uncultivable and shown in the returns accordingly.

The first three districts show a slight decrease in the area of unoccupied land taken up during the year, while a substantial increase is observable in the last three, more particularly the Hyderabad and the Thar and Párkar Districts. Here large areas are still being given out on the new canals, the Jámrao, the Dad, the Nasrat and the Hiral. Compared with the last year's figures there is a decrease in the area of lands relinquished (column 6) in all districts except Hyderabad where nearly 6,000 acres were thrown up in the Nasrat Táluka owing to the sandy nature of the soil.

The difference of 36,475 acres between the total of the areas accounted for in this statement and the total given in column 5 of the preceding statement represents the area of fallow forfeited and relinquished land restored to original occupants on payment of arrears or otherwise.

Of the total area of 48,770 granted free of malkano, over 38,000 acres were given out in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar Districts alone, 23,000 acres of these constituting peasant grants made in the Jámrao and Narsat tracts to colonists. The remaining area comprises mostly grants made in lieu of lands relinquished or in consideration of the mohag (frontage) rights of the grantee, or as reward for meritorious services rendered to Government.

The realizations under the head of "malkano" again show an increase which is due to larger areas having been taken up and higher rates realized in the Jámrao tract than in the previous year.

14.—Average Incidence of Land Revenue.

(*Appendix V.*)

The average incidence of land revenue per head of population and per acre has risen under all heads (columns 19, 31 and 36.) The rise is the result of the increase in revenue.

15.—Coercive Processes.

(*Appendix VI.*)

The increase in the number of notices, which is contributed by all the districts except Karáchi and Upper Sind Frontier, is the inevitable result of the large increase in the amount of revenue to be collected. It is, however, much less than proportional to the rise in revenue, the percentage of increase in the case of notices being 10·56 against 21·51 in the case of revenue for collection. There is a slight falling off in the number of cases dealt with under section 148, Land Revenue Code. This is due to a large decrease in the Lárkána District owing to the fact that last year the provisions of section 148 were, as a special case, made use of on a large scale in the Lárkána sub-division. Leaving this decrease out of consideration, the figures indicate a more extended use of the section throughout the province except in the Thar and Párkar District. As usual the forfeitures shown in the statement are mostly those carried out under the Sind Fallow Rules. The figures appearing in columns 28 to 30 represent proceedings taken against the contractor of a fishery farm in the Sukkur District and his two sureties owing to contumacy on the part of the former.

16.—Miscellaneous Revenue not included in the Taleband.

The revenue under this head increased from Rs. 42,118 in 1904-05 to Rs. 72,394 in the year under report. The increase is mostly due to the receipts from interests on loans made under Acts XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884 having risen from Rs. 41,681 to Rs. 71,871.

RESOLUTION.—The season of 1905-06 was marked by a general failure of crops and consequent scarcity in the east Deccan and Karnátak and by local failures, especially of the rice crop, in Gujarát. The cotton crop in Gujarát was, however, good and the high prices obtained for it compensated largely for the loss in respect of other crops. The season in Sind was favourable, both inundation and rainfall being very satisfactory.

2. Out of Rs. $86\frac{1}{2}$ lákhs outstanding on account of former years in the Presidency Divisions, Rs. $5\frac{2}{3}$ lákhs were written off and nearly Rs. 21 lákhs collected during the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 60 lákhs for collection at the end of the year. More than two-thirds of these collections were made in the Northern Division. After deducting remissions amounting to Rs. $16\frac{1}{4}$ lákhs, of which more than 65 per cent. were due to failure of crops, the revenue for collection on account of 1905-06 was Rs. 296 lákhs, of which Rs. 216 lákhs were collected, Rs. $71\frac{1}{4}$ lákhs were suspended, and Rs. $8\frac{3}{4}$ lákhs remained uncollected at the end of the year. The total realisations (Rs. 237 lákhs) fell short of the revenue due for the year of report alone by Rs. 59 lákhs, a result which cannot be considered unsatisfactory looking to the conditions of the year and the necessity of granting suspensions to a very large extent. Of the suspended revenue more than 93 per cent. pertained to the affected districts of the Deccan and Karnátak. Surat is the only other district which shows a large amount (Rs. $2\frac{1}{2}$ lákhs) of suspensions, while none were granted in Broach and Khándesh. Of the total outstanding (Rs. 140 lákhs) at the end of the year, Rs. $105\frac{1}{4}$ lákhs were expected to be recovered, Rs. $14\frac{3}{4}$ lákhs were classed as irrecoverable and the recovery of the remainder was considered doubtful. The arrears will now have to be dealt with in accordance with the very liberal rules as amended in Government Resolution No. 650, dated 22nd January 1907. Notwithstanding the unfavourable conditions of the year, there was a satisfactory increase of over 60,000 acres in the area of occupied Government land.

3. The districts of Kaira, Poona and Sátára again show very large amounts of unsuspected arrears, being together responsible for nearly Rs. 5

lákhs out of the total of Rs. 8½ lákhs. As for Poona and Sátára, the matter was specially noticed in Government Resolution No. 4801, dated 10th May 1907, and Government trust that the attention which the Commissioner states that the matter is receiving at the hands of the Collectors will result in a material reduction of the outstandings. As regards Kaira, no separate explanation has been furnished, but the Commissioner's report shows that about 37 per cent. of the total unauthorized arrears for the Division, three-fifths of which pertain to Kaira, have been recovered since the close of the year and that the remainder is in process of recovery. The large disproportion in this district between the number (27,645) of notices of demand issued and the number (5,413) actually served tends to show that many people though able to pay withhold payment of revenue until the last moment. The instructions on this subject given in paragraph 3 of Government Resolution No. 10001, dated 22nd October 1906, should be carefully attended to.

4. During the year under report the severer forms of coercive process were enforced to a much smaller extent than in the previous year in the Presidency proper. The number of cases in which a penalty was inflicted under section 148 of the Land Revenue Code and the number of distraints decreased by 282 and 334 respectively. In the large majority of cases (8,045) in which notice of intention to forfeit the occupancy was given prompt payment of revenue was the result, and forfeiture had actually to be resorted to only in 1,465 cases, of which the three districts of Kaira, Broach and Násik together contributed more than half. The total area forfeited was only 24,056 acres, as compared with 39,026 acres in the previous year. In all, 18 contumacious defaulters, in the Kaira, Broach, Thána and Násik Districts, were arrested under section 157 of the Code, with the result that the revenue was immediately paid in all cases. The suggestion of the Commissioner, S. D., to dispense with notice under section 152 of the Land Revenue Code and to issue a declaration of forfeiture under section 153 in all cases in which a notice is necessary does not commend itself to Government. It would be an extreme measure to issue a threat of forfeiture in every instance in which the occupant delays payment of assessment for a few days, and one of the necessity for which Government are by no means convinced although in certain parts of the Presidency organized contumacy undoubtedly exists.

5. The repayment instalments of takávi loans falling due during the year amounted to Rs. 24½ lákhs, to which must be added Rs. 60¼ lákhs, unrecovered instalments of past years. Of this only Rs. 17½ lákhs were collected and Rs. 43,752 written off during the year, leaving a large balance of arrears, Rs. 67½ lákhs, at the close of the year. The question of dealing with these arrears will be considered on receipt of the reports called for in Government Resolution No. 11363, dated 30th November 1906. Meanwhile Collectors must take steps, assuming an ordinary season, to prevent any further accumulation of arrears and in the event of a good season to reduce the outstanding balances as much as possible. The new loans made during the year amounted to Rs. 33½ lákhs, of which 87 per cent. were made in the affected districts of the Deccan and Karnátak.

6. The revenue collections in Sind were very satisfactory, more than 96 per cent. of the current demand and nearly 50 per cent. of past arrears being realised. Of the total outstanding of Rs. 8 lákhs at the end of the year it was expected that 92 per cent. would be recovered. The area of Government occupied land showed an increase of 312,000 acres over that of the previous year. Over Rs. 5½ lákhs were advanced in Sind as takávi during the year under report, the total recoveries were 61 per cent. of the instalments due, and after deducting remissions on account of past years' balances the outstandings at the end of the year amounted to Rs. 16½ lákhs, of which Rs. 12½ lákhs were under Act XIX of 1883 and the rest under Act XII of 1884.

7. Government approve of the suggestion of the Commissioner, S. D., that column 29 of Appendix I should be split up into two parts so as to distinguish between suspended and unsuspended balances of past years as is

done at present in the case of balances of the year under report. The columns will then show balances in the following form :—
