Sir,

In accordance with paragraph 6 of Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 2420, dated the 8th April 1903, I have the honour to submit herewith a statement showing the interest due at $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. on the total monthly outstanding balances of tagái advances for the whole Presidency, as compared with the interest actually received during the revenue year 1906-1907.

2. The recoveries of interest both on account of land improvement and seed and cattle loans were considerably higher than in any of the previous four years, and, for the first time during the quinquennial period, the takávi transactions for the revenue year resulted in a net gain to Government of Rs. 66,000, though under loans, seeds and cattle there was a loss of Rs. 43,000.

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT, PART I, FOR THE PRESIDENCY PROPER.

The following are the reports for the year 1906-1907 of the three divisions of the Presidency Proper. The usual appendices are attached. Jamabandi returns Nos. 6 and 7 have not been appended to this report, as they are now prepared decennially.

2. Season.

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The rains started seasonably in June and the fall was generally sufficient and well-distributed, except at the close of the season.

The kharif crops on the whole turned out well, but rabi was less satisfactory. In Ahmedabad and Kaira, the latter crops were damaged by heavy showers of rain in February accompanied by hail storms of extraordinary size. In the Panch Mahals wheat and gram were injured by rats and white ants, but in the Broach and Surat Districts these crops were good.

A rise in the price of cotton and grain materially helped the cultivation of Gujarát.

Water-supply.—The water-supply was sufficient.

Plague.—Plague was prevalent in all the districts of the division, the districts of Ahmedabad and Kaira being those seriously affected.

Cholera.—Cholera prevailed in all the talukás of the Thana district, except Dahanu, and accounted for 2,920 deaths. Bhiwndi Taluka alone was responsible for 702 deaths—nearly $\frac{1}{2}$ of the total mortality. This disease prevailed also in the town of Dobad and in the talukás of Jalálpore, Chorási and Olpád of the Surat district.

Cattle Disease.—Cattle diseases prevailed in Ahmedabad, the Panch Mahals and Surat. In Thána, rinderpest of a virulent type destroyed upwards of ten thousand cattle. Additional veterinary graduates were employed in Thána for inoculation, with, it is believed, satisfactory results.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was timely and sufficient rainfall for the sowing of the kharif crops in all the districts of the division, but the insufficiency of the later rainfall affected adversely the maturing of the crops and the high expectations raised by the early rains were not realized except in a few talukás of Násik and Ahmednagar.

The rainfall was sufficient for sowing rabi crops, except principally in Ahmednagar. The later rains held off and affected generally the yield everywhere.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The rainfall of the season, though unevenly distributed and not always timely, was, on the whole, sufficient. The most noticeable feature about the season in the Karnátak was that it began and ended somewhat badly for the kharif crops, the sowing of which was retarded in some places and in some had to be done twice, though the rainfall in July, August and September was sufficient to keep them going. As to the rabi crops, the season commenced well, but October and November were unfavourable, while December saw some extraordinarily heavy showers which, it is generally reported, did more harm than good. In the Konkan districts of Kolábá, Ratnágiri and Kánara the rainfall was on the whole sufficient and seasonable and the outturn of the chief crops varied from 10 to 12 annas. The outturn of the principal crops in Belgaum varied from 6 to 10 annas, while in Bijápur it is estimated at 6 annas and in Dhárwár from 8 to 10 annas. Though the condition of the crops was not altogether satisfactory, large supplies of fodder were available and the

water-supply was sufficient for the agricultural stock, which, however, suffered somewhat severely from rinderpest in the Dhárwár and Kánara districts. Prompt measures were taken to combat the disease by calling in extra veterinary aid. The public health was, speaking generally, good.

3. Gross Revenue.

(Column 6 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The gross revenue shows a decrease of Rs. 5,659, due chiefly to the acquisition of lands for public and special purposes in the district of Kaira and to fluctuation of revenue in sharakati (revenue-shared) villages in Surat.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was an increase of Rs. 31,970. It was chiefly due to revision settlement in Kalvan táluka of the Násik district, to unassessed waste land being assessed and given out for cultivation in East Khándesh and to the assessment on jiráyat lands being fixed at bágayat rates in West Khándesh. The increase in the Násik district is due to the survey rates being introduced into alienated villages.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

As compared with the figures of the preceding year there was a net increase of Rs. 2,42,608, due chiefly to the introduction of revision settlements in the Dhárwár district. Belgaum, Bijápur and Kolába show slight decreases of Rs. 108, Rs. 112 and Rs. 87. In Kánara the decrease comes to Rs. 790, mainly accounted for by forest demarcation, operations in connection with which are going on. The fall of Rs. 612 in Ratnágiri is attributed to the reduction of assessment on red warkas soils in the Sangameshvar táluka, sanctioned by Government Resolution No. 8877 of 17th September 1906.

4. Alienations.

(Column 9 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

There was a net decrease of Rs. 5,716 under this head, due chiefly to acquisition of land for public purposes in Ahmedabad, Kaira and Panch Maháls and to forfeiture of inám lands for default in payment of land revenue and correction of errors in assessments in certain cases in Ahmedabad and Broach; also to the giving up of certain service land rendered unfit for cultivation in Ahmedabad.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was a net increase of Rs. 1,340, principally due to the facts that (i) the Akluj-Dahigaon Deshmukh watan in the Sholápur district which had been resumed was re-granted as inám and (ii) revision survey settlement was introduced into the Kalvan táluka of the Násik district during the year under report.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Under this head occurs a net increase of Rs. 60,866 as shown in the margin, mainly due to the introduction of the second revision survey settlement in certain tálukas of the Dhárwár district. The decrease in Kolába is due to the coming into operation in the Panvel táluka of the orders regarding the payment of kadim cash allowances direct from the treasury. The decrease in the Ratnágiri district is due to the reduction of assessment on red warkas soils in the Sangameshvar táluka referred to in the preceding paragraph.

5. Net Government Revenue.

(Column 13 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

There was a net increase of Rs 40,197 under this head, chiefly due to the taking up of unoccupied land. The increases by districts are shown below :—

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was a net increase of Rs. 49,454 under this head over the figures of the previous year. It is shared by all the districts except Ahmednagar, Poona and Sholápur, and is mainly due (1) to the revision settlement in the Násik district, (2) to unassessed waste lands being assessed and given out for cultivation in the East Khándesh district and (3) to jiráyat land assessment being fixed at bágayat rates in West Khándesh. The decrease in the districts of Ahmednagar, Poona and Sholápur for the most part corresponds to the increase under the head "Alienations" and is so far only nominal.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The net ordinary fixed revenue shows an increase of Rs. 1,79,777 over the last year's figures. The increases and decreases in the several districts of this division are given below :—

The decrease in Belgaum is due to the forfeiture and entry of occupied lands as Government waste owing to default in the payment of land revenue. The increase in Dhárwár has already been accounted for.

6. Miscellaneous Revenue.

(Column 16 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

There was a net decrease of Rs. 1,231, chiefly due to fewer sales of trees and to the taking up on formal agreements of forfeited lands which had been unauthorizedly occupied in previous years.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

There was a net increase of Rs. 77,745 under this head. It occurred principally under the following heads in the districts noted against each of them:—

The receipts under grass and grazing in Belgaum fell by Rs. 5,540, which accounts for the decrease in that district.

In Bijápur there was an increase under almost all heads, but mainly under the following:—

- (a) Sale of land and occupancy rights.
- (b) Sale of grass and grazing.
- (c) Proceeds from unauthorized occupation (a large number of encroachments was discovered in Bijápur and Muddebihál towns).
- (d) Revenue from trees, due to sale by auction of "avari" bark in two talukás.

Occasional items and occupancy rights contributed mainly to the increase in Dhárwár. There was an increase of Rs. 6,544 under the former head, due to the recovery of nazarána on succession from the swámi of the Uttaradhi math, and Rs. 12,053 under the latter head due to a keen demand for land, the season being comparatively favourable. Under other items appearing in the tharāv-band, there was a decrease of Rs. 2,970, which is explained by the fact that the old practice of levying sale expenses in the case of land sold in execution of Civil Courts' decrees was put an end to by the Commissioner.

The rise in Kánara represents increased proceeds from the sale of occupancy rights over land.

The decrease of Rs. 3,180 in Kolába occurred mainly under occasional items, and the Collector has not explained it.

The last mentioned item includes Rs. 4,170 in Bijápúr and Rs. 1,445 in Ratnágiri. The former represents a sum that should have been remitted in 1904-1905, but which having been paid in before the remission was sanctioned was treated as an advance payment for the year 1906-1907. In last year's report it was stated that the amount remaining to be so treated as an advance payment on account of, and remitted in, the year 1906-1907 was Rs. 21,956. It now appears that only Rs. 4,170 have been remitted on this account. The Collector has now been asked to explain what steps have been taken with regard to the remainder. Rs. 35,744 were remitted in Dhárwár on account of the water-rate on rice lands in Hangal and Kod the crops on which had failed. The remission of Rs. 1,445 in the Ratnágiri district was due to the operation of the orders in Government Resolution No. 6852, dated 8th September 1904, relating to compensation to be paid to khots.

Of the suspended arrears of previous years, in Belgaum Rs. 14,863 were remitted under the rules sanctioned by Government Resolution No. 650, dated 22nd January 1907. The amounts remitted in other districts have not been noted in the reports.

8. Suspensions.

(Column 27 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The net decrease under this head is of Rs. 3,03,494 owing to a fairly good season.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Under the orders issued in Government Resolution No. 10724, dated 31st October 1907, amounts unauthorizedly suspended for the current as well as for

the former years are shown separately from those not so suspended. Thus, in the present year's Appendix No. 1, two columns, *i. e.*, 27 and 29 have been newly opened for the purpose.

There were no suspensions in the districts of East Khándesh, West Khándesh and Poona. For the remaining four districts, the total in column 27 shows that more than 24 per cent. of the balance for the current year 1906-07 has been suspended with sanction.

There are still for the year under report over 3½ lákhs of uncollected and unsuspended revenue, the largest amounts being in Ahmednagar, Poona and Sátára. The districts of Poona and Sátára were similarly responsible under this head in the previous year. There were also large balances from former years in all other districts except East and West Khándesh districts.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Suspensions on account of the failure of crops were granted in the three above-ghát districts, but on a much smaller scale than in the previous year, the total amount suspended being Rs. 96,287 against Rs. 23,93,893. In the Belgaum district, suspensions were given in Belgaum, Parasgad and Sampgaon talukas; in the Bijápur district, in 21 villages of the Bijápur taluka and in Dhárwár district, in Navalgund, Hangal and Kod talukas. No suspensions were granted in Kánara. Of the Rs. 1,353 suspended in Kolába, Rs. 1,041 are due to floods in the Panvel taluka and Rs. 312 to fire in the Panvel and Karjat talukas. Rs. 18,88,081 of former year's suspensions were resuspended.

9. Revenue for Collection.

(Columns 19, 22 and 23 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The amount of revenue for collection on account of the year under report was Rs. 96,72,664 (column 19) as compared with Rs. 93,36,136. The increase is due partly to remissions having been given to a smaller extent on account of a better season and partly to more land having been taken up for cultivation, than in the preceding year.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

The amount for collection (after granting remissions, but without taking suspensions into account) for the year under report (column 19) shows an increase of Rs. 3,21,129 and that on account of the years previous to 1906-07 (column 22) an increase of Rs. 34,22,544. The result (column 23) was a net increase of about 37 lákhs. The authorisedly suspended arrears of 1905-06 were more than 38 lákhs, which were mostly again suspended.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The increase of Rs. 3,27,110 in the year's revenue for collection was contributed to by all the districts as shown below:—

Large suspensions were given in 1905-1906. The total demand for the year was therefore Rs. 1,25,94,853 against Rs. 94,69,267 or an increase of Rs. 31,25,586. Excluding the suspensions shown in columns 27 and 29, however, the actual demand was Rs. 1,06,10,485 (Rs. 86,46,508 for current year + Rs. 19,63,977 for past years).

10. Collections.

(Columns 24, 25 and 26 of Appendix I.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The total amount realized out of the current year's demand of Rs. 96,37,660 (Rs. 96,72,664 minus Rs. 35,004 suspensions=Rs. 96,37,660) was Rs. 94,69,977 or 98.28 as compared with 97.06 per cent. in the preceding year.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Out of the total revenue for collection, *i. e.* (Rs. 1,89,18,434), a sum of Rs. 1,35,36,133 was collected. Taking into account amounts suspended, the percentage of collection over the amount for collection for the year under report is detailed below :—

The above percentages show that in all the districts taken together, more than 90 per cent. of revenue for collection for the year under report has been recovered. The balances in the East and West Khándesh districts are very trifling.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

Out of the actual demands for the year under report and former years, as given under head 9, Rs. 84,42,119 and Rs. 16,94,885 or 97.6 and 86.3 per cent. respectively were collected.

11. Balance.

NORTHERN DIVISION.

There is a net decrease of Rs. 17,00,991 in the balance outstanding at the close of the year. This is due to large collections of past arrears. Of the amount shown as irrecoverable in Appendix II, Kaira is responsible for Rs. 2,15,922 and Ahmedabad, Panch Maháls and Surat for Rs. 49,218, 51,480, and 3,579, respectively. This is due to previous bad years and failure of rabi crops in the districts of Ahmedabad and Kaira.

Out of the outstanding of Rs. 2,02,688 for the year under report, Rs. 35,004 were authorized suspensions. Thus, out of the amount noted for collection during the year, Rs. 1,67,684 remained uncollected and constituted unauthorized arrears, but it is reported that after the close of the year Rs. 44,851 were actually recovered and steps are in progress to recover the rest.

Out of the previous years' balance also, Rs. 6,149 have been recovered since the end of the year. Column 29 has been split up as directed in paragraph 7 of Government Resolution No. 10724, dated the 31st October 1907.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Appendix II shows the amount of balances that remained outstanding on the 1st August 1907. Of the balances for collection, *viz.* Rs. 53,82,301, less than 15 per cent. are estimated as irrecoverable. Column 6 of Appendix II includes amounts suspended with sanction.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The outstanding balances on account of the year under report and on account of previous years are respectively Rs. 3,00,676 and 21,57,173 against Rs. 30,47,172 and 9,02,106 outstanding at the end of 1905-06. These figures are inclusive of the amounts, the resuspension of which has been sanctioned, and those suspended out of the current year's demand. The unauthorized arrears are respectively Rs. 2,04,389 and Rs. 2,69,092 or Rs. 4,73,481. The following table shows for each district the percentage of unauthorized arrears to the amounts due for collection in the year.

The figure against Ratnágiri is only nominal, as a large portion of the arrears is merely on account of attachment expenses of khoti villages to be recovered from the khots or written off when the villages lapse. Out of the total amount of arrears of Rs. 1,00,226 appearing in column 31 against this district, Rs. 83,077 is the sum to be thus treated, Rs. 9,624 having already become due for remission.

The prospects of recovery of the balances (column 31) are shown in Appendix II. The Collector of Bijápúr remarks that the figures entered in this appendix are highly speculative and that nothing is likely to be recovered this year owing to the adverse nature of the season.

12. Takavi Advances, Recoveries and Balances.

(Appendix III.)

NORTHERN DIVISION.

The total advances made under the two Acts amount to Rs. 17,670 and Rs. 1,96,652 against Rs. 56,037 and Rs. 2,45,832 respectively in the preceding year, showing a total decrease of Rs. 87,547. This was due to improvement in the condition of ryots.

Out of the total amount outstanding under both the Acts, Rs. 34,58,984 and Rs. 12,62,699 were due in the year under report and Rs. 8,75,607 were arrears of past years. Of the former amount, Rs. 7,83,682 were collected and Rs. 3,259 were written off as irrecoverable. Of the latter, Rs. 2,55,087 were collected and Rs. 3,673 were written off. The percentage of collection on demands (including arrears) in the year under report was as given below :—

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The favourable nature of the season was reflected in the takávi transactions. Only Rs. 1,51,190 under the Land Improvement Loans Act and Rs. 2,13,461 under the Agriculturists Loans Act were advanced against Rs. 5,21,052 and Rs. 5,56,580, respectively, in 1905-1906. The decrease is general, Kolába alone showing a slight increase under the Agriculturists Loans Act. Rs. 39,227 out of the amounts advanced were due for recovery in the same year. This sum added to previous outstandings brought the total amount due for collection under both the Acts to Rs. 24,38,629 against Rs. 22,15,690 in 1905-1906 and the collections amounted to Rs. 9,13,962 against Rs. 3,03,374. The increase is shared by all the Gujarát districts and is due principally to land taken up on account of favourable early rains.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Jamábandi Return No. 5 shows the distribution of lands according to use in each of the seven districts. A comparison of the cultivable occupied area (column 12) in 1906-07 with the corresponding area for the previous year shows an increase of 45,819 acres. This increase has occurred in all the districts, except Poona, and is chiefly due to waste land having been taken up for cultivation. The decrease of 802 acres in Poona is due to land having been forfeited and to other minor causes.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The area of occupied assessed land (column 12) fell off by 1,410 acres. The chief causes of decrease are relinquishments (2,262 acres) and forfeitures (4,435 acres) occurring mostly in Belgaum, Bijápur, Dhárwár and Kánara where, on the other hand, 3,654 acres of land were newly brought under cultivation, as shown in the margin. The survey of kadim inám lands brought about an increase of 1,890 acres in Bijápur and 133 in Dhárwár. There are large variations under columns 6 and 7 against Kánara. The increase under forest (column 6) may be attributed to the operations of the Forest Settlement Officer, but the large decreases under other "special purposes" and under "public purposes" should have been fully explained by the Collector. The same remark applies to the large increase of over 2,000 acres under the head "unoccupied assessed land" (column 10) in Belgaum.

The increase is appreciable in the Bijápur and Dhárwár districts and in the former is due to a diminution of remissions granted, and in the latter the increased revenue brought in (Rs. 2,44,459) by the introduction of revision settlements in certain talukas. The incidence in surveyed alienated villages varies from Re. 0-3-4 in Ratnágiri to Rs. 1-3-2 in Dhárwár.

The cases of penalty under section 148 of the Land Revenue Code increased from 201 to 296. The increase was in Kaira, Surat and Thána.

Also the number of cases of distraint of moveable property increased in all the districts.

Forfeitures of occupancies increased from 709 to 992. The increases were in Ahmedabad, Kaira and Panch Maháls. Arrests under section 157 of the Land Revenue Code were made in Kaira and Broach. In Kaira four persons were arrested, of whom three were released on the very day of arrest on payment of arrears and one on payment of arrears after a detention of 12 days in the Civil Jail at Ahmedabad. In Broach one arrest was made and the person arrested paid up his arrears after a detention of one day.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

Jamábandi Return No. 9 shows the extent of coercive processes adopted for the realization of land revenue. The number of notices under section 152 (column 3) increased in all the districts, except Násik. The increase in the number of notices issued seems to be attributable to the fact that the amount of suspended revenue during the year under report is much less than that of the preceding year; consequently more revenue was set down for collection during the current year. The number of notices issued under section 153 has increased during the year under report throughout the division, especially in Satára.

During the year under report the provisions of section 157 were not resorted to.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The number of notices issued under section 152 and the amount of arrears for which they were issued are much larger than in the preceding year. 19,521 notices were issued for the recovery of arrears amounting to Rs 5,51,336 against 18,609 for Rs. 4,19,380 in 1905-1906. The increase occurs mostly in the above-ghát districts of Bijápur and Dhárwár, where the number of notices issued rose from 1,860 and 2,695 to 2,816 and 7,105 respectively. The season being favourable, efforts were made to recover the suspended revenue of previous years in addition to the current demand. But led away probably by the generous grant of remissions in recent years, even well-to-do occupants contumaciously withheld payment and could only be induced to pay when notices were served on them. In this respect, the coast talukas show a decided improvement; in Kolába, for example, the number of notices issued fell from 6,150 to 2,913.

The number of cases in which a penalty under section 148 was imposed rose from 298 to 416, though the amount of arrears for which the fine was imposed was less than in the preceding year. In Belgaum, a penalty was levied in 15 cases, of which 13 were in Sampgaon taluka alone. In Bijápur, the number of cases increased from 12 to 48, for 23 of which the Muddebihal taluka was responsible. The amount of fine realised in this district was nearly six times what it was in 1905-1906. Kánara as usual heads the list and the number has increased from 265 to 344, though the amount of penalty recovered increased by Rs. 5 only.

As compared with the preceding year, there was a large and satisfactory decrease in the cases of distraint and sale under section 154 in Ratnágiri. Bijápur and Dhárwár, however, show increases of 30 and 8 cases respectively. Though distraint had to be resorted to for the recovery of Rs. 7,332, actual sale was necessary only for Rs. 1,824, or 24 per cent. of the original amount. A spirit of contumacy and a disinclination on the part of the cultivating classes to meet their just obligations are alleged as the causes of this increase in distraint and sale, and the Commissioner has no doubt that action taken was necessary.

Action was taken under section 155 in one case only in the Dhárwár district, where a house was sold for Rs. 110 for the recovery of arrears amounting to Rs. 122.

The amount for which forfeiture and sale of occupancy under section 153 were resorted to was much larger than that of the preceding year, being Rs. 10,550 against Rs. 7,281. The three above-ghát districts, again, are responsible for this increase. In this connection, the Collector of Bijápur observes that "in forfeiting land, particular care was taken to see whether the defaulter was really poor or comparatively well off and merely contumacious; and unless the Mámlatdár or Special Head Kárkún had certified, after personal inquiry, that the rayat concerned was well-to-do, no land was ordered to be forfeited and sold. The new tenure remains unpopular, but attempts are made to give forfeited lands to defaulters on the new tenure when their arrears are not large."

Only Rs. 4,226 were realised by sale of the forfeited occupancies. 5,060 acres assessed at Rs. 4,710 were declared forfeited, but of these only 433 acres assessed at Rs. 436 were sold to the public. The fact is not without interest that the area sold under coercive process realised on an average nearly ten times the assessment. Only in Kánara were any forfeited lands returned to the defaulters. Lands assessed at Rs. 3,807 remained with Government as unoccupied waste.

Ratnágiri was the only district where no action was necessary either under section 153 or 155. Here and in Kolába, there was a general decrease in the amount of compulsion used for the recovery of land revenue.

16.—Miscellaneous Land Revenue not included in the Taleband.

NORTHERN DIVISION.

There was an increase of Rs. 6,196 under this head. This was due chiefly to the recovery of survey expenses.

The sale of trees on land, the leases of which have expired, is still in progress. As observed last year, a circular was issued to Collectors. Their reports are not encouraging.

CENTRAL DIVISION.

A comparison of the figures in column 32 of Appendix I shows that there was a net increase of Rs. 76,084 under this head. It is chiefly due to the extraordinary increase notified in paragraph 16 of the report for 1905-06 with respect to the adjustments in Khándesh effected under Railway Department Resolutions Nos. 762, 763, 932 and 1612 of 1906.

SOUTHERN DIVISION.

The total income under this head amounted to Rs. 20,706 against Rs. 23,998 last year.

The items under this head fluctuate from year to year, but the Collector of Kolába should have explained the decrease from Rs. 6,563 to Rs. 1,655 in that district. He remarks that under this head a sum of Rs. 2,753 was received on account of interest on tagái advances and he has been asked to explain this.

In Kánara the Collector ascribes the increase to the levy of penalty under the Record of Rights Act for delay in giving information, and to an increase in the number of copies supplied from the record of rights in disputed cases.

17.—Refunds.

LAND REVENUE ADMINISTRATION REPORT, PART I, SIND.

The following is the report for the year 1906-07 of Sind. The usual appendices are attached. Jamabandi Returns Nos. 6 and 7 have not been appended to this report, as they are now prepared decennially.

2.—Season.

The year under report was one of general prosperity owing to the extraordinarily good inundation which was among the best on record. The river was low at the commencement of the season when water was not much in demand, but the rise when it did occur was both opportune and rapid, and the continued maintenance of the level above 13 feet (the fair irrigating level) at the Sukkur gauge from the beginning of June right up to the end of September afforded a plentiful supply of water for both kharif and rabi crops. The rainfall also was copious everywhere, including both the Desert and the Kohistan. But the beneficial results of the latter tract were discounted owing to the destruction of crops by locusts in 23 out of the 28 makans into which it is divided. The total area under cultivation increased by 382,000 acres and the land revenue demand by nearly 7 lakhs. Remissions amounted to $5\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs against $3\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs in the preceding year. The increase is chiefly due to damage caused by floods in the different parts of the Province. The floods, which caused most damage, were those which resulted from breaches in the river bund at Budka Takkar in the Guni taluka and in the Baghar-Ochito Bund in the Karachi district. The public health was generally good except for plague which ran its usual course in the Karachi Town and paid a visit to the Sukkur Town.

Fodder was plentiful everywhere, except in the Hala Division where owing to the high level of the lands scarcity of fodder is the normal complaint and where not even the plentiful rains and the increased cultivation of the year could wholly mend matters. Cattle diseases, such as *Gloss Anthrax* and *Fluke*, appeared among cattle in some talukas of the Karachi district, but were confined to a few villages and the mortality was small. Four cases of *Glanders* were reported from the Karachi Town, all of which proved fatal.

3.—Gross Revenue.

(Column 6 of Appendix I.)

The district figures under this head present considerable variations when compared with those in the last report, the result being a decrease of a little over $6\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs in the total for the Province.

The most striking variations are (1) an increase of nearly 4 lakhs in the Karachi district and of 3 lakhs in the Upper Sind Frontier district, (2) a decrease of $13\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs in the Sukkur district and of over 3 lakhs in the Thar and Parkar district. The increase in the Karachi district is the result of the substitution of the Bigoti system for leases in the tract known as "the *bhal* lands" in the Shahbandar taluka. In consequence of this, the waste lands, which were formerly leased, have been excluded from the holdings of the lessees and brought on to the *khata* of Government, and the full assessment due on them included in column 6 instead of merely the amount due from the lessees. The increase in the Upper Sind Frontier district is due to the introduction, with effect from 1906-07, of revised rates of assessment in the Thul, Kandkot and Kashmore talukas. The enormous decrease in the Sukkur district occurs in the Rohri taluka and is the sequel of the survey operations undertaken in it in previous year, as a result of which a vast area of unsurveyed land hitherto shown in the returns as unassessed cultivable land has now been classed as uncultivable land. The decrease in the Thar and Parkar district is due to the average rate of assessment, deducted from the amounts due on occupied lands for the purpose of computing the assessment on fallow and unoccupied cultivable lands, being lower than in the previous year.

4.—Alienations.

(Column 9 of Appendix I.)

The provincial totals indicate a net increase of Rs. 17,994 under this head in spite of a decrease of Rs. 9,285 in the Hyderabad district, caused by the resumption of Jágírs on the death of the holders. The increase above referred to is attributable partly to the remission of village cess on alienated holdings under the orders contained in Government Resolution No. 10144, dated 25th October 1907, and partly to the enhancement of settlement rates in the Thul, Kandhkot and Kashmore talukas of the Upper Sind Frontier district.

5.—Net Government Revenue.

(Column 13 of Appendix I.)

The exceptionally high inundation of the year and the consequent expansion of cultivation resulted in a net increase of nearly 7 lakhs in the land-revenue demands of the year. With the exception of Thar and Párkar district where the agricultural operations in the rabi season were seriously hampered by the scanty supply of water in the Mithrau, all the districts have participated in the increase. The figures in column 13 include as usual the *hakabo* (water-rate) due on alienated lands, and the water-cess on certain lands in the Digri Mahal, which originally belonged to the Tando Bago taluka and in which, owing to the old guarantee being still in force, the Jámrao rates have not yet been introduced (*vide* Government Resolution No. 3562, dated 2nd May 1905). The amounts so included are as under:—

Both of these items are credited to the Public Works Department.

6.—Miscellaneous Government Revenue as shown in the Talebands.

(Column 16 of Appendix I.)

Though there is a net increase of Rs. 18,965 under this head, the Lárkána and Thar and Párkar districts show remarkable decreases, the result of a falling off in the receipts on account of *Malkano* (occupancy fees), which is explained as follows: In the Thar and Párkar district, the area of land taken up was much smaller than in the previous year, while in the Lárkána district, though the area taken up was larger, the amount of *Malkano* recoverable in the year under report was smaller. The increases appearing against the remaining four districts are due to (1) enhanced receipts under the head *malkano* and (2) to larger areas having been cultivated unauthorisedly, the fine and assessment chargeable on such lands being credited to "Miscellaneous revenue."

7.—Remissions.

(Column 20 of Appendix I.)

As stated in paragraph 2, the remissions granted in the year under report were considerably in excess of those granted in the previous year. The principal cause of the excess was the occurrence of floods in different parts of the Province which resulted in remission of sums aggregating Rs. 1,66,000 against Rs. 15,400 in the previous year. The remissions on account of insufficiency of water amounted to Rs. 37,300, of which Rs. 14,000 are accounted for by the Upper Sind Frontier district, where notwithstanding the plentiful supply of water enjoyed by the lands on the upper reaches of the Begari Canal, the lands towards its tail did not receive an adequate supply. A sum of Rs. 39,000 was remitted on account of damage caused by locusts. The sum of Rs. 1,14,833 appearing against the Upper Sind Frontier district includes Rs. 75,000 representing the difference between the old and revised assessments remitted, under the provisions of section 104 of the Land Revenue Code, in the Jacobabad taluka,

on the introduction of a revised settlement. Remissions on time-expired fallows amounted to Rs. 1,00,372 against 1,76,000 in the previous year, while Rs. 67,500 were remitted under the conditions applicable to peasant grants in the Jámrao tract.

8.—Suspensions.

(Column 33 of Appendix I.)

The total amount of land revenue under suspension is Rs. 2,82,499, of which Rs. 1,64,357 belong to the year under report and Rs. 1,18,142 to the previous years. Of the amount suspended in the current year, Rs. 89,856 were suspended in the Hyderabad District alone where it became necessary to accord liberal treatment to the cultivators on account of the losses they had suffered from the Budhika Takkar breach. As directed in paragraph 7 of Government Resolution No. 10724, dated 31st October 1907, a new column has been opened in Appendix I to show separately the past years' balances under suspension. As the amounts under postponements are included in the outstanding balances at the close of the year, they will be dealt with in paragraph 11 below.

9.—Revenue for collection.

(Column 21 of Appendix I.)

Notwithstanding the large increase in the amount of remissions granted, the net total revenue for collection amounted to nearly Rs. 1,10,00,000, or a little less than 5½ lákhs in excess of the previous years' demands. Adding to this, the previous years' balances, the amount due for collection works out to 117½ lákhs against 113½ lákhs in the preceding year and 97½ lákhs in the year 1904-05.

10.—Collections.

(Column 32 of Appendix I.)

As was to be expected in a prosperous year, little difficulty was experienced in realizing the bulk of the current year's demands. The total collections on account of the current year amounted to 95 per cent. of the demand. But for the liberal postponements granted in the Hyderabad district, the results would have been still more satisfactory. The collections on account of the past years' balances amounted to 45.9 per cent. of the demands. Though the percentage is smaller than the corresponding figure (49.49) of last year, a comparison of the district figures in column 29 with those in column 24 shows that except in the Upper Sind Frontier district, satisfactory progress has been made in the reduction of the past years' balances. The matter will be further noticed in the next paragraph.

Under Government Resolution No. 5420, dated 22nd August 1890, collections of land revenue, including miscellaneous items not brought to account in the Jamábandi, are to be compared with the collections shown in the Accountant General's books. The difference amounts to Rs. 35,827 and is explained in Statement A. The discrepancies are due principally to errors requiring adjustments in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar districts, owing to the collections on account of boundary marks recovered from occupants in the Jámrao tract having been excluded from the figures of the Jamábandi Return No. 1. Most of the amounts shown as over-collections appertain to the Hyderabad, Sukkur and Lárkána districts.

11.—Balances.

(Columns 33—37 of Appendix I and Appendix II.)

The total outstanding balances at the close of the year (including past years' balances) amounted to Rs. 9,50,939 against Rs. 8,03,957. These figures include items remitted or written off after the close of the year. De-

ducting these items, the balance at the end of the year amounts to Rs. 8,61,615 or 7·35 per cent. of the demands for actual recovery. If the sum of Rs. 61,943, which has been collected since the close of the year, be deducted, the unrecovered balance is reduced to Rs. 7,99,672, of which Rs. 4,26,015 belong to the current year and Rs. 3,73,657 to the former years. Out of the net balance shown above, (a) a sum of Rs. 1,81,262 is under postponement granted by due authority, (b) Rs. 17,136 are under correspondence for postponement, (c) Rs. 1,39,256 are due by the Manager, Incumbered Estates in Sind, (d) Rs. 3,79,853 are in course of recovery, (e) Rs. 23,303 are the subject of correspondence with a view to remission and (f) the remaining Rs. 58,862 are mostly on account of occupancy fees which will fall due for recovery in future years. Comparing these with the corresponding figures in the last report, the only important fluctuation is a large increase under (d). On the other hand, there has been, during the past two years, an appreciable reduction in the balances due from the Manager (the balance due from Manager at the end of 1904-05 being Rs. 1,93,221). This may fairly be attributed to the change in system of collecting dues from leased estates, the collections now being made by the Revenue Department instead of by the Incumbered Estates Department (*vide* correspondence ending with Government Resolution No. 3198, dated 27th March 1908). The bulk of the balance, after deducting the amount due by the Manager and the amounts shown under (e) and (f), is due, as in previous years, in the Karáchi (Rs. 1,07,368), Upper Sind Frontier (Rs. 1,16,663), Thar and Párkar (Rs. 1,16,886) and Hyderabad (Rs. 1,76,724) districts. Hyderabad and Karáchi districts show a marked increase over the corresponding figures of the preceding year. The straits to which Zamindárs in the Tando and Shahbandar sub-divisions were reduced by the Budhka Takkar breach rendered it impolitic to have recourse to coercive processes for the recovery of Government dues. The Deputy Commissioner, Upper Sind Frontier, who, in pursuance of the remarks made in the last report, was called upon to examine in detail the causes of the accumulating arrears in his district considers that undue leniency has been shown in the steps taken to enforce payment. As the result of the adoption of a firmer attitude, considerable amounts have been realized with little difficulty on account of both Takávi and Land Revenue; and it is anticipated that the greater part of the arrears will be recovered before September 1908.

The bulk of the outstandings in the Thar and Párkar district pertains to the current year and is due to partial failure of cotton and wheat crops owing to the attacks by boll-worm and blight and, in some measure, to the general deficiency of water in the Mithrau Canal during the rabi season. As required by Government Resolution No. 5140, dated 22nd July 1890, previous years' balances, which were shown as recoverable in Appendix II and which were not recovered in the year under report, have to be separately accounted for. Such balances amounted to Rs. 3,83,452 against Rs. 4,24,799 in the preceding year. Deducting the sum of Rs. 9,795 collected after the close of the year, the balance to be accounted for is reduced to Rs. 3,73,657. The detailed causes for these outstandings are shown in statement B appended.

12.—Taka'vi Advances.

(Appendix III.)

Details of takávi advances under Acts XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884 are given in Appendix III. The total advances made during the year under report under the two Acts amounted to Rs. 2,78,101 and Rs. 2,34,017 against Rs. 3,44,595 and Rs. 2,42,952, respectively, in the preceding year. The decrease noticeable is probably to be ascribed to the good inundation of the preceding season which doubtless enabled the cultivators to lay by seed for use in the season under report. The loans under the Land Improvement Loans Act were mostly granted for the construction of wells and clearance of karias and those under the Agriculturists' Loans Act for the purchase of seed and cattle.

Out of the total amount advanced, including the balances of advances made in previous years, *viz.*, Rs. 21,65,495, a sum of Rs. 5,70,445 was collected and Rs. 8,171 were remitted during the year, leaving a balance of Rs. 15,86,879.

This sum includes Rs. 12,37,068 which are due for collection in 1907-08 and subsequent years. The remainder (Rs. 3,49,811) is composed of Rs. 2,02,151 on account of arrears of previous years and Rs. 1,47,660 falling due within the year under report. It includes Rs. 500 about to be written off, and Rs. 10,709 since recovered. Statement C shows how the remaining arrears are accounted for. The total amount is Rs. 3,38,602 against Rs. 3,62,405* at the end of last year. The figures appearing against the Upper Sind Frontier and Sukkur districts show improvement over the last year's figures. The increase of the arrears in the Hyderabad district is due to the same causes which contributed to the increase in the outstandings on account of land-revenue. The information required by paragraph 5 of Government of India's No. 2155—321—7, dated 3rd October 1901, regarding the amount of agricultural loan business is embodied in statement D.

13.—Area.

(Appendix IV.)

The slight variation in the total area as compared with that shown in last report calls for no remarks. The bulk of the decrease of 623,057 acres in the area of unassessed cultivation (column 4) occurs in the Sukkur district, where as a result of survey operations recently undertaken in the Rohri taluka, an area of 465,594 acres which had hitherto been treated as cultivable waste, is now classed as unculturable land and included in column 5, while an appreciable area was broken up into assessed survey numbers and has accordingly been added to column 10. The aggregate of the increases in columns 5 and 10 against the Sukkur district very nearly corresponds to the decrease in column 4.

Compared with the figures in the last report, there is a net decrease of nearly 50,000 acres in the area of unoccupied land taken up during the year. Though all districts show considerable fluctuations, the most remarkable one is the decrease of 45,000 acres in the Thar and Párkar district, which is accounted for by the fact that most of the land now available for distribution on Jámrao Canal is of the poorest quality and consequently not so much in demand. Though there is a perceptible falling off in the area of land given out in the Hyderabad district, yet the demand for land there continues to be far more keen than elsewhere. In fact, the area taken up in the Hyderabad district during the year is nearly $1\frac{1}{2}$ times the area taken up in all the rest of the Province. The subject was discussed in paragraph 5 of the Commissioner's review of the annual report on the administration of the Jámrao tract for 1906-07.

* (The figure Rs. 3,22,405 given in the last report was a mistake.)

The irrigation authorities have suggested the expediency of placing an embargo on further grants of land in the Hyderabad district, pending the completion of the Rohri-Hyderabad Canal Project. The question presents many difficulties and is engaging the Commissioner's best attention.

There has practically been no change in the total area relinquished during the year (column 6 of the statement).

The difference of 44,809 acres between the total of the areas accounted for in this statement and the total given in column 5 of the preceding statement represents the area of fallow land forfeited and relinquished land restored to original occupants on payment of arrears or otherwise. Though free grants are still most numerous in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar districts, the area comprising the grants is proportionately smaller than in the previous year, and only 10,000 acres have been granted to colonists on the conditions applicable to peasants' grants. Most of the lands granted free elsewhere were either given on restricted tenure or in consideration of the *mohag* (frontage) rights of the grantees. The large decrease in the *malkano* realized during the year is the natural result of the reduction in the sales of land on the Jámrao and the low prices realized on account of the inferior quality of the land given out.

14.—Average Incidence of Land Revenue.

(Appendix V.)

The average incidence of land revenue per head of population has risen almost in all heads (columns 19, 31 and 36) owing to the increase in revenue.

15.—Coercive Processes.

(Appendix VI.)

There was again an increase in the number of notices issued under section 152 of the Land Revenue Code, which is shared by all districts, with the exception of the Sukkur and Upper Sind Frontier districts. One of the main causes is no doubt the increase in the amount of revenue for collection. The Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar districts however show abnormal increases, which in the case of the Hyderabad district at any rate, must be partially due to causes to which reference has already been made, *viz.* losses suffered by the zamindárs on account of floods. Though fines under section 148, Land Revenue Code, were inflicted in a much larger number of cases than in the previous year, their value in procuring prompt and punctual payment of Government dues has not been tested in the Hyderabad and Thar and Párkar districts, where, as may be

judged from the number of notices issued, the difficulty experienced in realizing land-revenue seems to have been greater than in the other parts of the Province. The attention of the Collector and Deputy Commissioner will be invited to the orders issued by Mr. Morison in November 1905 and referred to in paragraph 17 of the Administration Report, Part I, for 1904-05.

Comparing the figures in column 16 *et seq* with those in the last report, there appears a marked decrease in the forfeitures effected under section 153, while no arrests are reported under section 157. The majority of the forfeitures shown in the statement are the result of the operation of the Sind Fallow Rules.

16.—Miscellaneous Revenue not included in the Talebands.

The revenue under this head amounted to Rs. 73,637 against Rs. 72,394 in the preceding year. The slight increase is due to enhanced receipts under the head "Interest from loans under Acts XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884."

RESOLUTION.—The occurrence of a tolerably favourable season was naturally accompanied by considerable improvement in revenue collections. In the Presidency proper, the demand for 1906-07 amounted to 306 lakhs of rupees. To this must be added past arrears to the extent of 140 lakhs; bringing the gross figure for collection to a total of 446 lakhs. At the end of the year, a balance of 10 lakhs out of the current assessment remained unrealised, of which $2\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs represent arrears authorisidly suspended. Of the remaining $7\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, no less an amount than $\frac{3}{4}$ is due from the five districts of Kaira, Dhárwár, Poona, Ahmednagar and Sátára. In all these districts, however, with the exception of Ahmednagar, excellent collections of past arrears were effected; with the result that their total revenue for the year exceeded the current demand by amounts varying from $2\frac{3}{4}$ lakhs in the case of Poona to $6\frac{1}{4}$ in Dhárwár. Indeed, omitting from consideration East Khándesh, where arrears are insignificant, the collections in every district of the Presidency proper, with the one exception of Ahmednagar, where authorised suspensions are far larger than in any other districts, amounted to at least the demand on account of the current year's assessment, while over the Presidency proper as a whole the total collections exceeded that demand by about 41 lakhs or 13 per cent. This result indicates approximately the extent to which district officers considered themselves justified by the anna crop valuations in collecting more than a single year's demand. There can be no question that the discretion entrusted to the district officers was exercised with judgment and moderation. As may be gathered from these figures, the reduction of past arrears was not inconsiderable. Fifty-one lakhs of rupees were actually realised on this account, leaving a total outstanding on July 31st of 204 lakhs. Of this sum, $15\frac{1}{4}$ lakhs represent unsuspended arrears, the principal districts at fault being the five specially mentioned above, together with Ahmedabad and Sholápur. The end of the year thus shows a total balance outstanding in the Presidency proper of 204 lakhs, of which 64 lakhs are classed as recoverable, $11\frac{1}{2}$ as irrecoverable and 15 as doubtful. No delay should be allowed to occur in

writing off the irrecoverable amounts; which, however, owing to the comparatively unsatisfactory season of 1907-08, may prove larger than was calculated.

2. In Sind, an exceptionally good inundation produced a further extension of cultivation by over 200,000 acres. As a result, in spite of unusually heavy remissions, due mainly to floods, there was an increase in the current demand of nearly $5\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs. The outstandings of former years amounted to $7\frac{3}{4}$ lakhs. During the season under review, the district officers succeeded in collecting 95 per cent. of the current demand and 46 per cent. of the arrears. On August 1st, the balance outstanding was approximately $9\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, of which it was expected ultimately to realise all but a lakh of rupees. About one-third of the whole sum represents authorised suspensions.

3. These results may be considered to be satisfactory on the whole. In Sind, the unsuspended arrears appear at first sight heavy, but the explanations given by the Commissioner show that the situation is better than the figures would tend to suggest. In the Presidency proper, considerable reduction was made in the total of arrears, particularly in those Deccan districts in which the outstandings were largest. The figures for Broach are decidedly creditable; while Khándesh and the Koukan districts have, as usual, a nearly clean sheet. It is true that the achievement of these results entailed the use of coercive measures in the Presidency proper to an extent rather greater than in the previous year. The number of cases in which the severer forms of compulsion were employed is still, however, comparatively small. In Sind, there was a notable decrease in the number of distraints and forfeitures.

4. To turn to tagái, the improvement of the season is reflected in the smaller total of loans taken. Only $10\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs of rupees were distributed, as compared with 33 lakhs of the previous year. The balance from former seasons amounted on August 1st, 1906, to 146 lakhs. During the year under review $35\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs, inclusive of interest, were repaid, and the total outstandings at the close reached 126 lakhs. Of the instalments due in the season then current, slightly more than one-half was collected; while past arrears were reduced by 10 lakhs, or rather less than 20 per cent. These results compare unfavourably with those of land revenue. Arrears under both heads were, as a rule, heaviest in the same group of districts, and substantial repayments of both assessment and tagái were probably not always possible from one and the same individual. At the same time, Government consider it unsatisfactory that in a favourable season such a small proportion of the instalments due in the current year should have been collected. There is undoubtedly much room for improvement in the Deccan and Karnátak, where outstandings are particularly heavy. It is to be hoped that the recent arrangements for investigating and systematising loans in those regions will not be without effect.

In Sind, advances to the amount of 5 lakhs were made during the year, while recoveries, including interest, totalled $6\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs. Of the total balance of about 16 lakhs, outstanding on July 31st, 1907, $1\frac{1}{2}$ lakhs represented instalments due in the year under review, and slightly over 2 lakhs past arrears.

It is interesting to review the results of the tagái operations of Government from the year 1901-02 upto date. The figures, which are given below, shew that these operations have hitherto been far from profitable to the State; the amounts written off as irrecoverable very largely exceeding, except in the Southern Division, the interest realised:—

This result, so unsatisfactory financially, is of course due to the liberality with which advances had to be given in the famine and remitted subsequently owing to the inability of the people to recover their position in consequence of the continued succession of inferior or bad seasons.

5. The Governor in Council recognises that the accomplishment of the results summarised above has entailed hard work and anxious care on the part of district officers, and that the thankless and laborious duty of collecting the revenue has been performed with efficiency and without allowing the resources of the cultivators to be unduly strained.
