1. SEASON.

Northern Division.

The rainfall on the whole made a very good beginning over the whole division but a long break during September affected the kharif crops seriously in Ahmedabad, Kaira and part of the Broach and Panch Mahals district. The rains in the first week of October improved the situation to a certain extent, but the outturn of rabi crops was not satisfactory for lack of moisture in the soil. The season in the southern part of the Broach sub-division and in Surat, Thana and Bombay Suburban district was satisfactory.

In Ahmedabad, the monsoon began in the first week of June and sowing operations were begun vigorously. There was a timely break in the fall during the first week of July. Thereafter there was sufficient rainfall for the crops and for the transplantation of paddy. Up to the end of August, there were bright prospects for a good season but owing to a break during the month of September the rice crop failed and other crops were affected to some extent. It was a good bajri year. In the first week of October there were a few showers which improved the standing crops that were withering. After 5th October there was no rain. As a result of the failure of the rice crop, wheat, jowari and cotton crops were grown on rice land as far as possible. The rabi yield was not good owing to the lack of rain in the latter part of the monsoon. Crops were damaged by fire in the villages of Transad, taluka Dholka, and Sayra in Modasa Mahal, and necessary relief to individual khatedars was given on that account.

In Kaira, the regular monsoon began from the second week of June 1938 and continued up to the end of August. The rain during the month of June was sufficient for the sowing of kharif crops. Rain during the month of July helped the transplantation of paddy and bavto. The short breaks at regular intervals during June and July helped the agriculturists in their weeding operations. All the T Bk Ca 40-1 crops, up to the end of August, were in very good condition and the season was promising, but as the rain stopped from the beginning of September, the standing kharif crops except early sown bajri which were in ear did not get sufficient water to give a good outturn. As there was no rain at the end of the season, cultivators could not sow "pachhotar" jowari, and the rabi crops did not thrive for want of sufficient moisture in the soil.

The monscon began from the last week of May in Panch Mahals and from the first week of June in Broach. Owing to the timely and sufficient rainfall in June, sowing operations were begun in time and practically all the land usually sown was brought under cultivation. In July the rainfall was slightly excessive in Godhra taluka. The rainfall during August was insufficient in Panch Mahals and in Jambusar taluka and standing crops were adversely affected. Rainfall during September was also too light throughout the district and the situation became critical, but showers during the first week of October considerably relieved the situation.

In Surat rain during the season was a little below average, but it was most timely and favourable to all crops. In fact it was an ideal season with a good yield of all crops.

In Thana, the monsoon commenced in the last week of May. Rain was generally sufficient and well distributed all over the district. In October the rain was heavy, and this damaged the plantains in Bassein taluka and paddy in some talukas. Crops were generally good and the season was on the whole normal.

In Bombay Suburban district the monsoon began in the first week of June. Transplantation soon commenced and continued till the third week of July. There was a cyclonic downpour in the first week of October which did some damage. The rainfall was on the whole sufficient and the season satisfactory.

The rainfall in each district of the division during the year under report as compared with the average of the last five years is shown below :---

The average outturn of kharif crops in Ahmedabad was from 1 to 14 annas while in Kaira it was from 1 to 10 annas. In Broach and Panch Mahals it was from 5 to 10 annas, in Surat it was from 8 to 12 annas; in Thana it was from 10 to 12 annas while in the Bombay Suburban it was 10 annas.

Water Supply.—The supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was adequate throughout the division except in Gogho mahal, the "Bhal tract" and parts of Sanand mahal of the Ahmedabad district, and in the precarious tracts in below ghat and Jungalpatti villages in the Thana district. The deficiency in Ahmedabad was made good as far as possible by digging kacha wells in the beds of tanks and by cleaning the pacca wells. In Thana the deficiency was partly remedied by sinking new wells and constructing bunds.

Cattle and Fodder.—The supply of fodder was sufficient in all districts.

Rinderpest, foot and mouth disease and hæmorrhagic septicaemia appeared more or less in all districts except the Bombay Suburban. The veterinary assistants gave timely help and advice. The number of attacks and number of cattle inoculated during the year was as follows :—

In Kaira district Galsundho, foot disease and rinderpest took a heavy toll of 491 cattle and this is attributed chiefly to drought and scarcity of good drinking water. In Thana rinderpest and hæmorrhagic septicaemia caused many deaths and it is reported that had the Veterinary Department not taken immediate steps by way of inoculations, the death rate would have risen considerably.

Public Health.—Public health was generally good except for the prevalence of epidemic diseases as shown in the following table :—

Cerebro-spinal fever (meningitis) which has now become endemic in Ahmedabad city was effectively checked by proper measures. There were only 29 deaths out of 52 cases as against 55 deaths out of 75 attacks during the preceding year. Cholera took a heavy toll in Mandvi and Pardi talukas of the Sarat district and Umbergaon, Dahanu and Palghar talukas of the Thana district. Prompt measures to bring the epidemic under control were taken.

Central Division.

The regular monsoon set in early in June. The rainfall in that month was sufficient except in parts of Ahmednagar, Nasik and Satara districts where it was slightly deficient. In July the rainfall was general and sufficient everywhere except in parts of Nasik and Satara. In parts of West Khandesh and also in Sholapur it was slightly in excess of the requirement. In August the rain was sufficient and evenly distributed except in a part of Nasik and Satara. In parts of Ahmednagar, East Khandesh and Sholapur the rain was more than sufficient. The September rains improved the condition of the crops. In Ahmednagar the break was very useful to cotton and other kharif crops. In Poona more rain was required in some parts of the western division for the growth of the standing crops and for the sowing of the rabi crops. In Satara the rainfall was fairly adequate except for the kharif crop. In October there were heavy rains in parts of Ahmednagar and Nasik resulting in floods. In parts of Poona and Sholapur rabi sowing could not be taken on account of excessive moisture. On account of absence of rain in November and December the rabi crops did well. The season was on the whole good.

The situation in each district was as follows :----

Ahmednagar.-This year the monsoon started earlier than usual. There were good showers in the eastern part of the district during the month of June. In the first fortnight of July the rains were general and sufficient which facilitated the sowing of tushar and kharif crops. As there was continuous rain during June and in the first fortnight of July in the north-western part of the district sowing operations could not be undertaken in time in a number of villages. These rains, however, proved useful to the crops which were sown early in June. In Sangamner taluka there were heavy rains during the months of September and October which resulted in floods. The villages on the bank of the river Pravara suffered loss to an inappreciable extent. The September rains which were good and sufficient facilitated the sowing of rabi crops. In south-eastern part of the district continuous rains the somewhat retarded the sowing of the rabi crops. The low lying land held excessive moisture and the rabi crops were damaged to some extent by heavy rains. The outturn was on the whole quite satisfactory.~

East Khandesh.—The monsoon commenced in the district regularly from the first week of June. The rainfall in June was appreciably in excess of the amount usually received and the kharif sowings were completed before the end of the month. In July the rainfall was general and sufficient. In some parts of Jalgaon and Bhusawai talukas and Edlabad peta the early sown crops suffered due to excessive rains and in some cases the rapid growth of the standing crops was slightly retarded owing to the continuous drizling during the month. Clear sunshine and some break in the rains during the first week of August facilitated weeding and horrowing operations. In September and October the rainfall was general and sufficient and proved beneficial to the rabi crops. The season on the whole was good.

West Khandesh.—The rainfall during the year was abundant and opportune throughout the district. The monsoon commenced early in the first week of June. In the latter half of the month there was fairly wide-spread rainfall which proved very useful for the preliminary field operations and early sowing of cotton and groundnut. The heavy rains in July were fully utilised by the cultivators for kharif sowings, but the excessive rainfall in August proved unfavourable to crops in heavy soils. The rains in September were also in excess of the usual fall. Owing to continuous showers during July to September germinated crops in some parts of the district turned yellowish and their growth was stunted. The fall in October was up to the requirement. Rabi crops also fared well. On the whole the season was good.

Nasik.—The monsoon set in early, i.e., from the last week of May. The rainfall was very useful for the preparation of lands for kharif crops. The rainfall in June was opportune, well-distributed and sufficient for carrying on the sowing operations. Subsequent rainfall was also timely and sufficient for germination, growth and maturity of the kharif crops. There were heavy showers everywhere in the district in October. The Kadwa, the Girna, the Godavari, the Tambat and the Behed rivers were in high-floods causing damage to the standing crops. Damage was also caused to houses in many villages in Niphad taluka. The rainfall in September and October was useful to the rabi crops. There was no late rain in some of the talukas but the rabi season was on the whole normal.

Poona.—In the western division of the district the monsoon broke earlier than usual, i.e, in the first week of June. The rainfall was general and sufficient to enable agriculturists to sow kharif crops. It was continuous except in the first week of August in Junnar and Khed talukas where there was a break which improved the condition of kharif crops. There was again continuous and heavy rain in the first week of October. The fall exceeded the average. The sowing of the kharif crops was completed in time and the subsequent rains being well distributed the prospects were bright. The October rains however affected the principal kharif crops and caused some damage. Late sown bajri and the potato crop in Ambegaon peta were unaffected. Hill millets as sava and varai in the northern part of Mawal taluka suffered to a considerable extent.

In the eastern division though the monsoon broke later the rainfall was appreciably better than in the previous year. It was general and sufficient for agriculturists to undertake the sowing of kharif crops. In Sirur peta the rain recorded exceeded that for the previous three years. In August there was heavy rain in some parts of the peta but the crops were not affected. In Indapur and Bhimthadi talukas there was also heavy rain which affected crops to some extent. In September there was practically no rain. The cotton crop in Indapur taluka failed owing to excessive rain and also on account of the disease known as "Mawa". In Bhimthadi taluka the excessive rain damaged not only the standing kharif crop but also retarded the sowing of rabi crops. On account of the long drought from the middle of October the rabi crops and the jowar crop did not reach the flowering stage.

Satara.—The monsoon set in in the second week of June all over the district. These showers were followed by a break in the eastern part of the district. The sowing of rice, sawa and nachani and other kharif crops was started in the western part. In July and August there was general rainfall all over the district and it was followed by a short break. The rainfall in September was useful in undertaking the rabi sowing. There was also copious rainfall in October. The outturn of both the kharif and rabi crops was fairly good throughout the district except in Karoli and Vasagade villages in Tasgaon taluka and in ex-Khandala villages in Koregaon taluka.

Sholapur.-The rainfall in June was good for kharif sowings. The sowing had commenced in the second week of June in all the talukas except Karmala where it commenced in the first week of July. There was continuous rainfall with no long breaks in Sholapur sub-division and with intervals in Pandharpur subdivision as a result of which there was extensive growth of weeds everywhere which obstructed the growth of kharif crops. The kharif crops in low lying and bunded lands were adversely affected to some extent owing to water-logging. The cotton crops in Karmala and Pandharpur talukas and groundnut crop in Barsi taluka suffered slightly but the general annewari of kharif crops was not seriously affected. The rainfall in August and September was more than sufficient. As a result of this agriculturists in some parts of the district were unable to undertake rabi sowing. The late sown rabi crops in 7 villages in Sholapur taluka failed for want of further rains in November. The rabi crops were generally not below normal. There was a certain amount of damage caused by rats-chiefly to wheat crops-and due consideration was given to this in fixing the general annewaris of the crops. The season was on the whole good.

Cattle and Fodder.—The condition of cattle was fair in all the districts. Though diseases such as rinderpest, foot and mouth disease, hæmorrhagic septicaemia, black-quarter and anthrax, etc., were prevalent they were not so serious as to affect agricultural operations. The total number of deaths from disease was 6,669 as against 5,153 in the previous year. The total number of attacks and deaths was as follows :—

The supply of fodder was sufficient. The concession of free grazing in the open forest and the pasture forest lands and the revenue waste lands continued during the year.

Water Supply.—The supply of water was generally sufficient for drinking and irrigational purposes.

Public Health .--- Public health was on the whole good. The following epidemics prevailed :---

The cholera was nowhere of a severe type. Prompt measures ' such as anti-cholera inoculations and the free supply of cholera pills and permanganate of potash helped to check the spread of the epidemic. Small-pox was also general, but the outbreak was not of a very severe nature. The greatest number of those who succumbed to the disease was in East Khandesh. Plague prevailed in four villages in Shirata mahal of the Satara district and in Sholapur city, Pandharpur town and Barsi taluka of the Sholapur district. On account of the prompt measures taken it did not spread in an epidemic form.

Southern Division.

Belgaum.—Good "mango showers" in April and May helped the preliminary field operations. The regular monsoon started at the beginning of June throughout the district. But as the fall was insufficent in the Gokak and Hukeri talukas kharif sowings there were retarded. The July rains were well-distributed and beneficial. The latter half of the monsoon was deficient in the rice areas and adequate in the rabi tracts. The monsoon on the whole was satisfactory and the scason better than any during the last decade.

.

The appreciable increase in the area under all money crops and the marked decrease in that under food crops also indicated a prosperous year.

Bijapur.—The opportune, adequate and general monsoon of the season, after two successive lean years, created great hopes. The area under kharif crops increased. But the heavy and incessant showers of August and September affected the maturity of the kharif crops and the sowing of rabi crops. Though the kharif outturn was not up to the expectation, fodder was produced in abundance. Sufficient soil moisture and favourable winds in November and December helped the growth of rabi crops. The rat-pest affected the rabi yield in most of the talukas.

To the farmer who had been reduced to penury by the continued scarcity conditions of the past two years, the season was a godsend.

Dharwar.-The ante-monsoon showers in April were good and useful. The setting in of the regular monsoon from the second week of June enabled the timely sowing of paddy and other kharif crops. There were light showers in July, August and the first three weeks of September, but they were not sufficient to replenish the irrigation tanks. For want of heavy showers paddling operations were retarded in the whole of the Malnad tract except in the Kalghatgi taluka which experienced a good rainfall from the commencement of the season. In the Hangal and Kod talukas and in certain parts of the Bankapur, Dharwar, Hubli and Haveri talukas paddy crops suffered. The non-irrigated crops, e.g., jowari, chillies and ragi fared well in the Malnad tract except in a few villages of the Kod taluka. But this did not mean any appreciable compensation for the loss caused to the irrigators whose main crop was paddy. The season was rather unfavourable in the Malnad, and fair in the transition and dry tracts.

Kanara.—The rainfall was seasonable and well distributed. The outturn of paddy and other crops was satisfactory except in the Haliyal taluka where the yield from the paddy crop was poor and remissions of land revenue had to be granted. In Bhatkal peta heavy floods occurred, resulting in damage to crops and property in 22 villages. "Koleroga" as usual affected the betel-nut crop; but the damage resulting from it was on the whole not serious.

Koluba.—The monsoon began as early as the last week of May and was seasonable and well distributed throughout. But untimely showers in October caused some damage to the standing crops. There was also some damage to the paddy crop in few villages from blight. The outturn of the crop was normal.

Ratnagiri.—The rains began in the last week of May. In the first half of June the rainfall was well distributed and favourable for ploughing and sowing operations; but in the second half it was excessive, with the result that agricultural operations and the growth of crops were affected generally. In certain villages in the Fatnagiri, Chiplun, Sangameshwar, Deogad and Malwan

talukas, heavy rain and floods damaged crops, fields and embankments. Transplantation was in full swing by the end of June. The rainfall during July was normal and favourable for the transplanting operations which were completed by the end of the month. The fall during the second fortnight of August was beneficial to standing crops. The transplanting of nagli and wari and weeding operations were undertaken during August. The excessive rainfall during the second and third weeks of September and the first week of October was harmful to standing crops, especially the early ones which were maturing. Flooded rivers and nalas caused damage to the adjoining fields. The reaping of early crops was completed by the end of October and that of late crops by the end of November. Sowing of summer crops and cutting of grass were completed by third week of January and the cutting of *kawal* by the first week of March.

Water Supply.—In the paddy tract of the Belgaum district most of the irrigation tanks failed and remissions of water share of land revenue were granted to the extent of Rs. 14,000. In the dry tract of the district great hardship was caused on account of deficiency of drinking water in March, April and May.

In the Bijapur district the supply of water for drinking and domestic purposes was sufficient throughout except in three villages of the Bagalkot taluka and two of the Bilgi petha where there is chronic scarcity of water. Sinking of gunds (pits) and removal of silt from existing wells and tanks were carried out in several villages with the aid of the special grants received from Government and the District Local Board. The supply of water in the irrigation tanks was sufficient.

Scarcity of water was experienced in the hot season in the second division of the Dharwar district and in certain kharapat villages of the Kolaba district.

The supply of water was on the whole satisfactory throughout the year in the coastal tracts.

Cattle and Fodder.—The condition of cattle was good and the supply of fodder generally adequate throughout the division. In the Bijapur district scarcity of fodder was felt at the beginning of the year owing to the failure of crops in the previous year. Tagai in the form of fodder was advanced liberally and fodder depots were opened at certain places. But the rains having set in early, green grass became available in June and plenty of fodder by October.

Public Health.—Public health, was good throughout the division. Though plague, cholera and small-pox made their appearances in certain parts of the division their spread was checked by the preventive and curative measures promptly adopted by the local bodies, local officers and special medical officers deputed for the purpose by the Public Health Department.

Cattle diseases appeared in all districts of the division. The Veterinary Department took the usual preventive and curative measures to check them.

No takavi was advanced under the Non-Agriculturists Loans Act (Act III of 1928). The year opened with an outstanding balance of Rs. 28,70,550 (Principal Rs. 23,02,136 *plus* Interest Rs. 5,63,444).

In Ahmedabad district, the unauthorised arrears are mostly of talukdari villages of Viramgam taluka and Sanand and Gogho mahals. The arrears in the Broach and Panch Mahals district chiefly pertain to Jambusar, Wagra, Godhra and Dohad talukas and Jhalod mahal and are due partly to the unsatisfactory economic condition of the cultivators owing to the low prices of cotton and partly to the orders of Government.

In Thana the arrears were mainly on account of the poor condition of the cultivators in Shahpur, Kalyan and Bhiwandi talukas and in Vada mahal.

Central Division.

The amount of takavi advanced under both the Acts (XIX of 1883 and XII of 1884) during the year was Rs. 2,01,544 as against Rs. 2,97,557 in the previous year. The decrease is mainly due to the fact that normal conditions prevailed in the division and fewer advances of takavi were accordingly made to agriculturists.

Southern Division.

The enclosed statements show the transactions during the year ending 30th September 1939. The amount collected represents 12.4 per cent., of the debt outstanding at the beginning of the year (including the debits of the year) as against the abnormally lcw percentage of 2.84 in the previous year when scarcity prevailed in the Bijapur district.

This year again Bijapur leads the districts in the division in respect of takavi advances and this was due to scarcity continuing in that district up to the harvest of 1938-39.

The amount suspended in Bijapur was Rs. 1,95,832-14-6 principal and Rs. 89,080-3-8 interest against Rs. 2,87,867-12-0 and Rs. 1,25,628-4-0, respectively in the previous year. Special concessions were granted to Bijapur district in Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 9980/33, dated 23rd March 1939.

2. The following special schemes of importance were sponsored in connection with the takavi administration during the year :---

(a) Eradication of hariyali by tractor-ploughing in Dharwar district.

(b) "Koleroga" control programme by spraying operations in Kanara district.

(a) Rs. 1,381-7-4 was advanced for ploughing by tractor 97 acres 25 gunthas in Navalgund taluka, where the Hubli Tractor Ploughing Co. carried on these operations in accordance with Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 5898/28 of 28th February 1939.

(b) The scheme relating to the *koleroga* control programme, which was first applied only in the Siddapur taluka of the Kanara district, was extended to the garden tracts of other talukas and pethas in the district. Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. P. 23(a)/1442, dated 18th May 1938). Satisfactory progress in spraying operations was made in the garden tracts of Sirsi, Siddapur, Yellapur, and Honavar talukas and Bhatkal petha. Rs. 18,682 were advanced for this scheme up to the end of the year.

Government also sanctioned takavi loans to the extent of Rs. 15,100 for improvement of the tari and supari garden lands in Siddapur taluka, which were forfeited during the civil disobedience movement and have now been restored to their original holders. (*Vide* Government Resolutions, Revenue Department, Nos. 7159/33/ 3275 and 7159/33/30418, dated 5th April 1939 and 26th September 1939, respectively).

Unauthorised arrears are the heaviest in Bijapur, being 3. Rs. 1,21,738-5-6 principal and Rs. 71,467-1-3 interest. Dharwar district comes next in this respect with Rs. 78,475-14-5 principal interest. Belgaum 23,098-7-9 and Rs. stands third with Rs. 18,372-9-4 principal and Rs. 9,597-3-0 interest as unauthorised arrears, which represent nearly 37.8 per cent. of the demand for the year. Next comes Kanara, where the unauthorised arrears amount to Rs. 15,448-12-1 principal and Rs. 2,196-5-1 interest, of which the major portion was in Siddapur taluka. These arrears are due to the general depression of prices of money crops in consideration of which Government ordered the suspension of coercive processes for recovery, under Government Resolution, Revenue Department, No. 7230/33, dated 23rd July 1938.

Unauthorised arrears in Kolaba and Ratnagiri are negligible.

Out of the 8,367 notices issued, East Khandesh alone was responsible for 3,045. In Poona, Nasik, West Khandesh and Ahmednagar the numbers were 2,036, 1,335, 908 and 800 respectively. There was a decrease in the total number of persons proceeded against under section 148 of the Land Revenue Code. In West Khandesh there was not a single case while in Nasik only 3 persons were proceeded against. In Ahmednagar, East Khandesh, Sholapur and Satara the cases were 7, 7, 8 and 9, respectively. There was an increase in the number of cases under section 154 in all districts except Nasik and Satara. In Ahmednagar, East Khandesh and Sholapur the increase was marked. There was a decrease in the number of cases under section 153 of the Land Revenue Code, particularly in East Khandesh. In East Khandesh there was one case of arrest and imprisonment under section 157 of the Land Revenue Code.

There was a general decrease during the year in the issue of notices of demand in all the districts in the Southern Division except Bijapur and Kanara, which show a slight increase which is negligible. Moveable property was also attached in a fewer cases. Forfeiture and sale of occupancy was resorted to in less number of cases.

15. TRADE AND INDUSTRIES.

Northern Division.

Out of 100 spinning and weaving mills in Ahmedabad three remained closed during the year. Besides these cotton and silk mills, there were 10 hosiery factories and 3 textile miscellaneous ones. Other small factories continued to work as usual during the year.

Trade conditions in Ahmedabad were on the whole steady throughout the year.

There were 186 prosecutions under the Factories Act, during the year out of which 174 ended in convictions and 12 kept pending the decision of an appeal preferred in a similar case. The total fine imposed under the Factories Act was Rs. 9,720.

As regards Kaira District the New Shorrock Mill at Nadiad has continued to work satisfactorily.

There were 32 ginning and pressing factories and 85 flour mills during the year in the district. There were 590 hand looms working during the year as against 591 during the preceding year. The number of pumping plants during the year was 65 in Anand taluka and 185 in Borsad taluka as against 63 and 182 during the previous year and they supplied water to the agriculturists for irrigating crops. There was one milk dairy at Anand and one at Nadiad. There were 46 creameries mostly in Anand, Borsad and Nadiad talukas. This trade is carried on an extensive scale and the poor classes make a living by selling milk to the trade. There were 8 oil mills in the district-one at Nadiad, one at Thasra and six at Kapadvanj. There was a silk factory at Nadiad. There were 3 metal-breaking machines at Pali Sevalia which supplied metal to railway companies, public bodies and others for road and building purposes. There were water works for supplying drinking water to village people by means of pipes at Khambholaj, Karamsad, Sarsa in Anand taluka, Borsad and Sunav in the Borsad taluka and Mahmadpura and Uttarsanda in Nadiad taluka. Nadiad, Anand and Kapadvanj have electric power houses. There were 2 glass factories at Kapadvanj and one oil paints manufacturing factory at Thasra.

In the Panch Mahals sub-division the principal trade was in timber and grain. Dohad is the chief market for exporting grain and Godhra for exporting timber. The chief articles of export in Kalol are groundnuts, oil and tur, while Halol exports cotton and groundnut. The main trade of Jhalod is grain and hides. There were no industries on large scales in the Panch Mahals except the manganese mines at Shivrajpur and Bamankuwa in Halol mahal. Other small industries, viz., oil mills, flour mills, saw mills, ice and sugar factories, etc., continued to work as usual. In the Broach sub-division, cotton is the chief product and forms the staple article of trade and industry. There were 28 ginning factories and 12 presses working during the year as against 27 ginning factories and 13 presses during the preceding year.

Out of the two cotton mills in Broach city, viz., the Gopal Mills and the Fine Counts Mills, the Gopal Mills continued to work while the other remained closed.

There were 79 hand-looms as against 71 in the preceding year. These are mainly worked by backward class people. Total cotton ginned during the year was 1,22,584 bhars as against 1,00,784 bhars during the preceding year. The increase was due to better outturn of the crop. Bales of cotton were exported mostly to Bombay. Sugar, timber and ghee were imported while wheat, jowari and lang were exported.

Surat is not an industrial district. It depends mainly on agriculture and a few cottage industries. The principal produce in the district is cotton and 2 cotton mills, 30 ginning factories and 16 pressing factories worked during the year. The silk and embroidery industry in Surat city is not in a flourishing state on account of general depression in trade and changes in fashion. There is one cotton seed and oil mill at Vejalpore in the Jalalpore taluka, which is working steadily. An experiment for producing "gur" from toddy was conducted at Karadi in Jalalpore taluka. It is reported that the "gur" turned out was of good quality and was in good demand for this reason because it was cheaper.

The chief articles of export are grass, firewood, coal, timber, mangoes, rice, cotton and cotton seed. Grass, firewood, coal, timber and rice are exported to Bombay from Chikhli, Bulsar and Mandvi. Mandvi is famous for its country carts, which are strong and durable. Timber from Mandvi forests is exported to other parts of Gujarat by rail.

There were 4 stone quarries in Bulsar taluka. A mining license was granted to Messrs. Killick Nixon & Co. at Mujlav and Tadkeshwar in Mandvi taluka.

Imports and exports by sea from Surat port are increasing.

The chief commodities exported from Thans are rice paddy, timber, charcoal, milk, grass, salt, betel-leaves, plantains, vegetable, fish, matches, saris, lugadis, etc. Of these commodities, paddy, rice. milk, fish, charcoal, etc., find a market in Bombay and the rest in Gujarat and are exported either by rail or sea. Timber is chiefly carried by sea from Sawata, Manor and Sanjan ports. The rice mill machinery manufacturing industry at Bhiwandi made steady progress during the year. There were about 135 rice mills and several flour mills in the district. Bricks are manufactured on a large scale in Kalyan and Bhiwandi talukas and were as usual exported to Bombay and elsewhere. These factories provide work to more than 2,000 labourers for over 8 months. There were about 100 hand-looms and 10 cloth mills in Bhiwandi Nizampur. These are chiefly operated by Momins from Upper India. The hand-loom industry is affected adversely by the increasing number of power-loom factories which can afford to supply the public at a cheaper rate. There are 3 electric supply companies at Thana, Bassein and Kalyan. The Virar stone quarry is worked as usual by the B. B. & C. I. Railway through their There were 3 bone mills in the district, one at Thana, contractors. the second at Kelwa, and the third at Diva. The mill at Thana The woollen mill at Thana made steady remained closed. There are two match factories at Ambernath and progress.

Thana. There is a chemical factory at Ambernath which produces acids and heavy chemicals and supplies them to practically the whole of India. There are water works at Badalpur on the Ulhas river which supply water to the Ambernath area.

In the Bombay Suburban district there was no appreciable change in the condition of trade in the market as the general depression continued. No new factories were reported to have opened. There was only one strike worth mentioning during the year and that was observed by the Independent Labour Party workers at Kurla on 7th November 1938, although the mills were working on that day as usual.

The building and quarrying trades continued to do brisk business. There was no change to report in the fishing industry.

Central Division.

The chief industry of the division is agriculture. Trade is mainly confined to the export of raw materials. The principal articles exported are grain, cotton and oilseeds.

Jaggery is the most important article of trade in the irrigated tracts of Ahmednagar, Nasik and Poona districts. Cotton and groundnut continued to be the chief products of trade of the Khandesh districts but their prices were low. Groundnut, turmeric and jaggery are the important articles of trade of Satara district and they were exported on an extensive scale to Bombay and other industrial centres. Onions, betel-leaves and eggs are also exported on a large scale.

Manufacture of cloth and yarn.—There are five cotton spinning and weaving mills in East Khandesh, one each in Poona and West Khandesh and five spinning, weaving and two spinning mills in Sholapur. There was a mill strike at Dhulia. It continued for about six weeks. In May one of the three mills working nightshift at Sholapur closed night-shift altogether and recently all the mills at that place stopped some of their looms. There are a large number of ginning and pressing factories all over the division except in Satara district. In Khandesh districts some of the factories remained closed. The factories of these districts work on the joint system and the profits are distributed among all of them. Hand-loom weaving is carried on in all the districts. This industry is however unable to stand the competition of the mills in respect of either the quality or quantity of the produce, and it is therefore not faring well.

Sugar Factories.—There are three sugar factories in Ahmednagar district. The one at Belvandi in Shrigonda taluka did very profitable business this year. The other two factories are steadily prospering. Two new factories are in the course of construction in Kopargaon taluka. The sugar factory at Rawalgaon in Nasik district is making progess. The two sugar factories in Malsiras taluka, viz., the Saswad Mali Sugar Factory at Akluj and the Brihan Maharashtra Sugar Factory at Borgaon did good business. Miscellaneous Industries.—One tanning class has been opened at Kasara in Sakri taluka by the Department of Industry.

There is one tannery at Bhusawal conducted by a Madras firm. The two tanneries at Ahmednagar worked well. The bidi factories at Nasik and Sinnar supplied bidis as far as the Central Provinces and Berar. The Reay Paper Mill at Mundwa and the Rawiwarma Fine Art Litho Press at Malvali, the Kirloskar Iron Factory, the Iron Industrial Works at Satara Road all had a good year.

Southern Division.

There was no appreciable change in the condition of trade.

Agriculture is the main industry.

The principal exports of the Karnatak districts are wheat, cotton, jaggery, chillies, groundnut, betel-nut, betel-leaves, spices and timber; and of the Konkan districts rice, salt, fish, salted fish, mangoes and prepared cashew-nuts.

The cotton ginning and pressing factories in the Dharwar, Bijapur and Belgaum districts had a normal year. The spinning and weaving mills at Hubli and Gadag worked fairly well: but there was a strike at the Gokak Mills which involved serious losses both to the workers and the management. Normal conditions were restored before the end of the year.

The hand-loom industry showed no improvement. Bodice cloth manufactured at Guledgud and Gajendragad and saris manufactured at Ilkal and other places were in fair demand. Carpets and woollen kamblis are produced in several places for local consumption. Industrial schools have recently been opened at Medleri in the Dharwar district, Budihal S. Haveli in the Bijapur district and at Honavar in the Kanara district. In the last school instruction in spinning, weaving, dyeing, rope-making, bee-keeping and manufacture of various articles from ivory, tali-palm nuts, horns, bones, ebony and sandalwood, is imparted. An allotment of Rs. 3,141 was sanctioned by Government for this institution, which is reported to be doing good work.

The manufacture of copper and brass pots continued in the Dharwar and Kolaba districts. Aluminium buttons of the value of Rs. 17,000 were manufactured in the factories at Viziadurgin Deogad taluka.

The output of the soap factory at Goregaon was of the same value as the last year, viz., Rs. 6,000. The cutlery factory at Pen is progressing steadily. The Dhut Papeshwar Ayurvedic Pharmacy at Panvel had a prosperous year.

The salt works at Sanikatta in the Kanara district, Shiroda in the Ratnagiri district, and Pen and Uran in the Kolaba district gave their normal yield.

The Bharat Tile Factory at Mora in Uran mahal is making steady progress. The brick and the tile factories in the Khanapur taluka remain in an unsatisfactory condition owing to their inability to compete with the well-established factories at Mangalore. The growing use of cement and concrete for building purposes has given a setback to the brick industry.

The mango crop in the Ratnagiri district was good, but the prices realised in Bombay were low. During the season 120,013 parcels of graft mangoes worth Rs. 3,54,773 were exported to Bombay as against 86,000 parcels worth Rs. 3,75,000 in the previous year. Also green mangoes worth Rs. 1,07,003 and mango slices worth Rs. 38,845 were exported to Bombay.

The mango juice canning factory at Kelashi in the Dapoli taluka did a limited business. The Central Canning Company at Karwar continued its mango pulp industry during the year.

The cashew-nut shelling factories at Malwan and Vengurla had a prosperous year, the import of raw cashew-nuts from Africa and the export of prepared nuts to Bombay and America being respectively valued at Rs. 4,96,225 and Rs. 11,79,853 against Rs. 1,94,205 and Rs. 9,28,000 in the previous year.

Sandalwood, ebony and ivory carving was carried on as usual at Kumta, Honawar, and Sadashivgad in the Karwar taluka. For lack of demand the industry is not in a flourishing condition. The Tata Power Company's power houses at Bhivapuri, Campoli and Patnus continued to supply energy as usual.

There are seven saw mills in the Kanara district including the Forest Department's mill at Dandeli.

Perfumed sticks are manufactured at Hukeri and Pachapur in the Belgaum district and at Kuweshi in the Ratnagiri district.

16. PRICES.

Northern Division.

Prices of food grains in all districts showed a downward trend. In Ahmedabad and Kaira this was due to general economic depression. In Broach and Panch Mahals and Surat it was partly due to good crops and lack of demand from outside and partly due to general economic depression. The prices of cotton with seed ranged from Rs. 72 to Rs. 90 as against Rs. 75 to Rs. 100 per *bhar* in the preceding year. This recession was caused by the fall in international prices. In Thana there was a slight rise in the prices of rice, gram, etc., in the Bhiwandi Prant, but in general the prices of commodities showed a downward trend.

Owing to the low prices rebates in assessment were granted as a relief to the agriculturists in the talukas where they were considered necessary.

Central Division.

The prices in Poona and Ahmednagar were steady. The prices of groundnut and cotton which are the chief money crops in East Khandesh were low during the year. In Nusik and Satara the prices of bajri, wheat and rice were slightly lower than those in the last year. The prices in Sholapur did not show any remarkable rise or fall during the year.

Southern Division.

The price of cotton which is the main money crop of the black soil tracts of Belgaum, Bijapur and Dharwar districts fell owing to the general economic depression and other world factors.

In the Konkan districts the price of paddy and other crops was stationary except that the price of cocoanuts and of cardamums in Kanara tended to fall. Above the ghats the price of almost all food grains and fodder fell. The abundant harvest was enough to account for this.

17. LABOUR AND WAGES.

Northern Division.

In Ahmedabad, Kaira, Broach and Panch, Mahals, Surat and Bombay Suburban districts, the wages of both skilled and unskilled labour showed no appreciable change. In Thana, wages of skilled labour in Palghar taluka fell from Rs. 2 to Rs. 1-4-0. There was no change in the rate of daily wages of unskilled labour which varied from annas 4 to 8. Besides, this district being, in close proximity to Bombay, skilled and unskilled labourers especially from Thana, Kalyan and Bassein as usual found employment in Bombay at higher wages than they could get locally. Rice mills in the district as also the match factory at Ambernath and Thana and salt works at Bhayandar, Rai and Belapur, etc., provided sufficient work for both skilled and unskilled labourers. There was as usual no sign of unemployment in the labour classes of the district during the year but on the contrary, local labour could not cope with the demand and it had to be supplemented by importing upcountry labourers.

Similarly many skilled labourers had to be imported from Gujarat for brick manufacturing work.

Central Division.

The supply of labour was plentiful throughout the year and the rates of wages both for skilled and unskilled labourers remained practically steady except in East Khandesh, West Khandesh, Nasik, part of Satara and Sholapur. In East Khandesh there was a notable fail in the wages of ordinary and field labour towards the end of the year. In West Khandesh the wages of both skilled and unskilled labour showed a slight change in respect of male labourers only. In Nasik there was a slight fall in the rates of wages of skilled labour. In part of Satara the rates of both skilled and unskilled labourers had a downward trend in May 1939. In parts of Sholapur the wages of unskilled labourers was on the whole good. The railway works at Lonavla and Dhond, the spinning and weaving mills at Jalgaon, Amaluer, Chalisgaon, Dhulia, Poona, Barsi and Sholapur, the sugar factories in the Ahmednagar, Nasik, Poona and Sholapur districts, the several ginning and pressing factories in every district except Satara, the ammunition factory and the arsenal at Kirkee, the Government workshop at Dapuri, the Reay Paper Mill at Mundwa and the Tata works in the Poona district continued to absorb a large number of labourers from the countryside.

Southern Division.

The demand for skilled and unskilled labour was on the whole normal throughout the division. The very slight fluctuations in the rates of wages call for no remarks. There were again strikes in the Gokak Mills in July and December 1938. The relations between capital and labour elsewhere in the division were generally satisfactory.

Belgaum.—There was no dearth of employment throughout the district.

The wages for skilled and unskilled labour were almost uniform throughout the district. The condition of the labouring classes was satisfactory.

Bijapur.—Owing to the adequate rainfall during the year under report field work was available for unskilled labour. But owing to the economic depression the demand for skilled labour was poor.

The rates of wages showed no appreciable variations.

Dharwar.—The supply of labour both skilled and unskilled was generally in excess of the demand. There was very little variation in the rates of wages. Relations between the employers and employees remained satisfactory.

Kanara.—The labour required for the above-ghat talukas was imported as usual from Goa and the bordering districts of Dharwar, Belgaum and South Kanara.

The rates of wages for skilled labour were stationary except those in Honavar taluka where there was a rise from Re. 0-13-6 to Re. 0-14-0 and in Siddapur taluka and Mundgod peta a fall from Re. 0-14-0 to Re 0-12-0.

Except for very slight variations in Haliyal taluka and Mundgod and Supa petas the rates of wages for field labour were stationary.

Kolaba.--Wages varied from Re. 1 to Rs. 2 for skilled labour and from As. 3 to As. 6 for unskilled labour except at Uran where wages for unskilled labour were between 6 and 8 annas.

Ratnagiri.—There were slight variations in the rates of wages for skilled as well as unskilled labour. Agricultural labour was sufficient.

18. SPECIAL MATTERS.

Northern Division.

Two thousand seven hundred thirty acres were given out on restricted tenure in Ahmedabad district and much smaller areas elsewhere. The pace is restricted by the orders that blocks of 100 acres are only to be given out to co-operative farming societies which is not a popular system with cultivators, and to the large proportion of land which Government has directed to be reserved for grazing.

The Collector of Bombay Suburban district reports that the arrears of non-agricultural assessment are being reduced. The collection of land revenue of all kinds in this district which is 75 per cent. against 99 in the other districts requires to be greatly improved.

Corruption in subordinate revenue service.—Instructions according to the orders issued by Government from time to time are given to the subordinate officers. Touring officers while on tour impress upon their subordinates that the supplies they purchase in the villages must be paid for at the prevailing market rates. Anti-corruption committees have been formed in each district, and the cases of corruption brought to notice by them are dealt with promptly and action is taken against any persons found guilty.

Central Division.

(1) During the year His Excellency the Governor paid a visit to Dhulia in August 1938 and to Ahmednagar in October 1938. His Excellency visited some of the prominent institutions in Dhulia and heard the grievances of the agriculturists through their representatives. An exhibition of cottage industries and hand craft articles was arranged at Mohadi in Dhulia taluka to which His Excellency paid a visit. At Ahmednagar a crowded

programme for two days had been arranged and His Excellency and Lady Lumley paid visits to almost all official and private institutions in the town.

(2) The Saugamner Municipality was superseded owing to its mismanagement for many years. There was some excitement in the town but it soon subsided after an unsuccessful meeting held by the late councillors condemning the action of Government.

(3) A systematic agitation and propaganda was carried on in East Khandesh for remission of land revenue. The agitators gave false hopes to agriculturists that if they made a row they were sure to get some remission. A flood of applications to the extent of 6,191 in number were received. Most of them were on printed forms and they were specially engineered. Of this bulk 2,953 belonged to Jalgaon and Pachora talukas. Inquiry into these applications showed that a great majority of them were baseless. A conference was organised by socialist element at Jalgaon on 26th January 1939 in which they made sweeping demands for concessions. By this time Government had declared the grant of remission in the land revenue to the extent of two annas in the rupee in seven talukas and one peta. Seeing that the row still continued Government declared in May 1939 that they did not intend to grant any more concessions in the matter. This had a quietening effect on the agitation.

(4) Towards the close of the year 1937-38 confusion was found to exist in the village and taluka accounts of the Koregaon taluka in the Satara district. Enquiries were started and wherever misappropriations came to light action was taken against the village officers. 18 talatis were dismissed and 7 patils and 3 kulkarnis were removed from office. A special establishment of two jamabandi karkuns from other districts and two extra aval karkuns was appointed to set matters right. The jamabandi karkuns worked for 5 months and examined the village accounts of the last three years. The extra head karkuns assisted the Mamiatdar in the enquiry work. Most of the chaos has now been removed and the delinquents and offenders have been brought to book.

(5) Famine.—No scarcity or famine was declared in any of the districts during the year but as the annewari of crops for 1937-38 in 317 villages in the Sholapur district was below 6 annas, cash doles to 601 inferior village servants from these villages were paid from April to August 1938. On receipt of good rains these were stopped. The expenditure during the month of August 1938 in this behalf was Rs. 1,202.

The P. W. D. works of Hotgi and Gherdi tanks and the District Local Board works of Taratgaon-Begampur and Karkamb-Venegaon roads started for providing work for labourers were closed by the end of August 1938.

Concessional water rates of Rs. 2 for one watering and Rs. 3 for two waterings on all canals for rabi crops were sanctioned in December 1938 and they were of much use to the irrigators in the western half of Malsiras taluka in the Sholapur district as crops were on the point of withering for want of rain after October. (6) A Special Officer for Bhil uplift has been appointed for the partially excluded areas in the West Khandesh and also for the predominantly Bhil areas in Shirpur and Sakri talukas of the district. He looks to the interest of the Bhils and other aboriginal and hill tribes and acts as an intermediary between these tribes and the various departments of Government.

(7) Grant of waste land on the impartible tenure.—Waste land was given out for cultivation on the impartible tenure as detailed below :—

(8) Measures taken to prevent corruption.—In accordance with the orders contained in Government Resolution, Political and Services Department, No. 25-6/34, dated 5th April 1939, Anti Corruption Committees have been formed in each district. Notice boards restraining the public from paying bribes and also requesting them to co-operate with Government in stamping out corruption have been hung up in all the revenue offices.

Cases of Corruption.

Nasik district.-A talati in the Nasik Division was charged with having recovered Rs. 11-8-0 as costs of the superior holders in vahiwat suit No. 1 of 1937. It was alleged that he did not give a receipt but misappropriated the amount. The departmental enquiry showed that considerable time had elapsed between the date of the payment of the amount and the complaint. The complainant refused to give any evidence and to proceed with the complaint. The Prant Officer after enquiry ordered the papers to be filed. A talati in the Malegaon Division was charged with having resided in a house without payment of rent and with having taken wood without payment. Another talati in the same division was charged with demanding and receiving fees for doing work in connection with record of rights. In both the cases the charges were not substantiated. The mulki naik in the Baglan Mamlatdar's office was alleged to have received a sum of Re. 1-4-0 for allowing an applicant to present an application for Bohada to the Mamlatdar. He was also alleged to have abused the applicant and to have further demanded or received from him a sum of Re. 0-7-6 for delivering over the order. The Prant Officer reduced the naik to the grade of a peon, but the punishment was enhanced to one of dismissal from service by the Collector.

Poona district.—A mulki naik in the Haveli Mamlatdar's office was alleged to have taken Re. 1 from the mahars of Nanded in a vahiwat suit. The charge was not sufficiently and satisfactorily proved. The talati of Kadus in Khed taluka was charged with accepting illegal gratification for giving copies of record of rights. There was no sufficient evidence to prove the charge. He was however fined Rs. 5 departmentally as his conduct was not above suspicion. The talati of Adgaon saza in the same taluka admitted the charge of accepting bribe in making mutations in the record of rights and he was dismissed from Government service after departmental enquiry. The talati of Poona city was also alleged to have taken Rs. 5 from an occupant and to have threatened him with criminal prosecution for having dug earth in his land. The allegations were not proved.

Satara district.—A talati and a patil in a village were convicted under section 420, I. P. C., and sentenced to 1 month's rigorous imprisonment and a fine of Rs. 2) each.

Sholapur district.—One Circle Inspector has been dismissed from service. One Kulkarni from Madha taluka was removed from office under section 58 of the Watan Act.

Southern Division.

In October 1938, His Excellency the Governor of Bombay visited Khed and Chiplun talukas in the Ratnagiri district.

His Excellency visited Ratnagiri, Goa, Karwar, Vengurla and Malwan in November 1938 and Alibag in December 1938.

On 1st May 1939, His Excellency visited Belgaum and Dharwar on his way to Yellapur (Kanara) where he camped for 10 days. He also visited Matheran in the third week of May 1939.

Corruption in the subordinate revenue service.—In Belgaum, Mr. H. S. Mangalwedhekar, a clerk in the Chikodi Mamlatdar's office, was prosecuted, convicted and sentenced to one day's rigorons imprisonment and a fine of Rs. 30, for wrongfully confining an accused person with a view to extorting money. He was dismissed from service. Mr. Ishrappa Sheshappa, a patil in Yellapur taluka of the Kanara district, was discharged from service as he was found guilty of malpractices.

Mr. Nagappa Shiddaya, a talati in Mundgod peta of the Kanara district, was reduced from Rs. 40 to 35 for having taken illegal gratification.

Mr. Shelar, a talati in the Mahad taluka, was dismissed from service in September 1938 for having received a bribe of Rs. 10 for granting a dakhala of village land. He was also prosecuted and convicted.
