ADMINISTRATION REPORT
OF
THE POONA CITY MUNICIPALITY
FOR
1888-89.

I. *Date of establishment.* The Municipality was established in 1856-57.

II. *Population.* The population of the Municipality, according to the census of 1881, is 99,622.

III. *Municipal boundaries.* The limits of the Poona City Municipality were extended by Government in the year under report, as per Government Notification No. 1,688—A published in the Government Gazette, part I.—A. page 78, dated the 22nd June 1888. The effect has been that the villages of Bhamburda and Gultekli have been included in the Municipal District against the wishes of the Municipality. The boundaries of the Poona City Municipal District, as altered with the sanction of Government, stand as below :—

NORTH. The Southern side of the Wellesley or Kirkee road from the Bolai quarry west-wards to the G. I. P. Railway over bridge, thence the line of the said Railway up to the level crossing No. 65 in Bhamburda on the Poona and Ganesh Khind road, thence along the Southern side of that Road up to its junction with the road from Kirkee to Lakdipul.

SOUTH. The Southern boundary of Survey Nos. 95, 107, 106, 105, 104, 98, 221, 219, of the village of Manjeri, and the northern side of the Road to Singhar from the Sawar's Police Station to the bridge on the Ambil Odha near the village of Parbati.

EAST. The Western side of the road from the Bolai quarry towards the Synagogue upto the commencement of the approach to the City going by the South of Ghorpade's Takin and Babaji Manaji's Coach Factory ; thence a straight line to the Western end of the bridge on the Manik Nala near Sachapur, thence the Poona Military Cantonment boundary as far as the south-eastern corner of survey No. 95 in the village of Manjeri.

WEST. The eastern side of the Road from Kirkee to Lakdipul from its junction with the Ganesh Khind road to the north-west corner of Survey No. 71 in the village of Bhamburda ; thence a line drawn round the survey Nos. 71, 72, and 73 in the same village so as to include those Nos., thence the River Mutha from the Lakdipul to the Ambil Odha ; thence the Ambil Odha as far as the bridge on the road to Singhar near the village of Parbati ; next the eastern side of the Satara Road from the Sawar's Police Station to the south-west corner of Survey No. 219 in the village of Manjeri.

IV. *Number of Meetings.* There were 52 (*vide* Appendix A) meetings of the General Committee in 1888-89 against 54 and 36, in 1887-88, and 1886-87 respectively.

The number of items of business disposed of at these meetings has been 149 and that disposed of by circulation one. Of the 52 meetings four were quarterly and forty-eight general. On an average there has been a meeting every week.

Appendices A. and B. will show that the attendance of elected and nominated Members was 9.5 and 3.6 out of the total of 20, and 10 Commissioners respectively. The attendance has on an average fallen off. In the month of July when the Budget was being discussed, and February and March 1889, the attendance was more than 50 per cent., the highest being in the month of July 1888, when 13 out of 20 elected Commissioners attended. The attendance of the nominated Commissioners is on an average $\frac{1}{2}$ of the total number of 10, while of the 20 elected Members almost 10 attended all meetings. Out of 52 meetings one Member (the President) attended all meetings except two in December 1888 when he was in Bombay.

1. Rao Saheb R. D. Nagarkar, 2. Rao Saheb K. V. Mudliar, 3. Rao Saheb T. N. Rajmachikar, 4. Rao Bahadur Dr. Ghole, and 5. Rao Saheb Anant Ramsing, attended three-fourths and more of the meetings. Six Members attended half the number of meetings, while four Members attended even less than $\frac{1}{2}$; Rao Saheb B. A. Chobe attended only one meeting; and Khan Saheb Zenul Abedin and Rao Saheb Venkatrao Ramchandra were not present at a single meeting. These reduce the average attendance of the rest considerably.

There were 51 meetings of the Managing Committee *vide* (appendices C. and D.). They as a rule met once a week. Out of 7 Members, on an average more than 5 Members attended all meetings. Only one Member was absent from more than half the number of meetings. If he were left out of calculation, it will appear that the rest attended on an average 44 or 82 per cent. of the meetings. The average attendance in the year under report is 5.8 against 6 in the previous year. This was due to Mr. Plunkett, who was Chairman, being absent from Poona for two months and Khan Saheb Framji Dorabji being unable to attend on account of other business for some time. Rao Saheb K. V. Mudliar attended all meetings with the exception of only two; Rao Sahebs K. G. Natu and Nagarkar were absent from 3 and 4 meetings respectively.

The number of cases disposed of at meetings are 1,120 against 1,430 in the previous year, and that of those disposed of by circulation has been 293 against 171 in the preceding year. The total number of cases disposed of are 1,413 against 1,601 in the year 1887-88.

V. *Members.* There has been no change in the number of Members who have been 30. There was one change in the personnel of the Members. Rao Saheb M. M. Kunte, Head Master of the Local High School, and a Member of this Municipality, died in the month of October, and Rao Saheb Waman Prabhakar Paranjpe, who was Principal of the Training College in the Berars and has been a pensioner, was elected in his place. He took office in December 1888.

(a) *Octroi*.—Octroi yielded Rupees 10,076-3-10 more than in the preceding year. This is partly owing to a larger quantity of dutiable goods being imported into the District on one hand, and on the other a larger number of claims for refund of duty remaining unsatisfied at the end of the year, the applications for which were received too late in the year. When in 1887-88 Rs. 16,771-15-4 were refunded for articles exported, in 1888-89 only Rupees 14,164-14-11 were paid off, while the amount ought to have been much larger than that in 1887-88. The income from this source being Rs. 1,32,249-7-11, its percentage on the general revenues shows a rise of 7, which has a double explanation. The revenue from this source is in the first place larger this year than last year and secondly the total net income from other sources has fallen off.

Appendix E gives the net amount of duty levied on the 8 different classes of goods imported into the City limits together with gross imports and exports.

Appendix G gives the quantities of the different individual articles imported into the City, exported out of it, and net imports.

The Octroi Schedule was, as promised in the last year's Report, revised in the year 1888-89, as directed by Government in their Resolutions No. 1076 dated 4th April 1887 and No. 2918 dated 22nd August 1888. 13 specified articles such as Kerosine oil, Haberdashery, Galichas, Canvas tapes, Tarpaulins, Gunny and gunny bags &c, have been excluded from the schedule, which is calculated to cause a net loss of about Rupees 3,000 every year to the Municipality. The minimum amount of duty refundable has also been reduced to annas 8 from one rupee, which will have the effect of about 9,000 Rupees more being refunded for articles exported. These changes do not however affect the income or expenditure in the year under report, they being introduced from the 1st of April 1889.

(b) *House, Halalcore and Wheel Tax*.—In the year under report the revenue from the Conservancy Cess, House Tax and Wheel Tax amounted to Rupees 23,146-2-5, Rupees 18,762-12-2, and Rupees 4112-8-0 showing a decrease against all these heads of Rupees 5,325-4-7, Rupees 3,973-5-0, and Rupees 2,270-4-0 respectively. The decrease is due to a larger amount of balances (*vide* appendix F) remaining unrecovered at the close of the year under report, for the recoveries of which applications have been made to Magistrates. It is feared however that a ruling of Her Majesty's High Court, passed in December 1888, and recently brought to the notice of mofussil Magistrates, will probably cause the Municipality a loss of a few thousand rupees. The High Court declares that default in payment of Municipal dues is an offence punishable under Section 84 of the Bombay Act VI of 1873, as amended by Section 49 of the Bombay Act II of 1894. Applications for the recovery of arrears have therefore to be made within 3 months time, under Section 82 of the Act of 1873. This ruling has taken Municipalities quite by surprise, the practice with whom has hitherto been first to try all private means of recovery and to have recourse to law as the last resource. Applications under Section 84 were therefore always made too late for the limitation now sought to be imposed by the interpretation put by the High Court on Section 84 of the Municipal Act of 1873. Some recoveries have been latterly made by making applications direct to house and property owners. The Municipality has been trying every means to collect its dues in time.

(c) *Water Rate &c*.—The decrease in the revenue from water rates, fees on music and fees on animals for slaughter and trade registration fees is slight and does not require special explanation. Such fluctuations are likely to take place every year.

(d) *Realizations under Special Acts.*—Realizations under Special Acts include receipts from the cattle pound, which shows an increased revenue of Rs. 722-6-0 against Rs. 618-11-0 for 1887-88. It is due to the Committee having engaged a special man to arrest and impound stray cattle.

(e) *Markets.*—The increase in the revenue from markets is principally due to the Reay Market being more largely used by local dealers. There were at the close of the year under report very few stalls vacant. All the open grounds round about the main building have been let to shop-keepers.

(f) *Conservancy.*—The revenue from Conservancy, which chiefly consists of sale proceeds of pondrotte, manufactured by the Municipality, shows an unusually large decrease. It was primarily due to a fall in the prices offered for pondrotte, and a fall in the number of purchasers, which was mainly the result of the unfriendly attitude of the conservancy officers of the Cantonment of Poona. The passage of the city municipal pondrotte was actually stopped for some months on the ground of the alleged danger to public health. There was no sale for some months. The depot was stocked with heaps of pondrotte. No man would purchase it for fear of being prosecuted for transporting it through the Cantonment limits. A regular panic had spread amongst people, possessing fields to the East of the Cantonment where there is the largest demand for manure. It was with much difficulty and after a good deal of persuasion, that this Municipality succeeded in convincing the Cantonment authorities of the harmlessness of the city pondrotte. They at last—which was after the close of the year under report—consented to allow pondrotte carts to pass through their limits under certain restrictions. The stock of unsold pondrotte has now been almost disposed of, but the prices have not yet recovered, nor have purchasers yet got over their fears. The Municipality has already suffered a loss of about Rupees 24,000, and the effects of the panic, it is feared, will continue for some time to come.

(g) *Municipal Fines.*—The increase in the revenue from Municipal Fines is due to a larger number of prosecutions instituted and of convictions obtained. There were in the year under report (vide appendix) 1,179 prosecutions and 804 convictions as against 787 and 549 prosecutions and convictions respectively. This is again an index of greater attention paid to sanitation by Municipal servants.

(h) *Grant-in-aid &c.*—The increase of Rupees 439-5-2 is due to Government having paid grants for additional schools opened and aided by the Municipality.

(i) *School Fees.*—There is a slight decrease in school fees owing to the attendance in Municipal schools having fallen a little.

(j) *Proceeds from School Land.*—There is a piece of land in the city the proceeds of which are allotted by Government to the maintenance of the low caste school. Its occupancy right was sold for the last year for Rs. 300. This land was let to a man for a period of 5 years ending with 1887-88. Perhaps unmindful of it he grew sugar-cane on it. But before he could reap the crop his tenancy was over. The occupancy right was put to auction. As was natural he was anxious to retain the field in his possession for one year more at any cost and offered Rupees 300 for it which will explain the rise in the revenues from this source. In the current year it was again sold but it fetched Rupees 250 only owing to sugar-cane cultivation being stopped in the City limits and out side within a radius of one mile from the City, Suburban and Cantonment limits.

(k) *Sundries*.—Sundries principally include

It also includes other items. The increase is due to the interest being paid by the Bank in 1888-89 and there being no such income in 1887-88 which included as against this item Rupees 413 as contribution paid by Rao Bahadur Dr. Ghole for a Haud named after his father.

(l) *Debt*. The decrease against this head is very small and is due to ordinary fluctuations in transactions.

(m) Having thus given detailed causes of increase and decrease, a statement of percentages of incomes from the following principal sources on the total revenue would be necessary for a general idea of the whole financial situation as contrasted with that of the previous year:—

With the exceptions of Octroi, Municipal Fines, and Education all items show a decrease. The total net revenue has fallen in this year, by Rs. 20,992-9-9.

The total expenditure in 1888-89 was Rupees 2,76,310-3-2 as against Rupees 2,33,782-15-11 in 1887-88, thus showing an increase of Rupees 42,557-8-3.

(a) *Office and Inspection &c.*—This shows an increase of Rupees 28,50-13-5 which is due to the pay of the Head Clerk and the second clerk being increased by Rupees 5 and 15 per mensem respectively, a double foolscap size press being purchased at a cost of Rupees 2,100 which is charged to "Contingencies," and casual fluctuations in other unimportant items included in this head. Printing was given till last year to the local press, only small jobs being done by the old press of the Municipality. Now it is hoped that with the new press and an increased establishment for it the Municipality can get almost all necessary work done departmentally.

(b) *Collection of taxes.*—The increase of Rupees 449-9-9 represents the cost of the additional establishment, entertained temporarily in the year over and above what was maintained in 1887-88, for the execution of warrants and notices issued by Magistrates, for the recovery of Municipal dues.

(c) *Fire.*—Appendix I, shows that the number of fires in the year under report was only 6 as against 11 of the previous year. The value of property destroyed by fire was however Rupees 7495 (*vide* Appendix I.) while in 1887-88 it was Rs. 2,352. The value of the hay stack alone burnt outside the City is Rupees 7,000 and it is a well known fact that when hay stacks once catch fire it is almost impossible to save them. Excluding this particular case which was due to incendiarism, the total loss of house property amounts to Rupees 495 which is much smaller than that of the previous year. The Municipality has purchased another Steam Fire Engine in the year under report at a cost of Rupees 4,900, payment for which however has been made in 1889-90. With this additional help the Municipality trusts that the loss of property by fire will be still smaller in future.

(d) *Lighting.*—The number of street lamps has been increased from 887 to 1,008 as per Appendix J. The cost and the maintenance charges of the additional 116 lamps and lamp posts and the higher prices paid this year for oil, account for the increase of Rupees 4,675-14-7. The price per box of Kerosine oil was in 1887-88 Rupees 3-12-6 while it rose to Rupees 4-9-0 in 1888-89.

(e) *Registration of births and deaths.*—The increase in this item is due to a part of the remuneration to Municipal servants for collecting information regarding vital statistics being paid in 1888-89 for work done in 1887-88.

Appendices A, B, C, and D, attached to the Health Officer's Report (*vide O*) show 2,760 births against 2,919 in the previous year and 2,735 in the year previous to that. There were in the year under report 3,153 deaths, giving a death rate of 30.85 against 3,294 deaths with a death rate of 33.06 recorded in 1887-88. Statement C, gives as below figures of deaths from principal causes, as compared with those of the previous year :—

This shows that while there were fewer deaths from Cholera and other causes in this year, there were more from small-pox and fevers than in 1887-88. If deaths from Cholera and small-pox, which are due to abnormal causes, were excluded the death rate will fall to about 26 per mille. By localities, Ghorpade's Peth shows the highest death rate, and Narayen Peth the lowest; and by months August records the largest number of deaths while October the smallest. For further details see the Health Officer's Report, Appendix O.

(f) *Buildings, Markets, Latrines &c.*—In the year under report raised platforms or masonry "otas" were put up for the convenience of the Dalals; curtains have been put up for the convenience of shop-keepers in the building; and open gutters constructed in the compound at a cost of Rupees 5,000, part of the cost being paid in the current year and Rupees 2,881-18-0 in 1888-89. Four latrines of 4 seats each were constructed at four different places costing Rupees 1,497-18-0. Rupees 1,700 have been spent on constructing urinary gutters, in 1888-89 while in 1887-88 Rupees 1,973, 495 and 85 were spent respectively on these three works mentioned above. This explains the increase.

(g) *Repairs to Markets and Latrines &c.*—The increase under this head is not much and is chiefly owing to some of the latrines being painted white this year which was not done in the previous year.

(h) *Maintenance of Medical Institutions.*—The Municipality maintains 8 Dispensaries giving relief to 64,132 patients against 61,832 in 1887-88. The increase in expenditure is due to the item for medicines, the consumption being larger in the year under report, the cost of establishment remaining almost the same. The Municipality has also made, as usual, a grant of Rupees 1200 towards the maintenance of the Infirm Asylum, where lepers, blind and infirm people are fed, clothed and housed.

(i) *Vaccination.*—Shows slight increase in expenditure which is mainly due to uniforms being supplied to the vaccinators' peons and contingent charges having undergone a slight increase. As remarked in the last year's report, vaccination is done by the Sanitary Department of Government, the Municipality only finding the necessary funds. The Municipality has consented to have vaccination made compulsory in the City. The preliminaries are being settled by the Deputy Sanitary Commissioner, which work completed, Government will be moved to pass an Act in this behalf. The statistics are kept by the Sanitary Department.

(j) *Water Works, original and repairs.*—The total expenditure on this item amounts to Rupees 19,350-11-2 which is in excess of the previous year's total by Rupees 2,391-6-11.

The Municipality has constructed a cistern of which Rao Bahadur Dr. V. R. Ghole, has contributed half the cost, the other half being provided by the Municipality. It is called the "Ram Hand," being named after the Doctor's father in consideration of the contribution. New water pipes have been purchased for Rupees 1,456-10-7. 13 new public stand pipes have been put up at a cost of Rupees 370-1-3. The Katraj Tank has been cleared and also the Chaudhari aqueduct. The latter has also been repaired at a cost of Rupees 3,500 with a view to augment the supply of water from that source. Rupees 1,829-2-9 have been paid to Government in excess of the annual charge of Rupees 10,000, for water drawn in excess of the stipulated quantity *vide* Appendix K. All these items account for the increased expenditure.

(k) *Road watering*.—Here again there is an increase of Rupees 1,482-15-2 which is due to more watering being done (*vide*. Appendix L.) and to new carts being purchased at a cost of Rupees 267. Rupees 1,087 were spent in repairing old ones. All the principal streets were watered twice early in the morning and in the afternoon. Arrangements are being made to make the water from wells available by means of lifts and other means to relieve to some extent the drinking water supply of the strain on it.

(l) *Road cleaning*.—The expenditure on this head represents the pay, Rupees 7,684-9-0, of the sweepers who are 166 in number and other contingent charges such as repairs to old refuse carts costing Rs. 860, and new dust bins, Rupees 699-11-3 and purchase of new brooms and baskets, dust bins and refuse carts. Some of the old carts which had become useless had to be replaced, 10 and 6 additional sweepers were sanctioned for the City proper and Bhamburda which was added to the Municipal District in May 1888. The work of cleaning dust bins is done by contractor who empties them twice a day and removes the contents and appropriates them for private use, in consideration of which the Municipality received 40 cart-loads of ashes and as many of kachra required for use at the Night-soil Depôt. The number of road sweepers is not yet quite sufficient for the purpose. The Committee has been strengthening this establishment more and more every year.

(m) *Conservancy*.—The total expenditure on Conservancy is Rupees 65,613-11-7 against Rs. 59,147-14-7 spent on it last year. In the year under report the cost of general inspection establishment, including the Health Officer, the Conservancy Inspectors and Mukadams shows an excess of Rupees 1,639-12-8 over that of the last year when it was only Rs. 7,006-14-7. This is due to a Conservancy Inspector on Rupees 70 and 8 Bhangi Mukadams at Rupees 580 per mensem being maintained during the whole of the year while in 1887-88 they were in employ for 3 months only, being engaged from January 1888. The Removal of the night soil from the City to the Night-soil Depôt also cost Rupees 480-5-5 more, on account of more carts being engaged. The practice is that public latrines and private privies are cleansed by Bhangis engaged by the Municipality and the night-soil transferred to carts, stationed in different parts of the City; the filth is removed by a contractor who supplies bullocks and drivers at a fixed rate to the Depôt to the south of the City where it is turned into pondrette. The Municipality has spent some 3,800 Rupees more this year on the Depot than last year, the total expenditure on repairs and new works amounting to Rs. 6,806-3-5.

Amongst improvements made at the Depôt may be mentioned a tiled roof in the place of a thatched one on the Bhangi Chal, new masonry pans, corrugated iron shed 2,952 sq.ft. in area for the storage of ashes, pavement round the cistern where carts are washed, and repairs to roads leading to and in the yard. The contingent charges also show an increase of a thousand rupees which includes the price of a large quantity of kachra purchased from the Cantonment Committee, Poona, for use at the Depot, the Municipal contractor's supply being found insufficient. Gunny bags have also been made for the use of carts conveying manure from the Depot at a cost of Rupees 200. The only item that shows a decrease of Rs. 500 is "Repairs to night-soil carts" which were not done this year, being not required. In short the staff of labourers, and Inspectors and Mukadams has been increased for the improvement of general conservancy. Every effort is also made to keep the Night-soil Depôt in as good an order as such Depôts could practically be brought into.

(n) *Remission of Cess.*—The decrease of Rs. 2,171-6-9 is due to a large amount of outstanding balances being written off as irrecoverable in the year 1887-88 and the same being not done in the year, 1888-89.

(o) *Drainage—Drains and establishment.* The fact that while new drains show a decrease of Rupees 6,127-8-4, the establishment for the same should discover an increase of Rupees 8,618-8-5, or that the Municipality should have fewer drains with a larger establishment is easily accounted for. As was mentioned in the last year's Report, Rao Sahab Gangadhar Anant Bhat, M. A., L.C.E. whose services have been placed at the disposal of the Municipality, has been engaged, since March 1888, in preparing a drainage scheme and projects for filter works. His own pay is Rs. 500. He has under him an establishment of an overseer and at a monthly cost of Rupees 67. The Committee has, as has been already reported to Government, adopted a rough scheme of open drains, as prepared by Rao Sahab Bhat and approved of by the Executive Engineer and the Deputy Sanitary Commissioner Central Registration District. It has also adopted plans and estimates for filter works prepared by the same Officer. The total cost of both the works would, according to the estimates placed before the Committee, amount to Rupees 11,02,650

These schemes will be sent up to Government for their approval, as directed by them, on Rao Sahab Bhat working out all the necessary details which he hopes to finish soon. In anticipation of having to put into execution the General Drainage Scheme, the Municipality has stopped constructing new drains, which accounts for the decrease in expenditure, noticed above; and what little money has been shown here as spent represents partly the cost of the construction of drains that were indispensably necessary and could not be put off without much inconvenience to the public.

(p) *Markets—Establishment and other charges.*—The increase under this head is principally due to more money being spent on account of contingent charges in improving the open grounds about the Reny Market.

(q) *Public Gardens, roadside trees &c.*—The total cost is Rupees 313-4-11 and the increase is slight and is due to more plants being purchased for the Budhwar Garden.

(r) *Measures against Cholera.*—The total expenditure on this head is Rupees 4,757-5-2. This includes the cost of fumigation by means of cowdung cakes, dammar and sulphur; special disinfection by means of powder and phenyle and other disinfectants; and the pay of special cholera doctors and their assistants. Whenever cholera breaks out in the City, the Municipality engages special Medical practitioners, in addition to the men in charge of the Municipal Dispensaries, whose duty it is to treat cholera patients. This year the Committee had the services of experienced Hospital Assistants placed at its disposal by Government on payment of salaries and allowances. The decrease which is very small does not require to be explained.

(s). *Public Instruction.* The total expenditure on Public Instruction in the year 1888-89 amounts to Rupees 21,735-11-8 exceeding the last year's outlay by Rupees 2992,10-9. The number of boys' schools remained the same but that of the girls' schools, is increased by one, a new school being opened for Hindustani girls for whom there was no special provision made. The night schools are as before 8. The increase of Rupees 65-2-6 in the salary paid to the School Board clerk &c. is due to his being in employ for a few months only in 1887-88. The owners of two school houses have increased the rate of rent paid to them hitherto. Repairs to furniture and books and school houses have

cost Rupees 425-0-10, against Rupees 41-0-5, spent in 1887-88. Two school houses have been thoroughly repaired at a cost of Rupees 305. In the year under report the Municipality made grants in aid to indigenous schools to the amount of Rupees 1769 6-0 while in 1887-88 they amounted to only Rupees 678-11-5. Out of 63 indigenous schools in the City not less than 44 received Municipal help. The four Hindustani schools in Raste's, Vetal, Ganesh and Rawiwar Peth and one Marathi school in Raste's Peth received monthly grants of Rs. 60 four receiving Rs. 10, and one Rs. 20 according to their importance. The rest received them in lump sums once in a year.—(vide Appendix P.)

A grant of Rupees 150 has been made to Ornella's school. The Deccan Maratha Association has also a grant of Rupees 300 voted to it in aid to the education of Marathas and the backward classes. The Poona City Exhibition was also helped by the Municipality with a sum of Rupees 500. An additional grant of Rupees 120 has also been made to the primary school attached to the Female High School. It will thus appear that new grants amounting to Rupees 1,070 have been made this year in addition to those made in 1887-88. In other items there are also small fluctuations but they require no explanation. The Municipality has adopted a scheme, costing annually Rupees 3,000, for Technical Education, prepared by Professor J. Scorgie in consultation with the Board; and special classes for special branches will be shortly opened. This is however a subject for the current year's report but deserves a passing notice.

(t). *Public Works Establishment &c.*—The Establishment charges show an increase of Rupees 155-7-3 which is principally due to an annual increment of Rupees 10, sanctioned to the Engineer's salary, which rises from Rs. 100 to Rs. 150

(u). *Road Repairs.* This year the Municipality has spent an unusually large amount on repairing the roads in the City. With 122,869 and 62,282 cubic feet of soft and hard metal, more than 8 miles of roads have been repaired. Public lanes have also been kept in good condition with murum and sand.

(v). *Other New Works*—Amongst new works executed at a cost of Rs. 5,710-6-5 as shown in the foregoing table, has to be mentioned the Halalcore Bridge in Mangalwar which is widened by 12 feet with an expenditure of Rupees 3,153-10-4. A New Octroi Toll-house at Nawipeth and an office at the weighing station near the Stores have been built, at a cost of Rs. 646-13-11. In the current year also there is provision made for more toll-houses. Prickly pear plants have also been cut. The Daruwala Bridge in Rastia's Peth has also had provision made for men to get into the Nala by means of stops at a cost of Rupees 553-4-1. New sign-boards have been put up at a cost of Rupees 612-1-9.

(w). *Other repairs.*—The sum of Rupees 4,561-11-6 includes the cost of repairing lanes, Rs. 2,820-6-7, and that of repairing old Nakas and Bridges, Rupees 1,078-8-10. The Cattle Pound near the Faraskhana has cost Rupees 662-12-1 for some additions and alterations.

(x). *Debt and Deposits.*—Show an increase of Rupees 3,409-11-5 due to a larger amount of money being paid off which was again due to more transactions.

(y). *Miscellaneous.*—Miscellaneous includes principally remission of House Tax, Rupees 405-1-1, contribution to Government under the Highway Act, Rupees 2,000, issue of licenses &c. to Hackney Coach drivers, Rs. 718-9-6, killing of stray dogs, Rs. 100-8-0.

Law charges, Rs. 202-3-11, correction of the City Survey Maps and other unimportant items. The decrease of Rupees 179-5-9 which is slight is due to ordinary fluctuations.

(c) Having thus explained the decreases and increases in individual items the following comparative table will help to give at a glance an idea as to how the Municipality made in 1888-89 provision out of funds at its disposal for Public Safety, Health, Instruction, Convenience &c,

IX. *Balance*.—The balance in hand was Rupees 76,694 15-7 on the 1st of April 1888, and Rupees 66,941-5-4 on the 31st March 1889, out of which Rs. 40,000 were deposited in the Bombay Bank at interest.

X. *Dead stock*.—Appendix N, gives information about dead-stock.

XI. *Audit of accounts*.—The Municipal accounts have been duly and properly audited by Messrs. Babaji Khanderao Bopardikar and Moroshwar Sakharam Chitnis, who did the work last year also. They examined in the Municipal Office the account papers from month to month and submitted objection statements for explanation, compliance, or guidance, as was the case. The auditors are appointed anew every year by the Municipality who select good experienced men. They are paid each 25 Rupees per mensem. The present auditors have been elected more than twice.

XII. *Municipal wants*.—Amongst Municipal wants may be mentioned as important ones the following :—

1. Surface drainage.
2. Filter works.
3. Carriage stands.
4. Widening of roads.
5. A general extra-mural slaughter-house.
6. Municipal Offices.

The first four have already engaged the attention of the Municipality. Rao Sahab Bhat has prepared plans and estimates for a surface drainage scheme and filter works,

the estimated cost of both of which being Rupees 11,02,650. They will soon be submitted to Government. In this year the Municipality has provided a carriage stand by taking up, with the permission of Government, a portion of Budhwar Garden where the want of a regular stand was keenly felt. A Sub-Committee was appointed to make proposals for fixing the width of roads for future guidance of house and property owners, and the Committee has almost completed its report. It will be soon placed before the General Body for approval. The want of a Municipal Office and the consequent inconvenience have engaged the attention of the General and the Managing Committee. This as well as other wants will be attended to as funds, on which it must be remembered, there is already a very heavy drain in anticipation, may permit.

General Remarks.—The triennial period, for which the Municipal Commissioners were elected and nominated, expired on the 31st of January 1889. But Government extended, along with that of the several other Municipalities, the period of existence of this body by two months. They accordingly went out of office on the 31st March 1889 and the new Members took office on the 1st of April 1889. Fresh ward and general elections were held on the 21st of February and 1st March 1889 respectively with satisfactory results. Information about the total number of candidates that contested the 20 seats, the successful candidates, the number of votes polled by each, and other necessary particulars, will be found in Appendix Q.

In the year under report the Municipality suffered a heavy loss in the death of Rao Sahab M. M. Kunte, B.A., Head Master of the Local High School and a leading Member of the body. A more learned scholar, a more hard-working and energetic man, a student of greater application and a citizen who evinced greater interest in public matters can hardly be found.

In conclusion the Municipality must place on record their sense of the services of the Members of the Managing Committee, the Market Committee and the School Board and the officers who worked under them.

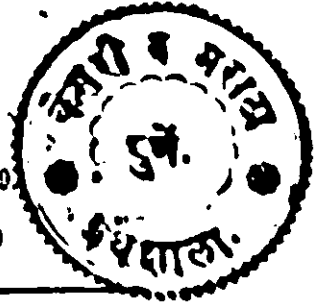

I have the honor to forward the Annual Report and Statements of the Health Department of the Poona City Municipality for the year 1888-89. At the out-set I must mention here that Mr. K. V. Dhurandhar the permanent Health Officer having resigned his appointment I was appointed temporarily and took charge on the 8th December 1888.

During the year 2,760 births were reported, males 1491 females 1269. Their distribution by months and peths will be seen in Appendix A.

Satisfactory inferences cannot be drawn from this return but it may be stated in a general way that fecundity is no evidence of vigor and that viability of offspring is a surer indication. As compared with last year a decrease of 159 is shown.

A proportionate decrease is also shown in the deaths viz. 3153 against 3294 of the previous year. The average is still high and judging from the statements for the past 20 years though low in 1879 viz. 17.0 and very high in 1885 viz. 37.04 shows a varying increase as compared with earlier years.—Appendices B. and D.

Whether this has been effected by improved registration is a question but judging from the Dispensary reports and epidemic returns the average must actually be high.

Poona owing to bad and insufficient drainage, heavy irrigation of Sub and Urban fields, lack of wide thoroughfares and open spaces to serve as lungs in its denser parts and general dirty habits of the people always affording a congenial sphere of action for every disease and epidemic in turn despite the exceptional efforts made to keep the City clean continually and minimise as far as possible their invasion and stay; and from its central situation to the various shrines of repute and consisting mainly of devout and orthodox Hindus affording larger scope for the blessings of the several Deities by the early translation of their worshippers from the scene of their earthly sorrows.

The heavy irrigation however ceases with the year under report to within a mile of the City boundaries. Were a thorough drainage next

secured with a widening of lanes and streets, the running up of air-shafts to every densely packed house, special fresh and clean water bathing places provided and the obnoxious, dirty, and immoral practise of bathing and washing of both sexes and clothing at each "howd" prohibited, larger and double sets of filters for each water supply provided and Grog shops &c. banished not only would the status of the individual be bettered but his health wonderfully improved.

Again the people have a certain perverse orthodoxy on sanitary matters and their education in them can only be effected speedily by repressive measures. Were the breach of Municipal laws dealt with more severely by our Magistrates immediate good results would be evidenced and when the taxpayer is thus compulsorily inducted into the practical details of sanitary science he would also learn to exact other measures for the Public good that lie within his rights as a citizen.

Some standard of cubic areas (per individual) of air should also be adopted and enforced with regard to new buildings, and in the denser parts of the City wide air shafts should be run up through each house to ensure ventilation though where the Wada and Chowk system is adopted this necessity does not exist.

Cholera.

Under God's providence the victims to this plague numbered more than one third less than the preceeding year being 242 as against 365, of whom 117 were males and 125 females. A margin should however be left for cases not properly diagnosed and which received as it were the benefit of the doubt. No efforts were spared by the Municipality with regard to aid to sufferers and suppressive measures by the thorough disinfection of infected localities and the entertainment of a staff of three Medical attendants assisted by two others supplied by Government on application.

As may be seen from Appendix B Rasta & Rawiwar Peths suffered most and equally while next in order come Sukarwar and Bhamburda which has lately been included within Municipal limits. The initial cases invariably occur amongst return pilgrims.—Appendix C.

Smallpox.

Deaths from this cause show high being a total of 303 as against 11 last year. The necessity for a complete system of vaccination is thus apparent. The Municipality has however agreed to make vaccination compulsory which will be done on Government passing a short act.

Fevers.

Still are in the ascendant and the poor City yields her annual holocaust at this shrine this year by an addition to last years numbers of 85. Whether the cessation of heavy irrigation within a mile of the City limits will alone suffice to remedy this evil remains to be seen.

Age.

As in every other clime the greatest mortality occurs up to the fifth year of life. Poona is no exception. Half the number of births are accounted for by death within 10 years nevertheless the fact that there were 441 deaths above 60 years speaks well in favor of the people and their mode of living running the gauntlet as they do from birth between

one fell disease and another. Deaths preponderate however over births by 393.

Caste.

With the Hindoo means status, so it cannot be surprising that the greatest mortality should occur amongst the lower classes whose avocation, means and consequent general indifference to sanitation is proverbial. It is however a matter for supreme satisfaction to be able to say that no Parsies died, but perhaps this is owing to the fact that their numbers are limited to two or three wealthy families who are able to try the effect of a change of climate (vide Appendix E.)

That Mohamedan women die off like sheep is also no wonder. Their close confinement and general exclusion from pure air and sunshine subjecting them and their progeny to a host of constitutional ailments which early marriage completing they seldom reach their prime.

Office.

The office establishment consists of one clerk and peon.

Inspectors.

Though reported on favourably in the last annual, a three months observance was altogether inadequate to form a correct judgement on the Bhungy Service. The additional aid was necessary, but the division was a mistake, the mucedums and Bhungees being thus deprived of constant intelligent and responsible supervision; one man being altogether inadequate for the purpose. On the other hand the same difficulty was apparently experienced with the sweeping staff and other aid had to be summoned from other establishments to assist generally.

Bhungees.

The Bhungees are I think from what I have seen in my time at present not quite sufficient in numbers. A redistribution now being formulated will equalize duty as some changes have occurred since last year. The greatest want felt just now is separate men to attend to the fouling of road and bye ways, the new latrines having nearly exhausted them. With the erection of newer latrines now in progress additional Bhungees will have to be entertained, however, besides a regular number of road cleaners. But this must depend on the number of new privies and latrines.

Sweepers.

160 sweepers are insufficient for the City. More should be early entertained Bhamboora is served by a separate establishment of its own.

- 1 Inspector
- 1 Mucedum
- 6 Sweepers
- 5 Bhungees

The number of sweepers must be increased. This is a new addition to the City and will soon meet with all the attention it demands.

Night soil.

To say that so many tons of Nightsoil were removed from the City is wide of the actual requirement, weight or quantity being easily increased or decreased by accident but this is certain every effort is made to remove all the daily collection constantly and thoroughly.

Latrines.

Wherever the want is felt new latrines are being erected.

City-privies.

Many have been demolished and the process continues.

Iron receptacles would be far superior to the time honoured and inefficient basket and withal more cleanly and presentable whereas their effectiveness with regard to a more complete removal of Night soil and washings needs no demonstration.

Nightsoil carts.

On the average 63 are in daily use.

Rubbish carts.

These remain the same as before. Some new ones required to replace the old extra carriage. The work of removing Kutchra being now however done by contractors no inconvenience is at present felt.

Dust bins.

The inhabitants are difficult to convince that these receptacles are intended for use and not for ornament as they religiously avoid throwing their waste into them but prefer doing so within a distance of 20 or 50 feet despite threats & prosecutions. A newer and a neater pattern is now issued.

Urinals.

Their total length is on the increase. Properly enclosed ones would be an improvement.

Burial grounds.

Continue the same.

Stringent conditions however should be laid on the use of intern ones and quick lime should be used to cover the bodies.

The sooner they can be closed and laid out as garden plots the better.

City-air spaces.

Such as remain open and belong to the Municipality should not be sold as building plots. The running up of air shafts in every new building in dense localities should be made compulsory and no permission to build be granted without.

Lanes should be widened wherever possible and insisted upon and the structure of new privies be granted only on plots opening into them. The prevalent style of building by road ways is much to be deprecated.

Slaughter yards.

Remain the same.

The project for the construction of a general one is under consideration. A separate one for Beef with market attached is also under consideration for the outskirts of Kasba.

Manure works.

These works attracted the notice of Government owing to the Cantonment authorities prohibiting the passage of manure through their limits. But they are now all that can be expected of them and every effort made to keep them so.

Dispensaries.

These useful institutions cannot be sufficiently commended. They ought to be improved. The sick and suffering poor attend them by thousands as may be seen below.

Prevailing diseases.

The prevailing diseases during the year were Fevers, Skin diseases, Diseases of the Respiratory organs, Bowel complaints, and Rheumatic affections.

Prosecutions.

The cases remaining undisposed of from last year were 98.—1081 other cases were sent up during the year.—804 were fined, 167 compromised and 102 cases remain undisposed of.

In this connection it may be mentioned that offenders against Municipal rules especially sanitary ones should be dealt with severely so that the punishment may have a repressive effect.

2 During the year under report there were, under the direct control of the Board, 29 Schools, of which 21 were Boys' Schools, and 8 Girls'. As compared with the previous year this shows an increase of one, the increase being in the number of schools for Mahomedan children.

3 The total number under instruction in the boys schools was 1859 and in those of the girls 431, which compared with the number of boys and girls in the respective schools for the previous year shows an increase of 7 pupils in the boys' schools and of 63 in the girls'.

4 The total income from fees during the year under report was Rs. 4,074-4-0 (Vide appendix A) which is about a hundred Rupees less than in the previous year. This small decrease in fees is due to ordinary fluctuations. The other sources of income do not show any material change and therefore require no remark.

The income from the garden land attached to the Free School in Nana's Peth shows an increase of about 450 Rupees, which is due to an abnormal cause, namely, the tenant increased it at the auction sale to avoid loss of income from his standing crop of sugarcane, which he had put down, although he had full knowledge that his period of tenancy would expire before the crop could be disposed of. The total expenditure to the Municipality on account of these schools was Rs. 15,119-5-2, while that during the last year was Rs. 14,277-2-0 as per appendix B.

5 As usual, the schools were inspected by the Deputy Educational Inspector and his Assistants. The results, it appears, were not as satisfactory as could have been wished, and the Board therefore took steps to ascertain from the Head Masters the causes of the unfavourable results, and measures were adopted to improve the schools and to insure better results during the current year. It may be mentioned on the other hand that a student (Datar) from School No. 7 won one of the middle class school scholarships tenable for three years and schools Nos. 1 and 2 pass annually some pupils in the Public service examination.

6 Before the close of the next official year the five years' period of contract with Government for the administration of the schools will expire, and the Board has therefore embraced the opportunity of ascertaining what progress the Municipality has been able to make during the past five years in spreading primary education in the City, a step as necessary in the interests of the Department as that of the Municipality. From the information herein supplied, the Municipality will, it is hoped, have reason to congratulate themselves on the success, attending the experiment which Government wanted to try in handing over their schools to the Municipality. Beginning with the number of departmental schools in the City, it will be seen that whereas there were only 15 schools for boys and girls in the City on the 1st of December 1884, the number has now increased to 29. The increase has been steady, inasmuch as there was an additional school opened almost each year.

7 Out of the 15 schools handed over to the Municipality 10 were for boys and 5 for girls. There was no school for the artizan classes. During the five years administration, the number of schools for boys has increased from 10 to 21 and that of girls from 5 to 8. The salary of all the mistresses have been increased to Rs. 15 in the year under report. Under the number of Schools for boys are included the 8 night schools which are for the benefit of those who on account of their occupations cannot themselves attend, nor let their sons attend the day schools.

8 The total number of boys in the departmental schools in 1884 was 1656 which has now increased to 1389, and it is expected that this number

will be further increased as the efficiency of our Schools improves. A similar increase is observed in the number of girls attending the primary schools. In 1354 it was 281 which has now advanced to 431. Bearing in mind the circumstances that the education of Girls for various reasons is not yet favourably received by the public, the increase of 200 pupils in the girls schools is certainly very creditable to the Administration. There are still parts of the City where girls' schools would be very acceptable but there are at present difficulties in the way of starting new schools which, it is hoped, will be soon overcome.

9 In looking to the castes of the 2370 pupils attending Municipal schools, it will be observed with pleasure that the primary education has extended to all the classes of the communities. On the 31st of March 1354, the year in which the schools were transferred to the Municipality, and on the 31st of March 1339, the year under report, there were in the different schools pupils as below;—

10 From the figures given above, it will be seen that there has been an increase in the number of pupils of each caste with the exception of Brahmins. The increase in the number of pupils of all the backward classes has however been very marked. The number under other Hindus has increased 75 per cent. The increase in the number of Mahomedan boys has been nearly three-fold. The pupils of the Mahar, Mang and other very backward communities has also increased marvellously. It must be mentioned here that the Board has also been helping the education of these classes by other means. They pay an annual grant of Rs. 500 in aid to the Maratha Association, which body takes special interest in the education of Marathas and other backward classes. The attempts to get primary education to reach the ignorant masses has been so far very successful. The success thus achieved increases the responsibility of the Municipality and it is satisfactory to find that the body is quite alive to this fact. The Board will not be far wrong if they, by anticipation, here make reference to one or two events which properly belong to the year 1339-90 in the history of primary education in the City. Steps are being taken to establish a

school for the Bhangis in the Bhangiwada, and also to improve the existing schools in Nana's and Mangalwar Peths. The Municipality has already sanctioned the building of a school house for the free school in Mangalwar Peth, so that both the free schools will have their own buildings. The other schools for boys in the City are all in want of good school-houses but the Municipality thought it proper to begin with those that wanted them most. The item however properly refers to the report of the next year and can not be dwelt upon in this report.

11 The particulars about the castes of female pupils in the Municipal schools are equally creditable. When the schools were transferred to the Municipality the number of Girls' schools was very small. Most of them were situated in localities inhabited by the advanced classes. There was no school for Mahomedan girls. These and similar shortcomings were noticed and steps were taken to remove them as far as it was practicable. The first Girls' school opened by the Municipality was near Tulsibag, where from the nature of the surrounding population a Girls' school was a very great necessity. The second Girls' school started by the Municipality was in Ganesh Peth, where the population is mostly non-Brahmin. The third Girls' school was started for the Mahomedans in Kasba Peth and from the attendance in that school, it appears, that the opening of that school was a step in the right direction.

12 Municipal schools are opened to all classes of the community, but by a natural arrangement, as it were, attendance of pupils from one community so far preponderates in particular schools that they can well be classified under different nationalities. The following table gives the number of schools of each denomination for the official years 1933-34 and 1933-39.

13 The following table of the income and expenditure of the Municipality on account of the Educational Department shows that whereas the income has remained almost steady during the last five years the expenditure has increased very considerably

14. Besides Municipal schools, there is the agency of Indigenous schools, which helps in the work of giving primary education to the people of this City. This agency requires to be encouraged and improved, and the Board is now considering how this can best be done. During the last three years a considerable amount of money has been spent by way of grants to the Indigenous schools in the City, but no rules regulating the grants have yet been framed. Perhaps this question shall have to be settled in consultation with the Department. In their Resolution No. 1933, dated 29th October, 1955, Government was pleased to state, on the representation of this Municipality, that they were quite prepared to help Municipal bodies in extending help to Indigenous schools. But no help has actually come; perhaps in arriving at the conditions on which the transferred schools should continue under Municipal management in future, this question will once for all be decided.

15. At present, besides Municipal schools, there are in this city about 68 Indigenous schools, giving instruction to 8355 pupils, out of these 44 schools receive aid from the Municipality. The amount of money spent in aiding these schools during the year under report was Rs. 1769-6-0.

16. Taking the Municipal and Indigenous schools together it would thus appear that the wants of the City, so far as primary education is concerned, are fairly well supplied.

17. In conclusion, during the five years that primary education has become a compulsory duty of the Municipality, several questions have arisen, on the satisfactory solution of which the future of primary education in the City principally depends. The first is whether the Municipality should go on increasing the number of schools, or should endeavour to get the work done through the cheaper agency of Indigenous schools. The second is about the quality of instruction imparted and the method of imparting it. Even now there are complaints that the aim of our present primary instruction is a little too high and that it entails a great loss of energy

and time. Perhaps the introduction of a better system would save both. The kinder garten system has been proposed. This system involves a considerable expenditure at first but finally appears to be more economic ; and the Board wishes to ascertain if a trial cannot be given to the kinder garten system. In case this proposal meets with the approval of Government, the financial responsibilities on account of primary education will have to be re-distributed ; and the time of the renewal of the five years contract will, it is believed, be the time best suited for such admission. The transfer of primary schools to Municipal bodies has been on the whole fruitful in good results, both to Government and to the people ; and with proper encouragement from Government they will yet, it is hoped, be placed on a better and more economic footing.

18. Before concluding I must take this opportunity of expressing my thanks to the members of the School Board for the interest they have taken in their duties in the cause of education in general and particularly that of the backward classes and in female schools.

19. The Board must place on record their sense of the loss sustained by the Municipality, and the Educational Department in particular, by the almost sudden death of Rao Sahab M. M. Kunte, whose ability, industry and energy were, to say the least, wonderful, and some time must pass before a citizen is found who can fill up his place.

20. The Board must express their satisfaction with the manner and zeal with which the school Board clerk Mr. K. S. Mokasi has been discharging his duties.

SIR

With reference to your letter No. 5,871, dated the 11th September 1888, I have the honor to report that the ward and general elections took place on the 21st February and 1st March 1889 and the results were declared in Special Meetings of Commissioners held on the 23rd ultimo and 2nd instant respectively.

2. Appendix A. to this letter gives the names with stations in life of the candidates who polled the highest number of votes at the several ward and general elections and were declared to be elected.

3. Of the 20 elected members 12 are by cast Brahmins, one Shimpli, one Maratha, two Marwadis, one Guzar, one Parbhu, and two Mudliars, and by profession 5 are Sawkars, four Pleaders, two Sirdars, two School Masters, one Pensioner, two Government servants, three land lords and one journalist. Of these, 11 have been already on the Board and with the exception of Rao Saheb S. H. Chiploukar who was a nominated member all have been elected members.

4. A reference to appendices B. & C. will show that there were 7,232 voters on the revised list for ward elections and 1,162 on those for the general elections. Of these 3,431 came to the Poll in the several wards and 726 at the General elections; thus on an average 47 per cent voted at the ward and 62 at the General elections. If the number of voters who were absent from Poona or who could not go to the Poll for unavoidable reasons (and who cannot be less than 15 or 20 per cent) were deducted from the total number of voters the percentage of voters who exercised their privilege would be very satisfactory. One who visited the town and the several polling stations on the days of elections could not but be struck with the great enthusiasm that prevailed every where and must be convinced of the fact that the boon of the elective franchise granted to the people of Poona has been well appreciated and that exertions are always being made to deserve the special concessions made by Government to the City of Poona in particular.
